I talked with Supervisor Tom Spencer, NYO, on the afternoon of October 22, 1953. I authorized him to call Elizabeth Bentley in New Orleans to determine whether she had ever furnished to the Bureau information to which she testified before Senctor Mundt's Committee regarding obtaining samples of German marks to be used as occupation script by U. S. military forces. Bentley also testified that she had assisted in putting pressure on Harry Dexter White to have the plates of this script made available to the Russians.

Supervisor Spencer later advised that he had talked to Bentley and that it was her recollection she had furnished this information to the Bureau during the first three or four months of our interviews with her. She was somewhat hazy as to whether she had furnished the information concerning the plates. She did not recall having written this information into her book, "Out of Bondage."

The NYO is continuing its efforts to locate this information in its files.

### ACTION:

### SYNOPSIS:

Elizabeth Bentley, guest on 'Meet the Press" program on December 6, 1953, was very conservative in her answers to questions and did not allow herself to be trapped. Mentioned Bureau only briefly and each time remarks were commendable. asked if she believed any persons whom she knew to be spies to be still working in Government but did not answer. Was questioned concerning Lester Pearson but would not become involved. she would not change her original testimony. With regard to Harry Dexter White case end stated she did not know him personally but convinced he was a spy from information given to her by Silvermaster. In answer to question of what FBI thought of her when she originally went to them in 1945 she stated Agents were courteous but noncommittal. Strongly resented word "informer" when applied to her. Was questioned as to whether Truman regime put any brakes on her but refused to become involved in politics. Stated she believes Earl Browder has much valuable knowledge of Soviet espionage. In conclusion she was asked what advice she would give to Soviet spies and she said she would advise them to break with Soviets and report to the FBI.

### DI TAILS:

Elizabeth Bentley was the guest on "Meet the Press" panel on Sunday evening, December 6, 1953. The Moderator was Lawrence Spivak and the panel was made up of R. Wilson, R. Brant, J. Madigan and R. Riggs.

Miss Bentley conducted herself very well, was very conservative in her answers and refused to be trapped by leading questions. For the most part, she pleaded ignorance to questions on the basis that she did not have any notes with her and that she had appeared before so many committees that she could not answer the questions intelligently without referring to her notes. The FBI was injected only casually and her remarks concerning the Bureau were commendatory.

The first question put to Miss Bentley was did she have any personal knowledge of persons still in Government whom she knows to be spies. She refused to answer this question directly but did state that she was told there was two other rings operating in Washington in addition to the one in which she operated and she presumed the other two were still operating. She stated she had given all information that she was aware of to the Bureau.

She was then reminded that she had testified in 1951 that Lester Pearson of Canada had been used by the Communists. She stated she did not recall this particular testimony and would not be questioned on this point.

She was asked what she thought of creating a commission to quietly investigate subversives in Government rather than have three or four congressional committees doing it with great fanfare. She replied she had not thought about it, although from a witness's point of view it would be much more desirable to appear before one group rather than a number of them.

She was asked what she thought of Igor Guzenko's proposal to make attractive offers to spies to induce them to come over to the democratic countries, much as Canada had done for him. She said she didn't know but it might be a good idea.

She was asked if she was given any inducements to talk by the FBI when she initially contacted the Bureau in 1945. She said no, that she was motivated by purely idealistic motives and if the FBI had come to her with inducements she probably would have resented it and not talked.

She was asked if she would change her original testimony today and she said no, she would not. She was also asked if she had given congressional committees all the testimony in her possession and she stated she was not sure, that she only responded to questions and she didn't believe the congressional committees had asked her about all persons involved. She stated she had given all information available to her to the FBI.

She was asked if she knew of any persons still engaged in espionage that she had not named publicedly. She said there probably were and that she still believes espionage is going on in America. She was asked where and she said probably in the Intelligence Services, State and Commerce Departments.

The questions then turned to the Harry Dexter White case and Miss Bentley was asked if there was enough evidence in 1945 to prove him a spy. She questioned whether the panel meant personal knowledge on her part or evidence which would be admissable in court. She stated she was personally convinced he was a spy even though she had not met him personally and knew he was part of the Silvermaster Ring because Silvermaster had personally told her.

She was asked if any of the persons named by her had been sentenced to prison and she said yes, and named Remington and Abe Brothman.

She was questioned as to why no legal action had been taken against Silvermaster, Perlo, Ullman and the others she had named. Miss Bentley stated she did not know, that she was not a lawyer but understood that it was very difficult to legally prove espionage. She was asked if she thought the ase against them would be stronger if wire tapping evidence were legal and she stated that she didn't believe so because her groups were too scared of telephones and when they did use them they only talked in code, which would not mean much to a monitor.

She was asked how she had gotten away with her espionage activities for so long - were her groups so clever or were the American people so stupid. She replied that she thought it was a combination of both, that the American people were trusting and that at the time Russia was our ally.

The questions then returned to Harry Dexter White and Miss Bentley was asked would the Communists have known of a surveillance placed on them as Truman inferred in his speech. She stated while some of them might have known it, it would

probably have never come to her attention.

She was then asked what the FBI thought when she originally went to them in 1945 and would they believe her. She stated she did not know, that they were very courteous but noncommittal. She was asked if their faces didn't betray some of their feelings regarding her story and she said no, that FBI Agents were well trained and had poker faces and gave no indication to her what they thought of her story. She did say that Agents told her a month after her initial visit to the Bureau in New Haven, Connecticut, that the story she told had been double checked carefully and her allegations verified.

Miss Bentley showed the most emotion when one of the panel used the word "informer" in regard to her. She said she resented this word very much, that she and others like her were only doing their civic duty and she did not consider herself a "tattle tale."

She was asked what made her finally see the light and she stated she got good and mad when her superiors tried to bribe her and tie her down. She explained that she had/working out of idealistic motives but they tried to involve her by offering her fur coats, money and other material things which was a favorite trick to involve individuals.

She was asked why she was in Washington, was it to appear before other hearings and she said no, she was in town only to appear on the program.

She was then asked did she think any brakes were put on her information by the Truman regime. She refused to answer this question and stated she did not want to get into politics. She was then asked how well she knew Earl Browder and she stated she worked closely with him and reported to him from 1942, when her immediate superior died, until 1946. She stated she believes Browder knows a great deal concerning Soviet espionage and that as head of the Communist Party at the time furnished Agents for Soviet espionage, covers for their work, and did other odd jobs. She said she believed he had important information today.

She was asked what concrete evidence did she turn over to the FBI in 1945, namely, did she have any documents or other pieces of evidence. She stated no, it was merely her story, her memory of meetings, of people she had worked with and documents that had passed through her hands. She was asked if she handled the currency plates which were turned over to Russia and she stated



ne, she only handled samples of the money they would make but the prints were turned over legally by the Government.

She was asked if her life had been threatened and she said yes, many times. She was asked if she was actively engaged in anti-Communist work now and said no, she was teaching, lecturing and trying to awaken the American people.

In conclusion she was asked what advice she would give the spies working for Soviet Russia today and she stated she would tell them to break with the Soviets and go to the FBI with their information.

### DONALD NIVEN WHEELER SECURITY MATTER (C)

There are attached hereto a considerable number of clippings which in summary reflect that WHEELER wrote a letter to "The Sequim Press", which is a weekly newspaper, which was published in the November 26, 1953, issue, and a similar letter almost identical to the "Port Angeles Evening News", which was published on Wednesday, December 2, 1953. The article by WHEELER to the two papers, copies of which are attached, is a tirade against the HARRY DEXTER WHITE publicity with a view to the fact that since he has been moligned throughout the country he is asking space in these two newspapers, where he lives, to defend himself. The language of the letters is intemperate and is so wild that Editor C. N. WEBSTER advises me that they published the whole content of the letters as speaking for themselves in evading the point and trying to throw a smoke screen. I went to Port Angeles and talked with WEBSTER, who advises me that he felt very strongly about the situation not only due to his position and the character of WHEELER but also due to the fact that they both were graduates of Reed College, which clarifies WEBSTER's comments concerning the article, which are also attached.

As a result of WEBSTER's solidifying his thinking in connection with the situation plus the fact that WHEELER was then in San FRancisco where he had refused to testify to the "sixty-four dollar question", as WEBSTER puts it, he made it available to the Associated Press expecting that it would backfire on WHEELER and possibly provide a libel suit basis for ELIZABETH BENTLEY to sue WHEELER for defamation of character.

As the Bureau undoubtedly would be aware, these two newspapers are very, very small in size due to their communities, and I did not feel that I should comment concerning WHEELER's letter since apparently Mr. WEBSTER had it all set up as to how it should be handled and had stated that the whole community knows of the situation. As an example of this, WEBSTER cited the point that there is another family, wholly innocent, named WHEELER who also live in Sequim who have had to take the trouble to advise everybody in Sequim and Port Angeles that there is no connection of their family with the subject, inasmuch as they are receiving considerable abuse and derision by the public, the stores, etc., in these two places because they think this is the subject's family. In view of this over-all situation, no comment was made by me at the time as I felt that the Bureau should not dignify WHEELER's comments beyond the 134-435-V action already taken.

WEBSTER has checked and advises that although it is common rumor that WHEELER was subpoensed, they could not find that he had ever testified in any way on the situation. He intends to probe further as to this to connect it up.

#### SY'OPSIS:

Elizabeth Bentley appeared on the television show, "Meet the Press," on Sunday, 12/6/53. In response to a question she stated that she had given all her information to the FBI. She said that she did not know if the FBI knew of her espionage activities defere she confesced to them in 1945. Miss Bentley commented that she has no reason to change any testimony previously given. The observed that she rever not Barry Beater White but did see information that he passed, and accepted the word of Silvermaster that White was part of his group. Hiss Bentley suggested that anyone involved in espionage activities who wished to break away should go to the FBI where they would be well treated. Miss Bentley advised a former Special Agent on 12/6/53 that the Director's comments about her before the Jenner Committee were wonderful. Although she had hesitated before, she now intends to write the Director and thank him for his remarks.

#### DETAILS:

On December 6, 1953, Elizabeth Pentley appeared on the television show, "Meet the Press." Larry Spivak was moderator, and the following comprised the questioning panel: Richard Wilson, Cowles Publications; Raymond Frandt, St. Louis Feet Dispatch; John Eadigan, Rearst Publications; Robert Highs, Louisville Courier Journal.

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Mr. Spivak introduced Miss Bentley as a former Soviet spy and courier. He then read the Director's comments about Miss Bentley's reliability and accuracy as given by the Director in his testimony before the Jenner Committee on November 17, 1953.

Miss Bentley then declined to answer a question as to whether or not she had personal knowledge that any U. S. Government employees were now spying for Russia. She stated that she had given all her information to the FBI. She was asked if she recalled testifying in August, 1951, that Lester Pearson (Canadian Secretary of State for External Affairs) had been used by a Communist spy ring. Miss Bentley said that she could not remember all the testimony she gave before committees and could not comment on the Pearson questioning unless she had an opportunity to review her testimony. In answer to another question Miss Bentley said that she did not know if the PBI knew of her activities before she confessed to the FBI in 1945. She said she was not induced to break from her espichage activities by the PBI. Che pointed out that the Russians had tried to bribe her, and this was the deciding factor in her break. She intimated that her idealism was shattered by the monetary offering.

Miss Bentley declared that she has no reason to now change any testimony that she has given previously.

In connection with the Harry Dexter White case she said that she had never met White, pursuant to his wish, but she saw material that he passed and she was told by Silvermaster that White was part of his group.

Miss Bentley was asked if she was under suspicion during the years that she was involved in Soviet espiorage and she advised Mr. Spivak that he would have to ask the Director that question. Spivak then asked about Earl Browder and Bentley replied that Browder knew a gread deal about the Communist conspiracy in the United States.

In answer to a question from Mr. Wilson as to what action she would recommend to people who are involved in espionage and who are on the verge of breaking, Miss Bentley suggested that such individuals should go to the FBI where they would be well treated.

Miss Bentley was asked a number of questions in which her opinions were solicited and any responses she made would necessarily be conjectural. She was generally successful in avoiding answering such questions. It might be stated that hiss Bentley handled herself quite well on the program while the newspapermen involved created the impression that they did not know what to ask hiss Bentley.

Former Special Agent J. M. Kelly, who handled Bentley in New York starting in November, 1945, telephonically contacted Supervisor R. J. Lamphere on December 7, 1953. 
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

These are the first four of a six article series which is appearing in the "New York Daily Mirror" It would seem apparent that BENTLEY'S material was closely edited by the publishers of the stories and that in so doing some minor changes have been made to give the articles more reader appeal. It would also appear that the material is basically the same as that originally furnished by AMPLEY to Bureau agents. It is also observed that practically all the material in these articles also appears in Miss BENTLEY'S book "Out of Bondage". It is possible that BENTLEY in rewriting this material in its present form may have "dressed up" the material to point out the importance of the information which she had.

Attention is called to the article appearing in the "New York Daily Mirror" on 12/13/53, in which she relates that WHITE furnished information that Secretary of Treasury MORGANTHEAU was dis gruntled with the reception Moscow was giving American lendlesse effort and WHITE'S suggestion that an accolade for the work being done by the US toward winning the war be included in a speech of by STALIN. This information is basically the same as that originally furnished by BENTELY to Eureau agents regarding this incident.

Information relative to LAUCHLIN CURRIE contained in the article appearing on 12/15/53, appears to be a more colorful portrayal by RENGLEY of information previously given by her to the Bureau and it appears she may be augmenting facts originally known to her with information she has obtained through Congressional hearings and other sources since her original statement.

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
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

# Line Ran Straight To Stalin, Says Bentley

THIS is the first article of a six-part series by Elizabeth Bentley, an admitted tormer Soviet spy courier, whose testimony naming 37 persons as agents in Red networks operating in the U.S. has been labeled entirely accurate by J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

In this series—the first she has ever written for any newspaper—she goes behind the scenes of espionage operations, names the high-placed officials who stole American secrets, tells of some specific acts of treachery accomplished by Americans who were espionage agents for the Soviet.

In today's article, she relates a hitherto unknown incident of high-level espionage intrigue and tells how she first entered the Communist Party.

THE names of Harry Dexter White, William Ludwig Ullman, Harold Glasser and other persons identified with a Soviet espionage ring whose tentacles were deep inside the United States government have been appearing

in the nation's headlines. The disclosures at long last are being brought with the impact they deserve to the attention of the American people.

The knowledge of the insidious operations of the Russian Soviet spy network comes understandably as a brutal shock to millions of Americans. The question naturally arises whether it is true that vital American secrets, information upon which depended the nation's security and safety, were actually passed with such impunity and such great volume to Soviet agents by persons in positions of trust and importance in the U. S. Government.

I can affest that they were,

I know this not as a matter of conjecture or from secondhand information. I know it because I was one of the most important cogs in the Russian spy system which operated and probably still is operating—in the U.S.

It was my job, indeed my "duty," during the decade I was a member of the Soviet underground to collect stolen secrets from American agents and transmit them directly to

representatives of the Russian secret police here. These spies were everywhere. In the most sensitive wartime bureaus, in the Army, the Air Force, the State Department, the Treasury

Department, the White House itself.

These agents, men like Harry Dexter White, Lauchlin Currie, Victor Perlo, Maurice Halperin, Nathan Gregory Silvermaster and others, were not professional paid spies. They were men who knowingly—or with minds deliberately closed against recognition of this knowledge—acted as spies on "ideological" grounds.

I saw the documents they stole. I listened to the secret information they transmitted verbally. I collected the Communist Party dues from many of them. I brought them their orders from the Soviet superiors. I was the watchdog set over them to keep them in line and to spur them on to greater espionage activity.

As I look back upon this turbulent, terrible, misguided phase of my life, even I find it hard to believe how important was the information I funneled into the espionage channels

that led directly to Moscow.

I recall how on one occasion, the very tone of international relations between the United States and Russia was affected by my underground work. It was during World War II, when the United States was supplying the sinews of war and astronomical sums of money to the Russians.

In one of my bi-weekly meetings with Silvermaster, who

highded one of the two major spy groups I "controlled," he reported to me that he had a message from Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Harry Dexter White. White, he said, had informed him that Treasury Secretary Morgenthau was tunhappy and disgruntled with the reception Moscow was giving the gigantic American lend-lease effort.

"Those damn Russians don't seem to appreciate what we are doing," White quoted Morgenthau.
WHITE TOLD Silvermaster

that it was of the utmost importance that Morgenthau be placated, that this powerful official of the U.S. Government be kept in a receptive mood towards Russia's unceasing demands for more military equipment, for more funds, Morgenthau, he said, must not become resistant to the unremitting pressure for greater monetary allocations for the Soviet.

White, Silvermaster told me, suggested that if would be a master stroke for Premier Sta-Bu to include in one of his speeches an accolade for the work being done by the United States toward winning the war.

This information I passed on to my Soviet "contact" in New York upon my return from Washing at the Instantly to Moscow. And in due course, Stalin carried out White's suggestion. Stalin publicly paid tribute to U. S. productivity and the part it was playing in the global struggle against Nazi ag-' gression, and to the importance of the entire lend-lease program.

MORGENTHAU WAS placated. Thanks to the Soviet espionage system, one of the most im-portant officials in wartime Washington had been continued in the "attitude" desired by White and required by the Rus-Sians.

But it was many years after I became a Communist before I was entrusted with such highlevel conrier work. First, I had to be east in the Communist mold, blinded by its dogma, enslaved by its discipline.

I am telling my story now, pressure brought to bear upon me by members of the League to join the Soviet espionage system, sistible, to strengthen the alert that is now being sounded across our land. Soviet espionage is not fanciful, haphazard, sporadic or

Eager to do something to comhat this menace, I was easy prey for the American League Against War and Fascism, an organization which, although I did not know it at the time, was under the con-trol of the Communist Party.

BROUGHT INTO THE LEAGUE by Lee Fuhr, a nurse studying at Teachers' College, I was gratified that I was now working for justice and humanity. The next step, in retrospect, was inevitable. The pressure brought to bear upon me sistible.

I was cajoled, derided and ostracized for my uncertainty about joining the Party. I was made tö feel that I was a traitor to my high ideals if I did not join the only militant group working for social justice.

And so, in March, 1935, more from a desire to conform than from conviction, I joined the Party and took the Party name of

Elizabeth Sherman after one of my Colonial ancestors.

THUS I BECAME a Communist to fight the good fight. How startled I would have been had I been told then that I had taken the first step toward becoming one of the most important couriers for the Soviet espionage system in the U.S.



# First A-Bomb Tip Given to Ring By Aide of 'Wild Bill'

By ELIZABETH BENTLEY

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Elizabeth Bentley, former top-ranking courier for the Soviet espionage network in the U.S., here tells of her contact within the White House itself. In this third article of an exclusive six-part series, she tells how this contact saved an ace spy from detection.

Once I began acting as the courier for the American agents stationed in Washington, I found there were three categories of spies with whom I had to maintain contact. One was the Silvermaster group, the second was the Pelle group and the third was individuals who were not assigned to a specific group but with whom I dealt directly.

ONE SUCH INDIVIDUAL was Maj. Duncan Lee, a confidential assistant to Gen, William "Wild Bill" Donovan, who was head of the Office of Strategic Services. Lee, who had been a member of the Communist faction in the Institute of Pacific Relations, was a valuable source of information but his personality was such that it was my constant headache to keep him from throwing over the traces.

UNLIKE the other agents, who for the most part were imbued with a steely determination to carry out their missions despite the ever-present dangers of discovery and disclosure. Lee was always fourful his dual role would be uncovered by the FBI.

I.EE, TOO, could add no further details. But it can be taken for granted that the Russians promptly investigated the report—and the true evaluation of this tip to the Russians will possibly be made public some day.

WHILE MOST of my contacts were spread over the various war-time agencies in Washington, one of them operated directly in the White House itself. He was Lauchlin Currie, administrative assistant to President Roosevelt.

A FULL-FLEDGED member of the Silvermaster group, Currie was invaluable to us when any emergency arose. In addition, one of his most important functions was giving references to members of the esplonage network to either get them promoted or shifted to more "productive" jobs in other agencies.

CURRIE PROVED his importance to us when the entire structure of the Soviet spy system in Washington was menaced and disastrous disclosure seemed imminent. Thanks to the help he give, the spy ring squeaked through the danger and emerged with a new, vigorous lease on life.

It happened this way: Nathan Gregory Silvermuster was one of the most courageous, productive and versatile agents in the entire Washington setup. To make him even more useful the Russian Secret Police representatives decided be should be taken out of the Farm Security Administration and placed in a more strategic post.

WITH THE HELP of Curle, who became Roosevelt's adviser on Far Eastern affairs, and of Harry Dexter White, the Treasury official, Silvermaster was

transferred from the FSA to the Board of Economic Warfare, where he became head of the Middle East Division.

Six months later, the blow struck. A letter from General Strong, head of Army Intelligence, was sent to Silvermaster's superior stating that the FBI, the Office of Naval Intelligence and other police agencies on the West Coast had discovered that Silvermaster was a Communist and was disloyal to the United States.

SILVERMASTER, ordinarily calm and fearless, was shaken and distraught. Unable to decide on a course of action, he was advised by his and my superiors in the Soviet secret police to sit tight. Meanwhile, he was told to contact Currie and White.

THESE TWO officials, using all the power of their high offices, brought pressure to bear upon Under Secretary of War Robert E. Patterson while the entire espionage system virtually held its breath.

The results were gratifying.
After about three months of Interminable waiting, Patterson directed the War Department to cancel its demands for Silvermaster's dismissal, and the act spy was permitted to return to the Farm Security Administration with absolutely no official blemish on his record.

OTHER TIME, Currie sent to George Silverman, who Wights personal friend, that the Afficians had just broken a Soviet code. When this red-hot information was transmitted to the Russians, they naturally, were burning to discover what code it was that was no longer useful to them.

FOR WEEKS, it was our job to try to find out about the code, but this one time we were unable to fulfill the Russians' demands.

I began the Washington phase of my undercover work for the Communists when Jacob Golos, the powerful American Communist and member of the Russian secret police with whom I was in love, told me he wanted to undertake the contact work for the esplonage groups operating there.

I agreed, of course, despite Golos' warning that I was beginning a dangerous assignment.

ACTUALLY, I HAD already been acting as a courier for information emanating from Washington, but on a secondary level. I had been put in contact with Mary Price, a veteran Communist who was the secretary of Walter Lippmann.

Mary would ransack the files of Lippmann's Washington office and extract whatever she thought would be useful to the Russian intelligence agents.

MARY PROVED useful, too, when I raveled to Washington to pick up my bi-weekly haul of stolen doduments. It was too dilugerous for me to register at a hotel where the FBI could no the regularity of my visits and I frequently stayed overnight at Mary's apartment.

was given to recurrent frights and fears, always imagining that sooner or later the FBI would crack down on her. Whenever I found her in one of these moods, I would take her out, wine and dine her, give her a pep talk about the importance of the work she was doing and inspire her with new confidence.

I, too, had my fears about the FBI, but I had learned to master them and I became adept at using

evasive techniques.

THE BURDEN of my work was heavy, almost crushing. Not only was I a courier, but I also had become an executive of World Tourists, which had been established by the Communist

Party as a cover and as a means of sending tourists to Russia.

I also was an executive of the U.S. Service & Shipping Corporation, which had been organized by Golos to take over some of the activities of World Tourists.

EXCEPT FOR my personal association with Golos, I had no life of my own. Every moment was sacrificed to the dictates of the Communist Party apparatus and the Soviet espionage system.

## Top-Secret D-Day Was Open Secret To Red Spy Ring

By ELIZABETH BENTLEY

Elizabeth Bentley, formerly one of the most important couriers for the Soviet espionage conspiracy in the U.S., continues her amazing disclosures of the operation of the Red spy underground. In this tourth article of an exclusive six-part series, she tells how a Communist secretary was supplied for Harry Dexter White.

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Despite the elaborate precautions taken by the U.S. to safeguard the secrecy of D-Day, when Allied troops were to land in France, the little-known fact is that the Soviet espionage network operating in Washington had discovered the fateful date far in advance of its occurrence and had transmitted it to the Russian secret police in this country.

Even the American spice themselves were overwhelmed with the gigantic success in stealing so closely-guarded a secret. Some of us even doubted the information could be accurate. But subsequent events proved that it was absolutely correct

THE SPY RING headed by Nathan Gregory Silvermaster was probably the most active espionage group operating in Washington. Silvermaster was never an open member of the Communist Party and his group was not an official cell.

When he went to Washington in 1935, he was told by Earl Browder not to tie himself up with any Communist unit, but to a ct as a "sleeper agent," gathering around him persons who would be able to seal information.

With the help of he wife, lielen, daughter of a hussian Baltic baron and a woman with a history of long involvement in

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tic revolutionary movement, he carried out his instructions with anazing success.

PRINCIPAL AGENTS of the group, Silvermaster built around him, included among others William L. Ullman, who lived in the Silvermaster home in Washington. Ullman, a major of the U.S. Army Air Forces stationed at the Pentagon, was a prime source of information. He obtained and photographed all kinds of secret data concerning U.S. war plans as well as reports of the FBI which were furnished to G-2 of the Army at the Pentagon.

Another was Harry Dexter White, the high-placed Treasury official who was in charge of monetary research and foreign funds control. Still another was George Silverman, a civilian employe of the War Department.

The bulk of the military information furnished the Soviet secret police was the result of the work by Ullman and Silverman.

OTHER MEMBERS of the Silvermaster group included Frank

Coe, Lauchlin Currie, Irving Kiplan lwho paid his Communist Party dues through the Victor Perlo spy group) and Sol Adler.

When Kaplan applied for a post with the Federal Works Agency in 1942, he used the names of Currie and George Silverman as character references. This was part of the overall scheme wherehy members of the spy network were obligated to aid their co-conspirators to advance to higher positions of trust and importance by recommendations and favored treatment.

the agents were active, too h filling lesser posts with persons who would be useful to the espionage ring. For example, at one time Harry Dexter White had a vacancy for a second secretary in his office. He communicated with Helen Silvermaster and notified her he wanted a secretary who was a Communist.

THE REASON, he said, was that he wanted to leave important documents around which she could remove from the office.

Helen Silvermaster accordingly went to the Baltimore headquarters of the Communist Party, obtained the name of a suitable candidate and sent word to her to present herself to White for an interview.

However, word was not relayed back to White in time and when the Communist secretary applied to him, he was not aware of her identity and did not here her.

THS TIME, White was told who the girl was. When she applied the second time, all persons concerned had been alerted. White hired her immediately and available outlet to the espionage hig was installed in his office.

As the disclosures of Communist espionage infiltration of our high government offices continue to unfold in the nation's headlines, as the names that I once knew as well as my own continue to be dredged from the insidious network of intrigue, let no one be Infled luto a false sense of security.

Exposure now does not mean final safety for the nation.

IT IS WISHFUL thinking to believe that the Communist secret police will now call a halt to the activities that have stolen for them some of the country's most vital secrets. America must never lose sight of the basic fact that the goal of the Communist master plan is conquest of the world.

The Communists will not and cannot abandon the espionage acm of their global struggle because some of its activities have been exposed and documented. What these developments mean for them is that henceforth their methods will have to be even more elever, less obvious, more foolproof.

They will continue to ensnare, seduce and impress agents for their spying. This is fact. Any

other hope is delusion.

MY FIRST SOVIET superior, when I began my assignment as courier for the Washington spy rings, was Jacob Golos. Him I knew best of all, lle belonged to what I would call the "old school" of espionage chiefs, which operated on the theory that its agents were people dedicated to certain beliefs which alone were sufficient motivation for their acts.

But when I was assigned to the Soviet superiors who succeeded Golos, I collided with a "new school" of spy chiefs, These were men who treated the American agents with contempt and arrogance. They were the men who sought to enmesh the agents and the spy groups they controlled with rewards of money, gifts, high living and Soviet honors.

I recall how forcibly this was brought home to me when I was taken over by the last Soviet representative with whom I was it contact before I broke loose from the ties that held me to the conspiracy. I had known him only by his code name "Al."

ONLY LATER, much later, did discover that he was Anatol Cromov, First Secretary of the Russian Embassy, who, according to the findings of the FBI, and been sent to the U. S. as the successor in Russian secret police activities here to Vassili Zubilin Zubilin, former Second Secretary of the Soviet Embassy, was recalled to Moscow in July, 1944.

"Al" importuned me endlessly to accept money for my courier work. The very thought revolted me. I had joined the Communist Party on ideological grounds. I had undertaken my espionage ring assignment under Golos as part of a dedicated service to what I thought was a noble sacrifice for Communist ideals.

llowever, at the time I had already told my story to the FBI and, acting on their instructions, I accepted the \$2,000 "Al" pressed on me. As soon as I could, I turned the money over to the FBI. I remember the astonishment of the FBI agent who counted the money before stowing it away in an envelope.

"THE RUSSIANS must be well-beeled to pass it out as casually as this," be said wonderingly.

Another time, when I was dining with "Al" in Washington, he suddenly sat erect, assumed his most official manner and solemnly announced that he was about to present me with a high honor. The Supreme Predium of the Soviet Union, he said, had awarded me one of its highest decorations, the Order of the Red Star.

It is difficult for me to express the revulsion I felt at the announcement. I had already been shaken by grave doubts about the purposes of the Communist movement and the pattern of its purposes was beginning to cut through the ideological miasma in which I had been imprisoned. This obvious attempt to pay off and buy the services I had willingly performed for what I had believed was the "good fight" was horrifying.

But I dured not let "A)" suspect any of this. As quickly as I could. I ended our meeting and fled, wondering desperately if there was a way out. I was to find the way later.

## Soviet Agents Bord DeeplyInto Office Of Strategic Services

-By ELIZABETH BENTLEY-

Elizabeth Bentley, whose revelations to the FBI about her role as a top-ranking courier in the Soviet espionage conspiracy in the U.S. have been labeled "entirely accurate" by FBI director J. Edgar Hoover, continues the amazing story of her spy career. In this fifth article of an exclusive six-part series, she tells the kind of information the Russians demanded the spies transmit to them.

One of the most sensitive U. S. agencies deeply infiltrated by spies for the Soviet espionage system was the Office of Strategic Services.

American spies there were in a particularly productive spot. Through them came an endless flow of highly secret information on what the OSS was doing. Through them we learned, for example, that the OSS was conducting secret negotiations with governments in the Balkan bloc in easy World War II ended; that the OSS was parachuting people into Hungary; that OSS men were being sent into Turkey.

WORLDWIDE INFORMA-1 TION of all sorts was transmitted to the Soviets—plus the contents of State Department cables on vital issues which were shown to the OSS.

The appetite of the Russian secret police in control of the espionage appratus functioning in the U.S. was insatiable and allencompassing. Every scrap of information was seized upon and digested by them.

In fact, by the natural of the

secret police concerned the "altitudes" of American officials with whom Russian government representatives would have to deal in the lend-lease program and in other activities

I recall that one official about whom the Russians never seemed to be able to obtain enough information was a William Batt of the War Production Board. His name came up time and again.

The members of the espionage rings would be asked to give their evaluation of the "attitude" of the U. S. official under study and these reports would then be handed back to the Russians for their guidance.

THESE REQUESTS for inler-

mation would be transmitted to ma verbally by the Russians, or when they were too numerous to trust to memory, a written list of questions would be handed over. Another recurrent request was for all information which the U.S. had about German planes. Answers to this type of question were generally furnished by the Silvermaster group.

The Russians were also ferribly eager for all information about new developments in American aviation and especially for data on the B-29. They insisted that the American agents secure performance figures on all our aircraft. We understood that the Russians were distrustful of the planes being shipped to them under the lend-lease program and were fearful that the U.S. might try to palm off its inferior aircraft on them.

Still another area of international relations in which the Russians were vitally interested was the financial transactions between the U.S. and Great Britain. Always pressing for greater allocations of funds for themselves, the Russians could use the Anglo-American transactions as a guide for their own demands.

THE SOVIET SECRET police also kept hounding the American agents to ferret out all information about U. S. undercover operations in the Nazi-occu

pied countries so that they could take steps to counteract whatever advantages the U.S. could gain from such activity.

One report the Russians turned over to me for amplilication and explanation by American spies concerned the nctivity of a group of patriots in Hungary who were desperately anxious to keep the Russians from taking over. This group sent a man to Geneva to meet with an OSS agent. In some fushion, the Russians learned of this and demanded additional information on the bubject.

I "acquired" the Silvermaster spy group in July, 1941, and in March, 1944, I took over "control" of the second spy group, known as the "Perlo ring." Jacob Golos had died the year before and it was Earl Browder who made the arrangements for me to be the go-between for the Perlo group.

BROWDER, WHO was fighting an inter-party intrigue for power and position in the apparatus, told me this second group had been handled by John Abt, but since Abt was in the public eye the was at one time general counsel for the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America), I must take it over.

I made first contact with the group in Abt's Central Park West apartment, where I met also Victor Perlo and Charlie Kranier.

Besides Perio, Abt and Kramer, others in the group included Edward Filzgerald, of the War Production Board; Harry Magdotf, of the Wir Production Board; Don-ald Mheeler, of the OSS; and Alan Josenberg.

STILL OTHER members of the erlo ring, whom I did not mee ersonally but for whom I acte s courier, included Sol Leshin ky, of UNRRA; George Perazielf. UNRIRA; and Harold Glasser, of Treasury.

There was a category of American spies who operated as individuals and were not a part of any organized group. Among these were Helen Tenney, of the OSS: J. Julius Joseph, of the OSS; Maurice Halperin, head of research and analysis, Lafin American branch of the OSS: Robert Miller, head of the political division of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs; Joseph Gregg, Miller's assistant; Ber-mard Redmont, in the press division of the CIAA; and William Remington of the War Production Board.

Silvermaster's home in Washington was an important base because of the photographic lah operated in his basement by Ullman. It was in this lab that stolen documents of every imaginable type were copied on microfilm. The rolls were then brought to New York by me.

SO GREAT was the deluge of stolen documents at one period, that there simply wasn't enough first-grade film to photograph them and Ullman's job was greatly complicated by the interior material with which he had to work.

I would carry the film, documents and other materials in a casual bundle to New York where I would turn them over to my Soviet confact. The proecdure was simple and the simplicity probably explains why it continued so long so successfully.

Carrying my innocent-looking bundle. I would meet the contact somewhere and we would walk into a convenient cafe or restaurant to dine. The Soviet agent would offer to help me with my bundle and I, naturally, would thank him and pass it over. After we had eaten, he would hold on to the bundle and we would part company,

carry my material in a dispatch case and proceed ito a rewsreel theatry in the midfown area. Taking a seat in the rear, I would wait for the Soviet agent—with whom all this had been appeared. whom all this had been arranged -to enter with a similar dispatch; case and sit beside me. We would then exchange cases surreptitiously in the semi-darkness and he would leave the theatre with the material securely in his posses-Sion

# White Arranged Secrets Exchange For Spy Network

Elizabeth Bentley, one of the most important couriers of the Saviet espionage rings operating in Washington, here writes the sixth and last article of the fascinating series exposing the activities of American spies in high office. In this concluding instalment, she tells of the importance of Harry Dexter While to the spy networks.

The influence which Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Harry Dexter White was able to exert on Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau was a tremendous assist to the American spies working for the Soviet espionage network in Washington.

Morgentiam of course, didn't fall in with the Communist plots, but the result of his ready neceptance of White's suggestions was, that much sever information which would ordinarily not be scallable to us, fell easily into the hands of the Soviet agents.

FOR EXAMPLE, it was White, a member of the Silvermaster spy ring, who proposed to Morgenthau that the Treasury ex-

change secret information with other strategic government agencies. When this plan ultimately was in full operation, the Treasury was frading information with at least seven or eight agencies. All this vital data funneled through White and he in turn, passed it on to the spy ring.

Included among the material which was turned over to me from White for delivery to the Soviet secret police were classified reports of the FBI and secret information from the Navy.

Hedoctrinated in Communist dogma and their souls warped by its poison, the American agents had a peculiar psychology about the FIII. It had been drummed into them over and over that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was a kind of brutal Coesnel, secret police organization until they seemed to believe this implicitie.

THE AMERICAN SOES, I found, hared the FBI with a tury that seemed to inspire them to willingly take great risks. Success in outwitting the FBI was a serf of exhibitating stimulant. I recall that Silvermaster used to flaunt his disdain for the FBI with such remarks as, "Do you thick the FBI is listening in?"—accompanied by laughter. Or else he would say with relish, "Well, if they tailed me today they didn't get anywhere."

One of the very few spics who actually severed all connection with the esplonage network before the cruckdown was Robert Miller, who worked in the office of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs.

Nervous and fearful, he would only pass on information verbally and refused to steal any documents for the ring. Eventually, in the last six months I knew him, he refused to give me any information at all. But his case was a rarity.

As for me, I had decided by the Summer of 1945 that I could no tonger serve my Soviet masters. Realization had finally come to me that instead of building a new world, insuring the dignity of man and the triumph of justice and democracy, we in the Communist movement had been used and corrupted. The real purpose of the Communist scheme for world domination had become frighteningly clear to me at last.

NOW THE PROBLEM was how the break could be made and low to make amends. I had the celing that by this time the

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Soviet . police had lost their completion fidence in me and wery beginning to worry about my/reliability.

I went through a long agony of doubt and indecision, and then one day, like a deansing revelation, I knew I must tell the full story to the FBI.

I was afraid that the Soviet agents were watching me and would put me out of the way at once if they suspected my intention. I realized it would be too much of a risk to go to the FBI offices in Washington or New York, where the chances of my being seen by someone in the spy network were great.

SO, IN AUGUST, 1945, I traveled to New Haven, Conn., and there I made my first voluntary contact with the FBI. A bureau man listened noncommittally to a brief outline of what I had to tell, thanked me for coming and said I would be told shortly what to do next.

While the FBI did its own checking, the days dragged by in a kind of nightmare as I waited for word. Meanwhile, as far as the Soviet secret police were concerned—I hoped—I was still a member of the apparatus. It was a wearing, nerve-wracking role, Grimly, I fought to keep myself under control.

Finally, the word from the FBI came. I was to go to the U.S. Court House at Foley Square and there an FBI agent would meet me. I recall my fright and despair as I walked down the long, endless corridors of the building accompanied by the agent. With every step, I feli I was walking deeper into a dungeon from which I would never emerge.

NOT KNOWING what to expect, I was amazed at the courtesy and kindness of the FBI men, so startling a contrast from the harshness and arrogance of the Russian secret police agents. I recited in detail the history of my years in the Communist movement and in the spy underground and was advised to continue my contacts under FBI supervision.

The unmasking of the gigantic conspiracy got under way. I supplied the FBI with the gaps in the vast amount of information the bureau itself had compiled.

Then, in June, 1917, the grand jury probing Communist activities and espionage began their deliberations and I spent many months testifying before that group. After a while, I lost contact completely with the espionage apparatus and the Soviet agents, apparently aware of what I was doing, made no effort to get in touch with me.

THE FOLLOWING YEAR, I

received subpenses from Congressional investigating bodies and I repeated my story to them. Two armed guards were assigned to me around the clock. Strangely enough, I had by this time lost all fear of Communist reprisal. Things were happening too fast. Fortunately, I had no time to worry about my personal safety.

worry about my personal safety. In September, 1948, I began lecturing to various groups across the country.

IN 1949 and 1950, I taught political science at Mundelein College in Chicago. Some time after that, I came to the College of the Sacred Heart in the bayou country of Louisiana, where I am now, as I write these words.

Here, I teach American government and Romance languages. Here, I have finally found peace and contentment as the days pass quietly and without incident.

What more can I say now? I have been asked what should be the attitude of the American people toward the Communist who recants, how I feel about those whom I have named to the FBI and the investigating committees.

I.ET ME SAY first that I have pity, not hate, in my heart for those former colleagues of mine who still cling to the monstrous doctring that has enslaved them.

doctrine that has enslaved them.

Then, let it be remembered that to deny that a former Communist can see the light and seek to restore himself to the society of decent men, is to impugn our entire concept of reform and rehabilitation. The FBI is completely capable of evaluating the sincerity of an ex-Communist and its verdict can be relied upon.

For myself. I hope that I need no longer retell my story to investigating committees. America has at last been alerted. This alert must be sustained, the dalegers of Communist espionage cannot be minimized and never, at least in the foresecable future, must we let down our guard.

However, in other instances, it was not possible to ascertain the exact identity of the individual.

In order that the identity of persons so mentioned may be clarified in order that proper action may be taken by the NYO, the following information is being set out and New Orleans is being requested to contact Miss BENTLEY to obtain the indicated clarification:

On Pages 41, 42 and 43 of the book, she refers to an "advanced student - who I shall call Edwin - at Union Theological Seminary" to whom she had been introduced by one ARPOLITATCH.

The purpose of this introduction was to enable BENTLLY to co-sign FWIN'S application in the Party. She further mentioned that EDWIN had discussed his prospective CP membership with Dr. HARRY who, according to EDWIN, had appeared to give his approval to EDWIN'S action in joining the CP. In her manuscript, this

student was originally called hay DER, then changed by penciled notes to "HARPY SCHULLER." hiss BENTLLY should be asked if she recalls the correct name of this individual and for any other information she may recall concerning him, both as to his activities and for the purpose of establishing his identity.

Also on Page 43, she refers to two other students at Union Theological Seminary who also joined the CP, their applications for Party membership having been signed by her. One of these individuals was referred to by her as a "prospective preacher who, like ELWIF, had not yet been ordained." New Orleans should question miss BENTLLY to ascertain whether or not she can furnish other information concerning this individual.

The other recruit mentioned in this regard was referred to by her as follows:

"The other was a minister who had been doing missionery work in Japan for several years and had returned to the U.S. to take a few refresher courses."

She goes on to state that she was worried about this person joining the CP inasmuch as he expected to return to Japan and she knew that the CP was illegal in that country. She should be asked to furnish any descriptive or other data in her possession concerning this person.

On Page 190 of her book she refers to "reports from Yasha's (JACO" GOLOS') undercover men in the Amtorg Corporation" which she said dealt with shady business transactions that were sabotaging the Soviet war effort. Miss Renable should be asked if she has any other information regarding the identity of GOLOS' contact in Amtorg.

On Pages 73 and 74, Miss BLNTLLY refers to "Comrade C" who accompanied her to the residence of JULIIT STUART TOYNT CLAZER. Comrade is referred to in the text as "a representative of the Harlem Section of the CP." Miss MENTLEY should be asked to identify "Comrade C" and Turnish such other information that she may recall concerning this individual.

Referenced Air-Tel instructed that NY should carefully review ELIZABETH BENTLEY'S book "Out of Bondage" to insure there is no other information which expands upon or differs with data she has furnished the Bureau during interviews. NY was also instructed to make sure that all pertinent data in her book is channelized to appropriate individual files.

As a result of this review presently being conducted by the NYO, a number of names are mentioned which, for various reasons, Miss BENTLEY has chosen to conceal for use in her book. In several instances, examination of the manuscript of the book which Miss, BENTLEY has made available has resulted in the obtaining of the correct identity of the individual mentioned. However, in other instances, it was not possible to ascertain the exect identity of the individual.

In order that the identity of persons so mentioned may be clarified in order that proper action may be taken by the NYO, the following information is being set out and New Orleans is being requested to contact Miss BENTLEY to obtain the indicated clarification:

On Pages 41, 42 and 43 of the book, she refers to an "advanced student - who I shall call Edwin - at Union Theological Seminary" to whom she had been introduced by one ARROLD PATCH. The purpose of this introduction was to enable BENTLEY to co-sign ELWIN'S application in the Party. She further mentioned that EDWIN had discussed his prospective CP membership with 1r. HARRY WARD, who, according to ELWIN, had appeared to give his approval to EDWIN'S action in joining the CP. In her manuscript, this

student was originally called HAYDEN, then changed by penciled notes to "HARRY SCHULER." Miss BENTLLY should be asked if she recalls the correct name of this individual and for any other information she may recall concerning him, both as to his activities and for the purpose of establishing his identity.

Also on Page 43, she refers to two other students at Union Theological Seminary who also joined the CP, their applications for Party membership having been signed by her. One of these individuals was referred to by her as a "prospective prescher who, like ELWIN, had not yet been ordained." New Orleans should question hiss BINTLEY to ascertain whether or not she can furnish other information concerning this individual.

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"The other was a Minister who had been doing missionary work in Japan for several years and had returned to the U.S. to take a few refresher courses."

She goes on to state that she was worried about this person joining the CP inasmuch as he expected to return to Japan and she knew that the CP was illegal in that country. She should be asked to furnish any descriptive or other data in her possession concerning this person.

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On Pages 73 and 74, Miss BINTLEY refers to "Comrade C" who accompanied her to the residence of JULIET STUART POYNTZ GLAZER. Comrade C is referred to in the text as "a representative of the Earlem Section of the CP." Miss PENTLEY ahould be asked to identify "Comrade C" and furnish such other information that she may recall concerning this individual.

On Pages 34, 36 and 38, Miss BENTLEY referred to a woman, "Comrade H" who was employed by the Home Relief Bureau

in New York City and to whom Miss SENTLEY was referred upon her transfer from the Columbia University Unit of the CP to the Harlem Section. Miss FINILEY should be requested to furnish further identifying information concerning "Comrade H".

On Pages 59, 60, 61, 62 and 64, Miss BINTLEY referred to a "Comrade LANE", member of the Columbia University CF Unit who was subjected to Party discipline and whom she later observed in the company of JULIET POYNTZ GLAZER. It is believed that the name "Comrade LANE" may actually refer to MATE GPAUBARD inasmuch as she refers to him as "MARE" in the manuscript. GRAUBARD is well known to the Bureau and has recently been cooperative with the Bureau. Miss BENTLEY should be asked to identify Comrade LAND and if he is some person other than GRAUBARD, she should furnish all descriptive information in her possession.

On Fage 184, Miss BENTLEY related details concerning a visit which she paid to the residence of FARL BROWNER and mentioned that a woman employed in BROWNER'S residence was called "NYANYA." Miss BENTLEY should be requested to furnish any additional descriptive data which she may have concerning this individual, including her correct name if she knows it.

On Page 224 and 225, Miss BENTLEY refers to a Russian girl employed at World Tourists whom she calls "EDITH". She should be asked to identify this individual.

A review of the book "Out of Bondage" written by HIIMARIN CHEMILY, revealed that on page 104 Miss BENTLM stated that on annerous occasions she entertained visiting Canadian functionaries including SAM CAPR. On page 150 she states that a party whom she called MARCHD SLOAN in her book, but who was identified in the manuscript as MARCH CIFE, was highly recommended by SAM CAPR and CIFE THEM, leaders of the Canadian CI. Based on this recommendation, MARCH SICE was well by the espionage organization of AMOR GOLA.

It should be noted that in the case entitled "MALE FIGH", this information was pointed out to the Eureau and the New Orleans Office was requested to reinterview DLIGADSMI BURTLYX to clarify this information.

It is suggested that the 1km Orleans Office, at the time Miss BENTLEY is questioned concerning NACON SIDE, also question her concerning any information she may have regarding SAT CARR. In this connection it is noted that ILDARAM BANTLY was never questioned specifically concerning TAY CARL and any information she may have furnished the 1MO in the past concerning him would have been incidental to information furnished concerning some other party.

There is bein; set out below information which appears in LIZABETH BENTLY's book "Out of Bondage" which does not expend or differ from information which the furnished the Bureau concerning RECINSTON, but is information she did not furnish nor was she requested to furnish concerning the personal problems she encountered in her dealings with RECINSTON and her discussion with GOLOG of this problem and also information concerning GOLOG' remarks to her when RECINSTON was about to be recruited.

On page 173 of her book the states in part, "Kuny of them were definitely 'problem children', due to their youth and norvousness about undercover activities. One of these was WILLIAM W. REMINGTON when we always referred to as our 'infant prodigy'."

On this page she gives information concerning GOIOS: remarks whon he came to see her about RAMINATOM, as follows:

"I think we've got another good contact", he said hopefully. "Not only is he a reliable Communist but he's brilliant in his own field and should go far in the government. Moreover, he's got a good solid middle class background - fine family, education in well known schools - and he has a reputation for being respectable. I doubt if any of his friends or acquaintances have the slightest suspicion that he has any radical tendencies. I don't know how useful his present job will prove. But with proper training we can always move him into some more productive government agency. I'm going to introduce you to him and his wife and you can make arrangements to see him in Washington."

On pages 180 and 181 she talks about her personal problem with REMINSTON as follows:

"It was difficult to get him to bring out carbon copies of doonments. Usually he would jet the information down on small scrape of paper, giving them to be furtively and with many admonitions about not letting them fall into the wrong hands. Moreover, lacking the courage to break with the Party

"and refuse to continue his undercover activities, he often resorted to elaborate and quite transparent subterfuses to avoid doing his Communist duties. He would deprecate the value of the information that he gave, saying that it wasn't worth bothering with. He would be tied up in non-existent conferences on the days when I was in Lashington, or he would be simply unreachable. All this reminded me very strongly of a small boy trying to avoid mowing the lawn or cleaning out the furnace when he would much rather go fishing. Sometimes I would suggest hopefully to YAMIA that we ought to return BILL to the open Party. The would say firmly. While the material he is producing is not outstanding, it does help to corroborate or supplement what we are getting through the SIINTERSTERS, and, besides, there is still the possibility that we can push him into a really good position.

"Despite my private conviction that UASIA was wrong, I continued the painful process of trying to extract information from BIHL. This was further complicated by the fact that both he and his wife were seemingly trying to get into left-wing or Communist front organizations, doubtless in the hope that by becoming well known as Reds they would lose their value to our organization and be sent back to the open Party. Although I teld them sternly to avoid any such activities, I could never be sure they carried out my orders. I began to feel that the HEMITIBIENT were more both a then they were worth, particularly in view of the many other contacts I had to handle."

It is not believed by the INO that the above information materially adds to the information Miss BUNTLEY furnished the Rureau concerning REMINITON which resulted in his successful prosecution.

Therefore, a copy of instant letter is not being directed to the New Orleans Office setting out a lead to have Miss BUNTLLY interviewed.

In connection with Holen Tenney, she was introduced to Golos (JACOB Golos) by Grace Granish who was I believe in the Editorial Department of Intercontinent News which is located somewhere in New York City. I am unable to state whether Granish furnished any information to Golos but do know, however, that it was through Granish that Golos met and knew Helen Tenney." (HELEN TENNEY formerly worked with GSS and was one of the subjects in the NATHAN GROSSAY SIEVERMASTIC investigation).

Referenced wirtel instructed that LLI MPETH PENTLEY's book, "Out of Bondage," be reviewed to insure that the book contained no information expanding upon or differing from data Miss HENTLEY hes furnished the Bureau.

On page 237 of her book Miss ENTLEY relates a conversation she had with EARL PROMIER regarding a "group to be turned over to our friends." Miss PENTLEY identifies "our friends" as the Russians. She relates that FROWDER then told her that the group had in the past been handled by JOHN AFT und material had passed through him, FROWNER, to GOLOS, but that ABT was going to take over a fairly public position and it would be too dangerous to continue on that way.

In connection with GOLOS, mentioned above, it should be noted that Miss PENTLEY had previously mentioned that JACOF GOLOS, whom she called "YASHA," was the contact to whom she passed espionage material prior to his death in November, 1943.

Miss BENTLLY then went on to describe her contacts with the VICTOR PERLO group, the members of which she first met at JOHN APT's apartment in approximately March, 1944.

A review of the information previously furnished by Miss FENTLEY to the Pureau regarding JOHN ABT reveals that she never before specifically referred to BROW DER's statement in which he related to her that naterial passed from ABT to EROWILER to GOLOS. This statement would appear to indicate that ABT was operating as a courier.

It is to be noted that ABT, among others, was described by Miss EENTLEY as a courier in a list submitted to the Sonate Judiciary Committee and made public 6/6/49. 134.435-

For the information of New Orleans, COHN APT is a lawyer who is considered a key figure in CP activities in the New York Division. APT has acted as attorney for the CP in hearings before the SACB and his been very active in CP meetings. In 1944 and until the cime of its dissolution, APT was General Counsel of the CIO - PAC and also was General Counsel of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers Union under SIDNEY HILLMAN. ABT worked for various government agencies, including the AAA and WPA, starting in 1933 and ending in approximately 1938. It has been alleged that APT was active in the MARCLD WARE espionage group in washington, D. C. APT is married to JESSICA SMITH, HARGLD WARE's widow.

It is requested that New Orleans interview EIIZAPETP TENTILEY and ascertain all information in her possession regarding the subject's activity as a courier of espionage material and the source of such information.

Referenced air-tel instructed that ELIZABETH BENTLY'S book "Out of Bondege" be reviewed to insure there is no other information (contained in the book) which expends upon or differs with data which she has furnished the Bureau, and that all pertinent data in the book be channelized to appropriate individual files.

Information appearing in the book concerning the about individual on pages 105, 121 and 122 differs in some respect from that appearing in ELIZ-33. The BENTERY's signed statement dated 11/30/45 (65-14603-264 p.11).

It is to be noted that in BENTLLY's book on page 105 paragraph 2 she states that she was introduced to ROST ARRIVED by J/COB GOLOD as "'ELIZABETH,' a good and trusted commade". BARREY stated in her book she was to go out to RO. H's house every so often to pick up whatever mail she had.

In her statement BENTLEY recorded that she learned during a luncheon dinner with GOLOS and LEOPOLO ARENAL and his wife HELEN AREN L that LEOPOLO AREN L's brother married ROSE AREN L and that ROSE was living some place in Brooklyn. The stated that "GOLOS informed me that LEOPOLO AREN L in Mexico would send communications to ROME ARENAL in Brooklyn and instructed me to obtain these letters from her and deliver them to him".

It would appear from Bill HEBY's book that ROLD REH in was cognizant of the fact that she was dealing with Communists which was never reported explicitly in her statement.

On pages 121 and 122 in the above-mentioned book, BHTELY states concorning the subject at the time she learned of the death of THOTSKY's chauffeur the following: "I.....telephoned ROLE ARLHAL to see if she had any letters. The rounded tense

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"and as if the were on the verge of hysteria. 'No,' she said. 'There's nothing. But please come see me this evening. Some shing terrible has happened.'

BENTLEY then goes on to say how she discovered in the evening paper the report of the mirder of ROBERT CHELDON NARTH, TROTERY's personal guard.

She then reports that GOLOS ordered her to "breck off all connections with ROLE immediately". GOLO, according to the book, then stated concerning the subject "She's probably under suspicion alredy, being BUIS's wife. Maybe he's even hiding out there. I just hope she doesn't go to pieces and talk too much."

In her statement BENTLEY merely stated "At the vine of the marder of TROTAKY's chauffeur.....I ceased to receive any communication from NOLE RENAL."

It is felt that BENTLEY expands on the activities of ROLL FRENT in her book. The above excerpts from PENTLLY's book implies that ROLE ERENIL seemed to be ewere that she was connected in some way with the murder of TROTLKY's chaiffeur.

It is to be noted that HOLL AREMAL in an interview at the NYO in April, 1951 stated that it was after the attempt on the life of LEON TROTERY in May, 1940 that she felt that the letters she turned over to BERTLEY might have concerned the attempted assassination. The also stated that as far as she know LUIS ARENAL, her husband, was not a member of the CP and she tated further that she, herself, never was nor is she now a member of the Communist Party.

It is to be further noted that by letter dated 11/16/51 the ULA, EDNY, advised that the IREN L case was being placed in a closed status in that office.

The New Orleans Office is requested upon interviewing PBHNTLMY to determine her recollection of how she was introduced to ROLE CRENAL and whether she feels that GRENAL was being used as a mail drop for the CP and whether GOLOS actually made the statement reported above or whether it was morely dramavization in her book.

Referenced air-tel instructed that W.IZABETH BENTLEY's book, "Out of Bondage," be reviewed to insure there is no other information (contained in the book) which expands upon or differe with data which she has furnished the Bureau, and that ell pertinent data in the book is channelized to appropriate individual files.

Information appearing on page 153 of the book, concerning the above individual, is in essence the same as that furnished by Miss BURLEY, and set out in the report of SA MARRICE A. TAYLOR, entitled "BEPRICE LEVIN, was," and dated 5/19/49, at New York.

The information set out on page 158 of Miss BINTLEY's book differs, however, with the information she furnished to the Bureau, in that in her book she states that BERNICE LAYID (whom she refers to as BERNICE LANDER) "became involved in a disappointing love affair which left her weep; and hervous. We therefore decided to drop nor as a contact and let her return to the open Party. This she did, later turning up in the 'street' unit to which belonged ANGELA CALOMIRIS, the plucky little Greek girl who for seven years worked undercover for the FBI in the Communist movement."

The information which Miss BENTUTY furnished the Bureau makes to mention of the fact that the subject was dropped as a contact because she was recept and pervous, and returned to the open Party, nor is it mentioned that she turned up in the same "street" unit as ANGONA CALOMERIC.

The aforementioned report of SA TAYLOR reflects that Miss B ETTLEY stated that BERKICE LIVIN furnished information to her until the middle of 1942, and that sometime in 1942, THYIN mentioned to her that she did not care for Mashington, D. C., and anticipated returning to New York City. Shortly thereafter,

Miss BENTURY lost contact with LEVIN, and did not hear from her again until 1943. It was at this time that JACOB GOLOS mentioned to her that LEVIN was working for the Tass News Agency in New York City.

In view of the fact that the information set out in Miss BENTLEY's book does not differ substantially from the information she furnished to the Bureau, and does not in any way affect the subject's security index status, no lead is being set out to the New Orleans Office to interview Miss BENTLEY.

I. On pages 165 and 166 of her book, BENT MY wrote concerming STLVFRMAN:

"Even more than HARRY (WHITE) he was nervous and worried about his esnionage activities; although he was a Communist of long standing, the realization that he was giving information to the Russian Secret Police gave him the jitters. He was offered a Colonelcy in the Army but, possibly fearing a court-martial if he were found out, he refused to accept it, remaining a civilian employee. His caution drove him to insist that GhEG (SILVERMASTER) go up to New York and deliver the ratorial to the Russians there, in the strange belief that that would be a safer procedure."

In BENTLEY's first statement to the Bureau dated 11/8/45, she stated in regard to SILVERMAN:

He looks as though he were scared of his shadow. He is jumpy. He is one of those people they have trouble with, they tell me, because he gets scared. He is an old Communist Party member. I believe he has been at least fifteen or twenty years in the movement.

In BINGLIY's statement to the Bureau dated 11/30/15. she stated that SJINVKHAN and ULIMAN were both members of came Communist Party unit in Washington, D.C. She said STIVEN AF

did not in fact know documents he brought were being photographed. She believed it was his impression that SIIVERMANTEL would read the documents, commit them more or less to memory and verbally pass on the contents thereof to EARL BROWDIR. BENTLEY was of the positive opinion that although SILVERMAN may have heard of GOLOS, he had no knowledge that such material was in fact being received by GOLOS.

## II. In her book, BENTIEY wrote (page 166):

"One time we had a very narrow escape. As I sat in the kitchen talking to FFLEW SILVERMASTER, GEORGE (SILVERMAN) arrived quite unexpectedly at the front door, his briefcase bulging with papers he had abstracted from the Pentagon. It was inevitable that we run into each other, and if he discovered that I was a Soviet agent, he would undoubtedly bolt out of the house in a panic and never return. With commendable presence of mind, HETEN introduced me as Mrs. Something-or-Other; a personal friend of hers. GFCKGF seemed slightly reassured, but I shall never forget the initial look of terror that came over his face. indeed, frightened of his own shadow. He saw F.H.T. men behind every bush, and he would arrive at an appointment dripping with cold sweat, yet somehow - I could never figure out how - he kept on poing. Periodically he would threaten to resign, and wearily the SILVERMACTERS would invite him over for a meal of his favorite broiled lobster. Then, when he was well fed and at peace with the world, they would argue him into continuine."

In BENTLEY's statement to the Fureau dated 11/30/45, she advised that FILVERMAN was at the SILVERS ASTERS home very often, and after being assigned to the Pentagon he began to bring documents to the FILVERMANTER home.

She stated that in the late summer of 1943, a steadily increasing volume of material was being obtained by ULIMAN and SILVERMAN, and a considerable volume of this

material was brought to the CII.ERMARTH home in its original form - the documents themselves.

PENTINY said the saw FILVIAMAN on one occasion, but had never formally met him.

In subsequent interviews with BENTLEY she advised agents that the only time she saw SILVERMAN was in the spring of 1944 on the occasion of her being present at the SILVERMANTERS residence and SILVERMAN arrived. She recalled that she spent most of the time that particular evening with HELEN IIVERMANTER in the kitchen, and that SILVERMAN and CIIVERMANTER and perhaps ULIMAN were in the living room. When SILVERMAN was leaving, however, he walked through the kitchen and FELEN SILVERMANTER casually introduced BENTLEY to him under a fictitious name.

It is further noted that in ECUA learings on 6/4/46, BENILFY testified that she was sitting in the kitchen of the SILVERY ANTER home, that SILVERY AN had come in the front door with some material and was leaving by the kitchen door. She said he went past very hurriedly and she was introduced by some name as being a friend of HELEN SILVERMASTER.

At these hearings, BENTLLY stated that the STILDERS told her that SILVERMAN as usual had come to bring material and that they, the SILVERMANTERS, were quite upset that see use there. The stated that they did not want her to neet other members of the group particularly SILVERMAN, who was extremely nervous and testified that SILVERMAN realized who she was see would probably fall to pieces.

She testified that the SITYFRMATTERS said SILVERMAN was very much concerned with what he was engaged in.

JII. In BENTLEY's book (page 172) she mentions ULLMAN graduating from Officers Candidate School as a

Lieutenant in the Air Corns, and then writes:

"Then, with GFONGF SITVERMAN and PANNY WHITE desperately nulling strings, he (ULIMAN) was finally assigned to the Fentagon in Washington, where he became even more valuable to us than he had been in the Treasury.

In BENTLEY's statement to the Bureau dated 11/30/k5, she mentions ULTMAN being commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Ferce and said she recalled that CITVERMARTER was most anxious that ULTMAN be assigned to the Pentagon and further that through GU RGE STIVERMAN he was in fact applied to the Pentagon.

IV. In BENTUET's book (page 240) she mentions that PULL had been worrying the SILVERMASTER group for a long time and wrote:

"Fomchow he had discovered that GEORGE CITYERMAN was a Communist, and he had been trying to get information from him; unfortunately, his methods were, to may the least, lacking in tact. Every so fitten he would march up to GEORGE and say to him Have you got anything for JOE?! - obviously referring to JOE STATIN. At this, GEORGE would take to his heels and flee in panic."

In BINTLEY's statement to the Bureau dated 11/30/65, she said that mention had previously been made to her of PERIO by SILVERMANTER who used to complain that the activities of Pikto in washington were upsetting the SILVERMAN.

From the above it appears that LENTINY in most instances has furnished the Bureau with substantially the same information as contained in her book, although it is noted she has expanded upon and colored the material.

BENTLEY's statements "That he was giving information to the Russian Secret Police gave him the fitters, and that he insisted SILVERMASTER go up to New York and deliver the material to the Russians there", appears in complete variance with her statements to the Bureau that she believed SILVERMAN was under the impression the information he gave was being

furnished verbally by SITAPRMANTER to BROWLER.

It also does not appear that BEMITEM has advised the Eureau regarding SILVERMAN being offered a Coloneley.

In accordance with Bureau instructions it is therefore requested that New Orleans review all of the above material with BENTLEY for clarification of the points in question and fully develop any additional facts and may possess concerning FILVERMAN.

Reference New York let 12/14/53 requesting New Haven compare the information supplied by ELIZABETH BENTLEY in her statements to the Bureau with information set forth in her book "Out of Bondage," to determine whether any conflict exists and whether all material set forth in the book has been furnished the Bureau. The pertinent passages with respect to the subject were set forth on pages 193, 195, 203, 212 and 258 of the book, which pages were furnished as an enclosure to referenced letter.

BENTLEY's statement of November 30, 1945 to agents of the New York Office is not available in the files of the New Haven Office. The pertinent portion thereof is set forth in the summary report in the captioned case dated November 9, 1953 at New York. A comparison of this excerpt with pertinent passages in the book reveal no specific conflict. However, two items are referred to in the book which do not appear to have been fully explored in BENTLEY's statements to agents as revealed in the New Haven file: the first being the assertion on page 193 of the book that MILDRED (COY) was "the organizer of the Communist unit which functioned in the Institute of Pacific Relations..." It is felt that Miss BENTLEY may be able to furnish added detail on this unit. such as the makeup of its membership, its leadership, its use in information gathering on behalf of Soviet networks or by the CP, USA.

"Out of Bondage" indicates that MILDRED PRICE served as a talent spotter for GOLOS' network (p. 203). The New Haven file on the subject reflects only one recruitment by the network on the basis of MILDRED PRICE COY's suggestions -- MICHAEL GREENBERG. It is felt BENTLEY should be specifically questioned as to whether others were attempted on the basis of the subject's talent spotting.

New Orleans is requested to reinterview Miss BENTLEY with respect to the above two items at an early date.

No additional leads are being act out for the New Orleans Office to interview BESTLEY at this time.

Referenced Air-Tel instructed that ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY's book "Out of Bondage" be reviewed to insure that there is no other information in the book which expands upon or differs with data which she has furnished to the Bureau.

On pages 158 and 259 of "Out of Bondage", she refers to "a man whom I shall call HAROLD SLOAN, a young Canadian whom I contacted over a year and a half——" Examination of Miss BENTLEY's manuscript for the book reflects that the name was originally that of the subject HAZEN SIZE.

Comparison of the material in the book with information furnished by Miss BENTLEY, concerning SISE, in her signed statements of November 30, 1945, and during an interview by SA LESTER O. GALLAHER on September 26, 1951, reflects that her statements to the Bureau Agents and material in the book are essentially comparable with the exception below:

In the book she stated SISE had been recommended for trustworthiness by TIM BUCK and SAM CARR, leaders of the Canadian Communist leaders, where as in her statements to Bureau Agents, she has stated that she believed SISE had been placed in contact with JACOB GOLOS by means of a letter of introduction from FRED ROSE, the Canadian Communist who most frequently corresponded with GOLOS. She stated that the basis of her belief that this letter of introduction was from ROSE stems from the fact that he more frequently corresponded with GOLOS than did BUCK or CARR (who also corresponded with GOLOS), although she did not actually know the letter was from ROSE, since she did not see it.

New Orleans is requested to ask Miss BENTLEY the basis for her statement that SIS had been recommended for trustworthiness by TIM BUCK and SAM CARR.

Reference is made to our nemorands of August 27, 1951, September 8, 1951, and October 3, 1951, in the matter captioned Lester B. Pearson, with alias Nichael Pearson.

This is to advise that in her book "Out of Bendage, on pages 158 and 259, Elizabeth Bentley refers to "a man whom I shall call Harold Sloan, a young Canadian whom I contacted over a year and one half ... " Examination of Miss Bentley's manuscript for the book reflects that the name was originally that of the subject of this communication, Masen Size. Com- z parison of the material in the book with information furnished by Hiss Bentley regarding Sise in her signed statement of November 30, 1945, and during an interview on September 26, 1951, reflects that her statements to Bureau agents and material in the book are essentially the same with the following exception: In the book she stated Sise had been recommended for trustworthiness by Tim Buck and Lam Carr, leaders of the Canadian Communist Farty, whereas in her statements to Bureau agents she stated that she believed Sise had been placed in contact with Jacob Golos by means of a letter of introduction from Fred Rose the Canadian Communist who corresponded with Golos most frequently She stated that the basis of her belief that this letter of introduction was from Rose was the fact that he corresponded with Golos more frequently than did Buck or Carr. She said she did not actually know that the letter was from Rose since she had not seen it.

Efforts are being made to determine from Miss Bentley the basis for her statement that Sise had been recommended for trustworthiness by Tim Buck and Mcm Carr. Upon receipt of this information it will be made available to you.

Referenced Airtel instructed that ELIZABETH BENILEY'S book, "Out of Bondage" be reviewed to insure there is no other information contained in the book which expands upon or differs with data which she has furnished the Bureau, and that all pertinent data in the book be channelized to appropriate individual files.

References to the above captioned individual were found in the book on pages 4, to 11, through 31, 35, 61, 62, 63, 80, 86 and 90 under the name LFE FUHR. This data was compated with data furnished by ELIZABETH BENTLEY in her signed statement dated November 30, 1945. References contained in the book which appear to expand upon or differ with material are attached to this letter. Because of the large number of individuals involved and the extremely large volume of information furnished by Miss BENTLEY, it was not possible to compare the information from the book with the total information furnished by her concerning each individual. In other instances the information has been routed to the case files and the material from the book is being reviewed and compared by agents handling these cases with information appearing in the files which has been furnished by BENTLEY.

In instances where offices other than NY are origin, excerpts from the book have been forwarded to the offices of origin for purposes of making this comparison. A review of the NY file in instant case reflects that the Bureau is office origin by virtue of the subject's residence in Mexico. This review also reflects that the NYO file is not complete enough to enable an adequate comparison of the attached material. It is therefore believed the Bureau as office of origin may find it desirable to have this comparison made at the Bureau or may wish to designate another office having a more complete file on the subject to handle this matter. Leads to clarify the information contained in BENTLEY'S book should be directed to the New Orlean's office in which district BENTLEY is presently residing.



Referenced air-tel instructed that ELIZABETH BENTLEY'S book "Out of Bondage" be reviewed to insure there is no other information contained therein which expands upon or differs from data which she has furnished the Bureau and that all pertinent data be disseminated to appropriate individual files.

The references pertaining to captioned subject which appear in the book on Pages 162, 244 and 247 were compared with previous information furnished by ELIZABETH BENTLEY. While it is thought that the information on Page 244 describing WILLIAM WEINTR as "the head of the Party's Finance Committee" with whom Miss BENTLEY had "dealt in connection with the future reorganization of World Tourists" is related to information furnished by Eiss BENTLEY as set forth in the report of SA HARCLE V. KERNEDY, 1/7/46 at NY entitled "NATHAN, GREGORY SILVERMAGTER, Espionage - R, (see below) it is believed that further clarification on this point would be helpful.

The information previously furnished by Miss BENTLEY and set forth in the above described report is as follows:

"In respect to the corporate affairs of "world Tourists, Inc. the informant declared that immediately prior to March 15, 19th there was considerable discussion among the various persons associated with the firm relative to filing of the annual corporation tax return. This was complicated because of the fact that GCLOS was the only stockholder and that no administration had been had of his estate. Involved in these discussions were SOL COHEM, previously mentioned, WILLIAM WEINER and MORRIS GREENBERG, an accountant, had handled some physical matters for the concern; they tentatively decided to effect an antedated stock transfer which would result in making it appear on the corporation's stock book that ARNOLD FINKELBERG rather than GOLOS was the owner of all outstanding shares

of World Tourists, Inc. They discussed this procedure with EARL BROWDER, however, and after he advised that in his opinion it would be 'suicidal' they apparently abandoned the scheme and so far as informant knows the stock is still in the name of GOLOS."

For information of the New Orleans Office WILLIAG WEINER and JACOB M. GOLOS, who was Miss BFNTLEY'S superior in espionage operations, were both officers of World Tourists, Inc. WEINER for many years was President of the INO and more recently he was connected with New Century Publishers, Inc., a Communist publishing house. According to informant WEINER controls the financial operations of the CP-USA and reportedly has directed the establishment of Communist business enterprises for the purpose of obtaining funds for the CP.

The New Orleans Office is requested to interview Mirs BENTLEY fully concerning her knowledge of METRER 's various activities and specifically to have her clarify and elaborate upon her dealings with WEINER in connection with the "future of the organization of World Tourists."
