





The report of L. H.RVMY N. JOHNEON, JR., Newark, 11/6/53, requests certain investigations concerning subject at the Philadelphia Signal Corp Procurement District namely: Locate and interview former co-workers and ascertain current addresses of fellow employees who have left the United States employment. New York Office believes that this load should be disregarded inasmuch as many of these employees have been located and interviewed and also to avoid additional duplication. The New York Office is presently attempting to cover this phase of the investigation at this time. However, in contacting the Philadelphia Signal Corp Procurement Office, it is requested that attempts be made to locate any administrative date available concerning subject including items such as his travel order assignments.

It is also requested that during the same contacts that information be secured concerning JOSEPH LEVITORY along the same lines as outlined above. It is also noted that the Newark report requests that all logical informants be contacted concerning subject. In this matter, it should be noted that JULIUS ROCLNBERG was an active worker of the FRECT in the period 1939 to 1940.

In 1942 when returning to the New York area, NO ENBERG was again active in organizing Branch #16 of the Communist Party, New York City. Therefore, the possibility exists that he may have organized a cell while employed by the Philadelphia Office of the Signal Corp, a nucleus of this cell being LEVITSAY, GREENBLUM, WALKER, HODES, and the other engineers mentioned as having resided and worked with ROSENBERG in Philadelphia in 1940 and 1941. Contacting informats is suggested as informants may have information along the above lines. Also any information in your file pertaining to FACET in the period 1940-1941 may furnish information of value concerning the activities of ROSENBERG, the subject and others.



On 2/17/58, DAVID GREENGLASS, convicted espionage agent, U.S. Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., furnished the following to SA THOMAS E. SAUNDERS:

GREENGLASS stated that on 2/1,2/58 while confined at the West Street Jail, New York City, in connection with a funera trip permitted him at the time of the death of his mother, he observed Colonel RUDOLF IVANOVICH ABEL in a cell at the West Street Jail, while dressing to attend the funeral. GREENGLASS stated that in addition to previously having viewed photographs of ABEL which were published in newspapers and magazines and now having seen ABEL in person, he definitely can say that he has never knowingly observed ABEL prior to his being convicted espimage charges.

Regarding statements previously made that it was conjecture on his part, but he felt that ABEL was JULIUS ROSENBERG! contact subsequent to 1948, GREENGLASS stated that his reasoning in this regard is as follows: (

Sometime in 1947, the exact period of time unknown, ROSENBERG lost contact with the Soviet. He said that he knows this is true as he had requested money of ROSENBERG and ROSENBERG told him that he had lost contact and to obtain money he would have to borrow some from one of his friends, which he did not care to do. GREENGLASS continued that later. sometime in 1948.



Furthermore, ROSENBERG told GREENGLASS that his new contact was a "sweet setup" in that he could meet him in theaters, outlying sections, and other special places which were not mentioned to GREENGLASS. As stated before, GREENGLASS stated this new contact was never identified to him by ROSENBERG.

Re report of SA GEORGE N. WOODLEY, Chicago, Illinois, 6/19/50, which set out the results of investigation in this division pertaining to MILLER.

In connection with the investigation in the Chicago Division of the case entitled "DAVID CHEENGLASS, was; ESPIONAGE - R" (Bufile 65-59028), MARY MEYERING, Alamni Association, University of Chicago, on 11/27/50, advised SA W. RULON PAYMAN that THOMAS ALLAN FINEHERG, 1746 Estes Avenue, Chicago 26, Illinois, in June, 1946, listed EDWARD J. HILLER, 4027 N. Downer, Shorewood, Wisconsin, as the person who would always know his whereabouts. Information in possession of the Chicago office does not permit a definite determination as to the possible identity of EDWARD JOSEPH MILLER with the ROWARD J. MILLER listed by FINEBERG. It is noted that in Bureau letter to Milwaukee dated 8/29/49, pertaining to EDWARD JOSEPH MILLER, a copy of which was received by Chicago, the address of 4233 N. Larkin Street, Shorewood, Wisconsin, appears as the address for EDWARD JOSEPH MILLER'S parents, brothers and sisters. The fact that this address is also in Shorewood, Wisconsin, and the fact that the names are identical indicates the possibility that the two MILLERS are the same. 67-440179.

Information pertaining to THOMAS ALLAN ALLAN ADDRESS appears in the reports of SA W. RULON PAYMAN, Chicago, Illinois, dated October 27, 1950 and December 19, 1950, entitled "DAVID GREENGLASS, was; ESPIONAGE - R". One copy of each of these reports is being furnished to Milwaukee for its information under separate cover.

THOMAS ALLAN FINEHERG was associated with DAVID GREENGLASS at Los Alamos New Maxico but denies close association.

Full information pertaining to FINERERG'S activities appears in the reports pertaining to DAVID GREENGLASS previously mentioned.

Ex-Sgt. David Greenglass, the Atom Bomb spy whose testimony helped convict his sister and brother-in-law, soon may be moved from the Federal prison, so that his testimony can be used in a new Red investigation . . . One of the world's foremost adentists a Nobel Prize winner—who was invited to come to America to attend a dinner in N. Y. this month, had to cancel the trip because he was unable to get an American visa. The State Dept. insists he has a questionable political record . . . Baron Guttfried Von Cramm will be on the German Davis Cup team again. His entry will be protested because of his record.

Both Rocky Compitello, the middleweight, and Jack Appel, the referee he knocked down and kicked last week (the boxer later was freed when Appel refused to press an assault charge against him) will lose their licenses. Bob Christenberry, the Boxing Commissioner, feels that in refusing to take strong action Appel was inviting attacks against other referees. . . Billy Rose is negotiating to re-open his Diamond Horseshoe nightclub again . Hallmark is releasing two more paintings by Winston Churchill for its Christmas card trade. One is a Holy Land scene painted in '36, the other a drawing-room interior painted in '25.

The Aga Khan is expected to arrive in this country within the next few days. Because of his control of the purse strings, he's the only one empowered to make a final disposition of the Rita Hayworth Aly Khan estrangement . . . Miss Hayworth, incldentally, negotiated a final settlement of her U. S. income tax matters, for \$15,000. The original problem evolved around the disallowance of a tax loss on her investment in Orson Welles' musical, "Around the World." Miss Hayworth's tax settlement automatically places a \$15,000 limit on Welles' hability, which means he can return here without any difficulties.

Y. har that in all likelihood they'll use no lawyer at all, and s their own counsel







On August 8, 1974 I wrote to Attorney General Europe concerning my interest in gaining access to Federal Bureau of Investigation and Department of Justice files concerning the Rosenberg-Sobel case from the 1950's. In my capacity as a journalist, historian; writer and television program producer, I requested: 1) reconsideration of the December 26, 1973 ruling of Acting Attorney General Bork denying my request for access to the records of interviews of David Greenglass and a 1950 interview of Ruth Greenglass; 2) an initial ruling with regard to an attached list of specific requests; and 3) an initial ruling on my request for access to the entire 25,000 page Rosenberg-Sobel file so that I can determine which parts of the file I would like to photocopy.

I was informed by you, in a letter dated September 12, 1974, that the Bureau had decided that "it would be inappropriate to grant" me "total or partial access to any of the Rosenberg files." In light of the language of your September 12th letter, particularly the last paragraph informing me that I may appeal your decision by writing to the Attorney General, Office of Legal Counsel, I was under the impression that the Bureau had made its final decision regarding my second and third requests. (My first request was not before the Bureau, but was before the Department of Justice on.appeal.)

Subsequent to the receipt of your letter I received a letter dated October 16, 1974 from Antonin Scalia, Assistant Attorney General, Office of Legal Counsel, stating that my second and third requests are now before the FBI and that the FBI has advised him that it will now consider these two requests because an appeal by Professor Allen Weinstein of his separate request has been acted upon by the Attorney General.

Because the two letters referred to have left me uncertain as to whether my second and third requests have been finally denied by your office, I would appreciate a prompt reply clarifying the question. Has your office made a

### LINKS IN THE CHAIN.

A number of other witnesses dogged questions about Hyman and current espionage activities. Joseph Levitsky, of River Edge N.J., who worked at Federal Tel until February of last year refused to say whether he discussed with Hyman the recruiting of people into an espionage ring last March. He refused to say whether he had been a member of the Rosenberg ring or whether he had tried to get persons at Fort Monmouth to commit espionage since leaving Federal Tel.

## MARCEL OLIMAN AND THE SHORE CLUB.

Marcell Ullman, who worked at Fort Monmouth until 1947, refused to say whether he had organized a Shore Club Unit of the Communist Party to infiltrate Fort Mommouth. He declined to say whether he had been in touch with Fort Monmouth, personnel or whether he gad gotten classified information from them as recently as September last year and passed it on to Soviet agents. He refused to say whether he had gotten documents from one bob Martin.

#### THE COLEMAN EPISODE

Did Ullman, McCerthy asked, visit Agron Coleman when he had in his apartment confidential documents taken from the Fort Monmouth lavoretories and obtain from him any of the documents or notes from them? Ullman declined to answer. In pessing, it is noted here that we are not touching on Coleman's testimony before the Committee last Fall because there is nothing in the record to show whether he had any connection with the current activities we are discussing.

## PERCOFF ALIAS HERBERT

Joseph Percoff, a close friend of Hyman, headed a Union at Fort Monmouth when he worked there. McCarthy put into the record the fact that Percoff had been a Communist under the party name Joseph Perbert and that hisparty card number was 17342. McCarthy declared that Percoff had been in touch with people handling secret Material at Monmouth. When he took the stand, Percoff refused to state whether he had been getting material out of Monmouth. Asked directly he had been getting material out of Monmouth. Asked directly he had been if it were not true that he, Hyman and Uliman had been engaged in obtaining secret material from Fort Monmouth and passing it on to an espionage ring, Percoff declined to answer on the ground of self-incrimination. Percoff had apparently also been active in the Shore Club but he wouldn't talk about it.

## MR SOCOL WOULDN'T TALK EITHER

Albert Socol, of Long Branch, N. J., whoused to workat the Evens Signel Laboratory at Monmouth pleaded the Fifth Amendment when asked if he knew Hyman was a Soviet agent, and whether Hyman had asked him to contact his friends at Fort Monmouth. He also invoked the Amendment when questioned about Communist meetings in his home, attended by some of the employees suspended from Fort Monmouth.

DID YOU AND HYMAN ENGAGE IN ESPIONAGE?

Another witness, Ernes Pataki, of New York City, who worked at Federal Tel until August, 1950, found the Fifth Amendment a convenient cover when asked whether he had been in constant touch with Julius Rosenberg while there. #### THE RESENBERGS' BABY SITTER.

Vivial Glassman, who worked at Monmouth during the war was a Rosenberg intimate. According to Greenglass when Ethel Rosenberg was out on her devil's work, Vivian would mind the children. McCarthy said Miss Glassman had appeared before the committee in executive session and had refused to incriminate herself when asked if she was a member of the Rosenberg spy ring. She invoked the Fifth Amendment when asked about her connections with suspended employees as of today. This was last November 24 when Vivian was supposed to testify in open session but did not because of illness. Vivian's sisterm Mrs. Eleanor Glassman Hutner, of New York City, who worked at Monmouth early in the war also qualified as an artful dodger when asked questions touching on this nation's security.

MR BARR'S CONTRIBUTION TO SOVIET ELECTRONICS.

Vivian Glassman's sweetheart was Jo 1 Barr. Greenglass said that Rosanberg was greatly concerned because the Soviets had a very small and very poor electronics industry. Barr, who worked for the Signal Corps and also for Sperry Gyroscope helped remedy this deficiency by giving the atom spy information on electronic apparatus.

#### FAIR STOOD THE WIND FOR FRANCE.

When Rosenberg feared the jig was up and that the spy ring would be exposed he urged Greenglass to leave the country by way of the port of New York and take a steamship to France. Greenglass denurred saying this was too risky. Rosenberg said more important people than Greenglass had left by that route, including Joel Barr. It was in this conversation that Rosenberg also revealed that Barr had gotten him information about a radar device which would send out interceptor guided missiles to knock out an enemy's guided missiles which had been detected by radar. This was in 1947 when the device was a top scientific secret.

### THE NEED FOR CONGRESSIONAL PROBES.

All of the evidence detailed in this brief report is taken from public documents available to any citizen for a few cents. The Administration and the Army brass had access to this information and a lot more a long time ago. Why then are they throwing road-blocks in the path of the McCarthy Committee? What mysterious force is behind this continuing effort to prevent an authorized committee of the ongress from carrying on its legitimate function?

## THE ROLE OF THE ANTI-DEFAMATION LEAGUE.

The Anti-Defanation League reaches into the White House. The general counsel of this dubious organization Arnold Forster recently denounced the Monmouth probe as anti-Semitic in a speech at Essex House, Newark. He also accused the president of the Anti-Communist League of making false accusations against the ADL. The charge appears in the October 20,1951 Congressonal Record that this same Foster's real name is Fastenberg and that the FBI files will show that he is or was a member of a Communist spyring.



The unidentified woman stated that her friend was sure she saw HARRY GOLD, then recently arrested in Philadelphia for espionage, visit the subject about two weeks before he was arrested. She also stated that DAVID GREENGLASS, who was arrested in connection with the GOLD case, was at the subject's place of business about six weeks prior to the time she called. She recognized GOLD and GREENGLASS from photographs in the newspapers (w)

On August 19, 1950, another telephone call was received from a woman who refused to disclose her identity. She said she had read the article concerning MORTON SOBELL, which appeared in the Times-Herald and was desirous of reporting the fact that it was common knowledge throughout the Georgetown neighborhood, around the 3200 block of M Street, N. W., that CASEY GUREWITZ and both of his wives were outspoken Communists. She stated that the store at 3215 M Street, N. W., which was run by the subject's father, was a center for Communism and that it was very possible that either, or both GOLD or GREENGLASS had been in the store. She could furnish no other details. (U)

By teletype dated August 31, 1950, the New York Office advised that GREENGLASS was interviewed concerning the above, and had denied being in Washington since he was in the Army and then he had only passed through Washington. He denied ever having heard of the New York Bargain House and stated he did not know and never heard of the subject.





One TED JACOBS, Room 2, 1050 6th Avenue, New York, New York, corresponded with SYLVIA STEINGART by means of an air mail letter posted at New York, New York, on October 6, 1954, according to information made available by T-12.

Two communications were addressed to the subject by Trip Charge, Inc., 5th Avenue at Hamilton, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, according to T-12. One was postmarked September 28, 1954, while the other was postmarked October 8, 1954.

T-12 stated that Mrs. STEINGART continues to receive the "National Guardian," the "Daily People's World" and communications from the Independent Progressive Party, 833 Fillmore Street in San Francisco, at regular intervals. Communications and circulars emanating from 228 McAllister Street, Room 201, in San Francisco, California, were also noted by T-12 as being received by the subject.

Frs. STEINGART was also the recipient of several communications from Los Angeles, California, carrying the return address of Room holi, 355 South Broadway, Los Angeles, California, according to T-12. This is the address of the Los Angeles Rosenberg - Sobell Committee.

T-12 advised that seven letters were addressed to Mrs. HELEN (MORTON) SCRELL in care of Mrs. STEINGART in the period between September 27, 1954, and October 8, 1954. In addition, a letter postmarked September 26, 1954, was received at 725-3 Ashbury Street, addressed to MARK SOBELL.

The 1949 Report of the California Committee on Un-American Activities cited the "National Guardian" as a publication launched in New York in 1948, aiming at national circulation, which they found to be from its inception notoriously Stalindst in its staff, writers, management and contents.

The "Daily People's World" is a West Coast Communist daily newspaper.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

For the information of the Newark and Pittsburgh Offices, the subject is known to have been associated with the Communist Party and the Communist Political Association in Birmingham, Alabama in April, 1943; in Vallejo, California, in October, 1944; and in San Francisco, California, in the period from 1944 until 1950.

DAVID GREENGLASS, an admitted former Soviet espionage agent, advised on Earch 27, 1951, that JULIUS ROSENBERG, convicted Soviet espionage agent, told GREENGLASS during 1945 or 1945 that friends on the West Coast to whom ROSENBERG had shipped furniture were engaged in espionage for the Soviets and were going to China. On March 22, 1951, ROSENBERG testified in New York, New York, during his espionage trial, that HARRY STEINGART had loaned him two tables when they moved to California.




CREENGLASS furnished a signed statement under date of July 17, 1950, which states, in part, "Through conversations with JULIUS ROSENHERG I got the impression that the man who previously rented the apartment at 10 Monroe Street, New York City, now occupied by the ROSENHERGs, was an engineer also engaged in Soviet espionage, and it was through this medium that ROSENHERG was able to get the apartment. This man left ostensibly to go to the West Coast to live, but instead went to China." When questioned on March 27, 1951, GREENGLASS stated that the above information did not apply to the former residents of the apartment at 10 Monroe Street, but rather to the person from whom ROSENHERG had borrowed furniture with which to furnish the apartment at 10 Monroe Street. GREENGLASS stated that he did not know STEINGART or his wife and that their names and photographs were not familiar to itim.

JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL were convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the U.S.S.R. in New York, New York, on March 29, 1951. The ROSENBERGS were executed at Sing Sing Prison, Ossiming, New York, on June 19, 1953, and MORTON SOBELL is confined in the U.S. Penitentiary, Alcatraz Island, San Francisco, California.



The Security Index card of the subject was checked on November 5, 1954, and the Los Angeles Office has been requested to secure verification of the address and employment of the subject in the Los Angeles area. A Form FD-122 has been forwarded to the Bureau in this regard.

Reference report of SA DONALD E. WALTER dated 9/15/54, at Washington, D. C., five copies of which are enclosed for the Bureau.

A review of this case reflects WILLIAMS has not been

the subject of a continuing investigation by the Bureau. reports submitted to WFO when it was designated office of origin reflect subject was at one time possibly a member of the Communist Party, served the Loyalist Forces in Spain, and associated in the early 1940's with Soviet Espionage It is observed DAVID GREENGLASS, who put subject in close contact with JULIUS ROSENBERG doubts WILLIAMS was involved in espionage.

The file review reflects further that WILLIAMS has falsified records concerning his personal history. Reports include conflicting statements attributed to WILLIAMS concerning his background and activities.

In view of the fact that most persons acquainted with JULIUS ROSENBERG, who were suspected of subversive activities, have been interviewed, it is suggested that this case might best be resolved by interview of WILLIAMS. It is to be borne in mind that no allegation of espionage has been made against him and no informant has placed him in recent Communist Party activity. Interview would have the additional advantage of clarifying his nebulous history.

Accordingly, WFO will contact local informants to see if they are acquainted with WILLIAMS, and if he is unknown to them, Bureau will be requested to authorize interview of him.



LINSCHITZ indicated on his Personnel Security Questionnaire submitted to the Atomic Energy Commission that he was born August 18, 1919 in Bronx County, NYC. Records of the Dept. of Health, NYC reflect that a male child of the family name of LINSCHITZ was born on October 18, 1919. The record indicated the father's name was JOSEPH and the mother, MINNIE MARGOLIES, both born in Austria.

LINSCHITZ was hired in 9/48 as an Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Syracuse University, which has AFA work. He was granted a "Q" clearance 2/28/50 as a Security Monitor on unclassified matters and non restricted data. LINSCHITZ presently resides at 735 W. Onondaga St., Syracuse, NY.

OREENGIASS was interviewed concerning the JULIUS ROSENBERG sespionage ring, he stated, after reviewing his address book, that he believed he had furnished among other names, the name of LINSCHITZ to HARRY GOLD as a possible L'espionage recruit at Los Alamos.

Interviewed by FBI agents on 2/23/51, LINSCHITZ denied thathe ever knew JULIUS ROSENBERG or HARRY GOLD or had been approached by anyone to furnish information to the Russian espionage system. He further denied categorically that he is or ever had been a member of the Communist Party MDFXF



#### II. AFFILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

#### Communist Party Membership and Communist Party Sympathies |

Confidential Informant T-2, of unknown reliability, a fellow employee of the subject at Arma Corp., Brooklyn, New York, advised in August, 1951 that he, the subject, and DAVID GREENGLASS, self-admitted Soviet Espionage Agent, were all fellow employees of the Arma Corp. during the same period.

This informant stated that during this time, he, 50IE, and GR ENGLASS, were fellow employees that engaged in frequent discussions on Communism, Socialism, Capitalism and related

subjects, and that BOTE was very outspoken in expressing views which the informant considered to be identical with the views of the Communist Party, although he could not recall any specific statements made by BOTE.

Informant stated that GREENGLASS was not as outspoken as BOI; in these discussions, although he generally agreed with the viewpoint expressed by BOIE. Informant expressed the opinion that BOIE and GREENGLASS did not associate with each other outside of working hours.

The informant said that he formed the opinion that BOIE was a Communist or Communist sympathizer, although BOIE never admitted as much. The informant described BOIE as well-spoken, very persuasive, intelligent and well-informed enough to be effective in subversive activities.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised in August, 1952 that in his opinion the subject was probably a Communist. This informant stated that he had become suspicious of subject after some strange activities at the subject's home. T-1 advised that every week or two, strangers would appear at the subject's home, remain for a short time, and then leave. This procedure continued over a considerable period of time.

DAVID DREENGLASS, Inmate, U. S. Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., was interviewed and a photograph of subject was exhibited to him by SA WAYNE G. HUNT on 6/10/54, for the purpose of ascertaining whether subject is identical to ROSENBERG'S friend, CHESTER, previously described by GREENGLASS. At this time, GREENGLASS advised that he was almost positive that subject is not identical to CHESTER but desired to view additional photographs of subject.

Additional photographs of subject were exhibited to GREENGLASS on 6/25/54 and he stated subject is definitely not identical to CHESTER. He stated the possibility exists that subject may be identical to another individual, name unknown to him, who also was a piano player and visited the apartment of his mother in New York City in the late thirties. He said this individual resembles the subject in some respect according to his memory, but stated since there has been such a lapse in time since he saw this unknown individual, he could not make a positive identification.

GREENGLASS advised that this unknown individual, who later worked with ROSENBERG in the Como Engineering Company in 1938 or 1939, was introduced to him by ROSENBERG as a good boy", which according to GREENGLASS probably meant that he was a Communist. GREENGLASS advised that this unknown individual came to the apartment located at 64 Sheriff Street, New York City, on several occasions with CHESTER, SUSSMAN, PAGE and others. He stated he saw him at the Como Engineering Company later working on a gear box which ROSENBERG later advised was a gear to drive a wind tunnel machine for the purpose of testing

GREENGLASS stated ROSENBERG later advised him that this unidentified individual was from Canada and had served time for forgery in Canada and was a Trotskyite. According to GREENGLASS, the fact that ROSENBERG found out that this unknown individual was a Trotskyite was the reason ROSENBERG broke relations with him.

GREENGLASS further advised that the subject answers the description of this unidentified individual as to age, height, shape of nose, hairline and features in the face.

STENOGRAPHIC TESTS VOCABULARY AND SPELLING TESTS — A straight of the vocabulary test which is used in the vocabulary test which is used in the junction with the spelling test and 80-word-per-minute stenographic test in examining candidates for stenographic appointments and employees desiring to qualify as stenographers. The revised vocabulary test consists of 40 answers, each having a value of 25 points. A total of 25 minutes is allowed for completing the vocabulary test and the papers should be picked up when the 25 minutes have expired. Failure to complete the test will carry its own penalty because for each unfilled blank there will be a penalty of 25 points. The key for grading vocabulary tests has been revised to cover these changes.

Wo change has been made in the spelling test previously furnished you. However, a time limit of 15 minutes has been placed on this test. The dictator should consume not more than 10 minutes in dictating the mpelling words. He may repeat the words as often as necessary for complete understanding. The remaining time up to 15 minutes should be allowed the candidate for the purpose of looking over his paper. All spelling papers should be picked up when 15 minutes have expired.

The minimum passing grade for the vocabulary and spealing tests and instructions concerning eligibility for re-examination contained in SAC Letter, Number 53-76, dated 11-24-53, remain the same.

Sets of the revised vocabulary test and key for grading will be furnished the field by separate cover. All obsolete vocabulary tests and keys should be destroyed.

Ernest Ewald Erber - Newark (Ernest Lund)

Erber joined the Young People's Socialist League in 1932, becoming its National Chairman in 1935. With the founding of the Socialist Workers Party (Trotskyite) in the latter part of 1937, he became affiliated with that group, in 1938 editing the paper "Channels of Youth." Subject pointed out that the ROSENBERGs had been illegally convicted for espionage. He went on to say that scientists agreed that no one man could put the

atomic bomb together unless he was a genius. According to subject, there was no proof on paper that the ROSENBERGS turned this information over to the Russians. Subject continued that the government had taken the word of GREENGLASS, Mrs. ROSENBERG's brother, and that GREENGLASS lied to save his own skin. The subject urged everyone to request the President to grant the ROSENBERG's a new trial.

T-6 advised on September 1, 1953 that at a meeting of the Midwest Conference of Deportee Defense Committees held on August 29, 1953 at the Greek Workers Hall, 522 South Halsted Street, Chicago, Illinois, NATHAM CALDWELL, JR., Administrative Secretary of the MWCPFB, had indicated that he was acquainted with the subject and his wife and had inquired concerning their wellbeing.



T-6 on June 28, 1953 advised that on June 11, 1953 the subject had discussed the ROSENBERG case with a South Bend Communist Party sympathizer. Subject stated that he had recently received a telegram from New York City that the Office of Clemency for the ROSENBERGs was open twenty-four hours a day. Subject stated that they had lots of new evidence that DAVID GREENGLASS had lied in his testimony. Subject continued that the Federal Courts had taken GREENGLASS's word against the MASENBERGS. According to subject, the ROSENBERGS had been INO members and had been in favor of a "second front." BOORDA indicated that he had recently obtained a donation of \$25.00 from an unidentified South Bend man for use in the ROSENBERG case.

T-6 on this same date stated that on or about June 15, 1953 the subject had contacted a South Bend Communist sympathizer and had solicited the sympathizer for money to help pay subject's expenses in going to Washington, D.C. to protest the pending execution of the ROSENBERGS.

T-6 on June 28, 1953 advised that he had learned on June 17, 1953 that the subject, however, had not gone to Washington to protest the pending execution of the ROSENBERGS inasmuch as the ROSENBERGS had secured a stay in their execution.

Alleged member of the Rosenberg espionage apparatus. After being questioned regarding his alleged espionage activities he fled the U.S. Formerly employed at Fort Monmouth.

#### HERBERT S. BENNETT

This person allegedly registered for the ALP in 1946 and received mail from the Eugene Dennis Defense Committee in 1947. He executed a primary enrollment form for 1946 in which he declared that he was in general sympathy with the principles of the ALP and that it was his intention to support the nomines of that party at the next general election. He attended CCNY at the same time as did many of the individuals involved in the ROSENBERG espionage ring. JULIUS ROSENBERG, in a portion of his testimony at his trial, stated that he want to school with, worked for and tried to solicit business from BENNETT.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Inasmuch as NATHAN SUSSMAN has been the subject of an Espionage - R investigation in the N.Y. office it is recommended that no action be taken in the Newark Office.

NATHAN SUSSMAN, 43-09 47th Avenue, Sunnyside, Queens, was transferred from the Industrial 16 B Division of the CP to the 2nd Assembly District Club of the CP, .... Queens County, transfer #12349H.

NATHAN SUSSMAN, 43-09 47th Avenue, Queens, New York, was a member of the Sunnyside Section of the CP in 1946.

NATHAN SUSSMAN was interviewed by Bureau Agents on 1/17/51 at Fairchild Aviation Corporation, Farmingdale, Long Island, New York. He advised that in about 1935 he joined Young Communist League, in Brooklyn, New York. He later transferred to the Main Club of YCL at CCNY. In 1937 he ran for and was elected President of the CCNY Club of YCL. He stated he attended YCL meetings regularly and in 1935-1937 he took part in "peace rallies", with particular reference to Spanish Civil War. He left YCL by becoming inactive in June or July, 1940.

After leaving YCL, he stated, he believed he attended occasional CP meetings prior to joining the CP, which he believed was in early 1942. He stated he belonged a branch of the Industrial Section, with meetings being held at homes of various members, one of which he recalled being held at his home. JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were members of this club.

SUSSMAN stated that in the Fall of 1943 the Industrial Section of CP was broken up, and as he was then married and living in Sunnyside, he requested a transfer to the Sunnyside Section of the CPA, and he became a member of the Thompson Hill Club of CPA. He stated he believes he resigned from the CP in January, 1945.

SUSSMAN advised he was also active, prior to joining the CP, in the American Youth Congress, and attended an AYC peace rally in Washington, D.C. in 1940.

While at CCNY, he stated he was a member of American Student Union, and in 1940 was associated with the American Peace Mobilization. He stated he later belonged to Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists, and Technicians.

She stated she recalled that the meetings were held at her husband's parents residence, 103 Eldridge Street, and at JULIUS ROSENBERG's, 10 Monroe Street, New York City. Mrs. SUSSMAN stated that she recalled the following individuals in attendance at the meetings:

MORRIS SAVITSKY and his wife; AL SARANT, JOEL BARR, JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG, NATHAN SUSSMAN and herself.

On 3/20/51 Mrs. NATHAN SUSSMAN, also known as GERTRUDE EDELSTEIN, 56-55 205th Street, Bayside, Long Island, New York, advised that shortly after her marriage on 12/2/43 to NATHAN SUSSMAN, she and her husband met ALFRED

SARANT, JOEL BARR and VIVIAN GLASSMAN somewhere in the Greenwich Village area of New York. She stated that in the early part of 1944, she and her husband journeyed to JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG's, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, during the evening hours and found VIVIAN GLASSMAN present in the apartment. She recalled that later JOEL BARR and possibly SARANT joined them at the ROSENBERGS. She said that she recalled a telephone conversation shortly thereafter with ETHEL ROSENBERG, in which ETHEL discussed with her the advisability of taking some courses in Psychology. Mrs. SUSSMAN recalled that in 1944 she and her husband attended a musical at JOEL BARR's parents penthouse on West 97th Street, New York City.

On 11/29/50 GERTRUDE SUSSMAN, wife of NATHAN SUSSMAN, was interviewed at her home 56-55 205th Street, Bayside, Long Island, New York. She stated that she and her husband often visited the ROSENBERGS in their apartment at 10 Monroe Street in Knickerbocker Village, New York City, both before and after her marriage. She indicated that she and her husband stopped seeing the ROSENBERGS about 1947.

#### Biographical informations

Wathen Susseen was born in New York City on May 5, 1918. He attended the City College of New York and received a degree in electrical angineering during 1938. In 1939 he received his Mesters degree in engineering from the City College of New York. He was employed by the Western Electrical Company, Kearny, New Jersey, from 1942 to 1947. He was with the Fairchild Aviation Corporation from January 5, 1948, until the date of his resignation, February 16, 1951. He was last known to have been employed by the Telos Electronics Company in New York City.

#### Investigation conducteds

The investigation of Sussman was originally instituted during October, 1944, when information was received that Sussman had transferred from Industrial Branch 168 of the Communist Party to the Second Assembly District, Queens County Communist Purty. This case was closed on December 11, 1944, when investigation failed to disclose further Communist Purty ectivity on Sussman's purt.

During August, 1950, David Greenglass, a self-admitted former espionage agent, savised that Sussian had been a member of the Young Communist League while at the City College of New York and that he was in the same class with Julius Resemberg. In addition Greenglass advised that Sussaan was in periodic contact with Rosenberg from 1936 to 1947, and it was his eminion that Sussaan passively furnished information to Rosenberg. Greenglass, however, characterised Sussaan as not being an aggreenive spy. On the basis of this information, Sussaan's case was respensed.

In Movember, 1950, Sussean was interviewed, at which time he denied membership in the Young Communist League and the Communist Party. He was reinterviewed during January and March, 1951, at which time he admitted membership in the Young Communist League beginning about 1935, and further that he had been president of a chapter of the NUL at the City College of New York in 1937.

Susman stated he discontinued TCL association in 1940 and joined the Communist Party, Industrial Branch 162, during early 1942. Among others he named his wife, Gertrude, Julius and Ethel Ecoemberg and Alfred Sarant as members of this cell. He stated that Branch 168 was disbanded during December, 1943, and that he and his wife transferred to snother section of the Communist Party and combined their activities until approximately January or Pebruary, 1945. Susman admitted browing Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, Morton Sobell, Villiam Parl and Alfred Sarant. All of these individuals have been identified as wembers of Rosenberg's espionage apparatus. Susman denied that he had ever been solicited by anyone for information concerning his work. He agreed to testify for the Government is the trials of Julius Rosenberg, Morton Sobell and William Perl. Susman has been interviewed on numerous occasions concerning the identities of individuals who were members of the TCL and the Communist Party.

In the efficients filed by Sussean while employed by Western Electric and Fairchild Aviation Corporation he emitted any reference to past membership in the Young Communist League and the Communist Party. These facts were presented to the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, and in February, 1952, the United States Attorney advised it was deemed insavigable to take any action against Susman as he would possibly be a witness in the perjary trial of William Perl and in any further court action taken against Merten Sobell in the event Sobell's conviction was reversed.

Following the conviction of Perl and the final ection of the United States Supreme Court in the Sobell case, the facts were presented to the United States Attorney, Eastern District of New York, who declined procedules because the afficients filed by Sussan did not call for a listing of subversive organisations, and further because Sussan had resigned from the Communist Party and had cooperated fully with the United States Government.

During the investigation of Susanan, no evidence of espionage activity was developed on his part. This case was placed in a closed status during September, 1953.

#### AFFILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

Association with David Greenglass

On June 15, 1950 DAVID REFNGLASS, executed and delivered a written waiver of search to SA's JOHN L. LEWIS and LEO H. FRUTKIN of the New York Office. Pursuant to this waiver of search, the residence of DAVID GREENGLASS was searched and there was found a letter and envelope, dated Sunday, 1 A.M., November 28, 1913, addressed to:

This letter was written by Mrs. RUTH GREENGLASS, wife of DAVID GREENGLASS.

It is noted that DAVID GREENGLASS is a self-confessed espionage agent, and plead guilty in the United States Southern District Court to an indictment charging him with conspiring with others to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviets (U.S.S.R.).

On April 6, 1951 DAVID GREENGLASS was sentenced to a term of fifteen years imprisonment.



### Russian Indicted In Atom Spy Plot

By the associated Press
NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—A Federal grand jury today indicted Anatoli H. Yakovlev, former Russian vice consul in New York, on espionage conspiracy charges.

Yakovlev, now believed in Russia, was indicted with Mr. and Mrs. Julius Rosenberg, New Yorkers previously agrested by the FBI.

United States Attorney Irving H. Saypol, who announced the indictment, said the three conspired with Harry Gold, confessed atom spy for Russis; David Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenbarg's Authors Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, and Ruth Greenglass, his wife.

The indictment charged that beginning about November 1, 1944, and up until as recently as last June 16 the Rosenbergs and the Russian, also known as "John," conspired with the Greenglasses and Gold, and others not known to the grand jury.

Mr. Saypol said the conspiracy "in the main centered around a plot to obtain secretive and classified data and information concerning the atom bomb project! at Los Alamos, N. Mex."

If convicted, the defendants are subject to the death penalty, Mr. Saypol said. Gold and the Greenglasses are named as coconspirators but not as defendan



The article criticized the decision of the ROSENBERG case and claimed, among other things, that the case had been tried by the newspapers of the mation before it ever reached the court.

The article also claimed that the government prosecution had admitted that its chief witness, DAVID GREENGLASS, perjured himself on the witness stand when he testified that he had no outside assistance in reproducing the sketch of the atomic secret together with 12 pages of formulae from memory.

The details should be promptly brought to the attention of the Director and in the event it appears this committee has obtained such information an explanation should be given as to why the Bureau did not know about it."

In order that the Domestic Intelligence Division can discharge its responsibilities there is attached hereto Photostats 708 of the McCarthy Committee proceedings of pages 631 to (00 of the moon one containing the testimony of the above captioned subject on 10-14-53 . This testimony should be reviewed by the substantive Supervisor who should thereafter submit a memorandum

analyzing the results of this review.

Where there has been substantial information not previously known to the Bureau developed in this testimony and an explanation is required in accordance with the above instructions, the explanation should accompany the memorandum of analysis.





WEIDON BRUCE DAYTON was interviewed by Bureau Agents on August 2, 1950 at which time he admitted being a very close friend and associate of one ALFRED SARANT.

DAVID GREENGLASS, convicted Soviet Espionage agent, and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited to work in Soviet Espionage by JULIUS ROSENBERG. JULIUS ROSENBERG has been convicted for violation of the Espionage statutes and is currently awaiting execution in Sing Sing Prison, Ossiming, New York. Both DAVID and FUTH GREENGLASS have advised that they learned from conversations with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that while ROSENDERG was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage, he was using an apartment in Greenwich Village section of New York City for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts.

ALFRED SABANT has advised Bureau Agents that he resided at Apartment 6-I, 65 Morton Street in the Greenwich Village section of New York City from approximately October, 1943 until September, 1946, and that he sub-leased his apartment on the latter date and relinquished the lease on January 26, 1950.





She further advised that one night a stranger came to her apartment and gave her \$2,000.00 with instructions to go to Cleveland, Ohio, and give the money to WILLIAM FERL, and to instruct PERL to go to Mexico. She said PERL refused to take money and that she returned to New York.


JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were convicted in the Federal District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951 on charges of espionage. They were sentenced to death by Federal Judge IRVING R. KAUFMAN on 4/5/51. This sentence was upheld by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals on February 25, 1952. After various unsuccessfuly appeals JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were executed on June 19, 1953.


DAVID CREENGLASS in an interview with SAS ROBERT F. ROYAL and RICHARD T. HRADSKY on March 9, 1951, advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG had told him JOEL BARR was active in the espionage set up. JOEL BARR left the United States in 1948 and his whereabouts is unknown.

On June 15, 1950, DAVID GREENGLASS in an interview with SAS JOHN W. LEWIS and LEO H. FRUTKIN advised he was a brother-in-law of JULIUS ROSENBERG. He said he had been recruited into the espionage ring headed by JULIUS ROSENBERG by his wife RUTH GREENGLASS in 1944. He admitted having worked as an espionage agent at the Los Alamos Atom Bomb Project. On January 31, 1951, an indictment was returned by the United States Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, charging DAVID GREENGLASS with conspiracy to commit espionage. On April 6, 1951, he was sentenced to a term of fifteen years in prison by Judge IRVING R. KAUFMAN.

On March 13, 1951, WILLIAM PERL was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, charged with perjury in four counts in that he denied acquaintance with, among others, JULIUS ROSENBERG.

On June 5, 1950 he was sentenced to five years in prison for perjury.

The following is being submitted for information of the Bureau.

Reference is made to Baltimore teletype to the Director on April 25, 1951, wherein the Bureau was advised that Mr. O. JOHN ROGGE, former assistant to the Attorney General, and the subject appeared in the Baltimore Office on afternoon of April 25, 1951. Mr. ROGGE explained that the purpose of his visit was to advise the FBI that he had been retained by subject as counsel and further, he had suggested to KITTY that he cooperate with the Bureau Agents by telling the truth concerning his knowledge of any activity in the ROSENBERG case.

In explaining his position Mr. ROGGE stated that he was firmly opposed to the present day loyalty program and the Attorney General's "blackball list" of organizations, but did believe that the government was entitled to the fullest cooperation of all citizens in connection with the ROSENBERG expionage investigation. Mr. ROGGE explained that his client had indicated a willingness to disclose the names of his former associates in the Young Communist League and The International Worker's Order, but would decline to furnish any information concerning his family's connection with the CESSING Communist Party.

During instant conversation, Mr. ROGGE stated that he had represented MAX and HELENE ELITCHER, DAVID GREENGLASS and others and that he had been responsible for breaking the ROSENBERG case in that he had succeeded in getting GREENGLASS to disclose to the Federal Bureau of Investigation his participation in the ROSENBERG case. He continued that during some of the pre-trial conferences with the Department of Justice attorneys, he suggested that some of these subjects be tried on a conspiracy count in New York and that he felt that he had contributed largely to the conviction of the ROSENBERGS and SOBEL.





"The purpose of the congress was indicated by its three-point agenda, which may be briefly summarized as: The adoption of measures for preserving the various national cultures at the stimulation of intercultural relations among the countries of Continent and outside the Continent; Defense of freedom of creation and opinion and of the specific interests of the representatives of culture."

The warmth snown me as a representative of the progressicultural movement of the United States was not for an individual, but for our people and the democratic cultural forces of our count the workers, students and intellectuals of Chile whom I met clearly distinguish between el imperialismo yanqui- Yankee imperialism - and those of us who use our pens, our canvases, our voices and our teachings to express the interests and aspirations of our working people. The congress itself drew the same distinction."

"In my own talk to the congress I spoke of these two U.S.A's. I spoke of the common enemy, the imperialist conquistadores of Wall Street, of their doctrine of Anglo-Saxon supremacy and white chauvinism, and of the war-inspired McCarthyite drive against culture. But I also tolds the fight-back that is developing and of the independent expression of people's culture in theatre, literature, music, art. I expressed the fervent desire of progressive cultural workers in the United fervent desire of cultural materials with their brothers and eisters below the Rio Grande."

"During those days I sang a dozen or more times in private homes, union halls, at dinner, in theatres, and in friends kitchens. There was deep interest in and love of our music - particularly the music of the Negro people with whom the Latin American peoples feel a powerful bond. They know many of our folk songs through the recordings of Paul Robeson, but they learned some new ones: they sang with me the chorus of 'Which Side Are You On' and called for 'Joe Hill' at every opportunity.
