ASAC Whelan of the New York Office called at 4.25 p.m. today and stated he had just received a call from Lloyd McMahon, who is in charge of the criminal work for U.S. Attorney Lumbard, who advised that Attorney O. John Rogge, who had represented DAVID GREENGLASS, wants to talk with Greenglass, at lewisburg Penitentiary, by telephone from New York,

for the purpose of asking him to waive the attorneyclient relationship. He stated the U.S. Attorney wanted an affidavit from Rogge concerning the stolen G. documents and the admissions that Greenglass may have

made to Rogge.

Mr. Whelan stated McMahon had called Olney of the Department, and Olney had told him he would have to get the permission of Director J. Edgar Hoover before he could permit the phone call to Greenglass.

A few minutes after talking with Whelan I received a call, by reference from the Director's office, from Lloyd McMahon, who recited the same information. He stated the U.S. Attorney's office was most anxious to have Rogge prepare the affidavit, and requested that I check with the Director and see if this was agreeable; if so, to have Whelan in New York advise McMahon, and he asked, further, if I would also call Mr. Olney and suggest that Olney telephonically contact Humphrey at Lewisburg in order to clear the receipt of the phone call at the penitentiary from Rogge.

Supervisor Tom McAndrews of the New York Office called at 1:30 pm today to advise that attorney 0. John Rogge called the New York Office today, fishing for information as to whether the McCarthy Committee was going back to Lewisburg to reinterview David Greenglass. Rogge was told the office did not know; that we have no connections with the McCarthy Committee.

Rogge stated he was thinking of writing or calling officials at Lewisburg Penitentiary to insist that no further interviews be conducted with Greenglass by the Committee unless Rogge is present. Rogge said he feels that the innuendoes in the press stories that Greenglass gave more information to the Committee than was contained in his original testimony at the Rosenberg trial are inaccurate and harmful to his client, Greenglass. Rogge as yet has not made up his mind whether he will contact Lewisburg Penitentiary. Rogge has not been invited by the Committee l to be present during any reinterview. Rogge said he is ending an article to the New York Times today, at the request of the New York Times, concerning the last interview of Greenglass by the McCarthy Committee. The article will cover in brief that David Greenglass told the McCarthy Committee the same things to which he testified in the trial. The article will appear in the Sunday New York Times.

Rogge said that his views are that matters of espionage do not fall within the province of the McCarthy Committee but rather within the jurisdiction of the FBI.

The appearance of David Greenglass, an inmate of the federal penichentiary at Lewisburg, before an executive session of the Senate chentiary at Lewisburg, before an executive session of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, to be held on Friday, Rovenger 5, 1953, at 11:00 a.m., in the United States Court House in New York City.

The Department of Justice desires to assist your Subcommittee in securing the testimony of any witness considered to be
essential, but there is no legal authority or precedent for producing an inmate of a federal penitentiary for public or private
testimony before a committee of Congress. A subpoena, even in
court cases, is insufficient to authorize the production of a
prisoner. In such cases the court must issue a writ of habeas
corpus at testificandum before the removal of the prisoner from
his place of imprisonment and his production in court can be
legally justified. Since your letter and the Subcommittee subpoena
do not constitute legally adequate authority, it will not be possible
to accede to your request or to honor the subpoena.

The Bubcommittee meeting in New York, I see no reason why the Subcommittee could not secure Greenglass' sworn testimony at Lewisburg if, as your letter states, his testimony is indispensable at the current investigation. Arrangements could be made at the penitentiary similar to those made for members of the Subcommittee staff who recently interviewed Greenglass at the prison and his sworn testimony could be secured before any member of the Subcommittee delegated and authorized to take the same. Of course, the testimony must necessarily

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be taken under conditions and diremstances which will not interfere with the operation and maintenance of discipline in the institution. If the Subcommittee desires to follow this course, sufficient notice should be given to the Department of Justice and the Bureau of Prisons to allow enough time to make suitable arrangements for the convenience and security of all concerned.





Pilfered by Rosenberg. Says Spy

NEW YORK-Julius Bosenberg, executed atom spy, stole a type of proximity fuse from the Emerson Radio Co. plant in Newark during World War II, and turned it over to a Russian agent, according to testimony bared before the Senate permanent investigating subcommittee today,

The testimony was contained in an affidavit taken from David Greenglass. Rosenberg's brotherin-law, and read into the record as public hearings opened before the subcommittee headed by Senator McCarthy (R., Wis.)

You are more that at a public hearing of the Moderthy Consisted held in New York City on Nevember 24, 1983, an affidants submitted by Batid Greengless to the counsisted man read into the record. REPORT ON INTERVIEW WITH DAVID GREENGLASS, No. 19352-NE, BY INVESTIGATORS FOR THE SENATE PERMANENT SUB-COMMITTEE ON IN-VESTIGATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS.

Investigators Roy Cohn, David Schine and Frank Carr for the Senate Permanent Sub-Committee and O. John Rogge, counsel for Greenglass, arrived at the institution at approximately one p.m. Thursday, October 29, 1953. Following their adminsion to the institution I discussed with them the arrangements for the requested interview with Greenglass. They were acreeable to all of the conditions except the allowance of only two investigators to be present. After discussing this objection with Mr. Pennett over the telephone it was agreed that all three of the investigators could be present.

We then retired to the interview room to which Greenclass was brot by Lt. John T. Willingham of the institutional Custodial Service. The interview was begun at about 1:30 p.m. With the following present: Mr. Roy Cohn, Mr. David Schine, Mr. Frank Carr, Mr. O. John Rogge, Marden Humphrey, Lt. Willingham, and David Greenglass.

Oreenglass that he had been inconference with the named investigators and had assured them that Greenglass would co-

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operate to the greatest extent of his ability and memory and asked Greenglass whether or not he would confirm that statement. Greenglass stated to the interviewers that he would be willing to answer all of their questions and cooperate in every way possible.

Hr. Cohn then outlined generally the matters in which they were particularly interested at this time, namely, Julius Rosenberg's activities and connections with regard to the gathering of data on the proximity fuse, radar, space stations, mechanisms for the guiding of missiles, and A-Bomb counter measures, for transmittal to the Soviet. To refresh Greenglass' memory, Mr. Cohn allowed him to read certain portions of the record of trial in the Rosenberg case. He then asked Greenglass if he recalled the period of Julius Rosenberg's employment by the Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth. He stated that he did and that it began sometime early in 1941 until Rosenberg's dismissal sometime in 1945, I believe. He traced his activities from the time he became employed by the Signal Corps up to his (Rosenberg's) arrest and trial.

Greenglass was then questioned about the identity of persons with whom he knew Rosenberg was associated and/or friendly, firstly while employed by the Signal Corps. The names of Joe Barr, Vivian Glassman, Mike and Ann Sidorovich, William Pearl and (blank) Sassman were mentioned by the interviewers. Greenglass disclaimed any knowledge that Rosenberg was ever associated or friendly with William Pearl and

(blank) Sassman. He stated that Rosenberg was closely associated with the others in his espionage work. Frior to this he that that Rosenberg's activities centered around the promotion of Communism as an ideology. Greenglass learned from Rosenberg that as inspectors he (Rosenberg) and/or Joe Barr were able to pass the security guards, both going to and coming from work, with a brief case; as such they were also able to reject parts and whole products, thus accumulating proximity fuses and turning them over to the Hussians. The same was true of data and parts for the development of the "thinking" devices.

Greenglass also stated there were efforts being made to obtain information on rumored space stations and A-Bomb counter measures. The only thing that Greenglass recalled about the latter was some discussion about a means of creating a pressure wave as a counter measure against A-Bombs.

Questioning then turned to the names and identities of persons with whom Rosenberg was acquainted who may have been working with him in the gathering of secret data and centered principally around classmates of Rosenberg at City College, especially the members of the class with who Rosenberg graduated.

A number of names were read from a list, none of which Greenglass was able to recall by name because, as he stated, they were "long and jaw-breakers". He said that he was young at the time and altho he might not recall a name he might either be able to identify some of these persons if shown a photograph of them or confronted them in person.

He was asked if he knew any of Rosenberg's associates who may have had connection with the Voice of America. Greenglass disclimed any knowledge of these. He was asked whether he was present at a dinner at a restaurant with the Rosenbergs,

Joe Barr, Vivian Glassman and at which some other close associate was present or a "prospect" was present for the purpose of being "looked over"; Greenglass stated he had not been present at any such dinner and on the few occasions he had eaten out with the Rosenbergs there were none of their associates present.

Greenglass talked about the apartments, one time numbering three, that Julius Rosenberg maintained for the purpose of housing and entertaining associates and "prospects". He recalled one time when he was still quite young and just being indoctrinated as a young Communist that Julius Rosenberg took him to Communist Headquarters on May Day and that to the best of his recollection practically the entire class with whom Julius Rosenberg graduated was present to participate in the parade. He also described some of Rosenberg's activities while he was attending College and active in the Young Com-

proselytizing for this organisation that most of his school work was done by his (Greenglass') sister Ethel. We told of Rosenberg discussing an unidentified student who was very persuasive and spent a great deal of time in "selling" Communism and soliciting members in the Young Communist League by "colaring" individuals on the campus, sitting them on benches and haranguing them at great length.

manufacturing components for secret devices where he was apparently not allowed to meet and whose names he never learned or neard mentioned.

In tracing the activities of others with whom Greenglass was familiar the names of Gunner Boye, Sam Novak and Mark
Page (Padowski) were mentioned. A Dr. Manitis was also brot into
the conversations but Greenglass declared that he was absolutely
free of any suspicion and had been very adamant in his refusal to
have anything to do with Rosenberg and his machinations. He mentioned a Schultz and a supervisor of a night shift (name unknown)
at los Alamos who were Communists and would probably have cooperated in supplying information to Russian espionage agents but to
his knowledge they had no contacts.

He assured the interviewers that Hyman Adler, a close friend of his, would be cooperative in supplying confirmation of such of the Rosenberg connections and contacts hereinbefore men-

tioned of which he, Adler, had knowledge. He also stated that Sam Novak would most likely be cooperative in the Committee's investigations. He said that the wife of Professor Kindom was a Communist and might be cooperative and, as an aside, stated that Professor Kindom was "under her thumbs."

The interview ended at approximately three p.m. Greenglass is a verbose and rambling talker but I believe that the salient points covered by the interview and most, if not all, of the important names (phonetically spelled) are set forth herein.

Mr. Cohn took the lead in the questioning; Mr. Scnine asked very few questions; Mr. Carr asked none but keptsome notes consisting in all of not a page and a half of 8x102 ruled paper. The interviewers were courteous to Greenglass thruout and made no attempt to brow-beat or cross-examine him. They would ask a leading question and allow him to talk at random and great length in replying.

Some news photographers met the group at the aircort where they took pictures for the press. No pictures were taken at the institution, either in or out. Three newsmen and a radio man talked to the investigators for a short time before the interview, remained in the officers lounge until its conclusion and then again talked to them. The radio man made a tape recording of his interview with them and this was later broadcast from WHIM in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania. Relations with the in-

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terviewers and newsmen were cordial thruout. There were no untoward incidents which could reflect unfavorably on the institution, the Prison Service or the Department.

In a discussion with the interviewers before their departure it was apparent that they felt that Greenglass should be brot to New York to amear before the Committee either in a closed or public hearing to repeat and/or elaborate upon the information obtained. In fact I am certain that they are going to recommend this to Senator McCarthy and urge him to issue a subpeona for Greenglass' appearance. From my knowledge of the case I do not think that any information which is not already . a matter of record was developed but despite this I do not believe we should oppose Greenglass' appearance as it ma create animosities which could result, thru a misunderstanding of our motives, in an unfavorable reaction and publicity. Further, if Greenglass does appear before the Committee there will be pressure to lodge him in the Tombs rather than at Federal Detention Headquarters, using as justification the fact that he will be more readily available from that place of detention than our own. I also know that Greenglass not only favors but will probably specifically request it. There is some indication that he and his attorney, Mr. Rogge, feel that he will be less restricted as to visits and consulations at the Tombs than he would be at Federal Detention Headquarters

under our usual procedures.

The interviewers accepted this statement without question and seemed convinced of its truth from information already a matter of record.

The interviewers were allowed to take the statement with them after copies had been made for our files. The total time consumed by this interview did not exceed fifteen to twenty minutes.

The following afternoon, Friday, October 30, 1953, Harry Gold requested to see me. Upon being called for interview he said he now recalled the other "occasion" and would like to make a supplement to his statement of Thursday, October 29, 1953, setting it forth. He was allowed to do so, signed it and took oath to its truth. The original of this supplement was mailed to Mr. Roy Cohn in New York. A copy is attached hereto.

Harry Gold being duly sworn states:

I heard of Shura Swan from a man called Abraham Brothman.

Brothman was one of my sources of information for the Soviet Espionage Organization of which I was a courier. I met Prothman in Sept. of 1941. About a half year after that Brothman first mentioned Shura Swan. Brothman said that it was Shura Swan who had introduced him to Soviet Espionage work. At a somewhat later date Brothman complained to me of the base ingratitude of the Soviet Espionage set up—He said that during a slack period, Swan, who was working for Amtorg, had been laid off. On a third occasion Brothman told me that he had met Swan through his wife (Brothman's wife) Naomi.

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SUPPLEMENT TO STATEMENT OF HARRY GOLD MADE ON OCTOBER 29, 1953

Harry Gold, being duly sworn, says:

This is the fourth occasion on which I heard of Shura Swan. Sometime in either 1942 or 1943 Abe Brothman asked me to request of my Soviet Superior that a job be obtained at amtorg for Shura Swan; this man who was my "boss" at that time I knew only as "Sam" but I have since identified him as Semen Markovich Semenov, an employee of Amtorg and also an espionage agent. I told Sam of Brothman's request—the Russian flew into a rage and said: "Tell Brothman to keep his nose out of other peoples business! And as for you, you mind yours too! We know all about this Shura Swan".

Thus chastised I was only too happy to let go of the subject. However, in telling Brothman of Sam's refusal, I softened the blow by saying merely that nothing was available at that time-for I had to keep in Abe's good graces so as to continue obtaining information from him.

At the time of asking me to intercede for Shura Swan, Abe told me that while Shura, who was loyal to the Soviet Union, had been laid off at Amtorg, there were others (presumably Americans employed at Amtorg) who secretly ridiculed the U.S.S.R., but who had been retained.

ABOUT 1947, AT A TIME WHEN IT WAS A TOP UNITED STATES SCIENTIFIC SECRET, JULIUS ROSENBERG TOLD ME ABUT INFORMATION HEW HAD OBTAINED FROM A FRIEND RELATING TO A THINKING MACHINE WHICH WOULD SEND OUT INTERCEPTOR GUIDED MISSILES TO KNOCK OUT AN ENEMIES GUIDED MISSILES WHICH HAD BEEN DETECTED BY OUR RADAR AND ITS COURSE PREDICTED BY OUR THINKING MACHINES. ROSENBERG WAS DISCUSSING THIS INFORMATION WITH ME, AS I SAID BEFORE, WHEN IT WAS A TOP AMERICAN SCIENTIFIC SECRET.

THE SIGNAL CORPS DURING WORLD WAR II AND WORKED AT FORT MONSOUTH AND AT OTHER PLACES WHICH WERE WORKING ON PRIME OR SUB-CONTACTS FOR THE SIGNAL CORPS SUCH AS THE EMERSON RADIO CORPORATION. AT ONE TIME, TOO ROSENBERG WAS AN INSPECTOR FOR THE SIGNAL CORPS.

AFTER THE WAR WHEN ROSENBERG AND I WERE IN BUSINESS TOGETHER IN NEW YORK, ROSENBERG USED HIS SIGNAL CORPS CONTACTS IN ATTEMPTS
TO OBTAIN CONTRACTS FOR PITT MACHINE PRODUCTS AND THE G & R ENGINERING COMPANY. AS A MATTER OF FACT, JULIUS MADE A NUMBER OF TRIPS

Q. DID ROSENBERG TELL YOU ANYTHING ABOUT WORKING ON THE PROXIMITY TUSE WHILE HE WAS AT THE SIGNAL CORPS INSTALLATION AT EMERSON.

A. YES. ROSENBERG TOLD ME THAT WHILE HE WAS EMPLOYED FOR THE SIGNAL CORPS AT EMERSON HE STOLE THE PROXIMITY FUSE AND GAVE IT TO THE RUSSIANS.

- A. YES. JULIUS TOLD ME THAT IT WAS HIS PRACTICE TO BRING HIS LUNCH TO WORK IN A BRIEF CASE. HE SAID THAT HE WAS ACTUALLY ABLE TO PLACE A PROXIMITY FUSE IN THE BRIEF CASE AND WALK OUT OF THE EMERSON PLANT WITH IT.

JULIUS, AT THIS TIME, WAS TRYING TO GET ME TO LEAVE THE SPY RING. WHEN I DIFFERED WITH JULIUS ON THE METHOD OF LEAVING THE COUNTRY, HE SAID THAT I SHOULD LEAVE VIA THE PORT OF NEW YORK, TAKING A STEAMSHIP TO FRANCE.

WHEN I REMONSTRATED WITH ROSENBERG SAYING THAT THIS WAS NOT A VERY GOOD METHOD SINCE I WOULD BE UNDER THE EYE OF THE F.B.I. AND THE STATE BEPARTMENT, JULIUS SAID THAT MORE IMPORTANT PEOPLE THAN I HAD LEFT BY THIS ROUTE. WHEN I ASKED WHO THEY WERE, JULIUS SAID "JOEL BARR, FOR ONE." JULIUS HAD TOLD ME THAT BARR WAS ONE OF THOSE WHO HAD GIVEN HIM INFORMATION ON ELECTRONIC APPARATUS. ROSENBERG THEN MENTIONED THAT HE HAD GOTTEN THE INFORMATION ON THE THINKING MACHINES FROM BARR.

JULIUS SAID THAT THERE WERE OTHERS WHO GAVE HIM INFORMATION BELATING TO ELECTRONICS. FOR EXAMPLE, HE ONCE TOLD ME HE HAD AN ESPIONAGE

AGENT AT GENERAL ELECTRIC WHO, LIKE ALL OF HIS OTHER ESPIONAGE AGENTS, WERE NOT MEMBERS OF COMMUNIST CELLS.

ON ONE OCCASION THERE WAS A TELEPHONE CALL FROM A MAN WHOSE VOICE I DID NOT RECOGNIZE. THE CALLER ASKED FOR JULIUS. I TOLD THE CALLER THAT JULIUS WAS OUT ON BUSINESS AND I TOLD HIM WHEN JULIUS COULD BE EXPECTED BACK. WHEN JULIUS RETURNED I TOLD HIM ABOUT THE CALL AND FROM THE FACTS I RELATED TO HIM HE IMMEDIATELY RECOGNIZED THE CALLER. A LITTLE LATER THE TELEPHONE RANG AGAIN AND JULIUS ANSWERED. AFTER JULIUS HUNG UP HE TOLD ME THAT HE HAD TO GO OUT TO MEET THE CALLER WHO WAS WAITING ON THE CORNER, THE CALL HAVING BEEN PLACED FROM A NEARBY TELEPHONE BOOTH. It will be recalled that after the interview of Greenglass by Roy Cohn at Lewisburg on 10-29-53, newspapers quoted Senator McCarthy as stating that Greenglass had given now testimony definitely tying the Rosenberg network to Fort Monmouth and the Signal Corps. It will be further recalled that 0. John Rogge, Greenglass' attorney, was present at this interview and advised that the FBI had previously covered every subject N explored by McCarthy investigators in their interview of Greenglass.

In a memorandum from Mr. Ladd to the Director dated 11-4-53. it was recommended that we interview Greenglass immediately to determine if he had given any new information to Cohn not previously known to the FBI. The Director noted that in view of the fact that the McCarthy Committee was due to be in Lewisburg on 11-6-53, to interview Greenglass in executive session, he thought it best to wait to interview Greenglass until the McCarthy Committee was through.

The McCarthy Committee has not interviewed Greenglass to In fact, a Washington City News Service item of 11-12-53, has quoted McCarthy as stating he "didn't know exactly when" he planned to visit Lewisburg.

Newspaper reports of 11-17-53, reveal that the McCarthy Committee is expected to open public hearings of its Fort Monmouth investigation on 11-24-53.

RECOMMENDATION:

Inasmuch as Greenglass has not been interviewed in example. session to date, it is believed advisable that we interview Greenglass at this time. Attached is a teletype to Philadelphia requesting such 15 m 64 .24 interview.

Washington City News Bervice release of 11-3-53, carries tealer to f Benator McCarthy that reading of the transcript of the interview of Greenglass by Roy Cohn reflects Greenglass has given process tealer to the testimony that will "definitely tie the Julius Rosenberg spy ring to the Army Signal Corps." The Director inquires "What about this." The release also states that Cohn said he felt Greenglass would cooperate in giving "all the information he has" including possible new material that was not touched on at the trial or under questioning by the FBI. The Director inquires "Have we again 'missed the boat.'"

It will be recalled that Cohn interviewed Greenglass at Lewisburg 10-29-53, and advised Mr. Nichols he felt Greenglass can establish there was espionage at Fort Monmouth and in the Signal Corps; that Joel Barr stole secret material and told Greenglass he had; that Rosenberg was engaged in espionage in the Signal Corps.

Barr was employed at Fort Monmouth from 7-1-40, to 2-23-42, and was dismissed when it was disclosed he had signed a CP petition in 1939.

Greenglass advised us during the Rosenberg investigation that when Rosenberg attempted to persuade him to flee the country, Rosenberg stated more important persons than Greenglass left the country and mentioned that Barr had left and was working for the Russians in Europe.

Our files do not reflect that Barr ever talked with Greenglass about his espionage activities. Further, our files do not reflect Rosenberg told Greenglass he or Barr was engaged in espionage in the Signal Corps. Greenglass did tell us that in September, 1945, Rosenberg admitted stealing a proximity fuse at the Emerson Corp., and turning it over to the Russians. Rosenberg was a Signal Corps inspector assigned to Emerson up to February, 1945, when he was dismissed. Rosenberg thereafter obtained private employment at Emerson in February, 1945, and worked the until December, 1945. The exact time Rosenberg stole this fuse has not been established.

On 10-29-53, Ruth Greenglass advised the NYO she knew nothing her husband could add to the stary he previously told the FBI. O. John Rogge, Greenglass' attorney, was present at the interview of Greenglass by Cohn and advised Greenglass told Cohn that Rosenberg stole the fuse from Emerson and that, according to Rosenberg, Barr had been at Fort Monmouth and was an important agent. Washington "Evening Star" of 11-3-53, reported that Rogge denied reports of the McCarthy Committee that Greenglass supplied important new information on espionage in the radar field. Rogge stated the FBI had previously covered every subject explored by the McCarthy investigators in their interview with Greenglass. SUBJECT:

Roy Cohn called. He stated their interview with Greenglass was very satisfactory; they feel Greenglass can definitely establish there was espionage at Fort Monmouth and in the Signal Corps; that Joel Barr stole secret material and told Greenglass he had that likewise Rosenberg was engaged in espionage activities in the Signal Corps.

Roy stated they contemplate calling Greenglass when they had hearings; that they were going to limit the questions asked Greenglass in his testimony to the Signal Corps and Fort Monmouth. Cohn was burnt up over their treatment at the prison. He stated the prison people sought to limit only two people to interviewing Greenglass, whereas the interview took place in a large conference room where at least 15 people could have sit down and he thinks this is a complete lack of cooperation on the part of the Department and he is not going to forget this. I told him it was a Departmental matter.

He asked if I thought he would have any difficulty getting Green glass to testify. I told him I was not in a position to comment on this as this was a Department matter.

Cohn then inquired whether we had received anything in the nature of a request from the Department for information on East and Snyder, two members of the Screening Board of the Secretary's office. I told him I had heard of nothing like this but then perhaps the Department was checking their files. He stated he was going to have Dick O'Melia call Minor and jack him up.

On this date United States Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., advised confidentially that on November 22, 1953, a Mr. DANIEL G. BUCKLEY, Investigator for the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations of the Committee on Government Operation, arrived at the U.S. Penitentiary at 5:00 p.m. and interviewed DAVID GREENGLASS until approximately 10:45 p.m. advised he and BUCKLEY were the only two in the room when GREENGLASS was interviewed.

- Did you plead guilty in Federal Court, New York, to conspiracy to commit espionage in which JULIUS ROSENBERG was involved?
- A. Yes, I did.
- Q. Did you, yourself, give atomic secrets to ROSENBERG and HARRY GOLD for transmission to Russia?
- A. Yes, when I was stationed at Los Alamos at the atomic bemb project, I passed sketches and other information on the bomb to ROSENBERG and to GOLD at their request.
- Q. After you were discharged from the service and left Los Alamos, did you have occasion to learn anything further about the espionage activities of the ROSENBERG ring?
- A. Yes. I was told more.
- Q. Under what circumstances?
- A. ROSENBERG and I went into the metal goods manufacturing business together in New York in 1946. While we were together, ROSENBERG told me certain things about the secrets and material they stole for Russia. Also, around the period after HARRY GOLD's arrest, when ROSENBERG was trying to get me to leave the United States and go to Russia, I found out more from him about those involved in the ring.
- Q. Did you learn if there was espionage in the Army Signal Corps?
- A. Yes. I learned that there was espionage in the Army Signal Corps. I learned that the ROSENBERG ring took and obtained secrets from the Army Signal Corps and transmitted them to Russia.
- Q. Will you give us some of the details concerning your knowledge of espionage in the Signal Corps?

Yes. ROBENBERG told me that the Russians had a very small and a very poor electronics industry, that is, of course, another name for the radar industry, and that it was of the utmost importance that information of an electronics nature be obtained and gotten to him. Things like electronic valves, (vacuum tubes) capicitors, transformers, and various other electronic and radio somponents were some of the things he was interested in.

ROSENBERG also told me that he gave all of the tube manuals he could get his hands on to Russia, some of which were classified Top Secret.

About 1947, at a time when it was the top United States scientific secret, JULIUS ROSENBERG told me about information he had obtained from a friend relating to a thinking machine which would send out interceptor guided missiles to knock out an enemy's guided missiles which had been detected by our radar and its course predicted by our thinking machines. ROSENBERG was discussing this information with me, as I said before, when it was a top American scientific secret.

Of course, it must be remembered that ROSENBERG was employed by the Signal Corps during World War II and worked at Fort Monmouth and the other places which were working on prime or subcontracts for the Signal Corps, such as the Emerson Radio Corporation. At that time too ROSENBERG was an inspector for the Signal Corps.

After the war, when ROSENBERG and I were in business together in New York, ROSENBERG used his Signal Corps contacts in attempts to obtain contracts for Pitt Machine Products and the G & R Engineering Company. As a matter of fact, JULIUS made a number of trips to Signal Corps efficials in Philadelphia for this purpose.

Once when I questioned JULIUS about the necessity of his frequent Philadelphia trips, he answered that not only were the trips necessary for company business, but also because he had to see his espionage contacts.

I also recall that in New York City there was a purchasing agent in the Air Corps whom JULIUS had met in the Signal Corps sometime earlier when both were in the Signal Corps. JULIUS was in contact with this individual and went to see him regularly.

- Q. Did ROSENBERG tell you anything about working on the proximity fuse while he was at the Signal Corps installation at Emerson?
- A. Yes, ROSENBERG told me that while he was employed for the Signal Corps at Emerson, he stole the proximity fuse and gave it to the Russians.
- Q. Did ROSENBERG tell you exactly how he accomplished this theft?
- A. Yes, JULIUS told me it was his practice to bring his lunch to work in a brief case. He said he was actually able to place a proximity fuse in the brief case and walk out of the Emerson plant with it.
- Q. Did ROSENBERG tell you what he had done with the proximity fuse once he had stolen it?
- A. Yes, he told me he handed it over to a Russian agent
- Q. Was ROSENBERG the only member of the ring who committed espionage in the Signal Corps?
- A. No, there were others.
- Q. Would you give us details on all you know about the others?
- A. Yes. There was JOEL BARR. He worked out at Fort Monmouth for the Signal Corps and later he worked with Sperry Gyroscope in Lake Success, New York. JULIUS, at this time, was trying to get me to leave the country, hoping that I would not be eaught and thereby expose the spy ring. When I differed with JULIUS on the method of leaving the country, he said I should leave via the Port of New York, taking a steamship to France.

When I remonstrated with RCB ENBERG, saying that this was not a very good method since I would be under the eye of the FBI and the State Department, JULIUS said that more important people than I had left by this route. When I asked who they were, JULIUS said, 'JOEL BARR, for one. JULIUS had told me that BARR was one of those who had given him information on the electronics apparatus. ROSENBERG then mentioned that he had gotten the information on the thinking machines from BARR.

Originally JULIUS had said that BARR had gone to Belgium to study music. JULIUS said that there were others who gave him information relating to electronics: for example. he once told me he had an espionage agent at General Electric who, like all of his other espionage agents, were not members of Communist cells. On one occasion, there was a telephone call from a man whose voice I did not recognize. The caller asked for JULIUS. I told the caller that JULIUS was out on business, and I told him when JULIUS could be expected back. When JULIUS returned, I told him about the call and, from the facts I related to him, he immediately recognized the caller. A little later. the telephone rang again and JULIUS answered. After JULIUS hung up, he told me he had to go out to meet the caller who was waiting on the corner, the call having been placed from a nearby telephone booth. I started to go out with JULIUS, being curious and wishing to see what the caller looked like, knowing from the mysterious circumstances surrounding the call and ROSENBERG's reaction to it that the caller was one of ROSENBERG's agents. JULIUS. however, did not want me to go, saying, 'I do not want you to see this man, so stay in the shop.' JULIUS did not return to work that day.

- When did the operations of the ROSENBERG ring, which had
- as its purpose the obtaining of radar for Russia, stop?
 As far as I know, these operations never stopped and could very possibly be continuing to this very day. When I was with the Arma Company during 1949 and 1950, working in the Research and Development Department on various fire control, gyroscopic and radar apparatus, JULIUS asked me to obtain information on the project upon which I was working. I refused.

Q. Do you know VIVIAR CLASSMAN?

NIK

A. Yes. I do.

- Q. Under what circumstances did you meet VIVIAN GLASSMAN?
- A. I first met VIVIAN GLASSMAN after the war, around 1946. I met VIVIAN at JULIUS and ETHEL's apartment where I was told she worked for some kind of a board that dealt with backward children. I believed she was employed as a secretary. VIVIAN, JULIUS, and ETHEL were exceedingly friendly. When, for example, ETHEL had to go out wednesday afternoons on her mysterious business, VIVIAN took care of the ROSENBERG children.

I also met VIVIAN down at our shop. JOEL BARR had some radio equipment at our shop. BARR was also building an electronics apparatus of some kind in the shop. VIVIAN would come to the shop to meet JOEL and they would eventually leave together. I later learned from JULIUS that JOEL and VIVIAN were keeping company together.

- Q. Did you believe VIVIAN GLASSMAN to be a member of the ROSENBERG spy ring?
- A. After JULIUS ROSENBERG told me about JOEL BARR, I, knowing about the relationship between JOEL BARR and VIVIAN GLASSMAN, came to the conclusion that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was involved in some way.
- Q. With reference to some of the other information which you had given to Mr. CARR, Mr. COHN, Mr. SCHINE, and Mr. BUCKLEY, of the Subcommittee staff, would you be agreeable to answering questions in the near future?
- A. I am going to answer any questions and give any information I may have if, in so doing, I can help my country and its authorities in exposing what had been done in giving Russia our secrets."

MINOPSIS:

Information furnished by Greenglass to McCarthy Committee in affidavit 11-22-53. Comparison of said information with information previously furnished by Greenglass to Bureau set forth. Analysis reflects no information of particular significance furnished by Greenglass to McCarthy Committee which was not previously known to the Bureau except for following: Greenglass recalled Rosenberg gave all tube manuals he could get his hands on to Russia; that Rosenberg had received from a friend information about atthinking machine which had some relation to guided missiles. Greenglass interviewed 11-23-53, and 11-24-53, by Philadelphia Office and states all information he gave McCarthy Committee was previously furnished to Bureau except States he recalled information concerning tube foregoing items. manuals for first time on 11-22-53. States information concerning thinking machine furnished to him by Rosenberg at same time Rosenberg mentioned receiving information on sky platform project. Bufiles reflect Greenglass advised us in 1950 about information received from Rosenberg concerning sky platform project, but no mention made 🖰 by Greenglass to Bureau agents concerning thinking machine.

RECOMMENDATION

l. That Liaison Section contact Research and Development Division of Department of Defense and Special Weapons Project of Department of Defense to determine if thinking machine mentioned by Greenglass ever existed and if so, identity of those plants which might have worked on device. If positive information is received as a result of this inquiry, the Field will be immediately requested to institute investigation in an effort to identify Rosenberg's possible source for such information.

2. Attached for approval is memo to G-2, advising of the above and soliciting their efforts to identify tube manuals.

DETAILS:

There is set forth hereinafter a summary of information furnished by David Greenglass in an affidavit dated 11-22-53, which he gave to the McCarthy Committee in connection with its inquiry into suspected espionage at the Army Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth. There is also set forth hereinafter a comparison of this information with the information previously furnished to the Bureau by David Greenglass.

Greenglass advised the McCarthy Committee that he learned the Rosenberg ring obtained secrets from the Army - Signal Corps as the result of the following details related to him by Rosenberg:

(1) Rosenberg was employed by the Army Signal Corps during World War II and worked at Fort Monmouth and other places, such as Emerson, which had contracts with the Signal Corps.

COMMENT - Rosenberg was employed by the Army Signal Corps from September, 1940 to February, 1945, when he was dismissed for being a Communist. He was an inspector who had been assigned to various private plants having Signal Corps contracts, among these plants being the Emerson Company. Rosenberg was never employed at Fort Monmouth, although he did attend a training school from September, 1940 to December, 1940, when he was preparing for his job as an inspector.

(2) Rosenberg told Greenglass that the Russians had a very poor electronics industry and it was of utmost importance that information of an electronics nature be obtained such as electronic valves, tubes, etc.

COMMENT - The signed statement of David Greenglass dated 7-17-50, which he furnished agents states: Rosenberg has told me that the Russians are very weak in electronics and radio tubes and any information in that regard is very valuable to them. (65-58236-320 page 22)

(3) Rosenberg gave all the tube manuals he could get his hands on to the Russians, some of which were classified top secret.

COMMENT - A check of available files in the Rosenberg and Greenglass cases does not reflect Greenglass specifically told us Rosenberg had taken tube manuals. However, it is

noted that during the search of the Rosenberg apartment on 7-17-50, by Bureau agents incidental to Rosenberg's arrest, agents located two War Department technical manuals which related to milling machines. Colonel Dawson of G-2 examined these manuals and stated there was no record that these manuals were ever classified. He advised that Rosenberg violated no security regulations for having these manuals in his possession. (65-58236-328 page 192, & serial 928)

On 11-23-53, Greenglass was interviewed by an agent of the Philadelphia Office at Lewisburg Penitentiary and he advised that the information concerning tube manuals had come to his mind only the day before (11-22-53).

(4) About 1947 Rosenberg advised Greenglass he had obtained from a friend information concerning a thinking machine which would send out interceptor guided missiles to knock out enemy guided missiles detected by our radar.

COMMENT - A review of available files in the Greenglass and Rosenberg cases fails to reflect that Greenglass specifically furnished us information concerning a thinking machine. Greenglass told us of various data Rosenberg allegedly obtained from his contacts such as information on the sky platform project, mathematics relating to atomic energy propulsion of airplanes and information on jet planes. (65-58236-328, pages 21, 22)

In an interview of Greenglass on 11-23-53, by a Bureau agent he stated that the information concerning the thinking machine was furnished to him by Rosenberg at the same time Rosenberg mentioned receiving information on the sky platform project.

(5) After the war when Rosenberg was in private business, he used his Signal Corps contacts in attempts to obtain contracts and made a number of trips to Signal Corps officials in Philadelphia for this purpose. Rosenberg also used these trips to see espionage contacts.

COMMENT - In a statement on 7-17-50, Greenglass advised us that he learned during his association with Rosenberg in business from 1946 to 1949, that Rosenberg had espionage contacts in Cleveland, Ohio, and in upstate New York at

such cities as Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo and Schenectady. (65-58236-328 page 21)

(6) There was a purchasing agent in the Air Corps whom Rosenberg went to see regularly. This individual had previously been in the Signal Corps with Rosenberg.

COMMENT - Available files fail to reflect that Greenglass told us Rosenberg was regularly seeing a purchasing agent of the Air Corps. However, our files do reflect that during the Rosenberg investigation the name of Milton Klein, Army Air Force, was found in Rosenberg's desk at his place of business. Greenglass was asked if he knew this individual and he said no. Klein was interviewed 1-30-51, by Bureau agents at the Air Force Material Command, 67 Broad Street, New York City, his place of employment. Klein admitted he was formerly employed with Rosenberg in the Army Signal Corps and had contact with him on several occasions until 1945. Klein thereafter went to work for the Air Force. Klein stated that Rosenberg attempted to solicit Air Force business from him without success. Klein stated at no time did Rosenberg attempt to secure classified information from him. (65-58236-503, page 86; serial 922, page 68)

(7) Rosenberg told Greenglass that while employed for the Signal Corps at Emerson he stole a proximity fuse by putting it in his briefcase and gave it to the Russians.

COMMENT - Greenglass previously furnished this information to us in his signed statement of 7-17-50. Greenglass also testified concerning this at the trial. (65-58236-320 page 22)

(8) Greenglass named Joel Barr as another member of the Rosenberg ring who committed espionage in the Signal Corps. Barr had worked at Fort Monmouth and later at Sperry Gyroscope Company, Lake Success, New York. Greenglass related that Rosenberg, in trying to convince Greenglass to flee the United States, teld Greenglass more important people had left and Rosenberg specifically mentioned Barr. Rosenberg told Greenglass that Barr was one of those who gave him information on electronics and the thinking machine.

COUMENT - Our files reflect that in 1950 and 1951 Greenglass had inquired of Rosenberg in 1947, shortly prior to Barr's departure for Europe, if Barr and his girl friend, Vivian Glassman, were in the espionage setup. Rosenberg assered

sharply *no.* A short time later, Rosenberg admitted to Greenglass that Barr was active in the network. In 1950, when Rosenberg was trying to convince Greenglass to flee the United States, Rosenberg told Greenglass that more important people had already left the country and specifically mentioned Barr as one of these people. (65-59453-106 page 6, 7)

Our files do not reflect that Rosenberg ever told Greenglass the specific type of information he had received from Barr.

During the interview of Greenglass by a Bureau agent on 11-23-53, at Lewisburg he admitted that he did not know as a fact what information Barr furnished to Rosenberg, but that it was his opinion only that Barr gave information on electronics and the thinking machine because Barr had worked at Fort Monmouth and later at Sperry. Greenglass further admitted that Rosenberg never told him that Barr was engaged in espionage while employed with the Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth. This information contradicts the information Greenglass furnished the McCarthy Committee in his affidavit.

(9) Rosenberg mentioned to Greenglass that he had an espionage contact at General Electric, Schenectady, who gave information on electronics.

COMMENT -Greenglass previously advised us in 1950 that Rosenberg told him he had a friend in upstate New York working on jet planes. It was Greenglass' opinion that this friend probably worked at General Electric, Schenectady. (65-59028-307, page 48)

(10) During Greenglass' employment at Arma Corporation in 1949 and 1950 Rosenberg asked him to obtain information. Greenglass refused.

COMMENT - Greenglass previously told us in 1950 that he had furnished no information to Julius Rosenberg concerning his work at Arma Corporation. (65-58236-328, page 138)

(11) Greenglass came to the conclusion that Vivian Glassman was involved in some way in the Rosenberg ring because of her close friendship with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and the fact that she was Joel Barr's close friend.

<u>COMMENT</u> - Greenglass previously advised us of this information in 1950. (65-59334-187 pages 30, 31, 32)

An analysis of the above information reflects that no information of particular significance was furnished by Greenglass to the McCarthy Committee which was not previously known to the Bureau except the information concerning the tube manuals and the thinking machine. As stated hereinbefore, Greenglass advised us on 11-23-53, that information concerning the tube manuals was recalled by him for the first time on 11-22-53, the date of his interview by a McCarthy Committee investigator. Also, as stated hereinbefore he recalled that the information concerning the thinking machine was furnished to him by Rosenberg at the same time Rosenberg mentioned receiving information on the sky platform project.

Reference is made to the memorandum dated November 27, 1953, from Mr. Branigan to Mr. Belmont under the above caption. which requests that through liaison we obtain from the Defense Department any information relating to the identity of those plants which might be involved in the manufacturing of a thinking machine" referred to by Greenglass.

On November 30, 1953, Mr. Ellis met with the following individuals who comprise the Guided Missile Committee of Research and Development, Department of Defense: Commander E. B. Johnson, Colonel J. W. Herndon, Lieutenant Colonel A. F. Rollins, Mr. J. O. Spriggs and Major Kent Herrin.

The Committee pointed out that there are a number of projects which deal with anti-missile missiles and various homing devices which were either under study or actually in some stage of production in 1946.

The Committee was of the opinion that the two larger projects in this field, and therefore the most logical ones to which Rosenberg might have referred, are Project Wizard at the University of Michigan, and Project Thumper at the General Electric plant, Schenectady, New York.

Project Wizard was and still is an Air Force project dealing with the counteraction of ballistic missiles, that is, anti-missile missiles. This project was actually geared to produce hardware in 1946 but the project has been retarded and has only been in a study stage during the last four years. The actual plant in which this work is being done in connection with the University of Michigan project is at Willow Run, Michigan.

Project Thumper, a contract let to General Electric at Schenectady, New York, also dealt with an anti-missile missile. It involved a proposed computor devised to smooth out radar data, () compute relative location of target, measure proposed collision course, and determine time of detonation. RECORDED - 60 65-59428

In addition to the above two projects the Committee was asked to compile a complete list of all other projects under study as being pertinent to Rosenberg's reference to a "thinking machine" or "brain mechanism." The Committee undertook this rather extensive research and has come up with the attached list of projects handled by the three services. It will be noted that the Navy list is separate and the Army and Air Force list is combined. These lists reflect the name of a contractor and the address, the contract number, the project, and personnel with titles who were in charge of the respective projects.

It was the Committee's recommendation that from a practical standpoint, and considering the Bureau's problem, that the possibility that Rosenberg's remark referred most logically to either the Wizard or Thumper Projects be considered first before the other possibilities are explored.

RECOUMENDATION:

That this matter be referred to the Espionage Section for information. A tickler copy has been referred directly to Supervisor Litrento, who is handling this case.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN

GLASSMAN was a girl friend of JOEL BARR and has been identified by DAVID GREENGLASS as a member of the ROSENBERG apparatus. She has been associated with many of the person involved in this ring and admitted to FBI agents that she delivered \$2000 to WILLIAM PERL in Cleveland with instructions for his flight from the U.S. to Mexico. This money supposedly came from a Soviet agent. After PERL refused the money, she was contacted by this man, who reclaimed the money. She has refused to identify this individual.

HARRY GOLD

GOLD is a self-confessed courier of an espionage ring, which turned atomic research information over to a representative

of the Soviet government. GOLD was tried and convicted for his activity and sentenced to prison for 30 years on 12/9/50.

RECOMMENDATION:

David Greenglass was indicted with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Porton Sobell for conspiracy to commit espionage for the Soviets. He pled guilty, testified as a government witness and was sentenced to 15 years. He turned over to the Rosenbergs, information about the atom bomb and Los Alamos.

Ruth Greenglass - wife

Ruth Greenglass, wife of David Greenglass, was named as a conspirator in the indictment naming the Rosenbergs and her husband.

She was sent by the Rosenbergs from New York City to Alburquerque, to recruit her husband to turn over information on the atom bomb to the Rosenbergs. She was present when David turned over information to Harry Gold and the Rosenbergs. She was never indicted but did testify as a government witness against the Rosenbergs.

GLASSMAN advised that during interview on 8/3/50, that on the night of 7/31/50 she was contacted by a man whose identity was unknown to her, who asked her to deliver \$2000 in cash and instructions to leave the U.S. and go to Mexico to WILLIAM PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, and that she had contacted PERL in Cleveland, but that he refused to take the money and that the unknown man contacted her again on 7/27/50 to whom she returned the money. GLASSMAN refused to assist agents to identify this man. She is now married to ERNEST J. PATANI, subject of a blind memo.

ANNE SIDOROVICH — Subject and his wife, RUTH GREENGIASS have identified MICHAEL and ANNE SIDOROVICH as close friends of JULIUS ROSHIBEIG. Both the GREENGIASSES said that they were told by RUSHIBEIG that ANNE SIDOROVICH would contact them in New Mexico to get information from DAVID GREENGIASS about the atom bomb.

HARRY GOID — is a self-confessed courier of an espionage ring, which turned atomic research information over to representatives of the Government of Soviet Russia. GOID was tried and convicted for his activity and sentenced to prison for thirty years on 12/9/50.

The Bureau is advised that Mrs. TESSIE XERERGLASS, Mother of DAVID GREENGLASS and ETHEL ROSENBERG, suffered a slight stroke during the early part of January, 1954. As a result, she has been confined to bed and will be so confined for another two or three weeks. She telephonically advised SA John A. Harrington today, 2/2/54, of these circumstances.

Mrs. CREENGLASS stated her physical condition will prohibit her from ever visiting her son, DAVID GREENGLASS at Lewisburg Penitentiary. She advised that it is her belief that DAVID would be retained at Lewisburg and that no appeal which she would make to the Bureau of Prisons would effect his removal to another penitentiary. She said she hoped DAVID could be moved to the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Connecticut, where she could visit him. The trip to Lewisburg imposed a physical hardship upon her which her doctor has advised she could not undergo again. A trip to Lewisburg from New York requires an overnight trip whereas Mrs. GREENGLASS could visit Benbury and return on the same day.

Mrs. GREENGLASS asked that her desires in this regard be trans mitted to the Director as she believed he would understand the feelings that motivate her request without setting them forth in detail. She said she would have written to the Director personally but that she could not write English.

The Bureau is advised that it has been ascertained from Warden Edward Thompson of the Federal House of Detention, New York City, that there is no prohibition in the regulations of the Bureau of Prisons to placing a man doing DAVID's term of fifteen years in a Correctional Institution.

In view of the cooperation of DAVID and TESSIE GREENGLASS with this Bureau during the investigation and prosecution of the ROSENBERG case, it is the recommendation of the New York Office that, if at all possible, the Bureau intercede on behalf of Mrs. CREENGLASS in this request. It is suggested that her request be brought to the attention of the Attorney General

As you are aware David Greenglass brother of Ethel Rosenberg, is serving a fifteen-year sentence, in the United States Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, for his part in the Julius Rosenberg espionage conspiracy. It will be recalled that Greenglass and his wife, Ruth, were most effective Government witheases against Julius and Ethel Rosenberg at the Rosenberg trial. The Greenglas have continued to cooperate with this Bureau.

It has been brought to my attention that Mrs. Tessie Greenglass, mother of David Greenglass and Ethel Rosenberg, suffered a slight stroke during the early part of January, 1954, which has necessitated her confinement to bed for an indefinite period. She, too, has been most cooperative with this Bureau in the Rosenberg investigation. She advised our New York Office that her physical condition will prevent her from ever visiting her son at Lewisburg Penitentiary. Her doctor has reportedly stated that she cannot undergo the trip to Lewisburg again because of the physical hardship that would be imposed upon her. It is the hope of Mrs. Greenglass that her son might be moved to the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Connectiout, where she could visit him. Ashe stated o that the trip to Lewisburg from New York is an overnighterip whereas if her son were transferred to Danbury, shen sould visit him and return to her home the same day. She miquested that her desires be made known to this Bureau.

The foregoing information is being brought to four attention for your assistance in considering the desiderof Hrs. Greenglass. At the suggestion of Mr. Belmont, I spoke to Deputy Attorney General William Rogers regarding our memorandum of February 5th pointing out the fact that it would be more convenient for the mother of David Greenglass to see him at Danbury Prison rather than at Lewisburg, which memo also makes the point that in view of Mrs. Greenglass' physical condition, she would not get to see her son in the future.

Rogers stated he thoroughly agreed that Greenglass should be transferred to Danbury and while I was with him, he called Jim Bennett on the phone. Bennett apparently had already sent a memo to Rogers, which Rogers had not seen. Bennett made three points in opposing the transferring of Greenglass to Danbury. One, they have a rule in force in Danbury providing that individuals will not be assigned there who are serving prison terms in excess of five years. Bennett stated that if Greenglass were to be transferred to Danbury, it would give the appearance he was a stool pigeon and this would be bad. Thirdly, Bennett told Rogers there was some concern about the physical security of Greenglass from threats inasmuch as he had testified against his own sister; that at Lewisburg they have him working in a shop with only one person, who is thoroughly reliable; that they would not have the same amount of security at Danbury. Bennett told Rogers it would be possible to work out a plan whereby at periodic intervals they sent Greenglass to Danbury for short periods of time, via bus, on the ground he had to be interviewed or some thing likenthateD . 15 65-8

I told Rogers the rule against assigning persons to Danbury permanently who were serving terms more than five years, of course, seemed to be a ligitimate excuse, but that Bennett's second and third reasons were just so much hogwash. Rogers stated he would get hold of Bennett's memo and would try to see what could be done.

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Bearles dated February 2, 1954, captioned "Julius Besenberg, Stal, Septenage - R," suggesting the request of Mrs. Tessie Greenglass that her son, David, be transferred from Lewisburg Penitentiary to the Federal Gerreational Institution, Danbury, Connecticut, he brought to the attention of the Atterney General.

The facts centained in your letter mere brought to the attention of the Atterney General, and information has been received from Deputy Atterney General Villian Regers that Junes 7. Bennett, Director, Federal Bureau of Pricens, to opposing such a transfer for Greenglass. Mr. Bennett bases his opposition on three points:

- In A rule in force at the Federal Correctional Institution, Danbury, provides that individuals serving terms in excess of five years will not be assigned there.
- 2. Such a transfer would make Greenglass appear to be a "ateol pigeon."
- B. Hene concern is felt about the physical security of Greenglase as he had testified against his eleter. Mr. Bennett hated that at Lewisburg Penttentiary Greenglase works in a shop with one other thoroughly reliable person but such security could not be had at Danbury.



Regarding individuals having knowledge of any phases of Soviet espionage activities, either in the United States or abroad, a review of material made available to this office does not reveal that DAVID GREENGLASS has been included in this program. Accordingly, his name is being submitted.

DAVID GREENGLASS - Philadelphia

This individual is now incarcerated at the Federal Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa., where he is serving a 15-year sentence. While in the U.S. Army, he worked as a machinist at Los Alamos, Hew Mexico, from 1944-1946. He was recruited into the Soviet espionage system by his brother-in-law and sister, Julius and ETHEL ROSENBERG. In 1945, he furnished to HARRY GOID, admitted Soviet agent, sketches relating to the atomic bomb. He testified as a Government witness at the ROSENBERG trial. GREENGLASS is cooperative and has furnished information on other associates of ROSENBERG who allegedly were recruited by ROSENBERG into Soviet espionage. By attached letter dated March 24, 1955, Villiam P. Norton, Ir., former Special Agent, forwarded a letter dated March 23, 1955, which he received from Ruth Greenglass, wife of the subject, asking him to write a letter to the Parole Board on behalf of her husband indicating the subject will be eligible for parole in February, 1956. Norton requests advice as this is a matter arising from his former position as a Special Agent since the Julius Rosenberg espionage case was assigned to him in the New York office in 1950.

David and Ruth Greenglass admitted participating in Soviet espionage with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed Soviet agents. David Greenglass, a brother of Ethel Rosenberg, was indicted for conspiracy to commit espionage and on April 6, 1951, was sentenced to 15 years. Both the subject and his wife testified on behalf of the Government during the trial of the Rosenbergs. Background information concerning the subject including mitigating circumstances was furnished to the Bureau of Prisons in the form of a parole report dated April 14, 1951.

William F. Norton, Jr. entered on duty with the Bureau on January 21, 1941, and resigned December 31, 1953. He is now practicing law at Widdletown, New York. His services while with the Bureau were satisfactory

Since his resignation correspondence with him has been cordial. b7C During 1950 the case captioned "Julius Rosenberg, was, et al, Espionage - R" was assigned to Norton in the New York office and he is aware of the details of the cooperation given the Government by Greenglass.

For your information, Mrs. Buth Greenglass, wife of the subject, has contacted Villian F. Morton, Jr., and John A. Marrington, former Special Agents of this Bureau who handled some of the investigation in instant case, and has requested them to direct letters to the furele Board on behalf of her husband who becomes eligible for parole in February, 1956. Mr. Marrington informed her hu was precluded from writing such a letter and Mrs. Greenglass then directed a letter to him, asking him to request Bureau permission to write the Furole Board. 

On 10-5-55 C. A. Rolander, Deputy Director of Security, Atomic Energy Commission (AEC), advised Liaison Agent Bates he had received a letter from Dr. Frederic de Heffmann, Vice President of General Dynamics Corporation and formerly an employee of the AEC. De Hoffmann stated he had received a letter from Ruth Greenglass, 4 wife of subject, in which she had asked for an appointment with 2 De Hoffmann. She stated "I am the wife of David Greenglass whom L'C you have met and the problem I would like to discuss with you concerns our future. De Hoffmann stated that he would prefer not to talk to her; on the other hand he was ready to be of any assistance to the AEC or the Department of Justice in any way possible. He asked Rolander what he should do. >

Bolander recalled that De Hoffman at the time the Fuche case broke was an employee of the AEC and assisted in an interview with Greenglass after his arrest. Bolander wanted to know whether the Bureau had any comments to make on whether or not De Hoffmann should see Ruth Greenglass. Her request to see De Hoffmann may possibly involve her efforts to assist her husband in obtaining parole from his sentence. Rolander pointed out that there might be a possibility that she could have additional information which Greenglass had given her. However, it is felt that the Bureau should not be placed in the position of advising De Hoffmann whether he should or should not see Ruth Greenglass.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that Liaison advise Rolander that the Bureau has no comment to make as to whether De Hoffmann should or should not see Buth Greenglass but that in the event he does see her, the Bureau would appreciate receiving any information he might obtain.
