BOARDMAN of the New York Division to Supervisor JOHN W. POWELL of this Office on January 7, 1953. SAC BOARDMAN indicated that he had, on that date, received a telephone call from JOSEPH RUSSO, reporter for the Bridgeport Sunday Herald, the covers the Stamford, Connecticut, RUSSO, in his call, requested information regarding the date and place the ROSENBERGS were arrested and mentioned that he had recently contacted CHARLES COOPER who manages a photographic studio at Stamford, Connecticut. RUSSO indicated that he had contacted COOPER in regard to the ROSENBERG case and that COOPER had become highly inceased and would not talk to him. RUSSO described tooper to SAC BOARDMAN as a "card-carrying member of the Communist Party." SAC BOARDMAN requested and was furnished information regarding the Bridgeport Sunday Herald and CHARLES COOPER, who is the subject of Bureau File 100-334587 and New York File 100-69486. This is to further advise that at 12:30 P.M. on January 7, 1953, JOSEPH RUSSO telephoned SA HUGO P. BLANDORI at the Stamford RA and requested information regarding CHARLES COOPER whom he again described an old-time card-carrying member of the Communist Party." SA BLANDORI did not give any information to BUSSO. RUSSO indicated in his conversation with SA BLANDORI that immediately upon the execution of the ROSENBERGS, he planned an expose in the Bridgeport Sunday Herald on CHARLES COOPER. He stated that he had information to the effect that COOPER was an associate of JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife and that at the time of the ROSENBERGS' arrest, they were occupying a house which they rented from COOPER. SA BLANDORI questioned MUSSO regarding the source of this minipraction and he stated that he recalled reading it at the time of the BOSEMBERGS! arrest and believed that the original source was the PBI. indicated to SA BLANDORI that he wanted to be very sure of his facts in this case because he did not want to be sued for libel by COOPER.

It is apparent that RUSSO was evidently trying to collaborate this information in ascertaining where the arrest of the ROSENBERGS took place.

It should also be noted that in the report of Special Agent JAMES P. LEE at New York dated September 8, 1950, on the ROSENBERG case, page 36 of this report contains the results of an interview conducted on August 21, 1950, by Special Agents NORMAN PHILCOX and THOMAS P. LYNCH of the New York Office. This interview reflected that JULIUS ROSENBERG and his family had rented a garage-apartment from COOPER in Goldens Bridge, New York, from July 15, 1949, until shortly after Labor Day, 1949. COOPER stated that he did not know JULIUS ROSENBERG and had rented the apartment through placing an ad in a New York newspaper. It is possible that MUSSO may have acquired some information regarding this transaction and is seeking to link COOPER to the ROSENBERGS.

The above information was furnished to SAC BOARDMAN by telephone on the morning of January 8, 1953.

For the further information of the Bureau and the New York Office, the Bridgeport Sunday Herald is a weekly newspaper published in Bridgeport. Connecticut, which publishes various editions for the entire State of Connecticut and has the largest circulation of any newspaper in the State. It is a newspaper which specializes in the sensational type of story, particularly in the scandal category, and it is unscrupulous in the methods by which it acquires its news and the type of news it publishes.

During the past few years, with the increasing unpopularity of the Communist Party and the interest of the general public in it, the Bridgeport Sunday Herald has published numerous anti-Communist articles regarding individuals and organizations in the State of Connecticut. These articles have always been extremely anti-Communist and have usually been written in the form of exposes.

JOSEPH RUSSO, the Stamford representative for this paper, frequently tries to secure information from this office in regard to subversive organizations and individuals particularly in the Stamford area. He recently published in the Bridgeport Herald an expose of ALFRED MANDER, formerly a functionary of the Communist Party in Connecticut who was underground for a period and lived in the Stamford area under an assumed name. As a result of these tricles, MARDER will return to New Haven in the immediate future.

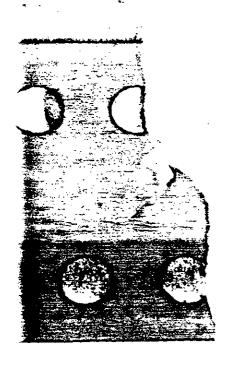

RUSSO is an intelligent and aggressive individual who has no scruples on how he obtains news.

This office is very cautious in its contacts with <u>RUSSO</u> or any member of the staff of the Bridgeport Sunday Herald, inasmuch as it is felt that they are prone to misquote and exaggerate any statements given them.

The above is being made available to the Bureau and the New York Office for informational purposes.



"My conscience is clear as a lawyer," Mr. Bloch said.

"Yes," I replied, "it should be. You have been everything a clie could expect. But is it clear as an American citizen?"

At this moment of crisis, when Gen. Eisenhower was stepping into office with a peace bid to the Soviet Union, the new President was faced with the sensitive problem of directly accusing Moscow of espio age if the White House refused clemency. It was a problem no Preside should have to tackle in his first days in the world's most complex office.

Bloch's answer was that a fundamental precept of American democrac was involved since all his clients were entitled to legal representation.

That is the law even for these people who were in effect part of t Soviet military operation.

Now look at the activity of some of Mr. Bloch's clients! He counseled Marion Bachrach, for almost 20 years a part of the Communist Party high command--officially employed by its national office. In December of 1948, some two years before the Resembergs telephoned and retained Bloch, Comrade Bachrach appeared before a Congressional committee accompanied by her counsel, Emanuel H. Bloch.

Although she admitted or denied knowing several persons listed for her by the committee interrogator, Marion Bachrach refused to affir deny that she knew Alger Hiss or his wife, Priscilla. Or that she has visited their home. Or that she knew members of the spy rings export by Whittaker Chambers and Elizabeth Bentley. Why?

Some two years later three women were summoned to the same committee's witness chair. Their attorney was Emanuel Bloch. According to the committee's records and statements, they were listed as mail drops, "in an elaborate system" used by Soviet agents operating between Mexico City and New York. The letters sent to these women had "ciphered messages in invisible ink". They were the communications link in the Soviet's effort to free the mysterious Frank Jacson, the Moscow agent who murdered Leon Trotsky.

Each of these three women was asked to testify on their participation in this ring. They refused to answer questions relating to this intrigue.

In his conversation with me Mr. Bloch maintained that even people "accused of the most heinous crimes had the right to defense counsel."

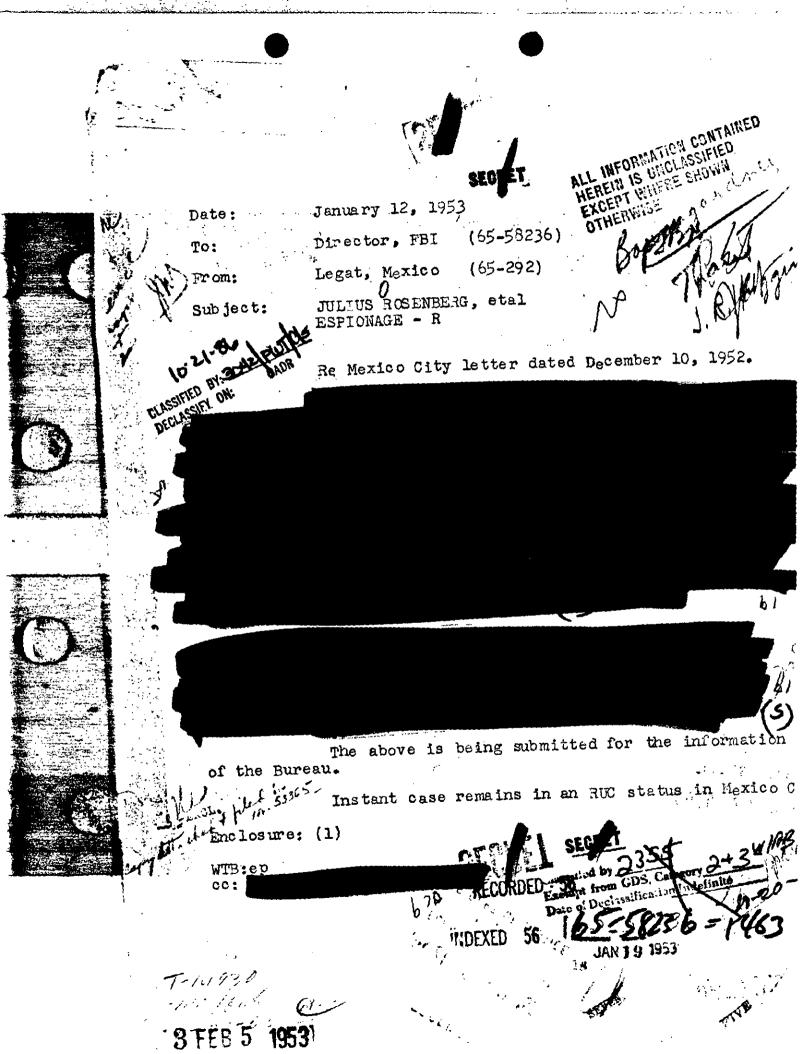
No one can argue with that statement.

When I asked why he had not denounced the Soviet's agitation from Red Peiping to Paris, directed at embarrassing the White House and smearing this land as anti-Semitic, Mr. Bloch replied:

"I stand on my responsibilities as a lawyer. I can't inject myself into the political, social and economic controversies and viewpoints of my clients."

Mr. Bloch is legally correct. But somewhere, somehow, there must be a better answer. For the record shows that the Soviet secret police and espionage apparatus is having such a field day in our land that it launched a series of events which wound up on Pres. Eisenhower's desk the first hours of his first day in the White House.

ALGUNA INHORMACION SCERE EL CASO RUSENBERG.

Una pareja de jóvenes americanos, padres de dos pequeños, van a - morir el 12 de enero próximo en la silla eléctrica, en el Estado de -- Nueva York, a menos que la protesta creciente del mundo en contra de - esta sentencia salvaje haga que el Presidente de los Estados Unidos -- conceda a los acusados clemencia.

Ethel y Julio Rosenberg fueron sentenciados en 1951 por su supues ta conspiración con otros para proporcionar a la Unión Soviética el — "secreto" de la bomba atómica. Ellos han mantenido su inocencia desde el principio. "Somos vícticas del mas grotesco tipo de emboscada pólitica que jamás se haya visto en los EE. UU.", dijo Ethel Rosenberg alser llevada a la cámara de la muerte en la prisión de Sing Sing.

Gold, asu vez, implicó a un sargento del ejército americano, David Greenglass quién había sido mecánico en el laboratorio de Los Alamos. Dijo Goldque el había ido a ver a Greenglass diciéndole que "Julius" lo había enviado. Greenglass le entregó un dibujó de un molde para lente, quese usó en la manufactura de la bomba, así como doce páginas de notas, a cambio de lo cual Greenglass recibió 500 dólares.

David Greenglass es el hermano de la señora Rosenberg! "Julius"es el primer nombre de Rosenberg, pero también es el nombre con el cual era conocido Fuchs entre sus amigos de los EE. UU.! Tan increíble como parezca. fué esta coincidencia, además de su larga enemistadcon su cuñado, misma que admitió, la que dió a Greenglass las bases pa
ra manufacturar su acusación en contra de su propia hermana y su cuñado! Ante las amenazas de la F.B.I. en el sentido de que tanto el come
su mujer podrían ser sentenciados a muerte, escogió la vida a costa de
honor. Se convirtió en el principal acusador de su hermana. Aún cuan
do confesó su culpa, le fué prometida elemencia a cambio de su testimonio en contra de su propia familia. Recibió una sentencia de quince
años de cárcel (misma que podrá ser conmutada a los cinco). Su esposa
quién también confesó su complicidad, no fué procesada. Pero los Rosenberg, que sostienen ser inocentes de toda concuión con este asunto
lueron condenados a morir.

We the undersigned Mexican citizens, in behalf of the right to live and receive humane treatment, which transcends all boundaries, request that you respect the lives of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG.

In view of the serious doubts which the trial of the ROSENBERGS has raised throughout the entire world on their guilt, and the feeling of horror which this unprecedented death sentence inflicted upon them inspires in us, we urgently beg that they be given the protection due to them. Our request does not imply legal proceedings on the guilt or innocence of the ROSENBERGS.

In behalf of justice, of human rights and feelings, and of the prestige of your great Nation, we request that the execution of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG be prevented; otherwise an irreparable injustice would be perpetrated.

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SOME INFORMATION ON THE ROSENBERG CASE

Two young Americans, parents of two children, are going to die next January 12th on the electric chair in the State of New York uhless the growing protest of the world against this savage sentence induces the President of the United States to grant them clemency.

ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG were sentenced in 1951 for their supposed conspiracy with others to provide the Soviet Union with the "secret" of the atomic bomb. They have defended their innocence from the beginning. "We are victims of the most grotesque type of political ambush which has ever taken place in the U. S." said ETHEL ROSENBERG on her way to the death chamber of the Sing Sing prison.

Thousands of Americans, including the eminent scientists who worked on the atomic bomb, do not believe the ROSENBERGS are guilty and thousands more are really horrified by the death sentence. Never, in the history of the country, has a death sentence been given by a civil court in an espionage charge, either in time of peace or in time of war. More and more people in other countries are studying the case and sending their protests to the White House in Washington.

How the Case Began

The ROSENBERG case is a development of the famous case of Dr. FUCHS in England. In 1950 a spy ring was uncovered headed by Dr. KLAUS EMIL JULIUS FUCHS, a German scientist employed by Great Britain, who had been working in Los Alamos, New Mexico, during the past world war. He and his American accomplice, HARRY GOLD, confessed they had supplied information on the progress of the atomic bomb to agents of the Soviet Union. GOLD, on his part, implicated a sergeant of the American army, DAVID GHEENGLASS who had been a mechanic in the Los Alamos laboratory. GOLD said that he had been to see GREENGLASS, telling him that "JULIUS" had sent him. GREENGLASS gave him a drawing of a lens which was used in the manufacture of the bomb, as well as twelve pages of notes, in exchange for which GREENGLASS received 500 dollars.

DAVID GREENGLASS is Mrs. ROSENBERG's brother! "JULIUS" is ROSENBERG's first name but it is also the name by which FUCHS was known among his friends in the U. S.1 As incredible as it

appears, it was this coincidence as well as his great animosity toward his brother-in-law, to which he admitted, which gave GREENGLASS the basis for fabricating his accusation against his own sister and his brother-in-law! Faced by the threats of the F.B.I., that he as well as his wife would be sentenced to death, he chose life at the cost of honor. He became his sister's principle accusor. Even when he confessed his guilt he was promised clemency in exchange for his testimony against his own family. He received a sentence of fifteen years in jail (which can be commuted to five). His wife, who also confessed her guilt, was not tried. But the ROSENBERGS who maintain they are innocent of all connection with this matter were condemned to die.

The Atomic Secret

The Judge justified the extreme penalty of death saying:
"Because of your treason the course of history has altered disadvantageously for our country by placing the atomic bomb in the hands of the Russians." Nevertheless, there exist abundant proofs that GRITIGIASS, the confessed spy, did not actually give any secret information. Furthermore, only his word exists, unsupported, to connect the ROSENBERGS with his activities.

The science editors of some of the most important publications in the United States found GREENGLASS' testimony doubtful.

The magazine Time: "Some of his testimony made little scientific sense."

The magazine Life: "The bomb which he describes seems to be illogical, if not entirely ineffective."

The magazine Scientific American: "The most elaborately guarded secret in history — how to make the atomic bomb — was allowed to escape casually in the court room last month, or wasn't this so?"

Dr. J. ROBERT OFFENHEIMER, Chief of the Los Alamos laboratory, during the last war, said in a speech in January 1951, (New York Times): "There are no 'unpublished' secrets in connection with atomic arms and there are no 'secret laws of nature' which are only within the reach of a few."

Trespassing the Sovereignty of Mexico

It is not generally known that the American F.B.I. even went so far as to trespass into Mexico in order to build this accusation against the ROSENBERGS. Declared guilty and sentenced to 30 years in prison, at the same time as the ROSENBERGS is ROSENBERG's friend and university companion, MARTIN SOBELL. When the F.B.I. began its investigation of all the friends and associates of ROSENBERG, it found that one named SOBELL was in Mexico. It also found someone like GREENGLASS who was ready to betray his neighbor and friend in order to obtain his own security. This man ELITCHER, said in his third statement to the F.B.I.: "ROSENBERG told me that SOBELL was also in this." ELITCHER was not tried.

The SOBELL couple had come to Mexico by plane to spend their summer vacation here; their people in New York were waiting for them to return. They had rented a flat in the city of Mexico, using their own names for this. Evidence was never presented that showed they had "fled" to Mexico as the F.B.I. stated. On August 16, 1951, ten armed men entered this couple's flat threatening SOPELL with knives. They put him in a car which was part of a caravan of five cars and after a trip of three days and three nights, at the ". S. border, they "pushed" him to cross the frontier. They arrested him and he was brought to New York.

Although the government of the United States could not accuse him of open illegal acts, the unsupported testimony of ELITCHER and only the fact that the families of SOBELL and ROSEN-BERG had previously visited each other was all that was needed to condemn SOBELL to jail for thirty years.

"Fabricated Proofs"

The "flight" of the SOBELLS to Mexico was used by the government to give more credulity to the theory that the ROSENBERGS were also considering "fleeing" to Mexico and later to Europe. This theory collapsed last week when it was revealed that an important testimony in this respect had been "prepared."

During the original trial a photographer stated he had taken pictures of the ROSENBERGS for a passport. (They denied it.) The photographer identified them in court, swearing that he had not seen them since the day he had taken their pictures. The F.B.I. has admitted in court that they took the photographer into the

court room the day before his statement and there they showed him the ROSENBERGS so that he would be able to identify them the following day when he testified. After this, it is almost impossible not to doubt the evidence that the F.B.I. presented.

Why the ROSENBERGS?

The question naturally arises, why have the ROSENBERGS been the object of this ambush, if it is an ambush. It is evident that for the desperate GREENGLASS they were the most appropriate scapegoats. Judging by the trial, it is obvious that they were also this for the government, fitting perfectly into its domestic policy, which is the identification of all progressive action with Communism, combined with the theory that all Communists are disloyal to their country.

The ROSENBERGS had sympathized with the Spanish Republic; they were active members of their respective unions; occasionally they read a radical periodical; they had made emphatic statements in favor of the "second front" in order to combat Hitler in Europe; ROSENBERG had been accused on one occasion of being a Communist and he had denied it under oath. These were the important factors which made the jury declare them guilty.

A Legal Opinion

A member of the Bar Association of England, Counselor of the Queen (previously of the King) since 1927, D. N. PRITT, after a careful analysis of the testimony of each one of the witnesses of the trial, reached the following conclusions:

"The trial of the case against the ROSENBERGS rests on the testimony of three persons (the GREENGLASSes and ELITCHER). Two of them are man and wife; it is doubtful that all of them are accomplices in the same case; and there are other reasons also.

"There was not a single independent witness who would corraborate his statement; no detective or official member of the police or even of the general public was called to testify that the ROSENBERGS had said or done something in their presence or within their hearing.

"Without excluding the police searches of the ROSENBERGS! home, no papers of any kind which the ROSENBERGS had written, received or even seen, were presented in the trial.

"I find it impossible to believe that if the case had not involved political issues or if it had not been heard in a period when hysteria and prejudice play such an important role, it would have been accepted by the prosecutor with such weak evidence in any country which follows the Anglo-Saxon traditions and legal procedures.

"I believe that under these circumstances, any court would have withdrawn the case. But this case was continued and not only were the ROSENBERGS declared guilty, but they were condemned to death.

"After a complete study, and from a purely professional point of view I feel that it would be an offense to all standards of Anglo-Saxon justice if not only the sentences but also the guilt of the ROSENBERGS remain."

Many persons still reject the idea that so elaborate a case as this could have been constructed by the American government from nothing and that as a result of it, two innocents have been condemned to die. Unfortunately there have been previous examples of this type in the history of the United States and of the world. TOM MOONEY, a labor leader was declared guilty of exploding a bomb in San Francisco and finally was saved from death by protests from the entire world. MCCNEY stayed in jail for many years; finally it was proved beyond a doubt that all the evidence which had been presented against him had been fabricated by the police with the help of prostitutes, gangsters, etc. Another man confessed that he had committed the crime for which SACCO and VANZETTI were electricuted. The principal witness in the famous Scottsboro case against nine Negro youths, admitted much later that he had lied. The martyrs of Haymarket died for a crime they did not commit, as the whole world knows today. The DREYFUS case was fabricated and later exposed to the world in its true aspect. Will this be a case in which these young parents will be sent to their martyrdom, only to be vindicated by history later when times are calmer? Is there not sufficient doubt of their guilt so that they may at least be granted clemency for this death sentence? If you think so, it is your duty to unite your protesting voice to the world chorus which is reaching the White House.

At 1:35 p.m., December 23, 1952, Supervisor Tom McAndrews, New York Office, telephonically advised an indication had been received from the High Court that the Circuit Court of Appeals will hand down a decision in connection with the captioned case on December 30, 1952. The NYO believes the Circuit Court of Appeals will rule similarly as previous rulings in this case; i.e., the motions of the defense will be denied and there will be no stay in the executions.

McAndrews advised that the defense will probably make a motion on December 30 for a reduction in sentence and judicial clemency before Judge Kaufman. At the same time, they will probably enter a motion for an application for executive clemency.

Judge Kaufman has instructed Assistant U. S. Attorney Kilsheimer to contact the Department and obtain from the Department a formal expression of opinion regarding the question of whether the subjects should be given any consideration relative to their contemplated motion for judicial clemency.

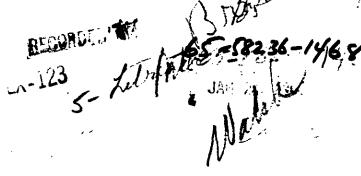

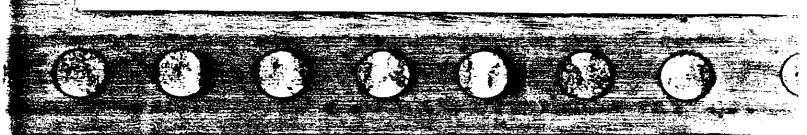

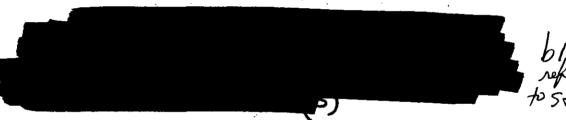

Reference is made to the Atomic Energy Act - Applicant investigation of the captioned individual. Reports reflecting the results of this investigation were transmitted to the Atomic Energy Commission on Movember 28, 1950, and February 16, 1950.

This Bureau was recently advised by Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman, Southern District of New York, that he is in receipt of a letter dated December 22, 1952, signed by * Henry Linschitz, Associate Professor of Chemistry, Syracuse University, Syrocuse 10, New York, requesting commutation of the death sentence given to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, convicted espionage agents.

Linechitz writed that during World War II, he worked as a research Group Leader at Los Alamos on the development of high explosive lenses and helped assemble the Magasaki bomb as a member of the Atomic Bond Field Group in the Marianas in August, 1945. Linschitz states he believes the sentence given to the Rosenbergs should be commuted because he has reason to doubt the oredibility of the testimony given by David Greenglass: the fact that the defendants and confessed spies are Jews might cause a Jevish judge to lean over backwards; and the timing of the trial during a period of bitter international feelings. 65-58236

As was to be expected the Communist press in Switzerland is busily beating the drums about the Rosenberg's conviction. The legation does not worry about the ridiculous allegations being made by the Communist papers since, at best, the Communists speak with a feeble, ineffective voice in Switzerland. However, it does find certain articles on the Rosenberg case carried in responsible papers a bit disturbing. Pertinent quotations from these articles are given below.

On January 5th, Damien, Columnist of LA SENTINELIE stated that the Rosenbergs were convicted on testimony given by persons who had a direct interest in putting all the blame on them.

"As I do not have the minutes of the 1800 page long tiplel, I can only form a personal opinion regarding the guilt of the Rosenberg pair, but what I know about the matter is enough to make me express the gravest doubts. For, in the opinion of many Americans - not only the Communists - this is an episode in the 'witch-hunt' organized by McCarthy, Taft and the like. And when one asks for proof of the Rosenberg's guilt, we are merely offered verbal statements (only 22 witnesses of the 118 quoted ever appeared during the proceedings), many of which are more than suspect. In particular, it was in order to save themselves that Rosenberg's sister and brother-in-law, the Greenglass couple - who have confessed to serious crimes as members of the spy ring (the Rosenbergs themselves have never confessed anything) - accused and charged the Sing Sing prisoners. Greenglass has been condemned to fifteen years' imprisonment, but his wife, Rosenberg's sister, is still free today, despite her confessions. On the contrary, it seems as though no better reason has been found for sentencing Mrs. Rosenberg to death than the fact that she lent tworal support to her busband.

In the tragic farce of the Slansky trial in Prague, the statements of the wife of one of the accused - I don't remember which- who
loaded her husband with odious accusations, and those of their children,
who piled still more onto them, were also quoted. It was enough to
make you sick. But now can one avoid condemning also as a tragic

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fares the verdict of Justice Hoffman, whose entire edifice of 'proofs' rests on the statements of a sister, a self-confessed spy, who, in order to save her own skin, has denounced and accused her brother and his wife - her brother, with whom she had previously had a sordid quarrel about family interests? On my part, I find it ground for the utmost anxiety that the United States should have reached the stage, in their struggle against Communism, of borrowing some of the Soviets most abject methods. In my opinion, President Truman would give proof of high statesmanship in reprieving the Rosenbergs. Noubt always favous the accused, this is an axiom of Western law. Let us observe it to the letter, in order to avoid falling back into the police state morals and the horrible parodies of justice which are current in the East."

In LA SENTINELLE of January 7th, L. Descoudres writes:

The Rosenbergs were condemned to death in an atmosphere of frantic anti-Communism. A crime was made out of their political opinions. They were condemned without any other proof than what was said by other defendants in the same trial. They themselves have always protested their innocence.

"These are the facts of the matter. There is nothing left for us to do now but hope that America and the West will not more seriously disgrace themselves, because there is still time to act and all the democracies ardently hope that the beginning of this year will see President Truman pardon the Rosenbergs. This would be a relief to the free world."

Pierre Beguin, editor in chief of the GAZETTE DE LAUSANNE, wrote on January 10th: She allow

There we have it! Reasons of State justify everything, even errors, even excesses, even iniquity! Two human beings whose guilt has not been proved conclusively can be coldly sacrificed, on the pretense that the moment has come to make an example of someone and to warn others who may be contemplating treason of the fate that awaits them. We are sorry to say so, but this is a totalitarian conception of instice. It used to be a Mazi conception, and not it is a Communist one. It is this conception which dictated the scandalous judgments rendered by the tribunals in Prague and elsewhere ! It is not a conception appertaining to a liberal world which allots the benefits of the doubt under all circumstances, out of respect for the Maman person, which only strikes when it is sure, and which refuses the slightest concession to what seems arbitrary or unjust.

"The worse danger inherent in totalitarianism is that it tempts its adversaries to fight it with its own weapons and its own methods. And this is the very temptation which must be avoided at all costs."

On January 13th the JOURNAL DE GENEVE, devoted a front page editorial by Bernard Beguin to the case. In the article, entitled "Justice or Mercy for the Rosenbergs!", Beguin stresses the absolute correctness of the legal procedure but

"Still there exists an uneasiness which is not due exclusively to the selfish campaign which the Communists have conducted over this affair. This uneasiness comes in the first place from the fact that one of the important pieces of evidence (but not the only one) for the prosecution was supplied by a co-defendant, David Greenglass, who, having pleaded guilty - whereas the Rosenbergs pleaded not guilty - got off with fifteen years in jail. Every court of justice in the world gives a chance to the defendant who pleads guilty. But from there to the insinuation that Greenglass bartered his head against his evidence it is only one step, and certain people have not hesitated to take it. Since this piece of evidence was not the only one, this does not alter the Rosenbergs' guilt.

"Indeed the uneasiness comes from farther off! It stems from the atmosphere created about the Rosenberg case by politicians who have made a career out of anti-communist purges. If the term 'hysteria' is incorrect, because it conjures up a picture of un-leashed fury, one may speak objectively of an obsession. Betrayed by their good faith and what they today call their naivete, the Americans - press, public, politicians and judges - are undeniably obsessed by the idea that they have been duped once more. Under such circumstances no human justice can pretend to be absolutely serene.

"In the Rosenberg case justice was done, conscientiously, and no one could ask the head of the Executive to disavow a sentence confirmed by all the courts of appeal which can be considered. But it is within his sovereign powers to tone down the extreme severity of this mechanism. Not justice, therefore, for the Rosenbergs, because they have had it, but pardon."

Not all of the articles carried by the responsible press have been negative. DIE TAT of January dismissed the charge of antisemitism as utter nonsense.

"It is not long since not only two Jews but a whole row of them were hanged in Prague. Strangely enough, Mr. Nuschke did not

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occasion, nor did s

send a telegram to the Pope on that occasion, nor did anyone hear the slightest sound from the bawlers who are now making so much fuss. The mere fact that all those who are talking now kept silent then is enough to make the object of the surrent demonstrations perfectly plain. It is not an unskillful attempt, in the fact of the electric chair, to put pressure on the emotions which do still function in the Western world and to generate an anti-American mood. That is all.

In the GAZETTE DE LAUSANNE of January 1st, special correspondent Michel Clerc explained the American point of view:

The question is a different one for the Americans. Communism is no longer a doctrine. It is the screen used by an empire with which - in Korea - they are at war. The Communists are not decent adversaries but enemies against whom one must protect one's self. Those who sympathize with them or who have done so at some time or other in their lives are enemy agents or suspected of being such.

"Who would have dreamed during the Hitlerian war of taking exception to measures taken against the 'Hazis'? Soon, if their appeal does not succeed, two American citizens, Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, will be electrocuted in Sing Sing prison. 'Out of idealism' they handed over to the Soviets secrets relating to atomic research. Should one have regarded them, in the name of free thought, merely as ideological adversaries and spared them? American public spinion would not have tolerated this.

*America is no longer a promised land. It is a nation. Because it has something to defend and because that something is threatened it has become conservative. Could it be otherwise? How could it be that the statue of liberty had not changed its face in this world of ours."

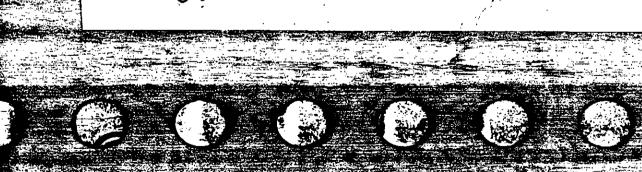

Information has been confidentially received that on January 31, 1953, Ethel Goldberg, sister of Julius Rosenberg, visited Ethel Rosenberg at Sing Sing Prison. At the beginning of the vicit Ers. Coldberg said "I want to know a little more about the table. Ithel Resemberg became angry and answered "Don't you mention that table in here. It doesn't concern you and you should not mention it." According to our source, it appeared that they were talking about a console table with a hollow base that the FBI had been interested in.

This source further advised that on February 5, 1953. Ethel and Julius Rosenberg had their meskly visit. Ethel maked Julius if his sister had asked him about the table when she visited him on January 31, 1953. Julius advised that she did inquire and he told his sister that she should not mention the table or the high chair and that it was none of her dusiness.

FEB 11 1953

It to believed that the table referred to is the console table that David Oreenglass testified to in the trial. According to his testimony, the Soviets had given this table to Julius Resemberg and it had been equipped to do microfilm work. It is not known what is the significance of Julius Rosenberg's reference to the high chair mentioned above.

Our source also advised that on February 4. 1953, the Rosenbergs were wisited by their attorney, Emanuel Block. Block advised them that recently Lleanor Roosevelt came out spainst clemency. He stated that he had not Harry Sacher (apparently referring to the former member of the defense counsel in the trial of the eleven good uniet Party functionaries before Judge Medina) and discussed this metter with him. It was Sacher's opinion that President Sisenhower was considering clemency and that Hrs. Receivedt had inside information of this fact and made the above statement so that no one would know she had this information.

Bloch also told the Rosenbergs that Rabbi
Silver berated him on the telephone because the letter
that Silver had sent to Bloch stating that he was for
clemency was given to Bloch in confidence and that
Bloch should not have published it. Bloch advised Silver
that he did not publish it, but that the National Comwittes to Secure Justice for the Rosenbergs did. Silver
would not accept this explanation. Bloch also told the
Rosenberge that Senator Langer is most helpful and is
working for them; further, that he did not see Senator
Taft, but saw his executive assistant. He also stated
that Senator Ives and Senator Lehman would not help them
that Senator Ives and Senator Lehman would not help them
to get clemency. Block also advised them that the world
picture has darkened because of the purges in Crechoslovskia
and Russia.

Eiller (a psychiatrist who visit Tithel Resemberg) is attempting to contact a witness named Schneiderman and persuade him to state that he testified as he did because of threats made against him by the FBI and because he had been ecached in his testimony. This is an obvious reference to Ben Schneider, a passport phtographer who testified as a government witness during the trial. For your information, Schneider has recently advised that a newspaperman of the "Daily Formard," a New York Yiddish publication, had been to see him and tried to question him about the trial. Schneider told this man that he would not discuss his testimony. Schneider has advised that in the event he is contacted by any person he will not discuss his testimony, but will obtain the identity of the person and advise our New York Office.

We are a group, primarily of graduate students, at UCLA. We represent no one but ourselves. Re: U.S.A. v. JULIUS AND ETHEL ROSENBERG

Dear Fellow Lawyer:

In the week of January 12, 1953, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg are scheduled to die in the electric chair. On November 17, 1952, when the Supreme Court denied a rehearing of its order of October 13, 1952, denying certiorari, Mr. Justice Black dissenting, (________, 97 L. Ed. (advance, p. 41)), Mr. Justice Frankfurter said:

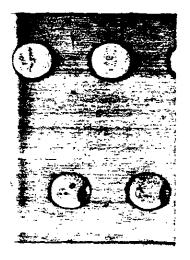
Although Supreme Court review has been denied, society has provided one last remedy for the Rosenbergs, i.e., executive elemency. In the interest of the good administration of American justice, we ask you to join us in requesting that the President commute the sentences to life imprisonment.

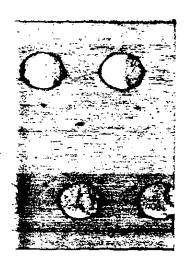
The following circumstances surrounded the trial and imposition of the death sentence.

- (1) The trial and the sentencing took place in an atmosphere of unprecedented animosity against these defendants, directly resulting from pre-trial publicity fed to the press by the Department of Justice. (See reversal of a conviction upon this ground in Delaney v. U.S. (C.A. 1—Oct. 10, 1952) 199 F. (2d) 107).) Among other ways, this prejudice was carried to the jury in the form of repeated irrelevant references to defendants' alleged Communist Party membership. When defendants urged this point on appeal, the Court of Appeals answered (195 Fed. (2) 583, at page 596) with a rather surprising statement, to wit: "It may be that such warnings (admonitions to the jury that communist membership has nothing to do with guilt or innocence) are no more than an empty ritual without any practical effect on the juror. (citing cases) If so, this danger is one of the risks therein in a trial by a jury; and the defendant made no effort to procure a trial by a judge alone, under Criminal Rule 23(a)." (Italics supplied.)
- (2) Although Judge Jerome Frank, of the 2nd Circuit, in affirming the conviction, said that without the testimony of David Greenglass, "the conviction could not stand" (195 F. 2d. 583, 592) the testimony of this witness is open to question in at least the following two respects:
 - (a) Though he admitted he knew no mathematics or physics, he testified that he alone prepared the atomic-bomb "cross-section diagram" introduced in evidence and that it was a reproduction of the "sketch" he alone had prepared and handed to the defendants seven years before. It has since been charged in a defense offer of proof that he received coaching in the preparation of the "diagram" (which has been described by Life magazine as "illogical, if not downright unworkable").
 - (b) Though he testified that he had confessed espionage upon his arrest (it was he who later implicated his sister and her husband, the Rosenbergs), the government has subsequently admitted that his confession occurred only after prolonged negotiations with him had taken place. It is noteworthy that, though self-confessed, he was subsequently sentenced to a comparatively mild 15 years' imprisonment on recommendation of the prosecution.
- (3) Though it is well known, and many eminent scientists have stated, that there is no "secret" of the atomic bomb, the trial proceeded on the theory that, as stated by the prosecution, the Rosenbergs stole "the one weapon that might well hold the key to the survival of this nation." In this connection, one might recall the statement of Dr. H. C. Urey, internationally-known A-bomb physicist, that "Detailed data on the atomic bomb would require 80 to 90 volumes of close print."
- (4) Though there was no evidence whatever introduced of any causal connection between the alleged acts of the defendants and the Korean War, the court stated, as a reason for passing sentence of death, that the defendants had by their acts "... caused, in my opinion, the Communist aggression in Korea..." (Footnote 28, 195 Fed. (2) 583 at pages 604 and 605). This would seem to be a clear case of erroneous reliance on unsubstantiated assertions concerning matters not subject to judicial determination in a particular case. That such a consideration would have a highly prejudicial effect on the defendants' sentence can hardly be questioned.

We are thus compelled at least to conclude, as has Dorothy Thompson, that "... it is unlikely that had they (the Rosenbergs) been tried in 1944 they would have received any such sentence." Never in the history of our country has a civil court in peace or war time decreed a death sentence for espionage. Even for treason only two death sentences have been imposed and they were not carried out. To do so here, even assuming the justice of the conviction for espionage (for a then wartime ally) would, we believe, only hurt the name of the United States.

Though perhaps for widely diverse reasons, millions of people here and throughout the world have expressed their opposition to this sentence or have urged a reduction therein. They include even Chairman-designate Velde of the Un-American Activities Committee of the House of Representatives. Believing that, as lawyers, we have a paramount duty to speak out on such occasions, we ask you to join with us, whether for reasons of doubt as to guilt or as to fairness of the trial or the sentence or general opposition to capital punishment or for still other reasons, in communicating to the President of the U. S. your request that the lives of the Rosenbergs be not taken. We would appreciate your sending a copy of your communication to any one of the undersigned.

Rosenberg Sentence Queried

Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel Prize Winner and renowned nuclear scientist

To the Editor of The New York Times:

After reading the testimony of the Rosenberg case I find that I cannot put to rest my doubts about the verdict and wish to cite the following points:

(1) Max Elitcher's testimony is of doubtful value. He says that he and Julius talked about espionage but never transferred any information for some five years. This doesn't seem probable to me.

(2) No certain conspiracy between Sobell and Rosenberg is established.

(3) The connections to others than Ruth and David Greenglass are not established. Miss Bentley was unable to identify the telephone voice that said, "This is Julius" with the voice of Julius Rosenberg. If "Julius" did not refer to him in this case, it probably did not when Harry Gold said, "I came from Julius" when he met Greenglass in New Mexico. From Gold's testimony it seems that he knew nothing of Rosenberg at all. It seems unbelievable to me that the name of an arch conspirator would be used in such identification phrases.

(4) No contact between the Rosenbergs and Anatoli A. Yakovlev is established.

(5) The Government's case rests on the testimony of Ruth and David Greenglass. He had pleaded guilty, but had not been sentenced and hoped for clemency. She has never been charged and tried, obviously it seems as a reward for her testimony. A family feud between the Greenglasses and Rosenbergs existed because of a business altercation. The Rosenbergs' testimony flatly contradicted that of the Greenglasses.

Testimony of Rosenbergs

I found the Rosenbergs' testimony more believable than that of the Greenglasses, although I realize that I have not had the jurors' advantage of hearing and seeing the witnesses. It it customary for spies to be paid in wrist watches and console tables? Greenglass and Fuchs were paid in cash. The Rosenbergs appear to have been as poor as churchmice and the statement that Julius was spending \$50 or \$75 a night in night clubs seems to me to be a very doubtful one. Had he done this, he would have been obviously and unaccountably rich to all his associates.

However, even if the verdict is correct, I am amazed at the unequal punishment for the same crime. For the very same conspiracy Ruth Greenglass was never brought to trial, though she admitted her guilt on the witness stand; David Greenglass got fifteen years; Morton Sobell and Harry Gold got thirty years, and Ethel and Julius Rosenberg got death. Only the last two took the witness stand and maintained their innocence. If capital punishment is to be given in the future for espionage I should like to have it introduced in a case for which the evidence rests on the testimony of witnesses who did not stand to profit from their testimony. I do not regard selfconfessed criminals as reliable wit-

We are engaged in a cold war with the tyrannical Government of the U. S. S. R. We wish to win the approval and loyalty of the good people of the world. Would it not be embarrassing if, after the execution of the Rosenbergs, it could be shown that the United States had executed two innocent people and let a guilty one go completely free? And, remember, somewhere there is a representative of the U. S. S. R. who knows what the facts are.

I strongly urge a careful reconsideration of this sentence.

On Nov. 17, 1952, the Supreme Court of the United States, with Mr. Justice Hugo Black dissenting, refused to review the convictions and death sentences of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg on charges of "conspiracy to commit" espionage for the Soviet Union. The atmosphere in which their trial was conducted and the methods employed to obtain their convictions have raised grave doubts in the minds of people all over the world as to their guilt.

DENIS NOWELL PRITT, author of this brilliant analysis of the Rosenberg trial, is one of the veteran senior members of the English Bar: a Queen's (King's) Counsel since 1927. For many years a Labour MP and chairman of the Howard League for Penal Reform and the Bentham Committee for Poor Litigants, he presided in Sept., 1933, over the Reichstag Fire inquiry in London. The inquiry—unlike the Berlin trial—considered the evidence soberly, indicted Goering whom the world now knows to have been the real incendiary.

In presenting his analysis, Mr. Pritt writes: "I must state my qualifications for this work. In my 43 years as an English barrister I have had considerable experience both in trial and in Appellate work. In the latter, I have had to study in detail many hundreds of Records of cases from all parts of the British Empire and Commonwealth, including India, in all of which countries the procedure is very similar to that of the U.S. A.; and I have studied also a certain number of Records from the U.S. A. itself. To form an estimate of the value which the evidence given in the Rosenberg case should possess in the eyes of impartial lawyers trained in Anglo-Saxon legal traditions, is thus work of the sort to which I have devoted a large part of my time as a barrister.

"I have studied the Record carefully, putting aside as far as humanly possible anything I had previously learned about the case, and have reached certain conclusions about both the conviction and the sentence, which I will state fully, with my reasons for these conclusions."

THE indictment on which Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were tried was returned on Jan. 31, 1951, against five defendants in all—the two Rosenbergs, one Morton Sobell, one Yakovley, and one David Greenglass. Greenglass pleaded guilty. The two Rosen-







bergs and Sobell pleaded not guilty and were tried together, the case of Yakovlev being severed.

The charge was that the five defendants named, together with one Harry Gold, one Ruth Greenglass, "and other persons unknown," had conspired over a period of six years, from June 6, 1944 to June 16, 1950,

... the U.S.A. being there and then at war, with intent and reason to believe that it would be used to the advantage of a foreign nation, to witthe U.S.S.R., to communicate, deliver and transmit to a foreign government, to wit the U.S.S.R., and representatives and agents thereof, directly and indirectly, documents, writings, electhes, notes and information relating to the 'National Defense of the U.S.A.

It is well to explain at the outset what is the essence of the crime of conspiracy and why a charge of conspiracy to commit some crime or other is so frequently made, in lieu of a charge that the crime was actually committed. "Conspiracy" can be defined, sufficiently for present purposes, as an agreement between two or more people to commit a crime; it is itself a crime, and the crime of conspiracy is complete as soon as two or more persons have agreed in any way whatsoever, whether formally or informally, by words or by conduct, to commit some crime; it is not necessary for the prosecution to prove the commission of the ultimate crime nor even of acts amounting to an attempt to commit it.

It is thus in general easier to secure a conviction for conspiracy than for any other offense, for less has actually to be proved against the defendants; and prejudice or excitement may lead a jury to convict parties on a mere allegation that they agreed or arranged together to do something, under circumstances where, if it were necessary to prove some positive criminal act, the jury would have to acquit because there would be no evidence at all of any such acts.

To secure a conviction is moreover made easier still by the operation of a peculiar rule of evidence. In all normal cases no evidence can be given against any defendant in a criminal case except evidence of acts which he himself did or words which he himself spoke; but in a conspiracy case, so long as some evidence—however tenuous—is given from which an agreement between the alleged conspirators might be inferred, the acts and words of any of them, asserted to be done or spoken in pursuance of the conspiracy, are admissible evidence against all the others, on the footing that they are all agents of one another, and so responsible for each other's words and actions.

The Rosenbergs' 12 'overt acts'

tension, in all countries, charges of conspiracy have been frequently made, and many defendants have been found guilty and sentenced to imprisonment, although little has been proved against them and no other crime could plausibly even be charged. The dangers, inherent in conspiracy charges, of convictions being reached on inadequate evidence are indeed so well recognized that the rule has been firmly established in most Anglo-Saxon jurisdictions, including that of the Federal Courts of the U.S.A., that "overt acts" demonstrating the conspiracy should be alleged in the indictment and proved

Such overt acts are normally alleged pretty specifically, so that the defendants can really know what case they have to meet—and indeed, also, that the public may know the nature and weight of the case. I turn accordingly to study the twelve overt acts mentioned in the indictment in this case. They are in substance as follows:—

- That Julius Rosemberg visited a building in Washington, D. C. on or about June 6, 1914.
- e That on or about Nov. 15, 1944, Julius Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg talked with-Ruth Greenglass.
- o That, five days later, Julius Rosenberg gave Buth Greenglass some money in New York.
- e That on the same day, Buth Greenglass took a train from New York to Mexico.
- o That, three weeks later, Julius Rosenberg went to a building in New York.
- o That on the same day Julius Rosenberg received from Ruth Greengians a paper containing written information.
- That on or about Jan. 5, 1945, in New York, Julius and Ethol Bosemberg talked with David and Euth Greenglass.
- e That, on the same day, Julius Rosenberg gave Ruth Greenglass a portion of the side of a torm cardboard "Jelio" box.
- That five days later Julius Rescuberg introduced David Greenglass to a man in New York.
- o That two days thereafter Julius Rosenberg talked with David Greengiass.
- o That on the same day Julius Rosenberg received from David' Greenglass a paper containing sketches of experiments conducted at the







o That, two days after that, Bavid Greenglass took a train from New York to New Mexico.

It will be noticed that the not very informative "overt acts" of this six years' conspiracy are spread over, or rather confined to, a period of only seven months, and that the only persons named as taking part in them are the two Rosenbergs and David and Ruth Greenglass; the defendants Sobell and Yakovlev are not mentioned. It is not surprising that applications were made to the Court on behalf of Sobell; for some enlightenment as to what was alleged against him; and it was finally alleged that he had joined the conspiracy on or about June 15, 1944, and five overt acts were alleged against him, namely that at some time in five separate months of 1946, 1947 and 1946, he had convergations with Julius Rosenberg!

The witnesses: who, what, why?

THE trial took place before Judge Irving R. Kaufman on 14 days in March, 1951. The prosecution put in a list of 112 witnesses, but in fact called only 22 of them, and one other.

The strength and weakness of the case depends, of course, on these witnesses, on their characters, on what they said, who they were, and what motives or interest they had; and it is thus of the greatest importance to know clearly all these points and to see exactly:

- (1) What sort of a reliable case all witnesses between them were able to build up to establish that the Rosenbergs were guilty at all, and
- (2) How serious anything was that the Rosenbergs were alleged to have done—and, above all, of course, whether what they had done merited the death penalty.

I turn at once to the evidence, adding only that, as I am dealing with the cases of the Rosenbergs, I will pay little attention to evidence which implicated only other persons, including Sobell, the only other person actually on trial with them.

Greenglass: 'terrible incentive for lying'

THE principal witness against the Rosenbergs was David Greenglass. There were an unusually large number of reasons for mistrusting his evidence. To begin with, he had pleaded guilty to the conspiracy for which the Rosenbergs were being tried, but had not yet been brought up for sentence; thus, he mighthope, and he expressly said that he did hope, to obtain some advantage for himself as a result of giving evidence against the Rosenbergs; for the Court might ultimately give him a light sentence, and even if it gave him a substantial one, the Government might well remit much or all of it. He thus had a strong motive to "pile it on." In addition, he was, of course, fully established by his plea of guilty, by his evidence, and by surrounding circumstances (such as his possession of substantial sums of money which could only be explained on the basis that he was telling the truth when he said that he was selling military secrets for money), to have been a party to a conspiracy which both he himself and the prosecution described as a most serious one.

He thus fell into the class of "accomplice" witnesses, those who, in the old English phrase, "turn Queen's evidence." Such witnesses are universally regarded as highly unreliable, not merely because they are self-confessed criminals, and are betraying their associates, but far more because it is dangerously easy for them to implicate falsely, for some benefit to themselves, or to pay off some "score," or for any other reason, one who in fact took no part in the crime.

They are in a position to tell a story that is in the main true, and thus much easier to tell without being exposed as a liar in cross-examination; but at the same time to insert into that story one limited but serious faistly, namely, the assertion that some accused person took part in it when in fact he had nothing to do with it; and, if anything could make this easier, it would be that the accused was related to the accomplice so that it would be natural for them to meet from time to time.

 Accomplices, moreover, as I have mentioned shortly above. have in many cases a very direct motive for implicating the accused persons as deeply as possible, for they hope to receive as a reward of their betrayal of their associates, and for their help in proving an alleged offense which could not be otherwise proved at all, either a lighter sentence from the Court, or some remission by the Government of whatever sentence is passed on them, or both. This provides so terrible an incentive for lying, and so great a danger of convictions on untrustworthy evidence, that in practically all of the many hundreds of cases of "accomplice evidence" which I have had to investigate in my practice the danger has been minimized either by giving the accomplice a free pardon before he gives evidence, or by sentencing him before he does . so; and even then the need for corroboration of his evidence by independent witnesses, free-from the taint of complicity, is always emphasized.









As an accomplice witness, David Greenglass was in the worst possible position; he had been neither pardoned nor sentenced, and he knew that so soon as the cases of the Rosenbergs and of Sobell had been disposed of he would come up for sentence. When he did come up, his Counsel made an eloquent and business-like plea to the effect that, unless people in his position could have some confidence that they would be dealt with lemiently, they would not betray their associates, and the Government would therefore not secure convictions. If the Government wanted help it should give help. It should give Greenglass "a pat on the back": he should be praised, not punished, said his Counsel. Greenglass was, however, given a sentence of 15 years imprisonment and his only chance of not serving this fully lies in the hope of leniency from a grateful government.

"To save his own skin"

do not end with this already formidable circumstance. For it has to be added that Ethel Rosenberg, whom he was thus pushing towards a sentence of death, was his own elder sister who had always befriended and helped him; and Julius Rosenberg, whom he was treating in the same way, was her husband and thus his brother-in-law. To save his own skin he was quite willing to give evidence against his sister and his brother-in-law. (It was also clear, if not perhaps very important, that there had been long disagreements between him and Julius Rosenberg over a business in which they were partners after his demobilization from the army, which eventuated in his instructing his lawyer to bring civil proceedings against Julius.)

Nor was that quite all; for Ruth Greenglass, named in the indictment as a party to the conspiracy, for some unstated reason not actually indicted, but standing in peril of being indicted at some subsequent time, was David's wife, and he professed to love her dearly. Nevertheless, in the course of the many interviews he had with the FBI, in which he told bit by bit, as he remembered it, the whole of his story, he betrayed in the very first conspiracy in which he himself, at any rate, was taking part. With such an equipment, David Greenglass might be regarded as a man on whose evidence it would not be safe to convict anyone, but his evidence must of course be examined.

His version of how he came to take past in the conspiracy

was that his wife went down from New York to the neighborhood of Los Alamos, where he was working as a machinist, to take him a message—as she alleged—from Julius Rosenberg, inviting him to take part in espionage, and that by the morning of the following day he had decided to do so! And, at a later stage, when according to him Julius Rosenberg warned him that he was in danger of arrest and ought to leave the country, he accepted from Rosenberg sums amounting to \$5,000 in cash to enable him to do so; he stated on oath that he never had any intention of leaving, and that he concealed his intention from Rosenberg but nevertheless accepted and retained the money. He had he added, such a distaste for the money that he wanted to flush it down the lavatory, but changed his mind and used it to nire Mr. O. John Rogge as his lawyer instead.

'No sort or kind of corroboration'

THE nature of his evidence against the Rosenbergs lent itself to no sort or kind of corroboration. It consisted of accounts of conversation with them, at which no third party was present, and of occasions on which he said that he furnished to the Rosenbergs sketches and written descriptions of processes and material objects such as lenses.

None of the alleged sketches or descriptions was produced, but Greenglass prepared—four or five years after the alleged incidents, from his own unaided memory—what he said were reproductions of the material, and these were put before the jury, whether his limited education made it possible for him to do anything of this sort accurately is a matter for scientists rather than lawyers; but from the point of view of a lawyer it can be said that such reproductions, from even the most reliable of witnesses, would add little or nothing to their evidence and could not in any way constitute corroboration.

I pass over a number of minor points in his evidence which were designed to implicate one or both of the Rosenbergs, because examination of all of them shows that there is nothing in them to constitute any corroboration of his story; and it remains true that not one word of his story against them was corroborated by anybody but his wife, nor by any circumstance or material.

It is my considered professional opinion that a conviction based upon such evidence from such sources, without independent corroboration, cannot be regarded as reliable and should not be





sustained. That not merely a conviction but a sentence of death should be based upon such evidence runs counter, in my opinion, to all normal standards of criminal procedure and of the administration of justice. I have myself appeared in many "accomplice" cases where convictions on evidence much less objectionable than this were set aside by appellate courts on the grounds that the accomplice evidence should not be accepted.

Importance of 'secrets' never shown

SHOULD add that, even if the evidence were regarded as providing a reliable basis for conviction, there would still be lacking, in my humble opinion, any good reason for imposing or upholding a death sentence. Such a sentence could surely only be justified if it were clear that the secret information involved was of the utmost importance.

Scientists may be able to express expert views on the value or absence of value of what the witness, David Greenglass, alleges that he communicated to the Rosenbergs, and, in particular, to tell us whether the information was old or new; whether it revealed or conveyed what is called "the secret of the atom bomb"; whether it was of such a nature that a foreign country which could not have developed the atom bomb without it was thereby enabled to do so; and finally, whether David Greenglass was sufficiently educated technically to be able to understand, remember and communicate it: all that a lawyer can say upon it is that there is no real evidence in the Record to show that it was of very great value. In general, in charges of espionage, there is expert evidence to show exactly why the information is important: but in the present case only two scientific witnesses gave evidence on this topic, and they said little. The evidence of the first of them, a Dr. Koski, read as a whole, constitutes no proof at all that there was any particular importance in what David Greenglass learnt; it shows merely that the information was secret and that an expert, seeing what Greenglass alleges he had taken, "would know what was going on at Los Alamos." The other witness, a Mr. Derry, stated that the description and the sketch given by Greenglass "related to the atom bomb which was in the course of development in 1945," and "demonstrated substantially and with sufficient accuracy the principle involved in the operation of the 1945 atomic bomb"; and, further, that an expert could perceive from this information, to a substantial degree, what the actual construction of the bomb was. He added that the information was classified as "top secret"; but he said

nothing as to how many people already knew as much, or how easy or how difficult it would be for other people to find it out by their own researches; he said, indeed, nothing more specific than that, so far as he knew, no foreign government other than those of Britain and Canada knew as much in 1945 about the development and structure of the atomic bomb as the American scientists knew. (Another witness, a Mr. John Lansdale, Jr. was also asked "to establish the authenticity of the information that Greenglass gave"—i.e., said he gave—"to Rosenberg," but after a discussion between Counsel and the judge the question was abandoned.)

Accordingly, while scientists can plainly make more effective comment than I can on this part of the evidence, I can assert as a lawyer that there was nothing in it to show that the information which David Greenglass claimed to have communicated to Julius Rosenberg was of any especial value or danger, such as to justify on any view the death penalty.

David Greenglass's wife, Ruth, whose position has already been explained, also gave evidence, which followed pretty closely that of her husband, and is equally devoid of any corroboration. It does not call for separate study; her hopes and fears for herself and her husband, her readiness to confess to crime and to implicate relatives in that crime, do not differ from her husband's. In a sense she can be said to corroborate her husband, but this could not be regarded as independent corroboration.

Witness who was 'scared to death'

THE evidence of the two Greenglasses was almost the only evidence against the Rosenbergs; but it is necessary just to examine what other evidence there was. I begin with Max Elitcher, a man who had worked in the Bureau of Ordnance of the Navy Dept. He was mainly a witness against the other defendant, Sobell, but he did say that on three occasions Julius Rosenberg asked him to obtain confidential information for him for Soviet purposes. He said, however, that he had not done so; and it is noticeable that none of the "overt acts" alleged against the Rosenbergs in the indictment covered the interview related by Elitcher; he said, moreover, in cross-examination, that two of his three meetings with Rosenberg were merely social.

Elitcher made it quite plain that he himself was an accomplice. As he said, "I was part of it." He admitted, too, that he had told lies under oath, and that, being "scared to death," he had

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told the FBI "everything he knew"—although he had lied to them too—in the hope that he might "come out the best way" and that "nothing would happen to him." For some unexplained reason, he was neither indicted nor even mentioned in the indictment as a co-conspirator. It is obvious that his evidence can add practically nothing to that of the Greenglasses; it is of little volume and of almost equally poor quality.

Of the remaining 17 prosecution witnesses, only four gave evidence of anything the Rosenbergs were alleged to have said or done. Dorothy Abel, the sister of Ruth Greenglass, gave evidence that she had once been asked to leave the room whilst her sister talked with Julius Rosenberg and that the latter had once in her presence praised the Soviet system and described the U.S.A. as "capitalistic"! A Dr. Bernhardt, Julius Rosenberg's physician, proved that Rosenberg asked him in 1950 what inoculations were needed for anyone entering Mexico. Two other witnesses, a Mrs. Cox and a Mr. Schneider, gave evidence "in rebuttal," after the close of the defendants' case, about the Rosenbergs on points that may fairly be left unmentioned as trivial. The remaining 13 witnesses either gave no evidence at all that bore on the Rosenbergs, or merely mentioned their name as hearsay.

Thus, the prosecution case against the Rosenbergs rested on the evidence of three persons, two of them husband and wife, and all of them unreliable as accomplices and for other reasons too. There was no corroboration of their story by any independent witness; no detective or other police official, let alone any member of the general public, was called to say that either of the Rosenbergs had ever said or done anything in their presence or hearing. Notwithstanding police searches of their home, no line of writing of any kind that they had ever written, received, or even seen, was adduced. There was nothing of any kind in evidence against them except what the two Greenglasses and Elitcher had said. I am unable to believe that, if the case had not involved political topics or had not been heard at a period when hysteria and prejudice played so strong a role, evidence so weak would have been put forward by the prosecution in any country in the world which followed the Anglo-Saxon traditions and procedure. I think that under those conditions any Court would almost certainly have withdrawn the case from the jury. But this case was allowed to go to the jury and the Rosenbergs were not only convicted but were sentenced to death.

The Recenbergs, who at every stage asserted their innocence,

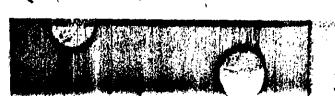
gave evidence and called two other witnesses; these latter dealt with points which can fairly be registered as unimportant. In a study designed to examine the strength or weakness of the prosecution case which the jury accepted, what the Rosenbergs themselves said is not of quite such importance as what the prosecution did or did not prove; but it remains true that they did give evidence, being of course submitted to cross-examination and answering fully and consistently everything that was alleged against them. Nothing was established against their character, unless it be that they had talked of the Soviet economic system, had thought that the Soviet Union was at one stage bearing the brunt of the Second World War, and had had in their possession a collecting box for Spanish refugee children.

Judge's 'very shocking ' comments

MUST say a little about the conduct of the trial. The prosecution, both in the opening statement of the prosecuting attorney and throughout the evidence, repeatedly made play with the alleged Communist connections of the Rosenbergs; the usual "warning" was given that of course communism is not evidence of conspiracy or of espionage, and was immediately nullified by the assertion-wholly unproved-that Communists are more likely to commit espionage than other people. The atmosphere of the case, as one can see from the observations in the Record alone, was indeed such that the mere suspicion of communist affiliation was almost enough of itself to make conviction certain. (Much the same comment must be made about questions and assertions on the point that the information was alleged to have been obtained on behalf of the Soviet Union, and indeed on any suggestion of any kind in favor of that country or of anything in it. I get from the Record the impression that both communism and the U.S.S.R. were such "red rags to a bull" that the bare mention of them, whether justifiable as relevant to the charges or not, of itself made it extremely difficult to secure a fair and judicial consideration of the evidence, or of the case generally.)

From a purely English point of view, it is noticeable that the trial judge at times treated the defense counsel with considerable abruptness and discourtesy, and at almost all stages of the cross-examination of the main prosecution witnesses, was harrying them to cut short their cross-examination.

The last and perhaps the most serious comment I have to make concerns the observations of the judge when passing sen-



tence. Having regard to what little evidence of any kind had been given against the Rosenbergs, it is very shocking to a lawyer brought up under the Anglo-Saxon system, in which judges should deal with what is proved in evidence and nothing else (apart from the very narrow field in which judges may take "judicial notice" of indisputable facts, like the days of the week and the seasons of the year), to read some of the statements made by the judge when passing sentence, presumably by way of expressing his reasons for deciding to impose the death sentence instead of sentence of imprisonment.

To begin with, it should be noticed, although it is far from being the most seriously objectionable of his remarks, that he made somewhat extravagant comments on "Russian terrorism" and on the administration of justice in the U.S.S.R.; he said, in short, the sort of things that one is accustomed to read in the more irresponsible newspapers, things which some of the less thoughtful readers may be led to believe. One might have hoped 4hat persons holding high judicial office would have been less guilible: but in any case, these observations, made by the judge of an important court when passing sentence of death, were not merely inaccurate: they were unsupported by any evidence and were wholly irrelevant. That the judge behaved in this way may indicate that anti-communist and anti-Soviet hysteria has gained such ground for the moment in the U.S.A. that it is difficult. If not impossible to accure a fair and dispassionate trial of a political case involving either communism or the U.S.S.R.

of the matter. He went on to treat the case as if the information which the Rosenbergs were said to have communicated to the U.S.S.R.—of the value of which, as I have already mentioned, there was no real evidence—had been established to be of the most fundamental importance. He began, for example, with the assertion that what the Rosenbergs had done "has already caused, in my opinion, the Communist aggression in Korea" (about which, of course, there was once again no evidence.) He went even further and based his determination on sentence on the wholly unproved assumption that the Rosenbergs had obtained from David Greenglass and given to the U.S.S.R. just the vital information that enabled that country to develop the atom bomb, which it could not have achieved without that information. The Rosenbergs had thus, as he put it, "altered

the history of the world" to the injury of the U.S.A. (Incidentally, although it could have been alleged in the indictment that the conspirators had acted with intent to injure the U.S.A., no such allegation was pleaded.)

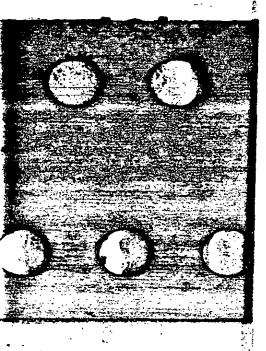
I am forced to the conclusion that, even if the conviction of the Rosenbergs had rested on reliable evidence that they had conspired to obtain some information, any sentence expressed by the judge to be based on such inaccurate and unproved assertions as to the importance of the information would have to be set aside on appeal under any procedure which provided for a free review of the sentence by an Appellate Court.

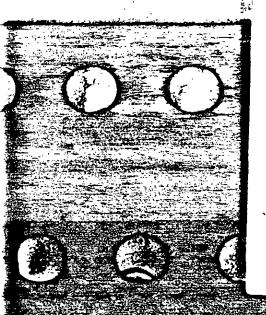
Unfortunately, the procedure applicable to this case does not provide for such a review, any more than it provides for a consideration of the credibility of the witnesses or the reliability of the evidence. Were the procedure different, it may well be that the whole matter would have been disposed of already. But there is, in effect, no appeal at all to any court from either of the two main defects of this trial, namely, the unreliability of the evidence and the gravely excessive sentence.

The duty of securing a review on these points thus rests on public opinion through the world. After full study, for the reasons which I have expressed above, I must express the view, from a purely professional standpoint, that it would offend against all Anglo-Saxon standards of justice that the convictions, let alone the sentence, of the Rosenbergs should be allowed to stand.

The Attorney General called to advise that he was going over to the White House this afternoon on the Rosenberg matter. He stated the CIA people wanted to be sure as to whether he had checked with me. The Attorney General stated he had read my memorandum very carefully and he thought he had judged it accurately, namely, that I feel there is no reasonable possibility if this sentence is commuted that they would talk. I told the Attorney General that I had a very strong feeling along that line, and he could make such a statement. I also stated that the Rosenbergs had been advised of what they could do not only by the judge but by friends of theirs and they have not utilized the opportunities given them. I indicated I felt it would be very unfortunate if any steps were to ten to lessen their sentence. The Attorney General stated he was going to but on this and I told him he could quote me to the fullest extent.

Reference is made to a memorandum dated January 15, 1953, from Mr. Abbott Washburn, which has been referred to my attention by your office. You will recall Mr. Washburn reported that one of his friends had been advised by Nathaniel-Weyl, ex-Communist who was in a Communist cell with Alger Hiss in Washington of the 1930's, of the possibility that the Rosenbergs would be willing to confess if given elemency. Washburn believed that Weyl based his belief on discussions Meyl had with "Jews who were friends of the Rosenbergs" and because of present Soviet anti-Semitism.

For your information, the Bureau received the same information from another source and interviewed ar. Weyl on January 16, 1953. Mr. Neyl stated that he has never made any statements that the Rosenbergs were ready to confess and has no knowledge about such information. Further, he stated that whoever attributed such statements to him is a "liar."

Nathaniel Weyl, a Jewish gentleman who was in a Communist cell with Alger Hiss in Washington in the 1930's (written up in last week's U. S. NEWS) has told one of our sources that he has reason to believe the Rosenbergs would be willing to expose the whole story of their Communist connections if the hint of a Presidential chemency deal were made to them.

We are led to believe that he bases this on discussions he has had with Jews who are friends of the Rosenbergs. The recent evidence of violent Soviet anti-Semitism (the Prague "trials" and the Russian doctors purge) has soured their allegiance considerably.

Moscow is putting on an all-out, world-wide campaign to exploit the Rosenberg case. If the Rosenbergs could be induced to talk, it would constitute a defeat for the Kremlin and a cold war victory for us.

In spite of the difficulties of the interregrum, this opportunity should not be allowed to slip between the chairs and be lost by default. In the larger struggle, it is not important whether this is handled by the new or the old administration. It would seem to me that both Mr. Dulles and General Smith should be consulted for policy on this, as well as C. D. Jackson.

PURPOSE:

To authorize transmittal of attached letter to Attorney General.

DETAILS:

A memorandum dated January 15, 1953, from
Abbott Washburn to the Attorney General has been referred
to the Director. This memorandum states that Nathaniel
Weyl, ex-Communist, had told one of Washburn's sources
that he, Weyl, had reason to believe the Rosenbergs would
be willing to confess if given clemency. Washburn believed
that Weyl based his opinion on discussions Weyl had with
Jewish friends of the Rosenbergs and because of Soviet
anti-Semitism as evidenced by the Prague trials and the
arrests of Russian Jewish doctors. Washburn pointed out
the importance of having the Rosenbergs talk in connection
with the cold war and suggested that General Smith, Mr.
Dulles and C. D. Jackson be consulted for policy on this,

Jackson is believed identical with a newly appointed administrative appointed in Fresident who has been assigned to the William Jackson committee, which has been set up by President Bisenhower to redictive which government's political and psychological warfare program as it applies to the cold war. Washburn has been reported to be Executive Secretary of this Committee.

The above is obviously the same information which was received by the Bureau as set forth in a memorandum from Mr. Keay to Mr. Belmont dated January 16, 1953, in the above-captioned case. This memorandum reported that on January 15, 1953, Frank Wisner, Deputy Director, Plans, Central Intelligence Agency, advised that on that date he had telephonically received information concerning the possibility of the Rosenbergs talking from Abbott Washburn who was attached to Eisenhower's headquarters in New York City. Wisner advised that Washburn's source was Nathaniel Weyl and gave substantially the same information as reported above.

On January 16, 1953, pursuant to Bureau instructions, WFO interviewed Weyl who has been cooperative with the Bureau in the past, and he advised that he has never made any such statements about the Rosenbergs, that he has never heard such information, and that whoever attributed such statements to him was a **G-- D--- liar.**

The results of the Weyl interview are set forth in a memorandum dated January 16, 1953, from Mr. Hennrich to Mr. Belmont.

OBSERVATIONS:

The Bureau has established very close liaison with Sing Sing Prison officials in order to insure that if the Rosenbergs have indicated any desire to talk, we will be immediately advised. To date, the indications have been that they will not talk. According to prison officials, on January 25, 1953, the Rosenbergs were visited by a brother of Julius and the latter was requested by them to contact Mrs. Tessie Greenglass, mother of Ethel Rosenberg and David Greenglass, and tell her that when she visits David at Lewisburg Penitentiary, she should persuade him to change his story about the Rosenbergs. From the foregoing, it is evident that the Rosenbergs are attempting to suborn Greenglass in an effort to gain their freedom or at least clemency. The Criminal Division of the Department has been advised of this information.

In view of the above, and the fact that Weyl has denied the story attributed to him by Washburn, no action is believed necessary concerning the suggestion of Washburn that Mr. Dulles, General Smith, and C. D. Jackson be consulted for policy in this matter.

ACTION:

It is felt that the Attorney General should be advised of the results of the Weyl interview for his information in view of his referral of this matter to the Director.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the attached letter to the Attorney General be approved and transmitted.

ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED

Attached hereto is an intra-office memorandum dated January 22, 1953, which was prepared by an unidentified Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) employee and was made available to the Liaison Agent by Allen Dulles. The memorandum describes the possibilities of convincing the subjects that the Soviet regime is persecuting and is ultimately bent on exterminating the Jews under its sovereignty. The writer of the memorandum injects the belief that the Rosenbergs could be persuaded to cooperate. Dulles advised the Liaison Agent that he was furnishing the memorandum solely for the Bureau's information. He made it clear that he fully understood the Bureau's responsibilities concerning the Rosenberg case and he had informed all CIA officials that no psychological warfare projects concerning the Rosenbergs should be promoted without first consulting with the FBI.

Dulles stated that various individuals handling political and psychological warfare matters in the CIA have given attention to the Rosenberg case. He expressed the opinion that the William Jackson Committee might take an interest in the psychological warfare aspects of the Rosenberg case. He advised that this was only his opinion and that he personally had discussed it with nobody on the Jackson Committee.

As you know, the William Jackson Committee was recently created by President Eisenhower for the purpose of surveying the Government's political and psychological warfare program.

Subject: The Rosenberg Case

PROPOSAL: A concerted effort to convince Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, convicted atom spies now under sentence of death, that the Soviet regime they serve is persecuting and ultimately bent on exterminating the Jews under its sovereignty. The action desired of the Rosenbergs is that they appeal to Jews in all countries to get out of the communist movement and seek to destroy it. In return, death sentence would be commuted. ADVANTAGES: The importance of success in this venture can scarcely be overstated from a psychological warfare standpoint. The Communist Parties throughout the world have built up the Rosenbergs as heroes and as martyrs to "American anti-semitism." Their recantation would entail backfiring of this entire Soviet propaganda effort. It would be virtually impossible for world communism to ignore or successfully discredit the Rosenbergs. The couple is ideally situated to serve as leading instruments of a psychological warfare campaign designed to split world communism on the Jewish issue, to create disaffected groups within the membership of the Parties, to utilize these groups for further infiltration and for intelligence work. (Whether the defection of the Rosenbergs would yield significant information concerning other Soviet espionage groups

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LIKELIHOOD OF SUCCESS: Apparently neither of the condemned has thus far wavered. An appraisal of the possibilities of their defection could be obtained from the FBI. The hypothesis suggested here is that the Soviet 'Doctors' accusations may have come as a great shock to them. Since they are Jews and have been placed in the role of victims to anti-semitism, it is believed that the new developments in Soviet policy vis-a-vis the Jews open new possibilities. It is also believed that people of the sort of the Rosenbergs can be swayed by duty where they can not be swayed by considerations of self-interest. They should not be asked to trade their principles for their lives -- for one thing, such an appeal to cowardice would almost certainly fail. The argument should be rather that they are about to die for a system that has betrayed and is destroying their own people, that they have the moral obligation of influencing other Jews against communism. In short, they would be offered two things psychologically: (1) an opportunity to recant while preserving their self-respect and honor; (2) a new purpose in life.

THE ETHICAL ISSUE: The purpose of the Government would be to gain a new instrument to make clear the sinister purposes of communism to its deluded followers and, incidentally, to save two lives. Certainly, neither purpose is immoral.

The means, however, necessarily involves the coercion of prisoners for no discussions can be termed free if the upshot determines whether people live or die. If this coercive element makes the whole plan repugnant to our traditions of due process, then naturally it should not be undertaken. Presumably, the Attorney General should evaluate this. If the answer is favorable, consideration must be given to the consequences of failure to sway the Rosenbergs — the virtual certainty that the Communists will use the attempt for their propaganda. Therefore, it is proposed that the emissaries chosen be unofficial, without credentials from the Government of any sort and with no authority to commit it to any action.

SUGGESTED APPROACH: The contact could be made by rabbis, representatives of Jewish organizations, former Communists. The last group would understand the mentality of the Rosenbergs far better than the others and would share with them common experiences and attitudes. However, the Rosenbergs would probably view them, not merely as enemies, but as traitors to the movement and this consideration seems to the writer to be decisive as far as the initial stage of conversations is concerned. Perhaps the ideal emissaries would be highly intelligent rabbis, representing reformed Judaism,

with a radical background or sympathetic understanding of radicalism, and with psychiatric knowledge. Such men can be found. Here again, the viewpoint of the FBI would be of the greatest value.

- (1) The emissaries do not need to be armed with a already formal promise of clemency, for the Rosenbergs understand that they can obtain commutation if they cooperate with the United States.
- (2) Complete confidentiality in the discussions is imperative. The Rosenbergs may have strong doubts of the rightness of their course which they would wish to explore with sympathetic, intelligent and well-informed anti-Communists. However, since these are doubts and not certainties, they will wish to be able to die as martyrs if the doubts disappear after investigation. They would therefore fear that any talks they have with the emissaries might be used afterwards to destroy the propaganda value of their death for communism should they decide in the end upon death. Preservation of confidence as to the discussions should be pledged, subject to a similar confidence on the part of the Rosenbergs. The emissaries should be people of such unimpeachable moral stature. that no suspicion of double dealing on their part could arise.
- (3) Date of execution should be stayed marking until the emissaries ascertain whether or not the Rosenbergs

are interested in entering into such protracted discussions. If they are not, the execution should proceed and the emissaries should preserve total silence.

- (4) If the Rosenbergs desire to explore these matters, an execution stay of one to two months seems indicated. First, time is needed for a thorough discussion of all those phases of Soviet conduct which the condemned would have to weigh in their minds before reaching what is for them their biggest decision. This is not merely a matter of persecution of Jews, but of the basic character of the Soviet dictatorship. Second, the Rosenbergs should have time to read the most authoritative and convincing literature available on such matters as the U.S.S.R. slave labor camps. (It should be recalled that as Communist they were explicitly forbidden heretofore from either reading such books or having them in their possession.) Third, fruitful discussions can hardly be held if they occur, as it were, under the shadow of imminent execution.
- (5) Should the operation succeed, generous commutation appears indicated -- both to encourage others to defect and to utilize the Rosenbergs as figures in an effective international psychological warfare campaign against communism primarily on the Jewish issue.

Transcript of Broadcast from EKEY on January 20, 1953. from 7:30 to 6:00 p.m.

This broadcast and the opinions expressed are not necessarily those of this radio station nor of its staff.

People all over the world have become gravely concerned over a situation. A serious situation. Voices have been raised in protest, and voices of protest are being heard, in Toronto, in Ottawa, in New York, Paris, London, Chicago and San Francisco. Why? Why the protests? Why so many voices raised? What is the truth about this situation about which so many people all over the world are so gravely concerned. The Toronto Committee to Secure Clemency for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg have purchased the time on this station in order to present to you this intimate and dramatic story - a story that cries for truth and justice - a documentary transcription filled with the poignancy of appeal of a genuine protest for truth and justice.

The San Francisco Bay Area Committee to Save the Rosenbergs presents "They Must Not Die", the documented story of the Rosenbergs written by Pis Messi and produced by the San Francisco Labor Theater.

July 1950, Munro Street, Knickerbocker Village. A housing project on New York's lower east side. An ordinary apartment -\$45 a month, including utilities, the usual second-hand furniture, new-looking console table from Macy's, a box full of children's toys. This is the Rosenberg home.

Julius is 34, a mild tempered man raised on New York's lower east side. He is a graduate in engineering from New York City College - worked as an engineer for the Government for a few years, and like millions of other Americans, he belongs to a union, The Pederation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians. Now he runs a small machine shop near his home; barely makes a living for his family.

Ethel, his wife, is a small woman with dark eyes and a sweet smile. She had gone to the same high school as Julius. Fent to work after graduation. At various times she studied voice, Hebrew and stenography. Then she stayed home with her two boys, Kike who is eight and Robbie, three. Yesterday there was the sound of laughter.

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(Laughter and baby talk) "...Look Robbie look. This is how a duck walks." (Laughter) "Come on Mommy, you walk like a duck. Look at the duck Mommy." "No more now Robbie. Come on boys put the chairs back and play quietly until Daddy comes home." "Cooh! Mommy sing us a song from the new book Daddy bought." "Ch! all right. What shall I sing." (Few lines of song by mother and children.) "It's Daddy, Daddy. Baddy. Hi! Daddy, Hi!"

"Julius -- you look -- Julius, is something wrong?"

*Boys look what I brought. Take it into the kitchen and open it up. *

"Oh! boy!"

"Now you let your brother open it up with you Mike."

"Julius, can I get you something?"

"No, no Ethel, sit down please. Have you seen the papers?"

"No. Every time you look like that . . . "

"This is about David."

"Oh! Why, what is it?"

"The FBI picked him up yesterday."

Why?"

"He confessed to stealing some secrets from Los Alamos."

"Oh! no."

"He confessed Ethel. He said he memorized some drawings and made a detailed report. He said he got \$500 for it."

"Impossible: Why he's never been able to memorize anything. He flunked every technical course he ever took. There must be some mistake,"

"That's what I thought."

"I can't believe he would get involved . . . "

"I can Ethel. He was scared, and when a man's scared -- I didn't tell you, but he came to the shop about a month ago. Told me he was in some kind of trouble and needed \$2,000 right away. Ethel, where was I going to raise \$2,000? I told him I only owed him a thousand and I couldn't even raise that. He got sore, lost his head and hit me. And then said something peculiar. He said,

"Well Julius, I've just got to have that money and if you don't get me that money, you're going to be sorry'."

"Why didn't you tell me about it?"

"Because you would have worried yourself sick. Every time your baby brother gets himself into hot water you or your mether bail him out. It's always poor Davy, little Davy. Ethel when are you going to learn that he is weak and dependent, that he has been using you for a crutch all his life? And Ruthy eggs him on. Ethel where are you going?"

"To help David."

"Ethel, sit down."

"I'm going."

"Not this time - don't get yourself mixed up in it."

(Knock on door)

"I'll go. Yes?"

"Julius Rosenberg?"

"Hey! wait a minute. Stop pushing in here. Who are you?"

"Federal Bureau of Investigation. They want you at Headquarters to answer some questions about your brother-in-law, David Greenglass."

"I have nothing to say."

"Julius, please, what are you . . . "

"Ethel keep out of this."

"Julius I beg you go with them - Davy's in trouble."

Tes, Davy was in trouble. Serious trouble. The Grand Jury in New Mexico had just indicted him for stealing information on atomic experiments when he was stationed at the Los Alamos project in 1945. That July afternoon in 1950, Julius learned that the FBI was no longer primarily interested in David Greenglass, but rather in him. Greenglass had implicated him in the espionage plot. Julius was arrested.

A month later Ethel Rosenberg was called to testify before a Grand Jury. Leaving the Court Room she was arrested and hustled off to the Yomen's Detention Home indicted with her husband for



conspiracy to commit espionage. But the press went far beyond the indictment. All during the fourteen months leading up to the trial the press fed the public spy stories, charging the Rosenbergs with crimes never even mentioned in the indictment. Remember the headlines in 1950: "Troops Mobilised to Avert Riot over Robson"; "University of California Passes Loyalty Oath"; "U.S. sends Troops to Korea"; "Eleven Top Communists Convicted". And then - "Commie Spys Indicted", "Red Spies to Tell All".

Yes, the arrest of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg was a fitting climax. Now all that was needed to keep the hysteria in pitch was a trial, and absolute conviction, a great big meon finger pointing out an act of treason by two individuals with progressive leadership. April 1951 - the Court Room was tense and hushed.

Government Prosecutor Irving Saypol stepped forward.

"Nay it please your honor, Mr. Foreman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the jury, the evidence will show that the loyalty, the allegiance of the Rosenbergs was not to our country, but that it was to Communism; Communism in this country and Communism throughout the world."

Defense Attorney Emmanuel Bloch rose and protested.

"I ask the Court to instruct the District Attorney to desist from making any remarks about Communism because Communism is not on trial here."

Again and again the prosecution hammered at the implication that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg were Communists. At one point even Judge Irving Kaufman interrupted to address the jury: "I want you to understand right at the outset that the fact that the defendants were mem ers of the Communist Party . . ."

The Defense Attorney rose to his feet. "Your Honor. There has been no evidence up to this point that the Rosenbergs were Communists, and I object to the introduction of this subject as irrelevant, misleading and inflammatory."

The trial proceeded. The prosecution had announced that 118 witnesses would be called among them top atomic scientists, but only 20 witnesses took the stand, and it was only two witnesses, David and Ruth Greenglass who even attempted to link the Rosenbergs to an atomic espionage plot. Listen now to some of David Greenglass' testimony under cross-examination by Defense Attorney Bloch:

"In 1945 I gave Julius Rosenberg a sketch of a lense mould. I marked the parts of the mould, A, B, and C and I defined what the markings meant."

* "Would you examine Government's exhibit two for identification and tell me if this is the sketch which you prepared?"

"Ich! - Ich! that's the sketch that I prepared."

"When did you prepare this?"

"During the trial yesterday."

When did you last see the original sketch which you turned over to Rosenberg?"

"In January 1945."

"And you have not seen it since?"

"No."

*Now Mr. Greenglass can you sketch every lense mould upon which you worked while at the shop in Los Alamos?"

"Not every one but I can draw or sketch a good deal of them."

"A good deal of them showing the developing process and the improvements that have been made. Can you do that?"

"Sketches are . . . but I mean it would be very difficult to tell which one was the improvement over the other."

"You did not even know the formulae, did you?"

"No."

"You have to be a scientist to know the formula, isn't that right?"

"Yes."

"But you are a machinist?"

"That is correct."

"Did you ever get a degree in science?"

"I did not get a degree."

"Did you ever get a Bachelor of Science Degree?"

"I did not."

"Did you ever get an Engineering Degree from a recognized institution?"

"I did not,"

"Did you ever take courses in calculus?"

No.

"Differential calculus?"

"I did not."

"Or thermodynamics?"

"I did not."

"Or muclear physics?"

"I did not."

"Or atomic physics?"

"I did not."

"Or quantum mechanics?"

"I did not."

"Or advanced calculus?"

"I did not."

"No more questions."

This is the record. This is the testimony of a man who claimed he drew from memory an elaborate sketch of the atom bomb together with 12 pages of descriptive material. This is the star witness of a prosecution.

But where were the scientists to back him up? The prosecution had promised that Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer and Harold P. Urey, heads of the Atom Bonb Project would testify. Why weren't they called? Was the prosecution afraid of their testimonies. Listen to the words of the uncalled witness, Dr. Harold P. Urey:

mpetailed data on the atomic bomb would require eighty to ninety volumes of close print which only a scientist or engineer would be able to read. Any spies capable of picking up this information will get information more rapidly by staying at home and working in their own laboratories."

Listen to what the science editor of Time Magazine said:
"Some of Greenglass' testimony made little scientific sense,"
and Life Magazine, "Greenglass' implosion bomb appears illogical,
if not downright unworkable." So much for the scientist Greenglass.

But now let's hear from top atomic scientists who tell us how secret the atom bomb really is. Again Dr. Urey: "There is no secret of the atom bomb that could be kept."

In 1949 when Russia exploded its first atomic bomb, Dr. Wendell Latimer, University of California chemistry professor and wartime plutonium researcher said: "Now that we are rid of the illusion that we are the only ones who can make a bomb, we can devote our energy to progress instead of giving all our time to protecting false secrets."

In 1950, the Atomic Energy Commission bared secret documentary proof that Russia had known the scientific secret of atom bomb manufacture since 1940 - five years before Greenglass claimed to have made his sketches. Now the date is 1951, the speaker, br. J. Robert Oppenheimer, another uncalled witness.

"There are no unpublic secrets concerning atomic weapons, and no secret laws of nature available to only a few."

But the prosecution relentlessly built its case. Here is the damming evidence. A console table which had belonged to the Rosenbergs but which the Government had impounded. Ruth Greenglass is now on the stand. The Prosecuting Attorney is questioning.

*Now Mrs. Greenglass, on any of your visits to the Rosenberg spartment, did you notice any particular piece of furniture?"

WYes, a mahogany console table."

"Did you have any conversation with the Resembergs concerning that table?"

Figs, I admired the table and I asked Ethel where she bought it. She said she had gotten it as a gift, and Julius said it was from a friend, and it was a special kind of table, and he turned the table on its side to show us why it was so special."

What did he show you when he turned the table on its side?"

"There was a portion of the table that was hollowed out for a lamp so that the table could not be used for photographic purposes."

"And did Julius Rosenberg tell you what he photographed?"

"Yes. He said he took pictures on microfilm of typewritten notes."

This is the testimony of the second star witness of the prosecution. But where was the console table to support the testimony? The impounded table was never produced in the court room. Why Not? Was the prosecution afraid of the testimony of a table? This is the record.

The case against the Rosenbergs depended almost entirely on the testimony of Ruth and David Greenglass, and the weaker the case, the more fantastic the charges.

"My brother-in-law spent sixty to seventy-five dollars a night on entertainment."

"Julius Rosenberg subsidised the education of likely espionage agents."

May brother-in-law was given unlimited funds by the Russians to recruit spies in defense plants and government agencies."

"He received a citation from the Russians for his work."

But no sums of money were found in the Rosenberg home or deposited in banks. No members of the alleged spy ring were produced in court. No citation. No students. No prospective spies. No one to back up David and Ruth Greenglass' testimony.

As for the written evidence - of 32 documents produced in the Court not one connected the Rosenbergs with any espionage plot. No, it wasn't the evidence that made the case against the Rosenbergs, it was the poison of our tiles. The poison of paid confessions, and conformities, of atom bombs and witch hunts.

After only 15 days of trial . . . the verdict was brought in "guilty as charged". And then Judge Kaufman passed a sentence unprecedented in the annals of American justice. In justification of this sentence the Judge made a fantastic charge:

"Your crime is worse than murder. I believe your conduct in putting the A-Bomb into the hands of the Russians years before our best scientists predicted Russia would perfect the bomb has already caused the Communist aggression in Korea with a resultant casualty exceeding 50,000 Americans. And who knows but what millions more of innocent people may pay the price of your disgrace. Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, for the crime for which you have been convicted you are hereby sentenced to the punishment of death."



Death to the Rosenbergs. Beath in peaceti e. Not for treason, not for espionage, but for an unproved charge of conspiracy to commit espionage.

The world stood shocked. Death in peacetime for a crime which could not exist.

As Ethel Rosenberg was led from the courtroom she faced the press. Her voice was low but steady. "We said, and we say again, that we are victims of the grossest type of political frame-up ever known in America."

And so for eighteen months she waited in Sing Sing's death row while her case was being appealed. Eighteen horror-ridden months with screams she dared not utter, or the hope she dared not hold too firmly.

A few weeks after she was brought to Sing Sing Ethel wrote her attorney. "When you see the warden won't you plead with him to allow me to have Michael's plant outside my cell where I can just see it, not touch it. Couldn't I see it just once so that I can truthfully tell Michael that it looks fine. Do you really think it would occur to Mike that my silence about it is due to the fact that I didn't truly receive it. My God! What harm can there possibly be? What crime committed if I am allowed some token of love from my darling children whom I have not seen for close to a year now. Beg them to let me have it, won't you?"

And, Mike and Robbie -- It was eighteen months before the children saw their parents again. They drove down to Sing Sing with the Rosenberg's attorney, Emmanuel Bloch and his wife. Mrs. Bloch tells of the trip.

"After the shock of the arrest we wondered how the children would take a visit with their parents. Because of the long separation we had decided that it would be best for the children to visit with each parent separately. As we drew up to the prison gates there was only the sound of the gravel beneath the wheels, and inside the car only silence. I watched Mike's grown-up nine-year-old face tighten. The twitch he had developed in the past year was more noticeable. I felt the blood pounding in my chest as my husband and the boys left the car and disappeared inside the prison. Only the lawyer was allowed to see the prisoners, and I waited those two endless hours in the car wondering, praying that the visit would come out all right.

After the children saw their father the attorney left them in the receiving room. Mike wore a baseball cap. The guard sitting on the edge of a table swinging his legs, smiled at him.

"Get out of here. I am sorry this had to happen, Mr. Bloch."

"Come on Mike don't pay any attention to that man. He doesn't know any better."

"Take it easy Mike. You're not going to let this spoil your wisit with your mother are you?"

"I'm all right."

"Now I'll leave you alone. Your Mother's coming."

What should I talk about, Manny."

WCh: There's lots to talk about Mike, school, Grandes Cophie, piano leusons."

"Michael -- Robbie. Why I would never have brown you from the pictures. How grown up you are. Robbie - Hanny, why we'es he hide from me? Doesn't he know me any ore." "He was only three Ethel. Give him a little tile, he'll warm up."

"Of course. Mike tell me how you are getting along with grandmother Rosenberg."

They think something's happened. I just come home after school and practice piano. Robbie, he doesn't do anything but look out the window at the cars. Hardly anybody comes to see us except Manny and his wife and sometimes that man from Daddy's union and his wife and kids. He plays the piano for me. Oh! Mom, did you like the plant I sent you?"

"The one with the blue flowers. Oh! I think it's beautiful.
Tell me what do you play on the piano?"

"Next year I'm going to play Grieg. Gee! I wish you could play for us like you used to."

wI don't have a plane here but I still sing. Do you remember any of the songs we used to sing?"

(Music and song)

"Look Ethel, Robbie remembers too. He is coming to you."

"Monmy, Mommy."

Eighteen months of silence from the court. Silence from the radio. Silence everywhere but in the heart. Eighteen months and committees sprang up all over the country. Pamphlets were written. Meetings held. Fifty-thousand people signed an amicus brief, urging that a new trial be held. Letters poured in from all over the world. England, China, the Netherlands, Japan, France. France the France that remembered another case of another time. The Dreyfus Affair.

Like Julius Rosenberg, Drayfus was a young Jew of thirty-five. An officer in the French army falsely accused of turning over military secrets to another country and for this he was condemned to life imprisonment. But then, as now, people of courage demanded that the case be re-opened and the facts brought to life. Emile Zola was one of these and for his burning indictment of that frame-up Zola himself was brought to trial. In 1890 Zola faced the jury.

"The Dreyfus case. Ah! Gentlemen, that has now become a very small affair. There is no lon er a Dreyfus case. The question now is whether France is still the France of the hights of Man, the

France that gave freedom to the world, and that is just. Are we still the most noble, the most fraternal, the most generous nation? Shall we preserve our reputation in Europe for equity and humanity? Are not all the victories that we have won called in question? Open your eyes and understand that to be in such confusion the French soul must have been stirred with death in the face of a terrible danger. A nation cannot be bought by death, without imperiling its moral existence. This is an exceptionally serious problem. The safety of the nation is at stake."

Tes, the safety of a great nation is at stake. Are we still the America of democracy, of justice, of freedom? Are not our recent victories called in question by this case? If the Rosenbergs die shall we preserve our reputation in the world for equity and humanity? Shall a Dreyfus have rotted in prison if we have learned nothing from history? Where is justice? In the rehearsed accusations of a terrified Greenglass, or in the facts? Facts that never came to light in Judge Kaufman's court. Shall the Rosenbergs die while we live in doubt? Yet if the only alternative to death is the purchase of life at the cost of personal dignity and abandonment of the struggle for democracy and ethical standards, there is no future for us or any legacy that we can leave our children, for those who survive and follow us. For the sake of American Democracy, justice and government. For the sake of truth and prayer and worry and the innocent prattle of little children, we shall remain here in dignity and wride in the deep and shiding knowledge of our innocence before God and man."

Are those the words of a traitoress? Upon each of you here in this room rests the responsibility of life for two people who have already accepted the responsibility of your lives. Pick up a sheet of paper, pen and ink. Write to President Truman now, this very hour. The Rosenbergs have but days to live. Wire him tonight. Demand clemency. The Rosenbergs must live.

As you are sware, the elemency appeal of Julius and Ithel Rosenberg was denied by the President on February 11, 1953. The date of their execution had been set for the week of March 9, 1953. However, on February 17, 1953, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals granted a stay of execution until March 31, 1953, in order to afford the Rosenbergs time to file en application to the United States Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari.

Internation has been confidentially received of Bing Sing Irison that the Rosenbergs feel the report made by you to the Presidenthan en your return from your recent trip abroad has caused the President to deny them clemency, and they are blaning you for this denial.

SYNOPSIS:

Source of unknown reliability advised Rosenberg, prior to arrest, gave \$7,000 and Leica camera to wife, Ethel who turned it over to unknown Communist Party member. David Engelson, known Communist and acquaintance of Rosenberg, being investigated as possible recipient of money and camera. Engelson recently pleaded guilty to an illegal dealing in gold in black market. Received two years suspended sentence and probation. Is presently cooperating with Secret Service against co-conspirators and will testify before Federal Grand Jury, February 16, 1953. NY recommends Engelson and wife, also Communist, be interviewed immediately after Grand Jury appearance. Interviews recommended.

PURPOSE:

To recommend transmittal of attached teletype to NY authorizing interviews of David and Lary Engelson.

BACKGROUND:

You are aware that information was furnished to the Bureau by Jerome Tartakow, of unknown reliability, concerning conversations he had with Julius Rosenberg while both were cellmates in Federal Detention Headquarters, New York City. will recall that, according to Tartakow, Rosenberg told him that the evening he returned to his home in Knickerbocker Village after being questioned by the FBI (6-16-50) he took \$7,000 and a Leica camera, which he had in his apartment, and gave same to Ethel, his wife. The next morning, Ethel placed the money and camera in a brown paper shopping bag and took them to the apartment of a CP member who also lived in Knickerbocker Village. Rosenberg described this individual as a father with two children and a staunch friend of his.

You will recall that Julius Rosenberg was arrested by the Bureau on July 17, 1950. Extensive investigation of this allegation by Tartakow was conducted by the New York Office with negative results.

DETAILS:

During an interview of David Greenglass at Lewisburg Penitentiary on January 30, 1953, he recalled that David English, it leader in the Young Comminist League of the Lower Mist Side, was a friend of the Rosenbergs. The New York Office in checking on Engelson and his wife, Hary Engelson, reported by air-tel of February 6, 1953, that Mr. and Mrs. Engelson are subjects of closed Security Matter - C cases in the New York Office, that they resided in Knickerbocker Village and had two children. On the basis of this information, New York was instituting investigation on ingelson as the possible recipient of the money and camera from Ethel Rosenberg.

The New York Office has also developed the following:

Engelson was arrested on September 25, 1952, by the United States Secret Service for fraudulently obtaining a gold buying certificate and selling gold in the black market. In December, 1952, he pleaded guilty and received two years suspended sentence and probation, plus a \$1,000 fine. According to probation records, Engelson became active in the black market in 1950. He operated the Snap Band Company and the logse Neck Chair Company, both of New York City, and was authorized to purchase 150 cunces of gold per day for business uses. He would purchase approximately \$2,000 worth of gold each day and dispose of the gold the same day to one of his contacts, which resulted in the gold ending up in the Back market. He would realize a profit of up to \$7.00 an ounce. At the present time, Engelson is cooperating with the Secret Service against his co-conspirators and he will appear before a Federal Grand Jury on February 16, 1953, to testify against them.

According to U.S. Probation Officer, if Engelson violates his probation, he would be subject to a sentence of up to ten years and a \$10,000 fine on each of three counts. The U.S. Secret Service and the Probation Office are aware of the Bureau's interest in Engelson and have offered to cooperate with the New York Office in every possible way.

The New York Office recommends that after Engeledn's testimony before the Federal Grand Jury on February 16, 1955, arrangements be made for the U.S. Probation Officer to call ingelson to his office and upon arrival direct him to another office, which will be made available to Bureau agents, and that Engelson be thoroughly interviewed concerning his association

with the Rosenbergs and his Communist Party activities.

NYO also recommends that his wife, hary Engelson, be interviewed simultaneously. NYO also advised that AUSA

James Kilsheimer, who is handling the Rosenberg case, is willing to subpoena Engelson and his wife before a Federal Grand Jury when and if the New York Office desires.

OBSERVATIONS:

The Rosenberg investigation reflects that undoubtedly Julius Rosenberg had access to great sums of money in connection with his espionage activities as evidenced by the \$5,000 he gave to David Greenglass to assist him in his escape. Therefore, it is highly probable that Rosenberg had a large sum of money and a Leica camera in his apartment, which he disposed of in anticipation of being arrested after Greenglass was picked up.

Because of Engelson's known association with the Rosenbergs, and the possibility he was the recipient of the money and camera; it is believed that he and his wife should be interviewed concerning this matter. It is felt that the denial of clemency for the Rosenbergs by President Eisenhower at this time, coupled with a possible belief by Engelson that his probation might be revoked if he does not cooperate, gives us a great psychological advantage in approaching him after is his appearance before a Federal Grand Jury on February 16, 1953. Also, if he was the recipient of this money, it might appear to him that by being approached at this time, the Rosenbergs might have talked in an effort to safe themselves and implicate him.

RECOME LADATION:

In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that the suggestions of the New York Office be approved and that the attached teletype be transmitted.
