Yakovlev) in a bar on Third Avenue in New York City for the purpose of discussing plans for his departure in June of 1945 for Santa Fe, New Mexico, to meet Fechs. Buring this meeting "John" supplied him with the name and address of an individual whom Gold has identified as Greenglass and instructed Gold to contact this person in Albuquerque, New Mexico. "John" also gave Gold an envelope centaining about \$500 and instructed that this honey be given to Greenglass.

This meeting, according to Gold, never took place. Gold also states that he set Mrs. Buth Greenglass in Alboquerque.





It is believed that you will be interested in the details of the admitted espionage sotivity on the part of David Greenglass who was, as you know, agrested on June 16, 1950, for conspiring with Harry Gold and Anatoli A. Takovely in violation of Section 34, Title 50, U. S. Code, Greenglass was arraigned before a United States Commission in the Southern District of New York and bail was set at \$100,000. Greenglass is to be removed to New Mexico, which is the district where venus will lie.

entacts with Greenglass. He has advised that in about May of 1945 he met his superior, "John," (Anateli A. Takovlev) in a her on Third Avenue in New York City for the purpose of discussing plans for his departure in June of 1945 for Santa Fe, New Mexico, to meet Fuchs. During this meeting "John" supplied him with the name and address of an individual whom Gold has identified as Greenglass and instructed Cold to contact this person in Albuquerque, New Mexico. "John" place gave Gold an envelope containing about \$500 and instructed that this money be given to Greenglass.

Gold states that he left Philadelphia in June of 1945 and went to Albuquerque and from there to Santa Fe, where he contacted Fuchs and on his return to Albuquerque, which he believed was on a Similar, he contacted Greenglass, learned that Greenglass was in the United States Army and believes that he was a Technician 5th Grade. Gold states that he,

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sold left Greenglass' house and leter in the afternoon returned, at which time he received from Greenglass an envelope containing three to five pages of written information and possibly one aketch. Sold believes that this information was a description of the area in Los Alamos, New Mexico, where Greenglass worked. He also believes that there may have been a sketch of some structural equipment or of a machine. Sold judged from that Greenglass said that he worked at Los Alamos as a draftsman, a mechanic or an electrician in the Physics Laboratory. During the conversation with Greenglass Gold made tentative arrangements for a second meeting to occur in New York City during a furlough which Greenglass expected at Christmas, 1945. This meeting, according to Gold, never took place. Sold also stated that he met Mrs. Buth Greenglass in Albuquarques.

Preenglass in a signed statement executed on June 16, 1950, admitted that on about November 29, 1944, his wife Ruth arrived in New Maxico from New York City and teld him that Julius Rosenberg, Greenglass brother-in-law, had asked if he would give information on the atom bomb because of the war with Germany and Japan and the fact that Soviet Russia was fighting the enemy and was entitled to the information. On this basis Greenglass agreed to give whatever information which came in his possession as a result of his employment at the Los Alexos Atomic Energy Project.

Greenglass stated that he believes that in about March of 1945 a man whom he identifies as Marry Gold came to his residence at 209 North High Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico, and had with him a term or out piece of paper which fitted a term piece of paper card which had been furnished to Greenglass as a means of identifying the person who would contect him for information. Greenglass was not able to recall whether he received his half of the piece of paper from his wife, Buth, or whether it had been given to him by Julius Rosenberg while Greenglass was in Newbork City on furlough between about December 20, 1944, and January 20, 1945. During the meeting Gold furnished to Greenglass on envelope containing \$500. In return Greenglass admits he furnished to Gold information concerning the Los Alamos project, a list of names of persons who were working at Los Alamos project, a list of names of persons who were working at Los Alamos moject, a list of names and persons who were working at Los Alamos and also a sketch of a high-explosive lens mold or something of that type. This, according to

Greenglass, was part of an experiment to study implosion effects on a steel tube in an effort to determine the effect it would have on uranium, particularly with respect to determining whether the critical mass of granium would explode before detonation. Included in the report furnished by Greenglass to Gold was information someorning the fact that Oppenheimer and Kistiskowski were working at Los Alamos.

Investigation has reflected that Devid Greenglass was born March 3, 1922, in New York City. From February to June, 1940, he attended the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, studying mechanical engineering, but did not graduate. He attended the Fratt Institute & Science during the terms ending Jume 14, 1948, and October 14, 1948, studying mechanical designing. Army records reflect that Greenglass was industed into the United States Army on April 5, 1943. During July, 1944, he was transferred to the First Provisional Special Regimetr Detachment Unit, Menhattan District, Cak Ridge, Termessee. He departed from Oak Ridge on August 2, 1944, and joined the Second Provisional SED Unit at Santa Fe on August 5, 1944. On February 28, 1946, he was transferred from Santa Fe to the Separation Center at Fort Eliss, Texas, and was discharged on February 29, 1946. The records at Los Alamos reflect that David Greenglass, T-4, was assigned to Group E (implosion experiment) in August, 1944, under G. B. Kistiakowski. He worked in Group E-5 in tagust, 1944, on "Study of Symmetry of Collapse and Future Methods for its Improvement." He was transferred to Group I-1 under group leader H. E. Bradbury in September, 1944, working on implosion research. In about December, 1944, or January, 1945, Greenglass was working in Group I-4 under E. A. Long and J. W.Steut. This group was charged with engineering of molds for high-explosives, research on sintered and plastic bonded explosives and other missellaneous services for X

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DETAILS: HUGH ROBERT HOLLAND, 823 Parker Street, Newark, New Jersey,
employed as a Development Engineer, Engineering and Development
Department, Wallace and Tiernan Company, 11 Mill Street, Belleville,
New Jersey, was interviewed June 26, 1950, and can testify to the following:

That he, HOLLAND, worked as a machinist in the Experimental Engineering Shop, Theta Building, X Division, Service Section, Los Alamos, New Mexico, from approximately March 1944 to approximately March 1945.

That he was made Foreman of instant shop in approximately March 1945 and served in that capacity until February 1946, during which time subject worked under him as a machinist.

HOLLAND can testify that a machinist's duties consisted of running various lathes, mills, and other shop machines located in the Experimental Engineering Shop, which were used to manufacture test equipment. That such equipment included, for example, high-speed cameras, metal moulds to hold high explosives, and various electrical timing devices.

MOLLAND can testify that GPEENGLASS was not assigned any particular machine in the shop but that he was one of the better machinists and had access to all the machinery in instant shop. That GREENGLASS also had access to the warehouse and office area located in the Theta Building. HOLLAND can testify that the warehouse contained various parts made in the field by private commercial concerns, which he believed to be apparatus or components used in reference to tests made on the Atom Bomb. That the offices in the Theta Building houses various records dealing mainly with procurement and a record of materials produced in the machine shop.

HOLLAND can testify that each person at Los Alamos was lectured by an Army Intelligence officer prior to his entry on duty here that the nature of the entire project was to be strictly confidential.

He can further testify that GREENGLASS and the other shop employees ran errands to procure material from other shops located on other parts of the base at Los Alamos.

HOLLAND can also testify generally as to the work methods used in instant machine shop and to the fact that employees came and went frequently during working hours when the shop was not busy. That Theta Building employees were permitted to work on personal projects (for example, radios) in the machine shop during after-duty hours, and that on one or two occasions he saw the subject in the shop at night accompanied by two friends whose names he cannot recall.

HOLLAND can testify that subject had access to the main machine shop at Los Alamos and another machine shop, name not recalled, both of which were located outside the Theta Building.

He can further testify that when he left Los Alamos to receive his Army discharge in February 1946, he recommended the subject to succeed him as shop foreman. This recommendation was made to Master Sergeant FITZPATRICK, first name recalled as GERALD, who was HOLLAND's immediate superior. HOLLAND based this recommendation on subject's seniority, his technical knowledge of machinery, and his good workmanship.

HOLIAND cannot testify of his own knowledge that the materials produced in the Experimental Engineering Shop or those contained in the Theta Building warehouse were actually used to make tests on the Atom Bomb. This information was not disclosed officially to shop employees, but he stated that he assumed this to be true on the basis of the nature of the entire project plus the fact that he recognized certain equipment later used in making tests at the "S Site" as the same equipment which had been produced in instant shop. HOLIAND stated that the "S Site" was a restricted area which contained facilities for testing explosives. In addition to the above, HOLLAND furnished the following general information:

He was born April 24, 1920 at New York City. He was serving in the Special Engineers Detachment, U. S. Army as a technician third grade at the time of his discharge. He worked in the Experimental Engineering machine shop at Los Alamos as a machinist from approximately March 1944 to approximately March 1945, at which time he was made foreman. He stated the subject came into the Experimental Engineering Shop around September 1944, at which time a civilian, AL DE MARS, was in charge of the shop. HOLLAND advised that DE MARS was his predecessor as foreman of instant shop. HOLLAND advised there were only about 8 to 10 employees in the entire Theta Building.

In connection with the confidential nature of the work at this project, HOLIAND stated that each person prior to entering the project was lectured by an Army Intelligence officer, during which the fact was stressed that the nature of the work of the entire project was to be strictly confidential. HOLIAND stated that the employees at Los Alamos were inclined to talk freely among themselves, assuming that each had been cleared by the Army. HOLIAND stated that subject had two friends, whose names he could not recall, one of whom worked in the building at Los Alamos in which research and testing activities were performed on electronic equipment. HOLIAND stated he saw the subject in the electronic building on one occasion but could not state that he was there without authorization, as the employees came and went practically at will.

With reference to the security measures taken at Los Alamos, HOLLAND stated that each person were a badge, either blue, red or white, which entitled the holder to enter certain areas. Employees were also issued passes under special circumstances, allowing them to go outside their normal working area to perform special work or to obtain requested materials. HOLLAND stated that he believed the blue badge was the lowest classification, probably issued to the common laborers. The red bedge allowed the wearer to have free access to the main project. It was his belief that the white badge allowed the wearer free access to the entire base. He advised that subject were a red badge.

HOLLAND advised that GREENGLASS was always very curious regarding all phases of development at Los Alamos. He further stated subject was known as liberal and social minded and appeared to be a loud mouth. In arguments inside the shop the subject invariably took the side of Communism 100 per cent. HOLLAND stated that on one occasion GREENGLASS informed his fellow employees that an Army Intelligence officer had ordered him to cancel his subscription to some newspaper. HOLLAND believed instant paper to be either "PM" or the "Daily Worker." HOLLAND said that GREENGLASS objected to this on the grounds that he was being dictated to as to what paper he could read. HOLLAND stated he received the impression that subject was definitely pro-Russian. He further stated GREENGLASS was well informed and always had statistics to support his pro-Communist arguments.

HOLLAND stated that he saw no indication that subject ever passed information to unauthorized sources. He further advised that in the machine shop where subject worked, there was no material manufactured to his knowledge which had anything to do with the A-Bomb itself.

DAVID JAMES SCHAUFFLER, 454 Tremont Place, Orange, New Jersey, who is employed as a Project Engineer, Edison Laboratory, Thomas A. Edison, Inc., Lakeside Avenue, West Orange, New Jersey, was interviewed June 26, 1950. SCHAUFFLER can testify to the following:

He was assigned to Los Alamos in August 1944 and began work as a Maintenance Engineer, X Division, Service Section, in either September or October 1944. Instant section was headed at that time by JOHN FITZPATRICK, who was a technician third grade, U. S. Army. In October 1945 SCHAUFFLER was discharged from the Army at Bruns General Hospital, Sante Fe, New Mexico, and in November 1945 he returned as a civilian to Los Alamos and took the same job he had held previously. Approximately one month later he was made section leader in the Theta Building to succeed FITZPATRICK, and as section leader he had charge of all functions of instant building.

be served as section leader of the Theta Building and that subject was employed under him during part of that time as a machinist. He can testify that a machinist's duty was to produce parts from drawings. He can testify that the function of the machine shop was to make apparatus required by any of the groups of a division, specifically to produce products which would be used in conducting tests of various parts of the Atom Bomb. That subject's assignments were general in nature in that the shop undertook to produce instruments or devices which had been ordered by various groups. SCHAUFFLER can testify that to his knowledge nothing was produced in instant shop which was used directly in the make-up of the Atom Bomb. In regard to the function of instant shop, SCHAUFFLER stated that none of the shop employees were officially informed of the fact that they were producing products to be used in conducting tests on the Atom Bomb. He stated this information was known only to those individuals who were white badges.

He can testify that sketches and blueprints of various products to be produced by the machine shop were given to the shop foreman, who in turn distributed them to shop employees of his selection. SCHAUFFLER does not recall that these blueprints or drawings were marked or classified in any manner. These were drawings of component parts of various instruments.

SCHAUFFLER can testify that GREENGLASS's specific job as a machinist was to produce parts from drawings. Subject made no contribution to the design of the products produced in instant shop. In regard to the confidential nature of the work performed by the subject, SCHAUFFLER can testify that each soldier prior to entering on duty at Los Alamos was lectured to by an Army Intelligence officer and specifically told that the nature of the work at this project was to be strictly confidential.

SCHAUFFLER stated that shop employees such as the subject wore red or blue badges (exact color not recalled), which entitled them to go anywhere in the Theta Building. In this connection, however, SCHAUFFLER stated that shop employees were allowed in the office only when white badge wearers were present. He stated that the wearer of a white badge was entitled to go anywhere on the base except where safety hazards existed. SCHAUFFLER stated that wearers of the blue or red badges could go no where cutside the Theta Building except within the area covered by their group or the areas where admission was restricted. With regard to the security set up of the X Division at the Theta Building, SCHAUFFLER stated that the office located in this building was the only part of the building which contained classified documents. He stated instant office was open only when the wearer of a white badge was present and that while the wearers of red or blue badges had access to the office, they did not have access to the classified documents contained therein.

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SCHAUFFLER also advised that a warehouse was located in the Theta Building which contained in general materials to be used in experimental work by various groups of the X Division, some of which was commercially manufactured and some of which was made at Los Alamos outside the X Division. Instant material was to be used in various tests made in connection with the Atom Bomb. Shop employees had free access to instant warehouse, and no material was kept in the warehouse which was considered classified.

In addition to the above, SCHAUFFLER furnished the following information:

He was born August 30, 1910 in New York City. He advised that the machine shop which was located in the Theta Building contained approximately 3 lathes, several drill presses, a bench or service grinder, and a milling machine. With reference to the lecture that each soldier received prior to entering Los Alamos, SCHAUFFLER stated that the Army officer giving a lecture never specifically mentioned the Atom Bomb. SCHAUFFLER stated that only wearers of white badges at Los Alamos were supposed to know that the project had anything to do with the Atom Bomb. SCHAUFFLER stated he was first informed that the work carried on at Los Alamos pertained to the Atom Bomb when he learned of this fact through his section leader in approximately November 1944. SCHAUFFLER stated that his section leader felt that he should know this fact because of his duties as a Maintenance Engineer.

SCHAUFFLER cannot recall the exact date when GREENGLASS left Los Alamos, but he believes it was between November 1945 and July 1946.

In regard to the administrative set up at Los Alamos, SCHAUFFLER stated that during duty hours all military personnel employed here as well as civilian personnel came under the administrative control of the University of California. During off-duty hours, all military personnel were subject to Army administration. In this regard SCHAUFFLER stated that promotions and furloughs were granted through the Army at the recommendation of the University of California and that special orders were cut in that regard. He stated, however, that job assignments on the base with respect to the work itself were made verbally as a function of the division head. These were based on ability and merit and no official papers were issued in connection therewith.

SCHAUFFLEP stated that as he recalled, the following were also employed at Los Alamos in the machine shop with the subject:

HUGH HOLLAND (foremen)
SCHROEDER
ALOD
AD DE MARS

SCHAUFFLER stated that DE MARS preceded HQUIAND as foreman in instant shop. SCHAUFFLER also stated that one WENDELD MARSHMAN, of Pompton Plains, New Jersey, was employed as shop expeditor for the X Division at Los Alamos and should be able to testify as to specific materials produced in instant machine shop.

SCHAUFFLER also made a rough sketch showing the floor plan of the Theta Building and the location of the office, the machine shop, and the warehouse. Instant sketch is being retained in the files of the Newark Division.

SCHAUFFLER stated that at no time did he have any reason to question the loyalty or activity of the subject during the latter's employment at Los Alamos.

It is also noted that SCHAUFFLER stated that he believed the subject's wife came to Albuquerque, New Mexico, for a short period of time while the subject was employed at Los Alamos. He could furnish no further information in this regard. SCHAUFFLER also said that it was his recollection that the subject was a technician third grade at the time he left Los Alamos to receive his Army discharge. He added, however, that he was not certain of the accuracy of this information.

It will be noted that both HUGH HOLLAND and DAVID SCHAUFFLER stated they would be available for Federal Grand Jury testimony at Sante Fe or Albuquerque, New Mexico, tentatively set for July 6, 1950.

WENDELL EDWARD MARSHMAN, 15 Center Street, Pompton Plains, New Jersey, who is employed at the J and H Label Processing Corporation, 230 West Passaic Street, Maywood, New Jersey, was interviewed June 27, 1950.

MARSHMAN stated that he served as Assistant Section Leader, X Division, Service Group, Los Alamos, New Mexico, from approximately March 1944 to May 1945. In this job he was responsible for the control of the group during the absence of the Section Leader, J. P. FITZPATRICK. He also served as a shop expeditor and had direct control over the work which was performed in the Experimental Engineering Shop, Theta Building. He also scheduled the work performed there on a priority basis. As Assistant Section Leader, MARSHMAN was a staff member of instant base and wore a white badge entitling him to go all over the site except where safety hazards existed.

MARSHMAN can state that GREENGLASS was a machinist in the Experimental Engineering Shop, Theta Building, and that his duties were to produce products from drawings, which products were later to be used in various tests performed on the Atom Bomb. MARSHMAN can also testify that the equipment produced in instant shop was used in tests on the A-Bomb and that designs were also

developed there which later went into mass production of equipment which became a part of the bomb. He can testify as to the specific material produced in the shop. For example, a design was made in instant shop from which several high-speed cameras were developed to be used in various tests on the A-Bomb. The bulk of the work in instant shop, however, was to specifically alter various metal shapes for experimental tests, the prototypes of which eventually ended up on the Atom Bomb.

MARSHMAN can state that drawings and blueprints, some of which were classified and others not classified, were used by the machinists in the normal performance of their duties. He can testify as to the physical layout of the Theta Building, which consisted of an "L" shaped building containing a warehouse, a woodwork shop, the Experimental Engineering Shop, a men's and women's layatory, and an administrative office.

MARSHMAN can testify that the Administrative Office, Theta Building, contained classified documents consisting of general technical area information circulars, precious metals, procurement records and records of materials produced in the machine shop. The office also centained blueprint files. The classified documents were kept in 2-hour fireproof safes and shop employees did not have access to instant documents except through specific permission from staff members.

The warehouse in the Theta Building contained materials and component parts needed for testing purposes in the development of the A-Bomb, a lot of which was classified material although not always designated as such. MARSHMAN stated shop employees had free access to instant warehouse.

MARSHMAN can furnish general information regarding the security set up and the administrative set up at Los Alamos.

MARSHMAN advised that at no time during his acquaintanceship with the subject at Los Alamos did he have any reason to question subject's loyalty. He stated, however, that he did not like GREENGLASS from a personal standpoint. In this regard, he stated that it was his desire and also the desire of FITZPATRICK, the Section Head, to have the subject transferred to another group. MARSHMAN stated the reason for this was mostly personal and was based on the fact that the subject was unable to get along with his fellow employees, that he had an obnoxious manner and that they (FITZPATRICK and MARSHMAN) had a personal dislike for him. MARSHMAN stated that FITZPATRICK approached his superior in an effort to secure subject's transfer but that nothing happened as a result thereof and that he, MARSHMAN, heard no more of the incident.

As to the confidential nature of the duties performed by the employees at Los Alamos, MARSHMAN stated that each individual was informed by Army Intelligence officers prior to the time that he began work at the project that the entire project was of a strictly confidential nature.

MARSHMAN advised that the X Division had at least three test sites located outside the Theta Building and on the base at Los Alamos to which the shop employees had access. He further stated that shop employees were frequently sent on specific errands to instant test sites.

MARSHMAN drew a rough sketch showing the physical layout of the Theta Building, which has been retained in the files of the Newark Office.

MARSHMAN advised that he was born January 31, 1917, at Providence, Rhode Island, and that he will be available for Foderal Grand Jury testimony at Sante Fe or Albuquerque, New Mexico, tentatively set for July 6, 1950.

John Rogge, the attorney for David Greenglass, was interviewed at his office, bol Broadway, New York City. Mr. Rogge stated that he feels that Greenglass has not made a complete divulgence of his activities and that, from the family relationship of Greenglass, his wife, and Julius Rosenberg, his brother-in-law, he feels that there are doubtless other items that might be disclosed. Mr. Roggs said that he thought he would be able to obtain these items in subsequent consultations with his elient. As one item, Rogge appecified that "they" wanted Greenglass to stay on at Los Alamos, but he had refused. Mr. Rogge said that he desired his client to cooperate with the Government because in so doing the identity of a sore important individual of individuals might be ascertained.

Greenglass had informed Mr. Rogge that his contact at Los Alesos was to be identified by the production of one-half of a box top, the matching part of the box top being held by Greenglass. Greenglass said the whole box had originated with his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg. Greenglass had also informed Mr. Rogge that a person other than Marry Gold should have been his contact. Mr. Rogge suggested that Gold be questioned regarding the identity of the person who gave him the one-half box top. As of interest to you in this connection, Gold has nemed his contact, "John," (Amstoli A. Takovlev) as the person who gave him his half of the box top.

Mr. Rogge offered the aforementioned item as evidence of his good faith in wanting the cooperation between his client and the Government. Mr. Rogge said that there was only one other person that Greenglass could implieate, and that was his brother-in-law. He also stated that he had not discussed the program of cooperation with David Greenglass before going to Washington on June 27, 1950. 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Argonne National Laboratory, Lemont, Illinois, as a senior chemical engineer, furnished the following information on June 23, 1950 to Special Agent J. B. REYNOLDS and the reporting agent.

Mr. FITZPATRICK was in charge of X-Service Group, Los Alamos during the period he was stationed at Los Alamos as a Master Sergeant in the United States Army which was from January, 19th to August, 19th. Subject was an assistant foreman of the Machine Shop Section of X-Service Group during this period.

### DUTIES - METHOD OF ASSIGNMENTS -CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF WORK

Subject was a machinist in the Machine Shop of I-Service which was described as a small specialized machine shop and had performed specific work, not handled by the general machine shop. The employees of this shop, which usually numbered approximately five individuals, in the course of their work would normally learn considerable information pertaining to practically all phases of production at Los Alamos. I Service was in charge of maintenance of all test sites. A great deal of experimental material was handled by this section. This section was also in charge of obtaining material and designs for the testing sites.

Original work was done by the machine shop group on molds, which information at this time is still considered highly confidential. K-Service had to know the entire program of activity at Los Alamos because work schedules pertaining to various experiments were prepared by this group. In addition, complete information pertaining to the type and quantity of explosives was known to this group because explosives were handled by this section.

In addition to the vast amount of confidential information that normally came through X-Service, complete drawings and designs would be submitted to the machinists of X-Service in connection with assignments to be made to these machinists. The machinists, including the Subject, would examine the drawings and charts and make free hand sketches to be utilized in the

course of performing specific assignments delegated to them by their immediate superior. No control was exercised over the free hand sketches made by the respective machinist.

Mr. FITZPATRICK did not make specific assignments to the machinists but would assign a project to the foreman in charge of the machine shop who, in turn, would portion the work out to the various machinists. Each employee in the machine shop usually was familiar with all work being performed in the machine shop because in most instances, they all cooperated toward the completion of a specific project or problem.

The employees at Los Alamos were classified as to security privileges. Blue badges were issued to employees who were limited to confidential information needed in the course of their specific assignments. White badges were issued to employees who received full security clearance and had access to all confidential information needed in the course of their work with the exception of documents marked "top secret." However, individuals permitted to wear a white badge could ask questions of any other employee pertaining to any information and were entitled to receive the specific information requested. The white badge entitled the wearer to attend seminars and special lectures. A white badge entitled the wearer to visit any area of the plant.

Mr. FITZPATRICK stated that he was reasonably sure that Subject had been issued a white badge. Subject, in his position and as wearer of a white badge, could have obtained complete information pertaining to all phases of production at Los Alamos. Mr. FITZPATRICK stated, however, that he did not believe that Subject could have obtained information on the secret equations for the mold and could not have learned information pertaining to stock piling; however, he could have made inquiries pertaining to this information.

It was further pointed out that Subject could have drawn very accurate conclusions regarding "drops" due to his freedom of accessability to all areas of the plant, his right to ask questions, and by noting departures of key personnel from the area. Mr. FITZPATRICK stated that to the best of his recollection, practically all of the machinists employed in the machine shop had been issued white badges.

Mr. FITZPATRICK stated that he had built up X-Service from the beginning and when he needed a machinist or other specialized employees, he put through a request to his superiors but never for any specific individual. The persons possessing the required qualifications would be selected by the Manhattan District Engineers as far as he knows and sent to Los Alamos for further selection there. These men, upon arrival at Los Alamos, would be interviewed by the heads of the respective sections and selections made. Mr. FITZPATRICK pointed out that he had no way of knowing who had selected the men sent to Los Alamos to fill the desired position.

These men had been cleared permitting them to wear a blue badge. White badges were subsequently requested for employees by their respective superiors as needed in the course of their work. The security section and the head of the respective divisions passed on the issuance of white badges.

To the best of Mr. FITZPATRICK's knowledge, Subject did not, at any time, request that a white badge be issued to him. He did not make any request for military promotions but did receive promotions from time to time.

It was further stated that no information had been learned pertaining to the Subject that would suggest possible espionage activity on his part. Subject was described as a "loud talker and possessing a rather argumentative disposition."

Mr. FITZPATRICK advised that at the time he was placed in charge of this group, he was a Master Sergeant in the United States Army and that the group was completed by Army personnel, however, during his work he was under the control and answerable to the civilian director of X-Service.

Mr. FITZPATRICK further stated that he would have to receive clearance from AEC in respect to any matters if called upon to testify.

Mr. FITZPATRICK advised that Subject was an assistant foreman of the machine shop of X-Service Group at Los Alamos during the period January, 1944 to August, 1946 and that his immediate superior was L. DE MARS who is presently residing in Detroit, Michigan and employed in some auto industry there. DE MARS was replaced by ROBERT HOLLAND, who presently resides in New York City, present address not known.

The exact date that Mr. HOLLAND replaced DE MARS was not recalled. HOLLAND was replaced by DAVID SCHAUFLER in 1945. SCHAUFLER resides in Orange, New Jersey, and is employed by Edison Industries there.

It was stated that SCHAUFLER was well acquainted with the Subject. The director of X-Service Group was G. B. KISTIOKOWSKI and the assistant director was NORRIS BRADBURY.

Subject's immediate shop associates were C. D. CONRAD, R. HOLLAND, P. SHATKUM, D. J. SCHROEDER, F. SIMRALL, and J. F. KLOD, also known as KLODZINSKI.

It was stated that there were two "cliques"in existence in the X-Service The machine shop employees, previously named, composed the one group. FITZPATRICK did not consider himself within this particular group. Subject was friendly with all members of this group but was especially friendly with SCHROEDER.

Mr. ROBERT HOLLAND, L. DE MARS, and DAVID SCHAUFLER were immediate superiors of the Subject and made specific assignments to him, and therefore would be in a position to furnish specific information pertaining to assignments made to Subject. Mr. FITZPATRICK pointed out that these men were closer to the Subject than he was and that he had had little or no direct contact with the Subject.

Oreenglass in a signed statement executed on June 16, 1950, admitted that on about Howenber 29, 1966, his wife Buth arrived in New Maxico from New York City and told him that Julius Rosenberg, Oreenglass brother-in-law, had asked if he would give information on the atom bomb because of the war with Germany and Japan and the fact that Soviet Bussia was fighting the energy and was entitled to the information. On this basis Greenglass agreed to give whatever information which came in his possession as a result of his employment at the los Alamos Atomic Energy Project.

Greenglass stated that he believes that in about March of 1945 a man whom he identifies as Harry Gold came to his residence at 209 North High Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico, and had with him a torn or out piece of paper which fitted a torn piece of paper card which had been furnished to Greenglass as a means of identifying the person who would contact him for information. Greenglass was not able to recall whether he received his half of the piece of paper from his wife, Buth, or whether it had been given to him by Julius Rosenberg while Greenglass was in New York City on furlough between about December 20, 1944, and January 20, 1945. During the meeting Gold furnished to Greenglass an envelope containing \$500. The records at Los Alames reflect that David Greenglass, T-4, was assigned to Group E (implesion experiment) in August, 1944, under G. B. Kistiakowski. He worked in Group E-5 in August, 1944, on "Study of Symmetry of Collapse and Future Methods for its Deprovement." He was transferred to Orong I-1 under group leader H. E. Bradbury in September, 1944, working on implosion research. In about December, 1944, or Jamary, 1945, Greenglass was working in Group X-4 under E. A. Long and J. V. Stout. This Group was charged with engineering of molds for high-explosives, research on sintered and plastic bonded explosives and other miscellaneous services for I Division.

St. Louis letter to Washington Field, with cepies to New York and Albuquerque, dated June 28, 1950, advised the Army service record for BENJAMIN BEDERSON, ASN 32505267, indicated he was reduced in grade from technician third grade to private on May 24, 1945, per Paragraph 6, Special Order #124, ASF, U. S. Engineer Detachment, Oak Ridge, Tennessee. The same information was reflected in the Morning Report for June 1, 1945. Special Order #124 was not located or any other information regarding the basis for reduction in grade. 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

At 3 PM, July 10th, 1950, Mr. Arthur Relander, Jr., Security Officer, AEC, telephonically advised Special Agent Rebert J. Lamphere that he had been talking to his representatives in Los Alamos who had expressed concern over the wording of the indictment against Greenglass in that there was described therein the fact that Greenglass had delivered to Gold a sketch of a high explosive lens mold. The atomic energy representatives in Los Alamos had pointed out that the sketch drawn by Greenglass from memory of the object which he had delivered to Gold was actually a steel tube to study the effects of implosion and that terming this a high explosive lens mold was incorrect.

Mr. Holander also was mildly concerned over the fact that this wording in the indictment in effect declassifies a term which has, to date, been classified by the AEC. It is to be noted that we previously issued instructions to the Albuquerque Office to discuss with the security officials at Los Alamos the security aspects of the testimony of atomic energy witnesses before the Grand Jury, and USA Grantham had expressed the desire to talk to the AEC witness prior to his testimony.

### RECOMMENDATION

There is attached for your approval a teletype to the Albuquerque Office calling this to their attention and instructing them to discuss it with Dr. Ralph C. Smith at Los Alamos and with USA Grantham for his decision. As soon as a reply is received from Albuquerque a memorandum will be directed to the Criminal Division of the Department regarding this matter.

### Allegations of Harry Gold

On June 1, 1950, Harry Gold advised that when he went to Santa Fe in June, 1945, he stopped at the Hilton Hotel in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and picked up information from a noncommissioned U. S. Army officer, who was then living in Albuquerque. The information he obtained was probably of a general nature on the "installation" at Los Alamos. Gold stated that he gave the Army man \$500 for the information. He could not recall this man's name but said that he was married and had no children. He believed that he could locate this individual's residence from a map of Albuquerque.

(Philadelphia teletype 6/1/50)

On June 2, 1950, Gold executed a signed statement concerning his contacts with this individual. In the statement he stated that sometime around May, 1945, he met his superior, "John," in a bar on Third Avenue in New York City for the purpose of discussing plans for his departure in June, 1945, for Santa Fe, New Mexico, to meet Klaus Fuchs. During this meeting "John" supplied him with the name and address of an individual in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and instructed Gold to contact this man. He indicated that he believed "John" had told him to contact the man's wife if the man was not there. "John" stated that he would receive information from this man which Gold was to deliver to "John." "John" gave Gold an envelope containing about \$500 and instructed that this money be given to the man in Albuquerque in payment for the information. He stated that the money was to be given to him only if he needed the funds.

Gold further stated that he left Philadelphia in June, 1945, and went to Albuquerque and then to Santa Fe. On his return to Albuquerque he tried unsuccessfully to contact the individual. The following morning, which he believed was Sunday, he again went to the address and met the individual, at which time he learned that he was in the United States Army and believes that he was a Technician Fifth Grade. Gold stated that he, Gold, used the name Frank Kessler or Frank Martin and that the soldier recognized the password which was given by Gold.

Gold stated that he returned to the house later in the afternoon, at which time he received from the soldier an envelope containing three to five pages of written information and possibly one sketch. Gold believes that this information was a generalized description of the area in Los Alemos, New Mexico, in which the soldier worked. He stated there also may have been a sketch of some structural equipment or a machine. Gold judged from what the soldier said that he worked at Los Alemos as a draftsman, a machinist, or electrician in the Physics Laboratory.

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At the time the information was furnished by the soldier to Gold the latter gave the soldier approximately \$500. The soldier had expressed a need for funds to enable his wife to stay near him.

During the conversation with the soldier Gold made tentative arrangements for a second meeting to occur in New York City during a furlough which the soldier expected at Christmastime in 1945. Gold was to call the soldier's father-in-law in the Bronx, New York, whose first name Gold said may have been Philip. Gold indicated, however, that this meeting never occurred on the orders of "John" who appeared to have lost interest when Gold mentioned the matter to him in the late Fall of 1945.

Gold stated that the information he received from the soldier in Albuquerque was turned over to "John" upon his, Gold's, return to New York. Gold believes the actual transfer of the information to "John" occurred in Brooklyn in the neighborhood of Metropolitan Avenue.

Gold stated that at the time he first met the soldier in Albuquerque he also met his wife, whose name may have been Ruth. He also stated that subsequent to the meeting in Albuquerque he never saw the soldier or his wife again. (Philadelphia letter 6/3/50)

Gold had the impression that the soldier was somewhat naive because he suggested to Gold that the latter recruit another individual who was assigned to the same section at Los Alamos as was the soldier. Gold said that the person mentioned by the soldier was a Corporal who had recently been "broken."

Gold furnished a detailed description of the soldier and his wife, as well as a detailed description of their residence in Albuquerque. Gold stated that although the wife was present at the time of the meeting, she was sent into the kitchen or the bathroom when the actual business was transacted between Gold and the soldier. He was of the opinion that at the time he contacted the soldier and his wife the latter had recently arrived in Albuquerque. (Philadelphia teletype 6/2/50)

As a result of inquiries by the Albuquerque Office based upon description of the soldier's residence, it was determined that the unknown soldier was possibly identical with David Greenglass, who resided at 209 North High Street from March 1945 to March 1946. The name of Greenglass was mentioned along with various other names on June 3, 1950, during the interview with Gold and although he would not make a definite statement regarding the name he believed that Greenglass was possibly the name of the unknown soldier.

(Philadelphia teletype 6/3/59)





Inquiries in Albuquerque reflect that David and Buth Greenglass resided at 209 North High Street in Albuquerque from March 29, 1945, to March 9, 1946. The landlords of the building of this address indicated that Mrs. Greenglass was employed by the OPA. They seemed to recall that either David or Buth, or both, may have made a trip home for Christmas in 1945, and stated that Greenglass paid the rent promptly in cash. The landlords, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Freeman, did not recall his having been financially embarrassed or "flushed" with money at any particular time.

(Albuquerque teletype 6/4/50)

The photograph of David Greenglass was displayed to Harry Gold on June 4, 1950. Although he did not make a definite identification he stated there is a definite resemblance, although Greenglass seemed to be heavier than the person he contacted in Albuquerque. He did state that many of the features are the same. (Philadelphia teletype 6/4/50)

On June 6, 1950, current photographs of Greenglass and his wife were displayed to Harry Gold, as well as photographs of Greenglass taken in 1940. Gold was not able to effect an identification of the current photographs, but stated that the picture of Greenglass taken in 1940 resembled the person whom he contacted in Albuquerque. He also stated that there was some resemblance between the photographs of Ruth Greenglass and the soldier's wife. However, he could not make a definite identification. (Philadelphia teletype 6/6/50)

On June 7, 1950, Gold was shown current moving pictures of Greenglass, but was unable to make a positive identification. He was also shown pictures of houses in Albuquerque and he picked out the house at 209 North High Street as most closely resembling the one he visited. He stated, however, in order to be positive he would need to see photographs taken of the residence prior to remodeling. He could not identify nor eliminate the photographs of Mr. W. B. Freeman as the individual who let him into the house at Albuquerque at the time that he originally went to contact the soldier. (Philadelphia teletype 6/7/50)

On June 12, 1950, Gold was shown additional photographs of the house at 209 North High Street in Albuquerque, and which photographs had been taken in 1945. He stated that the house very closely resembles the house he visited in June, 1945. He is reasonably certain that this is the house and remembers the small street number sign on the edge of the porch.

(Philadelphia teletype 6/12/50)

On June 15, 1950, Gold definitely identified a photograph of David Greenglass and wrote the following statement on the back of this photograph:

This is the man I contacted in A suquerque, New Mexico, in June, 1945, on instructions from my Soviet espionage superior, 'John.' The man in the picture gave me information relative to his work at Los Alamos, New Mexico, which information I later gave to 'John.'

Information From

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### Background of David and Ruth Greenglass

Investigation to date reflects that David Greenglass was born March 3, 1922, in New York City. He attended Public School No. 4 and the Haaren High School in New York, graduating from the latter in 1940, after being in attendance there from 1956 to 1940. From February to Jume, 1940, he attended the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute, studying mechanical engineering, but did not graduate. He attended the Pratt Institute of Science during the terms ending Jume 14, 1948, and October 14, 1948, studying mechanical designing.

Investigation has reflected various employments of Greenglass, some of which have not as yet been verified because of the possible association of his relatives with the companies where he was employed. Inquiries have indicated, however, that he was employed as an apprentice machinist for B. Greenglass in New York City, while he was attending school. He was employed by the Intermational Telephone and Telegraph Company in New York City from July to October, 1941, and was reportedly employed by Freeman Brothers, 755 Broadway, during the period June, 1940, to October, 1941. He was employed by Feerless Labs, 467 -10th Avenue, New York City, from October, 1941, to March, 1945. He was in the United States Army from April, 1945, to February, 1946, and was thereafter employed at the Pitt Machine Products Company from April, 1946, to August, 1949. On September 9, 1949, he was employed by the Arma Engineering Company in New York City and has continued employment with this company to the present time as a machinist.

It should be noted that the Arma Engineering Company handles Havy contracts, some of which are classified.

Army records reflect that Greenglass was inducted into the United States Army on April 5, 1945, and entered active duty on April 12, 1943, at Fort Dix, New Jersey. He was assigned Army Serial Rumber 32882475. During July, 1944, he was transferred from Headquarters, Army Service Forces Training Command, Mississippi Ordnance Plant, Flora, Mississippi, to the First Provisional Special Engineer Detachment Unit, Manhattan District, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, arriving July 27, 1944. He departed from Oak Ridge on August 2, 1944, and joined the Second Provisional SED Unit at Santa Fe on August 5, 1944. The Second Provisional SED Unit apparently became a part of the Santa Fe Detachment, 9812 TSU-CE, Manhattan District, Santa Fe, on November 28, 1945. On February 28, 1946, he was transferred from Company B, Santa Fe Detachment, 9812 TSU-CE, Manhattan District, Santa Fe, New Mexico, to the Separation Center at Fort Bliss, Texas. He was discharged at Fort Bliss on February 29, 1946.

Records in Los Alamos reflect that David Greenglass, T-4, was assigned to Group E (Implosion Experimentation) in August, 1944, under G. B. Kistiakowski. He worked in Group E-5 in August, 1944, on "Study of Symmetry of Collapse and of the Methods for its Improvement." He was transferred to Group X-1 under Group Leader N. B. Bradbury in September, 1944. This group



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worked on "Implosion Research" at that time. In about December, 1944,or January, 1945, Greenglass had been transferred to Group X-4 under E. A. Long and J. W. Stout. This group was charged with engineering of moulds for high explosives, research on sintered and plastic bonded explosives and miscellaneous services for X Division.

The Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory Document Room records indicated that Greenglass did not have access to classified documents at the central document room and no record was found of any scientific papers prepared by Greenglass while at Los Alamos. (Albuquerque teletype 6/9/50)

The service records reflect that Greenglass was on furlough during the following periods: Hovember 15 to Hovember 29, 1943; June 6 to June 20, 1944; December 30, 1944, to January 19, 1945; and September 7 to September 25, 1945. It was indicated that he saw no foreign service and was awarded the Good Conduct Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and the American Theater Service Ribbon. His character and efficiency ratings were excellent and there were no records of courts-martial or AWOLs. His civilian occupation was described as turret lathe operator-machinist and his military occupation as machinist. His Social Security number was listed as 057-12-3577. His VA claim number at New York City was C14289193. His local draft board was Number 6, New York City, and his Order number 1134.

Selective Service records reflect that Greenglass attained the rank of T-4 while in the Army.

Greenglass' residences as reflected in various employment and Army records, and through investigation, are set forth as follows: 1922 to 1941 -- 64 Sheriff Street, New York City; 1941 to 1943 -- 266 Stanton Street, New York City; 1945 to 1946 -- U. S. Army; as of 1949 -- 265 Rivington, New York City.

Greenglass' relatives are listed as follows: Parents - Barnett and Tessie Greenglass, 64 Sheriff Street, New York City; (father deceased, mother born in Austria); wife - Ruth Printz Greenglass, born in U.S.A., married Hovember 29, 1942, in New York City; son (Name Unknown); brother - Semuel Greenglass, age 39 (1949), watch and instrument worker, residence - 384 Carroll Street, Brooklyn, New York; brother - Bernard Abraham Greenglass, age 32 (1949), unemployed machinist, residence - 65 Cannon Street, New York; sister - Ethel Rosenberg, age 34 (1949), housewife, residence - 10 Monroe Street, New York City.

The New York files reflect that the INO membership records as of August, 1949, listed David Greenglass, born in 1922, and Ruth, born in 1924, as members of the INO. No addresses were given. New York files also reflect that the address book of an individual described as a member of the Communist Party reported the name of Ruth Greenglass, 266 Stanton Street, New York City, as a member of the AYD.

A search of the Identification Records of the Bureau reflected no record except that Greenglass' fingerprint card as a member of the Army was received on April 5, 1943, and was assigned number 459514 A.

Investigation has reflected that Greenglass' wife, Ruth Prints Greenglass, was born in New York City on May 1, 1925. Her father was born in Hungary and her mother in Austria. She attended Public School No. 4 in New York City until 1935; Public School No. 12 until February, 1938, and Seward Park High School, graduating in January, 1941. She attended the East Side Evening High School from February, 1941, to January, 1942, and the Washington Irving High School from February to June, 1942. She also attended Brooklyn College evening session from September, 1942, to January 22, 1945.

From April, 1941, to September, 1941, she was employed at Jacob Wachs Corporation, 204 East Fourth Street, New York City as a secretary. From October, 1941, to October, 1942, she was employed by Miziachi, 1133 Broadway, New York City, as a stenographer. From November, 1942, to February, 1943, she was employed by the Covington Fabrics Corporation, 261 Fifth Avenue, New York City, as a stenographer and switchboard operator. She was employed by Local 450 of the United Electrical Radio and Machine Workers of America at 554 Atlantic Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, from March, 1943, to March, 1944, doing secretarial work. During March, April and May, 1944, she was employed with the Joshua Hendy Iron Works, 206 East Commercial Street, Pomona, California.

She reportedly was employed by the QPA in Albuquerque, New Mexico, during 1945 and early 1946. (This employment has not been verified to date.)

With respect to the allegation of Harry Gold that he contacted Greenglass in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in June, 1945, it is to be noted that

according to the records of the Hilton Hotel, Albuquerque, New Mexico, Gold was registered in that hotel for the night of June 3, 1945. The handwriting on the registration card has been identified by the FBI Laboratory as that of Gold.

(Albuquerque teletype 6/6/50; FBI Laboratory report 6/12/50)

In connection with the above, the records of the Albuquerque Mational Bank, Albuquerque, New Mexico, reflect that Savings Account No. 35169 was held in the name of Ruth and David Greenglass. A deposit slip for the amount of \$400 in currency, dated June 4, 1945, has been obtained and submitted to the Laboratory. Harry Gold states that he gave approximately \$500 to Greenglass on his contact with him in June, 1945.

(Albuquerque memorandum 6/8/50.)

#### Interview of David Greenglass

At 1:46 p.m. on June 15, 1950, Special Agents John W. Lewis and Leo H. Frutkin began an interview of David Greenglass at Apartment 6, 265 Rivington Street, New York City. At 1:55 p.m. Greenglass was advised of his rights not to make any statements and his right to have an attorney. At 1:57 p.m. Greenglass signed a waiver of search for his residence. At 1:58 p.m. a search of his residence was started by Special Agents Frutkin and Lewis. At 2:26 p.m. Special Agent John A. Harrington joined the search at which time photographs of Greenglass and his wife were given to Special Agent William F. Norton for transmission to Philadelphia in order that they might be exhibited to Harry Gold. At 3:40 p.m. Greenglass signed a waiver of search for his safety deposit box. This waiver, however, was not executed on June 15, 1950, because the banks were by that time closed. The search of Greenglass's residence was completed at 4:42 p.m. and typewriter specimens were obtained. A trunk containing correspondence of Greenglass was taken from the premises with Greenglass's consent.

Greenglass voluntarily accompanied Special Agents Lewis, Frutkin, Harrington, and Norton to the New York FBI Offices at Foley Square, New York, arriving at 5:25 p.m. where he was interviewed. He was given two hamburgers and a large container of coffee at 7:06 p.m. At 9:25 p.m. Greenglass admitted his guilt and signed the following statement at 1:06 a.m. on June 16, 1950:

"New York, New York June 16, 1950

"I, David Greenglass, make the following statement to John W. Lewis and Leo H. Frutkin, who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I make this statement freely and voluntarily and have been advised of my right not to make a statement and that I have a right to an attorney. I understand that this statement may be used against me in a court of law.

"I was born March 3, 1922, at New York City and presently reside at 265 Rivington Street, New York City. On or about November 29, 1944, my wife, Ruth, arrived in New Mexico from New York City and told me that Julius Hosenberg, my brother-in-law, had asked if I would give information on the atom bomb and stated as a reason for that that we are at war with Germany and Japan and that they are the enemy and that Soviet Russia was fighting the enemy and was entitled to the information. On that basis, I agreed to give whatever information came to me in the course of my employment at Los Alamos, New Mexico, at the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project. This message, which my wife conveyed to me, was not her own idea but was an idea given to her by Julius Rosenberg.

She told me at the time that a man would contact me later for information about the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project. About February, 1945, my wife moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, from New York City. Three or four months later she had a miscarriage.

\*Approximately a month after that time, a man came to the place where Buth was living, 209 North High Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico. I did not know this man's name at the time but recently recognized his pictures in various newspapers as being Harry Gold. He had with him a torn or cut piece of paper card which fitted a torn piece of paper card furnished me as a means of identifying this man. I cannot recall at this time whether this torn piece of card was given to me by my wife, Ruth, at the time she moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, from New York about February, 1945, or whether I received it from Julius Rosenberg while I was in New York City on furlough between about December 20, 1944, and January 20, 1945. Gold gave me an envelope containing five hundred dollars. Gold said to me that I was living in a poor place at the time he gave me the five hundred dollars. I furnished him with information concerning the Los Alamos project, although I did not do it for the promise of money. I gave him a list of names of persons who were working at Los Alamos who, I thought, could be approached for information. They were names of both soldiers and civilians, to the best of my recollection. I felt it was gross negligence on the part of the United States not to give Russia the information about the atom bomb because she was an ally. I think that I gave Gold a sketch of a high-explosive lens mold, or something of that type of thing, which was an experiment to study implosion effects on a steel tube to understand the effect it would have on uranium so it could be determined how they could arrive at a critical mass that would not explode before detonation. I have furnished a rough penciled sketch of a portion of the above-mentioned high-explosive implosion test to F.B.I. Agents. I also furnished Gold with information concerning the identity of a world-famous scientist, who was working at Los Alamos under an assumed name. I also furnished the information to Gold that Oppenheimer was working at Los Alamos and that Kistiakowsky was working at Los Alamos. Gold told me that he would come back to see me again and I agreed to see him, however, he never contacted me again. My wife was not in the room at the time I received the money from Gold and at the time I gave him information about the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project. I gave Gold the information without expecting money for it.

WI was inducted into the Army April 12, 1943, and was given Army Serial Number 32882473. During the summer of 1944 I was assigned to Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where I remained for about two weeks. While at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, I was given a security pep talk by someone in Military Intelligence, and at Los Alamos was furnished with a security book. I understood that all of the work being done at Ios Alamos, New Mexico, was Top Secret. I understand that

under Army regulations "Top Secret" means that such information is not to be discussed with anyone, even with fellow employees, except when it is necessary for the work. I was assigned to the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project from about August, 1944, until about February, 1946, and during all that time I was a monocommissioned officer in the United States Army, having first, Grade T-5, and later Grade T-4. I was assigned to Theta Shop at Los Alamos where I worked on high-speed cameras, lucite parts, experimental equipment, and also made up parts that could not be bought on the outside. On one occasion that I recall I handled uranium. In general, the work was in regard to the atom bomb but I did not know this until about a month or two after I was assigned there. I heard it among the employees at the Los Alamos Project. I recall that I had a leave of five days in late Movember, 1944, and that my wife, who had arrived in Albuquerque for my wedding anniversary celebration, came on or about Movember 29, 1944. I also recall that I had a furlough from about December 50, 1944, to about January 20, 1945, and I spent my furlough time in New York City.

"I have read the above statement consisting of this page and three preceding pages and state that it is the truth to the best of my knowledge. He promises or threats or ecercion of any kind were used to obtain this statement.

(signed) \*David Greenglass\*

After the execution of the signed statement, arrangements were made for Greenglass to remain overnight in the New York Office and he was put to bed on a cot in the murse's office. Prior to going to bed, Greenglass telephonically requested his brother-in-law, Louis Abel, to obtain for him the attorney 0. John Rogge. Greenglass at that time told Abel that he was at the FBI Office.

At 10:25 AM, Assistant Special Agent in Charge Whelan of the New York Office advised Mr. Hennrich that he had just received a telephone call from the attorney, O. John Rogge, who said that he had been retained to represent Greenglass. Mr. Rogge wanted to know what charges were being placed against Greenglass and as to when he could see him. Mr. Rogge was advised that the facts regarding Greenglass were being considered by the Department of Justice and that if Mr. Rogge so desired, Greenglass was available and Mr. Rogge could talk to him. At 10:50 AM Mr. Whalen advised Mr. Hennrich that Mr. Rogge had called and was sending his associate, Herbert J. Fabricant, to the New York Office to talk to Greenglass.

### Interview of Ruth Greenglass

An interview of Ruth Greenglass had not been conducted simultaneously with that of her husband in view of the fact that she had entered the Gouvernour

Hospital in New York City at 11:30 a.m. on June 13, 1950, suffering from cellulitis (inflammation of the cellular or connective tissues) in her left leg, a result of burns suffered several months ago. It has been ascertained that she was to be hospitalized for two or three days.

However, on the morning of June 16, 1950, after the advice of Mr. Raymond Whearty and Mr. James McInerney of the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice had been obtained at 10:40 a.m., instructions were issued to Assistant SAC Whelan to ascertain who the doctor of Ruth Greenglass was and to determine if he would consent to an interview. At 2:50 p.m. on June 16, 1950, Mr. Whelan advised that permission had been secured from the doctor at the Gouvernour Hospital where Ruth Greenglass was a patient, to interview her. The doctor had stated that she was capable of being interviewed and the only reason she was bedridden was because of the condition of her leg.

The actual interview of Ruth Greenglass began at 1:35 p.m. at Gouvernour Hospital. Mrs. Greenglass supplied background information regarding herself and stated she first visited her husband in Albuquerque in November, 1944. She stayed about five days to celebrate their wedding anniversary and then returned to New York City. (You will note that this coincides with the information from Parties. Greenglass said that in about March 1945 she moved to Albuquerque and lived at a number of different addresses, although most of the time she lived at 209 North High Street. She said that a man by the name of Freeman was the owner of the building at 209 North High Street and his wife was a teacher. While in Albuquerque, Mrs. Greenglass worked for the OPA and also worked for about two weeks with the soil conservation group.

Mrs. Greenglass denied that anyone had visited her or her husband in Albuquerque. She denied knowing the names Harry Gold, Frank Kessler or Frank Martin. She repeatedly declared that the only persons who visited her were people from Albuquerque such as the wires of GI's and fellow employees. She claimed that she had never seen Harry Gold before his photograph appeared in the newspapers after his arrest, nor did she recognize him as anyone she knew by any other name. When she was confronted with information furnished by her husband she said that she would have to talk with her husband before she could believe that he had furnished such information. She was then confronted with the fact that Harry Gold and her husband had in separate interviews independently confirmed Gold's visit to Greenglass in the spring of 1945 at Albuquerque. At this point Mrs. Greenglass declined to answer any further questions pertaining to her husband or herself without the opportunity of talking to her husband. She said she would not believe any such intimations unless he told her so himself. The interview was terminated at 3:25 p.m. on June 16, 1950, at which time Mrs. Greenglass's father appeared at the hospital to take Mrs. Greenglass home.



#### Interview of Julius Rosenberg

In view of the fact that David Greenglass had implicated his sister's husband, Julius Rosenberg as the individual who arranged for his recruitment into Soviet espionage work, arrangements were made for an interview of Julius Rosenberg by Agents of the New York Office. This interview was conducted on June 16, 1950, at which time Julius Rosenberg denied any espionage activities and refused to sign a waiver of search. Rosenberg did admit that Buth Greenglass told him in about August 1944 that David Greenglass was assigned to a secret project at Los Alamos, New Mexico. Rosenberg also recalled that in about November 1944 Ruth Greenglass visited Albuquerque and stayed for a short time. He also recalled that in about March 1945 David Greenglass came to New York City on a furlough and after David returned to Albuquerque he procured an apartment for himself and his wife. Rosenberg denied asking Ruth Greenglass to request her husband David to give information on the secret project to the Soviets. Rosenberg also denied arranging details of David Greenglass's contacts by the Soviets and he also denied receiving any confidential information relating to the Los Alamos Project. Rosenberg specifically denied the circumstances reported by David Greenglass regarding the arranging for a contact in New York City in December 1945 between Greenglass and an unidentified Soviet agent.

Rosenberg furnished the following background information concerning himself: He was born May 12, 1918, in New York City. His parents names were Harry and Sofie Rosenberg who were born in Poland. Rosenberg graduated from the City College of New York in February 1939 with a BA Electrical Engineering Degree. In 1939 he took a tool design course at Brooklyn Polytechnical. In 1940 he attended the Guggenheim Aeronautical School at New York University, studying aeronautical dynamics and aviation motor design. He was employed from 1939 until the summer of 1940 by the Williams Aeronautical Research Company in New York City. In the summer of 1940 he obtained a position as a P-1 Junior Inspection Engineer with the Signal Corps of the United States Army. In Pebruary 1945 Rosenberg was dismissed from the Newark, New Jersey, Signal Corps Inspection Agency for alleged subversive activities. Rosenberg said that he had received legal advice from Victor Rabinowitz, a New York attorney, regarding his reinstatement in the Signal Corps. Rosenberg said that he was a member of the FAECT Union from 1940 to 1945 and the Chairman of the Civil Service Committee group in New York City during this period. He said that he joined this union through Marcel Sherer, who was then the union organizer and that he was designated Chairman of the Committee by Sherer. Rosenberg said that he was registered with Local Draft Board #7 in New York City. He was married June 18, 1939, to Ethel Greenglass, the sister of David Greenglass. They have two sons, Michael Allen Rosenberg age 7, and Robert Harry Rosenberg age 3.

gation is in progress to obtain full details regarding Rosenberg's prior activities in an effort to obtain sufficient evidence on which to institute prosecution of Rosenberg.

#### Prosecution

Shortly after 10:00 a.m. on June 16, 1950, Mr. Ladd, Supervisor Lamphere and Mr. Belmont conferred with Mr. James McInerney, Mr. Raymond P. Whearty, and Mr. George Kneip, of the Department, concerning the case of David Greenglass. At the start of the conference, Mr. McInerney was unavailable: however, he came in shortly after the conference started.

The memorandum to the Attorney General dated June 16, setting forth the background and available information concerning David Greenglass was furnished to the Department. After a study of this information, Mr. Whearty advised that the Department would authorize prosecution against Greenglass under Section 34 of Title 50 charging conspiracy to violate Section 32 a of Title 50 USC. Mr. Whearty was of the opinion that venue would most clearly lie in the Federal District of New Mexico, inasmuch as the passing of the information from David Greenglass to Harry Gold occurred at Albuquerque. Mr. Whearty was orally advised that Greenglass had been allowed to call his home on the night of June 15, 1950, and again on the morning of June 16, 1950, as a result of which, attorney O. John Rogge had called the New York Office on June 16, 1950, to state that he represented Greenglass and was sending Mr. Fabricant, a representative of his firm to the New York Office to interview Greenglass. Mr. Whearty was advised that arrangements were being made for Fabricant to interview Greenglass.

In view of the interest of Mr. Rogge in this matter, Mr. Whearty immediately called U. S. Attorney Saypol, SDNY, and requested him to be alert for any action on the part of Rogge to secure a writ for the release of Greenglass, although Greenglass was not then in actual custody. Mr. Whearty advised Mr. Saypol very briefly of the fact that a complaint was to be filed in Albuquerque against Greenglass and based on the warrant to be issued, Greenglass would be apprehended in New York. Mr. Whearty told Mr. Saypol there was to be no publicity prior to the arrest.



In view of the fact that it was only 8:00 a.m. in New Mexico at this time, Mr. Whearty also spoke to U. S. Attorney T. Vincent Keough, EDNY, to advise him of the same facts and that the Department was authorizing process in Albuquerque, but that if Attorney Rogge attempted to get a writ, it might be necessary to file a complaint immediately in the Eastern District of New York. Mr. Keough was advised by Mr. Whearty that this matter should be kept confidential and no publicity should be issued prior to the arrest.

Mr. Whearty then called Assistant U. S. Attorney Sanchez at Albuquerque, New Mexico, and advised him that the Department was authorizing process in the Federal District of New Mexico. He requested that Sanchez immediately contact SAC Wyly, who would have the necessary facts to draw up the complaint. He advised Sanchez that Greenglass was in New York and would be apprehended on the basis of the warrant to be issued in Albuquerque.

Prior to the calls to the above United States Attorneys, Mr. Whearty and Mr. Kneip drew up the complaint against Greenglass. The complaint charged Greenglass with conspiring with Harry Gold and "John" (Anatoli A. Yakovlev) to violate Sub Section a, Section 32, Title 50, US Code in violation of the Conspiracy Statute, Section 34, Title 50, US Code. Immediately on the completion of the drawing up of the complaint, both the New York Office and the Albuquerque Office were telephonically furnished the exact wording of the complaint. SAC Wyly was advised to take the matter up immediately with Mr. Sanchez and to have an Agent appear before the United States Commissioner, and to advise the Bureau telephonically the moment the warrant was issued.

The New York Office was advised to be prepared to arraign Greenglass immediately upon receipt of word that the warrant had been issued.

Mr. McInerney inquired as to what action the Bureau was taking concerning Julius Rosenberg. He was advised that Rosenberg is presently being questioned at the New York Office on a voluntary basis.

At 12:39 p.m., Mr. Carlton, of the Albuquerque Office, called to advise that the complaint had been filed at 9:36 a.m. Albuquerque time (12:36 p.m., Washington time) and the warrant issued immediately thereafter. The complaint was signed by Special Agent J. Jerome Maxwell before U. S. Commissioner Owen J. Mowrey. Bond was set at \$100,000 upon the recommendation of the U. S. Attorney, following recommendation by the Department for this amount. Bond is returnable forthwith at Albuquerque. Certified copies of the papers were being forwarded air mail special delivery to the U. S. Attorney at the SDNY. This information was immediately furnished to ASAC Whelan at New York with instructions that Greenglass be arraigned at once.



Relative to Ruth Greenglass and Julius Rosenberg, Mr. McInerney and the other Department representatives were of the opinion that process should not be issued at this time on the basis of the statement of Greenglass alone. They requested that the Department be kept advised of any developments resulting from the interviews of these individuals. They were told they would be kept advised.

At 2:05 p.m., ASAC Whelan advised that the subject had been arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Edward W. McDonald, SDNY. Bail was set at \$100,000 and Greenglass was remanded to the custody of the marshal until hearing scheduled for June 23, 1950. Attorney Rogge made a plea for bail in the amount of \$5,000, stating that hysteria is gripping the country; that figures mean nothing under these conditions; and that \$100,000 in reality means denying bail to the defendant and thus violating his Constitutional rights. Both the U. S. Attorney and the U. S. Commissioner disagreed with him and bail was set at \$100,000.

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The following information pertaining to RUTH L. TURKENGLASS, nee PRINTZ, was contained in the Office of Price Administration personnel file for her, now maintained on microfilm at the Archives, Washington, B. G.

She was born May 1, 1923 at New York City, and her address caring 1945 and 1946 was 209 North High Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico. She gave her husband's name as DAVID GREENGLASS, Fost Office Box \$1663, Santa Fe, New Mexico. She began her employment with the Office of Price Administration at Albuquerque, New Mexico on April 11, 1945, and ceased working for that agency at the close of business, February 28, 1946, giving as the reason for her resignation "changing residence." She noted on these records that she was familiar with the French, Hebrew and Jewish languages. Further, her legal residence appeared as 254 Rivington Street, New York City. Under former employment, BUTH GREENGLASS noted that she had been employed by the American Jewish Congress, 1834 Broadway, New York City, by Local #450 of the United Electrical Radio and Machine Workers Union, 554 Atlantic Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and by the Joshua Hendy Iron Works, 206 East Commercial Street, Pomona, California (March to May, 1944). As character references she listed the following individuals: GEORGE NX ROONEY, 33-42 72nd Street, Jackson, Heights, Long Island; MAI LEVINE, 1884 Broadway, New York City; MARION GORMAN, 725 Greenwich Street, New York City; BUTH TROTZ, 1834 Broadway, New York City; and BEN GOLDSTEIN, 261 5th Avenue, New York City. on ROGERS had been lost while en route from Los Alamos, New Mexico te
Chicago, Illinois, and that to date its location is not known. With
respect to JOAN CHASE HINTON, T-1's file reflected that much of the
information concerning her was in the form of latters between the Bureau
and T-1. However, the following being set out herein only as a matter of
record is additional information.

JOAN CHASE HINTON was connected with the Institute of Nuclear Physics at the University of Chicago from March 25, 1946 to June 30, 1946, but had no access to restricted data. She worked in conjunction with Doctors ENRICO FERMI and SAMUEL K. ALLISON, both of the University of Chicago.

Tel's concern ever HINTON stemmed from a report that as of May, 1949, she was known to be behind Communist lines in China, and it was assumed that if the Communists learned that she had worked on the Manhattan Project they might well attempt to extract the information from her. While connected with the Manhattan Project, HINTON had had considerable access to weapon data at Los Alamos, New Mexico, including data concerning the final assembly of the component parts of the atomic bomb. This file contained further information that on April 28, 1949, one JULIUS TABIN (no address indicated) had advised Tel that JOAN CHASE HINTON and her family were all "liberals" and had reputations for being interested in projects which would help the "underdog." In addition, her sister, JEAN HINTON, was reportedly at one time a CIO programser. While in Chicago, Illinois is 1945, JOAN CHASE HINTON was reportedly intimate with EDWARD TELLER and others in Tel's group in Chicago, Illinois.

The file further reflected that T-2 had received information from T-2, another governmental agency, that JON's brother



Further, that WILLIAM HINTON is now patently Communist apologist. This information also indicated that one SIDNEY ENGST was a good friend of WILLIAM HINTON and that ENGST may at one time have been an envoy for Mademoiselle SUN YAT-SEN. Most recent information in the file indicated that JOAN CHASE HINTON is still in Manchuria.

I would like to add the following to the statement dated June 2, 1950, which I gave the above named agents relative to the unknown individual cantacted in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in June of 1945, Since the above statement was made I have identified a picture shown to me by Agents MILUER and BRENNAN, and whom I have been told is DAVID GREENGLASS, as being the same man I previously described as being the Unknown G.I. whom I met in early June of 1945, in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

There also recalled the fact that my means of identifying myself to GREENGLASS and of his verifying this identification was by means of two term pieces of paper of an irregular shape, but which matched when put together. One such piece was in my possession, and had been given by solly, and the other piece has in GREENGLASS.

During & conversation I had with Mrs. CREENCLASS on the coasion of my first meeting, that is the morning meeting, at the

partment in Albuquerque, Mrs. GREENGLASS told me that when they returned to New York on GREENGLASS! expected furlough. hich was to take place about December of 1945, that I could contact then by getting in touch with a relative of kree OREEROLASS. I believe the man questioned was supposed to be Mrs. UREENGIASS' father, that is the father-in-law of DAVID OREKNGIASS, and I had previously stated that I believed his name to be PHILIP and that I believed in the Bronx, Now York. Since that time I have come to the belief that the more likely possibility may have been that this man was either an uncle or a relative of Mrs. GREENGLASS, and that his name may have been JULIUS. I am certain that I was given a telephone masher, but I am not certain as to whether I was also given an address. There is also the possibility that the location in New York may have been the Bronx. Mrs. GREENGLASS also told me that just prior to her leaving New York, in April of 1965, that she had talked with JULIUS and had explained this arrangement to him.

I had been instructed by Willy before leaving Albuquerque, that there was the possibility that this man might not be in Albuquerque, but that, certainly, his wife would be there and that in such an event, that she would turn over to me an envelope containing the information c energy, and that in turn that I was to give her the envelope containing the \$500,00. Purther, JUHN had explained to me that CREENCLASS wife was just as reliable as he was in conducting such an affair.

I would like to add also that during the major part of my conversation with GREENGLASS, which conversation included the fact that Harry Gold TSM REB

he was working at Los Alsmos; the fact that he was going to propose a possible recruit (and which I promptly discouraged), and the actual transfer of the information which occurred on the occasion of the second meeting of about five minutes duration on that same day, but in the afternoon, that Mrs. GREENGLASS was present during all of this. 

On the morning of June 28, 1950, I received a call from Mr. Whearty of the Department advising that USA Grantham of the Federal District of New Mexico had written to the Department stating that a Grand Jury would be in session at Santa Fe starting July 6, 1950, for the purpose of hearing the Greenglass case. Mr. Whearty wanted to be sure that the Bureau had this information and that appropriate arrangements would be made to have the necessary witnesses present for hearings before the Grand Jury.

I advised him that this matter was being discussed with USA Grantham by our Albuquerque Office and we would, of course, take such steps as Mr. Grantham desired. Mr. Whearty suggested that we make copies of the Greenglass reports available to Mr. Grantham. I told him this would be done.

Mr. Whearty called me later to advise that following attorney O. John Rogge's discussion with Mr. Ladd on June 26, Mr. Rogge came to the Department and saw Mr. McInerney. Mr. McInerney made no commitments whatever to Rogge. This morning Rogge called Mr. McInerney and stated that he had dug up a piece of corroborative evidence pertinent to the Gold and Greenglass cases which he wanted to make available. Mr. Whearty requested that we contact Rogge in New York and get this information.

I told Mr. Whearty that we would contact Mr. Rogge specifically on this item, advising him that in response to his call to Mr. McInerney this morning to the effect that he had some evidence he desired to make available, we were calling to get the evidence.

I called Supervisor Granville at New York, in the absence of ASAC Whelan, and advised him to get in touch with Rogge for the purpose of receiving this information. Mr. Granville was advised to restrict the contact with Rogge to this matter and to make sure that Rogge understands that the reason we are contacting him is at the request of Mr. McInerney in response to Rogge's call to McInerney this morning.

The New York Office will advise us of the results of this

contact.

After checking into this matter, Mr. Rolander has advised that Dr. Ralph Carlisle Smith, Assistant Director of Classification and Security, Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory can testify from the records at Los Alamos regarding the confidential nature of work performed and also as to the confidential classification of the lens mold.

Mr. Rolander pointed out that so far he had been unable to locate anyone at Los Alamos who worked with Greenglass; however, John P. Fitspatrick, presently employed at Argonne National Laboratory, Chicago, was the group leader and immediate supervisor of Greenglass at Los Alamos. Rolander has not communicated with Fitzpatrick as yet.





A True Bill &

Special Agent J. JEROME MAXWELL by memorandum dated July 7, 1950, has advised me of information in the nature of a "complaint" received by him from Mr. WILLIAM J. McELWREATH, Director of Security for the Atomic Energy Commission at Los Alamos. McELWREATH called attention to the newspaper account of the indictment in this matter with particular reference to the fact that MARRY GOLD allegedly received from GREENGLASS a whetch of a "High explosive lense wold." McELWREATH further complained that he understood from WENDELL EDWARD MARSHMAN, a former AEC/employee who testified as a Government witness, that the United States Attorney had mentioned before the Grand Jury that the "High explosive lense mold" had been used in the "implosion method." McELWREATH stated that references to both the quoted terms were violations of security as both are still classified as restricted data under the Atomic Energy Act.

McELWREATH stated that he on June 30, last, received a teletype from the Atomic Energy Commission at Washington advising that the Bureau was instructing the Albuquerque Division to discuss the classification of information as disclosed by GREENGLASS with RALPH CARLYSLE SMITH and that this office was being instructed to refer to McELWREATH's office any matters of security which might arise in the preparation of evidence or testimony for the Grand Jury.

MCELWREATH stated that he and RANGE SMITH went to Santa Fe, arriving there at approximately 9:00 AM, July 6, 1950, "... Expecting the FBI to arrange for the necessary conferences with the United States Attorney on matters of classification." They were introduced to United States Attorney GRANTHAM in the hall of the Federal Building by the Foreman of the Grand Jury. They were not advised then what the United States Attorney intended to include in the indictment, nor were they consulted on any matters of classification.

Br. RALPE CARLYSLE SMITH, Assistant Director for Classification and Security, LASL, stated that he had discussed the two classified terms used in the indictment before the Grand Jury with Mr. JAMES BECKERLEY, Director of Classification, AEC, Washington, D.C, who stated that he believed these two terms could be officially declassified in the event it became necessary for them to be used for the subsequent prosecution of this case. This will require action by the Commission. It is pointed out that both of these terms are used in the signed statement of GREENGLASS. It is suggested that the Bureau may desire to contact AEC in the interest of having these terms officially declassified prior to the firthcoming trial of this case.

AQ 65-39

McELWREATH and SMITH stated that they feel that the FBI was at least partially at fault in allowing information concerning "...a high explosive lease mold" to be included in the indictment. They point out that this information must have been furnished to the United States Attorney by the FBI and that the FBI should have known and advised the United States Attorney that same was classified. As a practical matter, it does not appear that any real damage has been done in view of the fact that GREENGLASS has admitted giving information on these subjects to the Russians and FUCHS, of course, admitted furnishing implosion data to the Soviets. McELWREATH and SMITH agree with this approach but state that AEC decided against publishing FUCHS' statement on the theory that some of the information furnished by him may have been garbled in transmission to Russia.

SMITH stated that he was not shown the sketch made by GREENGLASS at the Grand Jury hearing of this case. He further stated that this sketch was not a sketch of a "High explosive lense mold" as described in the indictment. His main reason for arriving at this decision was that the sketch included a detonator which a lense mold did not have. He stated that it might possibly be called a "Righ explosive lense" without the mold. He stated that if he were requested to identify this sketch in court he would describe it as "Koski arrangement for a form of cylindrical implosion on a steel tube," and that it was classified as restricted data. He stated that he could so testify only in the event AEC declassifies the term "implosion" prior to the trial.

In view of the allegations set forth above, I have gone into this matter thoroughly with Special Agent HERRY L. McCORNELL, to whom this case was assigned in Albuquerque, and who handled the interviews with AEC representatives, as well as necessary conferences with the United States Attorney prior to the convening of the Grand Jury. The following advice has been furnished by Special Agent McCORNELL:

On July 3, 1950, in the Resident Agency at Los Alamos, McCOMMELL conferred with Dr. RALPH CARLYSLE SMITH, WILLIAM J. McELWREATH, and P. F. BEICHER, Deputy to SMITH, At that time McCOMMELL advised these gentlemen of the testimony expected from WENDELL EDWARD MARSHMAN, as same appears in Newark teletype to the Bureau, New York, and Albuquerque, on June 27, last. SMITH advised that there was nothing in this expected testimony which was classified and that as far as he was concerned, it could be ". Printed in the newspaper."

prepared by GREENGLASS, as appearing in the report of Special Agent JOHN W. LEWIS, dated June 26, last, at New York City and specifically as same appears on Pages 5, 4, and 5 of that report. McCONNELL read verbatim to SMITH the following excerpt

"I think that I gave GOLD a sketch of high explosive lens mold, or something of that type of thing which was an experiment to study implosion effects on a steel tube, to understand what affect it would have on uranium so it could be determined how they could arrive at a critical mass that would not explode before detonation."

"I have furnished a rough pencil sketch of a portion of the above mentioned high-explosive implosion test to FBI Agents."

Mr. SMITH advised that the above-quoted data was classified in 1945 and has so remained.

A photostatic copy of the sketch prepared by GREENGLASS and to which he refers in his signed statement was exhibited to SMITH and McELWREATH and MELCHER. They advised that this sketch dealt with classified material and that same had always been classified.

SMITH advised McCOMMELL that he had been instructed by AEC, Washington, that SMITH was being held responsible to insure that no breach of security occurred in connection with instant case. He requested advice as to what procedure would be used in the indictment and in the trial to avoid security breaches. McCONNELL in the presence of Special Agent FREDERICK W. ARMSTRONG advised these three men that the problems and details pertaining to the Grand Jury proceedings, the indictment, and the subsequent trial would not be under the control of the Bureau but were matters handled by the Department of Justice and the United States Attorney's Office. These men were informed that United States Attorney EVERETT GRAFTHAM was not available for conferences on that date, July 3, but that he would be in his office at Santa Fe on the morning of July 6 prior to the convening of the Grand Jury and could be consulted with reference to such matters at that time. McCONNELL advised SMITH that Mr. GRANTHAM had stated he would rely upon SMITH for testimony as to the classified nature of any evidence to be presented in the GREENGLASS Case and McCONNEIL requested that Mr. SMITH be in the office of the United States Attorney at Santa Fe by 9:00 AM on July 6 in order that he might confer with Mr. GRAFTHAM. Mr. SMITH definitely stated that he and/or his Deputy BELCHER would be at the United States Attorney's Office as requested.

MCCOHNELL arrived at the office of the United States Attorney in Santa Fe at approximately 9:05 AM, July 6. Mr. GRAWHAM, the United States Attorney, Mr. SMITH, and Mr. REICHER were at that time standing in the reception room of the office of the United States Attorney but did not appear to be in

conversation. McCOMMELL attempted to introduce the United States Attorney to Mr. EMICHER and Mr. SMITH. Mr. GRANTHAM, REICHER, and SMITH all stated that they had previously met and were well acquainted. Immediately thereafter the United States Attorney called SMITH, BELCHER and Special Agents McCOHNELL, BRENNAN, LEWIS, and FRUTKIN, the latter three of the New York Division, into his private office for a conference. Mr. GRANTHAM stated that he was considering the indictment in this case and that at that time he had received no instructions from the Department of Justice and that it would probably be necessary for him to consult the Department telephonically before the indictment was read. Mr. GRANTHAM mentioned at that time that there would be no reporter in the Grand Jury room and that no transcript of the testimony would be made.

Shortly thereafter the Grand Jury convened and the testimony was completed at approximately noon on July 6, 1950.

From approximately noon until 2:30 PM, McCONNELL was engaged in a conference with Assistant Attorney General BEN BROOKS pertaining to another matter of importance to be presented to the Grand Jury. At approximately 3:00 PM, the United States Attorney's Secretary handed McCONNELL a copy of the indictment and advised that Mr. GMANTHAM was then in the Grand Jury room in connection with the GREENGLASS Case and that the Grand Jury would report thereon immediately. McCONNELL then proceeded to the court room and observed that United States Attorney GRANTHAM was there with members of the Grand Jury and they were in the process of reporting a true bill in instant matter.

McCONMELL advises that during the period 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM, July 6, 1950, Messrs. SMITH and BELCHER were observed going in and out of the United States Attorney's Office. McCOMMELL was not consulted as to the content of the indictment by the United States Attorney or by SMITH at any time during this period. McCOMMELL had no opportunity to review the indictment until the moment above described when it was being returned by the Grand Jury.

of possible interest in this matter is the fact that Mr. SMITH and Mr. CRANTHAM have had previous dealings in the past few years and their relations have been far from harmonious; therefore, animonisty on the part of SMITH toward CRANTHAM may have increased SMITH's tendency to complain.

In conclusion it would appear that SMITH and BELCHER had ample opportunity to confer with United States Attorney GRANTHAM prior to the drawing of this indictment. The possibility exists that AEC officials in Washington upon reading

the newspaper publicity and noting the alleged classified terms appearing therein may complain and criticize SMITH and/or McELWREATH for their failure to prevent the inclusion of classified data in the indictment or their failure to prevent the mention of classified terms before the Grand Jury. It appears to be obvious that SMITH fears such criticism and is attempting to "pass the buck" or be in a position to say that he depended upon Bureau Agents to prevent breaches of security. The possibility also appears to be evident that McELWREATH, SMITH and RELCHER feel that they were ignored by the United States Attorney at Santa Fe at the Grand Jury and this factor may have resulted in some animonisty.

AEC Headquarters in Washington may contact Bureau officials concerning this matter and the above data is furnished in order that the Bureau may be in a position to immediately refute any allegations which may be made by AEC representatives at Los Alamos.

Re Albuquerque letter to the Director May 18, 1950, which requested all offices receiving copies of the letter to check the names of suspects in instant case in the indices. These suspects names were set out in the report of SA J JEROME MAXWELL, Albuquerque, dated April 28, 1950.

The suspects' names have been checked in the Chicago indices for information pertinent to instant investigation. In making this check Bulet to Albuquerque, dated May 8, 1950, was used as a guide. This letter requested that Albuquerque in setting out leads should design them to develop information concerning the suspects' leave in November 1944, and travel in January 1945. Rebulet also stated that leads to develop Communist or subversive activity on the part of the suspect is of no immediate value pending the determination of the foregoing.

No information was located in the files of the Chicago Office pertaining to the suspects which showed the whereabuts of or activities of the suspects during November or December 1944, or January 1945, which was not already in the possession of the Albuquerque Office.

The Chicago files contain considerable information of a background nature concerning many of the suspects, and some information concerning suspects indicating possible subversive or Communistic activity. In most instances it appears that this information is already in the possession of the Albuquerque Office, but this cannot be definitely determined on the basis of information appearing in the Chicage. files. This information is not being set out at this time for reasons previously given.

With respect to the principal suspect in this case, DR. EDWARD FRIER, as set out in relet from Albuquerque to the Director, the Chicago Office has considerable information not in the possession of the Albuquerque Office. Much of this information, however, pertains to

MORRIS LEONARD PERLMAN is one of the suspects listed.

MR. ROBERT F. PLOTT Associate Physicist, Argonne National Laboratory, near Lemont, Illinois, in February 1949, advised SA WINFRED E. JESTER that in the latter part of 1945 or early spring of 1946, MORRIS PERIMAN, while employed at General Electric Laboratory, Schenectady, New York, referred to IGNACI WITZAK in a way which indicated he was acquainted with WITZAK. It is to be noted that WITZAK is a Russian espionage agent who formerly operated in the United States.

It is known to the Chicago Office that this information pertaining to PERLMAN had previously been furnished to Agents of the Albany Office, and also to Security Officers of the Atomic Energy Project.

PLOTT subsequently furnished information indicating that he had at one time seen a person referred to as WITZAK on the Atomic Energy Project in Chicago, Illinois. PLOTT has examined photographs of WITZAK and has stated that he is reasonably sure that the photographs are identical with those of the person he saw on the Atomic Energy Project in Chicago. Investigation has not been able to determine the identity of the person seen by PLOTT, and PERLMAN has denied knowing such an individual.

For the information of the Albuquerque Office PLOTT served as a confidential Informant for the Manhattan Engineering District on the Atomic Energy Project during World War II, and was considered reliable by the Manhattan Engineering District. He has been very cooperative with the Chicago Office.

It is to be noted that PLOTT, in connection with the mention of the name of WITZAK by PERIMAN states that he is reasonably certain that it was the name of WITZAK which was mentioned by PERIMAN.

## BACKGROUND

It will be recalled that Greenglass, who was arrested in

New York City on a Commissioner's Warrant charging him with violation
of the Espionage Statute, was scheduled to come before the Commissioner
in the SDNY tomorrow, July 13, 1950, in connection with his removal to
hibuquerque. It will be recalled that this removal action was postponed
from June 30, 1950, in order to give the Grant Jury at Albuquerque an
opportunity to return an indictment in this case. An indictment was returned
on July 6, 1950, and, therefore, at tomorrow's hearing it would be necessary
only to show identity in order to have Greenglass ordered removed.

## DEVELOPMENTS

ASAC Whelan of New York called at 3:25 P.M. and stated that this afternoon SA John Lewis, who is handling this case in the New York Office, contacted the Commissioner's Office for the purpose of verifying the removal hearing scheduled for tomorrow. Agent Lewis was advised that USA Saypol and attorney O. John Rogge were in to see the Commissioner today and as a result the hearing had been set over until August 2, 1950. Subsequently the Agent called Mr. Saypol's Office and was advised that Greenglass was coming in to the USA's Office tomorrow at 2:30 P.M., at which time Mr. Saypol stated he would like to have Agents of the New York Office present inasmuch as Greenglass "wants to cooperate."

Mr. Whelan stated that no additional details were obtained by the Agent and at the present time he, Whelan, is trying to reach Saypol to obtain further information concerning the postponement and Greenglass' offer to cooperate. As soon as these are obtained, Mr. Whelan said the Bureau would be notified.

Mr. Whelan said that apparently the members of the press assigned to the Federal Building are aware that something is going on between Saypol and Rogge. Norma Abrams of the Daily News told Mr. Whelan that Rogge and Saypol were seen together and, while in the past they have been known constantly to snarl at each other, they were very much "arm in arm today." Abrams indicated to Mr. Whelan that if her editors will go along, the News will carry a story tomorrow to the effect that Greenglass was cooperating with the Government.

#### ADDENDUM: 7-12-50

ASAC Whelan called back at 4:25 P.M. and stated that be hartzalked to USA Saypol about this. Mr. Saypol stated that Rogge cane ke hig office LLL:mer

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today and said he had talked to Mr. McInerney of the Department, and wanted to reiterate that his client was willing to cooperate with the Government. Rogge went on to say that he thought it would be to the advantage of the Government to have his client talk in New York rather than in New Mexico. Saypol told Mr. Whelan that he advised Mr. Rogge that if he were sincere he would agree to a postponement of the Commissioner's hearing set for tomorrow. Accordingly, Saypol and Rogge went before the Commissioner and had the hearing set over until August 2.

Mr. Saypol said that he told Rogge he could not and would not make any commitment and that the defendant, Greenglass, and his counsel, would have to depend on his, Saypol's, integrity.

Saypol related that he has arranged with the Marshal to bring Greenglass to his office tomorrow afternoon at 2:30. Rogge has promised to bring Mrs. Greenglass to Saypol's office, at which time they intend to talk over the entire matter. Saypol asked whether 6A Lewis and Mr. Whelan would care to sit in on this conference. Mr. Whelan stated that he asked Mr. Saypol that in the event Rogge were sincere and he actually does make the Greenglasses available for interview and they are willing to cooperate, whether arrangements could be made by the Bureau to interview them out of the presence of Rogge and Saypol. Saypol stated he was sure this could be effected.

Mr. Whelan said during his conversation with Saypol the latter mentioned that he had notified Mr. McInerney of the Department of this development.

I told Mr. Whelan to keep the Bureau fully informed of all pertinent developments in this case.

To reflect the results of a name check of the aliases of David Greenglass (David Green, David Greene), known espionage subject in the Harry Gold case, and a name check of his immediate family relatives includi his wife and wife's family.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Espionage Section requested and partially reviewed all build-ups and break-downs of the following names. This project was completed by the Correlation Section. However, the 82 search slips listing the references to "one Green" and "one Greene" were not reviewed.

### RESULTS:

No identical references were located. However, the following reference to a Ruth Greenglass is being reported as of possible interest.

On September 8, 1947, the New York Office submitted a list of Communist Party members. This list included a John Courtney Mackey under the caption "Kings" County". It was reported that he resided at 654 Walter Street, New York City, and the New Haven Office advised by letter dated April 25, 1945, that he had been arrested by the Stamford Police Department on April 10, 1945. A search of his belongings disclosed that in addition to other material relating to the Communist Party he had an address book in which appeared the names and addresses of several individuals and organizations. This address book contained the following entry:


