I, Harry Gold, of 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, make the following voluntary statement to Richard E. Brennan and T. Scott Miller, Jr., who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. No threats or promises have been made me, and I realize that any statement I make may be used against me in a court of law. I have been advised that I may secure the services of an attorney.

In the summer of 1936 I made several inquiries concerning the Communist Party of the United States. At this time I was employed as a chemist by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, of 1037 North Delaware Avenue, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

In the fall of 1936 I was visited at my home by a man who identified himself as Paul Smith. He said that he understood that I was a chemist, and he thought that possibly I might be interested in aiding in the procurement of industrial information for the Soviet Union. This began a period of industrial espionage on my part which lasted until 1943. My association with Smith was of relatively short duration, during which time I furnished him with some data concerning processes that were being worked on in the laboratory of the Pennsylvania Sugar Company and subsidiaries. This data was as complete and factual as I could make it.

Smith, whose name was obviously false, was followed in succession by two men, one of whom identified themselves as Fred, who had a pronounced Russian accent.

In the early summer of 1938 the possibilities at Pennsylvania Sugar Company had pretty well petered out, and I was several times pressed to try and obtain other sources of information. By this I mean people who could furnish us with technical data. However, in my circle of friends there were none who were even the remotest likely candidate, and so I did nothing. This led to a break of over two years, during which time I attended college in Cincinnati. I graduated in 1940.

On my return to Philadelphia I was again contacted by the people with whom I had worked before. I was called on the phone in July, 1940, and I went down town to see this man, who turned out to be Jacob Golos.

He again pressed me to continue the work which I had done previously, and I agreed. However, it was pretty sporadic in nature, and, with the exception of the one contact that he gave me, Abraham Brothman, nothing much came of it. I was supposed to get information of a technical nature from Brothman, but very little came of that, simply because he was extremely unreliable in getting material together. He gave me some data on mixing equipment which was practically all his design, and it seemed to me that practically everything he gave me at any time was his own invention or design. Brothman kept pressing me on several occasions, and wanted to know about the possibility of his doing consulting work for the Soviet Union on an open basis, as a private individual, and they acting as representatives of their government to this company, and whenever I mentioned it to the people with whom I was in touch they discounted the idea and wouldn't listen to it at all.

I never told Brothman of my association with the Soviet Union, but I think that he suspected it because of the way that I operated--I introduced myself by another name.

I knew Golos for a very brief time, and he was followed very shortly by a man called Sam about the end of 1940. It was with Sam that my association continued uninterruptedly as a contact. I used to meet Sam almost always in New York. Sometimes, very rarely, he would come to Philadelphia, but usually it was in New York, usually on a street corner that we met. Normally we went for a walk. Sometimes, but rarely, we had something to eat. Sam did not have a Russian accent, but I had an idea he was a Russian.

Shortly after I met Sam he told me that there was not much purpose to continuing this work in general, and that the best thing I could do would be to forget about it, and this state continued from late 1940 until the fall of 1941, after Russia was attacked by Germany. Then Sam called me up, I met him, and he told me that we had to begin an intensive campaign for obtaining information for the Soviet Union. This happened about a couple of months after Russia was attacked by Germany. At that time I made a half-dozen trips to upper New York state, namely, Syracuse, Rochester, and Buffalo. I was to transmit information--I acted as a go-between.

What I did on each of these occasions was to obtain information from someone that I didn't know but who was, I'm pretty sure, an American, a native, and I gave it over to Sam, or sometimes not to Sam but to someone who I did not know by name or anything. I just got it and either I received material whose nature I did not know except that they were very bulky packets, and in a matter of hours, or sometimes even minutes, turned it over to a third person, sometimes Sam. There was one man that I saw twice in Rochester,

one man that I saw twice in Buffalo, and there were two others that I saw once, and I got the definite impression in each case that they were native Americans. Sometimes I travelled with the information from one city to the adjacent one, that is, say, from Rochester to Buffalo before turning it over.

In very early 1944 I was told by Sam that I was to undertake an extremely important effort. This was to be work of so critical a nature that I was to think twice and three times before I ever spoke a word concerning it to anyone, or before I made a move, before I spoke to anyone concerned in it. He didn't elaborate on what the nature of the work actually was but he gave me the details of an arrangement whereby I met Doctor Klaus Fuchs. This meeting took place on the east side of New York on a Saturday. As I recall, the arrangements for actual recognition included the fact that I was to carry a pair of gloves in one hand, plus a green-covered book, and Dr. Fuchs was to carry a hand ball in one hand. I cannot recall whether Sam gave me Dr. Fuchs' name, he may have. In any event, we met in, I believe, late February or early March of 1944. I introduced myself to him as Raymond. He never used the name. He knew it was a phony. He introduced himself to me as Klaus Fuchs.

We went for a brief walk and then took a cab uptown to a restaurant around 3d Avenue in the 50's, where we had dinner, but we did not speak much there. Afterwards we went for a walk, during which we completed arrangements for further meetings. Among these arrangements were:

1. We were to be extremely careful and never meet in a restaurant again.
2. We were only to meet for as brief a period as was necessary to complete whatever we had to do.
3. Each meeting included complete arrangements for further meetings and provisions were made for alternate dates and places, but we were never to meet in the same place twice.

He told me during the first and second meetings that he was with the British Mission working with the Manhattan Engineer Project. He also explained to me the manpower set-up of the British group as he knew it. He told me that they were working on the separation of isotopes, and it seems to me that there was at least employed the eventual utilization of the energy produced by nuclear fission in the form of a weapon. One thing he told me on many occasions was that they worked in extremely tight compartments, and that one group did not know what the other group was doing. This I can verify by the fact that he told me that he thought that there was possibility

of a large-scale installation for isotope separation projected for future development somewhere, he thought, down in Georgia or Alabama. This, of course, later turned out to be Oak Ridge.

The second meeting with Fuchs consisted of an amplification of our arrangements for meeting and a description by Fuchs of the physical and personnel set-up of the Manhattan Engineer Project. *This meeting was in New York.* (NS)

During these first two meetings neither Dr. Fuchs nor I made any direct reference to his supplying me with information, but it was more or less mutually understood that he was to supply me with information from the work he was doing.

The second meeting took place with Fuchs a few weeks following the first one somewhere in Upper Manhattan. Successive meetings took place in a number of widely separated localities, including the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens. There were, in all, until the summer of 1944, a total of in the neighborhood of five meetings, on at least two of which occasions I obtained (from Dr. Fuchs) information. This consisted of a number of folded sheets of paper containing (during one brief glance that I took on one occasion) mathematical equations which seemed to concern mathematical derivations. This data I turned over to, I believe, Sam's successor, John.

I would like to add that Sam was succeeded by a man named John shortly after I met Dr. Fuchs. I do not believe that I ever turned any information over to Sam.

On the occasions when I turned over information which I had obtained from Dr. Fuchs, the time interval involved was very short; by short I mean a half-hour at the most.

The exact dates that the information was given to me in New York by Dr. Fuchs I cannot accurately say, except that they were probably between April and June or July of 1944. In August of 1944 Dr. Fuchs failed to show up for his scheduled meeting. This was to be in the vicinity of a movie theater near the Eastern Parkway in Brooklyn. He did not show up for the alternate appointment and I had no means of telling where he had gone, though he had mentioned that he was due to leave for another location. The only information he had was that he thought it was somewhere in Mexico, not New Mexico. John then obtained the information whereby he was once more enabled to get in touch with Dr. Fuchs. He gave me the address of a Mrs. Heinemann in Cambridge, Massachusetts, who is, I believe, Dr. Fuchs' sister. I went to see her in September of 1944. The family was away on vacation. I did see her the second time that I went to Cambridge, which was in the fall of 1944. I told her that I was a friend of Dr. Fuchs; that I had met him in New York; that I happened to be passing through Boston on business and I just wondered if she knew where Klaus was. I used here the same name that I had used on meeting Klaus, which was Raymond. She told me that Klaus was due about Christmas time, was very fond of Mrs. Heinemann's children and he had written her that he would be coming home about that time. She did not tell me where he was except that it was somewhere out west. So, I left an envelope containing a name and telephone number in Manhattan. This name I think may have contained the first name "Jerome" or at least a name with a "J" and was somewhat similar to Kaplan (phonetic). This is not the name. About all that I can say about it is that it evokes a familiar sound - a familiar memory chord.

Early in 1945, John got in touch with me and said that we had heard from Dr. Fuchs. I went up to Cambridge and saw Klaus there. He told me that he was working at a place called Los Alamos in New Mexico, he said some distance from Santa Fe. He also gave me written information at that time and we made an arrangement to meet in June of that year in Santa Fe. This meeting took place in the home of Mrs. Heinemann in Cambridge, Massachusetts, but she was not present at the time of our conversation. The whole meeting was of very brief duration. Before I met Dr. Fuchs on this occasion, I was given a sum of approximately \$1500, as I recall, to offer to Dr. Fuchs, should he need it. I was told to be very diplomatic about this matter so as not to offend him. He turned it down cold. He turned down cold even my tentative offer, so that when I returned to New York, I gave the money back to John, along with the information

which Fuchs had given me at this time.

During my vacation in June of 1945, I went to Santa Fe via Albuquerque and met Dr. Fuchs there. He gave me another set of data and we agreed to meet again in late September of the same year in Santa Fe. I took this information back with me to New York and gave it to John. Our conversation there was extremely brief and even there, as when he worked in New York, he was dubious about the possibilities for any real and immediate utilization of atomic energy in the form of a weapon. I do not exactly recall the circumstances under which I turned this information over to John in New York. I traveled to Albuquerque on this first meeting via train to Chicago, then by train to Albuquerque, and finally by bus to Santa Fe. My meeting with Dr. Fuchs was on Saturday afternoon. ~~This meeting was in the city of Santa Fe.~~ Then I returned from Santa Fe to Albuquerque by bus on the same day. As I recall, I slept in the hallway of a rooming house where those who were unable to obtain hotel accommodations were bedded. I returned the following day from Albuquerque to Chicago and then via Chicago by plane to either New York or Washington and then by train to Philadelphia. This jumbled up method of travel was necessitated by the traveling conditions at that time.

Here, I would like to make the following statement: All of the expenses involved in any of the work that I did were paid for by me entirely out of my own funds. Immediately upon my return to New York, I turned over the information which Fuchs had given me, to John. The next meeting with Dr. Fuchs took place in late September 1945. I again met him in Santa Fe, this time on the outskirts. He had a car, a rather dilapidated affair, which he had borrowed, and we conducted all of our conversation in it. He gave me some information again. Also, he told me he had been present at the initial large-scale trial of nuclear fission at Alamogordo in New Mexico, and also described to me the tremendous wonderment that had descended upon even those who had the most intimate knowledge of the potentialities of the weapon -- most especially on the occasion of the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima. It is my best understanding that he was actually present with the group or certainly near the group that set off the trial bomb at Alamogordo.

Dr. Fuchs told me also at this time that he would probably return to England soon but that by paying a call to his sister I could ascertain just when. This statement may not be completely accurate in this sense, ^{and} it also seems to me that he gave a definite time, about Christmas week of 1945 when he expected to again be in Cambridge.

In early evening I returned by bus to Albuquerque and got an early morning plane from Albuquerque to Kansas City. There, I had to transfer to a train which took me to Chicago and I went from Chicago by way of New York Central to New York. From New York I went to Philadelphia and no more than several days later, turned over the information that Dr. Fuchs had given me to John in New York City. To the best of my recollection, it was out beyond Jackson Heights somewhere in Queens where I turned this information over to John.

Here again, I would like to repeat what I previously said, that this jumbled up method of travel was necessitated by the lack of facilities at that time and heavy travel at that time and was not intended as a means of throwing anyone off my trail.

This was the last time that I saw Dr. Fuchs or obtained information from him.

I made either one or two attempts to see Dr. Fuchs again at the home of his sister. This effort was not successful in that he was still in New Mexico. After the possible second attempt which was in either late January or early February, 1946, my scheduled appointment to report to John did not take place. This was to be at the Earle Theater in the Bronx, New York. I never saw or heard from John again.

In summary, to the best of my recollection, Dr. Fuchs gave me information on five occasions. Two times in New York in the Spring and Summer of 1944, once in Cambridge in very early 1945, probably January and twice in Santa Fe, the first time in June, the second time in late September, both 1945. On each occasion I subsequently turned this information over to John. It is possible, although I doubt it, that Sam received from me the first information which I had obtained from Dr. Fuchs.

During my association with Dr. Fuchs, Sam and John, I fully realized that the information which Dr. Fuchs was supplying me and which I turned over to Sam or John was for the benefit of the Soviet Union. I also surmised that the information concerned the separation of isotopes and the

I began the work of industrial spying for the Soviet Union in 1936 with the full realization of what I was doing. I thought that I would be helping a Nation whose final aims I approved, along the road to industrial strength. Particularly, was I taken with the idea that whatever I did would go to help make living conditions far more advanced along the road as we know them here in the United States. To amplify, I felt that the industrial set up of a Nation which had only very recently begun to get any kind of a basic industry going, was so far inferior to what existed in other countries, that anything that I could do would be helpful.

Sometimes I was struck by doubts, twofold in nature;

Number one - Especially early in my association from 1936 to 1938 it seemed that the information I was turning over was exceedingly non-utilitarian but I was always assured that it was well received.

Second, the one fear that troubled me during the entire time from 1936 on was the possibility that in the event of exposure my family, which had no idea, not even the very slightest, of the work I was engaging in, would be completely and horribly disgraced.

This affair grew and as I imagine is the case with dealings of such a nature, I got so involved that even had I wanted to, it would have been extremely difficult to get out. However, I would like to qualify this last statement by saying, while on several occasions I did desire to once and for all stop doing this work, that I never once actually suggested it to any of the people with whom I worked. The longest break in all this time was the two year period when I went to school in Cincinnati, 1938 to 1940.

My reaction to the work that I did with Dr. Fuchs was twofold in nature. On the one hand I felt that as an ally, I was only helping the Soviet Union obtain information that I thought it was entitled to. I was troubled even by this, but I persistently put any thoughts out of my mind and as I have previously said, I was in so deep that I was, to a certain extent, bewildered and didn't know what to do. Secondly, the realization that I was turning over information to another power concerning a weapon was so frightening that the only thing I could do was to shove it away as far back in my mind as I could and simply not think on the matter at all.

To amplify somewhat, what I did except during the periods when I actually had to plan to meet Dr. Fuchs or to transmit what he gave me to

John, was to simply blot out of my mind as well as I could any thoughts whatever on the subject. I hoped, and many people do, that atomic energy would never again be employed as a weapon.

I would like to state that so far that I succeed in keeping this whole matter from my thoughts, that some of the feelings I have just stated are more or less recent, ~~with~~ *in the sense that I had only recently given them complete formulation.*

I would like now to make as absolute a statement as possible concerning the following:

Neither my mother, father nor brother ever had the slightest inkling that I was ever engaged in any work of such a nature, either industrial espionage or the later affair with Dr. Fuchs. This represented a considerable strain to keep concealing from them over so long a period but I did succeed by one maneuver or another and as of even this minute, they have not the vaguest idea what went on. The same applies to any people that I have known, and been in intimate contact, and have worked side by side with, and have been close friends with, over the period of the last 14 years. This particularly applies to people with whom I worked either in industrial laboratories or more recently, in medical research.

The one possible exception to the above is my former employer and acquaintance, Abraham Brothman and while I surmised that he suspected that I had given industrial processes to the Soviet Union, still he had not the slightest idea of my work with Dr. Fuchs.

I read the above typewritten statement consisting of ~~two~~ ^{two} pages and have initialed each page and the corrections thereof inasmuch as all my statements therein are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

On my final visit to the Heinemann's home in Cambridge, Massachusetts, I very briefly met Robert Heinemann. This is the only time that I ever saw him.

The entire idea of the underhanded work required in the industrial and subsequent spying was always very repugnant to me. I always considered myself as just a worker in a particular field requiring some degree of technical skill and diligence; and I have been most happy when I was just left alone in the laboratory to work. I always looked forward to the time when such actions as I have described in the body of this statement would no longer be necessary. I even expressed that to the people with whom I was in contact, and they agreed. This is not an attempt to shift any of the blame for my actions away from me.

That from on or about January 1, 1944, and continuously thereafter up to and including the date hereof in the Eastern District of New York and within the jurisdiction of this Court, Harry Gold and "John" Doe, the defendants herein, did in time of war unlawfully, wilfully, knowingly, feloniously, and with intent and reason to believe that it was to be used to the injury of the United States and to the advantage of a foreign nation, to wit, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, conspire, confederate and agree among themselves and with divers other persons to the complainant unknown, to violate Sub Section (A) of Section 32 of Title 50, United States Code, in that they did conspire, confederate and agree that the defendant, Harry Gold, would obtain and receive from one Emil Julius Klaus Fuchs, documents, writings, sketches, notes and information relating to the National Defense and would communicate, deliver, transmit and attempt to communicate, deliver and transmit the said documents, writings, sketches, notes and information relating to the National Defense to the defendant, "John" Doe, a representative, officer, agent and employee of a foreign Government, to wit, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and to divers other persons, to the complainant unknown, who were persons not entitled to receive the said documents, writings, sketches, notes and information.

On the morning of May 25, 1950, Dr. BALDI called from Holmesburg Prison to ASAC HINZE and said that he had talked today for the first time with HARRY GOLD. GOLD had asked if he could be assigned to do laboratory work. Dr. BALDI had told him this was not possible. He had asked if he might receive visits from his father and brother. BALDI had checked with Deputy Marshal JOHN LEAHY, who had given permission.

GOLD had also indicated a desire to speak with Agents of the FBI and BALDI was calling to find out if Agents would come to talk to him. He was told that Agents would be up early in the afternoon.

BALDI also advised that he had suggested to GOLD that he get his wits together and give all possible assistance to the FBI. He had likewise warned GOLD to be careful while in Holmesburg, since he might well be knifed by other inmates.

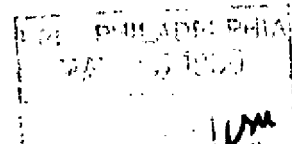

At 4.45 p.m., 5/26/50, Attorney WILLIAM A. GRAY called the office and spoke to the writer, advising he was calling from his home. Mr. GRAY stated he had been approached to represent HARRY GOLD.

Mr. GRAY stated that he wanted the FBI to know that he would only agree to represent HARRY GOLD if GOLD entered a plea and if GOLD assisted or continued to assist the FBI in every way possible. Mr. GRAY said he had no interest in defending GOLD, but thought that it may be more advantageous for someone with his viewpoint to represent GOLD rather than another attorney who might have a different viewpoint and who might cause difficulties. GRAY continued by stating that he felt that it may be his duty to agree to represent GOLD. In response to my inquiry, Mr. GRAY stated that he does not now represent GOLD, but that he has an appointment to consult with him tomorrow, at which time a decision would probably be made.

With respect to his contemplated consultation with GOLD tomorrow, Mr. GRAY pointed out he understood the FBI was planning to bring GOLD to the center city. He stated he would have no objection to this and would have no objection to interviewing GOLD in our presence. I told him this would not be necessary and that he should go through with his consultation with GOLD in the same manner as he would with any other prospective client.

Mr. GRAY reiterated on several occasions that he wanted his position made absolutely clear; that if he represented this man he would do so only on the condition that it would be of assistance to the FBI.

This information was furnished to Mr. A. BELMONT of the Bureau.

SAC CORNELIUS: I talked to Mr. BELMONT, and he advised that our position is that we could go ahead and interview HARRY GOLD, but once an attorney has talked to him then we should find out if the attorney has been employed to represent him. If so, then we should obtain the permission of the attorney before talking to GOLD further subsequent to the time he is represented by the attorney.

Mr. BELMONT mentioned bringing HARRY GOLD to the office in Philadelphia, and I told him that I at this time saw no reason why we should bring him to the office, but that we would talk to the Agents handling the interview with GOLD relative to the desirability of bringing him to the office for further interview; and that unless some good reason existed, which was not now apparent, this would ^{not} be done, but rather the interview would continue at the Holmesburg Prison. I told him that the Bureau would be contacted before any arrangements were made to bring GOLD to the office in the event it became desirable to bring him to ~~the office~~ ^{the Philadelphia office}.

University of Pennsylvania, was interviewed at his request in his office at 3:30 PM, May 26, 1950. [REDACTED] said that the reason for his telephone call to the Philadelphia Office for an interview by an Agent was that Campus Police Captain RYAN reported to [REDACTED] yesterday that HARRY GOLD had recently been put on a list of those allowed to enter the Medical School building after hours.

[REDACTED] MITCHELL said that early one morning about three weeks previously, at 4:00 AM, HARRY GOLD had attempted to enter the Medical School building and had been refused permission by the Campus Police. Shortly thereafter his name appeared on the list of those permitted to enter after hours. [REDACTED] MITCHELL said that he had investigated and learned that the request that GOLD's name be placed on the list was made by the secretary of Dr. I. S. RAVDIN who is the Head of the Department of Surgery and the Department of Research Surgery. He said that he has since corresponded with Dr. RAVDIN in regard to the request for permission and has learned that a Dr. LEWIS at the Philadelphia General Hospital, which adjoins the University of Pennsylvania Campus, and Dr. COHEN of the University of Pennsylvania Medical School staff, had been conducting a cardiographic experiment on some dogs and that it was necessary to bleed these dogs at irregular hours. Dr. LEWIS had gotten married and GOLD had offered to take his place in bleeding the dogs.

[REDACTED] Dr. MITCHELL said that Captain RYAN felt that GOLD was the individual who had attempted to enter the Medical School building several months ago but could give no explanation for his desires at that time. [REDACTED] Dr. MITCHELL said he had interviewed the heads of all the departments in the Medical School and was unable to find any reason why GOLD would desire to enter the Medical School except for the legitimate one of assisting in the above-described experiment. He said that there are no classified experiments being conducted at the present time and he does not believe that there is any classified material available anywhere in the Medical School. He said the Medical School libraries are locked after hours and it would be impossible for anyone to enter those without breaking in even though the person had permission to enter the building.

Enclosed herewith to the Philadelphia Office is one roll of sixteen-millimeter film which was exposed on June 18 and June 19, 1943. The portions of the film between the strings tied onto the edge of the film contain pictures of a man and a woman walking on the street. These pictures have been viewed by Agents who conducted surveillances of A. A. YAKOVLEV, and it is their belief that the man in these pictures is YAKOVLEV.

However, it is noted that this film was exposed in 1943, whereas surveillances were not conducted of YAKOVLEV until the latter part of 1946.

(u) The Agents who surveilled YAKOVLEV have also viewed the still pictures of YAKOVLEV taken with LAN ADOMIAN and which have been furnished to the Philadelphia Office by letter of May 27, 1950, and they have identified the still pictures of YAKOVLEV and feel that these stills are identical with the individual on the enclosed motion picture film.

It has also been noted by surveilling Agents that YAKOVLEV took shorter steps than the average man in walking, and carried his shoulders square, though hunched forward slightly.

It is requested that the motion picture film and the container be returned to the New York Office by the Philadelphia Office when they are no longer of use to that office.

On May 24, and 25, 1950, the following investigation was conducted by the writer:

On May 24, 1950 Mr. GEORGE J. MENTZ, Assistant Secretary and Business Manager, Philadelphia Public Schools, Administration Building, 21st and Parkway, Philadelphia, furnished the following information regarding subject:

MENTZ stated that HARRY GOLD, 2647 South Phillip Street, Philadelphia, entered the kindergarten of the Sharswood Elementary School, Second and Wolf Streets, in October 1916 and was graduated from elementary school at Sharswood in February 1925. MENTZ advised his records revealed subject was born in Switzerland, December 12, 1910 and that his father, SAMUEL GOLD, was born in Russia. The place of birth of the mother, CELIA GOLD, was not listed.

The records further revealed that GOLD entered the South Philadelphia High School for Boys, Broad and Jackson Streets, in February 1925 from which he was graduated in February 1929. He was graduated in the upper $\frac{1}{4}$ of his class which, according to MENTZ, meant that he was a very good student. At South Philadelphia High School for Boys, GOLD was a member of the Latin Club and the Science Club.

UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA

On May 25, 1950 [REDACTED] advised that Dr. LEE NELSON GULICK, Assistant to the Dean and Personnel Officer, would be the proper individual to contact in connection with the student record of HARRY GOLD.

Dr. GULICK was subsequently contacted, at which time he advised that HARRY GOLD, 2631 South Phillip Street, Philadelphia, Pa., entered the Freshman class of 1930 at the University of Pennsylvania in the fall of 1930. GULICK stated that he could not recall the subject.

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According to Dr. GULICK's records, GOLD was born in Bern, Switzerland, December 12, 1910 and was the son of SAMUEL GOLD. He was admitted for attendance at the University on July 25, 1930 from the South Philadelphia High School. He withdrew on March 12, 1932. At his entrance, he furnished the following certified high school credits:

GOLD also took a pre-freshman course, date unknown, at the University of Pennsylvania in Solid Geometry and Plain Trigonometry and made satisfactory grades.

According to Dr. GULICK, the records did not reveal who were GOLD's instructors while he attended the University. However, he advised that the following individuals may have instructed subject:

With the exception of UPBALL and BROWN, GULICK believed the other professors to be presently at the University. He had no information as to where UPBALL and BROWN might presently be.

Dr. GULICK stated that, according to his records, there was no indication that subject might have participated in sports, clubs or other organizations.

After GOLD had left the University, GULICK stated that transcripts of his work done there were sent to Drexel Institute of Technology on January 12, 1934; the University of Cincinnati on September 7, 1938; and Xavier University at Cincinnati on September 15, 1938.

DREXEL INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

[REDACTED], Philadelphia, Pa., advised that Mr. KENNETH RIDDLE, Director, Night School, at Drexel, would be the appropriate individual to contact regarding subject's school record while at Drexel. *BRD*

Subsequently, Mr. RIDDLE made available the record of HARRY COLLN, which contained the following information:

RIDDLE advised that these addresses were listed by date sequence. However, he stated that the dates that subject resided at each address was unknown.

According to RIDDLE, GOLD entered Drexel Night School in February 1933 and was graduated June 5, 1936 with a diploma in Chemical Engineering. He did not receive a degree at Drexel, inasmuch as degrees were not granted for evening classes. According to the record, he was not a member of any school, club, society or other organization. During the time that he was in Drexel, he was employed as Lab Assistant, at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, 1037 North Delaware Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa. with Mr. W. H. HOODLESS as superintendent. The employment at Pennsylvania Sugar Company was verified by Drexel on January 29, 1934, November 1, 1934, and December 10, 1935.

The record further revealed that GOLD did not attend summer quarters at school, which included the months of June, July and August.

Regarding the Cincinnati address of GOLD, RIDDLE stated that, although there was no way of telling positively from his records the date that subject resided in Cincinnati, he believed that it was probably during the summer of 1936, inasmuch as GOLD was employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company prior to his graduation.

The record also revealed that GOLD returned to Drexel Night School in September 1936, to do post graduate work as a result of being granted a George W. Childs Scholarship for his outstanding scholastic records. RIDDLE explained that each year, the Child's Scholarship was granted to approximately the upper $\frac{1}{4}$ of each graduating class, so that outstanding students could return for three quarters and broaden their education by taking courses outside the chemistry field. GOLD returned in September 1936 and took two of the three quarters in psychology and economics, according to RIDDLE.

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According to the record, GOLD brought correspondence with him from the University of Pennsylvania (January 1934) in Analytical Geometry, Differential Calculus, Inorganic Chemistry, Qualitative Chemistry and Quantitative Chemistry.

According to RIDDLE, transcripts of Drexel's records have been furnished, dates unknown, to the United States Civil Service Commission and the University of Cincinnati - probably after graduation.

Regarding the above mentioned instructors, RIDDLE advised that, with the exception of Dr. OSCAR WESLEY, 155 West Plumstead Avenue, Lansdowne, Pa., he did not believe that any of them were presently at Drexel. He stated that most of them were industrially employed and only instructed part time and the turnover was therefore great. RIDDLE stated that since the hearing of the HARRY GOLD case, he had heard Dr. A. WESLEY state that GOLD was evidently not very much outspoken, inasmuch as he could not recall him at all. However, he stated that he kept meticulous records at home of all classes he had ever instructed, and that he planned to review them in an effort to determine information regarding GOLD.

RIDDLE stated that his records also revealed that subject had previously attended South Philadelphia High School from which he had graduated in 1928 and that he had also attended Central High School and taken some evening work.

It may be noted that the records of the Philadelphia Public Schools did not reflect subject's ever having attended Philadelphia Central High School.

ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE

On May 25, 1950 Father JOSEPH J. MALLOY, Head of the Chemistry Department of the above college, advised that GOLD had attended a course in fermentation at St. Joseph's College from October 18, 1943 to January 17, 1944 and made a grade of A. He was absent only three evenings during the entire course. (The instructor was Mr. MORTON RAYMAN, who was employed at Publicker Industries at the time.)

GOLD took a course in distillery practice from February 14, 1944 to April 24, 1944 and was present at all sessions. He made a grade of B in this course. He later attended a class in glassware, which consisted principally of instruction in the maintenance and manufacture of Laboratory glassware, which he took from September 18, 1944 to November 10, 1944. At the beginning of this course, he gave his address as 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia. For the previous courses he gave his address as 5032 Boudinot Street, Philadelphia. During all the courses taken at St. Joseph's, he

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stated that he was employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, 1037 North Delaware Avenue.

On one occasion in the early part of 1944, GOLD stated that he was employed at the Siboney Distilling Corporation of the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, 1037 North Delaware Avenue, Philadelphia. Later, on November 20, 1944, GOLD enrolled in a class in advanced glassware, which terminated January 25, 1945. This course consisted of the maintenance and construction of glass, and was instructed by Dr. PERCY COLF, 3533 North 16th Street, an employee of the Barritt Division of Allied Dye and Chemical Company, who Father MALLOY believed would probably remember GOLD.)

According to Father MALLOY in the above course, seven of the nineteen students were awarded certificates for completion of the course. He stated that GOLD possibly was not one of the seven students and that the reason may have been that he was absent on too many occasions.

Father MALLOY recalled that GOLD and another individual always came to class together and would usually arrive about fifteen minutes prior to the beginning. He said that he could not recall the name or description of the individual, but that it may have been MAX B. MELLNER, 1421 Arch Street, Philadelphia, who was employed at the Philadelphia Navy Yard at the time. According to Father MALLOY, MELLNER was a graduate of Pennsylvania State, possessing a BS Degree.

Father MALLOY went on to state that according to his records, both MELLNER and subject, GOLD, were enrolled in the course in maintenance and construction of laboratory glassware and that both of them were present 39 hours out of the 48 required for the course.

Father MALLOY also recalled that JOHN MC CABE, telephone Locust 4-1100, an employee of Publicker Industries, Philadelphia, was also an instructor of GOLD during the time he attended school at St. Joseph's College.

Father MALLOY furnished the writer with lists of names and addresses of students taking courses with subject. The names and addresses of students enrolled in the courses in the Fermentation Process, Distillery Practice and Maintenance and Construction of Laboratory Glassware are being maintained as an exhibit in instant file. The names and addresses of students taking glassware advanced are as follows:

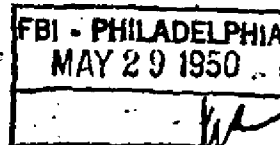

The only record maintained by Zeyher Mfg. Co., Inc. was a 3" x 5" index card listing SAMUEL GOLD began working for that company June 24, 1946 and was still so employed, although he had not reported for work this week. SAMUEL GOLD's residence was listed as 6823 Kindred St., Phila., Pa. and his Social Security No. was 160-05-4276. There was a notation that GOLD's wife died September 26, 1947. There was also a notation that in case of emergency the company should notify his son, JOSEPH GOLD, who was employed at the Naval Aviation Supply Depot, Oxford Avenue and Martins Mill Road, Phila., Pa.

On May 26, 1950, [redacted] of the Real Estate Trust Company, 15th and Sansom Streets, Philadelphia, advised that HARRY GOLD had a No Minimum Balance Checking Account at the above bank from September 11, 1944 until August 29, 1947. [redacted] said that this checking account was the type that required no minimum balance. However, a five cent charge was levied on each item in the account.

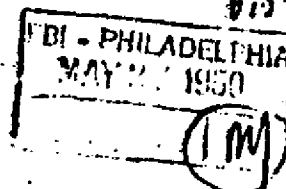
[redacted] of the Real Estate Trust Company, produced the Index Card on HARRY GOLD which showed that the account was opened on September 11, 1944 and closed on August 29, 1947. This card showed GOLD's business address to be the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, 2037 North Delaware Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa. His references were shown to be draft card and Captain of the Port Card. The initial deposit in the account was in the amount of \$103.50. (His home phone number was shown as PIL-8492 and his business phone as MAR-5500.) [redacted] His occupation was shown as chemist. This Index Card, which, according to [redacted] would show any account or transaction that GOLD had with the bank, showed that he had the checking account only. There was no record of any loans or other type transactions with the bank.

[redacted] also produced Deposit Slips for GOLD's accounts which showed the following:

[redacted] produced the microfilm on the above checks and made a photostatic copy of each check, which copies he gave to the writer. These photostatic copies will be made an exhibit in file 65-4307.

[redacted] also stated that he could not explain the \$375.00 check that was made out in favor of the Real Estate Trust Company. He offered the possibility that inasmuch as it was for \$375.00, that it may have been for a savings bond. However, he said this was only a supposition.

The Ledger Card of the above bank account showed that on February 16, 1946 the balance was \$16.00 and that the last check in the account was drawn on March 4, 1946 in the amount of \$15.00. The \$1.00 balance was used up by service charges through August 29, 1947, at which time the account, with a balance of zero dollars, was closed.

It shows that her husband, Mr. JOHN GLATFELTER was employed at Sharp and Dohme, 640 North Broad Street, Philadelphia. Mrs. GLATFELTER's employment at the time the account was opened was shown as the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, 1037 North Delaware Avenue. Her present address is given as 1841 South Alden Street, Philadelphia.

On 5/25/50, the writer interviewed MRS. MARY ATWELL, 1522 Mount Vernon Street, Philadelphia, Pa., who advised she had met HARRY GOLD on several occasions from 1943 to 1944 through MISS JEAN LOOKABOUGH, who was a fellow employee of GOLD's at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company. MISS LOOKABOUGH is now MRS. JOHN GLADFELTER, 1841 South Alden Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

MRS. ATWELL advised that she had no personal knowledge of trips, vacations, or other activities of GOLD, and had merely met him through her friendship with LOOKABOUGH and MISS BEATRICE M. SCHIED. MISS SCHIED is a chemist at the WILLIAM AMER COMPANY, 215 Willow Street, Philadelphia, and had formerly been employed at the Philadelphia General Hospital.

MRS. ATWELL stated that these three individuals, i.e. herself, ^(Revised) JEAN LOOKABOUGH, and MISS SCHIED had been classmates and through LOOKABOUGH had become acquainted with GOLD. MRS. ATWELL stated that JEAN LOOKABOUGH had done some typing for GOLD in the preparation of a scientific paper, the nature of which was unknown to her (MRS. ATWELL). She pointed out that the typewriter used was her personal typewriter which she still owned and retained at 1522 Mount Vernon Street. MRS. ATWELL was unable to provide further information relative to GOLD or his activities.

On 5/26/50, the writer interviewed MISS BEATRICE M. SCHIED at her place of employment, the WILLIAM AMER MANUFACTURING COMPANY, 215 Willow Street. MISS SCHIED advised that she met HARRY GOLD at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company in late 1943 or early 1944, which meeting was made through JEAN LOOKABOUGH, now MRS. JOHN GLADFELTER. MISS SCHIED advised after several meetings with GOLD at various social affairs, the dates of which she could not recall, GOLD had asked her for dates, which she turned down. She stated the last time that she met GOLD was in August of 1948, at which time he appeared at the residence of MRS. MARY ATWELL, 1522 Mount Vernon Street, MISS SCHIED'S residence at that time, to thank her for obtaining a position at the Philadelphia General Hospital for him.

MISS SCHIED explained that she had been employed for a period of about one and one-half years at the Philadelphia General Hospital as a laboratory technician and chemist, and had terminated her employment at that establishment in the middle of 1948. She stated she had heard that there was a vacancy for a bio-chemist and knew that HARRY GOLD, who at that time was employed in New York, was planning to return to Philadelphia and leave such employment. She informed GOLD of the vacancy and told him to see the head of the Research Department at the hospital. She stated that she had recommended GOLD for employment at the hospital; however, this recommendation was based merely upon statements made by other chemists -- namely, JEAN LOOKABOUGH and MORRELL DOUGHERTY. She stated she had no personal knowledge of his

ability; however, felt that her friends were reliable in their statements. She, therefore, recommended him to the hospital and later learned that he had obtained the position.

Relative to MORRELL DOUGHERTY, MISS SCHIED advised she was not well acquainted with him but knew that he was a very close friend of HARRY GOLD and JEAN LOOKABOUGH, and if anyone did know about GOLD'S activities these two individuals should.

MR. MARTIN J. SCHIED, 1505 Arch Street, Norristown, Pa., was interviewed by the writer at SCHIED'S place of employment, Sears & Roebuck Company, in Norristown. MR. SCHIED had no personal information concerning GOLD, according to his statements, and advised he had never met GOLD, but had heard his daughter, HEATRICE SCHIED, and MARY ATWELL speak of him on several occasions.

Efforts to locate FREDERICK STETSON at 6347 Wayne Avenue were unsuccessful.

MR. HENRY SKLAR, manager of the apartments at 6347 Wayne Avenue, advised that STETSON had left the Philadelphia area approximately in 1948, moving to Omaha, Nebraska. SKLAR advised he has learned that STETSON has since moved from Omaha; however, was unable to provide an exact address in Omaha or subsequent addresses.

It is recommended that Postal Authorities be contacted relative to possible forwarding addresses of STETSON in order that an interview may be accomplished.

The writer interviewed MR. RICHARD E. BOWERS, 1833 Elston Street, formerly of 1828-73rd Avenue, who was employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company from 1936 through 1942. BOWERS advised that he became acquainted with GOLD in 1937, at which time GOLD was employed in the laboratory at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company. However, he did not become well acquainted in that he did not like the way GOLD operated. He pointed out that GOLD was very close with MORRELL DOUGHERTY and JEAN LOOKABOUGH.

BOWERS stated that GOLD and DOUGHERTY were such close friends that they were referred to as the "Gold Dust Twins". He stated that DOUGHERTY and GOLD corresponded with each other when GOLD went to Ohio to attend the Xavier College in 1938 to 1940.

BOWERS stated that GOLD was very close-mouthed and while at Pennsylvania Sugar Company worked in a small laboratory that was set off from the rest of the laboratories of the company.

BOWERS advised he left the employ of the Pennsylvania Sugar Company on December 31, 1942, to enter the United States Army Air Force, and returned to the employ

of the company in December, 1945. He stated GOLD was still employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company at that time. However, he did not become well acquainted, pointing out that GOLD and DOUGHERTY tried to steal some of the laboratory equipment. BOWERS reported this theft to ROBERT TUSON, Superintendent of the Alcohol Plant, and the latter individual made GOLD and DOUGHERTY return the equipment. As a result of this incident, GOLD and BOWERS did not remain on speaking terms.

BOWERS pointed out that JEAN LOOKABOUGH took over his position while he was in the Army Air Force; hence he did not become well acquainted with her.



This information is submitted to indicate the close relationship between DOUGHERTY, LOOKABOUGH, and GOLD.

On May 26, 1950, the writer interviewed Mrs. JACK P. GLADFELTER, nee REGINA MARGARET LOOKABAUGH, at her residence, 1841 South Alden Street, Philadelphia, Pa., and the following information was obtained:

She was born in Philadelphia February 23, 1921 and resides with her parents at the above address, telephone SARatoga 9-8433. Her employment at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company covered a period from July 15, 1942 to February 1, 1946 when all of the employees in the laboratory where she worked were dismissed because of the plant closing down.

Her position was that of Assistant Chemist. About November, 1942, REGINA LOOKABAUGH started working in the same laboratory with HARRY GOLD and MORRELL DOUGHERTY. She described GOLD as a quiet, considerate, well liked and a type of person who was an extremely hard worker. He was interested in baseball, music and was not reticent in discussing his personal life.

(Note -) In the discussions regarding his personal life, he many times discussed attending Xavier University, of having had a very hard time financially and other similar incidents such as have been described in the papers. During the entire time that she knew GOLD he had never said or done ~~anything~~ anything which caused her to question his loyalty in any way.

Mrs. GLADFELTER pointed out that shortly after she went to work for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, probably about the early part of 1943, GOLD invited her to attend the Ice Follies, which she did. She stated that he appeared to be interested in continuing social relations, but that the above incident was the only time she ever accompanied him socially because of religious differences, GOLD being Jewish while she is Catholic. She pointed out, however, that while she was with him, GOLD was a perfect gentleman.

With respect to social activity of GOLD, she related that at work various ones used to tease him about a red-headed girl whose identity was unknown to her. She stated that GOLD also used to go out occasionally with a girl named MARIAN _____ (last name unknown) whom she

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thought resided on Sansom Street in the vicinity of 14th Street. (She could furnish no further information regarding MARIAN, and indicated that she had never seen her.)

According to Mrs. GLADFELTER, GOLD's closest friend without question at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company was MORRELL DOUGHERTY. GOLD and DOUGHERTY worked side by side all the time and were continuously together both at work and socially. She stated that GOLD's other friends at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company with whom he frequently associated were SANDY IRWIN, CLARENCE HUNT and TOM FERGUSON.

With respect to GOLD's absences from the Pennsylvania Sugar Company both on business and vacations, Mrs. GLADFELTER was unable to furnish any definite information regarding any vacation taken by GOLD. She pointed out that she recalled a business trip he made to Illinois either to or near Chicago where GOLD and DOUGHERTY visited a plant making Red Star yeast. She was unable to state the time of this trip, but recalled that another Lab employee at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, one WALTER KACHELE, died of a heart attack while GOLD and DOUGHERTY were away.

It was Mrs. GLADFELTER's recollection that at about the same time as the above described trip, GOLD and DOUGHERTY also made a trip on official business to a Kentucky destination which is the location of Segrans Distillery.

It was ascertained from Mrs. GLADFELTER that she typed some kind of a treatise or paper for GOLD on the Thermal Diffusion of Gases and that to the best of her recollection, this was probably typed during the year of 1945. She explained that she did not know anything about the contents of this article and, therefore, could give no opinion on what it might have dealt with. She explained that while she was employed as an Assistant Chemist, she knew very little about chemistry having received a degree in Home Economics and merely took chemistry courses because it was a requirement in order to receive a degree.

In about April or May of 1946, Mrs. GLADFELTER received a call from GOLD at which time he advised her of the possibility of obtaining a job with Brothman Associates in New York City. Inasmuch as she was out of work at the time, she visited the office of Brothman Associates in

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New York, at which time she ascertained that the available work involved plastics. Inasmuch as she felt that she did not know enough about chemistry to handle such work, she did not continue in her efforts to obtain such a position. Further, she stated that she was giving piano lessons to a group of children at her home and did not want to give this practice up.

Mrs. GLADFELTER was questioned at length regarding trips, vacations and activities of GOLD other than his actual employment at Pennsylvania Sugar Company, and she was unable to furnish any information of value. She definitely stated that she had never heard him mention anything about trips to Santa Fe, New Mexico, Boston, Mass. or New York City such as she had read of in the newspapers.

ZOLINAS advised he has been employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company since 1924 and has been acquainted with GOLD since about 1930. He indicated that his only contact with GOLD had been of a business nature while at work, and that he was not acquainted with him socially. He stated that GOLD was conscientious and a hard worker who put in considerable overtime. During this period, GOLD never said or did anything to ZOLINAS's knowledge which might reflect upon his loyalty to the United States. He stated that to his knowledge GOLD never removed any technical data or material from the plant and he was not aware of any periods that GOLD was away from the plant on vacation or official business.

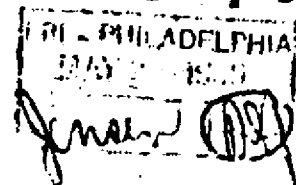

BAIRD said he first met GOLD about 1935. His only contacts with GOLD were at work and he was not personally acquainted with him. BAIRD said he never discussed politics with GOLD and that GOLD never indicated to him in any way that

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he might be disloyal. BAIRD said he had always thought of GOLD as being honest, reliable, and a hard worker. He said the only incident that he could recall that might reflect upon GOLD in any way occurred during 1936 or 1937 when part of the plant went on strike over a labor dispute, while the remaining part of the plant continued to work. Although GOLD was not involved in the strike, since he was considered a professional man, he refused to work until the striking members returned to work, in spite of the fact that he almost lost his job. He stated that to his knowledge, GOLD never removed any technical data or material from the plant and he was not aware of any periods that GOLD was away from the plant on vacation or official business.

GORLEY stated he has been employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company since 1924, and has been acquainted with GOLD since about 1930. He indicated that his contacts with GOLD have been rather limited, since 1942, since he entered the Army in that year and did not return until August of 1945, which was shortly before GOLD left the employment of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation, a subsidiary of Pennsylvania Sugar Company. GORLEY advised that most of his contacts with GOLD were of a business nature at the plant, although he did associate socially with GOLD on several occasions during the period 1937 to 1941 while he was studying chemistry at Temple University. On these occasions, GOLD was at his home for dinner and helped him with his chemistry problems. GORLEY added, however, that he never discussed politics with GOLD and that GOLD never indicated to him in any way that he might be disloyal. He said that GOLD, to his knowledge, never removed any technical data or material from the plant, and he was not aware of any periods that GOLD was away from the plant on vacation or official business.

She advised that she has known GOLD since approximately 1933, when she was first employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company. She indicated that her only contacts with GOLD were of a business nature, and she was not acquainted with him socially. During this period, GOLD never said or did anything which might reflect upon his loyalty to the United States. She indicated that to her knowledge, GOLD never removed any technical data or material from the plant and

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she was not aware of any periods that GOLD was away from the plant on vacation or official business. She stated that GOLD was a hard worker, conscientious, and a sincere individual, and added that she was extremely surprised to read of his activities in the newspaper. She stated that during the late 1930's GOLD, as well as many other individuals, took work home at nights, but added that this was more or less required at that time by the management and was not unusual.

RIEHLE advised he has been acquainted with GOLD since about 1931. He indicated that his contacts with GOLD had generally been of a business nature, and he was not acquainted with him socially. He stated that GOLD was a conscientious and hard worker, who put in considerable overtime. During this period, GOLD never said or did anything to RIEHLE'S knowledge which might reflect upon his loyalty to the United States. He stated to his knowledge GOLD never removed any technical data or material from the plant, and he was not aware of any periods that GOLD was away from the plant on vacation or official business. The only incident that RIEHLE could recall that might reflect upon GOLD occurred during 1936 or 1937, when part of the plant went on strike over a labor dispute. RIEHLE, however, could furnish no additional information concerning this incident other than that furnished by BAIRD.

On 5/26/50, considerable inquiry was made in the vicinity of 2549 South Galloway Street, Philadelphia, Pa., in an effort to locate a CLAIRE BLEYMAN who formerly resided at that address. It was finally ascertained that Miss BLEYMAN had married CHARLES MAHONEY, and presently resides at 2132 North Hancock Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

Subsequently, Mrs. MAHONEY was contacted and furnished the following information:

Mr

Mrs. MAHONEY stated that she was employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company as a chemical laboratory assistant from April 1945 until November 1945. She stated that she was actually on the payroll until about January 1946. However, she did not return to the company after leaving in November 1945. According to Mrs. MAHONEY, subject, HARRY GOLD, was a chemist at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company as an assistant to Dr. DOUGHERTY, during the entire time she was employed there. Mrs. MAHONEY related that GOLD was a nervous individual and that when he talked, especially to a woman, his face would become flushed. She said that he was a quiet individual who would sometimes converse a bit with the men, but would only talk to the women when he had a job for them to do. Mrs. MAHONEY added that for some reason, she never felt comfortable in his presence and only spoke to him on matters regarding their work in the laboratory. Mrs. MAHONEY went on to say that she was quite surprised to hear ~~that he was a spy~~ *was an agent* and stated that she could hardly believe it when she read the papers inasmuch as he was so mild mannered that she just didn't think him to be the type. Mrs. MAHONEY continued by stating that she could not recall GOLD having taken a vacation during the time she was employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, but added that he probably took one while she was there. She added that she had never heard him discuss vacation, travels and other activities and stated again that she had never talked with him except on laboratory business.

Mrs. MAHONEY went on to state that one JEAN LOOKERBAUGH (phonetic) who has since married and resides at 1841 South Alden Street, Philadelphia, Pa., as Mrs. JEAN GLATFALTER, was one of the female laboratory assistants who knew GOLD quite well and conversed with him on frequent occasions. MAHONEY added that Mrs. GLATFALTER would probably know GOLD better than anyone who worked at the laboratory with the exception of Dr. DOUGHERTY.

Regarding Dr. DOUGHERTY, MAHONEY stated that he appeared to be a very close friend of GOLD's, and stated that they often worked together. She believed DOUGHERTY to be intimately acquainted with GOLD and stated that it was undoubtedly quite a shock to DOUGHERTY to hear of GOLD's arrest.

Subsequent to the interview with Mrs. MAHONEY, an effort was made to locate Miss MARY COLLINS, who also allegedly worked with HARRY GOLD. Mrs. MAHONEY advised the writer that MARY COLLINS had left the 2004 Godfrey Avenue address, and had moved to 301 West Cambria Street.

Investigation in the vicinity of 301 West Cambria Street revealed that a few years ago a COLLINS girl had operated a restaurant at that address and had resided in the rear of the restaurant. The individual operating the above restaurant advised that he understood that MARY COLLINS had departed Philadelphia and had gone to another state. Additional investigation will be conducted to locate the whereabouts of MARY COLLINS.

In the vicinity of 4716 "D" Street, Philadelphia, it was ascertained that CLARENCE HUNT had moved from that address in January of 1950. Subsequent investigation disclosed that HUNT presently resides at 547 Van Kirk Street, Philadelphia. However, the writer appeared at the HUNT residence on two occasions during the afternoon of 5/26/50, to find no one at home. Neighbors advised that they had no idea where the HUNTS might be and stated they did not know where Mr. HUNT worked. Additional investigation will also be conducted to locate CLARENCE HUNT.

Mr. THOMAS J. FERGUSON was interviewed by the writer on May 25, 1950 at his residence, 1210 Greylock Street, Philadelphia, Pa. Mr. FERGUSON advised that he is presently employed from 10:00 PM to 7:00 AM at the Widener Building from the 18th to 13th floors as a cleaner.

FERGUSON stated that because of the number of years which have elapsed his dates might not be exactly correct; however, he furnished the following information concerning his association with GOLD.

He first became acquainted with GOLD in 1930 when GOLD was employed as a bottle washer. From 1934 or 1935 for approximately two years, he worked alone with GOLD at the Siboney Distillery and was teaching him the art of making yeast for beer mash. They worked together for approximately two years, at which time GOLD returned to the Pennsylvania Sugar laboratory. Shortly thereafter, GOLD went to school in Cincinnati and upon completion of his course, he worked as a chemist. (FERGUSON did not know the exact location where GOLD worked, but stated that he thought it was in some soap factory.)

Following this employment, GOLD returned to the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, and about 1944, Pennsylvania Sugar was sold to the National Sugar Company of New York. After the company changed hands, practically all employees, including GOLD, were laid off. According to FERGUSON, he had lost contact with GOLD since 1944 until about May 8, 1950. On this occasion, FERGUSON stated he was obtaining heart treatments at the Philadelphia General Hospital and the room in which he was obtaining the treatments was adjacent to Mr. GOLD's laboratory.

Upon their renewal of acquaintance, GOLD wrote FERGUSON's address down and stated that he would drop around and visit FERGUSON in the near future as he wanted to see the children again.

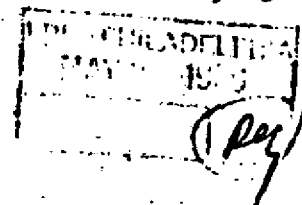
FERGUSON explained that although he had never been socially associated with GOLD, on occasions at infrequent intervals GOLD would visit him at his home and have a few drinks.

On May 25, 1950, Special Agents ALBERT L. PIERCE and JOHN A. HEBENSTREIT interviewed Mr. JOSEPH M. WEBER, Personnel Manager at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, Philadelphia Division, Delaware Avenue and Shackamaxon Street, Philadelphia, Pa. Mr. WEBER introduced the agents to Mr. JOSEPH R. EGGERT, Production Manager of the company, who assured the agents that the company would cooperate with the Bureau in every detail in obtaining information regarding GOLD during his employment at the company, but stated that the records of the company were very poorly kept during GOLD's period of employment. This was because GOLD was employed as a chemist for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company and the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation, a subsidiary, during most of his period of employment. Both of these companies had a complex history of name and ownership changes and for this reason many records were destroyed, or poorly and incompletely kept.

Mr. WEBER furnished the personal records of GOLD which reflected the following:

HARRY GOLD of 6823 Kindred Street was born December 12, 1910 in Switzerland and was naturalized. His nationality was indicated as Yiddish and his marital status, single. He listed as references the Gift Crafters; H&Lbrook Manufacturing Company, Jersey City; Moormeir Dairy Company, Cincinnati, Ohio.

An Employee Record revealed that HARRY GOLD's Social Security Number was 160-05-4277 and that he was employed on January 2, 1929. This record listed his address as 5032 North Broad Street, Philadelphia, and indicated that he had graduated from college with a B.S. Degree in Chemistry, and that he had previously been employed by the Kolbrook Company for one year as a chemist. This record also listed GOLD's employment as follows:

An Employee's Card for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company listed the following additional information:

A previous residence was listed as 2540 South Philip Street, Philadelphia. It was indicated that GOLD could speak and understand

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but could not read nor write the Yiddish language. His previous employment was listed as four months at the Gift Crafters, northeast corner, Turner and Mascher Streets, Philadelphia; nine months at the Halbrook Manufacturing Company, Jersey City, N.J.; and a year and ten months at the Moormeir Dairy Company, Cincinnati, Ohio. This card listed GOLD's employment as follows:

This last notation, 7/1/40, appeared in ink and was written in such a manner that it could easily be misinterpreted to be 1/1/40 or 11/1/40, which may account for the discrepancy in other records previously mentioned. A signature and photograph of GOLD appeared on this card, which is being photographed before returning to the company.

An Engagement Slip was also furnished for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company which indicated that GOLD was employed by the company as a chemist in the laboratory on July 1, 1940. GOLD signed this slip and a photographic copy is being made of his signature before returning the slip to the company.

An attempt was made to determine GOLD's complete record of vacations taken during his period of employment with the company. However, only one such record was found. This was found in the Payroll Register for the year 1944 for the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation. This record showed that for the week ending September 3, 1944, GOLD received extra pay in advance for a vacation the following week. The record for the week ending September 10, 1944 had the pay crossed out indicating that he was not paid for that week. These records were interpreted by WEBER as showing that GOLD took his vacation beginning September 4, 1944 for one week. These

records also indicated that MORRELL DOUGHERTY, an extremely close friend and associate of GOLD's and also a chemist in the same laboratory, took his vacation at the same time as GOLD.

Similar records in the Payroll Register for 1945 failed to disclose any vacation taken by GOLD during that year. However, it was explained that records of vacations were not always recorded in this register. The Payroll Register for July 1945, however, disclosed that DOUGHERTY had his vacation during the week ending July 15, 1945, and REGINA LOOKBRAUGH, who was also employed with GOLD in the same laboratory, had her vacation during the week ending August 12, 1945. CLARENCE SPRATT, a supervisor of the laboratory at that time, also had his vacation during the week ending August 12, 1945. These vacation periods are being set out for use in interviewing these people to assist them in recalling, if possible, when GOLD had his vacation during that year.)

Page 21 of a Loan Register kept by the company showed payments deducted from GOLD's pay each pay day for the purpose of repaying a \$500.00 loan made by the company. An entry of this register on September 23, 1945 indicated that \$10.00 in cash was taken from GOLD's vacation pay, September 17, 1945, and deposited in the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation cash receipts on September 21, 1945. An unsuccessful attempt to locate a further record of this vacation was made.

Mr. WEBER stated that GOLD and DOUGHERTY both applied for a loan of \$500.00 from the Pennsylvania Sugar Company on February 6, 1945 and, in their application, agreed to have withheld from their salary a certain amount each month to begin on February 16, 1945. These applications were signed by GOLD and DOUGHERTY. The original application signed by the officials of the company approving this loan was then located at the New York office of the National Sugar Refining Company, of which the Pennsylvania Sugar Company is a division. Mr. WEBER made arrangements and this application was placed in the mail and directed to him by registered mail so that it might be turned over to this office for photographing. The original application signed by DOUGHERTY and approved by officials of the company was available at that time in the payroll office.

Cancelled check number P3271 of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation, dated Philadelphia, February 9, 1945, to

the order of HARRY GOLD for \$500.00 and signed by Mr. NORMAN PEOPLES and JOSEPH A. WEBER, was obtained by Mr. JOSEPH RYAN of the Payroll Department and furnished to the agents for photographing. This check was endorsed by HARRY GOLD and was stamped on the back with the stamp of the Real Estate Trust Company of Philadelphia, February 9, 1945. A stamp on the face of the check contained the initials "J.J.B.", which RYAN stated were probably those of the teller at the Real Estate Trust Company where the check was evidently cashed.

A similar cancelled check, number P3270, identical in all other respects except the teller's stamp on the front, was made out to MORRELL DOUGHERTY and endorsed by him. This check also was furnished to the agents for photographing.

A check of the Payroll Register for the year 1946 for the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation revealed that payroll adjustments for the week ending February 10, 1946 listed HARRY GOLD as receiving \$5.68 as a proportionate part of his 1946 vacation. It was also indicated that HARRY GOLD was due \$500.00 separation pay at that time. \$91.90 of this amount was deducted for income tax purposes, leaving \$408.10, which was paid by check number 770 of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation. This cancelled check was located by JOSEPH RYAN in the Payroll Department and furnished to the agents for photographing. This check was dated January 31, 1946 and was signed by JOSEPH A. WEBER and another company official and was endorsed by HARRY GOLD on the back in addition to his identification signature on the face of the check. A stamp on the back of this check indicated that it was cashed at the Real Estate Trust Company on February 8, 1946.

During the process of attempting to locate vacation records, other records for GOLD were found and furnished by RYAN at the Payroll Department. These do not represent the complete payroll records for GOLD during his entire period of employment.

The Payroll Record for the year 1935 for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company reflected that GOLD was transferred from the Refinery Payroll on December 1, 1935. At that time his rate of pay was \$110.00 per month. A notation in the Payroll Record for 1936 indicated that GOLD was transferred from the Refinery Payroll in September 1936.

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The Payroll Record for the year 1937 indicated that he was on the payroll during all of that year.

The Payroll Record for the year 1938 reflected that he resigned on September 15, 1938. He was not on the payroll during the year 1939, but the Payroll Record for 1940 reflected that he returned to work at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company on July 1, 1940 and received \$75.00 per half month until October 16, 1940, at which time he received a slight increase.

A Payroll Earnings Card Book for the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation indicated that from the week ending January 7, 1945 through the week ending March 25, 1945, GOLD received \$48.46 per week which, with deductions, amounted to \$36.70 per week. On April 1, 1945, GOLD received a pay increase to \$60.00 per week which was retroactive to January 1, 1945. The difference in this pay from January 1, 1945 to April 1, 1945 amounted to \$138.48 which, with deductions, netted \$102.12. This amount was paid to GOLD in cash along with his regular pay at that time. From April 1, 1945 through December 30, 1945, GOLD received \$60.00 per week which, with deductions, amounted to \$45.20 per week.

During 1945, GOLD had deducted from his salary \$3.00 per week for Government bonds. An extra payment was made to GOLD on December 23, 1945 as a \$50.00 Christmas bonus. With deductions, this amounted to \$39.50 which was paid in cash.

Mr. ROBERT TUSON, Process Superintendent, Pennsylvania Sugar Company, was formerly in charge of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation laboratory where GOLD was employed as Chemical Supervisor. TUSON was interviewed by the agents on May 25, 1950. He stated he entered on duty on April 1, 1945, at which time GOLD was a chemical engineer under NEMESIO ALVARE, who was Plant Manager of both the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation and the Sibonay Distilling Company. Mr. FRIEDERICK STETSON was GOLD's immediate supervisor as Plant Superintendent of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation. When STETSON was laid off on June 15, 1945, TUSON took his position. GOLD worked under TUSON until February 1, 1946, at which time GOLD was laid off because the production operations were discontinued.

TUSON recalled that GOLD and MORRELL DOUGHERTY, who worked with him at the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation laboratory,

were inseparable friends and associates. He described GOLD as a quiet and retiring person who let DOUGHERTY do most of his talking for him. GOLD was described as an introvert, while DOUGHERTY was described as an extrovert. He recalled that GOLD and DOUGHERTY went on a business trip to the American Distilling Company at Pekin, Ill. and the Hiram Walker Distillery at Peoria, Ill. sometime between June 15 and August 1, 1945, to the best of his recollection. They visited these distilleries to obtain information regarding grain fermentation for production of beverage spirits. He believed this trip was primarily for the purpose of using this information to obtain more alcohol in connection with a grain holiday, which he believed to have been declared by the Government in August 1945. The Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation had been obtaining their alcohol from molasses and hoped to use the extra grain available during this holiday period declared by the Government for the purpose of adding to their available alcohol for the production of beverage spirits.

TUSON did not recall the exact dates during which this trip was made but believed it to have been approximately two weeks duration. He checked his records and obtained copies of reports submitted by GOLD and DOUGHERTY describing their visits to these distilleries and their conclusions based on the visits. He noticed that Page 2 of these conclusions stated, "We must improvise some immediate system for cooling the fermenters this summer. It would be a pity to lose all of this production, particularly during the beverage period." Because of this statement, TUSON believed that this visit must have been made either prior to, or early in the summer of 1945. TUSON furnished these reports for photostating or photographing as desired by this office.

TUSON unsuccessfully attempted to recall when GOLD took his vacation in 1945. He did recall that DOUGHERTY took his vacation early in the vacation period and, therefore, believed that GOLD probably took his vacation later. He believed that both DOUGHERTY and GOLD were not on vacation at the same time.

TUSON recalled that in approximately December 1945, he received information from RICHARD BOWERS, who was then employed as a Laboratory Assistant in that laboratory, that numerous items of equipment were missing. TUSON checked and found that these items were in fact missing and consisted of laboratory equipment of the nature of a Westphal balance, a Pycnometer, sets of "matched" thermometers covering successive ranges, and other similar types of laboratory equipment. These items would be useful for a laboratory

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chemist or technician, but were readily available at laboratory equipment and chemical supply houses. Nevertheless, the total items missing represented a large financial loss to the company.

OLT
TUSON stated that, because of the actions of DOUGHERTY and GOLD, he was suspicious of them and, knowing that he would tell GOLD, mentioned to DOUGHERTY that certain pieces of equipment were missing and that he thought it would be a good idea if he checked his equipment in before leaving so that no one would be likely to accuse them of taking the equipment after they had left. According to TUSON, immediately following his talk with DOUGHERTY, the missing equipment began to reappear, and that when it was finally checked there were no major items missing.

TUSON recalled that he noticed, during his association with DOUGHERTY and GOLD, that they appeared to be holding back some information regarding chemical analyses, etc., that they had made and that he and other officers of the plant had the uneasy feeling that their results were not to be trusted. He further recalled that the Laboratory Assistant, RICHARD BOWERS, had been told by DOUGHERTY not to turn in any results of laboratory analyses without clearing them with GOLD or DOUGHERTY. He further recalled that neither DOUGHERTY nor GOLD appeared anxious to turn in information without first talking it over with the other.

TUSON indicated that their records were so set up that GOLD would have had access to all technical data regarding distilling and refining processes and could have easily removed or copied this information without arousing suspicion. GOLD was an exceptionally hard worker and frequently worked evenings, Sundays, etc. TUSON stated that he did not believe any of the information in connection with any of the distilling or refining processes available to GOLD to be of a secret nature. He stated that it was readily available generally throughout the industries, but indicated that it may have been of help to backward nations.

TUSON recalled that CLARENCE HUNT, who worked with yeast and had numerous contacts with the laboratory, knew both DOUGHERTY and GOLD and that DOUGHERTY had frequently borrowed HUNT's automobile.

Mr. JOSEPH WEBER checked the records for HUNT and advised that he was first employed at the company June 10, 1937 and resigned

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on April 18, 1946. However, on February 11, 1946, he left the Alcohol Plant and went to work for the Pennsylvania Sugar Company. His last known address was 4716 D Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

TUSON and WEBER also furnished the names of the following individuals who were associated with GOLD other than those previously mentioned:

GUSTAV ("Doc") REICH, who was employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company on October 1, 1928 and resigned September 30, 1945. He was indicated as presently employed for himself in the Packard Building in Philadelphia.

CLAIRE BLEYMAN was employed as a Chemical Assistant, April 10, 1945 and resigned January 4, 1946. Her last known address was 2549 South Galloway Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

The records indicated that MARY COLLINS was employed in the laboratory with GOLD as a Chemist from August 13, 1945 to February 1, 1946. However, TUSON could not recall her employment there. Her last known address was 2004 Godfrey Avenue, Philadelphia.

Mr. A. J. HOEHN, Treasurer of the National Sugar Refining Company in New York, who happened to be in Philadelphia on May 25, 1950, was contacted by Agent PIERCE. Mr. HOEHN was asked how the expenses for business trips which were taken by GOLD and DOUGHERTY might have been recorded in the company records. Mr. HOEHN suggested checking the petty cash receipts which, with the assistance of JOSEPH RYAN of the Payroll Department, was done without locating any record of trips by GOLD.

Mr. HOEHN then suggested that contact be made with A. K. HAMILTON, who was formerly in charge of the Pennsylvania Alcohol and Chemical Corporation. Mr. HAMILTON had his main office in New York and visited Philadelphia approximately one day each week in order to handle the business of the corporation. He believed that HAMILTON was probably the man who authorized business trips for GOLD.

Mr. HOEHN further suggested that Mr. NORMAN PEOPLES, Night Plant Supervisor, be interviewed because he believed that he

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had arranged for and signed the contract with GOLD for the \$500.00 loan which the Pennsylvania Sugar Company granted.

Mr. NORMAN PEOPLES, Night Plant Supervisor, was contacted on May 25, 1950 by the agents, at which time he stated that he could not recall definitely, but he believed that either DOUGHERTY or GOLD had taken a business trip to Terre Haute, Ind. to visit the Commercial Solvents Corporation. He did not know the exact date of this trip but believed it to have been sometime between December 1941 and February 1946. He further recalled that both DOUGHERTY and GOLD had taken the trip previously described by TUSON. In that connection he stated that the trip was a hurry-up affair and it may have been financed by an advance drawn on a check made payable to him instead of to either DOUGHERTY, GOLD, or both; and that this might have explained why no records appeared in the company records regarding the expenses for this trip.

All of the persons interviewed on this date at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company stated that GOLD and DOUGHERTY were inseparable friends and associates and that DOUGHERTY did most of the talking for the two men, while GOLD stayed in the background and talked to very few people except DOUGHERTY. They indicated that GOLD was much the more intelligent of the two and that DOUGHERTY used GOLD's intelligence in talking with other people to get his point across.

Most of the persons interviewed also stated that both GOLD and DOUGHERTY appeared to be attempting to get everything that was due them in the form of money or rights in the plant and that they went to great lengths in order to do so.

During the discussions with most of these people, frequent mixups occurred regarding the correct name for the companies with which GOLD was employed or associated. It was suggested that the agents contact THOMAS HENEY, the Secretary of the National Sugar Refining Company, who would be able to give the complete picture regarding the various plant names and ownerships.

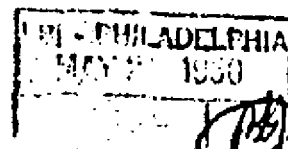
The following information was illicitly obtained from HARRY GOLD by the above Agents on May 19, 1950 and deals solely with background information. Additional information was obtained from GOLD pertaining to his association with ABRAHAM BROTHMAN on the same date. Attention is called to the fact that the information being set out hereinafter was obtained from GOLD prior to his confession. It may not be completely factual, although for the greater part, it is believed that it is the truth, inasmuch as GOLD generally was merely covering up his associations with FUCHS and other Russian Agents prior to his confession.

GOLD was born in Bern, Switzerland, December 12, ¹⁹¹⁰~~1920~~, the son of SAMUEL and CELIA GOLD. He said that his parents were both born in Russia and his father had been in Switzerland about eight or ten years following the occupation of a cabinet maker. He stated that his parents immigrated to the United States in 1914, at which time the family name was GOLODNITSKY. GOLD stated that when they arrived at Ellis Island they found that the family name had been spelled several different ways, which delayed them for a short period of time in getting into the United States. One of the Immigration men suggested to Mr. GOLD, that he change his name and suggested the name of GOLD. HARRY said that he thought that the name had been changed in a court, but could not recall where.

GOLD stated that the family went to Little Rock, Arkansas, where a relative resided and stayed there a short period of time. They then went to Chicago about the late summer of 1914 and stayed about nine or ten months there while his father worked in stock and coal yards. They stayed with a friend of the family in Chicago. They left Chicago, at which time SAMUEL GOLD went to Norfolk in an attempt to get employment in a shipyard and Mrs. GOLD and HARRY went to Philadelphia and were joined there shortly thereafter by Mr. GOLD. HARRY explained that they went to Philadelphia because his mother's brother resided there and that this was in the year 1915.

I talked to Judge McGRANERY 4.30 p.m. in response to his request that I get in touch with him, and he stated he had been advised that we planned to have HARRY GOLD brought to the office tomorrow for questioning and that he wanted to suggest that since there was some indication that HARRY GOLD might have a lawyer we advise the Bureau of the facts before making any arrangements to have him brought to the office. He said he had no thought that it wasn't all right, but he thought we should make certain it was clear with the Department.

I told him we did not plan now to have HARRY GOLD brought to the office, but rather planned on interviewing him at Holmesburg Prison and that HARRY GOLD had requested through the warden that Special Agents contact him; in other words, had asked to see the Agents. He said that "made all the difference in the world"; that that was fine; and that he no longer had any concern.

I called Mr. A. BELMONT of the Bureau and advised him of the conversation with Judge McGRANERY.

SA N. S. HARTZENSTEIN spoke to Mr. BELMONT and advised him that Agent MILLER had called from the prison; that HARRY GOLD had been visited early this afternoon by his brother JOSEPH and his father. After the visit, HARRY told Agent MILLER that his brother JOSEPH had obtained WILLIAM GRAY as a lawyer for him. Agent MILLER was told to find out specifically from HARRY whether he considered himself as having hired GRAY already or whether the meeting arranged for tomorrow afternoon was for the purpose of determining whether GRAY would be hired. MILLER called back and said that HARRY GOLD definitely did not consider himself as having employed GRAY as yet, but would decide that tomorrow when he spoke to GRAY; further, HARRY had said that he wants to continue talking to the Agents even though he does obtain a lawyer and that when he sees GRAY he intended to tell him that he wanted to continue talking. He said that unless GRAY convinced him that further talking would involve him and his family in worse fashion than he was already involved he planned to continue talking. He said that as far as he was concerned he felt that the statement he had already made had "cooked his," and that he couldn't implicate himself any worse. He said that if his lawyer advised him to stop talking for fear of implicating other people he did not intend to take such advice.

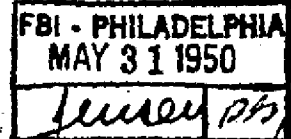

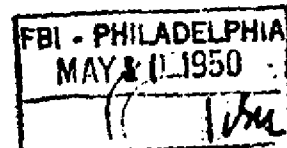

On May 25, 1950 the above Agents contacted HARRY GOLD in the Inspector's Office of the Holmesburg County Prison, Philadelphia, Pa. GOLD advised that he did not have an attorney as yet and further, even when he got one, it was not going to interfere with his continued discussion with the Agents of information in his possession concerning his knowledge of Soviet espionage.

GOLD advised he would like to remain in Philadelphia while in custody as long as possible so that he could be visited by his brother and father.

He stated that he realized he was not in a position to be asking any favors, but he wondered if one thing could be arranged. He said that he was in the middle of several experiments at the Laboratory of the Heart Section of the Philadelphia General Hospital and that no one else knew where to take the experiments up. He further added that he had ordered several pieces of equipment for the Laboratory and no one there would know for what experiment they were to be used.

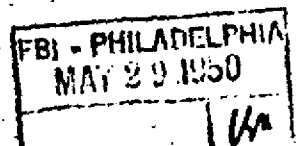
GOLD said that he would like to have a talk with someone in the Laboratory so that he could explain the status of each of the experiments and further explain why this equipment was ordered. GOLD said that it would take approximately thirty minutes and that while several people in the hospital would understand him, he would prefer to talk to Miss BELL, inasmuch as she worked side by side with him in the Laboratory and would understand best what he would try to explain.

GOLD was advised by the Agents that he was in the custody of the United States Marshal and that the Agents had no control over whom he could and whom he could not see. He was advised, however, that they would see what could be done about this. He said that there was no urgent need for this to be done and stated that if done in four or five days, it would be adequate.

GOLD said that he would be willing to come to the Philadelphia Office and be questioned there by the Agents concerning further information he might be able to supply.

The above information was given to Supervisor HARZENSTEIN by telephone.

ROBERT PATERSON, Security Officer, Frankford Arsenal, Philadelphia, was contacted by the writer on other business on May 29, 1950, at which time Mr. PATERSON volunteered the following information:

FRANCIS DELMARMAL, 1403 Rosalie Street, Philadelphia, who is employed at the Arsenal as an Expert Machinist and Tool Maker, and is presently engaged in work on a highly confidential project in progress at the Artillery Division of the Arsenal, advised Mr. PATERSON on May 26, 1950, that he had been contacted by a man whom he believed to be JOSEPH GOLD, brother of HARRY GOLD, approximately three weeks prior to May 26, 1950. DELMARMAL related that a Mr. GOLD, whom he had never met before, came to his home at 1403 Rosalie Street, to solicit an order for aluminum combination storm windows. During the course of the visit, Mr. GOLD indicated that he knew a special artillery project was underway at the Arsenal, and displayed interest in other activities carried on at the Arsenal.

DELMARMAL gave Mr. PATERSON an advertising handbill which GOLD had left with him, advertising Storm Master Aluminum Combination Storm Windows, manufactured by the AR-NEIL COMPANY, 429 W. Girard Avenue, Philadelphia. The handbill contains telephone number CU 8-0702, handwritten in ink in four different places on the handbill, and the name Mr. GOLD appears twice on the handbill. DELMARMAL told Mr. PATERSON that he had not ordered any storm windows and had forgotten about the incident until he saw JOSEPH GOLD's picture in Philadelphia daily newspapers following the arrest of HARRY GOLD. DELMARMAL told PATERSON that he was certain that the Mr. GOLD who called on him is identical with JOSEPH GOLD.

Mr. PATERSON stated that DELMARMAL has been employed for many years at the Arsenal and has previously furnished reliable information concerning petty thefts occurring at the Arsenal.

Mr. PATERSON verified the fact that a highly confidential project is underway in the Artillery Division at the Arsenal.

Mr. PATERSON advised that he had obtained no further information from DELMARMAL and stated that DELMARMAL would be available at the Arsenal in the event it is considered necessary to interview him regarding the identity of the Mr. GOLD.

Mr. NATHAN W. FESSENDEN, 1912 Dana Avenue, Cincinnati, advises he operated Moormeier Brothers Dairy Company, 1914 Dana Avenue, 1932 to 1940, at which time company went out of business. Available records fail to indicate employment of subject during that time and FESSENDEN does not recall GOLD which he claims he would if employed one year ten months. Also, no record of subject on payroll records of Dairy Bar, Incorporated, 1912 Dana Avenue, Cincinnati, which FESSENDEN has operated since 1935, for a time in conjunction with the dairy company.

Urtel also stated that GOLD furnished an address 19 Glendale Street, Cincinnati, during the summer of 1936. There is no number 19 on Glendale Street and Cincinnati City Directories do not contain such an address for the year 1936. Available residents of that block during 1936 do not recall the subject's residing there. GOLD did live at 49 Glendale Street while attending Xavier University, September, 1938 to June, 1940. Mrs. ALYS BROOKES, with whom the subject resided at 49 Glendale Street, recalls that at the time he first came to her home in 1938, GOLD appeared unfamiliar with that section of Cincinnati.

SA T. SCOTT MILLER called during the afternoon of 5/29/50 and stated that HARRY GOLD had advised the Agents that he wanted to request Judge McGRANERY to assign him an attorney. Agent MILLER advised that HARRY GOLD wanted to do this so that he can tell his father he has an attorney with the thought in mind that this will put his father's mind at ease. He asked the Agents to make the arrangements with the Warden to let him call Judge McGRANERY.

This information was transmitted to Mr. BELMONT of the Bureau; and, in accordance with his suggestions, Agent MILLER was advised that GOLD should be advised to communicate with the Warden and make a request of him; that Agent MILLER should advise the Warden of HARRY GOLD's desire and request, and inform him that it was up to him.

Agent MILLER stated that GOLD has advised him that he was going to tell the Judge that he wanted an attorney appointed and advised of the following stipulations: (1) that he will plead guilty; (2) that the attorney will allow him to continue talking to the FBI; and (3) that the attorney not be a "radical" or have any "red" leanings.

Judge McGRANERY called and stated that he had been contacted by HARRY GOLD and requested to appoint an attorney; that he planned on having him brought before him on Wednesday afternoon of this week; and that he would like to have two Agents assigned to, with the Marshal, bring GOLD before him on Wednesday afternoon. I told Judge McGRANERY that this would be taken up with the Bureau.

The matter was presented to Mr. BELMONT, and he advised that in view of the publicity attending this case the Agents' presence might be subject to misinterpretation and, therefore, undesirable. He requested that this be taken up with Judge McGRANERY on that basis.

I so advised Judge McGRANERY, and he agreed that he would have the Marshal handle the matter and request him to obtain the assistance of the Warden of Holmesburg in assigning guards to assist him.

In accordance with the instructions of Mr. BELMONT, I then asked the Judge if, in view of subject's request for an attorney, he felt it would be satisfactory to continue questioning GOLD, pointing out that Agents had been questioning him up to this time in accordance with his request. He stated that in view of the circumstances he felt that the interviews should be discontinued until after the attorney was appointed. This information was conveyed to Mr. BELMONT of the Bureau, and Supervisor HARTZENSTEIN was instructed to arrange for the discontinuance of the interviews until after the attorney was appointed, at which time his permission should be sought before further interviews are conducted.

On 5/27/50 Mr. CARL HENNRICH of the Bureau called and stated that the Bureau was in receipt of a teletype from the Salt Lake City Office dated 5/26/50 advising that DAVID C. EVANS, A Graduate Assistant, Physics Department, University of Utah, Salt Lake City, stated he had recognized GOLD's photograph as the man who was at the White Sands, New Mexico, Proving Ground on 9/15/49 or 9/16/49 to witness the launching of a rocket; that the man had introduced himself to EVANS as a Mr. GOLD; and that he had ascertained from him that he was a chemist from somewhere in the eastern United States. EVANS stated GOLD was driving a jeep belonging to the White Sands Base and was with two Army photographers. GOLD told EVANS during the course of the six or eight hours while they were together waiting for the rocket to be launched that he had read a book written by HENRY ERING of the University of Utah.

Mr. HENNRICH desired that GOLD be questioned regarding this and, upon receipt of a mailed copy of the teletype, appropriate investigation be instituted and conducted to determine if GOLD, subject in this case, is identical with the individual referred to by EVANS.

This information was conveyed to Supervisor HARZENSTEIN with instructions that it be handled.

Mr. FRANK UMIN was interviewed by the writer on May 29, 1950 and he furnished the following information:

He resides at 4906 Rorer St. and is employed by JACK TOBIN, 3111 W. Allegheny Ave., as a purchasing agent for children's dresses. FRANK UMIN is a cousin of the subject since UMIN's father and GOLD's mother were brother and sister. Mr. UMIN stated that he was never socially acquainted with HARRY GOLD and would guess he has not seen HARRY GOLD more than four or five times within the last ten years. The last time he had any contact with GOLD was at the time of GOLD's mother's death when he attended the funeral. He stated that the GOLD Family was a close knit group who do not have very many close friends. He stated that it was impossible for him to furnish any information concerning the friends or associates of HARRY GOLD inasmuch as he was not that well acquainted with GOLD.

He also advised that at the time of HARRY GOLD's arrest on May 23rd JOSEPH GOLD, brother of the subject, contacted him late in the evening and requested permission to bring their father to his residence so that the father would not be exposed to the unfavorable publicity which was going to be made public. This request was refused by FRANK UMIN. He stated that he did not want to expose his family to such unfavorable publicity.

Dr. PERCY COLE, Chemist in Charge of Technical Service Laboratory, Barrett Division, Allied Chemical and Dye Co., Margaret and Bermuda Sts., Philadelphia, was interviewed at his place of employment by the writer on May 31, 1950. Dr. COLE resides at 3533 No. 16th St., Philadelphia, telephone SAGamore 2-4095.

Dr. COLE stated he taught a course in glass blowing at St. Joseph's College for about three years between 1942 and 1946. Dr. COLE said there was nothing in the course that could possibly be detrimental to the national security of the United States if it were known generally.

Dr. COLE stated he does not remember HARRY GOLD as one of his students despite reading the stories in the newspapers and viewing the pictures of GOLD. He said that GOLD in all probability had no special problem to take up with him or COLE would have remembered GOLD for that reason.

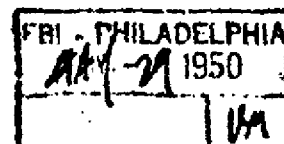

On May 29, 1950, WALTER FRANCIS DAVIS, 2042 North 5th Street, Philadelphia, appeared at this office to volunteer information about GOLD, since both were employed at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company during 1943.

DAVIS stated that he was a laborer working in the close vicinity of the laboratory, where HARRY GOLD worked during the first six months of 1943. DAVIS regularly appeared for work about one hour earlier, namely 7:30 A.M., and said the only other person who arrived at this hour was HARRY GOLD. He became suspicious of GOLD and did a little checking on GOLD on his own authority. He noted that GOLD, during the time prior to his regular working shift, was in the head chemist's office much of the time reading from the text books which belonged to, and were used by the head chemist, and making notes from material in these books. DAVIS felt that this action was suspicious.

DAVIS said that the men working at this plant quite frequently would discuss their activities over the week end when they would return to work on Monday. DAVIS stated that GOLD admitted spending the week end in New York about every second week during the three month period in which both were employed in the same part of this plant.

Mr. JOHN T. MC CABE, Chemist, Publicker Commercial Alcohol Company, 1429 Walnut Street, second floor, residence 348 West Duval Street, Germantown, was interviewed May 29, 1950, at his office by the writer. JOHN MC CABE taught a course in Distillery Practice at St. Joseph's College, during the 1943-1944 school year and during the 1944-1945 school year. He recalled that HARRY GOLD took that course, but could not furnish the date on which GOLD took the course.

MC CABE stated this course related strictly to the fermentation and distillation of materials used in the making of alcohol. There were no secrets involved in this course and it only related to the national defense of this country in that alcohol was used in the making of munitions. The course was given to refresh the memory of chemists and to give a correct understanding to distillery workers who were not technically trained.

MC CABE stated that to the best of his recollection HARRY GOLD, a man named DOUGHERTY, and a woman, all employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, took this course at the same time. MC CABE stated he could just barely recall GOLD after seeing his picture and reading the news stories in the news papers during the past week. He indicated that to the best of his recollection GOLD had a rather negative personality and was not especially brilliant, although he can recall very little, if any discussion with GOLD during class periods. MC CABE stated he felt that if GOLD had been asking questions that were foreign to the course being offered, on such questions as might relate to Atomic Fission, he would have recalled the circumstances. He can remember no radical remarks or anything that could be remotely related to un-Americanism.

MC CABE was asked specifically if GOLD contacted him after the subject completed the course taught by MC CABE. MC CABE answered that as best as he could recollect HARRY GOLD had not contacted him either in person or telephonically since GOLD completed the course taught by MC CABE at St. Joseph's College. MC CABE said that the only time there was any discussion in his class regarding recovery of valuable materials in gaseous form, was that during each course in Distillery Practice, he would devote one session to the method by which carbon dioxide was recovered during the process of distilling alcohol. Carbon dioxide being later made into dry ice.

MC CABE recalled DOUGHERTY readily, because he felt that DOUGHERTY had a very pleasing personality, was a "go getter," and because DOUGHERTY requested MC CABE to assist him in finding work on one occasion after he had finished his employment with Pennsylvania Sugar. MC CABE stated he was very pleased to attempt to be of assistance to DOUGHERTY in this regard, although his attempts did not get work for DOUGHERTY. On another occasion he received a telephone call from DOUGHERTY, stating that he had found work, which MC CABE believes to be that of a salesman.

MC CABE stated that JOSEPH BARNO and NATHAN WARTMAN also took the course in Distillery Practice at the same time as HARRY GOLD, and both have indicated to MC CABE, since the publicity broke in this investigation, that they could recall nothing suspicious, subversive or un-American about GOLD from their limited acquaintance ship.

In an effort to locate MORTON RAYMAN, a former employee of Publicker and a former part time teacher at St. Joseph's College, JOHN T. MC CABE was asked his whereabouts. MC CABE telephonically contacted one of the other Publicker employees, in the presence of the writer, and learned that RAYMAN is presently employed by either the Quarter Master Corps of the Army or the Container Corporation at the following address:

The indices of this office were negative both as to JOHN T. MC CABE and as to MORTON RAYMAN.

Mr. FRANK C. SCHIFBER, 2408 North Leithgow Street, Philadelphia, advised on May 29, 1950 that he had worked for the GIFTCRAFTERS, 2nd and Thompson Streets, Philadelphia, from 1926 to 1931. SCHIFBER advised that the GIFTCRAFTERS went out of business in 1931. He stated that their business was making ship models and other similar novelties.

SCHIFBER said that the owners of the company were JACK FORBES, his brother, and his father. He could not furnish any further information concerning these persons.

Numerous inquiries in the neighborhood of 2nd and Thompson and 2nd and Master Streets failed to reveal any other individuals who were employed by the GIFTCRAFTERS COMPANY or who had any knowledge of the company, except the above FRANK SCHIFBER.

- Mr. JOHN J. MC GROGAN, 1353 North Hancock Street, the Republican Committeeman for that Ward, furnished the writer with the name of FRANK SCHIEBER. MC GROGAN said that he knew of no other persons who may have been connected with the GIFTCRAFTERS COMPANY.

Inasmuch as numerous inquiries could not determine the owners of the GIFTCRAFTERS COMPANY and the fact that HARRY GOLD was employed at that company in 1928 and the company went out of business in 1931, it is believed that the time necessary to determine the owners of the company is not justified at this time.

A newspaper article referring to an unknown individual who applied for a position at the PHILADELPHIA GENERAL HOSPITAL at the same time HARRY GOLD was being considered for a position was discussed with Dr. SAUEL BELLET at the hospital.

Dr. BELLET advised that at the time they were considering persons for the position given to HARRY GOLD, several individuals were questioned including one whom was thought to be rather radical and possibly un-American. This individual was interviewed by several persons at the hospital, however, exhaustible checking by Dr. BELLET failed to reflect information which would disclose the person's name.

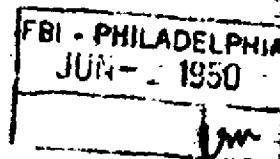
The only information available which might indicate the identity of this individual was the fact that Dr. BELLET and several others recalled that at about the time GOLD was hired, this unknown individual wrote a letter to the hospital stating that he did not desire to be considered further for the position inasmuch as he had obtained a position with the BARTOL FOUNDATION at Swarthmore.

This individual was described by Dr. BELLET as approximately 5'10", weight 160 pounds, age 35, keen minded, a very quick talker, and he also recalled that the man was married and had three children.

This information is being set forth inasmuch as it may be desired to check with the BARTOL FOUNDATION and look into the background of this unknown individual.

On 5/29/50, Mr. CLARENCE HUNT, 547 Van Kirk St., Phila., who is employed at the PURE CARBONIC DRY ICE, INC., 730 North Delaware Avenue, Phila., stated that he had known HARRY GOLD since about 1936 when both were employed at the PENNSYLVANIA ALCOHOL COMPANY of the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY. However, HUNT stated that he did not become well acquainted with GOLD until about 1943. He said that prior to that time he had been a laborer with the company and had no occasion to form more than a speaking acquaintance with GOLD. According to HUNT, his job terminated the latter part of 1946 and GOLD's job had ceased about four months previously.

HUNT related that about 1943 he was given the responsibility of handling yeast culture, which was used in laboratory experiments, and it was at this time that he became better acquainted with GOLD as he delivered yeast culture to him. HUNT said that this acquaintance grew to the extent that GOLD, MORRELL E. DOUGHERTY and himself on occasion would attend sport events together. According to HUNT, GOLD was very fond of sports, especially baseball, basketball and football.

At this point, HUNT stated that the individual who, in his opinion, knew GOLD intimately and who was with him almost constantly at work and away from work, was DOUGHERTY. According to HUNT, DOUGHERTY and GOLD were almost inseparable and appeared to be very close and intimate friends. According to HUNT, Dr. RICH, Head of the Chemistry Laboratory, and JEAN LOOKENBAUGH (ph) were also intimately acquainted with GOLD, and he said that he had heard that GOLD was considered to be the protege of Dr. RICH who held him in high esteem.

WSP HUNT continued that GOLD had been in his home about a half dozen times and he had probably been in GOLD's home perhaps three or four times; however, he said that during his entire acquaintance with GOLD he had never heard him say anything which would cause him to doubt the subject. He said that he had always thought of GOLD as being an individual who would not knowingly do anything that was wrong.

HUNT continued by stating that he could not recall GOLD having taken any vacations while he was employed at the PENNSYLVANIA ALCOHOL COMPANY. However, he said he could easily have taken vacations without his knowing it and added that he was not in a position to know when the chemists took their vacations.

According to HUNT, the records of the PENNSYLVANIA ALCOHOL COMPANY would disclose when GOLD took vacations. (HUNT could not recall that GOLD had ever discussed with him any vacations he had taken or any trips that he had made. HUNT stated that he thought it was odd that a chemist as capable as GOLD should remain so long at the PENNSYLVANIA ALCOHOL COMPANY and work for such a small amount of money as \$210.00 a month. However, he could give no explanation as to why GOLD would do so.

HUNT again stated that he just could not believe that GOLD would knowingly do anything that was wrong; however, he said that subject had access to all chemical processes in the plant and could easily have taken them away if he so desired.

According to HUNT, GOLD was one of the hardest working men he had ever known and often stayed until late at night working in the laboratory. He said that he almost always carried a brief case full of work home with him at night.

HUNT related that DOUGHERTY would often borrow his car which he and HARRY GOLD would use. He said that he did not believe the car was ever taken out of town and that he doubted if they had used it much over an hour on any one occasion. He said that he could not recall what it was used for in every instance but he did know that they sometimes used it to go to lunch and at other times went after supplies in it. He added that they usually borrowed it around noon time.

Regarding DOUGHERTY, HUNT stated that although he and GOLD were inseparable they were as different as night and day. He said that DOUGHERTY was a super salesman who could sell a person on almost anything; however, he added that DOUGHERTY was not nearly as likeable as GOLD.

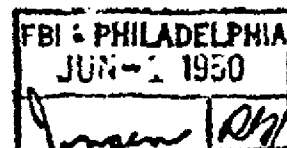

On 5/29/50, Mrs. ALBERT JOHN (MARY) MOFFA, 152 Earl Lane, Hatboro, Pa., who is employed as a cashier by the Philadelphia Transportation Company, was interviewed by the writer. Mrs. MOFFA stated that she was formerly Miss MARY COLLINS, 2004 Godfrey Avenue, Philadelphia, who worked at the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY from about September 4, 1945 until about April, 1946.

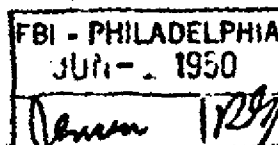
Mrs. MOFFA stated that she remembers HARRY GOLD, who was employed there at the same time, and that he appeared to be a close friend of MORRELL E. DOUGHERTY, who was also a chemist at the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY. She said that the two were often together and quite frequently were with JEAN LOOKENBAUGH (phonetic).

Regarding GOLD, Mrs. MOFFA stated that he appeared to be a very brilliant man who was very capable and extremely exacting. However, she said that her personal opinion, based on observations of him, was that he was mal-adjusted socially and did not know how to conduct himself properly in conversation. She explained this by saying that when he was conversing on subjects having to do other than with work, he usually appeared ill at ease and his face would often flush. However, she said that he was congenial to work with and was always pleasant. Mrs. MOFFA continued by saying that she could not recall GOLD having taken a vacation during the time she knew him and had never heard him discuss any vacations, trips, or places where he had been.

She concluded by stating that it seemed odd to her that DOUGHERTY and GOLD were let out of their jobs with the excuse that their positions had terminated when there were others who might not have been as capable, from an experience standpoint, who were placed in other laboratories belonging to the same company.

She stated that BILL BOWERS, telephone #VI-4 0053, had worked for the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY before entering the Army and upon his return was re-employed by the company. When his job in the laboratory had ceased, he was placed in one of the other laboratories. MOFFA stated that in conversations, BOWERS had indicated that he had no use for either GOLD or DOUGHERTY. Mrs. MOFFA cautioned that she wished this last bit of information to be regarded as confidential.

On 5/29/50, the following individuals were interviewed by the writer and furnished the following information:

DR. GUSTAV T. REICH
Packard Building
1422 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia

DR. REICH stated he was employed by the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY from October 1, 1928 to May 15, 1945. He said that at the time he left the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY he was Technical Director.

DR. REICH said that GOLD was first employed by the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY about 1929 or 1930 as a bench chemist and later advanced to a full chemist after completing his training at the University of Pennsylvania and Drexel Institute of Technology. He said that GOLD went to school in Cincinnati, Ohio, about 1939 or 1940 and upon his return was hired as a research chemist. Dr. REICH said he was GOLD's superior at the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY but because GOLD was just an ordinary employee he did not pay special attention to him and consequently could not furnish too much definite information.

Dr. REICH said he spent considerable time traveling and because of the duties of his position as Technical Director he did not have much opportunity to become acquainted with his employees socially. He indicated that his contacts with GOLD were of a business nature and indicated he had always looked upon GOLD as an industrious, hard working and intelligent chemist.

As best Dr. REICH could recall, GOLD worked on flue gases for him from about 1936 to 1939. Dr. REICH explained that the purpose of working with flue gas was to recover carbon dioxide which is used to make dry ice. Dr. REICH was questioned as to whether or not he believed these experiments and the results accomplished would be considered of a classified or confidential nature. He explained that flue gas had been used for about fifty years but that they have been attempting to find different ways to obtain carbon dioxide since there was a shortage. He said he could not say off hand if the work performed by GOLD would be considered of a confidential nature but would check his records and advise the writer at a later date.

To the best of Dr. REICH's recollection, GOLD worked on yeast fermentation about 1939 or 1940, as well as research concerning the distilling of alcohol from grain and molasses. Dr. REICH said that most of the alcohol being distilled was being used by the Government to make synthetic rubber and the remainder was used by private industry in the manufacture of solvents.

Dr. REICH stated that about 1943 GOLD was transferred to the PENNSYLVANIA ALCOHOL and CHEMICAL LABORATORY and that he had very little association with him after that. He stated that GOLD and MORRELL E. DOUGHERTY were extremely friendly and were always together. According to Dr. REICH, DOUGHERTY and GOLD were so close to each other that they called them the "Gold Dust Twins." According to Dr. REICH, if GOLD wanted to discuss something with him DOUGHERTY would always come with GOLD to do the talking. He added that if he gave either DOUGHERTY or GOLD some research work, it was the same as giving it to both of them since they would get together and discuss it and eventually work on it together.

He said that GOLD was extremely good natured and on many occasions would assist other chemists, who were attending school, with their chemistry problems.

Dr. REICH said that GOLD never discussed politics with him and that he had no reason to believe him to be a Communist or Communist sympathizer. He added that GOLD never said or did anything which would in any way indicate that he was disloyal to the United States. Dr. REICH said that to his knowledge, GOLD never removed any technical data from the plant. He was unable to furnish any information concerning GOLD's vacations nor could he recall that GOLD took various trips on official business for the company.

Dr. REICH stated that in 1947 GOLD came to his office and attempted to borrow \$500.00. GOLD indicated at that time that he was working on plastics and that his employer was nearly bankrupt and owed him several months pay. GOLD indicated he needed the money to live on until his employer could get his financial condition in such shape as to pay him his back salary. Dr. REICH did not loan him the money.

Dr. REICH said that he vaguely recalls that GOLD mentioned BROTHMAN but could not recall if GOLD mentioned working for him. Dr. REICH mentioned that he was not acquainted with BROTHMAN ASSOCIATES and could furnish no information concerning them.

Dr. REICH said that he had some records and reports which would reflect what GOLD was working on while at the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY and would make it available. He said, however, that he would have to dig it out of his records and that it would probably be Thursday before it would be available. Arrangements were made to meet Dr. REICH on Thursday and obtain these records.

Mr. MANLY stated that he first became acquainted with GOLD about 1942. His acquaintance with GOLD was mostly of a business nature, although he did have a few social contacts with him which consisted of attending several football and basketball games. Mr. MANLY said that he talked with GOLD a number of times at the plant but it generally concerned business.

According to Mr. MANLY, he never discussed politics with GOLD and he never gave him any indication that he was sympathetic to Russia. Mr. MANLY said GOLD never said or did anything which might indicate that he was disloyal. To his knowledge, GOLD never removed any information or technical data from the plant and he was unable to furnish any information concerning trips or vacations taken by GOLD. He indicated that GOLD never gave any indication of being financially embarrassed and to his knowledge never made any attempt to borrow money.

On May 31, 1950, the writer interviewed THOMAS L. BLACK at his place of employment, THE CHARLES W. BERG LABORATORIES, at 1827 North 5th Street, Philadelphia. Mr. BLACK advised he is acting in the capacity of a Consulting Chemist for the BERG LABORATORIES and that he resides at 1929 North 6th Street in Philadelphia, a rooming house. BLACK advised that he has known HARRY GOLD since 1933 and considered GOLD a fine, up-standing chemist and never had any reasons to doubt his loyalty to the United States.

BLACK advised that he himself was a member of the Communist Party from 1933 to about 1936 or 1937 in Jersey City, New Jersey. BLACK advised that he belonged to one of the three sections at that time in Jersey City and was well acquainted with most of the Party members in Jersey City. He stated that although he was acquainted with GOLD at that time, in fact GOLD took the position that BLACK was leaving at the HOLEROOK MANUFACTURING COMPANY in Jersey City, N.J., he had no knowledge of GOLD ever being a Communist Party member or interested in Communist matters. BLACK stated he became acquainted with GOLD when GOLD was being trained for the position which BLACK had held.

BLACK stated that GOLD was employed by the HOLEROOK MANUFACTURING COMPANY for approximately one year, during which time the two individuals met on several occasions and became quite good friends. However, after 1935, meetings between GOLD and BLACK were scattered until possibly June of 1945 when ELACK took a position with the BERG LABORATORIES in Philadelphia. BLACK pointed out that although he worked in Philadelphia he continued his residence in Jersey City commuting between the two towns, and as a result did not see much of GOLD. In June of 1945, BLACK stated he renewed his acquaintance with GOLD and also became acquainted with HARRY GOLD's brother JOSEPH and met GOLD's parents. He considered the family good American citizens.

BLACK stated the only trip that he was aware of GOLD making was one made in September or October of 1945. At that time GOLD had been in search of a better method of clearing bacteria from the alcohol products of the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY. BLACK made the recommendation to GOLD that he take a trip to Brooklyn, New York, to the HORMANN EQUIPMENT or MANUFACTURING COMPANY for the purpose of observing the "Hormann filter"

in operation. BLACK stated this filter was a mechanical device which would remove bacteria from a solution eliminating the then current process of heating. BLACK stated GOLD informed him of making a trip at the previous stated time to Brooklyn with MORRELL E. DOUGHERTY on behalf of the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY to see the filter in operation, and subsequent to GOLD's visit to the HORNANN COMPANY, the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY purchased one of the filters. BLACK was unable to provide more specific dates or details and advised the writer that he would appear, if necessary, to testify concerning the above information, however, desired that his former CP affiliations not be brought out in court.

It is recommended that BLACK's identity be protected inasmuch as he has offered to provide the FBI with his knowledge of the activities of the Communist Party. A separate memorandum is being prepared by the writer setting forth information received from BLACK concerning his affiliation with the CP in New Jersey.

A teletype was sent to the New York Office to secure from the HORNANN EQUIPMENT or MANUFACTURING COMPANY information they may have concerning the visits of the representatives of the PENNSYLVANIA SUGAR COMPANY in September or October 1945.

The following investigation was conducted by the writer May 31, 1950 and June 1, 1950.

May 31, 1950

On above date Mrs. SAMUEL OMINSKY, 4723 North Camac Street, Philadelphia, advised that her husband, SAMUEL OMINSKY, was a brother of subject's deceased mother. However, she stated that OMINSKY had been a sick and incapacitated man for six years as a result of two paralytic strokes and that she was afraid for him to be interviewed regarding the HARRY GOLD case for fear that he might suffer another stroke. She stated that she did not believe Mr. OMINSKY was aware that his nephew was identical with the HARRY GOLD who was arrested for espionage activities. Mrs. OMINSKY went on to advise that her family possessed no information regarding subject's activities or contacts and stated that the OMINSKYs only saw the GOLDS on very rare occasions. She declared that Mrs. GOLD had been dead for over two years and that Mr. OMINSKY was not aware of her death. She explained that if the OMINSKYs and the GOLDS had maintained close contact, Mr. OMINSKY would certainly be curious as to why his sister had not been to see him in recent years.

Mrs. OMINSKY then stated that her son, JACOB (JACK) OMINSKY, resided at 7813 Bayard Road, Philadelphia, and that two of her daughters, CELIA and KITTY, resided at the OMINSKY home at 4723 North Camac Street. She requested that if her son and daughters were interviewed that it be conducted at her home during the evening rather than at their places of employment, in view of the fact that she was afraid their employers might learn they were cousins of HARRY GOLD.

Subsequently JACOB and CELIA OMINSKY were interviewed, at which time both stated they knew nothing regarding associates and activities of HARRY GOLD, other than that he was a chemist and had attended Xavier University and the University of Pennsylvania. JACOB stated that the GOLD family was a cold, selfish family who kept to themselves and contacted their relatives only on rare occasions; such as sickness or death and similar circumstances. He said that shortly after the subject was arrested JOE GOLD called him and stated that HARRY was in trouble and requested the assistance of OMINSKY. However, according to OMINSKY, he told GOLD that he would be unable to take any part in the affair.

The OMINSKYs recalled that they had attended the funeral of Mrs. GOLD and that only relatives were in attendance. CELIA OMINSKY then

stated that she had a married sister, Mrs. E. NOAH (SARA) GOULD, 180 - 8th Street, Mason House, Troy, New York. However, she did not believe that Mrs. GOULD would know any more about HARRY GOLD than she did.

A lead has been set out for the Albany Division to interview Mrs. GOULD.

June 1, 1950

On above date Miss KATE (KEMMY) OMINSKY, 4723 North Camac Street, who is employed in the basement of Strawbridge and Clothier, 8th and Market Streets, Philadelphia, advised that she knew absolutely nothing regarding the contacts or associates of HARRY GOLD and stated that regarding his activities she only knew that he was a chemist and was somewhat interested in music.

Regarding the above mentioned individual, an indices check revealed that Miss KATE OMINSKY, 4723 North Camac Street, was on the mailing list of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Council for a Democratic Greece in 1947.

On the same date Mr. HARRY GELLAR, 6658 North Uber Street, Philadelphia, who advised that he was the husband of MATILDA UMIN, now deceased, stated that he had not seen HARRY GOLD for over seventeen years. Therefore, he said he possessed absolutely no information regarding contacts associates or activities of subject. GELLAR went on to advise that Mrs. GOLD, HARRY's mother, did not get along well with other relatives because she was a school teacher who taught in favor of Russia. GELLAR declared that he was opposed to Russia and Communism. GELLAR advised that he had formerly resided at 2443 North Myrtlewood Street.

A review of the indices in this office revealed that HARRY GELLAR, 2443 North Myrtlewood Street, had signed the 1940 Communist Party Nominating Petition with knowledge of the nature and purpose of the Petition.

A review of Philadelphia file 100-1888, entitled WALTER CARL NEUNSON, with alias, INTERNAL SECURITY - R, reflects the following contacts between NEUNSON and Soviet officials:

INDEX

It has been definitely established that NEUNSON has contacted STEPAN CHOUDENKO and ANATOLI ANTONOVICH YAKOVLEV, both clerks at the U.S.S.R. Consulate in New York. NEUNSON was interviewed several times and there were a number of discrepancies in his story. At one time, he stated that he had been interviewed at the Soviet Consulate in New York by two individuals whose names he believed to be MELNIKOV and KUZNETSOV. A number of photographs were exhibited to him and he identified EUGENI YAKOVLEVICH MELNIKOV and VSEVOLOD VSEVOLODOVICH KUZNETSOV.

During later interviews, he continued to name one of his contacts as KUZNETSOV but denied being interviewed by MELNIKOV.

NEUNSON also tentatively identified a photograph of PETR FAVOLYICH ANANINOV as an individual who called on him in 1944 and tried to get him to secure information regarding the Baldwin Locomotive Works. NEUNSON later withdrew this identification. A photograph of ALEXEI SERGEEVICH BULANOV was exhibited to him as a possibility, but he was unable to identify BULANOV as the individual who contacted him in 1944.

At the conclusion of the interviews, the only persons positively identified as contacts of NEUNSON were CHOUDENKO and YAKOVLEV. While he never withdrew his identification of KUZNETSOV, the file reflects that there is some doubt that this individual actually contacted NEUNSON.

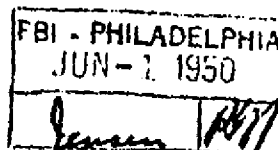
Miss FRANCES CLEARY, Intelligence Office, Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot, advised that HARRY GOLD, although certified to work for the Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot, had never accepted the position and had never previously been employed by that organization. Miss CLEARY also said that GOLD had never been employed on a temporary or probationary basis by the Civilian Personnel Department of the Depot.

Miss CLEARY said that she got the above information from Miss ALICE WOODWARD, Secretary of the Local Board of the United States Civil Service Commission, attached to the Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot, and from BORIS BLAI, the Civilian Personnel Officer at the Quartermaster Depot.

[REDACTED] Detective Division, Security Police, Philadelphia Navy Yard, Philadelphia, Pa., advised that HARRY GOLD had never been an employee of the Navy Yard, in any capacity whatsoever, nor at the Naval Aviation Supply Depot, Oxford Avenue and Martin's Mill Road, Philadelphia. MARGESON also said that there was no record at the Labor Board Office, attached to the Navy Yard, of GOLD ever having applied at any of the above installations.

On May 25, 1950 SA T. S. MILLER, JR. telephoned from Holmesburg Prison at 4:25 p.m. and said that GOLD had requested a visit from his brother and father. He apparently understood that he could see them once per week. One of the guards however, was of the opinion that he could receive visits only once per month. It was desirable to determine what day the brother and father would make their visit so that we would not be taking GOLD from the prison to the Field Office for questioning on that day.

GOLD also asked if he could spend about 30 minutes with one of the people from the Philadelphia General Hospital, preferably Miss BELL, so that he could advise her of the status of three or four tests and experiments which he was performing and tell her what remains to be done. Further, he expected the arrival of some chemicals in a shipment that he ordered, and only he knew what they were for.

Subsequently ASAC HINZE spoke with Warden BEVERIDGE at Holmesburg, who advised him that the brother and father would be visiting on May 26 and would be permitted visits twice a month thereafter. ASAC HINZE also spoke to JOHN LEAHY, Deputy Marshal, and advised him of the intention of having GOLD brought to the Philadelphia Office for interview. At that point, it was intended that he would be brought down for the first time on Saturday, May 27, so as not to interfere with the proposed visit of his brother and father on May 26. Marshal LEAHY had agreed to have GOLD brought down but asked if the FBI would furnish transportation. This was agreed to. He also asked to be advised if the FBI should learn that GOLD had obtained an attorney.

It was subsequently decided on May 26, 1950, that facilities for the interview of GOLD were adequate at the prison and no purpose would be served at this time by removing him to the FBI office for questioning. Chief Deputy Marshal HAMMILL was advised of this on the afternoon of the 26th by the writer.

Mr. WALTER A. R. PERTUCH, Head Librarian at the Franklin Institute, 20th Street and Benjamin Franklin Parkway, advised on June 1, 1950 that HARRY GOLD, 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, was a member of the Institute since February, 1946. PERTUCH said that he had come in contact with GOLD on only one or two occasions, but that GOLD used the library of the Institute about once a week. He said that GOLD was primarily interested in chemistry and that as far as he knew, GOLD never used any other books or facilities of the library, except those pertaining to chemistry. He advised that GOLD was a quiet and polite sort of individual who talked to people very seldom and who never forced his acquaintance on any of the other members.

PERTUCH said that GOLD had one man to whom he talked quite frequently by the name of BLACK.

PERTUCH also advised that a Mr. BOND, a sales agent for the Institute, had solicited GOLD's membership. He said that BOND had died about a year and a half ago and, therefore, he could not say how BOND met GOLD. He also said that it was not necessary for any member of the Institute to recommend or to propose membership for another individual. He explained that BOND probably solicited GOLD's membership and that he may have obtained GOLD's name either from his place of employment or from another source. He further explained that membership in the Institute was solicited quite regularly by the Institute's own staff of sales agents.

Miss RUTH APPLIGATE, Library Assistant, The Franklin Institute, who resides at 357 North Rolling Road, Springfield, Delaware County, Pa., advised that she knew nothing about GOLD except that he was quiet and seldom spoke to anyone, with the exception of a Mr. THOMAS L. BLACK. She said that BLACK and GOLD would meet in the library about once every two weeks and that they would occasionally call the library to cancel a meeting or to leave a call for the other person. She said these meetings have been going on since last Fall (1949) to the best of her knowledge.

She further explained that BLACK was primarily interested in "British Patents". She said that every time he comes into the library, he

inquires about the patents, wondering if they have arrived at the library. She explained that the Franklin Institute library receives all British patents once every year. She could not explain why BLACK was so interested in these above patents.

Judge McGRANERY called at 3.30 p.m. and stated that he had just appointed JOHN D. M. HAMILTON counsel for HARRY GOLD; that HARRY GOLD had conferred with him and agreed to accept him as his counsel. He suggested that I call at his office and meet Mr. HAMILTON and take up any matters I desired with him.

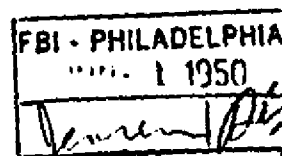
SA T. SCOTT MILLER and I proceeded to Judge McGRANERY's chambers and met Mr. HAMILTON. It was ascertained that AUGUSTUS S. BALLARD had been appointed associate counsel at the suggestion of Mr. HAMILTON. Messrs. HAMILTON and BALLARD were conferring with HARRY GOLD in Judge McGRANERY's chambers. During this conference, Mr. HAMILTON came over and stated that HARRY GOLD had requested that Agents talk to him as soon as his conference with Mr. HAMILTON was over.

As soon as the conference was over, SA T. SCOTT MILLER spoke to HARRY GOLD at one end of the conference table, and GOLD informed him of three men whom he had been in contact with who were involved with him in espionage activities. Two turned over information to him, and one THOMAS L. BLACK, a chemist in Philadelphia, originally brought him into espionage work. Another, AL SLACK, was the man mentioned by him previously, whom he had contacted in Rochester, N. Y., and whom he had previously identified as MARTIN. The third was a soldier at the time in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

I spoke to Mr. HAMILTON and requested permission from him to interview his client, HARRY GOLD, on a continuing basis. He stated that HARRY GOLD had expressed a desire to be interviewed by Agents and that, therefore, he had no objection and his permission was granted. He was advised that Agents would resume interviewing HARRY GOLD with his permission. I also advised him that we desired his permission to arrange for a search of the GOLD home, and he stated that he would contact JOSEPH GOLD to-night relative to this permission and would call me tonight and advise me of the result of his contact with JOSEPH and whether or not permission was granted.

The above information was transmitted to Mr. HENNRICH of the Bureau. Agent MILLER talked to Mr. HENNRICH and advised him of the results of his interview with Mr. GOLD. Agent JENSEN advised him of the information in this office on THOMAS L. BLACK. It is noted that BLACK was interviewed by Agents of this office on 5/31/50. Mr. HENNRICH agreed that it would be necessary to talk to HARRY GOLD and get more complete information as soon as possible. I informed him that arrangements were being attempted to interview him further tonight. He stated that it would be advisable to locate BLACK and make certain that he didn't get away from us or, if he did leave this area, that we would know of his whereabouts. I told him we would

make immediate arrangements to locate him and put a loose surveillance on him. Mr. HEINRICH also stated that it, of course, would be desirable to get all information received from HARRY GOLD in a teletype promptly to the Bureau, Buffalo, Newark, New York, and Albuquerque so that they would have and could use this information in covering leads. I told him this would be done. He instructed the Bureau be kept advised.

Agents MILLER and BRENNAN are making arrangements to continue the interview with GOLD tonight. Supervisor HARZENSTEIN was instructed to arrange for BLACK to be located and a loose surveillance placed on him promptly, and the objectives of the surveillance gone over with him.

He said he began seeing SLACK in Rochester while SLACK was working for the EASTMAN KODAK COMPANY. GOLD said that later SLACK went to work at the HOLSTON ORDNANCE WORKS in Kingsport, Tennessee, and still later at Oak Ridge, Tennessee. He said that he saw SLACK in Tennessee and got information from him on explosives.

GOLD advised when he went to see FUCHS in Santa Fe in September, 1945, he stayed at the Hilton Hotel in Albuquerque, as he had previously told the agents. GOLD said that this information was of a general nature on "installations". GOLD stated that he gave this Army man \$500.00 for the information. GOLD said that he could not recall the man's name, but that the man was married and had no child. GOLD said that if shown a map of Albuquerque he could show the agents exactly where the man lived at that time.

THOMAS L. BLACK

GOLD stated that BLACK is the man who introduced GOLD to PAUL SMITH and started GOLD off in Russian espionage. He said that BLACK himself commenced

GOLD RECALLS THAT THIRD TIME HE WENT TO ROCHESTER HE WAS DRIVEN BY SLACK TO LATTER'S FARM IN WEBSTER OR WEST WEBSTER, NEW YORK. THERE HE MET SLACK'S WIFE AND FATHER, LATTER BEING AN OLD RETIRED CHEMIST, FORMERLY EMPLOYED SOLVAY PROCESS CO., SYRACUSE, NEW YORK. WIFE MAY HAVE BEEN NAMED SYLVIA. GOLD ADVISED THAT OF SIX OR SEVEN TRIPS HE MADE TO ROCHESTER HE OBTAINED INFO ABOUT TWO OR THREE TIMES AND SUCH INFO INCLUDED SAMPLES OF CHEMICALS. GOLD RECALLS THAT HE PAID SLACK SEVERAL TIMES AND EVEN ON OCCASIONS WHEN NO INFO WAS TOLD BY SLACK, THE AMOUNT OF WHICH PAYMENT TO SLACK WAS APPROXIMATELY TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS WHICH HAD BEEN SUPPLIED GOLD BY SAM. GOLD ADVISED THAT ONE MEETING DURING THIS PERIOD TOOK PLACE IN PHILA. AT NORTH PHILA. STATION, PENNA. R.R., WHEN SLACK WAS RETURNING FROM BELLE, W. VA. SLACK HAD GONE TO BELLE, W.VA. TO CONTACT HOWARD OCHENAUR, WHO AT THAT TIME WAS EMPLOYED BY DUPONT PLANT THERE MFG. RAW MATERIALS FOR NYLON. THIS WOULD BE BETWEEN FALL FORTYTWO AND FALL FORTYTWO. SLACK, UPON INSTRUCTIONS FROM

GOLD, OBTAINED INFO ON MANUFACTURE OF NYLON FROM COCHENAUR AND PAID COCHENAUR THE SUM FROM FIVE HUNDRED TO ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, WHICH GOLD HAD GIVEN SLACK FOR THIS PURPOSE. GOLD HAD OBTAINED MONEY FROM SAM. GOLD IS OF OPINION THAT COCHENAUR ACTUALLY THOUGHT THE INFO WAS GOING TO ANOTHER COMMERCIAL FIRM IN THE U.S. INFO. NOT PASSED TO GOLD AT NO. PHILA. STATION BUT AT NEXT MEETING AT SLACK FARM. SLACK AND GOLD SPENT ENTIRE DAY GOING OVER FORMULA AND FOUND IT WAS QUITE JUMBLED AND DID NOT INCLUDE THE MOST IMPORTANT STEP, TO WIT, THE ACTUAL POLYMERIZATION TO THE HIGH MOLECULAR WEIGHT POLYAMIDE. GOLD RECALLS THAT ON ONE DAY SLACK CAME TO NEW YORK FOR A MEETING WITH GOLD NEAR GRAND CENTRAL AREA AND GOLD SEEMS TO RECALL, ALTHO VERY HAZY, THAT SLACK MET SAM. GOLD STATED HE DID NOT WANT TO MAKE THIS AS AN UNQUALIFIED STATEMENT. GOLD STATED THAT ON ONE TRIP TO ROCHESTER HE STAYED AT THE POWERS HOTEL AND MAY HAVE USED HIS OWN NAME. IN FALL OF FORTYTWO SLACK WAS TRANSFERRED TO TENNESSEE EASTMAN AT KINGSPORT, TENN., WHERE EMPLOYED IN THE CELLULOSE ACETATE PLANT. GOLD STATED THAT WHILE IN TENN. SLACK ALSO EMPLOYED AT HOLSTON ORDINANCE WORKS AND THAT LATTER MAY BE CONNECTED WITH TENN. EASTMAN. GOLD MADE TRIP TO ROCHESTER AND FOUND FROM SLACK'S WIFE WHERE HE WAS. GOLD LATER FOUND OUT THAT MRS. SLACK JOINED HUSBAND WINTER OF FORTYTWO. GOLD ADVISED THAT ON OCCASIONS IN ROCHESTER SLACK ACTED AS THOUGH HE WERE TRYING TO BREAK WITH SOVIETS AND GOLD HAD TO GIVE HIM WHAT GOLD DESCRIBED AS QUOTE PEP TALKS UNQUOTE. GOLD DESCRIBED THESE TALKS AS EXPLAINING TO SLACK WHAT A GREAT SERVICE HE COULD DO TO RUSSIA AND THAT HE SHOULD NOT BELIEVE THE STORIES HE READS ABOUT THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE AND THAT

THE GERMAN ARMY HAD A TERRIFIC STRIKING FORCE AND WITHOUT HELP FROM OTHERS RUSSIA WOULD BE OVERRUN AND IT WAS AN ABSOLUTE NECESSITY TO GET INFO TO HELP RUSSIA. AFTER THIS PERIOD OF HAVING LOST CONTACT WITH SLACK, GOLD WENT TO KINGSPORT, TENN. AND CALLED SLACK ON PHONE. GOLD DID NOT GET IN TOUCH WITH HIM THAT DAY BUT DID THE NEXT AND GOLD OF OPINION THAT SLACK WAS AGAIN ATTEMPTING TO BREAK WITH THE RUSSIANS BUT MUST HAVE REALIZED HOW DEEP HE WAS INVOLVED. GOLD MADE TWO OR THREE TRIPS TO KINGSPORT DURING FORTYTHREE. GOLD STATED THAT HE BELIEVES HE REGISTERED AT THE KINGSPORT INN, WHICH HE DESCRIBED AS THE LARGEST HOTEL IN KINGSPORT. HE DID NOT RECALL WHAT NAME HE USED WHEN REGISTERING. ON EACH OCCASION GOLD THINGS HE MET SLACK AT SLACK'S HOUSE IN KINGSPORT. GOLD RECALLED THIS HOUSE AS A VERY NEAR PLACE NOT TOO FAR FROM A STADIUM. ON SECOND TRIP TO TENN. GOLD STATED HE OBTAINED INFO FROM SLACK AND THAT THIS WAS ONLY TIME GOLD OBTAINED INFO FROM HIM WHILE SLACK IN TENN. THIS INFO WAS AS FOLLOWS: ONE, PREPARATION OF VERY PURE NITRIC ACID USED IN THE NITRATION PROCEDURE IN CONNECTION WITH MANUFACTURE OF A NEW POWERFUL EXPLOSIVE WHICH GOLD SAID HE LATER FIGURED OUT TO BE RDX; TWO, SAMPLE OF THIS EXPLOSIVE IN TWO RUBBER CONTAINERS WHICH SLACK STATED HAD BEEN PACKED IN SUCH A WAY THAT THERE WAS LITTLE DANGER OF EXPLOSION. GOLD RECALLS SOMETHING SLACK SAID ABOUT IT BEING PACKED QUOTE WET UNQUOTE. GOLD ADVISED THAT SLACK GAVE HIM A NAME FOR THIS EXPLOSIVE AT THE TIME BUT HE DID NOT RECALL IT. GOLD STATES, HOWEVER, THAT IF THE NAME WERE CALLED TO HIS ATTENTION HE WOULD PROBABLY RECOGNIZE IT. GOLD SAID HE RETURNED TO PHILA. WITH THIS INFO AND
