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JULIUS ROSENBERG: ESPIONAGE - R

On 7/10/50, at approximately 5:30 P. M., I talked to Mr. Leo L. Laughlin at the Bureau and called his attention to our teletipe of 6/29/50 in the above entitled case, which advised the Bureau that O. JOHN ROGGE, attorne; for DAVID GREENGLASS, had indicated he was going to Washington to present to the Eureau and the Department his offer of cooperation on behalf of DAVID GREEKGLASS. In our teletype we requested that the New York Office be advised of the results of the conferences, in view of the importance that we place on the matter of interviewing RUTE and DAVID GREENGLASS. I pointed out to Mr. Laughlin that we had has no official answer to that telet pe although I had understood in an oral conversation with Inspector A. H. Belmont that nothing was to come of ROGGE's offer of cooperation.

I pointed out to Mr. Laughlin that I thought it was in the interests of the Bureau that this matter be clarified and the Bureau should be full: advised of the Department's reaction and thinking in the matter for, as the situation now stands, RCGGE is in position where he has information or could have information which he has received from DAVID and RUTH GREEN-GLASS relative to Russian espionage in wartime, involving a subject or subjects more important than DAVID GREENGLASS, which information the FBI and the Department does not have and which information apparently the government declines to accept. If the record is clear that the price of the inforwation is too hich, we are on safe grounds, perhaps. However, if this matter has not been given ful, and appropriate consideration ROCGE may be in position to embarrass the Department and the FBI, and might even be in position to, for instance, write an article for a injurine which would be worth, perhaps, a substantial fee to him. I pointed out to Ur. Laughlin that the question of a seal, I die not think uscued to concern us too much for the reason that, first our case against DAVID GREETGESS is male, essentially, before this offer of cooperation is proffered; second, ROGGE realizes, as a former Department official, that the Department cannot bind a court in a deal, but can only alvise the court of a defendant's cooperation, against which there is no legal stricture. Further ROGGE holds himself out to be an imminent proponent of Civil Rights and he certainly could make no claim of violation of Civil Rights for any offer of cooperation on behalf of his client who had received the full benefit of ROGGE's counsel.

Fir. Laughlin indicated that the Bureau would advise us in this matter.

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

DETAILS:

The title of this report is being marked changed to reflect the additional aliases of AL SARANT and RAYMOND COOPER, his Communist Party name, as reported by Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, on August 5, 1944.

The following information which is being set out is believed to pertain to the subject of this investigation:

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on March 15, 1944 that AL SAKANT, 46 Monroe (?) Street, New York City, transferred from Branch 16B, the Industrial Division of the Communist Party (CP), on or about February 14, 1944. He was transferred to the Village Club of the 1st Assembly District section of Manhattan. His transfer number was 12348.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised on or about June 17, 1945 that AL SAMANT was transferred to the Sacco-Vanzetti Club, Communist Political Association (CPA), 1st and 2nd Assembly Districts, manhattan, on February 29, 1944. He was transferred from Branch 16B of the Industrial Division of the CP. His transfer number was 123484.

It is to be particularly noted that the AL SARAWT who transferred from the Industrial Division of the CP on or about February 14, 1944 was transferred under number 12348 to the Village Club, and that the AL SARANT who was transferred to the Sacco-Vanzetti Club of the CPA on February 29, 1944 from the Industrial Division of the CP was transferred under number 12348A. While these transfers occurred both within the month of February, 1944 from the same division, it would appear that AL SARAWT was a member of both clubs on separate occasions.

Confidential Informant T-2 also advised on or about June 17, 1945 that AL SAPANT transferred to the Village Club, 10th Assembly District, on May 4, 1944. His transfer number was 19872.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on June 17, 19th that AL SARANT, 65 worton Street, New York City, is a mombor of the Sacco-Vanzetti Club, CPA, which is located at 237 Bleecker Street, New York City.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised on August 8, 1944 that AL SARANT, also known as RAYMOND COOPER (Party name), name appeared on a membership list of the Greenwich Village Club of the CPA, 1st and 2nd Assembly Districts, Manhattan, New York.

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Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised on March 23, 1945 that AL SARANT, also known as RAYMOND COOPER, 65 Morton Street, New York City, is a member of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians - CIO.

FEDERATION OF ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, CHEMISTS AND TECHNICIANS

On Page 151 of the book, "The Story of the CIO", by BENJAMIN STOLBERG, appears the following:

"Only four CIO unions are under complete control of the Stalinist officials. They are the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians"

The following information regarding the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians appears on page 264 and page 265 of the above mentioned book by Mr. STOLBERG:

"The Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians was organized in 1924 mainly from the technical staffs of the Works Progress Administration. From the very beginning the Federation has been under Stalinist leadership, and its rank and file are generally Communist Party followers..."

Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised on January 30, 1945 that AL SARANT was active as a canvasser for Congressman VITO MARCANTONIO in the 18th Assembly District of Manhattan during the 1944 elections. The informant advised further that apparently this was one of AL SARANT'S Greenwich Village Club activities.

The Communist Party and the Communist Political Association have been declared within the purview of Executive Order 9835 by the Attorney General.

The record of ALFRED SARANT at Cooper Union was reviewed by SA RICHARD E. BRENNAN and reflected the following information:

He was born on September 26, 1918, and his address at the time of his entry into Cooper Union in September, 1936 was 23 Colony Street, West Hempstead, New York. He was graduated from Cooper Union on June 5, 1941 with a degree of Bachelor of Electrical Engineering.

Confidential Informant T-25, of known reliability, advised that a telephone call initiating from SAl'ANT'S home was made to New York City listing Circle 5-8900 on February 2L, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, has advised that the subscriber to this listing is the Wodern Ruseum of Art, 11 West 53rd Street, New York City.

Due to the nature of this above institution, no additional investigation is being conducted by the New York Office to ascertain the identity of the person to whom SARANT placed the above mentioned telephone call.

ARTHUR C. ECUDIN 500 Grand Street New York City

Confidential Informant T-25, mentioned previously, advised that a telephone call emanating from SARANT'S home at Ithaca, New York, was made to New York City listing Oregon 4-0802 on February 2, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned previously, advised on July 3, 1950 that Oregon 4-0802 is listed to ARTHUR C. ECUDIN, 500 Grand Street, New York City.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised on October 28, 1943 that SID BOUDIN, 9 Gay Street, New York City, was a member of the CP of kanhattan, New York. His membership was transferred from Branch C, Section C, New York County, New York, New York, to Section 1 - 2, Wanhattan, New York County, New York, New York, on October 21, 1943.

Mr. RALPH T. CRUMP, Manager, Du Cret and Company, 73 West 11th Street, realtors for 9 Gay Street, New York City, advised in 1944 that

that ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN resides at the above address with his wife. Mr. CRUMP indicated that he thought BOUDIN was a statistician at that time, and that he had formerly been employed by some union.

Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised in 1944 that one LEONARD B. BOUDIN is the brother of ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, and that their parents' address as of 1944 was 84-18 114th Street, Cueens, New York. This informant advised that ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN was forn on March 31, 1920 in New York City, and had attended the 'iniversity of Wisconsin for four years, receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in economics. The informant advised that BOUDIN had been previously employed as an office clerk in camps, and the reason why he was not inducted into the Armed Forces was due to an ulcerated condition.

Confidential Informant T-10, of known reliability, advised that Mrs. JOSEPH B. EDUDIN. also known as CLIRA BOUDIN, advised the informant in 1944 that her son, ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, could be located through his business telephone number, Volunteer 5-5426.

Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned previously, advised that this telephone number was that of Standard Brands, 595 Madison Avenue, New York City. It was ascertained through a contact made at this firm that BOUDIN was employed there.

Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised on August 8, 1944 that ART HOUDIN: 9 Day Street (14), telephone number Watkins 9-8782, an economist - COPWA - 16, age, twenty-three, is a member of the Greenwich Village Club, 1st and 2nd Assembly Districts section, CPA, Manhattan, New York. His membership card was number 5438. The informant advised that he was registered with the CPA from the 1st Election District.

Confidential Informant T-11, of known reliability, advised on March 5, 1944 that CLARA BOUDIN is a member of the Speakers Bureau of the Kings County Committee of the Communist Party, 26 Court Street, Brooklyn, New York. A review of the telephone directories for the City of New York in 1944 reflected that there was a JOSEPH B. BOUDIN living at 84-18 114th Street, Richmond Hill, New York.

JOSEPH B. BOUDIN advised Confidential Informant T-12, of known reliability, that his wife's name is CLARA.

ADMINISTRATIVE SHEET (cont'd)

The records of the New York County Clerk's Office, New York City, reflected that one JOSEPH B. BOUDIN, an attorney with offices at 299 Broadway, New York City, was one of the directors of the Products Exchange Corporation in its first year. On February 25, 1919, the firm of BOUDIN and LIERIAN had filed a Certificate of Incorporation in the County of New York for this corporation. Products Exchange Corporation was consulidated on May 27, 1924 with the Arcos - American, Incorporated, and the new name of Amtorg Trading Corporation. BOUDIN was listed as a Russian corporator of the above firm.

Confidential Informant T-13, of known reliability, advised in 1944 that JOSEPH POURIN. a member of the law firm of BOUDIN, COHN and GIJCKSTERN with offices at 20 West wird Street, New York City, is prominent in OP circles. This informant advised that employment in this firm is tantamount to OP membership, or the stricture of afternoon to Party lines.

The Martindule - Rubbell for Vivestory, issue of 1944 reflects that JOSEPH BOUDIN, MEDICARD BOUDIN, 10015 D. BOUDIN, VERA BOUDIN, and the firm of EDUPIN. COMM and BLICKSTEIN as having offices at 20 West 13rd Street, New York City.

It should be noted that it has not been lefinitely ascertained that ARIBUR C POIDIN of 500 Grand Street, New York City, is identical with the ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN who resided in 1944 at 9 Gay Street, Yew York City. However, since APTHUR CARL BOUDIN and SARINT were numbers of the same Greenwich Village Club in 1944, it would appear that these two are identical. Additional effort, are being made by this office to home atfinitely ascertain the identity of these two individuals remained above.

Institutional Cinema Service Corporation 165 West 46th Street New York City

The current Manhattan telephone directory reflects a listing for this concern as Plaza 7-3633. Confidential Informant T-25 advised that this telephone number was called from SARANT'S home at Ithaca, New York on February 27, 1950.

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any record for this above mentioned concern.

Confidential Informant T-25, mentioned previously, advised that a person to person telephone call was made from EARANT'S home telephone at Ithaca, New York to BETTY SANDERS at New York City, telephone number Buckingham 4-4145 on March 5, 1950 and June 14, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned previously, advised that there is no Buckingham exchange in the New York area; however, there is a

Buckminister 4-4145 listing which is to BETTY SANDERS of 2212 Ditmas Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. This informant advised that one BERNARD SCHLENGER, 2212 Ditmas Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, also has listing Buckminister 4-4145.

On June 1, 19th Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability, advised that BETTY SANDERS of 1186 East 19th Street, Brooklyn, New York, was a member of the Communist Club of the 8th Assembly District, 201 Second Avenue, New York, New York.

On August 28, 1947 Confidential Informant I 16 of known reliability, advised that BETTY SANDERS' name appeared in a record dated January 30, 1947 which reflected her transfer from the Kings Highway Section to the New York State CP, transfer number 14258NR.

Confidential Informant T-17, of known reliability, advised on February 21, 1949 that a communication had been received from BETTY SANDERS, Brooklyn, New York, protesting the proceedings in the arrest and/or trial of the twelve members of the National Committee of the Communist Party.

The "Daily Worker" for May 5, 1949, page 13, column 3, carried an article by BOB REED, telling of the reception given the program of songs and satire called "Now Is the Time", under the auspices of the Music Section of the Cultural Division of the CP, following the annual May Day celebration and parade held in New York City on April 30, 1949.

New Is the Time" was given in a panel room at 13 Aster Place.
New York City, following the May Day Farade.

The article stated that the script had been written by LEE HATS who also served as master of ecremonies. Among the participants in the program there appears the name of BETTY SANDERS.

Confidential Informant 1-18, of known reliabilitys advised on June 11, 1949 that BETTT SANDERS, a singer of partisan songs, is a member of the CP. The informant further advised that BETTY SANDERS is a member of the Ruscians Club of the CP.

Confidential Informant T-19, of known reliability, advised on October IL, 1949 that a handwritten letter was addressed to *Dear Editor*

(the "Daily Worker" or some similar organization at 35 East 12th Street, New York City) from BETTY SANDERS, pertaining to the chauvinism in the original lyrics of "Manana".

Confidential Informant T-20, of known reliability, advised on January 9, 1950 that BETTY SANDERS' name appears in a list of instructors and lecturers for the Winter term, 1950, of the Jefferson School of Social Science.

The Jefferson School of Social Science has a cortice in animathe purview of Executive Order 9835 by the Attorney General.

In connection with the investigation entitled, "ABRAHAM EDELSON, wa.; conducted by the New York Office in 1941 and 1942, it was ascertained through investigation that BERMARD SCHLENGER, 1185 East 19th Street, Brooklyn, New York, which is the same address given by Confidential Informant T-15 for BETTY SANDERS in 1944, is a lawyer with an office at 5 Bleeckman Street, New York City.

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York reflected at that time that SCHLENGER'S wife, LILLIAN SCHLENGER, was a school teacher at Public School #95, Brooklyn, New York. The record reflected that she had taught since October 16, 1918.

It is not known whether there is any family relationship between BETTY SANDERS and SCHLENGER; however, it would appear that the information pertaining to BETTY SANDERS' CP activities is identical with the BETTY SANDERS who was contacted by SARANT in March and June, 1950. Additional efforts are being made by this office to more definitely ascertain whether BETTY SANDERS, whom the subject contacted, and the BETTY SANDERS, about whom derogatory information has been previously furnished in this report, are identical.

The current Manhattan telephone directory reflects that MATHAN W. ACKERMAN, M.D., 12h East 8hth Street, (residence address) telephone number Rhinelander 4-0348, has offices at 43 East 78th Street, New York City, telephone Butterfield 8-1580.

Confidential Informant T-25, previously mentioned, advised that telephone calls were made to Dr. ACKERMAN'S offices from the SARANT home or March 15, 1950, and again to Dr. ACKERMAN'S offices from the home of March 15, 1950, and again to Dr. ACKERMAN'S offices from the home of March 17, 1950. This latter call was charged to SARANT'S, Ithaca, New York, telephone. Again on March 29, 1950 selephone calls were made to Dr. ACKERMAN'S residence and office telephone numbers.

Confidential Informant T-26, of known reliables against Tau mail was received by the SARANTS from Dr. ACKERMAN on April J., 1950.

The files of the New York Office failed to reflect any additional information pertaining to NATHAN W. ACKERMAN.

Confidential Informant T-25, mentioned previously, advised that LOUISE SARANT, apparently the subject's wife, made a collect telephone call to SARANT'S Ithaca telephone number from New York City listing Oregon 5-9421 on March 7, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-7, previously mentioned, advised that the Oregon 5-9421 listing is for LEO GORMAN, 2 West 14th Street, New York City.

The files of the New York Office failed to reflect any reference believed to be identical with this individual.

LEAH LEVINGER 182 Avenue A New York City

Confidential Informant T-25, mentioned previously, advised that a telephone call was made from SARANT'S home at Ithaca, New York, to LEAH LEVINGER, person to person, on Earch 29, 1950 LEAH LEVINGER'S telephone number is Oregon 3-6676.

Confidential Informant T-21, of known reliability, advised on November 17, 1943 that SAMUEL LIVINGER, brother of LEAH LEVINGER, 663 Locust Street, Mt. The informant advised that SAMUEL LEVINGER: 5 fether Dr. LEE LEVINGER, resided at 2257 Indianola Avenue, Columbus, Original Physics 17, 1943.

Confidential Informant T-25, previously mentioned, advised that a telephone call was made from SARANT'S home at Ithaca, New York to Baldwin, New York, 3-9312M on May 24, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned previously, advised that Baldwin, New York, listing 3-9312M is to N. G. SARANT, 160 West Kerrick Road, Baldwin, New York. The current Wassau County telephone directory reflects that this is the residence address for N. G. SARANT.

Confidential Informant T-25 also advised that a call was made from SARANT'S home at Ithaca, New York to Freeport, New York, 9-2222 on May 26, 1950. This call was not completed.

Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned previously, advised that the subscriber to Freeport 9-2222 listing is also N. G. SARANT, 170 West Sunrise Highway, Freeport, New York. The current Nassau telephone directory reflects that N. G. SARANT'S Freeport, New York, address is 255 West Sunrise Highway, and that he is in the insurance business. It is noted that the addresses for N. G. SARANT at Freeport, New York are different; however, Confidential Informant T-7 advised on July 3, 1950 that 170 West Sunrise Highway, Freeport, New York, is the current address for N. G. SARANT.

From the information furnished by Confidential Informant T-25 it is determined that N. G. SARANT is the father of the subject, and that his full name is NONDA GEORGE SARANT.

JAY DAVID WHITTAKER CHA BERS, a self confessed former espionage agent, advised SA THOMAS G. SPECNER that several of the members of the editorial staff of the "Scientific American" are either CP members, or are pro-Communist.

Confidential Informant T-22, of unknown reliability, advised on June 12, 1950 that the editor of "Scientific american" is DENNIS FLANAGAN. According to this informant, FLANAGAN'S mother, NAM BRAYMER, is informant advised there is a very close relationship between the mother and the son. The informant believes that the "Scientific American" is the type of magazine which could be used as a propaganda outlet by the CP in a method similar to that used by the magazine "Amerasia".

United Nations World 319 East Lith Street New York City

Confidential Informant T-26, previously mentioned, advised that mail was received by SARANT from the "United Nations World", 500 Nadison Avenue, New York City, on April 11, 1950. The current Kanhattan telephone directlry reflects that the "United Nations World" is located at 319 East With Street, and that their telephone number is Murray Hill 6-1338.

Confidential Informant T-23, of unknown reliability, who is a former employ:e of the "United Nations World", advised on June 25, 1947 that this magazine has a pro-Communist bias.

In the April 6, 1947 issue of the "Daily Worker" there is an article entitled, "Diplomats Say United States Nove Hurts U.N. ... A magazine pool indicated tonight (April 5, 1947) that 82% of the worlds dipolmats believe that America's handling of the Greco-Turkish hurt U.N. prestige.

"The pool was conducted by the 'United Nations World', a magazine which specializes in United Nations affairs. The magazine questioned eighty-three diplomats from thirty-eight countries."

The current Manhattan telephone directory reflects that the Frank G. Shattuck Company, with offices at 58 West 23rd Street, New York City, telephone number ORegon 5-5140, is the parent company for Schrafft's Stores, a large restaurant chain. It was noted that a Schrafft's store is located at 625 Madison Avenue, New York City, telephone number Eldorado 5-3783.

Inamuch as this is a large organization, no additional investigation is being conducted by this office in an attempt to ascertain who at Schrafft's Stores, 625 Madison Avenue, New York City, was in contact with SARANT.

ROLAND BURDICK c/o Oxford Book Company, Inc. 222 Fourth Avenue New York City

Reference is made to Newark teletype in instant matter to New York dated June 29, 1950, which advised that BURDICK, referring to ROLAND BURDICK, 1201 12th Street, Fairlawn, New Jersey, is currently employed as a sales manager since October, 1946 at the Oxford Book Company, 222 Fourth Avenue, New York City, and prior to that time he was in the Armed Service.

Confidential Informant T-24, of known reliability, advised on February 5, 1943 that one ROSE _____, otherwise unidentified, left word with kICKEY HOROWITZ at CP headquarters, 35 East 12th Street, New York City, to call ROSE at the office where she was employed, telephone number Gramercy 7-4660, which, according to Confidential Informant T-7, mentioned

previously, wasthe listing for Oxford Book Company, 222 Fourth Avenue, item. York City. The informant advised that arrangements were made tid. ILVICE FOTASH of the Furriers Union to meet GIL GREEN at CP headquarters at CP. M. that day.

It is to be noted that POTASH and GREEN were recently convicted in the trial of the twelve National Committee members of the CP, USA, and are currently awaiting review of their case by the United States Circut Court of Appeals.

While it is not known why it was necessary for ROSE to be used as a cutout for the above information pertaining to POTASH and GREEN, the above information was furnished pertaining to an employee of the Oxford Book Company inasmuch as that organization may be used in some connection with the CP movement.

The Personnel History Statement for JOE L. BARR in connection with his employment at the Sperry Gyroscope Company dated May 13, 1947 reflected the name of VICTOR K. D. ROSS, 422 Eddy Street, Ithaca, New York as a character reference. Confidential Informant T-25, mentioned previously, advised that VICTOR K. D. ROSS is SARANT'S father-in-law. It is particularly interesting to note that JOE BARR gave Mr. ROSS as a character reference, and this is the first indication from that investigation that there was a connection between BARR and SARANT.

Will attempt to ascertain if these three could have been off sick, leave without pay, etc.



Re: JULIUS ROSENBERG ESPIONAGE - R

At 5:30 this evening, in the absence of Inspector A. R. Belmont, I spoke with Inspector Leo Loughlin of the Bureau. I advised as follows:

Agents have completed for the day interviewing DAVID GREENGIASS and RUTH GREENGIASS, and in essence they informed us that in November, 1944, ROSENBERG asked RUTH GREENGIASS to go to Albuquerque, New Mexico, and persuade DAVID GREENGIASS to furnish information on the atomic bomb. RUTH did this on or about November 29, 1944, and DAVID agreed.

In January, 1945, DAVID came to New York City on furlough. ROSERBERG described to DAVID generally how the naval type atom bomb worked. DAVID then furnished ROSENBERG with the names of some of the personnel at Los Alamos who GREEN-GLASS considered ideologically suited for recruitment in espionage activities.

In February, 1945, RUTH moved to Albuquerque. Prior to going there, ROSENBERG had told her that she would be contacted in Albuquerque by VANNER who would pick up information received by RUTH from DAVID about the atomic bomb. RUTH was furnished with one-half of a piece of paper or cardboard, and MANNER was to have the matching piece (which ultimately was the piece GOLD had given to DAVID by ROSENDERS). MANNER was supposed to meet RUTH in front of a Safeway store on Central Avenue, Albuquerque, in the latter part of May, 1945. MANNER did not show. GOLD showed, on June 3, and the GOLD incident is exactly as we know it from previous information obtained.


The next furlough of GREENGLASS following the contact with GOLD was in the Fall of 1945. GREENGLASS came to New York City and furnished ROSENBERG with papers and notes and sketches he had made concerning the atom bomb—how it looks, what it is made of, etc., etc. GREENGLASS got no money on this occasion. He believes that it was at this time that the contact was made with the unknown man in the automobile through ROSENBERG as previously described.

GREENLASS was discharged in February, 1946, and until September, 1949, associated with ROSENBERG in business. GREENCIASS has learned through conversations with ROSENBERG that the latter has contacts in Upstate, New York, and in Cleveland, Ohio, which contacts GREENGIASS believes are espionage contacts, but of which he is not certain. The of course will go into his knowledge of these contacts as fully as necessary in later interviews. We believe that we have sufficient information to enable us to identify MANNET through investigation.

When FUCHS was arrested, ROSENBERG told GREENGLASS to get out of the country. GREENGLASS declined. When GOLD was arrested, ROSENBERG told GREENGLASS again to get out of the country, and gave him \$500 in cash. GREENGLASS said this was not enough money, and a few days later, on May 28, 1950, ROSENBERG gave GREENGLASS \$4,000 and told him to leave the country by June 11, going by way of Mexico and Sweden or Switzerland to Czechoslovakia. GREENGLASS said he hid this \$4,000 high in the chimney in the fireplace in his residence at Rivington Street, New York City, and that it has been given to 0. JOHN ROGGE as a fee. He says that ROGGE does not know the source of the money.

I described in detail in how obscure a manner GREENGLASS had hid the money in the chimney, which, according to GREENGLASS was in its hiding place when we had searched his apartment prior to his arrest. When ROSENBERG gave GREENGLASS the \$4,000, ROSENBERG said that he, too, was going to leave the country, and that SOEL BARR had left the country. He told GREENGLASS that when he got to Czechoslovskia he would see several people he knows there.

GREFNGIASS and RUTH decided between them not to leave the country. They planned to go someplace out of the city—to the mountains—and after ROSEN-BERG had left, planned on returning to New York City. GREFNGIASS said ROSEMBERG has thus far been unable to leave the country because he is under constant surveillance by the FBI. This latter is purely conjecture on the part of GREENGIASS.

With respect to our interview with RUTH thus far today, her story jibes with information we already know, except with one or two minor points which we will clear up in future interviews.

I advised Wr. Loughlin that undoubtedly the Bureau would desire to immediately present this additional information to the Department. I told Mr. Loughlin that the situation as it now stands has several problems with various aspects, all of which deserve consideration. I told him that we feel we have enough to warrant the issuance of process against ROSENBERG; that because of the lateness of the day and the fact that it is the last business day of the week, together with the fact that we have not completed our interviews with DAVID and RUTH GREENGIASS as thoroughly as we would like to, we feel that bringing him in ight now for questioning would be premature. We would like to have more ammunion in the way of additional facts from DAVID and RUTH to hit him with in order

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to make him break. On the other hand, we cannot assure the Bureau at all that if we do not bring him in we will be able to keep in full knowledge of his whereabouts over the weekend. Because of the neighborhood in which he lives, a physical surveillance cannot be conducted discreetly. He lives in Knickerbocker Village, a city housing development on the Lower East Side, a pushcart district. Agents in the neighborhood stand out like sore thumbs. The apartment house in which he lives takes in a full block. There are subterranean passage-ways to and from all the apartments within the block. GREENGIASS could go down to the cellar in his apartment and come out on any one of the four streets from any one of the apartments on those streets or from the stores on the streets he might choose. The only way we could run a surveillance on him and be assured of his whereabouts would be to station a man outside his door.

So far there is no reason to believe that ROSEMBERG would take a powder this weekend. The situation as far as we know is in his mind the same as it was last weekend, with one exception. There was an article in the Journal-American Thursday night when GREENGLASS removal proceedings had been adjourned, and in the article it stated that SAYPOL and ROGGE had been practically arm-in-arm, whereas previously they had been snarling at each other. It was conjectured that GREENGLASS might be now cooperating with the Government. In all likelihood ROSEN-BERG has seen this article. The GREENGLASSES assure us that they will not tell ROSENBERG they are cooperating.

I suggested that if we do not move against ROSENBERG tonight, the Bureau sanction a discreet surveillance, and we will do what we have been doing on him today, namely, keeping track of him without heating him. Of course, if anything develops from his movements which indicates he intends to skip, we can tighten our surveillance; we will have to use our judgment as the situations arise. I requested that the Bureau consider these data and advise us what course they want us to follow.

Later in the evening, Inspector Belmont called. He inquired as to when we had last seen ROSENBERG. I told him five minutes ago we had placed him in his apartment at Rivington Street; that he was extremely hot. Ir. Belmont advised that the Bureau had already presented information previously on hand to the Department, and that tey had not authorized on ROSENBERG. The Bureau was attempting to contact the Department to give them the additional information, but it did not appear we would have an answer on prosecution over the weekend. The Department does not exactly know what it wants to do about RUTH GREENGLASS.

Kr. Belmont wanted to know if we knew of any reason why ROSENBERG should attempt to skip this weekend any more than he would have last weekend. I told him 'we knew of none except the Journal-American article I had previously mentioned to Loughlin. Mr. Belmont stated that because of the lateness of the day and the impending weekend, plus the fact we had not gone into the GREENGLASSES' interviews

as thoroughly as we would like, the Bureau was inclined not to press for an arrest of ROSENBERG at this time. I told him we felt the same way, but told him our problem of attempting to keep track of ROSENBERG in the event he decided to take a powder. He said we should conduct a discreet surveillance since a full surveillance was impractical. We should continue with the same tactics we have been using today. We should try to be reasonably sure of his whereabouts until the GREENGIASSES' stories crystallize and signed statements are taken covering the essential racts of ROSENBERG'S activities. We should be certain not to burn up ROSENBERG on the surveillance, but be reasonably sure we know where he is.

Supervisor Granville and the agents handling this matter were made aware of the Bureau's instructions at once.
