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By attached letter dated 10/18/55, the Philadelphia office advised that Acting Chief, Immigration & Naturalization Service (INS), Philadelphia, requested permission to interview the subject to determine if he could be developed as an informant for general use by INS. INS stated it has no particular case in mind. Philadelphia advised local INS office to handle this matter through the Central Office, contacting the Bursau.

Greenglass is now serving a 15-year term in U.S. Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., for conspiracy to commit exionage and probably will be eligible for parole in early 1956. Harry Gold, admitted Soviet agent, is also serving a 30-year term in that prison. By letter of 12/27/54 the Warden, Lewisburg Penitentiary, advised that anti-Communist feeling in the prison was strong and he felt frequent interviews might intensify the feelings against Gold and Greenglass. It is noted this is the prison in which William Remington was incarcerated until he was killed on 11/22/54 by three other inmates. By letter 1/11/55 Philadelphia was instructed to reduce the frequency of interviews with Greenglass and Gold. SAC Letter 55-4 (L) informed all offices of this restriction and instructed no exploratory leads were to be set out to interview these men. By meno 1/11/55 Assistant Attorney General Tempkins was advised of the Varden's statements and that we were taking steps to reduce the frequency of the interviews.

ACTION: There is attached for your approval a letter to the Assistant Attorney General, William F. Tompkins, with a copy for INS, advising him of the inquiry received from INS and of our restrictions on the interviews of Greenglass and that it is believed inadvisable for INS to conduct any exploratory interviews.

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Supervisor Tom McAndrews called from New York on Herman December 1, 1955. He advised that former Special Agent John Gand Harrington who handled much of the investigation in the Greenglass case has been contacted by Ruth Greenglass, subject David Greenglass wife. Ruth states that David Greenglass will be up for parole in January and she requested Harrington to act as David Greenglass parole advisor. Harrington has advised the New York Office that he is not particularly desirous of accepting responsibility of acting as Greenglass parole advisor; however, he stated that if it will be to the Bureau's advantage in any respect, he will be glad to do so.

Both Ruth and David Greenglass have cooperated with the Bureau both during the investigation and during the trial. They played an important role in the successful prosecution of the subjects in the Rosenberg case. Former Agent Harrington handled the interviews with them and was in almost daily contact with them for a long period of time.

It would be desirable to have a parole advisor for Greenglass who would the proper interest des Greenglass at heart and who would not become involved in any sense with the still active Communists groups who are attempting to make propaganda out of the Rosenberg case. While Harrington offering to act in capacity of parole advisor would meet the problem of seeing that Greenglass is properly advised it could give the Communist forces a basis for charging that since Harrington is an ex-Agent the FBI is still attempting to retain control of Greenglass. McAndrews states that former AUSA James Kilsheimer was active in prosecution of the Rosenberg case. He is now in private practice of law and would undoubtedly have an interest in Greenglass and might well be willing to act as parole advisor.

<u> BECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is believed highly desirable that in the event Greenglass receives parole that he has a parole advisor who will not allow him to get in the clutches of Communist groups such as the Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case. Both of the Greenglasses have been of great benefit to the Government and it is felt that we should help out in this matter if it can be done discreetly.

It is recommended that we instruct the New York Office to advise former Agent Harrington that the Bureau does not desire to ask him to act in the capacity of parole advisor for subject Greenglass.

It is further recommended that the New York Office be instructed to discreetly contact Kilsheimer to see if he desires to act in such capacity for Greenglass and if so the New York Office suggest to Ruth Greenglass that she may desire to contact him. If this action is approved, New York will be instructed to handle this matter discreetly so that the Bureau will not be identified as attempting to intervene in the designation of parole advisor for Greenglass.

On December 1, 1955, the New York Office was advised by former special Agent John Harrington that he had been contacted by Ruth Greenglass the subject's wife, to inquire if he, Harrington, would act as David Greenglass' parole adviser, if David Greenglass is paroled in January, 1956. Harrington, while not particularly desirous of accepting the responsibility, stated that he would be willing to so act if it would be to the Bureau's advantage.

In view of the desirability for Greenglass having a parole adviser who would not let him get in the clutches of Communist groups, the New York Office was instructed to discreetly contact former Assistant U. S. Attorney James Kilsheimer, who was active in the prosecution of the Rosenberg case, to see if he desired to act as parole adviser for Greenglass and if agreeable, New York was instructed to discreetly contact Ruth Greenglass and suggest she get in touch with Kilsheimer. Former SA Harrington would not be an acceptable parole adviser since his former connection with the FBI might lead to a charge by the Communists that the FBI is still trying to obtain control of Greenglass. New York was instructed to advise Harrington the Bureau does not desire him to act as parole adviser.

 Supervisor Thomas McAndrews called today and advised that Kilsheimer had been discreetly contacted and that he was entirely agreeable to act as parole adviser for Greenglass. McAndrews advised that Ruth Greenglass was also agreeable and was going to be in contact with Kilsheimer. Former SA Harrington has been advised that the Bureau does not desire him to act as parole adviser, to which he is perfectly agreeable.

ACTION:

No further action is necessary. The parole hearings will come up in January and if it is decided to grant parole to Greenglass, the Board will in the same of the same inquire from him who he desires to act as his adviser at which time Mrs. Greenglass will submit the name of Applies Kilsheimer.

The eighth person died in 1939 and the ninth person declined an interview. RECOMMENDATION: No action indicated regarding the nine prospective witnesses involved in the Greenglass and Gold cases. 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The following nine people have been subject of past Bureau investigations. All have been interviewed by the Bureau with the exception of Briggs who died in 1939 and Page who declined to be interviewed.

<u>PAUL WILLIAMS</u> is an aeronautical engineer for whom Julius Rosenberg worked following graduation from engineering school in 1939. Williams denied being involved in espionage setivities.

MARK PAGE, with alias Marous: Pogarsky, and his wife, Stella, were long time acquaintances of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed Soviet agents. Ruth Greenglass, wife of David, said Rosenberg told her he attempted to recruit Page into espionage and was upset by Page's refusal. Page refused to be interviewed by agents on December 15, 1950, and again on February 18 and March 12, 1953. On January 31 and February 7, 1951, he refused to answer questions before a Federal grand jury.

DR. HENRY LINSCHITZ is a scientist who was employed at Los Alamos 1943-46. David Greenglass included his name on list of personnel he furnished Gold or Rosenberg as possible espionage recruits. Linschitz admitted knowing Greenglass but denied espionage.

FRED HELLER, a mutual friend of Thomas Black and Harry Gold, confessed Soviet agents; admitted furnishing technical information to the Soviets in 1934. He denied any contact with Soviets since 1934. He has denied espionage.

THOMAS BLACK in 1950 admitted being involved in Soviet espionage and that he introduced Gold to his (Gold's) first Soviet espionage superior. The Department in 1953 advised no prosecutive action being taken against Black.

<u>VERONICA KANE</u>, with aliases Vera Kane, was a close acquaintance of both Heller and Black. Kane in the mid-thirties typed technical information that Heller and Black had procured for the Soviet Union. She has denied knowing this information was destined for the Soviet Union.

ABRAHAM BROTHMAN has been identified by both Elizabeth T. Bentley and Harry Gold as having been involved in Soviet espionage activities. Brothman was convicted in November, 1950, of conspiracy to obstruct justice. He served his sentence in the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta and was released in November, 1952.

<u>RICHARD BRIGGS</u>, who died in 1939, according to Alfred Dean Slack, confessed Soviet agent, was the person who introduced Slack to Gaik Ovakimian, a known Soviet espionage agent. Slack through his association with Briggs met Ovakimian and at a later date Harry Gold.

BENJAMIN SMILG during interviews in 1950 admitted Harry Gold contacted him while he was employed at Fright Field, Dayton, Ohio. Smilg denied espionage. Gold in interviews has stated his Soviet superiors suggested he contact Smilg and get information from him in the late 1930's. Gold stated Smilg never gave him any information. Smilg was indicted for perjury in November, 1952, on the basis of statements he made before a Loyalty-Security Hearing Board at Wright Patterson Air Force Base. The trial of Smilg began on June 13, 1955. On June 18, 1955, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Communist Political Association, having met Julius and Ethel Rosenberg through Joel Barr and that Rosenberg propositioned him but stated "he didn't bite." Sarant allowed Agents to search his home on July 19 and 20, 1950. No warrant was obtained for his arrest. In August, 1950, in company with Dayton's wife, Sarant disappeared, and Sarant and Mrs. Dayton are known to have been in Mexico on August 13, 1950. His present location is not known.

Due to the inaccuracy of the statements of Greenglass, it is not believed likely that he obtained this information from FBI Agents. It is possible he reconstructed the above information from certain questions which may have been asked him as well as reading in the newspapers. It is noted Mrs. Sarant appeared before a public session of the McCarthy Committee and while she claimed the Fifth Amendment, the nature of the questions asked would provide certain information. Further, Weldon Bruce Dayton is attempting to obtain a passport to India and brought an action in the District Court to force the State Department to issue this passport. The denial of the State Department was upheld in the District Court with attendant newspaper publicity.

RECOMMENDATION:

1) Since Greenglass has stated he furnished a list of 20-25 names to the Committee in Executive Session, it is suggested that Mr. Nichols obtain a transcript of the testimony given by Greenglass in the Executive Session when these names were furnished in order to compare these names with the 18 names he furnished the Bureau. It is believed Greenglass testified in Executive Session on some date prior to April 26.

2) There is attached a letter to Philadelphia instructing that Greenglass be reinterviewed regarding his statement that he btained information from the FBI.

DAVID GREENGLASS, inmate, USP, Lewisburg, Pa., advised SA WAYNE G. HUNT on 5-17-56 that in his testimony before the Senate Interpal Security Subscamittee on 4-27-56, he was referring to Professor HANS HETHE, Cornell University, as the well known Scientist and to AIFRED SARANT as the friend of JURISBARE.

Regarding the statement, "Now I know nothing about this except where I have learned this from the FBI later on", GREENGLASS stated he meant he had no knowledge of this matter until after his arrest and the subsequent interviews by FBI agents in New York City. Following his arrest, GREENGLASS added, he was questioned extensively by different agents on numerous occasions regarding many people and many incidents. It is GREENGLASS's recollection that SARANT's mane was mentioned as an espionage agent on whom he might have information. ORKENGIASS stated at first that his version of the attempted arrest of SARANT resulted from information furnished to him by the agents during interviews, but later admitted that part of it may have resulted from his own deductions based on information that formed part of the questioning, as well as information he possibly overheard.

Regarding his testimony that "This friend approached the prefessor with a letter of introduction", GREENGLASS stated this was mostly supposition on his part as a logical way to make such a contact. He also indicated his testimony, "Using this name . . at this time, "was also mostly supposition on his part-

CREENGLASS claimed he is unable to remember the names of FBI agents and others who interviewed him regarding specific individuals or matters, such as ALFRED SARANT or the HANS BETHE matter. GREENGLASS sould not attribute any particular bit of information to any individual.

It is pointed out that GREENGLASS has been interrogated by representatives of Senate committees as well as by the FBI and it is

possible that if information was actually imparted to him it may have come in the course of interrogation by Senate investigators without ORMENGLASS now being able to specify the source or time.

GREENGIASS advised that prior to his testimony, he told Mr. MORRIS of the Subcommittee that some of the information in his possession was not of his own knowledge but was obtained when interviewed by the FBI. Mr. MORRIS told him that FBI files were secret but for him to testify as to what he had learned from the FBI as this was a good way to disseminate such information to the public.

GREENGLASS concluded by saying that he was "scared" and "very nervous" during the time he was giving testimony and may have said some things which did not make too much sense. He claimed that this situation upset him both before and after his testimony, especially since his wife was discharged from her position as a result of his testimony because her employer did not mant to receive any publicity.

SA HUNT noted during interview that since he testified under cath, GREENGLASS appeared to wish to wouch for the accuracy of what he had said even though he may not now be too sure whether the information same from his own deduction or assumption after being questioned by agents, or whether it was something he might have overheard while being questioned, and that he appeared to be reluctant to discuss his statement in detail.

Since GREENGLASS was recently denied parole and since in his testimony before the Subcommittee he indicated that the FBI imparted information to him, the possibility exists that GREENGLASS may have exaggerated his testimony in order to make a better impression on the Subcommittee with the thought in mind that the Subcommittee might effect an earlier release for him. On April 27, 1956, David Greenglass, admitted Soviet agent, now serving 15-year term in penitentary, testified before Senate Internal Security Subcommittee concerning his part in the Julius Rosenberg espionage ring.

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Review of this testimony reflects he related his role in obtaining information about atomic bomb from Los Alamos at the request of Rosenberg, and turning this information over to Rosenberg and Harry Gold. He told he prepared a list for Rosenberg of 20-25 names of scientists working in Los Alamos who, in his estimation, were likely recruits for espionage. Greenglass stated he turned such a list over to the FBI, and Robert Morris, counsel for the Committee, stated Greenglass told the Committee in Executive Session of the identities of some of these persons. It is noted during interview of Greenglass in 1950-51 he furnished to the Bureau the names of 18 persons which he said he turned over to Rosenberg as likely recruits. All 18 persons were identified, interviewed and denied participation in any espionage activity.

Greenglass also told the Committee a garbled version of what is believed to be the flight of Alfred Sarant from the U.S. He said one of the names on the list of 25 persons is a full professor at a New York State College and that Joel Barr (member of Rosenberg ring) had a friend who was also an espionage agent. He said Barr's friend approached the professor with a letter of introduction and was given a position as a project engineer on a cyclotron being built at that time. He continued Barr's friend was approached by the FBI on the day of his, Greenglass's, arrest and he refused to accompany the FBI and when the FBI returned with a warrant at 5 p.m. he had gone. Greenglass stated he learned of above from the FBI later on.

Greenglass said he could not recall the agents who interviewed him nor could he attributes any particular piece of information to any individual.

Greenglass stated he was "scared and very nervous" when he testified and may have said some things which did not make sense. He said he was upset before and after his testimony especially since his wife lost her job since her boss did not want the publicity.

Greenglass stated he told Robert Morris, Committee Counsel, some information he had which was not of his own knowledge but came from the FBI. He stated Morris stated FBI files are secret byt told him to testify concerning that information since this was a good way to disseminate the information. It is noted Greenglass has also been existioned by various Congressional committees and it is possible he received the information concerning Sarant in that fashion. Greenglass was reluctant to discuss his testimony in detail with the interviewing agents.

George E. Soloksky, in his column entitled "These Days Tele. Rodated 7/19/57 which appeared in the "Washington Post and Times Gendy—Herald," expressed the view that a person, in order to enjoy the benefits of a favorable decision apparently had to be an unrelented communist. Soloksky then referred to the case of David Greenglass, stating that he had been informed Greenglass was promised if he testified truthfully, he would get 5 years; that he got 15 years; and that he, Sokoksky, did not know who made the promise. He added that Greenglass recently applied for parole and was turned down; that no reason was given publicly as to why he was turned down but that had Greenglass been a communist there probably would have been a "committee to free Greenalass."

The Director inquired "What are the facts re Greenglass? H."

David Greenglass was sentenced to 15 years in prison on 4/6/51 by the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York after pleading guilty to the charge of conspiracy to commit espionage with Julius Rosenberg, Ethel Rosenberg, Anatolai A. Yakovlev, and Morton Sobell. Greenglass gave testimony which was helpful to the Government in the conviction of the Rosenbergs, and this fact was made known to the court at the time he was sentenced. Greenglass became eligible for parole in February, 1956.

At that time a parole was not granted and on 6/5/57

Mr. O. John Rogge, former Assistant Attorney General and attorney
for Greenglass, wrote the Director requesting an appointment with him
for the purpose of having the Director write a letter to the parole
board, pointing out the cooperation with the Government by Greenglass

McInerney stated, however, that he was writing a letter recommending that Greenglass be granted parole when he was eligible for it; that he was going to do this since he did not know whether he would be around when Greenglass came up for parole; and that he felt that Greenglass's cooperation had contributed immeasurably to the success of the Rosenberg case. The Director commented at that time, "We will be no party to any 'deals' or recommendations entered into by McInerney."

Many think they were framed, but a special U.S. report shows positively how these Americans gave Russia the A-bomb

AT 8 r.m. on FRIDAY, June 19, 1953, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg sat in the Death

And Ethel Rosenberg sat in the Death House at Sing Sing Prison awaiting execution.

Forty iniles away, in Union Square, the scene of New York City's left wing rallies, thousands of Communist guided Rosenberg sympathizers milled back and forth, singing Let My People Go. In Washington, D. C., pro-Communist pickets paraded before the White House, under the watchful eyes of extra details of policemen. In Paris and Rome, organized left ist moles surged through the streets, yelling the Rosenbergs' innocence.

By 8:25, the Rosenbergs had died in the electric chair, the first Americans ever to be put to death for explonage by an American civil court in peacetime.

civil court in peacetime.

That should have ended the most sensa-tional, most controversial spy case in U. S. his-tory. But it didn't, Minutes later, a speaker in

Union Square shouted, "They're gone-but we won't let them die!"

Those defiant words have proved to be prophetic. The Rosenbergs today are mentioned in the Communist press, both here and alroad, far more frequently than they ever were during their trial in 1951. And no less than 10 books have been written about what the Communists call "the American Dreyfus Case," all claiming that the Rosenbergs were railroaded to their deaths. The most important railroaded to their deaths. The most important of these books is a 661-page volume, The Judgment of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, written by a left-wing ex-Hollywood scenarist named John Wexley. The Communists quote the Wexley book the way Moslems quote the Koran. Through it, they have succeeded in winning over many well-meaning non-Communists, such as former OW I chief Elmer Davis, who wrote that after reading the loads by could not be that that, after reading the book, he could not be-lieve most of the testimony which condemned the Rosenbergs.
Emboldened by such reactions, the Com-

munist press constantly uses the Wexley book to hurl challenges at the U. S. Government. On June 16, 1957, for example, a lead article in The Daily Worker blared: "The Department of Justice has not answered the facts presented by John Wexley in The Judgment of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. It never will because it cannot. The Rosenberg-Sobell case was a frame-up."

The Government is now preparing to refute the Communist charges. For three and a half years. President Eisenhower and the Jus-

fute the Communist charges. For three and a half years, President Eisenhower and the Justice Department ignored the accusations. They believed that Americans had faith in their own jury system (and in the affirming decisions of the finest appeals judges on the U. S. bench). Because of this assumption, they felt that they did not have to reopen the files to prove again that the Rosenbergs were justly convicted. But now-four years after the execution—the elever propaganda of the Communists has so confused many loyal citizens that they are asking themselves; Were the Rosenbergs really guilty? ney General Herbert Brownell, Ir., ordered Assistant Attorney General William F. Tompkins, the head of the Department of Justice's Internal Security Division, to prepare a full report of the case—including previously unreleased facts. Assigned to the job was Benjamin F. Polkack, a brilliant Harvard Law School graduate and veteran Justice Demartment britism Harvard Law School grad-uate and veteran Ju<u>stice Department</u> attorney. For eight months, Pollack had access to all the FBI files and to all the evidence and testimony in the case. He interviewed witnesses and the men who arrested and proscut-ed the Rosenbergs and their co-con-spirator, Morton Sobell (now serving a 30-year sentence in Alcatraz). This reporter, who was aided in his research by Government Attorney A. Warren Littman, worked along with Pollack during much of his investigation. LOOK was given access to the extensive data that went into the Government report, of which this article is an exclusive preview.

HE report proves conclusively that the Rosenbergs were convicted by a powerful chain of interlinking testimony-hacked by strong cir-cumstantial evidence-that would be unassailable in any court in the world. It discloses for the first time the atomic secrets transmitted to the Russians by the Rosenbergs. It re-veals new information-such as the fact that there were seven other known American members of the spy ring, two of whom have now dis-appeared behind the Iron Curtain. In one of Godzenko's notebooks was the entry: "Klaus Fuchs, 81 George Lane, University of Edinburgh, Scotland." Fuchs was arrested by the British on February 3, 1950, and confessed that he was a Communist and had been springed. Communist and had been spying continuously for the Russians from 1911 to 1949. 

Gold revealed that he began his apy activities in 1935. It was nine years later that he entered the big time. In March, 1944, he was sent to meet a man he was to know only so meet a man he was to know only as "John," later identified as Soviet Vice Consul Anatoli Yakovlev. It was Yakovley who gave Gold his assignments to meet Fuchs and others in

the espionage ring.

Greenglass called his wife, and she fished the other part of the Jello how out of her part. The his wite, and she lished the other part of the Jello box out of her purse. The pieces matched. Greenglass invited Gold inside. He said he would have the material on the atomic homb ready for Gold later that afternoon. Gold then gave Greenglass an envelope containing \$500.

At 8:10 that evening, Gold was on the train headed east. On Tuesday.

At 8:10 that evening, Gold was on the train headed east. On Tuesday night in New York, he handed Ya-kovlev two envelopes, one marked "Doctor," containing the informa-tion he had received from Fuchs, and one labeled "Other," containing Greenglass' material. Two weeks lat-er, Yakovlev told Gold that the ma-terial received from Greenglass was excellent.

By the time Gold had reached this stage of his narrative, the FBI agents knew they had come across a spy case of enormous magnitude 'spy case of enormous magnitude. Quickly they moved in on David Greenglass, who was then working as a machinist in New York. On June 15, 1950, two agents visited him at his apartment. He had been questioned by the FRI once before, in February, 1950, about the disappearance of some uranium from Los Alamos when he was stationed there mos when he was stationed there. (Later, he admitted he had taken a piece of uranium as a souvenir but said he had become frightened about having it in his possession and had thrown it in the East River.) The FBI men indicated that the new in-If 10 men indicated that the new in-lier/sew was part of the same investi-gation. They asked permission to search the house. They found several photographs of Greenglass and his wife. They took the photos to Harry Gold. Gold studied them. "That's the man who gave me the atom bomb in-formation in Albuquerque," he said.

Four FBI agents returned to Greenglass apartment. They arrested him and, after a series of extensive interrogations, he made a complete

confession. The main facts of his confession jibed with the story told by Gold The IBI asked Greenglass who had instigated his explainage at tivities and to whom he had given most of his information. "My broth er to law, Julius Rosenberg," Green-

glass replied. Julius Rosenberg- who was 32 years old when he was arrested, was a tall, bespectacled, scholarly-looking man with a long record of affinity for Communist causes. The son of poor Jewish immigrants, he had been poor Jewish immigrants, he had been brought up in a strict religious at-mosphere, but apparently had re-belled against the precepts of his faith at an early age. The FBI un-covered evidence of his radical ten-dencies at Seward Park High School in New York City, and found he had been active in the Young Commu-nist League at the College of the City of New York, Later, after he was graduated as an electrical engineer graduated as an electrical engineer in 1939, he became an official of a professional association that was known to be Communist-dominated.

Just before he was graduated from college, he married Ethel Greenglass, a tough, domineering girl nearly three years his senior. She, too, came from poor parents who lived on New York's Lower East Side, and she, too, bad head an wife head; had broken with the strict Orthodox Jewish tradition. She was, in fact, a stronger adherent to the Communist cause than Rosenberg. Ethel's mother despaired about their political leanings and called them "a pair of Communist fanatics." Not so Ethel's younger brother, David A plodding youth who never did too well in school. David regarded his new brother-in law Julius as an admirable intellectual. Eventually, through the Rosenbergs' influence, David and his bride, Ruth, also became Communist sympathizers.

In 1943, when he was 21 years old, David Greenglass was drafted into the U.S. Army. He had had some technical education at Brooklyn Polylech and at Pratt Institute, and the Army trained him to be a machinist. In July, 1944, he was assigned to the Manhattan Project, the hush-hush group of scientists and Army engineers who were developing the world's first atomic bomb. He was sent to Oak Ridge, Tenn., and then to Los Alamos, N. M., where he was put to work in a machine shop called the Theta Shop. He was continually the Theta Shop. He was continually instructed about the ultrasecret nature of the project, but he had no idea of what actually was under con-

idea of what actually was under construction at Los Alamos.

He found out in November, 1944—from his 20 year-old wife. Ruth, who traveled to Allauquerque to spend their second wedding anniversary with him. Just before leaving New York, Ruth had a visit from Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, Julius and "I know that David is working said, "I know that David is working on a secret weapon called the atomic bomb. I want you to ask him to give me specific information about the locations, the personnel and the experi-ments conducted at Los Alamos."

Ruth protested about getting mixed up in anything of this sort. But Hosenberg said. "Don't you know Soviet Russia is an ally of the United States? The Russians are carrying a great share of the burden of war against Fascist Germany. The Soviet Umon. therefore, deserves a break in getting information which the Allies are denying to Russia. I myself have searched for two years, and I ve finally

made contact with a group through whom I can directly help Russia. Ethel Rosenberg also said to Ruth. "Haven't you noticed that I'm not buying the Daily Worker at the usual newsstand any more? The rea-son for that is that Julius has finally attained the ambition of his life-to be an undercover man in part of the Soviet espionage system in the United States. At last, he's doing really worth-while things for the cause. He can't be a conspicuous Communist sympathizer any more, he can't serve the cause and the can't be a conspicuous. so he can carry on the secret work

without suspicion."

That convinced Ruth, Like David, she held Julius in high esteem and felt he must know what was right. Julius then gave her \$1.50 to help pay the expenses of her trip—the first payment of money to be made to the

Greenglasses.

A FEW days later, Ruth gave David Julius' message. He. tuo, protested at first, but when she told him Julius' reasoning, he thought it over and agreed to give her information which she would memorize and transmit to the Rosenbergs. He detailed to be at the second later. tailed to her the exact layout of the Los Alamos base and its principal buildings. He also told her the names of the leading scientists who worked at the project, including those of Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, Dr. George B. Kistiakowsky and Dr. Niels Bohr. This was vital information, since the presence of these eminent scientists could easily tip off the nature of the project. So secret was the project that Bohr, for example, was known only as Dr. Baker, to conceal his true identity. The Russians may have already gotten this information from Fuchs, but, at the very least, the Greenglass data verified it.

In January, 1945, Greenglass got a furlough and went to New York. The next morning, Julius Rosenberg The next morning, Julius Rosenberg was at his apartment asking for information. He wanted specific details about all the work and experiments known to David at Los Alamos. According to Greenglass, Rosenberg then gave him a description of an atomic bomb, "so that I would be able to know what I am looking for." This turned out to be the type of bomb dropped at Hiroshima several months later. Justice Department investigator Poliack says that Rosenberg must have obtained this Rosenberg must have obtained this information from material fed to the spy ring by Dr. Fuchs. That night, at Rosenberg's request,

Greenglass sat down to prepare de-scriptions and sketches of the work he was doing at Los Alamos. He was one of 10 machinists assigned to a

shop working on a project under the general direction of Dr. Kistiakowsky, one of the world's top scientists in the field of thermodynamics. The Kistiakowsky group specialized in high explosives. The various scientists would come into Greenglass shop with directions for making acceled pieces of apparatus, and the machinists would tool the apparatus out of metal.

Is his work at Los Alamos, Greenglass made several so-called "flattype lens molds." As another top scientist in the group, Dr. Walter E. Koski, later described them, such molds were used to form various combinations of high explosives into a certain shape so that when they were detonated, the shock waves converged on a given point with terrific force. From what was later divulged about the Nagasaki-type atomic homb, it is apparent that Greenglass was working on the trigger mechanism that sets off the nuclear reaction in the bomb, Dr. Koski testified that the shape of the mold is the all-important factor, and this is what Greenglass gave to Rosenberg on that January, 1945, furlough, He also gave Kosenberg the names of "possible recruits" at Los Alamos "for espionage purposes." Those were his exact words. Greenglass' handwriting was bad, but Julius said Ethel would retype the information as she did with his other espionage material.

did with his other espionage material.

Rosenberg considered Greenglass' data about the high-explosive mold so important that he arranged for a meeting between Greenglass and a Russian member of the spy ring. The meeting was set for a street corner on First Avenue in New York City, at 11:30 one evening. Greenglass borrowed his father-in-daw's car, and when he parked at the appointed corner, Rosenberg came up with a stranger. The man got into the car and, while Rosenberg waited on the corner, Greenglass drove around for about 20 minutes. As he drove, the stranger interrogated him, He especially wanted to know the type of high explosives used, but Greenglass says he could not give positive answers to such questions, about which he had no direct knowledge. The strange automobile ride ended at the street corner where it had begun. Rosenberg and the Russian walked off together, and Greenglass went home.

On that same January furlough, Rosenberg invited David and Ruth Greenglass to dinner at his apart ment one night. They were introduced to a woman there. Rosenberg told Greenglass that this woman would come to Albuquerque to receive more information from him. "However." he said, "in case someone else comes, I'll give you something to identify him by." He then produced the side of a Jello hox, cut in two in a jagged manner. He gave Ruth Greenglass one half of the oddly cut cardboard. Rosenberg kept the other. They were

She did so on Rosenberg's assurance that money would be forthcoming from the Russians to cover her living expenses. In September, 1945, she and David returned to New York when he received another furlough. Again, Julius Rosenberg wasted no time in coming to see them David Greenglass had compiled a fairly comprehensive description of the atomic bomb itself. He knew it was different from the bomb Rosenberg had described to him in January, and he called it "the homb which works on an implosion effect." He did not know that this was the type that had been dropped on Nagasaki.

Greenglass gave Rosenberg a cross-section sketch of the homb and 12 pages of explanatory material. Rosenberg paid him \$200. Again, Ethel Rosenberg retyped the material and corrected the grammar. While this was being done, Greenglass and Rosenberg chatted, and Rosenberg told him that he had stolen a secret proximity fuse from the Emerson Radio Company, where he worked as an engineer, and had given it to the Russians. When Ethel Rosenberg had finished the typing, Julius hurned Greenglass' original notes in a frying pan and flushed the ashes down the toilet.

Between 1946 and 1950, according to Greenglass, he had many conversations with Rosemberg about the latter's continuing explonage activities. Once, Julius offered to have the Russians pay Greenglass living expenses if he would resume his education under the G.I. Bill of Rights at a good engineering college like M.I.T. Julius made it clear. David told the FBI, that the purpose of this was to "cultivate the friendship of people I had known at Los Alamus and also acquire new friendships with people who were in the field of ... nuclear energy."

Julius told David that he was paying for other students to go to school in various upstate New York universities. He also told him that he had agents in upstate New York and in Ohio who were feeding him secret defense information which he was transmitting to the Russians. He

mentioned specifically that he was getting information from someone at the General Electric Company in Schenectady, N. Y., and from someone in Cleveland, Ohio, Once, he told Greenglass, that, while he was in Cleveland, he visited one of his contacts at the Warner Swasey turrel tathe plant.

Several times, Julius spoke to David about a college classmate of his named Joel Barr, a brilliant mathematician and physicist, who had worked on the mathematician and physicist, who had worked on the mathematical problems of launching a "sky-platform earth satellite." (Some Government officials believe that Barr gave this data to Rosenberg in 1947.) Rosenberg also boasted that he had received the mathematics of an atomic plane from one of his contacts. Later, Rosenberg admitted a close friendship with Alfred Sarant, an engineer who had worked on this project. Barr vanished in Europe in 1947. Sarant escaped to Mexico with the wife of his best friend. Then he, too, disappeared. It is presumed that both are now behind the from Curtain.

Rosenberg told Greenglass about his methods of communicating with the Russians. Rosenberg told Greenglass about his methods of communicating with the Russians. "He told me that if he wanted to get in touch with the Russians, he had a means of communicating with them in a motion-picture theater, an alcove where he would put microfilm or messages and the Russians would pick it up. If he wanted to see them in person, he would put a message in there and by prearrangement they would meet at some lonely spot on Long Island." The Rosenbergs showed Greenglass gifts they had received "as a reward from the Russians"—two watches and a console table. The console table was hollowed out, and Julius told him he used it for microfilming. Greenglass frequently saw this table in the Rosenberg home.

By 1950, the Rosenberg Greenglass business partnership had linck en up and Ureenglass didn't see his brother inslaw so frequently. But one morning in February, an excited Rosenberg came to his apartment. He told him that Klaus Fuchs had been arrested in England, "Do you remember that man who came to see you in Albuquerquie?" asked Rosenberg, "Well, Fuchs was also one of his contacts." He told Greenglass he'd have to leave the country. David said he didn't know how he could do it, but Julius said, "Oh, they let other people out who are far more important than you are. They let Joel Barrout, and he was a member of our espionage ring."

GREENGLASS said he'd think it over. However, his wife was badby burned in an accident, and soon afterward she gave birth to their second child, so he did nothing about planning his escape. Late in May, Rosenberg came to see him again. This time, he had with him a newspaper detailing the arrest of Harry Gold. "Now you have to leave the country," he said. He gave Greenglass \$1,000 and promised him \$6,000 more. He instructed him to get five sets of passport photos of himself and his family, and he said that he, Rosenberg, would obtain inoculation certificates for the Greenglasses from a doctor he knew. He told them to go to Mexico, using the inoculation certificates to get tourist cards at the border.

In Mexico City, Greenglass was to write a letter to the secretary to the Soviet Ambassador, signing it "L. Jackson." Three days later, he was to go to the statue of Columbus in the Plaza Colon at 5 p.m., carrying a guide to the city, with his little finger inserted into the pages. A week later, he gave Greenglass an additional \$1,000. They took a walk to disenss David's escape plans. During the walk, they met a Mr. and Mrs. Her-man Einsohn, who stopped to chat for a few minutes with David, com-pletely unaware of his espionage in-volvement. A few days later, how-ever, Greenglass informed Rosenderg that he had changed his mind. He was not going to flee. By now, he knew he had committed a heinous crime and he was resigned to face the consequences. He was waiting when the FBI agents came to his apartment on June 15.

Four weeks after the arrest of David Greenglass, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were picked up. They denied everything. The FBI then fanned out to determine where else the tortuous espionage trail led. Methodically, they interviewed every one of

Rosenberg's classmates at C.C.N.Y. On July 20, 1950, they came upon a --man named Max Elitcher, who was

On July 20, 1928), they came upon a man named Max Elitcher, who was not in Rosenberg's class but who had known him in college.

Elitcher had been employed as agengineer in the Bureau of Ordinance of the Navy Department in Washington from 1932 to 1942. He worked on computers for aniaircraft, fire control. He told the FBI that Rose control. He told the FBI that Rose enberg visited him in Washington in 1914 and vainly tried to induce him to join his espionage ring. He said Rosenberg told him he merely had to bring him blueprints from his shop and that he'd photograph them and return them the next day. To try to convince him, Rosenberg told him that Elitcher's best friend and former roommate was among the many scithat Elitcher's best friend and former roommate was among the many scientists who were furnishing information to him for transmission to Russia. The man's name? Morton Sobell. He worked at the General Electric Company in Schenectady.

To the FRI men, this was another missing link. Greenglass had told them of the espionage contact whom Rosenberg visited frequently at the G.E. plant in Schenectady.



Sobell asked Elitcher to drive downtown with him while he delivered the film to Rosenberg. Elitcher waited outside the Rosenberg apartment while Sobell made the delivery.

The FBI now moved in on Sobell. They discovered that he failed to report for work at his job at the Reeves Instrument Company beginning on June 16, the day after David Greenglass caus arcested. On June 21. Sobell had withdrawn practically all

Sobell had withdrawn practically all his money from his bank account, and on June 22 he had flown to Mexico with his entire family. As soon as he arrived, he cashed in his return plane tickets.

plane tickets.

I sing several pseudonyms, Sobell attempted to book passage to Europe. On August 16, 1950, he was apprehended in Mexico City by the Mexican Federal Security Police. He was forcibly taken to the U.S. border and deported as an undesirable alien. FBL argents were weiting to arrest. FBI agents were waiting to arrest him as he was expelled across the border into Laredo, Texas.

Sobert, was the only one of eight known members of the spy ring to stand trial with the Rosenbergs and Greenglass. Two members of the ring Greenglass. Two members of the ring had disappeared, and the Government felt there was not enough evidence, beyond a reasonable doubt, to conxict the other five-two scientists and three women. The trial began on March 6, 1951, in the United States Court House in Foley Square in New York. It lasted exactly 31 days, and the Communist press barely took notice of the proceedings. b took notice of the proceedings.
The Government's main witnesses

were Gold, Elitcher and the Greenglasses, who recounted the same stories they had given to the FBI. Though she was named in the indictment, Ruth Greenglass was not a defendant. The Government attor-neys reasoned that her part in the plot had been primarily a passive one and that if she, too, had to stand trial. they might lose the co-operation of their key wincess. There were two high lights to the trial. The first came during Green-glass' testimony. So secret was the material he had passed to Rosenberg that there was a great debate within that there was a great debate within the Government as to whether it would jeopaidize the security of the nation to reveal it in open court. Members of the prosecution staff met with the Atomic Energy Commission and with the Joint Congressional

Committee on Atomic Energy, It was agreed that unless some material was disclosed—to indicate its highly secret nature-the entire case might be dismissed. A top official of the Atomic Energy Commission, Wil Atomic Energy Commission, Wil-liam Denson, was assigned to sit in court and declassify the material line by line-reclassifying it as "se-cret" after it was used as evidence. As it turned out, this wasn't nec-essary. In a surprise move, Julius Rosenberg's defense counsel, Eman-uel H. Bloch, arose and "as an Amer-ican citizen and as a series.

ican citizen and as a person who owes his allegiance to this country." moved that the confidential char acter of the material be preserved by showing it only to the court and to the jury. After a long discussion, Judge Irving Kaufman agreed to limit the disclosure of the material.

Julius and I the I Rosenberg testified for them selves. Morton Sobell didn't even take the stand to utter a single word in his own defense. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty against all three.

April 5, 1951. Judge Kaulinan passed sentence on the defendants. He said, "I consider your crime worse than minder... I believe your conduct in putting into the hands of the Russians the A-bomb... has already caused, in my opinion, the Communist aggression in Kotca, with the resultant casualties exceeding 50,000, and who knows but millions more of innocent people may pay the price of your treason." He then sentenced Julius and Ethel Rosenberg to death in the electric chair. Subell got 30 years, and Greenglass, 45. Harry Gold was already serving a 30-year sentence for his part in the Fuchs case.

The nation accepted the verdict and the sentences; the Communists virtually ignored them. But then an amazing thing happened. In August, 1954, the Communist press suddenly adopted the Rosenberg case as a cause eélèbre. The Rosenbergs and Soliell were convicted on concocted evidence, they said, as innocent victims of an anti-Sentite witch hunt. By December, 1951, the campaign was in high gear with the formation of the National Committee to Secure

Justice in the Rosenberg Case. The cry of anti-Seuntism reached its peak with the world-wide demonstrations on the evening of the Rosenbergs' execution.

on the evening of the Rosenbergs' eventions.

When Pollack began his report on the Rosenberg case in 1956, he was faced with a formidable task. As he puts it, "When you read the Wesley book without knowing the facts of the case, it makes out a plansible story. But on careful analysis, you can find very electer bias, very shrewdly employed. Wesley stressed only the aspects of the testimony that were favorable to his side."

First, Pollack (himself a Jew) began to investigate the reasons why the Communists belatedly took on the case as a great anti-Semitic issue. He says, "It happened at a serious time for the Communist party in the United States. In Russia, Stalin had just launched an anti-Semitic campaign of his own, and had jailed several distinguished Jewish physicians in the so called doctors' plot. In the satellite countries, Jewish leaders such as Stansky and Rajk had been tried and evented for treason. As a result, Jewish Communists in the United States had become disillusioned and were deserting the party in droves. So the American Polithuro seized on the Rosenberg casewhich it had studiously ignored to that moment—as a desperate move to divert attention from Russian anti-Semitism. It was a diabolically successful move. Not only did it succeed in distracting attention from Russia and the satellites, but it created doubt in many minds and took in hundreds



Communist charge: The selection of the Rosenberg jury was part of the frame-up. Although almost a third of the population of New York is Jewish, there was not a single Jew on the jury. The Government's answer: The defense had 120 peremptory challenges, 40 more than usual. That means that they could throw out 120 pro-pertive jurors without giving any reason whatever. Of five jurors with obviously Jewish names, the prosecution three out only one: the defense removed Jour by challenge. For example, the next to-last juror selected was a Jew. He was rejected by the defense.

Communist charge: Judge Irving Kaufman was biased and unfair to the defense throughout the trial. Himself a Jew, be was leaning over backwards to prove that Jews are not soft on communism. Similarly, Wexley says, "Whenever he had the slightest opportunity to do 50, he managed to exacerbate the defense by tossing in some remark that would humiliate, ridicule, confuse or throw them off balance." The Government's answer: The best way to resply to this charge is to quote, directly from the record, the remarks of chief defense counsel Emanuel H. Bloch at the end of the trial. Bloch said to Judge Kaufman, "I, for one, and I think all my co-counsel, feel that you have been extremely courteous to us and you have afforded us lawyer should expect in a criminal case.... We feel that the trial has been conducted... with that decorum and dignity that befit an American trial."

Communist charge: Harry Gold is a pathological liar. He made up the entire fantasy of the spy plot to boax the world and to see his name in headlines. He is mentally almost mal. Likewise. Wexley says, "Prison for Gold represented almost a sanctuary, a retreat." The Government's answer: It is difficult to believe that anyone would make up a story that would not him 30 years in prison. Besides, the one way to destroy the story of a "pathological liar" in court is to bring in psychiatrists and witnesses to refute him, and to tear his allegations apart in cross-examination. The Rosenberg defense didn't introduce a single witness to east doubt on Gold's testimony, and they didn't put him on the stand for any much us a single world of cross-examination.

Communist charge: There is

no proof that Harry Gold was in New Mexico to meet Fuebs and Green glass. The FBI got him to sign a registration card from the Hilton Hotel in Albuquerque after he was arrested five years later. They chose the Hilton because it is the only hotel in Albuquerque which keeps its registration cards for more than three years. The Government's answer: It is preposterous to suggest that the FBI would do such a thing, or that it could get away with it if it tried. Hotel employees and records could have been subpoenced to prove the falsity of the registration card, and experts could have testified that the ink was only a few months old instead of five years. With such obvious courses open to the Rosenberg defense, they certain ly would have taken advantage of them—and destroyed the entire Covernment case—if they thought the charge had any validity. The registration card was never challenged in cont

Communist charge: David Greenglass was not intelligent enough to absorb complicated infor-mation about the atomic bomb or to sketch its component parts. He was just a mechanic. He never graduated from any of the technical schools he attended. Foreign scientists and one of America's top atomic experts. Dr. Harold G. Urey, insist that he couldn't possibly understand - and therefore could not transmit - atomic data. The Government's answer: Greenglass didn't graduate from school because he worked at night and had to drop out when his sched and had to drop out when his sched-ule became too rigorous. However, he was skilled enough technically to become assistant foreman of his highly important shop at Los Ala-mos, one of the foreign scientist-or Dr. I rey ever saw Greenelass. They have no knowledge of the ma-terial he transmitted because it was impounded by the court. impounded by the court. None of them, moreover, was ever called by the defense to test Greenglass' intel lectual and technical capacity. On the other hand, a key Government witness, Dr. Walter Koski, was an witness. Dr. Walter Koski, was an eminent atomic scientist. He was one of Greenglass' superiors. He know hum at the Los Alamos laboratory and he heard all of the secret evidence in court. Dr. Koski testified that Greenglass' sketch of the high-explosive lens mold was "substantially an accurate representation of a sketch I made about that time at Los Alamos." He identified other of Greenglass' sketches as "reasonably area glass sketches as "reasonably accurate." He described Greenglass testi mony explaining the sketches as "reasonably accurate." Dr. Koski was asked. "Was the defendant Was asked, was me detendant Greenglass in a position where, by teason of his employment in the Theta Shop, he could see the sketches which you turned over?" Koski an-

Communist charge: The FBI coached Greenglass in prison to absurb the technical details of the atomic bomb. The Government's answer: There has never been a shred of proof offered to support this charge, even though Greenglass was incarcerated in a cell where dozens of other prisoners observed him at all times. During the trial, moreover, defense counsel Emanuel Bioch made detense counsel Emanuel Bloch made several vain attempts to discredit Greenglass' technical computeme with unexpected trick questions. Once, for example, he asked him suddenly, "Do you know what an isotope is?" Greenglass shot back: "An isotope is an element having the same atomic structure but having a

same atomic structure but having a different atomic weight."

Communist charge: The material altegedly transmitted by Greenglass to Rosenberg was generally known in scientific circles and of no value to the Rossians. The Government's unwer: The best reply to this is Dr. Koski's testimony. He told the court, "To the best of my knowledge and [that of] all of my colleagues who were involved in this field, there was no information in textbooks or journals on this partextbooks or journals on this par-ticular subject. It was a new and original field."

Communist charge: The Gov-

erament tried the Rosenbergs illegally. They were tried for treason under the espionage laws because the Government couldn't prove Russia was an enemy. The Government's answer: The statute under which the Rosenbergs were convicted

doesn't require that the espionage information be passed to an enemy.
If the material is classified "secret" by the U.S. and it is given to any foreign country, even a friendly one, for that country's advantage, that is enough to convict. It is not even necessary to prove injury to the United

Communist charge: How can anyone believe that the Rosenbergs were spies when they lived in such poverty-stricken circumstances? Why would they have received just two watches and a ronsole table as a reward for e-pionage? Spies don't work for peanuts. The Government's answer: Professional spies don't work for peanuts, but political fanatics do, when they think they are serving the cause. Besides, there is serving the cause. Resides, there is considerable evidence proving that Rosenberg had money available to him when he needed it. He gave Greenglass \$5,000 for his escape to Mexico, \$3,900 of which was identi-fied in court as having been turned over to Greenglass' lawyer, O. John Rogge, by G. conglass' brother-in-law Louis Abel.

The FBI found two fairly expensive watches in the Rosenbergs sive watches in the Rosenbergs apartment, in court, Julius Rosenberg said he hought one from an itinerant salesuean, another from a pushcart peddler. He did not substantiate this in any way. He maintained that he bought the console tailed that he bought store for table at Macy's department store for \$21. But again he produced no evi-dence. Mrs. Evelyn Cox, a part-time maid for the Rosenbergs, testifying for the Government, said that the for the Coveroment, said that the console table was the best piece of furniture the Rosenbergs had. Mrs. Rosenberg told her "it was a gift-sort of a late wedding present." One of the two outside witnesses called by the defense was Thomas V. Kelly, an



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attorney for Macy's who testified that a sales slip could not be furnished be cause the records for that year had been destroyed. On cross-examination however, Kelly said that deliv ery records might be available and that city sales-tax records were available. Either one of these could have scored a vital point for the Rosen-bergs' case if they had been submit ted as evidence They were not.

Communist charge: If, as the

FBI claimed the console table was used for microfilming, why was it not seized and brought in as evinot sezzed and brought in as evi-dence? The Government's an-swer: The simple truth is that the FBI could not find the console table in the Rosenbergs' apartment when they were arrested. Long after the trial, it was found by a left-wing newspaperman in Rosenberg's moth-'s home. If the defense knew where the table was, why didn't it bring it in and prove that it indeed had come from Macy's? Concerning the table's use for photography, the Rosenbergs' maid testified that, though it was the best piece of furniture the Rosen-bergs had, they habitually kept it in a dark closet. 



"Washington Post and Times Herald" carried International News Service article dated 11-22-57 that Robert Morris, Counsel, Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, stated that David Greenglass 16, was interviewed in prison on 11-21-57 and told of an American paymaster who carried Russian funds from abroad to Julius Rosenberg, executed Soviet agent. The paymaster was described as a \$200 per day engineering consultant connected with the Aswan Dam project in Egypt. Greenglass also said Rosenberg was hard-pressed for cash for two months in 1948 and explained he was awaiting the arrival of the regular payoff man a from the Middle East and gave him a brief description of this agent as set forth above.

This appears to be garbled version of information which Greenglass previously furnished the Bureau about a man who he said was one of Rosenberg's contacts. He stated this man was employed as a consultant on the Aswan Dam project and was paid \$200 per day and this man made a trip to Egypt between 1946 and 1949. Extensive investigation was conducted and it was learned that Dr. Theodore von Karman had performed some consulting work for the Chemical Construction Company and Hugh L. Cooper Company in connection with the work of these companies on the Aswan Dam project. Von Karman hired William Perl, a member of Rosenberg Espionage petwork, to work for him during 1947 and Perl was paid at the rate of \$4 per hour for his work. At that time Perl was working for National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics and was on annual leave. It is noted that Greenglass also stated this man had a Government job and was on leave to do consulting work.

Due to the lack of information that Greenglass had, it was impossible to pusitively identify Perl as being this unknown man. is noted Greenglass told us nothing about this consultant acting as a paymaster or that Rosenberg was hard-pressed for cash in 1948.

ACTION:

There is attached an airtel to Philadelphia that the Greenglass be reinterviewed about this article and that complete details be obtained concerning the information he furnished the Subcommittee.

International News Service etory dated 12-22-57. states David Greenglass told Senate Internal Security Subcommitt en 11-21-57 that an American paymaster earried Russian funds from abroad to Rosenberg. This man is described as having been a \$200 a day engineering consultant connected with the Aswan Dan project. Greenglass allegedly stated Rosenberg was hard-pressed for each for a two months' period in 1948 and could not payhis agents for their services and explained he was awaiting arrival of regular payoff man from Middle East.

Information concerning details of this case set forth in report of John A. Harrington dated 1-13-59 at New York, a copy of which was furnished to your office. It is noted Greenglass never advised the Bureau that this unknown subject was a paymaster for the Resemberg ring and that Greenglass never stated Resemberg was short of money.

Greenglass should be reinterviewed theroughly concerning this information and you should determine exactly what he told members of the Subcommittee in this interview. Results of this interview should be furnished to the Bureau promptly.

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

(Buftle 65-59028) DATE 11. 19.86 HARRY GOLD ESPIONAGE - R (Bufile 65-57449) In accordance with the Director's request that he be furnished with the pros and cons concerning the possible release of David Greenglass and Harry Gold from prison, the following information is set forth: The "Washington Star" for 11-24-57 carried an article with a dateline of Point Pleasant, New Jersey, 11-23 and stated that Robert Morris, counsel, Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, called for the creation of a committee to seek the release from prison of convicted atom spies David Greenglass and Harry Gold. The article continued that Morris pointed out that both have been cooperating with intelligence agencies for 8 years and their release should prompt others to step (forward and cooperate with the Government. David Greenglass was sentenced on 4-6-51 to a term of 15 years. Zeligible for parole in February, 1956, at which time he has not a granted parole. Machine In. 1957, his application for parole was d turned down. In favor of granting Greenglass parole, it should be noted that ? he was cooperative with the Bureau in furnishing details of the Rosenberg espionage operation and his involvement therein. He appeared as the main Government witness during the trial of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Norton Sobell. His wife, Ruth Greenglass, was named as a coconspirator but not a codefendant, and she also appeared as a Government witness in the Rosenberg-Sobell trial. Since his sentence, Greenglass has continued to be cooperative in furnishing any information he has relating to the operation of the Rosenberg network. His wife, Ruth, has also furnished information to the Bureau. Greenglass has furnished information to Senate committees and in 1956 he appeared before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in Vashington, D. C. In apposition to granting the parvie to greenglass, it must be noted that Greenglass committed a particularly henious crime when he. betrayed his trust as a sergeant in the Universites Army and, with full knowledge of his actions, turned information over to Rosenberg concerning the atomic bomb which information he knew would be given to the Soviet

Memorandum to Mr. Boardman Re: David Greenglass; Harry Gold Bufiles 65-59028; 65-57449

On 6-5-57 Mr. O. John Rogge, former Assistant Attorney General and attorney for Greenglass, wrote the Director, requesting an appointment with him for the purpose of having the Director write a letter to the parole board pointing out the cooperation given by Greenglass in the Rosenberg case. This matter was referred to Deputy Attorney General Rogers and Rogge was advised that he might desire to consult with the Department relative to this matter. Our files also reflect that on 4-17-51 former Assistant Attorney General McInerney advised the Bureau that O. John Rogge was alleged to have told the mother? of David Greenglass that he had a deal with McInerney whereby Greenglass would be sentenced to 3 years. McInerney advised that there was no such deal with Rogge and that he had told Rogge he would see to it that any cooperation furnished by Greenglass to the Government would be called to the attention of the court in connection with the sentence of Greenglass and that this was done. UcInerney stated however he was writing a letter recommending that Greenglass be granted parole when eligible and that he was writing this letter since he did not know whether he would be around when Greenglass came up for parole. At that time the Director commented: "We will be no party to any 'deals' or recommendations entered into by McInerney."

Concerning Harry Gold, he was sentenced on 12-9-50 to 30 years imprisonment but Judge McGranery on 12-14-50 issued an order amending this sentence from 30 years to 29 years and 223 days in order to credit Gold with the time served since his guilty plea on 7-20-50.

In favor of releasing Gold, it should be noted that he has been cooperative with the Bureau since he first admitted his identity as the courier for Klaus Fuchs. He has furnished complete information concerning the details of his espionage operations. He appeared as a witness in the trial of Abraham Brothman and in the trial of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell. Since his incarceration he has continued to cooperate and has also cooperated with various Senate committees.

In opposition to releasing Gold, it should be noted that he played an important part in the stealing of the secret of the atomic bomb and turning the same over to the Russians inasmuch as he was the courier between Klaus Fuchs and Anatoli Yakovlev, Soviet Vice Consul. It should also be noted that in the normal course of events, a person is eligible for parole after he has served approximately one third of his sentence and Gold has not served one third of his sentence as yet. Therefore, in order to obtain a release for Gold it would be necessary to obtain a pardon for him or to change his original sentence.

OBSERVATIONS A

It should be noted that the Bureau's position concerning Greenglass has been stated previously-that the matter of his parole is one for the Department to handle. The question of the parole of Harry Gold has not arisen before; however, it is believed that the Bureau's position would be the same concerning parole for Gold. The sentence which Greenglass received was 15 years and the maximum which he could have received was 30 years or death. It is noted that Judge Kaufman in sentencing Greenglass to 15 years took into consideration his cooperation with the Government when he gave him the lesser sentence. It is felt that the continued cooperation of Greenglass should be a mitigating circumstance considered in connection with his parole.

ACTION:

In the event the Attorney General requests the Director's opinion on this matter, it is believed the Attorney General should be informed that this is a question for the Department to consider. However, it is felt that the continued cooperation of both Greenglass and Gold should be given consideration in connection with any application for parole made on their behalf inasmuch as the seriousness of their crimes was considered by the judges when their sentences were imposed.

Regarding the above, GREENGLASS stated, this conversation came about when MORRIS asked GREENGLASS if there was anything else which he could think of that he had not previously mentioned to the Committee. GREENGLASS said that it was at this time that he volunteered the information to MORRIS that during the period 1947-1949, ROSENBERG had given money to one of his contacts in upper New York State, never identified to GREENGIASS, and had lost contact with the Soviet due to the COPLON situation. GREENGLASS stated that, as previously related to the FBI, he personally had many financial obligations to meet at this time and had asked ROSENBERG for money to meet them. He then reiterated that it was at this time that ROSENBERG informed him that he would be able to obtain the money and give GREENGLASS some when a consultant on the Aswan Dam project in Egypt flew in to the United States, as this man would give ROSENBERG the necessary funds. GREENGLASS stated that never at any time did ROSENBERG say that this consultant was carrying Russian funds, but rather ROSENBERG left GREENGIASS with the impression that it would be the consultant's personal funds that he would give to ROSENBERG. GREENGLASS stated that, as previously related to the Bureau, ROSENBERG did say that this consultant was a Government employee who was allegedly receiving \$200 per day as consultant on the Aswan Dam project, while on leave from his Government job,

Regarding matters discussed with him by MORRIS, GREENGLASS advised that with the exception of the matter mentioned above, it was a review of the information that he had previously furnished to Mr. MANDEL. He said that after the initial introduction, they engaged in similar conversation to that between him and MANDEL concerning the sky platform and the atomic airplane. He said that absolutely nothing he said to MORRIS regarding these matters varied at all from the information he had furnished MANDEL. He said that he again told Mr. MORRIS that MANDEL had distorted this informational however, MORRIS did not appear to him to be interested in GREENGLASS! objection in this regard. He said that he then informed MORRIS that ROSENBERG had informed him that he had

supplied the Russians with all types of technical manuals available to him, ROSENBERG, in his official capacity at the Signal Corps during World War II.

GREENGIASS related that Mr. MORRIS brought up the fact that in 1953 before the McCARTHY Committee, he, GREENGIASS had testified that JOEL BARR was working on an antimissile program. Mr. MORRIS wanted GREENGIASS to elaborate on this statement. GREENGIASS advised that he informed Mr. MORRIS that he did not recall having testified to such a statement and, in fact, at this time cannot recall whether JOEL BARR was doing such a thing or what the situation was at that time. He said he informed MORRIS that JULIUS ROSENBERG had been successful in obtaining an entire proximity fuse and it was his opinion that Mr. MORRIS had this confused with the antimissile information.

On 11/27/57 Associate Warden HERBERT COX advised SA SAUNDERS that he had monitored the meeting between Mr. MORRIS and GREENGLASS, had made notes of the conversation, and had dictated a memorandum from his notes. Mr. COX made available a copy of this memorandum for review which reads as follows:

The first phase of the interview concerned space platform. GREENGLASS stated that in 1947 ROSENBERG, GREENGLASS, and GREENGLASS! brother were talking, and ROSENBERG mentioned space platforms, a closed vessel which would rotate around the earth and space. He stated that later JULIUS ROSENBERG told him that the information on the space platform had been received from one of ROSENBERG's contacts and he passed it on to the Russians. He told Mr. MORRIS that a Dr. BARR was one of the espionage agents who worked as a project engineer for Sperry Gyroscope, was later fired by the Army, worked in the private shop with GREENGLASS and ROSENBERG, and later went to Europe. ROSENBERG asked him, GREENGLASS, to leave the country, as a man connected to him was

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being questioned by the British and on the basis of this he should leave. He couldn't go because at the time he was connected with Los Alamos.

The next subject discussed was the atom powered airplane. GREENGIASS stated that in 1947 or 1948 while they were thinking in terms of atom powered submarines, ROSENBERG told him that they had solved the problem of the atom powered airplane. ROSENBERG stated he received the information from 'one of the boys! and gave it to the Russians. The next subject: discussed was the anti-missile missile. GREENGLASS advised that ROSENBERG said JOEL BARR worked on the anti-missile missile and he secured information; in fact, BARR stole a complete proximity fuse while in the Signal Corps employ from Emerson Radio and Television Company, brought it out of the plant in a page briefcase, and gave it to ROSENEERG, who passed it on to the Russians. GREENGLASS stated that he did not know much about the anti-missile missile because he was out of spying from 1945-1950 when arrested. He and Mr. MORRIS had some discussion about a \$200.00 a day consultant flying back and forth from Egypt and was one of ROSENBERG's agents. GREENGLASS was told that in 1945 ROSENBERG secured every electronic catalogue and transmitted to the Russians because of the lack of electronic program in Russia. These electronics catalogues contained descriptions and data which would be valuable to them.

The entire interview was merely a rehash of previous interview with Mr. MANDEL. It ended when GREENGIASS could think of nothing else which he considered significant which might show that the information he and others passed through ROSENBERG to the Russians would have been instrumental in expediting or accelerating those subjects discussed. As Mr. MORRIS was leaving,

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the told GREENGLASS that he was aware of the fact that they were trying to help him and GREENGLASS said yes.

In an effort to clarify whether ROSENBERG had any contacts in Philadelphia in either the Signal Corps or in Air Force Electric Procurement, the entire situation was reviewed with GREENGLASS again, and there appears to be great confusion. on his part as to just what the true situation was. GREENGLASS relates that he, his brother BERNIE GREENGLASS, and ROSENBERG were, during the period of late 1947 until early 1949, engaged as partners in the operation of Pitt Machine Products, Inc., 370 East Houston Street, New York City. The following GREENGLASS states he can say with certainty: that during the time that they were operating the Pitt Machine Products, Inc., ROSENBERG did make two or maybe more trips to Philadelphia, ostensibly to contact people in an effort to obtain Government contracts for Pitt Machine Products. He can further say with certainty that ROSENBERG had become acquainted with various members of the Signal Corps while they were assigned in New York. He can further say with certainty that he definitely recalls ROSENBERG mentioning the words "Air Force" in connection with Philadelphia; hence, he now assumes that a former associate of ROSENBERG in the Signal Corps in New York City had been transferred to Philadelphia and was now associated with Air Force Procurement. GREENGIASS stated he cannot recall where he picked up the term "Air Force Electric Procurement, Philadelphia, but thinks that he recalled ROSENBERG having made that statement in connection with his trips to Philadelphia. GREENGLASS further pointed out that ROSENBERG never did discuss his trips to Philadelphia with him, nor did he

intimate that they were anything other than legitimate business trips. GREENGLASS said he was always a little suspicious, inasmuch as ROSENBERG had never been successful in obtaining any business for the plant, and pointed out that it is entirely possible that ROSENBERG never went to Philadelphia at all; however, this is conjecture on his part.

GREENGLASS further pointed out that in view of the alleged number of people that ROSENBERG became acquainted with in the Signal Corps in New York City, it is entirely possible that he would have known these same people after their transfer to Philadelphia in either the Signal Corps or Air Force Electric Procurement if, in fact, some Signal Corps people formerly assigned with the Signal Corps at New York City during World War II had been transferred to the Air Force Electric Procurement in Philadelphia.

GREENGIASS then recalled that only once ROSENBERG brought back anything from Philadelphia in the way of a possible subcontract, and from this fact he assumes that ROSENBERG did contact someone in the Signal Corps in Philadelphia. As to whether ROSENBERG ever actually made any contact with Air Force Electric Procurement, GREENGIASS states he has no actual knowledge such a contact was ever made.

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The public hearing held by the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on 11-21-57 has been reviewed. 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



Reference is made to memorandum from Mr. B. E. Moore to Mr. Belmont dated 8/27/58 advising that Judge Irving Kaufman received a request to write the U.S. Parole Board on behalf of W. C. Suffivan David Greenglass and that he was considering doing this in view of the past cooperation of Greenglass. Mr. Tolson requested a memorandum be prepared for the Director setting forth the cooperation of Greenglass and reflecting/we have advised the Department of his cooperation.

David Greenglass began cooperating with the Bureau during the interview conducted on 6/15/50. He continued to furnish information concerning the activities of the Rosenberg apparatus and both Greenglass and his wife, Ruth, appeared as Government witnesses at the trial of the Rosenbergs and Sobell. Without their testimony it would have been impossible to convict the Rosenbergs, since the Greenglasses were the only witnesses who could link the Rosenbergs with the espionage conspiracy. While Harry Gold could implicate, the Greenglasses, he did not know the Rosenbergs and thus his testimony would not have been sufficient for conviction.

Following the incarceration of Greenglass, both he and his wife have continued to be cooperative on interviews and have furnished complete details of their knowledge of the Rosenberg ring. David Greenglass has testified before Congressional committees and his most recent appearance was in 1956 before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee. Greenglass originally became eligible for parole in February, 1956, but this request and successive requests have been turned down.

During the investigation prior to the trial and throughout the numerous appeals of the Rosenbergs, we furnished the Department all pertinent information given by the Greenglasses on interviews. We have also advised the Department of their continued cooperation CMM and in a letter to the Attorney General dated 2/5/54 and in a letter to the Assistant Attorney General, Internal Security Division dated, 4/6/55 we noted the fact that both Greenglasses were continuing to 65-5402 cooperate. nFC- 34



By letter dated July 23, 1959, George J. Reed, Chairman, Gandy U.S. Board of Parole, advised the case of Greenglass was given a preview hearing on July 23, 1959, and it had been suggested to the Board from various sources that Greenglass had cooperated with the Government and the Parole Board should give him consideration because of this assistance. Reed stated that the Board of Parole would welcome any observation or comment which the Director may care to make regarding the Greenglass matter.

David Greenglass began cooperating with the Bureau during the interview conducted on June 15, 1950. He continued to furnish information concerning the activities of the Rosenberg apparatus and both he and his wife appeared as Government witnesses at the trial of the Rosenbergs and Sobell. Without their testimony, it would have been impossible to convict the Rosenbergs since the Greenglasses were the only witnesses who could link the Rosenbergs with the espionage conspiracy. While Harry Gold could implicate the Greenglasses, he did not know the Rosenbergs and his testimony would have not been enough for conviction. Since Greenglass was imprisoned in April, 1951, both he and his wife have continued to be cooperative on interviews. Greenglass has testified before Congressional committees and his most recent public appearance was before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in 1956. He has also been cooperative on interviews conducted at the prison by investigators for Congressional committees.

Greenglass was sentenced in April, 1951, to 15 years imprisonment and thus he originally became eligible for parole in 1956 but he has not been granted parole. We have furnished the Department, prior to the trial and throughout the numerous appeals of the Rosenbergs, all pertinent information given by the Greenglasses. We have also advised the Department in 1954 and in 1955 of the continued cooperation of the Greenglasses with the Government. Our position concerning Greenglass has been that the matter of his parole is one for the Department to handle. Therefore, it is believed we should advise Mr. Reed that the Bureau defers to his judgment concerning Greenglass parole but it is also believed that we should set forth for Mr. Reed the details of Greenglass cooperation with the Government.

There is attached for your approval Tester to Mr. Reed,
Chairman, U.S. Board of Parole, furnishing him by the Steals of the

to his judgment in this matter.



On the evening of June 15, 1950, DAVID GREENGLASS furnished the following signed statement:

"New York, New York June 15, 1950

"I, David Greenglass, make the following statement to John W.

Lewis and Leo R. Frutkin, who have identified themselves to me as Special

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I make this statement freely

and voluntarily and have been advised of my right not to make a statement and
that I have a right to en attorney. I understand that this statement may be

used against me in a court of law.

"I was born March 3, 1922, at New York City and presently reside at 265 Rivington Street, New York City.

Mexico from New York City and told me that Julius Rosenberg, my brother-in-law, had asked if I would give information on the Atom Bomb and stated as a reason for that that we are at war with Germany and Japan and that they are the enemy and that Soviet Russia was fighting the enemy and was entitled to the information. On that basis, I agreed to give whatever information came to me in the course of my employment at Los Alamos, New Mexico, at the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project. This message, which my wife conveyed to me, was not her own idea but was an idea given to her by Julius Rosenberg. She told me at the time that a man would contact me later for information about the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project.

"About February, 1945, my wife moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, from New York City. Three or four months later she had a miscarriage. Approximately a month after that time, a man came to the place where Ruth was living, 209 North High Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico. I did not know this man's name

Marry Gold. He had with him a torn or cut piece of paper card which fitted a torn piece of paper card furnished me as a means of identifying this man. I cannot recall at this time whether this torn piece of card was given to me by my wife, buth, at the time she moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, from New York about February, 1945, or whether I received it from Julius Rosenberg while I was in New York City on furlough between about December 20, 1944, and January 20, 1945. Gold gave me an envelope containing \$500. Gold said to me that I was living in a poor place at the time he gave me the \$500. I furnished him with information concerning the Los Alamos Project, although I did not do it for the promise of money. I gave him a list of names of persons who were working at Los Alamos who, I thought, could be approached for information. They were names of both soldiers and civilians, to the best of my recollection. I felt it was gross negligence on the part of the United States not to give Russia the information about the Atom Bomb because she was an ally.

"I think that I gave Gold a sketch of a high-explosive lens mold, or something of that type of thing, which was an experiment to study implosion effects on a steel tube to understand the effect it would have on uranium so it could be determined how they could arrive at a critical mass that would not explode before detonation.

"I have furnished a rough penciled sketch of a portion of the above-mentioned high-explosive implosion test to F.B.I. Agents.

"I also furnished Gold with information concerning the identity of a world-famous scientist, who was working at Los Alamos under an assumed name. I also furnished the information to Gold that Oppenheimer was working at Los Alamos and that Kistiakowsky was working at Los Alamos.

"Gold told me that he would come back to see me again and I agreed to see him; however, he never contacted me again.

"My wife was not in the room at the time I received the money from Gold and at the time I gave him information about the Los Alamos Atom Bomt Project. I gave Gold the information without expecting money for it.

"I was inducted into the Army April 12, 1943, and was given Army Serial Number 32882473. During the summer of 1944 I was assigned to Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where I remained for about two weeks. While at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, I was given a security pep talk by someone in Military Intelligence, and at Los Alamos was furnished with a security book, I understood that all of the work being done at Los Alamos, New Mexico, was top secret. I understand that under Army regulations 'top secret' means that such information is not to be discussed with anyone even with fellow employees, except when it is necessary for the work. I was assigned to the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project from about August, 1944, until about February, 1946, and during all that time I was a non-commissioned officer in the United States Army, having first, Grade T-5, and later, Grade T-4. I was assigned to Theta Shop at Los Alamos where I worked on high-speed cameras, lucite parts, experimental equipment, and also made up parts that could not be bought on the outside. Un one occasion that I recall I handled uranium. In general, the work was in regard to the Atom Bomb but I did not know this until about a month or two after I was assigned there. I heard it among the employees at the Los Alamos Project.

and that my wife, who had arrived in Albuquerque for my wedding anniversary celebration, came on or about November 29, 1944. I also recall that I had a furlough from about December 30, 1944 to about January 20, 1945, and I spent my furlough time in New York City.

"I have read the above statement consisting of this page and three preceding pages and state it is the truth to the best of my knowledge. No promises or threats or coercion of any kind were used to obtain this statement.

INTERVIEW WITH MRS. DAVID (RUTH) CREENCLASS

On June 16, 1950, Mrs. DAVID (RUTH) GREENGLASS was interviewed by Special Agents RAYMOND P. WORTH and EDWIN R. TULLY at the Gouverneur Hospital New York City. The interview with Mrs. GREENGLASS began at 1:35 P.M. in the library at Gouverneur Hospital after Dr. H. E. EAUER, Superintendent of the hospital, advised that Mrs. GREENGLASS was rell enough to be interviewed and was in fact being released from the hospital on that date. In the presence of the interviewing agents, Dr. BAUER asked Mrs. GREENGLASS if she was willing to be interviewed by the FBI and when she replied in the affirmative, Dr. BAUER made arrangements to have her transported from the ward to the library on the second floor in the hospital.

Mrs. GREENGLASS was advised that she did not have to talk to the interviewing agents if she did not so desire and that she had the right to consult with an attorney before answering any questions and further anything she said could be used against her in court. Mrs. GREENGLASS declared that she was perfectly willing to talk with the agents.

She advised that she will be married to DAVID GREENGIASS eight years this coming November. She said the first occasion she had to visit her husband in Albuquerque, New Mexico, was in November, 1944 when she and her husband celebrated their wedding anniversary, the date of the anniversary being November 29. Mrs. GREENGIASS stated that on the occasion of her visit to Albuquerque in November, 1944, she remained there around five days and then returned to New York City.

In about March, 1945, she moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, to be near her husband who was stationed with the United States Army at Ios Alamos. She said that while in Albuquerque she resided at approximately six different addresses. She recalled living at North Fifth Street, address unknown, and North Eighth Street, address unknown. However, she said that most of the time she lived at 209 North High Street in Albuquerque. She recalled that her husband was a T-4 in the Army at the time.

She recalled that a man named FREEMAN was the owner of 209 North High Street and described him as being about 50 or 60 years of age with a stocky build. She said that FREEMAN'S wife was a teacher. She described 209 North High Street as a two story house with a basement.

Mrs. GREENGIASS stated that she secured a job with the OPA in Albuquerque and worked for the OPA most of the time that she resided in Albuquerque. She recalled that she had worked for Soil Conservation for

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about two or three weeks. She said that the only money she received while in Albuquerque was that from her salary and from the allotment received from the government for being the wife of a soldier. She denied receiving money from any other source during her stay in Albuquerque.

husband, in Albuquerque. She denied knowing HARRY GOLD or FRANK/KESSLER or FRANK/MARTIN. She said she never saw HARRY GOLD before his photograph appeared in the newspapers after his arrest. She said she never recognized HARRY GOLD as anyone she knew or met by any other name.

Mrs. GREENGLASS was confronted with the facts that her husband had admitted to the FBI that HARRY GOLD had visited the GREENGLASSES at 209 North High Street in Albuquerque. She stated that she would have to talk with her husband before she would believe that he furnished such information. She was confronted with the fact that HARRY GOLD and her husband, DAVID, had in separate interviews independently confirmed GOLD'S visit to the GREENGLASSES in Albuquerque in the spring of 1945. She then advised that she would not answer any further questions concerning her husband. She said she would not believe any such admissions by her husband unless he himself

The ambulance that was to take Mrs. GREENGLASS home was outside the hospital and subsequently the interview was terminated at approximately 3:05 P.M.

DAVID GREENGLASS, 265 Rivington Street, New York City, advised the writer that while he was a member of the United States Army he was assigned to the Los Alamos project in July or August, 1944, under Mr. FITZPATRICK, who was the section leader. He recalled that he worked in the machine shop at Los Alamos, and that on one occasion he had some work done on an uranium hemisphere in this shop, which work was performed by CHARLES SHROEDER. He stated that he looked and touched this piece of uranium hemisphere out of curiosity, but that he never had any in his possession, and he never removed any uranium hemispheres or normal uranium from the Los Alemos project.

He stated that he saw homispheres of various sizes in the technical area and in the laboratories which he believes were probably referred to

tuballoy hemispheres, but that he was never in the tuballoy shop at Los Alamos. He stated that he never removed any of the above mentioned materials and he had no knowledge of anyone else having done so.

Reference is cade to a discussion on Hovember 8, 1973, between Departmental attorney Savery Gradoville, Office of Legal Compact, and a representative of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) unit of the FSI concerning captioned catter. Mr. Goldstein was denied access to three interviews of David and Suth Greenglass by letter dated October 25, 1973, and has additional requests pending which we are currently processing.

Por your information, David Greenglass testified. for the Government at the Posenberg trial, pleaded guilty to espionage charges, and received a 15 year sentence. His wife, Ruth Greenglass, was named a co-conspirator, testified at the trial, but was not indicted. Subsequent to David Greenglass' release from prison, the Greenglasses changed their name and have lived in amonymity since that time. The first interview Ar. Coldstein is senking is of David Greenelass at 265 Elvington Street, New York City, and was conducted in January, 1950. It concerned a theft of Government property investigation, and has nothing to do with the Rosenberg case. It is our view at that point in time, David Greenglass was not a figure of historical interest and, therefore, this interview does not come within the purview of Attorney General Order 528-71. The other two interviews are the initial statements given us by David and Ruth Graenglass in connection with our investigation concerning the Rosenberg case.

David and Ruth Greenglass have been in contact with our New York Office indicating they are aware a television documentary about the Rosenbarg case is being produced and that they are concerned their atterney. O. John Rogge, would reveal their current names and address. Rogge represented the Greenglasses at the Rosenbarg trial.

Necause the Greenglasses have attempted to lead their lives in anomymity, it is our view a release of these interviews to ir. With record to the Greenglasses' desire for anomymity, it should be noted Ethel Resonberg was David Greenglass' sister and her conviction was the direct result of his testimony.

In view of the recent decision, Maisberg v. United States Department of Justice, there is no statutory condate or case law which directs us to release these documents. The only directive lies in Attorney General Order 528-73 which places the release of FBI documents at the sole discretion of the Attorney General.

Dear Mr. Campbell:

This letter responds to your November 7, 1973 appeal from Director Kelley's denial of your request for the FBI records of three interviews and a signed statement of David and Ruth Greenglass dating from February and June of 1950. The denial was based on exemption 7 of the Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)), protecting investigatory files compiled for law enforcement purposes. These records are portions of the FBI's investigation of the espionage activities of the Greenglasses and the Rosenbergs.

After very careful consideration I have concluded that your request for access to these records should be denied at this time.

The records in question are clearly exempted by the statute from compulsory disclosure because they comprise investigatory files compiled for law enforcement purposes. The question, therefore, is one of administrative discretion, as outlined in the Department's "Policy Regarding Criteria for Discretionary Access to Investigatory Records of Historical Interest", 28 C.F.R. 50.8, 38 Fed. Reg. 19029 July 17, 1973.

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The criteria in the Policy Statement provide for the deletion of "... matter involving an unwarranted invasion of privacy, or other matter which may be used adversely to affect private persons". 28 C.F.R. 50.8(c)(3). This language, while in part similar to that in exemption 6 of the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(6), refers only to material which is independently exempted from compulsory disclosure under exemption 7 of that Act.

The situation of the Greenglasses raises the problem of privacy and related interests in very serious form. The present Policy Statement does not contain criteria for balancing these interests against the interest in disclosure. Until such criteria are developed it would be wrong to make a final decision in favor of releasing documents. An improper release might do damage that could never be repaired. Should disclosure be the proper course, however, that could be accomplished later. I have directed our Freedom of Information Committee to begin work on the development of the necessary additional criteria immediately.

The decision not to release at this time is also influenced by considerations relating to preservation of the effectiveness of the Department's law enforcement functions, a concern mentioned several times in the Statement. Release at this time and under these circumstances might have a serious chilling effect on the willingness of potential informants to confide in the FBI.

Problems of this kind involve the reconciliation of several important but competing values. That reconciliation may be accomplished more satisfactorily perhaps after the additional criteria that should guide the Department in cases of discretionary release have been examined and articulated. There have been and will be cases where release can go forward without awaiting that clarification, but the present case is peculiarly difficult.

That being soll have, as already noted, liven some weight to the fact that a possible error in withholding can be remedied in the future while an erroneous release would have effects beyond the power of recall.

I hereby formally request that the Bureau furnish me materials related to the case of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. This would include papers relating to the Rosenbergs, to David and Ruth Greenglass, to Max Elitcher, Harry Gold, Klaus Fuchs, and Anatoli A. Yakovlev. In addition, I am requesting papers relating to Abraham Brothman and Oscar these would. I believe, provide background information and may relate directly to the Rosenberg Case.

I am presently engaged in a historical and sociological study of the Rosenberg Case, and of the social and legal climate within which it took place. I am an associate professor of Scciology at Douglass College, Rutgers University, presently on a one year leave for the purpose of pursuing this research effort. I expect my work to result in the publication of scientific papers for sociological journals and a book.

I have already requested and received cooperation from the Eisenhower Library, Department of Justice, and the State Department. I look forward to receiving the cooperation of your department.





The above-named individuals were indicted by a Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York on January 31, 1951, for conspiracy to violate Subsection (a) of Section 32, Title 50, United States Code, in violation of Section 34, Title 50, United States Code (1946 Ed.). On February 2, 1951, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell entered pleas of not guilty and David Greenglass entered a plea of guilty.

Trial of these defendants commenced on March 6, 1951, before United States District Judge Irving R. Kaufman in New York, and on March 29, 1951, the jury returned a verdict of guilty as to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell. David Greenglass testified as a witness for the prosecution, and disclosed details of conspiratorial efforts to transmit atomic energy data to the USSR.

The offense of which these defendants were convicted was committed during time of war, and the maximum applicable penalty accordingly was death or imprisonment for not more than 30 years.

On April 5, 1951, Judge Kaufman imposed the following sentences:

Julius Rosenberg - death, such sentence to be carried out during the week of May 21, 1951.

Ethel Rosenberg - death, such sentence to be carried out during the week of May 21, 1951.

Morton Sobell - imprisonment for a term of 30 years.

On April 6, 1951, Judge Kaufman imposed the following sentence:

David Greenglass - imprisonment for a term of 15 years.
