SIDNEY NEWBERGER, Chief, AEC Security Division, advised SA J. JEROME MAXWELL on 6/23/50 that a confidential source had advised him that an employee of the University of California who recently arrived at Los Alamos had remarked that he knew GREENGLASS; had a low opinion of him, and was "surprised that he had not been apprehended before he was." NEWBERGER could only identify this individual as SCHLUTER. (phonetic).

Records of the AEC Security Division and the Personnel office of the University of California reflect that ROBERT ARVEL SCHLUTER, Z-38738, born 8-27-24 at Salt Lake City, Utah, ASN 19120133, has been employed by U. of C. at Los Alamos from June 19, 1950 to present but had been previously stationed at Los Alamos as a member of S. E. D. from 1944 to 1946. The MED file relative to him was forwarded to the Security Division, Chicago Operations Office, AEC, Chicago, Ill. on 3-24-50 and it could not be determined what group he was assigned to as a member of SED at Los Alamos, or whether or not he might have had any contact with GREENGLASS during such period. It was noted that SCHLUTER was a student and an employee of the University of Chicago from June, 1946 to April, 1950 and that an investigation conducted by FBI in April, 1950 under character of AEAA did not reveal any derogatory information relative to him. His home address is 2227 S. 22nd St., Salt Lake City, Utah, which is the residence of his father, ARVEL RISER SCHLUTER.

*Index* ROBERT ARVEL SCHLUTER, Research assistant, Group P-12, University of California; residence, Dormitory 274, 894 - 36th St., Los Alamos, N. M. was interviewed by writer on instant date. He advised that from March, 1944 to February, 1946 he was stationed at Los Alamos as a member of S. E. D., USA, and was attached to Group G-2, of which LYMON PARROTT was the group leader, during all of such period. This was not the group that GREENGLASS was attached to and SCHLUTER did not have any contact with him whatsoever through their work.

*Index* A friend of SCHLUTER, named JAMES CALVIN WIEBOLDT was stationed at Los Alamos during approximately the same period, and according to SCHLUTER, WIEBOLDT was moved into the same barracks as GREENGLASS sometime in the fall of 1944. Shortly after that time WIEBOLDT first mentioned GREENGLASS to SCHLUTER and even "pointed him out" but SCHLUTER never actually met GREENGLASS or ever had any contact with him in any way.

SCHLUTER stated that his only knowledge of GREENGLASS is from occasional references to him made by WIEBOLDT during their frequent conversations during late 1944 and at least part of 1945. He stated that he is sure that WIEBOLDT's only contact with GREENGLASS was in or about the barracks and that he never actually associated with him. He stated that WIEBOLDT described GREENGLASS as an outspoken, "loud-mouthed," and disturbing type of individual who was not very well liked by most of the men in that barracks.

SCHLUTER stated that he recalls that WIEBOLDT told him that GREENGLASS appeared to spend a great deal of his time discussing "politics" and that he appeared to favor a "socialistic" type of government. He stated that he does not recall that WIEBOLDT ever mentioned that GREENGLASS propounded communism or exhibited sympathy for Russia.

SCHLUTER stated that he never knew any actual associates or friends of GREENGLASS and has no idea as to any of his contacts at or away from Los Alamos, OR ANY possible or alleged espionage activity on his part. He further stated that WIEBOLDT never indicated to him that he ever had any knowledge of actual contacts, associates or activities of GREENGLASS.

SCHLUTER advised that WIEBOLDT's present address is 1712 Elmwood Ave., Wilmette, Illinois; that he recently graduated from Northwestern University, and is unemployed at the present time.

In view of the non-specific information furnished by SCHLUTER, with no indication that WIEBOLDT is able to furnish any information of value, it is suggested that no further action be taken in regard to this lead, and this memorandum filed as a matter of record only.

# Greenglass Tells Court He's Guilty

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—David Greenglass, 28-year-old former Army sergeant, pleaded guilty today in Federal court to a charge of conspiracy in time of war to convey secret government defense information to Russia.

The chunky defendant, who had worked on the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, N. Mex., pleaded to the charge in a firm voice before Federal Judge William Bondy.

Greenglass was originally indicted in New Mexico and was named in a superseding indictment here last week with four others, including Anatoli A. Yakovlev, former Russian vice-consul in New York.

Because of his plea, it was expected that Greenglass would turn government witness and thereby escape the death penalty when he is sentenced Dec. 4.

## Second to Plead

Greenglass was involved in the wartime espionage network served by British atomic physicist Dr. Klaus Fuchs, admitted spy now in prison. The ex-soldier allegedly turned secrets over to Harry Gold, a Philadelphia chemist and confessed go-between for Fuchs and Soviet agents.

Greenglass was the third American to plead guilty to spy charges. Gold was the first. The second was Alfred Dean Slack who was

sentenced to 15 years in prison in Greenville, Tenn., for giving Russian agents a sample of RDX, a high explosive, and the formula for its manufacture.

At the time of his arrest last June, Greenglass was quoted as saying he relayed the secrets because he felt the U. S. was not treating its ally, Russia, fairly in holding out atomic information.

Others named with Greenglass and Yakovlev in the indictment were electrical engineer Julius Rosenberg, 35, his wife, Ethel; and Morton Sobell, 33-year-old electronics and radar experts, all of New York.

Rosenberg's wife is Greenglass' sister, and allegedly helped recruit him into the spy ring.

Named in the indictment as co-conspirators but not co-defendants are Greenglass' 26-year-old wife, Ruth, and Gold. Gold is awaiting sentence on a guilty plea.

## Worked on Bomb

Greenglass, a machinist, was drafted into the Army in April, 1943, and assigned to Los Alamos in the summer of 1944. He remained there until his discharge in 1946. The FBI says he was detailed to work on the atomic bomb itself as an Army technician.

The short, heavy-set Greenglass and his wife have a three-year-old son and a five-months-old daughter.

When FBI agents arrested him at his Manhattan home, he was quoted as saying that if it had not been for his family, he was "thinking of running away or committing suicide."

Today he stood with his head bowed and hands clasped in front of him as the charge was read. He glanced at his attorney, O. John Rogge. The lawyer nodded, and Greenglass said:

"Guilty."

Rogge told the court that Greenglass was ready to "give what is his best recollection" of events alleged in the indictment at the trial of his co-defendants.

Greenglass resided in Albuquerque while he was stationed at Los Alamos during and after the end of War II. FBI officials previously said that he commuted to his home here on weekends.

The indictment against him originally was returned by a Federal Grand Jury at Santa Fe.

When he was arrested, the FBI said that he had held meetings in Santa Fe and Albuquerque with Harry Gold, also indicted as a member of the spy ring.

Reference is made to Albuquerque letter to the Bureau dated 8/1/50, copy of which was designated for the New York Office.

On August 31, 1950, DAVID GREENGLASS advised SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON that he believes he gave HARRY GOLD several names of persons employed at Los Alamos who were possible recruits for the espionage ring. Among the names furnished by GREENGLASS to GOLD was the name HY ADLER.

The records of the Veterans Administration, 252 7th Avenue, New York City, reflect that HYMAN ADLER, Army Serial #32997859, was inducted into the United States Army on August 2, 1943, and entered on active duty on September 2, 1943, in New York City. According to this record, HY ADLER was honorably discharged from the United States Army on March 9, 1946, at the Army Separation Center, Ft. Bliss, Texas, as a Sergeant (T/3).

According to this record, ADLER was born August 16, 1950, in New York City. His permanent address for mailing purpose was listed as care of WILLNER, 741 Hunts Point Avenue, Bronx, New York. He registered with Local Board #89, Bronx, County, New York. It was reflected that he was a machine shop foreman prior to being inducted into United States Army. This record reflects that while in the Army, ADLER was attached to the Special Engineering Attachment, Manhattan District; that he served with the atomic bomb project, Los Alamos, New Mexico; that he worked for the bomb physics division and was engaged in activities connected with the physic experimentation of the bomb.

Efforts have been made by the New York Office to obtain a photograph of HY ADLER but to date a photograph of ADLER has not been located.

It is requested that Albuquerque Office contact the Atomic Energy Commission, Security Office, Los Alamos, New Mexico and determine if the files of that organization contain a photograph of HYMAN ADLER. In the event a photograph

## Spy Tells of Giving Reds Los Alamos Atomic Secrets

NEW YORK, Mar. 9 (AP)—Confessed Spy David Greenglass denounced his own brother-in-law in federal court today as a traitor who seduced from him American A-bomb secrets for Russia.

Greenglass, on the government's side in America's first atom spy trial, also put the finger on his own wife as the go-between in his betrayal.

The brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, 34, the latter's wife, Ethel, also 34, and Martin Sobell, 33, are on trial on a charge of conspiring to give atom secrets to Russia.

Greenglass, awaiting sentence after pleading guilty to the same charge, turned on his relatives and became a government witness at their trial. His own wife, Ruth, is named as a co-conspirator but not a defendant in the case.

He told a jury today that he was working at the Los Alamos A-bomb project in 1944 when his wife came to visit him. Mrs.

Greenglass had visited the Rosenbergs a short time before.

"Ethel stated to Ruth," Greenglass said, "that she must have noticed that she—Ethel—was no longer involved in Communist party activities.

"Ethel said she doesn't buy the Daily Worker any more or attend club meetings and that the reason was because Julius finally got to the point where he was doing what he always wanted to do—giving information to the Soviet Union."

Greenglass quoted his wife as saying the Rosenbergs asked her to get from him A-bomb data to pass on to Russia.

"My wife objected to that," Greenglass continued. "She said she did not think it was a good idea and she said she didn't want to tell me about it. They told her I would want to know about it and that she should at least tell

me. My wife then asked me what I thought about it."

The request frightened him, Greenglass testified, adding:

"I told her I wouldn't do it. My wife then told me Julius told her that Russia was an ally and as such should get the information and was not getting the information coming to her (Russia).

"The following morning I told my wife I would give her the information and she then asked me for specific information."

Thus hooked, Greenglass said he turned over to his wife for the Rosenbergs an estimate of how many people worked at Los Alamos. He also listed some of the famed atomic scientists then perfecting the potent A-bomb—Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, Dr. George B. Kistiakowski and Dr. Neils Bohr, among others.

On a furlough to New York City in January of 1945, Greenglass said Rosenberg demanded data "specifically of any value on the atom bomb."

"I wrote up the information he wanted that evening," testified Greenglass, a stocky man in a brown suit.

He added that he turned the data over to Rosenberg the next morning. He said Rosenberg was so well-grounded "he gave me a description of the atom bomb."

Greenglass said he went to work at Los Alamos without any knowledge that he was in on the birth of the atom bomb.

He joined the Army as a private in 1943, he said, and a year later was assigned to the top-

# Relatives Talked— Him Into Spying, Greenglass Says

NEW YORK, March 10 (AP)—A former Army sergeant told a Federal Court late yesterday that his own sister and her husband talked him into giving them American atomic secrets for transmission to Russia.

The veteran, David Greenglass, a confessed spy, was the second Government witness in the espionage trial of his sister, Ethel Rosenberg, 34, her husband, Julius, also 34, and Martin Sobell, 33.

Accused of conspiring to give atom secrets to Russia, the three face possible death sentences if convicted by the trial jury.

His sister turned pale and pressed her hands to her eyes when he took the stand. Greenglass spoke in a low voice, avoiding the stare of his relatives.

Greenglass' story also implicated his own wife, Ruth, as the go-between in his betrayal. They both are named as co-conspirators but Mrs. Greenglass is not a defendant in the case. Greenglass has pleaded guilty and awaits sentencing.

## Asked for Data

Under questioning by U. S. Assistant Attorney Roy M. Cohn, Greenglass told of a furlough in New York City around Jan. 1, 1945. He said that Rosenberg came to him and asked him to write down all he knew about the atomic bomb.

"Anything else?" prompted Cohn.

"He gave me a description of the atom bomb," replied the witness. This was eight months before the first bomb was dropped in Japan.

Greenglass said several months before this meeting his wife came to visit him at the Los Alamos atomic project, where he was a foreman in a machine shop.

He said that she was the first person who ever told him that he was working on the atomic bomb. Until then, he said, he did not know what was being made of the parts his shop turned out.

"Julius said I was working on the atom bomb," he said his wife informed him.

He quoted his wife as saying the Rosenbergs asked her to get from him A-bomb data to pass on to Russia. Greenglass said his wife told him:

"Ethel said, she doesn't buy the Daily Worker any more or attend club meetings and that the reason was because Julius finally got to the point where he was doing what he always wanted to do—giving information to the Soviet Union."

## Says Wife Objected

Greenglass said his wife objected to the suggestion that he supply the data. He said he hesitated himself at first.

"My wife then told me Julius told her that Russia was an ally and as such should get the information and was not getting the information \* \* \*," Greenglass testified, adding:

"The following morning I told my wife I would give her the information and she then asked me for specific information."

This information, which he said he gave his wife for the Rosenbergs, included an estimate of the number of employees at Los Alamos, the layout of the plant, and the names of some of the scientists working there.

The trial was recessed today until Monday.

(Greenglass resided in Albuquerque while he was stationed at Los Alamos. He commuted here on weekends, the "BI" previously has reported. His wife was employed here by a division of the OPA).

## Greenglass Tells Of Relaying New Atom Bomb Plans

NEW YORK, Mar. 12 (AP)—A former atomic employee testified today he gave an alleged Russian spy ring a description of an atom bomb that superseded the Hiroshima model—and that the ring also obtained information on a fabulous space ship.

David Greenglass, 29, himself a confessed spy, related the space project story just before the end of today's surprise-packed session of the nation's first atom bomb spy trial.

The defendants, Julius Rosenberg, 33, his wife, Ethel, 33, and Morton Sobell, 33, are charged with conspiring to spy for Russia in wartime—an offense carrying a possible death penalty.

Greenglass said Rosenberg told him he obtained information on what he called a sky platform project from "one of the boys," not otherwise identified.

He said Rosenberg explained the project as involving the suspen-

NEW YORK, Mar. 13 (AP)—The Russian embassy in Mexico City was linked in testimony today to a spy ring accused of stealing some top United States atom bomb secrets.

Former Army Sgt. David Greenglass, 29, a confessed member of the ring, described the embassy as the key point in an escape route for spies when the FBI got too close on their trail.

Greenglass said he was instructed specifically by his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, an accused spy, in the procedure for contacting the Russian ambassador in Mexico last June.

Rosenberg, 33, an electrical engineer, is on trial in Federal Court with his wife, Ethel, 35 (Greenglass' sister), and radar expert Morton Sobell, 33, on a charge of conspiring to spy for Russia.

The witness said Rosenberg became alarmed after the arrests of Dr. Klaus Fuchs in England and Philadelphia chemist Harry Gold in the United States on espionage charges.

Greenglass, who previously was employed on the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, said Rosenberg told him to leave the country "as soon as possible."

### Gave Details

Greenglass said Rosenberg gave him these detailed instructions:

Go to Mexico City. Write to the Russian ambassador. Say something favorable in the letter about the Soviet position in the United States and sign it "I. Jackson."

Three days later go to the statue of Columbus in Mexico City with a travel guide. You will be approached by a "contact" man. Comment to him that "it is a magnificent statue" and add that you are from Oklahoma.

The contact will identify himself by saying there are more beautiful statues in Paris. Then he will give you money and a passport.

From Mexico City you will go to Vera Cruz, then to Sweden.

### In Sweden

In Stockholm you will follow the same procedure at the statue of Linneas and make contact with a man who will arrange transportation to Czechoslovakia.

In Czechoslovakia, write to the

Soviet ambassador, this time signing your full name.

Rosenberg told him that he, too, intended to flee the country, Greenglass testified.

Greenglass said he himself went so far as to get passport photographs and to accept \$5000 in "escape expense" money from Rosenberg.

But then, he said, he told Rosenberg he had decided "to stay right here and do nothing."

He did not explain his change of mind.

Ten days later he was arrested by FBI agents.

### Returned to Stand

Greenglass returned to the witness stand today after testifying yesterday on atom bomb details never before heard in a courtroom.

He said then that less than a month after the first atom bomb was dropped on Hiroshima in 1945 he gave Rosenberg plans of a newer model A-bomb from information acquired at Los Alamos.

Greenglass said today one reason he provided the information was because he had "a kind of hero worship" for Rosenberg.

The trial provided a dramatic moment when Greenglass said under cross-examination he still felt an affection for his sister and her husband (the Rosenbergs) even though he was testifying for the Government against them.

In response to a defense question, he said he realized his sister faced a possible death penalty.

### Clasps Hands

His sister, seated at a counsel table, nervously clasped and unclasped her hands. Her husband looked intently straight at Greenglass.

Greenglass himself is awaiting sentence after pleading guilty to an espionage charge.

Defense Atty. Emanuel Bloch asked him whether he had any "qualms" when he accepted an honorable discharge from the Army in February, 1946.

"I did my work as a soldier," Greenglass said, "and since the information went to a supposed ally at the time I had no qualms about accepting the honorable discharge."

Greenglass testified earlier that he had begun spying at the urging of his wife. She is named in the indictment as a co-conspirator, but is not a defendant. She is expected to be a Government witness.

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# Greenglass Discloses Escape Plan

NEW YORK, March 13 (UP)—Former Army Sgt. David Greenglass testified in Federal Court today that his brother-in-law gave him \$5000 to get out of the country last year when British scientist Dr. Klaus Fuchs confessed their atomic spying for Russia.

He said he was instructed to take his family to Mexico and contact the Soviet embassy there. That was to have been the starting point of a secrecy, shrouded journey which would have landed him behind the Iron Curtain, he added.

Greenglass said his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, 34, was the man in the Soviet spy ring who supplied him with funds and instructions for fleeing the country.

Rosenberg, his wife Ethel, 36, who is Greenglass' sister, and electronics engineer Morton Sobell are on trial for their lives, charged with spying for Russia in wartime. If convicted they could be sentenced to death.

## After Fuchs Arrested

Greenglass said Rosenberg came to him in February, 1950, a few days after Fuchs was arrested in England.

Rosenberg asked him if he remembered the man who picked up atomic bomb data from him in Albuquerque, N. M., Greenglass said. The man was Harry Gold, confessed member of the spy ring who is now serving a 30-year prison term.

"Julius said Fuchs was also one of this man's contacts and that the man undoubtedly would be arrested," Greenglass said. "Julius said I would have to leave the country and that he would get the money for me from the Russians."

Greenglass said Rosenberg continued to prod him to get out of the country in a series of meetings throughout April and May last year.

The prosecution ended direct examination of Greenglass shortly before noon after holding him on the stand for nearly three days.

## Sketched Bomb

yesterday that he gave a sketch of an improved atomic bomb and 12 pages of explanatory material to Rosenberg in September, 1945.

That was about one month after the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima. Greenglass said the information he passed to his brother-in-law was on "a different type of atomic bomb" that had outmoded the Hiroshima-type bomb.

Greenglass' testimony also touched on a "sky platform project" which supposedly was under consideration during the war. The witness said Rosenberg told him in 1947 he was obtaining information on such a project.

Greenglass said the project involved suspension of a platform or "large vessel" in the stratosphere between the moon and the earth where there is no gravity pull. Presumably it would be used as a launching site for guided missiles. But no details were given and Greenglass mentioned it only in passing.

## Attended Briefings

Under cross-examination today, Greenglass said he had attended briefings at both Oak Ridge, Tenn., and at Los Alamos on the espionage law. Asked by defense counsel whether he knew the penalty for espionage was death, he replied: "Yes, I knew that."

Greenglass, who has pleaded guilty to conspiracy to spy, is awaiting sentence.

He said his wife, Ruth, first asked him to take part in spying. He said he first told her he would not, then changed his mind and told her the next morning that he would. He said he consulted nobody in the meantime and that he made his decision of his own free will.

His wife is named in the indictment as a co-conspirator, but not as a defendant.

Greenglass said he received an honorable discharge from the Army in February, 1946.

Defense Counsel Emanuel Bloch asked whether he had any qualms about accepting it.

"I did my work as a soldier and since the information went to a supposed ally at the time I had no qualms about accepting the honorable discharge," Greenglass said.

However, he said he "started to have doubts almost as soon as I

said I was going to give the information."

He said one reason he provided the information was because he had "a kind of hero worship" for Rosenberg. But he said he did not mind taking money from Rosenberg because he felt "it was coming out of the Russians' pockets."

Greenglass testified much of the time with a wry smile.

He said he bore affection toward his sister and her husband (the Rosenbergs) even though he was testifying against them. Yes, he said, he realized she faced a possible death penalty if convicted. As he spoke, his sister, seated at a counsel table, clasped and unclasped her fingers.

Mrs. Greenglass will testify as a government witness in the trial.

# Greenglass Sentenced 15 Years in Prison

## Judge Is Easy On Man Who Told About A-Thefts

NEW YORK, April 6 (UP) The man who lifted essentials of the A-bomb secret out of the Los Alamos atomic laboratories was let off with his life in Federal Court today as a reward for testimony that got his sister and brother-in-law sentenced to the electric chair.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman sentenced David Greenglass, 29, former Army technical sergeant, to serve 15 years in prison for his prime part in the widespread espionage plot that delivered America's most prized defense secret to Soviet Russia even before the first test A-bomb was exploded.

While Greenglass heard his fate, his sister, Ethel, 35, and her husband Julius Rosenberg, 32, waited in heavily guarded prison cells to be transported to the death house of Sing Sing Prison. Greenglass was the chief witness against them. Admittedly they could not have been convicted if he hadn't repented his treason and aided the government.

nefarious scheme, Julius Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel Rosenberg.

### Required Courage

"I realize the courage that was required for you to give your testimony," he said. "It is obvious that the government gave due consideration to your assistance in their recommendation.

"By your assistance in this case, you have helped us strike a death blow to the trafficking in our military secrets to the advantage of a foreign nation."

"The uncovering of other espionage rings, which I am certain exist, depends to a great extent upon the testimony of those members of the ring who recant and seek to atone for their sins in some measure," judge continued.

"You, like so many other foolish men and women, believed that Soviet Russia was utopia. You learned that when you enlisted in what you believed was a cause for the liberation of men, you were in effect enlisting in the Russian foreign legion.

"However, you found your way back before the curtain fell on your life. You repented and brought to justice those who enlisted you in this case. I shall, therefore, follow the government's recommendation and sentence you to 15 years in prison."

Kaufman sentenced the bespectacled Rosenberg, and his wife, Ethel, to death yesterday at the conclusion of an eight-minute commentary on their treachery, which, he said, "altered the course of history."

It was the first time that a husband and wife had received the death sentence in a Federal court. The maximum penalty also was the first given in a civil court under the 1917 espionage act.

Kaufman was more lenient with

co-conspirator Morton Sobell, 35, a radar expert, only because evidence did not involve him with the atomic bomb betrayal. He was given a maximum 30-year sentence.

Attorneys for the Rosenbergs and Sobell said they would appeal the verdict to the U. S. Court of Appeals and, if necessary, to the United States Supreme Court.

### Can't Change Penalty

Although the Supreme Court can alter the verdict, it can not change the death penalty. Only President Truman is empowered to spare the Rosenbergs' lives if the higher courts reject their appeals.

Kaufman ordered the Rosenbergs, parents of two children, to be put to death some time during the week of May 21. If his sentence is carried out, Mrs. Rosenberg will become the first woman to die as a Federal prisoner since 1865, when Mrs. Mary Suratt was hanged publicly for plotting with John Wilkes Booth the assassination of President Lincoln.

It was the repentant Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenberg's "baby brother," who exposed her as a member of the spy ring that was exposed with the arrest of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, British atomic scientist.

Greenglass testified that the Rosenbergs had persuaded him to give them atomic secrets for use by the Russians in 1944, after he had mentioned the nature of his Army work while visiting them on furlough.

During the three-week trial, Greenglass described the inner workings of the atom bomb as it had been developed at Los Alamos, where he had been assigned as a technician. His testimony was so secret that Kaufman cleared the courtroom of newsmen and spectators.

Greenglass lived in Albuquerque, N. M., while he was stationed at Los Alamos. He commuted there on weekends. His wife was employed by the enforcement division of the OPA.

Greenglass passed the first atomic secrets on the first Sunday

in June, 1945 at his Albuquerque apartment to Harry Gold, also confessed atomic spy. Gold carried the secrets to the Rosenbergs in New York.

Kaufman indicated during the trial he would not be too harsh with Greenglass, even though he was equally guilty under his own admission. The judge said the decision of Greenglass to implicate his own sister had taken "a lot of soul-searching and courage."

### Hours in Prayer

Kaufman said he had reached his own decision to inflict the capital penalty upon the Rosenbergs only after he had searched his own soul. He said he spent hours of prayer for divine guidance in his synagogue before reaching his historic conclusion.

Last night the Rosenbergs spent about four hours singing in their cells in the Federal marshal's quarters of the courthouse. Mrs.

Rosenberg burst into an "One Fine Day," from "Madam Butterfly."

In an adjoining cell Rosenberg began a few minutes later to sing "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Ever since her arrest last August Mrs. Rosenberg has been singing in a small soprano voice. Her husband sings less often at jail attendants believe she vocalizes to cheer him up.

Ironically, the song she most favors is "America is a Beautiful Country."

## Greenglass Eased Off With 15-Year Sentence

NEW YORK, April 6 (AP) — Atom spy David Greenglass, who helped doom his sister and her husband to death, got off today with a 15-year prison sentence.

It was his reward for key testimony with which the Government convicted higher-ups in an international wartime ring of Russian-bossed spies.

Greenglass could have gotten the death penalty or imprisonment for 30 years.

Federal Judge Irving Kaufman said he wanted to deal more harshly with Greenglass. But he said he was fixing the lighter sentence in the hope other American traitors might step forward and atone for their sins.

### Parole in Five Years

Greenglass will become eligible for parole in five years. If he is not paroled, he can accumulate time off for good behavior and win release in 10 years.

"You helped us to strike a death blow to the trafficking of our military secrets by foreign agents," Kaufmann told Greenglass, as the confessed traitor stood before him as rigid as a statue.

Only yesterday, the same judge sentenced Julius Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel, to die for their part in the wartime spy plot. Kaufman gave another defendant, Morton Sobell, 30 years.

Judge Kaufman talked at some length to the 29-year-old Greenglass before passing sentence.

### No Perjury

"You, at least, had not added to your sins by committing the additional crime of perjury," Kaufman told him.

The judge referred to Greenglass' willingness to take the witness stand before a jury and help weave a web of guilt around his own sister and her husband.

The Rosenbergs, Sobell, and Greenglass all were members of an international espionage ring that included British scientist Klaus Fuchs and Philadelphia biochemist Harry Gold.

Fuchs is in prison in Britain and Gold confessed and drew an eight to 30 year sentence.

At 8:45 AM June 6, 1953 SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON telephoned from the New York Office and advised that the USA in New York wanted a certified copy of the complaint and indictment against captioned subject for use the first thing Monday morning, June 8, 1953, in a final hearing in the ROSENBERG case. HARRINGTON requested that these items be forwarded to the New York Office AMSD and that a brief teletype be sent the New York Office at the time the items were forwarded confirming their availability.

HARRINGTON explained that in the ROSENBERG case the USA desired to have evidence available to show that GREENGLASS was arrested on complaint and indictment prior to the time that ROSENBERG was arrested, since the USA anticipated that an effort would be made by the defense to indicate that a "deal" had been entered into by the Federal authorities in connection with the arrests of GREENGLASS and ROSENBERG.

Agent HARRINGTON advised that the USA at New York had been furnished certified copy of the indictment previously but cannot locate it in the present maze of papers he has in connection with this case.

# New Facts Released On Famed Spy Case

Some new facts with Albuquerque settings have been added to the story of New Mexico's most notorious espionage case, in which atomic secrets were conveyed to Russian agents. They are brought out in a report prepared by the Internal Security Division of the Department of Justice.

The case is that in which Harry Gold as courier transmitted information on the then hush-hush Los Alamos A-bomb project from scientist Klaus Fuchs and Army machinist David Greenglass. The information went to Julius Rosenberg, who, with his wife Ethel, was put to death in Sing Sing June 19, 1953, for espionage.

A preview of the full report on the case appears in a recent issue of Look. It was written by Bill Davidson, who aided in the preparation.

### Refutes Charges

Why was it prepared? To refute a flood of charges in the Communist press and in left wing books that the Rosenbergs were railroaded to their death, that their conviction was not justified. So states Mr. Davidson, who says that the report based on evidence gathered by the FBI precludes any doubt as to the guilt of the Rosenbergs.

The article takes up the

evidence to substantiate the Gold-Greenglass story, charged the Communist press.

The report states flatly that the assertion is a lie. It says that the day after Gold saw Greenglass in Albuquerque, June 3, 1945, Ruth Greenglass deposited \$400 in the Albuquerque National Bank and bought a \$50 war bond at the First National Bank. Gold had given Greenglass \$500 on June 2 in the Jello box meeting.

Another Commie press charge was that there was no proof Gold was in New Mexico to meet Fuchs and Greenglass, that the FBI got Gold to sign a Hilton Hotel registration card after he was arrested five

years later . . . and chose the Hilton because it keeps registration cards longer than three years.

### 'Preposterous'

The report points out that the registration was not challenged in court and calls the charge "preposterous," pointing out: 1. That hotel employees and records could have been subpoenaed to disprove the registration if it was false, and 2. That experts could have testified the ink was only months old instead of five years old.

The preview of the report makes interesting reading. When released in full, the report, as Davidson asserts, is likely to erase any vestige of doubt on the case.

**GOLD TOLD THE COMMITTEE** he was recruited for the Russians by Klaus Fuchs, a Los Alamos worker later convicted of espionage in England.

"He (Fuchs) told me where the work was being carried out on the atom bomb, at a place known as Los Alamos, a place I had never heard of."

Gold said he was to meet Fuchs in Santa Fe but was told

by a Russian vice consul in New York, Anatole A. Yakovlev, to see Greenglass after meeting Fuchs.

"I THINK THAT AS MUCH as any man knew about the progress of the atom bomb, except possibly those at the very top, Fuchs knew and was in a position to give," Gold told the Senate committee.

"Possibly he knew even more than those men, because he was in intimate contact with it."

Gold said he finally confessed his part in the spy ring in 1950, when the FBI found a brochure advertising the "Land of Enchantment" in his New York apartment.

# Greenglass wanted Red flag over company

WASHINGTON — David Greenglass, the confessed atom spy whose testimony helped send his sister and her husband to the electric chair, once told his wife he hoped to have his army company "raise the Red flag yet."

Excerpts from letters exchanged by Greenglass and his wife, Ruth, were released by the FBI in response to a request under the Freedom of Information Act for its files on Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

ALLEN WEINSTEIN, a Smith College professor whose three-year effort finally resulted in release of the documents, said the excerpts from Greenglass letters were among the most fascinating new pieces of information revealed by the documents.

The letters portray Greenglass as an eager propagandist for the Communist cause

during his military career — right up to the time he was chosen to work on the Manhattan Project, one of the most closely guarded secret operations in American history.

Greenglass confessed in 1950 that he had passed information and sketches relating to the construction of the atom bomb to a spy ring for transmittal to the Soviet Union. He obtained the information while working as a machinist at Los Alamos, N.M., the secret laboratory where the first bombs were devised.

LESS THAN a month before Greenglass told his wife, in a letter dated July 29, 1944, that he had been assigned to Oak Ridge, Tenn., for work on a classified project, he reported he had been removed from his old outfit because of "a matter of politics."

"The first sergeant didn't like me and, besides that, some of my politics must have reached his ears."

Greenglass wrote July 6, "This theory was upheld by the fact that another fellow from my former battalion, of like political opinion, was also chosen for this outfit. So you see, one of the higher-ups got rid of me."

On Aug. 24, 1943, Greenglass told his wife that he was guarded in talking to his fellow soldiers.

"I had two discussions on political questions with some fellows," he wrote. "I used the utmost patience and care in the choice of words so that I could get my point across and still not be suspected of communism. Well, I believe that I did get something across to them and I will continue to work on them further. I'll raise that flag yet so don't worry about the future."

BUT LATER letters indicate he became much more overt in expressing his Communist leanings, as these excerpts show:

Dec. 23, 1943, from Ft. Ord, Calif.: "Darling, this morning I had a political discussion with some of the fellows before they went to work... You probably know that I had injected a great deal of our beliefs into the discussion."

As a result, he said, he would no longer sign his letters "comrade," but would simply write "C."

The Greenglass letters, according to the FBI documents, were found in a foot

locker in the couple's New York apartment. An FBI agent reported that Green-

glass had pried open the rusty lock of the locker with a screwdriver and then gave

him permission to remove the locker and letters.

Greenglass and his wife

lived in Albuquerque, N.M., while he was stationed at Los Alamos.
