SUBJECT:

HARRY GOLD, was., ESPIONAGE - R.

At 3:15 pm, May 29, 1950, SAC Cornelius called from Philadelphia to advise that Harry Gold has asked the Special Agents interviewing him to make arrangements with the Warden of the prison to let him call Judge McGranery for the purpose of having the Judge appoint an attorney for him. Gold said that the reason he wanted an attorney was to make his father feel better and that he had not changed his position which was that he wanted to make a clean breast of things to the Agents. I advised Mr. Cornelius that Gold should make his request direct to the Warden, as it did not appear desirable for Agents to be entering the picture at all, in so far as an attorney is concerned.

I advised Mr. Cornelius that if he were talking to Judge McGranery, there was no objection to telling Judge McGranery that Gold had indicated to the Agents interviewing him that he was going to attempt to call the Judge to have him appoint an attorney.

At 4:30 pm, Mr. Cornelius called back to advise that Judge McGranery had called him to state that he had received a call from Harry Gold, requesting that an attorney be appointed for him by the court. Gold told Judge McGranery that he would like to have Attorney Gray represent him. You will recall that William A. Gray was considering handling the Gold case, as set forth in my memorandum of May 26, 1950, but decided that he would not take it. Judge McGranery advised that he has set Wednesday afternoon for Gold to come to his chambers, at which time he will appoint an attorney; that he will consult with Attorney Gray and unless Gray has some definite objection, he will appoint Gray to represent Gold. Mr. Cornelius advised that Judge McGranery suggested that two Agents accompany Gold from the prison to the Judge's chambers on Wednesday afternoon for security reasons.

I told Mr. Cornelius that it did not appear desirable for Agents to accompany Gold; that that was what prison guards or U. S. deputy marshals are for. I suggested that Cornelius call Judge McGranery and suggest to him that it might be better for this to be handled by prison guards or the U. S. marshal, inasmuch as the attendance of Agents on Gold during such a trip might be open to misinterpretation that we were putting pressure of some kind on Gold. I also suggested that Mr. Cornelius bring up the fact that as the Judge is aware, we had been interviewing Gold, and request his opinion as to whether Gold's request to the Judge for an attorney changed the picture at all in so far as continuing interview with him by Agents was concerned. I told Mr. Cornelius I thought this was necessary because Gold had spoken directly to the Judge.

Mr. Cornelius called me back to advise that the Judge agreed with us that Agents should not accompany Gold from the penitentiary to his chambers. Relative to continuing the interview with Gold, the Judge was of the opinion that now that Gold has requested the Judge to appoint an attorney, it would be better to hold off any further interviews with him until after his appearance in the Judge's chambers Wednesday afternoon. The wishes of the Judge are being followed.



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

Dear Sir:

I would like to call to the Bureau's attention what I believe to be the outstanding work done on the FOOCASE by SAs T. Scott Miller and Richard E. Brennan.

As the Bureau is aware, the New York Office and several other offices started conducting simultaneous interviews of ABRAHAM EBOTHMAN and several of his associates, including HARRY GOLD, on the morning of May 15, 1950. These interviews ultimately resulted in the confession of HARRY GOLD.

SAS T. Scott Miller and Richard E. Brennan were dispatched from the New York Office to Philadelphia to conduct the interviews with HARRY GOLD. The intelligent, imaginative, resourceful, and vigorous manner in which they carried out this assignment, I feel, is the basic reason for the confession which resulted. As we are aware in the Bureau, a confession frequently depends upon the manner in which the interviewing agents handle themselves with the particular subject and it is felt that such was the case in this instance. From every consideration, therefore, it would seen to me that both agents Miller and Brennan could be highly commended for the excellent job that they performed. It is recommended that they be considered for meritorious increases in salary in recognition of their work.

It is realized that other agents performed important parts of this investigation. However, there is still much to be done in the case and when it is completed, I believe the importance of the work of other men may be better evaluated and, of course, at that time, this office will advise the Bureau of its recommendations in that regard.

While discussing another matter with Mr. Peyton Ford he adviced me that he had just read on the ticker that Marry Odd had just appeared before Judge James P. McGranery and advised that he wanted a lawyer but he wants to continue to cooperate with the FBI and that he is going to plead guilty but not to the charge of meaning to hurt the United States. Wr. Ford said he did not know the name of the lawyer named by Judge McGranery. I told Mr. Ford that I had told Judge McGranery in my conversation yesterday that the Sureau was interested in knowing that Gold had a good lawyer who would thoroughly protect his rights. I told Mr. Ford that I was interested in moving as rapidly on this case as possible. Mr. Ford said that an indictment should be obtained as soon as possible, and I agreed with this.

Hr. Ford asked what I thought about Keough handling this matter by himself. I told Hr. Ford that I did not know him but my impression was that he was a rather good, sound lawyer and as long as Gold had a reasonably good lawyer, I believed that Keough could handle the case. Hr. Ford said he believed he would let him handle it for now.

At 12:10 pm on May 31, Mr. Peyton Ford called. He advised that
he had been talking to Judge McGranery concerning the request of Harry Gold
for an attorney and he wondered whether Gold had requested any specific
attorney. I advised him that Gold had made his request direct to Judge McGranery,
and as we understood it, had asked Judge McGranery to appoint an attorney for him
and had expressed his preference to Judge McGranery for William Gray, a Philadelphia
attorney. Mr. Ford was advised that this information was given to us by Judge
McGranery; that, of course, any arrangements between Gold and Judge McGranery were
made direct and not through the FEI as an intermediary.

Mr. Ford advised that Judge McGranery had told him that there was scmething in the press in Philadelphia to the effect that Gray had stated that if he were to go into the case, he would only do so if he were permitted to cooperate with the FBI. Mr. Ford had a thought that in view of such a public statement by Gray, it might give Gold a chance at a later date, if he turned sour, to complain that he was not properly represented. I advised Mr. Ford that the matter of an attorney to represent Gold was entirely up to Judge McGranery and the Department; that the Bureau is not entering the picture in any way.

I further advised Mr. Ford that when Judge McGranery informed us that Harry Gold had called him relative to an attorney, we had brought up the question as to whether we should continue to interview Gold in view of his request for an attorney and that Judge McGranery had expressed the opinion that we should hold off on further interviews until the hearing before McGranery on May 31. Mr. Ford was advised that we had immediately ceased interviewing Gold in accordance with the opinion of Judge McGranery. Mr. Ford advised that he saw no reason why we should not continue to interview Gold, if he requests such interviews, but that he did not believe we should seek out interviews with Gold; that if he requests them, we should continue. I advised Mr. Ford that undoubtedly this issue would be settled this afternoon when Gold appeared before Judge McGranery.

RECOMMENDATION:

This does not change the picture in so far as we are concerned. We have purposely kept out of any arrangements between Gold and Judge McGranery for an attorney and will continue to do so. We will continue to withhold further interview of Gold pending the hearing before Judge McGranery this afternoon. In the event there is any question as to the propriety of further interviews after the hearing today, the Department will again be put on notice in writing as to what our action will be.

Yesterday in telephonic conversation with Judge McGranery of Milladelphia he stated that Harry Gold, who has been charged with espionage, was to appear before him on the afternoon of May 31 to have an attorney designated to represent him. Judge McGranery informed me that Ford and McInerney had been favorably inclined to the appointment of Gray but that he, Judge McGranery, was inclined to the appointment of another man who at one time had been President of the Bar Association and who was a very reputable lawyer. I told Judge McGranery that in so far as the FBI was concerned we did not desire to inject ourselves in any way into the appointment of an attorney for Gold; that all we were desirous of having done was the designation of a competent attorney by the court who could properly represent the defendant. I told Judge McGranery that pending the appointment of such an attorney we would refrain from any further interviews with Gold and if after he, the Judge, appointed Gold's attorney, that attorney felt that Gold should further cooperate with the Government by submitting to interviews by the FBI we would be glad to resume interviews, but if Gold's attorney advised him against any further interviews with representatives of the FEI that would be entirely satisfactory to us.

I told Judge McGranery that Gold had been up to this time most cooperative and that we were entirely willing at any time to make a statement to this effect in court to either him or to whomever may ultimately become the trial judge.

Judge McGranery confidentially informed me that he gathered from talking with Ford and McInerney that they were planning to have this case tried at New Mexico rather than in Brooklyn. I told Judge McGranery that this was indeed a surprise to me; that in so far as I know no such intimation had been given to the Bureau and that we were assuming the case would be tried in Brooklyn; the Eastern Judicial Dist? It of New York. I think it would be well to immediately check with our SAC at Albuquerque to find out exactly how capable the United States Attorney is in that district because it is significant to me that if the Department is considering having Gold indicted in New Mexico that it has not seen fit as yet to discuss the matter with the FBI. I do not want to lose this case through inept prosecutive



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



On the afternoon of May 29th, I called the Boston Office and in the absence of Mr. Soucy and Mr. McCabe, I spoke to Special Agent Robert Tonis. I pointed out to him that Boston Agents have interviewed Iafazanos in the past and in view of the importance of this case, the Bureau feels that it is necessary to show the photograph of Gold to Lafazanos for identification purposes.

I advised him that the interview should be conducted with common sense and in such a manner that the issues raised in the Boston teletype would be avoided. I advised him that we expected the Agents to conduct the interview in such a manner that the Bureau would not be embarrassed.


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

August 1946. When questioned as to whether he knew an individual by the name of FRANK KEPPLER, Wellan stated that an individual by this name was connected with A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES, and came to the firm after relations between BROTHMAN and WOLLAN were strained. WOLLAN believed this was about the spring of 1946. He recalled that KEPPLER was BROTHMAN's right hand man and replaced WOLLAN to a large extent in the A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES Laboratory. KEPPLER became the General Over-all Supervisor in the Laboratory. WOLLAN had not known KEPPLER before and recalled that BROTHMAN obtained the services of KEPPLER who came from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and commuted from that city while employed by A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES. WOLLAN knew very little concerning KEPPLER's background, but believes KEPPLER's family was in Philadelphia. He was a chemist or chemical engineer and was employed in this connection.

Upon being shown a photograph of HARRY GOLD, which was exhibited to him in such a manner that the name appearing on the photograph could not be seen, WOLLAN readily identified GOLD as the person he knew as FRANK KEPPLER.

Later during the interview, WOLLAN was asked if he knew an individual by the name of HARRY GOLD, to which he quickly replied that he did and that it was GOLD's photograph he had previously identified during the course of the interview, referring, of course, to the photograph he had identified as being FRANK KEPPLER. Then WOLLAN became slightly frustrated when he apparently realized that the name of GOLD had not previously been mentioned during the course of the interview. He then stated that FRANK KEPFLER and HARRY GOLD were the same, recalling that GOLD used both names while employed by A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES. At this point of the interview, WOLLAN did not explain why GOLD used two names. WOLLAN believed that GOLD was married to a second wife by whom he had two small children.

GOLD, according to WOLLAN, was a chemist with some apparent chemical engineering experience but was not a physicist.

When first employed, GOLD worked only a day or two at a time commuting from Philadelphia, inasmuch as he apparently had other

employment. GOLD first worked in the offices of A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES on 32nd Street, but would come to the Laboratory and make sketches of his own and conduct various tests, allegedly at the specific request of BROTHMAN. WOLLAN did not know the nature of these tests and stated that although at that time he, WOLLAN, was the Laboratory Superintendent, GOLD did not disclose to him the nature of the tests or drawings. WOLLAN volunteered the statement "I was not involved with the work which GOLD was doing" but would not elaborate on this further. When questioned more specifically concerning this statement, WOLLAN remarked that GOLD never conferred with him on any work which he was doing even though it was done in the Laboratory where WOLLAN was Superintendent.

According to WOLLAN, GOLD was employed by BROTHMAN in the late winter of 1945 46 or early spring of 1946, and after being there a few months was employed fulltime, returning to his home in Philadelphia on weekends. GOLD and BROTHMAN became very closely associated together, and WOLLAN gathered the impression from general conversation that BROTHMAN and GOLD had known each other for a considerable length of time prior to GOLD's being employed by BROTHMAN.

WOLLAN recalled that GOLD assisted BROTHMAN in obtaining a contract with the Palestine Potash Company. This contract was for specifications for manufacturing plants to produce DET. The firm actually drew up specifications for two plants for the Palestine Potash Company and in addition to that ran tests in the A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES Laboratory in connection with "gun cotton" and "TNT". These tests were conducted in the hopes of obtaining a contract from the Palestine Potash Company to design plants to produce these items. WOLLAN did not know whether a contract was ever obtained from the Palestine Potash Company for plants to produce gun cotton and TNT.

WOLLAN left the firm of A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES in August 1946 and at the time he left, GOLD had come to the Laboratory and more or less replaced WOLLAN as Laboratory Superintendent. It was WOLLAN's belief that GOLD was given the position of Laboratory Superintendent when he, WOLLAN, left.

WOLLAN was questioned in detail concerning any knowledge of GOLD's background and of any business trips made by GOLD while employed by A. BROTHMAN & ASSOCIATES. WOLLAN advised that he knew very little of GOLD's background other than that he was a chemist, came from Philadelphia, and was apparently married to his second wife by whom he had two small children. WOLLAN stated he did not become closely acquainted with GOLD inasmuch as he felt that GOLD was apparently replacing him, WOLLAN, in the confidence of ABRAHAM BROTHMAN and was apparently, on BROTHMAN's instructions, assuming duties which normally would have been WOLLAN's responsibility.

WOLLAN volunteered that GOLD had a friendly feeling toward the Soviet Union. WOLLAN stated, however, he could recall no specific incident which occurred to indicate GOLD's friendly feeling toward the Soviet Union.

Based on information furnished by Mr. John McGuire, I called ASAC Whelan, of the New York Office, on the afternoon of May 26, to advise him that David Sentner, of the Hearst newspapers, had contacted the Bureau today to state that information had been received from New York to the effect that Abraham Brothman was the go-between between Elizabeth Bentley and Harry Gold; that the Bureau had made no comment to Mr. Sentner concerning this allegation. Mr. / 1 Sentner pointed out that in the event it would embarrass the Bureau, from the standpoint of any action we have pending against Brothman, to publish this story, he would hold up the story. However, he was advised that the Bureau did not wish to comment one way or another on it. Mr. Sentner indicated that from the records of the appearance of Elizabeth Bentley before a Congressional Committee, it had been learned that she had named Brothman as one of her contacts while engaged in espionage. The Hearst papers took it upon themselves to conduct investigation into the background of Brothman and came up with the fact that Harry Gold had worked for Brothman. Therefore, they have come to the conclusion that Brothman was the intermediary between Bentley and Gold. Mr. Whelan was advised that we were informing the New York Office of this probable publicity concerning Brothman, inasmuch as Brothman is still under interview by New York Agents and, therefore, should be prepared for possible publicity. Sentner stated they were not worried so much about a possible libel angle although that was a consideration, as they were about fouling up any activities on the part of the Bureau. He obviously was fishing. I told him that was something they would have to decide upon themselves.

Mr. Belmont was telephonically advised of this conversation and a copy of this memorandum is being routed to him for his information.

FRANK and HARRY RAYMOND, CHARTIN, KAPLAN, KESSIER and KEPPIER. • You will no doubt be interested in information concerning Gold who has been identified as the individual who received atomic information from Dr. Emil Julius Klaus Fuchs in the United States for transmittal to the Soviet Union.

Harry Gold was born December 12, 1910, in Switzerland. 1914, he came to the United States with his parents, Sem and Celia Golodnitaky, both of whom were born in Russia. At the time of their naturalization as United States citizens, their name was changed to Gold. Harry Gold claims citizenship by derivation through his parents. His mother is deceased. Harry Gold resides with his father and his brother, Joseph Gold, at 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Shortly after arriving in the United States, the Gold family moved to Philadelphia where, in 1929, Harry Gold became employed by the Fennsylvania Sugar Company in their laboratories. He continued his employment with this company until about February, 1946, at which time he became employed with A. Brothman Associates, Consulting Engineers, New York City. He left this firm in June, 1948. He presently is employed at the Fhiladelphia General Hospital and is a Civil Service employee of Philadelphia, Fennsylvania. At the hospital he is engaged in the laboratory doing research in connection with serious cardiac cases. COPIES DESTROYED

Gold first came to the attention of this Bureau in connection with the activities of Abraham Brothman, concerning whom Elizabeth T. Bentley furnished information. In a signed statement dated November 30, 1945, Bentley advised that in about May, 1940, she was introduced to Brothman, whose photograph she identified, by Jacob Golos, her Soviet espionage superior. She stated that Golos told her that Brothman would furnish her with certain blueprints. Following that she met with Brothman about ten times in the Summer of 1940 until the Fall of that year, and obtained blueprints from him for Golos. She said that in the Fall of 1940, Golos claimed to have become disgusted with Brothman and told her he was turning Brothman over to someone else.

As a result of this information, an investigation of Brothman was conducted, which resulted in an interview of Brothman on May 29, 1947. At first Brothman denied recognizing the name or photograph of Colos. Upon being shown a photograph of Bentley, which he identified as a person whom he knew as "Helen," he then admitted that he did recognize the photograph of Colos.

Brothman related that some time in 1938 or 1939 Golos had come to his office at 114 East 32nd Street, New York City, and advised Brothman that he had contacts with the Russian Government, by reason of which he was in a position to obtain contracts from that government for Brothman if Brothman would turn over to him blueprints of certain products on which Brothman was working at the time. Brothman advised that the blueprints in question were his own property. He said Golos visited his office on several occasions thereafter until Golos introduced him to "Helen." Golos advised that "Helen" would thereafter obtain the blueprints. "Helen" visited Brothman's office over a dozen times during 1938, 1939, and 1940. Some time in 1940, she stopped coming and another individual named Harry Gold appeared at Brothman's office and said that he represented Golos. Gold visited Brothman's office on a number of occasions during 1940 and 1941, and obtained blueprints from Brothman. He said the last time Gold picked up the blueprints, according to the best of his recollection, was late in 1941 or early 1942. He was emphatic in stating that Gold was the last individual to pick up any blueprints or material for Golos. He stated that Harry Gold was, at the time of the interview, namely May 29, 1947, employed by him as a chemist in his laboratory at Elmhurst, Long Island. A signed statement to this effect was obtained from Brothman.

Upon receiving the information about Gold from Brothman, Gold was interviewed the same day at A. Brothman Arsociates Laboratory, 8503 - 57th Avenue, Elmhurst, Long Island. Gold related in substance that he had met Jacob Golos in October, 1940, at a meeting of the American Chemical Lociety at the Franklin Institute, Philadelphia. At this time, Golos propositioned

Gold, saying that he had connections with individuals in a foreign country, not naming the country, and also had connections with Abraham Brothman in New York who was turning over certain blueprints. Golos told Gold that he required the services of a chemist to go to New York City, obtain the blueprints from Brothman, and then evaluate them on a chemical basis. Gold stated that about two weeks after this, in November, 1940, he contacted Brothman in New York City and introduced himself as a representative of Golos. For the next mix months he made visits to New York City on the average of every three weeks to obtain blueprints from Brothman. He said that during this period he received four or five telephone calls from Golos, who always stated that they would have to get together very soon, but that actually this never happened. He said the last telephone cell from Golos was in May, 1941, after which time he had no further word from Golos. He denied that he ever had seen Golos except on the occasion when he met him in October, 1940. Gold claimed that after his second or third trip to New York City, Brothman became friendly and exhibited an interest in Gold's career as a chemist. He said that ever since that time, Brothman had been interested in having Gold join Brothman's organization, but that it was not until February, 1946, that he could see his way clear to accept such employment, which he did at that time. Gold denied any financial agreement with Golos, and claimed he never received a cent from Golos. He insisted that he stood the expenses for the trips to New York City on the first two occasions, after which Brothman became friendly and furnished him a five-dollar bill to cover expenses. A signed statement to this effect was obtained from Gold.

On July 22 and 31, 1947, Abraham Brothman and Harry Gold, respectively, were called before the Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York. Both testified in substance before this Grand Jury to that which they had furnished on interview. The investigation of the Grand Jury concerning the charges of Elizabeth T. Bentley sulminated in the finding of a "no bill."

After extensive and intensive investigation which developed information indicating that Harry Gold was very probably the United States contact of Emil Julius Klaus Fuchs, he was interviewed at Fhiladelphia, Pennsylvania, and on May 22, 1950, he furnished a signed statement admitting espionage activity. He admitted that he began the procurement of industrial information for the Soviet Union in the Fall of 1936, and continued this activity University in Fincinnati, Ohio.

Gold advised that very early in 1944, his then superior made arrangements for him to meet Dr. Klaus Fuchs in New York City. This first meeting occurred on a Saturday afternoon in February or March, 1944, on the East Side of Manhattan, from where they took a cab uptown to a restaurar'

around Third Avenue in the 50's, possibly Manny Wolf's Restaurant. Following the dinner they walked about and completed arrangements for further meetings. Gold recalled the arrangements for actual recognition to be that he was to carry a pair of gloves in one hand, plus a greento be that he was to carry a pair of gloves in one hand, plus a greento because book, while Fuchs was to carry a handball. In connection with the current interview of Fuchs in London by representatives of this bureau, still and movie photographs of Gold were surreptitiously obtained for display to Fuchs. Previously, Fuchs and Robert and Kristel Heineman had failed to recognize a photograph of Gold. On May 20, 1950, Fuchs was shown the new still photographs of Gold and he did not identify them, though he stated he could not reject them.

On May 22, 1950, Fuchs viewed three repeat showings of the moving pictures of Gold, after which he stated that Gold was very likely his contact in the United States. It is most interesting to note that this information was received by cable at 11:08 A.M., while Gold had first admitted his espionage activity to the interviewing agents in Philadelphia at approximately 10:45 A. M. the same day.

On May 23, 1950, a complaint was filed before a United States Commissioner for the Eastern District of New York, Brooklyn, New York, charging Harry Gold and "John" Doe with conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics in violation of Section 32, Title 50, United States Code. A warrant was issued and Gold was thereupon taken before United States District Judge James P. McGranery at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for arraignment. Judge McGranery gave Gold the complaint to read and he admitted that he was the Harry Gold named in the complaint. A preliminary hearing was set for June 12, 1950, and bail was set at one hundred thousand dollars, in default of which Gold was remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

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make the following voluntary statement to Richard E. Brennan and T. Scott Miller, Jr., who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. No threats or promises have been made me and I realize that any statement I make may be used against me in a court of law. I have been advised that I may secure the services of an attorney.

"In the summer of 1936 I made several inquiries concerning the Communist Party of the United States. At this time I was employed as a chemist by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company of 1037 North Delaware Avenue, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

"In the fall of 1936 I was visited at my home by a man who identified himself as Paul Amith. He said that he understood that I was a chemist and he thought that possibly I might be interested in aiding in the procurement of industrial information for the Soviet Union. This began a period of industrial espionage on my part which lasted until 1943. My association with Smith was of relatively short duration during which time I furnished him with some data concerning processes that were being worked on in the laboratory of the Permsylvania Sugar Company and subsidiaries."
This data was as complete and factual as I could make it.

by two men, one of whom identified themselves as Fred, who had a pronounced Russian accent.

"In the early summer of 1938, the possibilities of Pennsylvania Sugar Company had pretty well petered out and I was several times pressed to try and obtain other sources of information. By this I mean people who could furnish us with technical data. However, in my circle of friends there were none who were even the remotest likely candidate and so I did nothing. This led to a break of over two years during which time I attended a college in Cincinnati. I graduated in 1940.

On my return to Philadelphia I was again dontacted by the people with whom I had worked before. I was called so the phone in Utily, 1940 and I went downtown to see this man who turned out to be Jacob tolog.

(Signed by Karth Gold) dated 5/22/50 and witnessed by Agents Brennan and Hiller)

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"He again pressed me to continue the work which I had done previously and I agreed, however, it was pretty sporadic in nature and with the exception of the one contact that he gave me, Abraham rothman, nothing much came of it. I was supposed to get information of a technical nature from Brothman but very little came of that, simply because he was extremely unreliable in getting material together. He gave me some data on mixing equipment which was practically all his design and it seems to me that practically everything he gave me at any time was his own invention or design. Brothman kept pressing me on several occasions and wanted to know about the possibility of his doing consulting work for the Seviet Union on an open basis as a private individual and they acting as representatives of their government to this company and whenever I mentioned it to the people with whom I was in touch, they discounted the idea and wouldn't listen to it at all.

"I never told Brothman of my association with the Soviet Union but I think that he suspected it because of the way that I operated—I introduced myself by another name.

shortly by a man called Sam about the end of 1940. It was with Sam that my association continued uninterruptedly as a contact. I used to meet Sam almost always in New York, sometimes very rarely he would come to Philadelphia but usually it was in New York, usually on a street corner that we met. Normally we went for a walk. Sometimes but rarely we had something to eat. Sam did not have a Russian accent but I had an idea he was a Russian.

"Shortly after I met Sam he told me that there was not much purpose to continuing this work in general and that the best thing I could do would be to forget about it and this state continued from late 1940 until the fall of 1941 after Russia was attacked by Germany. Then Sam called me up. I met him and he told me that we had to begin an intensive campaign for obtaining information for the Soviet Union. This happened about a couple of months after Russia was attacked by Germany. At that time I made a half dozen trips to upper New York State, namely, Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo. I was to transmit information—I acted as a go-between.

"What I did on each of these occasions was to obtain information from someone that I did not know but who was, I am pretty sure, an American, a native, and I gave it over to Sam, or sometimes not to Sam but to someone who I didn't know by name or anything. I just got it and either I received material whose nature I did not know except that they were very bulky packets and in a matter of hours or sometimes even minutes I turned it over to a third person, sometimes Sam. There was one man that I saw twice in Rochester.

wone man that I saw twice in Buffalo, and there were two others that I saw once, and I got the definite impression in each case that they were native Americans. Sometimes I traveled with the information from one city to the adjacent one, that is, say, from Rochester to Buffalo before turning it over.

"In very early 1944, I was told by Sam that I was to undertake an extremely important effort. This was to be work of so critical a nature that I was to think twice and three times before I ever spoke a word concerning it to anyone or before I made a move (at this point are inserted in Gold's handwriting the words "that is" and his initials "HG") before I spoke to anyone concerned in it. He didn't elaborate on what the nature of the work actually was, but he gave me the details of an arrangement whereby I met Dr. Klaus Fuchs. This meeting took place on the East Side of New York on a Saturday. As I recall, the arrangements for actual recognition included the fact that I was to carry a pair of gloves in one hand plus a green covered book and Dr. Fuchs was to carry a handball in one hand. I cannot recall whether Sam gave me Dr. Fuchs' name. He may have. In any event we met in, I believe, late February or early March of 1944. I introduced myself to him as Raymond. He never used the name. He knew it was a phoney. He introduced himself to me as Klaus Fuchs. We went for a brief walk and then took a cab uptown to a restaurant around Third Avenue in the 50's, where we had dinner but we didn't speak much there. Afterwards we went for a walk during which we completed arrangements for further meetings. Among these arrangements were:

- "l. We were to be extremely careful and never meet in a restaurant again.
- *2. We were only to meet for as brief a period as was necessary to complete whatever we had to do.
- *3. Each meeting included complete arrangements for further meetings and provisions were made for alternate dates and places but we were never to meet in the same place twice.

"He told me during the first and second meetings that he was with the British Mission working with the Manhattan Engineer Project. He also explained to me the manpower set-up of the British group as he kmew it. He told me that they were working on the separation of isotopes, and it seems to me that there was at least employed (at this point the word "employed" is crossed out and written above it in long-hand with the initials "HG" is the word "implied) the eventual utilization of the energy produced by nuclear fission in the form of a weapon. One thing he told me on many occasions was that they worked in extremely tight compartments and that one group did not know what the other group was doing. This I can verify by the fact that he told me that he thought that there was a possibility of a large-scale installation for isotype separation projected for future development somewhere, he thought down in Georgia or Alabama. This, of course, later turned out to be Oak Ridge.

"The second meeting with Fuchs consisted of an amplification of our arrangements for meeting and a description by Fuchs of the physical and personnel setup of the canhattan Engineer Project.

This meeting was in New York.

"During these first two meetings neither Dr. Fuchs nor I made any direct reference to his supplying me with information, but it was more or less mutually understood that he was to supply me with information from the work he was doing.

"The second meeting took place with Fuchs a few weeks following the first one somewhere in upper Manhattan. Successive meetings took place in a number of widely separated localities, including the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan and Queens. There were, in all, until the Summer of 1944 a total of in the neighborhood of five meetings, on at least two of which occasions I obtained from Dr. Fuchs information. This consisted of a number of folded sheets of paper containing (during one brief glance that I took on one occasion) mathematical equations which seemed to concern mathematical derivations. This data I turned over to I believe, Sam's successor, John.

"I would like to add that Sam was succeeded by a man named John shortly after I met Dr. Fuchs. I do not believe that he ever turned any information over to Sam.

"On the occasions when I turned over information which I had obtained from Dr. Fuchs the time interval involved was very short by which I mean a half hour at the most.

(Signed by Harry Gold, May 22, 1950) (Witnessed by Agents Brennan and Miller)

"The exact dates that the information was given to me in New York by Dr. Fuchs I cannot accurately say except that they were probably between April and June or July of 1944. In August of 1944 Dr. > Fuchs failed to show up for his scheduled meeting. This was to be in the vicinity of a movie theater near the Eastern Parkway in Brooklyn. He did not show up for the alternate appointment and I had no means of telling where he had gone though he had mentioned that he was due to leave for another location. The only information he had was that he thought it was somewhere in Mexico not New Mexico. John then obtained the information whereby he was once more enabled to get in touch with Dr. Fuchs. He gave me the address of a Mrs. Heinemann in Cambridge, Massachusetts, who is I believe Dr. Fuchs' sister. I went to see her in September of 1944. The family was away on vacation. I did see her the second time that I went to Cambridge which was in the Fall of 1944. I told her that I was a friend of Dr. Fuchs; that I had met him in New York; that I happened to be passing through Boston on business and I just wondered if she knew where Klaus was. I used here the same name that I had used on meeting Klaus which was Raymond. She told me that Klaus was due about Christmas time, was very fond of Mrs. Heinemann's children and he had written her that he would be coming home about that time. She did not say where he was except that it was somewhere out West. So I left an envelope containing a name and telephone number in Manhattan. This name I think may have contained a first name NJerome" or at least a name with a "J" and was somewhat similar to Keplun (phonetic). This is not the name. About all that I can say about it is that it evokes a femiliar sound -- a femiliar memory chord.

"Early in 1945, John got in touch with me and said that we had heard from Dr. Fuchs. I went up to Cambridge and saw Klaus there. He told me that he was working at a place called Los Alamos in New Mexico, he said some distance from Santa Fe. He also gave me written information at that time and we made an arrangement to meet in June of that year in Santa Fe. This meeting took place in the home of Mrs. Heinemann in Cambridge, Massachusetts, but she was not present at the time of our conversation. The whole meeting was of very brief duration. Before I met Dr. Fuchs on this occasion I was given a sum of approximately \$1500 as I recall to offer to Dr. Fuchs should he need it. I was told to be very diplomatic about this matter so as not to offend him. He turned it down cold. He turned down cold even my tentative offer so that when I returned to New York I gave the money back to John, along with the information,

"During my vacation in June of 1945, I went to Santa Fe, via Albuquerque and met Dr. Fuchs there. He gave me another set of data and we agreed to meet again in late September of the same year in Santa Fe. I took this information back with me to New York and gave it to John. Our conversation there was extremely brief and even there, as when he worked in New York, he was dubious about the possibilities for any real and immediate utilization of atomic energy in the form of a weapon. I do not ? exactly recall the circumstances under which I turned this information over to John in New York. I traveled to Albuquerque on this first meeting via train to Chicago then by train to Albuquerque, and finally by bus to Santa Fe. My meeting with Dr. Fuchs was on Saturday afternoon. Then I returned from Santa Fe to Albuquerque by bus on the same day. As I recall, I slept in the hallway of a rooming house where those who were unable to obtain hotel accommodations were bedded. I returned the following day from Albuquerque to Chicago and then via Chicago by plane to either New York or Washington and then by train to Philadelphia. This jumbled up method of travel was necessitated by the traveling conditions at that time.

where I would like to make the following statement: All of the expenses involved in any of the work that I did were paid for by me entirely out of my own funds. Immediately upon my return to New York, I turned over the information which Fuchs had given me to John. The next meeting with Dr. Fuchs took place in late September, 1945. I again met him in Santa Fe, this time on the outskirts. He had a car, a rather dilapidated affair, which he had borrowed, and we conducted all of our conversation in it. He gave me some information again. Also, he told me he had been present at the initial large-scale trial of nuclear fission at Alamogordo in New Mexico, and also described to me the tremendous wonderment that had descended upon even those who had the most intimate knowledge of the potentialities of the weapon—most especially on the occasion of the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima. It is my best understanding that he was actually present with the group or certainly near the group that set off the trial bomb at Alamogordo.

*Dr. Fuchs told me also at that time that he would probably return to England soon but that by paying a call to his sister, I could ascertain just when. This statement may not be completely accurate in this sense since it also seems to me that he gave a definite time, about Christmas week of 1945 when he expected to again be in Cambridge.

morning plane from Albuquerque to Kansas City. There, I had to transfer to a train which took me to Chicago and I went from Chicago by way of New York Central to New York. From New York I went to Fhiladelphia and not more than several days later turned over the information that Dr. Fuchs had given me to John in New York City. To the best of my recollection, it was out beyond Jackson Heights somewhere in Queens where I turned this information over to John.

There again, I would like to repeat what I previously said, that this jumbled up method of travel was necessitated by the lack of facilities at that time and heavy travel at that time and was not intended as a means of throwing anyone off my trail.

"This was the last time that I saw Dr. Fuchs or obtained information from him.

home of his sister. This effort was not successful in that he was still in New Mexico. After the possible second attempt which was in either late January or early February, 1946, my scheduled appointment to report to John did not take place. This was to be at the Farle Theater in the Bronx, New York. I never saw or heard from John again.

"In summary, to the best of my recollection, Dr. Fuchs gave me information on five occasions. Two times, in New York in the Spring and Summer of 1944, once in Cambridge in very early 1945, probably January end twice in Santa Fe, the first time in June, the second time in late September, both 1945. On each occasion I subsequently turned this information over to John. It is possible although he doubted it, that Sam received from me the first information which he had obtained from Dr. Fuchs.

During my association with Dr. Fuchs, Sam and John, I fully realized that the information which Dr. Fuchs was supplying me and which I turned over to Sam or John was for the benefit of the Soviet Union. I also surmised that the information concerned the operation of icotopes and the

(Signed by Harry Gold, May 22, 1950) (Witnessed by Agents Brennan and Miller) subsequent nuclear fission to release tremendous amounts of energy even in the form of a weapon.

I began the work of industrial spying for the Soviet Union in 1936 with the full realization of what I was doing. I thought that I would be helping a nation whose final aims I approved, along the road to industrial strength. Particularly was I taken with the idea that whatever I did would go to help make living conditions far more advanced along the road as we know them here in the United States. To amplify, I felt that the industrial setup of a nation which had only very recently begun to get any kind of a basic industry go, was so far inferior to what existed in other countries that anything that I could do would be helpful.

Sometimes I was struck by doubt twofold in nature:

Number one - especially early in my association from 1936 to 1938 it seemed that the information I was turning over was exceedingly non-utilitarian but I was always assured that it was well received.

Second, the one fear that troubled me during the entire time from 1936 on was the possibility that in the event of exposure, my family, which had no idea, not even the very slightest, of the work I was engaging in, would be completely and horribly disgraced.

This affair grew, and as I imagine is the case with dealings of such a nature, I got so involved that even had I wanted to, it would have been extremely difficult to get out. However, I would like to qualify this last statement by saying, while on several occasions I did desire to once and for all stop doing this work, that I never once actually suggested it to any of the people with whom I worked. The longest break in all this time was the two-year period when I went to school in Cincinnati, 1938 to 1940.

My reaction to the work that I did with Dr. Fuchs was twofold in nature. On the one hand I felt that as an ally I was only helping the Soviet Union obtain information that I thought it was entitled to. I was troubled even by this but I persistently put any thoughts out of my mind and as I have previously said, I was in so deep that I was, to a certain extent bewildered and didn't know what to do. Actually the realization that I was turning over information to another power concerning a weapon was so frightening that the only thing I could do was to shove it away as far back in my mind as I could and simply not to think on the matter at all.

To amplify somewhat, what I did experience during the period when I actually had to plan to meet Dr. Fuchs or to transmit what he gave me to

John, was to simply block out of my mind as well as I could any thought whatever on the subject. I hope, as many people do, that atomic energy would never again be employed as a weapon. I would like to state that so far I succeeded in keeping this whole matter from my thought, that some of the fears I have just stated are more or less recent in the sense that I only recently gave them complete formulation.

I would like now to make as absolute a statement as possible concerning the following:

Neither my mother, father, nor brother ever had the slightest inkling that I was ever engaged in any work of such a nature, either industrial espionage or the latter affair with Dr. Fuchs. This represented a considerable strain to keep concealed from them over so long a period but I did succeed by one means or another and even as of this minute they have not the vaguest idea what went on. The same applied to any people that I have known, and been intimate with, and have worked side by side with, and have been close friends with, over the period of the last fourteen years. This particularly applies to people with whom I worked either in industrial laboratories or more recently, in medical research.

The one possible exception to the above is my former employer and acquaintance, Abraham Brothman, and while I surmised that he suspected that I had given industrial processes to the Soviet Union, still he had not the slightest idea of my work with Dr. Fuchs.

I read the above typewritten statement consisting of five pages and have initialed each page and all corrections thereon inasmuch as all my statements are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.





ON MAY TWENTYTHREE HE CALLED SA WILLIAM J. MC CARTHY, JR. OF THIS OFFICE AND ADVISED THAT HE NOW FEELS THAT HE SAW HARRY GOLD IN THE OFFICE OF JACOB GOLOS ONCE OR TWICE. HE CANNOT PLACE THE TIME, BUT FEELS IT WAS EITHER DUBING NINETEEN THIRTYEIGHT

DASH THIRTYNINE WHEN HE, BUDENCE AND WAS WORKING WITH THE SOVIET POLICE OR DURING NINETEEN

COPIES PORTYTHREE WHEN GOLOS WAS IN CONTACT WITH BUDENZ FOR ESPIONAGE WORK.

BUDENZ STATED THAT HE WAS NOT INTRODUCED TO GOLD. BUDENZ BELIEVES THAT GOLD WAS PROBABLY IN AN ADJOINING ROOM TO THE ONE WHERE BUDENZ

AND GOLOS CONFERRED AND BUDENZ COULD SEE GOLD. BUDENZ WAS OF THE OPINION THAT GOLOS OFFICE CONSISTED OF TWO OR THREE ROOMS. BUDENZ ADDED THAT GOLOS OFFICE WAS LOCATED ABOVE THE GROUND FLOOR OF THE FLATIRON BUILDING, NINE FOUR NINE BROADWAY. THE OFFICE WAS THAT OF WORLD TOURISTS. BUDENZ STATED THAT HE COULD NOT RECALL WHO WAS PRESENT WHEN HE TALKED WITH GOLOS AND SAW GOLD. HE BELIEVED THAT THERE WERE OTHER PEOPLE IN THE OFFICE, SINCE GOLOS HAD A COUPLE OF WOMEN, WHOSE NAMES HE CANNOT RECALL, WORKING FOR HIM. BUDENZ STATED HE SAW MANY PEOPLE IN GOLOS OFFICE AND WAS NEVER INTRODUCED TO ANYONE EXCEPT ROBERTS, WHO WAS CONNECTED WITH THE SOVIET SECRET POLICE AND WAS BUDENZ PRINCIPAL. THIS INTRODUCTION TOOK PLACE AROUND NINETEEN THIRTY-EIGHT AND ONLY ROBERTS, GOLOS AND BUDENZ WERE PRESENT IN THE OFFICE. BUDENZ STILL FEELS THAT HE MAY HAVE SEEN GOLD AT AN ENLARGED NATIONAL COMMITTEE MEETING, BUT HE CANNOT PLACE THE DATE, TIME OR CIRCUMSTANCES. SINCE HARRY GOLD HAS STATED THAT HE FIRST MET JACOB GOLOS IN NINETEEN FORTY, THIS WOULD PRECLUDE BUDENZ HAVING SEEN GOLD PRIOR TO THAT TIME, IF WHAT GOLD SAYS IS TRUE. IT IS ALSO FELT THAT GOLD DOES NOT HAVE SUCH AN UNCOMMON FACE, AND THAT HE COULD BE READILY RECOGNIZED, AND IT MAY BE THAT BUDENZ IS MISTAKING GOLD FOR SOMEONE ELSE.

Continuing the activity in instant case relative to Harry Gold. SAC Cornelius called from Philadelphia at 8:40 P.M. on May 2 to request that we return some of the photographs of Gold to him inasmuch as all photographs had been sent to the Bureau.

Arrangements have been made to send some of the photographs

back.

At 9:10 P.M. Mr. Cornelius advised that the brother of Harry Gold, Joseph, was in the office talking to subject Gold. The two interviewing Agents and an Agent from the Philadelphia Office were in with them. After hearing part of the story, Joseph remarked to his brother, Harry, that the Navy could not possibly keep him in his job now so Joseph would be bound to lose his job. There was a brief discussion about an attorney but naither brother seemed to want one, rather the question was left in the air.

At 11:30 P.W. Mr. Cornelius advised that Joseph Gold had called his father and told him that the FBI wanted to talk to Harry regarding the Brothman Laboratory and that his father should not worry. There was further discussion between the two brothers regarding an attorney. SAC Cornelius and the Agents conducting the interview advised the brothers that they could make no recommendations, that the matter of an attorney was entirely up to them. Harry Gold stated he wanted to make a clean breast of this matter and did not want an attorney to tell him to keep quiet; that the only reason he would want an attorney was to protect his brother and father as they had no part in this matter. Joseph Gold advised he would not contact anyone tonight and requested permission to come back at 2:00 P.M., May 23, to again see Harry Gold. He was advised that he should feel free to come back.

SAC Cornelius advised that Robert Heineman viewed Harry Gold through a two-way mirror and stated that Gold was of the same build and general appearance as the unknown chemist but he could not say whether he was the same individual. Heineman was very nervous. Heineman was taken into the room and he spoke to Gold. Gold said he recognized Heineman. However, Heineman refused to state that he recognized Gold. Heineman is staying in Philadelphia overnight with his attorney and will probably return to Boston on May 23. He is highly nervous and probably will be useless as a witness. Classified by 30(2 PW)

I requested Mr. Cornelius to furnish us with the background as to various addresses used by Gold on the morning of the 23rd in order that we could eliminate the numerous Gold names in the Bureau files. It is noted that we have several hundred references that we have not been able to identify or eliminate.

Mr. Cornelius was asked to have the Agents interviewing Gold tie him down as to the specific dates, times and places where he received and passed on material. The purpose of this is to enable us to see where the best case can be built up against Gold and we need specific details to determine this, and for the various counts in the possible indictment. I told Mr. Cornelius that an analysis was being made of this question and we would like to have the details on the morning of May 23.

As of midnight Gold was being taken to his hotel at the Benjamin Franklin where a suite has been reserved. Four Agents are staying with him, two of whom will stay awake all night while the two Agents who have conducted the interview will sleep.

ACTION:

For your information the New York Office under Ruman instructions took all photographs of the Philadelphia last night in order that photographs might be displayed to Gold for identification of his superiors; 1113

SAC Cornelius called Albany and Buffalo last night to get such additional photographs as they might have of subjects, particularly those working in plants and with whom Gold might have dealt as he was active, according to his statement, in the vicinity of Syracuse and Buffalo.

A cable was sent to London furnishing the pertinent parts of Gold's confession to assist in the interview with Fuchs and to clear up any discrepancies between the stories of Fuchs and Gold.

The additional motion picture film and still photographs taken by Philadelphia with Gold's permission are being forwarded through the pilot of an American Overseas Airlines at 3:00 P.M. on the afternoon of May 23, and the plane will be met by Mr. Cimperman at 9:45 A.M. on May 24. This is an excellent film.

HCUA, Army, Navy and State Department files are being checked for any reference to Gold, as are Manhattan Engineering District records.



SCONEIDENTIAL

On the night of May 22, the New York Office was instructed to carry the ball on interviews with all former espionage agents active during the period of Gold's activities. This would include persons such as Feldman and Sabatini. New York was instructed to set out leads such as Feldman and Sabatini. New York was instructed to set out leads for immediate interviews with these people and to include everyone who might be of assistance to us.

This case is being followed very closely.



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For attempts to, or sids or induces another to, communicate, deliver, or transmit, to any foreign government, or to any faction or party or military or naval force within a foreign country, whether recognised or unrecognised by the United States, or to any representative, officer, agent, employee, subject, or citizen thereof, either directly or indirectly, any document, writing, code book, signal book, sketch, photograph, photographic negative, blueprint, plan, map, model, note, instrument, appliance, or information relating to the national defense, shall be punished by imprisonment for not more than twenty years: PROVIDED, That whoever shall violate the provisions of this subsection in time of war shall be punished by death or by imprisonment for not more than thirty years."

Title 50, Section 34, U. S. Code (Now Title 18, Section 794 and Section 2388)

"If two or more persons conspire to violate the provisions of sections 32 or 33 of this title, and one or more of such persons does any act to effect the object of the conspiracy, each of the perties to such conspiracy shall be punished as in said sections provided in the case of the doing of the act the accomplishment of which is the object of such conspiracy. IL STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS

Title 18, Section 581 (a), U. S. Code (Now Title 18, Section 3281)

TIT. PROSECUTIVE ACTION AIREADY TAKEN

A complaint was filed by an Agent of the FBI, May 23, 1950, before a United States Commissioner for the Eastern District of New York, at Brooklyn, New York, charging Harry Gold and "John" Doe with conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics in violation of Title 50, Section 32 (a), United States Code. A warrant was issued and Gold was taken before United States District Judge James P. McGranery at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on the same date, for arraignment. Judge McGranery allowed Gold to read the complaint and he admitted that he was the Harry Cold named in the complaint. Bail was set at \$100,000 and the preliminary hearing was set for June 12, 1950. Gold was not able to meet the bond and was, therefore, remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal. U

IV. WITHFSSES

1. Appropriate Official, United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C.

Will testify that Dr. Elaus Fuchs was associated with the Manhattan Engineering District, United States War Department, during his stay in the United States, and that Fuchs was brought to this country to engage in atomic energy work, and that during his stay here he was so engaged. U

Appropriate Official, United States Atomic Energy Commission

Can testify that Fuchs had access to top secret information regarding the use of atomic energy of all various atomic processes including the use of nuclear fission, and that the information available to Fuchs could be utilized in the making and the exploding of an atomic bomb. This official can testify that Puchs was employed by the Atomic Energy Commission at Los Alamos, New Mexico, in the Theoretical Physics Division of the laboratory and resided in Room 17, Dormitory 7-102, and that Fuchs arrived at Los Alamos, August 14, 1944, and departed permanently therefrom, June 16, 1946. W

This official can further testify that according to the Atomic Energy Commission records at Los Alamos, Hew Yexico, Puchs left Los Alamos, February 11, 1945, on a trip and returned on February 25, 1945. The records reflect that Fuchs could be reached during this trip c/o Mrs. Heineman, 114 Lake View Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts, February 13 to February 22, 1945. The records further reflect that on his return to Los Alamos, February 25, 1945, Fuchs stated that there had been no deviation from his previous itinerary. W

Dr. Bail Julius Meus Fuchs

Dr. Fuchs, who was convicted of violation of the British Official Secrets Act in London, England, March 1, 1950, in that he had furnished information concerning atomic energy to Soviet agents, is presently confined to prison at Wormwood Scrubbs, England. Fuchs has identified Harry Gold as the person in the United States to whom he furnished atomic secrets in 19/,4 and 1945. W


Pirst Keeting

Fuchs has advised that his first meeting with Gold in the United States was probably about Christmas of 1943, which was one month after his arrival in the United States. This meeting occurred on Henry Street near Market Street on the lower East Side of Manhattan, New York City; that at the first meeting with Gold, Puchs carried a tennis ball to aid in the identification at this meeting. Gold did not give a name for himself, however, Fuchs told Gold his correct name. According to Fuchs, Gold expressed pleasure in being



chosen for such an important assignment. Atomic energy and the atomic bomb were mentioned by one of them, probably Fuchs. On this occasion they walked together for about twenty minutes.

With reference to the New York City meetings, other than the first one, Fuchs has been unable to specifically fix them in their chronological order. Fuchs has stated that there were a total of five meetings in New York City, though possibly one or two more. He recalled that meetings occurred on the street at the Queens Borough Bridge which they walked under on First Avenue during the contact. Fuchs recalled another meeting on the street near the entrance to the subway station, "Museum Stop, " Independent Subway Line, Central Park West, New York City. Fuchs recalled another meeting which occurred in the Bronx near a theatre, possibly on the Grand Concourse near 159th or 161st Street. He recalled another meeting having been arranged for Brooklyn, possibly near Boro Hall, shortly prior to the time that he left for Los Alamos, but the contact did not show up. Fuchs stated that at some meeting of which he is not sure; he explained to Gold the work of the British Mission assigned to the Manhattan Engineering District in New York, also, the physical and personnel set up concerned with gaseous diffusion and in the Kellex Company. 7

Puche has advised that in 1944, he gove the address of the sister, Kristel Heineman, to his American contact who was to call at the Heineman recidence to find out when fuchs would be coming there. He additted that he met the contect at the Reineman residence in February, 1945, at which time they discussed questions orally, though not in the presence of Kristel Reinsman. Fuchs maintains that he gave no written information to Gold at his sister's residence. At this meeting fold and Puchs made an appointment for another meeting a day or two later on a street in Buston near the river and probably near North Station. Rith the aid of a map, Fuchs placed this meeting as arranged to take place on Portland Street, below the Borth Station, Boston, Massermeetts. Fuchs claims that in the interin between the meeting in the Heineman residence and the appointment to meet in sosten a day or two later, he wrote ensuers to the questions received orally at the Heineman home and subsequently kept the eccond meeting in Soston, at which time he delivered the answers to Cold. Fuchs recalls that he gave Gold about six handwritten pages, including mostly what the known to him concerning emplosion; also facts concerning the type of high explosive for compression was considered but not finally decided upon; also the differences between sultiple high detenation, on which problem Fuchs was subsequently working. Fuchs states that this report was written in language that a physicist would understand and that he feels sure would not be understood by Gold. Fuolis believes that at either this meeting or the next one he furnished to sold the dirensions of high explosive. U

richs has advised hr. Michael t. Perrin, referred to above, that in February, 1945, in Poston, Massachusetts, he wrote & report covering acverol pages summarizing the whole problem of making an atomic bomb as he then saw it. This report included a statement




of the special difficulties that would have to be overcome in making a plutonium bomb. Fuchs reported the highly spontaneous fission rate of plutonium and the deduction that a plutonium bomb would have to be detenated by using the emplosion method rather than the relatively simple gun method which could be used with U-235. He also reported that the critical mass for plutonium was less than that for U-235 and that about 5 to 15 kilograms would be necessary for a bomb. At this time the issue was not clear as to whether uniform compression of the core could be better obtained with a highly explosive lens system, or with multiple detonation over the surface of a uniform sphere of high explosives. He reported the current ideas as to the need for an initiator, though these, at the time, were very vagua, and it was thought that a constant neutron source might be sufficient Finally, when he wrote his report in February, 1945, he referred only to the hollow plutonium core for the atomic bomb as he did not then know anything about the possibility of a solid core. U.

Santa Fe, New Wexico

First Meeting

Fuchs stated that he met his Soviet contact in Santa Fe, New Mexico in June, 1945. He stated that the meeting was held on a quiet street along the river and subsequently identified the locality as being on the North bank of the Santa Fe River on Alameda Street between Castillo and Delgado Streets. Fuchs picked up Gold in his ear, after which they drove across the river, turned down a lane, and stopped at a gate in a deserted spot. Fuchs advised that on this occasion he brought his contact up to date on all information he possessed. He said that at that time he knew about the test explosion scheduled in July, and that he discussed the detonation plans by emplosion. We

He identified the place of this meeting as being between testington Avenue, just below Karney Street, from which point they proceeded to Hishop's lodge fload. He stated that he turned over to the contact information in the form of handwritten or typowritten notes.

During the latter period at Los Alamos, or perhaps some time after his return to the United Kingdom he, Fucha, had given his contact some general information about the possibility of developing a "mixed" both. The above-mentioned agents interviewed Harry Gold on the following dates:

May 15, 1950 - This interview was discontinued when it was necessary for Gold to return to the hospital where his job required constant attention. Accordingly, for his convenience, arrangements were made to continue the interview on the evening of Eay 19, 1950. The interview of Harry Gold was resumed May 19, 1950, at the Philadelphi Office from 6:20 P.M. to 1:15 A.M., May 20, 1950. The interview was resumed May 20 at 6:05 P.M., but was limited inasmuch as Gold was fatigued. On Eay 21, 1950, Gold was reinterviewed from 3:30 P.M. until 7:20 P.M. On the morning of May 22, 1950, the interview of Gold was resumed and at 10:15 A.M., Gold stated that he had received information from Dr. Fuchs and executed a nine page signed statement with a tenth page added as an addendum, which is attached to this memorandum.

From the interviews conducted and the statement obtained, Special Agents Miller and Brennan cen testify to the following information admitted to them by Gold: (For the sake of clarity, the meetings of Gold and Fuchs will be set out according to the locality in which they occurred.)

New York City

First Meeting

Harry Gold advised that his first meeting with Fuchs occurred in New York City on a Saturday afternoon in February or Mach, 1944. They met on the east side of Manhattan, near a playground, from where they took a cab uptown to a restaurant on 3rd Avenue in the 50's, possibly Manny Wolf's Restaurant. Following the dinner they walked about and completed arrangements for further meetings. No written information was passed at this time, but Fuchs revealed that he was with the British Mission, working with the Manhattan Engineer Project, and told Gold that the British Mission was working on the separation of isotopes. W

Gold believes there was at least implied the eventual utilization of the energy produced by nuclear fission in the form of a weapon. Gold stated there was not a direct reference made by either Fuchs or himself about Fuchs furnishing information to Gold, though this was more or less mutually understood.

Second Neeting

Gold advised that his second meeting with Fuchs in New York City took place in March or April, 1944, approximately three weeks after the first meeting. According to Gold's recollection it took place in upper Manhattan on the east side and not in the Bronx. Gold stated that the second meeting with Fuchs consisted of emplification of their arrangements for meeting and an oral description by Fuchs of the physical and personnel setup of the Manhattan Engineer Project. Rowritten information was passed at this time and there was still no information by Fuchs.

Third Meeting

Gold advised that the third meeting which occurred in May, 1944, was in New York City though he could not recall in which borough it was held. He said he was given information by Fuchs on this occasion while they were going down a very dark street. This information was in the form of folded sheets of paper containing mathematical equations which seemed to concern mathematical derivations. Gold passed the package of folded papers to "John" about fifteen minutes later at a place within walking distance. He said these meetings with Fuchs and "John" were very short. W.

Pourth Meeting

Gold stated that the fourth meeting took place in late June or early July, 1944, in the Fronx, not too far from Fordham University. He stated he met Fuchs near a movie theater on the street and they walked with each other from 3/4ths of an hour to an hour. Gold stated that nothing written was passed on this occasion.

Gold stated that the fifth meeting occurred in late July, 1944, at which time he met Fuchs in Queens, Long Island, not far out, not as far as Jackson Heights. He went there by subway. On this occasion Fuchs gave him another package, which Gold believes he opened and saw that it contained what appeared to be mathematical equations. About an hour later Gold gave this package to "John", farther out in Queens. These meetings with Fuchs and "John" were very brief.

Gold advised that there was a meeting acheduled for August, 1944, but Fuchs did not show up. Since Fuchs did not show up for this meeting, Gold believes that he saw "John" about two or three weeks later and had a discussion as to what he should do about contacting Fuchs. "John" furnished Fuchs' address on 77th Street, possibly near Broadway. This meeting with "John" occurred in the neighborhood of Washington Square, Greenwich Village, Manhattan, Island, New York. Gold stated that he went to the address furnished by "John" and noticed the name "Dr. Maus Fuchs" on the mail box. Gold made inquiry at this address and was informed that Fuchs had left. Gold recontacted "John" on the same day at a meeting place, previously arranged, above Columbia University. Gold stated that he informed "John" of the negative results of his attempted contact with Fuchs and was advised by "John" to "sit tight."

Gold stated that a subsequent meeting was arranged with "John" and Gold was furnished with the address of Krs. Heineman, Cambridge, Massachusetts, on Lakeview Street or a name similar to that. Gold stated that he felt uneasy over this assignment as the Heinemans were total strangers. Gold stated that "John" told him to get out fast if Robert Heineman was there, but that he was to act naturally with Mrs. Heineman.

Boston - Cambridge, Massachusetts

Gold stated that as a result of instructions from "John", he went to Cambridge in late October or early November, 1944, and presented himself to krs. Heineman as a friend of Dr. Fuchs and inquired as to where Klaus could be located. Gold stated that krs. Heineman told him that Fuchs had been transferred to the southwest but was expected at her home at Christmas. At this time he left a note for Fuchs and he later told "John" of what hadhappened. During Christmas week, 1944, probably shortly after Christmas Day, Gold





returned to Carbridge, Fassachusetts and met Fuchs in Fuchs' room in the home of Krs. Heineman. This meeting between Gold and Fuchs lasted about twenty minutes. Frs. Heineman was there for a minute or two, according to Gold, but Fuchs suggested that she leave. On this occasion Fuchs told Gold that he was working at Los Alamos, New Fexico, a short distance from Santa Fe. Gold stated that Fuchs gave him written information at this time and that he offered Fuchs approximately \$1500, which Fuchs refused. At this time Gold made a date to see Fuchs at Santa Fe, New Mexico in June, 1945. Gold stated that he immediately returned to New York where he saw "John" on the same day and delivered the information. He could not recall where he met "John" on this occasion. U

Santa Pe, New Mexico

Mirst Meeting

Harry Gold advised that during his vacation in June, 1945, he went to Santa Fe, New Mexico, via Albuquerque, and met Iv. Fuchs. At Santa Fe Fuchs gave Gold another set of data. Gold and Fuchs agreed to meet again in late September of the same year in Santa Fe. Gold returned to New York City with this information and believes he gave the material to "John" in the vicinity of Ketropolitan Avenue, far out in Brooklyn. Gold said that he believes "John" took the material and arranged a meeting later that night in Brooklyn. Gold could not recall whether this second meeting was on a corner or at a bar. Gold stated that before he went on this trip to Santa Fe in June, 1945, he met "John" in a bar on 3rd Avenue, somewhere in the 40's, New York City. This meeting occurred a few days before Gold went to Santa Fe. Gold stated that the purpose of this meeting with "John" was, first: to make sure that Gold would go, and second: to make arrangements to meet "John" on Gold's return from Santa Fe. U

Second Meeting

Gold advised that he again met with Fuchs in Santa Fe, New Mexico in September, 1945, at which time Fuchs furnished him with further information. Gold advised that on the occasion of this meeting with Fuchs, Fuchs had a car which he had borrowed and all conversation was carried on in this car. Gold stated that Fuchs told him that he, Fuchs, had been present at the initial large-scale trial of nuclear fission at Alamogordo, New Mexico. Gold believed that Fuchs was actually present with the group or U



certainly near the group that set off the trial bomb at Alamogordo. Gold stated that he returned from Santa Fe, New Hexico via Chicago, where he stopped at the Palmer House Hotel and registered. Gold stated that he believes he brought the material he received from Puchs directly to Fhiladelphia and kept it in his possession for a couple of days before meeting with "John" out beyond Jackson Heights in New York City. Gold turned the material over to "John." Gold stated that no definite arrangements were made with Fuchs at Santa Fe for an additional meeting, and that Fuchs told him that he believed he would return to England shortly. According to Gold, Fuchs stated that he could inquire of Fuchs' sister, Mrs. Heineman, regarding his location.

near the St. George Hotel in Brooklyn, New York sometime before the first of the year, 1946. Gold said that "John" was very apprehensive and told Gold that they had to be very careful. Gold stated that "John" made a couple of additional appointments with him, one in Jamaica and the other at the Earle Theater, New York City. W

7. Kristel Fuchs Heineman, aka., Mrs. Robert Block Heineman, sieter of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, 94 Lakeview Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts

According to medical authorities in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Kristel Fuchs Heineman, as of May 25, 1950, was undergoing "shock treatments" and was completely hallucinated. She has also been recently confined as a mental patient in the Westboro Hospital, Westboro, Massachusetts. U

On February 2, 1950, Kristel Heineman was interviewed at the Westboro State Hospital, after Agents obtained the permission of the authorities, at which time she admitted that approximately two or three weeks before her brother visited her on February 12, 1945, she was looking out the window at 144 Lakeview Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts, and noticed a man walking down the street whom she did not know and was, therefore, surprised when he came to her door and rang the bell. The time was just before noon and she had fixed the date as somewhere between January 20, 1945 and the first day of February, 1945. When she answered the door, the unidentified individual asked her if she were hirs. Heineman, the sister of Klaus Fuchs. She responded in the affirmative and he introduced himself by name, W





which she does not remember, and he stated he was a chemist who had worked with Fuchs and was anxious to see him. At this time Kristel Heineman's children came home from school for lunch and she invited the man to join them. During the course of the meal the unknown man learned the dates which Fuchs would be visiting her in Cambridge. Mrs. Heineman was under the impression that this man had worked with Fuchs at Los Alamos, but she could form no basis for this recollection.

Mrs. Heineman stated that on the second day that Fuchs was in Cambridge the same man rang her doorbell. She recalled that the approximate date would be February 14 or 15, 1945. This call was late in the afternoon, Mrs. Heineman basing this on the fact that her children were home from school. The unknown man presented Mrs. Heineman with a then popular work of light fiction, "Mrs. Palmer's Honey." He also brought candy for Mrs. Heineman's children. She stated that prior to the man's arrival she had informed Fuchs of the previous visit of the man, at which time Fuchs appeared to be somewhat annoyed, but did not comment beyond saying, "Ch, it is all right."

On this second visit of the man he talked to Fuchs for a period of fifteen or twenty minutes in the Heinemans' living room. Mrs. Heineman was present for at least a part of the conversation, but stated that she did not hear any of it. She recalled that she was surprised at the short duration of the visit in view of the fact that it was her belief that the man had travelled a considerable distance to see Fuchs. Hrs. Heineman recalled that a few weeks or months later, possibly April, 1945, the man rang her doorbell for a third time. The man again asked for Fuchs and again stayed for lunch. During this visit the man requested information concerning the next visit of Fuchs to the Heineman home. She responded that she did not know when Fuchs would again visit her. (It is noted that Ers. Heineman has not specifically identified Gold as the person who visited her; however, she cannot be approached now because of her present condition.) W



8. Robert Block Heineman 94 Lakeview Averms Cambridge, Massachusetts

Robert Heineman has stated that he met the unidentified man who called at the Heineman home on one occasion. He placed this as during the last few days of February or first ten days of March, 1945. Heineman came home from classes at Harvard for lunch and the unidentified man was already in his home. He was introduced to Robert Heineman as a friend of Klaus Fuchs, and as a chemist who worked with Fuchs. For lack of any other information, the two men discussed the weather and the man made reference to the exceedingly heavy snowfall in Buffalo, New York. Robert Heineman was of the impression that the man had arrived by train in Boston from some point outside the city and he believed from his recollection concerning snow in Buffalo that the individual's train had passed through that city. Heineman also had the recollection that sometime during the course of the conversation the City of Philadelphia was mentioned. Heineman stated that the man did not stay long at his home, and he does not recall that anyone else was present except Mrs. Heineman and the three Heineman children. Heineman described this individual as in his late 30's, 5'8" tall, 170 to 175 pounds, stocky, not fat, dark, thin, receding hairline, complexion dark, full face, occupation chemist, wore glasses, married and two children. 2/2

Robert Block Heineman and Harry Gold were brought together face to face in the Philadelphia Office of the FBI on the evening of May 22, 1950, at which time Harry Gold recognized Heineman as the individual at whose home he visited in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Robert Heineman could not or would not identify Harry Gold. U

Konstantin Iafazanos

Konstantin Lafazanos, alleged paramour of Kristel Heineman, is reportedly mentally unbalanced. During World War II he was classified 4-F by reason of a medical statement that he was then a psychoneurotic. His reliability as a witness would, therefore, be questionable. We



Konstantin Lafazanos has advised that he can recall a scientist visiting the Reineman home one day at noon approximately February, 1945, and prior to Fuchs arrival. Lafasanos stated that he had gone to the Heineman home to take care of their children and recalls that a man arrived about 11:00 A.M. looking for Fuchs and stayed for lunch. Lafazanos stated that this individual was not very tall, under 51 8m and possibly 51 5m, of stocky build, weight about 200 pounds and having a rather round face and giving a Polish or Slavic appearance. Lafazanos had few recollections concerming this person, but it is his impression that the visitor discussed the value of vitamins, and lafaranos concluded that the scientist was a bacteriologist connected in some way with Hew York wholesale grocery manufacturing company. Y

10. Appropriate Official Hilton Hotel Albuquerque, Kew Mexic

A registration card at the Hilton Hotel reflects that on September 19, 1945, Room #521 was rented to Harry Gold. This card shows the home address of Harry Gold as 5032 Boudinot Avenue, Philadelphia 24, Pennsylvania. On this card is listed the firm name of A. B. A. Laboratories, New York City.

(This card has been forwarded to the FBI laboratory and will be compared against the known handwriting of subject Harry Gold

11. Appropriate Official Palmer House Hotel Chicago, Illinois

Palmer House registration card #7678 reflects that Harry Gold registered at the Palmer House Hotel September 16, 1945 to September 17, 1945. This card shows Gold's address as 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and that he represented Terry and Leibert. (The FBI Laboratory has identified the handwriting on this card as being identical with that of Harry Gold, subject of this case). 7/





12. FBI Document Examiner

FBI document examiner can testify that the handwriting appearing on aforementioned Palmer House registration card #7678, and Hilton Hotel registration card dated September 19, 1945 at Albuquerque, New Mexico, is identical with the known handwriting of Harry Gold, subject of this case. 1/

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V. POSSIPLE VENUE

A review of the meetings and activities between Harry Gold and Klaus Fuchs and between Harry Gold and Wohn" establishes we mue in the following judicial districts on the basis of the facts indicated below: ((1))

United States District Court, Southern District of New York, Manhattan, New York

- 1. First meeting between Gold and Fuchs in February or March, 1944 on East Side of Manhattan. Only oral information furnished. (U)
- 2. Meeting between Gold and Fuchs in March or April 1944 in upper Manhattan on East Side. Only oral information furnished.
- 3. Meeting between Gold and Fuchs in June or July 1944 in the Brong not too far from Fordham University. No written information passed.
- Westing between Gold and "John" in neighborhood of Washington Square after Gold lost contact with Fuchs in late July or early August 1944. (21)
- 5. Visit by Gold to address of Dr. Klaus Fuchs on 77th Street, New York City, in effort to re-establish contact with Fuchs. (U)
- 6. Meeting between Gold and "John" above Columbia University on same day about August 1944 that inquiry was made at 77th Street address.
- 7. Heeting between Gold and "John" in June 1945 in a bar on Third Avenue, somewhere in the forties, New York City, for purpose of determining whether Gold did go to Santa Fe, New Mexico to see Fuchs.

United States District Court, Eastern District of New York, Brooklyn, New York

1. Meeting between Gold and Fuchs in late July 1944 in Queens, long Island, not as far out as Jackson Heights. Written information was passed. (21)





- 2. Resting between Gold and "John" farther out in Queens about an hour after above seating with Fuchs for purpose of delivering information received from Fuchs to "John."
- 3. Resting between Gold and "John" in June 1945 in the vicinity of Metropolitan Avenue, far out in Brooklyn for the purpose of delivering information received from Fuchs at Santa Fe, New Mexico to "John."
- h. Heeting between Gold and "John" in Brooklyn the night of the same day that the last mentioned meeting occurred.
- 5. Eacting between Gold and "John" on Long Island out beyond Jackson Heights in September 1945 at which Gold turned over to "John" the information he had received from Fuchs in Santa Fe, New Yexico that same month. (())
- 6. Heating between Gold and "John" near St. George Hotel in Brooklyn in early 1966 after making one or two unsuccessful attempts to recontact Fuchs through Kristel Heineman, after the September 1965 meeting with Fuchs in Santa Fe, New Hexico.

United States Fistrict Court, Edstrict of Massachusetts, Boston, Massachusetts

1. Yesting between Gold and Fuchs shortly after Christmas 19th or early 19th at the home of Kristel Heineman, Carbridge. Gold stated that written information was passed to him at this meeting but Fuchs stated that he was merely given oral questions at the Beineman residence, the answers to which he furnished in writing a day or two later in a meeting on Fortland Street below the North Station, Boston, Nassachusetts.

United States Listrict Court, District of New Mexico, Santa Po, New Mexico

1. Recting between Harry Gold and Klaus Fuchs in June 1945 at or in the vicinity of Panta Fa, New Mexico. Exitten information was passed.



2. Meeting between Harm old and Fuchs in September 1945 at or in the vicinity of Santa Fe, New Mexico. Written information was passed at this meeting.
