Yakovlev and David Greenglass had violated Section 34, Title 50, United States Code, in that they had conspired to commit espionage for the benefit of a foreign nation, to wit, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. His trial began on March 6, 1951, and a verdict of guilty was returned on March 29, 1951. On April 5, 1951, he was sentenced to a term of thirty years imprisonment. He is currently serving this sentence at the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri.

Current information regarding subject's health set forth. Subject's wife continues to participate in activities of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell. Information set forth concerning WILBUR R. ENGELS, 1015 East Aloha Street, Seattle, Washington, who requested permission to visit subject during October, 1964 while the latter was incarcerated at the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri.

DETAILS

I. PLACE OF INCARCERATION

On August 21, 1964, SA JAMES A. MITCHELL reviewed files of the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners (MCFP), Springfield, Missouri, pertaining to MORTON SOBELL. This file reflected a letter dated August 12, 1964, from JOSEPH N. SHORE, Parole Executive, Washington, D.C., to the Warden of the MCFP at Springfield, Missouri. The letter stated that the Parole Board had concluded its annual reconsideration review regarding SOBELL and had ordered no change in the previous order denying parole.

On January 27, 1965, Mr. MELVIN LEMONS, Secretary to the Warden, MCFP, Springfield, Missouri, advised SA MITCHELL that subject was being transferred to the United States Penitentiary (USP), Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.

Dr. LLOYD C. GUTHRIE, Chief Medical Officer, United States Public Health Service, USP, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, advised SA GEORGE P. GAMBLIN, on February 19, 1965, that MORTON SOBELL, USP Registry Number 31408-NE, was received at that institution for incarceration on January 30, 1965.

II. CONDITION OF HEALTH

On May 1, 1964, Mr. MELVIN LEMONS, previously identified, advised SA MITCHELL that subject remained confined to the hospital and there had been no change in his condition and no plans to transfer him to another institution. The file reflected that on February 18, 1964

the subject requested to see a doctor about his dietary problems. Dr. P.J. CICCONE noted on the request that he talked to SOBELL at which time SOBELL made various complaints about his diet. Dr. CICCONE indicated that this complaint was being discussed with Mr. MANION, Food Administrator at the MCFP. Mr. LEMONS further advised that SOBELL had been working as an K-Ray technician since July 22, 1963, and had been receiving above-average work reports

On August 21, 1964, SA MITCHELL reviewed files of the MCFP, Springfield, Missouri, which reflected that subject was doing well in the X-Ray Department, where he was employed and received some meritorious good time on January 1, 1964. He was considered to be a valuable employee in the X-Ray Department and his file reflected that during the previous year there had been no organized pressure upon the institution in his behalf.

Dr LLOYD C. GUTHRIE, previously identified, advised on February 19, 1965, that MORTON SOBELL had not been hospitalized since his arrival at the USP, Lewsburg, Pennsylvania, on January 30, 1965. He stated subject's medical history reflected he has a mild case of psycho-physiological gastro-intestinal reaction caused by nervous tension and that he appears to be doing well at this time. Dr. GUTHRIE stated that the psychiatric evaluation of MORTON SOBELL is as follows:

MY T-1 advised on various dates during 1964 that the subject wife, HELEN SOBELL, continued to participate in the activities of the CSJMS and that she was a National Staff member of that organization.

The November 30, 1964, issue of the "Springfield Baily News", a Springfield, Missouri, daily newspaper, contained on page 1, an article entitled "Mrs. SOBELL Hopeful Husband To Be Freed". The article stated that Mrs. MORTON SOBELL and her son MARK, age 15, were spending the weekend in Springfield in order to visit the subject who was incarcerated at the MCFP. The article went on to state that the subject's wife and mother, both of New York City, headed a committee which was working toward subject's freedom. According to the article, Mrs. SOBELL claimed that her husband was innocent and that efforts were being made to bring petitions before President JOHNSON urging that MORTON SOBELL be released from prison.

IV. INFORMATION CONCERNING WILBUR R. ENGELS

On October 5, 1964, MELVIN LEMONS, Secretary to the Warden, MCFP, Springfield, Missouri, advised SA JAMES A. MITCHELL that they had received a letter from a man named W.R. ENGEES, Claridge Hotel, 1004

Locust Street, Kansas City, Missouri. In the letter, ENGELS informed the Medical Center that he would like to see SOBELL, if possible, commenting that he did not know him, but since he was in this vicinity, he would like to visit with him.

LEMONS stated that ENGELS is was: Informed that this visit would not be approved.

A news article in the Seattle Times, December 2, 1960 indicated ENGLES had been arrested and found guilty of driving while under influence of liquor and was fined \$200.

No record was found in the files of the Seattle Police Department or the King County Sheriff's Office on November 27, 1964, other than that mentioned above.

Seattle, produced a card dated October, 1962 indicating WILBUR R. ENGLES was born February 23, 1910, at Seattle, was residing at 1015 East Aloha Street as of October, 1962, and his occupation was a laborer. BACKGROUND:

Yesterday afternoon, Inspector Wick of your office received a telephone call from Judge Kaufman expressing concern about efforts to free Morton Sobell who was convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage in 1951. It is noted that Sobell received a 30-year prison sentence at that time and in connection with the sentence, Judge Kaufman commented to the effect that Sobell should serve his entire sentence. Judge Kaufman's telephone call was prompted by an article in the 3-21-65 issue of "The New York Times," which contained a lengthy column concerning efforts to free Sobell. *ATTACHED

According to "The New York Times" article, the most recent Government statement has been a Department of Justice reply to an appeal by Mrs. Sobell to Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson. Reed Cozart, pardon attorney, reportedly wrote that if Sobell filed a clemency petition "based on his belief that his sentence was excessive, based on his institutional adjustment, etc., we would be glad to give it consideration." Further, Cozart's letter dated 2-5-65 reportedly said "there would be no basis for acting favorably upon a petition predicated upon his plea of innocence primarily," and the Government was "bound by the legal adjudication of his guilt in this case."

INFORMATION IN BUREAU FILES:

A review of the main files of Morton Sobell, his wife and the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell reveals that there has, of course, been a continuing effort on the part of Mrs. Sobell and the Committee, as well as Sobell's sympathizers, to obtain clemency for Sobell based on his alleged "innocence." These files do not indicate any contact by the Department of Justice regarding an inquiry by Mrs. Lyndon Johnson concerning Schell.

It is noted, however, that a highly confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on 2-4-65 that a meeting of the Sobell Committee was held in New York City the previous day. It was learned at this meeting that Sobell had been transfered to the Federal Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, on 1-31-65

and it was suggested to Mrs. Sobell at this meeting that she write to the Attorney General to thank him in the event he was responsible for the transfer. (This transfer puts Sobell closer to his family and attorneys.) Mrs. Sobell indicated she would not write such a letter as a third party (not identified) had been involved and she was not at liberty to disclose just what steps had been taken. She did indicate, however, that she had written to Mrs. Lyndon Johnson.

We have been keeping the White House informed of pertinent matters involving efforts to obtain Sobell's release. "The New York Times" article mentioned that the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell has obtained 8,000 signatures "calling her husband innocent" and when 10,000 are gathered, the petition will be submitted to President Johnson. On 11-16-64, the matter of presenting a petition to the President was furnished to the White House.

RECOMMENDATION:

There appears to be no further action to be taken at this time inasmuch as the White House is being kept informed of pertinent developments regarding clemency for Morton Sobell.

WALTER D. SCHNEIR MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING (Espionage)

BACKGROUND:

In August of 1965 a book entitled "Invitation to an Inquest' written by Walter and Miriam Schneir was published. This book, in summary, contains conclusions designed to discredit Harry Gold, a Government witness who testified in the case involving Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, executed spies, and implies that the Government's case against A Morton Sobell, who was involved with the Rosenbergs in espionage activities, was false.

Information has been received from the New York Office indicating that the Schneirs will begin a "national tour" of major cities in the United States as well as several cities in Canada to publicate and sell their book. This tour was announced in a recent letter from the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell. It is believed advisable to alert all Offices of the contemplated tour of the Schneirs and that all Offices be instructed to direct any inquires concerning the authors or the book to the attention of the Crime Records Division at the Bureau. The Crime Records Division agrees with the course of action suggested above.

In this connection, it should be noted that the Schneirs spent approximately five years preparing this book and that during this time the were in close contact with Isidore Gibby Needleman, who is a suspected Soviet agent and a current contact of high-level officials of the Communist Party. From the very outset it was evident that the Schneirs intended to discredit Harry Gold.

RECOMMENDATION:

There is attached for your approval a letter to all Offices alerting the Offices to the tour mentioned above and instructing that any inquiries concerning the Schneirs or the publication be directed to the Bureau.

The following is submitted pursuant to your request for an explanation as to why action was not initiated by me with the New York Office to fix responsibility for the destruction of an original hotel registration in the handwriting of Harry Gold on 9/19/45.

On 9/3 I was assigned to the desk of Inspector Donald E. Moore who was then on annual leave. I received from the Laboratory the original letter from Martin Sobell's attorney which requested that the defense be permitted to examine the original hotel registration card of the Albuquerque Hilton Hotel for June 3, 1945, and for September 19, 1945. A note was immediately prepared under my direction to advise that we were reviewing files concerning the location of the cards, following which we would consult with the Department as to how to answer Sobell's attorney. This was done in order that Bureau officials could be aware of the request made of the Bureau. An immediate file review of the voluminous files of the Rosenburg, Sobell and Gold cases was initiated. At the same time, I called the Albuquerque Office requesting that they initiate a file review to locate the documents in question. Later when I learned that one of the documents may have been sent to the New York Office, I instructed that they be contacted and the Bureau should be advised by teletype of the results of the search to locate the pertinent hotel registrations. By teletype 9/3 the Albuquerque Office advised of the destruction of the June 3, 1945, registration by the Albuquerque Hilton Hotel. By teletype dated 9/3 New York Office advised that the September 19, 1945, record was destroyed on February 11, 1960. When this was brought to my attention on 9/7 while still assigned to the desk of Inspector Donald E. Moore, I telephonically contacted Special Agent in Charge Schmit in New York and requested him to advise why the hotel registration had been destroyed. On the same day Special Agent in Charge Schmit in effect informed me that the registration had been destroyed during a regular semiannual review of bulky exhibits, that the registration had served its purpose and the New York Office believed at the time (this was in 1960) that it had no further value. Special Agent in Charge Schmit also advised that they did not have the approval of the United States attorney to destroy the document and that they had not consulted the Bureau concerning their action. On the same day, I discussed with the Assistant to the Director Belmont the necessity for consulting with the Department prior to answering the letter from Sobell's attorney and it was felt that there was no need for such

Under date of September 9, 1965, two memoranda were prepared, the purpose of which was to recommend how to respond to Sobell's attorney. Both memoranda, one of which was a synopsis-type memorandum, stated that the September 19, 1945, registration was destroyed by the New York Office in the normal course of purging their files. These memoranda did not initiate administrative action if a delinquency had occurred since such was not in issue at the time and the only issue was how to respond to the request received from Sobell's attorney. On the original of the synopsis memorandum of September 9, the Director noted to the effect that the September, 1945, registration should not have been destroyed by our New York Office and that this might be very embarrassing in the future. He instructed that instructions be issued so that this could not happen in the future. When this was received in the Soviet Section, I discussed with Inspector Donald R. Moore how we could best comply with the Director's instructions and it was agreed that a suitable letter to all Special Agents in Charge should go forward.

MORTON SOBELL ESPIONAGE - RUSSIA

This memorandum recommends that the attorneys for Morton Sobell, convicted espionage agent, be advised the originals of hotel registration cards for Harry Gold who stayed at the Hotel Hilton in Albuquerque on two occasions in 1945 are no longer available.

BACKGROUND:

By letter dated August 31, 1965, William M. Kunstler of the law firm of Kunstler, Kunstler, and Kinoy, attorneys for Morton Sobell, advised that during the trial of Sobell and the Rosenbergs in 1951 a photostat of what purported to be a registration card of the Hotel Hilton, Albuquerque, for June 3, 1945, in the name of Harry Gold was introduced into evidence; that he understands our Agents visited the Hilton Hotel in May, 1950, and procured this card as well as a card for the registration of Gold at the same hotel on September 19, 1945. Kunstler requested their handwriting expert be permitted to examine the original cards if in the possession of the Bureau and. if not, his firm be advised of the exact whereabouts of the cards, Kunstler asked for this information in connection with a petition to be filed on behalf of Sobell under Title 28 United States Code, Section 2255. (Section 2255 provides for a motion on behalf of a prisoner to vacate, set aside or correct his sentence on various grounds.

This new legal action is probably based on information set forth in a book entitled "Invitation to an Inquest" by Walter and Miriam Schneir, published in August, 1965, which attacks the Government's case against the Rosenbergs and Sobell. One of the witnesses in that case was Harry Gold, admitted Soviet agent who acted as a courier between his principal and Klaus Fuchs, British scientist and admitted Soviet agent. Gold testified that in June, 1945, he went to Santa Fe, New Mexico, to meet Fuchs and on instructions from his superiors, went to Albuquerque (sixty miles from Santa Fe) to contact David Greenglass. He arrived in Albuquerque about 8:30 p.m. on June 2, 1945, and went to the Greenglass home and found no one there. He spent the night in a rooming house and on Sunday morning June 3, 1945, he registered in

the Hilton Hotel in Albuquerque paying the day rate of \$1.50. He contacted Greenglass that day and left for New York that evening. During the trial Defense Counsel agreed to admit a photostat of the registration card of the Hilton Hotel, dated June 3, 1945, to be introduced into evidence by the Government making it unnecessary for a representative of the hotel to travel to New York to identify the original document.

ACCUSATIONS MADE IN BOOK:

The Schneirs in the book noted that the photostat of the registration card had a handwritten time of June 3, 1945, on the face but a time and date stamp of June 4, 1945, on the reverse side. Since Gold had also registered at the same hotel on September 19, 1945, the authors had photostats of the registration cards with both dates examined by Mrs. Elizabeth McCarthy, an alleged handwriting expert. McCarthy is the same individual who appeared in the Alger Hiss case attempting to prove "forgery by typewriter." McCarthy expressed doubt that the June, 1945, card was filled out by the hotel clerk and the statement is made in the book that McCarthy would like to examine the originals of the cards.

The Schneirs also note that the September 19, 1945, card had the initials of Agents of the FBI and a hotel representative while the June 3, 1945, had only the initials of the hotel manager. From these allegations the authors make a strong suggestion that the June 3 card is a false one manufactured by the FBI in order to place Gold in Albuquerque on June 3 since on June 4 a deposit was made in the Greenglass bank account of a portion of the money which Gold gave to the Greenglasses. The authors feel that Gold was not in Albuquerque on June 3 and, therefore, did not give any money to the Greenglasses. The authors also make the statement that the September 19, 1945, card was not introduced into evidence and referred to it as being "suppressed" by the Government.

The authors also feel that United States Attorney deliberately used the photostat of the June registration card in order to avoid having a representative of the hotel appear on the stand and subjected to cross-examination concerning the conflict in dates.

CHECK OF BUREAU FILES:

Our files show that the Albuquerque Office obtained the registration card of June 3, 1945, from Fletcher L. Brumit, manager of the Hotel Hilton, and forwarded this to the Bureau by letter dated June 7, 1950. This letter also points out that Mr. Brumit

was asked about the discrepancy in the dates and he stated that all the registration cards received in the hotel on June 3, 1945, were stamped June 4 and he offered the opinion that through mechanical error the time and date stamp machine erroneously set the date for June 4 rather than June 3. In that same letter the Albuquerque Office advised that Mr. Brumit had initialed the card and wanted it returned as the hotel preferred to retain the card and would produce it in response to a subpoena. This was done and the original was not used at the trial. A check with the hotel shows that all registration cards prior to 1957 have been destroyed.

In addition, a review of the record of the trial shows that the United States Attorney obtained the consent of Defense Counsel Emanuel Bloch to admit the photostat of the card without objection. When it was introduced, United States Attorney stated, "I will ask leave to read it to the Jury and exhibit it to the jury, both the face and reverse side of the photostat received. May I proceed to read it to the jury." The record then states that Government Exhibit 16 was exhibited and read to the jury. Thus, the jury and all members of the Defense Counsel saw this card and had an opportunity to examine it. A reading of the summation made by the Defense Counsel in the trial shows that on several occasions he conceded that the testimony of Harry Gold was correct and that he was in Albuquerque on June 3, 1945. (Exhibit 16 is the June registration card)

Our files show that the registration card for the stay of Gold at the Hotel Hilton on September 19, 1945, was not introduced in evidence at the trial since it was not pertinent to the case. The original of the card was maintained by the New York Office until February 11, 1960, when it was destroyed in the normal course of purging files.

INFORMATION IN BUREAU FILES REGARDING ATTORNEYS:

Arthur Kinoy of this law firm was born September 29, 1920, in New York City. Informants who have furnished reliable information in the past report that Kinoy has had long association with the Communist Party, USA. In 1958 he attempted to activate a Communist Party professional group in New York City. As of August 5, 1964, he was Vice President of the National Lawyers Guild. Information was also received on November 10, 1964, that he had been retained by the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell to take over the legal leadership in the Sobell case. His name is on the Security Index.

William Moses Kunstler was born July 7, 1919, in New York. He is an attorney who has been active in Communist Party front organizations and in contact with Communist Party members. On

September 16, 1964, he participated in a radio discussion-type program during which the book "The FBI Nobody Knows" by Fred Cook was discussed. Kunstler stated that Mr. Hoover had a totalitarian nature, was a demigod and had achieved a position of power to such an extent that he was feared by politicians at all levels. Kunstler claimed that he had been told by someone in the Bureau that the Director was going to resign in two months. Concerning civil rights, Kunstler claimed that only southern Agents were assigned to FBI Offices in the south until recently and that the Director's "fetish" for maintaining favorable relations with local police departments had forestalled action in civil rights cases. Kunstler stated he felt there was discrimination against Jews and Negroes in the FBI and this was probably due to the efforts of the FBI to recruit Agents who resembled the "all American boy," that is Agents who would be acceptable in all parts of the country.

kunstler also participated in a television program entitled "The Les Crane Show" on December 5, 1964. Crane began by asking two questions of his audience: "Was J. Edgar Hoover imprudent in making his statements about Martin Luther King?" "Should he be removed?" Kunstler and Robert Morris, former counsel for the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, were introduced during the last thirty minutes. Kunstler stated that the Director had been notorously delinquent in the south and that if he had any dignity he would resign after his remarks regarding Reverend King. Kunstler also said the Warren Commission justifiably criticized the FBI, that Lee Harvey Oswald was a known Soviet defector and the FBI should have furnished this information to the Secret Service. Kunstler also alleged that the Director had worked very well with every conservative in the Senate and every southern legislator regards him as a States Righter. Kunstler is on the Reserve Index, Section A.

Michael J. Kunstler is a brother of William. His name appeared on a list of names made available by a confidential informant on May 21 and 22, 1961, which was maintained at the headquarters of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, 799 Broadway, New York City. The name of his brother William Kunstler also appeared on this list.

OBSERVATIONS:

The story of the hotel registration card of Gold is an obvious attempt to make an issue where none exists. We noted the discrepancy in the dates when we first obtained the card in June, 1950, and resolved the question. The United States Attorney read the front and back of the photostat of the card in Court and the jury and all attorneys were on notice of the discrepancy. It is felt we should respond to this request with a terse letter noting that these items are no longer available.

WALTER SCHNEIR appeared at a "meet the author" meeting, Garrett Park, Maryland, on October 3. At the meeting, HELEN SOBELL announced that recently her attorneys received a letter from J. EDGAR HOOVER, Director of the FBI, in answer to their request to see HARRY GOLD's hotel registration card from the Hilton Hotel, Albuquerque, New Mexico. Mrs. SOBELL remarked that Mr. HOOVER stated in his letter that "due to the passage of time the cards are no longer available." She commented that based on this reply, her attorneys are planning in the near future to subpoena Director HOOVER and to take a deposition as to who had control of the card, where they were stored, who moved them, who last saw them; were they actually destroyed; and, if so, who ordered them destroyed.

According to Mrs. SOBELL, the purpose of seeing the cards is that SCHNEIR, the author, found that on the face of GOLD's registration card there appeared a date that GOLD registered at the hotel. However, on the reverse side of the card appeared a hotel date-stamp of the following day. Therefore, they have concluded that the hotel card is a forgery.

A Source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that there was a meeting on Sunday, October 3, 1965, from 5:00PM to 7:00PM at the home of Mark and Evelyn Harris, 10905 Montrose Avenue, Garrett Park, Maryland. About 25 to 35 people attended. The meeting was to "meet the author," Walter Schneir, who spoke about his book "Invitation to an Inquest - A New Look at the Rosenberg - Sobell Case." The announcement for the meeting did not contain a sponsoring organization and no sponsoring organization was mentioned at the meeting. Schneir stated during his speech that the trial of Morton Sobell had fallacies and that Morton Sobell was tried by the press.

There were no tickets sold for the meeting and no donations were collected. Helen Sobell announced that money is made by the sale of Schneir's book. She collected money at the meeting for books to be delivered later. About sixty to seventy-five books at \$6.00 apiece were sold at the meeting. Mrs. Sobell took the money and said she had to pay the publisher to publish the book. They had already distributed 2500 books. Another 1000 are to be delivered to the offices of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell (CSJMS) in New York City on October 5, 1965. Those bought at the October 3 meeting will be mailed to the Washington, D. C., purchasers from themelood books. Mrs. Sobell announced that funds are raised from the difference between the \$6.00 paid for the book and the money she has to pay the publisher.

The source further advised that Harris' wife, Evelyn, was also a member of the Navy Department CP Cell during the same period.

COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell, the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg - Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and then the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case'..."

In August, 1965, a book entitled "Invitation to an Inquest" by Walter and Miriam Schneir was published concerning the espionage case of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell. This book attacks the Government's case and claims that the Government knowingly used fabricated evidence. We alerted the field to this book and that the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell would be attempting to publicize this book in various sections of the country,

Washington Field Office advised that a meeting was held in a private home at Garrett Park, Maryland, on Sunday, October 3, 1965. The purpose of the meeting was to "meet the author" and Walter Schneir and Helen, Sobell, wife of Morton Sobell, appeared. Mrs. Sobell stated her attorneys planned to subpoena the Director to obtain details of the disposition of the hotel registration cards of Harry Gold at the Hotel Hilton in Albuquerque in 1945.

In this book the authors noted that the photostat of the June 3 card has a date stamp of June 4 on the back and reached the conclusion that this card probably was a forgery. The card did have a different date on the back, however, our files show that in June, 1950, when we first examined the card we noted this discrepancy and the hotel manager explained that all the June 3 cards had a date stamp of June 4 on the back indicating that the date stamp machine was in erro In addition to this, the United States Attorney read both sides of the photostat of the card in open court when it was introduced into REC- 28 10 1- 24/83evidence.



A review of the trial records shows that the original of the June 3, 1945, registration card of the Hotel Hilton was not introduced into evidence. The United States Attorney, Southern District of New York obtained the consent of Emanuel Bloch, counsel for Julius Rosenberg, to admit a photostat of it without objection to obviate the necessity of calling an official of the hotel to introduce the original card. When this photostat was introduced, the United States Attorney stated "I want to ask leave to read it to the jury and exhibit it to the jury, both the face and reverse side of the photostat received." The record then states that Government Exhibit 16 was exhibited and read to the jury. Thus no attempt was made to conceal any portion of this photostat from the jury or any member of the defense counsel staff.

It is also noted that Emanuel Bloch, in his summation, conceded that the testimony of Harry Gold was correct and that he was in Albuquerque on June 3, 1945.

The registration card of the Hotel Hilton, Albuquerque, for September 19, 1945, was not introduced into evidence.

This memorandum recommends that an inquiry received from the attorneys for Morton Sobell, convicted Soviet agent, for information relating to the disposition of hotel registration cards pertaining to the stay of Harry Gold in Albuquerque in 1945 be referred to the Department for consideration.

BACKGROUND:

By letter dated August 31, 1965 Kunstler, Kunstler and Kinoy, attorneys for Morton Sobell, convicted Soviet agent, asked the Bureau for the original registration cards for the stay of Harry Gold at the Hotel Hilton, Albuquerque, on June 3 and September 19, 1945, in order to permit a handwriting expert to examine the cards. The attorneys plan to file a notion to set aside the conviction of Sobell probably based on allegations made in a book entitled "Invitation to an Inquest" by Walter and Miriam Schneir. The Schneir's claim that Gold was not in Albuquerque on June 3, 1945. and strongly suggest that the PBI forged this registration card to establish the presence of Gold in that city on that date to substantiate the testimony of Greenglass. By letter of September 10, 1965, we informed the attorneys these cards were no longer available.

1778 REC- 16 10/-24 Our files show that the June 3, 1945, card was destroyed by the hotel in the regular course of business and the September 19, 1945, card was destroyed by our New York Office in 1960 in the course of purging files. A photostat of the June 3, 1945, card was introduced into evidence. The original had been obtained by our Albuquerque Office and forwarded to the Bureau by letter dated June 8, 1950, The FBI Laboratory identified the handwriting on the card as that of Gold, returned the card to the Albuquerque Office and it was returned to the hotel on June 20, 1950. The card was obtained from the hotel again on March 14, 1951, and forwarded to the New York Office. It was returned to Albuquerque in July, 1951, and to the hotel on August 4, 1951. The Motel destroyed the card. September 19, 1945, card was obtained by our Albuquerque Office & ... and was forwarded to the New York Office. The vas not introduced into evidence and the New York Office destroyed the card on 2/11/60.

Eunstler and Kinoy have made inquiry concerning the disposition of these cards. They also ask if we have a receipt in our files for these cards and request the names and current addresses of the persons who obtained the cards. The June 3, 1945, card has only the initials on the reverse side of FLB, which initials stand for Fletcher L. Brumit who was the manager of the Hetel Hilton in 1950. The September 19, 1945, card had the initials on the reverse side of FIP, AP and CB. The initials FIP stand for Special Agent Finis I. Parrish, now retired; the initials AP stand for former Special Agent Arthur LaPlant and CB stands for Cody Brieha, assistant manager of the Hetel Hilton in 1950. LaPlant died March 9, 1965

OBSERVATIONS:

By letter dated September 10, 1965, we did advise Mr. Yeagley of the receipt of the first letter from Sebell's attorneys and the fact that both these registration cards had been destroyed, one by the hotel and the other by our New York Office.

Inasmuch as Sobell's atterneys have indicated court action is new planned on behalf of Sobell, it is believed that this letter from Kunstler, Kunstler and Kinoy should be referred to the Department inasmuch as legal action is now involved. We will furnish to the Department information in our files concerning the questions raised by Sobell's atterneys in the above-mentioned letter.

This memorandum records a telephone call from Departmental Attorney Paul Vincent for information relating to this case.

BACKGROUND:

The attorneys for Morton Sobell, convicted espionage agent, have advised they plan to file a motion to set aside the conviction of Sobell. They plan to base this motion on allegations made in the book entitled "Invitation to an Inquest" that the FBI forged a registration card for Harry Gold, Government witness, at the Hotel Hilton, Albuquerque, for June 3, 1945. The book alleges the forgery was done in order to substantiate the testimony of David Greenglass. Sobell's attorney requested advice on the disposition of this card as well as a registration card for Harry Gold at the same hotel for 9/19/45 in order that a handwriting examination can be conducted. In view of the impending legal action this matter was referred to Assistant Attorney General Yeagley.

CURRENT INQUIRY:

On December 9, 1965, Departmental Attorney Paul Vincent telephonically contacted Special Agent James P. Lee in the Soviet Section for information concerning this case. He asked if the FBI Laboratory had conducted a handwriting examination of the June 3 and September 19, 1945, cards. He was informed that such an examination was done and a positive mentification was made of the handwriting of Harry Gold. No examination was conducted of the clerk's handwritten notations made on the card. It is noted that Elizabeth McCarthy, the handwriting expert hired by Sobell's attorney, has expressed doubts that the clerk's notations on the June 3 and September 19 cards were prepared by the same clerk although the same initials appear on both cards. Mr. Vincent also asked if the September 19, 1945, card was used in any other legal action. Mr. Vincent was referred to the book "Invitation to an Inquest" which points out on page 384 that United States Attorney Gerald Gleeson, Philadelphia, told Judge McGranery that Gold had stayed over night at the Hotel Hilton in Albuquerque, New Mexico All September 1945, and was registered under his own name.



Reference is made to your letter of December J. 1965 enclosing copies of an exchange of letters between your and er, Hoover.

photostatic copies of the hotel registration cards for Harry Gold, at the Albuquerque Hilton Hotel, For June 3, and September 19, 1945, were introduced into Evidence at the trial of Norton Sobell. Only a photostatic copy of the June 3rd card was introduced into evidence by the government. This was pursuant to a stipulation by defense counsel as to its authenticity. The September 19th card was not involved in the trial.

The original card dated June 3rd was referred to the hotel on August 4, 1951, and it is our information that it was destroyed by the hotel, together with all cards dated prior to 1957, in the ordinary course of business.

The original eard dated September 19th was destroyed in the normal course of operations, by the Pederal Bureau of Investigation, on Pebruary 11, 1960.

From the nature of your letters to the Pederal Bureau of Investigation we assume that your interest in the aforementioned registration eards springs from the baseless accusations set forth in the book entitled "Invitation To In Inquest". We find it diffigult to believe that you

ROSENBERG-SOBELL CASE BEING RE-EXAMINED

IN LIGHT OF NEW EVIDENCE; U.S. PRESS ASKS

PROBING QUESTIONS ABOUT TRIAL FOR FIRST TIME

For the past fourteen years, since the spring 1951 trial and conviction of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Morton Sobell in federal court in New York City on a charge of conspiracy to commit espionage, the major U.S. press media have taken the position that the defendants were proved guilty by overwhelming evidence. The existence of such "overwhelming evidence" has been assumed, more or less on faith, by most Americans.

In point of fact, although the Rosenberg-Sobell case is one of the most famous political trials of the 20th century, not a single leading U.S. newspaper or magazine ever has presented its readers with a detailed objective analysis of the evidence that sent two persons to their deaths and a third, Morton Sobell, to thirty years in prison. By contrast, numerous periodicals throughout the world have raised serious questions about the prosecution's case and appealed for clemency for the Rosenbergs prior to their executions on June 19, 1953.

Now, with the publication of INVITATION TO AN INQUEST (Doubleday) by Walter and Miriam Schneir, the Rosenberg-Sobell case has, in effect, been reopened. For the authors of this sober five-year study -- which Notel Prize winner Harold C. Urey says "should be serious reading for all those interested in the integrity of American justice" -- have uncovered and documented startling new evidence that led them to the conclusion that the Rosenbergs and Sobell were completely innocent.

Attorneys for Morton Sobell, the surviving defendant in the case, will shortly go into the same federal court in New York City where the original trial was held to seek immediate freedom or a new trial for their client on the basis of this newly discovered material. The attorneys will charge that Morton Sobell was denied his constitutional right to a fair trial because the prosecution used against him forged evidence and perjured testimony and also suppressed evidence that would have been beneficial to the defense.

If the court grants a hearing, it would enable the defense to call for questioning various government witnesses, U.S. attorneys, and F3I agents and officials who participated in the preparation and prosecution of the Rosenberg-Sobell trial. Morton Sobell has been in prison since the time of his arrest, shortly after the outbreak of the Korean War. He was then 33 years of age; he is now 48. Despite the intervention of many eminent individuals, he has been denied parole repeatedly.

In the past few months, since the publication of INVITATION TO AN INQUEST, the attitude of the U.S. press towards the Rosenberg-Sobell case has changed dramatically. For the first time, millions of Americans have been reading (as well as hearing on radio and television) that there are indeed serious unanswered questions about this case -- questions that must be responded to, in particular, by Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The following are excerpts from recent U.S. book reviews and newspaper columns. (The full review or column is available on request.):

NEWSWEEK: "Whatever the ruling on the [Sobell] motion, the Schneirs' book, like the case itself, is disquieting. Not a line of it can be readily dismissed as mere apologetics. No scrap of evidence is transparently flimsy....The Rosenbergs lie in an unquiet grave."

WASHINGTON STAR: "...it is difficult to read the book without coming to the conclusion that at the least it is unlikely that the Rosenbergs and Sobell were guilty....Even if one discards all but their mildest -- and most likely -- contention, it seems to the layman that they have assembled sufficient evidence to warrant a reopening of the case."

Edgar Hoover and from Irving H. Continuing Effort for Truth in the Rosenberg-Sobell Case
Court Action Seeks Freedom for Morton Sobell

SUMMARY OF MOTION TO VACATE SENTENCE

According to Title 28, United States Code, \$2255, it is possible for a federal prisoner who claims that his sentence was illegally imposed to move for his release. One of the main grounds for such a motion is that "the sentence was imposed in violation of the Constitution or laws of the United States..." The motion is made before the court which originally sentenced the prisoner, in this case the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York.

In brief, Morton Sobell is claiming that he was illegally convicted of a conspiracy to transmit information relating to the national defense to the Soviet Union because the prosecution (1) knowingly used perjured testimony and forged documents, and (2) suppressed evidence that would have proved his innocence. He now asks only for a hearing in which to prove the truth of his charges.

The government's case was based solely and exclusively on the existence of a grand conspiracy among confessed atomic spies David and Ruth Greenglass, admitted Soviet courier Harry Gold, former Russian Vice-Consul Anatoli A. Yakovlev, the Rosenbergs and Mr. Sobell for the purpose of transmitting atomic bomb information to the Soviet Union. The only legally sufficient evidence to support this conspiracy was an elleged meeting between the Greenglasses and Gold on June 3, 1945, in Albuquerque, N.M. As the prosecution well knew, this meeting never took place.

In order to prove that it did, the government introduced the only documentary evidence as to Gold's presence in Albuquerque on June 3, 1945 -- namely, a photostatic copy of a Hotel Hilton registration card. This card is a provable forgery. Not only did it bear a timedate stamp for the following day, but it is visibly different from legitimate cards issued by the hotel at approximately the same time.

This photostat was introduced into evidence at the trial as Exhibit 16 a day after the testimony of Harry Gold, when it would normally have been proferred. The prosecution waited until it was assured that Gold was not going to be cross-examined by the defense to offer the card. Obviously, it did not want Gold to be questioned about a document that materially contradicted his own testimony and varied from legitimate cards.

Mrs. Elizabeth McCarthy, a recognized handwriting expert who has examined Exhibit 16 and a legitimate card, has come to the conclusion that there are serious doubts as to the authenticity of the former. However, she insists that only by a microscopic examination of the originals can she render a final opinion. Despite extensive correspondence from Mr. Sobell's lawyers to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover requesting the production of the cards for such an examination,

Gold's pre-trial statements to his own lawyers, which were not made available to Sobell or the Rosenbergs, clearly reveal that he perjured himself about the June 3rd Albuquerque meeting. Among other things, they indicated that he did not remember the name "Greenglass", had never stayed at the Hilton Hotel in June, 1945, had not used a jello box side or the name "Julius" to identify himself in Albuquerque and had received information of no value from an ananymous soldier. It was only after hundreds of hours with the FBI that the story he told at the trial emerged.

Moreover, the government failed to call to the stand a woman who, according to the prosecution, was "an espionage courier", even though her name appeared on its list of witnesses. As it well knew, this woman -- one Ann Sidorovich -- would have denied any espionage activities and shattered the entire jello box side fabrication.

Lastly, the financial history of the Greenglasses suggests that they were receiving money regularly from a variety of unexplained sources. In fact, it was their deposit of \$400.00 on June 4, 1945, the day after a weekend when Greenglass would normally be on leave from his military duties, that led to the date of the fabricated Gold visit to Albuquerque. The government took the juxtaposition of the \$400.00 deposit and the weekend to arrive at the June 3 date. All that was then necessary, outside of the Greenglass perjury, was some documentary proof of Gold's presence in Albuquerque. Hence the forged registration card.

In his petition, Sobell will ask for bail or an order providing for his presence at any hearing. Although he has filed other petitions, on different grounds, prior to this one, he has never received the hearing provided for in the statute. If he is granted such a hearing, he is prepared to place people on the stand to testify to the truth of every charge he makes. As the citizen of a country which prides itself on its adherence to due process, he is entitled to be heard. If he is, perhaps the truth will out after fifteen long years.

The attorneys for Morton Sobell are William M. Kunstler and Marshall Perlin. The date for the filing of the motion is January 6, 1966.
