Re: memo of SA JAMES P. LEE, 8/1/50, concerning mail received from senders described below/ at ROSENBERG's place of business.

MORIS J. SMIRNOFF, Plant Superintendent, Ketay Manufacturing Company, 555 Broadway, NYC, advised that his company has done business with ROSENBERG and the Pitt Machine Products Corporation for about a year. All contacts were with ROSENBERG. It was not known he had a partner in the business until his arrest. GREENGLASS and other associates of ROSENBERG were not familiar to him, he said. Most of ROSENBERG's contacts with the company were through ROBERT CARLETON, Purchasing Agent.

Mr. SMIRNOFF advised that KETAY is doing exclusively defense work and is primarily engaged in manufacturing "SYNCHROS" for the U. S. Navy. Synchros are electrical devices which are part of the fire-control mechanisms used in naval gunnery. ROSENBERG made only minor component parts and did not assemble work. He made his parts from diagrams and specifications for the individual parts. He presumably did not know what parts he was making or for what device they were intended. He had access to the inspection department of Ketay when parts of his were rejected as not within specifications or where that sort of question came up. The work on the synchros is "Confidential" in so far as the plans and diagrams are concerned, and the most restricted area is in the research department, where improvements in the synchros are sought. ROSENBERG had no access to the research department and, so far as is known, never saw except from a distance a completed synchro. The synchros themselves, though not in the current improved form, were available as war surplus for fifty cents after the war. Extensive literature on them is also available, including official Navy literature, and can be bought by anyone. Mr. SMIRNOFF said that nothing ROSENBERG ever did suggested espionage activities or any other misconduct. All relationships with him appeared to be quite legitimate and typical of those of a sub-contractor, which he was. All contacts were those of business. Mr. SMIRNOFF said that he personally had only six or eight contacts with ROSENBERG.

ROBERT CARLETON, Purchasing Agent, Ketay Manufacturing Company, 555 Broadway, advised that ROSENBERG first came to see him about a year ago to solicit business. Since then he has, intermittently, done small jobs for Ketay, making detail parts on a sub-contract basis, mostly for bells and buzzers being made for the Navy and occasionally making component parts for synchros. His contacts with ROSENBERG and PITT MACHING PRODUCTS CORPORATION have been purely business. He has seen ROSENBERG personally five or six times, has talked to him on the phone fifteen to twenty times, has never met GREENGLASS, has never visited ROSENBERG's place of business, and knows nothing about him, he said, except as it relates directly to the business which ROSENBERG did for Ketay. He continued: ROSENBERG did no assembly work. He had no way of knowing how the parts he made fitted into the final product. He had no access to plans or diagrams except for the particular minor parts. He had no access to the research section. He was never permitted to roam about the plant. He had access to the inspection section, but would not there have been in a position to learn anything secret. ROSENBERG seemed innocent of any intention to or effort to learn anything he was not entitled to know. Mr. CARLETON said that he doubted whether ROSENBERG could possibly have profited from an espionage standpoint from his contacts with Ketay, especially as such contacts were very limited in number and scope and involved a total of very little business for either Ketay or ROSENBERG..

Mr. CARLETON advised that he recognizes none of the photographs of alleged associates of ROSENBERG except that of NOEL BARR, whom he said he thought he recalled as a fellow engineer at Western Electric. He said that he did not know the person by name, did not know him socially, does not know any of his associates, knows nothing of his background, but merely believes that he saw him at Western Electric while he was there, between January, 1944 to July, 1945, both dates approximate.

Mrs. ANN LESHAN, Industrial Relations, New York Association for New Americans, 15 Park Row, advised that she could find no reference to ROSENBERG or GREENGLASS or to their company under either known name. She suggested that possibly the Association had merely attempted to solicit money from Pitt or had notified him, along with many other companies listed in the classified telephone directories and industrial lists, of the availability of refugees for possible employment.

HARRY I. BROWN, Metropolitan Employment Agency, 43 West 47th Street, advised that ROSENBERG, his company, and GREENGLASS are unknown to him and not included in his accounts or records. He pointed out that he solicits business by sending thousands of blotters and other literature by mail to firms listed in the New York State Industrial Guide and other such registers.

ARTHUR G. NORMAN, Sales Consultant, Commerce and Industry Association of New York (Chamber of Commerce), 233 Broadway, advised that he could find no record in the Association files for ROSENBERG, GREENGLASS, or their company by either name and said that if any contact existed between the Association and Pitt, it must have been some casual inquiry, such as any business or citizen might make of the Association.

Dr. GEORGE BERNHARDT telephonically contacted the New York Office and advised he would like to speak to an agent concerning information he had given to SAS ROBERT L. STEVENSON, JR. and BERT TAYLOR on August 7, 1950.

On August 10, 1950, the writer and SA DANIEL F. O'CONNOR contacted BERNHARDT at his home, 40 Monroe Street, New York City, Apartment F711. Dr. BERNHARDT advised he had been thinking about the statement he had given on August 7, 1950 in which he said he did not recall ROSENBERG ever having asked about getting a vaccination certificate for a friend of his. (ROSENBERG).

Dr. BERNHARDT said last night, August 9, 1950, he finally recalled that about two or three months ago ROSENBERG did call him at his home and said, "What kind of shots does one have to take if one wants to go to Mexico? Don't get scared it's not for me, it's for a friend of mine." Dr. BERNHARDT told ROSENBERG he would need a Small Pox Vaccination and that he would also recommend Typhoid Shots. BERNHARDT then asked if the person was going to the interior of Mexico and he said yes. BERNHARDT then recommended Typhus Shots. BERNHARDT asked if the person going to Mexico was a "Vet" and ROSENBERG said yes. He then told ROSENBERG all he would need would be booster doses. BERNHARDT said that to the best of his recollection ROSENBERG never asked for a certificate of vaccination for his friend.

Dr. BERNHARDT advised he would be in New York until 6:00 PM Friday, August 11, 1950. He would then go to Camp Summerland, New Windsor, New York, and remain there until 9:30 AM Monday morning, August 14, 1950. Dr. BERNHARDT said he thought he would be back in New York next week and the following week he would go on vacation until after Labor Day. While on vacation he would be at Camp Summerland or at Martha's Vineyard off Cape Cod, Massachusetts.

Re: memo of SA JAMES P. LEE, 8/2/50 concerning canceled check payable to E. WEINBAUM, issued 3/14/50, No. 993, in the amount of \$50.00, apparently drawn by ROSENBERG on the National Bank and Trust Company.

MAY SACKS, Treasurer, Eastern Farm Products Company, 290 Oakland Street, Brooklyn, advised that the notation "R15" on the back of the check under the endorsement "E. Weinbaum" referred to Route 15 in their system of distributing milk to retailers and restaurants, etc. The additional notation "29", he said, is sufficient to refer them immediately to the customer at 29 Monroe Street, NYC, which is a regular cash customer on Route 15. He said that WEINBAUM is unknown to him and is not listed by name on company records. He said that the routemen often take checks cashed by their customers for the benefit of the customers of the latter and that the notations referred to are for the company's protection against loss in case of theft or bad checks.


DAVID WEINBAUM, son of BENJAMIN WEINBAUM, Village Grocery and Dairy, 29 Monroe Street, advised that he and his father have known ROSENBERG and his wife as customers for the period of three and a half years that they have had the grocery at that address. The ROSENBERGS have been very good customers over all the period, have generally been strictly cash customers but have occasionally been a little short and have received credit, have always been honest, pleasant, and apparently quite respectable citizens. Mr. WEINBAUM said that he knows over a hundred actual communists in the development across the street and many others who are pro-communist, but that the ROSENBERGS never gave the slightest indication of any such affiliations or tendencies and, on the contrary, left the impression of being opposed to communism. He said that he was very much surprised to learn of ROSENBERG's arrest. He pointed out that the ROSENBERGS have continued to come into the store to trade.

BENJAMIN WEINBAUM, grocer, advised to the same effect as his sons above, saying that other customers had indicated pro-communist sentiments, but the ROSENBERGS, never. He and his son pointed out that their relationship with the ROSENBERGS had been business only, but said that they were more friendly with ROSENBERG and his wife than the typical usual customer.

On August 9, 1950 the writer and SA DANIEL O'CONNOR interviewed DAVID SCHEIN, 2161 Pitkin Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and SCHEIN's lawyer, HARRY ZUCKER, 16 Court Street, Brooklyn, New York. The interview was conducted at 2161 Pitkin Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

ZUCKER advised that in the latter part of 1947, November or December, SCHEIN was the President of a Synagogue at 370 Houston Street, New York City. The caretaker of the synagogue, Mr. W.Y. GOODWILLIG, since deceased, introduced SCHEIN to ROSENBERG. ROSENBERG wanted to rent space on the first floor of the building in which the synagogue was located.

ZUCKER said that SCHEIN talked to JULIUS ROSENBERG, DAVID and BERNHARD GREENGLASS in November or December of 1947. Apparently SCHEIN, according to ZUCKER, was impressed by ROSENBERG and the GREENGLASS brothers and he decided to invest fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) in a new corporation. ROSENBERG and the GREENGLASSES, who at the time were operating the G and R Engineering Company, East Second Street and the corner of Sheriff Street, New York City, were to turn over the assets of the G and R Company as their share of the new corporation.

ZUCKER advised that he drew up the papers to form the new corporation which was named the Pitt Machine Products, Inc. and that DANIEL REIT, of Reit and Reit, 1441 Broadway, New York City, drew up the contract

ZUCKER said that the GREENGLASS brothers and JULIUS ROSENBERG were to draw fifty-five dollars (\$55) per week as salary and at the same time SCHEIN was to be paid fifty-five dollars (\$55) a week on the preferred stock he held in the corporation. When the fifteen thousand dollars of preferred stock was paid off, SCHEIN was to receive one-fourth of the common stock in the corporation.

However, business went from bad to worse and finally the GREENGLASS brothers withdrew from the corporation.

*Statement*  
In May, 1950 SCHEIN decided to take a loss on his investment and get out of the business. He offered to sell his stock to ROSENBERG for five thousand dollars (\$5,000) plus one thousand dollars (\$1,000) that ROSENBERG owed to him. ROSENBERG gave SCHEIN one thousand dollars which, SCHEIN claimed, he borrowed from an unknown individual without giving sufficient security. SCHEIN and ZUCKER said that the person who loaned ROSENBERG the one thousand dollars would be known to SOLOMON BAUCH, lawyer at 45 John Street, New York City. BAUCH at the time SCHEIN got out of the Pitt Corporation was acting as ROSENBERG's lawyer.

The remaining five thousand dollars for which SCHEIN was to be paid for his shares of the preferred stock was to be paid off at the rate of one hundred sixty dollars (\$160.00) a month. SCHEIN advised that he received about three thousand dollars (\$3,000) of his initial investment.

SCHEIN advised that he did not know the GREENGLASSES or ROSENBERG prior to 1947 and that at the time he met them he had money which he wanted to invest. He was convinced that the Pitt Corporation would be a sound investment.

SCHEIN said the only bank used by the Pitt Corporation was the Public National Bank, Avenue C and East Seventh Street, New York City and that no member of the corporation could draw checks on the account without SCHEIN's signature inasmuch as he was the Treasurer.

SCHEIN advised that he was born in Brooklyn, New York, on July 27, 1909 and that he resides at 10 Shore Boulevard, Brooklyn, New York.

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He advised he has been a food distributor for Aron Streit Inc., 152 Rivington Street, New York City, for the past sixteen years.

SCHFIN further advised that he had met Mrs. DAVID GREENGLASS and Mrs. J. ROSENBERG but that he did not know any associates of the ROSENBERG or GREENGLASS families.

Attorney General J. Howard McGrath and J. Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, announced the arrest today of Mrs. ETHEL GREENGLASS ROSENBERG, age thirty four, by Special Agents of the FBI in New York City on a charge of Conspiracy to Commit Espionage. She is the American born wife of JULIUS ROSENBERG arrested by the FBI in New York City on a similar charge July 17, 1950.

Mr. Hoover stated that ETHEL ROSENBERG was charged with conspiring with and assisting her husband and others in recruiting her brother, DAVID GREENGLASS, arrested by the FBI at New York City on June 16, 1950, to obtain classified information concerning the Atomic Bomb for the Soviet Union. Greenglass has been charged with furnishing Atomic secrets to JULIUS ROSENBERG and HARRY GOLD while stationed at Los Alamos as a soldier in Nineteen Forty Five.

ETHEL ROSENBERG was born September 28, 1915, at New York City. Her father was born in Russia and her mother in Austria. She graduated from Seward Park High School, New York City, in 1931, and married JULIUS ROSENBERG on June 19, 1939. After employment as a stenographer with various industrial organizations in New York City, she obtained employment as a temporary clerk at the Census Bureau, United States Department of Commerce, Washington, D. C., on June 10, 1940, and voluntarily terminated this employment on October 1, 1940.

ETHEL was married to JULIUS ROSENBERG on June 19, 1939, at New York, N. Y. She has two children, MICHAEL ALLEN ROSENBERG, born March 10, 1943, and ROBERT HARRY ROSENBERG, born May 14, 1947, at New York, N. Y.

ETHEL ROSENBERG resides at 10 Monroe Street, Apartment 6E-11, New York, N. Y. She attended Public School #4 in Manhattan and was graduated from Seward Park High School, New York City in 1931.

ETHEL ROSENBERG was formerly employed by the National Packing & Shipping Company, 327 West 36th Street, New York City, from February 1932 to October 1935, and by the Bell Textile Company, 353 Broadway, New York City, as a stenographer from August 1938 to June 1940. She was employed as a temporary clerk by the Census Bureau at Washington, D. C., from June 10, 1940 to November 1, 1940. Since then she has been a housewife.

ETHEL ROSENBERG joined with her husband, JULIUS ROSENBERG, in a conspiracy to recruit her brother, DAVID GREENGLASS, to engage in espionage and to obtain atomic information for the Soviet Union.

JOSEF KRAUTHAMER, Universal Brass Turning Company, 912 Cortland Ave., Bronx, advised that he is president of the company. He said that he does not know either ROSENBERG or GREENGLASS and said that he has never actually done business with the PITT MACHINE PRODUCTS CORPORATION. He pointed out, however, that he had heard of that company from someone, whose name he does not recall, but at that time threw away his notation of the name and address of Pitt. About ten days ago, he said, he drove by Pitt's place of business, recalled having previously heard of it, noticed that the business had milling machines, in addition to equipment previously referred to, and decided to get in touch with Pitt, especially as a current strike at his own plant made outside assistance necessary. He said that he therefore wrote to Pitt to inquire what facilities they had and what sort of work they were prepared to do. He said that he has never received an answer. U

Mr. KRAUTHAMER said that the photograph of GREENGLASS seemed familiar to him and that he believes the letter came into his place of business to solicit business. He said that no business resulted from any such contact. Mr. KRAUTHAMER also said that photographs of MARTIN SOEHL and JOEL BARR seemed quite familiar to him. He later agreed with his son that SOEHL, or the person he thought resembled SOEHL, had been an employee of his. The name SOEHL, however, was unfamiliar to him, he said. U

KARL KRAUTHAMER, son, advised that it was his impression that both SOEHL and BARR, from their photos, had been employees of Universal. A check of photographs for the year 1947, however, revealed that the person he had in mind was, on closer examination, not identical with BARR. He explained that all employees since 1945 or 1946 had been photographed. No records prior to 1947 were available, however, and in the payroll records for 1947 through 1949, examination of all photos available failed to turn up one resembling SOEHL. It was his recollection that the person he thought to be SOEHL had been employed there about four or four and a half years ago. U

He pointed out, however, that it is more than likely that he has sent form letters to Pitt Machine Products Corporation, inasmuch as he sends thousands of such letters through the mail to all types of industrial and machine shops, the names of which he derives from the telephone books, trade papers, the New York State Industrial Guide, etc.. He said that only those organizations which reply come to be listed in his records. He pointed out that his business is that of jobber handling chemicals used in processing metals. He said that none of the photographs of ROSENBERG and associates was familiar to him except that of JOEL BARR, which seemed familiar to him, but which he could not place. LF

ELITCHER was interviewed on August 9, 1950 and furnished the following  
information:

ELITCHER stated that he knew one BERNICE LEVIN, who  
resided at 2225 N Street, Washington, D. C., with ANN GOODMAN. He stated  
that LEVIN resided with GOODMAN at this address around 1941 and indicated  
that she was there at the time when the American Peace Mobilization Move-  
ment was in force in Washington, D. C.

ELITCHER stated that BERNICE LEVIN met MORTON SOBELL  
in about 1940 and that thereafter SOBELL dated her on occasion. Eventually  
ELITCHER, himself, went out socially with LEVIN a few times between Sep-  
tember, 1941 and May, 1943.

ELITCHER stated that he was of the impression that  
BERNICE LEVIN was employed as a steno-typist in the Department of Labor  
in Washington at the time of his association with her. He stated that  
he read in the papers about six months ago that BERNICE LEVIN was named  
by ELIZABETH BENTLEY as an individual who had furnished information to a  
Soviet espionage network. ELITCHER said that he last saw BERNICE LEVIN  
at the funeral of his brother, MORRIS ALSCHER, who died recently. He  
said that LEVIN was a close friend of RUTH ALSCHER, ELITCHER'S sister-  
in-law.

ELITCHER stated that LEVIN had never indicated to him  
that she was engaged in an espionage system and, further, never endeavored  
to recruit him. ELITCHER further mentioned that he had no information
