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

On August 31, 1950 DAVID GREENGIASS was interviewed by SA LEO H. FRUTKIN. At that time DAVID GREENGIASS recalled that about September or October 1946, while he was associated with the G & R Engineering Company, New York City, JULIUS ROSENBERG told him that a mutual friend of JOEL BARR and JULIUS ROSENBERG had at that time given to JULIUS ROSENBERG an Atlas lathe and Buffalo drill press, which that individual had owned.
JULIUS ROSENBERG did not identify this individual to DAVID GREENGIASS, but told DAVID that the unknown individual had formerly used the lathe and drill press at a little laboratory which the unknown individual had operated.
DAVID GREENGIASS was of the opinion that this laboratory had not been in the unknown individual's home, but had probably been in a store. JULIUS ECSENBERG told DAVID that this man gave the lathe and drill press to him because the man had to go up-state to work. This lathe and drill press were installed at the Machine Products Company, which succeeded the G & R Engineering Company.

DAVID GREENCLASS also advised that he does not recall ever seeing this individual himself. He further stated that the following persons might be able to furnish information as to the identity of the unknown individual or of the location of the laboratory from which these machines had come:

(1) BENUARD GREENGLASS, brother of DAVID GREENGLASS; (2) ISADORE GOLDSTEIN, residing at Knickerbocker Village, former partner of G & R Engineering Company.

DAVID GREE-GIAGS also advised that there was a possibility that these machines had been transported from the unknown individual's laboratory

to the G & R Engineering Company by Sherdel Trucking Company, which is located on Delancey Street between Sheriff Street and Columbia Street, New York City.

DAVID GREENGIASS also recalled that while the G & R Engineering Company was still in existence, JOEL BARR came in a few times to use the lathe to make some bushings for a fishing rod or something of that nature. DAVID GREENGIASS also recalled that JOEL BARR used to putter at a bench in the rear of the G & R shop at what seemed to be a radio chassis. DAVID GREENGIASS pointed out that this bench also came from the aforementioned unknown individual who gave JULIUS ROSENBERG the lathe and drill press. DAVID GREENGIASS stated that JOEL BARR was not employed by G & R Engineering Company. DAVID GREENGIASS was unable to describe in greater detail just what JOEL BARR was working on in connection with the radio chassis.

Investigation set out below regarding SAUL COVEN of the following firm, whose business card was found in the subject's apartment incident to his arrest, covers the period July 27, 31, and August 2,16, 23, 1950:

LONDON UPHOLSTERY COMPANY
315 West 125th St.

JOHN PHIPPS, elevator operator, 315 West 125th Street, New York, New York, advised that the London Upholstery Company went out of business approximately two years ago. He advised that JOSEPH and MORRIS SOLOWAY, former partners, deserted the business. He stated that a former employee of the company, a STEVE HERTELENDY, 500 West 176th Street, New York, New York, is now employed by the Durabilt Company, 1166 Colgate avenue, Bronx. Mr. PHIPPS stated that the employees of the London Upholstery Company, when the firm went into bankruptcy, banked together for several months under the name London Decorators, which firm was later bought by the Durabilt Company.

STEVE HERTELENDY, salesman, Durabilt Company, Bronx, New York, reported that JOSEPH SOLOWAY, former partner of the London Upholstery Company, could be located c/o Dairyland Restaurant, 36h Whalley Avenue, New Haven, Connecticut (Telephone New Haven 8-9356). He stated that MORRIS SOLOWAY, the other partner, has been reported living outside of the United States since the bankruptcy of the London Upholstery Company.

It was ascertained that this number was listed to BEATRICE COHEN, 1475 Wythe Place, Bronx, and subsequent inquiry at this address revealed that Mrs. BEATRICE COHEN and her husband were currently residing at 111 East Front Street, Long Beach, Long Island, New York. BEATRICE COHEN was contacted at her Long Beach address by SA J. GARTH GRAY and arrangements were made for the interview of her husband SAUL COHEN.

COMMIN. When interviewed in this office by the writer, reported that in business he uses the name SAUL COVEN. He stated that he is at present a free lance salesman and maintains no business office in New York City. He reported that he was formerly the outside salesman for the London Upholstery Company and manager of the London Decorators, 315 West 125th Street, New York City, after the bankruptcy of the London Upholstery Company. Mr. COMEN stated that he later formed the Mercury Upholstery Company, 1507 Lexington Avenue, New York, New York, which firm has been out of business for over a year.

I'r. COHEN stated that the subject and his engineering firm are unknown to him. The photograph of the subject and his associates were exhibited to Mr. COHEN and also to Mr. HERTELENDY, who failed to identify the subject or his associates as former business or social contacts.

It is recommended that a lead be set out to interview JOSEPH SOLOWAY, care of Dairyland Restaurant, 364 Whalley Avenue, New Haven, Connecticut.

HARRY PLETMAN, 210 West 101st. St, Tel/AC 2-8372, owner, Aristocrat Whipper Corporation, formerly at 424 Brooms Street, now at 370 East Houston Street, Tel. GR 3-8330, advised that he first met ROSENBERG in about November, 1948, when the latter came in to his place of business at 424 Brooms Street to solicit business. He said that he recalls that ROSENBERG said something about having heard from some tool salesman, name not recalled, that PLETMAN needed some machine shop work done.

Mr. BLETMAN continued essentially as follows: Shortly after that initial contact, he gave ROSENBERG an order for 1000 pieces needed in his manufacture of whip cream machines. From that time until 2/24/50 he occasionally did business with ROSENBERG and PITT MACHINE PRODUCTS CORPORATION, being visited by ROSENBERG from time to time and himself visiting Pitt on six to ten occasions, mostly to hurry up the work being done or to help them work out some detail in the business. On 2/24/50, his own shop at 424 Broome Street burned down. he took a small store near 370 Houston Street and prevailed upon ROSEN-BERG to let him use a corner of his shop and put there some of the machinery he was able to silvage from the fire. He paid ROSENBERG rent for the space and, because of the fire and his own limited capacity resulting therefrom, caused ROSENBERG to do more and more of his work in manufacturing whipper parts. From that time on he saw ROSENBERG abnost daily until his arrest. He knew him almost exclusively from a business standpoint, but dove him home occasionally and had dinner with him from time to time. In his business contacts with ROSENBERG he often had difficulty. Wost of that difficulty was delay in completing an order. On several occasions the work was spoiled and had to be done over elsewhere. He had business with ROSENBERG pending at the time of the latter's arrest. When ROSENBERG SHOWED UP at the shop after the arrest of DAVID GREWGLASS -- later explaining that the day following that arrest heled been interrogated by the FBI or the U S Attorney -- he said nothing about GREENGLASS for several days or a week. He then brought that up on his ownscoord at lunch one day, indicating disbelief in GRFENGLASS' guilt, but then broke off the discussion when asked questions about the matter. He never discussed the matter after that

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Mr. PLETMAN continued essentially as follows: ROSENBERG was not a good businessman and did not run his whop well. He was at times too lenient with his employees and then unduly strict. They did not respect him very much. He was changeable also in his contracts, making definite committments to do certain work and then the next day putting the work off indefinitely. When he, Mr. PLETMAN, suggested that he was not right and that he might well consult a psychiatrist, ROSENEERG merely said that he was not feeling well or that he had hay fever.

The day after ROSINPIEC's arrest (FTHEL ROSINBERC came to the shop to say that certain jobs onlywere to be completed and that the rest could not be. She said that he would try to get rid of the business as best she could. Mr. PLETMAN put her in touch with BICFARD HOSENBERG, no relation, of the New Jersey Carbonated Company, 250 Madison Street, Passaic, New Jersey, residing at 187 Grove Street, Passaic, who was supposed to see her about buying the plant on the very day that she was arrested. The New Jersey Carbonated Company is a customer of Mr. PLETMAN, and he explained that he hoped to facilitate such a deal in order to make it easier for him to carry on his cwn business. The Pitt business was sold 8/31/50 to RICHARD HOSEMBERG, individually and not for the Carbonated Company, with arrangements providing for PLETMAN to use the plant. FTHEL HOSEMBERG was not co-operative with him, he said, and gave him no information about her husband or the espionage case.

Mr. PLETMAN said that his total business with Pitt amounted to about £1500.00 to £2,000.00. None of the Pitt books are available on the premises at 370 East Houston Street. Pitt's accountent was named ISAACS. Pitt did business with a firm known as Continental, but the rest of the name and its address are not known to him. They also did business with a firm known as "M.R.M." of 191 Berry Street, Brooklyn, the only Pitt customer who has called him and arranged for him to2do work previously done by Pitt, but only after making sure that the business now is in no way connected with Pitt and ROSINFERG.

Mr. PLETMAN said that he heard from RICHAPD HOSENBERG that a man named FUCHS, probably, tolk him that he, PLETMAN, was related to ROSENBERG, which is not true, he said.

Mr. Pletnan said that he never discussed politics with FOSFNBFAG or GREENCLASS; that FOSENEFAG did not allow such discussions in the plant; that he hever detected anything to suggest espionage or other illegal activity; that he was surprised at the errests of ROSENEFAG and GREENCLASS; and that he recognizes none of the photographs shown him except those of the FOSENEERGS and the GREENCLASS and that of SOBFLL, which he knew only from the newspapers.

A review of telephone toll calls made from the subject's residence, phone BEekman 3-1308. reflects that on February 27, 1949, a call was placed to PRimrose 5-6912J. SE WILLIAM E. STAPLETON contacted the New York Telephone Company and determined that this number is listed to the W. P. POWELL residence, 93-44 246th Street, Bellrose, Long Island. The records of the New York Blephone Company further reflect that this number was changed on May 28, 1950, to PRimrose 5-2139. The phone was installed prior to 1947, and credit records of the Telephone Company reflect that as of 1941 POWELL was unemployed and maintained a checking account in the National City Bank.

The reputation of W. P. POWELL, 93-44 246th Street, Bellrose, Long Island, should be determined, and he should be thereafter interviewed to ascertain the nature and extent of his association with ROSENBERG.

DAVID GREENGLASS advised that he did not know the identity of the EVELYNE MARCH whose name appeared scratched on the face of the typewriter found in ROSENBERG'S apartment on July 17, 1950. He stated that he had never personally noticed this name on the typewriter.

DAVID GREENGLASS also advised that he did not give HARRY GOLD any telephone number at which GOLD could contact him in New York City. GREENGLASS stated he never arranged with GOLD (during the Albuquerque visit) for any future contact anywhere.



Refmemo above quotes RUTH GRIFNGLASS as naming IDA ALTFRUAN as an active member of the Club Lincoln of the YCL who knew ESTHER ROSEN-BERG and who, along with one PEARL GOLD, remarked that ESTHER ROSENBERG was not in YCL because she was too old, but implied that they knew her as a CP member.

The second listed reference—5/:-14/:-11056k=-has not been examined. All others are thought to refer to the IDA ALTERUAN in question.

Fussell S. Garner of by Catholic Youth Organization, Archdicesse of New York, 15 E. 51 St. NYC, which he in turn obtained from 6 (both sources to be protected), who 6 YCL in 1943, listed IDA ALTAMAN as membership director of the Mannattan AYD. It is noted that the same list includes the name MINNIE (or MERVINE) ALTERMAN, 504 Grand Street, as a member of the Victory Club, YCL.

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100-6906-1A196 represents information provided SA Russell S. Garner, 3/4/42, by Mrs. MARGARET DISCO, NYC PD, consisting of lists of persons, including "YCL Members & Leaders (East Side Section," which contains the following: "IDA ALTERMAN (Party Name IDA ALTMAN), 248 Division Street, Apartment 3, NYC. Sister of SYLVIA ALTERMAN. Went to Albany in 1941 for NY St. Civil Service job. Was formerly branch organizer. White, female, 22-23, 5'5", 130; very sallow, unattractive complexion, with rash on face frequently. Talks with slight lisp."

and made available to FBI 6/23/44, of a membership Audit Work Sheet" of the Club "Lincoln E.S.", of county figures as of 6/15/43 and the result of audit on/6/16/43, listing as club members present: "IDA SYLVIA ALTERMAN" and "CERT PROTEIN". It also lists as "Club members responsible for membership and dues record, SYRVIA (crossed out on original) IDA ALTERMAN, CERT PROTEIN."

It is noted that SYLVIA ALTERMAN is subject of the case file 100-39522*.

Mrs. ISAAC TENDLER, landlady, 287 Henry Street, advised that the ALTIRMAN family still resides at that address, but that IDA ALTERMAN is married and lives with her husband, named ROTH somewhere in the immediate neighborhood, but at/an address unknown to her. Her parents are AFRAHAM and ANNIE ALTERMAN, who previously lived at 234 Division Street and were reportedly forced to move out, she said. She described the entire family as Communists and said that they are friends of HELEN LEVY GOLD, her parents, named LEVY, who live in the building, and of the GOLD family into which HELEN LEVY married. She said that she does not know where the GOLD family lives. She said that IDA and her husband lived with her parents for a while. She described the husband as formerly an artist, but said that she does not know his present occupation. She said that it is her impression that IDA ROTH has recently been ill

GOVERN JONES, Superintendent, Knickerbocker Station, U.S.P.O., 130 East Broadway, EXEXXEXEMENT advised that he had checked with the carrier coming 156 Henry Street, to learn that IDA ROTH was currently residing in the basement at that address.

HAROLD ROTH, 156 Henry Street, advised the writer and SA CHARLES VANCE that his wife was ill in bed; that she had been ill for several months; that she was suffering from "a nervous disorder"; and that she could not be interviewed at present or in the forsecable future. He said that it would be disturbing to her to be interviewed by agents of the FBI. Incidental to a question as to whether he knew PEAFL COLD—who had not at that point been identified—he said that he did not know her and that he had not been in school with his wife or her friends, having lived in the Bronx. DESCRIPTION of HAROLD ROTH from personal observation:

Re report of SA(A) HAROID F. GOOD dated August 30, 1950.

On August 30, 1950, MARTIN ECKHOUSE, 1707 Nelson Avenue, Bronx, New York, an employee of the Pitt Machine Products, Inc., during 1947 and 1948, was interviewed by the writer.

MARTIN ECKHOUSE stated that he was employed by Pitt Machine Products, Inc., for about 18 months during 1947 and 1948 under the GI Bill. ECKHOUSE stated that during the time he was employed by that company, it was operated by JULIUS ROSENBERG, DAVID GREENGLASS and BERNIE GREENGLASS. He stated that DAVID GREENGLASS was the foreman of the Pitt Machine Products, Inc., and that his brother, BERNIE, was his assistant.

ECKHOUSE stated that ROSENBERG was primarily engaged in soliciting business for the company and was in the shop only about half of the time. ECKHOUSE stated that to his knowledge, he does not recall that ROSENBERG was away from the shop for any length of time and that DAVID GREENGLASS to his knowledge was in the shop each day.

ECKHOUSE stated, however, that during the summer of 1947 or 1948, DAVID GREENGLASS'S wife, RUTH, spent the summer months in Monticello, New York and that DAVID GREENGLASS would visit her there each weekend.

ECKHOUSE stated that the Pitt Machine Products, Inc., prior to moving to its present address on Houston Street, was located on Second Avenue, New York City.



JOHN P. DESMOND, Secretary-Treasurer, Thomas J. Long, Inc., 123 Schermerhorn Street, Brooklyn, New York, advised that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG of Pitt Machine Products, Inc. through the firm Coil Winders. WOSENBERG did work for Coil Winders, the latter firm furnishing the laminated bakelite purchased from Thomas J. Long, Inc. Subsequently, ROSENBERG purchased the bakelite direct from LONG.

Business with Pitt Machine Products for 1950 totaled \$3.40 and for 1949 totaled \$210.00.

VILTON EPSTEIN of Coil Winders had stated to DESMOND that he had known ROSENBERG for a number of years. EPSTEIN handled the sales for Coil Winders and is presently in Europe. Then YELSEY (phonetic) of Coil Tinders was formerly the boss of JULIUS ROSENBERG with the Army Signal Corps.

WILLIAM DOXEY, Office Manager, T. E. Conklin Brass and Copper Company, Inc., 54 Lafayette Street, New York City, advised that the account of Pitt Machine Products was opened in 1950 and the total sales to that company was \$40.00. Nickel-silver, brass and copper bars were sold to that company.

HOWARD HUMMEL, Sales Representative, T. E. Conklin Brass and Copper Company, Inc., stated that he contacted Pitt Machine Products on only a couple of occasions, since this account placed orders by telephone. The man he spoke to at Pitt was CHARLES BOZSICK, who appeared to be a foreman and not a principal. HUMMEL stated that he never met ROSENBERG, GREENGLASS, or any other individual at Pitt Machine Products.
