



RE: MORTON SOBELL ESPIONAGE - R

Warden L. L. THOMPSON, Federal Detention Headquarters, 127 Most Street. New York City, advised on August 22, 1952 that who is being held at the Federal House of Letention, is due to be moved to a Federal prison on instructions from JAMES W. BENNETT, Director of the Bureau of Prisons, Washington, D. C. THOMPSON stated that he has done everything in his power to hold at the Federal House but that unless he is given authority by the Department to hold at West Street, it will be necessary to move him.

Acting on instructions received from the Bureau by teletype the United States Attorney, MYLES J. LANE, Southern District of New York, was contacted by the writer, and the matter was discussed with him. LANE stated that he would telephonically contact the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C. and that he would request the Department to ask the Fureau of Frischs to hold at the Federal House of Detention for at least another two months. The following article appeared in the "Morning Freiheit" of July 2, 1952 on page 8, columns 1-5:

Chicago, July: - (By airmail) The prominent local Rabbi Dr. J. George Fox, stated that he supports the movement to win justice for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg because he believes that the death sentence against them is not just and that the scandalous sentence of death was handed down as a result of the raging hysteria prevalent in this country now.

Rabbi Fox made this statement in the latest issue of the "Sentinel", where he treats in detail why he joined the movement to save the Rosenbergs from the electric chair.

In his statement he reveals that because he has undertaken to work for the Rosenbergs he is reviled and threatened and even charged him with "communism". In his statement Fox emphasized that, as a whole, he considers himself an opponent of communism, but that he decided to help win justice for the Rosenbergs because he is profoundly convinced that the death sentence is too brutal and that if he, a spiritual leader for hO years, would not take a stand and remained silent he would be committing a frightful crims against his own conscience, and that if such people as he would not fight for justice and mercy, who would fight for it?

In his statement Fox sharply condemned the current hysteria in the country and the witch-hunters who are driving the country into the arms of catastrophe. Speaking of those who terrorize public opinion, Rabbi Fox stated, in part:

"I see that a disgraceful hysteria has been created by men of ill will. This hysteria has started having a mortal affect and that the result of this is the destruction of America. I believe that this poison has wormed its way into the minds of the people without realizing that this condition creates a disgraceful atmosphere which, if it is not soon eliminated, will eventually destroy all our freedoms."







At 10:35 A. M., 11/25/52, I telephonically contacted Inspectors Carl Hennrich, Eureau, and advised that Judge Edward Weinfeld had dewrifted to grant a further stay of removal for SOBELL to Alcatraz. The presonnel unit stay expires at 12:01 A. M., 11/26/52. In declining to grant a furthaning unit stay, Judge Weinfeld filed a memorandum in which he requested the United States Attorney to make absolutely certain that no question of fact exists which would require the defendant's presence before the court to determine the motion under Section 2255 wherein the defendant requests that his conviction be set aside on grounds of improper conduct on the part of the United States Attorney, prejudicial publicity during the trial, etc. Judge Weinfeld's memorandum requests this action of the United States Attorney in order that undue expense might not be incurred by the government in the event SORELL would be required to appear in court at a later date. 🛬

The NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE IN THE ROSERBERG CASE called upon the people of the country, yesterday, to appeal to President Truman, immediately, to save the life of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

As you know, NewYork Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman ordered the execution of the Rosenbergs the week of January 12th.

The Rosenbergs, young Jewish parents of two children, were sentenced by Judge Kaufman, on April 5,1951, to be executed on the framed charge of having given atom secrets to the Soviet Union. They have been in the death house at Sing Sing for over nineteen months. On Friday Judge Kaufman made his ruling on the request of Federal Attorney Miles J. Lans, who, just a few days ago, was revealed as a friend of the NewYork underworld boss Thomas Luchese.

Emanuel Bloch, lawyer for the Rosenbergs, that tomorrow, Monde, he would apply at the Federal District Court for a ruling to reverse the sentence against the Rosenbergs. He will also request a newtrid.

Federal Marshal William Carrol stated that the day of execution would be kept secret, and that only one representative from each of the three news agencies would be permitted to witness it: the United Press, the Associated Press and the International News Service.

and received thirty years in jail. He is now in the Federal Jail at West Street, NewYork.

The Rosenberg Committee stated that "the sending of Sobell to Alcatraz now will make it impossible for him to confer with his lawyers at a time when they are preparing legal steps". The Committee also asked why the "prosecutor wants to send Sobell three thousand miles away from his wife and children to a jail in which are held the worst hardened criminals in the country". The Committee pointed out that there are many Federal Prisons in the eastern states.

Mrs. Helen Sobell, the wife of Morton Sobell, who is playing an important role in the campaign for a newtrial for her husband and for the Rosenbergs, said that the transferring of her husband to Alcatrax Prison is the newest gruesome step in an effort by the government to force her husband to "confess to a crime which he never committed".

On Friday Federal Judge Weinfeld ordered that the transfer of Sobell be postponed until Tuesday. On Tuesday there is supposed to be a hearing on a request to reverse the sentence against Sobell.

The Rosenberg Committee calls upon the people to send letters and telegrams to Attorney General James P.Mc Granery, Justice Department, Washington, D.C., requesting that he postpone the transfer of Sobell to another jail.

A holiday delegation will visit the Rosenbergs at Sing Sing on Sunday, December 4th, the second day of Hanukah, was announced by William L.Patterson, executive secretary of the Civil Rights Congress.

The big mass-meeting was under the sponsorship of the COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE IN THE ROSENBERG CASE.

One of the main speacrs at this people's meeting was Rabbi Keyer Scharff, a well-known orthodox Rabbi from Brooklyn. Other religious speakers were Rev. Amos Murphy, of Boston; Clarence I.Duffy, minister; Rabbi Max Felshin, of the Radio City Synagogue, and others.

Mrs. Bessie Mitchell, sister of one of the two Negroes in Trenton who are still in jail after the others of the "Trenton Six" were freed, made a moving speech. She said that the Rosenbergs were treated gresiely as unjustly as her brother and the other defendants with him.

Joseph Brainin, author and social leader, was chairman of the impressive meeting. Among the speakers were Helem Sobell, wife of Morton Sobell; Mrs. Emily Hellman, neighbor of the Rosenbergs; and Sol Tischler, union leader.

The "Forning Freiheit" of October 16, 1952, on page 1, headlined: Supreme Court Orders Postponement of Execution of Rosenbergs. The column 1-2 article stated:

Washington, Oct. 15. - Today the Supreme Court ordered the postponement of the date of execution of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, in order to make it possible for them to appeal for their case to be reviewed.

On Monday the Supreme Court refused to accept their appeal thereby sealing the fate of the Rosenbergs who are the first to be sentenced to death during peace—time on a charge of "espionage". The action of the Supreme Court, which refused even to receive the appeal, astounded right—thinking people. A movement has started to demand justice for the Rosenbergs, who are victims of the war-hystoria, as stated by the committee for their defense. The latest act by the Supreme Court in postponing their execution is a minor concession to the storm of disapproval which the previous ruling aroused.

The "United Press" reports that "the lawyers for the government had planned to demand that the trial judge set the date of the execution".

As you know, the judge in the case was Irving Kaufm an, who, on April 11, 1951, handed down the death sentence, which has been condemned widely as a "gruesome and unprecedented sentence". Many people have charged that in doing this Judge Kaufman wanted to prove to the anti-semites that he, a Jew, was not mild toward the defendants who are Jews.

The defense lawyers argued before the Supreme Court that the sentence against the Rosenbergs is "gruesome and unusual", but, as mentioned, above, the Supreme Court didn't even want to receive the appeal. Now the lawyers have 15 days to appeal to the Supreme Court to change its ruling and hear the appeal.

Dear Mr. Taylor:

I am writing to ask your help in a matter which is crucial to me and to my children.

- -- My husband, Morton Sobell, has maintained and continues to maintain his innocence of the charges against him. However, his claim that the trial was most unfair and the evidence illegal and insufficient, has been rejected by the Appellate Courts, with dissents.
 - Mort's attorney and we feel, of course, that the sentence against him was most excessive, and imposed without consideration of his back-, ground and character. He was sentenced to thirty years. We have the right to ask first the trial judge, and later the President, to reduce the sentence. We would appreciate any statement you would care to make, to use for this purpose. You would not be required to make any expression of opinion you may have as to his guilt or innocence --that is now supposed to be irrelevant.

What we need is a statement (1) identifying your own present position, (2) of the nature of your relationship with Nort (3) your opportunitie to observe his conduct and character and, in the light of this (4) you opinion as to his character and personality, and (5) as to his usefulness to society as a scientist based on what you know of his work. I you feel free to say, for example, that Nort contributed substantially to the national defense of the United States, even in the period of the "cold war", that would be somewhat significant. The point is to establish that his sentence should be reduced, so that he can be rehabitated and become a useful member of society, before his talents and character are completely destroyed.

I will take the liberty of telephoning you to ask for an appointment to discuss any questions you may have.

I hope you will act in this matter.

1,200 In The Bronx Demand Pardon For Rosenbergs

Protests and tears, anger and pain were mingled at a big and stormy meeting, the night before last, at the Bronx Terrace Garden, to demand pardons for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Over 1,200 people, who jammed the hall, promised to take every possible step to seve this young Jewish couple from death.

Particularly dramatic was the speech by HELEN SOBELL, wife of 🥙 MORTON SOBELL who was sentenced to 30 years on similar charges to those which resulted in the gruesome sentence against the Rosenbergs. While Mrs. Sobell : spoke you could hear muffled crying in various parts of the hall. "How bitter it is for my child and In, Ers. Sobell said in a broken voice. it the same as the tragedy of the Rosenbergs and their two small boys. She emphasized that every minute is charged with danger, and only an unceasing stream of appeals to President Truman, and other mass action can result in the Rosenbergs remaining alive.

B.Z. GOLDBERG, who could not attend, sent a long speech which was read. In the speech Goldberg analyzed the Rosenberg case in detail - the indictment, the Judge's actions, the Supreme Court ruling - and he concluded that the Rosenbergs did not commit any crime to justify such a frightful sentence. Commenting on the appeal by the Israeli rabbis, Goldberg pointed out that it is the particular duty of every Jew to demand that President Truman save the lives of the Rosenbergs.

ALBERT KAHN, president of the JEWISH PEOPLES FRATERNAL ORDER, aroused the audience with his call to intensify the fight for the Rosenbergs. His appeal for financial assistance brought in a sizeable sum of money.

A moving speech was made by MURRAY PORTHOY, outstanding leader of the Electrical Workers Union. HERBERT RANDOLPH, was chairman. SARAH FISHMAN, a graduate of the Progressive Jewish Children's Schools, read a very appropriate poem by I.L. Peretz, in the spirit of the meeting, and another poem, in English, dedicated to the Rosenbergs. There was a dramatic presentation of the exchange of letters between Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, mince the time they were jailed.



Government Admits That Witness Against Rosenbergs Lied

In an affidavit submitted to the U.S. District Court, F.B.I. Agent John A. Harrington admitted that Ben Schneider, a government witness against Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, lied on the witness stand, and is therefore with guilty of perjury, was reported yesterday by the "Committee To Secure Justice In The Rosenberg Case".

This fact was revealed to the Court by the Rosenberg defense, and it was also brought out in the Court hearing before Judge Sylvester Ryan. which took place last Tuesday. On the basis of this fact, and on the basis of other proof, the defense petition demanded that the sentence against the Rosenbergs and against Morton Sobell be set aside and that there be a new trial.

In answer to the defense petition the government admitted the F.B.I. Agent Harrington confessed that Ben Schneider lied when he testified against the Rosenbergs. The Rosenberg defense charged the government that the prosecutor, knowing that the witness Schneider was lying, still permitted him to testify. The defense also charged that David Greenglass, the main government witness against the Rosenbergs, also lied on the witness stand.

Judge Ryan rejected the defense request to subpoens a number of hatelets people to testify, among them Judge Kaufman, who conducted the trial against the Rosenbergs and Sobell, and who sentenced them.

On the defense petition to set aside the sentence and to set a new trial, Judge Ryan promised to rule this Monday.

Yesterday, JOSEPH BRAININ, chairman of the Rosenberg Committee, sent a telegram to James Wexler, editor of the "New York Post", in which he charges that newspaper with a disgusting campaign against the Rosenbergs "aimed at see" exerting pressure on the Court which is now receiving new evidence in the Case".

"Your efforts to surpress the truth are confirmed by your refusal to accept an advertisement by the Rosenberg Committee about the sale of the Court record of the case, and also about the facts in the case. This is a violation of the American standard of freedom of the press and free speech, says the telegram.

Stating that "you opened your pages for a series of cheap, sensational garbling of the truth, which violates the tradition of honest journalism", Brainin's telegram requested that the "New York Post" give the Rosenberg Committee "paid and unpaid space" in the newspaper to present the true facts.

Testerday the Rosenberg Committee sent telegrams to the New York "Times", "Herald Tribune", "Daily News", "World-Telegram" and "New York Post", stating that the Committee "is ready to submit paid advertisements, for a whole page, giving the facts in the Rosenberg case and calling upon the President to pardon them. The Committee telegrams requested an answer.

The following article appeared in the "Morning Freiheit" of January 10, 1953, on page 1, columns 3-4:

FRIEDA KERCHWAY, editor and publisher of the magazine "Nation", in the January 10th edition, published an article under her name which calls upon President Truman to extend clemency to Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

Miss Kerchway's article "Mercy For The Rosenbergs" argues against the death sentence which Judge Irving Kaufman handed down against the Rosenbergs and says that "we express our profound hope that President Truman will find another answer. If he does not it will lay heavily on the conscience of the American people".

At this 11th hour for the set execution, Miss Kerchway stated in her article, it is not necessary to go into the question of their guilt or innocence. The only question is humanity and clemency and the question of the brutality of the sentence.

Analyzing the arguments of Judge Kaufman when he refused to change the death sentence to a lesser one, Miss Kerchway pointed out their weak points.

Testerday Judge Irving Kaufman rejected the request by Morton Sobell for a reduction in sentence. As you know, Morton Sobell was convicted together with the Rosenbergs, on the same charge. He is now in Alcatraz Prison, California. In rejecting Morton Sobell's request, Judge Kaufman argued that Sobell did not follow the example of the truitors and refused to admit his guilt and reveal the others.

Tomorrow, Sunday, January 11th, 3 P.M., there will be an emergency mass conference in Philadelphia to save the Rosenbergs. The conference will take place at the "Filographic Arts Auditorium", 2128 Walnut Street.

Appearing at this conference will be Mrs. Emile Olman, member of the National Committee To Secure Justice In The Rosenberg Case, and a number of delegates from Pennsylvania who participated in the tremendous clamency ANDEXED.





HUGH WESTON, Unitarian Minister, without portfolio, said all people, whether they believe in God or not, should stand together for peace, equality and justice. He, as a minister, considers it a privilege and obligation to support all causes such as the ROSENBERG case. He stated that nothing was proved against them and they were framed. He stated that the people are told "Look at the Soviet Unions concentration camps. We are better than they are. We just have little concentration camps." He gave the following brief of previous similar cases:

SOCRATES -- 'People lost that case.

JESUS -- People lost that case.

DREYFUS -- People lost that case.

MOONEY -- People won that case after 20 years. It was not much satisfaction to MOONEY after spending his life in jail for a frame-up.

ROSENBERG -- If they die the people will have lost that case. If they are later exonerated it will not benefit the ROSENBERGs.

He made the following differences:

Spies -- Those foreign agents working against us to intelligence -- Our men working to learn secrets of the foreign countries. We do not call them spies.

He stated that the West recognizes espionage as a necessary function of a Government branch. Even if guilty of espionage the ROSENBERGS were giving information to an ally. They should have minor punishment ala FUCHS, GOLD and GREENGLASS.
