RE: KRISTEL HEINEMAN

Mr. Fletcher was informed at 3:30 PM that arrangements had been made to have ROBERT BLOCH HEINEMAN interviewed at the Huron Self-Service Store, Cambridge, Mass., where he works between 4 and 5 PM each day, and if possible to interview him in the office; that SA E.S. Gordon had already determined that KRISTEL was an inmate at the Westboro State Hospital for the mentally diseased.

Gordon's contact there was with a [REDACTED] who was questioned regarding the possibility of interviewing KRISTEL. In talking to Gordon he informed me [REDACTED] efforts had been made by the hospital authorities to determine the reasons for her insanity. [REDACTED]

Gordon states this was not revealed in an inquiry there.

He, according to Gordon, could very well have been a courier but he has frequently absented himself from his home while traveling with his pervert friends.

[REDACTED] They further stated her father had been in this country a short while ago but had returned. They further stated HEINEMAN is very conscious of his Jewish background and this should be borne in mind when he is being interviewed. He or she has a brother in the Russian Zone of Germany.

This information was furnished to Mr. Fletcher and he was advised we should contact the doctor before conducting any interview and be governed by his decision. However, the interview with the husband would go on as scheduled at 5:15 PM.

Gordon advised the office he had been in touch with Dr. Hadley who told him he could see no harm in interviewing her, although he considered her obstinate and probably not one willing to cooperate.

Immediately after this call Mr. Fletcher was advised permission had been granted to interview her and that an attempt would be made to interrogate her. He stated he saw no harm in making known to her that we had received information her brother had been active in undercover Communist work in Germany. He was also told that in all probability we would interview LAFAZANOS since he might have some information of value to our inquiry. He saw no objection to this either. Gordon told me he thought this person was living in Lowell. A check at Harvard indicates the last address they had for him in 1939 was 27 Church St., Pittsfield, Mass. No record of a telephone is listed under the name LAFAZANOS at Lowell or Pittsfield, Mass.

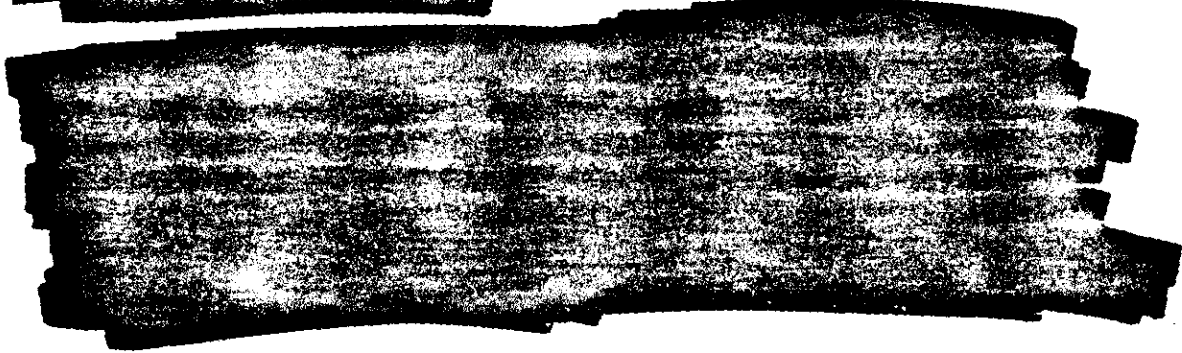
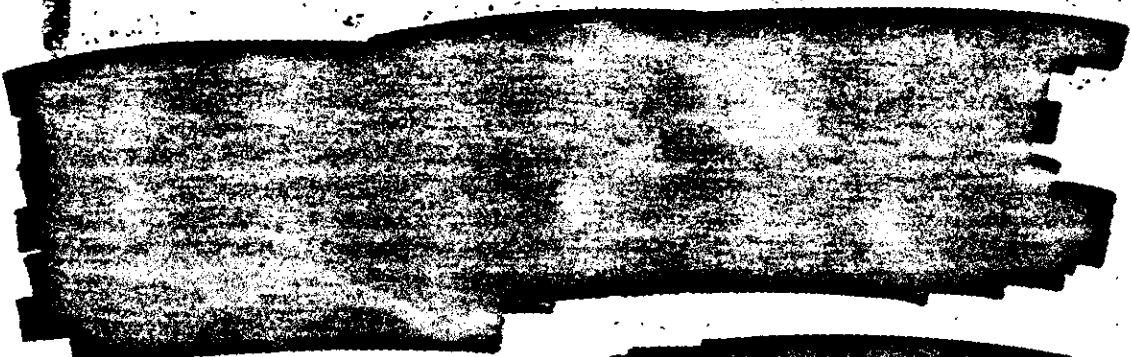

He informed me SA Charles E. Pelletier is familiar with this matter and that it should be considered extremely confidential, adding that FUCHS has confessed Soviet espionage from the end of 1941 to February, 1949, and has admitted furnishing the Soviets with complete atomic bomb know-how from Los Alamos. He said he had only one contact in the U.S. but he has not furnished identifying data regarding this contact.

FUCHS also said KRISTEL HEINEMAN, who is his sister, did not engage in Soviet espionage but did say she may have witnessed contacts he, Fuchs, had with contact man.

FUCHS admits to meetings with the contact man on the street when he, Fuchs, was visiting the Heinemanns at Cambridge, Mass., and sets the date as February, 1945. He further said that KRISTEL HEINEMAN, his sister, had knowledge of his undercover work in Germany and therefore if she witnessed his contacts, as indicated above, she may have surmised his espionage activity.





Instant subject was interviewed at Boston Division Offices between 10:00 and 11:30 PM Feb. 4, 1950 by SAs RICHARD E. DON and the writer. The following represents a concise summary of the interview and was furnished to Assistant Director H. W. FLETCHER telephonically last night at 12:20 AM.

HEINEMAN at last admitted his own affiliations with the Communist Party in Cambridge and confirmed the fact that his Party name is ROBERT MILL. He admitted that he had attended meetings during the 1940's and that meetings had been held at his home. He admitted formal membership in 1947 and denied it in 1944. He states, however, that he was a member in 1943 and that any Party official might well have re-registered him in 1944 without his knowledge. He states that he still regards himself as a Communist and that he holds many of its ideals very highly. He stated that throughout his Party experience he had always experienced difficulty in adjusting his own personality to the discipline of the organization, i.e. intellectual discipline.

HEINEMAN, however, still refused to identify his associates in the Party.

With reference to KLAUS FUCHS, HEINEMAN asserted that FUCHS did visit his home at 144 Lakeview Street between Feb. 12 or 13 and Feb. 22 or 23, 1945. He can recall that he attended the Ice Follies with FUCHS, his wife KRISTEL, and CONSTANTIN LAPAZANOF. During this particular visit, at the request of FUCHS, he drove FUCHS to Buckingham Street in Cambridge, Mass. He drove FUCHS to this address so that FUCHS might meet with HARPIN DEUTSCH. He personally did not then meet DEUTSCH and has never met DEUTSCH.

With reference to DEUTSCH, HEINEMAN provided the following information. DEUTSCH is related in some fashion to TED VELDPORT's wife's family. In 1944, summer, HEINEMAN rented a cottage at Dennisport through the efforts of Mrs. ROCK (phonetic - TED VELDPORT's mother-in-law). HEINEMAN himself remained in Cambridge at summer school and his family was at the Dennis location. HEINEMAN has a dim recollection that DEUTSCH and his family visited KRISTEL HEINEMAN during that summer. The recollection is dim because it is predicated on a now almost forgotten statement to that effect made by Mrs. HEINEMAN to her husband. Their marital relations at that time were very strained and there was little conversation.

HEINEMAN, with reference to the Feb. 1945 visit, can recall that the HEINEMAN family's association with DEUTSCH was predicated upon the intimate association of KRISTEL FUCHS and DEUTSCH rather than upon the association with the VEIDENFORD family and ROBERT HEINEMAN. It is noted that HEINEMAN could not recall DEUTSCH's first name nor that of his wife. He did identify DEUTSCH as the son of a doctor and a woman psychiatrist who resided in his immediate area. (It is noted that file 116-763 shows MARTIN DEUTSCH's residence address to be on Buckingham St., Cambridge; that the PSQ form identifies the first names of his parents; that the 1944 Cambridge City Directory in the office reflects the parents to have the occupation attributed to them by HEINEMAN).

HEINEMAN could further recall that at some time in the summer, most likely of 1946, Mrs. MARTIN DEUTSCH, while pregnant, resided with the HEINEMANS at 94 Lakeview Street, Cambridge. This arrangement, of a temporary nature, was made solely by KRISTEL HEINEMAN and out of appreciation of her brother's friendship with the DEUTSCHs.

HEINEMAN can recall that FUCHS visited his home at 94 Lakeview in late June or very early July 1946. HEINEMAN had just completed his teaching duties at Intrin, New Hampshire. On the occasion of this visit, FUCHS took his sister, KRISTEL, on a flying trip to Schenectady, New York to visit a scientific friend. Although it was described at the time as a pleasure trip for KRISTEL, it was so quickly that FUCHS and KRISTEL were only gone for a day or two. It is HEINEMAN's recollection that they may have flown to Schenectady and returned; that he had to mind the children and that he had his "friend", CONSTANTIN, in the house to mind the children. It is HEINEMAN's best but not positive recollection that the man visited in Schenectady was HANS BETHE of Cornell.

In reference to VICTOR WEISSHOFF, HEINEMAN can recall that on some one of his visits to Cambridge, he borrowed WEISSHOFF's automobile; that sometime, probably two years ago, his wife noted WEISSHOFF's picture in the Boston Herald and commented that she had met WEISSHOFF through her brother KLAUS and that WEISSHOFF and KLAUS were friendly.

SA R. . . and the writer on 2/5/50 interviewed instant subject at the Westboro State Hospital, Westboro, Mass., in the presence of Dr. ROLLINS K. HADLEY, Supervisor of the Hospital. The interview began at approximately 12:20 p.m., and ended at approximately 1:45 p.m. In contrast with the interview of the same person under the same circumstances by the writer and SA O'LALOR on 2/2/50, instant subject appeared to be generally confused. It is noted that she is receiving treatment because her mental illness had caused confusion in her mind as to time, persons and places. In contrast with the interview of 2/2, Dr. HADLEY stated instant subject on this occasion showed many of the described tendencies.

With reference to subject KLAUS FUCHS, Mrs. HEINEMAN today stated that she first saw him in the U.S. at Christmastime 1943. She stated that this visit occurred shortly after his arrival in the U.S. She recalled no additional details concerning the meeting of Dec. 1943.

Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that she next saw FUCHS in Feb. 1945 at 94 Lakeview, Cambridge. On this date she recalled that WENDELL and BETTY FURRY had called at the HEINEMAN home during FUCHS' visit. She further stated that Dr. and Mrs. HOWARD CARYBURY had also visited them. She denied that she had ever been visited by IRVING HALPERIN. She at first stated that MARTIN DEUTSCH, and it is noted that she does not recall the first name with any degree of accuracy, also visited the HEINEMAN home in Feb. 1945. Subsequently or at a later point in the interview, she denied that DEUTSCH had ever contacted her and her brother prior to the summer of 1947. She insisted that in Feb. 1945 she, her brother KLAUS and her children spent a day traveling to the beach at Ipswich, Mass. He and she also accompanied them and they met no one. She specifically denied that she attended the Ice Follies with anyone in 1945 and asserted that the first time she had ever seen such a show in her life was in 1948. She expressed the opinion that it was possible that her brother might have taken one or more of her children to the Ice Follies in 1945 but she has no memory of such an event.

Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that KLAUS FUCHS did visit her at Cambridge, Mass., sometime in the latter part of June 1946 for about a week. She was then living at

94 Lakeview. She denied, however, that this visit was the occasion of their mutual trip to Schenectady, N.Y. She had, as a matter of fact, no memories of what he might have done while in Cambridge in June 1946.

Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that KLAUS FUCHS came to the U.S. at sometime during the summer of 1947. He came on a mission for his British agency and arrived at Washington, DC. He proceeded from Washington to the HEINEMAN home at 94 Lakeview, Cambridge, and spent a few days with them. On this visit, according to Mrs. HEINEMAN, FUCHS had to make a trip to Schenectady, N.Y. He was going to visit a scientist who had been with him at Los Alamos, and she, according to her, was a very important man. She, however, could not recall the name of this individual. Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that she and FUCHS left Boston on an evening train and arrived in Schenectady, N.Y., on the following morning. Her brother left her in a drugstore not far from the railroad station. He took a cab to visit the unidentified scientist. With reference to the latter, she states that the man was professionally a teacher who had accepted a one year employment with a company having offices in Schenectady. She could not recall the name of the company.

Several hours after he had left her, FUCHS returned and they took a bus to the unidentified scientist's home on the outskirts of the city. They had dinner at this man's home and met several students who had called to see him, i.e., the unidentified scientist. She does not recall the name of any person outside of her brother in connection with this trip. She and FUCHS considered an airlight to Boston but because of misty weather conditions they finally took an overnight train. Her explanation for this rather unusual trip in so far as she was concerned was that her brother simply desired to get her away from her home and children where things had been somewhat difficult for her.

With reference to this visit in the summer of 1947 of FUCHS, Mrs. HEINEMAN states that during the same summer she is of the dim recollection that she also met MARY HALPERIN. She can recall that MARY HALPERIN on the occasion of this meeting, and it is the only time she has met her, was concerned about her husband's future employment. Mrs. HEINEMAN does not associate MARY HALPERIN with subject FUCHS and does not believe that FUCHS saw MARY HALPERIN or necessarily knew of her being in Cambridge.

Mrs. HEINEMAN further states that in the summer of 1947, MARTIN DEUTSCH inquired as to when her brother might be in Cambridge. When FUCHS did arrive, she and Mrs. HEINEMAN visited the DEUTSCH home to make his presence in Cambridge known to the DEUTSCHES. Mrs. HEINEMAN claims she had never met DEUTSCH before this. She had met his wife through mutual friends, the GRUBBLY ROCKLINS, and because all 3 families had some connection with the Shady Hill School.

The first day Mrs. DEUTSCH visited the HEINEMAN home and invited KLAUS FUCHS to her home for dinner. Mrs. HEINEMAN states that KLAUS FUCHS accepted the invitation and went to the DEUTSCH home for dinner. He was not accompanied by either Mrs. HEINEMAN or her husband.

When FUCHS left Cambridge in the summer of 1947, he went to Montreal, Canada, in furtherance of his British mission and then returned to England.

With reference to the prior association of HALPERIN and FUCHS, Mrs. HEINEMAN stated on this occasion that she heard that her brother was interned in a German alien camp in Canada. She roughly places this as April, 1942, and stated he was in the camp for one year. She discussed the matter with the FUCHSs, who stated that they had a brother-in-law, now but not then known to her as ISRAEL HALPERIN, and that they would write and have HALPERIN contact FUCHS. HALPERIN did so. Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that during the year of her brother's internment she sent him cigarettes and books directly and not through any intermediary. She further stated that she received but one letter from her brother during that year of incarceration.

The picture of GERHARDT WOLLAND was exhibited to her along with other photographs. She did not know him. It is noted that ROBERT HEINEMAN also failed to identify WOLLAND.

With reference to other persons known to be acquainted with subject FUCHS, Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that the name HANS BETHE meant nothing to her. Neither did the names ROBERT MARSHAK and RICHARD FEYNMAN. With reference to VICTOR WEISSKOPF, Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that before World War II, a Czechoslovakian, named WEISSKOPF, had addressed a gathering of students of German origin at the Parker House in Boston. She was of the recollection that said WEISSKOPF was affiliated in some capacity with Harvard University. It is noted that prior to World War II, VICTOR WEISSKOPF was not in this area and he has never been affiliated with Harvard University.

Out of the questioning of her concerning other descriptive notes bearing upon the identity of the unknown subject in this case, Mrs. HEINEMAN recited the following:

Approximately 3 weeks before KLAUS FUCHS' visit in Cambridge in Feb. 1945, a chemist rang her doorbell and asked if KLAUS had arrived. He introduced himself as a chemist who had worked with KLAUS and she is under the impression that he worked at Los Alamos. Questioning revealed that there was no basis in fact now known to her for this assumption. The unidentified chemist visited with her and her children. At first she stated that this man was associated with Harvard, but upon questioning she declared that he had stopped in Cambridge

between trains. She gave him lunch and aside from her and her children, no one else was present. She advised this chemist that her brother was expected within a certain calendar date.

On the second day after FUCHS' arrival at the HEINEMAN home, the same chemist referred to above, rang her doorbell and met her brother. Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that he spent about 15 minutes in her living room with her brother and that they did not appear to know one another well. She stated she did not listen to their conversation, although she was present in the immediate vicinity throughout. The chemist on this occasion brought candy for her children and a book, most likely entitled "Mrs. Palmer's Honey", for her. She does not know that the chemist received anything from FUCHS or gave anything to FUCHS. He was again apparently between trains, and left.

Sometime in the following few months, this same unidentified chemist again stopped at her home and made inquiry as to whether her brother would visit her in the near future. There was no knowledge of an impending visit at that time. She again gave the chemist lunch and again was alone with her children when he came. She has a dim recollection that her husband may have met this man as he left the house with a brief introduction.

Mrs. HEINEMAN described the unidentified chemist as follows: about 40 years of age; height, 5'8" to 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ "; build, stocky; weight, possibly 180 lbs.; hair, very dark brown, thin and not curly.

She can further recall that the unidentified chemist had a name which was "very American"; that he spoke with no traceable accent, and that somewhere she gathered the impression that he came from the vicinity of Chicago. She can further recall that on the occasion of his second or third visit, he promised her oldest boy STEPHEN that he would send him a chemistry set. The set has never arrived.

Mrs. HEINEMAN indicated that she might recall the name of the unidentified chemist if it was spoken to her. There also exists the possibility that she might recognize him from a photograph.

In view of the contradictions contained in the above to that material previously supplied by the same woman and the other witnesses interviewed in this case, it is difficult to evaluate with any certainty the foregoing material.

Congress Ponders Fuchs Extradition

Britain Is Unlikely To Turn Him Over

(Boston Herald-N. Y. Times Dispatch)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The Senate-House Committee on Atomic Energy is considering the possibility of trying to have Dr. Klaus Fuchs extradited to this country to answer charges that he passed atomic and hydrogen bomb secrets to the Russians.

However, there are doubts, even within the committee, that such an effort would be successful.

Senator McMahon, chairman, confirmed today that the committee had discussed the matter, and still had it under consideration. But in a cautiously-worded statement, he quoted staff lawyers as having "doubts" that the United States could make a strong claim to force the British scientist to come here.

Seized in London

Fuchs, a member of the British team of scientists who came to this country in wartime to help develop the atomic bomb was arrested on espionage charges in London last Friday.

Yesterday, the McMahon committee heard Lt.-Gen. Leslie R. Groves, who directed construction of the first atomic bombs, testify that Fuchs, while in this country in 1943 and afterward, had access to the "most vital weapons information." The scientist's arrest in London followed leads furnished by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, whose chief, J. Edgar Hoover, will testify at a closed session of the committee tomorrow morning.

Congress Eyes Claim on Fuchs

That the possibility of Dr. Fuchs' extradition to try him for possible violation of American laws had come before the committee was revealed first by Rep. Durham (D., N.C.)

McMahon was then asked about it, and in response issued this statement:

"Fuchs is a British subject and the British judicial processes seem to be working, and the British authorities seem to be on the alert.

"It is true that the matter of Fuchs' violation of our laws has been discussed in the joint committee. At my request, inquiries into the legal problems involved in his possible extradition have been made.

"I am informed by counsel for the committee that doubt exists in his mind as to whether or not the applicable extradition treaty between the United States and Great Britain would apply."

The "applicable treaty" is one signed by the two countries in 1931. It provides for the countries turning over to the other an exchange of persons wanted by either of the two countries for court action. Mostly, criminals are involved.

However, the treaty exempts persons already "tried, discharged or punished," or who are "still under trial" in the country where charges have been filed. Legal experts felt that Dr. Fuchs must certainly be considered "still under trial" in England. He therefore, appeared to be exempted from the treaty provisions.

The United States tried to invoke the same treaty last spring in the quite different case of Gerhart Eisler, so called "No. 1 Communist agent in the United States" who had jumped a \$23,500 bail after being convicted of perjury and contempt of Congress. Eisler, after stowing away on a Polish liner, was arrested by British police in Southampton where the boat docked en route to Poland.

The Department of Justice said it wanted Eisler back as a fugitive from justice, but an English court rejected the claim, and freed Eisler after stating the treaty didn't apply.

Fuchs, a native of Germany, is a British citizen. He was arrested on charges of violating Britain's Official Secrets Act.

Hoover, while testifying before a Senate appropriations sub-committee on Friday, is reported to have indicated there was evidence that the British scientist passed information on both the atomic and hydrogen bomb to Russia.

The FBI director will tell the McMahon committee all he knows about the case tomorrow morning. This will be behind closed doors.

Tuesday the committee will question Gen. Groves at a public meeting. The general's testimony Saturday was given to the senators privately.

At 9:45 a.m. on this date, the writer received a telephone call from former Special Agent JAMES F. MAHAN, a practicing attorney with offices at 31 State Street, Boston, Mass. He was calling from his home in Cambridge, telephone University 4-2046.

Through friends which MAHAN has in Cambridge, HEINEMAN was recommended to him and MAHAN told HEINEMAN that he could not represent him at this time and suggested that HEINEMAN come to the FBI Office and tell the Agents all that he knew concerning FUCHS. MAHAN stated that, in his opinion, HEINEMAN did not know very much concerning FUCHS, but that HEINEMAN had admitted to MAHAN that he had been a member of the Communist Party at one time.

MAHAN said he called this morning to say that HEINEMAN was very unstable and that he is under a doctor's care and that he has been treating with a psychiatrist, and the psychiatrist suggested that the Agents not interview him again for at least a week. MAHAN said that he talked with HEINEMAN this morning and that HEINEMAN could not remember any of the things he told the Agents when last interviewed.

MAHAN requested that HEINEMAN not be interviewed again for at least two days, when he might be in a better position to remember some of the things that the Agents asked him on the last interview.

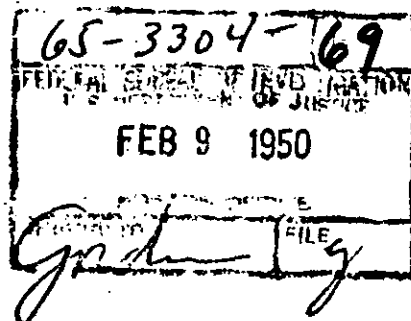

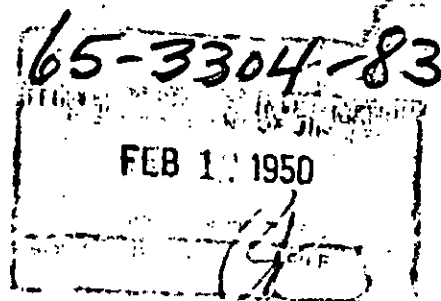

HEINEMAN HOME IN CAMBRIDGE

Residence of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Heineman at 94 Lakeview ave., Cambridge. Mrs. Heineman is a sister of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, betrayer of bomb secrets.

Dr. Klaus Fuchs, the German-born scientist, who has confessed he betrayed American and British atomic secrets, is the brother of Mrs. Kristel Heineman of 94 Lakeview ave., Cambridge, it became known last night.

Mrs. Heineman, wife of Robert B. Heineman, operator of a self-service laundry in Cambridge, is presently ill in a hospital. The Heinemans have three children.

For the past week FBI agents, it was learned in the neighborhood last night, have been in the vicinity seeking information about the meeting in Boston which Dr. Fuchs has said in England he held with Russian agents.

Neighbors of the Heineman family spoke highly of them last night and said they did not recall ever seeing Dr. Fuchs during 1945. Neighbors recalled seeing Dr. Emil Fuchs and a grandson at the Heineman home last summer. Dr. Fuchs, Sr., and the boy returned to Germany last fall.

Mrs. Heineman declined to discuss the relationships last night. Mrs. Heineman became ill several weeks ago.

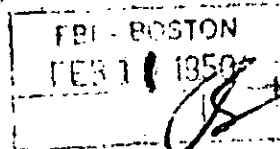

Steeled Self to Betrayal, For Love of Communism

LONDON, Feb. 10—The official report of London's historic Bow Street court — tribunal of beggars, pickpockets and murderers—contains for this date some vital source material for future historians of the dawning atomic age.

Given Refuge from Hitler's Persecution

Therein set down in scratchy longhand notes of the court stenographer is the story of how the United States and Britain believe that essential facts about the most closely guarded strategic secret of our time reached Soviet Russia from the lips of a scientific genius who sought refuge here from Hitler's Nazi Germany and then let loyalty to communism lead him to treason against the country that adopted him.

The man in the dock accused of a betrayal whose consequences may well change the course of history was a bespectacled, insignificant looking man of 38 named Klaus Emil Julius Fuchs, who was snatched from a British internment camp in 1942 and catapulted into the center of atomic research projects here and in the United States.

Schooled His Mind for Part

According to the confession which, it was said, he had made voluntarily he had so schooled his disciplined mind that he could swear allegiance in one breath and commit treason in the next without any qualm of conscience. His mental processes as depicted in this strange document

Fuchs Eyes Floor!

LONDON, Feb. 10—Dr. Klaus Emil Fuchs lowered his eyes to the floor today when the prosecution read the confession he was said to have made.

Whether he was a villain who had betrayed the country that gave him asylum from the Nazis, as the state contends, or the victim of circumstances as he, himself, asserts was left for a jury to decide when Sir Laurence Dunne, chief magistrate, who presided at today's preliminary hearing, committed Fuchs for trial at Old Bailey, London's central criminal court.

Throughout the hearing, which lasted two hours, Fuchs showed few signs of nervousness. Occasionally his cheeks would twitch slightly and his left hand would grip his knees. He would look up whenever a new point was reached in the prosecution's evidence and listened with an appearance of polite interest to three witnesses who testified against him.

Whenever a lengthy statement was reached such as his alleged confession, Fuchs would look downward, more in modesty, it appeared, than in shame.

Text of Dr. Fuchs' Confession Of Betraying Atomic Secrets

LONDON, Feb. 10—Following is a stenographic transcript of the portions of Dr. Klaus Fuchs' confession as read in court today by the prosecutor:

"AFTER MY RELEASE (from internment) I was asked to help Prof. Pyles in Birmingham on some war work. I accepted it without knowing at first what the work was but I doubt whether it would have made any difference to my subsequent action if I had.

"When I learned about the purpose of the work I decided to inform Russia and I established contact through a member of the Communist party. Since that time I have had continual contacts with persons completely unknown to me, except that they would give information to the Russians. At this time I had complete confidence in Russian policy and I had no hesitation in giving all the information I had.

DECEIVED FRIENDS

"I believed the Western Allies deliberately allowed Germany and Russia to fight each other to death. I tried to concentrate on giving information on the result of my own work. In the course of this work I began naturally to form bonds of personal friendship and I had to conceal from them my own thoughts.

"I used my Marxian philosophy to conceal my thoughts in two separate compartments. One side was the man I wanted to be. I could be free and easy and happy with other people without fear of disclosing myself because I knew the other compartment would step in if I reached the danger point. It appeared to me at the time I had become a free man because I succeeded in the other compartment of establishing myself completely independent of the surrounding forces of society.

"Looking back on it now the best way is to call it a controlled schizophrenia. In the post-war period I had doubts about Russian policy but eventually I came to the point when I knew I disapproved of many actions of the Russians. I still believed Russia would build a new world and that I would take part in it. During this time I was not sure I could give all the information I had, however. It became more and more evident that the time when Russia would spread influence all over Europe was far away. I had to decide whether I could continue to hand over information without being sure I was doing right.

"I decided I could not do so. I

did not go to one rendezvous because I was ill at the time and I decided not to go to the following one.

UNEXPECTED TURN

"Shortly afterwards my father told me he might be going to the Eastern zone of Germany. He disapproved of many things in Eastern Europe and had always done so and he knew that when he went there he would stay there. I could not bring myself to stop my father from going there. However, it made me face at least some of the facts about myself. I suppose I did not have the courage to fight it out myself, and therefore took it out of my hands by informing the authorities that my father was going to the Eastern zone.

"A few months passed and I became more and more convinced that I had to leave Harwell. I was then confronted with the fact that there was evidence I had given away information in New York. I at first denied the allegations made against me. I decided I would have to leave Harwell but it became clear that in leaving Harwell in these circumstances I would deal a great blow to Harwell and all the work I had loved and also leave suspicions against friends whom I had loved and people who thought I was their friend.

"I had to realize that the controlled mechanism had warned me of danger to myself. I realized that the combination of the three ideas which made me what I was wrong.

FEELS SORRY NOW

"That every single one was wrong and that there were certain standards of moral behavior that are in you and which you cannot disregard. I find that I myself was made by circumstances. I know that I cannot go back on that and I know that all I can do now is to try and repair the damage I have done. The first thing is to make sure that Harwell will suffer as little as possible.

"Before I joined the project, most of the English people with whom I had made contact were left wing and affected by similar philosophy. Since coming to Harwell I have met English people of all kinds and I have come to see in many of them a deep-rooted firmness which enables them to live a decent life."

(End confession.)

The prosecution said Fuchs read the statement, corrected it and then wrote on the last line: "I have read this statement and to the best of my knowledge it is true"

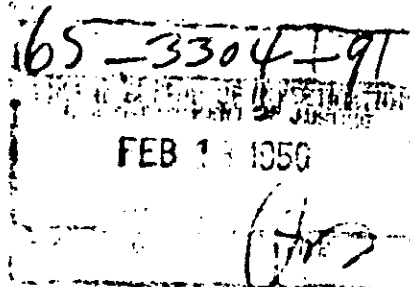

On February 10, 1950 at 5:30 P.M. Special Agent R. W. DOW and the writer interviewed KRISTEL HEINEMAN at the Westboro State Hospital, Westboro, Mass. The interview occurred in the presence of Dr. ROLLINS K. HEALEY, Director of the Hospital.

The interview was concerned with one item, i.e., the identity of the unidentified chemist referred to at Page 46 of the writer's report in this case dated February 9, 1950.

Mrs. HEINEMAN confirmed all of the information set forth at the above reference and added the following descriptive notes concerning the unknown subject:

The man was definitely about 40. He, when conversing with her, mentioned that he had more than one child. She is of the recollection that he had two. His children were then younger than her second child, MARCIA. MARCIA was then four and, accordingly, the unknown subject's children must have been then three and two or less. He also commented that he had a wife, but he furnished no information which would be descriptive of her.

KRISTEL HEINEMAN can remember further that the unknown subject walked up Lakeview Avenue to her home. She knows this because she was standing at a window and watched him approach, without realizing at that instant that he was coming to her house. When he rang her doorbell he first asked her if she were the Mrs. HEINEMAN who was a sister to KLAUS FUCHS. She admitted her identity and she knows that the man then introduced himself by name as a friend of her brothers. She could not recall the name.

Mrs. HEINEMAN further stated that the man on the occasion of his first visit stated he was tired from his long train ride and her best recollection is that he came from Chicago. She could provide no information with reference to Buffalo or Philadelphia.

Mrs. HEINEMAN further stated that when KLAUS FUCHS did arrive at Cambridge in February, 1945 he expressed surprise that the unknown subject had called at her home to find out when he would be present.

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FEB 15 1950

was further surprised that the man considered a meeting with him to be of so much urgency. She, therefore, she believes, advised [redacted] of the unknown subject's identity and the fact that he was looking FUCHS.

In an effort to refresh her recollection concerning the unknown subject's name, Mrs. HEINEMAN looked through the alphabetical listing of the Westboro telephone directory. There were no affirmative results. Photographs of ARTHUR P. WEBER, ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, MARTIN DEUTSCH, VICTOR WEISSKOPF, GERHARD WOLLAND and ALEXANDER BOGROW were exhibited to her. She stated that none of them were identical with the unknown subject or resembled him. She recognized the photographs of DEUTSCH and WEISSKOPF, but did not know their names. She promised to continue to think and to try and recollect the name of the unknown subject. She stated when she was able to recall the name or something similar to it, she would promptly advise Dr. HEALEY, who will, in turn, communicate with us.

KONSTANTIN LAFAZANOS was also with them and HEINEMAN is quite
in stating that FUCHS could not have visited him at the farm;
any visit of FUCHS to Boston in the summer of 1947 must have
occurred in the late summer.

HEINEMAN recalled the unidentified chemist at Page 46 of the
prior's report in this case dated February 9, 1950. He met the
man about three weeks after KLAUS FUCHS' visit with that person.
He would place this visit, which was the third in a series related by
himself, as occurring in the very last days of February, 1945 and first
days of March, 1945. HEINEMAN stated that this individual was at
his home on one noon hour for lunch. This was HEINEMAN's only meeting
with the man, and from what he has read in the press, he is convinced
that this is probably the contact man we seek. From this one meeting,
HEINEMAN provided the following descriptive notes concerning the
subject:

Age	In his 30's
Height	About 5'6"
Build	Stocky, but not appearing so
Face	Full, but features were fine
Hair	Dark, thin, receding hair- line giving impression at times of baldness
Complexion	Dark
Speech	In no way unusual
Dress	Conservative and good, probably wearing blue or gray worsted material with dull pattern.
Eyes	Wore glasses, but type not remembered.
Mannerism	Pleasant, affable, good personality.
Name	The first three letters of the last name were ROB

HEINEMAN's best recollection at this moment was that the un-
known subject's name was something similar to ROEKINS, ROBERTS or
ROBINSON.

HEINEMAN further remembered that in discussing the weather, the unknown subject had mentioned the tremendous amounts of snow he had seen in Buffalo; he also mentioned Philadelphia and HEINEMAN cannot recall that he mentioned Chicago at all.

HEINEMAN on this occasion was completely cooperative and volunteered to interrogate his son for any recollections he might have of the above individual, to further search his own mind for additional descriptive notes concerning this unknown subject. He, too, is of the opinion, if not recollection, that the unknown subject came to Boston by train.

Reference is made to the writer's earlier memo of this date, concerning the conversations of Attorney James F. Mahan with ROBERT HEINEMAN's psychiatrist.

At 11:30 A.M., February 14, 1950, Attorney MAHAN telephonically recontacted the writer and advised:

MAHAN had telephonically contacted HEINEMAN following his earlier conversation with the writer. He found HEINEMAN to be in a gracious and cooperative mood. HEINEMAN advised him that he had interviewed his boy, STEPHEN, in reference to the unidentified chemist, who had called the HEINEMAN home during the pertinent period and who had allegedly promised STEPHEN a chemistry set. STEPHEN was unable to recall the unidentified chemist in any manner whatsoever.

HEINEMAN stated that he had done considerably more thinking concerning this unidentified chemist and was now of the positive recollection that the man's first name was "JOSEPH". HEINEMAN further stated that in searching his recollection he had become even more convinced that the first three letters of the man's last name were "ROB--"

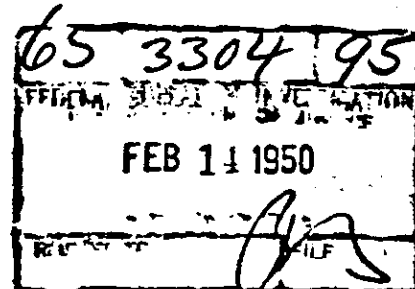
HEINEMAN stated that he wished to discuss some aspects of his personal situation further with MAHAN, and that an appointment was made for 9:00 P.M. on this date at the HEINEMAN home. With reference to the foregoing, it is noted that much of it represents the conclusions of the psychiatrist who does not possess all of the facts in this case and who, in fact, knows less about it than we do.

It must be further noted he interviewed HEINEMAN at a time when the latter had been through a great emotional strain. Prior to the interview with the psychiatrist, HEINEMAN had telephonically advised Attorney MAHAN that he could not recall what information he had furnished Special Agents GORDON and DOW.

MAHAN is recontacting HEINEMAN for the purpose of ascertaining what action he has taken to discover the information which may be in the possession of his son STEVEN concerning the identity of the unidentified chemist. At that time MAHAN will explore, in his capacity as attorney, the attitude of HEINEMAN toward another interview by Special Agent DOW and the writer within the next twenty-four hours.

He informed me SA Charles L. Pelletier is familiar with this matter and that it should be considered extremely confidential, adding that FUCHS has confessed Soviet espionage from the end of 1941 to February, 1949, and has admitted furnishing the Soviets with complete atomic bomb know-how from Los Alamos. He said he had only one contact in the U.S. but he has not furnished identifying data regarding this contact.

FUCHS also said KRISTEL HEINEMAN, who is his sister, did not engage in Soviet espionage but did say she may have witnessed contacts he, Fuchs, had with contact man.

FUCHS admits to meetings with the contact man on the street when he, Fuchs, was visiting the Heinemans at Cambridge, Mass., and sets the date as February, 1945. He further said that KRISTEL HEINEMAN, his sister, had knowledge of his undercover work in Germany and therefore if she witnessed his contacts, as indicated above, she may have surmised his espionage activity.

FUCHS will probably be arrested today in England and the report of his arrest may be reported later today or tomorrow, and it is reasonable to expect publicity in connection with this matter. Therefore, arrangements are to be made to have KRISTEL HEINEMAN and her husband interviewed immediately.

They should be interviewed separately and simultaneously, if possible. Only the most mature Agents should participate in the interview. They should make no reference to the arrest. There is a possibility she may have seen FUCHS make the contact or that she may have seen the individual with whom he was doing business, although he said he made his two contacts on the street.



Mr. Fletcher is desirous of being advised regarding our plans for the intended interview.

SA Thomas D. Manning and the writer conducted a surveillance of the home of MARTIN DEUTSCH, 43 Reservoir Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts, on Sunday, February 12, 1950. DEUTSCH remained at his home throughout the day. At 11:40 A.M., a 1948 Chrysler convertible coupe, Massachusetts registration 141-545, pulled up to the curb in front of the house and a middle-aged couple went into DEUTSCH's home carrying flowers and food. At 2:00 P.M., a 1948 Studebaker sedan, Massachusetts registration number 190-587, arrived at the DEUTSCH home and another couple entered. This was followed by a 1949 Willys Station Wagon, Massachusetts registration 939-151, and a girl approximately 28 years of age entered the home of DEUTSCH. All three cars left from 43 Reservoir Street, Cambridge, Mass., at 6:45 P.M., and DEUTSCH and his family were alone from that time on.

A check of the records of the Registry of Motor Vehicles, 100 Nashua Street, Boston, Mass., reflected the following information concerning the above-mentioned license plates.

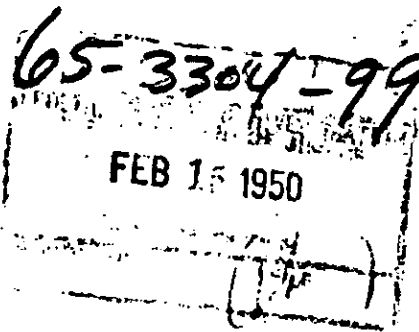

The Bureau's attention is further directed to its file on MANSON BENEDICT's brother, WILLIAM SIDNEY BENEDICT, was., Physicist, Commerce - LGE." The Boston Division submitted a report on July 12, 1948, by SA BRENTON E. GORDON on the latter case. It reflects that WILLIAM SIDNEY BENEDICT was acquainted with WENDELL HINKLE FURRY, a brother-in-law to ISRAEL HALPERIN. Thumbnail sketches of both FURRY and HALPERIN are contained at pages 50, 51 and 52 of the above mentioned report of SA GORDON in the HEINEMAN case.

ROBERT HEINEMAN, since the submission of SA GORDON's report concerning him, has admitted to GORDON that he belonged for many years to a Cambridge, Mass., branch of the Communist Party in which both Mrs. ANDER and Mrs. FURRY were members. He has attended meetings at the

homes of both. He is of the opinion, however, that Mrs. AMDUR has not been an active member for several years and he, himself, claims to have been inactive in the past two or three years. He notes further that he never actually knew WENDELL FURRY and ISADOR AMDUR as Communist Party members. They would absent themselves from their homes when meetings were held therein. He has a personal opinion that they were probably members predicated upon their wives' admission of membership, in their respective presence, and further their whole course of conduct as such as to demonstrate no hostility to the Communist Party, USA.

The foregoing would indicate that an associate of BENEDICT would be, or could be, at least passingly familiar with the circumstances in the HEINEMAN home and with the Party situation and intellectual circles in Cambridge, Mass.

Newark has been furnished with a copy of this letter because MANSON BENEDICT, according to information contained in the Boston file, resided as of 1947 at 465 Topping Hill Road, Westfield, New Jersey. Newark is requested to furnish a copy of a photograph of MANSON BENEDICT, if it has such in its possession.

It is further suggested that the New York Division might well find it profitable to review the above cited certification of the Smyth Report if it has not already done so inasmuch as it traces the beginnings and development of the process of thermal diffusion at Columbia, Kellogg, etc.

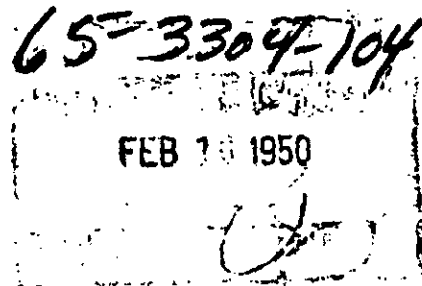

On the afternoon of February 15, 1950, the writer reviewed the underwriter's file on ROBERT HEINEMAN maintained at the Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company, 6 St. James Avenue, Boston, Mass. It is noted that this company is a Wisconsin concern and is not to be confused with the Employers Group Company on Kilby Street.

Mr. H. H. DENNISON, Manager of the Employers Mutual office, and Mr. LAWTON KINGSBURY made the file available for review. Mr. DENNISON stated that HEINEMAN, upon his arrival at Boston, had personally appeared at the Employers office and ordered his insurance. He selected this company because it was a Wisconsin one and his father had previously done business with them. His account has since been handled by a sales representative, Mr. GEORGE TARBELL of Lincoln, Mass., who has come to know HEINEMAN fairly well but not intimately. The file reflects the following matter of potential interest:

HEINEMAN purchased his present home at 94 Lakeview Avenue, Cambridge, Mass., on May 4, 1946. He purchased his farm at Bridgewater Corners, Vermont, on July 18, 1947. On approximately January 4, 1947, he telephonically contacted the Employers office to advise that he was going to Mexico; that he wished to have all floater type and liability insurance extended to cover him while in Mexico. The company representative at that time advised HEINEMAN that it would be necessary to secure home office approval and requested him to recontact the office in order to furnish his itinerary and Mexican address. HEINEMAN did not recontact the office and on approximately January 28, 1947, Mr. KINGSBURY telephonically communicated with Mrs. KRISTEL HEINEMAN in an effort to obtain the information. KINGSBURY was amazed to learn that Mrs. HEINEMAN had no idea as to her husband's then whereabouts and appeared to be grateful to know that he was in Mexico. A company representative from the home office in Wisconsin communicated with HEINEMAN's father in Hollywood, Fla., and obtained sufficient information to have the company issue the endorsements providing the desired coverage.

The file further reflects that on one or three occasions HEINEMAN has failed to pay his premiums by the due date and that the company has always been able to obtain the money immediately by communicating with GABRIEL HEINEMAN.

With reference to HEINEMAN's laundry business at 146 Huron Ave., Cambridge, the file reflects the following:

The business was initiated from the insurance records on approximately September 15, 1947, and operations ending on October 9, 1948; gross receipts were \$7,036.83; pay roll was \$2,256.25. The company auditors complained about the inadequacy of HEINEMAN's records and he stated that "records and papers confused him." The company representative noted the file to the effect that HEINEMAN was confused about a great number of things, when he experienced similar difficulty in obtaining figures for the period ending September 9, 1949. From October 9, 1948, to September 9, 1949, the business showed gross receipts of \$13,520.30, with a pay roll of \$7,019.41. The company auditors again complained about the inadequacy of HEINEMAN's records. To this point the business had been insured as a partnership between ROBERT HEINEMAN and his father, GABRIEL. When the company threatened to cancel the insurance in September, 1949, unless HEINEMAN mended his business methods, the business records were changed to reflect that GABRIEL HEINEMAN, effective October 19, 1949, became the sole owner of the business. GABRIEL HEINEMAN, therefore, became responsible for the records and the premiums. This arrangement apparently satisfied the Employers company.

The file further shows, in Mr. DENNISON's words, that HEINEMAN is a "worry wart." He has had a number of inconsequential accidents while driving his automobile, which have resulted in frequent telephone calls to the company. He was very much concerned during the past year lest the company would not insure, under its Employers Liability Group coverage, a woman employee who had a joint missing from her index finger. HEINEMAN has always been most prompt in initially advising the company of some situation effecting his insurance and has then failed utterly to answer any inquiries directed by the company to him concerning the same matter.

The Employers file further reflects with reference to fire and theft coverage that HEINEMAN purchased a new automobile in late May, 1949, which would be shortly after his wife's commitment to the Westboro Hospital. Strangely enough, it does not reflect the make of the automobile. The daily reports for the company's policies are maintained at Wisconsin and the latter information was gained from a congratulatory letter enclosing the policy from TARBELL to HEINEMAN.

The file also reflects that HEINEMAN leases the premises at 146 Huron Avenue from REBECCA EHRLICH, who is represented by GOLDBERG & GOLDBERG, attorneys, 6 Pemberton Square, Boston.

Special Agent RICHARD W. DOW and the writer on February 14, 1950 interviewed Mrs. KNISTEL HEINEMAN beginning at 3:30 PM and at the Westboro State Hospital. Dr. ROLLINS K. HADLEY was present for a large part of the interview.

Photographs of FEYNMAN, MORRISON, MARSHAK, WEISSKOPF, BETHE and WEBER were exhibited to her and no identifications were effected.

Reverting to the unidentified chemist mentioned in the writer's report dated February 9, 1950, page 46, Mrs. HEINEMAN furnished the following information additional to that set out.

Visit #1 - The unidentified chemist rang her doorbell; she answered; he asked if she were Mrs. HEINEMAN and the sister of KLAUS FUCHS. When she responded affirmatively he introduced himself by name, stated that he was a chemist who had worked with KLAUS and who was anxious to see him. At that particular moment, the children came in from school for lunch and she invited the unidentified chemist to join them. During the course of the meal he played with the children and learned from her the dates between which KLAUS was to visit her. He left a message with her to tell KLAUS that he would see him when KLAUS was next in Cambridge. The unidentified chemist then departed, and Mrs. HEINEMAN is under the definite impression he ^{was} ~~was~~ a bus destined for Harvard Square where he would catch further transportation for a railroad station. She is also under the definite impression he came from a long distance, possibly Chicago, and was very tired.

Visit #2 - When KLAUS FUCHS arrived, Mrs. HEINEMAN advised him of the unidentified chemist's first visit. KLAUS seemed very surprised and somewhat annoyed. KLAUS then said "Oh, it's all right. The second day KLAUS was in Cambridge, approximately February 14 or 15, 1945, the unknown chemist again called at the home. He called late in the afternoon, because Mrs. HEINEMAN recalled the children were home from school. He did not call so late, however, that it was dark and there was still light by which they could play outdoors. The chemist and KLAUS FUCHS talked to each other in the living room for a period of fifteen to twenty minutes. He brought the book and candy described in the earlier memos and then, after exchanging greetings with the children and herself, he again departed, apparently in the fashion of his first visit.

KLAUS FUCHS on his visit to Cambridge carried a small brief case, the contents of which were not known to Mrs. HEINEMAN at any time.

Third Visit - on the occasion of this interview, Mrs. HEINEMAN placed the third visit a few months later, possibly late April. She could not recall that spring had arrived in full bloom but it was close to the budding of the leaves, etc. He again asked for KLAUS and stayed for lunch. Mrs. HEINEMAN now has a faint recollection he again brought something as a gift for her and the children. She stated to him she did not know when she would see KLAUS again and now declared she never advised KLAUS of this third visit. Questioned repeatedly about the latter item, she stated she believed she did in some fashion, possibly in the summer of 1946, advise KLAUS of the third visit and this one had very much surprised and annoyed him. She was of the recollection on this occasion that the unidentified chemist seemed to know no one else in Cambridge.

She was also of the impression on this occasion she had advised KONSTANTIN IAFANZANOS about the first visit, approximately two weeks after it occurred. She also had the faint recollection KONSTANTIN might have been present with her husband on the occasion of the third visit for lunch. As she proceeded to develop these recollections she had a definite impression that she had informed KLAUS of the third visit when she next saw him and that KLAUS was annoyed.

Mrs. HEINEMAN stated she had never discussed the unidentified chemist with her father.

Mrs. HEINEMAN asserted that KLAUS had been anxious in February, 1945 to take Mrs. HEINEMAN and the three HEINEMAN children back with him to Los Alamos. He had not invited his brother-in-law because Mrs. HEINEMAN wanted to leave her husband.

Mrs. HEINEMAN is of the opinion that KLAUS probably knew that BOB HEINEMAN was in the Communist Party. On the other hand, she felt certain that BOB HEINEMAN had never known of KLAUS FUCHS' membership in the Party in Germany in 1933-1934. She stated no occasion had arisen which would cause them to converse about it.

In final reference to the unidentified chemist, Mrs. HEINEMAN stated that definitely KLAUS FUCHS knew him by name and it was not necessary for her to describe him further.

Dr. HADLEY advised that Mrs. HENRY T. CADBURY had called at the hospital to visit with KRISTEL on the afternoon of February 13. She was interviewed by Dr. HOLT who discovered she was well acquainted with the various members of the FUCHS and HEINEMAN families, knew their backgrounds and present whereabouts. She was dissuaded from visiting with KRISTEL on the theory that any visitors

at this time might upset Mrs. HEINEMAN.

Mrs. HEINEMAN had prepared letters to her children, to KLAUS FUCHS, Harwell, Borkshires, England; and to KLAUS FUCHS KITOWSKI, Odenwaldschule Oberhambuo, Post Heppenheim, AD Bergstrasse, American Zone Germany.

The first of the above letters of a purely innocuous character. The second was in German and to the writer's best knowledge indicated she was dissatisfied with being continuously absent from the children. She further asked KLAUS FUCHS to identify the man he had brought to her home. The third letter, to her nine or ten-year-old nephew was sealed. The doctor posted all letters after the above examination.

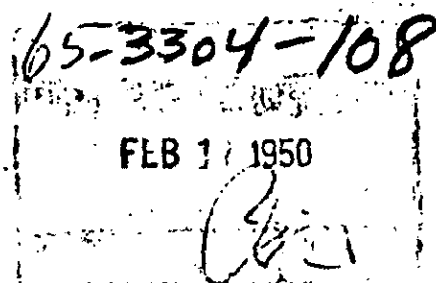

Former Special Agent JAMES F. MAHAN telephonically advised the writer at noon on February 15, 1950 that he had held a lengthy conference with ROBERT HEINEMAN between 9 PM and 1 AM on February 14, 1950. The men had discussed HEINEMAN's personal and financial difficulties and also the instant case. MAHAN said nothing additional to that previously developed in the course of interviews of HEINEMAN by the writer and Special Agent DON developed in the course of these conversations, excepting for the following:

HEINEMAN can now recall that when his wife was committed to Westboro he examined her personal effects in the process of cleaning up the house. He destroyed a number of letters and items of correspondence. One of these he can recall was a letter from KLAUS FUCHS to KRISTEL HEINEMAN. He knows it was one of the latest letters received by her from KLAUS but he cannot fix the exact time of its receipt. The letter was of a general personal nature and made no comments with reference to his work or philosophic beliefs. It contained a postscript in which KLAUS asked to be remembered to persons whom he had met while in Cambridge and to members of the HEINEMAN family. The last named on the list of those whom he asked to have his greetings extended was "JOSEPH ROB-----". It is the recollection of this letter which caused ROBERT HEINEMAN to recall the name of the unidentified chemist whom he had met in the early spring of 1945.

MAHAN in the course of the conversation had an opportunity to query HEINEMAN with reference to the name "MAYNARD." HEINEMAN had absolutely no recollection of this name with reference to either the instant case or any other of his acquaintances. MAHAN then rechecked with the psychiatrist, BILINSKI (phonetic), and learned that the latter had prepared his notes on his interview with HEINEMAN after the interview and also after some other event, possibly a sermon. MAHAN is, therefore, of the impression that "MAYNARD" is a fiction of the psychiatrist's mind. MAHAN further advised that HEINEMAN had stated that his father-in-law EMIL FUCHS had received a charge card, bearing serial #E-11559 from the Hotel Bristol, 122-124 West 49 Street, New York 19, New York. HEINEMAN, after advising MAHAN of this, has destroyed the card.

Re: KRISTEL HEINEMAN

DONAL M. SULLIVAN, Boston Globe reporter, visited the office on February 17, 1950, at which time he told the writer he had ascertained that KRISTEL HEINEMAN had been committed to an insane hospital in Massachusetts, and he understood she was a schizophrenia or dementia praecox. He also understands that her mother committed suicide and that his sister who was allegedly killed in Berlin by a train, probably committed suicide.

In view of the alleged mental instability of FUCHS family, SULLIVAN is in the process of preparing a newspaper story, the scope of which he advised would be roughly as follows:

- (1) That various members of the FUCHS family were insane.
- (2) A recitation of certain facts which would tend to indicate that many intellectuals are of a frustrated nature which would include the public's idea of "long-haired intellectuals" and indicate that such odd people, who become scientists, constitute a definite security problem.
- (3) A reference to the Chandler and Best Treason Cases and the fact that one of the defendants refused to go along with an insanity plea.
- (4) A background of psychiatric case work which he claims he picked up in his experiences while in the Army in the Greenland theatre.

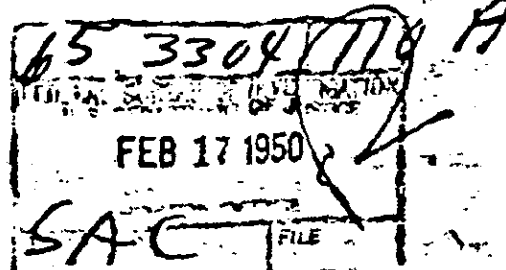
SULLIVAN stated that he did not know where KRISTEL HEINEMAN was confined and also not particularly interested. He stated that he does confidential work for the Commissioner of Mental Health of Massachusetts, Dr. PERKINS.

In view of the foregoing, he stated he thought he could construct a story and there is a possibility that he may have access to files of the department of Mental Health.

(1) SULLIVAN agreed that any story which he would print would not include references to the FBI other than that which has already appeared in the public press.

(2) He further agreed that his visit to the office this afternoon was "off the record."

SULLIVAN states that he is a Captain in the Coast Artillery Reserve

and is officer in charge of the Labor Section, 305th Military Group. He indicated that in the past he had connections which were left wing and that on one occasion while employed by the newspaper, a person by the name of MORGAN HALL, presently deceased, had endeavored to recruit him in the Communist Party. In this connection, he stated he was willing to make available to any Agent of this office information concerning his experiences while a member of this white collar union.

In conclusion, SULLIVAN advised that his reason for visiting the office on this date was that he wanted to be sure the printing of such a story would not embarrass a present investigation of this Bureau. He said further that in the event the FBI did not wish this story printed, because it might possibly embarrass a current investigation, he would take one of two courses of action: (1) either he would tell the Globe he was not writing it because the FBI had requested him not to print it; (2) or secondly, he would turn his story over to Mr. WINSHIP, the Managing Editor of the Globe, and he felt sure that Mr. WINSHIP would give the FBI whatever consideration might be necessary to protect any current investigation.

SULLIVAN said that he could be reached either through the Globe or at his home, telephone Wellesley 6-5433.

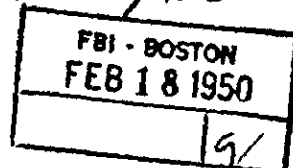

On the afternoon of February 15, 1950, SA MICHAEL W. 145 and the writer interviewed KONSTANTIN LAPAZANOS, 24 Millis Street, Lowell, Massachusetts.

LAPAZANOS was questioned specifically concerning any knowledge that he might have concerning the unidentified chemist [REDACTED]. It is noted that earlier Mrs. HEIDEMAN had stated that she had a faint recollection that LAPAZANOS might either have met the chemist or that she might have talked to LAPAZANOS about the chemist. The word "chemist" was not specifically mentioned, but LAPAZANOS was questioned regarding any scientists he might have met at the HEIDEMAN home who were acquainted with ELAINE FUCHS. The following represents a summary of LAPAZANOS' recollection: **51**

LAPAZANOS first met FUCHS approximately Christmas, 1943. In 1945, late January or possibly very early February, before FUCHS made the lengthy visit in February, 1945 to the HEIDEMAN home, LAPAZANOS met a scientist who was well acquainted with FUCHS. LAPAZANOS stated that he had come to the HEIDEMAN home on a morning in the wintertime to care for their children because the HEIDEMANS were going to visit the Judge Baker Guidance Center. His best recollection is that he arrived at about 11:00 AM and for lunch. While he was there, a person called at the house inquiring for FUCHS. LAPAZANOS states that this person was not very tall, under 5'8" and possibly 5'5", of stocky build with weight about 200 pounds, and having a face with a rather round, solid or Slavic appearance. LAPAZANOS has no further recollection concerning descriptive notes of this individual. The man had lunch with the HEIDEMANS and HEIDEMAN, and immediately after lunch the HEIDEMANS departed. The man remained for a time discussing topics of the day with LAPAZANOS. LAPAZANOS remembers only that in some manner the topic of vitamins for children was discussed and that the unidentified individual indicated that little was known about the value of vitamins because they had only been tested on mice. From this information, LAPAZANOS has concluded that the unidentified individual was a bacteriologist connected in some way with a New York wholesale grocery wholesaler company. The unidentified individual was introduced originally to LAPAZANOS by ELAINE FUCHS and apparently had no direct connection with the HEIDEMAN family.

In reference to the foregoing, it is noted that LAPAZANOS was vague and definitely inclined to state conclusions for which he could not offer substantiating facts. It is not believed that he is a reliable witness in this matter.

LAPAZANOS further advised that he had earlier remembered picking up a telegram addressed to FUCHS from a British subject in Washington. As a result of reading newspaper stories concerning the FUCHS case, LAPAZANOS

is not of the opinion that this scientist was named COCKROFT.

With reference to Mrs. HILB's visit to Connecticut, New York with FUCHS, LAPAZANOS is now of the opinion that the individual visited had a short appearance, possibly of German origin. He specifically denied that the name was FUCHS. He is certain that he would recall the name if it were presented to him.

LAPAZANOS, in general conversation, stated that KRISTEL HEINEMAN never indicated in any manner that she knew or suspected her brother of being involved in espionage. LAPAZANOS offered the opinion that if KRISTEL had asked HILB, she would not have told her. LAPAZANOS claims that KRISTEL received a number of letters from FUCHS at Los Alamos; that the two were very close, but that she did not know the nature of his work or anyone's work at that location. She appeared to be at first surprised and then proud of HILB when the secret of the atomic bomb was made known and the importance of the work done at Los Alamos was published.

LAPAZANOS further declared that KRISTEL had never mentioned KLAUS's pre-war activities excepting to indicate that he was a leader of the youth section of a political party known as "SPD" (possibly the Socialist Party of New York).

With reference to later visits of FUCHS to the HEINEMAN home, LAPAZANOS stated that FUCHS had never indicated any of his close friends or associates at Los Alamos excepting on one occasion to state that he was very well acquainted with HILB HILB, in response to a question submitted by LAPAZANOS.

LAPAZANOS was observed to be quite egotistical, prone to express conclusions which are in fact opinions but which he states as dogma. It is not believed that he can be profitably interviewed because of his readiness to speculate. It is, therefore, recommended that further interviews of him be reduced to a minimum.

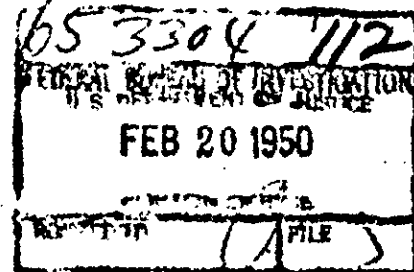

On the evening of February 17, 1950, Special Agent RICHARD L. JOE and the writer interviewed Mrs. KATHLEEN HEINERMAN at the Westboro State Hospital and in the presence of Mr. ROLLINS LADDA.

The photographs enumerated in the Boston teletype to the Bureau, New York and Washington field dated February 17, 1950 and concerning ROBERT HEINERMAN's identifications, were exhibited to her. It is noted that these photographs included many shown to her on February 14, 1950. Mrs. HEINERMAN recognized no one and was responding in that fashion before she actually had an opportunity to look at the picture. She was, therefore, noncooperative although she was constantly reiterating her desire to cooperate. She indicated quite plainly that she intended to do nothing further in this case until she heard from her brother that those stories now being published about him in the press were, in fact, true.

Mr. LADDA noted that this was a part of her ailment and that it was entirely possible that on another occasion she would adopt a different attitude.

JOHN HEINMAN was interviewed at 1:10 P. in Room 1324, this building, on February 17, 1950, by Special Agent RICHARD S. KENNEL and the writer.

Photographs enumerated in Boston teletype to Bureau, New York, and Washington field dated February 17, 1950, were exhibited to him and no information was obtained in connection with these photographs additional to that set forth in the teletype.

With further reference to the name of the unidentified chemist, HEINMAN advised: He is fairly certain in his own mind now that the unidentified chemist's last name began with the letters ROB. With reference to the first name, HEINMAN withdrew somewhat from information previously supplied by Attorney LUNAN. HEINMAN stated that in the fall of 1949, he went through his wife's correspondence and effects in an effort to locate material which might possibly be of value to him in a divorce proceeding. He further was endeavoring to clean up his home. He can recall that he located one letter addressed by ALAN MURKIN to KRISTEL HEINMAN. It was largely of a personal nature but the last paragraph contained MURKIN's request that his personal regards be extended to the HEINMAN children, to some other people in Cambridge whom HEINMAN knew and to have attached no special significance, and finally to "JOSEPH." HEINMAN stated that he cannot connect in his own experience any affiliation on his part with any friend of his or his wife named JOSEPH. HEINMAN further stated that he cannot recall that he has known anyone whose last name began with "ROB" excepting for his recollections concerning the unidentified chemist already set forth. Because both JOSEPH and "ROB" are unfamiliar to HEINMAN personally, he has in his own mind associated the two together. The result is that he has an opinion, but not a recollection, that the unidentified chemist is "JOSEPH ROB--."

HEINMAN stated that he had talked to his oldest children, STEVEN and MONICA about the friend of their uncle's who had promised STEVEN a chemistry set. He talked to STEVEN because the set was allegedly promised to him and he talked to MONICA because she might have been jealous about not being offered anything by this visitor. Neither have any recollections of any nature concerning such an incident. Both stated that at one time, HEINMAN's father, SAMUEL HEINMAN, promised STEVEN a chemistry set and that he had failed to deliver it.

SUBJECT: FOOCASE

On the late afternoon of February 15, 1950, Special Agent RICHARD W. DOW and the writer interviewed MARTIN DEUTSCH at his parents' home on Reservoir Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

DEUTSCH, who possesses an excellent personality, initially stated that he had anticipated the interview because he was certain that we would know or determine that he was one of the two Americans closest to FUCHS. In preparation, therefore, he had in the preceding two weeks discussed with his wife all independent and mutual recollections they had of FUCHS. In addition, he noted that FUCHS' arrest had been the subject of widespread discussion among the faculty members at Massachusetts Institute of Technology who had known FUCHS or had met him. DEUTSCH has used these "bull sessions" as a further means to refresh his recollection.

DEUTSCH asserted that he was not amazed at the headlines concerning FUCHS. FUCHS at Los Alamos had been a lonely, reticent individual and as a single man had little opportunity to circulate in society or to amuse himself socially. Out of kindly human sympathy, DEUTSCH asserted, he and his wife had made it a point to invite FUCHS to their home whenever they entertained socially, particularly for dinners and similar events. In their subsequent discussions concerning him, they had often commented, one to the other, that one had the feeling that he knew FUCHS until he attempted to judge what FUCHS' reaction might be to a given situation. There was never any answer to this question, according to DEUTSCH, to either him or his wife and they gradually came to the conclusion that they only knew "the shell or hull of the man." Because of DEUTSCH's family background in psychiatry, DEUTSCH and his wife had attempted an amateurish psycho-analysis of their house guest. DEUTSCH stated that they had long ago reached the conclusion that he only presented outward appearances and that he had carefully kept his true personality from coming to the observation of his acquaintances. If he were an artist, the DEUTSCHES stated, it would have been easy to have then determined that these characteristics indicated a schizophrenic. Artists often create imaginary worlds, according to DEUTSCH, into which they ultimately go in permanent residence and they are, therefore, true schizophrenics. DEUTSCH noted that it is difficult for scientists to become schizophrenics because they are constantly dealing with material elements, largely in the manner of measure, and, therefore, they cannot easily create the imaginary world which is typical of the schizophrenic. They had, therefore, concluded that FUCHS was of the presented unusual character because he suffered from an ailment more common to scientists, i.e. homosexuality.

Immediately upon reading the headline concerning FUCHS' arrest, DEUTSCH stated that he and his wife had both realized that their previous analysis of FUCHS had been wrong and that he was, in fact, a true schizophrenic. DEUTSCH stated that their curbstone opinion was subsequently corroborated by FUCHS' confession.

DEUTSCH stated that FUCHS was a person who left few impressions. DEUTSCH could not recall the names of any visitors or persons who had been associated with FUCHS at Los Alamos or elsewhere other than the following:

1. ^{Robert} MARTIN MARSHAK.

This person was as closely associated with FUCHS at Los Alamos as was DEUTSCH. DEUTSCH expressed the opinion that the association was social and largely based upon the same motives which caused his association with FUCHS. He noted, however, that shortly after FUCHS' arrest, Mrs. MARSHAK had written to Mrs. DEUTSCH stating in part, "Of all the people to pick on." DEUTSCH noted further that MARSHAK was in almost daily contact with FUCHS because they worked in the same division at Los Alamos.

2. RUDOLPH and EUGENIA PEIERLS, Head of the British Mission.

It is noted that originally DEUTSCH recited this name as PEIERLS, but that he telephonically corrected this on the following day. DEUTSCH asserted that Mrs. PEIERLS was known as "Lothar Peierls" and as an older person made it a practice to entertain and look after the single members of the scientific group at Los Alamos, particularly fellow Britishers. DEUTSCH stated that he had visited England at Christmastime, 1949 (he corrected this to Christmastime 1946) and had stayed at the PEIERLS' home. He had visited Harwell and had been entertained rather extensively by the PEIERLS, along with atomic scientists from Harwell. In the course of one cocktail party and in the presence of a large group, he can only remember Dr. PEIERLS specifically, DEUTSCH stated that he asked if the British were experiencing any difficulties with "the extreme left wing." Someone in the crowd responded that the British had had no difficulty excepting that KLAUS FUCHS was apparently under investigation because of his pre-war Germany Communist affiliations. Someone else commented that FUCHS had definitely been a Communist prior to leaving Germany in the early 1930's. DEUTSCH asserted that this was the first knowledge he ever had to the effect that FUCHS had been involved in any way with the Communist Party or that he had any professed political feelings.

DEUTSCH further noted that he might have in his psycho-analysis of FUCHS had some indication of FUCHS' political sympathies in that FUCHS had mentioned in social conversations the fact that he had been involved in an anti-Hitler underground in Germany. DEUTSCH noted that FUCHS was not Jewish and that he had not suffered any personal persecution under Hitler. He was not a man of great physical strength or courage and he must, therefore, have been motivated by some strong spiritual force to have gone into an underground.

However, while DEUTSCH claims that he speculated privately about this, he had never reached any conclusions nor had he ever discussed what he now considers to have been this unusual trait with anyone.

After considerable recollection concerning the date of the birth of his child and other matters which would refresh his recollection, DEUTSCH asserted that he had been contacted by FUCHS in Cambridge in February, 1947. It is DEUTSCH's best knowledge that FUCHS had come to the United States to consult with the AEC concerning declassification of certain material and had then come to Cambridge to visit with his sister. He contacted DEUTSCH who invited him to dinner. It is DEUTSCH's again best memory that they had dinner at some restaurant where DEUTSCH acted as host. Those present, according to DEUTSCH, were his wife and FUCHS, and no others.

DEUTSCH then noted, and he claimed that he was doubtful that anyone else would admit it, that in 1944 and 1945, there was a considerable amount of "bulling and griping" among the Los Alamos scientists concerning the atomic bomb. It was a general realization that a terribly destructive force had been created which force, unless amicably controlled on a worldwide basis, could result in irreparable injury to mankind. Many of the scientists had noted that the allies were engaged in a tremendous war against Nazi Germany. The United States was developing this new weapon and had, as of that time, at late date invited British allies to participate in the work and to share in the secret. The Russians, on the other hand, were conspicuous by their absence. The scientists were of the opinion that this was wrong, that no agreement which would preserve peace in the post-war world could be reached effectively without the Russians. Some of them felt that since the Russians were allies and were suffering in the same war, that they should be invited to participate as had been the British. Others felt that it would be impossible to effect a working international control without the Russians and that it would be better to invite them to participate before the bomb was announced than after. A subsequent and separate advice to the Russians could only engender a feeling of suspicion and distrust on the part of the Russians because of the advanced notice already given the British. DEUTSCH noted that this was largely conversation and theory but that in the midst of it occasionally someone, now unidentified, would suggest that maybe there was a duty resting in the scientists to disclose this secret anyhow to the Russians in the interest of humanity. DEUTSCH stated that he specifically remembers that FUCHS never participated in any of these discussions, that he did not comment, and that it is now amazing that he was the only person who actually took affirmative action. DEUTSCH expressed the quick opinion, which he noted that he could not regard seriously, that it may have been possible that these conversations acted as a spur to FUCHS in his work.

DEUTSCH revealed that in the preceding forty-eight hours he had met a group of atomic scientists in Washington and New York, and that he had

specifically attempted to discuss the FUCHS case with two of them, i.e. ROBERT MARSHAK and VICTOR WEISKOPF. WEISKOPF simply shook his head and made no comments. MARSHAK refused to comment.

At the conclusion of the interview, DEUTSCH recalled that one CARLSON or CARSON MARKS (phonetic to DEUTSCH), a Canadian scientist at Los Alamos and possibly still there, also apparently knew FUCHS very well.

Mrs. DEUTSCH was thereafter interviewed at the suggestion of her husband. She had nothing to add to the foregoing excepting to confirm the fact that FUCHS had visited them in February, 1947 and not in some other year at Cambridge. She noted that she was familiar with HEINEMAN's and the FUCHS' family history with schizophrenia. She stated that she did not know them well.

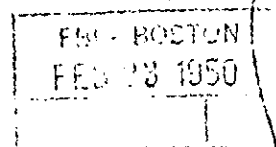

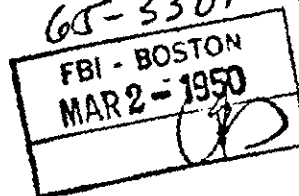

The records of the Harvard University Alumni Office, which were examined by the writer, identified the above named individual as the recipient of the following degrees from Harvard University: AB summa cum laude, 1922; AM, 1924; Ph.D, 1926.

The record discloses numerous addresses for COOPMAN during the course of his college days with the most recently recorded address as care of Department of Mathematics, Columbia University, New York.

The Office of the President, Harvard University, which office maintains employment records with respect to individuals associated with the University faculty and receiving corporation employment, lists the following employment for COOPMAN:

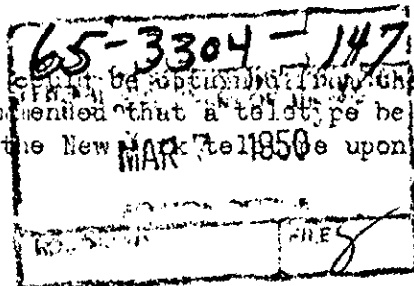
1. Instructor in Mathematics, 9/1/22 to 9/1/23
2. Benjamin Pierce Instructor in Mathematics, 9/1/25 to 9/1/26
3. Lecturer in Mathematics, 9/1/36 to 9/1/37.

Miss FRIEDRICK, Office of Personnel, Harvard University, advised that their records contained no reference to COOPMAN.

The Class Directory of the Class of 1922, its 25 report issued in 1947, contains a statement by COOPMAN in which he set forth general background information relating to himself indicating that he has continued his association with Columbia University since about 1928 with some periodic leaves for additional study, trips to Europe, etc. He stated in 1944-1945 he was a member of the Operations Research Group, Office of the Commander in Chief, United States Navy, Washington, D. C., and referred to the fact that he had brought his family to Washington and they were residing in Virginia at the time the report was prepared.

The above inquiry was made to determine the availability of a current photograph of COOPMAN with an indication that COOPMAN had reportedly done research work at Harvard University during 1944-1945.

It would appear that a current photograph of COOPMAN could be obtained from the Navy Department at Washington, D. C., and it is recommended that a teletype be prepared incorporating the information set forth in the New York letter upon which this inquiry was predicated.

FILE MEMORANDUM

Re: FOOCASE.

On the late afternoon of March 2, 1950 Dr. ROLLINS K. HADLEY, Director of the Westboro State Hospital, advised Special Agents John J. O'Lalor and Brenton S. Gordon that Dr. SAMUEL HOLT, who is in charge of KRISTEL HEINEMAN'S treatment, had made a suggestion that KRISTEL be given a dose of Amitol, a truth serum. HOLT pointed out that in three other cases in the past, which had been diagnosed as incurable, an injection of truth serum, followed by an interview, had been successful in causing the patients to relate facts and circumstances in their lives, most likely responsible for their mental illness. Dr. HADLEY stated that such treatment was in the nature of releasing mental pressure.

Dr. HOLT, from his review of the press on the FUCHS case, feels that KRISTEL HEINEMAN possibly has been attempting too long and too hard to conceal information from everyone.

Dr. HADLEY stated that the normal course in such matters is to have a meeting of the Board of Physicians who discuss the proposed treatment and then vote for or against it. Dr. HOLT'S suggestion is being taken up at the next Board Meeting; scheduled to occur sometime between March 3 and March 8th. If the Board votes affirmatively the treatment would be given at once. The questions asked the patient while under the injection, are drawn up in advance and the answers are normally recorded.

Dr. HADLEY stated that if the Bureau objected to such treatment it would not be undertaken; that if a Bureau Agent wished to be present and participate in the interrogation, that would be possible; that if a Bureau Agent wished to assist in the preparation of the list of questions, that could also be done.

SA Gordon advised Dr. HADLEY that Bureau Agents would not be qualified medically, and that he could give no suggestion to Dr. HADLEY with respect to the proposed treatment. SA Gordon asked Dr. HADLEY to very plainly understand that such treatment was not suggested by the Bureau and neither approved nor disapproved by the Bureau. SA Gordon further stated that he could not offer Dr. HADLEY any list of proposed questions or participate in the interview in any manner.

Dr. HADLEY has always been very cooperative and cordial and he stated that quite naturally the questions would be based upon their knowledge of her relationship with FUCHS, this being according to Dr. HOLT, and likely cause for her present mental condition, and he would immediately advise Agent Gordon in the event any responses provided material not previously published in the press.

Mr. Al Belmont of the Bureau was informed of this intended action and the fact that this office was in no way responsible for the decision to conduct such treatment, nor will any Agent be present or participate in this phase of medical treatment. Further, it was plainly indicated to Mr. Belmont that no Agent had encouraged the treatment, and at the present time it is not known definitely that such treatment will be put into effect. He informed me that under the circumstances we appeared to be in the clear and in no way involved in the proposed action, and consequently our attitude and the action already taken by us appeared to be perfectly satisfactory.

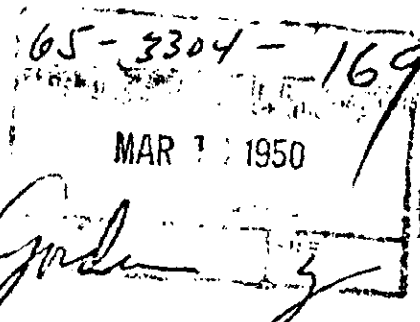

On the morning of March 11, 1950 ROBERT B. HEINEMAN, accompanied by his attorney, JAMES MAMON, and SA B. S. Gordon, of the Boston Office, arrived in New York City for the purpose of having HEINEMAN view JOSEPH ARNOLD ROBBINS, with alias, to determine whether ROBBINS was identical with the man seen by HEINEMAN in his home in 1945.

At about noon on March 11, 1950 ROBBINS left his home at 5501 14th Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and thereafter HEINEMAN was afforded the opportunity of viewing ROBBINS from all angles, with and without his hat, and in each instance HEINEMAN was emphatic in stating that ROBBINS is not identical with the person who had visited his home in February, 1945. HEINEMAN commented that ROBBINS' features are larger and coarser than those of the unknown individual and that ROBBINS in no way resembled this unknown man.

Thereafter an attempt was made to have HEINEMAN view EUGENE LOUIS FISHER, whose photograph HEINEMAN had previously selected as somewhat similar to the unknown man. However, FISHER'S activities for the weekend were not known and he was not seen at any time in the vicinity of his apartment while HEINEMAN was present. It is believed advisable, however, in view of HEINEMAN'S selection of FISHER'S photograph, to have him view FISHER. Accordingly, the New York Office will furnish the Bureau and Boston with FISHER'S teaching schedule at Long Island University during the week in order that the Boston Office can perfect plans to have HEINEMAN again come to New

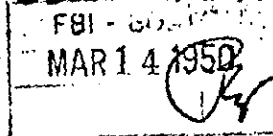

Concerning the Use Of Wire-Tapping

One good argument for the use of wire-tapping in espionage matters, if nowhere else, is the unveiling of Dr. Karl Fuchs, British scientist accused of turning over atomic secrets to Russia. That's how the FBI says it caught up with Fuchs.

Wire-tapping, admittedly, is dangerous to liberty and privacy if the technique is abused, but the fundamental security of the U.S. justifies its use in apprehending spies. As agents of foreign powers, of potential enemies, they are not entitled to the privileges we guard jealously for ourselves and our friends beyond our borders.

As a matter of fact, while the idea of wire-tapping, like any other form of snooping, is abhorrent to Americans in general, it is not a method in much danger of being abused. The amount of information that the FBI or any other organization would get from tapping the phones of most citizens would be exactly nil. And except for the resentment at being under suspicion, we believe the reaction which most phone subscribers would have to the tip that their calls were being monitored would be amusement. It is only those with bad consciences who are likely to get very upset at the idea.

In connection with the matter of phone-tapping, the high indignation of the Russian delegation in the U.N. at the FBI's wiretapping activities is more than a little amusing. For the representatives of a country where all telephones can be tapped at any time, and where all officials except Mr. Stalin are under the constant surveillance of the MVD, to stand aghast at American security measures implies a total lack of sense of humor, and an inability of the Russians to see themselves as others see them.

R. WEISMAN.


The indices of the Boston Division were checked with negative results with reference to WEISMAN. This memorandum was prepared for record purposes.

Deny Fuchs Had Pipeline From Jail

LONDON (AP)—The British government flatly denied a newspaper report today that all sorts of things have been going in and out of the jail cell of imprisoned atom spy Klaus Fuchs—including Fuchs himself.

Fuchs, 40-year-old German-born physicist, has served 27 months of a 14-year sentence for passing atom secrets to Russia.

The Daily Express reported today he had been transferred from Stafford Prison, northwest of Birmingham, to London's Pentonville jail. The Express said officials at Stafford found in Fuchs' cell:

1. Scientific writing—hidden in a hollow leg of his bed.

2. A diary giving details of papers he had smuggled out of prison.

3. Three letters smuggled in from the scientist's father, Dr. Emil Fuchs, of Leipzig University in the Soviet zone of Germany.

In reply, the Home Office issue said:

"The statements that Fuchs has been transferred from Stafford prison to Pentonville are completely untrue.

"He is not at Pentonville. He has not been transferred from Stafford to any other prison.

"No diaries have been found and there has been no discovery of papers going in and out of the prison."
