Greenglass Gave Nagasaki Bomb Plan to Rosenberg

NEW YORK, Mar. 20 (AP)—The atom bomb sketch which confessed spy David Greenglass says he gave his brother-in-law for relay to Russia was identified today as a drawing of the bomb dropped at Nagasaki.

The brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, his wife, Ethel, and Morton Sobell, a radar expert, are on trial in federal court, charged with conspiring to spy for Russia during wartime. Mrs. Rosenberg is Greenglass' sister.

All three face a possible death penalty if convicted.

The sketch and other data which Greenglass has testified he gave to Rosenberg were identified by John A. Derry, special assistant to the director of production of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The courtroom was cleared of spectators, except for newspapermen, while Derry was on the stand.

Greenglass, who has pleaded guilty and is awaiting sentence for spying, already has testified he got the information while serving as an Army sergeant at the Los Alamos atom bomb project.

Derry testified he was a liaison officer between the Los Alamos project and Lt. Gen. Lester R. Groves, head of the wartime atom bomb project.

"In 1945, to your knowledge, did any foreign government have knowledge regarding the development and construction of that weapon?" U. S. Atty. Irving Saypol asked.

"With the exception of Britain and Canada, no other," Derry replied.

Los Alamos No. 1 Wartime Secret, A-Spy Jury Told

NEW YORK, March 20 (INS)—The Government disclosed to a jury in Federal Court today the strict security regulations which a Russian spy ring was able to crack at Los Alamos, N.M., in 1944 to obtain secrets about America's atom bomb.

John Lansdale Jr., a Cleveland lawyer who was formerly chief military intelligence officer at Los Alamos, declared the project was so secret that even the words "atom bomb" were never used in official correspondence to the late President Roosevelt.

Lansdale was a Government witness at the trial of Julius Rosenberg, his wife, Ethel, and Morton Sobell, who are accused of conspiracy to commit espionage. The trio face a maximum penalty of death if convicted.

Lansdale testified that the names of scientists, including Dr. Niels Bohr, the famous Danish nuclear expert, were "highly classified"—so much so that Dr. Bohr was given the fictitious name of "Nicholas Baker" at the project.

Russians Got Information

In spite of the stringent regulations, however, the Russians in November, 1944, obtained general information about the Los Alamos setup.

David Greenglass, a former Army sergeant, has testified he gave his wife, Ruth, for passage to Rosenberg and then to the Russians, facts on the Los Alamos buildings, the number of people working at "Site Y," as it was known, the names of scientists, including Bohr, and other pertinent information.

Lansdale told the jury Los Alamos was selected because of its remote and lonely location. It was spread over 50,000 acres and was surrounded by a high wire fence.

he said, were indoctrinated to maintain the greatest secrecy and only the top personnel knew they were working on the atom bomb. Mail and telephone calls were censored. The personnel was carefully screened. Use of the words "nuclear fission" were barred in correspondence.

"We in G-2 had no knowledge that the Russians were working on an atom bomb, but we knew they were much interested in what we were doing along this line," said Lansdale.

Says Germans Ahead

The strictest precautions were taken, he went on, to prevent the Germans or any foreign power from realizing America was working on the A-bomb. He said the Germans were further advanced on the A-bomb than the United States and if they became aware America was working on one, they would "redouble their efforts."

Initially, he said, no foreign country participated in the project at Los Alamos but eventually Britain and Canada were taking part.

Through the efforts of the Russian spy ring, including the co-operation of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, the British scientist, and a group of Red spies, the A-bomb secret leaked out full six months prior to the dropping of the bomb on Hiroshima in 1945.

Dr. Fuchs, having pleaded guilty to espionage, following his arrest, is now serving a 14-year term in an English prison.

D. C., a member of the Atomic Energy Commission, testified that "Los Alamos was more classified than anything else in the country" in 1944 and 1945.

He said he took part in the first A-bomb explosion at Alamogordo, N. M., in 1945.

The prosecution then asked a court reporter to read to the jury testimony Greenglass had given in which he detailed information concerning the makeup of the improved type of A-bomb which was dropped on Nagasaki in September, 1945. Greenglass had passed information to the Russian spy ring concerning this bomb as well as one dropped earlier on Hiroshima.

Derry said Greenglass' description was "substantially correct" and that an expert could preceive the construction of the atom bomb from such a description.

A-Spy Suspect Refuses to Tell If He Is Red

NEW YORK, March 23 (AP)—A defendant at the atomic spy trial in Federal Court is refusing to answer questions on whether he ever was a member of the Communist party or Young Communist League.

The defendant, Julius Rosenberg, bases his refusal on the ground of possible self-incrimination.

Judge Irving R. Kaufman said he would keep an open mind temporarily on whether to direct Rosenberg to answer.

Conceding that the defendant's contention had some merit, the judge said he might or might not sustain Rosenberg in his refusal to testify on Communist affiliations.

A decision may come Monday, when the trial resumes after a recess for Good Friday. U. S. Attorney Irving H. Saypol will continue cross-examining Rosenberg on Monday.

Rosenberg, a 34-year-old electrical engineer; his wife, Ethel, 35, and Morton Sobell, 33, a radar expert, are on trial on charges of conspiracy to commit atomic espionage for Russia during World War II.

All could get the death penalty if convicted.

Prosecution witnesses have testified that Rosenberg was a Communist. The Government charges that the three defendants had a common bond of membership in the Communist party, and that this bond provided the motive for the alleged spy conspiracy.

One of the questions at which Rosenberg balked was whether he had known a City College classmate named "Perl or Mutterperl."

William Perl, 32-year-old jet propulsion expert and Columbia University instructor, was arrested March 14 on a perjury indictment. He was charged with lying when he told a Federal grand jury that he did not know Rosenberg, Sobell or other persons mentioned in the spy case.

A-Spy Plot Unfolded In Local Apartment

The fantastic espionage plot which reached its climax in a New York Federal courtroom today and placed two men and a woman in the shadow of the electric chair had its full bloom in an Albuquerque apartment.

The apartment at 208 N. High was the rendezvous of the one-time Army sergeant, David Greenglass, and his wife, Ruth.

Greenglass, a confessed spy, had been an Army technician in Los Alamos, the "lightly-guarded atomic center." He was the principal Government witness in the trial of his own sister, Ethel Rosenberg; his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, and Morton Sobell, a radar expert.

Greenglass mounted the witness stand in the trial which resulted in today's verdict of guilty and gave the details of the plot to transfer wartime atomic secrets to Russia.

Wife Worked Here
His wife, Ruth, came to Albuquerque to work in the Office of

Price Administration in the Roosevelt Building from April, 1945, to the following February.

The apartment at 208 N. High is where Greenglass met with his wife on weekend visits and where he made the "contacts" to transfer information he gathered at Los Alamos to Russian agents.

The apartment was the scene of the delivery of secrets to Harry Gold, another confessed spy, who already has been sentenced to 30 years in prison for his role in the espionage plot.

Greenglass proved he was a man of remarkable memory during his testimony against his sister, his brother-in-law, and Sobell. He made sketches of the atom bomb which was dropped on Nagasaki. The sketches were good enough, together with the physical description of the bomb, to enable any atom bomb maker to overcome some of the most serious obstacles.

Greenglass, who also faces espionage charges, told during the

trial how he helped innocents to get information. He "just walked" into a laboratory at Los Alamos and picked up a piece of material from a table, he said. The material he picked up was a "source of neutrons." He testified that he "intended to be tricky" in picking up bits of information at Los Alamos.

Called on Memory
"I didn't take any blueprints," Greenglass testified. "I sketched out of Los Alamos," Greenglass testified. "I relied on my memory."

Mrs. Greenglass testified during the trial that Rosenberg had first proposed that she help in passing atom secrets to Russia just before she was to come to Albuquerque to meet her husband.

Her brother-in-law, she said, gave her \$150 to come here to meet her husband, after she decided to relay Rosenberg's message to him. She has been named a conspirator in the plot, but not indicted as a defendant. Greenglass insisted

spy story twist to the testimony during the trial when he told of how contact would be established with him in Albuquerque.

The scene, he testified, was the Rosenberg home in New York. His sister went into the kitchen and returned with a Jello box cut into two pieces. Rosenberg got one of the pieces. He got the other, Greenglass said.

This was done so that when his "contact" appeared in Albuquerque he would have the other piece to the Jello box to establish identification and the link with the Rosenbergs.

After he and his wife had become established in the apartment here, he had his first "contact," Greenglass said.

"The first Sunday in June, 1943, a man knocked at the door of my home," he said. "My wife and I were at home." The caller told him "Julius sent me," Greenglass said.

Produces Box Piece

The visitor produced the piece of the Jello box and Greenglass got his piece of the box from his wife's purse. The pieces fitted and "contact" had been established, Greenglass related.

He identified the "contact" as Harry Gold, who was linked to the Klaus Fuchs spy case in which British scientist Fuchs now is serving a prison term in England.

Greenglass passed on to Gold at the meeting here a report on the lens mold and sketches of the bomb.

After he gave Gold the information, Greenglass said, Gold handed

him an envelope containing \$500. Greenglass had sold out his country.

Greenglass said "It was easy" to take secrets from the Los Alamos plant where he worked. He testified he never was "frisked."

Mrs. Greenglass has been recalled by former co-worker in the OPA office here as one who did not mix well with other workers.

OPA did not make a security check on her because she was referred to the office by Civil Service and was the wife of a soldier.

She always was critical of anything outside of New York, her former co-workers said, and always seemed to be well supplied with Kleenex and nylon when those items were scarce during the war.

The "final payment" for Greenglass will come when the court metes out his own sentence.

Death Penalty Is Possible; Appeal Planned

NEW YORK, March 29—(INS)—A Federal Court jury today found two men and a woman guilty in America's first atomic spy trial.

They face a possible death penalty when they are sentenced next week for conspiracy to steal their country's A-bomb secrets for Russia during World War II.

The convicted defendants are Julius Rosenberg, 33, a New York electrical engineer, his wife, Ethel, 33, and Morton Sobell, 34, an electronics and radar specialist.

It was testified at the trial that the material stolen by the conspirators included a cross-section drawing of the type of A-bomb dropped on Hiroshima.

All three defendants took the verdict stoically.

Judge Irving R. Kaufman, who called the crimes on which the three stand convicted "loathesome," announced he will impose sentence on April 5.

If the death sentence is not imposed—and the Government did not specifically demand it—the two men and one woman could be given prison terms up to 30 years each.

Plan Appeal

Defense counsel immediately announced that appeals will be taken "to the highest court of this land," both from the verdicts, and the sentences.

The defense lawyers said: "Despite the jury's verdict, the defendants maintain that they are innocent of the crime. They intend to appeal the judgment and the sentence to the highest court of this land. They will always maintain their innocence."

Defense Attorney Emanuel H. Bloch said that "in this kind of a political climate the defendants felt it was almost impossible to overcome a charge of this kind."

Sobell's wife, a petite brunette who has attended the trial from the start, was near tears. "I haven't anything to say," she said. "I don't want to speak to anyone."

The Rosenbergs are the parents of two young children.

A tense silence gripped the courtroom as the jury of 11 men and one woman filed into the courtroom at 11 a. m. to announce its verdict. It had been given the case at 4:52 p. m. yesterday.

Judge Kaufman, the young-looking jurist who presided at the long trial, ascended the bench just before the jury came in.

Rosenberg, tall, slim, and spectacled, sat quietly beside his short, plump, black-haired wife. He wore a gray business suit. She was

attired in a Navy blue skirt, pink shirtwaist and red weskit. The faces of the Rosenbergs were pale as they scanned the jurors.

A few feet away, flanked by his two lawyers, sat Sobell, their friend, a stocky, swarthy-complexioned man with glasses. Sobell nervously rubbed his hands together.

The traditional pin could have been heard drop as the court waited the climax of an international spy mystery that first was exploded just over a year ago with the arrest and conviction of British atomic scientist Dr. Klaus Fuchs, and the subsequent arrest and confession of Philadelphia biochemist Harry Gold.

All three persons in this case were linked to the sensational Fuchs-Gold conspiracy and Gold was a star government witness against them. So was Mrs. Rosen-

berg's own brother, former Army Sgt. David Greenglass, who told of filching A-secrets while he was with the Army at the Los Alamos atom installation.

Sgt. Greenglass will be sentenced April 5.

The clerk of court, Martin Schaefer, polled the jurors one by one. "Members of the jury," the clerk asked, "have you reached a verdict?"

"We have," announced the foreman, Vincent J. Lebonotte of White Plains, N. Y., a department store manager.

Standing up and in a clear voice, the foreman then said:

"We the jury find the defendant Julius Rosenberg guilty as charged."

There was a pause. He then said:

"We find the defendant Ethel Rosenberg guilty as charged."

And then:

"We find the defendant Morton Sobell guilty as charged."

Rosenberg leaned over a bit and whispered something to his wife. Sobell's face took on a grim appearance and he whispered something to his counsel.

The clerk of court then polled the jury, asking each member:

"Is that your verdict?"

Each juror in turn replied, "Yes."

Judge Kaufman leaned forward and, addressing the jurors, said:

"You have my deep gratitude for the work you have done, for the patience you have shown in the performance of your duty."

"I must say as an individual I cannot be happy because it is a sad day for America. A crime of this kind is so shocking, involving as it did one of the most destructive weapons in history, that I can find no words to describe this loathesome deed."

Turning to the attorneys for both sides, the judge praised them for their "capable and fair presentation of this case." He also took occasion to laud the FBI.

The defendants were allowed to have lunch at the Federal Building before being removed to three different places of detention—Rosenberg to the Federal House of Detention, Ethel Rosenberg to the Women's Department of City Prison and Sobell to the City Prison. They will remain separated until after their sentence.

Tip Off Came in 1950

The events which led to the arrests of scholarly-looking Rosenberg, his wife and Sobell began in February, 1950, when German-born Dr. Klaus Fuchs was seized in Britain where he worked as one of the nation's top atomic scientists.

Fuchs, who admitted passing

secret atomic data to Soviet agents on four occasions between 1943 and 1947, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 14 years in prison.

The downfall of Fuchs, the mastermind of the atomic ring quickly led Federal spy-hunter to his chief American counterpart Harry Gold, 39-year-old Philadelphia biochemist.

Gold, arrested by the FBI on May 23, admitted that Fuchs had turned over to him a number of atomic secrets when the British scientist worked at the Los Alamos atomic project.

The Philadelphian pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

Gold's confession led to the arrest of ex-Sgt. Greenglass, who readily admitted that he transmitted vital atom secrets to the Philadelphian when he was assigned to the Los Alamos installation.

Greenglass, who turned informer and became the Government chief witness against his sister and brother-in-law, was seized by the FBI on June 16, 1950.

Has Two Children

Greenglass was born in New York of Russian-Polish parentage and is a married man with two children. He testified that Rosenberg recruited him for the Soviet spy ring and gave him money to flee the U. S. when Fuchs and Gold were arrested.

Mrs. Rosenberg was arrested Aug. 11. She was seized as she left the U. S. Courthouse in New York where she testified before grand jury investigating subversive activities.

One week later, the FBI grabbed Sobell at Laredo, Tex. Sobell, who had been a college classmate of Rosenberg, had gone to Mexico but was deported.

NEW YORK, April 5 (UP) The man and woman who stole America's A-bomb secret for Soviet Russia and "altered the course of history" were sentenced today to death in the electric chair.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman ruled that Julius Rosenberg, 32, an electrical engineer, and his tiny wife, Ethel, 35, would have to pay the supreme penalty for "a crime worse than murder—that has already caused the Communist aggression in Korea."

He left their co-conspirator, Morton Sobell, 34, an electronic engineer, off with his life but imposed the maximum prison term permissible under the espionage law—30 years.

The Rosenbergs were the first persons ever sentenced to death for espionage by United States civil courts.

Under Federal law, a death sentence imposed by a Federal court is carried out in and by the mode of the state in which the court sat. This means the Rosenbergs must die in the electric chair of New York's Sing Sing Prison—unless an appeal succeeds.

Kaufman set the week of May 21 for their executions but this date will be postponed by an appeal.

Greenglass Up Tomorrow
The fourth member of the conspiracy, Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, David Greenglass, 29, will be sentenced at 2 p. m., tomorrow. He was the government's chief witness against his sister and her husband, and U. S. District Attorney Irving R. Saypol was expected to recommend leniency.

Greenglass, while a sergeant in the Army, stole the A-bomb secrets from Los Alamos, N. M., and turned them over to the Rosenbergs, who delivered them to Russia by way of the Soviet vice consul in New York.

Greenglass turned over the information to one of the spy ring couriers at the Albuquerque apartment of his wife, who worked in Albuquerque while her husband was assigned to Los Alamos.

The widespread investigation of successful Russian espionage began

Klaus Fuchs, British atomic physicist, was arrested in Britain. He himself got off with a 30-year prison sentence, the maximum penalty under British law. Gold, a Philadelphia biologist, who functioned as a courier for the spy ring that permitted Russians to make an atomic bomb at least three years earlier than they could have on their own, was given a 30-year sentence. Kaufman summoned the Rosenbergs, parents of two small children, before the court first and addressed them in grave and measured tones. Their crime was worse than murder, he said.

In committing murder the defendant kills only his victim, but in your case I believe your conduct in putting into the hands of the enemy the secrets of the atomic bomb already caused the Communist aggression in Korea. I believe by your betrayal you have altered the course of history," he said.

The man and woman took their defense without flinching but Rosenberg's face, without a word, was ashen. Both were in New York's Lower East Side tenement district and both the use of the American opportunity by getting good education despite the poverty of their immigrant parents. They themselves are the parents of two small children.

Appeal Announced
Manuel H. Bloch, attorney for the Rosenbergs, announced an immediate appeal to the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals and if that fails, to the United States Supreme Court.

No matter what the outcome, they will assert their innocence as long as they breathe," he said. "I believe they are victims of political hysteria and that the sentence of the court was based on extraneous political considerations having no legitimate connection with the crime charged." The judge's attorney, Harold Phillips, said: "The sentence seemed to me to be much too severe even if all the statements made against them were in every way true. The viewpoint of the judge is understandable and I am convinced his motives were of the best."

The Rosenbergs were sentenced under the Federal espionage law which permits the death penalty only if the espionage was committed during wartime. In passing sentence, Kaufman noted that the maximum penalty for espionage during peacetime was 30 years imprisonment.

"I ask that some thought be given to that for a moment, for it is most likely means that even if they are successful in the year-

1951 in delivering to Russia or any foreign power our secrets concerning the newer type atom bombs, or even the H-bomb, the maximum punishment that any court could impose in that situation would be 30 years," he said.

"I therefore say that it is time for Congress to re-examine the penal provision of the espionage statute."

Devoted to Communism

The Rosenbergs refused to testify during their trial whether or not they were Communists on grounds of self-incrimination, but Kaufman left no doubt that their betrayal of their native country had been inspired by devotion to communism and Soviet Russia.

Their betrayal, he said, was "rather a sordid, dirty work — however idealistic the rationalizations of the persons who engaged in it—with but one paramount theme, the betrayal of one's own country."

"Citizens of this country who betray their fellow countrymen can be under none of the delusions about the benignity of Soviet power that they might have been prior to World War II. The nature of Russian terrorism is now self-evident."

Because of their far-reaching treachery, which was "a diabolical conspiracy to destroy this God-fearing nation," Kaufman said he was compelled to impose a sentence "which will demonstrate that the nation's security must remain inviolate."

He based the supreme penalty, he continued, on the evidence of their trial which showed clearly that Rosenberg was "a prime mover in this conspiracy" and his wife was "a full-fledged partner in this crime."

The Rosenbergs were called before the bench at 11:31 a. m. Kaufman asked if they had anything to say. They said they didn't. Then, in grave and measured tones, the judge tongue-lashed them for treachery to their country and told them they would have to die.

"I've searched the record, I've searched by conscience to find some reason for mercy, for it is only human to be merciful," Kaufman said.

Nevertheless, he continued, he felt he would be violating his trust

if he imposed a sentence less than the extreme penalty.

U. S. Attorney Irving R. Saypol, did not specifically demand the death penalty but asked whether there was "any room for compassion and mercy" for spies who served "antagonistic forces which may well be prepared to overwhelm us."

He said the defendants had affected the lives and freedom of

possibly whole generations of mankind.

Declaring Americans were giving their lives daily in Korea to "preserve our freedom," Saypol asked:

"How could the life of one of these individuals be weighed against the life of a single American soldier?"

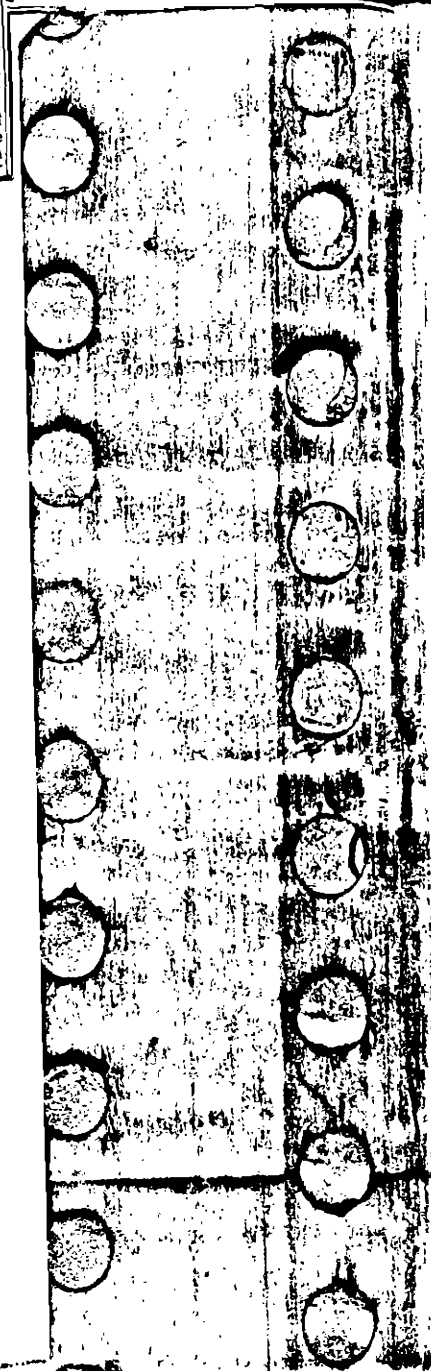
The prosecutor said it "would be a delusion to believe that the war in Korea is anything but a

struggle by Russia." "And if the defendants, he said, had given their allegiance to that force

which "is identified as the real enemy in that fight."

Leniency would be an invitation

to further acts of the same kind, and mercy would be "an indication of weakness," Saypol said.

As interested divisions were informed by reflet, inquiry was directed to the Criminal Division of the Department for an opinion as to what action should be taken by the Bureau in the event Sarant or Mrs. Carol Dayton re-enters the United States. The following memorandum has now been received from the Criminal Division:

"The office of the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York has now advised the Department that should Sarant re-enter the country it would be desirable to have him served immediately with a subpoena requiring his appearance forthwith before the grand jury in the Southern District of New York, in the belief that Sarant's testimony might well disclose additional information regarding the activities of William Perl, presently under indictment in that district for perjury.

"A subpoena for Sarant would be valid anywhere in the United States, as you know, but since there is no way of ascertaining at what point he may attempt to enter the country, the following procedure is recommended: Upon receipt of information by you from the Immigration and Naturalization Service or the Bureau of Customs, pursuant to the steps you have placed with those agencies, that Sarant is attempting to re-enter the country the United States Attorney's office in the Southern District of New York should be notified immediately in order that a subpoena can be transmitted to the United States Marshal in the district covering the point of entry for service upon Sarant. At the same time the United States Marshal's office having jurisdiction should be put on notice to expect said subpoena from the Southern District of New York in order that arrangements can be made for prompt service. You may also find it advisable to maintain a physical surveillance of Sarant for the purpose of facilitating the service of the subpoena. Your attention is invited to the fact that inasmuch as there is no warrant outstanding for Sarant's arrest, there is no way in which he can be involuntarily detained.

"With respect to Mrs. Carol Dayton, it would appear that since there is no process outstanding for her, the only action that can be taken should she return to the United States would be for Bureau agents to seek an early interview with her for whatever information she may choose to furnish. The United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York should be notified, however, inasmuch as he may wish at that time to issue a subpoena for Mrs. Dayton to appear forthwith before the grand jury, in which event the Bureau should proceed along the same lines as recommended for Sarant."

Any division receiving information indicating the return of Sarant or Carol Dayton to the United States should be guided by the foregoing, and the Bureau and the Albany and New York divisions should be advised immediately upon receipt of such information.

High Court Rejects Atomic Spies Plea

Rosenbergs Are Nearer Death Chair

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—The Supreme Court refused today to reconsider its recent action dooming Julius and Ethel Rosenberg to the electric chair as atomic spies.

The husband and wife team were convicted in New York Federal District Court March 29, 1951 on charges of passing atomic secrets to Russia.

They have been confined to the Sing Sing Prison death house for a year and a half while their appeal moved through the courts.

The Supreme Court originally rejected the Rosenbergs' appeal Oct. 13, but delayed sending its mandate to the trial court so the couple could make the usual plea to the tribunal for reconsideration of its action.

To Send Mandate

The high bench now is expected to send its mandate to the trial court in a few days. Normal procedure then is for government attorneys to demand that the death sentence be carried out.

The tribunal's brief order noted that Justice Hugo L. Black still felt the Rosenbergs appeals should be heard.

Justice Felix Frankfurter filed a two-page statement reiterating that denial of review means only that there were not four members of the court who thought there were sufficient grounds for taking the case.

Frankfurters noted that the Rosenbergs, in applying for a rehearing, brought up five additional legal questions. One of these, he said, "is beyond the scope of the authority of this court, and I deem it appropriate to say so." This issue was the contention that the death sentence was too severe.

"A sentence imposed by a United States district court, even though it be a death sentence, is not within the power of this court to revise," Frankfurter said.

Not Last Hope

Today's action does not necessarily snuff out the last hope of the tall electrical engineer and his petite wife.

Sometimes, after losing an appeal, defense lawyers seek habeas corpus action, alleging that their clients did not receive a fair trial. The Rosenbergs also could appeal to President Truman to commute the death sentences.

In refusing to reconsider its earlier action, the Supreme Court also:

1—Denied a petition on behalf of an estimated 50,000 interested persons who sought to act as "friends of the court" in the case. The signatures were obtained by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case (1050 Sixth Ave.) New York. The petition asked permission to file a brief in which it was argued that the Rosenbergs deserved a new trial.

2—Rejected an appeal for reconsideration filed by Morton Sobell, who drew a 30-year prison term as an accomplice of the Rosenbergs.

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Two Atomic Spies Lose Final Appeal To Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The Supreme Court today fired a double-barreled "no" at pleas by convicted atomic spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg that the high tribunal save them from the electric chair.

By an 8 to 1 vote—Justice Black dissenting—the court refused for the second time in just over a month to review their conviction on charges of stealing A-bomb secrets for Russia.

And Justice Frankfurter, in a statement, declared the high court did not have the power to reduce their death sentence, as the couple had asked. Congress he said, abolished such power in 1911.

This second turndown for the New York couple—the first came Oct. 13—came close to slamming Sing Sing prison's deathhouse door on the couple. The Rosenbergs have been imprisoned there during the 19 months since they were convicted.

Only the President can save the Rosenbergs by reducing their death sentences to prison terms. Today's ruling clears the way for the federal prosecutor in New York to ask the U. S. district court to set an execution date.

The husband-wife spy team cannot appeal to the Supreme Court again without the court's special permission.

The tribunal today also refused for the second time to hear an appeal by Morton Sobell, radar expert who was convicted of aiding the Rosenbergs in their spying. He is under a 30-year prison term.

In a relatively light day of decisions, the court handed down two other important rulings. It said:

1. A fugitive wanting to test the constitutionality of the treat-

ment he received in a state prison from which he fled must go to the state courts in which the prison is located.

The court upheld 8-1 Ohio's attempts to send Robert Woodall, a Negro who fled the Alabama state penitentiary, back to Alabama. In fighting extradition, he said he would receive "barbaric and cruel" torture if returned to Alabama. Woodall had served six years for burglary and larceny in Alabama when he escaped. He was captured in Cleveland.

2. Payments from GI insurance policies may not be made to the heirs of beneficiaries, and payments stop when the beneficiaries die.

The 5-4 ruling awarded to Mrs. Clara Belle Henning of Boston the entire \$10,000 payment from a national service insurance policy on the life of her son, Eugene C. Henning. He died July 4, 1945, while in the Navy.

The decision reversed the U. S. District Court in Boston which had ordered the payments from the policy divided between Mrs. Henning and the heirs of young Henning's deceased father, Otto F. Henning, and stepmother, Mrs. Bessie M. Henning. The father, original beneficiary of the policy, died five months after his son without filing a claim and Bessie Henning died in 1949.

Question Fairness

The Rosenbergs had questioned whether they received a fair trial, saying the death sentences may "have been unduly influenced by political prejudice and hysteria."

The couple said although they were accused of conspiracy to commit espionage their trial in U. S. District Court in New York amounted to one for treason without the required constitutional safeguards.

The high court also refused to consider another petition asking a new trial for the Rosenbergs and Sobell. Sponsors of the petition said it was signed by 50,000 persons.

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Atom Spy Team To Be Executed Week of Jan. 12

Judge Signs Order For Electrocution Of Rosenberg, Wife

NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP)—The week of Jan. 12 was set today for the execution of a husband and wife atom spy team—the first traitors in American history doomed to death by a civil court.

The pair, Julius Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel, were convicted and sentenced to death April 5, 1951, for ferreting out American A-bomb secrets for a Russian-bossed international spy ring.

Countless of their fellow-Americans—in anger or curiosity—have pleaded to be allowed to watch them die in Sing Sing's electric chair. Few if any of these requests can be granted.

Execution Jan. 15 Likely

The execution date was set by Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman, who doomed them originally with the personal opinion that their treason led to the war in Korea. They will probably die Jan. 15—a Thursday.

In contrast to the dramatic tone of their sentencing, when bells tolled the hour of noon outside Kaufman's federal courtroom, the only sound today was the scratch of the judge's pen as he signed the execution order.

Since they were sentenced, the Rosenbergs carried an appeal doggedly from one court to another. Finally, last week, the U. S. Supreme Court gave them a final rejection.

Their attorney, Emanuel H. Bloch, said he'll try once again Monday for a new trial. But his was plainly a move of last-minute desperation, with little chance of success.

Pardon Seems Unlikely

Unless President Truman pardons the couple, they almost certainly will leave their separate death house cells the third week in January to walk the grim "last mile" to the electric chair.

A pardon seems unlikely unless the Rosenbergs name fellow traitors whose identity the government claims they are concealing.

Military courts have sentenced native American spies to death before, but never a civil court.

The Communists have demanded that the Rosenbergs be spared. And 50,000 persons have petitioned that they be granted a new

trial. The death sentences have been denounced as "cruel and unusual punishment."

But others are eager to see them die. U. S. Marshal William A. Carroll said he has had countless letters and phone calls from people all over the country who want to witness the executions.

Room For Few Spectators

There is room for only a handful of spectators in the death house, however. Carroll said he will ask the Rosenbergs "whom they want to be present."

Rosenberg, 34, and his wife, 36, have two small children. They have seen little of them since they went to the death house some 18 months ago.

Rosenberg, a New York born electrical engineer, was depicted in trial testimony as long dedicated to service of the Russians and a volunteer spy for them.

He persuaded his own brother-in-law, David Greenglass, to feed him A-bomb secrets from Los Alamos, cradle of America's war-time atom bomb development. Greenglass was an Army sergeant there.

Gets 15-Year Sentence

Greenglass testified against his brother-in-law and sister at their trial and got off with a 15-year sentence.

Convicted with the Rosenbergs was Morton Sobell, 36, a radar expert. He escaped the death penalty and got 30 years in prison instead because of his lesser guilt.

Sobell served a month in Atlanta Penitentiary. Then he elected to interrupt his term to appeal his case. He has spent most of the last 18 months in the Federal House of Detention in New York. He receives no credit for this latter period behind bars.

The government tried today to move him to Alcatraz, but he won a court stay for a few days.

The Price of Treason—No. 1—

Spy Ring Got Atomic Bomb Secrets in Local Apartment

On the first Sunday in June, 1945 in an apartment at 209 High NE, Albuquerque, sketches of the atomic bomb designed and made at Los Alamos were passed to a Russian spy.

David Greenglass, then an Army sergeant at Los Alamos, gave the sketches to Harry Gold, a principal in the Rosenberg atomic spy ring.

Greenglass spent his weekends in Albuquerque. His wife worked as a stenographer in the Office of Price Administration in the Rosenwald Building.

The Rosenbergs have been sentenced to die in the New York electric chair during the week of Jan. 12. Greenglass and Gold are in prison.

The Tribune today presents the first article of a two part series on the gigantic espionage ring which changed the course of history because it gave the Russians the secret of the deadly atomic bomb.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24—

"Plain, deliberate, contemplated murder," the judge began, "is dwarfed in magnitude by comparison with the crime you have committed."

So declared Federal Judge Irving Kaufman on April 5, 1951. He made it quite clear to spectators, moustached Julius Rosenberg and his thin-lipped wife, Ethel, that there was no reason for mercy.

The sentence of the court was death. And for their crime of treason against the United States—stealing atomic secrets for Russia—the Rosenbergs were doomed to the electric chair.

Their doom was upheld by the Court of Appeals. And the Supreme Court not once, but twice,

refused to intervene in the decision.

Never before had any American

court handed down a death penalty in peacetime for wartime espionage. (Continued on Page 7)

pionage. Nor had any American civil court ever—in peace or war—handed down a death judgment against spies. Even in dooming Ethel Rosenberg, American justice was breaking a 90-year-old precedent of sparing women spies.

From the beginning, the case—like the judgment—was enormous in its reach.

There was, first, the complication of time. The Grand Jury's indictment charged the Rosenbergs with giving atomic secrets to the Russians between 1944 and 1946. And though the crime was committed when Russia had been an American ally, by trial time the two nations were antagonists.

The case was further involved by the national boundaries it crossed. Strands of the gigantic espionage web were anchored in Los Alamos, Canada, New York, London, Mexico City, Albuquerque, and Moscow.

The net also involved important names: physicists Allan Nunn May and Klaus Fuchs, a member of the British Atomic Energy Mission. And such unlikely names as "Dave from Pittsburgh" and "The Lone Ranger."

The name of Rosenberg did not

appear until long after the Russians exploded their atomic bomb in September, 1949. Even then atomic experts were wondering why the Reds had waited so long.

A year earlier it had become apparent that "the world's best kept secret" had been exposed. The Kremlin knew more about atomic energy than all but a handful of men among the democracies.

The FBI was called in to trace what looked like espionage. They constructed a mythical spy. He was high up in the atomic bomb organization. He had access to American and British information. He was a scientist.

The trail led to London. And within months they had nailed Dr. Klaus Fuchs. Gnawed by conscience, he confessed quickly. But he had been merely an idealist serving a cause. He knew no names. Not even that of his colleague, Allan Nunn May, who had been sharing secrets with the Reds, too.

But Fuchs could identify the courier who had picked up the information. Not the fellow's

name, but enough to make it easy for the FBI in New York to arrest Harry Gold.

Under aliases and with plenty of Russian-supplied money, Gold had been liaison man for the Kremlin. He had worked with Anatoli Yakovlev, Soviet vice consul in New York. They met on subway trains, in front of statues, at busy intersections. Gold passed on his information and received orders.

In his confession, Gold named Fuchs, May, Yakovlev. He also named a former U. S. Army sergeant, David Greenglass. And Greenglass' brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg.

"Fantastic," said Rosenberg at his arraignment. "It's something like kids hear on the Lone Ranger."

High Court Turns Down Rosenbergs Plea for Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today refused for the second time to grant a hearing to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, the New York couple condemned to death for passing A-bomb secrets to Russia.

The refusal clears the way for the government to ask that an execution date be set for the husband-wife spy team.

Thus, only a commutation of their death sentence by the President could save them from going to the electric chair in New York's Sing Sing prison. The couple has been in the Sing Sing death house for 19 months.

The Supreme Court last Oct. 13 refused to review the Rosenbergs' trial. Their lawyers then asked the court to reconsider and grant them a hearing. This request was rejected in a short court order.

The order noted that Justice Black adhered to the view that the Rosenbergs and radar expert Morton Sobell should have a high court hearing. Thus, the vote today and last October 13 was 8-1.

Sobell, was convicted with the Rosenbergs and got a 30-year prison sentence. He, too, asked the court to reconsider but that request was denied today.

The Price of Treason—No. 2—

A-Spy Ring Courier Paid Greenglass Here for Secrets

Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, the atomic spies, carved an infamous niche in history when they stole A-secrets for Russia. They have been sentenced to die during the week of Jan. 12 in the New York electric chair.

A part of their plot was perpetrated in Albuquerque. David Greenglass, then an Army sergeant at Los Alamos, passed atomic-bomb sketches to "David from Pittsburgh" (Harry Gold), the Rosenberg courier.

This is a second article of a two-part series on a plot which altered the course of history.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—"Who knows," said Federal Judge Irving Kaufman in pronouncing the death sentence on Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, but that millions of innocent people may pay the price of your treason.

The jurge was quite certain that the silent couple standing before him had already contributed heavily to the Communist aggression in Korea. And for their part in a world-wide spy-

May had confesed. So had spy-courier Harry Gold, who named the Rosenbergs in the plot.

Said the Rosenbergs: "We cannot reassert often or emphatically enough our complete innocence."

Thus, much of the Rosenberg story came from Ethel's brother, David Greenglass, who played a strong supporting role. His reward for state's evidence was a light sentence of 15 years.

find his wife's brother in a key position. For years he had curried Greenglass with presents and party literature, until he could call the younger man his protege.

Now it was time for David Greenglass to contribute to Russia. Greenglass searched his soul that night, and the following morning he answered the questions Julius had sent with Ruth. How many employed at Los Alamos? How many buildings? What big names?

Ruth went home with the memorized information. And two months later her husband came to New York on furlough with more information. At the Rosenbergs' Monroe Street apartment on the fringe of Greenwich Village, he dictated facts and figures to Ethel. And from memory he drew the plans for the lenses that had been designed to detonate the A-bomb.

Now Julius had a new plan. He cut a Jello boxtop in half, giving one part to Greenglass. The matching half, he said, would identify the courier who would come to Los Alamos for information.

In June of 1945, a stranger with half of a boxtop called on the Greenglasses in their Albuquerque apartment. He was, he said,

"Dave from Pittsburgh"—in court he signed his name, "Harry Gold."

In return for Greenglass' sketches and data, he turned over an unexpected gift of \$500. Ruth Greenglass put that money in a bank — except for \$37.50 with which she bought a U. S. War Bond.

As soon as David Greenglass was honorably discharged from the Army, he lost his value as an informant. But by then the Rosenbergs were busy with other new sources. And the two couples confined their cooperation to a family machine shop that never made much money.

The espionage business did not come between them until the FBI moved in on Klaus Fuchs. His confession in London threw the Rosenbergs into desperation.

Quickly, Julius made intricate plans to get the Greenglasses out of the country. He gave them \$5000 and planned their journey by the underground Red railroad to Mexico and Switzerland.

In spite of Fuchs' confession and Harry Gold's arrest, the Greenglasses expected the scare to blow over. But neither Julius nor Ethel Rosenberg was surprised on July 17, 1950, when the FBI knocked on their door.

The big surprise must have been in Judge Kaufman's death sentence — a sentence as historic as the espionage for which it was handed down by the court.

The Greenglasses resided in an apartment at 209 High NE in Albuquerque. David Greenglass spent the weekends here with his wife, coming from Los Alamos.

On the first Sunday in June, 1945, he gave Gold here more sketches on the lens used to "trigger" the atomic bomb. He also drew from memory, sketches of the bomb.

When Gold knocked on the door of the Greenglass apartment here that Sunday, he said: "Julius sent me." That, too, was one of the keys in the fantastic bomb plot. Then he produced the Jello box top to complete one of the links in the conspiracy chain.

Met Fuchs at Santa Fe

On the day before he met Greenglass here, Gold also met Dr. Karl Fuchs, one of the key men in the spy plot, at Santa Fe. Fuchs gave him secrets about the Los Alamos plant and the bomb. Fuchs is now in a British prison.

Greenglass testified at the Rosenberg trial that "it was easy" to take secrets from Los Alamos. He said he was never "frisked."

Mrs. Greenglass came to Albuquerque with \$150 given her by Rosenberg. She was a stenographer and found employment here in the Enforcement and Price Di-

vision of the Office of Price Administration with offices in the Rosenwald Building. She worked there from April, 1945 to February, 1946.

OPA did not make a security check on her because she was referred to the office by Civil Service and was the wife of a soldier.

Mrs. Greenglass was indicted as a co-conspirator in the case but was not named as a defendant in the Rosenberg spy trial. She was a key witness against the Rosenbergs.

Gold Pleaded Guilty

Gold also pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

A congressional committee has estimated that the defection of Gold, Greenglass and the Rosenbergs speeded up the first test of the Soviet A-Bomb by 18 months. Others believed they speeded it by 10 years.

The first atomic bomb was exploded at Alamogordo on July 16, 1945. The Russians through the Fuchs-Rosenberg-Gold-Greenglass plot, got the secrets months before.

Atom Spy Case Gets New Judge

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Three atomic spies, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell, had another judge assigned to their case today.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman was relieved from hearing the trio's applications to have their sentences set aside on constitutional grounds.

Kaufman is the judge who sentenced the Rosenbergs to death and Sobell to 30 years in prison for conspiring to give atomic secrets to Russia.

Defense counsel had submitted affidavits alleging that Kaufman was biased in the case.

Judge Sylvester J. Ryan was assigned to hear the applications. Ryan scheduled a hearing Monday.

The Rosenbergs are scheduled to die at Sing Sing Prison the week of Jan. 12. Sobell is in Alcatraz Prison.

Atom Spy Followed Example of His Adored Sister

ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED
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Ethel Rosenberg Big Influence On Her Brother

(Editor's Note: What makes a person become a paid traitor? In the case of David Greenglass, it was a matter of following the example of his adored older sister and her suitor. Here is another close look at convicted atom spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg and those about them.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—There is a saying that in the animal kingdom, the female is the dealer of the species.

It could be applied to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

Ethel Greenglass Rosenberg was 24 when she married Julius Rosenberg. That was in 1939. He was 21. They had courted for two years, in one of those strange romances which the Communist Party approved of. Working together on party assignments took the place of dates.

Ethel was a homely girl who had always felt a need to dominate a man. At home in the cold water flat behind her father's machine shop at 64 Sheriff St. in the east side of Manhattan, she practiced on David, the youngest of her three brothers.

David, a happy youngster, idolized his older sister. When he was 13, Ethel, then 20, began feeding him Communist literature.

Wedding Present

Gradually, under Ethel's tutelage, assisted in the later stages by Julius' example, David was brought into the Communist Party. On the day Julius and Ethel were married, David, as a wedding present, joined the Young Communist League.

Greenglass resided in Albuquerque while he was stationed at Los Alamos and visited over the weekends here with his wife, who was an OPA employee.

When the war came on, color-blind David was rejected by the Navy but drafted by the Army. Through a failure in Army security regulations, he was assigned to Oak Ridge and then as a shop machinist at Los Alamos, N. M., where the atom bomb was being manufactured.

It was Ethel and Julius Rosenberg who eventually told David what he was working on—Julius having learned through his Russian superiors, who wanted every scrap of information they could get. Ethel persuaded David, Julius helping, to pass sketches and information to Julius.

A cash consideration came from the Russians. It was paid through Julius, enabling David to bring his bride, Ruth Prime Greenglass, first to visit and then live with him at Albuquerque.

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Devoted to Wife

David, an essentially jolly young man and deeply devoted to Ruth, spied indefatigably for the Russians, after some earlier misgivings. When the net closed in, Ethel pressed him to flee through Mexico to Russia using \$5000 supplied by Julius. But Ruth was still ailing from severe burns in a fire and there was also an 8-day-old baby.

David chose to stay and face the music, even though it involved giving evidence against his sister and her husband.

Julius and Ethel then obtained passport pictures for themselves and their two little boys, Michael and Robert. But the FBI closed in. At the trial, David who drew 15 years and didn't appeal, was depicted by the Rosenbergs' lawyer as a monster who sought the death of his own sister.

The defense said nothing about a sister who, seven years older and aware of the risks and dishonor involved in espionage, used her influence to drag a worshipping younger brother into a plot against his country.

Ethel Was Encourager

But no matter the reason, the fact remains that David Greenglass was a spy and a traitor.

Ethel was the encourager of spies. She typed the notes and helped with the contacts. When Julius graduated to handling large sums of bribe money for the Russians, she boasted of the night club bills he ran up in entertaining his contacts.

Yet, there was good in Ethel Greenglass Rosenberg.

In her trial testimony, there are touching passages describing her efforts to make a home for her husband and their two children in Knickerbocker Village, a

slum clearance project in Manhattan. ~~Stray~~ remarks about gathering a piece of furniture here, a piece there. Making do with substitutes. Cooking, washing, cleaning. Taking child psychology courses and additional music lessons in order to be a better mother for little Michael, who was emotionally disturbed, and the baby Robert.

Strong moves have been taken to gain clemency for the Rosenbergs.

Here there have been the usual familiar petitions and newspaper ads. This time, the sponsors call themselves the Emergency Committee of the Arts and Professions to Secure Clemency for the Rosenbergs.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver was quoted in one ad as protesting the death sentences, but he wrote a public letter, saying publication of the excerpt was unauthorized and omitted his strong personal condemnation of the Rosenbergs' guilt.

Appealing to the revulsion many people feel for the death penalty for any crime is a large part of the Red strategy.

Let's Name Be Used

Harvard's Dr. Harlow Shapley also let his name be used.

Hundreds of abusive letters and telegrams have poured in on Federal Judge Irving Kaufman, who tried and sentenced the Rosenbergs. Some effort has been made to counteract this. Veterans organizations have praised Kaufman and counter-picketed the Reds.

The American Committee for Cultural Freedom issued a statement warning that "... those who permit any doubt to arise about the pre-eminent fact of the Rosenbergs' guilt are doing a grave disservice to the cause of justice—and of mercy, too."

The committee is convinced that the Rosenbergs could still save their lives if they would repent, but that the Communists won't let them. "Dead," says the statement, "the Rosenbergs are Communist martyrs. Alive, they are potential informers. There is no doubt as to where the Communist preference lies."

Rosenbergs' Fate May Be Left to Ike

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (UP)
—President Truman may pass on to his successor the problem of deciding whether to spare the lives of condemned atomic spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

The Rosenbergs are awaiting execution in Sing Sing Penitentiary for helping to pass U. S. atomic secrets to Russia. They have appealed to the President for execution clemency, and their execution — originally scheduled for this week — has been postponed indefinitely pending a White House decision.

Mr. Truman told his farewell news conference yesterday that the Rosenbergs appeals had not yet come to him from the Justice Department. Since Mr. Truman has only four more days in office, it appeared likely that President-elect Eisenhower would inherit problem.

Julius Rosenberg Repudiated Jewish Religion as Youth

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16—Moral scruples don't hamper Communists. Lying is standard equipment with them.

But it is doubtful if any evil they have ever done has surpassed the effort they and their agents

have made to raise an issue of anti-Semitism in the Rosenberg case.

Julius and Ethel Rosenberg are Jews in name only. In their youth, they turned their backs on Judaism, scorning its infinite treasures and high moral standards.

Before they were married and throughout their marriage, they were zealously non-Jews. Those who have forsaken a religious tradition without finding or

evolving a satisfactory substitute are communism's easy converts.

Julius' repudiation of his religion was the more dramatic because in Jewish family life, the male heir has special duties and responsibilities.

Julius went as far as being confirmed at the bar mizvah ceremony which Jewish boys undergo at puberty. But afterward, he turned his back on his father's ambition for him to be a rabbi.

Father Garment Worker

Harry Rosenberg, the father, was an East Side garment worker, much respected for his honesty, uprightness and piety. There were lots of fathers like him in New York at the turn of the century, men whose eyes saw the vision of liberty and opportunity offered even in the slums of a great city.

Papa Rosenberg could remember how much worse life was—and how hopeless—in other places. Of an evening he would gather his family around the kitchen table and lecture them on Washington and Jefferson, the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights.

He died before Julius' final disgrace. But for five years the ailing old man was estranged from his son who dishonored the family name for the first time publicly when he lost a wartime government job because of Communist connections.

Father Rosenberg died in his sleep one night, after Julius had visited him at a hospital. Everybody hoped, for the father's sake, that there had been some words of peace and reconciliation between them.

At the espionage trial in New York, Julius Rosenberg tried shamelessly to cloak himself in the respectability of the religion he had discarded. He dropped references unnecessarily, for example, to a watch given him at his confirmation.

Though refusing eight times to answer questions about his Communist associations on grounds of self-incrimination, at one point he tried to explain his radical views on the ground that he hated Hitler who had killed "millions of my co-religionists."

The Jewish judge, the Jewish prosecutor, and other Jews in the court were unimpressed. But since the Russians and their agents have taken up the case, millions over the world have heard that Julius and Ethel were sentenced to die because they were Jews.

Tried to Scotch Lie
Jewish publications and Jewish

leaders have tried to scotch the lie, which curiously was carried to its ultimate intensity at the very time the entire Jewish component of the Red government of Czechoslovakia was being hanged for "cosmopolitanism," a veiled word for Jewish internationalism—without a peep from the Daily Worker.

Reds in Europe have slyly insinuated that the Rosenbergs received the death penalty because the officers of the court wished to disassociate themselves from their disgraced co-religionists.

Le Monde, an influential Paris newspaper, fell completely for this angle and compared the Ros-

ROSENBERGS GRANTED STAY

Douglas Puts Off Execution

WASHINGTON, June 17 (UP)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas today granted a stay of execution to atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, but it still was not definitely settled whether the condemned couple will escape the electric chair tomorrow night.



Justice William O. Douglas

The Justice Department announced it will try to contest Douglas' "unprecedented action" before an emergency session of the entire Supreme Court.

Within an hour after Douglas made his dramatic ruling, Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell Jr. said he will ask Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson later today to convene the full court for a review of Douglas' action.

It will be up to Vinson to decide when—or whether—the full court will be called back into emergency session. It recessed Monday for the summer after turning down the Rosenbergs.

The government's hope was that it could get the full court to meet tomorrow and set Douglas' decision aside.

Six justices constitute a quorum and that number possibly could be convened soon if Vinson desired.

Douglas Leaves Town

Among the justices not in town was Douglas. He left town, pre-

sumably for Oregon, before his ruling was released.

Douglas, acting alone, reprieved the Rosenbergs because of "serious doubts" in his mind that the death sentence could be imposed in their case unless the jury recommended it. The jury had not done so.

The Rosenbergs won the indefinite stay—it could be a year before a final decision in the case—just 36 hours before they were scheduled to die in the Sing Sing electric chair at 11 p.m. tomorrow—their 14th wedding anniversary—for passing atomic secrets to Russia.

In an eight-page opinion, Douglas said that the stay would be effective indefinitely until one of the complex legal questions involved in the case can be determined in the lower courts.

The big question on which the

Rosenbergs won their reprieve was whether the penalty provisions of the 1946 Atomic Energy Act superseded those of the espionage law under which they were convicted in March, 1951, and sentenced to die by Federal Judge Irvin R. Kaufman of New York.

Douglas said that in the Atomic Energy Act "Congress lowered the level of penalties" to permit a death sentence only on recommendation of the convicting jury.

Victory For Outsider

Ironically, it was not the battery of Rosenberg lawyers who won the stay, but two outsiders who had been described earlier in the week by Kaufman as "intruders and interlopers." They are Fyke Farmer of Nashville, Tenn., and Daniel G. Marshall of Los Angeles, who represented Irwin Edelman, a Los Angeles resident who had interested himself in the case.

It was Farmer and Marshall who raised the issue of the Atomic Energy Act.

Farmer had raised the same issue before Kaufman, the trial and sentencing judge, earlier in the week. Kaufman turned him down.

Chief defense attorney Emanuel H. Bloch announced that his next move will be to start action in New York Federal District Court.

Bloch said he thinks it will take a long time—possibly as much as a year—to get a final decision on the question of sentence.

The Rosenbergs were tried under the Espionage Act of 1917 for crimes alleged to have been committed in 1944 and 1945. Under that act the penalty for violations committed in wartime can be death or a maximum of 30 years in prison.

Act Explained

The Atomic Energy Act—which went on the statute books in 1946, after the crimes charged to the Rosenbergs but four years before their arrest and indictment—provides the death penalty in certain instances but "only upon recommendation of the jury and only in cases where the offense was committed with intent to injure the United States." If the jury does not recommend death the maximum penalty is \$20,000 fine and 20 years in prison.

If the offender merely had "reason to believe" his act would hurt the United States and aid a foreign power, the maximum penalty is \$10,000 fine and 10 years' imprisonment.

The convicting jury had not recommended the death penalty. It made no recommendation. Judge Kaufman himself had imposed the death sentence.

It was on this issue that Douglas granted the condemned husband-and-wife spy team at least a temporary reprieve.

"I have serious doubts whether this death sentence may be imposed for this offense except and unless a jury recommends it," Douglas said. "The Rosenbergs should have an opportunity to litigate that issue."

Douglas said it is important that the country "be protected against the nefarious plans of spies who would destroy us," but that "it is also important that before we allow human lives to be snuffed out we be sure—emphatically sure—that we act within the law. If we are not sure, there will be lingering doubts to plague the conscience after the event."

Douglas, in his ruling, said he did not decide whether the death sentence was properly imposed but merely that there is a "substantial" legal question "which should be decided after full argument and deliberation."

The Rosenbergs won the dramatic 11th hour stay from Douglas after failing in three separate moves before the full bench Monday to obtain Supreme Court intervention. On Monday, the tribunal had refused a stay, turned down for the fourth time an appeal for a review of the case and denied a petition for a writ of habeas corpus that would have had the effect of delaying the execution. And last month, Chief Justice Vinson also had denied a stay.

But the defense lawyers persisted in their efforts—and finally succeeded.

Calls It a New Point

After the court recesses—as it did last Monday—it is permissible for a single justice to consider, and grant, a stay of execution if he finds there are new considerations in a case that have not been presented before.

Douglas said the point about validity of the death sentence had not been raised in any of the five earlier petitions presented to the court.

"The first reaction is that if it was not raised previously, it must have no substance to it," Douglas said. "But on reflection it presents a considerable question. One purpose of the Atomic Energy Act was to ameliorate the penalties imposed for disclosing atomic secrets."

He said Congress had indicated the purpose of the law was to pro-

tect the national defense and yet assure "sufficient freedom of interchange between scientists to assure the nation of continued scientific progress."

Douglas said the Rosenbergs "obviously were not engaged in an exchange of scientific information in the interests of science," but he held that "Congress lowered the level of penalties to protect all those who might be charged with the unlawful disclosure of atomic data."

Question Up Before

"If the Rosenbergs are the beneficiaries, it is merely the result of the application of the new law with an even hand," the opinion said. "In any event, Congress prescribed the precise conditions under which the death penalty could be imposed. And all violators—Communists as well as non-Communists—are entitled to that protection."

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(K) "THE ROSENBERG CASE: A STUDY IN COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA" - CENTRAL RESEARCH MATTER -- There are enclosed herewith copies of a research paper prepared by the Central Research Unit and captioned as above. This study includes a review of the Rosenberg trial, a summary of Communist activities on behalf of the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell, and a point-by-point refutation of the specific charges advanced

by the Communist movement in an effort to discredit the Government's case and exploit this matter for propaganda purposes.

It is believed that this paper may prove especially valuable to those agents assigned to the Toplev Program as well as those who are handling interviews in connection with the Security Informant Program. The Communist movement is making a continuing issue out of the so-called Rosenberg "frame-up" and it is, therefore, expected that agents assigned to security work will encounter frequent references to this case during contacts with Communist Party members and sympathizers. The primary purpose of this research paper is to acquaint agents with the full facts of this case, to apprise them of likely Communist allegations in connection with the case, and to provide them with convincing answers to such allegations. In a sense this study might be regarded as "counterpropaganda" although this is not to infer that the paper is in any way at variance with the facts.

Rosenberg case files released

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI has made public the first of its secret files on the espionage investigation of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, a batch of 725 pages turned

over to a history professor researching the case.

The action was the first time the FBI has disclosed any material from the probe which led to the conviction

of the Rosenbergs for slipping atomic bomb secrets to Soviet agents and their executions in the electric chair in 1953.

THE DOCUMENTS include progress reports on the investigation, lists of items found in a search of the Rosenbergs' New York apartment, and summaries of interviews with Rosenberg and with confessed spy David Greenglass, brother of Ethel Rosenberg and the principal witness against the Rosenbergs.

The FBI turned over the documents to Allen Weinstein, a Smith College professor who petitioned for them three years ago and subsequently filed suit under the Freedom of Information Act.

THE ROSENBERGS' sons, Robert and Michael Meeropol, also have brought suit to obtain the 48,000-page FBI file. The sons use the name of the couple who adopted them after their parents' execution. A federal court has ordered disclosure of most documents by Nov. 15 and Deputy Atty. Gen. Harold R. Tyler has pressed the

FBI for "maximum possible disclosure" quickly.

THE DOCUMENTS delivered to Weinstein also will be mailed to the Meeropols who have claimed that full disclosure of the files would prove their parents were innocent.

One document, a summary of an FBI interview with Rosenberg on June 16, 1950, said: "Rosenberg claimed that he and David did not discuss the atom bomb from the technical standpoint, either before or after the restrictions were lifted."

THE SUMMARY continued: "He said that prior to dropping of the atom bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, that he did not know anything about the atom bomb."

Another document states that Rosenberg denied in a 1941 statement concerning his firing from a government job that he or his wife were Communist Party members. During the trial, Rosenberg refused to testify about his alleged party membership on Fifth Amendment grounds.

"At the trial of the above-named client of this office which began on March 6, 1951, in the U. S. District Court for the Southern District of New York, the Government introduced into evidence as its exhibit 16 a photostatic copy of what purported to be a registration card of the Albuquerque Hilton Hotel for June 3, 1945, in the name of guest HARRY GOLD. This card showed on its reverse side, in addition to the hotel date-time stamp, only the initials 'F.L.B.'"

(2) "It is the understanding of this office that Agents acting under supervision visited the Albuquerque Hilton in May of 1950 and procured this card, as well as another, dated September 19, 1945 for the same guest. The latter card bears, in addition to the date-time stamp, the handwritten date '5-23-50', an FBI identification number '65-6' and three sets of initials, 'F.I.T.', 'A.L.' and one that is undecipherable by this office.

"Since a serious question has arisen as to the authenticity of the June third card, it is imperative that a handwriting expert for Mr. Sobell examine the original cards. Only photostatic copies were, as has been indicated, introduced in evidence at the trial and the originals are not on file with the Court. We respectfully request that our expert be permitted to examine the original cards if they are in the possession of your agency, and, if not, that we be informed as to their exact whereabouts."

Bridge Had Big Spy Role

The Castillo St. Bridge, now being demolished along the route of Santa Fe's inner loop, played a part in one of history's most important espionage plots.

It was at the Castillo St. Bridge, and the College St. Bridge a block to the west, that Atomic Spy Harry Gold met with confederates and received America's nuclear secrets in the 1940s.

Gold, who was released from federal prison a year ago tomorrow after serving nearly 16 years of a 30-year sentence, was a major figure in the Dr. Klaus Fuchs espionage ring.

One of the members of the Soviet spy ring with whom Gold communicated in Santa Fe was David Greenglass, a brother-in-law of Julius Rosenberg. Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel, were executed for conspiring to smuggle top secret atomic information out of Los Alamos for the Russians.

Greenglass was an Army sergeant working at Los Alamos in 1945. His part in the spy ring was to slip atomic development information from Los Alamos to Gold, a Philadelphia chemist.

According to the FBI reports on the case, Rosenberg gave Greenglass half of the top of a Jello box top as an identification marker to be matched with the other half when meeting Gold.

No Rosenberg records in state, Ortega reports

Requests by the two sons of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg for New Mexico records relating to their parents' infamous spy case cannot be granted because the records no longer exist, the U.S. attorney here said.

U.S. Attorney Victor Ortega said that the records had been turned over to the Federal Record Center in Denver, Colo., years ago and had been routinely destroyed.

THE RECORDS sought in New Mexico by the two sons pertained to an indictment the state once had against David Greenglass, brother of Ethel Rosenberg.

The indictment later was dismissed, Ortega said.

"My predecessors had turned all the records over to Denver and, after 15 years, they were disposed of," he said.

"All we had here was a card file indicating that we once had some records," he added.

THE SONS, Robert and Michael Meeropol, now living in New York, asked the U.S. District Court on Monday in Washington, D.C., to bare all the government's files on the celebrated espionage case.

They hope to prove the innocence of their parents, who were convicted in a New York court and sentenced to die.

They were executed in the electric chair at Sing Sing on June 19, 1953, after weaving a web of espionage that centered on Albuquerque and Los Alamos.

THEIR CASE was the first involving atomic espionage. The Rosenbergs stole se-

crets about the atomic bombs being made at Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory during World War II and gave them to the Russians.

The Rosenbergs lived for a time during the war in an apartment at 209 High NE.

It was there that the Rosenbergs passed secret atomic bomb information to Red agent Harry Gold. Gold identified himself to the Rosenbergs by showing them a half of a Jello box that matched the other half he carried.

THEY TURNED details and sketches of the bomb over to Gold in June 1945.

The plans had been supplied by Greenglass, an Army sergeant stationed in Los Alamos.

Greenglass was a key government witness against the Rosenbergs.

The Meeropol brothers, who took the name of the

family that adopted them, contend in their suit that prosecutors attempted to extort a confession from their parents.

Failing that, they "orchestrated" the testimony and improperly communicated with the trial judge in order to gain conviction and the death penalty, they contend.

ORTEGA SAID that his office had told the Meeropols' attorneys earlier that the Greenglass files in New Mexico no longer existed.

"The record center informed us when we inquired as to what happened to this file, in order to respond to our inquiry, that the file had been pulped," he said.

"In my view, whatever they are interested in should be available through the FBI or the U.S. Attorney's Office in the southern district of New York where they were tried," Ortega said.

Rosenberg sons will sue FBI

WASHINGTON (AP) — The sons of convicted spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg say they still plan a law suit to obtain secret government files on their parents' case despite a Justice Department offer of many of the files.

"We haven't received one page of those files despite many such promises" the sons, Robert and Michael Meeropol, said in a statement.

THE MEEROPOLS, who go by the name of the couple who adopted them after their parents were executed 22 years ago, contend the Rosenbergs were innocent. The sons say secret government records will prove there was no foundation for the charges against their parents.

The Rosenbergs were convicted of giving U.S. atomic secrets to the Soviet Union.

The Justice Department has ordered the FBI to turn over many secret files on the Rosenberg case to the sons, letters made public Thursday revealed.

In one of the letters, Deputy Atty. Gen. Harold Tyler

Jr. said the Meeropols' request for files on their parents' case "involves some 240 sections of records, containing an estimated 48,000 pages."

THE FBI has launched "a page-by-page review" of those records to determine

which ones may be withheld because they deal with national security information, FBI investigating techniques or other matters protected by law from disclosure, he said.

But the FBI has been instructed "to begin releasing

documents as soon as possible and to continue to do so on a regular basis," Tyler wrote. A June 19 letter from Atty. Gen. Edward Levi contained similar instructions.

ROBERT MEEROPOL said in a telephone interview that it was "a bald lie that they have to go through the files." He said the FBI began a page-by-page review of the files in 1973 after then-Atty. Gen. Elliot Richardson ordered the bureau to turn over 25,000 pages to an historian studying the Rosenberg case.

The Meeropols said the letters told them they could consider the letters denials of requests that the sons made in February for the information under the Freedom of Information Act.

The Justice Department letters promised them some files, but did not specify which or when they would be given to them, the Meeropols' statement said.

"Until we actually get the files, and we mean all the files, including the prosecution witnesses' pretrial statements, we will have to move in the courts," they said.

Block Asked on Action By Rosenbergs' Sons

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Dept. has asked a U.S. District Court to block further demands by the sons of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg for records of an investigation that led to their execution as Russian spies.

The department sought to head off more demands by Michael and Robert Meeropol, who use the name of the family which adopted them after the Rosenbergs were convicted of passing atomic secrets to Russia and executed in 1953.

The department moved for a summary judgment that it has made all the effort the freedom of information act requires to locate the documents.

JEFFREY AXELRAD, a department attorney, said the FBI alone assigned 73 full time and 21 part-time workers to the search. He said 700 pages have gone to

the Meeropols and thousands more are being processed.

"I think this is unprecedented," Axelrad said.

Several other persons have filed suits for the "Rosenberg Files," but the Meeropols' demands are far broader than any of the others, Axelrad said.

The Meeropols sought records of the FBI, CIA, State and Defense departments, Atomic Energy Commission, the pardon attorney, several U.S. attorneys, and state and local agencies, among others.

THE MEEROPOLS also sought records concerning more than 100 persons other than the Rosenbergs who might have been involved in the investigation in any way.

If the searches have failed to turn up some documents the Meeropols want, it is because they were not described with a reasonable accuracy in the request, the Justice Dept. told the court in a memorandum.

"What is required is a description which enables a professional employee of the agency who was familiar with the subject area... to locate the record with a reasonable amount of effort," the department argued.

"It would be incredible to deem defendants' actions to be less than 'a reasonable amount of effort,'" the memorandum said.



AFFIDAVIT

I, DONALD F. BAUER, being duly sworn, depose as follows:

1. I am the Chief Clerk of the Albuquerque Field Division of the FBI and have been employed by the FBI since 1941 to date. I became Chief Clerk of the Albuquerque Division on December 27, 1949.

2. The functions of the Chief Clerk are the over-all supervision of the clerical employees of the office. This function includes searching, filing and handling of all paper pertaining to each individual file. During the course of my duties, it is necessary to have routine disposal of files in the office in accordance with the instructions in the Manual of Rules and Regulations (MRR), as set out by FBI Headquarters (FBIHQ). This routine disposal is also necessary for the saving of space, which is needed to add current files.

3. Upon receipt of a teletype from FBIHQ, dated January 22, 1976, furnished me by Special Agent (SA) JOHN J. DILLON of the Albuquerque Division, I caused a search of the Albuquerque Office indices pertaining to the following individuals:







Affidavit of SA JOHN J. DILLON.

I, JOHN J. DILLON, being duly sworn, depose as follows:

(1) I am a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) assigned to the Albuquerque, New Mexico Field Office of the FBI.

(2) I have read and am familiar with the contents of a teletype dated July 30, 1976, from FBI Headquarters (FBIHQ) to all FBI Field Offices, captioned "MICHAEL MEEROPOL, ET AL., V. EDWARD H. LEVI, ET AL., Civil Action No. 75-1121." This teletype instructed that a search be conducted of all FBI Field Offices to determine which of these offices possess files, of any type, pertaining to the 12 "Principals" in the ROSENBERG espionage case, and also to determine which of these offices possess files pertaining to approximately 100 additional individuals, as these files relate to the investigation and trial of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG. The teletype set forth specific guidelines and instructions concerning the method of search to be conducted.

(3) I personally supervised the search conducted in the Albuquerque Field Office pursuant to the above-mentioned teletype, and this search was conducted exactly in conformance with the instructions contained therein. The information set forth herein is based on my personal knowledge, obtained in my official capacity.

(4) Attached hereto as Exhibit A, and incorporated by reference herein, is a list of those names enumerated in the teletype concerning whom it has been determined the Albuquerque Field Office possesses no files within the meaning of the instructions contained in the teletype.


(5) Attached hereto as Exhibit B, and incorporated by reference herein, is a list of those names enumerated in the teletype concerning whom it has been determined the Albuquerque Field Office may possess files within the meaning of the instructions contained in the teletype. Because of the lack of complete identifying data concerning many of the names, it is not possible to determine at this time whether the subject of the "Main" file and/or "See" reference in the Albuquerque Field Office is identical to the individual whose name is contained in the teletype.

(7) Exhibits B and C contain, immediately adjacent to each name listed therein, the total number of "Main" file volumes located, if any, and also, the total number of "See" references located, if any.

(8) Inasmuch as the results reported herein are based only on a manual search of the indices of the Albuquerque Field Office, and not (except for the limited purpose of ascertaining the number of "Main" file volumes or whether an individual who is the subject of a file is identifiable with the name in the teletype) an actual page-by-page search of the files of the Albuquerque Field Office, the possibility exists that records referred to in the indices of the Albuquerque Field Office have been routinely disposed of pursuant to past instructions issued by FBIHQ under the authority of regulations issued by the National Archives Records Service (NARS). No determination concerning this possibility could be made, however, without a manual search of the files themselves. Also, it would not

be possible to determine, without a search of the files themselves, whether a "See" reference concerning an individual would consist of a single mention of that individual, or an entire file volume concerning that individual. Thus, a realistic estimate of the total number of pages of "See" references cannot be given at this time.

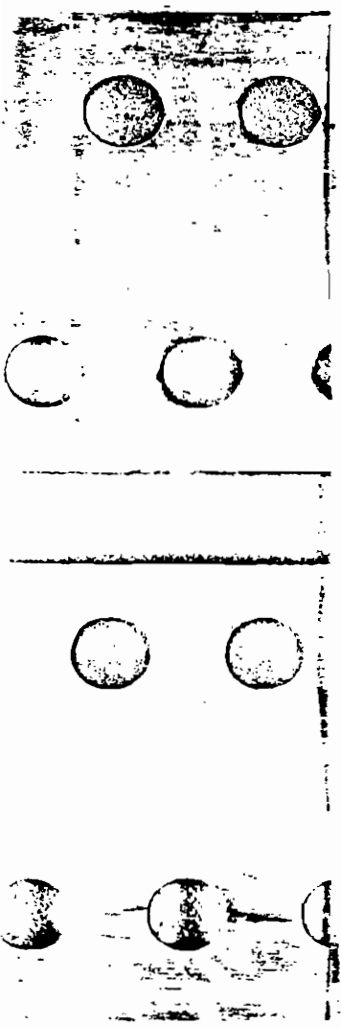

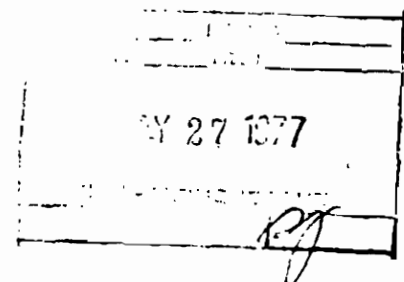

Atom bomb secrets changed hands on High Street

One of the low points in American history happened on High Street in Albuquerque.

On June 2, 1945, in Apartment 4 at 209 High St. N.E., two men matched pieces cut from a Jello-O box. Harry Gold handed David Greenglass \$500. Greenglass gave Gold sketches of America's most secret weapon — the atomic bomb.

Harry Gold is dead. So are Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, who were executed for giving the sketches to the Russians. Greenglass, who was Ethel Rosenberg's brother, has assumed another identity and is believed to be living in Texas.

The second-floor rear apartment is much the same as it was 40 years ago. And the woman who best remembers that Sunday afternoon in June still lives in the house on High Street.



Freeman

Margaret Freeman and her husband, W.B. Freeman, who died in 1973, came to Albuquerque in 1944 from Evanston, Wyo. There, they had owned Freeman's Cabins and Auto Courts. Postcards of the tourist court noted that it was "known from coast to coast."

The Freemans became nationally known themselves in 1951, when details of the plot to give America's atomic secrets to Russia were revealed in the espionage trials that sent Gold and Greenglass to prison and the Rosenbergs to the electric chair.

"I haven't been a celebrity for a long time," Margaret Freeman says.

She is 78, a chipper woman who revels in the attention occasionally bestowed upon her by reporters. She keeps a large plastic bag of brittle newspaper clippings that include *The Albuquerque Tribune* headline: "Soviet spy courier got A-secret here."

In April of 1945, David and Ruth Greenglass rented Apartment 4 — with its 13-foot square

bedroom and tiny kitchen and the bathroom across the hall — for \$32 a month. David Greenglass was an Army sergeant and a machinist at Los Alamos, where the atomic bomb was hatching. He commuted on weekends to Albuquerque, to be with his wife, Ruth, who worked for the federal Office of Price Administration.

"We didn't see him too often," Margaret Freeman says. "He was kind of tall and chunky, with curly hair. Never said much."

"She was short and squatty. She came down to use the phone a lot. She told the other tenants how wonderful it was in New York and how miserable it was here."

The only good thing Ruth Greenglass had to say about Albuquerque was that she was able to buy lots of Kleenex and nylon stockings to mail to friends in her native New York City.

On that Sunday afternoon in June, a man rang the doorbell at 209 High St. Margaret Freeman's father, Pete Scherer, who everybody in the house called "Pappy," answered the door. He told Harry Gold that the Greenglasses lived upstairs.

When David Greenglass answered the knock at Apartment 4, Gold said, "I come from Julius." David Greenglass fetched the jaggedly cut scrap of Jell-O box from his wife's purse, matched it with a similar piece from Gold and knew the contact had been made.

David Greenglass didn't have the information written on paper. He asked Gold to come back later in the day. Gold returned to his room at the old Hilton Hotel and read a mystery novel. Greenglass wrote four pages of information and made several sketches, including one showing the implosion effect needed to trigger an atomic reaction.

Gold returned with \$500. Greenglass gave him the secrets. He and his wife walked Gold back downtown. They stopped at the USO Building at Broadway and Tijeras. Gold kept walking to the Hilton.

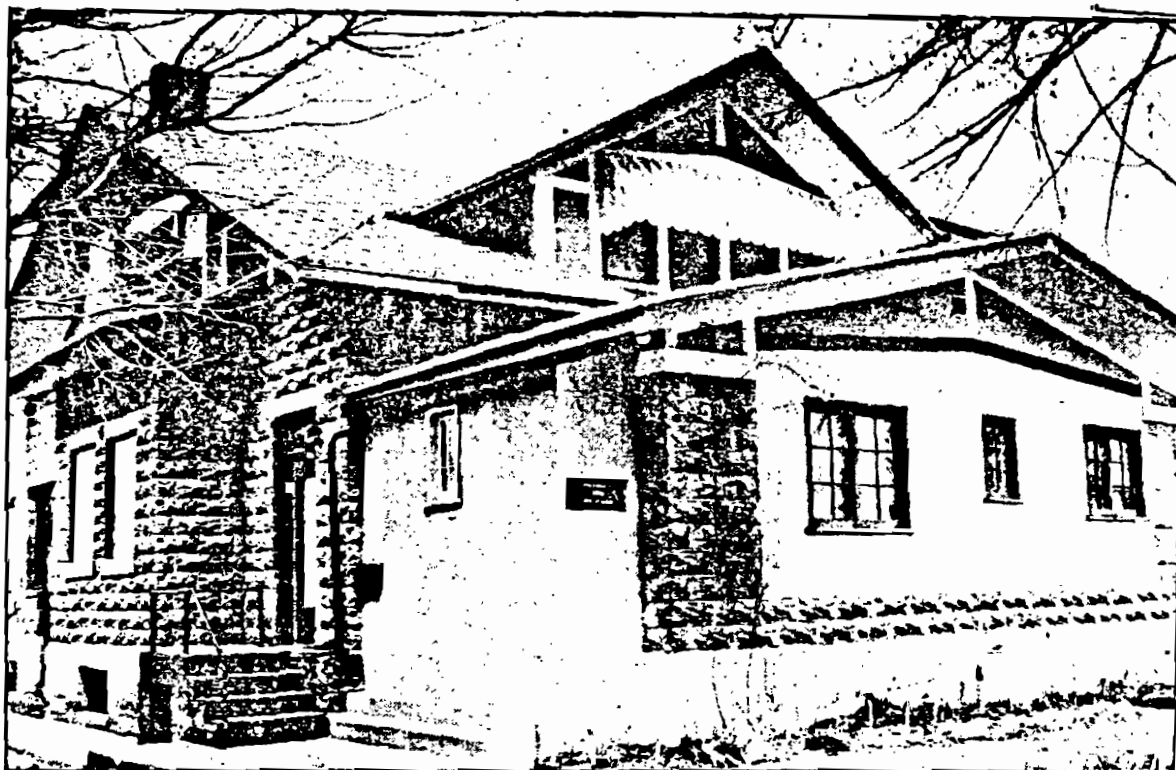
The following day, Ruth Greenglass deposited \$400 in Albuquerque National Bank. Ever the patriot, she also bought a \$50 war bond.

"We had no reason to be suspicious," Margaret

Freeman says. "When the FBI came and talked to us (in 1950), we didn't have any idea what this thing was all about."

Gold, the spy courier who worked for a sugar laboratory in Philadelphia, had a fantastic memory. He described to the FBI that there was a used car lot called Criswell Car Co. at the corner of Central and High, that the Freemans had painted their front window sills pink, that there had been a large screen porch in front of the house.

"We were just amazed when we found out what had happened," Margaret Freeman says.

Forty years later, Apartment 4 is being rented by a University of New Mexico student named

Jim Sandoval. His father works at Los Alamos National Laboratory. One of the few decorations in Sandoval's room is a pop-up card showing Albert Einstein riding a bicycle.

Like Sandoval, most of the tenants were not born when David and Ruth Greenglass came to live at the house on High Street. They still enjoy hearing Margaret Freeman tell of the quiet man who came to visit Apartment 4 on that Sunday afternoon. They like hearing her describe hours of questioning by the FBI and subsequent visits by reporters.

"It used to be exciting around here," Margaret Freeman says, "but not any more."
