At his last actual meeting which he held in New York City with Reymond (Harry Gold), Fuchs stated he believes he told Reymond he was about to be transferred either to England or to Los Alemos, and that in the event Reymond desired to get in touch with Fuchs he should contact Fuchs' sister, Wrs. Eristel Reimman, at 114 Lakeview Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts. Fuchs later learned that he was to go to Los Alemos and he informed his sister that she might be contacted by an individual to whom she should furnish his whereabouts.

August 14, 1944, and working as a physicist in the Theoretical Division of the Inboratory. His first trip may from Los Alamos was to visit his sister im Pebruary, 1945. Pouchs stated that he expected to be met there by his contact, Raymond, and he believes that his sister had written him that his contact had celled at the Reinsman home looking for him. Fuchs stated that shortly after his arrival in Los Alamos, Raymond did contact him there, and Fuchs said that arrangements were made for a subsequent contact in Boston a few days later. In the meantime Fuchs prepared a handwritten report of approximately six pages containing classified information dealing with the whole problem of making an atom bomb from fissionable material as he than knew the problem. He also furnished in this report the agreed upon, as well as the prospective plans for the construction and possible detonation of an atom bomb as he then understood the problem.

It might be noted at this time that there is considerable doubt as to whether Fuchs passed this information at the Boston meeting or whether he actually prepared and furnished this information at the meeting at the Beineman home, and that Fuchs is merely attempting to protect his sister, Kristel Beineman. In this connection, Earry Gold has stated definitely that he received the written information at the Beineman home. At the meeting in the Beineman home Fuchs made arrangements for a subsequent contact with Raymond at los Alemos in June, 1945, and furnished to Raymond a map of the City of Santa Fe, New Mexico, designating the meeting point.

The meeting did take place in June, 1945, at Santa Pe, New Merico, en Alameda Street between Castillo and Delgado Streets. Froke picked up his contact in the car and drove to a deserted lane where they parked. At this time Fuchs delivered, in writing, additional, detailed information concerning





the work being done on the production of an atom bomb. We also informed Raymond that a test explosion was soon to be held in July at Alamogordo, New Mexico. He gave, in writing, a description of the plutonium bomb, information concerning the ignition of the bomb, the method of calculating efficiency and the results of such calculations, and he prepared a sketch of the bomb and its components, with important detonations indicated. He also furnished the names of the types of explosives to be used in the bomb.

Another meeting was held in Santa Pe, New Mexico, in December, 1945, between Fuche and Raymond. This meeting had been arranged at the previously described meeting, and at this time Fuche gave to Raymond information regarding the test which had taken place at Alamogordo, New Mexico. He also furnished the fact that the production of Uranium 285 was about 100 kilograms per month, and that the production of plutonium was about 20 kilograms per month. He furnished certain details econorning predetonation and information concerning the blast waves.

Arrangements were made at this meeting for Fuchs to establish a new context in London, England, in view of the fact that Fuchs believed that he would be returned to England about the first of the year 1946. Fuchs selected the place for this meeting as Mornington Crescent, which is the name of an underground (subway) station in London. Arrangements were made for Fuchs to carry a copy of Life Magazine, and the contact was to have a bundle of books with a cord tied around the books.

Fuchs returned to England in June, 1945, and he never utilized the method of resetablishing contact at the Mornington Grescent meeting-place because of the exposure which had been made public in connection with the Soviet Intelligence Network in Camada. Fuchs was fearful of utilizing the contact because of the arrest of Dr. Alan Num May, the British scientist, although Fuchs said he believed he would not be actually involved in view of the fact that he never had engaged in espionage in Ganada.

contact with the Soviet Intelligence Service, and having learned that Jurgen Encymber had returned to Germany he made contact with Johanna Elopatech, whom he know to be active in connection with the underground section of the German Communist Party. We told her that he had "lost contact" and for her to furnish this information to whomever had taken Encymber's place. A week or so later he contacted Elopatech just outside or inside the gate at Hampton Court, and



she at that time gave him instructions as to how he would establish contect. Puchs' new contact was to carry a red book in his hand, while Fuchs was to earry a copy of "Tribune" and they were to meet at the Mage Read Pub in London, England. From did establish contact with a man and he maintained contact with this individual from early 1947 until February or March, 1949. Fuchs said that he missed a large number of contacts with this individual. He does not believe that the number of meetings would be over six. Funks said that in either 1947 or 1948 he eccepted one hundred pounds in English money from his contact. He said that he was motivated in doing this by the fact that security precautions had been tightened after the exposures in Canada and he felt that in scoopting this money he was more or less assuring his contact of his loyalty. Fuchs stated that in 1948 it was suggested to him that he contect an individual by the name of Sukhonlin (actually Vassili V. Soukhomline) at 2 Rue Adolphi Bartholdi in Paris, France. Puchs was told that this individual would be able to place him in contact with someone who would be able to more fully understand scientific terms. Puohs said he never made this contact because of the restrictions placed on sterling for use in foreign travel at about that time.

Arrengements also were made in order that Fuchs might establish contact with his intermediary in case the other arrangements broke down by going to a particular address at 166 New Road in Richmond, Surrey, England, at this point Fuchs was to throw a copy of the periodical "Mem Only" ever the well of the house. On the tenth page of this periodical Fuchs was to write instructions for the next meeting. Fuchs was then to go to another point end to make a chalk mark on a wall. Fuchs utilized this method on only one consion, which was merely for the purpose of testing the arrangements and his contact informed him that he had received word that Fuchs had utilized the method.

Funhs has stated that during the period that he was intermed in Canada during the year 1944 he did receive certain scientific periodicals from Israel - Ealperin through the sail. Fuchs said that there are two possibilities as to b how Halperin learned of his presence in Canada — one would be through his sister. Kristel Heimman, and the second would be that Cerman Communist Party



members in England wrote to Helperin 44 look after the scientists who were incorporated in Canada. Fuchs stated that he/never had any espionage dealings or affiliations directly or indirectly with Helperin.

Pushe also maintains that his trip to the United States in Hovember, 1947, to attend a declassification conference in Mashington, D. C., was not motivated by his Soviet espionage contacts, and that he engaged in mo espionage activities while in the United States at this time.

On June 15, 1950, memoranda were prepared for transmittal to the Atomic Energy Commission and the State Department, furnishing them additional details regarding Fuchs' espionage activities as furnished to the Bureau's representatives in London, England. In this connection you will recall that CIA, in a memorandum dated May 8, 1950, requested details as to Fuchs' espionage activities in the United States, and Mr. Tolson recommended that a letter which had been in the prepared in enswer to CIA's request not be sent and that consideration be

prepared in enswer to CIA's request not be sent and that consideration be

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given at a later date to furnishing CIA such information as might be available concerning Fuchs activities while in the United States. Mr. Tolson stated that it did not seem that CIA had a legitimate interest in the matter at this time. The Director commented, "I very definitely agree."

You will note that in the attached memoranda there is a memorandum to CIA, and the memorandum to the Attorney General states that a memorandum is being directed to the CIA.

RECOMMENDATION

It is believed desirable to furnish to CIA such information in connection with this case as we are furnishing to other intelligence agencies.

On June 1, 1950 ROBERT B HEINEMAN in company with Special Agent BRENTON S. GORDON of the Boston Division voluntarily searched through all the personal property of KRISTED HEINEMAN now in his residence at 94 Lakeview Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Mr. HEINEMAN and Agent GORDON discovered approximately ten items of correspondence in the German language which had been addressed The Agent was seeking any memoranda or notebook prepared by KRISTEL HEINEMAN which might reflect names and addresses of her contacts as well as their telephone numbers. The search resulted in the production of nine or ten documents in the German language referred to above and these are being enclosed herewith for translation by the Bureau at the Seat of Government.

It is noted that earlier ROBERT HEINEMAN had made available a considerable volume of personal papers of KRISTEL HEINEMAN which have been translated, copies of these translations having been furnished the New York and Boston Divisions. It can be noted summarily that these contained more detailed background information concerning the FUCHS family than has heretofore been reported or developed by interrogation of the principal subject. This matter will be set out in a report on FUCHS now in preparation at Boston.

It can be further noted that HEINEMAN advised that at one time his wife did maintain on two 8 by 11 ruled white "composition sheets" placed between two souvenir wooden covers a list of names and addresses of friends and associates. The covers are still in the HEINEMAN home but the sheets disappeared prior to her first commitment and HEINEMAN believes it is possible that she destroyed them.

The Bureau is requested to furnish translations of the enclosed material to the New York. Philadelphia and Boston Offices.






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

Garnes June 6, 1950 JULIUS HOLVES, State Department SUBJECT: Mr. Julius Holmes of the State Department called me on the morning of June 5, 1950 for the purpose of discussing another matter. Subsequent to that discussion he stated that he had just returned from London, where he met Assistant Director Clegg and Special Agent Lamphere, who were in London at that time interrogating Fuchs. He stated that Mr. Clegg and Mr. Lamphere handled the entire situation very well. He pointed out that the British has originally been reluctant to permit representatives of this Bureau to interview Fuchs and, indescribing the situation, he stated you know, our cousins worship their traditions. He also commented about the London press, stating that during the entire case the press was very difficult to handle, but that in his opinion Kr. Clegg handled the press very well.
