advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG claimed that he had 1,000 and a Leica Camera hidden in his apartment when Special agents of the FBI visited his apartment on June 16, 1950.

ROSENBERG told the informant that on that same day his wife, ETHEL, took the 67,000 and a Leica Camera, placed the money and camera in a brown paper shopping bag, and delivered it to "friends" who lived in another house in inickerbooker Village. ROSENBERG described these "friends" as members of the Communist Party, good friends of his, had two children and at one time considered moving and buying their own home and further that the husband was a member of the American Labor Party (ALP) in the neighborhood of Knickerbooker Village.

T-4, of known reliability, advised that from the time of its inception in 1936, there existed within the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three groups. These were the Communist Party, the Socialist Party and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940's the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally those were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau and Westchester Counties, and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942 the Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn. T-4 knew this situation to continue up until at least 1949.

Examination of Mr. GR.Y'S file of the Camera Club reflects that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and DAVID and MILY LICEN were not members or officials of this club.

Ar. GRAY remarked that when the LIMANS advised him that they were buying a house in May Jersey, that he passed a command to one of his associates they ALMANS, must anvalmade some good money working on the Rosenberg Committee.

Mr. L GR.Y lives at apartment 18-12 at Monroo Street, Knickerbocker Village, and is employed in the Special Investigations Unit of the New York Motor Vehicle Commission, 30 Centre Street, New York City. He stated that he did not knew JULIUS and ITHEL ROSLABING and knew nothing about them until they were arrested. He stated that he had been a member of the Knickerbocker Village Camera Club from its inception and had been a past president or some other officer.

He advised that he did not know DAVID or BUILY ALMY and that to his knowledge withor the Links or the hos NBLAGS had ever been members or officers of the Camera Club.

Be further advised that to his knowledge they never visited the quarters of the Camera Club since they were restricted to the membership. He advised that he never heard any of the members discuss that the ROSEBERGS or the ALPENS had a Leica Camera or any camera.

He stated that the Camera Club was not truly a camera club where people of together and jointly take pictures, discuss their equipment and perform or engage in group set vities. He stated that the reason the Camera Club was not up in Knickerbocker Village by the management was due to the fact that many people in the Village were

He advised that he was teaching in the history department and had no connection with JULIUS ROSENBERG, WILLIAM P.RL or MORTON SOBELL. He advised that he did not know them and that as students they would not have been eligible for membership in the Communist Party unit at the college since that unit was made up of members of the teaching staff.

It is noted that MORTON SO BELL ims convicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG of conspiracy to commit espionage and that WILLIAM PERL was convicted in the Southern District of New York of perjury in that he denied before a Grand Jury knowing JULIUS ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBULL.

Rebulet of 8/4/54, in which the Bureau requested NY to submit in detail the reasons why NY in its letter of 7/30/54 named DAVID and EMILY ALMAN as the most logical suspects for the couple to whom ETHEL ROSENBERG gave \$7,000 and a Leica Camera on or about 6/16/50.

MY has concluded a thorough and complete review of this case.in an effort to determine logical suspects for the couple who received the above named items. MY has been unable to find any other counte who would fit the description given by ; namely, that they were staunch friends of the b7D ROSENBERGS whom he trusted implicitedly; they they lived in Knickerbocker Village; and one of the couple was a CP member. Further, that this couple had children and were considering buying a home of their own.

The ALMANs fit the foregoing to this extent. are both members of the CP and are SI subjects of this office. They did live in Knickerbocker Village and have two children. They were friends of the ROSENBERGs as is fully illustrated by the fact that both of them were principal officials in the movement and action of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case (NCSJRC). It has now been ascertained that the ALMANs moved from Knickerbocker Village on 10/29/53 and purchased a farm at Englishtown, New Jersey. Perhaps they should not be called as NY letter referred to them "the most logical suspects". But on the basis of the information known about them to date, it is believed that they should be considered as suspects...

As the Bureau is awars, NY recommended the approach of SOBELL at Alcetraz and recommended the approach of WILLIAM PERL and thereafter his wife and to these recommendations the Bureau gave its assent. My recommended these interviews believing that it was from the principals in the ROSENBERG network that information could be secured concerning the activities of the network.

The approaches to SOBELL have been made/to date have not secured his cooperation. The Bureau will receive a letter from NY in the SOBELL case recommending that that case be closed under certain conditions.

william PERL was approached at Terra Hause and refused to cooperate. His wife was contacted and told all available information that was in the Bureau's possession concerning the activities of her husband. She is to visit PERL at the penitentiary at Terrahaute on 11/3 and 4/54. When she returns to NY, she will be reinterviewed to determine the results of her visit to her husband. If this interview with Mrs. PERL discloses no further information concerning the activities of the ROSENBERGs and if no request for interview by a Bureau agent is made by MORTON SOBELL, within six weeks from the date of the comtemplated last—visit to him, NY will close this case.

A closing report, which will include future contact with Mrs. PERL and a brief resume of the conversations of the San Francisco agents with SOBELL, will be furnished; and also a report which will set forth the known facts of the delivery of the Leica Camera and the \$7,000 by ETHEL ROSENBERG to the unknown couple, together with a brief summary of the identity of DAVID and EMILY ALMAN.

Deckground and Principal Allegations

Julius Bosenberg was the head of a Soviet espienage ring which included his wife, Ethel, his brother-in-law, Bavid Greenglass, his sister-in-law, Buth Greenglass, and Borton Sobell, from 1944 to 1950. Bosenberg, his wife, and Sobell were convicted of conspiracy to commit espienage in April, 1951, and the Bosenberge were executed on June 19, 1953. Sobell is now serving a 30-year prison term. Bosenberg was employed at the United States Signal Corps so an engineer from September 3, 1940, until his removal for Communist Party affiliations on Barch 26, 1945.

Genments Relative to Jeopardizing Bureau Informants or Techniques

The information prepared by the Civil Service Commission pertaining to Julius Resemberg includes infornation regarding the transfer of Rosenberg from one Communist Party club to another in 1944. This information was originally obtained by the Bureau through a confidential source developed at headquarters of the Hew York County Committee of the Communist Party on Barch 15, 1944. The information was furnished to the Security and Intelligence Division, Second Service mand, for its information and served as a basis for Army to discharge Resemberg in 1945. The infor-ion regarding the existence of such a transfer oard made public during the Rosenberg trial when it was f to Julius Resemberg by the United States Attorney cross examination, and it is not believed it will perdize Bureau technique to include it in the Civil vice Commission information. The information relative the one Julius Resemberg who held membership book mber 6603 in the Communist Party in 1940 was not stained from a Aureau source.



Newark Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that from the time of its inception in 1936, there existed within the ALP a struggle for power among three groups. These were the CP, the SOCIALIST PARTY and the SOCIAL DEMOCRATS. By the early 1940's the CP emerged as the controlling force within the ALP in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally, these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau and Westchester Counties and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942 the CP was able to capture the ALP in Brooklyn. The informant knew this situation to continue up until at least 1949. Newark Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in July 1954 that the CP today, as in the past through its members in key positions in the ALP, constitutes the force that controls it.

The April 4, 1952 issue of the "Daily Worker", page 8, column 3, reflects that EMILY ALMAN was one of a delegation which conferred with A. F. OHMEN, Special Assistant to the Attorney General, regarding a new trial for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOHELL.

The "Daily Worker" of August 13, 1953 on page 2, column 1, announced that future activity of the NCSJRC would be planned at a two-day Eastern Seaboard Conference to be held August 15 and 16 at the Manhattan Towers Hotel, 77th Street and Broadway, New York City. 



Subject interviewed on 1-26-55 and 1-31-55. Personal history set out. Advised he flew a plane for the Loyalists in the Spanish Civil War in 1937. Returned to New York City and became Adjutant Commander of VALB. Taught at FAECT School in evenings and instructed members of IWO Flying Club. Admitted signing GP Petition in 1939 supporting candidacy of Communist ISRAEL AMTER for public office. Subject wrote several articles which appeared in the "Daily Worker" covering his flying activities and experiences in Spain. WILLIAMS attended a number of CP meetings in New York City, a National Negro Congress convention in Washington and admitted serving the Communist cause prior to 1940 but denied actual YCL, NNC or CP membership. Subject taught JULIUS ROSENBERG, MARK POGARSKY membership. and MICHAEL SIDOROVICH at FAECT School and employed them in WILLIAMS' Aeronautical Research Corporation. WILLIAMS denied any espionage activities and stated he has not engaged in any CF or front activities since about 1940.

DETAILS: AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

PAUL WILLIAMS was interviewed on January 26 and 31, 1955, by SA HOWARD FLETCHER, JR., and the reporting Agent at the Washington Field Office and furnished the following information:

PERSONAL HISTORY

<u>Birth</u>

June 17, 1907 at Youngstown, Ohio. Subject stated he has indicated at different times his birth to be June 17, 1909 which he did to assist him in securing certain types of employment. In addition, he stated he had indicated to employers he was older than he actually is, and he recalls doing this particularly to obtain employment on the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad when he was still in high school. A certified copy of subject's birth certificate filed with the Thieblot Aircraft Company, 4924 Hampden Lane, Bethesda, Maryland, reflects his birth as June 17, 1907.

Education

Rayen High School at Youngstown, Ohio. WILLIAMS stated he just completed his junior year at this school and then attended the Ohio Institute of Aeronautics where he completed his high school work.

Ohio Institute of Aeronautics

1928-1932 at Youngstown, Ohio. The subject stated he attended this school for four years and graduated in 1932 but that he received no degree from this school. The Institute conducted courses in aeronautics and in addition they built airplanes as school projects. Subject stated he had never attended the Carnegie Institute but that he may have indicated to some acquaintances that he attended school there.

Employment

After graduation from the Ohio Institute of Aeronautics, WILLIAMS had a number of temporary employments, and he hitchhiked to a number of areas of the country, and in 1934 he returned to Dayton, Ohio, where he became employed

by the Works Progress Administration as Instructor in aeronautics from September 1934 to mid-1937.

Mid-1937 - WILLIAMS sought employment in Los Angeles at the Douglas Aircraft Plant unsuccessfully.

August 1937 to December 1937 - en route to and returning from Spain.

January 1938 to December 1938 - Designer with the Cuomo Aeronautics Development Company at 24 West 17th Street, New York City.

1938 (concurrent with the employment at Cuomo) part-time instructor for approximately two semesters at
the School of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists
and Technicians in New York City and part-time instructor
for approximately three months on an infrequent basis
for the International Workers! Order Flying Club.

August 1939 to May 1942, self-employed with the WILLIAMS' Aeronautical Research Corporation at 24 West 17th Street, New York City, and 420 Lexington Avenue, New York City.

1939 to 1941 - WPA, Architectural drawing (concurrent with his self-employment in the WILLIAMS! Aeronautical Research Corporation).

June 1942 to August 1942 - National Youth Administration on a per diem basis (concurrent with his employment at WILLIAMS! Aeronautical Research Corporation).

August 1942 to October 1942 - Methods Engineer with the Augrapa Tool Corporation at 241 Centre Street, New York City.

Fall of 1942 to January 15, 1947 - Wright Field Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio. WILLIAMS was suspended on January 6, 1947, pending investigation for removal from this employment. He terminated January 15, 1947, by resignation in lieu of removal for falsification of entrance application papers as to experience, scholastic background and arrests. Subject stated that in 1942 he took an examination for employment in the Aircraft Division of the Philadelphia Navy Yard and passed the examination but never was actually employed at the Philadelphia Navy Yard or any other Navy installation.

February 1947 to January 1952 - self-employed as a contracting architect on commercial buildings with offices at 1020 West Fifth Street, Dayton, Ohio, and 1118 West Fifth Street, Dayton, Ohio. He operated as the N and W Development Company, which was a partnership with a ROBERT M. NELSON, in the architectural firm doing business with the contractor, Miller and Farmer Company of that city. Concurrent with this self-employment as an architect, subject continued to work on an airplane which he was constructing to demonstrate his theory of aeronautical principles (with a bird configuration). Subject stated he was the architect for the McFall Hotel in Dayton, Ohio, which he estimates to be a \$100,000 building and was also the architect for the Harris block which is a business block of six or seven stores in a one-story masonry building which he estimates to be about a \$100,000 building. In addition he was the architect for the Germantown Pike Hilltop Motel in Dayton, Ohio.

January 9, 1952, to February 1954, Draftsman and Layout Man, United States Recording Company, Washington, D. C. WILLIAMS stated he came to Washington to see a Dr. LOUIS CROOKS (deceased) at Catholic University in an attempt to have Dr. CROOKS make a wind-tunnel model of an airplane demonstrating WILLIAMS' aeronautical principles. WILLIAMS stated CROOKS did make a model of the plane for which he paid him \$300 and subject related numerous tests were conducted which supported his theory on aeronautical principles.

February 23, 1954 to date - Draftsman at the Thieblot Aircraft Company, Incorporated, 4924 Hampden Lane, Bethesda, Maryland. He stated he originally contacted this company in an effort to have THIEBLOT promote production of his type plane, but THIEBLOT evidenced no interest at that time but offered him employment as a Draftsman. WILLIAMS stated that within the past three weeks Mr. THIEBLOT, President of the corporation, has evinced interest in subject's model plane.

Addresses

July 1937, 1180 East 52nd Street, Los Angeles, California. Subject stated when in Los Angeles he attempted

to stay at the Young Men's Christian Association but was unable to do so and stayed in a rooming house which was on the YMCA's approved list. Subject stated he also stayed at a rooming house at an unknown number on Figueroa Street in Los Angeles but that any residence he had in that city was temporary and undoubtedly a rooming house.

August 1937 to December 1937, en route to and returning from Spain.

December 1937 to March 1938, Broadway Central Hotel, New York City. Subject said his expenses at this hotel were borne by the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade.

March 1938 to October 1942, 425 East 6th Street, New York City, apartment 3A. He resided at this address with his first wife.

1942 to 1943, 16 Elgin Street, Dayton, Ohio (rooming house) and 2314 Lakeview, Dayton, Ohio, a private residence owned by ROBERT S. NELSON (his business partner from 1947 to 1951).

June 1943 to 1944, 1849 Ditzel Avenue, Dayton, Ohio. Subject stated this was an efficiency apartment in a government project and he lived here with his second wife, his first wife having died in New York City in early 1943.

1944 to 1949, 2642 Pickering Avenue, Dayton, Ohio. This is a house that WILLIAMS designed. He stated he did some architectural drawing of houses while he was employed at Wright Field Air Force Base; 1020 West 5th Street, Dayton, Ohio. Following his divorce, subject lived at this address which was his office. Subsequently he moved to the McFall Hotel for a time.

January 1950 to December 1951, 1229 Germantown Street, Dayton, Ohio. This was a building that WILLIAMS had designed, and he lived there with Detective Sergeant GLEATON, of the Dayton Police Force.

December 1951 to about May 1952, unknown address in the vicinity of Fifth and Florida Avenue, N. E., in Washington, D. C., at a rooming house.

May 1952 to date, 1321 T Street, N. W.

ACTIVITIES

Spanish Civil War

When WILLIAMS was in California in 1937 and had sought employment at the Douglas Aircraft Plant, he indicated he did not receive employment because of his color. In conversation with men at the rooming house where he was staying it was suggested that he visit the office of the North American Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy because it would be possible for him, being a pilot, to make \$1,000 per month flying for the Spanish Loyalists. Because he was without employment, WILLIAMS made application, which was approved, applied for his passport in California, and was given bus fare to New York from Los Angeles, and in August 1937 he sailed for France on the "Queen Mary."

WILLIAMS landed at Cherbourg, took a train to Paris, where he placed his passport in a safety deposit box, took a train to SouthemFrance and walked across the border into He went to Albacete, which was the Loyalists headquarters, and an attempt was made to have him go into the infantry, but he refused and he was sent to La Ribera where he made one flight in a plane for the Spanish Loyalists. subject stated this was the extent of his combat duty in Spain. He stated he did not fly more because he was told that the Spanish Loyalists had no longer any need for mercenaries because they had trained enough pilots to preclude their use. He subsequently went to Paris, and he recalled arriving in Paris on a November holiday. He stated he returned to the United States in December on the SS Aquatania. Upon arriving in New York he went to the headquarters of the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade and they secured quarters for him at the Broadway Central Hotel, and he stated his room at this hotel was paid for by the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade.

Membership in the VALB

The subject stated that upon his return to this country the VALB assisted him in obtaining employment. In addition WILLIAMS related that he was catered to by this organization because he had been a veteran of the Spanish Civil War, a pilot and because he was a negro. For this reason WILLIAMS became a member of the VALB and subsequently was made Adjutant Commander (second in command). WILLIAMS stated the

VALB obtained a position for him at the FAECT School as an instructor in aeronautics, and it was through this connection that he became an instructor for the International Workers' Order Flying Club. These courses of instruction were given at night, and it was possible for the subject to continue a day-time employment WILLIAMS said he never joined the FAECT because the dues were too high for him, but he was given honorary membership on the basis of his service in the Spanish Civil War.

Association with the ROSENBERGS

While instructing in an aeronautical class at the FAECT School, subject recalled he had in his class as students JULIUS ROSENBERG, executed Soviet espionage agent, MICHAEL SIDOROVICH and MARK POGARSKY, associates of ROSENBERG. WILLIAMS stated that when he organized his Aeronautical Research Corporation these individuals became employed in his firm with the understanding that they were to participate in financial profit that might result from their efforts. In addition to these individuals, WILLIAMS advised that ETHEL ROSENBERG did clerical and typing work for the firm. Most of the work done by these persons was performed at night. Subject stated he had been in the ROSENBERG home, which he recalled was on Sheriff Street in New York, but that he was in their home on only one or two occasions, and he has no distinct recollection of the visits except he recalled the ROSENBERGS were living with the parents of either the husband or wife. He recalled that on one occasion he met DAVID GREENGLASS at the home of the ROSENBERGS. Subject observed photographs of DAVID GREENGLASS, JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG, MICHAEL SIDOROVICH and MARK POGARSKY and identified them as the individuals with whom he had associated in New York.

Subject stated he had attended some Communist Party meetings where JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were present, and he recalled that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH was present at some of the big Communist Party meetings (those held in Madison Square Garden). In addition, he stated that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and SIDOROVICH in their conversations openly spoke of being members of the Communist Party, and he recalled that POGARSKY admitted being a member of the Young Communist League. WILLIAMS stated he had never seen DAVID GREENGLASS at any Communist Party meetings he attended.

Communist Party Activities

WILLIAMS denied having ever been a member of the Young Communist League or the Communist Party, but he readily admitted he had participated in Communist Party activities and those ... of front groups and was for a time sympathetic to their cause. He explained he felt he had experienced too much discrimination in this country because he is a negro, and in addition, he felt that the Communist Party represented merely another political faction on the United States political front. Subject stated he attended a number of Communist Party meetings in New York but they were small groups, generally speaking, and at different locations, and he has no clear recollection of the meeting places at this time. He recalled that on one occasion he gave a speech before one of the CP meetings on the race question. He recalled further having attended CP meetings at Madison Square Garden, and he advised he participated in two May Day parades in New York.

In recalling his activities during this period, which he estimates to be from about January 1938 until sometime in 1940, WILLIAMS is of the opinion that he was being exploited by the Communists because he was a negro, because he was sympathetic to their cause, naturally, and because he was a Spanish Civil War veteran. He feels he was of value to them as a representative of the negro race, and he readily admits that he was sympathetic to the political purposes of the CP.

During this period when he was in sympathy with Communist activities, WILLIAMS regularly read the "Daily Worker", and he had written five or six articles which were eventually published in the "Daily Worker" wherein he wrote concerning his experiences as an aviator and as a Spanish Civil War veteran. With regard to the numerous discrepancies in his personal history, WILLIAMS explained some of them may have occurred from these write-ups in the "Daily Worker" wherein activities, feats and background were attributed to him which were erroneous. WILLIAMS felt that this was done by the "Daily Worker" in order to make him more of a hero in the eyes of the negro people and in turn influence other negroes to become interested in the CP. He stated he was paid a nominal sum for these articles which appeared in the "Daily Worker."

WILLIAMS was queried as to why he declined to join the CP yet he did not hestate to participate in their cause and was fully sympathetic to their purposes. He stated he had

seriously considered the matter of joining the Party and failed to do so because he was unable to make up his mind. He said a CP card had been given to him at the VALB headquarters in New York with his name filled in, but he stated he paid no dues nor membership fees, and he took no steps to acquire membership.

WILLIAMS recalled that in early 1938 or 1939 he had attended a meeting of the National Negro Congress held in Washington, D. C. He stated he was never a member of the National Negro Congress, and his attendance at the meeting in Washington was the extent of his activities in the National Negro Congress.

WILLIAMS stated he had signed a CP Petition for ISRAEL AMTER in New York for a political campaign. He is unable to recall the public office AMTER was seeking, but he stated his action in signing this petition was in accord with his previous thoughts concerning the CP, namely that it was a political organization seeking to improve the negro status in American life.

Subject stated that about 1939 or 1940 he came to the realization that the CP actually had nothing to offer the negro race, and he had some personal experiences on grievance committees of the WPA wherein he felt the activities of the Communists in presenting their grievances were excessive. He recalled with regard to his association with the ROSENBERGS that it was about this time he informed them that there was nothing further for them to do in connection with the WILLIAMS Aeronautical Research Corporation. He said he had never paid the ROSENBERGS any money for their efforts because they expected to participate in a patent which they hoped to obtain. He said the ROSENBERGS were considerably upset when they discontinued association, but he had no further contact with them from that date forward. He estimates the breakup to have occurred in late 1939 or 1940. He said the ROSENBERGS had no knowledge of his address after 1940 and that he had had no personal contact with them. Concerning the ROSENBERGS' arrest and conviction on espionage charges, he said he had no knowledge that they might be participating in such activities, but he stated he was not greatly shocked because he had known them as firebrand type of Communists.

The Communist Party, the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, the National Negro Congress and the International Workers Order have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States as coming within the purview of Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker" is an east-coast Communist daily newspaper.

Espionage Activities

The subject advised he has never engaged in any espionage activities against the United States nor has he been requested to engage in such. He recalled that when he was still close to the Communist Party he had had contact with some individuals at Amtorg in New York City, and on one occasion he had been offered an exporter's commission by some individual at Amtorg if he would buy a Curtiss electric propeller ostensibly for his own firm which would be delivered to Amtorg. Subject contacted the Curtiss firm, but the firm immediately discerned that he was attempting to obtain the propeller for Amtorg and so informed him. When confronted in such a manner, WILLIAMS did not argue with the Curtiss firm and was unsuccessful in obtaining a propeller. To the best of his recollection, this occurred in early 1940.

MISCELLANEOUS

Subject stated he became interested in flying in his youth, and when he was in Ohio he would perform drafting work in order to exchange his talents for materials for his own plane and to acquire flying time. He recalled he had been in a crash in the early 1930's in Youngstown and had suffered a fractured skull. For an extended period of time he has done experimental and promotion work on his plane and a model of it in an effort to demonstrate an aeronautical principle on which he admits the National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics has made an unfavorable recommendation.

WILLIAMS stated he has been married four times. His first wife, SYLVIA COLLINS WILLIAMS, he married in New York in 1940 and she died of tuberculosis in New York City in early 1943. His second wife was GRACE THORPE WILLIAMS whom he married in Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1943 or 1944. He stated she divorced him in 1948 for incompatability. From this union was born a son, who is now living with his former wife in Cincinnati, Ohio. WILLIAMS attributed this divorce to his inability to provide as high a standard of living as his wife desired. His third wife was ELIZABETH STEVENSON WILLIAMS, whom he married in 1950 and divorced in 1951. He stated they lived together approximately two months and during this period of time she was home only about a week.

His present wife is RUTH
HOLLAND WILLIAMS, born September 15, 1927. He resides with his
wife, her mother and three of her brothers at 1321 T Street,
N. W., Washington, D. C. WILLIAMS has a daughter by this wife
who is now three months of age. He explained his wife formerly
was employed in a clerical position at the Pentagon in the
Department of the Air Force but that prior to the birth of
their child she left this employment and has no re-employment
rights. She is currently unemployed. WILLIAMS added he is
the main support of the family because his mother-in-law does not
work and two of his wife's brothers have hemophilia and are unable
to perform physical labor. A third brother is 15 years of age.

WILLIAMS stated he and all members of his family are highly active in the Jehovah's Witnesses. WILLIAMS advised that he gives speeches in connection with his activities in the Jehovah's Witnesses, pointing out the evils of Communism based on his experience in the past.

Subject stated he has been arrested on only one occasion in his life and that occurred in Dayton, Ohio, in the 1930's before he went to Spain. He was arrested on suspicion of selling stolen medical supplies but was released. WILLIAMS maintains his acts of selling the supplies were legal because he had received the medical supplies as payment for work he had performed.

Additional photographs of individuals connected with the ROSENBERG case were exhibited to subject, but he was unable to identify any persons other than those mentioned herein.

The only individual at Amtorg whom he was able to recall was a man by the name of YAROSLAVSKY who was a United States citizen from Brooklyn. YAROSLAVSKY was a doorman at Amtorg. YAROSLAVSKY was interested in promoting WILLIAMS' plane principle in hopes of making some money on it, but Amtorg was not interested in anything of an experimental nature but wanted products and plans of actual operating equipment. Subject was unable to recall any of the individuals with whom he talked at Amtorg.

Concerning other discrepancies in his personal history, WILLIAMS stated he had never left the United States during the period Selective Service was in operation during World War II in an effort to seek employment with the Ferry

Command of the Royal Air Force. He stated he may have asked permission of his Selective Service Board to make the trip to Canada, but this was never done. He stated he had never been in the United States Navy and had never been in Hawaii.



on June 16, 1950. Subject told the informant that on that same day, his wife, ETHEL, took the \$7,000.00 and the Leica Camera, placed the money and camera in a brown paper shopping bag, and delivered it to "friends" who lived in another house in Knickerbocker Village.

The subject described these "friends" as members of the Communist Party who were good friends of his, and who had two children, and at one time considered moving and buying their own home, and further, that the husband was a member of the American Labor Party in the neighborhood of Knickerbocker Village.

Newark Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that from the time of its inception, in 1936, there existed within the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three groups. These were the Communist Party, the Socialist Party, and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940's, the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally, these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau, and Westchester Counties, and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942, the Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn. The informant knew this situation to continue up until at least 1949. The American Labor Party never developed into an organization of any real consequence in the non-industrial areas of New York State.


Newark Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in July, 1954, that the Communist Party today, as in the past, through its members in key positions in the American Labor Party, constitutes the force that controls it.

The records of Knickerbocker Village reflect that DAVID and EMILY ALMAN occupied an apartment in that development commencing in 1940, and resided at 20 Monroe Street, New York City, in Apartment LE-8 and later in Apartment LI-5.

Newark Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliative, advised in 1946, that DAVID and EMILY ALMAN, of Apartment TX-5. Knickerbocker Village, New York City, were engaged in obtaining signatures on petitions for BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR., Communist Party candidate for the City Council of New York, in 1946. The informant further advised that these individuals were members of the Communist Party, East Side Club, 5 Rutgers Street, New York City.

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Newark Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that DAVID and EMILY ALMAN purchased a home at RD #1, Box 42, Bergen Mill Road, Englishtown, New Jersey, on October 19, 1953.



The records of the Middlesex County Clerks Office, Middlesex County Court House, New Brunswick, New Jersey, were checked by Special Agent ROLLO V. CLARK, JR., on February 18, 1955, and found to reflect the following information regarding the residence purchased by DAVID and EMILY ALMAN on October 19, 1953:

Deed #11714, filed in Book 1713, Volume 222, recorded October 21, 1953, reflects that WARREN W. RAGAGLIA and EDNA H. RAGAGLIA, RD #1, Box 42, Englishtown, New Jersey, conveyed 27 and 62/100 acres of land in Monroe Township, New Jersey, to DAVID and EMILY ALMAN, 20 Monroe Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, County of New York, New York State, and CECELIA G. ARNOW, 3832 Poplar Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, Kings County, State of New York, on October 19, 1953, and that the property was conveyed subject to a first mortgage in the amount of \$8,902.75 held by the Perth Amboy Savings Institution, which was executed February 1, 1951, which the ALMANS and ARNOW agreed to assume as part of the purchase price.

The above deed conveyed an undivided half interest in the property to DAVID ALMAN and EMILY ALMAN, and an undivided half interest in the property to CECELIA G. ARNOW, widow, as tenants in common. The deed also conveys the undivided one half interest in the property to DAVID ALMAN and EMILY ALMAN, husband and wife, as tenants in the entirety.

Mortgage #11608, Book 1215, Volume 124, Recorded October 21, 1953, indicates that DAVID and EMILY ALMAN, husband and wife, residing at 20 Monroe Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, County of New York, State of New York, and CECELIA G. ARNOW, widow, residing at 3832 Poplar Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, State of New York, gave a mortgage dated October 19, 1953, to SIMON FEDERMAN, residing at 162 West 34th Street, Borough of Manhattan, County of New York, State of New York, in the amount of \$2,000.00, 2% interest per annum, in part payment of 27 and 62/100 acres of land conveyed to DAVID ALMAN, EMILY ALMAN, and CECELIA G. ARNOW by WARREN W. RAGAGLIA and EDNA H, RAGAGLIA, and that the mortgage would be subordinate only to a first mortgage executed to the Perth Amboy Savings Institution on February 1, 1951, in approximately the sum of \$8,933.57. This \$2,000.00 mortgage provided the principal to be paid as follows:



One hundred dollars on the 19th day of January, 1954; one hundred dollars on the 19th day of each and every month thereafter for twenty consecutive months, and that the principal must be paid in full by August 19, 1955.


Discharge Book #22, Page 222, reflects that the above mortgage given by DAVID ALMAN, EMILY ALMAN, and CECELIA G. ARNOW to SIMON FEDERMAN, 162 West 34th Street, New York, New York, was discharged on May 24, 1954, and that the discharge was recorded on June 15, 1954. The discharge was stamped "Return to Law Office of BERNARD H. WEISER, 10 West Main Street, Freehold, New Jersey."

The above records contain no other additional information concerning SIMON FEDERMAN.

The aforementioned records of the Middlesex County Clerks Office, also reflect that the mortgage held by the Perth Amboy Savings Institution, Perth Amboy, New Jersey, on the above property was originally given to the Perth Amboy Savings Institution in the amount of \$10,000 by GEORGEXSCHALHOUB and JEANNE M.

(SCHALHOUB, his wife, Monroe Township, Middlesex County, New Jersey, on February 1, 1951, and was recorded February 5, 1951.

The mortgage provided that the principal and interest would be paid in monthly installments of \$60.60 commencing March, 1951, and if not sconer, the final payment would be made in March, 1971. The mortgage indicated that the property had been conveyed on March 1, 1951, by JOSEPHAKYAK and CONSTANTINA KYAK, his wife to the SCHALHOUBS and that the mortgage was given to the Perth Amboy Savings Institution to secure payment of money advanced to pay a portion of the purchase price for the property.

This mortgage was discharged on May 24, 1954, and was to be forwarded to the law office of BERNARD H. WEISER, 10 West-Main Street, Freehold, New Yersey.

Inasmuch as FEDERMAN is a resident of New York City. and this effice is not aware of his identity or activities, no attempt was made to contact WEISER in this matter.

Newark files contain several references to the name SIMON FEDERMAN, which reflect that an individual of that name was President of the American Federation of Polish Jews in 1949, and was listed as a speaker before such groups as the American Birobitjan Committee and the American Committee of Jewish Writers, Artists, and Scientists during 1949 and 1950.

I. SCOPE AND GENERAL ACTIVITY OF THE NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SOBELL IN THE ROSENBERG CASE

An indication of the lack of activity of this committee in the Boston area was received when Boston Informant T-1 advised on November 16, 1954 that he had met on November 10, 1954. During a conversation with told T-1 that he felt there should be a re-activation of the ROSENERG SOBELL Committee and that an attempt should be made to stimulate interest again in this committee. T-1 indicated to that he felt such an attempt to re-activate the work of this committee was inadvisable at the present time because of the feeling which Senator MC CARTHY has aroused against Communism. T-1 stated that the felt that in the face of such opposition the committee should become active again.

Miss ANNE MATHEWS in her testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in 1947 concerning Communist activities at Winston-Salem, North Carolina identified PHIL KORITZ as a Communist Party member at Winston-Salem in 1947.

The March 26, 1952 issue of the "Daily Worker" identified PHIL EORITZ as Chairman of the Boston Chapter of the Civil Rights Congress. The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist daily publication.

The Civil Rights Congress has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order #10450.

Boston Informant T-2, on March 13, 1954, stated that SUE KORITZ, wife of PHIL KORITZ, appeared to be in charge of the National Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SO BELL in the ROSENEER Case.

HOLLIS MOSHER, a publicly admitted former member of the Communist Party, identified SUE KORITZ as Chairman of the Mattapan Branch of the Communist Party as of that date, January 30, 1950.

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order #10450.

Boston Informant T-3, on December 7, 1954, advised that he had been in attendance at a meeting of the People's Victory Forum held on November 14, 1954 at the Morton Plaza, Dorchester, Massachusetts.

The purpose of this meeting was a lecture given by a JCHN WEXLER, the author of a book written about the ROSENBERGS. T-3 stated that WEXLER read from his book and made comments upon various passages. According to T-3 the lecture was a defense of the ROSENBERGS and the theme of the lecture revolved around a supposed plot which had sent them to the chair. WEXLER concluded his lecture by expressing the hope that his book would prove the innocence of the ROSENBERGS and would raise enough money to help obtain the release of the other innocent victim who was spending thirty years in Alcatraz.

HOLLIS MCSHER, a publicly admitted former member of the Communist Party, District #1, Boston, Massachusetts, advised on December 20, 1954 that as a former Communist Party member he attended functions sponsored by the People's Victory Forum from 1949 to 1954. He stated the People's Victory Forum, in his opinion, followed the Communist Party line on numerous public issues and that it supported Communist Party policies; that this organization allowed Communist Party literature to be sold at its meetings; that its leadership had openly spoken in favor of Communism, as well as promoting Communist Party literature; and that its leadership had also invited Communist Party members to speak at its functions at which time direct Soviet Union propaganda had been disseminated.

Boston Informant T-4, on November 23, 1954, made available a mimeographed letter, which letter bears the signature of ROSE SOBELL. Printed at the top of the page is the name and address, "Mrs. ROSE SOBELL, 2400 Davidson Avenue, Bronx, New York". The letter concerns the writer's son, MCRTON SCBELL, and expresses thanks that he is still alive. The letter discusses the fact that MORTON SOBELL has been sentenced to thirty years in Alcatraz, and requests that aid, in the form of money, be sent to help free MORTON SOBELL. A postscript on the letter states that checks can be made out to either ROSE SOBELL or MORTON's wife, HELEN SOBELL.

This letter was received through the mail by Boston Informant T-4.

On November 23, 1954 T-4 also furnished a pamphlet entitled, "The Facts in the Case of MORTON SOBELL". This was received through the mail by T-4 and the last page bears the name of the National Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SCHELL, 1050 Sixth Avenue, New York, New York.

The pamphlet discusses SOBELL's background, his "kidnapping" from Mexico to be returned to the United States and quotes various sources in an effort to show the lack of justice in the trial of MORTON SOBELL.

The pamphlet concludes with a request that the reader join the thousands who are writing letters to the Director of Prisons, Justice Department, Washington, D.C. urging that SCBELL be removed from Alcatraz to a regular federal prison.

MORTON SOBELL was convicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG on March 29, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage. On April 5, 1951 MORTON SOBELL was sentenced to a term of thirty years.

It is noted that JULIUS and ETHIL ROSENBERG were convicted on March 29, 1951 at the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, for conspiracy to commit espionage and were sentenced to death by Trial Judge IRVING R. KAUFMAN on April 5, 1951. The ROSENBERGS were executed on June 19, 1953 at Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, New York,

Boston Informants T-4, T-5 and T-6, who in the past have had some knowledge of the activities of instant committee, stated on March 18, 1955, February 14, 1955 and March 3, 1955 respectively that they know of no local activity on the part of this committee.

EMILY and DAVID ALMAN have been active officers in the National Committee to Secure Justice im the Rosenberg Case and have to date continued their activities in behalf of MORTON SOBELL and protesting the innocence of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. Both names are included on the Security Index.

It is also to be noted that SIMON FEDERMAN, who held a #2,000 mortgage on the ALMAN residence and who is referred to in the enclosed report, advised SAS JAMES R. HOYMAN and ALESIO SAVIOLA on 11/2/53, that he had nothing to discuss with the agents and refused to make any statement regarding his affiliations or associations with the Communist movement. SIMON FEDERMAN'S name is also included on the Security Index.

ROSENBERG described these "friends" as members of the Communist Party who were good friends of his and who had two children, and at one time considered moving and buying their own home, and further that the husband was a member of the American Labor Party in the neighborhood of Knickerbocker Village.

The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

T-2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on September 4, 1954, that from the time of its inception in 1936, there existed within the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three groups. These were the Communist Party, the Socialist Party, and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940's the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Nassau and Westchester Counties, and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942, the Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn. T-2 knew this situation to continue up until at least 1949. The American Labor Party never developed into an organization of any real consequence in the non-industrial areas of New York State.

T-3, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on July 14, 1954, that the Communist Party, today, as in the past, through its members in key positions in the American Labor Party, constitutes the force that controls it.


Mr. THOMAS GRAY, Manager, Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, New York, advised SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON on October 28, 1954, that DAVID and EMILY ALMAN occupied an apartment in that development from 1940 to 1953 and resided at 20 Monroe Street, New York City.


T-4, who is familiar with legal matters pertaining to the purchase of a home in Englishtown, New Jersey, by EMILY and DAVID ALMAN, advised on February 7, 1955, that the purchase took place during October, 1953.

The records of the Middlesex County Clerk's Office, Middlesex County Court House, New Brunswick, New Jersey, were checked by SA ROLLO V. CLARK, JR., on February 18, 1955, and Discharge Book number 22, page 222, reflected that the mortgage given by DAVID ALMAN, EMILY ALMAN and CECELIA ARNOW to SIMON FEDERMAN, 162 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was discharged on May 24, 1954, and that the discharge was recorded on June 15, 1954.

SIMON FEDERMAN

T-5, who is in a position to know the residence and employment of SIMON FEDERMAN, advised on March 17, 1955, that FEDERMAN resides at 625 Ocean Avenue, apartment 6A, Brooklyn, New York, and is self-employed under the business name, Embroidery, Efficiency Novelty, 162 West 34th Street, New York City.





The CRC, the American Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born, the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee and the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade have all been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Since the information furnished by T-7 furnished no identifying information concerning SIMON FEDERMAN, it is not known whether this individual is the same as the individual who held the second mortgage on the property of the ALMANS.



"The Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," dated March 3, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. contains the following concerning the "Morning Freiheit" and "Jewish Life":

The "Daily Worker" dated August 1, 1951, page 3, reflects an article captioned, "\$20,000 Bail Accepted for ALEXANDER BITTELMAN". The article stated that among those who posted the bail was one SIMON FEDERMAN, Embroidery Manufacturer, 625 Ocean Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, who put up \$10,000 in United States Treasury bonds and \$500 in cash.

ALEXANDER BITTELMAN was convicted in the Southern District of New York on January 21, 1953, for violation of the Smith Act.

The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

November 2, 1953, SIMON FEDERMAN, 625 Ocean Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, advised SAS JAMES R. HOYMAN and ALESIO SAVIOLA that he had nothing to discuss with the interviewing agents and refused to make any statement regarding his affiliations or associations with the Communist Party.

DAVID and EMILY ALMAN

T-9, who is in a position to furnished information of record, advised on March 3, 1955, that a search of available records at the Canal Street branch of the Manufacturers Trust Company, New York City, failed to reflect any record of an account under the names DAVID or EMELY ALMAN or under the maiden name of Miss EMILY ARNOW.

The above information, furnished on a confidential basis, should not be made public without the prior issuance of a subpoena duces tecum.



It is noted I-1 in verep is Jerome Lugene Iartakow, pormer who was formerly described as being of unknown bid reliability and is described in verep as one who has furnished reliable information in the past. The Bureau is aware of the difficulty in describing Iartakow accurately, since the information he furnished which was susceptible of proof has been proven, but it must also be considered that despite the above Iartakow has a criminal record and was serving a sentence on eleven counts of car theft when he was developed as an informant in the instant case.

The Bureau also realizes that Tartakow was, because of such a sentence, placed in the unique position of being able to gain the confidence of Rosenberg. However, in view of Tartakow's unsavery background, it is believed that when information furnished by him is set forth in reports in the future, he should be described as "T-.., who has furnished reliable information in the past but whose background is questionable..." It is believed this phrase should be added in the future in order to place other agencies receiving Bureau reports on notice that Tartakow is not considered to be of unquestioned reliability. No changes or corrections are necessary in rerep.

DETAILS:

JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL were convicted in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951, of conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union. The ROSENBERGs were sentenced to death, and SOBELL was sentenced to serve thirty years' imprisonment.

I. ADDRESS

San Francisco T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, related on February 1, 1955, that the head-quarters for the San Francisco Rosenberg-Sobell Committee (SFRSC) were located at 1122 Market Street, Room 216, San Francisco, California.

San Francisco T-2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, related on April 14, 1955, that the committee did not have any branches in the Northern District of California.

San Francisco T-3, who is in a position to furnish reliable information, related on April 22, 1955, that the committee had occupied Room 216, 1122 Market Street, San Francisco, since February 1, 1955, and was paying \$25 per month for rental of the room. T-3 went on to say that the committee had identified itself as the San Francisco Sobell Committee.

II. OFFICERS

T-2 related on April 14, 1955, that the following were officers of the SFRSC up to the time the committee moved to its new headquarters:

SYLVIA STEINGART PEARL BALEY BELLE ELBERT Executive Secretary Local Chairman Recording Secretary

San Francisco T-4, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported in May, 1950, that SYLVIA STEINGART was the Organizational Secretary for the New Jewish Congress Branch of the San Francisco County Communist Party (SFCCP).

The Communist Party, USA, has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

San Francisco T-5, who has furnished reliable information in the past, related in September, 1952, that PEARL BALEY was a member of the Inter-Mission Section of the SFCCP.

San Francisco T-6, a self-admitted member of the Communist Political Association (CPA) and the Communist Party (CP) from April, 1945, to September, 1949, related on March 19, 1951, that some time around 1947 BELLE ELBERT was a member of the Russian Hill Branch of the SFCCP.

The CP was known as the CPA during the period from May 23, 1944, to July 28, 1945.

III. ACTIVITIES

In the November 19, 1954, issue of the "Daily People's World" (DPW), page 2, columns 3-4, appeared an article captioned "Sobell group spurs transfer campaign." The article informed that the SFRSC had announced that forty persons not previously in the campaign had pledged to devote at least one hour before the Thanksgiving holiday to circulate petitions to transfer MORTON SOBELL from Alcatraz Prison. The article went on to inform that the committee had a November goal of 1,000 signatures on the petition and 500 letters to JAMES V. BENNETT, Director of Prisons, Washington, D.C., asking for SOBELL's transfer.

The DPW is a West Coast Communist newspaper.

T-2 related on April 14, 1955, that the activities of the SFRSC were directed towards getting MORTON SOBELL removed from Alcatraz Prison and/or to get him a new trial.

IV. FINANCES

San Francisco T-7, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on August 25, September 24, and October 26, 1954, made available the following information concerning the checking account balance of the SFRSC:



By airtel 5/11/55 the NYO forwarded the enclosed first 429 pages of a book captioned "The Judgment of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, " written by John Wexley and published by Cameron and Kahn. These pages were received by the NYO from H & S Company which company is printing this book. The publication date is June 19, 1955. May 9, 1955, Judge Irving R. Kaufman, trial judge at the Rosenberg trial, advised Mr. Nichols telephonically that a young lawyer in the District Attorney's office advised him this book contained criminal and civil libel which had been inserted deliberately in the hopes of provoking a libel suit which would afford Cameron and Kahn an opportunity to make a public issue of freedom of the press.

Wexley is a screen writer and free lance author who has been identified as a member of the Communist Party (CP), is the subject of a pending Security Watter - C case and his name is on the Security Index. Cameron and Kahn is the publishing house which published "False Witness" by Harvey M. Matusow.

The portion of the book enclosed alleges the entire case against the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell was a gigantic frame-up participated in by then Attorney General Howard McGrath, then U.S. Attorney, Southern District of New York, Irving Saypol, then Assistant U. S. Attorneys Myles Lane, Roy Cohn, James Kilsheimer, Judge Irving R. Kaufman and the FBI. He attempts to relate the trial to world events, claiming the Truman administration wanted to disprove the charge of being soft on Reds and to justify its erroneous estimate of Russian military know-how, and to do this claimed the atomic bomb had been

He attempts to psychoanalyze Klaus Fuchs and reaches the novel conclusion Fuchs was a Nazi spy who confessed to be a Soviet spy so he would be tried under the Official Secrets Act rather than the Treason Act for dealing with the enemy which carried the death penalty (pages 24-25). He ridicules the man hunt for Gold described by the Director in the article in "Reader's Digest" captioned "Crime of the Century," claiming it did not occur since Bureau agents did not interview Fuchs until after May 18, 1950, and that Gold's confession was released May 24, 1950. Wexley apparently does not recognize the fact the Bureau received information from the British in the interim (pages 64-65).

Wexley likens Ruth Greenglass to Lady MacBeth urging her husband to destroy the Rosenbergs, due to Ruth's envy of the more talented Ethel Rosenberg and the better educated Julius Rosenberg (page 122). In an introduction to one chapter he attempts to liken Sobell's flight to Mexico to the Flight to Egypt (page 146). Wexley analyzes the trial testimony in a word for word manner and in those places where any slight deviation is made between the testimony of the Greenglasses and Harry Gold, he brands them perjurers. If the testimony agrees, he then states it was well rehearsed. He makes the assumption Gold and Greenglass conferred while imprisoned together in New York City before the trial.

Wexley attempts to develop an "anatomy of frame-up" whereby derogatory information is developed on a person by the FBI and this person is then forced to fabricate a story or he will be prosecuted for an offense developed in the original derogatory information. In the case of Gold he quotes from "Crime of the Century" a statement that in 1947 the investigation of Gold "developed some highly useful information." By speculation Wexley enlarges the information into some heinous unknown crime which Gold wanted concealed and he thus became a willing witness (pages 64-65). Regarding Greenglass he accuses him of stealing uranium and of black market operations in stolen Army material while stationed at Los Alamos and states this was used as a lever to force Greenglass' testimony (page 85). Regarding Elitcher he states it was fear of prosecution for the false affidavit Elitcher furnished to the Navy Department concerning his membership in the CP.

Wexley also discusses in a knowing manner a FBI file which he calls "Central Subversive File Checks" in which file all subversive data on everyone is kept and is used whenever necessary. He states the name of David Greenglass was included in this file when he played handball in a Young Communist League while in his teens (page 81).

Wexley attempts to explain Sobell's flight to Mexico as just getting "welcome respite from the oppressive atmosphere in the United States." He also states that when the Korean War broke out Sobell stayed in Mexico due to his fear of Palmer raids which he assumed would be made (page 150). In a footnote Wexley states the Director masterminded the Palmer raids. Wexley describes Sobell in Mexico as one of the pathetic victims of hysterical times and not reasonable (page 158).

Wexley states Judge Kaufman was thoroughly indoctrinated by the Roman Catholic Church since the age of 15 due to his attendance at Fordham University. He states Kaufman attended Fordham to gain the double advantage, politically, of being Jewish and a graduate of a Catholic university. Wexley questions why the Judge was not in the armed forces and why no mention was made of any civilian contribution made by Kaufman to the war effort (page 252).

On page 115 Wexley makes the following statement: "... when Greenglass testified at the trial that there was no coercion and that he testified voluntarily, it was not only perjury but substration of perjury because the prosecution knew he was lying and permitted him to lie."

In March, 1953, the Department was requested to advise if a libel action might be filed on behalf of SA John A. Harrington against "New Jersey Committee for Clemency for the Rosenbergs" which stated in an advertisement that Harrington admitted he helped an important witness in that case to lie under oath. The Criminal Division advised there is no Federal statute making it a crime to publish libelous matter; however, it is a criminal offense in a number of states including the District of Columbia and the Bureau might wish to consider having Harrington institute local proceedings. The Civil Division by letter of April 23, 1953, advised no injunctive relief was available to Harrington although he could, if he desired,

personally bring a suit for libel but no opinion was expressed regarding his chances for success in such a suit. The Civil Division advised no precedent had been found, despite exhaustive research, for the Attorney General to institute a civil suit for libel on behalf of a Government employee.

ACTION:

Pages numbered 430 to 557 of the book entitled "The Judgment of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg," by John Wexley, were received from the "I office by airtel 5/13/55. The first 429 pages of this book were reviewed in a memo from me to you 5/17, captioned as above.

It will be recalled Judge Irving Kaufman advised Mr. Nichols telephonically 5/9/55 that he learned this book contained civil and criminal libel deliberately inserted by the publishers, Cameron & Kahn, to provoke a court test on the point of freedom of the press.

This portion of the book continues to analyze the trial testimony of David Greenglass and raises questions which _o were brought out on the various appeals, namely, Greenglass lacked the basic educational qualifications to determine the functioning of the atomic bomb and, likewise, to reproduce a sketch of the boxb. Vexley, therefore, concludes in his usual authoritative monner that Greenglass was coached before the trial by Harry Gold and others. Wexley also discusses the testimony of the Greenglasses, referring to the console table given Rosenberg as a gift by the Russians and which he adapted for microfilming purposes. The author states the prosecution "must have sponsored these perjuries wilfully, J C maliciously and deliberately" and is, therefore, "guilty o subornation of perjury. (p. 456)

flight from the U.S. Wexley states the \$1000 given Greenglass was a business debt Rosenberg was paying off. (p. 467) The \$4000 was made up of Greenglass' profit from black market operations and contributions from relatives. (p. 463)

Wexley accuses Greenglass of taking innocent conversations and putting a sinister twist to them.

Irving Saypol, then United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, is accused of a "deliberate falsehood" in informing Judge Kau man and the defense attorneys that the indictment of Villiam (Perl for perjury during the Rosenberg trial was made in the regular course of administration of justice. (p. 491-492) On this point, Verley cites the decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals, condemning this arrest butruling that since the defense did not make a timely motion during the trial, it waived its rights for a mistrial. Verley then likens the Circuit Court of Appeals to Pontius Pilate, washing its hands after it found the verdict to be corrupt. (p. 493)

"Roy Cohn who was one of the most responsible for that mockery of Justice" called the Rosenberg trial. He states this "effete, sickly, ambitious youth" achieved the "most notorious reputation in the annals of the American bar." (p. 487)

The author reviews the testimony of the 18 other witnesses and claims none of it corroborates the testimony of the Greenglasses, Elitcher, Gold and Bentley. An entire chapter is devoted to Elizabeth Bentley (Chapter 22, p. 512-27) in which her credibility is attacked and the authorities cited for this attack are Harvey V. Natusow and Byron Scott, the latter being the attorney for Villiam Henry Taylor, member of the Silvermaster network. This chapter concludes with the statement that the "blunt truth is that Elizabeth Bentley, Red Spy Queen, is primarily the creation of John Edgar Hoover."
p. 527.

The Sobell case is discussed and the conclusion reached that Elitcher's accusation was the only testimony presented and all the other witnesses against Sobell are described as substitutes for corroboration. The Government is accused of coercing Elitcher into framing Sobell and criminally manufacturing a "deportation" out of a brutal kidnapping to create in the minds of a jury the picture of a hunted fugitive captured with the aid of the Mexican Government. (p. 535)

The testimony of Julius Rosenberg is reviewed and, as to be expected, is described as the complete truth and forthright. Judge Kaufman is described as the "boy judge" who made so little attempt to conceal his hostility that the press picked it up. (p. 538) The conclusion is reached that Judge Kaufman, not Julius Rosenberg, is the fanatic. (p. 548)

The author states with no hesitation the FBI had Julius Rosenberg under surveillance from 1944 on, as that was the date of his membership in the CP which the FBI reported to G-2. (p. 556) He reaches the same conclusion concerning William Perl, based on the fact that the FBI obtained copies of money orders Perl sent to Alfred Barant in Ithaca in 1947 for payment of rent on Sarant's New York apartment. The author then states why, during all this surveillance, did not the FBI produce one scrap of incriminating evidence? (p. 557)

Regarding the FBI report made to G-2 re the CP membership of Julius Rosenberg, the author states "This may very well have been another piece of malevolence or idiocy such as the false accusation that was made against Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Assistant Secretary of Defense, by the ex-Communist Informer, Ralph deSola." (p. 557) Actually, the information concerning Rosenberg's CP membership was obtained from a list of members of the Industrial Section 16-B of the CP who were being transferred to their local branches.




