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The informant in a handwritten report dated 10/8/56 furnished some of the details of a symposium held at the JSSS on the draft resolution for the 16th National Convention of the CP. The report, as written by the informant, is herein set forth its entirety:

On October 5 8p.m. at the Jefferson School Sixth Ave. at 16th Street there was a symposium on the Draft Resolution for the 16th National Convention of the Communist Party. The panel of speakers were: John T. Mc Manus, General Manager of the National Guardian, Joseph R. Starobin ex communist and ex foreign editor of the Daily Worker, Sydney Stine of the National Committee of the Communist Party, Dr. Howard Selsam director of the Jefferson School was the Moderator.

Mc Manus opened the discussion. He said he was opposed to the Communist changing into a less radical and more of a liberal party. He said the C.P. must remain a revolutionary party. He said he felt there was a tendency at this present time in the C.P. away from its revolutionary past and towards liberalism. This he was definately against. Mc Manus gave the impression that his fears were that the C.P. might become so liberal as to usurp the place in society held by the "Guardian" and the group around it.

Starobin said he left the C.P. because long before this discussion started in the C.P. he wanted to express some contrary views but he found no place


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to air his views. He thinks the C.P. as constutited has outlived its usefullness and should be reconstituted or drastically changed.



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

On November 14, 1958, the National Council of American Soviet Friendship held a Rally for Peace at Carnegie Hall, New York City. The orchestra section was completely filled and the balcony was partially filled. An estimate of the number of people present would be 1200 to 1400.

: Chairman of the meeting was Rockwell Kent.

The first speaker was Eslanda Robeson who was introduced by Kent as the wife of Paul Robeson. Her speech dealt primarily with her recent trip to the USSR. She expressed the love the the Russian people manifested towards her and her husband. She also indicated that the people in England have accepted them with open arms. She stated that she brought a message from Paul Robeson to the effect that his home will always be in the USA even though he is presently making his headquarters in England. She stressed the fact that the Russian people want peace and she claimed that the Russian Government also wants peace.

The next speaker was a Professor Schuman of Williams College. He spoke at length about the history of US-USSR relations. He stated that he did not agree that the Communists are trying to conquer the world and he claimed that if the United States had listened to Russia in 1933 there would not have been World War II. His prime contention was that if we do not develop a policy of exchange of ideas, "both cultural and scientific", the cold war will continue and culminate in a thermo-nuclear warfare which means complete annihilation of mankind. Professor Schuman stated that the Russian people want peaceful co-existence. He also urged the recognition of Red China.

Following Schuman's speech, a collection was taken up and this lasted approximately 1/2 hour. The collection speech was made by Rev. Mcrford and the amount collected was not announced. After the collection the Ukrainian chorus sang a series of Russian songs.

A meeting of the "Worker Advisory Council" was held on May 26th, 1960 at the Polonia Club in New York.

About 18 communists attended this meeting. (LOU WEINSTOCK told the meeting that EETTY ("D", from Brooklyn) couldn't come to this meeting. She had a nerous breakdown and is in the hospital).

Food, cold drinks and coffee was served before the meeting stated for which "The Worker" will pay.

AL NAIDICH, as chairman of the Advisory Council, chaired the meeting.

LOU WEINSTOCK reported.

He told the meeting that in connection with the building of The Worker the press directors of the New York area (CP) are now meeting regularly twice a month and that "some good decisions came from these meetings in connection with the building of The Worker. He said that "the press directors elected a sub-committee to act between the meetings. The sub-committee consists of AL./GAY and FANNY." (HECHTMAN)

LOU said that he just came from a visit to Chicago, Detroit and Cleveland. He said that he cannot "make a happy report" on the press activities in the cities he visited. "Everyone agrees and understands the importance of the building of our press, but there, as in New York, they haven't enough forces towerk with." He stated that "we will build up The Worker and we will start the Daily Worker but it will take time."

LOU said that it is planned to call a press building conference in the middwest and that "we should start planning of calling here an Eastern seaboard conference for the building of our press."

NY 97+169

which stands now at about "40%" (fund drive) and "50%" (sub drive) isn't going well. "We decide that no matter how much money we will raise the fund drive will end on July 4th. We can continue the fund drive indefinately. We must start concentrating on the Daily Worker."

LOU claimed that he is "confident" that "we could raise the neccessary funds for the reestablishing of the Daily Worker." DAVE, (or DAVID) a lawyer, read a paper, which he prepared for this meeting, suggesting to establish a special fund for the Daily Worker. The money collected for this purpose cannot be used the work nor for any other purpose. A committee of trustees should be in charge of this funds.

During the discussion of the question of the Daily Worker, ALEX TRACHTENBERG, EDDIE and HARRY GAY spoke in approval of the suggestion made by DAVE.

AL NAIDICH said that he is for the plan but he cannot see how "we can raise at present \$100,000 to start publishing the Daily Worker. JACK STACHEL claims that \$50,000 would have saved the D.W. from being closed. At that time the Party (CP) was about 5 times bigger than today and we couldn't raise \$50,000. How can we expect to raise \$100,000 today? We cannot even bring to a successfull conclusion the present fund drive. It is not a question of desire. Everyone here wants to have back the D.W. The question is can we do it with our limited forces?"

BOB said that he agrees with AL.

LOU claimed that he knows many people, some of them his personal friends, who are willing to give money "and I don't mean 10 dollars, or 25 dollars, one friend told me that he has \$1,200 in stocks and he asked me to take it for the Daily Worker."

FANNY HECHTMAN claimed that she has \$1,000 for the D.W.

CARL BRODSKY claimed that a lot of money could be raised for the D.W. by organizing picknics, boat rides and to have a dinner charging from "25 to \$100 a plate." "We can do it. People will come and bring money.

LOU said that this organization (the Advisory Council) "which is going to be national in scope will be able to raise enough funds to afford the reestablishment of the Daily Worker."

AL NAIDICH remarked: "OK. Let's try."

The meeting elected as trustees of the Daily Worker Fund a committee of 3: CARL BRODSKY, FANNY HECHTMAN and ALEX TRACHTENBERG. All 3 will sign the checks.

It was also elected an "affairs committee consisting of JULIUS HELMAN, LOU PASTERNAK, and LUEEROW-a house painter.

JAMES JACKSON, AL NAIDICH and HARRY GAY were elected as the committee on Editorial and Management.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Advisory Council "in about a month." The sub-committees will meet before the meeting of the "A.C." in bring their reports to the general meeting of the A.C.

RICHARD MORFORD introduced JESSICA SMITH, Chairman for the evening. Election returns were read from time to time, without comment.

SHIRLEY GRAHAM spoke about the "Liberation Movement." She said that dark-skinned citizens in the Soviet Union walk with dignity. JESSICA SMITH, in introducing her, said that Dr. DU BOIS had said that, on their recent trip, SHIRLEY had caught "liberation fever", which is probably contagious.

The ballerina from the Bolshoi had been invited to this country, according to JESSICA SMITH, by the Washington School of Ballet. Unfortunately, she could not dance at Carnegie because the floor had just been waxed and was too slippery. Two girls, about 8 and 10, presented her with bouquets.

JACK SPIEGEL, trade union leader from Chicago, Director of Organization, Chicago District of the United Shoe Workers of America, AFL-CIO:

The trade union policy now is encouraging the Cold War, but the workers do not share the leaders! policies.



durran in NY and GORMAN (?) in Chicago have taken the first steps to dislodge the present policy of the trade union leadership. The Embassy in Moscow said we would not be permitted to go where we wanted, but this was absolutely untrue.

Recently in Russia, the workers' hours were cut, but wages were raised in Textile. 88 willion new housing units will be built by 1965. The trade unions are assigning the people to these new houses. 5% of weekly wages go for rent. Rent is practically free. Education is free, hospitalization is free. Men retire at 69; women at 55. Pensions are from 55 to 100% of wages. There is no closed shop, but 99% of workers are in unions. Let us get people from every union to go to the Soviet Union to see what is going on.

MORFORD: We need information. I have been traveling, trying to get trade unionists to go to the Soviet Union. We need direct action for peace. We must see that our country is willing to negotiate. The Soviet Union is prepared for inspection and control. We are not doing enough here. We need money to carry on our work.

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

Readers' Conference on the WORKER Adelphi Hall, NYC, Thursday, 11/17/60, 7:30-10:00 p.m.



LOUIS WEINSTOCK introduced AL, the Chairman for the evening, who introduced HATHAWAY, for the main report, on the elections.

HATHAWAY:

In view of the fact that LOU has called this meeting primarily to deal with the question of the WORKER, the fund drive and everything related to the building of the WORKER, it is not my intention to hog the meeting by making a prolonged and exhaustive report on the question of the election campaign. I am going to try, however, to deal with the high points of the campaign and primarily in terms of the tasks that we are now confronted with. At the outset, we should emphasize the fact that there are no grounds for complacency in estimating the outcome of the election, and neither should we overlook the very positive factors that give us an opportunity of increasing all phases of our mass work.

We can state at the outset that the judgment of the Party in connection with the events leading up to the election were correct. Already, after the national conventions of the two parties, the NC emphasized the fact that our position against boycott was correct. It was not correct to urge people to vote for socialist or Trotzkyite candidates. In the elections, despite the fact that both parties represent the position of monopoly capitalism and that all candidates were committed to a program, so far as foreign policy is concerned, that in no way was associated with effective struggle for peace and disarmament, nevertheless the people expressed themselves as they did by defeating NIXON, and with an overwhelming majority in the industrial centers, and particularly among the Negro people, who cast their votes for KENNEDY. Also, for example, here in NY State, whereas four years ago EISENHCWER carried the State by 1,600,000 votes, this year KENNEDY carried the state by over 400,000 votes, a shift of almost a quarter of the votes from one party to the other. As compared with two years ago, ROCKEFELLER, in NYCm received 43% of the vote, this year NIXON received only 33%. Two years ago, ROCKEFELLER carried the entire upstate NY, including Buffalo, Schenectady, etc. This year KENNEDY carried them both by large majorities. In the Negro sections, according to figures published in this morning's Tribune, in four key Negro districts in Harlem, some 78% of the vote was cast for KENNEDY in the campaign. The entire country, in all the industrial centers, the workers and Negro people voted largely for KENNEDY.

The headlines tonight said that the US Navy has moved into the Carribean. This is an act of provocation to pave the way for an attack against the Cuban Revolution. We must raise the question of "Hands Off Cuba!".

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We must take the commitments of the Democrats and arouse the workers to fight on those issues.

(At this point, LOU WEINSTOCK was called to the phone; returned and sent ED ROYCE out, with his hat and coat. ROYCE returned about 30 minutes later)

HATHAWAY:

The elections show that, with all sorts of conflicting pressures, with unfit candidates and the limitations of the two-party system, with the injection of religious issues, and other things that made the elections complex, the people have nevertheless expressed themselves and have shown a beginning of struggle that, if understood and appreciated and developed by us, can become a very powerful movement that will lead in directions that are in keeping with our aims and purposes.

We have to build our own Party and strengthen our position among the masses of the Negro and Puerto Rican people in NY.

WEINSTOCK:

These readers' conferences are called once a month, ever since last March. We have not discussed finances at these meetings in the past, but tonight I am going to discuss circulation, building the press, and finances, too. NORTH, ERIC BERT and myself spent a weekend in Chicago. mid-west edition of the Worker called a mid-western conference. Minnesota, Wisconsin, Missouri, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan sent delegates. Saturday and Sunday we discussed only the importance of the Worker, its editorial policies, criticizing the paper and the mid-west edition, with constructive criticism. It was a very successful meeting and it gave us an idea that a similar conference could be called in NY, covering New England, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York, to discuss the same problems. We could have it in a month or two, and work towards a national WORKER builders'conference sometime next year. First we must build a broader foundation for the WORKER.
