





III. MISCELLAMEOUS

On August 22, 1962, SA caused the records of the Bureau of Special Services, New York City Police Department, to be examined for any information concerning the subject. No pertinent unreported information was noted.

Certain informants of the New York Office who are familiar with some phases of Communist Party activity in the New York City area were contacted during the months of July and August, 1962, and exhibited a photograph of the subject. COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENPERG in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon MORTON SOPELL,' the ROSENBERGS' codefendant. NEW YORK COUNCIL TO ADOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE.

York Council To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAUAC), 150 West 34th Street, New York City, New York, was formed at a meeting held in New York City on November 17, 1960. This organization was founded principally through the efforts of FRANK WILKINSON, Field Representative of the National Committee To Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC).

A second source advised on September 17, 1952, that FRANK WILKINSON was a Communist Party member as of September, 1952. .

A third source furnished copy of resolutions of the New York Council to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NYCAHUAC) which were adopted by the NYCAHUAC. One such resolution affirmed the intention to continue to work for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and to continue its efforts to broaden the participation in this fight. Another resolution accepted as a modus vivendi the suggestion of the Field Representative of the "National Committee to Abolish the HCUA" (NCAHUAC) namely that local abolition committees may identify and co-ordinate their efforts as closely as they desire with NCAHUAC, still maintaining their autonomy for as flexible and independent a program as possible.

Various sources have advised during March, 1962, that Communist Party (CP) members in the New York City area have been solicited to support activities of the NYCAHUAC during attendance at CP club meetings.

1962 LABOR AND PEOPLES COMMITTEE FOR MAY DAY

Records of the Department of Parks, New York City, reflect that a permit was issued to hold a celebration at Union Square Park Plaza, 17th Street between Fourth Avenue and Broadway, New York City, on May 1, 1962, from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. The application for the permit, dated January 4, 1962, was made in the name of 1962 Labor and Peoples Committee for May Day, and listed ARTHUR KNIGHT as Chairman pro tem.

A source advised in February, 1961, that ARTHUR KNIGHT was the Press Director of the New York County Communist Party (CP).

"The Worker" in its issue of April 8, 1962, page 12, carried an appeal for help in the preparation of a rally on May 1, 1962, in the name of the 1952 Union Square May Day Committee for Defense of the Bill of Rights, 130 East 16th Street, Room 201, New York City, telephone AL 4-3550.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

Special Agents of the Federal Eureau of Investigation observed the proceedings of the rally on May 1, 1962. The speakers, including GUS HALL, called for peace and the freedom of the press; an end to nuclear testing; an end to the arms race; an end to segregation; and an end to the use of the Taft-Hartley and Mc Carran Acts. They also urged that the House Committee on Un-American Activities be abolished.


"The Worker" in its issue of October 23, 1960, page 3, listed GUS HALL as General Secretary of the CP.

The Information Operator of the New York Telephone Company on May 14, 1962, advised that telephone number AL 4-3550 was disconnected and had been temporarily listed to the 1962 Union Square May Day Committee for Defense of the Bill of Rights.

Volume 2, Number 7, April - May, 1962, issue of "New Horizons for Youth" indicated that LIONEL LIBSON was Editor and DANIEL RUBIN, Associate Editor. The publication is now using a magazine rather than newspaper format, which it had used prior to the March, 1962, issue.

A source advised on January 23, 1962, that LIONEL LIPSON was a member of the CP Youth Club, Communist Party, Eastern Pennsylvania and Delaware, and his duties were that of fund raiser for the Club.

NY T-1, on March 5, 1964, furnished information that the subject was observed in attendance at the above mentioned rally.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

May Day Rally, 1964

The April 21, 1964 issue of "The Worker", page 1, reflects that the May Day rally of May 1, 1964, will be sponsored by the the Greater New York Labor Press Club (GNYLPC).

On May 1, 1964, the subject was observed by a Special Agent of the FBI at the May Day rally at Union Square, New York, New York.

GREATER NEW YORK LABOR PRESS CLUB

A source advised on December 6, 1962, that the Greater New York Press Club (GNYPC) was formed during February, 1961, by LOUIS WEINSTOCK when he was the General Manager of "The Worker" by obtaining members who would contribute funds, subscribe to and work for "The Worker," and also to hold social and cultural affairs.

The source stated that in the spring of 1962, JAMES LUSTIG was the <u>Business</u> Manager of "The Worker."

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The purpose of this new club was to coordinate the work of all the borough press clubs in the New York City ares; to strengthen the work of the press clubs; to organize new press clubs; and to draw in people who were not members of the Communist Party, United States of America (CPUSA). The source stated that the basic purpose was to raise funds for "The Worker" and increase the circulation of that publication. Persons not members of the CPUSA could be members of the new club, but leadership in the club was limited to members of the CPUSA. The name of the CPCEB was later changed to "Greater City Press Club" (GCPC) which club became the successor of the GNYPC.

The nource continued that in July, 1962, LOUIS WEINSTOCK again became General Manager of "The Worker" and the GCPC again became known as the Greater New York Readers' Club, Greater New York Readers' Club, Greater New York Readers' Conference, Greater City Press Club and the City Press Club,

had no office or headquarters and used the mailing address of "The Worker," 23 West 26th Street, New York City.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

The second source advised on August 15, 1962, that the Greater New York Readers' Club was formerly known as the "Three Boro Readers' Club."

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APPENDIX

GREATER NEW YORK LABOR PRESS CLUB

The first source advised on May 28, 1963, that the GNYPC holds no membership meetings and that the officers had ceased to function for the GNYPC. The source advised that LOUIS WEINSTOCK was responsible for using the name of the GNYPC in conjunction with the activities of the Readers Conferences at "Worker" functions. The organization of the GNYPC no longer functions.

The first source advised on April 21, 1964, that, on March 31, 1964, about 50 members of the CPUSA met at the Hotel Woodstock, 127 West 43rd Street, New York City. At this meeting, JOE BRANDT, the Business Manager of "The Worker," advised that, after consultation with the Editorial Board and other officials of "The Worker," it was decided to rebuild the GNYPC and to rename it the Greater New York Labor Press Club (GNYLPC). Those present at the meeting, without a dissenting vote, approved this decision.

A third source advised on April 29, 1964, that on the same date ERIC BERT, Managing Editor of "The Worker" said that the GNYLPC is a group of individuals who, as volunteers, help support "The Worker" and aid in its distribution and circulation.



A source advised on December 6, 1962, that the Greater New York Press Club (GNYPC) was formed during February, 1961, by LOUIS WEINSTOCK when he was the General Manager of "The Worker" by obtaining members who would contribute funds, subscribe to and work for "The Worker," and also to hold social and cultural affairs.

The source stated that in the spring of 1962, JAMES LUSTIG was the Business Manager of "The Worker."

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The source continued that in July, 1962, LOUIS WEINSTOCK again became General Manager of "The Worker" and the GOPC again become known as the Greater New York Readers' Club, Greater New York Readers' Club, Greater New York Readers' Conference, Greater City Press Club and the City Press Club.

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"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

The second source advised on August 15, 1962, that the Greater New York Readers' Club was formerly known as the "Three Boro Readers' Club."

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The first source advised on April 21, 1964, that, on March 31, 1964, about 50 members of the CPUSA met at the Hotel Woodstock, 127 West 43rd Street, New York City. At this meeting, JOE BRANDT, the Business Manager of "The Worker," advised that, after consultation with the Editorial Board and other officials of "The Worker," it was decided to rebuild the GNYPC and to rename it the Greater New York Labor Press Club (GNYLPC). Those present at the meeting, without a dissenting vote, approved this decision.

A third source advised on April 29, 1964, that on the same date ERIC BERT, Managing Editor of "The Worker" said that the GNYLPC is a group of individuals who, as volunteers, help support "The Worker" and aid in its distribution and circulation.

On July 24, 1968, Special Agents (SAS) of the FBI observed PASTERNAK at a Black Liberation School on June 15, 1968.




A characterization of the W. E. B. Du Bois Club appears in the Appendix Section of the report.

On May 28, 1969, an SA of the FBI observed PASTERNAK at the Riverside Plaza Hotel, 253 West 73rd Street, NYC. He was present at a meeting featuring as speaker, GUS HALL, General Secretary of the CP-USA.





On October 16, 1970, PASTERNAK attended the 60th Birthday Party of GUS HALL, General Secretary of the CP-USA.



III. MISCELLANEOUS

Other confidential sources at the New York Office, who are familiar with some phases of CP activity in the NYC area, advised during January and February, 1971, that they had no information concerning PASTERNAK's current activities.

On May 1, 1970, a source advised the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (DCA) was formed in June, 1964, as a Marxist-oriented youth organization which would be used as a recruiting ground for the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA). This organization merged with CP youth and independent Marxist youth in the formation of a new organization in February, 1970, at which time the DCA became defunct.


