The reporter asked her to comment on her testimony.

"I don't want to get into this," she said. "I'd rather you read the record. The testimony of a witness before a body is worth more than an off-hand statement."

A review was made of the script entitled "Fred Beal" and the script entitled "Lou Rosser" in the Internal Security Section. These scripts were not found to be defective in any substantial way although it was pointed out that Rosser testified in Smith Act trials in both Los Angeles and New York and both cuses are now rending on appeal, and it might not be advantageous to the appeal of these cases to have Rosser publicized in such an article. Departmental clearance might be desirable up on the concursances.

Supervisor Thitson, of the Espience Section read the script concerning Elizabeth Rentley. He per ted out that it appeared to be highly fictionized and the names of the individuals referred to have been changed. However, he indicated there is a grave error in the script in which Bentley is shown to have been at work for the FBI as a "double agent" from August, 1943. This is a serious lerror because Elizabeth Bentley did not act as a "double agent" for the FBI beginning August, 1943. Jacob Golca, her superior and with whom she was intimate, did not die until November 27, 1943. Elizabeth Bentley admitted her espionare activities to the Bureau in November, 1945. She could have been considered acting as a "double agent" thereafter until December 7, 1945, when her Soviet superior, Anatoli Gromov, left for Koscow only by stretching the term "double agent" to include a person who meets with a foreign principal but receives no espionage assignment.

He also pointed out that the setting of August, 1943, as a date on which Bentiev became a "double agent" for the FRI might confuse the Soviets but also confuses the record.

On October 22, 1955, BENTLEY advised at Grand Coteau, La., that she had no dealings with Amtorg or Isidore Gibby Needleman, except for conversation (telephonic) with someone at Amtorg in 1941, who was possibly NEEDLEMAN, when Amtorg was trying to get her company, U. S. Service and Shipping Corp., to handle their business through Amtorg. She stated she mentioned the conversation to her superior, JACOB NATHAN GOLLOS, and heard nothing else from Amtorg. She stated the setting up of U. S. Service and Shipping Corp. was handled by GOLLOS who was then president of World Tourist, which then became a sub-agent of her company; that GOLLOS set up her company on behalf of Russian Secret Police and arranged for contract with Intourist; that she does not know AVERELL HARRIMAN personally, has never talked to him, and, so far as she knows, he had nothing to do with procurement of contract between her company and Intourist; that the law firm of Clark, Carr and Ellis, 120 Broadway, did some legal work for her company in the way of obtaining licenses and insurance and it is her understanding this firm also represented AVERELL HARRIMAN. She stated she knew who NEEDLEMAN was from GOLLOS; however, aside from telephone call referred to above, she never had any contact with him at any time. She stated that after GOLLOS died Intourist lost interest in her company and the contract was cancelled; that although NEEDLEMAN probably had something to do with cancellation, she did not know it to be a fact. She stated that she knew of no American, who helped her company get the contract with Intourist; that contract worked out by GOLLOS.





On the night of November 14, 1955, I received calls from both Robert Morris and Elizabeth Bentley. Bentley called Morris and subsequently called me. She was pretty much agitated. Two months have elapsed and she has heard nothing of the offer of compromise on her income tax matter. I told her that I had assumed it had all been taken care of and I had heard nothing further. I inquired if she had been in touch with her attorney, Godfrey Schmitt. She said she had heard nothing from him for a month and a half. She had an intuition that something was wrong. She had just learned that Coleman Andrews had left Internal Revenue. I told her to see Schmitt. I told her we had heard nothing here. She was leaving on November 15 to go to Dallas to make some lectures and would be back this weekend. She was almost afraid to leave for fear Internal Revenue would start another action against her. I told her I thought she was being unduly concerned.

Morris told me that the problem was that there had been an offer of compromise; it has been accepted but the money has not been paid and he was going to talk to Godfrey Schmitt on November 15 and see what could be worked out.

ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY was contacted at Grand Couteau, Louisiana, on November 21, 1955. She said she has seen JAY LOVESTONE on only one occasion. This was in 1948, at Washington, D.C., while the House Committee on Un-American Activities was holding some of its hearings. She does not recall just how the meeting was arranged, but she believes LOVESTONE was also a witness at some of these hearings. He evidently expressed his desire to meet her to one of the Committee members.

One of the committee members whose name she does not recall brought LOVESTONE over to the Congressional Hotel where she was ataying to see her. She said the main thing that impressed her about LOVESTONE was the fact that he completely dominated the conversation. She does not recall specifically what they discussed, but she does remember that LOVESTONE expressed the opinion that the Communists of that period were "soft" and were a great deal different from the "rough and tumble" type he used to know.

Miss BENTLEY said she has had no further contact with LOVESTONE, RUC.

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

Dear Lou:

I am enclosing a copy of a letter, written to my attorney, Ocdfrey Schmidt, in reference to the affair of my 1951 income tax.

As you know, I have been anxious to settle up this matter for some time but for some reason that I do not understand things have dragged on for over six menths. None of this is any of my doing and I am getting a little weary of waiting patiently. It may very well be that my attorney is doing the best he can for me and is not writing because he has run into difficulties. but at least he owes me a report on the matter. Should the U.S. Treasury, perticularly in its present peculiar mood, pull another "fast one", it would be legally I who would be responsible for the long inactivity and not my lawyer, even though like most laymen I am completely dependent on someone who does know Therefore, I feel justified in issuing this ultimatum to him.

I am letting you know about my action in this matter because it is obvious that this affair of mine with the U.S. Treasury is not a question of an invividual U.S. citizen getting into difficulties with the government over mistakes in an income tax but because at present I seem to be Target No. 1 for my "old friends". Therefore this is a matter which equally concerns the F.B.I. or any other agency which is fighting subversion.

Probably there is nothing that you or anyone clse in the Bureau can do about this matter and I wouldn't expect that you could. However, if you do know anyone in authority in the Internal Hevenue Bureau who not only puts the interests of his country the interests of his politics and who in addition is sufficiently intelligent about international affairs to realize the implications of an affair such as this, I wish that you would let me know. I want no special favors, from the government; what I do want is a chance to settle this matter up equitably without giving further ammunition to the enemy.

A very Merry Christmas and my best wishes for the best next year yet. more power to the F.B.I.!!

PERSONAL AND CONFIDENTIAL

I thought that you might be interested in the following incident which has been called to the Eureau's attention on a very personal and confidential basis.

It is reported that on August 22, 1955. Mr. Ben Gincburg of the enate Subcommittee on Constitutional Rights upbraided a momber of the clerical staff of this committee by the name of Miss Simmons. Miss Elisabeth J. Hand. interceded on behalf of Miss Simmons who apparently was a subordinate of Miss Iland. It is reported that Miss Simmons was shocked at the manner in which Mr. Gin/burg spoke to her, and Mis/ Hand interceded and suggested to Mr. Gin/bur that he had said enough. At this point, Mr. Gin burg rushed at Miss Hand. It is reported that his arms were raised and Mis. Hand was terrified at the expression on his face and in a hysterical manner asked Gin-burg if he were going to hit her. At this point. Mr. Lon Hocker, the Counsel for the Subcommittee on Constitutional Rights, apparently attracted by the commotion, left the office of Mr. Marshall MacDuffie, a former Counsel, and entered the room where the fracas was taking place and is reported to have observed Ginaburg shouting at Miss Hand, forcing her back in between two desks. It is further stated that Ginzburg took the position that either Miss Hand had to be fired or he would leave the committee. Accordingly on the evening of August 42. 1955, Miss Hand was informed by Marshall MacDuffle that he was discharging her from her position on the committee at the direction of Mr. Lon Hocker.

It is reported that Miss Hand is very much disturbed over the manger in which she was discharged from the committee and has attempted to work out some kind of arrangement whereby she could return to the committee and then terminate her services without having a notation of being discharged on her record. Apparently the shift has been unwilling to do this, and there is some indication that Miss Hand might seek redress from other members of the Senate. It certainly seems rather plocking that this committee will tolerate such highlanded actions and, at the same time, be sitting in judgment on the Federal Employee Security

Irving Ferman has confidentially given me a copy of a lette addressed to Lon Hocker of the Hennings Subcommittée dated August 30, 1955, by Elisabeth J. Hand. The letter points out that she had been discharged unjustifiably by the Subcommittee; that on one occasion Ben Cinzburg rushed at her with his arms raised and a wild look on his fact. She was terrified and asked Ginzburg if he was going to hit her. The letter points out to Hocker that Hocker came out of the office of Marshall MacDuffie in time to see Ginzurg still hemming her in between the two desks and shouting at her. Miss Hand then pleads for another chance, and it really is quite a letter describing a sordid situation in a committee which purports to set itself up as a monitor of the Federal Employee Security Program.

Ferman told me in confidence that he is trying to get Miss Hand to talk to some friendly newspaperman and bring this out into the open. If she won't do this, then he will try to get her to talk to Senator O'Mahoney, whom he thinks will intervene -- in any event, he is trying to get this out in the open.

Ferman further told me that Langdon West, Senator Hennings' Administrative Assistant, was still trying to find out some way to investigate Elizabeth Bentley.

For the Bureau's information, on the night of January 7, 1956, Miss BENTLEY telephonically communicated with SA JULIAN A. MARTIN at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and stated she had received a call from the editor of the paper at Lafayette, Louisiana, asking her about a release by the AP in which BYRON N. SCOTT, Attorney of WILLIAM HENRY TAYLOR, had cast doubt on the veracity of BENTLEY's testimony concerning TAYLOR. She stated she had told the newspaper man nothing as she did not know the nature of the release.

Attached hereto is a news release which appeared in the State Times, daily newspaper, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, January 7, 1956, entitled "Testimony in Loyalty Case Eyed". It is a Washington, D. C., AP article.

On January 9, 1956, Miss BENTLEY read the attached article and stated that she feared it was the cpening barrage of an attack on her integrity by TAYLOR and his lawyer SCOTT; that now that TAYLOR was cleared by the hearing board he would continue to attack her. She expressed the opinion there might be some connection between TAYLOR and some officials of the United States Treasury Department, which has prevented the final settlement of the Treasury's claim against her. BACKGROUND:

Irving Ferman, the Washington representative of the American Civil Liberties Union, informed me that George Eddy, a former Treasury Department lemployee, is writing a book defending Harry Dexter White and discrediting testimony by Elizabeth Bentley and Whittaker Chambers. Ferman stated that Eddy, who formerly was involved in a Treasury Department security case and was represented by Byron Scott, was having difficulty in obtaining a publisher. Ferman stated Eddy was high in his praise of the Werley book on the Rosenberg case.

INFORMATION IN BUFILES:

Bufiles reveal that George Eddy, born 6-15-07, at East Orange, New Jersey, was the subject of loyalty investigation at the request of the Treasury Department on 12-11-53 to 3-10-54. The investigation was based on Eddy's association with Frank Coe, Lauchlin B. Currie and Harry Dexter White. The investigation substantiated this association and also revealed Eddy had exhibited a particular interest in the testimony of Elizabeth Bentley and Whittaker Chambers from a view of proving it to be erroneous. Eddy also offered financial assistance to Coe if he would testify fully. The results of the Bureau's investigation were disseminated to the Civil Service. Commission and the Department of Justice on 3-24-54.

Eddy was suspended from the Treasury Department 9-1-54. On 11-15-54, the Treasury Department advised the Bureau that Eddy circulated a letter to approximately 300 persons answering the charges. This letter contained erroneous allegations that the FBI had conducted a search of Eddy's office in November, 1953. On 12-6-54, during Eddy's hearings and in his presence, this allegation was shown to be false and a Secret Service agent testified that the search of Eddy's office was made by that agency. During Eddy's hearing, he denied that he had furnished certain information to Special Agents of the FBI when interviewed during the Bureau's investigations of William Henry Taylor and Virginius Frank Coe. Two Washington Field Office Agents testified at these hearings to refute Eddy's denial.

On 1-27-55, Bureau Agents advised Eddy and his attorney, Byron M. Scott, that the Bureau did not conduct a search of his office and inquired as to what action Eddy contemplated to retract this false allegation. Eddy and his attorney advised they would discuss the matter and would advise the Bureau what action they would take. On 2-15-55, a letter from Eddy was received indicating he still was not satisfied that his allegation was false. His letter was not acknowledged by the Bureau and no further action was taken.

The Security Hearing Board on May 31, 1955, decided the charges against Eddy were substantiated but did not constitute grounds for dismissal under Executive Order 10450. On June 14, 1955, the Treasury Department dismissed Eddy on grounds of suitability. Congressman Ralph Gwinn contacted Under Secretary of the Treasury W. Randolph Burgess on behalf of Eddy on June 21, 1955. As a result, Eddy was reinstated and allowed to resign effective June 30, 1955. On August 5, 1955, the Civil Service Commission notified the Bureau that the case on Eddy resulted in a favorable determination.

Eddy's main file reflects that he executed a personal history form for the Treasury Department which shows he was employed by the Journal of Commerce, New York, New York, in 1939, indicating he may have had some writing experience.



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
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

Dear Frs. Erb

My "Aunt" Ina has asked me to write you explaining a situation which I can't understand and at the same time asking your "help" as one Patriotic D.A.B. to another.

My daughters are attending the Cathedral School of St. Mary in Garden City, L.I. Bishop James P. De Wolfe resides across the street on Cathedral Avenue. This is their second year (and last - I am withdrawing them), the older girl is in 10th Grade, the younger in 8th Grade.

In January of this year when the F.B.I. Story was being reviewed a picture of Elizabeth Bentley appeared in the newspapers. She was recognized by students as one of the Faculty at the school! Immediately the Dean called a Mass Meeting - asking the students to keep it quiet - not to mention it to parents - she (Elizabeth Bentley) was rather like a heroine in having given facts to our Government etc.... My younger daughter has her for English.

Now, as the school has no active P.T.A. - and I'm not a resident of Garden City - I have been at a loss as to what action I should take. Finally, I wrote the Bishop on April 16th but to date I have received only a curt acknowledgment!

My contention is - the parents of girls who were to be in her classes should have been given a chance to vote on whether they wanted their daughters subjected to that sort of personelity. Certainly she has not been an admirable person - she became a stool-pigeon to save her own neck - and I repeat - she has been a weak and twisted personality. As a teacher I am not impressed by what my daughter reflects - (she is an Honor or Honorable Mention student). But, believe me, I am truly impressed, when, at the dinner table she starts a conversation with "Did you know Miss Bentley was a mistress etc... Did you know someone said they found a man murdered in her apartment when she was a Communist.... Did you know that her Autobiography has some real 'moments' in it...."

Do you, Mrs. Erb, think that someone who inspires that sort of talk and thinking among minors, grammar school children - is the sort of person to have on a Faculty? Doesn't that contribute toward delinquency? Don't you think the Bishop owes me an explanation?

I have two boys at the "Brother" school, St. Pauls. My older one has been there five years now. However, I believe I shall with-draw them as I have lost faith in the sort of Diocese that does not handle children and their parents thoughtfully....

Anxiously I await your comments and help.

ALICE MARTIN advised on 11/4 and 5/57, that during the period of the Spanish Civil War in 1935 and 1937, she worked as a messenger and secretary in a secret Ci organization; that she was known at this time as ALICE ALFERT. MARTIN advised that this organization was recruiting persons to fight in Spain; that during the course of her activities her superiors were BILL LAURE CE (tentatively identified as WILLIAM LAZAR, was; Bifile 100-1751) and A.W. MILLS (tentutively identified as identical with SAMFSON MILGROM, wa; Bufile 100-773). MARTIN advised that during this period (1935-1937) she was periodically ordered by LAWRENCE and MILLS to deliver to and pick up from JACOB GOLOS of World Tourists, Inc., gackages or Items which she, KANTIN, assumed were passports. MARTIN stated that on one occusion she was also instructed to go, from NYC to Washington, D.C. where she either received from Tiknown individual or delivered to an unknown individual, items which she assumed were pussports or money; that she

does not recall who this individual was or whether she knew him. MARTIN further stated she assumed the items were passports or money because of her belief that this person was probably a recruit who was being sent to Spain to fight for the Loyalists. MARTIN advised that to the best of her recollection, her contact at World Tourists, Inc., was always JACOB GOLOS.

For the information of the New Haven Office, MARTIN has advised that from 1937 to 1939, she was an open member of the CP, attending meetings in Scheneotudy, MY, and in the Williamsburg Section of Brooklyn, NY, and her husband was a paid CP official in both of those areas. ALICE MARTIN further stated that from 1939 to 1942. she received assignments to contact members of the CP underground, primarily for the purpose of collecting The stated that in 1944, she was given an assignment by BILL LAWRENCE to meet with a min for instructions. FARTIN advised that this mun whom she met was JACK SOBLE and that she furnished SOBLE, at his request, with information about Jewish persons and Jewish organizations with whom she was associated in NYC. MARTIN stated that she introduced her husband JANES to JACK SOBLE in approximately 1945; that at SOBLE's request her husband furnished SOBLE information about the American Legion and individual members of the American Legion.

MARTIN has steadfastly maintailed that she was never cognizant of the fact that she was engaged in espionage, and always assumed that her activities were being conducted for the CP underground.

JACK SOBLE (Mocase subject), a self admitted Soviet espionage agent, advised during interviews in 1957, that ALICE MARTIN did furnish him with information.

SOBLE stated that MARTIN, who was introduced to him by ESTHER HAND, (described by SOBLE as a person engaged in Soviet espionage) was cognizant of the fact that he, SOBLE, was a Soviet espionage agent, and that she, ALICE MARTIN, knew that the information she furnished would be transmitted to the Soviets.

SOBLE further advised that MANTIN had volunteered the services of herself and her husband JAMES at the time of her first meeting with SOBLE; that in subsequent meetings it was evident to SOBLE that MARTIN had previously worked for the Soviets because MARTIN furnished a written biography to SOBLE pertaining to one RICHAHD LAUTERBACH (deceased) in the manner and form used by Soviet agents.

ALICE MARTIN is described as follows.

Miss BENTLEY has advised this office that during the first week in March 1958 she suffered a "blackout" and she was placed in the Hartford Hospital, Hartford, Conn., under observation for a week. She was released from the hospital about March 15th and she was authorized by the doctor to resume her former schedule, that is, employment in an office of a construction company and courses at Trinity College in Hartford, evenings and Saturday. She advised that on March 19, 1958, this schedule was too much for her and she quit her job and advised the authorities at Trinity College that she was discontinuing her studies. At this point she doesn't know what she is going to do.

Miss BENTLEY advised that she received psychiatric examination during her stay in the Hartford Hospital - and this appears to have been the reason for her hospitalization. The doctor was obtained for her by Trinity College authorities. She stated that she left Trinity College one night after class and drove around for about an hour and wound up back at the college. This is as much detail as she furnished about her "blackout".

She has indicated that the psychiatrist suggested that she should try to put her past espionage activity out of her mind, suggesting that this be in part responsible for her difficulty. She has not said that she doesn't want to be contacted, in fact she has kept in contact with this office and wants to discuss her problems with the agents.

She has been advised that for the next 30 days the Bureau will make no demands upon her time in order to give her

Miss BENTLEY advised that she has now sold her residence at Madison, Connecticut, in order to obtain funds to pay her recent hospital and medical bills. She stated she is now living at the Highland Heights Orphanage, New Haven, Connecticut, where she is receiving her room and board while assisting the Catholic nuns there in handling the orphans.

Miss BENTLEY also related that she still plans to obtain her teacher's certificate in Connecticut, and is pursuing a course in education at Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut, and plans to take summer courses at Fairfield University, Fairfield, Connecticut, this summer and thus complete the requirements for the teacher's certificate.

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



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Information furnished by the new Haven Office reflected that HENTLEY had appeared at the New Haven Office on 5/21/50, at which time she indicated that she did not went to be interviewed again by the FEI; however, she agreed to tail to the New York Agents. SAS FRANCIS W. ZANGLE and WALTER C. ROETTING of the NYO and SA S. F. DUCIBELLA of the New Haven Office attempted to interview DENTLEY on 5/25/58 at the New Haven Office but she was not cooperative. She stated that she wanted to make a new life for herself and could not do so if she continued her contact with the FBI. She pointed out that she has been interviewed on numerous occasions during the past 13 years and that she has furnished the FBI everything she knows about the captioned subjects. She also indicated that she is doubtful thatshe could now recognize photographs of the subjects. During the course of the Interview LENTLEY did answer several questions concerning the subjects but nothing of value was obtained.

The New Haven Office will furnish the Bureau with a detailed summary of DERTLEY'S present attitude toward future interviews with the FBI.

Re New Haven letter to the Bureau 5-15-58, advising that Miss PENTLEY had visited the NHO, discussed her health and future plans, and agreed to meet NYO agents in connection with an espionage investigation between May 27 and May 30.

On May 26, 1958, FW TLEY was contacted at the Wighland Heights Orphanage at which time she agreed to meet the NY agents on May 28. 1958, and stated she preferred to see them at the New Haven Office. Miss BENTLEY displayed a friendly attitude and appeared to be in a happy frame of mind because she had just received payment from the sale of her home in Madison.

On the following day, May 27, 1958, Miss BENTLEY appeared at the New Haven Office. At the outset she stated that she did not want to sec the NY agents the following day, that she had felt for some time that she must forget and make a complete break with her past life. that she wanted to build a new life as a school teacher, that interviews with agents, INS and Government committees about her past always served to keep her in a highly nervous state, that she suffered severe headaches from this delving into the past and that she had now definitely decided that she must put a complete stop to this and go on notice that she was no longer available for these inquiries.

In view of BETTLEY's recent breakdown considerable time was spent in going over with her the importance of her information in the past and the highly important reasons for her continuing to be of assistance in matters where she can help. This seemed to dissipate her earlier opposition to continued interviews.

Fiss PENTLEY then agreed to come to the New Taven Office the following day for the interview with the MY agents and indicated that she would be willing to be contacted in cases which were of vital and pressing importance. She was assured that interviews with her in the future would be restricted to important cases and to matters wherein it could reasonably be expected that she would have knowledge.

On May 28, 1958, Miss FENTLEY appeared at the new Haven Office for the interview above-mentioned. BENTLEY appeared to be in a highly nervous state and immediately stated that she was very much upset and that she had now definitely decided that she would no longer be available for interviews into her past, that she had been under great strain, that it was incumbent that she regain her mental health and build a new career as a school teacher, that she felt it essential that she make a complete break with her past, that the recurrent delving into the past and the prospect of being asked about details of the past kept her in such a highly nervous and tense, emotional state that she was unable to plan and build a new life.

Control of the second

FRITLEY also stated that fourteen years had passed since her espionage activities, that her memory of past activities had naturally direct and that she no longer was able to recall details of events or persons, that she had furnished all information to the FRI at a time that it was fresh in her mind, and that now it was only with great difficulty and strain that she could think of the past.

After it was again pointed out to her how significant her information had been, and might be, she permitted the NY agents to ask her questions about the pending matter. The Bureau is being adviced of this matter by the NYO under reparate cover. For responses to questions were of a negative and non-informative nature. It also appeared that she had a negative attitude toward the inquiry.

At the conclusion of the inquiry by the NY agents, as BENTLEY was about to leave the New Haven Office she stated that this was "Goodby" and that she would be no longer available for interviews. She was asked if this meant whether she was no longer available even in the most urgent matters affecting the welfare of the country to which she replied that she would have to decide that when the occasion arose.

In view of her evident mental disturbance, and in view of the stand which she has taken, this office recommends that PETTEY not be contacted for six months and then if circumstances require another effort be made to enlist her cooperation. In the meanwhile PENTEY's attitude may correct itself if she is able to successfully readjust her personal life.

It is suggested that the Pureau notify the field that leads to contact RETLEY should only be authorized and approved by the Bureau.

Reference is made to your memo dated May 29, 1958, concerning the captioned individual. In view of the development set forth in your memo concerning Bentley's mental attitude, the Bureau is in agreement with your recommendation that Bentley not be contacted on a regular basis for a sixmonth period. At the end of that time the situation with respect to Bentley should be re-evaluated by your office. During the interim, and in the event it becomes necessary to contact Bentley because of some emergency situation the Bureau should be advised, and consideration will be given to authorizing contacts of an emergency nature.

At the present time it is not deemed advisable to notify all offices that leads to contact Bentley should be approved by the Bureau. Instead of following this plan you should forward to the Bureau any leads received to interview Bentley where they will be evaluated and appropriate advice given.



Special Agent Joseph Connors of the Washington Field Office, who handles liaison duties with the House Un-American Activities Committee, advised Wick this morning that Don Appel of the Committee desired the current, address of above-captioned. It appears the Committee intends to put her on the

payroll for performance of some work on a current project. They had employed her in 1955, Connors thought.

ACTION TAKEN:

After checking with the Domestic Intelligence Division, I had Wick tell Connors to inform Appel that Miss Bentley had asked to be let alone for approximately six months (as of approximately June 1 of this year) for the reason that she wants to start a new life as a school teacher; desires to forget the past; and was not well. This Connors did but he said Appel was not too pleased and might discuss the matter with Dick Arens with the hope that the FBI would change its mind and give the Committee Miss Bentley's address.

When our New Haven Office talked with Miss Bentley early this summer, Miss Bentley, in no uncertain terms, stated that only in a case of emergency did she desire to be contacted and we currently are respecting her wishes. Under the circumstances we are not in a position to disclose her whereabouts. She is in the New Haven territory and the House Committee could forward a letter to her last address which they have and it would in all probability be forwarded.

When last interviewed on May 28, 1958, BENTLEY stated positively that she had decided that she must put a complete stop to further. interviews with government agencies, including the FBI, and that she wanted to go on notice that she was no longer available for these in-uiries. At that time she stated that if there was any change in this decision of hers that she would advise this office. BENTLEY has not contacted this office since that time and this office has no indication of any change of attitude on her part.

When last seen, BENTLEY stated that she was planning to teach at the Sacret Heart Academy in Providence, R. I., in the Fall of 1958. It has been discreetly ascertained that she in fact has been teaching French at Mt. Saint Joseph's Academy, West Hartford, Conr., where she is currently located. BENTLEY has never notified this office of this employment.

In past contacts BENTLEY has continually pointed out that she was being questioned about persons and events having no relationship with her former operation; also that she had made a complete and all-inclusive statement to agents in New York detailing her activities and that this statement was much more reliable than her present recollection. Indiscriminate contacts at frequent intervals in matters not associated with the Gregory case have appeared to be a source of irritation to her.

Therefore, this office recommends that she not be contacted except in matters which could be associated with the Gregory case, and these only where the matter has not been covered in her statement of November, 1945. This office will keep abreast of BENTLEY's whereabouts and employment, and the Bureau will be advised of developments.

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You will recall that in June, 1958, the Bureau instructed New Haven to withhold contacts with Elizabeth Bentley on a regular basis for a six-month period at the end of which time the situation with respect to Bentley was to be re-evaluated by the New Haven Office. This action was taken as the result of an interview with Bentley around the end of May, 1958, at which time she appeared to be in a highly nervous state and expressed a desire to build a new life for herself with a complete break from her past activities. At that time she was asked what her position would be in respect to contacts involving urgent matters and she indicated she would have to decide that when the occasion arose. She advised New Haven that if there was any change in this decision she would contact the New Haven Office. Bentley has not contacted New Haven since May, 1958. New Haven has advised there is no indication: of any change in her attitude. New Haven has discreetly ascertained that Bentley is presently employed at Mount St. Joseph Academy, West Hartford, Connecticut, and is teaching a course in French.

In the past Bentley has continually pointed out that she was being questioned about persons and events having no relationship with her former operation and that she had made a complete and all inclusive statement to agents in New York detailing her activities at a time when her recollection was more reliable than it is at present. It appears that contacts relating to matters other than the Gregory Case have been a source of irritation to her.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

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1. In view of this, it is recommended that Bentley not be contacted except in matters which could be directly associated with her past activities and that these contacts be made only where the matter has not been covered in her statement of November, 1945, or where clarification is needed regarding a statement previously made by Bentley re-





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

The Bureau's attention is called to New Haven letters to the Bureau dated 5-29-58, and 2-2-59, advising that BEWILLY had appeared at the New Haven Office and stated that she had decided to put a complete stop to further interviews with government agencies, including the FBI, because of the highly nervous and tense emotional state she was experiencing.

By letter dated 2-25-59, the Rureau instructed that future contacts with BENTLEY be limited to matters which could be associated with the Gregory case, and that Bureau authority be obtained prior to any interviews on such matters.

Recently this Office received leads to exhibit photographs to BENTLEY in two cases: "NATHAN KAPLAN, AKA, ESPICNAGE (R)", Bufile 100-305909 and "SOVROB - ESPIONAGE (R)", Bufile 105-69253.

A review of the leads in these cases reflected that they were pertinent to the period of time that BENTLEY was involved in the GREGORY case operation, and that it was possible that BENTLEY may have been in a position to have some knowledge of the subjects.

It was discreetly ascertained that BENTLEY is now teaching English and French at Mt. Saint Joseph's Academy, West Hartford, Conn., and that she was rooming in a private residence at 255 Vine Street, Hartford, Conn.

Inasmuch as no contact had been had with BENTLEY since her appearance at the New Haven Office in May, 1958, it was felt that a preliminary contact should be had with her to determine her attitude with respect to resuming substantive interviews with her.

On April 27, 1959, BENTLEY was telephonically contacted at her residence. BESTLEY at first made statements of friendly personal regard with the constacting Agent, but when the matter of arranging an appointment was raised, BENTLEY immediately became evasive and stated that she had furnished all the information she had to the FBI, and anything that she may not have she would not be able to recall because of the passage of time; further,

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that she was too busy and had no time available to see Bureau Agents about old matters which she felt she had given the FBI when it was fresh in her mind and which she now wanted to forget.

It was pointed out to BENTLEY that the matters involved were of vital importance, that it was possible that she might be of great assistance, and that it was desired that she examine some photographs which would consume but very little of her time. BENTLEY reiterated that she was too busy, that she did not have the time for such an appointment, and that in any case she did not wish to go back into her past, that it was most important that she no longer make any attempt to review her past as she wanted to forget it and attempt to make a new life. She then stated that there was no change in the position that she had previously expressed on the occasion of her last visit to the New Haven Office. In expressing the above, Miss BENTLEY became very nervous, emotional and non-responsive. It was apparent that she is still experiencing the highly nervous and emotional state noted in May, 1958.

This is being furnished to the Bureau for its information in order that the Bureau may be aware of BENTLEY's continued non-cooperative attitude.

By memorandum dated February 19, 1959, you were adviséd that the Bureau had instructed New Haven to withhold contacts with Elizabeth Bentley in June, 1958, and that a re-evaluation of situation insofar as Bentley was concerned would be made. was recommended as a result of the re-evaluation that Bentley be contacted only in matters that could be directly associated with her past activities insofar as Soviet espionage was concerned and that such contacts were to be made only after prior Bureau approval. You will recall that this situation arose as a result of Bentley's request that she not be contacted concerning her past because of the highly nervous and emotional state that she was experiencing.

On April 27, 1959, Bentley was telephonically contacted by the New Haven Office at her residence as a preliminary move to determine whether her attitude toward interviews had changed. Bentley appeared friendly but when the matter of arranging appointments with her was raised, she became evasive and stated she had furnished all information she had to the FBI and that anything that she may not have furnished would be beyond recall at this point because of the passage of time; that she was too busy and that she had no time to see agents about matters which she now wanted to forget.

New Haven pointed out to Miss Bentley that the matters involved were of vital importance; that it was possible that she might be of great assistance and that it was a matter of merely examining some photographs which would consume very little of her time. She reiterated she was too busy and that she did not wish to go back into her past; that it was most important that she no longer make any attempt to review her past as she wanted to forget it and start a new life. She stated that there had been no change in her views along this line since her past visit to the New Haven Office in Nau. 1958.

New Haven noted that it appeared that he was still experiencing the difficulties noted in May, 1958.

W.C. Sullivan Hiss Bentley has written a letter dated 8-10-59 to the Director stating she is "in search of a position and in the teaching profession particularly it is most important that one's bona fides be established." She inquires whether it would be possible for the Director to give her a letter "which would for once and all allay doubts in the minds of school superintendents and principals and in the minds of the general public as well" concerning her loyalty. She points out that her obtaining a position is a crucial problem for her at the present time.

Bentley, a former Soviet espionage courier involved in the Silvermaster espionage ring, has in the past furnished voluminous valuable information and has been fully cooperative. For sometime Miss Bentley has exhibited a highly nervous and emotional state and has requested she not be contacted further concerning her past. It appears she is attempting to establish a new life for herself. She has stated that it is most important to her that she no longer attempt to review her past since, to her knowledge, she has previously furnished all information of value in this regard. It is possible that her highly emotional state may be due to a stage in life through which she is passing. As a consequence, the field has been instructed that she not be contacted without Bureau authorization and that they keep informed concerning her whereabouts so she can be reached without delay in event of necessity.

OBSERVATION:

It should be noted that it was Miss Bentley's revelations which caused investigations to be initiated of members of the Silvermaster espionage ring. Her revelations resulted in the development of an awareness on the part of the American public as to the extent of Soviet espionage operations and activities in Government circles in the U.S. It must, therefore, be recognized that information she furnished to the Bureau and testimony she has given in public and private before juries, courts and Congressional committees has constituted a valuable contribution to the security of the U.S. REC. 26 134-435 = 228



Re New York letter 4-27-60 which recommended that Elizabeth Bently and Whittaker Chambers be interviewed in this matter.

For the information of Baltimore and New Haven, the New York letter pointed out that appropriate material would be forwarded if the Bureau approves these interviews.

The Bufile regarding Chambers indicates that he is available for interview concerning espionage and related matters of importance and concerning which he can be reasonably expected to have pertinent knowledge. Interview of Chambers is therefore authorized and should be handled by Baltimore upon receipt of appropriate data from New York.

The Bufile pertaining to Elizabeth Terrill Bentley indicates that pursuant to New Haven letter 4-30-59 the Bureau on 5-18-59 instructed New Haven not to contact Bentley without Bureau authority because of Bentley's nervous condition and her reluctance to talk to Bureau agents. However, on 8-10-59 Bentley forwarded a letter to the Bureau indicating that she, while attempting to find employment in the teaching profession, was having some difficulty in establishing her bona fides. "Your cooperation with this Bureau is a matter of public record. You will recall that I made the following statement November 17, 1953, before the Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on the Judiclary:

"All information furnished by Nies Bentley, which was susceptible to oheck, has ? proven to be correct. She had been subjected to the most searching cross-examinations, her testimony has been evaluated by juries and reviewed by the courts and has been found to be accurats."

"I trust this will answer your request."

By letter dated II-II-59 Bentley expressed appreciation for the Bureau's letter and indicated that she was teaching English in a secondary school run by the State of Connecticut for teen-age delinquent girls. In response thereto, the Sureau directed a letter to her as follows:

"I have received your letter of November 11, 1959, advising me of your present employment.

"I am glad to hear that you have been successful in obtaining a teaching position in which you have, in the past, expressed an interest, and I hope that you will continue to keep me advised of your progress."

In view of the recent exchange of correspondence between the Eureau and Bentley, New Haven is authorized to interview her in this matter at such time as the appropriate data is received from the New York Office.

NOTE: Subject during 1930s was an associate of Joseph Echart known Sobiet agent. She has denied knowledge of his espionage activities. Interviews with Bentley and Chambers are desirable because both previously furnished information regarding Echart. They may have information regarding this subject.

NOTE: Subject has been under Bureau investigation based on association with Willie Hirsch recently indicted and arrested on espionage charges and because of previous CP activity. New York Office believes that subject's background and description render him possibly identical with unsub Charlie. Elizabeth Bentley previously advised that following the arrest of Gaik Ovakimian in 1941 Jacob Golos, her Soviet superior, started turning over material to a contact named "Charlie." Extensive investigation has been conducted to identify Charlie with negative results.

In May, 1959, New Haven was instructed not to contact Elizabeth Bentley without Bureau authority because of her nervous condition and reluctance to talk to Bureau agents. Subsequently, in 1959, however, therewas a cordial exchange of correspondence between the Bureau and Bentley and in May, 1960, New Haven was authorized to interview her concerning a subject of a Bureau investigation. She was interviewed and was very cooperative at that time. It is believed instant contact is warranted since she is the original source of the information and may be able to furnish information of value.

This investigation involves an effort to identify two unknown individuals who temporarily served as the Soviet superiors of Elizabeth Bentley after the death of Jacob Golos in November, 1943. Although Elizabeth Bentley has indicated that she did not desire to carry on regular contact with Bureau Agents due to the length of time that has transpired since her involvement with the Soviets, she has been periodically contacted and has been cooperative. We have limited our contacts with her to those instances where she was the only logical source of information. In this instance she is the only source of information and the only individual who can identify the unknown subjects in this case. It is, therefore, felt that the contact is justified. It should be noted that in June, 1961, a letter from Elizabeth Bentley was acknowledged over the Director's signature expressing an interest in her progress in obtaining a Lasters Degree and in establishing herself in a teaching position.

Upon the termination of the interviews concerning the WIDENER and MC KOWN cases, HENTLEY was advised that while the Bureau appreciated her desire to forget her past life, that there was still another matter which was of great importance and about which the Bureau desired to interview her. BENTLEY appeared to be agreeable to another interview.

In the course of the interviews on 7/1/60, BENTLEY mentioned that she is now successfully embarked on her career as a teacher, had obtained a teacher's certificate in Conn., and in June 1960, had obtained a Master of Arts degree at Trinity College, about which she seemed to be very pleased, but that it was necessary for her to obtain summer employment. She stated that she had heard that the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp., manufacturers of atomic power submarines at Groton, Conn., was hiring people for summer employment. BENTLEY inquired whether such persons would have to be "cleared" by the FBI and she was advised that such clearance was within the province of the Naval authorities, but that it was customary for these authorities to obtain pertinent information on employees from other government agencies, including the FBI.

The above is being noted because it appeared to the interviewing agents that this situation may have been a factor in BENTLEY's cooperative attitude toward the interviewing agents.

While the New Haven Office recommends that BENTLEY be interviewed in irstant case, it suggests that future requests to interview BENTLEY should be made on a highly selected basis and only in cases of unquestioned importance where it is clear that BENTLEY has knowledge of the subject or subject matter involved.

In the event the Bureau authorizes this interview, the New York Office should furnish New Neven with photographs of FREDERICKA MARTIN and pertinent information concerning her background for such interview.

Also, certain personal characteristics, including facial features, manner of Lair dress and manner of speech, are apparently lacking insofar as Martin is concerned in comparison to the known characteristics of the unknown subject in this case.

The report of 3% frank B. hatts dated 5-6-60 at New Naven which sets forth an interview with tr. Lewis Fox concerning Fredericks Aurtin contains information to the effect that the artists sketch of unknown Catherine was displayed to Dr. Fox and thathe advised that the sketch of unknown subject Catherine did not resemble Fredericks Martin. It is noted that Dr. Fox apparently knew Fredericks Martin same 20 years ago.

In view of the above, the Bureau feels that there is insufficient basis for approaching Bentley for the sole purose of showing a photo to Hentley of Fredericka Partia. With respect to further centacts with Elizabeth Pentley, the New Baven Office should be guided by the policy previously set forth, namely that Bentley shall not be contacted except in matters of the utmost importance to the Bureau and that contacts with her shall be made only after Bureau authority is obtained. New Baven should continue to keep abreast of developments insofar as Bentley's progress is concerned and keep the Bureau informed of her attitude, insofar as cooperation with the Bureau is concerned.

NOTE: Nartin is subject of separate security investigation and has been considered as a possible suspect for unsubject Catherine and considerable investigation has been conducted in this case in effort identify Martin as unsub. Bentley was favorably impressed by fact she had received friendly and sympathetic let from Director in regard to her efforts to establish herself as a teacher.



In November, I had read a New York Times story reporting that the Attorney General had agreed to permit interested scholars to secure access to the FBI's investigative files. Being an historian specializing in post-world War II politics and internal see security matters, I greeted that news with keen interest. My major research interest centers on the important internal security cases and congressional investigations of the Truman years. Noting, however, that researchers must pay for the cost of FBI personnel reviewing the files and that the cost for the Rosenbergs file was estimated as being \$5,000 and the Hiss file as being \$12,895, I thought it appropriate first to ascertain the approximate cost of files I would be interested in researching and, if possible, the foot length of these files.

The files that I would be interested in beyond the Hiss and Rosenbergs files include: the Amerasia case, Elizabeth Bentley, Louis Budenz, Whittaker Chambers, the Communist Eleven who went to trial in the Dennis case, Judith Coplon; and any files you have dealing with your correspondence, interviews, and responses to requests from the House Committee on Un-American Activities, the Internal Security Subcomittee of the Denate, Judiciary Committee, and Senator Joseph R. McCarthy No. TECOTORD

If you could, given me a cost breakdown for each agathese; requests. If it is not feasible to give me an exact cost breakdown, I would appreciate a rough estimate (as, for example, the total request would run in the range of xthousand to ythousand dollars).



A highly confidential source has advised that Lovestone stated the only "ex" who had always told the truth and had never been crossed up was Elizabeth Bentley. Lovestone claimed Bentley told him the story of her work with Jacob Golos and Earl Browder while in the presence of and under guard of two FBI people. Lovestone reportedly wanted to size Bentley up and determine if she wis a phony. Lovestone claimed he asked Bentley questions and told the fellows with her she was telling the truth and not exaggerating. The source of this information should not be compromised during your interview of Bentley.


This interview should be handled promptly. You should submit an extra copy of your letter covering this interview for inclusion in the Bureau file an Lovestone (61-1292).

NOTE: Bufiles reflect that one Athan Theoharis was active in lobbying efforts against the U. S. policy in Vietnam in 1965 (62-110039-23). A Loyalty of Government Employees investigation in 1954 and 1955 on Adeline Mary Theoharis, possible mother, was instigated on the basis of Mrs. Theoharis signature having appeared on a 1940 CP nominating committee for CP candidate for Governor, State of Wisconsin. Civil Service Commission advised on 2/7/56, that a favorable determination was made in connection with investigation under Executive Order 10450. The above reply was discussed with a representative of the Intelligence Division.
