ASAC Whelan of New York called at 2:20 PM today and talked with Assistant Director Belmont and later with Wick in my office.

Whelan said a squib in Earl Wilson's column of the April 15, 1952, issue of the New York Post reads as follows:

"Oliver Pilat's book, 'The Atom Spies,' singes the FBI."

Whelan was told he should make arrangements through & sources in New York to obtain an advance copy of the book and forward it to the Bureau. The Putnam Publishing Company in New York plans to release the book some time this month.

As you recall, Pilat contacted the Bureau on August 9, 1951, stating he needed FBI help in writing what he characterized the life history, family background and activities of each of the persons convicted in the atom spy cases to date. On December 14, 1951, Pilat left with the Bureau a copy of several of the proposed book chapters which could be construed as critical of the Bureau. This material was reviewed by the Domestic Intelligence Division; numerous inaccuractes, false statements and objections were noted. Wr. McGuire of my office on December 26, 1951, brought such inaccuracies, etc., to Pilat's attention in the interest of accuracy. (65-57449-810)

Until we receive an advance copy of the book we do not know, of course, whether our suggestions were followed or whether the author has included in the finished product critical material not appearing in the chapters submitted to us for review.

RECOMMENDATION

U S DEPT OF JUSTICE

That we obtain an advance capy as this book. It is suggested it be reviewed by the Domestic Intelligence Division at the earliest possible date. The New York Office When been instructed to forward an advance copy of this book.

As the Bureau is aware, GOLD did not testify at VAGO'S trial since the latter was convicted upon an agreed set of facts which were presented to District Judge Sylvester J. Ryan. No witnesses were heard during this proceeding.

Further, according to Bureau Bulletin #23, Series 1952, dated 6/12/52, parole reports will no longer be submitted unless the Bureau receives a specific request from the Parole Board which has agreed to make such a request only in unusual cases. In this particular instance the Parole Board has not requested a parole report.

In view of the above, therefore, no report is being submitted and this case is being placed in a closed status.



PURPOSE:

To obtain authority to close this case.

DZTA ILS:

Subject is the Soviet espionage courier who participated in the atomic espionage of Klaus Fuchs, for which he was arrested in May, 1950, and sentenced to thirty years imprisonment. There is no outstanding investigation, all leads having been covered. While all of Gold's associates in espionage have not yet been identified, separate investigations have been opened on such associates. The information furnished by Gold has been incorporated in the individual files on such associates.

This case has been in a pending inactive status solely to prepare a parole report which was to reflect Gold's cooperativeness with the Government as displayed in part in the trial of Oscar John Vago for illegal entry at which Gold was scheduled to testify. Inasmuch as Vago has now been tried on an agreed set of facts, Gold did not testify. Furthermore, Bureau Bulletin 23 dated June 12, 1952, removed the requirement that parole reports be submitted except in such cases wherein the Parole Board makes a specific request.

RICOMMANDATION:

In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that this case be closed. It is not recommended that a review of the See references be made as Cold has been incarcerated/ since his arrest at which time a review of such references was conducted.

Harry Gold, convicted Soviet espionage agent presently incarcerated at Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, has been running blood tests for the U.S. Army in an effort to develop a serum which will prevent yellow jaundice.

The Korean campaign has demonstrated that wounded soldiers supplied blood plasma have developed severe cases of yellow jaundice. In an effort to assist the Army in developing this serum, Gold subjected himself to an injection of contaminated blood and developed yellow jaundice.

Gold is currently hospitalized at Lewisburg.



While talking with Wr. Frank Loveland, Assistant
Director, Bureau of Prisons, on October 27, 1952, he referred to
the above-entitled book and stated he had recently read it. He
stated he has been considering the advisability of buying a
number of copies of this back and making it available to "our
people" around the country for their information. He said he
considered it desirable that the personnel of the Bureau of
Prisons be cognizant of developments in espionage, as they do
come in contact with a good many subversive individuals, particularly
since the Smith Act convictions. He said he wanted to be sure the
information contained in the book is proper and factual. He wanted
to know if the Bureau could advise him generally as to the book.

Prior to the publishing of "The Atom Spies," certain material from the book was submitted to the Bureau for review. At that time, certain criticisms and inaccuracies were called to the attention of the author. The book, in final published form, reflects that it was reworked following submission to the Bureau. It continues to reflect unfavorably on the Bureau. The Bureau is charged with "carelessness in counterespionage" in connection with the Harry Gold case and the book concludes that if Gold's revelations had been received in 1947, President Truman might have been led to advance by a year or two his 1950 decision to start extensive work on development of the hydrogen bomb. The book contains inaccuracies which were not included in the material previously submitted to the Bureau. For example, it refers to 500 FBI agents participating with Military Intelligence agencies and police employees of the Manhattan Engineering District and credits the British with singling out Fuchs as a Soviet spy after receiving a tip from the FBI that there had been a leak in the Pritish contingent.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that Mr. Loveland be advised that
"The Atom Spies" does contain a number of inaccuracies, erroneous
conclusions, and false statements, for which reason the Bureau
cannot recommend it as a book proper for distribution to Bureau of
Prisons personnel as a factual documentation of espionage activities.

Ion will recall that Marry Gold identified Senon Merkevick Sevener and Anatoli Antonovick Takevier as two of his former Soviet espisance superiors. Semenou une formerly a Soulet official connected with Autory Trading Corporation and the Soviet Soverament Purchasing Countesion, and Interior se formerly a Clork and Tipe Consul at the Soviet Consulate in New York Gity. Semener, who left the Buited States on September 88, 1944, and Interlev, who departed on December 21 1946, were both embedgestly in Perio, France, as Soutet (4) efficials until about 1948.

In addition, Herry Gold identified Papel Inchesical Telesinov es a Ivasian uho net hin as an alternate for Interior on one seconter in becomber, 1946. On this equalient Bold was asked whether he had any information from Elaux-Füshä.

Podosinov first entered the United States in 1935 of an employee of datory Corporation in charge of orders for machine to als. He also seted as a guide at the Soviet Parizing Borld's Jair, Sow York. At the ease time, his wife, Vera Sergeevas Pedesimera, was also in the United States and employed at inters under the name of Pera Corolova. Reference is made to air-tel from Philadelphia dated November 17, 1952, reflecting that Harry Gold at the U. S. Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, has expressed concern over rumors reaching him to the effect that he is to be transferred to Leavenworth Penitentiary.

We have been interviewing Gold from time to time for information in his possession. He has just/recently been brought before a Grand Jury in Dayton, Ohio in connection with the possible perjury charge against Benjamin Smilg. We will undoubtedly have to consult him in the future and probably use him as a witness in future prosecutions. He has remained cooperative with us.

Because of the above factors, I spoke to Assistant Director Frank Loveland, of the Bureau of Prisons, on November 19, 1952, advising him that Gold had expressed concern over the rumors of his transfer and I inquired whether there was any plan to transfer him from Lewisburg. I told him I was not making any request to hold up any contemplated action but that I merely wanted information at this time. Mr. Loveland advised that there is no plan to move Gold; that the Bureau of Prisons knows that he has been cooperative and before any attempt would be made to move him, undoubtedly the Department and the F3I would be consulted. I asked Loveland whether there was any objection to advising Gold that we had checked on this and the rumors had no substance. He said there was no objection.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that we advise the Philadelphia Office to inform Gold we have checked on this rumor and it has no substance and there are no plans to transfer him from Lewisburg Penitentiary. An air-tel is attached, so advising Philadelphia.



ReBulet enclosed an anonymous communication relative to two Communist spies in the United States working for Russia who were employees of Danast, Inc., Philadelphia, in 1949.

Investigation has reflected that Danast, Inc., Players Uniform Co., southeast corner Ruth and Somerset Streets, Philadelphia, went out of business in May 1950.

Dun and Bradstreet records contained the names of the officials of Danast, Inc., but usual investigative sources have failed to reveal the present whereabouts of these officials. Inquiries at former addresses resulted in obtaining the name of IRVING MARKS, as the attorney for Danast, Inc., during the time it was in operation.

Mr. IRVING MARKS, Lewis Tower Building, Philadelphia, advised that the individuals operating Danast, Inc., had "lost everything" and were either presently employed in other industries or deceased. He stated that during the week of April 27, 1953, he would be able to contact a former plant manager of Danast, Inc., and would refer this individual to the Philadelphia Office.

Investigation is continuing in this matter, and the Bureau will be kept advised.

She was employed by this concern for approximately eleven weeks in 1949, and her husband, PETER KUDRICH, worked for the firm less than one week in 1949. MR + MRS

It will be noted that in the interview of GOID reported in referenced teletype, GOID asserted that in late 1942 or early 1943, after he, GOID, had been having "so much trouble" with BROTHMAN relative to the latter's not showing up for meetings or not coming through with information which EROTHMAN had promised, the unknown subject, with alias SAM, suggested to GOID that he personally would give BROTHMAN a "pep talk".

After a conference between "SAN" and GOLD, it was agreed that GULD would tell BROTHNAN that an important Russian was in town and wanted to see BROTHNAN to thank him personally for information which BROTHNAN had made available to the Soviet Union. Pursuant to this, GOLD stated that he emgaged a suite consisting of a bedroom and parlor in the Hotel Lincoln, New York City, either under the name of HARRY GOLD or FRANK KESSIER. Therefore, the meeting between BROTHNAN and "SAH" occurred in that notel suite.

SA LESTER O. GALLAHER examined the records of the Hotel Lincoln, New York City, on June 7, 1950, with the following results. (It should be noted that these records are in a highly disorganised state and that there is no uniform filing system by means of which existing records can be located with any certainty.)

One HARRY COLD, address 1227 North Broad Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, registered at the Hotel Lincoln in Room 2639 on November 10, 1913, remaining there for the dates November 10 and 11. He gave his employer's name as the Sun Ray Drug Company, no address given. The actual registration card signed by this HARRY COLD has been obtained and is being forwarded for examination by the FRI Laboratory.

One HARRY GOLD registered from 120 Elm Street, Troy, New York, on October 15, 1913, for one day and was assigned Room 614. Specimens of his mandwriting are also being forwarded to the Bureau.

One HARRY COLD, probably identical with the HARRY COLD mentioned immediately above, registered at the Hotel Lincoln on Movember 29, 1913, from 121 Klm Street, Troy, New York, and was assigned Room 1121. He was there on November 29 and 30. His registration card is also being forwarded to the Bureau.

One HARRY COLD registered from 122 Fim Street, Yonkers, Hew York, on November 12, 1913, at the Hotel Lincoln and was assigned Room 1126. The records do not show how long he remained at the hotel. It is possible that this HARLY COLD is identical with the above two HARRY COLDS registering from the Klm Street address in Troy, New York. This registration card is also being forwarded to the Bureau.

- On how many occasions did he register at the Hotel Lincoln for the purpose of meeting with BROTHMAN or espionage superiors or for any other purpose.
- 2. Whether the dates as set forth above of the eleven registrations by this HARRY GOLD mean anything to him in connection with registrations made by him at the Hotel Lincoln.

3. GOLD should be asked whether the dates of any of the registrations of the above individuals mean anything to him.

Ho record of any FRANK KEPPLER was located at the Hetel Lincoln.

The registration of one P. W. KESSLER, 15 West 5th Street, Danbury, Connecticut, was located. It is noted that this individual registered on the following dates at the Hotel Lincoln:

In connection with the registrations of F. W. KESSLER, it is to be noted, however, that on one occasion, October 23, 1943, Mrs. F. W. KESSLER, 15 West 8th Street, Danbury, Connecticut, registered at the Hotel Lincoln and was assigned Room 2142, the same room than occupied by F. W. KESSLER.

Although no registration of any FRANK KEPPLER was located at the Hotel Lincoln, the registration of one KEPPLER, address 195 Saybrook Street, Hartford, Connecticut, was located for the date December 19, 1943. This registration is not supported by the actual handwriting of this individual, but it is known that he was assigned Room 2419%.

In connection with these registrations, Mrs. CAROL KOHLER, Assistant Credit Manager, or JAMES R. O'KEEFE, Credit Manager, are competent to produce them.

Mrs. KOHLER and Mr. MACK, Assistnat Manager, Rotel Lincoln, have advised further that there are in excess of twenty suites in the Motel Lincoln such as has been described by GOLD. Also in this connection

they have stated that there also exist in the hotel three-room suites with two bedrooms and a parlor, which, if the occasion demands, are blocked off and reduced to two-room suites with one bedroom and a parlor, which also would neet the description furnished by GOLD. In the event any identification is made by the FBI Laboratory of the specimens of handwriting forwarded with this letter as subject's, it will then be determined by the New York Office whether the room occupied by GOLD meets with his present physical description of it.

In connection with the six specimens of handwriting being enclosed with this letter, the FBI Laboratory is requested to compare the specimens with the known handwriting of subject HARPY GOLD in an effort to effect an identification of one or more of these enclosures as the handwriting of GOLD.



Results of Examination:

It was concluded that the handwriting on specimen Q1 was written by HARRY GOLD, K2, Bureau file 65-57449.


It was also concluded that the A. D. SLACK signature on the second page of the typewritten report entitled "Recovery of 2 M 3 Removable Jet Scrap, Report No.2," which is a part of specimen Q2, was written by ALFRED DEAN SLACK, whose known handwriting is found on specimens Kel through Ke3, K6, K8, Kell, K13 and K20 in this case. It may be noted that this conclusion was also reported in Laboratory Report, dated June 16, 1950, directed to the Albany Office. It was concluded that none of the other handwriting on specimen Q2 was written by RICHARD M. BRIGGS, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, STANLEY EARL GLASS or ALFRED DEAN SLACK. The known handwriting of RICHARD M. HRIGGS is found on specimens K7 and K21. The handwriting of STANLEY EARL GLASS appears on specimen K18. The handwriting of HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR is found on specimens K5, Kc9 and K16.

No conclusion could be reached whether the handwriting on specimen Q3 was written by HARRY GOLD, because the questioned writing is so small that most of the handwriting characteristics are concealed. However, characteristics of sufficient significance to warrant the obtaining of additional known writing from HARRY GOLD for comparison with Q3 were noted in the examination. If such specimens are obtainable, they should be prepared in the same wording as on Q3 with pencil and on the same size card as Q3.

A definite conclusion could not be reached whether the handprinting appearing on the inside covers of specimens Q4 and Q5 was prepared by ALFRED DRAN SLACK, because of the limited nature of the questioned handprinting. A number of significant characteristics were noted in the examination.

A part of specimen Q6 consists of nine yellow sheets of typewriting bearing a number of handwritten notations. Because of the limited nature of these notations, no conclusion could be reached whether they were written by ALFRED DEAN SIACK, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, RICHARD M. BRIGGS or STANLEY BARL GLASS.

Another portion of specimen Q6 consists of three pages of a handwritten report entitled "Jacket for Silver Tubing of Urea Converter." It was concluded that the handwriting on these pages was not written by ALFRED DEAN SLACK, RICHARD M. BRIGGS, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR or STANLEY BARL GLASS.




Also included with specimen Q6 are several data sheets ruled with red vertical lines and blue-green horizontal lines. Five of these sheets are attached to typewritten memoranda and two of the sheets are stapled to three other documents consisting of a 3" by 5" card, a 4" by 6" sheet of paper and 3" by 5" slip of paper. Nothing of significance was found in comparing the limited amount of handwriting on these items with the known writing of ALPRET DEAN SLACK, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, RICHARD M. BRIGGS and STANLEY BARL GLASS with the exception of the following writing: "Chemical No. 73 - 28% Ammonium hydroxide" written in pencil on the data sheet dated 11/17/41 and "Experimental only" written in pencil on data sheet dated 1/12/42. Significant characteristics were found in this writing when compared with the known writing of ALFRED DRAN SLACK, but because of the limited nature of the questioned writing, a definite conclusion could not be reached whether the writing was prepared by SLACK. If it is desired that this writing be further compared with the known writing of ALFRED DEAN SLACK, it is suggested that additional known specimens in the wording of the questioned writing be obtained from this individual.

Another portion of Q6 consists of a color photograph of a graph of the Paramount West Coast Laboratory stapled to a sheet of white paper. On this paper there is written in pencil "Get Explanation of T." It was concluded that this writing was written by HARRY GOLD, K2, Bureau file 65-57449.

Another part of Q6 is a circular diagram pertaining to "Circulation of Solvent" which contains handprinting. It was concluded that this handprinting was not prepared by ALFRED DEAN SLACK. No conclusion was reached whether this handprinting was prepared by STANLEY EARL GLASS, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR or RICHARD M. BRIGGS because the available known handprinting of GOCHENOUR is too limited and no handprinting of GLASS or BRIGGS has been submitted.

It was concluded that the handwriting on the graphs comprising Q7 was not written by ALFRED DEAN SLACK, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, RICHARD M. BRIGGS OF STANLEY BARL GLASS.

A small amount of handwriting in black ink appears on the manila envelope included with Q8. Because of the limited nature of this writing, no conclusion



A part of Q9 consists of seven graphs which contain handprinting. Ho conclusion could be reached whether this handprinting was prepared by ALFRED DEAN SLACK, because of variations which could not be accounted for. Ho conclusion could be reached whether this handprinting was prepared by HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, because the available known handprinting of this individual is not adequate for comparison. Ho handprinting of RICHARD M. HRIGGS or STANLEY EARL GLASS is available for comparison.

Also included with Q9 is a photostatic copy of a triangular - shaped graph attached to a typewritten report entitled "Method of Operating Machines above the Upper Explosive Limit." It was concluded that the handprinting on this graph was not prepared by ALFRED DEAN SLACK. No conclusion could be reached whether this handprinting was prepared by HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, RICHARI W. ERICGS or STANLEY EARL GLASS, because the submitted known handprinting of GOCHENOUR is inadequate and because no handprinting of ERIGGS or GLASS has been submitted for comparison.

A number of typewritten "Sub Conference Reports" dated November 29, 1935 through September 24, 1937 are included with specimen Q9. Some of the pages included with these reports contain handwritten and handprinted notations of a limited nature, prepared for the most part in ink. A definite conclusion could not be reached whether any of these handwritten or handprinted notations were prepared by ALFRED DEAN SLACK, because of the limited nature of the questioned specimens. A number of significant characteristics were noted, however which would warrant the obtaining of further known writing from SLACK in the exact wording of these notations, if this is advisable at this stage of the investigation. Nothing of significance was noted in comparing these notations with the handwriting of HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, RICHARD W. BRIGGS or STANLEY BARL GLASS.

It was concluded that the handwriting on the pages of ruled paper comprising a part of Q10, with the exception of the diagram on page 3, was written by HARRY GOLD, K2, Bureau file 65-57449. It is noted that these ruled pages comprise a six-page report on "Magnesium Powder Plant."

Page 6 D-117987 BB It was concluded that the handprinting on the diagram on page 3 of the report entitled "Magnesium Powder Plent" was not prepared by HARRY GOLD or ALFRED DEAN SLACK. He conclusion was reached whether this handprinting was prepared by GLASS, GOCHENOUR or BRIGGS because no known handprinting of GLASS and BRIGGS is available and because the available handprinting of GOCHENOUR is too limited.

It was concluded that the unruled pages containing a list of chemicals, handwritten in pencil, comprising the other part of Q10, were not written by HARRY GOLD, HOWARD W. GOCHENOUR, STANLEY BARL GLASS, ALFRED DEAN SLACK or RICHARD M. BRIGGS.

It was concluded that the ALFRED D. SLACK signature on Qc12 and the handprinting and signature of the applicant on Qc13 were written by ALFRED DRAN SLACK.

The handprinting and handwriting of ALFRED DEAN SLACK have previously been compared with the appropriate sections of the National Security File without effecting an identification. Photographic copies of this handprintin, and handwriting have been added to this file for future reference and comparison.

In accordance with Albany teletype to the Bureau dated June 28, 1950, the handwriting of REGINALD ARTHUR ERIGCS was not compared with specimens Q1 throughout above. The known handwriting of REGINALD ARTHUR BRIGGS appears on specimens Kolo and Kol5 listed above.

Reference is made in Pittsburgh letter dated June 21, 1950, to a check drawn on the account of the Russian Embassy on July 2, 1947, in the amount of \$75.00, made payable to "Mrs. GOCHENOUR." This check has not yet been receive in the Laboratory. However, as soon as this specimen is received the requeste comparison will be made with the known writing of Mrs. LEAH B. OOCHENOUR, K17, and a report will be furnished to the interested offices.

It was concluded that none of the typewriting on the various specimens included with Q1 through Q10 was prepared on the typewriter used to prepare specimen K19 listed above.

Specimens Q1 through Q10 will be returned under separate cover to the Philadelphia Office within the next several days, as soon as appropriate photographic copies have been made and further typewriting comparisons conducted.

By letter dated 10-7-53, John D. M. Hamilton, courtappointed attorney for Harry Gold, advised he had in his possession much material relating to his client. Hamilton stated
this material contained the names of many whose activities had
not been brought to light as yet and for this reason believed it
unsafe to maintain this material in his files. One of Gold's
contacts probably included in this group is Joseph Katz, who has
not yet been publicly identified. Hamilton advised he would
appreciate our suggestions concerning this material. He has
also written Harry Gold, his client, concerning this situation.

The likelihood of any new material appearing in Hamilton's files appears slight. This statement is made in view of the fact that Gold has been cooperative with the Bureau. Hamilton was cooperative and also commendatory of the FBI in federal court on the date Gold was sentenced (12-7-50).

It is believed, however, the Philadelphia Office should review this material to aetermine if anything new or pertinent is contained therein.

Letter to Hamilton prepared advising this Bureau will review material he has on hand. Addendum to copy of letter to Hamilton requests Philadelphia to contact Hamilton and review material.

Ton 11-14-50, Hamilton contacted the Philadelphia Office and advised he would like to 50 over with representatives of the FBI the facts he planned on presenting to the Court on 12-7-50. He was advised on Bureau instructions that the Bureau did not consider it proper to review material prior to trial. He was thanked for his thoughtfulness.



With relevence to my memorandum of October 16, covering a conference which I attended in the Atterney General's Office dealing with a request made by Sonater McCarthy for permission to proceed to the Lewisburg Ponitentiary, Mr. Bannett advised the stall at luncheon today that a telegram had been received this morning signed by Senator McCarthy and seat from New York, stating that arriving tomorrow morning at Levisburg would be Mr. Roy Cobyl. General Goussel for the McCarthy Committee; Mesers. Schipe, Carr and Clark of the McCarthy Committee; Mr. O. John Rogge, attorney of New York City and prosumably the attorney for Greenglass; and an officer of the Army from Fort Monmouth, and that the Committee desired to laterview both Greenglass and Gold at Lewisburg tomorrow. Mr. Benneti stated that this raised a number of problems. He pointed out that the original request which the Attorney General had approved was for Senator McCarthy to personally interview Greenglass and there had been no indication that there would be any such large entourage, including the representative of the Army and an outside lawyer. There was a general free-for-all discussion in which I did not participate until the end. The 🕾 Attorney General was annoyed at the increase in the size of the group to go to Lewisburg and also at the fact that the Committee new wasted to laterview Gold, whereas the original request was limited solely to Greenglass. The Attorney General indicated, however, that probably the best way out of the predicament was to raise as objection and to let the matter proceed in the regular course. Mr. Bennett golated out that many complications were bound to arise and it was suggested that it might be better to take Greenglass to Hew York and that a hearing be bod about by the Committee.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL:

Warden Bumphrey of the Lewisburg penitentiary called the this afternoon to report on the interview of David reenglass and harry old by investigators of Senator McCarthy's committee.

The "arden advised that they spent very little time with Harry Gold and their only nurpose was to get from him an affidavit concerning his knowledge of someone who had an arently been called before the Jenner committee. The affidavit had no connection with the Monmouth cases and Gold stated that he knew nothing whatever about the investigation. A copy of the Gold affidavit is being forwarded here.

The interview with reenglass was of considerably longer duration and the questioning took place in the presence of Mr. U. John Rogge. From what the Warden tells me I judge that Greenglass was glad to takk but spent almost all of his time repeating information he had previously given on the stand at the time he testified in the Rosenberg case. The warden believes he named no one not known in connection with either the trial or the investigation of the Rosenberg case. Greenglass couldn't identify any of the names mentioned to him by the investigators in connection with the Monwouth cases. Although it is believed that the complete details of GOLD's financial transactions while in Soviet espionage has previously been furnished to the Bureau, this document appears to be of definite interest to It is recommended that the document be photostated inasmuch as it sets forth in one place for ready reference the details of GOLD's financial transactions while in Soviet espionage. Photostatic copies would be furnished to the Bureau and New York. Document entitled "Statement" by HARRY GOLD dated 7/20/50. This consists of 26 handwritten penciled pages by HARRY GOLD. his Soviet superiors and also his own American contacts in chronological order. GOLD then discusses in detail his reasons for entering Soviet espionage. He also mentions that he has tried to make amends for his actions by recalling every detail of his activity while in Soviet espionage and furnishing this to the Government.

It is recommended that this document be photostated.

- 3. Document entitled "The Early Life of HARRY GOLD A Report" dated 10/23/50. This report, handwritten by GOLD in pencil, covers his life from birth until the time he finished high school. It is 76 pages in length and is divided into four parts.
 - A. History of GOLD's family from the date of GOLD's father's arrival in Switzerland in 1904 until 1928 when GOLD's secondary education was completed.
 - B. Pleasures and happy events GOLD carried through the years.
 - C. Disappointments, fears, and sorrows
 - D. Facts GOLD deems important that fall under (1) family relationship; (2) beliefs which GOLD held firmly in youth.

There does not appear to be anything in this document of possible interest to us.

4. Document entitled "Chronology of Work for Soviet Union" dated 6/15/50, by HARRY GOLD. This consists of an eight page pencil written document in outline form showing in chronological order GOLD's Soviet superiors and the work performed for each one.

It is believed this document should be photostated in order to furnish a ready reference regarding GOLD's Soviet superiors. It is believed useful in that it would save thumbing through voluminous reports in attempting to obtain a chronological account of GOLD's superiors.

D. M. HAMILTON dated 7/31/50. This letter concerns GOLD's request for a conference with someone from the heart station at the Philadelphia General Hospital regarding his unfinished experimental work and the suggestions he has for conducting future experiments.

There appears to be nothing of possible interest to us, in this letter.

6. Document entitled "The Circumstances Surrounding My Work as a Soviet Agent - A Report" by HARRY GOLD dated 10/11/50. This consists of a 110 page pencil written report, which is an amplification of the statement submitted by GOLD on 7/20/50. Pertinent portions in this report appear to be listed from pages 72 through 110. Persons GOLD identified as being involved in Soviet espionage are discussed on these pages. An item especially important on page 98 is GOLD's identification of one of his Soviet superiors as JOSEPH KATZ. GOLD mentions he only met KATZ for a brief period on one occasion.

To our knowledge in this office the KATZ investigation is still classified secret. KATZ is the subject of Bureau file 65-57913 and New York file 65-14913. No publicity has ever been released on KATZ. It is believed that after the complete review of the material furnished by HAMILTON is made, the fact that no publicity has ever been released on JOSEPH KATZ should be made known to HAMILTON and again pointed out to GOLD in order to prevent any premature disclosures concerning KATZ.

It is believed this document should be photostated and copies furnished to the Bureau and New York for information.

7. Two yellow sheets containing a chronology of the life of HARRY GOLD dated 6/28/50. There does not appear to be anything new in this account of GOLD's life and it is, therefore, not believed necessary to photostat it.

John D. M. Hamilton, attorney for Harry Gold, by letter 7 dated 10-7-53, advised of material in his possession relating to ? his client. Philadelphia requested to review material on 10-12-53. By letter dated 12-26-53, Philadelphia advised review of material to date reflected no new information. Philadelphia suggested certain material relating to Gold's activities be Photostated for purpose of ready reference in the future. One document captioned "The circumstance: Surrounding My Work as a Soviet Agent" identifies Joseph Katz as a superior of Gold. Philadelphia should advise Hamilton and Gold that disclosure of information in this document might be prejudicial to interests of this Bureau. Philadelphia also requested authority to secure sound scriber equipment from Laboratory in order to review interviews of Gold and his attorney. It is recommended that Philadelphia secure Photostats of certain material in possession of Gold's attorney and that Philadelphia secure the sound scriber equipment from the Laboratory. (3) Authority be granted Philadelphia to secure sound scriber equipment from the Laboratory in order to review the recorded interviews with Gold and his attorney.

DETAILS:

By letter dated 10-7-53, John D. M. Hamilton, Court appointed attorney for Harry Gold, advised he had in his possession much material relating to his client. Hamilton stated he would appreciate our suggestions concerning this material.

Philadelphia was requested on 10-12-53, to contact Hamilton and review the material in his possession. Philadelphia was directed to be particularly alert for any new or pertinent information not previously known to the Bureau.

By letter dated 12-16-53, Philadelphia advised that in their review of this material certain items, though not new, should be Photostated and copies retained for ready reference. These items are:

- (1) "Money Accounting of My Espionage Fork" dated 12-3-50. This is an estimate by Gold of the money received from his various Soviet superiors.
- (2) A document entitled "Statement," which consists of the dates of interviews and a summary of Gold's activities in Soviet espionage.
- (3) A document entitled "Early Life of Harry Gold A Report" dated 10-23-50. Philadelphia rules against securing a Photostat of this background material and it is agreed we do not need a copy of this.
- (4) A document captioned "Chronology of Work for Soviet Union" dated 6-15-50, which in outline form lists chronologically the work performed by Gold for each Soviet superior.

- (5) This item is a letter from Gold to his attorney dated 7-91-50, requesting a conference with someone in the Philadelphia General Hospital regarding Gold's unfinished experimental work. This is of no interest to us and no Photostat is being secured.
- (6) A document captioned "The Circumstances Surrounding My Work as a Soviet Agent" dated 10-11-50. This is a 110 page report prepared by Gold wherein one of his Soviet superiors is identified as Joseph Katz. Philadelphia suggests that after review of all material both Hamilton and Gold be advised no publicity has been released concerning Katz to prevent any premature disclosures.

Philadelphia should advise both Hamilton and Gold we are in no position to request the information in this document not be made public. It should, however, be suggested to both Hamilton and Gold that premature disclosure of this material might be detrimental to the interests of this Bureau. Philadelphia should, of course, not identify the person in this document in whom we have a current active interest.

(7) Two sheets containing a chronology of the life of Harry Gold dated 6-28-50. Philadelphia states this contains nothing new and recommends against securing a Photostat.

Philadelphia also requests authority to secure a sound scriber from the Laboratory in order that the sound scriber disks covering interviews of Gold by Hamilton can be reviewed. This is being authorized.

It should be noted the review as completed by Philadelphia to date has not reflected any new or pertinent information. Philadelphia's recommendations for securing Photostats of certain items are primarily for the purpose of providing a ready reference to pertinent information concerning Gold's activities.

In connection with the Semontel Case, CIC dossiers maintained by G-2, First Army, New York, were reviewed on a total of 667-individuals who are former or present employees or associates of former or present employees of the Army Signal Corps, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, and the Federal Telecommunication Laboratories, Nutley, New Jersey. Upon completion of the review of these CIC dossiers, the files of the Bureau and the Newark and New York offices were reviewed on each of the 667 individuals. These file reviews were completed on 10-12-53 and based on the results thereof, no action was taken by the Bureau on a number of individuals involved, including the above-captioned subject.

This is for record purposes and should be filed in the subject's main file. A copy is being placed in the Semontel control file.

DAVID GREENGLASS - Subject of separate blind memo. He is a self-confessed member of the ROSEVBERG espionage ring. Admitted furnishing Atomic Research data to contact man, HARRY GOLD, in violation of espionage statutes. Later-convicted and given prison sentence for his espionage activities.



With the foregoing in mind, the Pittsburch Office should be most circumspect with any contact with and should keep in mind that he may desire to build up an association with the Pittaburgh Office with the hopes that such will benefit him in the event he again finds himself in difficulty With respect to his parole status. Pittsburgh letter of 2-5-54 reflects voluntarily offered to report any anticipated Comminist Party contacts he has to the PBI. this connection, Pittsburgh should keep in mind the possibility of covering by physical surveillance any Communist estates he is to attend. Such coverage Party meeting would permit Pittsburgh to evaluate any subsequent report Flway may make to that office regarding the contact.

The Philadelphia Office should interview Harry Gold at the Lewisburg Penitentiary and question him as to his knowledge of and any information he may possess regarding the association alleges he had in the penitentiary with Gold, Greenglass, Hiss and Memington. If necessary, Philadelphia may also desire to similarly interview Greenglass; however, Philadelphia must be careful to insure that neither Greenglass nor Gold reveals to other prison inmates the substance of the interviews.

If the further investigation conducted in this respect indicates there is any accuracy in the allegation made by as set forth in Pittsburgh letter of 2-5-54, it would, or course, be necessary that reports be submitted in the appropriate cases.

A copy of this letter is being furnished the New York Office in view of its interest in the Remington, Hiss and Gold cases.

The Bureau should be advised of the results of any further inquiry conducted regarding this matter,

His reason for furnishing the information to Pittsburgh was so as not to jeopardise his present parale and he said he will not go back to prison alive as his temperator will not permit him to stand further strain of prison life.


