The "New York Herald Tribune" issue of August 14, 1963, page 7, column 1, contains an article captioned "Thurmond Assails A Leader of Herch". The article stated that, in answer to charges by Senator Strom Thurmond, Bayard Bustin admitted joining the Young Communist League (YCL) in 1936. Rustin also reportedly stated that he broke completely with the YCL in June, 1941.

The YCL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker", issue of February 25, 1957, page 1, column 1, contained an article which stated that Bayard Rustin, Executive Secretary, War Resisters League, was one of eight non-communist observers at the Communist Party National Convention in 1957.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958.

NEW YORK COUNCIL TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

On March 9, 1961, a source advised that the New York Council To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAUAC), 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was formed at a meeting held in New York City on November 17, 1960. This organization was rounded principally through the efforts of FRANK WILKINSON, Field Representative of the National Committee To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

A second source advised on September 17, 1952, that FRANK WILKINSON was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952.

A third source furnished on September 14, 1961, a copy of resolutions of the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) which were adopted by the NYCAHUAC. The such resolution affirmed the intention to continue to work for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and to continue its efforts to broaden the participation in this fight. Another resolution accepted as a modus vivendi the suggestion of the Field Representative of the "National Committee to Abolish the HCUA" (NCAHUAC) namely that local abolition committees may identify and co-ordinate their efforts as closely as they desire with NCAHUAC, still maintaining their autonomy for as flexible and independent a program as possible.

Various sources have advised during March, 1962, that Communist Party (CP) members in the New York City area have been solicited to support activities of the NYCAHUAC during attendance at CP club meetings.

On May 6, 1963, the first source advised that the NYCAHUAC continues to function from its office at 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York.

All sources have furnished rolls lo information in the past.

On January 19, 1964, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished information that on that date Bayard Rustin stated Martin Luther King wants him (Rustin) to come to a three day conference which King is holding in North Carolina.—Rustin also stated that King told Rustin also mentioned that this conference would "bring 25 key people together."

On January 20, 1964, the same source furnished information that Rustin would take a United Airlines Flight from Newark, New Jersey, on January 20, 1964, at 12:30 p.m., and would arrive in Asheville, North Carolina, at 4:29 p.m. He also indicated that on Wednesday (January 22, 1964) he would depart from Asheville at 4:15 p.m. and arrive at Newark at 7:39 p.m.

With respect to the foregoing information, it is to be noted that Martin Luther King is having a "retreat conference" at Black Mountain, North Carolina, starting on January 20, 1964, which is to the ATTENDED DISCOURTED CHISTIANU CHARLES IN CONFERENCE AND STHERS.

On January 19, 1964, the same source furnished information which indicated that Bill Kunstler contacted Rustin on that date. Kunstler said he would like to meet with Rustin, but Rustin explained that he was leaving to spend three days with Martin Luther King. Rustin mentioned that he had been offered a job in the National Association For the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), but he stated that he feels this is just Kunstler agreed that the NAACP wants "to put a blanket" on Rustin. Kunstler stated that both he and Arthur Kinoy would talk to Rustin upon his return from seeing King about the (civil rights) movement.

A conficential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on October 29, 1962, that a rally was held on October 24, 1962, sponsored by the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee at the Manhattan Center, 34th Street and Eighth Avenua, New York City. William Kunstler spoke at the rally and told the audience that the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) interferes with social progress and the brotherhood of man. Kunstler called for the abolition of the HCUA.

Another confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on November 3, 1962, that Kunstler had had the "Daily Worker" delivered to his home in Port Chester, Kew York.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1956.







The January 16, 1964 issue of the "National Guardian," on page 10, contained an announcement to the effect that The Southern Conference Educational Fund (SCEF) "honoring twenty-five years of constructive struggle in the integration movement" was sponsoring an affair on Honday evening, February 3, 1954, commencing at 8:00 p.m. in the Grand Ballroom, Roosevelt Hotel, Madison Avenue at 45th Street, New York City. This announcement further reflected that the chairman of this affair was to be Dr. Harold Taylor, educator and author, and the honored guest was to be the Reverend Fred L. Shuttlesworth, incoming President of the SCEF. According to this announcement, those scheduled to participate in this affair were Mr. Sam Shirah, Field Representative, Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC); Mr. John R. Salter, Jr., Field Organizer, SCEF; Arthur Kinoy, Esquire, Attorney; and Benjamin E. Smith, Esquire, Attorney. This announcement reflected that refreshments were to be served at 8:00 p.m. and the program was to get underway at 8:30 p.m. announcement also reflected that reservations for this affair at \$2.50 each could be made at the SCEF New York Area Office, 905 St. Mark's Avenue, Brooklyn, New York 11213, telephone number IN 7-1198.


In connection with Dr. Harold Taylor, mentioned above, the following is noted:

On December 14, 1946, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished an announcement that the Committee of Women of the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship (NCASF) was sponsoring a lunch at the Hotel Pierre, New York City, on December 12, 1946. This announcement listed Dr. Harold Taylor, President of Sarah Bawrence College, Bronxville, New York, as one of the scheduled guests and speakers.







On August 30, 1963, a fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that he knows Benjamin J. Davis to be the present National Secretary of the CP, United States of America.

In connection with Benjamin E. Smith, Esquire, mentioned above, the following is noted:

The "Southern Patriot," official publication of the SCEF, in its issue of December, 1953, Volume 21, Number 10, page 2, sets forth a list of officers of the SCEF, and Benjamin E. Smith is listed as Treasurer of the SCEF.

On February 7, 1964, a representative of the Bureau of Special Services (BSS) of the New York-City Police Department (NYCPD) advised that the abovementioned SCEF affair commenced at 8:30 p.m. with the serving of refreshments and the speaking program started at 9:00 p.m. This representative further advised that there were approximately 500 people in attendance at this affair.

On February 4, 1964, a fifth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Dr. Harold Taylor, Chairman of this affair, spoke and told of the background of the SCEF; of the work of the SCEF in the field of civil rights; and of the fact that Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt strongly supported the SCEF during her lifetime and, in general, Dr. Taylor called for support for the SCEF.

This fifth source further advised that John Salter, described as an SCEF Field Organizer, spoke and told of his work in the fight for civil rights in the South and the Southwest. This fifth source stated that Salter said progress was being made and he was sure this progress would continue with the support of persons such as those in attendance. This fifth source further stated that Salter talked further of plans to integrate Roanoke, Virginia and Raleigh, North Carolina.





On February 5, 1964, a sixth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Salter is a college professor. (v.)

The fifth source, previously mentioned, advised that Arthur Kinoy, who was introduced as an attorney at this affair, talked about indictments against Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth and others brought about by Iouisiana authorities and how they would be fought. This fifth source further advised that Kinoy said that there is currently a lull in civil rights activity but that this Summer, when students get out of their respective schools, activities will be greatly increased.

The sixth source, previously mentioned, advised that Kinoy, a lawyer for the SCEF, spoke of current indictments against Jim Dombrowski, Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth and Ben Smith, another lawyer, by the State of Louisiana. This source further advised that Kinoy said the State of Louisiana is indicting SCEF leaders because the SCEF is essentially the same as a prior civil rights organization called the Southern Conference for Human Rights. (V.)

In connection with Jim Dombrowski, mentioned above, the following is noted:

On May 27, 1963, a seventh source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that in the past, he has considered James Dombrowski, Executive Director of the SCEF, to be a Communist, if not an actual CP member, a Communist because he followed Communist principles.

The fifth source, previously mentioned, advised that Sam Shirah, who was introduced at this affair as a Field Representative of SNCC, said "poor whites" should be included in the fight for civil rights. This fifth source further advised that Shirah said SNCC wants an additional sixteen men to do field work in the coming year, and as a result, more money would be needed by SNCC, and he appealed for financial support for SNCC from all present.

The sixth source, previously mentioned, advised that Sam Shirah, a young white man in his 20's, who had just arrived from the South, spoke of plans to incorporate poor whites in the civil rights movement in the South and not restrict the movement to Negroes. This sixth source further advised that Shirah said there is a lull in the civil rights movement at the present time because the students are back in school. This sixth source stated that Shirah said that in the Summer months there will be more and increased activity in the civil rights movement.

The fifth source, previously mentioned, advised that Ben Smith, introduced at this affair as an attorney, spoke briefly and pointed out the great need of the SCEF for money. This fifth source further advised that Smith said the 1963 SCEF budget was \$111,000. This fifth source stated that Smith passed out envelopes and requested that generous contributions be made to the SCEF.

The sixth source, previously mentioned, advised that Smith, a lawyer for the SCEF, spoke of the necessity to raise funds for 1964. This sixth source further advised that the 1963 SCEF budget was \$111,000, broken down, approximately, as follows:

Salaries \$25,000

Administration 36,000

Special Projects 50,000

This source stated that Ben Smith started the fund raising for the evening and pledge envelopes were placed on all the tables. This sixth source estimated that about \$15,000 was pledged but no exact figure was announced. This sixth source added that a cash collection was also taken up among the individuals in attendance, but there was no total amount collected announced. W



The fifth source, previously mentioned, advised that the honored guest at this affair was the Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth, who was introduced as the incoming President of the SCEF. This fifth source further advised that Shuttlesworth delivered a very dramatic speech on the subject of civil rights; the work of the SCEF; and the need to support the SCEF and other civil rights groups. This fifth source stated that Shuttlesworth said that after June, when students finish school, activity in the civil rights field will increase considerably.

The representative of the BSS of the NYCPD, mentioned above, advised that this affair terminated at 11:15 p.m., and there were no incidents or disorders of any type at this affair. This representative stated that he is unable to furnishmany information in addition to that set forth above.


The enclosed LHM has been classified "Confidential" because unauthorized disclosure of the information furnished by the second, third, fourth, fifth and seventh sources, could reveal confidential informants of continuing value and impair their future effectiveness, and such impairment could have an adverse effect upon the national defense interests of the United States.

For the information of the Bureau and New Orleans, the enclosed LHM does not contain a characterization of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. (SCEF) inasmuch as the NYO is not in possession of an up-to-date characterization of the SCEF. A rally, to honor twenty-five years of struggle in the integration movement, was held, under the auspices of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, on Monday evening, February 3, 1964, in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Roosevelt, Madison Avenue and Forty-fifth Street, New York City, New York.

The above affair commenced at about 8:55 PM with approximately 500 to 525 persons in attendance. Tickets for the affair were \$2.50.

Refreshments were served from 8:00 PM to the time the program began.

Chairman of the rally was Dr. HAROLD TAYLOR who told of the background of the Southern Conference Educational Fund (SCEF); the work of the group in the field of civil rights; the fact Mrs. FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT strongly supported SCEF during her lifetime and in general called for support for SCEF.

JOHN SALMER, described as a SCEF Field Organizer, spoke and told of his work in the fight for civil rights in both the South and Southwest. He said progress was being made and he was sure this progress would continue with support of persons such as those in attendance. He talked further of plans to integrate Roanoke, Virginia and Raleigh, North Carolina.

ARTHUR KINOY, introduced as an attorney, talked about indictments against Reverend FRED SHUTTLESWORTH and others brought about by Louisiana authorities and how they would be fought. He said that there is currently a lull in civil rights activities but that this summer, when students get out of their respective schools, activities would be greatly increased.

SAM SHIRAH, introduced as a Field Representative of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, said "poor whites" should be included in the fight for civil rights. He said his group wants an additional sixteen men to do field work in the coming year and as a result more money would be needed by the organization. At this point he appealed for financial support from all present.

BEN SMITH, an attorney, spoke briefly and pointed out the great need of SCEF for money. He said the 1963 budget was \$111,000. He passed out envelopes and requested that generous contributions be made to SCEF.

The honored guest and main speaker was the Reverend FRED SHUMPLESWORTH, introduced as the incoming President of SCEF. He delivered a very dramatic speech on the subject of civil rights; the work of SCEF; the need to support SCEF and other civil rights groups and the fact that after June, when students finish school, activity in the civil rights field would increase considerably.







On March 24, 1954, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished information which indicated that Martin Luther King contacted Clarence Jones on that date. King stated that he had been called by Congressman Ryan who wanted him (King) to speak in New York at a dinner honoring Ryan. King said that he was looking for a way to get out of this, and he indicated that he did not want to make people like Pyan, who are really with them, think that we are not with them. King said that he still wanted to maintain his policy of not making political speeches. Jones cited two reasons why King should not speak: first, King's policy against making political speeches; second, the fact that a serious political mistake was made in Ryan's district concerning local politics. Jones explained that Ryan did not have anything to do with this situation, but he said that it took piece in Ryan's district. Jones suggested that King decline the offer to speak but instead send a telegram to be read at the affair suggesting his support for Ryan. 💛



Jones also suggested that King should only participate in politics on a national basis if at all. Jones stated that if the pituation (the campaign for the presidency) gets too close on a national basis King would not have to endorse (President) Johnson, but he could say that he favored one (political) platform over the other.

Jones mid that Rodman Rockefeller (a son of Governor Nelson Rockefeller) told him that he was only able to collect approximately \$10,000 for the overall program and that he expressed his regrets.

Jones told King that he had discussed King's tax problems with Jean Daves (who is the publisher's representative for King's forthcoming book) concerning the royalties which King will receive from all of his books. Jones recommended against the use of a charitable trust. King told Jenes to be prepared to discuss all of the possibilities with him when they meet in Washington, D.C., on March 26, 1964. King stated that his main purpose was not to accumulate a great deal of money for himself and his family but to give the money to worthy causes. Jones urged King to set up a trust for his wife and children, and he advised that no one could criticize him for that.

Jones inquired about how things are going in Washington to which King replied that things were going well. King mentioned that he had spoken to Walter Fauntrcy (Director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLO) bureau in Washington) and that he had advised him (King) to go over to the Senate on Thursday (March 25, 1963, and have Senator Humphrey take him to the family section of the gallery and then make a statement to the press concerning the fact that there will be no compresse on the Civil Rights Fill and that the bill has to be passed. King said that the Southerners (Southern Senators) are now getting "all of the mileage" because they are doing all of the talking.

King mentioned that they would discuss (at their Washington, D.C. meeting on March 26, 1964) mainly their summer program which, he indicated, will involve Alabama. King stated that they would also discuss the fillbuster (which is expected in the Senate regarding the Civil Rights Bill).

Jones and King discussed who King was considering to take Wyatt Walker's position (Executive Director of the SCIC), and Jones suggested C.T. Vivian (Director of Affiliates of the SCIC). King said that he thought Vivian would do a better job where he is. According to King, he has two people in mind for the job, and he said they are (Walter) Fauntroy from Washington, DC, and Blackwell (phonetic), an attorney, who has been a school teacher and was active in Huntsville, Alabama, in the Direct Action Movement.

Jones asked King about speaking to the Reform Group in Westport, Connecticut, on May 22, 1964, and King replied that he did not want to make a commitment until after the meeting in Washington, because the purpose of the meeting was to set up a time table. King stated he would give an answer on Thursday as to whether he would speak. (V)

Jones advised that he would go to Washington, D.C., either on Wednesday night (March 25, 1964) or on Thursday (March 25, 1964) morning on the early shuttle.

The same confidential source also furnished information that Jack Greenberg (Of the National Advancement of Colored People (NAACF) Legal Deense Fund) contacted Clarence Jones on March 24, 1954. Greenberg stated that he had learned that Bill Kunstler has been saying that he (Kunstler) has been designated by Martin Luther King to represent the civil rights group which is going to Mississippi. Greenberg stated that it is expected that some members of

this group will be arrested, and that Kunstler will handle the cases when they go to court. Jones made it known that King never told Kunstler to represent this group, and he remarked that "Kunstler quite frequently lies about being in privity with King". Greenberg remarked that Kunster and (Arthur) Kinoy have tried to "invade" the Congress of Racial Equality (CCRE) and the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee without much success and are now directing their efforts toward this group.

It is to be noted that plans have been made to organize approximately 1500 white students from the North to go to Mississippi during the summer to run "freedom schools" and generally protest against the conditions concerning the Negro in Mississippi.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in November, 1947, advised that C.T. Vivian was a member of the Community Section, of the Communist Party in Peoria, Illinois. On June 24, 1948, this source advised that C.T. Vivian had not been active in Communist Party affairs in the Peoria area for time and advised he had not been in the area for a long period of time. (w)



NEW YORK COUNCIL TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

On March 9, 1961, a source advised that the New York Council To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAUAC), 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was formed at a meeting held in New York City on November 17, 1960. This organization was founded principally through the efforts of FRANK WILKINSON, Field Representative of the National Committee To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

A second source advised on September 17, 1952, that FRANK WILKINSON was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952.

A third source furnished on September 14, 1961, a copy of resolutions of the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) which were adopted by the NYCAHUAC. One such resolution affirmed the intention to continue to work for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and to continue its efforts to broaden the participation in this fight. Another resolution accepted as a modus vivendi the suggestion of the Field Representative of the "National Committee to Abolich the HCUA" (NCAHUAC) namely that local abolition committees may identify and co-ordinate their efforts as closely as they desire with NCAHUAC, still maintaining their autonomy for as flexible and independent a program as possible.

Various sources have advised during March, 1962, that Communist Party (CP) members in the New York City area have been solicited to support activities of the NYCAHUAC during attendance at CP club meetings.

On May 6, 1963, the first source advised that the NYCAHUAC continues to function from its office at 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York.



With respect to Congressman RYAN mentioned in the LHM, it is to be noted that US Representative WILLHAM F. RYAN is a Congressman from NY.

With respect to the mistake made in local politics in Congressman RYAN's district, JONES mentioned that the mistake was attempting to run RALPH ELLISON for the State Senate. It is to be noted that NOEL A. ELLISON was on the ballot for the office of State Senator in New York, but was ruled off the ballot by a court decision in 1/54. It was made public that he had three convictions in garbling charges. A charge of irregularities at the nomination meeting had been aimed at ELLISON.

This LHM has been classified "Salvet" because it contains information from NT 4092-3\*. This solute has furnished highly sensitive information with respect to the racial situation in the NY area and the Communist infiltration thereof, and it is felt that this classification is necessary in order not to jeopardize the valuable position of the informant in furnishing information of this nature.

"The morning session of the national meeting was held as scheduled. Fred Samuelson and Alice Trigg of the Washington Area Committee for the Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee (WACAHUAC) were stationed at the door and collected \$8 from each person who entered. This money is to be used to finance luncheons on 3/14 and 15/64, and the dinner to be held at the Hays' residence on 3/14/64.

"Approximately 70 to 75 people were present at this first

session, including:





"Harvey O'Connor was the Chairman of the first session, and the first speaker was Donna Allen, who reviewed the record of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) for the past five years. She also reviewed abolition work during this period. Allen said many of the Representatives are afraid to take a chance by going on record against the HCUA because this is an election year. She stated that many Representatives feel that HCUA is not carrying out its original mandate, but, rather, is going beyond it. She said that many of these Congressmen want to keep clear of an abolition position, and added that 'we' have to protect these individuals who are sympathetic with abolition by not attacking them. She said there are a 'good number' of Congressmen against HCUA. In a discussion following Allen's speech Frank Wilkinson stated that last year there were 80 members of the House in favor of abolition of HCUA, and were prepared to vote against it. He added that there is currently a group of five Congressmen who have prepared a five page petition against HCUA. This petition has 19 signatures on it, and 25 are needed to bring it out of committee. He said he has a copy of this petition.

"The next speaker was Anne Braden. Hen theme was that the HCUA is the cause of integration not working in the South because of its 'red baiting.' She stated that 'little HUCA' committees have been set up in southern states which are fed material by the HCUA, and that liberals in the South are attacked as communists. This scares people away from working for integration. Braden put over the idea that civil rights are synomonous with civil liberties, and said that the 'civil rights people' have to make up their minds to assist the 'civil liberties people' by giving them the necessary weapons to carry on the fight. These weapons are in the form of support of the civil liberties position and funds. Braden also said that her pamphlet 'HUAC, Bulwark of Segregation' is almost ready for the printers, and will be distributed in the near future.

The next speaker was Arthur Kinoy, an attorney, who spoke on the raid on the Southern Conference Educational Fund last fall by state authorities in Louisiana. He said this was actually a 'three state conspiracy' against the Negro by what he termed the 'Southern power structure'. Kinoy said the SCEF records were taken into Mississippi in order to avoid a subpoena





by local or state courts in Louisiana, and that they are now in Washington, D.C. Kinoy said this 'southern power structure' goes from state to state in the south to block integration, but added that its time is limited. He added that Senator Eastland of Mississippi is behind most of the anti-integration activity in the South, by his use of the 'little HUAC committees.'

"Lafayette Surner made a short speech concerning the situation in the South. He said he is affiliated with the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and has been working on voter registration in the state of Mississippi. He said that all opposition to integration stems from Senator Eastland, and that it is hard to get Negroes in the South to do any more that to say they would like to vote. He said this reluctance is due to their fear of economic reprisals. He also said that most people working for integration are labeled 'communists.'





#### EMERGENCY CIVIL LIBERTIES COMMITTEE

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee:

"Emergency Civil Liberties Committee

"l. The Emergency Civil Liberties Committee is an organization with headquarters in New York, whose avowed purpose is to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities and discredit the FBI. \* \* \* The committee finds that the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, established in 1951, although representing itself as a non-Communist group, actually operates as a front for the Communist Party. It has repeatedly assisted, by means of funds and legal aid, Communists involved in Smith Act violations and similar legal proceedings. One of its chief activities has been and still is the dissemination of voluminous Communist propaganda material.

FRANK WILKINSON was called as a witness when he appeared in Atlanta as a representative of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee to propagandize against the Committee on Un-American Activities and to protest its hearings. In 1956 WILKINSON was identified as a Communist Party member by a former FBI undercover agent within the party. Summoned at that time to answer the allegation, his reply to all questions was, "I am answering no questions of this committee." This also became his stock reply to questions when he appeared during the Atlanta hearings. \* \* \* WILKINSON has since been convicted of contempt of Congress and sentenced to one year in jail.'





"Cited as a 'new organization' set up in the summer of 1960 to lead and direct the Communist Party's 'Operation Abolition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as Communists.

A source has advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee.

NEW YORK COUNCIL TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

On March 9, 1961, a source advised that the New York Council To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAUAC), 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was formed at a meeting held in New York City on November 17, 1960. This organization was founded principally through the efforts of FRANK WILKINSON, Field Representative of the National Committee To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

A second source advised on September 17, 1952, that FRANK WILKINSON was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952.

A third source furnished on September 14, 1961, a copy of resolutions of the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) which were adopted by the NYCAHUAC. One such resolution affirmed the intention to continue to work for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and to continue its efforts to broaden the participation in this fight. Another resolution accepted as a modus vivendi the suggestion of the Field Representative of the "National abolition committees may identify and co-ordinate their efforts as closely as they desire with NCAHUAC, still maintaining their autonomy for as flexible and independent a program as possible.

Various sources have advised during March, 1962, that Communist Party (CP) members in the New York City area have been solicited to support activities of the NYCAHUAC during attendance at CP club meetings.

On May 6, 1963, the first source advised that the NYCAHUAC continues to function from its office at 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York.

#### NEW YORK SCHOOL FOR MARXIST STUDIES

the People's School for Marxist Studies was founded in September, 1960, as the result of a decision of the CPUSA, NYD. Adult classes were scheduled to start October 17, 1960.

"The Worker" of October 16, 1950, announced the opening of the New York School for Marxist Studies (NYSMS) with general classes beginning October 17, 1960, and Student Committee On Progressive Education (SCOPE) (Youth) Classes beginning October 14, 1960. The address of the School is Room 1922, 853 Broadway at 14th Street, New York, New York.

The records of Pearce Mayer and Greer, 41 East 42nd Street, New York City, reflect that on August 29, 1960, HERBERT APTHEKER leased Room 1922-23, 863 Broadway, New York City, for the period starting October 1, 1960. The premises were to be occupied by a "People's School." On July 3, 1962, HERBERT APTHEKER signed a new lease for Room 1922-23, 853 Broadway, New York City, to start October 1, 1962, which reflects that the premises were to be used as an office for the NYSMS.

During April and May, 1963, a second source furnished information that the NYSIS was then in operation at 853 Broadway, New York, New York.


The Spring Term, 1963 Bulletin of the NYSMS reflects Dr. HERBERT APTHERER as the Director of the School.

A third source advised on December 14, 1959, that at the 17th National Convention of the CPUSA, held December 10-13, 1959, HERBERT APTHEKER was elected a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.

The May, 1963, issue of "Political Affairs," self-described as the theoretical organ of the CPUSA, reflects that HERBERT APTHEKER has been replaced as editor of that publication after holding this position for several years.

STUDENT COMMITTEE ON PROGRESSIVE EDUCATION (SCOPE)

A confidential source advised on June 16, 1958, that the Student Committee on Progressive Education (SCOPE) was formed in early 1958, by a group of individuals who were believed to be, by the source, sympathizers of the former Labor Youth League (LYL).

The LYL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A second confidential source advised on November 20, 1958, that at the third day's session of the National Executive Committee (NEC), Communist Party, United States of America (CPUSA), held that day in New York City, ROBERT THOMPSON, Executive Secretary, CPUSA, stated that in New York there is a group of about 21 youths who have been a very active force in youth and formed a group called SCOPE, a Student Committee on Progressive Education, which has run for the last year with young people with a Marxist character. THOMPSON stated that approximately 8 or 10 of this group are CP members.

most of the discussions on youth are between the National Office (CP) and two groups of young people who function in New York which are either Party groups or pro-Party groups. The first group is called SCOPE (Student Committee on Progressive Education) and this group stands closest to the CP leadership


A fourth confidential source made available on March 23, 1961, a mimeographed letter signed by "The SCOPE Committee." This letter sets forth that last fall SCOPE became a part of the newly formed New York School for Marxist Studies (NYSMS) as its autonomous youth division.

The Spring Term 1963 Bulletin of the NYSMS states that SCOPE is trying to provide conditions in which youth can broaden their knowledge and improve their understanding of this changing, perplexing, and exciting age. The goal of SCOPE is "to provide a unique opportunity for the study and discussion of Marxism."

On May 17, 1963, the fourth source advised that SCOPE continues to share the office space in Room 1922, 853 Broadway, New York City, with the NYSMS.

The organization has 'headquarters in Room 201, 421 Seventh Avenue, New York.'
'The committee \* \* \* found significant the fact that the organization occupies the same rooms and uses the same staff as the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, the principal aim of which is to abolish this committee and discredit the FBI.'

'This organization has since changed its name to "Youth to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee" and, more recently, to "Youth to Abolish Un-American Committees." (Committee on Un-American Activities, Annual Report for 1960, House Report 2237. January 2, 1961, pp. 51 and 15, fn.)"





The first confidential source learned on July 4, 1964, that a meeting was to be held on Tuesday night, July 7, 1964, at the Temple Beth El in New Rochelle, at 8:00 p.m. According to the source, Nat Schwerner described Ossie Davis as the Frogram Committee Chairman, and Samson Gordon as the Organizing Chairman.

The source further advised on July 4, 1964, that Nat Schwerner told Ossie Davis that he felt that Davis should chair the meeting on July 7, 1964, and that a member of the Student Non-Vielant Co-ordinating (Commutives (COC) strong make the collection speech. Davis agreed to this arrangement.

### Ossie Davis

The first confidential source advised on July 2, 1964, that according to Anne Schwerner, the meeting was being conducted by the Citizens For Human Rights in New Rochelle, New York, and was set up by friends of hers because of what had happened to her son, Mickey Schwerner, to raise money to let people know what is going on in Mississippi and what they can do to protect the other workers there. She said that the money was for COFO to be used for bail money.

On July 4, 1964, the first confidential source learned that Milton Heimlich and Nat. Schwerner had discussed the forthcoming New Rochelle, New York, Tuesday night, July 7th meeting. Nat Schwerner stated that he had been in close contact with SNCC concerning the meeting and that a nationally known mamber of the organization would appear to make an appeal. Milton Meimlich told Schwerner that he had been in touch with Catholic dioceses in New York and New Rochelle, and that they would support it with contributions. According to the source, Schwerner requested Heimlich to look into the matter of trucking food and books to Jackson, Mississippi.





Friedlander wanted Nat Schwerner and his family to come and listen and Schwerner told her that he would let her know if he could attend.

Friedlander also stated that there would be a meeting of about 100 people which would be held at 8:30 p.m. on July 23, 1964, at 444 Central Park West, to raise money.

The source further advised on July 13, 1964, that on that date, Mat Schwerner was in contact with William Kunstler who said he had been in Mississippi where he met with James Formen, head of SNGC and Robert Moses, who is the Director of the COFO Project in Mississippi. The 2 of them decided that all checks received abould go to COFO in Jackson, Mississippi, and that checks should be made out to the kegal coordinator of COFO in order to show that it is going to legal defense and, therefore, will be tax exempt. Kunstler pointed out that there is \$1700 on deposit for COFO in Jackson, Mississippi.

Hilda stated that she had formed a committee to solicit donations and Schwerner told her there would be no trouble with Internal Revenue, that people should make their checks payable to the First Unitarian Church of New Orleans. White was instructed to open a temporary account to deposit the checks and then to send the entire proceeds to Kunstler, Kunstler and Kinoy, attorneys at 511 5th Avenue, New York City.

Hilda White nee Crystal aka Hilda Brown

A confidential source on October 9, 1947, made available a list of 14 section organizers and organizational secretaries of the CP. The name of Hilda Brown, 854 West 180th Street, was listed as organizational secretary of the Washington Heights section.

## EMERGENCY CIVIL LIBERTIES COMMITTEE

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee:

"Emergency Civil Liberties Committee

"l. 'The Emergency Civil Liberties Committee is an organization with headquarters in New York, whose avowed purpose is to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities and discredit the FBI. \* \* \* The committee finds that the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, established in 1951, although representing itself as a non-Communist group, actually operates as a front for the Communist Party. It has repeatedly assisted, by means of funds and legal aid, Communists involved in Smith Act violations and similar legal proceedings. One of its chief activities has been and still is the dissemination of voluminous Communist propaganda material.

\*FRANK WILKINSON was called as a witness when he appeared in Atlanta as a representative of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee to propagandize against the Committee on Un-American Activities and to protest its hearings. In 1956 WILKINSON was identified as a Communist Party member by a former FBI undercover agent within the party. Summoned at that time to answer the allegation, his reply to all questions was, "I am answering no questions of this committee." This also became his stock reply to questions when he appeared during the Atlanta hearings. \* \* \* WILKINSON has since been convicted of contempt of Congress and sentenced to one year in jail. ### EMERGENCY CIVIL LIBERTIES COMMITTEE

Disputing the non-Communist claim of the organization, the committee finds that a number of other individuals connected with the ECLC also have been identified under oath as Communists.

(Committee on Un-American Activities, Annual Report for 1958, House Report 187, March 9, 1959, pp. 34 and 35.)

To defend the cases of Communist law-breakers, fronts have been devised; making special appeals in behalf of civil liberties and reaching out far beyond the confines of the Communist Party itself. Among these organizations are the \* \* \* Emergency Civil Liberties Committee. When the Communist Party itself is under fire these fronts offer a bulwark of protection.'
(Internal Security Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Handbook for Americans, S. Doc. 117, April 23, 1956, p. 91.)"

# FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contained a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening In Cuba," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FFCC in New York City and declared the FFCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1951, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TARER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TARER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the aforementioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the FPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist Workers Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the FPCC and thereby influence FPCC policy. This source added that during the past year there had been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and other organizations in the FPCC so that their influence as of May, 1963, was negligible.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 20, 1963, a second source advised that VINCENT "TED" IZE, FPCC National Office Director, was then formulating FPCC policy and had indicated that he had no intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. This source stated that LEE believed that the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and should support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations. LEE did not advocate supporting the Cuban revolution per se.

## FAIR PLAY FOR CURA COMMITTEE

The November 23, 1963, edition of "The New York Times" reported that Senator THOMAS J. DODD of Connecticut had called FPCC "the chief public relations instrument of the CASTRO network in the United States." It is to be noted that Senator DODD was a member of the Senate Internal Security Succommittee which twice conducted hearings on the FPCC.

World Telegram and Sun newspaper stated that the pro-CASTRO FPCO was socking to go out of business and that iss prime activity during its lifetime had been sponsorship of pro-CASTRO street rallies and mass picket lines, and the direction of an active propaganda mill highlighting illegal travel-to-Cuba campaigns. Its comparatively brief span of life was attributed to mounting anti-CASTRO American public opinion, the 1952 Congressional hearings which discapped FPCO financing by CASTRO's United Nations Delegation, and alternately, the bad publicity which the FFCC received from Alcolonary of activities on its behalf by suspected presidential assassin, LES H. OSWALD.

On February 6, 1964, the previously mentioned second source advised that V. T. LEE had recently remarked that the FPCC was dead and that there were no plans to organize another similar organization.

On April 13, 1964, a third source advised that there had not been any FFGC activity in many months and that the FPCC had been dissolved.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the National Lawyers Guild:

#### "National Lawyers Guild

- "1. Cited as a Communist front. (Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1311 on the CIO Political Action Committee, March 29, 1944, p. 149.)
- "2. Cited as a Communist front which 'is the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party, its front organizations, and controlled unions' and which 'since its inception has never failed to rally to the legal defense of the Communist Party and individual members thereof, including known esplonage agents.'

  (Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 3123 on the National Lawyers Cuild, September 21, 1950, originally related September 17, 1950.)
- "3. 'To defend the cases of Communist lawbreakers, fronts have been devised making special appeals in behalf of civil liberties and reaching out far beyond the confines of the Communist Party itself.
