The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., contains the following concerning the National Lawyers Guild:

1. Cited as a Communist front.

(Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1311 on the CIO Political Action Committee, March 29, 1944, p. 149.)

2. Cited as a Communist front which "is the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party, its front organizations, and controlled unions" and which "since its inception has never failed to rally to the legal defense of the Communist Party and individual members thereof, including known espionage agents."

"Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 3123 of the National Lawyers Guild, September 21, 1950, originally related September 17, 1950.

3. "To defend the cases of Communist lawbreakers, fronts have been devised making special appeals in behalf of civil liberties and reaching out far beyond the confines of the Communist Party itself. Among these organizations are the *** National Lawyers Guild. When the Communist Party itself is under fire these offer a bulwark of protection."

- 2. A letter prepared on NLG stationery dated 10/28/64, under the signature of ERNEST GOODMAN, President, which states as follows:

"Dear Fellow: Member: "

"On November 6," 1963; I attended the first interracial lawyers workshop ever held in Louisiana. It was sponsored by the National Lawyers Guild. During one session, a rumor began to spread that Ben Smith, Vice-President of the Guild and conference chairman, was being arrested. We walked outside just in time to see Ben, in the back seat of a sheriff's patrol car, under arrest and about to be driven to prison. The few of us who were there called to Ben to cheer up - we would get him out of jail.

"We soon discovered that Ben's partner Bruce Waltzer, had also been arrested and that their homes and office had been ransacked under a warrant charging them with not having registered as members in the National Lawyers Guild, in violation of a Louisiana statute:

"Although they were released that afternoon, the criminal proceedings against them, and a suit by them in Federal Court to declare the Louisiana statute unconstitutional, are still in the courts. In the latter case, to be argued in the U. S. Supreme Court next month, both the Guild and the American Civil Liberties - Union have filed Amicus Briefs.

"Those of us at the conference and those who attended the National Executive Board Meeting several weeks later, assured Ben and Bruce

"that we considered their fight our fight, and we promised to raise \$2,500.00 to help defray the legal expense and costs involved in the litigation.

"We know, and the southern power structure knows, that the real reason for the indictment is the work of Ben, Bruce and the Guild's Committee for Legal Assistance in the South, in enforcing Federal constitutional rights for Southern Negroes. They hate and fear us because our work there continually exposes the injustice and illegality inherent in a society based on the theory of racial supremacy.

"Each of us, as Guild members, should feel a personal commitment "to make Louisiana and the South safe for Guild members.' To that end, I am asking that each Guild member use the enclosed envelope to send a contribution to the "Smith-Waltzer Defense Fund," 1509 Cadillac Tower Building, Detroit 26, Michigan.

"Their fight is our fight! I hope you agree that each of us does have a stake with Ben and Bruce.

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
NATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD IS-C ISA, 1950

On January 6, 1965, the January, 1965 issue of "Newsletter" was received.

This "Newsletter" is maintained in Myrile 100-10709 18-775.

The "Newsletter" indicated that it was published by the New York City Chapter of the National Lawrers Guild (NLO), 30 Park Row, New York City. Page two of the Newsletter" contained an item called "Constitutional Liberties Committee". This item set out that this connittee met on December 16, 1964, and that STANLEY FAULKNER was elected as Chairman and MARY KAURIAN was elected as Secretary. The article set out that the committee plans to be an active working committee involving itself in specific needs of Constitutional inpurtance that are of timely interest and concern. The article set out that the next meeting of the committee would be held on January 20, 1965, at the NLG Office. ARTHUR KINOY and WILLIAM KUNSTLER, noted Constitutional Lawrers, would discuss recent Supreme Court decisions.

"Newsletter" on page two contained an item entitled "Committee on law and the Interpreted Society. This item set out that the next meeting of the above committee would be held on January 20, 1965, at the office of HETMAN GERRINGER, 165 Impadumy, New York City. The item reported that this committee is concentrating on problems involved in obtaining preferential treatment for Negrocs and members of other underprivileged minorities.



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The article reported that the committee intends to develope and publish a bibliography of existing materials on the subject.

The December 5, 1964 issue of the "New York Times", in an article captioned, "Mississippi Seats From Challenge", related that a spokesman for the Freedom Dancratic Party (FDP) announced at a news conference in Washington, D.C., that a "Legal Peace Corps" of more than 100 lawyers would go to Mississippi to gather evidence to challenge the seating of all five members of the Mississippi delegation to the House of Representatives. This article further related that William M. Kunstler of New York, counsel for the FDP, said the challenge would be based on two principal grounds: 1. The Constitutional requirement that members of the House be elected by all the people, which was violated because many Negroes were not permitted to register and vote; and 2. Mississippi disenfranchised Negroes in its Constitution of 1890, thus violating a compact under which it was readmitted to the Union after the Civil War and which compact promised to maintain nondiscriminatory voting procedures then in effect.

The December 18, 1964 issue of the "New York Times" contains a letter dated December 11, 1964, signed by a group of attorneys from Seattle, Washington, self-identified as volunteers of legal assistance to the Council of Federated Organizations (COFO) in Mississippi last summer. In the letter,

this group urges establishment of a special committee to investigate voting and registration practices in Mississippi and Alabama so that the House of Representatives "will be in a position to determine the number of Representatives these states are entitled to, if any". Individuals comprising this group and shown as signers of this letter were: John Caughlan, Samuel Fancher, David Hood, Thomas Lynch, Carl Maxey and James Wilson.

The January 8, 1965 issue of the "new York Times", in an article entitled, "Lawyers Recruited To And in Unseating Five Mississippians", stated that William M. Kunstler of New York, lawyer for the FDP, said more than 50 lawyers had been signed to take depositions in Mississippi to be presented to the House Administrative Committee in an attempt to prove systematic exclusion of Negroes from voting in Mississippi. In this work, Kunstler related he had received help from two liberal lawyers' groups, the National Lawyers Guild (NIG), with headquarters in Detroit, and the Lawyers Constitutional Defense Committee, which was formed last year to defend civil rights workers arrested in the South.

A characterization of the NLG is attached hereto.

The January 11, 1965 issue of the "New York Times", in an article captioned, "21 Lawyers Begin Mississippi Drive", indicated that 21 lawyers, meeting at the Broadway Congregational Church, 211 West 56th Street, New York City, on the previous day, pledged to go to Mississippi beginning January 11, 1965, to take depositions for the purpose of ousting Mississippi's five present members from the United States House of Representatives. Identified as participants in this "Deposition Caravan" were: Ephraim Cross, professor emeritus of romance languages at City College; Morton Stavis, a Newark lawyer who is national coordinator of the caravan; William Kunstler; Arthur Kinoy and Benjamin E. Smith of New Orleans, the latter two being general attorneys for the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (MFDP). According to the article, the lawyers would seek subpoenas for depositions throughout

Mississippi's 22 counties and among those to be served and questioned about charges that Negroes have been systematically excluded from voting in Mississippi are Governor Paul B. Johnson, Jr., Attorney General Joe T. Patterson and Secretary of State Heber Ladner.

NY T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on October 29, 1962, that a rally was held on October 24, 1962, sponsored by the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Commutee (NYCAHUAC) at the Manhattan Center, 34th Street and Eighth Avenue, New York City. William Kunstler spoke at this rally and told the audience the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) interferes with social progress and the brotherhood of man and called for the abolition of the HCUA.

furnished sponsors for the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NCAHUAC)

William M. Kunstler, New York City attorney, was listed as one of the sponsors.

Characterizations of NYCAHUAC and NCAHUAC are attached and sources mentioned therein have furnished reliable information in the past.

NY T-3, who was in a position to furnish reliable information, on February 25, 1964, furnished information that William Kunstler gave a speech at the NLG Convention held February 21 and 22, 1964, at the Henrose

Hotel, Detroit, Michigan. Following his speech, Kunstler returned to a panel discussion on the problems of the integration of the Bar.

In October, 1963, NY T-4, who has furnished reliable information in the past, edvised that William Kunstler was in contact with Clarence Jones, who, as of September 15, 1963, was General Counsel for the andhi Society for Human Rights, 15 East 40th Street, New York City.

NY T-5, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on February 26, 1957, identified a photograph of Clarence Jones as the person whom he knew during late 1953 or early 1954, to be a member in a position of leadership in the Labor Youth League (LYL).

A characterization of the Gandhi Society for Human Rights is attached hereto and the source mentioned therein has furnished reliable information in the past.

The LYL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

NY T-6, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished information at various times from August, 1962 through January, 1963, indicating that William Kunstler and his wife, Lotte Kunstler, were in contact during this period with Stanley Levison, relative to matters pertaining to civil rights and also as to an affair held at White Plains, New York, on December 11, 1962, as a fund raising campaign for Martin Luther King, President of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC).

On February 27, 1964, NY T-7, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Ephraim Cross was then a member of the Advisory Committee of the NYCAHUAC, but that the Committee was not then active.

On December 14, 1962, NY T-8, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Cross was Faculty Advisor for the Marxist Discussion Club, CCNY, (City College of New York), for the year 1962.

"The Worker" issue of April 10, 1962, page one, column one, and page 7, column one, reflected that Professor Ephraim Cross of the Romance Language Department, CCNY, introduced Gus Hall when Hall spoke on the "Communist Program for America" at the invitation of the Marxist Discussion Club, on Thursday, April 7, 1962.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

On October 14, 1964, NY T-9, who has furnished reliable information in the past, identified Gus Hall as General Secretary of the Communist Party, United States of America (CPUSA).

A characterization of the Marxist Discussion Club is attached hereto and sources mentioned therein have furnished reliable information in the past.

On August 5, 1964, NY T-10, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available information which indicated that as of June, 1964, Arthur Kinoy was a Vice President of the NLG.

A source advised on August 2, 1963, that the Gandhi Society for Human Rights is an organization which was formed for the purpose of developing a philosophy and technique of non-violent civil rights protests. It allegedly makes no attempt to influence legislation nor to participate in demonstrations. The Society furnished legal assistance in civil rights cases. The Society was incorporated on June 14, 1962.

MARXIST DISCUSSION CLUB, CITY COLLEGE OF NEW YORK

On May 15, 1964, a source advised that the Marxist Discussion Club (MDC) of City College of New York, 139th Street and Convent Avenue, New York City, is a student organization which was formed several years ago by the students for the purpose of conducting a balanced program of pro-Marxist and anti-Marxist speakers, and to hold discussions about Marxism.

The source stated that the MDC holds a charter at the College as a recognized campus activity, must conform to the rules of the college, and is entitled to the same privileges of all student organizations.

The source stated that although not all members of the MDC are sympathetic with the Communist Party (CP), the MDC seems to attract many students with such sympathies, and has often chosen as its faculty advisor a member of the faculty who at one time or another has gained some notoriety in connection with CP front organizations.

The source further stated that the MDC participates in demonstrations for peace and civil rights. The club has been more inclined to invite "left-wing" speakers and during the recent Fall and Spring semesters has had some leading Communists for guest speakers.

On May 18, 1964, a second source advised that William L. Patterson was a featured speaker at the MDC meeting on May 15, 1964.

On January 3, 1964, a third source advised that William L. Patterson is the Chairman of the New York District CP.

NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" issued December 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives, page 115, contains the following citation regarding the National Committee to Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

"Cited as a 'new organization' set up in the summer of 1960 to lead and direct the Communist Party's 'Operation Abolition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as Communists.

(Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1278 on the Truth About the Film 'Operation Abolition,' Part 1, October 3, 1961, p. 5.)"

A source has advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee.

- "3. 'To defend the cases of Communist lawbreakers, fronts have been devised making special appeals in behalf of civil liberties and reaching out far beyond the confines of the Communist Party itself. Among these organizations are the * * National Lawyers Guild. When the Communist Party itself is under fire these offer a bulwark of protection.' 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

In a syndicated article appearing on page 2 of the "Clarion Ledger", a Jackson, Mississippi, daily newspaper, dated January 25, 1965, it was indicated that certain attorneys will work in Jackson, Mississippi, taking depositions (in an effort to obtain evidence in support of the allegation that Negroes had been improperly deprived from registering to vote in the November, 1964 election in Mississippi). The article stated that among the attorneys directing the case are Arthur Kinoy and william Kunstler.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on October 29, 1952, that a rally was held on October 24, 1962, sponsored by the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee at the Manhattan Center, 34th Etreet and Kighth Avenue, New York City. William Kunztler spoke at the rally and told the audience that the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) interferes with social progress and the brotherhood of man. Kunstler called for the abolition of the HCUA.

Kinoy is described as a white, male, American, 45 years old, 5'4", 125 pounds, black hair and brown eyes. He is married to Susan Knopf Kinoy.

The records of the Passport Office, Department of State, reflect that Kinoy was issued Passport Number G 632703 on June 3, 1956, for travel to England, Scotland, Italy and Greece for the purpose of pleasure and tourism. Kinoy indicated he planned on leaving the United States on June 17, 1966, for six weeks and planned on traveling by ship and plane.





W. E. B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has edvised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of settling in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. These delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution are, "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people."

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois, and a new slate of officers was elected to the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the DCA. Since Labor Day, 1965, identities of those serving on the NEC has varied; however, according to a third source as of May, 1966, thirteen of the fifteen members of the NEC were members of the CP in the San Francisco Bay area.

As of May, 1966, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 1830 Fell Street, San Francisco, California.



TERROR' LAID TO PANEL

21 Young Men and Women Booked-Court Hearing on Committee Role Put Off

> By JOHN HERBERS Special to The New York Times

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17-A lawyer for subpoensed witnesses was forcibly ejected from a Congressional hearing on anti-Vietnam war activities today in another riotous session of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

The lawyer, Arthur Kinoy of . New York, a small but scrappy man, was seized by three United - States marshals who pulled him by the neck and arms through the crowded hearing room. They took him to a police station, where he was charged with disorderly conduct.

Seven other lawyers, including the bead of the American Civil Liberties Union, walked out of the hearing in protest. They charged that they could not function in an "atmosphere of terror and intimidation."

By the end of the day, two withesses also had left in Se fiance of the committee, young men and women had been arrested for shouting in the hearing room or demonstrating in the corridors, and one witness had admitted—to the surprise of the committee—that he was a Communist. ...

proceedings The entire reached such a legal snarl that a panel of three Federal judges postponed hearings on charges that the committee's functioning constitutes a violation of First Amendment rights of free speech.

Purposes of Inquiry

The subcommittee conducting the current hearings is headed by Representative Joe R. Pool, Democrat of Texas. The panel is considering a bill that would make it a crime to aid persons engaged in hostilities against the United States, but Mr. Pool said the hearings were also a general inquiry into Communism.

It was Mr. Pool who ordered Mr. Kinoy ejected, after the; lawyer had failed to respond to the Congressman's order to ait : down during a heated argument on legal points involved in the hearing.

The angry battle between the lawyers and the committee began when the panel was questioning a friendly witness this morning. The witness was Philip A. McCombs, a recent Yale graduate and a reporter for The , National Review, a conservative magazine.

When Mr. McCombs mentioned the name of Walter D. Teague 3d, one of the subpoensed Vietnam war opponents, William M. Kunstler of New York. law partner of Mr. Kinoy, rose t to protest. He said Mr. Teague would not have a chance to cross-examine Mr. McCombs. ...

Mr. Kinoy joined Mr. Kunstler at the table directly in front of the Representatives and added other objections.

Mr. Kinoy, however, continued arguing with Representative John M. Ashbrook, Republican of Ohio.

Mr. Pool shouted again, "Now you sit down," and motioned to the marshals to move in. As they did, Mr. Kunstler shouted:

"Take your hands off this man, he's a member of the bar."

Throw Us All Out'

"I am an attorney of the law, and I will not be removed from this hearing," Mr. Kinoy shouted.

The officers grabbed him. He continued to shout, and struggled in their grip.

He was carried from the room with one marshal's arm around his neck. His face was livid, and although his arms were pinned to his body he shook his fist at the committee.

shook his fist at the committee. "Throw us all out," Mr sunstler shouted. "Mr. Kinoy is my colleague, a professor of law at Rutgers University and a member of the Bar of New York."

He asked Mr. Pool to have Mr. Kinoy returned to the room and to apologize to him. Mr. Pool refused.

exactly what happened."

The other lawyers rushed forward and began objecting. Jeremiah S. Gutman of New York taid Mr. Kinoy had been carried away "choked and trussed." Let the record show that Mr. Kinoy is five feet two inches stall," he said.

Frank Donner of New York, author of "The Un-Americans," a book about the committee, said he had been practicing law, before the committee for years but had never seen an attorney ejected in that manner.

York, executive director of the
American Civil Libertian Union,
came forward and said:

"I do solomnly ask that he De returned."

Mr. Kinoy, Mr. Kunstier and some of the other lawyers also do work for the Civil Liberties Union.

Finally, after several more exchanges, Mr. Pool asked the police to look in the hall and see if Mr. Kinoy was there. The officers said he was not.

Then Mr. Kunstler said he would have to withdraw because he could not represent witnesses without his colleague. One by one, the other lawyers said they, too, would have to leave.

Beverly Axelrod of San Francisco said she felt she would be "physically endangered" by staying.

Meantime, Mr. Kinoy had been taken to the police station and booked. Mr. Gutman went down and posted \$25 bail.

Mr. Kinoy returned to the hearing in the afternoon and told reporters he had been "roughly treated" on the way to the station. He was detained there almost one hour before being charged.

"This is the first time I have ever heard of a lawyer being seized and charged with disorderly conduct while arguing a legal motion," he said.

Statement by Lawyers

Mr. Pemberton and Mr. Kinoy then reappeared before the committee and submitted a prepared statement signed by them, Mr. Kunstler, Mr. Gutman, Mr. Donner, Miss Axelrod, Ira Gollobin of New York and Joseph Forer of Washington. This group included the Lawyers who withdrew.

"Although we have finally been able to bail Mr. Kings and of Jan," the statement said, "the brutal treatment offered him has all but destroyed any chance we may ever have had to represent our clients adequately.

"Attorneys cannot function in an atmosphere of terror and intimidation. The fundamental constitutional right to be represented by counsel means by counsel free from brutalization and terrorization."

After Mr. Pemberton had read the statement, Representative Richard H. Ichord, Democrat of Missouri, read from a committee rule, stating that attorneys are permitted to give advice to witnesses but not to engage in oral argument.

Mr. Ichord said Mr. Kinoy had not been advising a elient but had attempted to engage in oral argument. This, he said, was the reason for Mr. Pool's order to the marshals to eject him when he did not take his seat immediately.

Mr. Ichord then referred to a statement distributed by Dr. Allen M. Krebs, one of the sub-poenzed witnesses, before Dr. Krebs left the room in defiance of the committee. The statement concluded:

"As I leave this room, to my brothers who stand here after me today, this week, next month—and there are signs that the inquisition of the sixties has now begun—you have my respect and my compassion."

Representative Ashbrook said while Mr. Pool's order might have seemed "arbitrary" to some, the situation had been "faisted" on him.

To these statements, Pemberton replied softly, but in a voice filled with emotion, that in all his years as an attorney the had never "experienced the shock I did this morning" at the forcible removal of Mr. Kinoy.

After Mr. Pemberton had left, Mr. Pool ordered all 12 witnesses left without counsel to come forward one by one. The told them they had until noon tomorrow to obtain lawyers of their choice. He said that if they could not do so they were to consult and the Association of the Bar of the District of Columbia to furnish counsel.

It seemed likely that the bar association would provide lawers associated with the American Civil Liberties Union.

"I am proud that everything I do in a court of law is vigorously pursued." he said. Mr. Kinoy's concern with the rights of citizens has taken him into stifling courthouses in rural Mississippi as well as the august, echoing marble chamber of the United States Supreme Court.

It was there last year that he argued successfully the case that provided the basis for the American Civil Liberties Union's present attack on the hearings of the Un-American Activities Committee. Mr. Kinoy and his law partners convinced the high Court in Dombrowski v. Pfister that Federal district judges should have the power to enjoin the enforcement of unconstitutional laws that pose "a chilling effect" on free speech.

There he teaches constitutional and criminal law to students who rejoice in the fact that their professor is no ivory-tower dweller but a man who knows intimately the hurly-burly of the court-

Although he showed a flaming temper, out of proportion to his 5 feet 4 inches and 135 pounds, as he was being dragged out of the House chamber Wednesday, Mr. Kinoy was later inclined to be philosophic about what had happened.

Representative Joe R. Pool, Democrat of Texas, who had ordered him arrested, simply didn't understand the rules of the game among lawyers, Mr. Kinoy said. The most aggressive lawyers can go through an entire legal carreer without being punished by the short-tempered judges because they always get a warning, and sometimes several, first.

Defended Rosenbergs

Mr. Kinoy was one of the lawyers who defended Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Jiorton Sobell in their trial involving atomic secrets in 1951. Two years later he made the last despairing effort before a Federal appeals court to prevent the execution of the Rosenbergs.

And he did not drop Sobell's case after his client received a 30-year sentence. The repeated efforts of him and his associates to reopen the case resulted in a favorable preliminary ruling earlier this month.

Among Mr. Kinoy's other unpopular clients were Steve Nelson, the Communist functionary; Adam Weber, the New Orleans soldier facing court-martial because of his refusal to kill in Vietnam, and the Mississippi Freedom Democratic party, which sought to unseat the state's Congressional delegation.

Mr. Kinoy, who was born in New York Sept. 29, 1920, attended Fieldston School and was graduated magna cum laude from Harvard in 1941. His honors thesis in American history won the Bowdoin Prize, He served in the Army from 1942 to 1945, seeing action in the North African and Italian campaigns.



A source advised on January 25, 1966, that the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms, 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, had recently changed its name to Southern Californians for Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Southern Californians to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee. This is now the official name and the new letterhead of the organization carries the name as "Southern Californians to Abolish HUAC".

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations", revised, December 1, 1961, pp. 43-44, describes the CCPAF as follows:

"The Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms * * * specializes in propaganda aimed at abolishing the Committee on Un-American Activities and discrediting the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Created in Los Angeles in 1952, the front organization is run by FRANK WILKINSON, an identified Communist who recently resumed the full-time, paid post of executive secretary after approximately a year's leave of absence to assist in a similar campaign by another front in New York City, the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee.

"When the Committee on Un-American Activities held hearings in Los Angeles, September 2-5, 1958, to inquire into the nature of the Party's recent reorganization in California, the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms sponsored a series of public meetings to protest the hearings and the very existence of the Committee.

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

The groups that were present were; Progressive Labor Party, Committee for Non Violent Action, SANL, Students for a Demoncratic Society, Workers World, Young Socialist Alliance, Socialist Workers Party, and the Buffalo branch of YAWF.



Once the afternoon sessions started, a supeanoed witness named WALTER THAGUE was called to testify. Congressman POLLE began to throw one sided questions at THAGUL. When THAGUE answered in his own way, POOLE tried to silence him. It seemed that POOLE wanted yes or no answers to questions that could not be answered yes or no. Congressman POOLE continued to push for this type answer and silencing the witness when the answers did not suit the line of questioning.

Federal marshals and rolice moved in. There was a small scuffle as the demonstrators were led away and arrested for disorderly conduct. When this ended, most of the witnesses refuse to testify without benefit of council. (their council had walked out in protest to the treatment of one of their fellow attorneys, ARTHUR KINCY, who was dragged out of court and arrested while arguing a point in defense of his client. The hearing ended at this point.

Later on in the day, a rally was put on by the Progressive Labor Party, Socialist Workers Party and YAWF, in a park across from the hearing building. The whole rally was centered on denounciation of the hearings as a "fascist trick to smear the peace movement." Two main speakers were; JUDY WHITE of the Socialist Workers Party, and DIEDRE GRISWALD of YAWF. The rally began at seven oclock. It ended at about nine oclock. A half hour after the rally, a meeting was held at St. Marks Church. It cantered on what the general policy of the groups in Wash. should be. The meeting ended in an uproar, and nothing was derived at. This meeting ended at about ten fourtyfive.



The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" issued December 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Page 115, contains the following citation regarding the National Committee to Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

"Cited as a 'new organization' set up in the summer of 1950 to lead and direct the Communist Party's 'Operation Abolition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as Communists.

"(Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1278 on the Truth About the Film, 'Operation Abolition', Part 1, October 3, 1961, P. 5)"

A source has advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NCAHUAC). A national meeting of this organization was held in Chicago, Illinois, on April 27, and 28, 1963.

A second source advised on May 9, 1966, that as of that date the NCAHUAC continued to function with headquarters at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

"Chairman was DOROTHY MARSHAL, who opened the meeting and spoke briefly, telling the participants that the Citizen's Committee to preserve American freedom is disolved and it's activities are beeing taken over by the So. Calif. Committee to abolish HUAC.

"The chairman then introduced BERNICE BELDON as the new secretary of the committee, who spoke briefly and told the assembled that part of her work will consist on calling in person or by phone the participants of the meeting to remind them of their monthly pledges, so that the committee is able to function properly and have sufficient funds to pay for printing and mailing various material, in connection with the committee's work towards the abolishment of the House Committee on Un-Americanism.

"Another speaker to be introduced by the chairman, who spoke briefly was AL VIRIN. He told the gatherers that the HARRIS case, which will come up in Court in October, is very important. HARRIS was arrested and will be tried on an old law, which passed in 1919 and has only been used on 2 occasions. 'Criminal Syndicalism' is the law, that is beeing used to try HARRIS, said VIRIN. HARRIS, who passed out leaflets, blaming Chief PARKER for the Watts riot and comparing Negro Guettos to Concentration camps and calling for an end to the war in Vietnam, etc. etc. was held on \$15,000 bail, FRANK PASTANA, said VIRIN, managed to bring the bail down to \$1500. Not, only do we want to free HARRIS, but we also want and must repeal the Criminal Syndicalism law in Calif. concluded AL VIRIN.

"Next to be introduced by the chairman was FRANK WILKINSON, who began his talk by saying: 'I am happy to report to you, that our long fight to abolish the Committee on Un-Americanism is almost won. Six years ago, when we organized the Committee, we only had one Congressman with us and that was JAMES ROOSEVELT. Today, we have about 90 Congressmen, who are ready to introduce bills in Congress, which will call for the abolishment of the Committee on Un-Americanism. Besides the Congressmen, said WILKINSSON, we have thousands of University Professors, Clergymen and especially Catholic Clergymen, who came out strongly for the abolishment of the House Committee. We also have a famous physician, Dr. DODLEY WHITE, who was Pres. EISENHOWER's physician when he suffered a heart attack. Not only do we have him, said WILKINSON, but he organized 500 medical men and

"enlisted them in the fight to abolish the committee. We have 3 more weeks, before the 89th Congress adjourns and we have a lot of work ahead of us and we also need funds. I will ask you now to make contributions so we can cover our expenses. Our Natl. representatives are making a great sacrifice. None of them are receiving more than \$66. per week. We need funds badly. The monthly sustainers do not cover all our expenses, said WILKINSON.

"The featured speaker, ARTHUR KINOY, was introduced by LEONARD HORWIN. KINOY got a loud standing ovation. In his \(\frac{1}{2} \) hour talk, he told of his experiences during the hearings, held by the Committee on Un-Americanism in Washington in August. We heard, said KINOY, from reliable sources, a week before the hearings began, that the House Committee got word from persons holding high positions, that the protests and demonstrations against the war in Vietnam, is getting out of hand and that something has to be done about it. A number of meetings took place with the young men, who were subpeanead by the House Committee. We had many discussions, we knew what is awaiting us at the hearings, we were frightened. We made a decision that we go in to Federal Court for an injunction against the House Committee. To our biggest surprise, that afternoon, the Judge issued an injunction and called for a 3 Judge Court to decide the question of constitution in regards to the House Committee. The rest you know, how the injunction was vacated and we all had to appear at the hearings before the House Committee, which was terrified with anger and reacted in that fashion. knew that they will soon be out of business, said KINOY and that is a natural reaction of any person, who knows he will soon be out of business. When I was dragged out of the hearing rooms, I was asked by a reporter whether I looked in the eyes of the officers who dragged me. I told them I did not. The reporter told me: 'I did. I have seen blood in their eyes.' These hearings, which were called in order to pass the Pool Bill, which would have called for a fine and imprisonment for anyone, speaking out against the war in Vietnam, had extraordinary precautions in this country and all over the world. You can imagine, that the following day, government men came to the hearings before the House Committee, arguing that the bill is not necessary. A lot of members of Congress were very much angered at the conduct of the hearings by the House Committee. One Congressman LA 100-41016

"told me confidentially, that if a secret ballot was taken on the abolishment of the House Committee, all Congressmen would vote for Openly they would be afraid to do so, on account of their constituence back home. The pictures, showing hwo I was dragged out with others of the hearing, because we were defiant to the Committee, had such an impact all over, that I have received thousands and thousands of letters and telegrams, congradulating me for taking a stand the way I did against the House Committee, said KINOY. The men on the Committee, most of them Southern Dixicrats, were frightening and we had no other choice but act in defiance to their questions and used the first Amendment. papers all over the country came out with editorials against the House Committee, as a result of the hearings in August. Committee must be abolished and could be abolished. We, the lawyers, did our job. There is nothing more we can do. You people have to do the rest. Get ahold of issues of the September Saturday Evening Post, together with any material that you can lay your hands on, which will help our cause the abolishment of the House Committee, give it to your friends to read, bring it to organizations, keep up the fight until we win, concluded KINOY.

Sponsored by SOUTHERN CALIFORNIAMS TO ABOLISH HUAC, a program designated HEAR ARTHUR KINCY SPEAK was presented at Temple Issiah, 10345 W. Pico Elvd. on Sunday Sept.25, 1966.

Dorothy Marchall presided at what she described as "an historic occasion." She reviewed the 14 years activities of SCAHUAC (formerly COPAF) since its inception in 1952, and also dwelt on the evils of the HUAC.

Esther Laurence, introduced as a "folksinger" apparently pleased the audience with her performance of 3 songs.

Attorney A.L. Wirin discussed the John Harris case which he described as "a matter of great concern." The indictment for "criminal syndicalism", based on an archaic and unconstitution law, is an attempt to intimidate and suppress Negroes in their militant drive for human rights, Wirin contends. He urged members of the audience to communicate with the District Attorney and demand the dropping of charges against

Harris, and the repeal of the Syndicalist Act.

Mrs. Marshall introduced Bernice Bolton as the new Secretary of SCANUAC, who spoke briefly on the importance of a united front in the cause of civil liberties and civil rights. She introduced John Slavin.

Slevin, of American Friends Service Committee, described the growing opposition among "thinking people" of our population and on compuses, to war with its "brutalizing effect on our young men" and its "diabolic meanons" and the "deprivation of freelem". He said the HUAC is "stiffling dissent. Slevin described Arthur Rinoy as "the great champion of justice, civil rights, and civil liberties."

Frank Wilkinson referred to the Harris case as the result of former Police Chief Parker's handling of the Deadwyler case, and referred to Parker as the cause of the Matts riots and the death of 34 Hegroes.

Wilkinson said that 95 members of the 89th Congress have registered opposition to HUAC, including 19 Republicans, and feels that Abolition may be close in 1967. The HUAC is fighting against Civil Liberties, Wilkinson said, and there will be no peace in the country until the Committee is abolished, Wilkinson said. A change of climate has taken place as evidenced by the transmiduous public support from religious and academic leaders, and from newspaper editorist. The Saturday Evening Post is now calling for Abolition, have

Wilkinson stressed the need for ifnancial support for addition in its fight for Abolition and called on manbers of the audience for contributions. The audience responded with

Kinoy addressed the audience as "clients of mine" because he has started a lawsuit against HUAC for every American.

We approached the hearings with fear, Kinoy said, and decided to move first and take the offensive, because the Committee "violates the constitution, and law belongs to the people."

He caid "we have learned a new techique from the August hearings," and described the background of the hearings as "extremely serious."

The Committee feels that the growing opposition of civil rights movements, academic, religious, and enti-war groups is getting out of hand. The Poole bill "makes it illegal to breathe," he said.

A Senate member stated his opinion to Kinoy by saying that the Committee "has reached a new low."


Newspaper editorials from one end of the country to the other are calling for abolition of the Committee, Kinoy said, and NUAC now faces the most severe challenge of its existence and is irightened and running scared. He received thousands of wires and letters of congratulation because of the reaction to the hearings.

We must persuade Congress and the judiciary to meet their responsibilities on the rights of the minority to differ, Kinoy said. "It's up to you," he said in closing.

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Activities Committee, Citizens Committee
to Preserve American Freedoms

"At this time, leaders of the Party's Southern California District, were mobilizing Communists in the area for participation in an intensified campaign to abolish this committee of Congress. How the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms served the Party in this effort was revealed by (Communist Party) District Chairman DOROTHY HTALET in a report to the Party's Southern California District Council on September 21, 1958. Mrs. HEALEY declared that the Party preferred public protest meetings to be held by the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms rather than under party auspices because Communists could attend without danger of being exposed as members of the Party. She also noted that Communists scheduled as congressional committee witnesses could not appear beforehand at openly Communist rallies without creating the impression that the Party was conspiring with witnesses to withhold information from the committee.


