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

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

Reference is made to the teletype from the Syracuse, New York resident agency to the Bureau, Albany and New York Offices, dated June 11, 1950, in the above captioned case.

For the assistance of the Syracuse resident agency, there is being enclosed herewith a surveillance photograph of ABRAHAM PROTHMAN, thich photograph was taken so Telemary 2, 1950, and is me excellent likeness of him as he appears ab this tire.

For the further assistance of the Syracuse resident agency, there is being set forth hereinafter a summary of the activities of BROTHMAN as originally reported by ELIZABETH BENTLEY. BENTLEY has stated that in about May 1940, JACOB COLOS, now deceased, a known Soviet agent, introduced her to BROTHLIAN, who, at that time, according to BENTLEY, resided in Massau County, New York, which county is just outside the New York City limits or adjacent to Queens County, Now York City, BUITLEY said that BROTHMAN was then employed at the Republic Steel Company, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, as an engineer (actually BROTHMAN was then employed by the Republic floring) Machinery Company, 154 Nassau Street, BROTHMAN to be living in Sunnyside, Long Irland in 1940).

BENTLEY says that GOLOS told her that EROTHMAN would furnish her with certain blueprints. She stated that in the summer of 1940 until about the fall of 1940 she met with PROTHUN about ten times in New York City and obtained from him certain blueprints. On some occasions she claims that BEOTHMAN would give the blueprints to GOLOS and at other times to here Usually, she stated, she would meet BROTHMAN at the Mosler Safe Company, 5th Avenue and 32nd Street, New York City, after which they would go to dinner and DROTHMAN would make available the blueprints. On several occasions, she stated, GOIOS would make copies of those blueprints furnished

by BROTHMAN and then the originals would be returned to BROTHMAN. BENTLEY was not certain what the blueprints contained. BENTLEY stated that in about the fall of 1940, GOLOG became "disgusted" with BROTHMAN and indicated to her that he was turning BROTHMAN over to someone else (some other Soviet superior)

Room 1212, 29-28 blst Avenue, long Island City, New York (Queensbridge Plans area), EROTHMAN stated that in 1938 or 1939 a man whom he identified later in the interview from a photograph as JACOB GOLOS, came into his effice at the Republic Cherdeal Machinery Company, which company was them associated with the Hendrick Manufacturing Company, Carbondale, Pennsylvania. GOLOS at that time, according to EROTHMAN, told him that he had contacts with the Russian government and that he was in a position to get contracts from the Russian government for EROTHMAN if ROOTHMAN would turn over to him blue-prints of dortain products EROTHMAN was working on at that time. Enothmish maintained that these blueprints were his own property and that they were, for the most part, of shafts, vats, and other equipment necessary in the operation of a plant manufacturing chemicals.

According to BROTHEM, COLOS visited his office on several occasions and some time following GOLOS original visit, GOLOS introduced him to an individual whom BROTHEM stated he knew only as SHELPA" (ELIZABETH BENTLEY). BROTHEM claimed he was under the impression that WHILLES was a secretary to GOLOS. GOLOS told BROTHEM that WHELEAU would in the future obtain the blusprints which PROTREMS previously had been accustomed to turn over to GOLOS.

Thereafter, and as related by BENTLEY, BROTHMAN claims he met "HELEN" on about a dozen occasions during 1938-1940. REOTHMAN recalled on the occasion of this interview that sometime in 1940 "HELEN" stopped soming to his office and another individual named HAERY GOID came to see him, stating that he represented GOLOS. Thereafter, according to BROTHMAN's story in 1947, GOID, whom he knew then to live in Philadelphia, made many trips to Hew York to obtain blueprints from BROTHMAN to be delivered to GOLOS. BROTHMAN placed the date of the last such trip by GOID to see him for this purpose as being in late 1941 or early 1942.

Also, in this interview in 1947, BROTHMAN stated upon questioning that he had become acquainted with GOLOS "possibly because GOLOS know of his firm through advertising in various chemical magazines". He emphatically Lotte o Albany, NY 652 330

stated this was the only possible way that GOLOS would get in touch with him and denied that anybody had ever sent GOLOS to him. PROTEIAN then stated it was a common practice in the engineering field to turn over blueprints to various individuals in an effort to obtain contracts. He also stated this was his sole purpose in turning over the blueprints to GOLOS, hamely that GOLOS had represented to him that he was in a position to obtain contracts for PROTEIAN from the Russian government.

Soviet Government Purchasing Commission and to the Amtorg Trading Corporation but that he had never obtained any contracts from either of these two agencies.

EPOTHULN admitted monbership in the Young Communist League at Columbia University in 1933, but stated that he did not attend any Communist Party acctings now (as of 1917) nor was he actively engaged in any Communist Party affairs.

the Canadian espionage case broke in 1946, he began to suspect that GOIOS might have been engaged in espionage activities as of 1940. Later, before a Grand Jury on July 22, 1947, BROTHMAN reiterated the above story regarding his relationship with BRITLEY, GOIOS and GOID. GOID also appeared before this Grand Jury on July 31, 1947 and told a story which generally conformed to the one related by BROTHMAN.

In recent interviews with EPOTIPLAN, namely, on May 15, 16 and 22, 1950, EMOTHMAN repeated the story furnished the agents in 1947 and the Grand Juny later in 1947, as set forth above. The results of these recent interviews are set forth on pages 10 through 14 of the report of SA Joseph C. Walsh, Jr., in the case entitled "MARRI GOLD, with aliaces", dated May 29, 1950 at New York, two copies of which were furnished the Albany Office.

as told by PROTEMAN and GOLD to agents and the Grand Jury regarding the origin of their association were completely fabricated. It now appears that PROTEMAN and GOLD, on May 29, 1947, got together between interviews and on the insistence of PROTHMAN, GOLD told the agents and later the Grand Jury that he had first met PROTHMAN through GOLOS when, as a matter of fact, according to GOLD now, he was originally sent to PROTHMAN by SAN (SPACEM BENEMOY). It also appears that PROTHMAN was being contacted by an individual connected with Amtorg several years before HENTLEY or GOLOS or GOLD started to contact him.

Reinterview with MROTHMAN is anticipated in the immediate future and, of course, he will be confronted with GOLD's present statements.

It should be added that in connection with the statement by GOID as set forth in the teletype of June 12, 1950 from Philadelphia, to the effect that GOID met BROTHMAN first in BROTHMAN's automobile and that BAN had furnished GOID with BROTHMAN's license number, BEHTLEY had the following to say in a recent interview:

BENTLEY stated that after GOLOS returned from Philadelphia in late 1940, he instructed her to tell BROTHMAN on the occasion of her next meeting with him that BROTHMAN was goin, to be turned over to a now contact, BENTLEY stated GOLOS never turned over any of his contacts unless he had been specifically instructed to do so by his superiors. Following this conversation with GOLOS, she stated she met BROTHMAN at a pre-arranged meeting, brought him to Paddy's Clam House on Nest 31th Street, New York, and informed him of GOLOS' request. She claims BROTHMAN became adament and it was necessary for both BENTLEY and GOLOS to see BROTHMAN at a subsequent time, after which she, BENTLEY, ceased to see him any more.

BENTLEY says that the change-over (of contacts) was effected by obtaining the licenze number of BROTHMAN's automobile and requesting him to park his car and remain in it on 8th or 9th Avenue in uptown Manhattan. At a specific time the new contact would come by, get into the car, and talk to BROTHMAN, accepting any material he had. She also recalled that letter to albeing

about the both or two after she coased to see PROTHMAN, he called her and information he had lost touch with his new contact. She relayed this information to 00103 and heard nothing more about it. Her impression was that colos was able to rehabilitate the contact.

It will also be poted that GOID arranged a meeting between SAN (SEMEROV) and EROTHMAN at the Hotel Lincoln, New York City, in late 1942 or early 1943.

In this connection it should be noted that HUOTHMAN for the past several years has lived at hl-OB 42nd Street, Sunnyside, Queens, which is within five minutes drive of the Queens Plaza area. He lives there with his wife NACHI METT EROTHMAN, who is Russian born, and his two children. BROTHMAN mas married on June 15, 1937 and simittedly "does not get along with her".

BROTHMAN also rents or owns a summer home in Peckskill, New York.

before the Grand Jury in 1947, MOTHMAN stated that after graduating from Columbia in 1933 he did research work in a laboratory of his own for about three years. From about 1936 to 1938, MOTHMAN stated, he worked for the Ansbacher-Siegle Company. Thereafter he became employed at the Republic Chemical and Machinery Company and the Hendrick Manufacturing Company, 15h Massau Street, later 11h Mast 32nd Street, and later at 30 Church Street, Manufacturing Company, 1942.

Re Syracuse teletype June 11, 1950, in instant matter, the New York files reflect the following information regarding JACOB GOLOS:

in 1938-1939. COLCS was Secretary of World Tourist INC. as of 1940. According to ELECT, GOLOS operated as the head of an espionage group in Eashington, D. C., from 1938 to 1943. GOLOS died in New York City on Hovember 27, 1943.

GOLOS introduced AME RECTIMEN to BUNTLEY in May 1910. Selective Service records reveal that in 1940 BROTHER resided at 41-08 - \$2nd Street, Long Island City, New York, telephone number Ironsides 6 - 7769. BROTHER is described as: Born August 15, 1913, New York City; 5' 84°; 165 lbs.; brown eyes; brown hair; light complexion; married, wife MACHI.

In connection with the investigation of GAIK B. GVAKIMIAN, known Soviet espionage agent, a surveillance was instituted in December 1360. On January 25, 1941, GYAKIMIAN contacted a person identified as JACOB GOLGS. There were several subsequent contacts on the part of these two individuals until May 5, 1941, when GYAKIMIAN was arrested by Agents of the New York Office. They made no contacts after the arrest. GYAKIMIAN departed from the United States on July 23, 1941.

BENTLEY advised that FRED ROSE, subject in the CURRY case, spent about ten days in New York City in 1913, shortly before COLOS' death. Nost of this time was spent with COLOS.

The true name of GOLOS was JACOB RAISIN. He was known to BILLIAM ROMINOTON and MARY PRICE as "JOHN"; and to ROBERT MILLER as JOHN PRICEMAN. REMINITION, PRICE, and MILLER figured in the investigation of the SILVERMANTER case. GOLOS was also known in 1922-1924 as "DIVIS". GOLOS was born in Hussia and was 33 years of age in 1924. He was a printer by trade.

Referenced New York teletype indicated that the possibility exists that CVAKIMIAN recruited RICHARD M. ERICOS and ALFRED DEAN SLACK. In this connection, it is particularly noted that CVAKIMIAN is a Doctor of Chemistry and SRICOS and SLACK were chemists.

The is to be noted further that CVARINIAN was employed at ANTORO TRADING CORPORATION at the same time as spirit spiritor.

In an interview with GOLD and display of GYAKIMIAN'S photograph, the possibility of GYAKIMIAN being identical with unknown subject "FRED" is to be considered. With the exception of the description of "FRED" as wearing a monstache, the descriptions of GYAKIMIAN and "FRED" are fairly similar.

Reference is also made to Albany letter dated June 12, 1950, reinstant matter, wherein it is noted that COLD stated that PAYEL PATEOVICE MIKHAILOV might be an individual to whom he turned over information in either Buffalo, Syracuse, or Rochester. 

Under date of June 2, 1950, THOMAS M. It is requested that THOMAS BRUCE be interviewed and that detailed information be obtained concerning his knowledge of HARRY GOLD, and also, all available information regarding KRONENBERG should be developed.

Mr. Belmont of the Bureau called at 11:30 AM, June 15, 1950, and wanted to know what our plans were with regard to our contemplated interviews of BROTHMAN, MOSKOWITZ, GREENGLASS, his wife RUTH, and PRINTZ.

I told Mr. Belmont we had prepared teletypes that were being forwarded to the Bureau and that with respect to BROTHMAN, we contemplated interviewing him on June 16th and before the completion of his interview would interview MUSKOWITZ.

I advised Mr. Belmont the only thing that was holding up picking up BRJTHMAN was to be certain we had obtained all the information from GUID and we were awaiting the results of Philadelphia's interview of BIACK.

With regard to GREENGIASS, I told Mr. Belmont we were moving in on him the afternoon of June 15th; that his wife was in the hospital suffering from an infection as the result of serious burns and it was the recommendation of this office that we not interview her at this time.

With regard to PRINTZ, I told Wr. Belmont we were holding off his interview until we had questioned GREENGLASS to obtain additional facts.

Mr. Belmont said this was satisfactory and requested a teletype be forwarded to the Bureau.

INTERVIEW OF OLGA TROUGHTON

OIGA TROUGHTON was interviewed on June 10, 1950 and June 12, 1950 at her residence, 51 East 78th Street, New York City. She furnished the following information:

She stated she met ALFRED SLACK for the first time in Rochester, New York in 1937. She stated that she had never visited at SLACK'S farm at Webster, New York. She advised that about 1937 SLACK made five or six trips to New York City. On each occasion he left her to make contact with an unknown person in either Long Island City, New York, or an unknown place in New Jersey. She recalled that KLLA TROUGHTON, her sister, accompanied SLACK to New York on one occasion. She stated at this time that SLACK'S automobile was used in these trips. However, upon interview on June 12, 1950 she stated that SLACK used his automobile on only two occasions on these trips to New York City. On the other trips he travelled by train.

she stated SLACK would call her on the telephone, or upon leaving her on the previous evening would advise that he had to go to long Island City to meet someone on the following day. She recalled specifically that he did mention long Island City as the locale of these contacts. She stated that at no time did he ever mention the name, address or telephone number of his contact at long Island City.

She indicated that RICHARD BRIGGS was living in New Jersey at this time. However, she did not think that BRIGGS was with SLACK on the occasions of these visits to Long Island City.



Whereas on June 10, 1950 she advised that SLACK made a contact in New Jersey, on the interview of June 12, 1950 she corrected that impression to state that SLACK made no visits to New Jersey during this period. She stated that she was acquainted with only one individual in New Jersey who knew SLACK, and that was RICHARD BRIGGS.

Sister ELLA TROUGHTON accompanied SLACK to New York they made a visit to New Jersey. She stated that they may have seen ERIGGS on the occasion of this trip, but she could not recall specifically that they did. She exhibited a photograph of ELIA TROUGHTON, which she said was taken in New Jersey on the occasion of this particular trip. The background for this photograph was a sign, "Magazine—Dangerous—Explosives". It is noted that the photograph showed daisies in bloom, which would indicate that it was taken in the spring of the year, approximately the latter part of May or early part of June. It would appear that this visit to New Jersey occurred in the spring of 1938, inasmuch as it has been determined that BRIGGS first resided in Verona, New Jersey in September, 1937.

In this connection it is to be noted that ELLA TROUGHTON had advised that she kept company with SLACK from April, 1937 until September, 1938.

It is to be noted that OLGA and GWEN TROUGHTON advised that during the occasion of SLACK'S visits to New York he stayed at the Times Square Hotel in New York City, and further stated that BRIGGS also stayed at the Times Square Hotel about this time. BRIGGS has also indicated independently that he may have been residing at the Times Square Hotel in February or March, 1938.

Olga advised that about the time that SIACK was making these trips to New York City he was also making contact with an individual in Buffalo, New York. It was the recollection of Olga TROUGHTON that ELIA TROUGHTON had occasion to go to Buffalo with SIACK. QIGA TROUGHTON was of the opinion that SIACK'S trips



to New York and Buffalo were regarding the same matter, and that they had something to do with SLACK'S work for the Russians. She related the following is the basis for her opinion: SLACK was always evasive about this business and she, OLGA TROUGHTON, had witnessed considerable discussion between BRIGGS and SLACK regarding their feelings about Russia, and their desire to go to Russia. She further knew that this business was not connected with SLACK'S job at Eastman Kodak Company. She said that she was also sware of the rumors that BRIGGS and SLACK were selling secrets to the Russians. Other than that she had no definite information to establish the reasons for these contacts.

OLGA TROUGHTON stated that she met no friends of SLACK or BRIGGS, other than LIBBY VOLPI and her husband. She recalled having a date one evening in New York City in about 1938 with RICHARD BRIGGS. In the perty were LIBBY VOLPI (maiden name) and her husband. She did not think that SLACK was in the party at this time. VOLPI was from Rochester, New York and an old girl-friend of BRIGGS. She was one or two years behind OLGA TROUGHTON in school at Rochester. OLGA advised that she graduated from John Karshall High School in Rochester in 1930. She described LIBBY VOLPI as follows:

She stated that VOLPI shared BRIGGS' political ideas. OlGA advised that she thought her sister ELLA TROUGHTON would know about LIBBY VOLPI. She thought also that ELLA would have information regarding SLACK'S activities and friends.

form at Webster, New York, during October, 1937. ELLA TROUGHTON, RICHARD N. BRIGGS, JOSEPH SLACK (father of the subject) and ALFRED SLACK were at the farm on this occasion. At this time an unknown individual came into the house and deposited a package in the ice box in the kitchen. She thought this was strange at the time. However, it was ignored by the TROJGHTONS. Later during the same day SLACK and his friend FRIGGS took this package from the ice box and an argument ensued about the division of certain money. At this time SLACK'S father and the TROUGHTONS were outside the house and SLACK'S father indicated that this money was received from the Russians for information furnished them by SLACK and BRIGGS.

In 1917, OIGA TROUGHTON, when interviewed about this matter, advised that SIACK had been known to her family for many years, and during this friendship he had exhibited a definite Communist attitude and was in favor of the Russian form of government. She said she was not certain whether or not he was a member of the Communist Party. She stated that SIACK was known to be a close friend of RICHARD BRIGGS, who was then deceased, but whom she believed was a member of the Communist Party and a leader in the Party in the Rochester, New York section.

Both SLACK and BRIGGS, according to OLGA TROUGHTON, were employed for a number of years as chemists for the Eastman Kodak Company in Rochester, New York. She said SLACK was engaged in the development of chemical photography and high-speed film for the Eastman Kodak Company.

With respect to the aforementioned ice-box incident, it is to be noted that EILA TROUGHTON, in 1947, advised that she was frequently in the company of AIFRED SLACK between April, 1937 and September, 1938. She stated that she did not know SLACK to be a member of or affiliated with the Communist Party at this time. She indicated that the only associate of SLACK that she knew was RICHARD BRIGGS. She had no information at that time which would indicate that SLACK was in the employ of the Russian Government during the period of their association. At that time (1947) EILA TROUGHTON

said she was not acquainted with the ice-box incident as related above. She stated that she had visited the SLACK farm in Webster, New York on very few occasions. It was her recollection that OLGA TROUGHTON was present at the SLACK farm in 1938 or 1939.

OLGA TROUGHTON recalled that she saw SLACK in early 1915, when he visited New York City, having just returned from England. He stayed at the Hotel New Yorker at this time. During the course of this visit SLACK related that he had been working on an important preject in England and that he was the victim of an explosion, which necessitated his having to have plastic surgery performed on his face. It was OLGA TROUGHTON'S recollection that SLACK claimed he was a civilian employee working for the United States Army in England.

It is to be noted that employment records reveal that SLACK was employed from November 6, 1944 to October 5, 1945 by the Tennessee-Eastman Corporation at the Clinton Engineer Works, Dak Nidge, Tennessee.

OLGA TROUGHTON advised that the last contact she had with SLACK was on the occasion of a visit he made to New York in 1947. At the time he edvised that during the war he had been employed on the atom bomb project and had worked in California, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, Florida and New Mexico.

OLGA TROUGHTON advised that on every occasion of her meeting SLACK he had planty of money and was a free spender.

It was OLGA TROUGHTON'S recollection that in 1937 or 1938 SLACK had been married, but was either divorced or separated at this time. The name of his wife was unknown to the TROUGHTONS. This individual may be identical with "EDITH NAE". In this respect it is to be noted that there was a judgment outstanding in 1938 against SLACK in favor of LIZZIE W. AOKE, mother-in-law, and two additional judgments against SLACK in 1938 and 1939, in favor of EDITH MAE, ex-wife of SLACK. OLGA TROUGHTON was of the opinion that SLACK'S wife was related to BRIGGS! wife. She recalled that BRIGGS was married shortly before his death in 1939 to an epileptic or, a bripple. The name or whereabouts of the wife of BRIGGS were unknown to OLGA TROUGHTON.

INTERVIEW OF GWEN TROUGHTON

GWEN TROUGHTON was interviewed on June 12, 1950 at her residence, 51 East 78th Street, New York City. She stated that she met ALFRED SLACK in 1936 at the Rochester, New York railroad station, when she was en route to California. At the time SIACK was present with her sister ELL: TROUGHTON to greet her during the stopover. She next met SLACK at his farm in Webster, New York, in October, 1937. She recalled that ELLA TROUGHTON and possibly the father of the TROUGHTONS, RICHARD N. BRIGGS, JOSEPH SLACK and the subject were present at the time. She recalled one occasion about this time when she and ELLA TROUGHTON had borrowed SLACK'S car for a trip to Niegara Falls. SLACK advised that there was plenty of money in the glove compartment if it was needed. Examination of the glove compartment revealed that there was \$100 to \$200 therein. GWEN TROUGHTON'S reaction at the time was that this was a considerable amount of cash for SLACK to have in his possession, since Resiman Kodak Company had, a reputation for paying poorly at the time (1937-1938).

TROUGHTON could furnish no details. She recalled that during the trip that ELLA TROUGHTON and SLACK made to New York, she, together with their sister OIGA TROUGHTON, went out with SLACK to dinner and to some shows. It was her recollection that SLACK stayed at the Times Square Hotel during this visit.

GWEN TROUGHTON recalled that SLICK had been making trips to Buffalo, New York at about this time. This information was furnished to her by her sister ELLA TROUGHTON. GMEN TROUGHTON recalled that in July, 1947 she furnished information regarding the ice-box incident, which has been set out above. She stated that she was not present at the farm on the occasion of this incident, although she had previously left the impression that she was in attendance. She stated that her father, TOM TROUGHTON, had related this incident to her and further stated that her father witnessed the incident. It was her recollection that this occurred about October, 1937. GMEN TROUGHTON continued that her father was at the SLACK farm on several occasions and since he disliked SLACK it is probable that ELLA TROUGHTON wastrith him on the occasion of this ice-box incident and on any other visit. GWEN TROUGHTON specifically recalled having been told by her father that SLACK received money from the Russians; that he was working for the Russians and selling them secrets. She had no information regarding the source of her father's knowledge. She concurred in the impression of her sister OLGA that ELLA TROUGHTON may have information regarding SLACK'S activities and friends.



She stated that whenever she was in the company of SLLCK he had plenty of money and spent it freely.

She stated that she never met any of the friends of ALFRED SLACK or RICHARD BRIGGS.

GWEN TROUGHTON recalled SLACK'S visit to New York City in 1945 and she furnished the same information regarding this visit that has been furnished by OLGA TROUGHTON.

GWEN stated that the last time she saw ALFRED SLACK was in 1947 when he visited New York City. She also recalled specifically that SLACK advised at this time that during the war he had been employed on the atom bomb project and worked in California, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, Florida and New Mexico.

GWEN TROUGHTON was of the impression that SLACK had been separated or divorced at the time of his keeping company with her sister ELLA TROUGHTON. She did not know the name of SLACK'S ex-wife. She also stated that she was of the impression that SLACK'S wife and ERIGGS' wife were related. She could furnish no information as to the present whereabouts of the wife of BRIGGS.

INSURANCE RECORDS

The records of the home office of the Equitable Assurance Company, New York City, revealed that SLACK has an ordinary life policy, No. 12877992. Photographs of the handwriting of SLACK, as appearing in the files of the Equitable Life Assurance Company, were obtained.

RICHARD MARLOE BRIGGS, was: Richard Milburn Briggs, Richard Daniel Briggs

Investigation of this individual is predicated upon information furnished by HARRY GOLD, admitted Soviet espionage agent and a contact of Doctor EMIL KLAUS FUCHS. GOLD has stated that subject SLACK furnished him with information from several sources, including information from Eastman Kodak Company, between the fall of either 1940 or 1941 and Christmas, 1943.

Heistated that from his association with SLACK he ascertained that STACK had probably been put in contact with the Soviets by a friend named "DICK", last name unknown, now deceased, who was a "radical".

Among material seized from GOID'S residence was a folder labeled "DICK BRIGGS". The folder contained about sixty pages of material relating to various chemical processes dealing with the handling of urea and, in part, with a discussion of film processing and tests at Eastman Kodak Company. The paper discussing urea was stapled together with a typewritten cover sheet reading "February, 1912. The report and data attached to this sheet have been assembled from the effects of the late R. FRIGGS and are being submitted in that they may be of some value."

RICHERD MERIOE BRIGGS, FBI #1521802, was arrested by the Police of Jacksonville Beach, Florida on May 9, 1938. He was charged with contributing to the moral delinquency of a minor. The disposition was not shown on BRIGGS! criminal record. At the time of his affect an address book was found in his possession belonging to him, in which the name "LEVINE" appeared in two places.

BRIGGS furnished a voluntary statement to the Miami Office of the FRI on May 17, 1938. At the same time he voluntarily turned over to this Bureau his address book and a bank book issued in his name by the Manufacturers Trust Company, New York City. Also secured were five sheets of thin typewriting paper which were in BRIGGS! suitcase. BRIGGS! statement follows:

*Jacksonville, Florida May 17, 1938.

Rochester, New York, state that I lived in that city at 26 Albemarle Street, until October, 1936, when I left to go to St. Louis, Missouri, where I was employed by the HAMMER DRY PLATE CO. at Ohio Avenue and Miami Street. I lived in St. Louis at Saum Apartment Hotel, 1919 South Grand Boulevard. I lived and worked in St. Louis for about 9 months, but during that time I made several trips back to Rochester to straighten

wout some business affairs concerning my father's estate. He was ill and finally died in 1937. About August, 1937, I left St. Louis for Verona, New Jersey, and went by Rochester. I arrived in Verona in September, 1937. In Verona I worked for the DAILEY CORPORATION.

She said I see 'it's just like having a mama and papa.' Then she began telling me about her own mama and papa. I told her she would have to keep giving the snail new water every day. She said she didn't believe she could do that, and then said come on down on the beach and show me how; but I didn't go, and there was a man standing right near by. I was following her along, after I had put my bags

The address book and bank book belonging to BRIGGS were returned to him by the New York Office of the FBI by letter dated August 26, 1938. The letter was addressed to BRIGGS at 1 East Lincoln Street, Verona, New Jersey.

Photographs of BRINGS, taken by the Miami Office in 1938, were transmitted to the New York Office along with a copy of the foregoing signed statement, five sheets of typewriting paper and the bank book and address book aforementioned. Also sent was a written voluntary authorization bearing the pencilled signature of BRIGGS, permitting this Bureau to take and use the address book and bank book to which reference has been made.

By letter dated August. 15, 1938 the Miami Office advised that one EDWIN C. COFFEE, attorney-at-law, Law Exchange Building, Miami, Florida, had received a letter from BRIGGS requesting him to endeavor to obtain his address book and bank book from the Miami Office of the FBI.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on June 13, 1950 that the Central Indices of the Manufacturers Trust Company, New York City, contained no record of the account of ERIGGS. Informant stated that the Central Indices contained records of individuals who have maintained Special or Regular Checking Accounts. They do not contain the names of persons maintaining Savings Accounts with the Manufacturers Trust Company.

In connection with the possibility that BRIGGS may have been involved in the kidnaping of PETER DAVID LEVINE, Lieutenant HERMAN FINKELSTEIN, 892 Athens Pike, Huntsville, Alabama, was interviewed in April, 1942 by SA R. J. Lamphere. FINKELSTEIN stated that he had been the physician of ROBERT M. ERIGGS from sometime in the Summer of 1938 until BRIGGS! death on September 29, 1939. It is noted that BRIGGS! given name is set out as ROBERT throughout the report of the FINKELSTEIN interview, although At appears that his correct name is RICHARD.

FINKELSTEIN stated that BRIGGS was an "unusual man", char-

acterizing him as a "rare bird." BRIGGS was very brilliant and had been employed as a chemist for Eastman Rodak Company. He had become a chronic alcoholic, a condition which, according to FINKELSTEIN, eventually caused his death.

BRIGGS, according to FINKEISTEIN, was a collector and reader of psychology books and maintained a fine collection of first editions. He was also an accomplished pianist. When FINKEISTEIN first knew him, BRIGGS had considerable money. At the time of his death, however, BRIGGS had evidently spent all of his money on liquor and on the care of his wife who suffered from paralysis agitans. FINKEISTEIN stated that shortly before his death BRIGGS was consuming between two and five quarts of whiskey daily.

According to FINKELSTEIN, BRIGOS had very few friends and had moved to Verona, New Jersey only a short time before FINKELSTEIN began treating him. In spite of FINKELSTEIN'S recommendations BRIGGS refused to enter an institution to cure his alcoholism.

In regard to the name "LEVINE" found in ERIGGS' notebook, FINKELSTEIN could offer no information. He stated ERIGGS was the type of individual who made a habit of taking notes on all sorts of problems that he wanted to solve. He took notes on "everything", possibly because he felt he was losing his mind.

FINKELSTEIN also stated he had learned BRIGGS! wife had died.

He said BRIGGS! sister had married a man who had been a good friend

of BRIGGS!. FINKELSTEIN indicated that this was "funny" but on being
questioned further he appeared a little upset and said only that friends
marrying sisters was "funny."

PINKELSTEIN concluded that BRIGGS! mental condition throughout the period he had treated him was not in the least criminal.

By letter dated March 26, 1942 the Birmingham Office of the FBI received information from Lieutenant HERMAN FINKELSTEIN, Huntsville, Alabama, indicating that BRIGGS' brother-in-law was A. SLACK, Gravel Road, Webster, New York.

In November, 1942 JULIA SIACK, 841 Gravel Road, Webster, New York, advised SA Lowell J. Kappelo, of the Buffalo Office, that she was

the wife of ALFRED SLACK, who was then employed at Holston Ordnance, Kingsport, Tennessee. She stated that she had a brother-in-law; RICHARD "DICK" BRIGGS, now deceased, formerly of Verona, New Jersey. She also stated that her sister, SARAH BRIGGS, widow of RICHARD BRIGGS, was also deceased.

In an effort to locate SLACK, Mr. TOM WARRICK, Personnel Manager, Holston Ordnance Works, Kingsport, Tennesses, advised SAC William A: Murphy, of the Knoxville Office, on February 6, 1943, that SLACK was then working in Cincinnati, Ohio as an expeditor for the Holston Ordnance Works. SLACK'S residence was listed as 2763 Madison Road, place not given.

On February 21, 1913 ALFRED SIACK was interviewed by SA Eugene E. Bangs, of the Cincinnati Office. SIACK was then residing at the Metropole Hotel, Cincinnati. He could not recall where his brother-in-law ROBERT (sic) BRIGGS had been at the time of the kidnaping of PETER DAVID LEVINE, although he stated he believed BRIGGS had been in New Jersey or St. Louis, Missouri during 1938 and 1939. He stated that BRIGGS had been employed by the Hammer Dry Brand Company, St. Louis, Missouri, for several months during 1938 or 1939.

SIACK did not believe BRIGGS had anything to do with the LEVINE kidnaping as BRIGGS had always "scened too kind a fellow to do anything like that." He added that BRIGGS had been a recluse for a number of years and did not have any close friends who would be able to furnish any information concerning his activities in the past.

SIACK further advised that BRIGGS "constantly walked around with a bottle of liquor, so if it were a task which required careful planning, he would probably have been totally incapable of doing it."

The following composite description of BRIGGS was obtained from the Rochester, New York Police Department and from the files of this Bureaus

LOUIS BUDENZ, PAUL and HEDZ MASSING and ELIZABETH TERRILL BETTLEY examined photographs of SLACK but failed to affect an identification. SLACK'S photograph will be exhibited to ROBERT GORDON SWITZ when the latter is evailable for interview.

Pursuant to Syracuse Resident Agency teletype dated June 11, 1950 the following information was transmitted by letter dated June 12, 1950. There was enclosed with this letter a surveillance photograph of ABRAHAM EROTHMAN, which photograph was taken February 22, 1950 and is an excellent likeness of him as he appears at this time. Additional photographs of BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSKOWITZ were also submitted with this letter.

Following is a summary of the activities of BROTHMAN, as originally reported by ELIZABETH BENTLEY. BENTLEY has stated that about May, 1940 JACOB GOLOS, now deceased, a known Soviet agent, introduced her to BROTHMAN who at that time, according to BENTLEY, resided in Nassau County, New York. BENTLEY said BROTHLAN was then employed at the Republic Steel Company, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, as an engineer. Actually, BROTHMAN was then employed by the Republic Chemical Machinery Company, 154 Massau Street, New York City, and, according to Selective -Service records, in 1940 BROTHMAN was residing at 41-08 42nd Street, Sunnyside, Queens, New York, which might also be referred to as Long Island City. BENTLEY said GOLOS told her BROTHMAN could furnish her with certain blueprints. She stated that in the summer of 1940 until about the fall of 1940 she met with BROTHEAN about ten times in New York City and obtained from him certain blueprints. On some occasions she claims that BROTHMAN would give the blueprints to GOLOS and at other times to her. Usually, she stated, she would meet BROTHMAN at the Mosler Safe Company, Fifth Avenue and 32nd Street, New York City, after which they would go to dinner and BROTHMAN would make available the blueprints. On several occasions, she stated, GOLOS would make copies of these blueprints furnished by BROTHMAN and then the originals would be returned to BROTHMAN. BENTLEY was not certain what the blueprints contained. BENTLEY stated that in about the fall of 1940 GOLOS became "disgusted" with BROTHMAN and indicated to her that he was turning BROTHMAN over to someone clse (some other Soviet superior).

Upon interview by Bureau Agents on May 29, 1947 in his office, Room 1212, 29-28 41st Avenue, Long Island City, New York (Queensbridge Plata area), BROTHMAN stated that in 1938 or 1939 a man whom he identified later in the interview from a photograph as JACOB GOLOS, came into his office at the Republic Chemical Machinery Company, which company was then associated with the Hendrick Manufacturing Company, Carbondale, Pennsylvania. GOLOS at that time, according to BROTHMAN, told him that he had contacts with the Russian Government and that he was in a position to get contracts from the Russian Government for BROTHMAN if BROTHMAN would turn over to him blueprints of certain products BROTHMAN was working on at that time. BROTHMAN maintained that these blueprints were his own property and that they were, for

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the most part, of shafts, wats, and other equipment necessary in the operation of a plant manufacturing chemicals.

According to BROTHMAN, COLOS visited his office on several occasions and some time following GOLOS' original visit GOLOS introduced him to an individual whom BROTHMAN stated he knew only as whelen (ELIZABETH BENTLEY). BROTHMAN claimed he was under the impression that "HELEN" was a secretary to GOLOS. GOLOS told BROTHMAN that "HELEN" would in the future obtain the blueprints which BROTHMAN previously had been accustomed to turn over to GOLOS.

Thereafter, and as related by BELTLEY, BROTHMAN claimed he met "HELEN" on about a dozen occasions during 1938-1940. BROTHMAN recalled en the occasion of this interview that sometime in 1940 "HELEN" stopped coming to his office and another individual named HARRY COLD came to see him, stating that he represented GOLOS. Thereafter, according to BROTHMAN'S story in 1947, GOLD, whom he knew then to live in Philadelphia, made many trips to New York to obtain blueprints from BROTHMAN to be delivered to GOLOS. BROTHMAN placed the date of the last such trip by GOLD to see him for this purpose as being in late 1941 or early 1942.

Also in this interview in 1947 BROTHMAN stated upon questioning that he had become acquainted with GOLOS "possibly because GOLOS knew of his firm through advertising in various chemical magazines." He emphatically stated this was the only possible way that GOLOS would get in touch with him and denied that anybody had ever sent GOLOS to him. BROTHMAN then stated it was a common practice in the engineering field to turn over blueprints to various individuals in an effort to obtain contracts. He also stated this was his sole purpose in turning over the blueprints to GOLOS, namely, that GOLOS had represented to him that he was in a position to obtain contracts for BROTHMAN from the Russian Government.

BROTHMAN admitted he had submitted various contracts to the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission and to the Amtorg Trading Corporation but that he had never obtained any contracts from either of these two agencies.

BROTHMAN admitted membership in the Toung Communist League

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at Columbia University in 1933, but stated that he did not attend any Communist Party meetings as of 1947, nor was he actively engaged in any Communist Party affairs.

Upon questioning, EROTHMAN stated that at the time the Canadian espionage case broke in 1946 he began to suspect that GOLOS might have been engaged in espionage activities as of 1940. Later, before a Grand Jury on July 27, 1947, EROTHMAN reiterated the above story regarding his relationship with BENTLEY, GOLOS and GOLD. GOLD also appeared before this Grand Jury on July 31, 1947 and told a story which generally conformed to the one related by BROTHMAN.

In recent interviews with BROTHMAN, namely, on May 15, 16 and 22, 1950, BROTHMAN repeated the story furnished the Agents in 1947 and the Grand Jury later in 1947, as set forth hereinbefore. The results of these recent interviews are set forth on pages 10 through 14 of the report of SA Joseph C. Walsh, Jr., in the case entitled "HARRY GOLD, with aliases," dated May 29, 1950 at New York, two copies of which were furnished the Albany Office.

For the further assistance of the Syracuse Resident Agency there were enclosed photostatic copies of the following dated teletypes in the following captioned cases:

Teletype from Philadelphia to the Bureau and New York dated June 12, 1950, entitled "HARRY GOLD, was; ESPIONAGE - R. ..

Az will be seen from perusal of these teletypes, the stories

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as told by BROTHMAN and GOLD to Agents and the Grand Jury regarding the origin of their association were completely fabricated. It now appears that BROTHMAN and GOLD, on May 29, 1947, got together between interviews and on the insistence of BROTHMAN, GOLD told the Agents and later the Grand Jury that he had first met BROTHMAN through GOLOS when, as a matter of fact, according to GOLD now, he was originally sent to BROTHMAN by SAM (SEMEN SEMENOV). It also appears that BROTHMAN was being contacted by an individual connected with Amtorg several years before BENTLEY or GOLOS or GOLD started to contact him.

GOLD as set forth in the teletype of June 12, 1950 from Philadelphia, to the effect that GOLD met BROTHMAN first in BROTHMAN'S automobile and that SAM had furnished GOLD with BROTHMAN'S license number, BENTLEY had the following to say in a recent interviews

BENTLEY stated that after GOLOS returned from Philadelphia in late 1910, he instructed her to tell BROTHMAN on the occasion of her next meeting with him that BROTHMAN was going to be turned over to a new contact. BENTLEY stated GOLOS never turned over any of his contacts unless he had been specifically instructed to do so by his superiors. Following this conversation with GOLOS, she stated she met BROTHMAN at a pre-arranged meeting, brought him to Paddy's Clam House on West 34th Street, New York City, and informed him of GOLOS' request. She claims BROTHMAN became adamant and it was necessary for both BENTLEY and GOLOS to see BROTHMAN at a subsequent time, after which she, BENTLEY, ceased to see him anymore.

BENTLEY said that the change-over (of contacts) was effected by obtaining the license number of BROTHMAN'S automobile and requesting him to park his car and remain in it on Eighth or Ninth Avenue in uptown Manhattan. At a specific time the new contact would come by, get into the car, and talk to BROTHMAN, accepting any material he had. She also recalled that after a month or two after she ceased to see

BROTHMAN, he called her and informed her he had lost touch with his new contact. She relayed this information to GOLOS and heard nothing more about it. Her impression was that GOLOS was able to rehabilitate the contact.

It will also be noted that GOLD arranged a meeting between SAN (SEMENOV) and BROTHMAN at the Hotel Lincoln, New York City, in late 1942 or early 1943.

BROTHMAN, in all interviews, has denied that GOID was ever in his home. GOID, however, states that he has been in BROTHMAN'S home. In this connection it should be noted that BROTHMAN for the past several years has lived at 41-08 42nd Street, Sunnyside, Queens, New York, which is within five minutes' drive of the Queens Plaza araa. He lives there with his wife, NAOVI METT BROTHMAN, who is Russian born, and his two children. BROTHMAN was married on June 15, 1937 and admittedly "does not get along with her." BROTHMAN also rents or owns a summer home in Peekskill, New York.

Of further possible interest is the fact that while testifying before the Grand Jury in 1947, BROTHMAN stated that after graduating from Columbia in 1933 he did research work in a laboratory of
his own for about three years. From about 1936 to 1938 BROTHMAN stated,
he worked for the Ansbacher-Siegle Company. Thereafter he became employed at the Republic Chemical and Machinery Company and the Hendrick
Manufacturing Company, 154 Nassau Street, later 114 East 32nd Street,
and later at 30 Church Street, all New York City. The dates of this
last employment were from 1938 to July, 1942.

From July, 1942 to about August, 1944 BROTHMAN was employed as a chemical engineer in the firm of the Chemurgy Design Corporation, 420 Lexington Avenue, (Graybar Building, 43rd Street). In August, 1944 he organized the A. Brothman and Associates, a firm of consulting engineers. His original partners were JULES KORCHIEN, OSCAR J. VAGO, EMIL Z. BAHISH and GERHARD N. WOLLAN. The original address of this firm was 114 East 32nd Street, New York City. BARISH and WOLLAN, and finally VAGO and KORCHIEN left BROTHMAN between the years August, 1944 and June, 1948, All of the above-named individuals have been subjects of SECURITY MATTER - C investigations by the New York Office.

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Since June, 1948 BROTHMAN has had as his partner MIRIAM MOSKOJITZ, formerly his secretary and presently his paramour. BROTHMAN'S offices are still at 29-28 List Street, Long Island City, New York.

By letter dated June 13, 1950 the following information was furnished to the Syracuse Resident Agency regarding JACOB GOLOS:

GOLOS, as TIM, in 1938-1939. GOLOS was the Secretary of World Tourist, Inc., as of 1910. According to BENTLEY, GOLOS operated as the Head of an espionage group in Washington, D. C. from 1938 to 1943. GOLOS died in New York City on November 27, 1943.

GOLOS introduced ABE BROTHMAN to ELIZABETH BENTLEY in May,

It is to be noted that Selective Service records reveal

that in 1940 BROIRAN resided at 41-08 42nd Street, Long Island City, New York, telephone IRonsides 6-7769.

In connection with the investigation of GAIK OVAKIMIAN, a known Soviet agent, a surveillance was instituted in December, 1940. On January 18, 1941 OVAKIMIAN contacted a person identified as JACOB GOLGE. There were several subsequent contacts on the part of these two individuals until May 5, 1941 when OVAKIMIAN was arrested by Agents of the New York Office. They made no contact after this arrest. OVAKIMIAN & Aganted from the United States on July 23, 1941.

the Corby Case, spent about ten days in New York City in 1943 and most of that time he spent with JACOB GOLOS.

By letter dated June 13, 1950 photographs of OVAKIMIAN were submitted to the Philadelphia Office to exhibit to GOLD.

Resident Agency were photographs of OVAKIMIAN and GCLOS for possible use in the interview of SIACK.

It is to be noted that OVAKIMIAN is possibly identical with UNSUB FRED, GOLD'S third espionage superior. GOLD met FRED in late 1937 or early 1938 in New York City.

The true name of JACOB GOLOS was JACOB RAISIN. He was known to TILLIAM REMINGTON and MARY PRICE as "JOHN;" to ROBERT MILLER as JOHN FRIEDMAN. REMINGTON, PRICE and MILLER are the subjects of investigation in connection with the SILVERMASTER Case.

GOLOS was also known in 1922 - 1924 as "DAVIS."

New York teletype to the Bureau, Philadelphia, Albany and the Syracuse Resident Agency dated June 12, 1950, entitled "HARRY GOLD, was; ESPIONIGE - R," referred to the Philadelphia teletype dated June 12, 1950 which mentioned that GOLD stated that EROTHMAN claimed to have a superior several years before ELIZABETH T. BENTLEY, who worked at the

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Amtorg Trading Corporation, was an Armenian and was replaced by a Russian. GOLD stated that this individual had an Armenian name, possibly beginning with "S" or "K". The New York teletype pointed out that this individual may be identical with GAIK OVAKIMIAN, an Armenian and a known Soviet agent. It was especially noteworthy that since OVAKIMIAN was a Doctor of Chemistry and worked at the Amtorg Trading Corporation the same time as SEMEN SEMENOV, he, OVAKIMIAN, possibly recruited RICHARD M. BRIGGS and ALFRED DEAN SLACK, who Tax: also chemists.

Pursuant to Albany letter dated June 12, 1950 a photograph of PAVEL PETROVICH MIKHAILOV was sent to the Syracuse Resident Agency by letter dated June 13, 1950. The Albany letter pointed out that GOLD stated that MIKHAILOV might be an individual to whom he turned over-information in either Buffalo, Rechester or Syracuse.

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furnished to the New York Office regarding ALFRED DEAN SLACK, P.B.I. Komes 4391354. Photographs of SLACK were enclosed with the Identification record. A copy of this Identification record was submitted to Albany (Syrecuse Resident Agency) by New York letter dated June 9, 1950.

By toletype dated June 2, 1950 Buffalo Office was requested to investigate RICHARD DANIEL BRIGGS, mentioned in Buffalo file 117-3 re ALFRED D. SLACK; AFA, and to obtain a photograph of BRIGGS as possibly identified with unknown Americans number one, three and four. Ruffalo was also requested to furnish a photograph to Philadelphia for exhibition to GOLD. It is now known that unknown Americans one, three and four are identical with subject ILEX.

By teletype dated June 2, 1950 Knoxville was requested to check registrations of the Kingsport lim, Kingsport, Tennessee, for GOLD's registration and to submit the same to the F.B.I. Laboratory. A copy of this teletype was furnished to Albany by letter dated June 9, 1950.

By teletype dated June 2, 1950 Chicago was requested to check the Bureau of Public Dobt for information concerning the present whereabouts of SLACK. By the same teletype the Identification Division was requested to furnish pertinent information from the Identification records regarding SLACK. A copy of this teletype was sent to Albany by letter dated June 9th.

Teletypo dated June 3, 1950 to the Buroau, Albany, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Charlotte, and Los Angeles advised that subject's photographs were being forwarded to all offices listed in SAC letter, May 4, 1950, entitleds "ESPICHAGE and INTERHAL SECURITY investigation" (full utilization of Confidential Informants and sources of information) for possible display to contacts listed therein.

Letter dated June 3, 1950 to the Bureau with a copy to all offices listed in above mentioned SAC letter was transmitted together with a photograph of the subject taken in 1942 or 1944.

By letter dated June 6, 1950 the Bureau furnished to Philadelphia photographs of S/. W/LTER C. HOLLOWAY for exhibition to GOLD. A copy of this communication was cent to Albany by letter dated June 9, 1950.

By teletypo dated June 8, 1950 to the Bureau, Baltimore, Los Angeles and Charlotte were requested to exhibit SLACK's photograph to WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, AMADEO SABATIMI, and JOHN

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J. MATHM, respectively.

By letter dated June 5, 1950 Knoxville submitted to the Bureau a photograph of SLACK as requested in Philadelphia teletype dated June 1, 1950. Photograph taken approximately October 1944. The letter noted that the negative of the photograph was available at the Knoxville Office.

By Now York teletype dated June 9, 1950 there was transmitted in full quote the following teletypes:

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 9, 1950 wherein the association of the subject with EUGENE CLEVITCH and APRANAM H. ZIPPERSTEIN in the Development Engineers Company, Atlanta, Georgia, is set out. Indices of the New York Field Division reflect no reference to EUGENE CLEVITCH and ABRAHAM ZIPPERSTEIN or the Development Engineers Company.

Instauch as OLGA and GWEN TROUCHTCH advised that SLACK claimed to have returned from England in 1945 a teletype dated June 13, 1950 was directed to Washington Field requesting that office to check the Passport Division of the State Department for any record regarding SLACK.

A copy of this roport is being furnished to the Pittsburgh Office inasmuch as HOMARD GOCHENAUR, a contact of SLACK, resides within the Pittsburgh Field Division.

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By teletype dated June 13, 1950 the New York Office requested the Newark Office to report and set out leads based on information contained in the following reports, all of which were made at Newark, New Jersey in the case entitled "Communication 9716, UNKNOWN SUBJECTS, PETER DAVID LEVINE - VICTIM; KIDNAPING:"

Report of SA Clyde E. Smith, 2/14/39; Report of SA J. J. Mechan, 6/7/39; Report of SA Glen C. Metcalf, 2/21/42.

The report dated February 21, 1912, mentioned above, reflects on Page Three information that after the death of ERIGIC in Scatember, 1939 a "brother-in-law who came from Rochester" came to Falidai residence in Verona, New Jersey and took away all of ERIGGS: "Perconal property and papers. It is suggested, therefore, that the brother-in-law" is probably subject, SIACK, and that the address book of BRIGGS! probably came into SIACK'S possession at that time. It further appears probable that the folder found in GOLD'S residence containing the information relating to urea and film processing may have also come into SIACK'S possession on BRIGGS! death. This material at a later date was probably furnished to GOLD by SIACK.

At the time BRIGGS was arrested in Florida he signed an authorization permitting this Bureau to make use of his address book and bank book. This authorization bearing BRIGGS' pencilled signature was forwarded to the New York Office by the Miami Office in a letter dated May 30, 1938 in the case entitled "LENAP." Also forwarded by the same letter were five blank sheets of thin typewriting paper found in BRIGGS' suitcase at the time of his arrest. The authorization bearing BRIGGS' signature and the five sheets of typewriting paper have been forwarded by the New York Office to the FBI Laboratory for use in comparison examination.

By teletype dated June 12, 1950 the New York Office advised the Bureau, Albany, Newark and the Syracuse Resident Agency that the address book and bank book belonging to RICHARD M. BRIGGS were mailed by the New York Office to BRIGGS, at 1 East Lincoln Street, Verona, New Jersey, on August 26, 1938.

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



Potails: This is a joint report of SA THOMAS F. RELLY, Jr. and the writer,

Er. ELTON ROLAND ALLISON, Chemist, Faterials Ecction, Foundstion and Esterial Preach, Engineering Division, Walla Balla District, Corpa of Engineers, who resides at 106 Clay Street, Walla Walls, Washington, was interviewed at his place of exployment and furnished the following information relative to his contects with CAIK CVAKIMIAN.

ALLISCH stated that the information furnished to the Regional Loyalty Roard of the 12th L. E. Civil Service Commission Region, San Francisco, California, relative to the fact that OVAKINIAN offered to compensate him if he would obtain for OVAKINIAN the plans of the Hercules Powder facilities at Kenvil, New Jersey, had not been previously furnished to this Eurecu because of the fact that he feared reprisal by the Russians, and because of the fact that he feared the adverse opinions of his employers and friends if they ascertained that the Russians considered him safe to contact relative to such a plan.

ALLICON said that in the summer of 1929 he was a Research Chanist for the Atlantic Refining Company at Philadelphia, Pennsylvanis; that one of his fellow employees was KILLIAN VALISOFF. He stated that this position was a summer job and had a duration of only approximately ten or twolve weeks.

In the early fell of 1933, at which time ALLICON stated he was unexployed, he attended a lecture on the water purification system of the city of Fhiladelphia by Dr. LAX TRUMPER. After the lecture, ALLISON stated he approached teet him at his office at a later date. Shortly thereafter ALLISON contacted TRUMPER and advised TRUMPER that he was a Socialist Farty member; that he benish individuals positions.

attempt to obtain a position in Ruceia where he understood they needed research men. When ALLICON questioned him relative to obtaining a position in Russia, TRULPEN stated that he believed that this could be done through the ALTORO Trading Company, New York City.

ALLISON advised that he mentioned this fact to CHUCK A. PORTER, an individual who was employed at the Atlantic Refining Company and who resided in his home, and that POITER later stated that PALISOFF had advised him, POINTER, that he knew of an individual in the ALTORN Trading Company.

ALLISON said that in the spring of 1934 he went to see Fr. MALISOFF, and at that time 1/11/207F suggested that they go to New York City to contact this individual. This trip was undertaken with ALLISON's wife in attendance, and ALLISON stated that MALISOFF took him to the ACTORS Trading Company and introduced him to GAIK OVAKIKIAE and then left the premises.

ALLISON stated that he advised OVAKINIAN that he was a Socialist Party member and that he believed in Covernment ownership of industry and

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asked about the possibility of obtaining a position in Russia. He also said that this second to be a prearranged interview and that he thought that WALL-\$077 had previously contected OV/XIMIAN, informing OV/XIMIAN that he was bringing someone to his office who was favorable to the Russian system.

This interview lested approximately fifteen minutes, and according to ALLISON, he not no other individuals but was virtually assured of a position in Russia. 可可能的知识。在特别的人的现在分词

He stated that he then returned to Philodelphia and did not make another trip to New York until approximately October 15, 1934. Luring the intervening time, however, he stated that he had carried on some correspondence with OVAKILIAN relative to the dolay in obtaining employment in Eussia.

On approximately October 15, 193h, ALLISON advised that he had been notified that the necessary housing arrangements had been made in Russia and ; that he then went to New York to make the necessary arrangements with OVAKI-MIAN relative to his travel. He said that he contacted CWAKIK AN approximately three times in his office at the AMONG Trading Company and that each of these times they talked of the position, salary, transportation and place of work relative to his promised job.

No stated that he not one other individual only, whose name he can not recall, but that this individual, a Muscian, had just arrived in the United States from Stalinogorsk, the city where ALLISON was to be employed. ALLISON said that he talked to this individual for approximately ten minutes but only concerning the living and working conditions in Stalinogorek.

Then the necessary arrangements had been made, which was shortly after October 15, 193h, ALLISON stated that OVANIMIAN gave him a letter to. deliver to the All-Union Chemical Trust in Moscow, USCH, and one other document which he was to give to the Bussian Imaigration Authorities at . Leningrad, where he was to enter. He advised that the first document was merely concerning his work, but that he did not know the contents of the second document, since it was written in the Eussian language; but OVAMINIAN informed him that this was merely the noccessory information for the Incigration Authorities and permission for him to take his trunk into the country.

He said that he entered Russia at Leningrad, travelled by train to Poscow, where he contacted one ly. ORACIE, an individual in the All-Union Chemical Trust, who

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handled foreign workers.

He was then sent to Stalinogorsk. At Stalinogorsk, he worked at a plant, and this work was chiefly concerned with the analysis and purification of synthetic methanol.

While employed at this plent, he attended political lectures which were hold each week, in which the Russian form of Government was supposized. He frequently argued with the lecturer at this political meeting, because he did not often agree with them.

At this plant, ALLICH advised, he was assisted by one FARRIE YOLSON (phonetic), a Latvian women who spoke many languages and who seemed to be there to assist in helping the foreign workers with their problems. He advised that this individual ands friends with his wife and that he felt that she was "tailing" him. He stated that he arrived at this conclusion because of her friendship and because of the nature of the conversations she would draw him into.

He stated that she was on the technical staff of this plant, was highly paid and dressed better than the other employees. He described her as follows:

ALLISON stated that he soon became involved in a querrel with Kr. FULDIMAN, the Director of the Stalinogorsk plant, and he went to see the head of the Communist Ferty at Stalinogorsk because he had learned during his residence in this city that the Communist Ferty was "all-powerful". ALLISON added that he had never met this individual previously; that he could not recall his name, but that he had observed him on the street in Stalinogorsk where people had pointed him out as being the Secretary of the Communist Party.

He stated that he received no satisfaction from this individual and was later contacted and advised that he no longer had a position at this plant. He was advised, however, that the Russians would attempt to obtain a position for him in the Characcoutical Trust at Moscow.

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Shortly after this, he went to the local militia to renew his living permit and was advised that this permit had expired and that he had only three days to leave Mussis. This greatly troubled and frightened him, and he contacted his wife, who at that time was employed in a hospital in lossow.

Upon recommendation of his wife's Russian friends, she contacted the American Communiste, and ALLISON was granted an extension of time in which to get out of America.

He added that in regard to his position with the Phermaceutical Trust, he had obtained this position but could not go to work until he could find living quarters in Poscow. ALLIGHE advised that he resided at the Notel for Lasterners for approximately one month in Poscow and contacted Charles of the All-Union Chemical Trust several times in attempting to obtain living quarters. He was, however, unable to do so; therefore, he and his wife departed from Russia.

ALLISON stated that this was in February of 1936 and that it was his opinion that this was a polite way of forcing him to leave the country, since the Russians had fixed it so he could not obtain living quarters.

ALLISON servised that he and his wife travelled from Morcow to Paris via train and that they arrived in New York City approximately April 8, 1936, at which time they were not at the dock by Mr. and Mrs. DONALD F. PINNELL, friends of theirs who resided in Brooklyn, New York. He stated that he and his wife resided with the PINNELLS in Brooklyn for a period of time and that after approximately three or four days he contacted CVAKIMIAN at his office at the AMTORG Tracing Company and "aprilled his sad tale" relative to his troubles encountered in Russia. He stated by so-doing he thought he could help other foreigners who were to be applayed in Jussia.

At this time, he was unoncloyed, and OTAKIVIAN, knowing this, stated that through his business contacts with the APTORS Trading Company he had learned of several companies which had aggressive research programs in the chemical field. He furnished ALLISON with the names of four individuals and four individuals companies who might possibly be able to help him obtain exployment. One of these was ir. HILLIYIN of the Hercules Ponder Company, and ALLISON advised that he was unable to recall the names of the other individuals but that two of the firms were the Chemical Construction Company, New York City, and the Carbide and Carbon Company, New York City.

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Approximately two or three weeks after arriving in the United States from Russis, ALLISON advised that he and his wife drove over to OVAKINIAN's spartment in Brooklyn. He stated that when they arrived at this apartment, there was a blonde Russian woman, a friend of OVAKINIAN, and that OVAKINIAN was very short with him and his wife and appeared to be upset, due to the fact that they had drouped in without any prior arrangements. Due to this situation, ALLISON stated that he and his wife stayed only approximately ten minutes and then went back to the PIEMELL residence where they were staying.

ir. ALLISON furnished the following voluntary signed statement concerning further contest and attempted "bribe" by OVAKINIANA (1988) (1988)

Firella Falls, Washington June 9, 1950

*I, ELTON FOLAND ALLISON, make the following voluntary statement to PCNALD L. COFFIN and THOMAS F. KILLY, Jr., who have identified thomselves to me to be frecials Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Cepartment of Justice.

"After returning to the Uni'ed Etates from Russis on April 8, 1936, I, in three or four days, contected GIFK OVAKINIAN at the Antong Trading Corporttion in Mez York City to explain to him the trouble and treatment I had been subjected to while in Russia. I did this because I thought by so complaining it would possibly help other Americans in their travels or employment in Russia. At this time br. OVAKINIAN, knowing that I was unemployed, offered suggestions to help me obtain employment, through some of his busimess contacts. He explained that as a representative of the Autory Trading Corporation, that he knew of several fires, which had aggressive research a progress in the chemical field. He furnished me the names of four individuals in four different companies, one of which was ir. EILLIK N of the was Mercules Powder Company. I contacted Pr. MILLIAM at Millmington, Delaware, and he acknowledged the fact that he knew ir. OWAKIMIAN, but it is my inpression on being interviewed at this time that Er. OVAKINTAN had not a pression or being interviewed at this time that Er. approached by. MILLIKEN relative to hiring me. Mr. MILLIKEN sent me to the Rercules experimental station outside Kilmington, where I applied for a : position as a research chemist. About ten days after this I was notified to report for work at the Mercules Experiment Station. I do not believe M that Er. CVAKIVIAN assisted in any way in getting me this position.

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Fifter my return from Bussia I had exchanged Christmas cards with Kr. WILLIAM WALISOFF of Brooklyn, New York, a former fellow employee at the Atlantic Refining Company, Philedelphia, Pa. Shortly thereafter, Fe, Kr. WALISOFF, invited my wife and I to attend a Lincoln's Lay lecture in New York City by Benry Ballace. This was in February of 1939.

Wipon arrival at the lecture hall, it was found that ir. OVAKINIAN was occupying a seat in our box. I beleive that some arrangeous were made at that time for my wife and I to have have dinner with kr. CVARITIES at a future date.

"About two or three neeks after this, my wife and I drove to br. OVARILIAN's apartment in Prooklyn, R. T. He took my wife and I to dinner at a hotel and later to a night club. When returning to Er. OWAKIMIAN ... apartment in his automobile, a discussion took place concerning my work. I told him that I was working on double base powder and had found it to be effective; that if the kuscians did not siready have double base ponder then they should have it or at least be doing research work on it. Furing the a conversation, when I asked him if the livestens had double base ponder, he ignored my question. He then made a plen for help, playing on my sympathies, stating that the Aussians were in danger of war with Germany; and that he would like to get information concerning the powder that I was working on at the Kenvil Plant. At this time, he asked me to get a lay out of the 100 Renvil Plant, the production methods, the materials, and a description of the mechines used at this plant. For this information he offered to compensate me between \$500 and \$1,000, the exact amount which I can not recall. At this particular time, I was anti-mazi and pro-russian and would have liked to have given the requested information to the Russians. However, because of my logalty to the Europles Fonder Company, I fult that I could not soll this information since it was not mine. I told QVAXINIAN that the only time that I would sell this information would be if I terminated my 🙈 employment with the Bercules Company; in that event, I would have felt in ethically free to give him the desired information. I could not see where the componention offered by CVAKINIAN would pay no to terminate my employment with the Bercules Powler Company which paid me a good salary. Therefore, I told OVAKINIAN that if I decided to terminate my employment or to furnish him the desired information, I would let him know. After talking this over with my wife, I decided not to furnish OVAKIMIAN the desired information or to terminate my employment since I could not see myself doing odd jobs for the Russians for the rest of my life.

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OVANTHIAN and this was the only occasion where he attempted to solicit information from me.

When questioned concerning the statement that "I could not see myself doing odd jobs for the Euscians for the rest of my life", he stated that he meant that he could not see furnishing technical and research data which was available to him to the Euscians for whatever compensation they offered him.

ALLISON edvised that he had always considered FILLIAN PALISON? as a pro-Russian and possibly a member of the Communist Party. However, he said that he read in the News Edition of the Industrial Engineers and Charlets that PALISOFF had died in 1947.

ALLYSON emphatically denied that he had ever furnished any information to OVAKINIAN — that he had communicated with OVAKINIAN while he, ALLICON, was in Russia, and he further stated that OVAKINIAN, nor any other individual whom he thought to be a Russian Agent, had contacted him after OVAKINIAN had offered to compensate him for obtaining the plans of the Kenvil Plant of the Rercules Powder Company.

My dear Mr. Cornelius:

I have just returned from an interview with Harry Gold and he advised he that during the Grand Jury hearings at which he testified in New York City, and I think a week ago today, although the date is not particularly naterial, he made certain statements which were not in accordance with the facts. The particular statements to which I refer have to do with noney received by him from Soviet sources. Hr. Gold tells me that his testimony before the Grand Jury was in substance to the effect he had received no makey from Soviet klans Fuchs. He says that the facts are that for five or six years he had received money to recompense him for expenses incurred. Hr. tails as best he can remember them of these payments by Soviet agents to the members of your Burcau.

I am not confident in my our wind that such a correction of his testimony given to your agents is sufficient to correct the vectord of the Grand Jury hearings and I am particularly anxious that he should not stand in the position of being charged with verjury in that connection. If the corrections in this matter have not been forwarded to the Unites States District Attorney of the proper District, I would appreciate it if you would send to him the copy of this letter which is enclosed herewith for your convenience.



At 3:10 P.M., Inspector Carl Hennrich, Bureau, called and stated the Bureau was concerned re HARRY GOLD's testimony in the forthcoming trials and in this connection wanted to know when the trials in New York are scheduled. I advised him, as follows:

The BROTHMAN case is to be called on the calendar for 10/30/50. The present plan is to set it down for trial on the following Monday, 11/6/50, pick the jury that day; and, election day being 11/1/50, the trial would probably start 11/8/50. They expect the trial to take about one week.

REMINGTON CASE is to be called 11/3/50, on which date they hope to set the trial date. They hope to set it in November and, it will probably be set for either 11/17/50 or 11/20/50.

ROSENBERG case is on calendar for call 12/4/50. The United States Attorney told me yesterday that he does not desire to have this case come before a Christmas Jury and for that reason would set it over until early in January, 1950.

The reason these trials are not being set together is that the United States Attorney himself wants to try all three of them and wants to participate personally in the trials. HARRY GOLD is considered to be a very essential witness in the ROSENBERG case.

GOLD advised that he was born December 12, 1910 in Berne, Switzerland, the son of SAM and CELIA GOLD. He said that his parents were both born in Russia, and that his father had been in Switzerland for about eight or ten years following the occupation of a cabinet maker. His parents emigrated to the United States in 1914, at which time the family name was GOLODNITSKY. GOLD explained that on arrival at Ellis Island, the family name had been spelled in several different ways, which delayed their entry into the country. To facilitate matters his father changed, his name to GOLD.

The GOLD family went to Little Rock, Arkansas, where they resided with a relative for a short period of time. In the late summer of 1914 they went to Chicago, Illinois, where they stayed for approximately nine or ten months, while the father was employed in the stock yards and coal yards. On leaving Chicago SAM GOLD went to Norfolk, Virginia, to get employment in a shipyard, while CELIA and HARRY GOLD came to Philadelphia, where they were joined shortly thereafter by the father. They resided with CELIA GOLD'S brother in Philadelphia. This was in the year 1915.



GOID advised that there are no known living relatives of his family in Europe.

Father - SAM GOLD

SAM GOLD was born January 1, 1881 in Kiev, Russia. He was employed by RCA from December 24, 1916 to January 31, 1946, with periodic short term layoffs. He was head sander in the Cabinet Department prior to 1942 and was a stock handler to 1946. His average salary was \$40.00 to \$50.00 per week at the time of his retirement. He is presently receiving a pension of \$25.96 from RCA. SAM GOLD received "excellent and a very good ratings" from his employer and there was nothing derogatory in his record regarding his work, conduct, attitude, character or loyalty.

Brother - JOSEPH GOLD

On JOSEPH GCID'S Civil Service application dated May 9, 1946 he indicated that he was born February 20, 1917 at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania;

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that he was single, and was previously employed by the Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot, United States Army. He left this position in March, 1943, to enter the United States Army. He was previously employed from February 1936 to April 1942 as a router and clerk by Merchants Parcel Delivery, Philadelphia. He left this position to have a hernia operation. He was graduated from the South Philadelphia High School (no date given.) He also attended Central Signal Corps School, Camp Crowder, Missouri, while in the Army from May, 1943, to November, 1943, receiving as switchboard installer T.5.

He has a 10% service connected disability because of Maleria. A physical examination for the position of clerk with the Veterans Administration was taken July 30, 1946 and he began work August 2, 1946 as Clerk CAF 2.

JOSEPH GOLD'S Army Serial Number was 13111964 and he was honorably discharged as T/5 from Detachment F, 4025 Signal Service Group on January 17, 1946. JOSEPH GCID enlisted in the United States Army August 18, 1942 at Philadelphia. He was engaged in battles and campaigns at New Guinea, South Philippines, Luzon, General Orders 30 and 40, War Department 45. GOLD entered the Freshman Class at the University of Pennsylvania in the Fall of 1930. He withdrew on March 12, 1932. The records gave no indication that GOLD had participated in sports groups or other organizational activities.

Drexel Institute of Technology

GOLD entered Drexel Night School in February 1933 and was graduated June 5, 1936 with a diploma in Chemical Engineering. Drexel Night School does not award degrees, and consequently GOLD received only a diploma. The records at this school do not disclose GOLD'S membership in any school group, cociety or other organization.



GOLD'S Statements re Background Not Heretofore Reported

While at Southern High School, Philadelphia, GOLD stated that he corrected papers of students in an examination given in Senior English class regarding Macbeth. GOLD stated that his instructor gave him the papers to take home and grade, and that he spent the entire night making corrections and erasures on all the papers so that no student would fail. GOLD stated that his teacher, a Dr. FARBINI, was apparently cognizant of GOLD'S act and was quite sarcastic to him. GOLD stated that he told BROTHMAN of this incident.

GOLD pointed out that the fabrication about his having a wife and child was in accordance with specific instructions received from his Soviet superiors; that SEMEN SEMENOV told GOLD to say that he was married in his dealings with both SLACK and ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, on the theory that if his contacts knew he was married, they would consider him more stable, dependable and reliable.

war, which he told BROTHMAN, was used as a simple expedient in that he could not get to New York for a meeting with BROTHMAN.

GOLD stated that when he went to work for BROTHMAN in 1946 he told BROTHMAN that he and his wife had quarreled and were contemplating a separation; that his wife had become aware of his using the family money for espionage, and this was the reason for their separation. He asserted that BROTHMAN was quite sympathetic and said that everything would work out. GOLD said that he kept up the fiction of his marriage until the FBI Agents interviewed him at the time of BROTHMAN'S Grand Jury testimony. At this time GOLD told BROTHMAN he was not married.

GOLD said that he has been drinking regularly from the time he was about seventeen or eighteen years of age. He recalls that while on night work in 1932 he got drunk on the job and slept it off. Once again the same thing happened in 1933. He says he did not drink at work from about 1933 to 1940. During this period GOLD was employed by the Pennsylvania Alcohol Company, which is a subsidiary of the Pennsylvania Sugar Company.

GOLD stated that he does not believe either SEMENOV or YAKOVLEV knew of his excessive drinking, nor does he believe BROTHMAN was aware of the same.

During the period beginning in 1937 or 1938, while employed at the Pennsylvania Alcohol Company, GOLD said that he and MORRELL E.

DOUGHERTY stole alcohol from the still room and the bonded warehouse at the Penn Alcohol Company. In late 1940 GOLD and DOUGHERTY stole alcohol regularly and intensively, taking as much as ten gallons a week. This they transferred to a flat one gallon container which they transported from the company in brief cases. They sold this alcohol to various employees for five or six collars per gallom. GOLD explained that the money he realized from this source was used to some extent in financing his trips to see SLACK.

GOID steadfastly denies any acts of homosexuality or of ever having been involved in anything of the sort.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

FGJ for Northeastern Division of the Eastern Judicial District of Tennessee on 9-1-50 at Greeneville, Tennessee, returned indictment against the subject, charging him with conspiracy to commit Espionage in that he and the (1) met and conspired with HARRY GOLD and (2) delivered to HARRY GOLD information relating to the national defense of the United States. At his arraignment on 9-18-50 before Judge ROBERT L. TAYLOR of the U. S. District Court, Greeneville, SLACK pleaded guilty to both counts. On 9-22-50 Judge TAYLOR sentenced the subject to imprisonment for a term of 15 years. SLACK admits receiving about six cash payments for information furnished by him to HAPRY GOID' and advises that SEGENOV made one additional offer. The formation and operations of the Development Engineering Company explained by SIACK with denial that it, or the partners involved with SLACK in this organization, were involved in any manner with his espionage activities. Fi MARIO CASTILIO'S association with SLACK at Oak Ridge ? reported, and no connection with SLACK'S espionage activities noted. SLACK unable to furnish any information . regarding the training of Russian Nationals at the Dailey. Paper Company and states that he was never cognizant of 🗟 any such plan. Admits that the individual who sought to obtain the notebook from the home of RICHARD BRIGGS after BRIGGS' death could have been GEORGE CAMPBELL. Report and Disposition Sheet submitted.

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DETAILS:

I. PROSECUTIVE ACTION

The Federal Grand Jury for the Northeastern Division of the Eastern Judicial District of Tennessee, meeting on September 1, 1950, in Greeneville, Tennessee, returned an indictment against the subject, charging him with violation of Sub-section (a) of Section 32, Title 50, United States Code, in that he conspired to commit explonage against the United States and that, in the execution of this conspiracy, he did (1) meet and conspire with HARRY GOLD, and (2) deliver to HARRY GOLD information relating to the national defense of the United States.

The subject was arraigned before Judge ROBERT L. TAYLOR, United States District Court, on September 18, 1950, at Greeneville, Tennessee, and pleaded guilty to both counts of the indictment. SLACK was represented by attorneys RAT JENKING of Knowville and KYLE K. KING of Kingsport, Tennessee.

AUSA JAMES M: MEEK presented a recommendation from the Attorney General of the United States that a sentence of ten years imprisonment be considered for SLACK. Judge TAYLOR deferred sentence until a later date.

SLACK again appeared before Judge TAMOR on September 22, 1950, and was sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment in a Federal institution to be designated by the Attorney Coneral.

SLACK departed for the United States Penitentiary at Atlanta, Georgia, in custody of the United States Earshal on September 22, 1950, to await the designation of the penal institution in which he would serve his term.

II. DITERVIEWS WITH ALFRED DEAM SLACK

All interviews were conducted by the writer and Special Agent CHARLTON C. McSMAIN.

A. PAYMENTS RECEIVED FROM HARRY GOLD

SLACK adviced that each time he was paid for his espionage activities by HALRY GOLD, he was paid in each. SLACK gave GOLD a receipt on each occasion when GOLD made a payment to SLACK and signed each receipt with the name "DOOLITTLE." This money received from GOLD was, according to SLACK, never deposited by him, but was used to purchase war bonds or was utilized for SLACK'S current expenses.

These receipts were written to Secretary of paper with either pencil or pen and consisted merely of:

"Received (sum of money)

Doolittle"

GOLD never indicated to SLACK the disposition of these receipts, but SLACK assumed that they were passed on to COLD'S espianage superiors. Information of some nature was furnished to SOLD on each occasion when GOLD paid SLACK.

The last payment made by GOLD was during the period SLACK was employed at the Eastman Kodak Company in Rochester. There were no payments nade to SLACK after SLACK left the employ of the Eastman Kodak Company.

SLACK attempted to recall the number of times he was paid by GOLD and the number of receipts he Furnished to MOLD. These occasions did not exceed a maximum of six.

SLACK recalled one specific payment of approximately \$250.00 by GOLD on an occasion in New York City when he not COLD on the otreet on Madison Avenue near the florist shop. (This meeting has been previously reported.) He was unable to recall exactly what information he furnished COLD, but was of the opinion that it concerned data on the components of scrap film.

SLACK was unable to remember the specific instance, but he was of the opinion that he had been paid on at least one other occasion in New York City.

SLACK recalled one payment of approximately \$250.00 while GOLD and SLACK were driving between Rochester and SLACK'S home at West Webster, and believes that he furnished GOLD with information regarding the recovery of scrap film at this time. He placed this payment as approximately one year prior to the termination of his Eastern Kodak employment.

SLACK remembered a second payment by GOLD at SLACK'S home in Webster amounting to about \$250.00 and believed that he probables farmished GOLD information on the recovery of silver from second film at this time.



SLACK could not recellect specifically, out estimated there must have been at least two other occasions when he received payments from GOLD in the vicinity of Rochester.

SLACK continued that "ROBERT" had effered SLACK \$300.00 in each on the occasion of SLACK'S last contact with "ROBERT". This contact has been previously reported. SLACK stated that he was attempting to withdraw from the espionage ring at this time, and consequently refused to accept the money. "ROBERT" then advised SLACK that the workers of Rassia were accumulating a fund to purchase a battleship and that "ROBERT" would put this \$300.00 in this workers' fund.

B. DEVELOPALET ENGINEERING COMPANY

On July 2h and 27, 1950, ALFRED DYAM SLACK was interrogated concerning his association with EUGENE OLIVITCH, ABRAHAM ZIPPERSTEIN and R. E. HOLLKWAY on their formation of the Development Engineering Company and with regard to the activities of the Development Engineering Company itself. There is being set forth herewith a chronological narrative of this activity as given by SLACK.

SLACK stated he first met EUGEVE OLEVITCH shortly after he went to work in Building 9202 of the Y-12 area. OLEVITCH was transferred in as a shift supervisor in this building and upon reporting for work, called who was in charge. SLACK was introduced to him and he advised SLACK that he had been with the Manhattan District and had been sent down to start a new unit. SLACK stated that at the time. OLEVITCH reported, he, SLACK, was doing mechanic's work in setting up that particular unit of 9202. During the following weeks in which they were closely associated in their work, they deceme well acquainted and inasmuch as OLEVITCH was single and lived in a barracks at Ock Ridge, SLACK hed invited him to his home for dinner and OLEVITCH visited his home on asveral occasions socially.

SIACK stated he first met ABRAMAN EIPPERSTEEN one day while he and his wife, JULIA, were out fishing. EIPPERSTEEN happened to be fishing in the same spot and they struck up a conversation. At this same time JULIA SLACK went up to ZIPPERSTEEN'S car and began a conversation with Mrs. ZIPPERSTEEN. SLACK determined that ZIPPERSTEEN worked in one of the Sata Buildings in the Y-12 area and found tast ZIPPERSTEEN worked in the same building with GERE WILLIAMS who already was a friend of SLACK. For quite a period of time, SLACK folly that zero and the impression that he, SLACK, was an F.B.I. man or an



intelligence agent at Oakeridge 11 to 11 CK can give no reason why ZIPPENSTEIN would have thought this of him. He stated that during the ensuing months, he and ZIPFENSTEIN became quite well acquainted and that ZIPFENSTEIN and his wife frequently visited their home socially.

SLACK stated that he had previously known R. L. HOLLOWAY in Cincinnati, Ohio, at which time they were both employed as expediters for the Tennessee Eastman Corporation in connection with their work for the Helaton Ordnance Works. HOLLOWAY was, for a short period of time, temployed as an expediter at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and after leaving this position and moving on to a sales job in Atlanta, Georgia, SLACK thinks that HOLLOWAY may have called him on several occasions.

SLACK stated that absolutely no persons, other than the three named above, had any connection whatsoever with the Development Engineering Company which was later formed.

During 1965, SLACK stated he had begun to look around for some type of work other than that at Oak Ridge and ne desired to find some work which he considered "completely innocuous" as he wished to relieve bimself of the fear that he might be again contacted by some Seviet representative. In connection with this, he had nad several . conversations with HOLLOWAY concerning the development of a plastic band to replace a cotton band being used in textile mills as tension pullers on spindles. SLACK believed that HOLLOWAY, after leaving Oak Ridge, had gone to work as a salesman for the Meadows Manufacturing Company of Atlanta, Georgia, having met WEALOWS during the time he was working as an expediter at Oak Ridge. Through this employment, HOLLOWAY became aware of the need for an improved band for textile mills and knowing that SLaCK had some knowledge of plustics had discussed the possibility of namufacturing them with SLACK. Consequently, SLACK stated that during his vacation period in 1915, he went to Atlanta, Georgia, where HOLLOWAY had arranged for him to meet AMADOWS. He thinks he may have stayed with HOLLOWAY in East Point, Georgia, although he cannot recall clearly at this time whether or not HOLLOWAY was there. He does recall that he kept his appointment with MEADOWS at this time and that HOLLOWAY was not present during this discussion with MEADOWS. Upon this first meeting with MEADOWS, they discussed the possibility of development of the plastic band and MEADOWS asked him to come to Atlanta, Georgia and begin the work, and SLACKed tentatively accepted.

With regard to the second and the with MEADOWS, SLACK stated he recalls that he went to Atlante and a handally communicated with MEMADOWS and made the appointment to meet him. He believed he was in Atlanta two or three days and that although HOLLOWAY was not present during the time he was talking with MEADOWS, he did return before SLACK left Atlanta and they talked concerning has conversation with MEADOWS. SLACK stated that at the time he had this conversation with E ADONS, he already had a well-formed idea as to how he could produce the plastic band desired and that such knowledge had been gleaned by him through his studies in related fields and his previous Lexperience in chemistry. SLACK also stated that both he and HOLIOWAY were aware of the fact, through some medium, that such a plastic band had been utilized in Germany at some time in the past. Accordingly, SLACK stated that HOLLOWAY merely acted as the contact man with MEADOWS and played no part in the actual development of this band.

SIACK continued that he left Oak Nidge, Tennessee, approximately three menths after the bombing of Hiroshima and went directly to Atlanta, Georgia. Immediately upon arriving in Atlanta, he began work for MEADOWS on a strict salary basis. He stated that he set up a small laboratory in the Meadows Plant, bought the necessary equipment and began making tests. After working on it for some time, MEADOW'S partner became somewhat impatient and felt they were not making rapid enough progress. MEADOWS talked this over with SIACK and advised that since his partner, WHITEMEAD, did not agree with what they were trying to do, they would set up another company for the development and MEADOWS would be willing to share equally in all expenses. Following this, SIACK stated he took all the equipment that had been assembled and the experimental materials and chemicals for which he gave MEADOWS a note for \$1,000.00.

SLACK stated that just prior to this, which would be early in 19h6, EUGEME OLEVITCH had been discharged from his job due to reduction in force at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and had come to Atlanta as a result of conversation which he, SLACK, had had with OLEVITCH concerning the project which he had undertaken. SLACK stated he and OLEVITCH had become good friends and therefore OLEVITCH came to live in the house with him and his wife, JULIA. SLACK said it was OLEVITCH'S idea when he came to Atlanta to go into the development business with SLACK. He pointed out that even while at Oak Ridge, he and OLEVITCH had often discussed their plans for the future and OLEVITCH had frequently expressed a desire to start his own consultant engineering business.

SLACK stated that also about this time, ZIPPERSTEIN had been terminated from Oak Ridge due to a reduction in force, and also being a good friend of SLACK, had come to Atlanta, Georgia, on a visit. SLACK stated that ZIPPERSTEIN had worked in Cincinnati before the war as a chemical engineer and that while at Oak Ridge he and SLACK had had conversations concerning the future after leaving Oak Ridge, and ZIPPERSTEIN desired to continue his work in the chemical engineering field.

Inasmuch as ZIPPERSTEIN and OLEVITCH were good friends and JULIA SLACK and ZIPPERSTEIN'S wife were good friends and had corresponded subsequent to SLACK'S leaving Oak Ridge, SLACK felt it only natural that ZIPPERSTEIN had come down to Atlanta to see them after leaving Oak Ridge. Also, in this connection, it was SLACK'S recollection that when he first left Oak Ridge and went to Atlanta, Georgia, he had resided in the Y.M.C.A. until such time as he was able to find a home and upon finding a residence, ZIPPERSTEIN had driven JULIA to Atlanta and assisted her in moving.

Thus it occurred, according to SLACK, that both OLEVITCH and ZIPPERSTEIN were in Atlanta when MAADOWS approached him re the desirability of establishing an independent company with regard to the development of the plastic band. When SLACK sathered the material at the Meadows Plant, ZIPPERSTEIN and OLEVITCH had already found a place to rent which was in a former garage. He stated that they all planned to live on their savings and to share expenses in the development work which they had ahead of them. SLACK stated that MEADOWS put absolutely no meney into the enterprise other than the fact that he allowed them to take all of the chemicals, experimental materials, and machines upon the basis of a \$1,000.00 note.

SLACK stated that they actually formed a company known as the Development Engineering Company which was registered in Atlanta, Georgia, and thereupon advertised in the paper as consultant engineers and development chemists. At this point, in addition to their work on the plastic band, they had received another idea from HOLLOWAY with regard to an oiling system which would be automatic for loom spindles. This was to be OLEVITCH'S principal work whereas the others were to continue work on the plastic band. As the work progressed, they worked together on these two ideas and tackled any newspace which were put to them. SLACK stated that HOLLOWAT very definitely did not have any part in the Development Engineering Company and never put any money into it. He further denies categorically that ETADOMS at any

time gave him considerable amounts. Such as \$7,000.00 or \$8,000.00. He further stated that he was not aware of any disgruntlement on the part of HOLLOWAY and to his knowledge they never had any type of falling out. With regard to considerable sums put out by MEADOWS, SLACK stated be does recall on one occasion when they were looking for an extruing machine, they had a line on one they thought they could buy for \$3,000.00. MEADOWS agreed to spend this amount of money for it and SLACK had inquired concerning the possible purchase of the machine. SLACK found that the machine had already been purchased when he contacted the owner and therefore, this money was never spent by EEDOMS.

Silical continued blas when they first started the Development Engineering Company, ZIFTENSTEIN and his wife, as well as OLEVITCH, were living with him and JULIA.

The company was formed as a registered pertnership by SLACK and maintained a bank account at the East Point Sank, East Point, Georgia. He stated that each of the interested persons, who were ZIPPENSTER, OLEVETCH, and himself, contributed \$500.00 at the beginning.

After forming the company and beginning their advertisements, they received a jet placing mirrors for an Atlanta company which manufactured medicine carinets. They were successful in doing a good plating job for this manufacturer and during the entire period that the Development Engineering Company was operative, they were constantly working on orders for this company. SLACK was unable to remember the name of the manufacturer for whom they did this work.

In attempts to develop the plastic band, SIACK stated it was necessary for him to obtain a certain type of polyvinal alcohol and, in this connection, it was necessary for him to make inquiries of several large cherical companies. He does recall that they contacted the Dow Chemical Company, but never received an answer other than a sample recompat. He also recalls that he contacted the Dupont Chemical Company at Wilmington, Delaware, and in this connection actually made a trip to this plant and had a talk with the assistant siles manager whose name he recalls as TYSON. SLACK remembers that they were slow about furnishing the alcohol requested and seemed to be reluctant to make it available although he does not know specifically why this was see. SLACK stated he had the knowledge that the I. G. Farber Company of Germany had patented this alcohol for use many years in the past.

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He also recalled he had samples of the winal alcohol from the Tennessee Mastman Corporation and the Celanese Corporation as well as the other two named. This development work went on for a little over a year and SIACA stated they never got the plastic band to a marketable point due to the difficulty had in obtaining the alcohol. He also stated naming ever came of their developing an automatic eiler for the leam spindles. The only actual production they did was the mirror plating for the un-named company.

SLACK advised that he could be much more specific with regard to dates, income of the company, expenditures, et cetera, if he were able to review the records of that company which had been maintained and with as has repadence in Syracuse, New York. SLACK also recalls : that during this product when the Development Engineering Company was operating he had been contacted by JOSEPH W. MILLER of the Hammer Dry Plate Company in St. Louis, Missouri. WILLER had been a friend of RICHARD MARLOWS PRICES during the time that BRIGGS had worked for the Hammer Dry Plate Company during 1936 and 1937. With regard to HILLER, he stated that HILLER and previously tried to contact him once before when he had gone to West Webster, New York, and ShACH had already moved to Kingsport. From the story which SLICK later got from MILLER, it was SLACK'S recollection toat BHLER had been talking with SALZGEBER in St. Louis, who also had been a friend of MICHAPO BRIGHS, and they were looking for someone to develop some material for the Buck Ex-O-Graph Company of St. Louis, which was a manufacturer of X-ray film and almost every other product in the X-ray line except the machine itself.

SLACK could not recall how MILLER located hum in Atlanta, Georgia, but he does recall he had considerable correspondence with MILLER during this time and that on one occasion MILLER made a trip to Atlanta with another young follow, whose name SLACK cornet recall. SLACK stated that although MILLER had known RICHARD BRIGGS and had seen him in New York on one occasion, he, SLACK, certainly never suspected that MILLER might have had any connection whatsoever with FRIGGS activities as an agent of the Soviet. It was SLICK'S belief that MILLER'S friendship with ERICGS aprung purely from their business association.

SLACK continued that through LILLTH'S assistance, arrangements were made for the Development Engineering Company to do research work for the Cramer Company of St. Louis in photo emilsion. In this connection, SLACK made a trip to St. Louis, Missouri, where he met with JOE BILLER and R. W. SALZGEBER, and Mr. Ruch Concerning work

that he was to do for them. As a result this trip, the Development Engineering Company began working in photo emulsion for Cramer, unti-collation backing for Hammer Dry Plate Company and sensitizers for the Pack Engli Company.

SLACK advised that they did succeed in developing a satisfactory emulsion for the Cramer Company and thereafter engaged in producing this chemical for their use and sold it to the company.

SLACK stated that it soon become apparent that the Development Engineering Company was not going to be a successful venture and that ZIPPERNIFE! segarated himself from the organization approximately seven to eight months after coming to Atlanta. ZIPPERSTERN ment from Atlanta to Cincinnati, Ohio, where it is SLACK'S belief that he obtained a job with some brewery or organization manufacturing yeast. The organization continued for approximately seven months longer at the end of which time he, SLACK, was almost broke and decided to try to obtain another job. It was at this time that he obtained his position with the Scripto Manufacturing Company in Atlanta, Georgia, where he acted as a foreman in the production of mechanical pencils. He stated that he was engaged primarily in production of these pencils but recalls that he did do a slight amount of work in helping the superintendent develop and improve types of pens. During the time he was employed at Scripte. OLEVITCH continued his activities with the Development Engineering Commany and produced the emulsion for the Cramer Company as well as the plating job for the medicine cabinet manufacturer.

SIACK recalls that his superior at Scripto Manufacturing Company was Mr. ASLECAR. The Manager of the Scripto Manufacturing Company, named FIGHDS, approached BLACK with the possibility of taking over ASHMORE'S job, but just at this time ASHMORE had come to SIACK with a letter which he had received from a Mr. W. C. MAYS in Providence, Abade Island, in which letter MAYS was attempting to find someone to assist him in the numeracturing of pencils in the company known as Mays Associates at Providence. ASIGORE persuaded SIACK to go to P.cvidence to see MAYS concerning a job,

SLACK continued that he went to Providence and discussed the possibility of a job with MAYS and that on the occasion of this trip, W. C. MAYS offered him a job as Plant Manager for Mays Associates. A This company was engaged in the manufacture of sechanical panels.

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also. SLACK returned to Atlanta where he made final arrangements for moving and then immediately moved to Providence, Rhode Island, to take his new position there. EUGENE OLYTICH accompanied SLACK to Providence with the idea that he would obtain a position with Mays Associates through the assistance of SLACK. After mariving in Providence, OLEVITCH did not immediately begin work with Hays Associates although a position was eventually secured for him in this company. In any event, OLEVITCH continued to manufacture the emission for the Cramer Company of St. Louis, and they derived some small income—from this activity.

SLACK stated that it soon became obvious that the methods used by MAYS in the production of the mechanical pencils was not one which was communically feasible, and it soon was apparent that Mays Associates could not continue. It was been that SLACK decided that it would be advisable to find other employment. Upon reaching the decision that Mays Associates could not be developed into a paying activity, he returned to Syracuse, New York, in search of employment. When he lost Providence, Rhode Island, OLTVITCH also left and OLEVITCH went back to St. Louis, Lissouri.

SLACK stated that he did not immediately go to work for the Sundure Paint Corpany upon his return to Webster, New York, but spent come combs building his own home on the property which he owned. With regard to his financial status at that time, he said that while none of his financial ventures subsequent to his leaving Cak Ridge, Tennessee, had proven profitable, he nevertheless had managed to not lose a great deal of money by reason of the fact that most of his expenses had been paid by others, and trips, research, et determ, had been financed by others. He said that the savings which he had accumulated up until his employment in 19h6 had remained rather stable. Therefore, he still had sufficient money left upon his return to Webster to undertake the building of his home while looking for further employment.

SLACK stated that up until the time of his errost, he and OLEVITCH had continued to produce the emulsion chemical for the Crawer Company and had realized a small income from this activity. The normal procedure followed was for OLEVITCH to produce the material and to send it to SLACK for checking prior to being delivered to Cramer Company. Cramer always paid SLACK directly by checks and after SLACK had deducted the amount which was his share, the remainder would be forwarded to OLEVITCH, who, in turn, madde share this amount with MILLER and WENDY WALGREN.

With regard to time, SLICK is of the clief that he left Scripto Manufacturing Company in Atlanta in May, 1967, and within the following week went to Providence, Mhode Island, and began his employment with Mays Associates. It is his belief that he went to Providence alone, but that OLEVITCH joined him there in a very short time. He recalls that he was with Mays Associates for a period of about nine months which would have placed his return to Webster, New York, in approximately January or Pebruary, 1968. When returning to New York, he first went to live with his brother inacmach as JULIA had yone to live with LOUIS Shack at the time that SLACK moved from Atlanta to Providence.

SLICE recalls he began his employment with the Sundure Paint Company in August, 1948, having spent almost the entire summer building his home. He stated that during this period of unemployment, he had absolutely no income other than that small amount which was derived in the production of dyestuffs for the Cremer Company in St. Louis.

With regard to the income which SLACK and his associates had from the Cramer Company, SLACK advised he could not give any definite figures unless as was able to review the records they had kept concerning these transactions. On the basis of pure estimates, it was his belief that they received a gross income of anymhere from \$6,000.00 to \$6000.00 per year from the production of the dyestuffs. He advised that the Cramer Company also paid them a regulty on the emulsion which they had developed for them and that this regult; amounted to approximately \$600.00 per year. He also stated that while the Development Engineering Company was active in Atlanta, they had developed for the Cramer Company an emulsion couting bar for which Cramer had paid them \$1,000.00.

The income from this production of dyestufis for Cremer Company, according to SLACK, is divided equally between JOE MILLER, WEIDY WALGEN, EUGENE OLEVITCH, and himself. MILLER and WALGEN do not participate in the production of the dyestuffs, but are considered the contacts making the sales possible. WALGEN was a contractor in the graphic arts field and during the time the Development Engineering Company was operating, JOE MILLER had conceived the idea that he would combine the Development Engineering Company with his operations in the graphic arts field. In this connection, they had observed a tentative partnership with the understanding that SLCKC and OLEVITCH would continue to do the production. ASSLCK-stated it is his

expectation that OLEVITCH will complete the over the production of the dyesturfs for the Cramer Company and although he does not know what action will be taken with regard to him in view of present developments, it is his hope that he will continue to receive his portion of the income.

When queried concerning other persons who may have been, in any manner, associated with his activities subsequent to his leaving Oak Ridge in 1945, several persons were brought to mind. SLACK stated that during the time the Development Engineering Company was operating in Atlanta, they had utilized the assistance of a young man the was a student at Georgia School of Technology and who had been employed as a dualtament at the Headows Hamulacturing Company. SLACK was unable to recall this student's name but was sure five employment records at Headows Company would reflect his name and he could be easily located.

SLACK stated he also not OLIVER SHUNK when he made the trip to St. Louis to discuss with EUCK of Buck Ex-O-Graph Company, MILLER and SALEGEBER the possibility of Development Engineering Company's doing research work for their various concerns. On this trip to St. Louis, at which time he stayed at the home of OLEVITCH, he was introduced to several persons who were connected with these companies. In addition to OLIVER SHUNK, he recalled also having been introduced to a man named LANDOW who was a chemist with Cramer Company. SLACK also recalls that during this trip to St. Louis, SALEGHPER had - approached him with the possibility that SLACK replace LANDON in the Laboratory of the Harmer Dry Plate Company. SLACK worked in the laboratory of this company for one-half day assisting them in a technical problem which he, SLACK, solved for them in a very short time. He stated that he absolutely did not have any disagreement with LANDON on the occasion of this visit to the laboratory and that this was his only meeting with LANDON. It was SLACK'S belief that both OLIVER SHUMK and LANDOW had known PRIGGS Juring the time BRIGGS was working in St. Louis, Missouri, and SLACK stated he received the impression from previous knowledge of LAMDON received through BRIGGS that BRIGGS and LANDOW had disliked each other rather intensely.

SLACK concluded his narration of incidents involving the Development Engineering Company and these persons associated with its activities by stating that this business venture had absolutely a no connection with any of his previous activities which might have been of consequence in espionage activities and that insofar as he is



knows, none of the persons with whom he has been associated in the Development Engineering Company or in subsequent businesses have had any connection whatsoever with the Soviet or espionage activities, nor does he have any knowledge of JOE MILLER, R. W. SALZGEBER, or any of the others ever having had any such association during the time they were acquainted with RICHARD BRIGGS.

. C. HARIO CASTILLO

A photograph of CASTILIO was exhibited to SLACK, and he immediately identified this photograph as that of the person known to him as EARIO CASTILIO.

SLACK stated that he first met CASTILLO in Building 9202 at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, approximately two or three months after SLACK arrived at Oak Ridge. SLACK was sitting at his dock in Euilding 9202 when CASTILLO came into his office and inquired for Dr. BELL, who was in charge of that particular building. Upon being advised that Dr. BELL was not immediately available, CASTILLO began a conversation with SLACK, during which conversation he advised SLACK that he and his wife were emperiencing considerable difficulty in finding a place to live in Oak Ridge. CASTILLO seemed to be considerably upset because he was unable to find accommodations for his family. It was SLACK's recollection that CASTILLO was living in a dermitory and was an enlisted man in the Special Engineer Detachment at Oak Ridge. SLACK had no knowledge as to where CASTILLO'S wife was residing at the time-of this conversation.

SIACK further remembered that he asked his wife if she would offer CASTILLO and his wife an unoccupied bedroom in their apartment. This was agreeable to Mrs. SLACK, and SLACK located CASTILLO on the following day and offered him these quarters until such time as CASTILLO could find more suitable housing. Shortly after the offer was made, MARIO CASTILLO and his wife moved into the SLACK home, where they resided for a period of approximately two months. SLACK stated that he did not remember what financial arrangements were made between Mrs. CASTILLO and Mrs. SLACK in regard to the amount of rent to be paid for the use of this room, but that it was a nominal amount.

SLACK also recalled that CASTILLO and his wife cooked en occasional meal in their home, but more commonly ate their meals out. He does not remember what the apparent financial status of a CASTILLO was, but he cannot recall enything which would indicate

to him that CASTILLO had financiar the list case. He also recalled that CASTILLO'S wife was pregnant when they lived in his home, and it is his belief that the baby was born shortly after CASTILLO managed to obtain other accommodations.

SLACK adviced that he had never become very friendly with CASTILLO and had few conversations with him. He can recall no instance wherein he discussed world affairs or politics with CASTILLO and had formed no opinion with regard to CASTILLO'S beliefs along these lines. SLACK stated he had found CASTILLO not to be the type of individual with whom he desired to become friendly.

SLACK was unable to recollect what type of position CASTILLO occupied at Oak Ridge, but he said that it must have been in some capacity as a chemist inasmuch as it was his recollection that CASTILLO had received his education as a chemical engineer.

SLACK recounted one particular activity of CASTILLO by observing that CASTILLO had exhibited to him a set of chessmen which he was making as a gift for his father. CASTILLO advised SLACK that he was making these chessmen on the lathe in the Y-12 plant and that he was making them out of stainless steel and brass which he was obtaining from the plant. SLACK commented that he had no knowledge that CASTILLO might be taking anything from the plant other than the material contained in these chessmen.

Thith regard to CASTILLO'S background, SLACK stated that he was nover interested enough in CASTILLO to find out much about him. He described CASTILLO as not "typically American", but observed that CASTILLO'S wife appeared to be an average American girl. SLACK could not recall having met CASTILLO'S fother, but vaguely believed that CASTILLO'S father lived some place close to Oak Ridge and possibly may have resided with CASTILLO after the CASTILLOS left the SLACK residence. SLACK and no specific recollection that CASTILLO'S father had ever actually visited Oak Ridge.

Concerning associates of CASTILIO at Oak Ridge, SLACK stated that CASTILIO was acquainted with EUGHNE OLEVITCH, BILL WILLIAMS, GENE WILLIAMS, and LAUMENCE LATTMAN, but does not recall that CASTILIO was particularly friendly with any one of this group. He expressed the belief that CASTILIO was not close to any of the employees at Oak Ridge. He has a vague recollection of a couple coming to his home to visit the CASTILIOS on only one occasion.

SLACK continued that, after the Carrian'S moved from his residence, they stopped by at his home on only one occasion. SLACK stated that he has never seen MARIO CASTILLO since leaving Oak Ridge and has not corresponded with him nor heard from him in any manner since that time. SLACK stated that he was not aware of the fact that CASTILLO even resided in Englewood, New Jersey, and said that he definitely did not see him at any time while he resided there. SLACK also expressed doubt that his wife had ever heard from Mrs. CASTILLO.

SLACK continued that during the time CASTILIO resided at his home, he recalled nothing which indicated to him that CASTILIO was particularly interested in photography as a hebby or otherwise. He had no specific recollection of any cameras or other photographic equipment being in CASTILLO'S possession, although he pointed out that CASTILIO may have had these items and SLACK would not have known about them.

SLACK observed that he never discussed CASTILLO'S work with him and that he does not know precisely what kind of job CASTILLO had, but he received the impression it was some type of experimental work. He said that MARIO CASTILLO never mentioned handling any metallic uranium, nor did he advise where he had obtained the metal out of which he was making the chessmen. SLACK continued that he did not know exactly what building CASTILLO worked in at Y-12 and cannot recall CASTILLO'S ever telling him anything which would make this location known to SLACK. With regard to the chessmen which CASTILLO displayed to SLACK which were supposedly node from obtainless steel, SLACK stated that he has never seen normal uranium in a metallic state and therefore would not know, from having seen these chessmen, whether they were made of normal uranium or strinless steel.

SLACK stated that during his acquaintance with CASTILIO, he never received the impression that CASTILIO had more money than his normal expected salary, nor had he observed that CASTILIO seemed to be in any type of financial difficulty. He further states that, although he had no discussion with him, he can recall nothing which would have led him to believe that CASTILIO harbored any Communistic leanings or Russian sympathies. SLACK suggested that his wife, JULIA SLACK, be interviewed in this regard, particularly concerning information furnished by CASTILIO'S wife to JULIA during the hours they were at home together.

SLACK emphatically stated that he had homeofied e of any facts which would give him any reason to believe that CANTILLO may have been

involved in any type of Salas and stated that he certainly never received any indication that Castle and stated that he known to the espionage ring in which SLACK himself had been involved. He further denied that he had any knowledge that CASTILLO had ever taken any material out of the Y-12 area other than that material contained in the chese set which CASTILLO had stated he was making for his father.

Mr. R. E. TIARP, Security Agent, USAEC, Oak Ridge, reported that Mr. G. H. CLEWITT, a former supervisor of MARIO CASTILLO at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, has currently advised him that CASTILLO was a former employee in Building 9733-1 in the Y-12 area. This building principally housed a fluorination pilot plant and experiments were conducted therein with regard to the fluorination of the various uranium metals. CLEWITT continued that one of the principal duties of CASTILLO was to take bars of normal uranium and turn them down on a lathe to accumulate shavings or machine turnings to be used in their analytical lab work.

The set of chessmen referred to above is in the possession of the Knozville Division, and appropriate investigation will be conducted to properly identify the material from which these chessmen were made.

D. DATLEY PAFER COMPANY

SLACK stated that he had never before heard of the proposed plan to train Russian Nationals at the Dailey Paper Company. He said that to the best of his knowledge this company was engaged in a legitimate business enterprise in the photographic paper supply field. EKICGS had never mentioned to him that there was a plan to train Russian Nationals at this company nor had SLACK ever had any idea that a meeting had been held in New York with representatives of the Amterg Company to effectuate such a plan. He definitely denied that he had ever been at the Dailey Paper Company plant for a two-week period for any purpose and stated that he was not aware of any survey supposedly conducted by him at this company in order to effectuate this plan of training Russian Nationals.

SLACK stated that the name of GEORGE CAMPBELL was not familiar to him and that he had never met nor heard of an individual by this name.

With reference to LEIGH CHANDLER, SLACK could only advise that he was a stock promoter who was brought into the Dailey Paper Company to finance the corporation. He recalled that DRIGGS, who had been somewhat skeptical of CHANDLER'S background, had advised.



SLACK that BRICGS wass RULL TOTALE (Mrs. VERDIE FUDGE) secure a write-up on CHANDLER of the Price of the price PRICES later adviced SLACK had been secured for min by BERYL TORKE, consisted primarily of information regarding CHAMDLER'S business experience and financial background. According to BRIGES, TOME had this report prepared for her by an acquaintance of here, who had access in some manner to Dun and Bradstreet reports. The individual who actually prepared this report for TOWE, who in turn furnished it to BHIGGS, was an employee in a banking or credit institution where the reports of Dum and Bradstreet would be available. SLACK recalled, at the time of BRIGGS! death and SLACK'S subsequent -disposal of DRIGGS' personal effects, observing a four or five page typewritten report on LEIGH CHANDLER, and SLACK mentally observed at that time that this must have been the report submitted by BERYL TO:NE.

SLACK'S recollection was that LEIGH CHARDLER was the individual who put in an appearance at the BRIGGS residence in New Jersey the day after BRIGGS! death. SLACK had driven to New Jersey from his home in New York State accompanied by his wife and his mother. One of these two individuals was with SLACK in BRIGGS! home at the time CHANDLER appeared at the front door and can verify the following facts.

SIACK believes that CHANDLER introduced himself by name as a friend and business associate of BRIGGS. BRIGGS, according to CHANDLER, had in his possession a notebook containing photographic data which was part of the Dailey Paper Company's information, was extremely important to the company, and CHANDLER was interested in cetting this notebook. SLACK explained that he was upset by BRIGGS' death, was tired from the long automobile ride which he had made the preceding evening, and, although he recalled the name LEIGH CHANDLER as a business associate of BRIGGS because of his knowledge of the biographical write-up, he was extremely bruck and discourteous to CHANDLER. He advised CHANDLER that he would not permit CHANDLER to go through BRIGGS! personal possessions and told CHANDLER to leave the residence. CHANDLER left the residence with considerable ill will.

SIACK recalled that he did locate a notebook, which apparently contained formulas for the processing of photographic paper, with a notation on the fly sheet to the effect that the formulas in the notebook had been copied from the notebook of an old German and that this notebook had been loaned to BRIGGS by one of the Dailey brothers.



SIACK stated that this was a cheap ten tent of x 100 bound notebook and should have been located by the agents during the search of his residence inasmuch as this notebook was one item that he had retained when he had inspected BRIGGS' personal possessions after BRIGGS decease.

SIACK observed that there had been a second notebook among the possessions of RICHARD BRIGIS and that the second notebook had contained many names and addresses. It was from the second notebook that SIACK secured the telephone number of Dr. LEVENE'S laboratory, New York City, where he ultimately contacted "JEORGE" (GAIK OVAKIMIAN). SIACK definitely recalls that this notebook was burned along with other personal unimportant possessions of BRIGIS.

It is noted that CHANDLER has denied calling at the home of SRIGGS to secure this notebook. It is also noted that a JULES GUEDALIA has advised that GEORGE CAMPBELL would have been the logical person to attempt to secure the BRIGGS papers and not CHANDLER. GEORGE CAMPBELL, on interview, has stated that he used J. C. HUNTER to contact SLACK regarding the BRIGGS papers.

SLACK was questioned as to whether or not there could have been a GEORGE CAMPBELL who called at the BRIGGS residence instead of a LEIGH CHANDLER. SLACK admitted that he could not be positive that it was CHANDLER who had attempted to secure the BRIGGS notebook.

E. MISCELLANEOUS

SIACK advised that, during the month of September, 1950, STANLEY E. GLASS had mailed the sum of \$25.00 to the subject's wife. SLACK'S wife advised him of this contribution, but SLACK knew of no reason why GLASS would denate this money to his family.

SLACK observed that a gelatin salesman representing the American Agricultural Gelatin Company (or the American Gelatin Company) had been an extremely close friend of RICHARD BRIGGS and could furnish more information about the Daily Paper Company. He advised that he had met

this salesman through BRIGGS who had the concede them while PRIGGS was still employed at the Eastman Kodak Company in Rochester. He was unable to furnish the name of this individual, but stated that R. W. SALZGENER could furnish the name. This salasman wrote to SLACK while SLACK was employed by the Mays Associates in Providence, Rhode Island, and had been referred to SLACK by SALZGERER. salesman was seeking information as to whether or not SLACK could manufacture and supply particular types of dyes. SLACK had corresponded with this salesman and expressed an interest in this proposal -but had never heard from him again. It is noted that there has been a close association between this salesman and BRICCS, and it will be recalled that there were seven graphs, which pertained to experiments in connection with the production of gelatin, located among the possessions of HARW GOLD during a search of his residence. source of these graphs has never been established, although COLD has advised that SLACK furnished them to him, and SLACK has stated that he might possibly have gotten these graphs from the possessions of RUCHARD BRIGGE.

SLACK recalled a JOHN EVERTS MILLARD as a fellow employee at Eastman Kodak in Rochester who occupied a dack in the same office with SLACK. It will be noted that papers and memoranda, presumably from the dask of MILLARD, have been located during a permissive search of the residence of HARRY COLD. SLACK confessed that he and MILLARD shared a filing cabinet in the Eastman Kodak Office and that SLACK had removed memoranda and correspondence from this filing cabinet and furnished it to either BRIGGS or GCLD. SLACK stated that MILLARD knew neither BRIGGS nor GOLD and that any material located at the GOLD residence which pertained to MILLARD had been removed from Eastman Kodak by SLACK.

III. MISCELLAMEOUS

The following individuals, each of whom is presently employed by the Tennessee Eastman Corporation at Kingsport, Tennessee, and each of whom was a fellow employee of the subject while the subject was employed at the Holston Ordnance Works, Kingsport, or at the Clinton Engineering Works, Oak Ridge, were interviewed and could furnish no information of value to this investigation:

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Mr. and Mrs. CURTIS CROWDIR, Route , Church Hill, Mr. and Mrs. LEWIS SARTAIN, 1633 Pinsola Avenue, Kingsport, and Mr. and Mrs. ALF W. KELLY, 1101 Midland Drive, Kingsport, each of whom was a former neighbor of the subject's during the time he resided in Kingsport, could furnish no information pertinent to this investigation.

Photographs of HARRY GOID were displayed to each of the above employees and neighbors, and they advised that they had never seen this man.

Eight manuals were located in the residence of SLaCK at Clay, New York, during a permissive search by ligents of the Albany Office. These manuals were issued by the Holston Ordnance Works to SLACK, and according to his statement, were received by him in the ordinary course of his work.

Kr. ROBERT C. BURTON, Superintendent, Tennesses Eastman Corporation. Kingsport, reviewed the manuals and stated they had been assigned to SLACK during his employment at the Holston Ordnance Works and described them as being identical to publications issued to all supervisors formerly employed in the Nitric Acid Plant at the HCW. These manuals, which were published prior to World War II, do not have a military classification, and the material contained therein is protected by patents owned by the Hercules Powder Company and by the Dupont Company. BURTON stated that SLACK had violated the regulations of the HOW in taking these manuals with him at the termination of his employment, but commented that numerous employees had undoubtedly-been guilty of the identical violation.

The photographs of the following individuals were displayed to SLACK, and he advised that he had never seen any of these individuals before and could furnish no information concerning them:

Federal Grand Jury Action

Case was presented to the Federal Grand Jury for the Northeastern Division of the Eastern Judicial District of Tennessee on September 1, 1950, at Greeneville, Tennessee. Special Agent RICHARD E. BRENHAM presented to the Grand Jury the original signed statements of HARMY GOLD, setting forth SLACK'S involvement in GOLD'S espionage activities, and presented photographs of SEMEN SEMENOV and AMATCHI A. YAKCVLEV, whom OCLD had identified as his Soviet superiors.

Special Agent MICHAEL H. O'ROURKE identified the photograph of SEMENOV as being an individual in the official employ of the Soviet government.

Special Agent RIYMCID T. WIRTH identified the photograph of YAKOVLEV as being that of an individual in the employ of the Soviet government.

Special Agent ROBERT 3. MARGISON presented the original signed statements of the subject in which SLACK confessed his guilt and participation in the espionage activities of HARRY GOLD.

Colonal C. H. M. ROBERTS, Office of the Chief of Ordnance, Pentagon, Washington, D. C., testified that the manufacturing process for NUX, and RDX itself, was a classified process and product.

Miscellanecus

Thirty-seven loose-leaf pages, which apparently came from a loose-leaf notebook, were located by Special Agent KIRBY A. VOSBURGH in the right hand top drawer of a desk in the living room of the subject's home at Clay, New York, during a permissive search on June 15, 1950. These pages were reviewed with the subject, and he furnished the following explanation concerning each individual listed in this notebook.

C. R. BARRETT, Room 221, and G. R. BOYD, Room 122, Letropole hotel — These individuals were Expeditors working in Cincinnati, Ohio, for the HCV at Kingsport, Tennessee.

SLACK'S contacts with them were limited to his duties in connection with his HCW employment.

GUY BOYD, hoh Hedin a Metairie Louisiana — A fellow employee at the HOT

Dr. COFIELD, 19 West 7th Street — A physician at Cincinnati, Ohio, whom SLACK visited for the treatment of a skin eruption.

MARGARET FRICKER, 602 Euclid Avenue, Tampa, Florida — A sister of GRACE HOLLOWAY visited by GRACE and JULIA SLACK on social occasions.

RAY HENRY, 3860 Ridge Road, 7. — A fellow employee at Eastman Kodak Company, Rochester.

HERRY HOPSTMANN, 203 West Minister — A salesman for the General Dyestuff Company who contacted SLACK at Eastman Kodak in Rochester, New York, relative to SLACK'S duties concerning purchase of dyestuff. This company has a plant in Albany, New York, but it is SLACK'S opinion that HORSTLANN now resides in New York City, where he is employed by this company.

E. E. HULPHRIES or HUNHRIES, Cooksville, P. H. Knight Company — A contact of SLACK'S in connection with SLACK'S HOW employment. The Knight Company made packing material for absorption towers for the HOW. (It is noted that there is a Cooksville in Maryland, Mississippi, and Illinois; also that there has been an unidentified "JOHNNY HUMPHRIES" whom HARRY COLD advises was suggested to him by SLACK as a potential espicing recruit.

TOWN INDLEKCFER, 251 Lark Street, Rochester, New York - A fellow employee at Eastman Kodak.

MACK SHAVZIN, 542 Prospect Place, Telephone UN 1236 — A business contact of SLACK'S in either Michmond, Virginia, or Cincinnati, Ohio, in connection with SLACK'S HOW duties.

ARLOE SLEETH, 560 Roberts Avenue — An automobile dealer and former Sunday School teacher of the subject in Syracuse, New York.

Main Street Station, 31081 — SLACK is of the opinion that this is a telephone number of some individual in kickmond whose identity he is unable to recall.



A photostatic record of the subject's complete personnel file at the HCW at Kingsport, Tennessee, was made available by SAM W. MITCHELL, Superintendent, Personnel Department, Tennessee Eastman Corporation, Kingsport, Tennessee, and furnished to the Albany Division.

Transcripts of the savings account maintained by Mrs. JULIA W. SIACK and of the checking account maintained by ALFRED DEAN and JULIA W. SIACK at the First National Bank in Kingsport in 1943 and 1944 were made available by Division.

The names of all of the individuals listed in Albany letter to the Director dated August 15, 1950, which names were listed in two address books found during a permissive search of the subject's home, were searched through the Knoxville indices. No pertinent information pertaining to any of these individuals, other than that already set forth in reports in this case, was located.

Efforts to identify the individual who called at Brigg's home at the time of the latter's demise in search of Brigg's notebook are continuing. Photographs of George Campbell, Leigh Chandler, and J. C. Hunter are being obtained and forwarded to Atlanta for display to Slack.
