





On the other hand, while there hasn't been any evidence I have noticed of excessive curiosity, there is little assurance of privacy, and I haven't felt that it would make sense to have literature around. Advice, commont, suggestion, or whatever of appropriate procedure under the circumstances would be welcome.

In response to the New York request it was accertained that R.V.S. represented the initials of RICHIPD MESES SUMMEY, who resided at 538 Stratfield Road, Bridgeport. 

Hr. GERRGE FIRCH. Personnol Hanager of the Eridgeport Brass Company, Bridgeport, Connecticut, advised that RICARD ECIRS SHALLY was terminated officially by the Bridgeport Braze Company as an amployee at Bridgeport as of June 1, 1948. Fr. FIECE

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advised that Mr. SUNDAN had been promoted to the position of Director of Operations for Bridgeport Brass (Canada) Ltd., Montreal, Canada, where he would be permanently assigned.

MARRIAGE DATA

An article appeared in the Bridgeport Herald July 11, 1948, to the effect that VIRGINIA HAMPTON, former Director of the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children for the Bridgeport, Connecticut, area during the first week of July eloped and married RICHARD NAMES SULMEN, Canadian representative of the Bridgeport Brass Company at Toronto, Canada,

with a marker of the free to Confidential Informant II who has had occasion to know VIRGINIA HAMPTON professionally has no information concerning her background prior to arrival in Bridgeport, Connecticut, except that Mrs. HAKPION had indicated in some namer that she had previously been an actress and had traveled extensively in Europe. This same informant had also learned that ENUFTON had been employed as an interviewer by the United States Employment Service. Compensation Division. Il attempted to secure for this office the exact date and place of the marriage of RICHARD SUIN of and VIRGINIA HAMPTON from a close acquaintaince of Virginia Haipion, Mrs. alma locksood, a reporter for the Bridgeport Post. Mrs. LOCKHOOD indicated that VIRGINIA HAMPTON had told her that she had been married quietly in a small coastal town on the Canadian border: during the first week in July.

Confidential Informant 72 indicated that the telephone listing of Fairfield 9-4472 is in the name of Mrs. VIRCINIA HAMPION, now subject's wife. A call was placed to this number by the subject on June 10, 1948, from Montreal, Canada.

Confidential Informant II indicated that he was under the general impression that the marriage between SURIN and HAMPION was a marriage of convenience. He felt that Mrs. HAMPION had married SURIN partially on the basis of advice from her psychiatrist and partially because she felt her employment was terminating as Director of the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children and she was desirous of making herself secure. Il who on munerous occasions has had an epportunity to evaluate HAMPION's personality indicated that he considered her impractical, tempermental, extravagant, a tireless workers.

Confidential Informent 12 who has known VIRGINIA HAMPION since HAMPION was employed by the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children stated that he is her opinion she had concluded from remarks made by HAMPION that she

Well critical of the government of the United States, a champion of laber of flighty, impractical, a liberal but not disloyal. It was asked what she meant by liberal but she refused to further evaluate the term and indicated that she was using it in its best sense and not as indicative of radicalism. Being a liberal, VIRGINIA HAMPTON favored the laboring class. Informant indicated that she did not want any misunderstanding as to what she meant by saying that HAMPTON was critical of the government. She simply meant that HAMPTON was critical of simple problems involving social legislation which could not be construed in any way as being tainted by disloyalty. It would not define the terms of her criticism beyond this point.

According to T2, HAMPSON's elesest friends were Dr. HICHAM. BRODSING Psychiatrist, Mrs. MARGARET CON'ORS DRISCOLL, Bridgeport Attornoy, and Mrs. ALMA LOCKHOOD, featured writer for the Bridgeport Post and Mrs. ELSANOR MANN, fermer Director of the Crippled Children's Work Shop, Bridgeport, Connecticut, who currently is attending the San Jose Teachers College, San Jose, California.

Confidential informant T2 in reference to VIRGINIA HAMPTON'S marriage to the subject advised that she knew only that he was Canadian representative of the Bridgeport Brass and that the marriage case as a surprise to all of HAUPTOR's friends. With reference to VIRGINIA HAUFTON's Cenadian contacts, II advised that during Christmas of 1947 for a period of approximately one week Mrs. HAMPTON went to Toronto, Ontario, Canada, where she inspected a rehabilitation center operated by Dr. SERIS. During the last part of October, 1948, HALPTON was in New York City at the Bellevue Bospital Rehibilitation Institute located at East 38th Street, You York City, N. Yes apparently taking post graduate work. The purpose of her additional education was allegedly to start a rehabilitation center in Contreal, Canada. At about this time JaANNETTE WALT:R, Bridgeport, Connecticut, physical therapist at the Veterans Rome and Rospital, Rocky Will, Connecticut, received a telephone call from VIRGINIAHAMPTON and EAMPTON attempted to have her visit her in Son York. It would appear to informent that this was purely a business costure on the part of HALPTON inasmuch as WALTER and HALPTON were not close because their personality and emotional traits were antagonistic.

According to Confidential Informant T2, HAMPTON is approximately fortyfive years of age and was first married to an individual by the name of
KAMINSKY who currently leads a bohomian life in California. From this
marriage VIRGINIA HAMPTON has one daughter, JANIA KAMINSKY approximately
twenty years of age a student at Benington College, Benington, Vermont.
Informant advised that to the best of her recollection this marriage ended
in divorce in 1933 or thereabouts. Prior to the divorce the couple resided
in Paris, France. HAMPTON married DAVID MAYPTON, an artist and suther in
it about 1937, possibly in California. This individual died several years
subsequent to the marriage,

Mrs. HAMPION is a graduate of Pomona College, Pomona, California, and reserved a Masters Degree from Mon York University in rehabilitation work TH 100-1145

in about 1941 or 1942. In about 1948 VIRGINIA HAMPTON left her job with the United States Daployment Service and joined the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children as a field worker in Fairfield County. She was made chairman of the Bridgeport Rehabilitation Center in approximately April, 1945, where she served until June of 1948 when the program at Bridgeport, Connecticut, was discontinued.

The records of the Commectical Society for Crippled Children reflect exactly

OSCAR JOHN VAGO, 66-07 99th Street, Rego Park, was interviewed on May 15, 1950 by SAS LEO H. FRUTKIN and ROBERT M. KANE. VAGO advised that he was born in Budapest, Hungary on February 27, 1898 and that he first came to the United States at New York in January of 1925 after completing his engineering training at the Royal Joseph Technical School at Budapest. He stated that he had resided with an uncle, WILLIAM GOLDSTEIN, now deceased, and that he had been employed by a number of engineering firms in New York, whose names he does not recall, before returning to Hungary in 1928. In that same year, he married CLAIR WEISWAN. The couple have two children, JOHN, age twelve, and SUSAN, age four. VAGO advised that he and his wife had returned to New York in January of 1933 and that he had not been outside the United States since that time. He was naturalized in the Southern District of New York in September, 1939 and is presently employed as a structural engineer for JACK ARONOW, consulting engineer at 12 East 48th Street, New York City.

VAGO stated that he had resided in New York exclusively except for three years in Washington, and he listed the following employments since 1938:

June, 1938 to December, 1939, Procurement Division,

December, 1939 to June, 1941, Quartermaster Corps, War Department,

June, 1941 to April, 1943, Fellheimer Wagner, 155 East 42nd Street,

April, 1943 to November, 1943, John E. Greenewalt, Chrysler Building,

November, 1943 to February, 1944, Angelo Conti, 25 Broadway,

February, 1944 to August, 1944, Regal Chemical Company, Greenpoint,

August 1944 to June, 1948, A. Brothman, Associates 65-15136-(

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June, 1948 to date, Jack Aronow, 12 East 48th Street.

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VAGO stated that he had resided at the Buckingham Development in Arlington, Virginia while working in Washington and that he has resided at the same address in New York since 1941.

In connection with his relationship with BROTHMAN. VAGO advised that he had received a telephone call from BROTHMAN in June or July of 1941 at which time, BROTHMAN advised him that a mutual friend, whose name VACO could not recall, had suggested that VACO might be interested in [32.7] doing some part-time work. VAGO advised that BROTHMAN was, at that time, designing a chemical plant for a Rufert Company at Seymour, Connecticut and that he had paid VAGO \$25.00 for some structural engineering work which VAGO had done in his spare time. He related that he had given his work to BROTHMAN who was then employed at Chemurgy and that subsequent to that time, he had not seen or heard from EROTHMAN until early 1944. At that time, BROTHMAN called VAGO and informed him that he was hiring men for the Regal Chemical Company and asked VACO to take a position as a structural engineer which VAGO did. VAGO stated that BROTHMAN'S job was to organize an engineering staff and that BROTHMAN was also a kind of trouble shooter for different plants of the company. VAGO recalled that structural engineering work was scarce at the time so that BROTHMAN had VAGO doing odds and ends of engineering work in setting up a plant which was to manufacture DDT. VACO related that BROTHMAN was to design the plant and that VAGO was instructed to set up an office at 55 West 42nd Street to handle work at the plant but that the project had lasted only about three weeks when BROTHMAN quarrelled with HEILIG of the Regal Chemical Company and was discharged along with all those whom he had hired. VACO recalled that the quarrel was over financial questions but he was unable to supply any details.

Since BROTHMAN and VAGO were both unemployed, they looked for new positions until BROTHMAN conceived the idea of setting up a firm of engineers. BROTHMAN promised that through his connections, he would be able to obtain some large engineering jobs, VAGO said, and he painted such a rosy picture that the other partners readily accepted his proposition.

VAGO said that he had met BARISH and WCIIAN at the Regal Chemical Company and the other partners at the time that the partnership was set up.

VAGO said that there was no discussion of profit sharing at the time the partnership was set up nor was there any written agreement of any kind. He stated that it was assumed that EROTHMAN would receive the lion's share of the income since his connections would furnish all of the firm's business. VAGO stated that the other partners knew very little of EROTHMAN'S background at the time but were taken in by his glib promises.

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VAGO stated that he himself knew at the time that EROTHIAN had been employed by Chemurgy and the Regal Chemical Company and also by a firm known as Hendricks and that he had attended Columbia University. He recalled that the office of the firm was set up at 114 East 32nd Street with very little equipment and with no paying in of capital since there were no initial expenses. The original plan was to have a drawing account of \$100.00 a week for each partner which was shortly reduced to \$65.00 and dropped all together after a few months.

In the early days of the firm, VACO seid the only income which the Company had was from the Bridgeport Brass Company and the Graver Tank Company, both of whom had paid BROTHMAN a retainer for engineering work of about five to six hundred dollars a month. He stated that it was his understanding that BROTHMAN had had these retainers for about two years before the partnership was set up and that he believed that they were discontinued in late 1945.

According to VAGO, PROTHMAN planned to make up proposals for engineering jobs which would result in contracts for the firm. As a result, he said, the partners were extremely busy working some seventy hours a week making up some elaborate proposals which were never accepted and for which they received no payment. VAGO expressed the opinion that BROTHMAN might possibly have been receiving payment for these proposals while telling the other partners that it was not professional practice to pay for such proposals unless they were accepted by clients.

VAGO stated that the firm was in desperate straits financially during almost the entire period of its existence and that he himself had gone in debt \$2,500.00 for personal living expenses although he had incurred no debts for the firm.

In 1945, VACO said the firm received a contract from the Chinese Covernment to design a plant for military aircraft in China. The negotiations for the contract were made by BROTHMAN and VACO was unable to explain PRCTHMAN'S connections which resulted in obtaining the contract.

VAGO advised that all of the members of the firm had worked continually on this project for about eighteen months and that they were to receive \$86,000.00 according to the terms of the contract; \$70,000.00 of which was actually received. VAGO recalled that \$30,000.00 was received in one payment and that the remainder was to be paid in monthly sums of \$5,000.00 but that the latter payments were usually delayed. Fifteen percent of the contractual amount was not received because the plant was never actually completed and \$6,000.00 was taken off the contract price because of the fact that certain inspections were unnecessary.

VAGO stated that the Chinese contract was completed in 1947, and that later in that year, the firm received a contract to build a plant in Philadelphia involving some ingredient for Toni permanents for which they received \$10,000.00.

Another contract received in 1947 was with the Mettur Chemical Company of India for which they received \$500.00. This contract dealt with the building of a plant to utilize chlorine wastes. VACO stated that a \$10,000.00 bill had been sent to this company at the time that the proposals were sent but that no payment had ever been received although BROTHMAN advised them that an oral agreement had been made for such a payment.

vaco stated that to the best of his recollection, no other income was ever received by the Company with the exception of some minor items which he might have forgotten.

In order to keep up current expenses of the firm, VAGO stated, BROTHMAN borrowed money repeatedly informing the partners that he was borrowing on his own credit from personal friends. VAGO was unable to supply the names of these lenders but he stated that he himself had never been called upon to pay any of the obligations nor had any of the other partners to his knowledge.

VAGO stated that the firm was in dire straits each month for such items as rent and telephone bills and that the employees of the company were almost without exception cheated out of a part of their salaries; some of them to a considerable extent. He stated that as a result of the financial failure of the firm, BARISH had dropped out in a few months, probably in December of 1944 and that WOLLAN had dropped out in 1946 after a quarrel with BROTHMAN. He stated that KORCHIEN, who was an architect, had dropped out probably in 1946 because there was no work in his field during the existence of the firm,

In 1946, VACO said, when the firm was moved to Long Island City, only he, BROTHMAN and MIRIAM MOSCOWITZ remained. He stated that the move had been made on money received on the Chinese contract and partly on account of that contract since the job necessitated extra space and extra workers. VAGO related that he himself had left the firm in June, 1948 as a result of a number of cumulative grievances chiefly because of the fact that he was not permitted to share in policy making and also because of what he considered personal mistreatment by BROTHMAN. He advised that he had not talked to BROTHMAN since that time and that on the one occasion when he had seen BROTHMAN, it was to sign dissolution papers and he, VAGO, had specified that there was to be no conversation between them.

VAGO stated that he had come to believe that BROTHMAN might have been cheating the other partners although he admitted that BROTHMAN'S standard of living had never been out of keeping with his alleged financial difficulties.

VACO stated that EROTHMAN was always careful to conceal his tusiness dealings from all the partners except MIRIAM MOSCOWITZ but that she apparently accompanied BROTHMAN on almost all of his business contacts. VACO felt that BROTHMAN probably did not want the other partners to meet his business contacts because of his fear that they might take leave of the firm and keep some of BROTHMAN'S clients.

. VAGO stated that he could recall no social calls at the office for EROTHMAN nor any individual who either called or appeared at the office frequently. VAGO stated that he had visited in BROTHMAN'S home with his wife on a few occasions early in the relationship but that there had been no other guests at the home.

In connection with the laboratory rented by the firm, VAGO recalled that it had been set up in late 1945 at the time that the Chinese contract was received and VAGO stated positively that the firm had had no laboratory prior to that time since all of the earlier work was of the mechanical engineering type involving no testing of processes.

WACO stated that the firm had rented a single room in a factory whose name he could not recall near Moodhaven Boulevard and Queens Boulevard in Queens. He stated that the factory in which the room was rented was engaged in the manufacture of coated paper and that his firm paid \$35.00 a month for an empty room for which they supplied their own equipment.

He stated that the work on Buna-5 which BROTHMAN had told him about was done for the United States Rubber Company in 1942 or 1943. He stated that he himself had done none of the purchasing for the laboratory and that he had visited it only infrequently. He advised, however, that to his knowledge, all of the materials used in the laboratory were bought from Eimer and Amend, a large New York firm and that they were ordered by laboratory employees. He stated that the laboratory had first been rented by WOLLAN and that after the latter's resignation from the firm, it was rented by HARRY COLD.

VAGO stated that the laboratory employees had never worked in the main office of the company and he supplied the names of the following:

In connection with MANDELKORN, VACO advised that he had been employed there about 2½ years beginning shortly after the Chinese contract was received and that he appeared to be friendly with BROTHMAN both inside and outside the office. He stated that he did not know the extent of MANDELKORN'S association with BROTHMAN but that it was definitely umsual for BROTHMAN to make friends with laboratory employees. He stated that BROTHMAN informed him that he had met MANDELKORN on a train returning from Connecticut and had hired him when the position opened up.

ISAAC HELPERN. VAGO stated that HELPERN was not actually an employee of the firm but was a Certified Public Accountant who did the firm's accounting work.

VAGO stated that ROHALL was employed by the firm from 1946 to April, 1949 and that he had great faith in EROTHMAN'S promises although at the time of his resignation, the firm owed him some \$3000.00 in back pay. VAGO related that ROHALL often called him to chat with him and when asked why he did not resign, he always mentioned some new promise made by BROTHMAN.

BERNARD KISHKIN, age 35, 5'10", 150 lbs., blond hair, married, residence Park Avenue. He stated that WISHKIN was a contact man for the firm who appeared at the office only infrequently. VACO stated that he did not know the financial arrangements made for paying MISHKIN but advised that he had often heard him quarrelling with BROTHMAN.

WOLLAN, brother of GERHARD WOLLAN, age 30 years, 6' tall, 190 lbs., blond hair, period of employment one year. VACO stated that WOLLAN had been a Physics instructor in some college in Montana and that he had worked at the laboratory only while out of a job. He resigned to return to his teaching position in Montana.

In connection with Chemurgy Design Corporation, 420 Lexington Avenue, VAGO advised that the only contact that he had ever had with this firm was to deliver the previously mentioned work to BROTHMAN at the company office. He stated that it was his belief that BROTHMAN was a Vice-President of the firm and that KORCHIEN was an architect and BARISH a draftsman.

In connection with the travel by members of the firm, VAGO advised that BROTHKAN had travelled to Philadelphia, Chicago and Connecticut but that none of the other partners or employees had done any traveling on firm business.

VACO stated that in May of 1948, BROTHMAN had gone to Switzerland to contact a Swiss chemical company with whom he had been corresponding. VACO stated that the expenses were paid by that company. He stated also that he had seen correspondence from the firm and believed the trip to be a bona fide one.

VAGO advised that he had met HARRY GOLD at the time when the latter was hired for the laboratory in 1947 and that he had known him during the year and one-half that he worked there. He stated that GOLD had been hired by BROTHMAN as a chemist and that he had been in charge of the laboratory after WOLIAN left. He stated that he did not know of any previous relationship between BROTHMAN and GOLD but that the two were obviously very friendly.

VAGO was unable to identify photographs of JACOB GOLOS, VLADINIR TVERIANOVICH, IVAN MAIOROV or ELIZABETH BENTLEY but identified the photograph of JOSEPH A. ROBBINS as being HARRY COLD. He also identified the photograph of GOLD himself.

MISS BENTLEY was, of course, not informed of the Bureau's knowledge of GOLD'S participation in the FOOCASE but she was informed that GOLD'S name might probably be set out in the newspapers in connection with some activities

of his. She was also informed that it was highly possible that his name might be mentioned in connection with JACOB GOIOS and that, if so, it was extremely likely that the newspaper people would attempt to contact her to get a story. She was requested to immediately inform this office in the event she was contacted by the press or anyone else in connection with GOLD or GOIOS and she stated that she would definitely do this. It was suggested to her that if such inquiry was made she make no comment, at least for the present. She stated that she had followed the practice of not giving any stories to the newspapers in the past and that she would be particularly mindful of this request in connection with the present situation.

MISS BENTLEY plans to remain a resident of the Commodore Hotel for some time and promised she would notify the writer personally in the event she decided to go out of town for any reason or for any definite or indefinite stay.

SA T. Scott Miller, from Philadelphia, advised that GOLD had told agents interviewing him that he had visited at the home of BROTHMAN at Peekskill, N and this fact was verified by the presence of timetable in GOLD's home . I advised SA Miller that BROTHMAN said he did not know GOLD and he said that GOLD actually lived with BROTHMAN according to GOLD and there is no reason why GOLD should lie about this. GOLD has stated that the only associate he ever had except those who were actually involved in espionage who had an inkling that he (GOLD) was engaged, at least in industrial espionage; was BROTHMAN, and he made this'statement because BROTHMAN asked GOLD whether or not GOLD could put him in touch with Soviet officials who would be in a position to afford Soviet contracts to BROTHMAN, or Soviets who could let him do some consultaint work for them. GOLD feels that BROTHMAN was an espionage agent of a sort, but as far as being an important espionage agent; he does not know. He characterized BROTH AN as a communicat. He said they were all Communists, with the possible exception of BARISH. GOLD himself. was never a member of the CP. He said he made inquiry about joining the part in 1936 and about three months later a man contacted him and said he understood that HARRY wanted to work for the Soviet Union. That is how he got himself involved in industrial espionage, and then, when this big thing came up, he could not get himself out of it. According to SA Miller, GOLD admits everything.

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



Agent for the following reasons.

Re originally introduced himself to BROTHMAN under the name FRANK
KESSLER or another phony name and he introduced himself as being sent by GOLOS
for the purpose of obtaining chemical processes from BROTHMAN for GOLOS. As
far as the time and circumstances of his meeting with BROTHMAN, the information
he gave before the confession is more or less accurate, either very late 1940
or early 1941 in New York.

BROTHMAN, on one occasion asked GOLD if he would make appropriate contacts to see if GOLD could not arrange for BROTHMAN to have some Russian work thrown his way, probably consulting engineering work, but GOLD specified it was to be legitimate work, in other words, BROTHMAN would do it in the open and get a fee for it. When GOLD took this up with his Soviet superior at the time he would have nothing to do with it.

As far as BROTHMAN being an agent is concerned, GOLD does not know; however, be does say that if he was an agent he does not believe he was important, as far as GOLD is concerned, because, although he was sent to BROTHMAN to obtain chemical information, all he ever obtained was some material of BROTHMAN's own design and he thinks that on only two occasions did he pick up from BROTHMAN material which he gave to GOLOS and on both of these occasions it was material of BROTHMAN's own design. He said thathe and BROTHMAN had little, if no conversation regarding GOLOS.

He said BROTHMAN never told him that he (BROTHMAN) was interested in the Buna 5 Process. GOLD said he did visit BROTHMAN at his home on at least one, two, or three occasions before he went to work for BROTHMAN and that he net BROTHMAN s wife, NACHI. After he was employed by BROTHMAN, he lived at his home for two weeks and went to his summer home in Peekskill.

SA Miller suggested that we might ask EROTHMAN why he introduced GOLD weber as KESSLER because at that time BROTHMAN knew GOLD's correct name. After GOLD confessed, GOLD said to his (GOLD's) brother that BROTHMAN was a Communist but was not "mixed up in this mess".

Re the Laboratory, GOLD said he pever had serious conversation with BROTEMAN. He said his Russian superior suggested to HARRY GOLD several times that he start a laboratory, GOLD said he believed the purpose of this to be, so that he could have more time to work for the Russians. Mr. Miller said of that it appears the second laboratory possibly refers to the Elmhurst Laboratory. GOLD said BROTHMAN never indicated any particular interest in Thermal Diffusion. GOLD said his interest relative to Thermal Diffusion was for his own benefit.

GOLD SAID, with regard to his statement relative to his marriage, he said he happened to mention this to BROTHMAN; that it was a lie, but after he had made the statement, he felt he should carry through with it until they found out the truth.

SA Miller said he believes that GOLD's superior from 1941 to late 1943 that is the unknown subject SAM is SEMEN SEMENOV. He said that GOLD has tentatively identified him as SAM. He further advises that GOLD believes that his other contacts in the United States were Russians with possibly one exception.

MIRIAN NOSCOVITS was interviewed at the New York office on May 15, 1950, from 6:35 to 8:30 P.M. and again on May 16, 1950 at the office of ABS BROTHMAN and Associates at 2928 41st frome, Long Island City, from 1:15 P.M. to 4:15 P.M. She was interviewed by SAS RALPR P. MILLER and THOMAS E. ZOWLER.

Miss NOSKOVITS furnished the following information concerning

She was born June 10, 1916, at Bayonne, New Jersey. She attended high school in Bayonne, New Jersey, and night school at City College of New York, graduating in 1942, receiving a B.S. degree in Education. She furnished the following employment: 1934 - 1936, Detmort Holding Corporation, 1819 Breadway, New York City; 1936 - 1941, Scan Leasing Corporation, Hast 41st Street near Madison Avenue, New York City; March 1941 until the end of 1941, INS, New York City; also 1941 Social Security Board, New York City; 1942 until fall of 1944 employed War Manpower Commission, New York City; 1942 until fall of 1944 employed War Manpower Commission, New York City; fall of 1944 until the present time employed by ARE BROTHMAN and ASSOCIATES. Also MOSKOWITE advised that she went to work for ABE BROTHMAN and Associates in the early fall of 1944. At that time the company was already formed and the states that she did not know any of the members of

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firm prior to her employment there. It is her recollection that the heard of the position available with the firm through some friend whose news she does not presently recall. Nembers of the firm were ABRAHAM BROTHKAN, OSCAR JOHN VAGO, JULES KORCHIEN, EMIL 2. BARISH, and GHEHARD HORVAL VALLAN. They were chemical engineers and located at 114 East 32nd Street, Hew York City.

Miss MOSKOVITZ stated that the T2nd Street office consisted of a small design room and a small "cubby hole" space used as an office. She advised that at the time she came to work for the company, they used a laboratory which was not located in the 32nd street building. It is her recollection that this laboratory was a marshift affair, not very equipped, but that it was used by the firm and is the only lab she knows of used by the firm until the formation of the laboratory at Elnhurst, L.I., E.Y., which will be described later. Miss MOSKOVITZ stated that she had never been to this laboratory.

Miss MOSKOVITZ stated that when she came to work for the company they had two principal projects, one with the Bridgeport Brass Company, Bridgeport, Connecticut, for whom they were working on DDT dispensers, and the other the Graver Tank Company in Chicago, Illinois. Graver Tank Cospany is engaged in making heavy machinery and Mr. BROTEMAN was engaged in getting up a cales manual on mixing equipment. She recalled that Mr. JACK NILLS of Bridgeport Brass was one of the firm's contacts, but did not know any other individuals contacted by them. She also recalled that at about the time she came with the firm, there were some negotiations for the sale of a plant to the Cyanamid Company for the manufacture of DDT, but this will never materialized. Also a firm in the midwest wanted Mr. BROTHMAE to go on their payroll as an employee, whereas he wanted to be retained by them as consulting engineer and accordingly, no/agreement was ever reached by probably Scuttern Ruday BROTHKAN with this firm. AT. Imusimo, Mus. NEV

Miss MOSKOWITZ stated that she knew nothing of BROTHMAN'S business associates or BROTHMAN'S places of employment prior to the time she came to work for him. Later, however, when the names of the concerns were suggested to her, she admitted knowing BROTHMAN had worked for the Chemurgy Design Corporation, the Hendricks Manufacturing Company, and the Blawknox Company in Pennsylvania, for which BROTHMAN did some sort of development work. She stated that she knows nothing about profit sharing of the members of the company due mainly to the fact that the company never had any profits

after she came. She stated that BROTHMAN, in her opinion, is just not a business man and could give no reason why the company did not "pan out" except the lack of a good business manager. She stated that shortly after she came to the company, the DDT work of Bridgeport Brass Company was in very poor financial straits. Miss MOSKOVITZ stated that it is her opinion that BROTHMAN could and should have received royalty payments from the Bridgeport Brass Company instead of the cash fee which he did receive.

Miss MOSKOWITZ stated that KORCHIKE did very little work as a member of the firm and was concerned principally with doing work for himself as an architect. She advised that BARISE left she company soon after she went to work for them and shortly after he left, which was in very early 1945 "the Chinese arrived". Miss MOWKOWITZ said that in January 1945, negotiations were started with the Air Force and the Chinese Government, who wanted to make plywood and lucite for planes. The Chinese were unable to get the DaPont Company to make these articles and as they had heard of BROTHNAM'S reputation in the trade, they came to him and wanted him to develop the two materials, particularly the lucite without conflicting with existing patents held by the DaPont Company. Miss MOSKOWITZ stated that the lucite was very difficult to develope without conflicting with patents, but that BROTHMAN thought he could do it.

She advised that there were months of negotiating with the Chinese and the contract with them was signed about June 1, 1945. She stated that a C.S. WAN and a W.C. TANG, whom she believes were both colonels in the Chinese Air Force did handle the negotiations with the firm. She stated that all members of the firm with the exception of KORCHIEN participated.

Miss MOSKOVITZ recalled that at the same time that negotiations overe going on with the Chinese, BROTHMAN was negotiating with some man in the Bronx on a project/design a machine in connection with separity highly fling She stated that this project never amounted to anything.

Riss KOSKOVITZ advised that immediately after, the Chinese began negotiating with them, they realized that if the contract were signed, it would be necessary for the firm to have a laboratory of their own. She said that practically the day after the Chinese contract was signed, it was decided to build the laboratory Klahmret, L.I. She advised that about 600

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square feet of space was rented at 85-03 57th Avenue. Elmhurst. She advised that this building is owned by a Mr. EDWARD QUICK, who is still the owner of the building. QUICK operates a company called the "Peacock Gold Relating the Company" at this address. She advised that Mr. WOLLAH was in charge of setting up the lab. It is her opinion that SRIMOUR MANDELECEN was one of the first persons hired to work in the laboratory and he assisted Mr. WOLLAH in obtaining the other employees:

Hiss MOSFOWITZ stated that there were also a couple of young draftsmen brought in to work on the Chinese contract, but they did not stay long and she cannot know recall their names.

Miss MCSKOWITZ advised that she believes most of the employees were hired through advertisements in the "New York Times" and the technical magazines. She stated that MCDEAN did most of the hiring and that Mr. BROTHKAN was not pleased about some of them. She advised that ROLF WOLLAN came from the midwest and she believes the others were from New York City. Concerning HARRY GOLD, she stated that he had known Mr. BROTHKAN before. GOLD was pleased to have had considerable chemical laboratory experience and them Mr. BROTHKAN thought that he would be a good person to run the laboratory. GOLD was employed from about June 1946 to May or June 1948.

The Chinese contract ended in approximately September, 1947, but was successful in that the materials were produced, but the firm lost money on the deal, according to Miss MOSKOVITA.

TORCHIES dropped out of the firm at the time the firm moved to their present location in Long Island, which was about October 1946. He remained in the 52nd Street office and is still there.

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WOLLAN dropped out of the firm a few weeks after KORCHIEN did. He received a teaching job.

MIRIAN MOSKOWITZ became a partner about the time the firm moved to Long island. She stated that the firm was unable to meet a payroll and that she had put \$500.00 of her own savings into the company's fund to meet the payroll and that she later on put in money up to about a thousand dollars. She was made a partner as "some sort of a recard".

KORCHIEN received no return when he dropped out of the line. It was felt that KORCHIEN had not contributed material to the company as he was engaged in his own architectual work.

BARISH received \$500. or \$600. at the time he left.

COMPANY vas broke at the time.

VAGO dropped out in June, 1948 and received nothing. BROTHMAN was broke at the time, using his own savings to run the company.

After the Chinese contract ended about September of 1947, the laboratory carried on in the development of the various steps of manufacturing lucite, the idea being to obtain patents under various steps used to develop the product.

SILBERSTIIF left the laboratory about June 1947. ROLF WOLLAW left a few weeks later. GERSON left in the winter of 1948. MANUELECES had left the company before the firm moved to Long Island in October, 1946. ROHALL left the firm in June of 1947, stayed away about a month and then returned. He was working for a chemical engineer degree and wanted to get experience in design work. He stayed with the firm until February or March of 1949.

At attorney by the name of SERGE JARVIS was helping the firmwork on the negotiations with the Chinese, but he was "dropped" before the Chinese contract was signed.

vho handled the company's books in both the 32nd Street address and in Long leland City. HALPERN was in business by himself with an office and residence in Hanhattan. He is described as: in 60's; 5' tall; very tiny and very thin; were thick lensed glasses; grey hair.

When the name was suggested to her. Miss MOSKOVITZ stated that BERNARD MISHKIN was associated with the company about October, 1946. He was a "contact man" who knew several rich people and was going to be a sales representative. She stated that nothing ever came of MISHKIN'S association with the company. She advised that he took a trip to England in the spring of 1947 and came back with a large contract with an English firm for the development of a methacrylate process. This contract was cancelled by the English firm a few weeks later due to monitary difficulties with the British Government. MISHKIN was described as: 38 (1950), 510° tall, 160 lbs.; blond curly hair; slender build; wore well tailored suits; wore glasses for reading.

Miss MOSKOWITZ advised that the names FRANK REPPLER and FRANK KESSLER mean nothing to her. She had never heard of them.

The present accountant for the firm is DAVID LICHTNAN of the firm of WARTIN B. GETTET on 5th Avenue. New York City. The firm's bank account

of MARTIN B. GETTRY on 5th Avenue, New York City. The firm's bank account is presently located in the Mational City Bank, Queens Plaza Branch. It was formerly located at the Mational City Bank, 32nd Street Branch.

Miss MOSKOWITZ has no bank account at the present time. She has a small savings account at the Empire City Savings Bank, 33rd Street and Park Avenue, New York City. She has always filed her federal income tax return at either 110 Livingston Street, Brooklyn, or at 45th Street, Manhattan. She recalls that she did not file one in 1946 or 1947 due to the financial losses she had taken in the company. All state tax returns have been filed in Albany, New York. She has never filed a tax return in New Jersey.

Of the photographs shown to her. Miss MOSKOVITZ picked out the photograph of HARRY GOLD, but stated that she did not think it was a good picture of him, did not look like him, and that he certainly was not 55° tall. She picked out the picture of HIZABETH BENTLEY and stated that she recognized it from having been published in the newspapers.

Niss MOSKOWITZ furnished the following information concerning the background of BEOTHHAM'S partners:

RORCHIEN - born upstate New York; father deceased; sister a dancer, a social butterfly type; was not in Armed Service; single; now about 50 years old; mature personality; does not know how he met BROTHMAN; belongs to professional architects organizations; knows of no other organizations to which KORCHIEN belonged.

BARISH - came from west; went to school in California; father and mother were teachers; middle name is ZOLA; lost a thumb in a machine shop when young; has two children; BARISH and BROTHMAH had known each other before; knew of no organizations to which BARISH belonged.

VAGO - Rungarian accent; wore glasses; thin hair, almost bald; went to school in Europe at University of Budapest; has two children to which devoted; man for details; childish in some respects; believes he knew Mr. KORCHIEN; knew of no organization to which VAGO belonged.

WOLLAN - from midwest; a teacher at one time; father was a school teacher; WOLLAN'S wife from midwest; had one child; possibly knew BROTHKAN before; knew of no organizations to which WOLLAN belonged.

None of BROTHMAN'S partners were in the Armed Forces.

Miss MOSKOWITZ furnished the following information concerning HARRY GOLD; she had not known him prior to the time he came with the firm in May or June 1946.

or May 1946 before working at the laboratory, but did not know how he came into contact with BROTHMAN. She first became aware of his name when discussions were held concerning the need of a chemist in the laboratory and Mollimanne was variously as a good wants head the Kab.

When GOLD came with the firm from Philadelphia, he spoke of his wife whom he described as a tall beautiful redheaded girl who had formerly been a model with Gimbels. He often spoke of his twins, ESSIE and DAVID, and on one occasion pulled out his wallet to show Miss MOSKOWITZ a picture of them, but put it back immediately, stating he apparently did not have the pictures with him. GOLD apparently talked to the others in the lab about his wife and children and according to Miss MOSKOWITZ appeared to be very devoted to them. He also said he had a brother who was a paratrooper who had been killed in the Pacific.

In 1947, 1948 in filling out a withholding income tax form, Miss MOSKOWITZ asked how many dependents to put down. GOLD said one and when she suggested his wife and children should be put down as dependents, he became hysterical. Miss MOSKOWITZ was suspicious at this time as to the existence of GOLD'S family.

MOSKOWITZ visited GOLD when his mother died and met his brother who was supposed to have been killed. There was no evidence of any wife or children. She was convinced that they were not existent. The mother died in the winter or spring of 1948.

WOSKOVITZ believed that GOLD originally agreed to come on whatever salary could be paid him and he had received about \$100. per week. The apparently had no other income of his own. Sometime in 1947, the firm MENO ... 100-95068

went absolutely broke and GOLD agreed to stay on in the expectation of eventually receiving his calary and obtaining a share in whatever proceeds might be made. However, his salary was never paid and the firm now owes him approximately \$2500.00 for about one half year's wages. During this flatter period, GOLD had to repay a loan to a bank and he was "frantic for cash". NOSKOWITZ knew no further details regarding this, however, she believed that he possibly borrowed from his brother and father to obtain such of his living expenses during this time. In June, 1948, GOLD went back home to Philadelphia. His father and brother wanted him to come back and for this reason, he left the firm.

MOSKOWITZ recalled that in the summer of 1947 one PRILIP LEVINE started to hang around the laboratory and he eventually was hired towork in the lab. LEVINE, whose home originally was in Boston, had previously worked at a hospital and also at a private lab in New York City. He had a wife, a child, and got an apartment in Forest Hills in the vicinity where Mr. VAGO lived. The possibility of a job with the firm was apparently suggested to him by Mr. VAGO. He was described as 30 (1948); 6' tall; 180 lbs.; medium build; black curly hair; no glasses. LEVINE, GOLD and VAGO left the employment of the firm about the same time.

With regard to travel, MOSKOWITZ stated that EROTHMAN did all of the travelling for the firm and the partners never did any travelling. She indicated travelling done by years as follows:

1945-1946 - She knew of no travel.

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1947 - In the summer of 1947, BROTHMAN began to make trips to Philadelphia in connection with a contract with the Stanton Laboratories with which the contract was finally signed in November of that year.

EROTHMAN drew up a brochure giving him authority to negotiate and POMERANIEC returned to Europe. The firm occasionally received a few letters from him and he wrote sometime in 1947 of negotiations with a Swiss firm, Lonza, a major chemical and electrical firm in Switzerland located at Basale. In connection with negotiations with this latter firm, BEOTHMAN and Miss MOSKOWITZ went to England in May 1948 meeting Dr. POMERANIEC in London. The following day they went to Switzerland where they stayed at Fitznow for several weeks. Negotiations were not concluded then and BEOTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ returned to the United States in the beginning of June 1948. Discussions were continued by mail.

ASSOCIATES agent, signed a contract with Lonza in June 1949, BROTHMAN and MOSKOWITZ went to London, England, where they stayed two or three days. Regotiations were conducted with Imperial Chemicals Industries and a possible contract with this company is now pending. From London, they went to Switzerland where they stayed four weeks. They then returned to Paris four days, London two days, returned to the United States at the end of July.

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BROTHMAN made a trip to St. Louis about five months ago in connection with a contract for industrial process engineers at Newark.

Neither BROTHMAN or Niss MOSKOVITZ ever went to Canada. MOSKOVITZ never heard of EMIL JULIUS KLAUS FUCHS, except what she read recently in the newspapers. She stated that she would never have believed it if she had not seen FUCHS! statement in the papers.

Hone of the partners ever made any trips to Canada as far as Miss NOSAOWITZ knew. She did not know of any travel made by any of the employees excepting GOLD frequently went to Philadelphia over the weekends apparently to see his family, during the time he was employed with the firm.

Yith reference to R.V. RAHANI, he came from India from a firm for whom BROTHMAN and ASSOCIATES did a lot of work on an original \$500.00 fee basis. Later the work expanded so that about \$10,000.00 was expended by the firm, and although they billed the Indian Company for this amount they NIKO NT 100-95068

were only paid the original \$500.00 fee. This is the Seshasayu Brothers, Ltd., Trichinopoly, South India. RAKANI was sent to them for training.

Vith reference to laboratories known to MOSKOWITZ, she stated that other than as previously indicated, she only knew of the small laboratory conducted by Dr. LUDWIG ROSKESTEIF located in the same building on West 32nd Street as ABE EROTHMAN and ASSOCIATES had been located. BROTHMAN frequently met Dr. ROSENSTEIN for lunch and this was purely a contact as between two professional men. The firm never did any work in ROSENSTRIN'S lab and there were no connections between the two. ROSENSTRIN was with the Texas Company and is now in California.



GRANVILLE, 7/18/50, which reflects that HENRY RICHMOND, 2011 Broadway, NYC, had advised him that a telephone operator at the Spencer Arms Hotel had remarked that she recognized the photograph of EMIL FUCHS as being an individual who contacted a girl residing at the Spencer Arms Hotel.

On 7/19/50 Mr. HENRY RICHMOND, Surrier, 2014 Broadway, New York City, advised that a Miss PARKER, telephone operator at the Spencer Arms Hotel, 69th Street and Broadway, NYC, had informed him that when EMIL FUCHS, Soviet espionage agent, was arrested in England and his photograph was published in New York newspapers she and the other hotel switchboard operator recognized him as being the individual who contacted a woman named RAY LEV, a resident of the Spencer Arms Hotel. RICHMOND said LEV is a prominent concert planist and is well known as a Communist in the Spencer Arms Hotel and that she was a candidate for the City Council on the Communist ticket in NYC in 1949. RICHMOND stated that Miss PARKER was on vacation and could not be interviewed until July 24, 1950.

On July 21, 1950, Miss E. PARKER was interviewed and advised that when FUCHS' picture was published in NY newspapers a fellow employee, THOMAS RAIPH, switchboard operator at the Spencer Arms Hotel, brought this picture to her and stated that FUCHS looked like the man who called upon RAY LEV at the Spencer Arms Hotel. Miss PARKER stated that she agreed that it did but thought no more about it. Shown a picture of FUCHS, PARKER state that it resembled the individual she saw come into the Spencer Arms Hotel as announce himself on the house phone to RAY LEV. Miss PARKER could not place the approximate date of this individual's contacts with Miss LEV, could not describe his build or age, claimed to have never seen him without his hat and could not specifically identify FUCHS as the contact of LEV.

He recalled that when FUCHS' picture was published in the newspapers he showed it to Miss PARKER and told her that it looked like the man who contacts RAY LEV, a resident of the Spencer Arms Hotel. RALPH was certain that the only person he had ever seen who resembled FUCHS was Miss FELICINAD's paramour and was sure that he was only between 20 and 25 years of age. He stated that he did not believe he had ever seen FUCHS.

It was apparent from the above interviews that Miss PARKER was repeating information that she had received from THOMAS RALPH. Inasmuch as RALPH has stated that the individual he had in mind as resembling FUCHS was the aforementioned Spaniard, who is at present residing at the Spencer Arms Hotel, he cannot be identical with EMIL FUCHS, who is now in England. It is also pointed out that EMIL FUCHS is about 39 years of age while RALPH has stated that the Spaniard is only 20 to 25 years of age.
