Slack, a self-confessed Soviet espionage agent, began his clandestine activities in 1936 while employed by the Eastman Kodak Company at Rochester, New York, by furnishing industrial information to one Richard Briggs, a former associate at the Eastman Company. In 1938, Briggs admitted that he was passing this information to a Russian named George. Slack shortly thereafter met George (Gaik Kovakimian). Slack then began furnishing photographed Eastman Kodak reports directly to George, for which he received monetary payments.

In the summer of 1940, one Martin (Harry Cold, selfconfessed member of the Klaus Buchs espionage network) contacted Slack in Rochester, New York, and Slack furnished industrial information to Martin until approximately 1942. During this period Martin

introduced Slack to one Robert (Semen Semenov, a Soviet Government official) in New York City and Slack became aware that information he accumulated was going to Robert, and that Robert was furnishing the funds on which Martin operated.

RUSS

In 1942, Slack accepted employment at the Holston Ordnance Works in Kingsport, Tennessee. He was contacted in 1943, by Martin, who demanded a report on the manufacturing process for RDX, a highly secret explosive being produced at Holston. In the Spring of 1944, Slack furnished Martin this report and a sample of RDX in a rubber container. It is this activity for which Slack was indicted in September, 1950, and is currently serving a fifteen year sentence at the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta, Georgia.



SIACK was released on 9/8/60 from the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Conn. and is currently residing at Clay, N.Y., where he is engaged in a radio and television repair service. SLACK is a white, male, was born 8/6/05 at Syracuse, N.Y., and is a citizen of the U.S. by birth. He is in apparent good health.

SLACK's wife, JULIA, died while SLACK was incarcerated and his two teen-age sons are apparently with the father.

SLACK began his clandestine activities in 1936 while employed by the Eastman-Kodak Co. in Rochester, N.Y., by furnishing industrial information to one RICHARD BRIGGS, now deceased. In 1938 BRIGGS admitted that he was passing this information to a Russian named GEORGE, ultimately identified

as GAIK OVAKIMIAN. SIACK soon the earter met OVAKIMIAN and began furnishing photographed Eastman-Kodak reports directly to him, for which he received monetary payments. In the summer of 1940, one MARTIN (identified as HARRY GOLD) contacted SLACK in Rochester and SLACK furnished industrial information to MARTIN until approximately 1942. MARTIN then introduced SIACK to ROBERT (identified as SEMEN SEMENOV) in N.Y.C., and SLACK began to be aware that information he furnished to MARTIN was going to ROBERT and that ROBERT was furnishing the operating funds for MARTIN. In 1942 SIACK accepted employment at the Holston Ordnance Works in Kingsport, Tenn. MARTIN contacted him there in 1943 and demanded a report on the manufacturers' process for RDX, a highly secret explosive being produced at Holsten. In the spring of 1944, SLACK furnished MARTIN this report and a sample of RDX in a rubber container. For this activity SIACK was indicted in September of 1950 and sentenced to a 15 year term at the federal penitentiary. On 9/8/60, SLACK was released from federal custody and is now under the supervision of the U.S. Probation Officer at Albany, N.Y.

It is contemplated that this interview will be conducted by SA ROBERT E. MARGISON.

SA MARGISON investigated this case in knoxville; Tenn. and, for approximately a 45 day period, had daily contact with SLACK in the Knoxville Co. jail. A relationship was created here which it is felt may be of some future value. It is recognized that SIACK made an attempt to have his conviction set aside and alleged that he was improperly represented and that promises had been made to him by representatives in the case which were not fulfilled. It is believed that these were Megal maneuveurs which SIACK attempted but with no true conviction on his part that he had been unfairly dealt with. It is believed that no animosity exists on the part of SIACK toward this Bureau.

This interview can be conducted by two agents if the Bureau so desires. Albany recommends, however, that
the Bureau consider authorizing the interview by SA MARGISON
alone. It is felt that a better relationship can be established by a single agent.

DETAILS

SLACK was contacted at his residence on Maider Road in Clay, New York, on December 4, 1961. SLACK resides there with his 82 year old mother who is his housekeeper. His wife died while he was incarcerated. He has brought his two teen age sons to live with him and they attend school from his residence. His brother, LEWIS SLACK, has purchased equipment and set the subject up in the TV and radio repair business. SLACK learned this trade in prison. He has built a workshop at the residence and operates the business from there. He states that his neighbors and acquaintances have been most friendly toward him and that the repair business is a going concern. He additionally handles a local newspaper, the "Syracuse Post Standard," on a rural delivery route, from 1:30 to 6:30 a.m., seven days a week, which nets him approximately \$65.00 a week. SLACK has drawn the remnants

of his family together and is making a sincere effort to salvage what is left of their respective lives.

He reminisced about HARRY GOLD and DAVIB GREENGLASS individuals who were involved in the espionage parallel with which he was affiliated. He said he has never heard from any of these individuals since his imprisonment. He speculated on the present whereabouts and activities of two Soviet Intelligence agents whom he discovered, during his trial, were handling information which he passed. He volunteered the comment that if he ever did hear from any of these people again, the FBI would be the first to know about it. He was reminded of his comment, approximately eleven years ago, while incarcerated in the Knoxville County Jail, to the effect that he wished he met the FBI Agents when he had first become involved in "this mess." It was suggested that should any indications ever arise that anyone was attempting to again involve him, that the FBI would be extremely interested in prompt notification.

It is noted that SLACK is still of medium build and is wearing glasses with steel frames and a dark horn-rimmed top and bows. His black hair is noticeably gray on the fringes. He wears no rings.

espionage activities. The interviews with HARRY GOLD have been conducted by SAs T. SCOTT MILLER, JR., and RICHARD E. BRENNAN.

On June 1 and 2, 1950, HARRY GOLD advised that his initial contact in Soviet espionage work during the fall of 1935 was an individual known to him as PAUL SMITH. This name, GOLD has stated, was obviously an alias; however, he never did learn this contact's true name, nor has he been able to identify him.

GOLD said that during the summer of 1937, he kept an appointment with PAUL SMITH in New York City. GOLD stated that this meeting occurred somewhere in the vicinity of Columbia University, New York City. During the course of this conversation with SMITH, the latter told GOLD that he had to leave very shortly and that in the future GOLD would report to another individual. SMITH told GOLD as they were walking along that his, SMITH'S, successor would meet them in a few minutes walking toward them in New York City. GOLD said that within a matter of a block or two, he and SMITH were approached by a man whom SMITH introduced to GOLD as STEVE SWARTZ. GOLD said that in a moment or two, SMITH left and that he has never seen him again. He said that from that time on, that is from the summer of 1937 until late in that year or very early in 1938, GOLD turned over information which he was supplying from his place of employment, the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, to STEVE SWARTZ.

GOID also advised that during the short period in which he was reporting to STEVE SWARTZ, he had pretty much exhausted the amount of information available at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company which he could transmit to SWARTZ. As a result of this, he only turned over information to SWARTZ on a very few occasions.

He has also advised that he is fairly sure that SWARTZ was a Russian and that furthermore, SWARTZ had not been in this country very long prior to 1937. SWARTZ, according to GOLD, also had a rather heavy Russian accent.

In late 1937 or early 1938, GOLD met SWARTZ in New York City and the two went to a restaurant on Broadway in the 80's. GOLD advised

that he recalled that this restaurant was of the chain type, such as Rudley's. While the two of them were in this restaurant, SWARTZ left, saying that he would be back in a few moments. GOLD was of the impresion that SWARTZ had left to make a telephone call. About five minutes after SWARTZ returned, the latter motioned to GOLD to notice an unknown man enter the restaurant. At this time, SWARTZ informed GOLD that this man was to begin working with him, and instructed GOLD to make a sign of recognition to the man, who later turned out to be "FRED." GOLD said he did give such a sign, which he cannot recall, but stated it was probably a smile or a nod, and "FRED" sat down with them and at this time an introduction was made. GOLD has advised that he had no subsequent dealings with SWARTZ after he was introduced to "FRED."

On June 29, 1950, HARRY GOLD furnished the following supplemental information concerning STEVE SWARTZ. He said he was of the impression that SWARTZ attended social functions on a consular or diplomatic level, although he was of the opinion that SWARTZ may also have been attached to AMTORG.

On the same date, GOLD furnished the following description of STEVE SWARTZ:

On June 30, 1950, HARRY GOLD was shown a picture of SEMEN MEFODIEVICH RUGA. He stated at this time that the picture was identical with the individual whom he knew as STEVE SWARTZ. GOLD said he was positive about this identification and there is no doubt whatsoever in his mind.

HARRY GOLD was interviewed in the New York City Prison, Criminal Courts Building, 100 Centre Street, New York City, by SAS JOSEPH C. WALSH and FRANCIS W. ZANGLE. A group photograph which was taken January 7, 1944 in front of a Russian decaped locometive at the Baldwin Locometive Works, Eddystone, Pennsylvania, was displayed to GOLD. There were no names on the photo and GOLD was simply asked to try and identify any of the persons appearing in the photo. He looked at the photo and said he did not recognize any of the individuals therein.

Then a photo of ROUGA, taken for identification purposes at the Baldwin Locomotive Works, was exhibited to GOLD and he again did not recognize it.

Thereafter it was pointed out to GOLD that S. M. ROUGA appeared in the group photograph and that the individual photograph was also of ROUGA, whom he had previously identified as the unknown subject, STEVE SWARTZ. He was also told that the two men appearing next to ROUGA in the group photograph were 6°2° and 5° even in height, respectively. GOLD stated then that he was positive that he had mistakingly identified ROUGA as the man whom he knew as STEVE SWARTZ.

GOLD advised that he definitely was correct when he stated that STEVE SWARTZ was about 6'2".

He was again questioned about his recollection of STEVE SWARTZ, but the only information he seemed to add was that he believed that STEVE SWARTZ had arrived from Russia in May or July, 1936. He said he had gathered this from remarks made by PAUL/SMITH, his espionage superior just prior to STEVE SWARTZ, and from later remarks by STEVE. GOLD said he could not recall any mention having been made about where STEVE SWARTZ entered the United States, but he was of the impression that a lot of Russians during that era entered from the West Coast.

GOLD stated there was no doubt in his mind that STEVE SWARTZ was a Russian national and that STEVE SWARTZ was not his real name.

GOLD recalled seeing a photograph in the same drawer that the ROUGA photograph had been taken from which he believed to have resembled STEVE SWARTZ. He estimated that the photograph he had in mind was about ten pictures before or after the ROUGA photograph. He requested that he be permitted to view this photograph again.

A review was made of the FELDMAN-OVAKIMIAN case file in the New York Office in an effort to turn up suspects for the unknown subject STEVE SWARTZ. No suspects answering the general description of STEVE SWARTZ were located.



For the information of the Newark Office the unknown subject in instant case was an espionage superior of HARRY GOLD from the summer of 1937 until late 1937 or early 1938. GOLD furnished SWARTZ information obtained from the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, where GOLD was employed. This information chiefly concerned various industrial processes used at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company.

GOLD has stated in his interviews subsequent to the time that he admitted participation in Russian espionage, that the second Russian agent to whom he supplied information in the US was a person whom GOLD knew as STEVE SWARTZ.

GOLD said that he was initially contacted in the Fall of 1936 by PAULYSMITH, which name was obviously an alias, and that SMITH told GOLD he understood the latter was interested in supplying information to Russia. GOLD said he bagan to give SMITH copies of chemical processes from the Pennsylvania Sugar Company and its allied institutions, shortly thereafter, and continued to supply information to SMITH until sometime in the Summer of 1937.

GOLD said, during the Summer of 1937, he kept an appointment with SMITH in NYC semewhere in the vicinity of Columbia University, and that, during the course of this meeting, SMITH told GOLD that he had to leave very shortly and in the future GOLD would report to another individual. SMITH told GOLD, as they were walking along, that SMITH'S successor would meet them in a few minutes walking toward them on the street. GOLD said that withing a block or two, a man approached them whom SMITH introduced to GOLD as STEVE SWARTZ. GOLD said that in a moment or two, SMITH left and that he has never seen him again, and that from that time on until late in that year or early in 1938, he turned over information which he was supplying from the Pennsylvania Sugar Company to STEVE SWARTZ.

GOLD has stated that among all of his contacts, while he was engaged in Russian espionage, STEVE SWARTZ was the most nondescript of all of these people, and, as a result, he remembers

GOLD has stated that all of the meetings he had with STEVE, which he can recall, occurred in NYC, and that it was his impression that STEVE was married and living in Brooklyn, NY. GOLD said that during the time he was seeing STEVE, he had pretty well exhausted the amount of information available at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, and, as a result, only turned over information to STEVE on a very few occasions. GOLD said he was fairly sure STEVE was a Russian and that furthermore, he had not been in this country very long prior to 1937, and that STEVE had a rather heavy Russian accent.

STEVE was not well because he usually had a very fatigued look and that he recalls that STEVE probably had some kind of stomach trouble. GOLD said STEVE never seemed to be too interested in the work. GOLD further advised that in late 1937 or early 1938, he met STEVE in New York, and the two went to a restaurant on Broadway in the Eighties and that, within a short time STEVE told GOLD to notice an unknown man enter the restaurant, at which time STEVE informed him that the man was to begin working with him. GOLD gave a sign of recognition such as a smile or a nod to the man, and was thereupon introduced by STEVE to him, and was advised the man's name was "FRED".

in which he was out of contact with STEVE, this being in early November of 1937, when GOLD was partly burned in an industrial accident at his place of employment and was confined in a hospital as a result.

GOLD subsequently identified Russian by the name of SIMON MEFODIEVICH RUGA as being identifiable with STEVE SWARTZ. A considerable amount of investigation concerning RUGA was undertaken by various offices, but, in December, 1950, GOLD retracted this identification when he was shown a group photograph taken in 1944 in the US at the Baldwin Locomotive Works. There were no names on this photograph and SIMONYRUGA appeared in it. GOLD was unable to identify RUGA from this picture or from an individual photograph of RUGA taken at the Baldwin Locomotive Works. GOLD advised that he was definitely correct when he said that STEVE SWARTZ was about 6'2", whereas in the group photograph RUGA is standing next to a man known to be 5'2", and RUGA was very noticably shorter than this individual.

Photographs of SIMON RUGA were viewed by HARRY GOLD with negative results. GOLD has been shown all available photographs of and other suspects who have osen suggested from a review of pertinent files. No identification has been made with the exception of RUGA'S photograph identification, which was later repudiated.

In fact, it appears that this information has never been incorporated in the case file on Swartz.

The write-up on Swartz fails to include Gold's information that Swartz once asked Gold for background information on William Malisoff for recruitment purposes. This information likewise has never been incorporated in the Swartz case file. The write-up on Swartz also does not include data mentioned by Gold at pages 66 and 73 of the document he compiled under the title "The Circumstances Surrounding My Work as a Soviet Agent - A Report," which was furnished to the Bureau by New York letter dated 5-10-51 in the Gold case. Again, this information does not appear in the Swartz file. (65-57449, Serial 790)

In the write-up on Fred, it is set forth on pages four and five that Gold had received an assignment from Fred concerning Carl Buchman whom Gold believed to be a protection.

No mention is made of the fact that Carl Buchman's brother, Alexander Hassel Buchman, was in close contact with followers of Trotsky at the pertinent time and, in fact, later spent considerable time in the Trotsky household in Mexico. This is considered pertinent because it supports Gold's information to the effect that he received assignments concerning Trotskyite matters from Fred. (105-1199)

Weither of these write-ups contain an analysis of various pertinent facts and probabilities which tend to identify these subjects with various known Soviet agents and thus, indicate more clearly the possibilities of effecting identifications.

These subjects are former superiors of Harry Gold. Gold was brought into Soviet espionage in the Fall of 1935 when Thomas L. Black introduced his then superior, Paul Petersen, to Gold as Paul Smith. Prior to Black's connection with Petersen/Smith, Black became connected with Soviet espionage through contact with Gaik B. Ovakimian. Starting with Ovakimian as Black's first superior, the subsequent superiors of Black and Gold up into the 1940's are as follows:

matter, Louis F. Budens has advised that in about 1936, Frank Laverne Palmer requested him to engage in Trotskylte work for the Russians and, as you know, Budens subsequently engaged in such work under Dr. Gregory L. Rabinovich. Under Rabinovich, Budenz brought Sylvia Callen, wife of Zalmond David Franklin, to New York in 1938 to serve as a Communist Party "plant" in the Socialist Workers Party. Franklin has been identified as the first espionage superior of Jones Orin York who was recruited in 1935 or 1936 by Stanislaus Shumovsky of Amtorg. Shumovsky's name was utilized by Fred in connection with Fred's direction of Gold's contacts with Ben Smilg of Dayton, Ohio, and furthermore Shumovsky is known to have been an associate of Semenov who succeeded Fred as Gold's superior

The above described interrelation of Fred with the activities of Rabinovich and other superiors of Black suggest most strongly that Fred probably was connected with Amtorg and was an associate of Rabinovich of the Russian Red Cross and Ovakimian, Semenov and Shumovsky of Amtorg. Likewise, it would appear that the same conclusion applies to Steve Swartz who, according to Gold, was succeeded by Fred as Gold's superior, merely because of Swartz's unusual height in comparison with that of Gold. Furthermore, it appears that Swartz may have been connected with William Malisoff and that Swartz and/or

Fred may possibly have been known to Zalmond David

Accordingly, the Bureau feels that efforts to identify these subjects must encompass thorough reviews of available information on Ovakimian, Semenov, Rabinovich Shumovsky, York, Malisoff, and Franklin, all subjects of separate investigations, in order that known associates of these individuals may be considered as suspects. Likewise, consider-

has not been completely interviewed. Referenced Unsolved Situations write-ups indicate that efforts to identify these unknown subjects have not been based on analysis of Fred and his connections as outlined above, and do not reflect that consideration has been given to the information available concerning the above-mentioned individuals, except in the case of Ovakimian. It is instructed, therefore, that instant cases not be closed at this time and until the above research and investigation is conducted.

The above indicated connection of Fred with Shumovsky and Semenov, both onetime students at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), taken in conjunction with Fred's efforts to have Gold attend MIT suggests the possibility that Fred himself may have attended MIT. The report of SA C. H. Kimball, Boston, 1-22-41, entitled "Stanislaw Shunovsky, was., Espionage, reflects that in February, 1938, Shumovsky appeared at MIT on behalf of Nicholas Nicholaievich Ershov, a student from Russia. The above-mentioned report of SA Reywood reflects that Ershov was born 4-16-07 in the USSR and graduated from MIT in 1940. He was connected with Amtorg and his mailing address was 751 St. Marks, Brooklyn, New York. It is to be noted that this address is identical with the one time address of Semen Semenov and that Ershow when later in England,

Further descriptive data is not available but it is to be noted that Black has stated that Ershov resembles his superior, John. It is desired that further information be developed concerning Ershov and that arrangements



be made for the eventual display of his photograph to Gold, even though this may have been done before, for his further

possibility that Black's superior, Karl, may be identical with Swartz. While there is a difference in the height and weight of Swarts and Karl, as respectively described by Gold and Black, it is to be noted that Black has not been black stated that Karl appeared to be well read since he could discuss philosophy, art, etc. Gold's document entitled accurates Surrounding My Work as a Soviet Agent - A reference of the flowers and art and the fact that it was swarts who introduced Gold to Cezanne, Van Gogh and the world one Ilia Agapov resembled Karl though he felt certain that Amtorg in 1936. Rabinovich, Bulet dated 10-22-51 instructed that investigation be conducted to identify other members of the Russian Red Cross and to display photographs of such individuals to Black. In view of the indicated connection between Fred and Rabinovich, investigation in these cases should also include the display to Harry Gold of photographs of other members of the Russian Red Cross.

The Bureau desires that genuine efforts be made to identify these unknown subjects in order that these cases can be brought to a logical conclusion. The information mentioned earlier as not having been included in the individual case file on Swartz should be incorporated in the next investigative report. Careful consideration should be given to the suggestions contained herein after which you should initiate the necessary investigation, set forth specific leads, and arrange for the display of all pertinent photographs to Harry Gold

Referenced Unsolved Situations write-ups are not being included in the Unsolved Situations file at this time and should not be included by the offices receiving copies of this letter. In the event that it becomes necessary to include these cases in the Unsolved Situations file the write-ups should be rewritten so as to include all pertinent information.



A surveillance photograph of was also shown to Miss BENTLEY, and she stated that she is almost certain that this is JOHN but because of lack of clarity in the photograph, she could not be absolutely certain.

The individual known to Miss BENTLEY as VOHN served for a time as an empionage principal of Miss BENTLEY somewhat in an alternate capacity to JACOB GOLOS, who customarily received the material which she obtained as a result of her espionage activity.

She stated that considerable confusion has arisen with regard to this individual because of the fact that when she first described JOHN she stated that he had blond hair. In referring to this, she stated that actually she did not mean that JOHN had light blond hair, but rather had dark blond or light brown hair.

Miss BENTLEY stated that her contacts with JOHN began in late June or early July, 1941 and continued intermittently thereafter until sometime in 1943. During the latter part of that period her contacts with JOHN were interspersed with contacts with MARGARET," who was introduced to her by JOHN. She said that she had a total of about ten or fifteen meetings with JOHN. When she first met him he seemed rather poorly dressed and looked as though he had just come from Russia. At that time he also seemed to be somewhat emaciated in appearance. She said that she came to dislike him somewhat toward the latter months of her connection with him because of occasional improper advances which he made to her.





BOOKER resided in Greenwich Village at 20 West 10th Street in 1933 prior to her travelabroad, and has resided at three different addresses in the Greenwich Village area since 1941 to the present time.

LUCY BOOKER was born in St. Louis, Missouri, but there is no record of her ever having been married. However, in this respect it is noted that HARRY COLD, convicted Soviet espionage agent, told many people with whom he was in contact that he was married and had two children, all of which was an attempt to create a false picture of himself.

It is further noted that JACOB GOLOS told ELIZABETH BENTLEY in 1940 or 1941, according to BENTLEY, that "LUCY" (LUCY BOOKER) was upset because she had had an unsatisfactory love affair and was in a rather emotional state. Further, previous investigation conducted in this case reflected that when BOOKER returned to her home in St. Louis, Missouri from Europe in 1940, she was in a highly emotional state verging on a nervous breakdown.

RABINOWITZ, head of the Russian Red Cross in the United States. RABINOWITZ has been identified by several former Soviet espionage agents as the person who was their superior in the late 1930's.

There is no known connection between BOOKER and RABINOVITZ at this time

By letter dated October 5, 1951, the Philadelphia Office reported that on September 3, 1951, a photograph of the subject was exhibited to Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability, who advised that he had never seen or met the subject at any time.

The Philadelphi Office further advised that on October 1, 1951, HARRY COLD, a convicted Soviet espionage agent, advised that he had never seen or met the subject and further that the subject's name was unfamiliar to him.

PHOTOGRAPHIC PROCESS

ALFRED DEAN SLACK in 1940-1942 furnished information relative to the photographic process of the Eastman Kodak Company to HARRY GOLD. The furnishing of these processes was terminated upon SLACK'S transfer to the Holston Ordnance Works, Kingsport, Tennessee, in September 1942. GOLD had turned the processes over to his Soviet contact, SEMEN SEMENOV. Also some notes concerning the photographic process were found in GOLD'S home in May 1950.

NYLON PROCESS

Information concerning the nylon process was obtained by ALFRED DEAN SLACK from HOWARD GOCHENOUR of Charleston, West Virginia and was turned over to HARRY GOLD during the years 1941-1942. GOLD turned the nylon information over to his Soviet contact.

BUNA - S_

HARRY GOLD and ABRAHAM BROTHMAN collaborated in late March 1942, on a report concerning Buna - S, and the report was turned over by GOLD to SEMEN SEMENOV.

MIXING EQUIPMENT

ABRAHAM BROTHMAN prepared papers on mixing equipment which he turned over in October and November 1942, to GOLD, who in turn passed the material on to SEMENOV in the Ferris Wheel Bar in New York, New York, in December 1942.

MAGNESIUM POWDER PROCESS

There was found in HARRY GOLD'S home five or six handwritten pages in GOLD'S handwriting concerning the magnesium powder process. GOLD said that these pages referred to the beginning of the process and the preliminary calculation; also some of the notations were in EROTHMAN'S

handwriting. GOLD further stated in his July 11, 1950, statement that SEMENOV while not interested in the Aerosol dispenser did in the beginning evidence some degree of concern or enthusiasm for the magnesium powder process. GOLD, in continuing his contact with SEMENOV, brought out the fact that Aerosol and magnesium powder were entirely the product of ABRAHAM BROTHMAN'S work; whereupon, SEMENOV made a vulgar remark and said he wanted nothing to do with it. GOLD said that none of the material found in his home pertaining to the Aerosol dispenser and the magnesium powder was ever turned over to any Soviet agent.

NICKEL CATALYST ,

HARRY GOLD in his July 11, 1950, state-ment said that sometime in the fall of 1942 and continuing through 1943 and into 1944, he received from BROTHMAN a considerable amount of material, mostly blueprints, concerning a plant which was being put up by HENRY GOLDWYNNE and CHEMURGY for the Rufert Chemical Company, Seymour, Connecticut. He said this related to a plant for the production of nickel catalyst, both in pellet form and as vehicle impregnated. GOLD said that the nickel catalyst is used in connection with various hydrogenation processes, particularly as concerned with the production of fats such as Crisco and Spry. GOLD stated that none of the information on the nickel catalyst was ever turned over to any Soviet agent.

Another possibility occurs to the Knoxville office which, although slight, does appear to warrant some inquiry.

WORK on "Thermal Diffusion of Gases." Shortly after this period, KLAUS/FUCHS was in the United States working with the British team on "gaseous diffusion" methods.

Among the best possible methods apparent at that time for the separation of U-235 was "gaseous diffusion" by filtration according to atomic weight. This is the present system in use at Oak Ridge in the K-25 Gaseous Diffusion Plant. Success of this was contingent upon the development of a "barrier material" or filter membranes sufficiently porous to allow passage of the gas, but with such small pore size that the more rapidly moving lighter atoms would pass through in greater percentage ratio, coupled with the very essential property of sufficient strength to withstand the needed differential in pressure. Research soon settled on the development of a nickel alloy for this material.

These names were to be sub mitted to Steve Swartz, Gold's superior at that time. recalled only one name furnished by Bruin, to wit, Tom Jackson, whom Gold recalled was a draftsman or mechanical engineer of English ancestry employed at that time at the Baldwin Locomotive Works and possibly a member of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists, and Technicians. Investigation at that time at the Baldwin Locomotive Works failed to locate any past or present employee by the name of Tom Jackson. By teletype dated September 27, 1951, entitled "Frank Price Heckel NY, AMA," Philadelphia pointed out that Heckel's reference, Rhomas Sackson, aka-Thomas Albian Jackson, 112 Walnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, appears to be identical with the Tom Jacksom mentioned by Harry Gold. Subject is presently employed as a draftsman with 0/5 Catalytic Construction Company, which is engaged in an AEA project. In connection with this employment, subject refused to fill out a Personnel Security Questionnaire and requested that he be placed on work requiring no clearance, and this was done. espionage recruits. Information relative to their backgrounds was also secured and submitted to STEVE SWARTZ, GOLD's Soviet superior at that time. GOLD was able to recall only one of these names and was vague about that. He seemed to recall the name of TOM JACKSON, a draftsman or mechanical engineer at the Baldwin Locomotive Works. He was of English ancestry and was possibly a member of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians.

On December 10, 1951, GOLD was re-interviewed at the U.S. Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., and was shown a photograph of subject, TOM ALBION JACKSON. He was unable to recognize the photograph, stating that he had never met JACKSON. GOLD seemed to recall that the name TOM JACKSON came from JACK BRUIN.

GOLD related that JACK ERUIN came to him on one occasion and said that DeLatal Company in Trenton, N. J., was making something of military interest. ERUIN thought that he could get this information for the Soviets. GOLD does not specifically recall that ERUIN mentioned the name of the person he could get this information from. GOLD does recall that he did introduce ERUIN to his Soviet superior, STEVE SWARTZ. BRUIN told SWARTZ about the possibility of getting information from DeLaval Company and SWARTZ seemed very interested in this. GOLD does not know what further steps were taken by ERUIN or SWARTZ.

It should be noted that JACKSON had worked at the Baldwin Locomotive Works from 1932 to 1938 and at DeLaval Steem Turbine Company, Trenton, N. J., from 1939 to 1943.

THOMAS L. HLACK, an admitted Soviet agent, advised in January, 1952, that the name and face of THOMAS ALBION JACKSON were familiar, but he could not exactly say where he might have seen or met JACKSON. HLACK stated that he might have possibly met this person in New York City in the early 1930's. HLACK mentioned that before he became a Communist Party member he consorted with various left-wing groups. One of these groups bore the name Technical Union, or some name similar to that. It was HLACK's recollection that this group was the forerunner of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians. It was in the Technical Union that HLACK believes he might have seen or met THOMAS A. JACKSON.

Concerning JACK ERUIN, HARRY GOLD advised that ERUIN was an open and avowed Communist during the mid-1930's while they were both students at Drexel Institute of Technology.





This person was described as about 5'9" in height, slender build, dark hair, long nose, and married and his wife being a schoolteacher.

At this time, according to GOLD, BROTHMAN mentioned that his friend, SHURA SWAN, who had worked for the Soviet men, had been laid off. Further, BROTHMAN gave GOLD the idea that SWAN worked for Amtorg and was the individual who first introduced BROTHMAN to another Amtorg man, not identified, to engage in industrial espionage. BROTHMAN requested GOLD to see hat he could do to resecure SMAN's job at Amtorg. GOLD replied he would see what he could do in this respect.

GOLD recalled that SWAN's name was merely mentioned in 1943. However, in about June 1946 BROTHMAN was berating various Soviet officials in this country for makericans working for them. He referred to SWAN's case.

In his letter, DuBridge stated not one single American scientist of the thousands engaged in security program in past fifteen years has yet been convicted or seriously accused of espionage or treason.

You requested a memorandum concerning scientists who have been involved in subversive activities. As you are aware, there are many and varied fields of scientific endeavor. DuBridge is obviously in error in his above statement, which is broad in scope and far beyond his personal knowledge. Some outstanding examples of American scientists with subversive backgrounds are:

- (1) J. Robert Oppenheimer Atomic scientist whose AEC clearance has been suspended because of alleged Communist activities and associations.
- (2) Frank Friedman Oppenheimer Former atomic scientist who has admitted past membership in the Communist Party.

(3) Joseph Woodrow Weinberg - Former atomic scientist who was a Communist Party member and who gave secret atomic energy data to Steve Nelson, then a Communist Party functionary. NOA

(4) William Perl - Physicist, electrical engineer and aeronautical research scientist who is alleged to have been a Soviet Agent and who was sentenced to serve 5 years for perjury on June 5, 1953, by denying he knew Morton Sobell and Julius Rosenberg.

He was employed at National Advisory Council for Aeronautics from 1939 to 1943 at Langley Field, Virginia, and from 1944-1945 at Lewis Flight Propulsion Laboratory, Cleveland, Ohio, Returning in 1948 after leave of absence, he was again employed by NACA as an aeronautical research scientist. This gave Perl access to the latest developments in aeronautics, jet propulsion and aerodynamics.

He was employed as an instructor of physics at Columbia University from September 1, 1950, until he was arrested on March 14, 1951, on charges of perjury.

described Perl as a brilliant man in the field of aerodynamics and said some of the material he furnished was terrific and that he had given Rosenbergs the plans for "nuclear fission to propel airplanes."

Perl was convicted on two counts of perjury in denying knowing Rosenberg and Sobell on May 22, 1953, and was sentenced on June 5, 1953, to serve five years concurrently on each count.

From 1939-1940 he worked for the Bureau of Naval Ordnance; June 1942 to June 1947 he worked for General Electric, Schenectady, New York, and from 1947-1950 he worked for Reeves Instrument Company, New York. He had access to secret data at both places and worked on fire control radar. Sobell was a member of the Communist Party in 1939. He was convicted with the Rosenbergs for conspiracy to commit espionage in 1951 and was sentenced to thirty years' imprisonment.

HARRY TOLD SUMMARY

Harry Gold, a naturalized American citizen, received a B. S. degree cum laude in 1940 from Tavier University, Cincinnati, Ohio. Prior to completing requirements for his degree in 1940, and subsequent thereto, he was employed as a chemist at the Pennsylvania Sugar Co., Philadelphia. In June, 1948, he entered the employ of the Philadelphia General Hospital as a senior biochemist.

At the time of his arrest in May, 1950, he was the Chief Research Analyst at the Philadelphia General Hospital. In May, 1950, Gold confessed to his involvement in Soviet espionage, beginning in late 1935 and continuing until early 1950. He admitted being the American to whom Emil Julius Klaus Fuchs delivered atom bomb information for delivery to Soviet representatives in this country. Gold is presently serving a term of 30 years in the Federal Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.



HAYHANEN stated that "MARK" never mentioned his entering or leaving the United States through Canada. HAYHANEN stated that when he and "MARK" were discussing how he, HAYHANEN, would leave the United States for Russia in 1957, they discussed the advantages of Canada as compared to Mexico for leaving the United States.

HAYHANEN additionally advised that during the numerous discussions he held with "MARK," the latter individual newer mentioned that he had former agents involved in the ROSENBERG spy ring as his agents; never mentioned how or when any of his agents came into or left the United States; in fact, he never mentioned that any of his agents ever had traveled outside the United States. "MARK" did, however, discuss with him, HAYHANEN, on several occasions the fact that some of his, "MARK's," agents were turned over to him by Soviet officials. HAYHANEN stated that while he is aware that "MARK" was an amateur painter, he never heard "MARK" discuss the possibility of concealing messages in his paintings.

HAYHANEN advised he never knew that "MARK" was ever called "MILT."

The following names were mentioned to HAYHANEN in connection with "MARK" to determine if he could furnish any information concerning them:


REINO HAYHANEN during interview previously set forth in the details, both JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage in behalf of the Soviet Union in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951.

The ROSENBERGS were sentenced to death on April 5, 1951, and were executed at Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, New York, on June 19, 1953.

The following background information pertains to the individuals mentioned during the above interview of REINO HAYHANEN:

On August 17, 1957, a search, pursuant to a search warrant, was conducted in Room 509, 252 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, which space was utilized by the subject as a storeroom.

The names and addresses "Mr. Al Gabel, 1533 Townsend Avenue", and "Messinger, 176 E. 176th Street, Bronx", were penciled on the wall of Room 509 at the above address.

A photograph of WALTER VALENTINE KASSEL was obtained by SA W. DANA CARSON from the Passport Office, Department of State, Washington, D. C., because of the similarity of the KASSEL photographs to that of the subject.

Miscellaneous

DAVID GREENGLASS, convicted Soviet espionage agent, United States Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, was interviewed on February 17, 1958, by SA THOMAS E. SAUNDERS. GREENGLASS stated in part, that on February 1 and 2, 1958, while confined at the West Street Jail, New York City, (Federal House of Detention,) in connection with a funeral trip permitted him at the time of the death of his mother, he observed Colonel RUDOLF IVANOVICH ABEL in a cell at the West Street Jail while he (GREENGLASS) was dressing to attend the funeral. GREENGLASS stated that in addition to previously having viewed photographs of ABEL which were published in newspapers and magazines and now having seen ABEL in person, he definitely can say that he has never knowingly observed ABEL prior to his being convicted on espionage charges.

HARRY GOLD, convicted Soviet espionage agent, was interviewed at the above penitentiary by SA SAUNDERS on February 17, 1958, GOLD after viewing the photographs of the subject, stated that ABEL was totally unfamiliar to him and was never a part of his previous activities.

CONFUNENTIAL METHOD

On March 12, 1958, JACK SOBLE, a convicted Soviet espionage agent, was interviewed at the Federal House of Detention, New York City, by SAS EDWARD F. MC CARTHY and STEPHEN A. MC GARR.

During the interview, SOBLE stated that he had learned from prison sources, which he would not disclose, that ABEL was confined at the Federal House of Detention, New York City, and had mentioned that some day he (ABEL) will be held accountable by the Soviets for the \$5,000 he was supposed to give to HELEN SOBELL. According to SOBLE, ABEL stated his "betrayer" spent it on orgies. ABEL also stated he was chosen for the "work" because of his language ability.

HELEN SOBELL is the wife of MORTON SOBELL, a convicted Soviet espionage agent.

Concerning the \$5,000, mentioned above, REINO HAYHANEN, on May 12, 1957, advised SAS LAWRENCE MC WILLIAMS and EDWARD H. MOODY that "MARK" had received instructions from Moscow to give the \$5,000 to the wife of "STONE".

HAYHANEN subsequently identified photographs of MORTON/SOBELL as being identical with STONE".



Reference is made to No Number SAC Letter dated May 4, 1950, wherein the background of 29 informants and sources of information was set forth. Each office was instructed to consider utilizing those individuals on a very selective basis in certain important espionage and internal security cases.

For the further assistance of the field, there are being set forth the backgrounds of additional informants and sources of information. Each Agent is again cautioned not to set out leads indiscriminately to contact these individuals. Obviously if an informant stopped his Party or espionage activity in the mid-130s. he is not going to have information concerning an individual now under investigation who would have been only ten years old at the time. Too many contacts with these individuals may cause them to become uncooperative. On the other hand, if it is felt that these informants or sources of information have information of value, they should, of course, be interviewed.



Reference is made to my telephone call to Inspector J. J. McGUIRE of the Bureau 1 p.m., 5/24/50, relative to a call received from Mr. JOSEPH W IRAGONETTI, local manager of "Editor and Publisher," Philadelphia, who called relative to the arraignment of HARRY SOLD, subject in the case entitled "HARRY GOLD, was, ESPIONAGE (R)," in Judge JAMES P. McGRANERY's chambers, U. S. Courthouse, Philadelphia, 5/23/50.

Reference is also made to an article which appeared in "Editor and Publisher" for 5/27/50, Page 52, captioned leged Spy in Philadelphia, Story in D.C., which story is inaccurate in several respects.

The first paragraph states that J. EDGAR HOOVER released the story from Washington, which is incorrect, the news release having been made by the Department.

Paragraph three of the article states that the hearing for GOLD was in process the same time the story broke from Washington. This is incorrect because a reporter called this office within a minute or two after I had left the office to take GOLD down to the Federal Building for the arraignment, at which time the reporter advised Supervisor NORRIS S. HARZENSTEIN that the story was then coming in on the press wires and that this was the reason for his call.

The article reflects that I told E & P that I "could not say whether newsmen were barred or not." I am transmitting a copy of memorandum reflecting my conversation with DRAGONETTI and the information actually furnished to him.

On Saturday night, 5/27/50, I met RUSSELL GREEN of United Press and ORLO ROBERTSON of Associated Press, who are referred to in the article in E & P; and they advised me that DRAGONETTI had tried very hard to get them to tell him that they had been barred from the GOLD arraignment in Judge McGRANERY's chambers. They were both in complete agreement that DRAGONETTI had been very interested in having them say that they had been barred from the hearing. GREEN said that DRACONETTI had actually argued with him to get him to say that he had been barred, and ROBERTSON agreed that the same thing had happened to him. Both stated that they had told DRAGONETTI that they had not been barred from the Judge's chambers, but rather that they had gotten there late and that the Judge's door had been closed and they did not feel they had the right to go barging in; that two men were sitting in the Judge's futer office whom they did not know, who when they asked advised them there was E hearing going on. GREEN stated that they later found out that these men were Hie Judge's law clerks, but at the time they did not know who they were. GREEN stated that they had told DRAGONETTI, "You just don't go barging in a Federal Judge's shambers when the door is closed."

I thought the Bureau would be interested in this information, which would seem to indicate DRAGONETTI's approach was subjective rather shan objective.

ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED On June 1, 1950 the writer personally contacted Mr JOHN C.

MERRILL, Managing Editor of the Easton, Pa., newspaper "The Easton Express", and as previously instructed, conveyed your personal appreciation of his assistance in the matter of the unfavorable publicity given to the Bureau by the Wilkes Barre, Pa., newspapers. Mr MERRILL advised he was happy to have been able to be of assistance to both you and the Bureau and that he would always cooperate to the fullest extent with both you and the Bureau. He said that as far as he has been able to detirmine the Wilkes Barre news-1 papers have not made any correction or retraction of the false impression they left with their readers and doubts they will now do so. that in his opinion they were guilty of "both bad newspaper work and shabby treatment of the Bureau".

At this time Mr MERRILL produced a clipping from the magazine Editor & Publisher entitled "Alleged Say in Philadelphia, Story in D.C." which as he recalls appeared in the issue of (May 26) 1950. Mr MERRILL desired to keep this clipping for his files and inasmuch as it may possibly not have been brought to your attention it is being quoted in it's entirety:

Finiladelphia - No newspapermen were present at the hearing May 16 for HARRY GOLD, the Philadelphian accused by the FBI of being ab atomic spy, because J. Edgar Hoover released the story from Washington and local agents, acting under orders. would not volunteer any additional details.

"Although newsmen were not actually barred from the hearing, held late at night in the chambers of Federal Judge James P. McGranery it was conducted under such secrecy that coverage was difficult.

"The chief gripe among reporters and desk men here was that the hearing for Gould was in process at the same time the story broke from Washington. However, reporters here were able to get some sketchy details from Judge McGranery.

At 12.40 p.m., 5/24/50, I received a message from ASAC HINZE that JOSEPH W. IRAGONHETTI, local manager of "Editor & Publisher," RI 6-4582, desired that I call relative to the hearing in Judge McGRANERI's chambers on the GOLD case.

I called Mr. IMAGONMETTI, and he stated that the Philadelphia Inquirer had commonted in their article on the GOID case that last night the acceptance were barred from the arraignment. He wanted to know if this was true and, if so, why.

I told Mr. IPAGONNETTI that I was at the arraigment and that I had no personal knowledge of any barring of reporters. As one reporter told the Editor and Publisher manager in Philadelphia who questioned him about the hearing, "You just don't go barging in a Federal Judge's chambers when the door is closed." Both men further stated that the "guard" consisted of two of Judge You Tanery's law clerks who told the reporter a hearing was in process.

The hearing, of course, was not conducted by the FBI, but by Judge McGranery who had sole authority over it. Mr. Cornelius did not advise Editor and Fublisher, as the latter reports, "he could not say whether newsmen were barred or not . . ." Mr. Cornelius did say, however, he attended the hearing and had no personal knowledge of barring of reporters. He explained that admission to the chambers was solely a matter for Judge McGranery to decide. He explained he talked with several reporters after the hearing and also observed press photographers in the outer room of the Judge's chambers.

There seems no question but that Joseph W. Dragonetti, Philadelphia manager of Editor and Fublisher, was interested in having the reporters he talked with state they had been barred from the hearing. This they refused to do, pointing out they were not barred but were late in arriving at the Judge's chambers.

Because of the personal interest you have shown in this matter I thought it proper to call to your attention the several errors in fact and distortions contained in the Editor and Fublisher article.

FBI'S GOOD JOB

eral Bureau of Investigation is unearthing an international Communist spy ring that may prove the most far-flung and sensational in history.

It began, as far as known, with the arrest and confession of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, Germanborn British atomic spy, who has admitted handing over top-secret bomb information to Russians. It may end with the capture of hundreds of Americans, Canadians and British, enmeshed in a gigantic plot to sell out their countries.

It was the FBI that instigated the arrest of Fuchs. Through the British renegade scientist, information was obtained that led to apprehension of Harry Gold, an obscure hospital biochemist, charged with being an intermediary through which Fuchs passed to the Soviet some of the most elaborately guarded secrets of military annals.

The case of Gold is harshly disturbing. He was so colored by anonymity, not even members of his own family had an inkling of his Communist tendencies. He was not a soap-boxer, belonged to no fellow-traveling groups, did not talk the cult. But he served an alien, inimical power.

Gold is reported to have told the FBI trat he believed he was "only helping the Soviet Minion obtain certain information to which it has entitled." Fuchs told a similar story. In the investigation of the Canadian spy ring, it was disclosed that every member had been called on to make a choice—loyalty to country or loyalty to the world cause of Communism. Communism won in each instance. Perhaps there had been a struggle with conscience, but in each instance the pull of Communism, the belief that its ideology had priority over any other, made traitors of them all.


Is it any wonder the "hysteria" some charge in our Communist rootings has gripped so many? When a man of Gold's caliber can be taken in by an utterly foreign philosophy and betray his country to enemy agents, even the professionally tolerant must be struck with hard-pricking fear. The spy machinery of Russia reaches wide and far below the surface of our easy democracy.

Combatting these vicious operations, the FBI is racking up a creditable record. Before Dr. Fuchs' questioning by FBI men is ended, it is expected several thousands of names will be added to FBI dossiers. London newspapers talk of impending arrests and about 2000 suspects are being investigated.

The leaders of Red front groups are stready tabulated and watched by FBI. The tougher job of ferreting out the more dangerous subversives, the professionals and minateurs in espidinage, is being handled steadily. There is no sinceure. But the assignment looks to be in capable hands.



Is it out of order to call attention to the fact that it wasn't a congressional investigation that broke the Gold case!

The arrest of Harry Gold, the Philadelphia bio-chemist was is said to have confessed serving as one of the go-betweens taking atomic energy secrets from Dr. Klaus Fuchs and forwarding them to Russia, makes it clearer than ever that espionage has been one of the functions of the Communist Party apparatus in this country.

It was the breaking of the Fuchs case that led to the discovery of Gold's part in the conspiracy. Gold, himself, may be willing to furnish information which will lead to further revelations and more evidence of the Communist Party's actual role.

From the facts that are established in this way it may be possible to arrive at common-sense conclusions about the need for tightening our internal defenses against penetration by Communist Party agents and subversive persons working for the Communist Party.

It is worth noting, however, that the evidence that broke the Gold case was not gathered by radio commentators seeking to create exclusive news for their own broadcasts. It is worth not-

ing that the facts were not dug up by senators who needed something senastional to proclaim at part; dinners. The investigating was not carried out in front of a battery of kleig lights and television cameras and microphones. The Gold case, like every other case that has brought to light important facts in connection with the activities of the country's enemies, was developed through long months of detailed work, earefully guarded against publicity.

Gold never would have been caught if the investigators had shouted from the rooftops every time they came upon a new suspect. Gold was pinned down only after the elimination of hundreds of persons who might have been temporarily under suspicion.

This sequel to the Fuchs case and chapters yet to come in the chronicle of atomic espionage in the United States are possible only because we have as expert and well-disciplined a security organization as the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

With reference to the above comment, I called Fred. Blumenthal, Pearson's top assistant, and told him that someone had really hung one on Drew last night.

He immediately stated that he was shocked when he heard Drew make the statement of Harry Gold's coming in as it was his recollection that Gold had been identified after more than 1,000 suspects had been investigated and that he thought that they had had the true version in their column at one time.

I told Blumenthal that this was exactly the facts, that Fuchs did not even give us Gold's name and that there were some 1,500 suspects involved.

Blumenthal stated he did not know where Drew got this information, that his hunch is that somebody probably gave it to him in England. He stated that he knows Drew is very unhappy, is anxious to get home and probably was just not thinking because it was too stupid a thing for him to do. Another Feather For FBI

The FBI was faced with an enormously difficult task in running down Harry Gold, 39, who now admits he was one of the contact men for Dr. Klaus Fuchs, the German born British physicist, in transmitting atomic information from the United States to Soviet Russia during World War II.

According to the New York Times, Fuchs, on being questioned by FBI agents in his prison cell in England, was unable to give the names of any of his associates.

But he did furnish descriptions.

One of these was that of a dark haired man about 40 years of age, five feet eight inches tall, round faced, and Slavic in appearance.

With this to go on, the FBI deduced that the unidentified suspect must be a man of scient tific pursuits. On this basis, a list of 1,300 names was compiled and each individual thereon checked.

By a process of elimination, the list finally boiled down to some half dozen chemists in the New York and Philadelphia Gold. He is 32 years of age, in native of Switzerland of Russiar: parentage and decidedly Slavic in appearance.

His own admissions finally put the brand of guilt upon him.

Gold's identification was almost like picking a needle out of a haystack.

Once more the country is reminded of the never say die persistence and down to the last suspect thoroughness typifying the FBI's pursuit of law breakers.

Even now other Fuchs helpers well may be trembling in their boots fearfully awaiting the day when their unholy treachery will be revealed.

The FBI may not always get its man but its batting average is so high as to make Americans feel our internal security is in capable and thoroughly trustworthy non political hands. Mr. Clegg

Bill stated he does not know the Attorney General and does not feel he could take the matter up with the Attorney General; however, we might get the Director to intercede for him in mentioning this to the Attorney General.

It seems to me that the most that we can do is to tell the Attorney General or Jim Bennett that we, of course, would have no objection to this if it were consistent with their policy. I do think we should make some overture merely so that we can tell Bill that we have let them know that we have no objection.

The Director might like to mention this to the Attorney General. We might even call Jim Bennett on the telephone and then leave it

solely up to them.

The Hidden Treason

The small, stocky ngure of Harry Gold, propelled suddenly from a colorless anonymity into world notoriety, is a portent of a deeply disturbing kind. There was nothing about Mr. Gold to distinguish him from hundreds of thousands of other Americans in minor technical or professional jobs. Of comparatively recent immigrant stock, in modest circumstances, with a good mind which had made excellent use of the great educational opportunities offered to all in this country, he was a hospital bio-chemist ving in a quiet obscurity and apparently bsorbed in his work. To find him at all the 'ederal' Bureau of Investigation had to dredge painstakingly through a list of some 1,200 names. But once found, he has been arrested, charged with being the intermediary in the Soviet espionage system through whom the British Dr. Klaus Fuchs passed to the Kremlin the most precious and the most elaborately guarded secrets in history.

It is his utter obscurity, the complete

It is his utter obscurity. His completely protective coloration, which is frightening. His own family and associates never red motely suspected, they declare, that he had any Communist leanings or connections. He received his science degree from a Catholic university. He was not a rebel or a fighter; he was not a victim of persecution; there was nothing to mark him as even a possible member of the vast Communist conspiracy against our Western civilization. Yet if the somehow managed to reach but, to pluck that from the countless thousands of his fellows and convert him into a singularly dangerous agent for the subvertion of the society whose privileges the so quietly

enjoyed.

Proof, of course, remains to be established.
But whatever the judgment as to Mr. Go d himself, no one can doubt certainly not after the Canadian cases, the Fuchs case, the Hiss case, the many other similar evidences of recent years—that this is the insidious way in which Soviet Russian conspiracy, infiltration and treason operate in our society. The lengths to which the F. B. I. had to go to make this arrest are instructive, and disturbing, in themselves. We are often accused of an anti-Communist "hysteria," and the excesses of McCarthyism give too much ground for the charge. But there is a reason behind even the excesse and before the portentous sigure of the byscure Mr. Gold, no one can deny that it

THE FBI'S arrest of an obscure Philadelphia chemist, Harry Gold, as a key figure in the Anglo-American atomic spy case throws interesting light not only on the problem of subversives in this country but on the Government's effort to combat it.

To understand the problem, it is necessary to consider its extent. It has been estimated reliably that thousands of persons are actively engaged in trying to obtain American secrets that might be valuable to Russia in case of war. Efforts are made to establish networks of esplonage agents in government, in labor unions, in key industries, in research organizations—in every sensitive area of our national life.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI, has estimated that there are 54,000 card-carrying Communists in the United States, supported by some 488,000 fellow travelers, all of them considered potential spies.

Now how did Harry Gold fit into this broad picture? Thus far, there has been no evidence to show that he was a member of the Communist Party. He had first come to the attention of anti-subversive agents through information furnished by a former Communist, Elizabeth Bentley. By 1947, the FBI had him pretty well tagged as a pro-Commie.

Then last winter the scene shifted to London, where Dr. Klaus Fuchs, the convicted British atomic scientist, said he had given secrets to an American intermediary whom he could not name. With no more than a physical description of their quarry as given by Dr. Fuchs, the FBI was able to put the finger on Gold out of some 1,200 suspects.

That is quite a tribute to the FBI. It is also rather reassuring evidence of the extent to which the agency keeps track of Communists and fellow travelers in this country. We will be surprised if the FBi fails to produce additional suspects before the atomic spy case has been





Investigation at the Rockefeller Institute indicated that OVAKIMIAN was a Doctor in the Chemistry Division of the Rockefeller Institute, having come there on January 1, 1937, on a fellowship from the Russian Government. He worked with the Institute until January 1, 1940, when he terminated this connection and left his forwarding address as Amtorg.

OVAKIMIAN was indicted for failure to register as a Soviet agent and was arrested and deported in 1941.

on June 1 and 2, 1950, HARRY DOID, self-admitted Soviet espionage agent, advised agents of the Philadelphia Office that in the summer of 1937 he met an individual who was introduced to him as STEVE SWARTZ. He advised that he turned information over to SWARTZ during 1937 and 1938. GOLD was of the impression that SWARTZ attended social functions on a Consular or diplomatic level and also that he, SWARTZ, may have been attached to Amtorg.





F.B.I. SPREADS NEW ANTI-SOVIET SPY STORY TO INTENSIFY WAR PREPARATIONS AND WITCH HUNTS

Yesterday, the spy hysteria and witch hunts in the United States were intensified by a brand new sensation about the arrest of a "phoney" atom spy.

In order to justify the "cold" war and the atemic war preparations, the F.B.I. announced that it arrested, in Philadelphia, one Harry Gold, who is supposed to have aided the English scientists Dr. Klaus Euchs in transmitting atomic information to a representative of the Soviet Union during wartime.

After Dr. Fuchs was sentenced for having given atomic secrets to a "foreign state", on March 1st, the Soviet Union announced, in an official statement, that the story about Fuchs' giving atomic secrets to the Soviet Union was fabricated from beginning to end.

Now the F.B.I. has refreshed the anti-Soviet spy hysteria with a statement about the arrest of one of Fuchs' assistants in the United States.

The F.B.I. says the arrested Harry fold was born in Switzerland, is 39 years old, and is a research chemist in a Philadelphia hospital. Gold was detained under \$100,000.00 bail.

Gold was detained for two days before official charges were brought in against him. The F.B.I. says Harry Gold confessed "to having been in contact with Fuchs" in 1944 and 1945 when that British scientist was visiting in the United States.

Gold is unmarried. For the past two years he has been chief biochemist of a hear's research project at Philadelphia General Hospital. He lived with his brother Joseph and his father Samuel. His brother and father stated that they are astounded by the arrest because none of them was ever a communist, nor even a communist sympathizer.

THOMAS L. BLACK, 1929 North Sixth Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, furnished the following information to Special Agents WILLIAM B. WELTE, Jr. and ROBERT W. HOLMES:

BLACK was contacted by a Soviet agent whom he knew as "GEORGE" for a period of three or four months in the early part of 1938 prior to his accident. BLACK was injured on March 10, 1938. GEORGE's contacts were few, and injured on march 10, 1938. GEORGE's contacts were few, and there is nothing about them which would stand out in BLACK's mind except that they were in general a continuation of PETERSEN's in that GEORGE showed an interest in industrial espionage. BLACK does not recall any specific information that he gave to GEORGE or any assignment that GEORGE gave him.





He stated that while he was in Moscow and apparently as a result of the contacts he made there, although he could remember none of the individuals by name with whom he talked, his brother JOHN was contacted in Salt Lake City by an individual named A. A. YAKOVLEV who was associated with the General Electric Company at Schenectady, New York.

"had a heavier bone structure and was not fate. swarthy complexion, almost Mexican-like in texture, black dancing eyes, and a really warm and friendly smile. SEMENOV was the only one of the Soviets who could have passed for an American (possibly on account of the length of his stay in this country) both in the manner in which he spoke, dressed and acted - and especially in the way in which he wore his hat. For some reason foreigners never wear their hats as Americans do, even though these hats are purchased here. Somehow or other they do something to them. SAM was erudite and cultured and a mechanical engineer and mathematician by trade. He had read widely in English literature and was thoroughly familiar with the works of CHARLES DICKENS, E-FENIMORE COOPER, SOMERSET MAUGHAM, THOMAS WOLF, and the poets WADSWORTH, BROWNING, SANDBERG (a mediocrity he said, and a bit of a faker!), ROBERT FROST and EDGAR LEE MASTERS. Regarding BROWNING, I can even recall our discussion of 'My Last Duchess. 1

complain of the nasty job he was doing and, in particular, would be critical of the paid agents with whom he worked apparently there were many such - for SEMENOV was indeed an active man. Also, it was soon evident (I knew SEMENOV from July of 1940 until March of 1944) that he was a very homesick man, one who longed to be in his native land. At every opportunity he would go to the ice hockey games at Madison Square Garden and then would remain for the free ice skating afterwards and he would tell me of how much joy he had got out of skiing in Russia and how he regretted that he was too busy to take advantage of the few opportunities here.

drudgery for me, but it was even more so for SAM. His whole life was a succession of waiting apprehensively on street corners in New York and in various other cities, and in all sorts of weather. Waits which were often futile and sometimeseextremely dangerous. Eating in cheap out-of-the-way restaurants and cajoling, pleading with and threatening various people.

"But, as I have said, for the most part, his was a happy and effusive nature and, over the years, we accumulated a store of memories and private jokes concerning out past trials and difficulties with various people - just as two very good and close friends often do.

"And, SAM would worry mbout me; on one occasion I came to New York four times in a single week, in a fruitless effort to obtain a report from ABE BROTHMAN on synthetic rubber, (Buna-S (ABE kept assuring me that the data was ready, but actually he had not even begun to work on the report). The last trip was on a Friday night and I met my Soviet superior afterwards and said, "ABE absolutely promised to have the report complete tomorrow; let's make the arrangements to meet. At this SEMENOV flew into the worst rage that I have ever seen: 'Look at you, ' he said. not only look like a ghost, but you are one - you're absolutely dead on your feet and exhausted. What must you're mother think? You goddamn fool. Let me not hear of one more work of coming to New York tomorrow or for several weeks to come - go home and spend some time with your family. This is an order. Listen, I'll bet you that son-of-a-bitch BROTHMAN has not even started this report and is just stalling for time. He is heartless and doesn't care how often you take trips to New York. You're good company and you listen to his bragging, so, of course, he is glad to see you. The hell with his Buna-S and everything - even if Moscow will fall tomorrow (which it never will) I am forbidding you to come to New York Saturday. for a literal

"All this was said in one explosive breath. Thep, SAM calmed down. 'Come, he said, we will go to the Ferris wheel Bar (in the cellar of the Henry Hudson Hotel on 57th Street and Ninth Avenue) and have a few double Canadian Clubs and some sandwiches, and then I shall put you in a cab and personally see that you get on a train for Philadelphia, Better yet, I shall buy you a parlob car seat and some Corona Corona cigars.' So it was.

"and, SAM was right. I was not till two months later, plus a prodigious amount of prodding and work on my part that the Buna-S report was finally readied by BROTHMAN.

PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY OF TH "One more incident; SAM would periodically about the fact that I was so often away from my family and, in particular, my mother. And, when my brother YUS/left for overseas service, he became especially anxious and tried in every way to cut down on my trips. But, his greatest concern seemed to be over the fact that I had no wife and family of my own. 'I realize that it is because of this work,' he said. But ites not natural or good. You are not ascetic and you have normal instincts and desires. We must find some solution to this problem. Obviously you cannot take on the responsibilities of marriage and still do this work, (And do not think that our people fail to realize the sacrifice you are making). So, as soon as it is possible, you will once and for all cease dealing in this lousy business and completely forget it all. But entirely. And, you can then go ahead and run around with girls every night in the week (even as your mother thinks you do now), and then pick out a nice one and get married and have children.

"SAM would continue saying that I could not go on in espionage work indefinitely - he said that I have already been in it too long - because not only was it too much of an ordeal, but inevitably a slip would occur, possibly not even one of my own making and the exposure would follow. How right he was.

for a family is one that caused me to tell both BROTHMAN and Mrs. HEINEMAN, Dr. FUCH'S sister in Cambridge, that I was married to a red-headed woman and was the father of twins. Ironically, this was the first clue that lead the FBI to me. Originally the purpose of this lie was to instill confidence in both AEE and FUCHS' sister - SEMENOV and YAKOVLEV had both instructed me that I should appear as a married man for the dual purpose of concealment of my true identity and to give the evidence of stability which a single man could not.

"And, SAM would continue: The obtaining of information in this underhanded way will not always be necessary. You'll see. After the war is over there will come a great period of cooperation between all nations and people will be

"able to travel freely back and forth through all countries.
You will openly come to Moscow and will meet all of your old friends again - They will be so glad to see you - and we'll have a wonderful party and I'll show you all around the town. Oh, we'll have a great time.

I do not think these were fakes - from PAUL and STEVE and FRED and would say that they were well. Even in the matter of the doubtlessly, carefully planned and staged presentation to me of the 'Order of The Red Star,' I am sure that, in spite of the ulterior motives involved (to set me up for the coming FUCHS affair and to insure that I would take enough money for expenses so as to carry out this work successfully) it was still the element of a genuine reward for work well done - and at a considerable risk and sacrifice. I have said many times that I would be utterly frank, and possibly I am now carrying this to the point of pathological honesty, but it must be clearly understood that there is no element of braggadocio here. There is only an unrelenting, stabbing pain that I could have done the harm that I did.

The last item regarding SEMENOV: I saw him for the final time in late February or early March of 1944, just after my meeting with YAKOVLEV for the first time earlier that very day. In July of that year I failed to keep an appointment in New York with YAKOVLEV and, when I saw him the next time, he regretfully told me that he and SEMENOV had waited for three hours for me to show up - they had planned that we would all have a last farewell drink together at the Ferris Wheel Bar and on two occasions in 1945, JOHN brought me greeting from SEMENOV, messages worked so that they were indoubtedly from SAM.

as SEMENOV, Even on a 12 year old photograph, that smile and those dark eyes and full lips were unmistakable. God knows what has happened to him in the Soviet Union. Yes, it made me think that I should want to rant and rave at those who 'got me into this' predicament. But, I cannot bring myself to think of these people without sorrow.

HARRY GOLD, interviewed during the period June 1 to July 10, 1950 furnished the following information:

Late in 1940 he, GOLD, went to Rochester, New York, to pick up information relating to photographic processes.

SEMENOV sent him on this trip. He was to pick up this information from ALFRED DEAN SLACK, an Espionage Agent.

SEMENOV told GOLD that he was to deliver this information received from SLACK to an alternate Soviet agent, not to SEMENOV. GOLD stated that he went to Buffalo, New York, after he had contacted SLACK and met the alternate near the Buffalo Railroad Station on a deserted street.

GOLD had received the impression that SEMENOV, in discussing this alternate agent, had mentioned the fact that he would probably not be as neat as GOLD would expect. GOLD advised that he believed that SEMENOV had later said to him "was he untidy as usual?" SEMENOV had also told GOLD that this alternate agent had been quite ill.

On June 21, 1950 GOLD was shown a photograph of JOSEPH KATZ. He stated that KATZ could well be the individual whom he contacted in Buffalo in 1940 but he could not be positive.

GOID Edvised that his Soviet superiors FRED (not identified) and SEMENOV, were apparently looking for introductions to important individuals in the newspaper or radio field outside of New York. GOID mentioned that he knew an employee at station KYW in Philadelphia but he was a 100 per cent loyal American. He recalled that SEMENOV quickly dismissed this suggestion particularly in view of the fact that this person did not have a high position and SEMENOV was only interested in people who were in policy-making positions. GOID said that in April or May, 1942, SEMENOV told him to be alert for anything in the press or scientific magazines for Comments on a "pressure wave."

GOLD said that at the time he did not realize what SEMENOV was referring to so he made inquiries of SEMENOV and from the responses felt that he too was ignorant of what was

actually wanted and that a pressure wave had something to do with a distributive pressure over a large area. GOID said that he now believes SEMENOV was referring to an atomic bomb explosion.

In 1943 SEMENOV suggested that he fake a nervous breakdown in order that he would get an extensive leave from his job and would be hospitalized by the Soviets somewhere in the southwest. He stated that this plan never materialized.

each of the Soviet agents with whom he worked. There was a considerable amount of repitition since in general the same techniques were employed. SEMENOV told GOLD that if he should detect signs of a surveillance at the moment of their meeting he should keep on going of if he should detect signs of a surveillance or if he, SEMENOV, detected signs of surveillance, he would keep on going and would make no attempt to effect contact.

In such cases, GOLD was instructed not to follow him, but if he came around again in five or ten minutes this was a sign that everything was alright and that his suspicions had been premature. SEMENOV also advised that if they should detect any signs of being watched while they were at dinner, they were to act in the following manner:

Should SEMENOV ever stand up suddenly in the middle of a sentence, slap GOLD on the back and say to him, I have left my money at home, and then leave, GOLD was to take this as a signal that SEMENOV had observed someone watching them. GOLD was to sit in the restaurant for some twenty to thirty minutes and upon leaving was to follow a very elusive course composed of a good deal of dodging and turning. He was to take buses, subways and taxi cabs but all in one direction as if heading for a definite destination. Then SEMENOV would call one of GOLD'S cousins in New York as a cover-up for GOLD'S reason for being in the City. Further, GOLD was not to return to Philadelphia that night. If GOLD thought it was necessary the following day he was to go away from Philadelphia rather than to it.

for getting rid of any incriminatory evidence on pieces of paper on his person was to walk along, tear the paper into yery tiny bits and scatter them while he walked.

SEMENOV related the following incident to GOLD:

attempting to get in touch with a man and his wife whom he knew lived on a farm near the town. SEMENOV stated that he reasoned they must come into town on some occasions and he began to wonder where the one place was which they were almost certain to visit. Finally he struck on the idea that Americans always went to drug stores. Thereupon he inquired in one of the two drug stores in the town and the persons he was interested in were readily identified.

GOLD said that SEMENOV had set twenty minutes as a definite waiting time. He said that on one occasion SEMENOV did not show up for two hours and he had waited for the simple reason that he had no return fare to Philadelphia. When SEMENOV finally did show up he said that he had been unable to make the original meeting but had just come by on the chance that GOLD might still be there.

any code except that they always referred to the material which GOLD was bringing to SEMENOV as candy.

ALFRED DEAN SLACK

on June 11, 1950 HARRY GOLD furnished the following information regarding his contacts with ALFRED DEAN SLACK on behalf of his Soviet expionage superior SEMENOV whom he referred to as "SAM":

whom he referred to as "SAM":

At this time he was shown various items seized
from his home under waiver. GOLD was shown a manila envelope
of Eastman Kodak, Rochester, bearing a handwritten name

. Building 110", with the name, "W. M B. 46" which appeared in the upper left corner. GOID said he wrote none of the above but he did write the notation on the envelope "development", with reference to the contents of the envelope, which were 29 pieces of a cut up aerial photograph of what appeared to be an Industrial plant, GOID stated that he did not recall it but that it undoubtedly was given to him by SLACK. He stated that from the appearance, it looked as though the photograph was cut with a large paper cutter and apparently had been recovered from a waste disposal, probably given to him by SLACK so that GOID could piece it together. GOID said that there were several possibilities as to why this was still in his possession. One-that SLACK gave it to him but GOLD forgot to turn it over to SAM. Two- SLACK wanted to show GOID the possibility of using kodachrome and aerial photography but that SIACK later might have given GOLD better examples of such, so that GOLD retained the one found in his possession, the better one being turned over by GOLD to SAM. GOLD recalled that SAM had exhibited an interest in the possibility of using kodachrome sin aerial photography but did not recall whether SAM first mentioned this or whether it was suggested to SAM by GOLD as a result of a conversation with SLACK.

The next item shown to GOLD was a folder containing numerous papers pertaining to work at Eastman Kodak. Outside of this folder was printed "DICK BRIGGS". GOLD stated that he had printed this. Relative to the source of this material, GOLD stated that it was given to him by SLACK and that he believed that he either must have forgotten to give it to SAM or might have told SAM about it and SAM was not interested. GOLD said that the entire file came from SLACK and SLACK probably thought that SAM would be interested in it in view of BRIGGS' former association with the Soviets.

The next item was a folder entitled "Flue Gas from Smelters", which contained plant notes, photostats of charts, and other data which apparently came from Eastman Kodak, Rochester, GOLD perused all this material and stated that it undoubtedly had been given him by SLACK. A piece of white bond paper in a

folder contained only the following typewritten notation, "the accompanying material represents material and data concerning work which has been done on the problem of silver recovery from salvaged photographic emulsion, " GOLD said that he had no independent recollection of this notation but it apparently was for the benefit of GOLD and/or SAM. GOLD could not explain why this was still in his possession but he gave two possibilities or guesses as to the reasons. One-SIACK later got more up to date processes covering the same material which were better and which were given to GOLD who subsequently transmitted them to SAM, and therefore GOLD retained the outmoded ones. Two-that SLACK was to do some more work on the material so that an explanation of what the material was concerned with could be given to SAME. GOLD stated that he never took any material out of the package to discuss with SAM at any time when they were together, and he never recalled SAM returning any material to him, so that the possibility of this material having been given to SAM and sub sequently returned to GOLD was out of the question.

The next item shown was a blank manila folder containing plain pieces of unruled paper with handwriting thereon. All of this material was in GOLD'S handwriting, according to him. GOLD said that all was a rough draft of reports which he intended making up for transmittal to SAM, but that he could not remember whether final reports were ever drawn up and turned over to SAM, although there was definite possibility that such was done.

The next items shown were three handwritten pages beginning as follows. Page 1 "Design report covering drawing H-189, etc." Page 2- Beginning, "Baffle Plates to inhibit swirling, etc." Page 3- Beginning, "The use of the subject type of assembly, etc." GOLD stated that all three pages were in his handwriting and was fough draft report for transmittal to SAM but he stated that this was in connection with ABRAHAM BROTHMAN.

The next item shown was an unlabeled manila folder containing numerous reports which GOLD stated dealt with photography, some reports dating as early as 1942, Included in this folder were numerous reports entitled, "Sub-Conference",
