

According to New Scotland Yard, RUSSELL is not a member of the British Communist Party. At one time he leaned to the "left" but is now believed to be sincere in his beliefs. He was also described as an ardent pacifist.







THE SOBELL CASE To the Editor of the Manchester Guardia Sir,-Lord Russell's assertion that he United States has become a police State is so fantastic as to be undeserving of any reply. Not only has he been grossly unfair to the United States, he has been grossly unfair to his own reputation. He ought not to have let emotion gallop away with him.

As an American I owe thanks to Wade Mack for pointing out that the F.B.I. has no police powers and for outlining so clearly the scope and nature of its activities. Mr Mack's opening paragraph, however, is as misleading as his subsequent exposition is welcome. He says that "when the (Rosenberg) trial was over and the verdict delivered, there was not one faction or group or section of the public, with the exception of the Communist party, that did not believe that justice had been done." This statement is ambiguous. On the one hand, it might mean that the only organised body of opinion which protested the result of the trial was the Communist party. On the other hand, it might mean that everyone in the United States, with the exception of the Com-munists, agreed that justice had been done. In the first case, the statement has hardly any significance. In the second case, it is palpably untrue. There were many individuals in the United States who were not Conmunists and who had doubts, at least the second to the justice of the second case. with regard to the justice of the sentence. It might be well to remember that two Supreme Court justices were among them. A dissenting opinion is not an exercise in rhetoric. But the implication of Mr Mack's statement is even more unfortunate. That seems to be that anyone who voices doubts about the justice of the Rosenbergs' execution is by definition a Communist. To the Editor of the Manchester Guardian Sir,—The reactions of my American countrymen to Lord Russell's original letter on Morton Sobell are more alarming than the actual contents of that letter. Such over-righteous indignation comports ill with America's pride in its capacity for self-criticism. Some of your correspondents assume Some of your correspondents assume that criticism of the F.B.I. must be unfounded, must be merely anti-American, must be the result of falsifying and distorting some facts and inventing others. These things I find it inconceivable to associate with Lord Russell; though his letter surprised me, it was clear that the appropriate response was to inquire further, seek response was to induite further, seem more information from Lord Russell (such as he supplied in his second letter), and weigh his charges as objectively as possible. Your correobjectively as possible. Your correspondents merely piped shrill polemics, told stories about fine young F.B.I. agents they have known, and even tried to discredit Lord Russell's claim by ad hominem remarks which we clearly intended to discredit him. This technique only lends colour to his complaints.

Indeed why do these self-appointed spokesmen for the United States set so emotional when America is referred to as a Police State? Why is it so absurd to compare the United States to Fascist Germany and Communist Russia? If such charges are false then Russia? If such charges are talse then they are false; it should be easy to prove it. But why the hysterics? Is it not perhaps that prima facie at least the last six years of American internal affairs make such imputations plausible? A case subject to a foreign jurisdiction no doubt calls for even greater caution—and diffidence. But the case of the Rosenbergs, for whom nothing can now be done, and of Mr Sobell, who is still alive—so far as existence in Alcatraz can properly be so described—has aroused world—

wide interest for several years.
In June of last year Mr John
Wexley published in America a long and fully documented account of the matter under the fitle of "The Judgment of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg."
It runs to 664 pages, including 22 appendices. So far as I know, no action has yet been taken against the author or publishers. author or publishers, nor, again so far as I know, is any action contemplated. as I know, is any action contemplated. Yet it contains statements of fact and express inferences from those facts which, if they were made in corresponding circumstances in this country, would leave both author and publishers with no defence, not merely against protections for gross contempt of pourt unless indeed they for true. If they are true, and they do not seem to save been challenged, all freese convictions are quite plainly gross missirriages of justice. If they are not ENCLOSURE

true, I cannot understand Mr Wexley's immunity, nor why no injunction against further publication has been sought. For myself, I have little doubt that they are substantially true. On lay, I am confident, the United States will be as ashamed of these trials as they already are of the Secondary they already are of the Sacco and Vanzetti affair and as France is of the Dreyfus case.

It is not possible to re-try these cases in the correspondence columns of a newspaper. But perhaps the views of some representative Americans may be of interest. The trial judge made it abundantly clear that the case against Mr Sobell rested upon the sole evidence of one Elitcher, a man who had already been convicted—he has never been sentenced—of perjury. Of his evidence Mr Elmer Davis declared: "I cannot believe the evidence of Elitcher," and Mr McWilliams in "The Nation": "His testimony is inherently incredible." Professor Love, professor of law in the North-Western University, has said: "The 30-year sentence imposed upon Morton Sobell is a blight upon the reputation of American justice." Mr Sobell rested upon the sole evidence the reputation of American justice."

Judge Frank, in a dissenting judgment in the Circuit Court of Appeals, said: in the Circuit Court of Appeals, said:
"There was error, in this respect, which requires that Sobell be given a new trial," while Dr Harold C. Urey, a well-known atomic scientist and a Nobel Prize winner, has declared:
"The integrity of justice as it is administered in the United States is at stake. Mr Sobell was not ormerly stake. . . . Mr Sobell was not properly tried and the verdict and sentence were not justified."

No human institution is infallible. No one expects it to be. What undermines confidence in the administration of fustice is not doubt about its infallibility but doubt about its integrity. The F.B.I. has been justly criticised on occasion, like all security services, but to compare it with the agents of "other police States" is simply fartastic, and a charge which furthermore, by implication, asserts that the Supreme Court and the Presidents and officials of both and the Presidents and officials of both Democratic and Republican administrations have been false to their oaths to uphold the Constitution. This charge I flatly reject, even when Lord Russell palliates President Eisenhower's guilt by making it guilt by morance.

Lastly, as to the effect of the letter which you published. I cannot imagine that Lord Russell serfously believes that such a shrill and distorted protest can serve any useful nurpose as far as

THE CASE OF MORTON SOBELL

To the Editor of the Manchester Guardian Sir.—The letter from Professor Perkins which appeared in your issue of March 31 demands an answer. It is possible to read through the whole of possible to read through the whole of the official report of the judicial pro-ceedings in the Sobell case without learning many of the most important facts. Some, however, can be learnt from the official report. Professor Perkins objects to my saying that Sobell was condemned on the evidence of Flitcher alone. As to this Judge of Elitcher alone. As to this, Judge Irving Kaufman in his charge to the jury said: "If you do not believe the testimony of Max Elitcher as it pertains to Sobell, then you must acquit the defendant Sobell." Elitcher's motives for giving false testimony do not, of course, appear in the official report. But the interesting fact does appear there that the chief agent in the prosecution was McCarthy's now discredited henchman Cohn.

I should be glad to know how Professor Perkins would defend the kidnapping of Sobell and the illegal stamping of his card by the United States immigration officer as "Deported from Mexico." As for the "blanket indictment" of the F.B.I., everybody knows at least the use that the F.B.I. has made of repentant Communists. It is generally recognised in modern times that confessions extorted by torture in past ages are unreliable, but it is thought that testimony extorted from confessed perjurors by the threat of prosecution should be accepted without question.

Testerday, at the Maro-Sanguler home, Mrs. 2082 SOBELL, mether of MORTON SOBELL, codefendant of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG - and innocent like them - was received by a axaber of persons to whom she talked in a bewildering manner regarding her son's plight. MONTON SOBELL, who was sentenced to thirty years imprisonment (without any precise charge being preferred against him, is presently incorcerated in Alcatras, where he is living under terrible conditions (Alcatraz is reserved, in the United States, for criminals, recidiuists, and for particularly dangerous or unbalanced bandita).

From the time of BOBELL's arrest pressure was brought to bear upon him to cause him to compromise the 2082HBERGe. 80BELL always refused to do so and still refuses.

His nother sited the following factor Prior to MORTON SOBELL's transfer (three years age) to Alcatron the prisen warden of the institution in which he was then located told 2082 SOBILL:

"Tour non would not have to go to Alestran if he wented to talk...." Last year an Agent of the IBI (American political police) went to locate #OBELL in his cell and spoke to him in the following tenor: "You can't do any more harm to the 208EFBEEGS. Thy don't you think about yourself? All you have to do so to talk, to 'cooperate' with we and you will be free."

A decision was taken by all persons present to make known the case of MORTON SOBELL and to struggle in order to cause function to be rendered to him.

WITHIN THE LATTICED SOLITUDE OF IMPRISONMENT IN ALCATRAZ

MORTON BORELL, CORETENDANT OF ETHEL AND JULIES ROSENBERG

A woman, a mether to at this moment in France to remind everyone that a man, her son, MORTON BOBELL, is suffering unjustly in the latticed solitude, in the terrible prison of Aloatras, the American "Bovil's Island." MORTON BOBELL was the sedefendent of BIHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG, and like them he is innocent. But the dossier against him was so empty, so inexistent, so pearly fabricated that he was not sentenced to death, and yet to thirty years imprisonment, that is to say, almost for life. It was only because the ROSEHBERG's frama was more urgent, because it was more trreparable, because there was the threat of the electric chair, that BOBELL was slightly forgotten, because they were thinking only of ETHEL and JULIUS; the shadow of Sing-Sing overshadowed that of Aloatras.

How was MORTON SOBELL linked to the ROSENBERG affair? One should bring it back to mind: He was acquainted with JULIUS ROSENBERG, when he had known as a schoolnate in college, and he had, for his misfortune, a friend and neighbor: MAI BLITCHER. This ELITCHER, who had in 19-" signed a fraudulent declaration claiming that he did not belong to the Communist Party, let himself become terrorized by the FBI (American political police) and, because of the promise - which was lived up to - that he would not be nelected for his perjury, he agreed to implicate his friend SORELL in order that the FBI could "strengthen" the charges against the ROSENBERGS.

THE F. B. I. S FABLE

And here is the fable which the FBI suggested that ELITCHER should present squinet NOBELL at the trial; ELITCHER would testify that there had been two occasions on which he was able to learn that ROSENBERG and SOBELL were spice. The first time, in June, 1944, in Washington, JULIUS ROSENBERG telephoned ELITCHER, whom he had not seen in five or six years, and then went to his home. After a vague conversation of a few minutes he asked Wro. ELITCHER to leave the from; he then declared that they should thelp the Eucsians in their war effort by furnishing them scientific military information. JULIUS ROSENBERG then revealed to ELITCHER that he was a spy, that SOBELL was also one and invited ELITCHER to join them.

The second time, in July or August 1948, KLITCHER paid a visit to 808ELL's home, in Gullus, 280 kilometers from Tashington. Upon arriving he told 808ELL that two cars (undoubtedly the F. B. I.) had followed him from Tashington. 808ELL became furious and told him that he had at his home some important "secret documents" which he needed, producing "the information" and furnishing it. He decided on the most with information and furnishing it. He decided on the most with JULIUS ROSENBERG and asked ELITCHER to accompany him, under the pretext that he was too tired to drive. He nevertheless drove the car himself all the way to New York, to the ROSENBERGs' home. ELITCHER saw SOBELL place microfilms in the car's glove compartment. SOBELL, having left ELITCHER in the car when he went up to the ROSENBERGs' home, told him upon returning that "all went well."

IMPROBABLE "TESTINOUT".

The improbability, the absurdity of this "testimony," which cost SORELL a sentence of thirty years imprisonment is manifest. A few simple questions bring out the lies

- I) Is it conceivable that JULIUS ROSENBERG, who had not seen ELITCHER in five years, would propose to him, at the end of fifteen minutes of conversation, that he become a "opy," and do so directly?
- 2) Furthermore, following this proposal which was accepted, according to ELITCHER can we believe that BOSENBERO never pursued this conversation any further and never asked any information from ELITCHER?

a) Is it thinkable that SOBELL, whom ELITCHER had just told that he was being trailed by the F. B. I., would rush, with ELITCHER in his ear, straight to the ROSENBERGE home?

a) Can one believe that the F. B. I., which had bept track of what went on, and ELITCHER, and SOBELL, and the BOSSHBERGE, would have natted two years without even questioning such other?

We could detech downs of other improbabilities. And nevertheless the testinony of ELITCHER, an admitted perfurer, which furnished no suidence to support his statements, is enough to send NORTON SORELL to prison where he is still located.

And he runs the rick of remaining there enother twenty-five years, unless he should period before them, if the force of public opinion does not intercede to tree him.

Winterrowd Winterrowd Division of the Department with reference to captioned case.

It was explained that we had received information indicating that motion welld be made by the defense for a new trial for Morton Sobell. The basis for the motion would be that the Government used perjured evidence in the trial. It was indicated to us that an attorney named Perlin would represent the defendant.

We explained that our New York Office had contacted Assistant Enited States Attorney Silvio J. Mollo furnishing him this information. Mr. Mollo told our Agents that Perlin had requested Photostats of the Government trial exhibits pertaining to Sobell. Mollo also advised that it was his decision that there was no reason to retain the originals of Sobell's property presently maintained by the Bureau and it was his intention to return the documents. Mollo requested that we prepare Photostats of Sobell's property, stating that the return of the originals would deprive Perlin of the argument that the Government was withholding Sobell's property and that the Photostats would be sufficient for the Government's use in the event of a hearing. It was explained that Mr. Mollo had requested that the chain of evidence be retained by the employee who Photostats the documents and Agents who receive the Photostats initial the same. We explained that we were presenting this matter to the Department in view of the importance of the Sobell case and in the belief that the Department would want to consider the action before authorizing the release of the material.

Mr. Foley telephonically contacted Assistant Attorney General Tompkins, who instructed that he was not going to authorize the release of any material relating to Sobell until the matter had been taken up with him personally by the United States Attorney for the Southern District in New York. Mr. Foley requested that we recontact Assistant United States Attorney Mollo and explain that this had been discussed at the Departmental level and that Mr. Tompkins would not authorize the release of the material until he had been personally contacted by United States Attorney. The above material is in the possession of the New York Office.

On 5/10/56 with Supervisor J. P. Lee, a conference was vinterrowd held with Thomas Hall of the Department relative to the petition Tele. Room for a new trial filed by subject. A Photostat of the notice of Gandy motion and petition was given to Mr. Hall. He also reviewed Photostats of the exhibits filed. These consist of several hundred pages in Epanish and consist of the Mexican Constitution, immigration laws, treaty and extradition et cetera. Hall stated Department would not need these and if need arises he will call us.

Mr. Hall stated off hand the only item which might cause any concern is the allegation in the petition that the Government knowingly used false and perjurious testimony at the trial. This refers to the allegation that James S. Huggins, I&NS inspector who testified at the trial and introduced a manifest card indicating Sobell was deported from Mexico, knew Sobell was not legally deported. Hall noted that actually Huggins testified that he filled out this card in the regular course of business and that he made this notation as a result of his own observations which consisted of noting that subject was escorted to the I&NS office by approximately 9 Mexican police officers. Huggins further testified he put this notation on the card while Sobell was in the I&NS office. He further stated that none of the Mexican officials told him Sobell was being deported. Of course, the decision as to the calling of the witnesses at the trial was made by the U.S. Attorney, So. District of NY (SDNY).

Mr. Hall advised he is assigning Kevin Monroney and Marvin Segal to start research on this matter immediately and if they have any questions, they will contact us. He also stated he would contact Paul Williams, USA, SDNY, and will coordinate the research on this matter with Williams and his staff.
