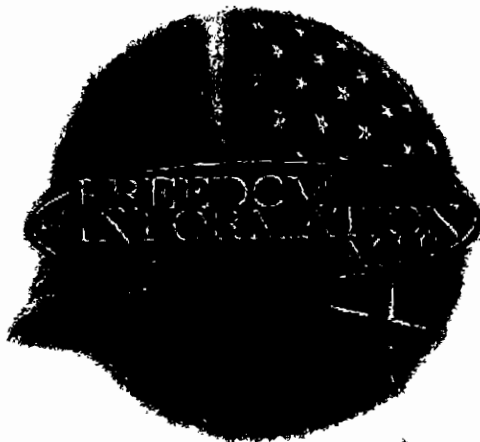

The CAMBELLS stated the WIDMAYERS were excellent people in every respect and could be considered as their favorite tenants. They stated that the WIDMAYERS had no particular outside interests, but were a quiet "home type" people, who had no children, paid \$47.50 per month rent, did little entertaining and could be considered as very conservative people. Mrs. CAMBELL stated that she was quite friendly with Mrs. WIDMAYER whom she characterized as a somewhat reserved person who was ambitious for she and her husband to save money and eventually own their own home. Mrs. CAMBELL did not recollect any signs of radical thought or comment in Mrs. WIDMAYER and stated that she probably would know if there were any inasmuch as Mrs. WIDMAYER and her husband appeared to be very

read, intelligent people who constantly commented concerning present events and had there been anything strange or radical said she would probably have remembered it. She stated she has been watching the family closely because Mrs. CAMPBELL and her husband, who is assistant pastor of the Unitarian Church in North Hollywood, were anxious to get Mr. and Mrs. WIDMAYER out of their church group and away from the Unitarian Church, which she believed she now attended.

Interview was had with Mrs. EDNA DICKERSON, next door neighbor at 10937 Landale, who stated that she and her husband spent a good deal of social time with Mrs. WIDMAYER and her husband. She stated that the WIDMAYERS were a somewhat reserved pair and that actually she knew very little about them. She commented that she knew that Mrs. WIDMAYER had a brother (the applicant) whom she stated had once visited Mrs. WIDMAYER but that she knew absolutely nothing about the family or the applicant's employment and further that Mrs. WIDMAYER had never told her anything concerning the family beyond the fact that during the War Mrs. WIDMAYER's husband, WILLIAM, was a photographer in the Army with Lord LOUIS MOUNTBATTEN. According to Mrs. DICKERSON, Mr. WIDMAYER had received some sort of a letter of citation for his work with MOUNTBATTEN.

Mrs. DICKERSON was led to comment concerning Mr. WIDMAYER's employment with M-G-M Studios as a cameraman as to her recollection of Mr. WIDMAYER's opinion as to the present strike going on in the motion picture studios under union leadership. She stated that Mr. WIDMAYER seldom commented about the situation, but that she remembered that he thought that while the unions were a good thing that the present activity of the unions was disgusting and that he thought that the present practice of the union would eventually lead to its cutting its own throat.

Mrs. DICKERSON commented that both of the WIDMAYERS were well balanced people and although well read and talked considerably concerning current events did not evidence any radical tendencies, but were just good people. She stated that the WIDMAYERS took an occasional social trip at their home, but that she had in the more than a year's acquaintance with them never seen them other than perfectly normal in every respect.

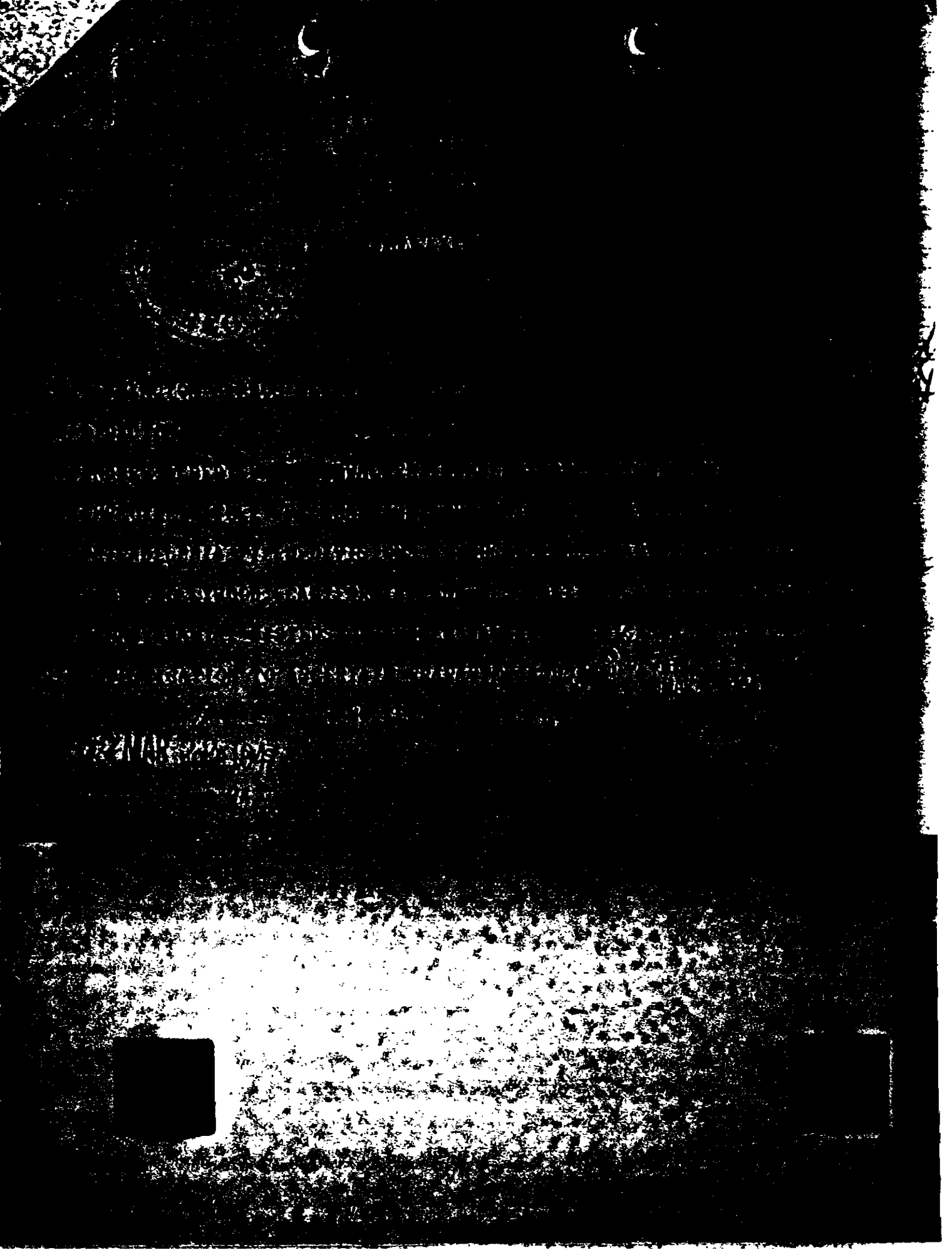

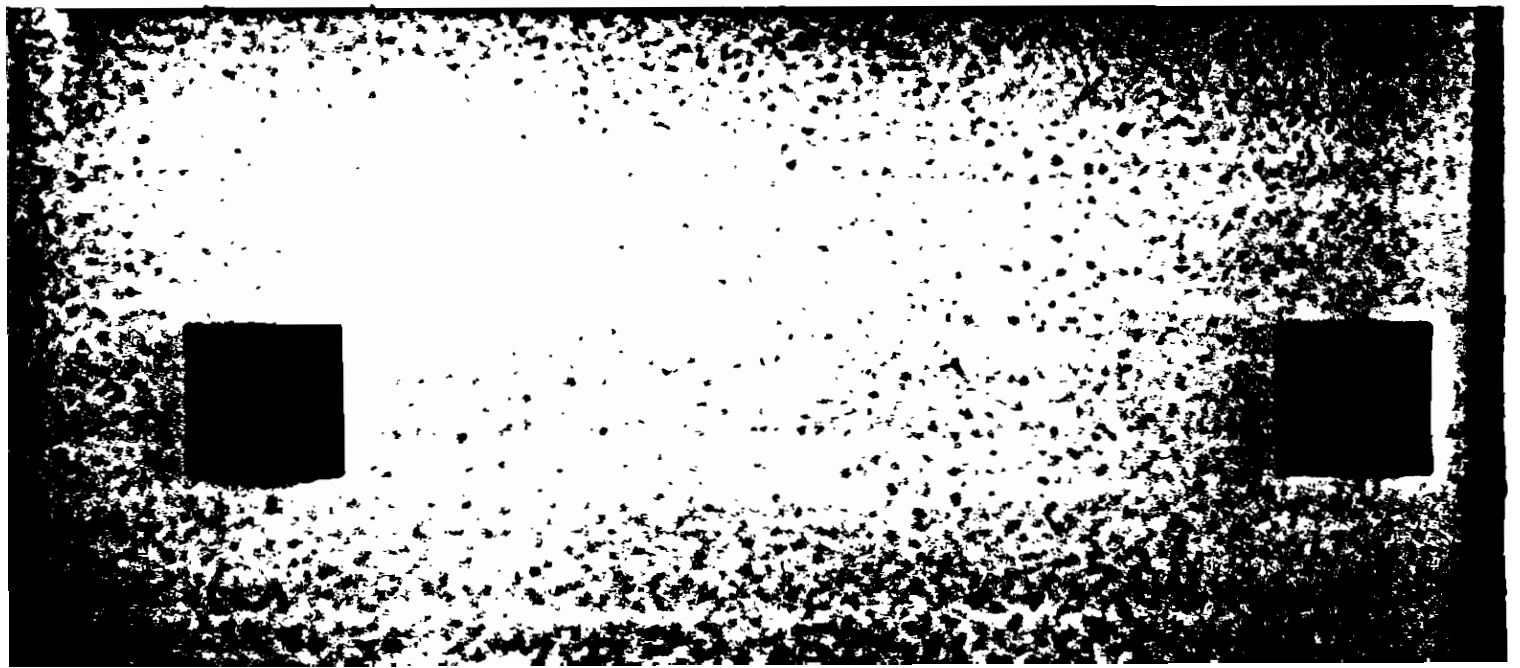
