SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

On 6/20/51, Confidential Informant T-1 furnished information by which a most probable identification of MAXWELL FIRESTONE as the last man JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his espionage organization. T-1 advised that on the July 4th week-end in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4th week-end, 1948) WILLIAM PERL brought to ROSENBERG'S home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town (Cleveland, Ohio) for an individual with a Leica camera, believed to be by the Informant to be MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, and together with a fourth man, believed to be FIRESTONE, photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption. Informant advises that ROSENBERG confided that a man, believed to be FIRESTONE, borrowed a 1949 or 1950 black convertible Buick from a friend, believed to be JAMES WEINSTEIN, to ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a "pick-up" of espionage material. T-1 states that ROSENBERG has confided that he does not know for certain, but considering all the circumstances, he believes that the Russians sent the man, believed to be FIRESTONE to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN. It is recalled that GLASSMAN thereafter went to Cleveland, Ohio, on 7/22/50 and on 7/23/50, she contacted PERL with money and instructions to go to Mexico. FIRESTONE observed by Special

Agents, New York Office, in contact with GLASSMAN on 4/5/51. JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG had been sentenced to death for Conspiracy to Commit Espionage earlier on that date. FINESTONE resided in SARANT'S apartment 6I, 65 Morton Street, New York City, believed to be ROSENBERG'S conspiratorial apartment from approximately October, 1949 until January, 1950. GARY PICKARD, who resided with FINESTONE, located and interviewed. PICKARD identified PEARL and WELDON BRUCE DINTON as in contact with FINESTONE at the Morton Street apartment on 1/29/50. PEARL and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, VIVIAN'S sister, observed together at FINESTONE WEINSTEIN, 418 East 9th Street, New York City apartment, February, 1950. FLOYD ELMEN, Jr. observed with FINESTONE and an unknown man together in New York City, April 1951. FINESTONE'S Communist affiliations set forth. Negative interviews with FINESTONE set out. Testified FBI, SDNY, 4/15, 4/17 and 6/26, 27 and 6/29/51. Background investigation including

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DETAILS:

I BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION

A. Probable Identification of Maxwell Finestone
as a Soviet Espionage Agent

1. Information Furnished by Confidential
Informant T-1

On June 20, 1951, Confidential Informant T-1, of unknown reliability, furnished information by which a most probable identification of MAXWELL FINESTONE as identical with the man who will be referred to as "X", was effected. JAMES WEINSTEIN is believed identical with the man who will be referred to as "Y".

The Informant stated that JULIUS ROSENBERG advised that the last man he recruited into his organization, which is interpreted by the Informant to mean recruited into the JULIUS ROSENBERG espionage organization, is a man described as "X" who lives with the son of a wealthy family, described as "Y". "Y" owns a black convertible Buick with a white top, either a 1949 or 1950 model. "Y" studied law, though he does not practice it, and "Y" is a personal friend of O. JOHN ROGGE. "Y" has considerable ideological arguments with his family. "X" borrowed "Y's" car to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York to see ALFRED SARANT and make a "pick-up" of espionage material.

ROSENBERG stated to Informant that he does not know for certain, but considering all the circumstances, he believes that the Russians sent "X" to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN. The Informant said that "X" may be an Abraham Lincoln Brigade Member; that ROSENBERG did not indicate "X's" profession or occupation. However, he did state that "X" lived in New York City.

ROSENBERG advised the Informant that "X" drove him to Ithaca, New York in a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible coupe owned by the individual described as "Y". T-1 stated JULIUS ROSENBERG could not drive a car and thus necessitated the need

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for an individual to drive him to Ithaca.

The Informant stated that ROSENBERG indicated to him that "PUSS", the wife of ALFRED SARANT, and the man referred to as "X", went into another room or another part of the SARANT home while ROSENBERG and SARANT talked. ROSENBERG said that they were at the SARANT residence only a few hours and then he and "X" returned to New York City.

"X", according to information furnished to the Informant by ROSENBERG, "drove like mad -- 60, 65, and 70 miles an hour all the way". ROSENBERG said that it rained all the way back to New York City.

Confidential Informant T-1 was questioned pertaining to the date of this alleged trip to see SARANT at Ithaca, New York by ROSENBERG, and the individual described as "X". The Informant stated that he does not recall ROSENBERG having furnished this date, however, based on information furnished to him by ROSENBERG pertaining to ALFRED SARANT, he believes it was probably subsequent to the completion of SARANT'S home in Ithaca, New York. It was also the observation of the Informant that this trip would have been subsequent to the purchase of the 1949 or 1950 model black convertible Buick.

ALFRED SARANT advised during interviews conducted by agents of the Albany Office (July 19 through 25, 1950) that from July, 1948 until February, 1949, he and his family lived with the WELDON BRUCE DAYTONS, Tayuga Heights Road, RD No. 1, Ithaca, New York. During this period, he stated that he worked on the construction of his house located next door. SARANT advised that from February, 1949 and up until the dates of his interview, he resided in the previously referred to house located on Tayuga Heights Road, Ithaca, New York.

ROSENBERG, according to information furnished by the Informant, in commenting on "X" stated that he believed him to be a very capable individual and showed great promise as a member of his organization. ROSENBERG also referred to him as an intelligent man.

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The Informant stated that ROSENBERG, in commenting on "X's" "great promise", stated that he showed considerable adaptability in performing duties assigned to him in his (ROSENBERG'S) organization.

This Informant further advised that on the 4th of July weekend in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4 weekend, 1948), WILLIAM PERL brought to ROSENBERG'S home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town for an individual with a Leica camera, and together with a fourth man, they photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption.

The Informant stated on July 10, 1951, that the individual who was brought in from out-of-town, according to information he had received from JULIUS ROSENBERG, was a man from Cleveland, Ohio. The Informant stated that considering all the previous information furnished to him by JULIUS ROSENBERG, he believed that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH is identical with the individual who was brought in from Cleveland.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that the fourth man is identical with the man herein described as "X".

The Informant has advised that ALFRED SARANT, WILLIAM PERL, and MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, were also members of his "organization". The Informant has interpreted this to mean that SARANT, PERL, and SIDOROVICH were Soviet espionage agents, and were affiliated with ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage endeavors. JULIUS ROSENBERG was sentenced to death for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States, on April 5, 1951.

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2. ANALYSIS OF IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION

a. "X" Lives With Son of a Wealthy Family

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York have reflected that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, who is the father of JAMES WEINSTEIN, is President of Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 7th Avenue, New York City, a ladies garment manufacturing concern.

b. "Y" Owns a Black Convertible Buick

The records of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Department of Taxation and Finance, State of New York, 80 Center Street, New York City, were reviewed on June 22, 1951. The records reflected that JAMES WEINSTEIN had owned a 1940 and a 1949 Buick convertible coupes.

Re: 1940 Buick Convertible Coupe.

A 1947 Registration Renewal Stub, No. C7590, dated January 16, 1947, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, to BOBBIE K. WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, New York, for a 1940 Buick convertible, weight 3785, 8 cyls., Serial No. 13855147, and Engine No. 54052642.

This automobile (1940 Buick) was transferred from BOBBIE K. WEINSTEIN (Mother) to JAMES WEINSTEIN (son) 211 Central Park West, New York, New York, on January 5, 1948.

A 1948 Passenger Vehicle Registration C4707, dated January 7, 1948, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles to JAMES WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, 24, New York, for this automobile.

A 1949 Passenger Vehicle Registration Renewal Stub, 3886912 (consigned to Tioga Company, New York), dated February 2, 1949, was issued to WEINSTEIN at the above address for this automobile.

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This automobile was transferred to LEONARD
X BLUM, Engineers Building, Cleveland, Ohio, on May 14, 1949.

Re: 1949 Buick Convertible Coupe

Certificate of Sale No. C411307 reflects that the GLIDDEN Buick Corporation, 1731 Broadway, New York, New York, sold JAMES WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, a 1949 Buick convertible coupe, weight 4000, model 56C, 8 cyls., Serial No. 35160786, Engine No. 53837655, and color grey on May 16, 1949.

A 1949 Passenger Vehicle Registration, No. 13382, dated May 16, 1949, Plate No. C4707, was issued for this 1949 Buick Convertible coupe in WEINSTEIN'S name at the above address. WEINSTEIN'S age is listed as 22.

A 1950 Passenger Vehicle Registration, No. 269296, dated January 30, 1950, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles for the above described 1949 Buick Convertible coupe to JAMES WEINSTEIN, 418 East 9th Street, New York 3, New York. WEINSTEIN'S date of birth is reflected as "6/17/26."

It will be noted that a 1951 passenger vehicle registration for the 1949 Buick convertible coupe in WEINSTEIN'S name is not reflected in the records of the Bureau of Motor Registration at New York, New York, nor is there any record of a transfer in ownership.

c. "Y" Studied Law. Though He Does Not Practice It

The records of Columbia University, New York City have reflected that JAMES WEINSTEIN entered Columbia Law School in September, 1949 and attended first year classes, but did not take the final examination in May, 1950. He registered for the second year, but being absent from examinations had given him a mark of failure, which, without other grades under the average rule, disqualified him, and made it necessary for him to petition in order to enter second year classes, which he has not done.

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d. "Y" Personal Friend of O. John Rogge

O. JOHN ROGGE, advised SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON on June 21, 1951, that he is personally acquainted with both JAMES WEINSTEIN and his father, JOSEPH WEINSTEIN. ROGGE stated that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN is a wealthy clothing manufacturer in New York City, and that he has represented him on occasions in the past.

ROGGE advised that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN has told him that his son, JAMES, rebelled against his wishes and had moved out of their apartment (211 Central Park West, New York City) and has taken an apartment on the Lower East Side of New York, (418 East 9th Street). JOSEPH WEINSTEIN related to ROGGE that his son, JAMES, was a stubborn and headstrong boy, who had upset him over his associates whom his father believed to be too "radical".

ROGGE states that he talked to JAMES WEINSTEIN pertaining to this, and other matters, and tried to convince him to continue his law studies and had recommended that he could study with his (ROGGE'S) son, who is also a law student.

e. "Y" Has Considerable Ideological Arguments
With His Family

It is noted that as set out above, O. JOHN ROGGE stated that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN had related to him that his son, JAMES, was a stubborn headstrong boy who had upset him over his associates, whom his father believed to be too "radical".

JOSEPH WEINSTEIN has advised ROGGE that his son, JAMES, had rebelled against his wishes and moved out of their apartment and has taken an apartment on the Lower East Side of New York City.

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f. "X" Borrowed "Y's" Car to Drive Rosenberg
to Ithaca, New York

Although it can not be definitely shown at this time that MAXWELL FINESTONE borrowed JAMES WEINSTEIN'S 1949 Buick convertible, to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, it should be noted that GARY PICKARD, who resided with JAMES WEINSTEIN and MAXWELL FINESTONE at their 418 East 9th Street Apartment, during February, 1950, has advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE borrowed WEINSTEIN'S 1949 Buick convertible to move PICKARD'S clothing from 65 Morton Street, New York City, on or about January 29, 1950 to the East 9th Street apartment. PICKARD has advised that WEINSTEIN would loan FINESTONE his 1949 Buick convertible upon request.

PICKARD also advised that FINESTONE moved into WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, sometime during the month of January, 1950, and lived there during 1950.

g. "X" May Be an Abraham Lincoln Brigade Member

On May 20, 1946, Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that on May 20, 1946 the name of one M. FINESTONE, appeared on page 37 of a souvenir program for the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade - 15th Anniversary of the Spanish Republic under the caption, "Greetings from New Yorkers."

Although it is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE would have been too young to have fought in the Spanish Civil War, inasmuch as he was born in 1922, it would appear that FINESTONE had some connection with the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, based upon the information furnished by Confidential Informant T-2.

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h. Summary

Based on the above information in this section, it is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE is identical with the unknown individual described as "X", and that JAMES WEINSTEIN is identical with the unknown individual described as "Y".

B. Alleged Espionage Activities

1. Photographic

As has been previously set forth, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that on the fourth of July weekend in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4 weekend, 1949), WILLIAM PERL brought to the ROSENBERG home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town for an individual with a Leica camera, and together with a fourth man they photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption.

The Informant stated that on July 10, 1951 that the individual who was brought in from out-of-town, according to information he had received from JULIUS ROSENBERG, was a man from Cleveland, Ohio. The Informant stated that considering all the previous information to him by JULIUS ROSENBERG, he believes that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH is identical with the individual who was brought in from Cleveland.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that the fourth man is identical with the man described as "X". It is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE is identical with the man described as "X", based on the analysis of identifiable information developed in this report.

The records of the National Advisory Committee on Aviation (NACA) in Washington, D. C., have reflected that WILLIAM PERL signed receipts for 24 classified documents on July 3, 1948. This material was obtained through the Pupin Laboratory, Columbia University, New York City.

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The records of NACA in Cleveland, Ohio, have reflected that WILLIAM PERL was on annual leave from June 26, 1948 through July 9, 1948.

From the review of a 1948 calendar the July 4 weekend would have included Saturday, July 3rd, Sunday July 4th, and Monday, July 5th.

The records of the Tucker Industries, Cleveland, Ohio, have reflected that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH was on annual leave on July 5, 1948 and it is believed that he would have been off on July 3rd and July 4th, 1948, as well, due to the weekend days.

It is noted that JULIUS ROSENBERG, as of July 4, 1948, resided at 10 Monroe Street (Knickerbocker Village) New York City.

Although the whereabouts of MAXWELL FINESTONE for the July 4th, 1948 weekend are not known, it is known that he was still in attendance at Cornell University during this period. Investigation is being directed to ascertain the whereabouts of MAXWELL FINESTONE on the July 4th weekend in question.

2. Rosenberg's Driver

As has been previously reported, Confidential Informant T-1 stated that ROSENBERG confided that "X" borrowed "Y's" 1949 or 1950 black convertible Buick to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a "pick-up" of espionage material.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that JULIUS ROSENBERG can not drive a car and thus necessitated the need for an individual to drive him to Ithaca, New York. The informant stated that ROSENBERG indicated to him that "PUSS", the wife of ALFRED SARANT, and the man referred to as "X", went into another room or into another part of SARANT'S home

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while ROSENBERG and SARANT talked. ROSENBERG said that they were at the SARANT residence only a few hours and that he and "X" then returned to New York City.

"X", according to information furnished by ROSENBERG to the Informant, "drove like mad -- 60, 65, and 70 miles an hour all the way". ROSENBERG said that it rained all the way back to New York City.

BERNARD GREENGLASS, 65 Cannon Street, New York City, brother of DAVID GREENGLASS and ETHEL GREENGLASS ROSENBERG, advised the writer during interview at the New York City Office on June 23, 1951, that JULIUS ROSENBERG could not drive a car. He had discussed with him his plans to have DAVID GREENGLASS, his brother-in-law, to teach him to drive. ROSENBERG expressed a desire to learn on several occasions.

Photographs of MAXWELL FINESTONE were exhibited to BERNARD GREENGLASS on June 23, 1951 by the writer. He stated that he does not know this individual and in no way does he connect this person with either JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG.

On June 26, 1951, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE formerly of Route No. 4, Ithaca, New York, has a current New York State Operators License, No. 5135816, issued on May 31, 1949, and to expire on September 30, 1951. The informant stated that on the reverse side of FINESTONE'S operators license his change of address to 418 East 9th Street, New York City, appears.

This operators license reflects that FINESTONE was born on July 28, 1922, is white, male, 160 lbs, 6', brown hair and eyes.

Photographic copies of this original operators license for FINESTONE have been made and are being retained as exhibits in instant investigation.

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3. Probable Identification of MAXWELL FINESTONE as Unknown Man Who Contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

a. Interview with VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and the writer interviewed VIVIAN GLASSMAN at her apartment, NA, at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of August 3, 1950. She advised that she had formerly been the girl friend of JOEL BARR and that this relationship continued until the time that he sailed for Europe in January, 1945. She advised that she had been an extremely close friend of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and she is also acquainted with ALFRED SARANT and WILLIAM PERL. She stated that on Friday, July 21, 1950, an unknown man came to her apartment during the evening hours, and having introduced himself as a friend of her former boy friend, JOEL BARR, and having in some way been connected with his leaving the country, he requested that she should go to Cleveland, Ohio, and contact a friend of hers who was an aeronautical engineer. This unknown man further stated that this aeronautical engineer was also a friend of VIVIAN'S sister, ELEANOR GLASSMAN. GLASSMAN stated that this unknown man left her \$2,000 in ten and twenty dollar bills and gave her verbal instructions to contact this aeronautical engineer who she believed to be WILLIAM PERL, and that PERL should go to Mexico. She further advised that she immediately made a reservation on the United Air Lines plane to Cleveland under the assumed name of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG, and flew to Cleveland on Saturday, July 22, 1950.

GLASSMAN stated that she contacted PERL on Sunday, July 23, 1950, at PERL'S residence at Cleveland, at which time PERL refused to accept the money or the instructions. She advised she immediately returned to New York City and that this unknown individual again contacted her on Thursday, July 27, 1950, at her home during the very late evening hours, at which time he wanted to know the results of her contact with the aeronautical engineer in Cleveland. She advised him that PERL refused

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to accept the money or the instructions and had sent her away. She stated that she returned this \$2,000 to this unknown man and that this was the last contact she had with this individual.

GLASSMAN provided the following description of the unknown man:

In subsequent interviews with VIVIAN GLASSMAN she refused to identify the unknown man.

On August 11, 1950, Miss GABRIELLE BERNODY, of the United Air Lines, New York City, advised that a reservation was made with the United Air Lines for a Mrs. S. GOLDBERG on July 22, 1950, for a flight to Cleveland, Ohio. Miss BERNODY advised that the records of United Air Lines reflect that a reservation was made in the name of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG on Flight #643, leaving Le Guardia at 1:30 PM, Daylight Saving Time, July 22, 1950.

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arriving in Cleveland, 3:30 PM, Daylight Saving Time. According to Miss DERNODY, this reservation was made by telephone by an individual who refused to give her telephone number or her address. The ticket was picked up at the United Air Lines Terminal at 30 East 42nd Street, New York City. Miss DERNODY further advised that this reservation was made by a United Air Lines employee who was on duty between 12:30 AM and 8:00 AM, on July 22, 1950, but no exact time as to when the reservation was made was available.

On August 5, 1950, the registration of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG, 165 East 33rd Street, New York City, was located at the Hotel Regent, Cleveland, Ohio, for July 23, 1950.

At Cleveland, Ohio, the registration of a Mrs. GOLDBERG on Flight #642, United Air Lines, July 23, 1950, leaving Cleveland at 4:35 PM, Eastern Standard Time, was located. This registration was booked by phone between 1:20 and 1:40 PM, July 23, 1950.

It is noted that WILLIAM PERL has furnished a signed statement to agents of the Cleveland Office which verified VIVIAN GLASSMAN'S contact with him on July 22, 1950, in Cleveland.

b. Information Furnished by Confidential

Informant T-1.

As has been previously reported earlier in this report, Confidential Informant T-1 states that JULIUS ROSENBERG has confided that he does not know for certain, but considering all the circumstances, he believes that the Russians sent X to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

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c. FINESTONE'S Contact With VIVIAN GLASSMAN,
Evening April 5, 1951.

On April 5, 1951, VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOFFNER and SA RICHARD T. HIGGINS leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, during the late evening hours, with an unknown man described as follows:

These two individuals entered an automobile bearing 1951 New York State license plate 6189-12. The New York Motor Vehicle Bureau advised that this automobile license is registered to ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, 500a Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOUDIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950, and who represented JOELITH COPLON, Soviet spy, at her trial in New York City in 1950.

ARTHUR BOUDIN'S application for a New York State Operator's License, 1949/52, reflects that he was born on March 21, 1920, is 5'9" in height, has brown hair and green eyes, and is employed at Ted Bates and Company, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City, an advertising firm.

On May 23, 1951, ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN was observed by the writer at Ted Bates and Company, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City, and it was ascertained that he was not the individual observed with the subject on April 5, 1951.

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A check of the photograph and descriptive data on MAX FINESTONE available in the New York Office was made by SA JOHN J. LOERMER and SA RICHARD T. HRADESKY and FINESTONE was identified as the unknown man observed with VIVIAN GLASSMAN on the night of April 5, 1951.

On May 23, 1951, inquiry of Miss LOIS ANDREWS, owner of Andrews Surveys, 415 West 18th Street, New York City, indicated that MAX FINESTONE was definitely working on April 5, 1951, in connection with his employment with her firm as a market research survey interviewer and that he borrowed an automobile to conduct this work. Miss ANDREWS advised SA ROBERT F. ROYAL that MAX FINESTONE had stated to her that the automobile belonged to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

It should be noted that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were sentenced to death for conspiracy to commit Espionage on April 5, 1951.

C. FINESTONE'S Association with ALFRED and LOUISE SARANT.

1. Interview With ALFRED SARANT

On July 19, 1950, ALFRED SARANT executed a waiver authorizing agents of the Albany Office to search his residence at Ithaca, New York. During this search the agents located a Bates List Finder which contained an entry under the initial "F", which read as follows:

"FINESTONE

ALP - 318 8th Avenue.

CI 6-2086

(crossed out)

210 West 21st Street"

(FINESTONE, Ch 3-2964 was also written in).

ALFRED SARANT commented on this entry by stating that FINESTONE worked for him as a painter in Ithaca, New York, and was a student at Cornell University.

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2. Interviews with LOUISE SARANT

Mrs. LOUISE SARANT, in commenting on the above Bates List Finder entry, stated that this is MAX FINESTONE, a friend of their's who at one time worked for her husband as a painter. She stated she first became acquainted with him while attending high school in Ithaca, New York, and that FINESTONE later attended Cornell University and during the war was employed in the Merchant Marine Service in 1944 and 1945. Mrs. SARANT further advised that FINESTONE had visited the SARANT apartment frequently, at 65 Morton Street, New York City. She said that since his parents reside at Ithaca, New York, he has moved frequently between New York City and Ithaca. She stated she believes he is currently working on a television survey (July, 1950) in New York City. She stated that he also resides in New York City. However, she did not know his current address.

She further advised that FINESTONE was never too well acquainted with her husband and that she does not recall whether he ever met JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, or VIVIAN GLASSMAN in any of his visits to the Morton Street apartment.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, has advised that a telephone call initiated from Murray Hill 3-3623, to the SARANT residence in Ithaca, New York, on December 31, 1949. The informant stated that this telephone number was then connected in the apartment of PETER LONGYEAR, 418 East 9th Street, New York City. Information has been developed which will be set forth in greater detail in a later part of this report which indicates that MAXWELL FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN had use of PETER LONGYEAR'S telephone as early as the beginning of the fourth week in December, 1949.

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Mrs. SARANT has been interviewed pertaining to this telephone call and specifically questioned as to whether FINESTONE could have instructed her or her husband to give up the Morton Street apartment at that time. She stated she does not recall this particular telephone call. She, however, denied that she has ever received any instructions from FINESTONE with regard to the Morton Street apartment. She was questioned again concerning the reason for terminating the lease on the Morton Street apartment (January 23, 1950) and she advised that she still does not recall who instructed them to give the apartment up or their reason for terminating the lease at that particular time.

LOUISE SARANT was subsequently interviewed by agents of the Albany Office concerning both MAXWELL FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN. She advised that JAMES WEINSTEIN is unknown to her and that to her knowledge he was not a friend of MAXWELL FINESTONE when she knew him in New York City. She further advised with regard to FINESTONE that he never resided in the apartment at 65 Morton Street. She added that he never paid rent on this apartment and that he never had use of the apartment.

Mrs. SARANT advised that she never visited this apartment after vacating same on September 13, 1946.

Mrs. SARANT again stated that she has no knowledge of its being used for Russian espionage activity, that she has no knowledge of its use between 1946 and 1950, other than a place of residence for JOEL BARR and WILLIAM FERL, and that she does not recall who instructed her or her husband when to give up the apartment.

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With reference to the utility payments she advised that she and her husband only paid the monthly rent (September, 1946 to February, 1950) and that all other payments must have been made by the occupants of the apartment.

3. Employment For ALFRED SARANT.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE was employed by ALFRED SARANT in 1949 or 1950 as a painter and that he had an address of 418 East 9th Street, New York City, in 1950.

D. FINESTONE'S Use of SARANT'S Apartment, 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City.

1. Chronology of Users

a. Records, 65 Morton Street Realty Company.

The records of the 65 Morton Street Realty Company, 310 East 55th Street, New York City, reflect that ALFRED SARANT rented apartment 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 until February, 1950.

Among the correspondence located in the file pertaining to apartment 61, at the 65 Morton Street Realty Company was a letter dated January 23, 1950, which is being quoted:

"Mr. ROBERT GARLOTT
65 Morton Street Realty Company
310 East 55th Street
New York, New York

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"Dear Sir:

"Having decided to make permanent residence in Ithaca, I wish to give you occupancy of apartment 6I at 65 Morton Street, effective as of your receipt of this letter.

"I am enclosing a check for \$45.50 covering rent for the month of January. My belongings have been removed from the apartment so it is available now for a succeeding tenant.

"Yours truly,

s/ "ALFRED SARANT"

According to the records of the 65 Morton Street Realty Company, this \$45.50 check mentioned in the above quoted letter was received on January 27, 1950.

b. Interview of ALFRED SARANT Pertaining to the Apartment.

ALFRED SARANT furnished the following information concerning the apartment, 6I, 65 Morton Street, New York City:

SARANT advised that in about August, 1943, he was transferred to New York City from Bayonne, New Jersey, by Western Electric Company, and that he went to New York City in the evenings to look for an apartment. He finally located apartment 6I at 65 Morton Street, New York City. He said that he moved there about October, 1943. He said that no one helped him locate the apartment.

During the course of the search of SARANT'S home on the evening of July 19, 1950 and morning of July 20, 1950, on Cayuga Heights Road, Ithaca, New York, by authority of a waiver of search signed by SARANT on

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July 19, 1950, a lease was located by SA JOHN D. MARONEY between SARANT and the 65 Morton Street Realty Corporation, which agreement was made on September 19, 1943. This agreement was for the rental of Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, for a period of twelve months at an annual rental of \$540 to become effective October 1, 1943, and to end on September 30, 1944.

SARANT advised that the rental for the apartment included water and heat, but he had to pay for gas, lights and telephone. He also said that he had an A.C. current run into his apartment so that he could use his record player and occasionally use his electric shaver. He had this from about the time he moved into this apartment at a monthly charge of fifty cents.

SARANT advised that he lived in the apartment at 65 Morton Street alone until he was married on July 6, 1945 to LOUISE JACQUELINE ROSS, whose nickname is PUSYCAT or PUSS.

SARANT stated that in the summer of 1946 he decided that he wanted to go back to school to get a master's degree and he came to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946, to try and enroll at Cornell University. At the time he decided to leave, JOEL BARR told him that he would take over his (SARANT'S) apartment for himself and he intimated that he might turn it over to WILLIAM PERL who was studying in New York. At that time apartments were scarce in New York City, and because of this fact, BARR wanted the apartment.

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SARANT stated BARR, or whoever stayed at the apartment would send the money to him and he would send a check to 65 Horton Street Realty Corporation. He said that he told the manager of the apartment that he was not giving up the apartment because he didn't know for sure whether he would be coming back to New York or not. SARANT stated that the manager was trying to oust him from the apartment and to insure that BARR got the apartment he left a small amount of furniture in it. He claimed he did not remember what furniture he left there, and said that he was not paid for the furniture.

During this interview SARANT said that he kept the apartment until about 1948, and paid the rent by check. He advised that he received money orders from BARR for the rent and after BARR left, the date of which he could not remember, PERL lived in the apartment and sent him money orders, some of which came from Cincinnati or Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL was working.

SARANT thought that when PERL moved out, he had received a note from PERL stating that SARANT should give up the apartment as he didn't need it any longer. At the time of the interview SARANT stated that he believed he still had the note from PERL at his home. He thought that it had been a year or more ago that he heard from PERL concerning the apartment.

ALFRED SARANT was interviewed at the New York Office during the evening of July 28, 1950, by SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer, and he advised that when he left the 65 Horton Street apartment approximately September, 1946, he turned it over to JOEL BARR and he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN, BARR'S girl friend had sent the first few rental payments to him in the form of money orders and that he in turn, would pay the rental agency for the apartment by check.

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SARANT stated that WILLIAM PERL and HENRIETTA SAVIDGE (now Mrs. WILLIAM PERL) had used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR and that they too had sent money orders to him for payment of the apartment. He stated that he believes either BARR or PERL made a \$270 lump sum payment toward the rental of this apartment which would have been for a six months rental.

SARANT reiterated that he does not know of anyone else who used the apartment and he believes that WILLIAM PERL, in sending the last money order for the rental of the apartment in January, 1950, attached a note to the money order requesting that SARANT relinquish the apartment as he no longer had any need for the apartment.

SARANT stated that he believes that he visited the apartment while PERL was residing there in 1947 and possibly that he visited JOEL BARR in 1948 at the apartment.

c. Probable use of the Apartment by FINESTONE, Christmas, 1948 and February, 1949.

(1) Toll Calls

Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised July 25, 1950, that two telephone calls were made from ALFRED SARANT'S telephone at 65 Morton Street, New York City, telephone Watkins 4-1927 to Yonkers 3-3862 on December 24, 1948 and February 4, 1949. This informant has advised that Yonkers 3-3862 was currently listed to HERBERT W. COLE, 122 Caryl Avenue, Yonkers, New York.

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The "Herald Statesman", a Yonkers daily newspaper, in its April 4, 1949 issue announced the marriage of Miss BARBARA M. COLE to BARRY FEIDEN. The article stated that both BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN were graduates of the New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University.

The current Queens telephone directory reflects a listing for BARRY FEIDEN at 143-15 38th Avenue, Flushing, telephone INdependence 3-3697.

(2) Interviews of BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN

On August 23, 1950, SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer interviewed BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN at their residence at 143-15 38th Avenue, Flushing, Long Island, New York. They advised that BARBARA had graduated from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, in February, 1948 and that BARRY graduated from Cornell in February, 1949. Both had attended the New York School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell. They stated that they had both been at the home of BARBARA'S parents, Mr. and Mrs. HERBERT M. COLE, Caryl Avenue, Yonkers, New York, and the home of BARRY'S parents at Newburgh, New York, during the Christmas vacation of 1948. BARRY said that in February, 1949, he had travelled from Ithaca, on approximately February 1, 1949, to his parent's home in Newburgh, New York, and from there, after a day or so, travelled to BARBARA'S home in Yonkers, New York.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN stated that they had friends named MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN who shared an apartment at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. They stated that they had known FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN at Cornell for approximately two years as they had both attended classes with him and that WEINSTEIN had been a roommate of BARRY FEIDEN during BARRY'S last six months at Cornell.

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At this point, BARRY FEIDEN advised the interviewing agents that he had just recalled that at one time, date unknown, possibly during the Christmas vacation of 1948 or during the mid-semester vacation in February, 1949 or at approximately the time of MAX FINESTONE'S graduation in June, 1949 (September 20, 1949), MAX FINESTONE had been in New York City, at which time he told BARRY FEIDEN that he, MAX, had the use of an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York. BARRY stated that he recalled from this conversation with MAX FINESTONE that this apartment was seldom used and he said he somehow gathered the impression that it was a "women's" apartment.

BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN were then questioned concerning MAXWELL FINESTONE'S travel to New York. They advised that they believed he had been in New York City during the latter part of the Christmas vacation, 1948; during the mid-semester vacation in February, 1949; and they both recalled that MAX had gone to New York job hunting after his graduation in June, 1949.

BARRY and BARBARA stated that all of their friends, they believed, have BARBARA'S Yonkers address and telephone number, including MAX FINESTONE, and they believed that MAX would probably have called either BARBARA or BARRY at BARBARA'S home when he was in New York.

BARRY and BARBARA stated that they had visited FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street between February and June, 1950. They said they had been there on one occasion at a party and on another occasion after a theater party. The FEIDENS stated that they believed that the furniture now in the apartment occupied by FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN had been supplied mainly by WEINSTEIN. They stated that they

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believed that FINESTONE had brought a dresser from Ithaca and said that he had told them that his mother had decorated the apartment with such things as draperies. They said that MAX had use of his father's truck on several occasions, which they described as a one-half to three-quarter ton buff colored Studebaker truck, model unknown. The FEIDENs advised that they had noticed that there were two telephones in FINESTONE'S and WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street, one being in the living room and one in the bathroom, and they thought that one of these phones had been left in by a previous tenant and would be disconnected and taken out.

The FEIDENs also advised that MAX FINESTONE had been employed only part time while in New York and that he seemed to accept employment only sufficient for him to "get along." They stated that he has been working on "public opinion surveys" and had helped conduct one survey concerning television programs. They said that he told them he only accepted such employment until he obtains another job and that he was qualified for personnel work. They stated that in their opinion FINESTONE has personality defects and presents a poor appearance. They said that they could not picture FINESTONE as "dressing up" or putting on a clean shirt in order to hold a job.

Mr. and Mrs. FEIDEN were shown photographs of ALFRED SARANT and his wife, LOUISE SARANT. They advised that they did not recognize the photograph of LOUISE or ALFRED SARANT; however, the photograph of ALFRED SARANT somehow looked familiar to them. They were given SARANT'S name and questioned concerning their knowledge of MAX FINESTONE'S employment at Ithaca, New York. BARRY FEIDEN advised that he did not recognize the name SARANT although it also sounded familiar to him. He said

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that he knew that MAX FINESTONE was employed by some contractor as a painter at one time during his attendance at Cornell University but said he did not know the identity of this contractor.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN identified photographs of MAX FINESTONE, which were displayed to them, as identical with their friend MAX FINESTONE who resides at 418 East 9th Street, New York City.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN denied any knowledge of any espionage activities on their part or on the part of any of their associates or contacts.

BARRY FEIDEN advised that he was currently employed at Peter F. Mallon, Incorporated, a printing plant located at Court Square, Long Island City, New York. BARBARA advised that she was employed as an employment interviewer at the New York State Employment Service, 225 West 34th Street, New York City.

It is to be noted in connection with the two toll calls made from ALFRED SARANT'S apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in December, 1948, and February, 1949, to the home of HERBERT H. COLE at Yonkers, New York, that MAX FINESTONE was probably in New York on the dates the calls were made according to information furnished by BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN.

BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN advised that they had friends named RUBIN DIAMOND, aka, "RUBY" and wife, MARION, who are now residing at 370 West 56th Street, New York City. They stated that RUBY DIAMOND was a classmate at Cornell University and also was a friend of MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN.

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They also advised that they knew a GLADYS GLASSMAN who had dated a student named DAVE GELBIN or GELBEN at Cornell University. They stated that they recalled that GLADYS GLASSMAN worked for the United Office and Public Workers of America. They said that they did not know a VIVIAN GLASSMAN and had no knowledge as to whether or not GLADYS GLASSMAN was related to her.

In connection with MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN, the FEIDENS stated that JIMMY had dropped out of Columbia University where he had been studying law and that they had gotten the impression that there was a personality clash between FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN.

The files of the New York Office contained no information which could be identified with BARBARA COLE.

Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised in approximately December, 1947, that one BARBARA COLE had been elected recording secretary of the Young Progressive Citizens of America chapter at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and that another one of the officers was named RUBIN DIAMOND. Confidential Informant T-6 said that the Young Progressive Citizens of America group was organized at Cornell University in March, 1947 and by May, 1947 had acquired a membership of about 75 students. The informant said that it was his personal belief that several members of this group were also members of the American Youth for Democracy, Marxist discussion group, and other leftist or ultra-liberal student groups. Confidential Informant T-6 stated that in the spring of 1947 the principal activity of the Young Progressive Citizens of America had been to oppose President TRUMAN'S proposed aid to Greece, and to oppose the President's Executive Order calling for the loyalty check on Federal employees.

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Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised on March 15, 1948 that the Communist Party was instructing their youth groups to join the Young Progressive Citizens of America, and then attempt to take over leadership of this organization.

The American Youth for Democracy was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944, and by the Attorney General of the United States as "Communist" under Executive Order 9835.

d. Interviews of GARY PICKARD

(1) Location of GARY PICKARD

The records of the Psychological Corporation of New York City have reflected that MAXWELL FINESTONE, in applying for employment on November 30, 1949, indicated that he was then residing in Apartment 6I, 65 Morton Street, New York City, and could be reached in care of TR 7-2563.

Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised on May 18, 1951, that EARRIE REID of 5 Riverside Drive, New York City, is the subscriber to TR 7-2563.

The current Manhattan address telephone directory indicates that this listing first appeared in the December, 1949 directory.

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any record of EARRIE REID.

Mr. HARRY ROONEY, Doorman, 5 Riverside Drive, New York City, advised the writer on May 18, 1951, that

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a Miss BARRIE REID formerly resided in Apartment 2E. He stated that three young ladies currently reside in this apartment namely:

1. Miss (CAROL ELIZABETH) RITTER
2. Miss HARLOW (ph.) MITCHELL
3. CHRISTINE DUNLAP

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any record for these three women.

Miss CAROL ELIZABETH RITTER, who is also known as BETTY RITTER, advised SA RICHARD T. HEATSKY on May 19, 1951, that as of November 30, 1949, Miss JOAN PICKARD resided with Miss MITCHELL and herself in Apartment 2E, 5 Riverside Drive, New York City. She stated that JOAN PICKARD'S brother, GARY PICKARD, prevailed upon his sister, Miss MITCHELL and herself to take incoming calls from MAXWELL FINESTONE and himself in the latter months of 1949 and possibly early 1950.

Miss RITTER indicated that GARY PICKARD was a former student at Cornell University and is a personal friend of MAX FINESTONE; that PICKARD formerly resided at 780 Greenwich Street, Greenwich Village, New York, and she recalls there was some type of business relationship between PICKARD and FINESTONE. Miss RITTER also recalls having received incoming calls for FINESTONE and PICKARD on several occasions and having spoken to FINESTONE on the telephone on several occasions pertaining to these incoming calls. She recalls having spoken to some unknown woman pertaining to these incoming calls for FINESTONE. She was unable to recall any details pertaining to these calls and stated that although she personally knew GARY PICKARD, she had never met MAXWELL FINESTONE. Miss

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RITTER indicated that FINESTONE and PICKARD resided in the Greenwich Village area of New York, possibly together, and that PICKARD was doing some type of "market analyst or research work."

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Miss RITTER indicated that GARY PICKARD had operated a radio station at Cornell and recalled that Miss WHEELER and herself visited PICKARD in his second Greenwich Village apartment which was located at 730 Greenwich Street, New York City, on one occasion during the period extending from late January 1950 to August or September 1950.

Miss RITTER stated that PICKARD is alleged to be currently operating a radio station in Las Vegas, Nevada, and had something to do with the Flamingo Club there. PICKARD, according to Miss RITTER, left New York City in approximately September 1950 and went to either Reno or Las Vegas, Nevada, for the purpose of obtaining a divorce.

Pertaining to the visit to PICKARD'S apartment at 730 Greenwich Street, Miss RITTER noted that it was sparsely furnished, mostly by purchases from war surplus and discarded furniture from unknown sources. PICKARD resided with two men, namely, J. LYLE, also known as DAVID LYLE and H.L. CATTY.

Miss RITTER described J. LYLE as being male, white, in his 20's, tall, slender, blond hair, graduate of Cornell University, having majored in English and had attended the New School for Social Research in February 1950. LYLE owned a "jeepster".

Miss RITTER described H.L. CATTY as being male, white, in his 20's, tall, dark hair, a graduate of Cornell University, majoring in hotel management, and recalled that CATTY'S father had flown with EILEY POST, a famous aviator.

Miss RITTER described GARY PICKARD as being male, white, in his 20's, 5'8", 150 pounds, long nose, dark blond or light brown hair, attended Cornell University, has a sister named JOAN PICKARD, and his mother's name is HEVA or REBECCA PICKARD, alleged to have an interest in a hardware store in White Plains, New York. Miss RITTER said PICKARD'S occupation is a radio announcer, Las Vegas, Nevada, and he is divorced.

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Miss RITTER advised that GARY PICKARD'S family formerly resided in Pleasantville, New York, and is alleged to now reside in White Plains, New York. JOAN PICKARD married R. T. CRAIG in October 1950 in the New York City area. Her current address is in care of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, 3rd and Jendergast, Jamestown, New York. Miss RITTER stated that her husband is the manager of the Goodyear store in Jamestown.

Miss RITTER stated that she last saw GARY PICKARD in October 1950 when he was home for his sister's wedding.

Mr. EDWARD JONES, Superintendent of apartment building located at 730 Greenwich Street, Greenwich Village, New York City, advised SA RICHARD T. BRADSKY and the writer on May 19, 1951 that J. LYLE, H. L. GATTY and G. PICKARD formerly occupied apartment 34 from some time subsequent to February 17, 1950 until August, 1950. He stated that their apartment rented for \$145.00 a month, was sparsely furnished and recalled that J. LYLE had a jeep with Connecticut license plates.

Mr. JONES recalled that house furnishings were moved to this address via LYLE'S jeep by H. L. GATTY. He recalls that GATTY and a young man with a Southern accent moved furniture out of the apartment in August 1950 and that a sofa and a living room chair are currently stored in this building's storage room.

Mrs. REVA PICKARD, who is employed at the PICKARD Hardware Store in White Plains, New York, advised on May 22, 1951, that her son, GARY PICKARD, is currently employed as announcer and program arranger for the Las Vegas Radio Station, Las Vegas, Nevada. Mrs. PICKARD indicated that her son formerly resided at 730 Greenwich Street, New York City, some time subsequent to February 1950 with JOHN DAVID LYLE and H. L. GATTY or L. R. GATTY. She indicated that from approximately the summer of 1949 until February 1950, her son, GARY, had a permanent residence at their home in Pleasantville, New York.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that on various occasions, her son had spent weekends at MAX PINTSTONE'S apartment

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located at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. Mrs. PICKARD indicated that she was not familiar with the location of PINESTONE'S previous apartment at 65 Morton Street, Greenwich Village, New York City. She stated that her son, GARY, had been formerly married to a Miss ANN FARLEY who had resided in Chappaqua and Mount Kisco, New York.

Mrs. PICKARD further indicated that her son's former roommates, LYLE and GATTY, are probably not acquainted with MAX PINESTONE, however, she did indicate that she had met PINESTONE on one occasion and thereafter cautioned her son as to his further association with PINESTONE.

On May 29, 1951, Mrs. PICKARD was reinterviewed by SA EDWARD J. CANILL and the writer at the Pickard Hardware Store, 145 Post Road, White Plains, New York, telephone number, White Plains C-5100, where she is employed. Her brother-in-law, VICTOR PICKARD, owns this hardware store.

Mrs. PICKARD advised that soon after her son, GARY, began to attend Columbia University in the fall of 1949 (February 1950), he discontinued hitch-hiking from their Pleasantville, New York residence as had been his custom for a short period, possibly during the month of October 1949, and resided with MAX PINESTONE in an apartment in the Greenwich Village area of New York City on a gratis basis. Concerning this residence, she stated that GARY never furnished the address of the apartment building, however, she did explain that he could be reached through his sister JOAN PICKARD, who then resided at 5 Riverside Drive, New York City.

She stated also that subsequent to GARY'S residence in the Greenwich Village apartment, he stayed for a short time at PINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street, New York City. In approximately the latter part of February 1950, GARY obtained an apartment located at 780 Greenwich Street with two former Cornell students by the name of GATTY and LYLE.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that she gave her son some "odds and ends" to help him furnish his apartment at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City and also recalls having

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given him \$25 to \$30 to buy a bed. She was unable to place the exact time of this purchase, however, she believes that it was prior to his residency at 730 Greenwich Street, New York City.

Mrs. PICKARD recalled that LYLE, GARY, her son, and a young lady, whose last name is DARCEY (Phonetic), visited her in Pleasantville, New York in 1950. They came out in LYLE's jeep from New York City.

She described Miss (CLARE) DARCEY (Phonetic) as white, 5' 1" - 5' 2" tall, slight build, dark complexion, dark hair, in her 20's and employed by some advertising firm in New York City.

Concerning her dislike for MAX FINESTONE, she stated that it was partially based upon information received pertaining to him from her daughter JOAN. She said that her daughter was employed by Lever Brothers Incorporated in New York City in the 1945/1950 period, and at the suggestion of either JOAN or GARY, FINESTONE filled out an application for employment with Lever Brothers Incorporated. JOAN PICKARD was then working in the personnel section and according to Mrs. PICKARD, her daughter personally gave FINESTONE an employment application.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that her daughter had advised her that FINESTONE filled out the application but failed to sign the non-Communist affidavit which was included in this application, or to fill in the section of the application which included questions pertaining to Communist Party membership. FINESTONE refused to sign either the affidavit or the pertinent section, but she did not know which. She related that her daughter JOAN was quite upset over FINESTONE'S reaction and was at a loss to explain why he refused to do this other than the supposition that he was now or had been previously a member of the Communist Party. Mrs. PICKARD stated that her daughter JOAN tore up the employment application in FINESTONE'S presence, inasmuch as he refused to complete this application.

Mrs. PICKARD further advised that her son GARY

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explained FINESTONE'S action as, "A man has a right to his own beliefs".

Mrs. PICKARD also related that during the period which her son GARY was residing at FINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street, New York City, sometime during the early months of 1950, one of his government disability checks was stolen from their mailbox at their apartment building. Mrs. PICKARD stated that her son is a veteran of World War II, having been disabled through his war service and that he receives disability checks each month from the Veterans Administration. She pointed out that his disability checks were forwarded in care of FINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street during the period of GARY'S residence there and that a check at the Veterans Administration in New York City would place the exact time during which her son lived in the FINESTONE apartment.

(2) Initial Interviews With GARY PICKARD

GARY PICKARD, currently residing at 711 7th Street and employed at Radio Station KRA and "Fabulous Las Vegas" weekly magazine, Las Vegas, Nevada, advised he first met MAX FINESTONE while both were students at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and had frequent contact with him until approximately the summer of 1949. PICKARD and his wife separated at this time and he cannot recall associations with FINESTONE during the summer of 1949.

PICKARD left Cornell University September 1949, and went to New York City seeking employment. He met FINESTONE in New York City in the latter part of October 1949 and, being short on finances, FINESTONE insisted that he reside with him in an apartment located at 65 Morton Street, Greenwich Village, New York City. PICKARD could not recall the exact number of the apartment, but stated it was on the sixth floor. FINESTONE told PICKARD the apartment was actually being rented by friends of his who allowed him to stay there while they were out of the city. The names and whereabouts of these friends are unknown to

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PICKARD. These friends had indicated to FINESTONE that they might not return to the apartment and they had almost completely stripped the apartment of furniture. The only furniture in the apartment was a double bed, day bed, ward table, three wooden chairs, and two book cases, all being broken down and almost worthless.

In January 1950, FINESTONE received word through the superintendent of this apartment building that these friends were releasing the apartment, requiring FINESTONE and PICKARD to vacate. At the request of the superintendent and to make way for painters to redecorate this apartment, FINESTONE and PICKARD carried the above described furniture down to the basement of the apartment building. PICKARD maintained no one else was present when the furniture was moved. The exact date of moving the furniture is unknown, but it is believed to have been the middle or latter part of January 1950.

About three weeks after moving from the apartment, PICKARD returned to the apartment building one day in a borrowed jeep with FINESTONE and obtained the day bed from the basement, which PICKARD took to another apartment he had obtained with DAVID LYLE and HAROLD GATTY, both graduates of Cornell University. PICKARD placed this date around the first part of February 1950 and maintained no one else assisted but FINESTONE.

In December 1949, while residing with FINESTONE in the apartment at 65 Norton Street, PICKARD met JAMES WEINSTEIN, a close friend of FINESTONE and a former student of Cornell University. WEINSTEIN resided at 416 East 9th Street, New York City, and was attending the School of Law at Columbia University. When moving from 65 Norton Street, FINESTONE moved in permanently with WEINSTEIN and PICKARD moved in temporarily until he could locate something else. A short time later, PICKARD moved into an apartment at 700 Greenwich Street, New York City, with LYLE and GATTY. PICKARD lived at this address until August 1950 when he went to Las Vegas, Nevada, to obtain a divorce, and after obtaining a divorce decided to stay in Las Vegas. Pickard stated he has returned to New York City twice, the last time being in February 1951 and that he has seen FINESTONE both times.

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While residing together in New York City, **PINESTONE** and **PICKARD** were employed doing survey work for the American or U. S. Research Bureau, New York City Branch, headquarters in Washington, D.C., and later, doing the same type of work, by the Psychological Corporation, Fifth Avenue, New York City. **PINESTONE** was last known to be employed in the Survey Branch of a large advertising agency in New York City, exact name and location unknown. **PINESTONE'S** residence address is unknown to **PICKARD**, but **PINESTONE** can possibly be located through **WEINSTEIN** at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. It is believed that **WEINSTEIN** is still probably attending Columbia University.

PICKARD stated he became well acquainted with **PINESTONE** and considers him a close friend, but recalls no particular associates he had in New York City. **PICKARD** claimed he knew **WEINSTEIN** only briefly and did not become friendly with him.

PICKARD stated that **DAVE LYLE** is currently residing in Lexington, Massachusetts, with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. F. K. LINDSAY. **BAROLD GATTY** is a Private in the United States Army, present station unknown. **PICKARD'S** former wife, **ANN FARLEY**, has remarried and is now Mrs. **RICHARD WENDT**, residing in Bedford Hills, New York.

PICKARD is described as follows:

The Salt Lake City office advised on June 1, 1951, that numerous photographs were exhibited to **GARY PICKARD** and he could not recall having seen any of the

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individuals whose photographs were exhibited with the exception of MAX FINESTONE. It is noted that among the photographs exhibited to PICKARD were those of WILLIAM PERL and WELDON BRUCE DAYTON.

(3) Interviews with GARY PICKARD at New York City

On June 1, 1951, Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. MCLELL advised that a Federal Grand Jury subpoena was being issued for the appearance of GARY PICKARD, Southern District of New York, on June 12, 1951.

On June 11, 1951, SA EDWARD J. CAHILL and the writer met GARY PICKARD on his arrival at LaGuardia Field at 7:30 pm.

PICKARD stated that the last time he saw MAX FINESTONE was when he was in New York during FEBRUARY, 1951.

GARY PICKARD stated that he left Ithaca, New York, on or about September 30, 1949, having graduated from Cornell University and resigned from his position with the radio station there and returned to his parents' residence at Fleischville, New York. He stated that in October 1949, he came to New York City job hunting. He recalled definitely attempting to get a position with the Radio Station WOR in New York City.

PICKARD does not recall how he initially contacted MAX FINESTONE during October 1949, however, he does recall that during the summer of 1949, MAX worked as a painter or contractor and during September or October, FINESTONE came to New York and that the two of them got in touch with one another. PICKARD stated that at that time MAX FINESTONE was residing in Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, and offered the use of this apartment to him on a gratis basis. He recalled having seen the name of SARANT printed on the doorbell. FINESTONE had advised him that a couple had possession of the

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apartment and that they had moved to California. They were retaining the apartment with the idea that they were returning to New York City.

GARY PICKARD recalled that during the Christmas vacation period of 1949, either FINESTONE or himself invited DAVID LYLE, HAROLD GATTY and his brother, RONALD GATTY, Mr. and Mrs. NORMAN POINIER, of Worcester, Massachusetts, to spend the Christmas holiday period with them at 65 Morton Street, New York City. He stated that all of these individuals were students at Cornell University and had come to New York City to see the "lights" and that staying with them at Morton Street was a convenience extended toward them by FINESTONE and himself. PICKARD explained that it was necessary for them to improvise sleeping facilities by making beds on the floor to handle this overflow group. PICKARD stated that he had a double bed and a daybed in the apartment, which would have slept three or four of the individuals and that the others slept on the floor. He advised that this group came to New York via LYLE'S jeep.

It is noted that Mr. FLOYD ELWIN, JR. advised that during the Christmas period, 1949, he had occasion to be in Apartment 61 and noted seven men present in the apartment and that there were sleeping bags laid out on the living room floor. ELWIN did not recall that there was any woman present in the apartment at that time.

PICKARD stated that this group, previously mentioned, stayed until after New Year's Day, and returned to Cornell; that he was present during most of the Christmas holiday period, however, he took off two days and went to Pleasantville to visit with his family. He believed that possibly upon his return from Pleasantville, in discussing the continuance of his residence at 65 Morton Street with FINESTONE, MAX indicated that possibly the apartment would have to be vacated, however, there was no immediate necessity for them to move to another location.

PICKARD stated that FINESTONE told him that the rent for the apartment was \$45.00 and change, of which FINESTONE has not paid any of this amount. FINESTONE was in contact with the legal tenants of the apartment, according to PICKARD, however, he did not know their method of communication. He stated that FINESTONE was

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very mysterious in discussing this apartment and the identity of the couple who were tenants. However, during the month of January, he definitely recalled **FINESTONE** stating that the owner had given up the apartment and that they would have to be out by the first of the month. **PICKARD** discussed his continuing to rent the apartment with **FINESTONE**, however, **PAX** said that this was impossible and that they would definitely have to move.

PICKARD recalled that possibly on a Saturday night prior to the Sunday on which the remainder of the furniture was moved from the apartment, the superintendent knocked on the door and he admitted to the apartment the superintendent and the new tenant. Accompanying the new tenant were two women and a man. He stated that the new tenant and these other individuals after having viewed the apartment left, and it was possible at this time that the superintendent told him that he would have to be out of the apartment by the following day so that the superintendent would have an opportunity to clean and make this apartment ready for the new tenant who was alleged to be moving in on or about February 1, 1950.

PICKARD stated that the unknown woman who was present during the time when the new tenant and those individuals who accompanied the tenant appeared at the apartment, was Miss **ELISANDE "NOMMY" CONIGON**, who at that time resided at the Salvation Army Hotel for Women in New York City.

PICKARD recalled that **JIMMY WEINSTEIN** possibly visited the Lorton Street apartment for the first time in the latter part of January 1950. However, he stated that he could be wrong about this date and that possibly the first time **JIMMY** visited the apartment was in December. He recalled that after this visit with **PAX FINESTONE** and **JAMES WEINSTEIN**, he went to look at a new apartment which they later rented at 416 East 9th Street, New York City.

PICKARD stated that during the month of January, **FINESTONE** moved from the apartment a chest, a Hollywood type bed, a kitchen table and possibly one kitchen chair to the 416 East 9th Street apartment. He advised that

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he was not present during the moving of this furniture and he does not recall how it was accomplished.

PICKARD stated that subsequent to the superintendent's visit to the Morton Street apartment with the new tenant, he contacted PINESTONE at the 9th Street apartment either in person or by telephone, and that MAX came to the apartment in response to his contact and while there, he assisted him in carrying bookcases, a garbage can, a daybed, a card table, kitchen chairs to the basement of the Morton Street apartment building where they stored these furnishings. PICKARD stated that the superintendent had granted permission to him to leave these furnishings in the basement.

PICKARD recalled that they left some junk in the closets, such as a violin and several pieces of wood board and other odds and ends. PICKARD stated that after obtaining the 730 Greenwich Street apartment that the furnishings which had been moved to the basement were removed and transported via LYLE'S jeep to the Greenwich Street apartment.

PICKARD advised that he possibly stayed at his parents' residence for a day or so or at someone else's apartment after leaving the Morton Street apartment. Thereafter he moved in with PINESTONE and BETH ELIN at the 418 East 9th Street apartment and stayed there for four to six weeks.

On June 12, 1951, GARY PICKARD accompanied SA RICHARD T. BRADSHAW and the writer to 65 Morton Street, New York City. He reenacted for the reviewing agents the moving process on or about January 29, 1950 in which MAX PINESTONE and himself carried the remaining furnishings from apartment 6I to the basement of the building. He stated that he knew the exact location where the furniture was stored opposite the superintendent's apartment door in the basement and advised of the approximate location of each piece of furniture which was moved to the basement. It is noted that his description of the placing of the furniture in the basement was identical to that supplied by Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELLER, JR.

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During the course of this demonstration, GARY PICKARD was observed by both Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELVIN, Jr. and subsequently they were introduced to him. Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELVIN, JR. confronted PICKARD with the information which they had previously furnished concerning the moving and other incidents which took place at their apartment building.

PICKARD after hearing their recital stated that possibly he was incorrect in having advised agents of the Salt Lake City office that there was no one else present during the moving of the furniture on or about January 29, 1950. He then recalled that two individuals came to the Horton Street apartment during the course of the moving and inquired about FINESTONE. PICKARD stated that he was in the process of packing his clothes and he believes that he instructed these two individuals to go to the basement of the apartment building and there they would find FINESTONE. PICKARD at this time did not recall the names of these individuals.

Subsequently, upon return to the New York office, PICKARD was shown numerous photographs including those of WILLIAM PERL and WELDON BRUCE DAYTON. He identified the photographs of WILLIAM PERL and WELDON BRUCE DAYTON as being those of the two individuals who had inquired pertaining to FINESTONE at the apartment.

PICKARD stated that he does not have personal knowledge that either PERL or DAYTON physically assisted FINESTONE or himself in the moving of furniture from this apartment to the basement on or about January 29, 1950. However, PICKARD desired to clarify this statement by stating that possibly after he had directed PERL and DAYTON to go to the basement and there they would find FINESTONE, and that in so doing the superintendent and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELVIN, JR. noted that these two individuals were with FINESTONE and assumed that they were participating in the moving of the furniture.

PICKARD stated that he believed that immediately prior to the departure from the Horton Street Building, FINESTONE introduced PERL and DAYTON to him as "BILL and

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BRUCE", respectively, and that he recalled walking with DAYTON down the steps and behind them came PERL and PINESTONE and that at this time he conversed with DAYTON. He stated that PINESTONE had borrowed JAMES WEINSTEIN'S 1948 or 1949 Buick convertible that date and that the four of them left the Morton Street apartment building together and believed that PINESTONE drove PERL and DAYTON to a subway station. He does not recall seeing DAYTON since that date.

PICKARD stated that he definitely recalls seeing WILLIAM PERL with ELEANOR GLASSMAN, sister of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, at a social attended by approximately 25 to 30 individuals at the apartment of MAX PINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, during the first week of February 1950. PICKARD was then temporarily residing with PINESTONE and WEINSTEIN at this above address. PICKARD further advised that PERL and ELEANOR GLASSMAN and himself sat on a sofa in the PINESTONE-WEINSTEIN apartment and conversed at considerable length. He stated that ELEANOR GLASSMAN was the date that evening of WILLIAM PERL.

PICKARD volunteered to attempt to get in touch with MAX PINESTONE that evening and arrange for dinner or some suitable contact, at which time he would attempt to secure information from PINESTONE during their conversation. He indicated that this information would be passed on to the interviewing agents without disclosing to PINESTONE that he was cooperating with the FBI.

It should be noted that PICKARD made repeated attempts during his stay in New York City to contact MAX PINESTONE without success. It was later learned that PINESTONE, during most of PICKARD'S visit in New York City, was confined to the Willard Parker Hospital in New York City with "measles".

During the course of the interview on June 12, 1951, PICKARD was shown photographs of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. He stated that he had never seen either of these individuals, however, he did recognize their pictures, having seen various photographs of them in newspapers and magazines.

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PICKARD, in viewing the photograph of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, stated that he believed that he has seen this individual somewhere, however, he was unable to furnish any definite information pertaining to this individual. He made the same comment when a photograph of ANN SIDOROVICH was exhibited to him.

Photographs of FORTON SOEHL were exhibited to PICKARD and he stated he had seen this individual somewhere, however, he was unable to state where. He stated it was quite possible that he had seen this individual's picture in the newspaper and that was the basis for this tentative recognition.

PICKARD when shown a photograph of VIVIAN GLASMAN, stated that he had met her somewhere, possibly at a party at the FINESTONE-WEINSTEIN apartment on East 9th Street. He stated that this would have been in the early months of 1950 and he recalled that she was a "fast talker". He definitely recalled that while living at the East 9th Street apartment of FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN, VIVIAN GLASMAN had telephoned this apartment and asked for MAX FINESTONE.

PICKARD stated that after viewing the photograph of ALFRED SARANT, he believed that he met him at the FINESTONE-WEINSTEIN apartment in February 1950. He stated that it was quite possible that he may have met him on the Cornell campus in Ithaca, New York. In this connection, it is recalled that ALFRED SARANT was in New York City during the latter part of February 1950.

PICKARD identified a photograph of VICTOR K. D. ROSS, the father-in-law of ALFRED SARANT. He stated that he had seen him in Ithaca, New York.

PICKARD stated that the photograph of HENRIETTA SAVIDGE was familiar and recalled that MAX FINESTONE had mentioned to him that he had known a girl by the name of "HETTIE".

PICKARD was unable to identify a photograph of JOEL BARR, however, he stated that he had heard this name from some source.

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PICKARD further commented on the contents of the foyer closet in Apartment 6I at 65 Horton Street by stating that he had opened the door and examined the odds and ends in the apartment subsequent to his having moved into the apartment. He stated there were several pieces of wood two to three feet in length which had nails appearing above the surface of this wood. He said that it was his definite recollection that this had something to do with photography. He stated that he questioned FINESTONE about these odds and ends in the closet and FINESTONE advised him that someone who had formerly lived in the apartment had discarded these articles.

PICKARD was again interviewed on June 13, 1951 by SA RICHARD T. HRANSKY and the writer. On this date, he was further questioned about the Christmas holiday incident in which friends of theirs from Cornell had stayed with them. He stated that he was not in the apartment when the superintendent came up and fixed a leak in the bathroom. He recalled that GATTY later told him about this. PICKARD stated that this incident must have taken place during the two day period which he spent at his parents' residence in Pleasantville, New York.

PICKARD stated that Miss BETTY BUEHLER who currently resides at 178 East 71st Street, New York City, had possibly visited in the 65 Horton Street apartment. He stated that she has been employed in various free lance radio acting jobs, that MAX FINESTONE dated her during the 1949-1950 period, having previously known her while he was attending Ithaca College, Ithaca, New York. GARY stated that he believed that MAX FINESTONE first introduced BETTY BUEHLER to him in October 1949.

PICKARD also advised that he has dated BUEHLER on various occasions subsequent to October 1949 and that he had seen her as recent as June 12, 1950.

PICKARD described Miss BUEHLER as white, 5'5", 120 pounds, approximately 27 years of age, reddish blonde hair (dyed), divorced.

GARY PICKARD further advised on June 13, 1951, that he met a man through MAX FINESTONE immediately prior

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to or during the initial period which he resided at Apartment 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City, who worked for a labor union, possibly out of town, near Pittsburgh. PICKARD could not recall this man's full name. However, he thought that his first name was DAVE. He believes that this individual was a union organizer, possibly for the electrical or steel union. He stated that he owned his own car, which he described as either a black or dark blue 1940 Pontiac or Chevrolet.

PICKARD described this unknown man as white, 5' 6" tall, 24 to 26 years of age, stocky build, blond reddish hair combed back, hook nose. He stated that this man had a girl friend who worked for the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, 1710 Broadway.

PICKARD stated that this unknown man and his girl friend came to the Morton Street apartment on at least one occasion to visit PINESTONE, and that after PINESTONE and himself moved to the 418 East 9th Street apartment, New York City, that this unknown man stayed over at least on one occasion.

PICKARD, in describing the relationship which existed between PINESTONE and this unknown man, stated that they seemed to have known each other from somewhere in the past; they had mutual friends and there seemed to be a genuine friendship existing between the two.

PICKARD, in describing the girl friend of this unknown man, stated that she was white, approximately 5' 3" to 5' 9" tall, medium build, blonde hair, fairly good looking and in her early twenties. PICKARD stated that it was his recollection that she had previously been married and is now divorced.

On June 14, 1951, PICKARD was questioned concerning the identity of the unknown man whom Mr. WILCOX ELLIOTT, Jr. states that he found in the Morton Street apartment during the morning hours on or about January 29, 1950. ELLIOTT believes that this individual is identical with WELDON BRUCE DANTON. ELLIOTT has advised that this individual was wearing pajamas and was sitting at a card table, which was placed

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in the middle of the living room of Apartment 61. He recalls there there was toast, jelly and possibly a glass of water on the card table.

PICKARD states that there is no question in his mind that Mr. ELSTN is referring to himself as this unknown individual. He states that he recalls the incident and the facts are substantially the same as furnished by Mr. ELSTN. PICKARD believes that this incident occurred possibly on the Sunday on which MAX FINESTONE and himself moved the remaining furniture from this apartment to the basement of the building. This date has been fixed as January 29, 1950.

Photographs of the bedroom door which contained the ten holes were exhibited to PICKARD. He states that he does not recall seeing these holes in the door, which would have been, during the period he lived there, probably filled with a plastic wood. He states that the bedroom door was very dirty and usually remained opened and pushed back against the bedroom wall.

GARY PICKARD personally observed LOUISE SARANT on June 14, 1951. He states that LOUISE SARANT is not familiar and he does not recall having known her or having ever seen her in the past.

On June 15, 1951, GARY PICKARD accompanied the writer to 173 West End Avenue, the former residence of MAX FINESTONE, in an attempt to locate FINESTONE so that PICKARD would have an opportunity to converse with him. PICKARD made an unsuccessful attempt to locate FINESTONE at this address. Subsequently, he accompanied the writer to 546 West Broadway, where FINESTONE was received his mail in care of JOHN A. LEARY. There PICKARD made an unsuccessful attempt to contact FINESTONE. However, he stated that this is the address of a former friend of MAX FINESTONE, whose name was LEARY. He recalls having accompanied FINESTONE to this address on at least one occasion while they both resided at 65 Norton Street, and there they played cards with LEARY. He states that LEARY was formerly in the Merchant Marine Service with FINESTONE.

On June 16, 1951, GARY PICKARD discreetly ob-

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served ELDON BRUCE DAYTON and personally identified him as the individual who accompanied WILLIAM FENL to the Horton Street apartment on or about January 29, 1950.

PICKARD introduced himself to DAYTON while they were both waiting in the Grand Jury waiting room that date. DAYTON advised PICKARD that he did not know him. PICKARD stated that he explained to DAYTON that he had resided with MAX FINESTONE at 65 Horton Street in New York City for a few months prior to the latter part of January 1950, and definitely felt that he met him and had been introduced to him as "BRUCE" by MAX FINESTONE. DAYTON stated that that seemed unlikely to him and he does not recall his name or this meeting.

PICKARD stated that DAYTON advised him that "they" questioned him about moving furniture, which he had denied. DAYTON also advised that if he had met MAX FINESTONE at all in New York City, it certainly was not in the Greenwich Village area. He suggested various places at Cornell University where they could have met, and PICKARD advised that they were all highly unlikely to him.

DAYTON also advised that he was not worried for he is not implicated in any way in this investigation. He said that he did not know MAX FINESTONE very well.

On June 18, 1951, GARY PICKARD also had an opportunity to meet JAMES WEINSTEIN in the Grand Jury waiting room. He stated that WEINSTEIN immediately recognized him and advised him that he had not seen MAX FINESTONE since April 1951. PICKARD stated that he advised WEINSTEIN that he was there to testify as a witness and that he had been trying to locate MAX FINESTONE for approximately one week. He asked WEINSTEIN if he knew FINESTONE'S current whereabouts. WEINSTEIN stated, as before, that he had not seen FINESTONE since April, and that he does not know where FINESTONE is. However, he believes that he had left the apartment that he had with HARRY. It is noted that HARRY is undoubtedly identical with HARRY SHACH, whom FINESTONE resided with at 173 West End Avenue, New York City.

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PICKARD stated that from his discussion with WEINSTEIN, this HARTY may have been a former student at Cornell University.

WEINSTEIN advised PICKARD that he felt sure that neither he nor PICKARD were implicated in any way in the Government's investigation. However, he explained that he was not answering some of the questions put to him in the Grand Jury because he had been quite active politically and that a lot of his political beliefs are toward the left, which is frowned upon these days. WEINSTEIN advised PICKARD that it was not to his advantage to become implicated in any way in the Government's investigation, and since he had nothing to do with what FINESTONE may be under suspicion of, he did not desire to answer the Government's questions. WEINSTEIN told PICKARD that he does not know ELLON BRUCE DAYTON.

It is to be noted that throughout the interviews which took place in New York City from June 11 through 15 and June 18, 1951, GARY PICKARD denied that he is now, or has ever been, a member of the Communist Party or any of its front organizations. He stated further that he had never been approached or knowingly performed any espionage functions on behalf of MAX FINESTONE or any other individual. He stated that he had attended a protest rally in behalf of the eleven Communist leaders, who were on trial for conspiracy to overthrow the government, with MAX FINESTONE. He stated that FINESTONE had invited him to attend this rally and that he had consented to do so mainly through curiosity. He stated that he also attended a "hootenanny", which he believed had been sponsored by some Communist front organization, with MAX FINESTONE. He advised that BETTY SANDERS, a friend of MAX FINESTONE, had been possibly Chairman, or appeared as one of the performers at this "hootenanny".

PICKARD has advised that he believes that MAX FINESTONE is pro-Communist in his political beliefs. He bases this belief on various discussions which he had had with FINESTONE over a several month period in 1949 and 1950. He advised that he had no knowledge as to whether FINESTONE had ever been a member of the Communist Party.

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However, in his opinion, FINESTONE may have been a member of the Party at some previous date. He advised that FINESTONE or WEINSTEIN made available Communist literature to him when he lived at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, with them in February 1950. He stated that he read some of this literature and later discussed it with FINESTONE. He again stated that his interest in reading the literature was both of a curious and intellectual nature.

It should also be noted that throughout these interviews, GARY PICKARD exhibited a warm cooperative spirit in answering the interviewing agents' questions. He explained that his having accepted FINESTONE's offer to share the Morton Street apartment and later the 9th Street apartment was based on an economic necessity. He further advised that both FINESTONE and himself were of Russian Jewish extraction, and that they had a natural basis for a friendship. PICKARD stated that their initial friendship had developed when both FINESTONE and himself resided in the same neighborhood while each of them was attending Cornell University in 1946 or 1947. He stated that it was quite by accident that they had initially met and explained that he had an automobile and drove from his residence on one of the rural routes of Ithaca, New York, to Cornell, and that he has noted that FINESTONE was also a student at Cornell, and he would pick him up and take him to school.

Assistant United States Attorney JOHN H. POLEY has expressed the opinion that GARY PICKARD would be an excellent Government witness in the event that his services are needed in any future Government case or cases in which he might be called to testify.

Assistant United States Attorney JOHN H. POLEY, Southern District of New York, has advised the writer that GARY PICKARD testified for the Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York on June 13, 14 and 18, 1951.

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c. Interviews with Mr. and Mrs.
FLOYD ELVYN, JR.

On July 18 and 19, 1950, SAS HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer interviewed Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELVYN, JR, 65 Morton Street, New York City. They advised that FLOYD ELVYN, JR. has been superintendent at 65 Morton Street, a large six-story walk-up apartment building, since October, 1942, succeeding his father to this position. They stated that the records in their possession concerning 65 Morton Street reflected that Apartment 6I at that address was rented to ALFRED SARANT in 1943, probably October, and that SARANT vacated the apartment in January 1950. The records, they said, also indicated that the name ROSS was added to the register along with SARANT in 1945 and in 1946 the name PERL was noted as a tenant in Apartment 6I. They stated that at the time PERL'S name was added to the record, it was indicated on the records that "Sarant sends in check".

FLOYD ELVYN, JR. continued that when he assumed the superintendent responsibilities, he was told that SARANT lived in Rochester or some place in Upstate New York and that he only visited and used the apartment occasionally paying the rent to the main office by mail. He continued that approximately three months later, probably in December 1948 or January 1949, the tenants below Apartment 6I had complained of a leak which was showing on the ceiling of their apartment. ELVYN said that at that time he entered SARANT'S apartment to fix or locate this leak.

ELVYN said that the apartment was rented unfurnished with only a stove and a refrigerator. Mr. ELVYN advised that as no one was in the apartment at that time, he had occasion to observe the whole apartment which consisted of a living room, bedroom, kitchen and bath.

ELVYN related that in the living room there was a small kitchen table with a white metal top and a reflector type photo-flood bulb or similar type bulb which was screwed into a socket on the wall. The bulb he said was arranged so as to cast its light or beam on the table. ELVYN also recalled that there were at least a dozen fountain pens and

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a few colored pencils on the table. He said that the room contained a three piece glass front sectional bookcase, two old kitchen chairs, and a couple of old wooden boxes which were apparently being used as chairs. Mr. ELYN said that the only thing in the bedroom was the bottom half of a dark blue studio couch and that the kitchen held a few dishes and silverware but no pots and pans. Mr. ELYN said that to his recollection, there was nothing else in the apartment except possibly a few small odds and ends which he could not at this time describe.

FLOYD ELYN, JR., advised that at the time he entered SARANT'S apartment in possibly December 1948, or January 1949, he had never seen anyone at SARANT'S apartment and it was not until June or July 1949 that a man who claimed to be SARANT came to him and asked for a key to 61, stating that he had left his key in another suit in the apartment. ELYN said that he went to apartment 61 with this man, unlocked the door and let him in. He continued that this man, who claimed to be SARANT, stayed around the apartment for a week and then left without notice.

Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELYN, JR. personally observed JAMES L. FINESTONE at the United States Court House Building, Foley Square, New York City on April 17, 1951. They both identified him as the unknown individual who claimed to be SARANT mentioned immediately above.

The ELYNS said that two or three months after June or July 1949, a colored woman had come to the superintendent's apartment and asked for a key to Apartment 61, stating that Mrs. SARANT had called her and asked her to clean the apartment. ELYN said he refused this woman the key. He described her as an old lady in her 60's, 5'4" tall, poorly dressed, heavy built and walked with an effort.

Mrs. ELYN continued that a little while later a telephone repairman came and told her that a woman in apartment 61 wanted the phone changed into her name and this telephone repairman requested a key to the apartment, which was refused. The ELYNS both stated that they had never seen nor heard of a woman being in SARANT'S apartment during the time they had been there.

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FLOYD ELWYN, JR., said that a while after the first telephone man came, another one came and wanted the key, stating he had instructions to take the phone out of the apartment. ELWYN said he refused this man the key but that the phone was taken out later (he thought in November, 1949, at a time when someone was at the apartment.)

ELWYN related that near the Christmas holidays of 1949 tenants were complaining of water which was continuously running somewhere in the building and on checking this complaint he had traced it to the toilet in apartment 61. He stated he went to SARANT'S apartment and gained entrance and that there he observed about seven men lying awake talking, each in a separate khaki sleeping bag. ELWYN stated he had to step over these men, who were in the living room, to reach the bathroom and that while he was there he heard other men talking in the bedroom but did not see them as the door was closed. ELWYN said that while he was in the bathroom one man came in and asked how long he would be and that this man seemed in a hurry to have him leave. Mr. ELWYN stated that the man who previously identified himself as SARANT was not among the seven men he noted in the living room, however, he believes that WILLIAM PERL is identical with the man who came into the bathroom while he was in the apartment on this occasion.

It is noted that Mr. ELWYN has previously personally observed WILLIAM PERL and identified him.

FLOYD ELWYN, JR., continued that at one time a letter came for a Mr. PERL and that the mailman had given this to him. He said that he saw a man opening the mailbox for apartment 61 and that he asked him about PERL. Mr. ELWYN said that this man told him Mr. PERL was in the apartment so he could give the letter to this man.

It is noted that Mr. FLOYD ELWYN, JR. has personally observed Dr. ELDON BRUCE DAYTON and identified him as the person he saw opening the mailbox as described immediately above.

Mr. ELWYN stated that he first heard of the vacancy of this apartment when his employer, ROBERT GARLOCK

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came to collect rent in the building on approximately January 26, 1950. ELWYN stated that he visited the apartment for the first time in connection with the vacating of the apartment on approximately January 27, 1950 and noted that it contained little furniture and there was no one in the apartment at the time. ELWYN stated that he now recalls having telephoned ROBERT GARLOCK at his home and advised him that the apartment had not been completely vacated and he desired instructions as to what disposition was to be made with the furnishings therein. ELWYN stated that GARLOCK told him that he had received a letter from ALFRED SARANT in Ithaca, New York dated January 23, 1950, which indicated that SARANT desired to vacate the apartment and that his possessions were out of the apartment.

ELWYN stated it was on January 31, 1950 that THOMAS F. DONOVAN occupied the apartment. He recalled that DONOVAN told of the incident by which DONOVAN's former landlady desired occupancy of her apartment for a new tenant prior to February 1, 1950. DONOVAN indicated to ELWYN that if he, DONOVAN, was not out of the apartment so that it could be rented by February 1, 1950, he would have to pay an additional month's rent.

Mr. ELWYN recalls that Mr. THOMAS F. DONOVAN, the current tenant in Apartment 6I, 65 Morton Street, Mrs. FRANK GARLAND, his sister, and Mr. and Mrs. THOMAS A. MCGILL, brother-in-law and sister of Mr. DONOVAN, respectively, accompanied him to Apartment 6I on or about January 28, 1950. He recalls that there was some mention made in his conversation with these individuals on the day they went to the apartment pertaining to the burial of their mother.

It is noted, Mr. DONOVAN'S mother had been buried on the morning of January 28, 1950.

Mr. ELWYN stated that they were admitted to the apartment by a man, whom he has subsequently personally identified as GARY PICKARD. Mr. ELWYN stated that on the following day, which would have been Sunday, January 29, 1950, he recalls that he went to Apartment 6I and found whom he had originally believed to be Dr. ELMER BRUCE.

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DAYTON, mentioned previously, however, now he believes that this individual may have been identical with GARY PICKARD. He said that he knocked on the door and there was no answer and he let himself in with his passkey. ELAYN stated that when he entered the apartment there was the man he presently believes that he saw at the mailbox and he said that this man was sitting at the kitchen table which was in the middle of the living room eating crackers and jelly and had only a glass of water to go with them. ELAYN stated that he believed that there was no one else in the apartment and that when he told this man that the apartment was supposed to be vacated, the man replied, "Sarant is letting us keep it until the rent runs out".

Mrs. ELAYN stated that she recalls the group of four previously mentioned individuals who came to their apartment late on the day of the burial of Mr. GIOVANNI'S mother, requesting that her husband accompany them to Apartment 61.

Mr. ELAYN has advised that on or about January 29, 1950, he observed WILLIAM PERL, Dr. YELDON BRUCE DAYTON, GARY PICKARD and MAXELL FINESTONE, moving furniture which allegedly came from Apartment 61, into the basement of his building.

Mrs. ELAYN has advised that she observed on that date, WILLIAM PERL, Dr. YELDON BRUCE DAYTON and MAX FINESTONE, moving furniture into the basement of their apartment building, however, she recalls that her husband advised her on that date that there was a fourth man who participated in the moving of this furniture.

It is to be noted that GARY PICKARD has advised that he participated in the moving of this furniture and secondly, the fourth man which she did not see would of necessity have been GARY PICKARD. It is further noted, Mrs. ELAYN has personally identified PERL, DAYTON and FINESTONE.

ELAYN said that there was a telephone in SARANT'S apartment when he came in 1940 and that he now recalls that a telephone company collector had asked about SARANT in

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October or September 1949. He said that this man mentioned to him that the bill had not been paid in months. ELBYN also recalled that apartment 6I, when rented by SARANT, was called the "ghost apartment" by other tenants of the building because they seldom saw anyone but heard signs of occupancy from time to time. ELBYN also recalled that when the apartment was vacated in January of 1950 the apartment house porter, T. B. ILEY, found what appeared to be an easel or drawing board, which was made of 1/2" pine lumber, in the closet of the living room. ELBYN stated that he had observed this board and that it was about 24" to 30" long by 18" to 20" wide with a groove near the bottom edge as if it would be a groove to hold pencils. He said that this board had 4 legs, each about 3' long, and that hinges were connected to the legs and to the bottom center of the board, giving the appearance that the whole easel could be folded.

ELBYN continued that the board itself, as he recalled, was made of 4 pieces of board to form an oblong and that the legs were approximately 2" wide. What appeared most odd and attracted his attention to the easel, he said, was the fact that the board had small finishing nails about 1" apart along all four edges. ELBYN stated that this board was broken up as if it had been pushed in the closet and kicked by someone's feet, thereby breaking it. He said he believed the board was destroyed by the porter with the trash.

On May 15, 1951, Mr. MOYD ELBYN, JR. advised the writer that he observed MAXWELL FINESTONE, WILLIAM PERL and a third unknown man, who may be described as white, approximately 5' 11", broad shoulders, 170 pounds, 35 to 37 years of age, light brown or reddish hair, medium complexion and wearing a grey business suit and no hat, subsequent to April 17, 1951 walking north on Seventh Avenue South near Grove Street in the Greenwich Village section. ELBYN states that he believes that FINESTONE recognized him and immediately after this apparent recognition, the group of three crossed to the east side of Seventh Avenue. ELBYN stated that although he personally observed WILLIAM PERL and MAXWELL FINESTONE, he does not recall ever having seen the third individual.

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f. Money Orders

(1) Received from WILLIAM PERL

It will be noted that ALFRED and LOUISE SARANT have both admitted the receipt of Postal Money Orders from WILLIAM PERL in payment of rent on the 65 Morton Street apartment. Money order stubs were located at the Ithaca Post Office as having been received by ALFRED SARANT as follows:

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The FBI Laboratory has advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN'S signature is identical with her known handwriting. Therefore, they have concluded that she sent this money order.

2. CONSPIRATORIAL USE OF APARTMENT

a. Interviews with DAVID GREENGLASS

On March 3, 1951, DAVID GREENGLASS was interviewed at the City Prison, New York City, by SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and the writer in an attempt to develop further information pertaining to ROSENBERG'S Greenwich Village apartment. GREENGLASS recalls that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned to him in approximately July 1948, that he was paying rent on an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City. ROSENBERG indicated that this apartment was being used for microfilming, as a "stop-over" location for out of town espionage contacts and as a meeting place for espionage contacts. ROSENBERG advised that DAVID'S wife, EITH GREENGLASS, would probably not like the apartment due to the fact that it was a walk-up apartment located on the sixth and top floor of the building. It is noted that at that time the GREENGLASSES were contemplating the renting of an apartment.

The apartment of ALFRED SARANT at 65 Norton Street, New York City, was described to DAVID GREENGLASS as being a three room walk-up apartment located on the sixth and top floor of the building. DAVID GREENGLASS stated that although he had never seen the apartment or its physical location, there was no doubt in his mind whatsoever that the SARANT apartment is identical with the apartment that JULIUS ROSENBERG was utilizing in connection with his espionage endeavors. It is recalled that from investigation conducted to date, there was no permanent resident at SARANT'S apartment from early summer, 1948, until the fall of 1949.

DAVID GREENGLASS was interviewed at the City Prison, New York City on June 30, 1951 by SAS JOHN A.

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HARRINGTON, WILLIAM F. NORTON and the writer. On July 2, 1951, GREENGLASS was again interviewed in Room 425, United States Court House Building, Foley Square, New York City by SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON and the writer. GREENGLASS advised of the following during the course of these two interviews:

He stated that during the Christmas Holiday period of 1949, he went to see JULIUS ROSENBERG, his brother-in-law, at the Pitt Machine Products Company, 307 East Houston Street, New York City, for the purpose of discussing his status in this business. DAVID GREENGLASS explained that he had a stock certificate for 25 of the 100 outstanding shares in this business and desired to sell his shares to ROSENBERG. On this occasion, ROSENBERG explained to GREENGLASS in the office of the Pitt Machine Products Company during a preliminary discussion pertaining to the business, that he was attempting to borrow \$5,000. from a cousin in order to buy DAVID SHEIN'S 25 shares in this business. He told GREENGLASS that GREENGLASS should sign over his stock shares to him. ROSENBERG stated that he did not want to alarm DAVID but that "you will have to begin thinking about going away to Paris" and that GREENGLASS was "hot".

GREENGLASS stated that his interest mounted and he became quite excited. ROSENBERG invited him to have a cup of coffee with him at the corner luncheonette, which GREENGLASS explained was located at Houston Street and Avenue C. While sitting in a booth in the luncheonette, ROSENBERG explained that GREENGLASS and his wife should obtain United States passports and visas for France by applying at the Department of State and at the French Consulate, both in New York City. GREENGLASS was advised to state as his purpose, that he owned property in France and that he desired to dispose of it. This trip was to be accomplished via ship travelling from the Port of New York to a French port. He was told that money would be provided for the trip and that in Paris he would make contact with someone else in their "espionage ring".

GREENGLASS advised that he questioned ROSENBERG as to why he was to leave the United States and JULIUS explained that "something is happening which will cause you

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to leave the United States". ROSENBERG stated that he would have to get rid of the other apartment. DAVID said he asked JULIUS, "Do you mean the Twelfth Street (and Avenue B) apartment?" ROSENBERG indicated to DAVID that he had already disposed of the Twelfth Street apartment.

It is noted that GARY PICKARD has advised SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and the writer during his interviews in New York City in June 1951, that MAX FINESTONE stated during the Christmas Holiday period, 1949, that he had received information from the "owners" of Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City to the effect that this apartment would have to be vacated, however, there was no immediate urgency.

ROSENBERG indicated to DAVID GREENGLASS that he did not have to worry, that he should sign his stock certificate for 25 shares, have it notarized and then bring it to him. DAVID advised that he put him off by stating that it was in his safe deposit box. DAVID GREENGLASS stated that he left ROSENBERG having agreed to the above request. He told his wife only about the stock certificate part of his discussion with ROSENBERG. "e did not then tell her that they would have to leave the country. She agreed that he should sign the certificate, have it notarized, and wait until JULIUS ROSENBERG paid them for their 25 shares before giving up the stock certificate.

GREENGLASS further advised that he recalls "feeling uneasy" during a New Year's Eve party at the home of JACK SCHLEIDER, who resides at 54 Forsyth Street, New York City, telephone number CA 6-3355, on December 31, 1949. He stated that during this party he thought about what JULIUS ROSENBERG had said about going away and definitely recalls reminiscing about his friends who were present and thought that this would be the last New Year's Eve party that he would spend with them.

He stated that shortly after the first of January 1950, he signed the stock certificate and had his druggist Mr. BENJAMIN P. GELMAN notarize the certificate.

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On July 2, 1951, Assistant United States Attorney JOHN E. FOLEY, Southern District of New York, allowed the writer to review GREENGLASS' stock certificate which was entered as Defense Exhibit C-1 in the ROSENBERG et al espionage trial, United States District Court, Southern District of New York on March 22, 1951. On the certificate is inscribed:

"For value received, I hereby sell, assign and transfer unto JULIUS ROSENBERG 25 shares of the capital stock represented by the within certificate, and do hereby irrevocably constitute and appoint _____ attorney, to transfer the said stock on the books of the within named corporation (Fitt Machine Products Company) with full power of substitution in the business.

GREENGLASS stated that this certificate was surrendered to ROSENBERG on or about May 1, 1950. It is noted that this certificate is marked "Cancelled May 1, 1950". Photostatic copies of this certificate have been made and are being retained as exhibits in instant investigation.

DAVID GREENGLASS states that a special agent of the FBI (LAWRENCE J. SPILLATINE) called him at his home (265 Livingston Street, New York City) during the morning of January 27, 1950, at which time he arranged an appointment to see GREENGLASS at 2 p m that afternoon. DAVID states that after the special agent called, he went to see

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ROSENBERG at the Pitt Machine Products Company. He advised JULIUS of his call and appointment. ROSENBERG told him to find out what the agent wanted and to get in touch with him later and advise him of the FBI'S interest.

GREENGLASS stated that the special agent interviewed him at his home, 265 Rivington Street, New York City, at 2 p m as scheduled. He learned that the agent's inquiry was of a routine nature regarding some uranium that had been stolen from the Atomic Energy Project at Los Alamos, New Mexico. He stated that he went to work after the interview (Arma Machine Company, Brooklyn, New York, 4 to 12 shift). He indicated that this interview must have taken place on a Friday (verified through 1950 calendar), for the following day was Saturday and was the Jewish Sabbath. He explained that the Pitt Machine Products Company was not open on Saturday due to the fact that in part of the Pitt Machine Products Company building there is located a Jewish Synagogue. GREENGLASS stated that on Sunday morning, January 29, 1950, he again contacted ROSENBERG at the Pitt Machine Products Company and advised him of the agent's interest. ROSENBERG told him that there was nothing for him to worry about.

SA LAWRENCE W. SPILLANE advised the writer on July 2, 1951 that he contacted DAVID GREENGLASS at 265 Rivington Street, New York City as alleged at 2 p m on January 27, 1950, after having telephoned him that morning to arrange an appointment. SA LAWRENCE W. SPILLANE explained that this interview was concluded after approximately 45 to 60 minutes duration.

DAVID GREENGLASS further advised that after the arrest of Dr. KLAUS FUCHS (February 4, 1950) in England, JULIUS ROSENBERG immediately came to his home. DAVID stated that he and JULIUS took a walk at which time ROSENBERG told DAVID, "This guy Fuchs is the man who was contacted in this country by 'Dave' (HARRY GOLD) and now you will have to leave". JULIUS further advised that FUCHS had been contacted by the British Police prior to GREENGLASS' contact with ROSENBERG during the Christmas Holidays of 1949 and that he (FUCHS) is the reason why DAVID will have to leave the United States. DAVID suggested that JULIUS get hold of "DAVE" (GOLD) and have him lay low for a while.

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JULIUS ROSENBERG countered by explaining that ETHEL (his wife) had said the same thing. ROSENBERG also advised that this time the "Russians tried to work six months ahead of the FBI". ROSENBERG explained that when one man such as FUCHS is contacted, then they try to anticipate who the FBI will be contacting in six months and get to that man first. In this case JULIUS ROSENBERG thought that "DAVE" (GOLD) and GREENGLASS would be next.

b. Interview with T. B. WILEY

On July 24, 1950, T. B. WILEY, 1125 Dean Street, Brooklyn, New York, age 33, was interviewed by SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN. He advised that he had been a porter at 65 Norton Street, New York City, since September 1945.

WILEY was questioned concerning his knowledge of incidents or individuals in connection with Apartment 6I at that address and he stated that the only thing he recalled is that he cleaned this apartment after it was vacated in January 1950. He said that he found an old brown felt hat, a glass dish or vase similar to a fruit bowl of opaque white glass in the apartment, and that in the closet in the living room of the apartment he found what appeared to be a drawing board. WILEY stated that he could not describe the drawing board at that time and that he had noticed nothing else that he could now describe.

A number of photographs were displayed to WILEY and he said that he recognized the photographs of ALFRED SARANT as an individual whom he did not know personally but whom he had met in the apartment house on the stairs or in the halls. He said that he could not recall when he last saw SARANT but that it had not been for some time, probably not within the last four years.

WILEY also stated that he recognized a photograph of JULIUS ROSENBERG as an individual he had met in the apartment house. He said that he did not know ROSENBERG, but that he has seen him within the last two years.

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c. Information furnished by Confidential Informant T-1

On March 23, 1951, Confidential Informant T-1, mentioned previously, advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on Morton Street, where he (ROSENBERG), JOEL BARR and 'Bill' used to meet in secret and discuss their plans. Rent for this apartment was \$55. per month.

On July 10, 1951 this informant advised further that from the information furnished to the informant by ROSENBERG, the student mentioned above is a fourth individual and that this individual was not aware of the nature of these meetings.

This apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study, however, the real reason, according to ROSENBERG, was to have a place for meetings. The informant stated that ROSENBERG did not further identify "BILL", however, from information that the informant had received from ROSENBERG, the informant believes that "BILL" is identical with WILLIAM PERL. ROSENBERG further indicated that he had typed on various occasions for many hours in the Morton Street apartment. ROSENBERG stated that in order to alleviate some of the noise created in typing, he placed rubber caps under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom.

It is to be noted that DAVID GREENGLASS 1, interviewed on July 2, 1951, stated that ROSENBERG had confided that he had an apartment which he would often go to during the late evening hours and perform typing. ROSENBERG stated that at this apartment he would alleviate noise by putting a rubberized cushion or some type of rubber cap under the typewriter and would turn on the water in the bathroom.

The informant stated that ROSENBERG paid the rent on this apartment and that the amount of \$55. in all probability was the total expenditure for this apartment, which included not only rent but utilities as well. It is recalled that the SARANT apartment on Morton Street rented

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for \$45.50 per month. however, gas and electricity and telephone expenses were separate items.

It is further noted that HENRIETTA SAVIDGE (Mrs. WILLIAM PERL) used the ALFRED SARANT apartment on Norton Street from approximately February 1947 until September 1947, at which time she obtained her present apartment which is located at 104 East 32nd Street, New York City. During the February 1947 to September 1947 period, HENRIETTA SAVIDGE was attending New York University. WILLIAM PERL at that time was attending Columbia University working toward his doctor's degree. However, these meetings would have had by necessity taken place prior to JOEL FARR'S trip to Europe in January 1948. FARR has not returned to the United States and his current whereabouts are unknown.

DAVID GREENGLASS has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG told him that JOEL FARR went to Europe in 1947 ostensibly to study music, however, the real purpose of FARR'S trip to Europe was to further act as a Soviet espionage agent.

It is recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS has previously advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned to him in approximately July 1948 that he was paying rent on an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City. ROSENBERG indicated that this apartment was being used for microfilming, as a "stopover" location for Soviet espionage contacts and as a meeting place for espionage contacts. GREENGLASS stated that if he had desired, ROSENBERG would possibly have made available the Greenwich Village apartment for him to live in.

GREENGLASS also advised that although he had never seen the Greenwich Village apartment or its physical location, there is no doubt in his mind whatsoever that the SARANT apartment on Norton Street is identical with the apartment JULIUS ROSENBERG was utilizing in connection with his espionage endeavors. GREENGLASS bases this identification on a comparison of information furnished to him pertaining to the Greenwich Village apartment by ROSENBERG and comparable information furnished to him by the writer.

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3. PROSECUTIVE OPINION

On July 2, 1951, Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. FOLEY, Southern District of New York, advised SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON and the writer, that in his opinion, based on information furnished to him that date by DAVID GREENGLASS, on information previously furnished to him in interviews with GARY PICKARD, and on information which he had reviewed in reports pertaining to the various individuals involved in the ROSENBERG group, the Government could now prove in a circumstantial manner that ALFRED SARANT'S Apartment 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City, was used by JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, MAXWELL PINESTONE and others for the furtherance of an espionage conspiracy.

Mr. FOLEY was also of the opinion that ALFRED and LOUISE SARANT'S participation in the paying of the rent to the 65 Morton Street Realty Company of New York City and VIVIAN GLASSMAN'S payment of rent to ALFRED SARANT for potential use of this apartment, tended to show their conspiracy in this matter.

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E. FINESTONE'S COMMUNIST AFFILIATIONS

In the August 10, 1945 issue of "The Pilot", a national paper for maritime workers, there appears on page 9 a sub-heading of "ALP Rallies On Seamen's Pay." This article stated that MAX FINESTONE, Executive Secretary of the Third Assembly District Club of the American Labor Party, New York City, was rallying American Labor Party membership behind the wage campaign of the National Maritime Union.

The American Labor Party was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, on March 29, 1944.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised that MAX FINESTONE, who then resided at Ithaca, New York, had attended a Communist Party convention held on June 26 and 27, 1948, at Buffalo, New York. Confidential Informant T-8 said that FINESTONE gave a report on the progress of the Communist Party at Ithaca, New York.

Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised on March 5, 1948, that MAX FINESTONE in 1947 held Communist Party membership card number 43554.

The Communist Party has been declared by the Attorney General as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

On December 23, 1947, Confidential Informant T-10, of known reliability, advised that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, who was born in 1922, was a member of Lodge #718, International Workers Order, New York City, as of December, 1946. The informant further advised that by FINESTONE'S name there appeared a notation "suspended."

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It is to be noted that MAXWELL FINESTONE, the subject of instant investigation, was born on July 28, 1922, in Boston, Massachusetts. Therefore, it is believed that he is identical with the MAXWELL FINESTONE who was a member of Lodge #718 of the International Workers Order.

The International Workers Order has been declared by the Attorney General as an organization coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

II. INTERVIEWS OF MAXWELL FINESTONE

It should be noted that in connection with the attempted location of ALFRED SARANT that among others MAXWELL FINESTONE was interviewed and the following information developed during the course of these interviews:

On the evening of August 21, 1950, SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer contacted MAXWELL FINESTONE at his apartment, B2, 418 East 9th Street, New York City. At this time another individual was present in the apartment who identified himself to the agents as JAMES WEINSTEIN. MAXWELL FINESTONE advised that he and WEINSTEIN shared the apartment. FINESTONE admitted that he knew ALFRED SARANT of Ithaca, New York, but at this point he advised that he did not wish to discuss SARANT or any other matter with the agents until he had consulted an attorney. FINESTONE said, "You know why you're here and I know why you're here, so why should we kid each other."

In answer to questions, FINESTONE did state that he was not currently employed; that he had been working on a market research project, but he declined to advise as to the nature of this project or the identity of his employer.

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At the time the agents were conducting the interview, they observed that FINESTONE'S apartment, which is located on the third floor, front, consisted of a living room, two bedrooms, a kitchen and bathroom. SA LITTLEJOHN observed in the bathroom a telephone, on the edge of the bathtub, which had no identifying number. Agents ROYAL and LITTLEJOHN observed that there was a second telephone in the living room which bore telephone number GRamercy 5-2146. The apartment was very nicely decorated.

It is noted that Mr. and Mrs. ELWIN have described, among the articles of furniture they observed being moved from SARANT'S apartment, two old kitchen chairs and a white metal top kitchen table. SARANT, in interview, has advised that he had a Hollywood type double bed in Apartment 6-I at 65 Morton Street. During the above contact with MAXWELL FINESTONE, SA LITTLEJOHN and the writer observed that the kitchen of FINESTONE'S apartment contained two kitchen tables, one of which was a white rectangular metal top kitchen table, and that the bedroom directly off of the living room of FINESTONE'S apartment contained a double Hollywood type bed.

On August 22, 1950, SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN telephonically contacted MAXWELL FINESTONE, at which time FINESTONE stated that he planned to see an attorney that day and said he would make a decision as to whether or not he would discuss any matter with the interviewing agents. FINESTONE said that he would recontact SA LITTLEJOHN and the writer in the event he desired to furnish any information, but apparently has made no effort to do so.

III. FINESTONE'S APPEARANCES BEFORE THE FEDERAL GRAND JURY, SOUTHERN DISTRICT OF NEW YORK

MAXWELL FINESTONE, according to information received from Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. FOLEY, Southern District of New York, testified before

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the Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, on April 16 and 17, June 26, 27, and 29, 1951.

On June 25, 1951, MAXWELL FINESTONE telephonically contacted the writer at 9:20 a.m. at the New York Office. He stated that he learned through a friend, whose name he did not care to disclose, that a Grand Jury subpoena was outstanding for him. He requested information as to how this subpoena could be served. FINESTONE was advised that he should contact Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. FOLEY, Southern District of New York, pertaining to this Grand Jury subpoena.

Mr. FOLEY advised that FINESTONE telephonically contacted him at 9:30 a.m. on June 25, 1951, and that he agreed to come to Mr. FOLEY'S office at 10:30 a.m. on June 26, 1951.

Mr. FOLEY spoke to FINESTONE at approximately 10:45 a.m. on June 26, 1951, at which time FINESTONE was served with a Grand Jury subpoena for appearance that date. Mr. FOLEY discussed with FINESTONE the plausibleness of being further interviewed by agents of the FBI at this time in preference to numerous Grand Jury appearances in an attempt to develop information which would be of assistance to the Government's investigation. FINESTONE stated that he did not desire to be interviewed by FBI agents due to the fact that they would ask him questions pertaining to the "meat" of this investigation and that he could not "afford" to answer their questions.

Mr. FOLEY further advised on June 29, 1951, that FINESTONE'S Grand Jury subpoena had been continued for July 6, 1951.

On July 6, 1951, Mr. FOLEY advised that FINESTONE had telephoned him prior to his scheduled

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Grand Jury appearance and explained that he would be late due to an unavoidable situation. Mr. FOLEY stated that inasmuch as the Grand Jury was not convening that date he excused FINESTONE until some later date. He stated that he planned to call him possibly on July 20, 1951.

IV. INTERVIEWS WITH JAMES WEINSTEIN

On August 21, 1950, at the time SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer attempted to interview MAXWELL FINESTONE at his residence, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, JAMES WEINSTEIN was present in the apartment. He identified himself by producing an identification card of the United States Naval Reserve which reflected that he had Navy serial number 910-69-31; rank, ETM Second Class, USNR; active duty, January 10, 1945 to July 23, 1946.

He also produced a New York registration dated January 19, 1950, for a 1949 Buick convertible, serial number 35160786, motor number 53837655. This automobile had New York license tag number C 4707.

WEINSTEIN produced New York Operator's License number 1283170 dated October 4, 1948, which reflected that he resided as of that time at 211 Central Park West, New York City. He was described on this license as having been born on July 17, 1926, white, male, 145 pounds, 6 feet, brown eyes, brown hair, and wears glasses.

On August 22, 1950, SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN telephonically contacted WEINSTEIN at his residence, at which time he advised he had formerly been a student at Columbia Law School, and that he has dropped out. He stated that he is now unemployed. He indicated at this time that he would like to furnish information

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pertaining to any matter which the Bureau might wish to discuss and that he would call SA LITTLEJOHN on August 23, 1950, as to an appointment for an interview.

On August 29, 1950, JAMES WEINSTEIN was telephonically contacted by the writer, at which time he stated that he would appear at the New York Office for an interview at 1:30 p.m. on August 30, 1950. On August 30, 1950, at approximately 1:00 p.m. he telephonically contacted the writer, at which time he advised he did not wish to appear at the New York Office for an interview, and further, he did not wish to furnish any information pertaining to any matter to agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

JAMES WEINSTEIN, according to information furnished to the writer by Assistant United States Attorney JOHN H. FOLEY, testified before the Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, on April 17, June 18 and 19, 1951.

On February 4, 1950, Confidential Informant T-11, of known reliability, furnished a slip of paper on which was written: "JAMES WEINSTEIN; From - Cornell; To - Columbia University Law School; NR." This informant advised that this above information is believed to emanate from District #3, Communist Party, USA Headquarters, 250 South Broad Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

V. INTERVIEW WITH DR. WELDON BRUCE DAYTON

Dr. WELDON BRUCE DAYTON was interviewed on June 18th to 20th, 1951, by SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and the writer and again on June 21, 1951, by the writer. For the most part, these interviews took place in Room 425, U. S. Court House Building, Foley Square, New York.

On June 18, 1951, Dr. DAYTON was shown the most recent photographs of WILLIAM PERL and again, as before, he denied having known this individual. He states that he had never accompanied this individual to 65 Morton Street, in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, as alleged by GARY PICKARD and Mr. and Mrs. FLOYD ELWYN, JR. In this connection he stated that he never recalled having met GARY PICKARD; further he does not recall ever having met MAX FINESTONE in New York City.

Concerning Dr. DAYTON'S talk with MAX FINESTONE in the Grand Jury Waiting Room on April 17, 1951, the following information was offered by DAYTON:

He stated that he told MAX FINESTONE about the ELWYN'S' identification of him as one of the individuals who participated in the moving of furniture during the latter part of January, 1950, from 65 Morton Street. He stated that FINESTONE did not comment on this. However, he did state "that one day, he (FINESTONE) was in the Village and found himself on Morton Street, and did he leave in a hurry".

FINESTONE further advised DAYTON that he had chosen to use his Constitutional privilege in not answering certain questions which were asked him during the Grand Jury proceedings, and DAYTON stated that he told FINESTONE that he, himself, had not used his Constitutional privilege and was attempting to answer the questions asked him before the Grand Jury.

DAYTON further advised that on April 17, 1951, he and MAX FINESTONE had lunch together in Chinatown, New

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York. During this lunch they generally discussed this whole matter. However, he stated that FINESTONE would not commit himself as to what actually took place on the alleged date which PERL, FINESTONE, himself, and a fourth individual, who has subsequently been identified to be GARY PICKARD, moved furniture from ALFRED SARANT'S apartment which was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. He stated that FINESTONE was very friendly toward him and had invited him to come to his apartment that evening for further conversation. DAYTON stated that he courteously refused FINESTONE'S invitation and departed from him.

On June 19, 1951, Dr. DAYTON accompanied SA HRADSKY and the writer to the 65 Morton Street, New York City, apartment building in an attempt to further refresh his memory as to his having appeared there on or about January 29, 1950, with WILLIAM PERL. After having thoroughly viewed the immediate surroundings of the 65 Morton Street building and the interior of the Morton Street building, including the basement and the sixth floor, he again stated that he had never been to this address at any time during his life.

On June 20, 1951, Dr. DAYTON was again interviewed about his alleged appearance at the 65 Morton Street apartment building on or about January 29, 1950, with WILLIAM PERL. He stated that he fully realized that the Government had several witnesses who could testify as to his having been there on the alleged date with PERL; however, he again stated that he was not present. DAYTON stated that he could fully understand the Government's position in this espionage investigation and he knows that his having refused to cooperate with the FBI in the location of his wife CAROL immediately after her flight with ALFRED SARANT to Mexico, coupled with his refusal to sign a waiver of search which would allow the FBI to search his Ithaca, New York, residence at the time of his initial interview on August 2, 1950, would logically indicate that he was in some way involved in this espionage investigation.

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Dr. DAYTON stated that this was not true, and the reason for his refusal to assist the FBI in the location of his wife was due to his fear that when and if his wife was located and returned to the U. S. that she would cast an accusing finger at him and that this would cause him to possibly be unable to effect a marital reconciliation. He explained that his refusal to sign a waiver of search during his initial interview by agents of the FBI on August 2, 1950, was based on his firm belief that this was a matter of choice and he chose not to allow the search on general principles.

DAYTON was questioned on this date as to whether he had talked to either FINESTONE or PERL about the allegation that he was present at the Morton Street apartment building on or about January 29, 1950. He stated that he had not been in contact with WILLIAM PERL or MAXWELL FINESTONE. He added that he did not discuss his being present on the alleged date with FINESTONE on the occasion of their having lunch together on April 17, 1951, subsequent to both of their Grand Jury appearances that date, inasmuch as it seemed ridiculous to him to discuss with FINESTONE something that was alleged to have happened when he was not present.

He stated that he would consider contacting WILLIAM PERL and MAXWELL FINESTONE and in the event he effected this contact discussion would be had pertaining to this allegation.

On June 21, 1951, Dr. DAYTON advised that he had talked with his attorney, Mr. SAMUEL SILVERMAN, subsequent to his interview on June 20, 1951. He advised that his attorney advised against seeing WILLIAM PERL; however, he consented to his contacting MAXWELL FINESTONE.

He stated, further, that he had dinner last evening with LOUISE SARANT in an Italian restaurant in Greenwich Village. Thereafter they spent wandering around in mid New York prior to her departure by train

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at 12:44 a.m. for Old Westbury, Long Island, where she was staying with her sister-in-law, Mrs. ELECTRA SARANT JAYSON. DAYTON advised that during last evening he discussed with LOUISE SARANT the plausibility of her accompanying him to see MAXWELL FINESTONE. She advised him that her attorney, Mrs. BELLA S. ABZUG, would not allow her to have any contact with FINESTONE.

DAYTON stated that prior to this interview on June 21, 1951, he attempted to telephonically contact FINESTONE at JOHN A. LEARY'S, 546 West Broadway, New York City, residence. DAYTON stated that he spoke with LEARY and was advised that FINESTONE had been in the hospital several days previously, however, he did not know where FINESTONE could be located.

Dr. WELDON BRUCE DAYTON testified before the Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York, according to information furnished by Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. FOLEY, on April 17, 1951, and on June 18th and 19th, 1951.

It should be noted that Dr. DAYTON, from 1946 until the latter part of September, 1950, was a graduate student and had a part-time research fellowship in the Physics Department of Cornell University. DAYTON began employment in the latter part of September or early October, 1950, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology as a Research Staff member. He has advised that he is, by profession, an Experimental Physicist and has specialized in Nuclear Energy.

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VI. EDUCATION

The records of Cornell University at Ithaca, New York, have reflected the following information pertaining to MAXWELL FINESTONE:

FINESTONE was born July 28, 1922, at Boston, Massachusetts. In his application for admission at Cornell University, he listed as his parent or guardian, ANNA SHAFFIN FINESTONE, RD #4, Ithaca, New York (Danby Road). He advised that his mother's maiden name was ANNA SAUNDERS. He stated that his father, SAMUEL FINESTONE, was born in Russia and that he became a naturalized citizen of the United States, that his father had been an upholsterer, and that he died in 1937.

FINESTONE'S file at Cornell further reflected that he graduated from Ithaca High School in 1940. He attended Northeastern University, Boston, Massachusetts, from 1940 to 1941 and Ithaca College at Ithaca, New York, from 1941 to 1942. He was admitted to the New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell in the fall of 1946 and received a Bachelor of Science degree on September 20, 1949.

His file in the New York School of Industrial and Labor Relations reflects the following employment record:

United States Army, Seneca Ordnance Depot, Romulus, New York, May, 1942 to September, 1942, as an ammunition handler and checker; Merchant Marine as second cook and baker from October, 1943 to December, 1944; American Labor Party, 313 Eighth Avenue, New York City, as Executive Secretary from January, 1945 to May, 1946. He was also employed at Pollack's Furniture Company, East 11th Street, New York City, as a furniture polisher from June, 1946 to October, 1946. This file further reflected that FINESTONE was employed by ALFRED SARANT as an apprentice painter as of July 1, 1949.

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With reference to his employment by the Merchant Marine, FINESTONE advised that he attended the United States Maritime Service Center, Shoopshhead Bay, New York, for eight weeks in October and November, 1943, and that he also attended the United States Maritime Cooks and Bakers School in New York City for four weeks in April, 1944. He was discharged from the United States Maritime Service in October, 1945.

FINESTONE'S file at the School of Industrial and Labor Relations further reflected that he was a member of the following organizations while at Cornell:

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A letter was also noted in FINESTONE'S file by a Mr. MANDEL, 13 Astor Place, New York City. MANDEL, a real estate operator, advised that he had known FINESTONE for approximately five years as a neighbor.

The following miscellaneous information appearing in FINESTONE'S file is being set forth:

He advised in his application that he expected to enter the field of trade union organization and that he had discussed this intention with ARTHUR SCHUTZER, 570 Seventh Avenue, New York City.

As regards his service in the Merchant Marine, FINESTONE stated he entered this service after being turned down by Selective Service twice for health reasons. When in the Merchant Marine, he stated that he was a member of the National Maritime Union, CIO, and that in 1944 he was appointed to the Union's Political Action Committee by JOSEPH SWEAT, National Political Action Director.

He stated that HARRY BROWN, 23 West 26th Street, New York City, was his immediate supervisor when he was employed as Executive Secretary of the American Labor Party in New York City.

One letter of reference in FINESTONE'S file was from EUGENE P. CONNELLY, Councilman, Borough of Manhattan, New York City.

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VII. EMPLOYMENT HISTORY (SINCE NOVEMBER, 1949)

Miss LEE ANDREWS, owner of Andrew Surveys, advised the writer on May 17, 1951, that MAX FINESTONE of 173 West End Avenue, New York City, has been employed by this organization as a "free lance" market research interviewer (hourly basis) since March 15, 1951. She indicated that she had considered employing FINESTONE on a full-time basis in an executive capacity with her firm, but that general business conditions had prevented her from doing so.

She indicated that FINESTONE had furnished her a resume which included his education, work experience, activities, war service, and references. Miss ANDREWS made available this resume which reflected the following background information pertaining to FINESTONE:

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In connection with his work experience, Miss ANDREWS stated that the Kenyon Research Company is a part of the Kenyon and Ekhardt advertising concern, 247 Park Avenue, New York City. She stated also that FINESTONE had indicated to her that he had worked for CY LISTERMAN at Pepsi Cola and for HILDA BARNES at Hofstra College.

Pertaining to his references, Miss ANDREWS stated that she recently telephonically contacted ARTHUR BOUDIN at Ted Bates and Company, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City, where BOUDIN is employed, pertaining to FINESTONE. BOUDIN highly recommended MAX FINESTONE and stated that he is a personal friend of his.

Miss ANDREWS stated that MAX FINESTONE told her that he had borrowed ARTHUR BOUDIN'S personally-owned automobile to use on a job which he had performed for her survey organization in April, 1951.

Miss ANDREWS stated that this work would have been performed between April 1 and April 11, 1951, and that she had two bills in her possession which would substantiate FINESTONE'S having need for an automobile during this April 1 - April 11, 1951 period.

She stated that she received these bills on April 11, 1951, and from a review of the first one it appears that he drove twenty miles in connection with his work for her and billed her for twenty miles at seven cents a mile. The second bill, she stated, reflected that FINESTONE had driven 475 miles and had put in seventy-one hours in connection with a Tandem Tractor survey job in New Jersey. On this occasion he billed her for the 475 miles at seven cents a mile.

Miss ANDREWS stated that FINESTONE received salary checks from her on the following dates:

On May 18, 1951, Miss ANDREWS telephonically contacted the writer and advised that she now recalls that Mr. JOHN BROOKS, Assistant Director of the Research Department and Personnel for the Federal Advertising Agency, 385 Madison Avenue, New York City, had originally referred FINESTONE to her organization.

On June 20, 1951, Miss LEE ANDREWS advised that MAX FINESTONE had placed permanent wave materials with a number of young women during April and May, 1951, among whom were CARMEN DOWNS, 245 West 69th Street, New York City, telephone number SC 4-9289, and whose employment is with the Inter-continental Hotel Corporation of New York City, and DOLORES SCHOENFELD, 1500 Thieriot Avenue, Bronx, New York, telephone number UN 3-3902, and whose employment is with the International Garment Workers Union. Miss ANDREWS stated that both CARMEN DOWNS and DOLORES SCHOENFELD were known by her to be personal friends of MAX FINESTONE.

On June 21, 1951, Miss ANDREWS was again contacted pertaining to MAX FINESTONE in an attempt to develop the names of any banks with which he may have done business.

Miss ANDREWS reviewed for the writer the endorsements on FINESTONE'S salaried checks while in her employ and was unable to ascertain the bank endorsement which would lead to the identification of a bank with which FINESTONE was doing business.

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B. AMERICAN RESEARCH BUREAU

Dr. CHARLES L. VAUGHN, Market Research Division, Psychological Corporation, 522 Fifth Avenue, New York City, advised the writer on May 31, 1951, that Mr. WILLIAM A. REYNOLDS who is currently employed by Batten, Barton, Durstine, and Osborn, Inc., advertising agents, 383 Madison Avenue, New York City, was formerly associated with the American Research Bureau which currently has offices in Washington, D. C.

Mr. WILLIAM A. REYNOLDS, an employee in the Statistical Department, Batten, Barton, Durstine, and Osborn (BBDO), 7th floor, 383 Madison Avenue, New York City, telephone number EL 5-5800, advised the writer on May 31, 1951, that on November 28, 1949, MAX FINESTONE and GARY PICKARD applied for part-time employment with BBDO as field interviewers. Mr. REYNOLDS stated that neither of these men was ever employed by BBDO.

Mr. REYNOLDS produced applicant records for FINESTONE which reflected that as of November 28, 1949, he resided at 65 Morton Street, Apartment 6-I, New York City, telephone number TR 7-2563. FINESTONE indicated that he would be available for employment at any time, that he had a B. S. degree, and that he had majored in speech, drama, and industrial and labor relations at Cornell University.

FINESTONE indicated that he was employed by the Cornell University Sociology Department as a field interviewer in 1948-1949 under Professor E. A. SUCHMAN.

FINESTONE also indicated that he had a certain proficiency in typing.

Mr. REYNOLDS indicated that the BBDO application for employment records for GARY PICKARD reflect that as of November 28, 1949, PICKARD gave as his permanent address 100 Sunnyside Avenue, Pleasantville, New York.

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He gave as his permanent telephone number Pleasantville 2-1797 and indicated that he could be reached c/o TR 7-2563 during the evenings.

Mr. REYNOLDS advised that Mr. JAMES SEILER, who is the head of the American Research Bureau, which has offices in the National Press Building, Room 1194, Washington, D. C., had requested his wife (Mrs. WILLIAM A. REYNOLDS) to handle his New York office in approximately the fall of 1949. REYNOLDS stated that his wife coordinated interviews in connection with several television surveys for JAMES SEILER until February, 1951.

Mr. REYNOLDS stated that he hired MAX FINESTONE and GARY PICKARD as field interviewers for the American Research Bureau on or about November 28, 1949. He stated that they worked for the American Research Bureau on an "on-and-off basis" from approximately November 28, 1949 to approximately March 15, 1950.

Mr. REYNOLDS further advised that FINESTONE filed a claim with the New York State Unemployment Compensation Commission Office in New York City. He stated that there was a referee action hearing pertaining to FINESTONE'S claim which was held during the second and third weeks of February, 1951, at which time FINESTONE made a personal appearance. Mr. REYNOLDS recalls that FINESTONE stated that while he was employed by the American Research Bureau in 1949 and 1950, as indicated above, he hired GARY PICKARD and ROBERT SCHLENGER who resided at 2212 Ditmas Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and therefore would be entitled to unemployment compensation inasmuch as FINESTONE alleged that Mrs. REYNOLDS would have made the fourth employee for the American Research Bureau in the New York office. REYNOLDS stated that although he knew that PICKARD had worked under FINESTONE, he was not aware until this hearing that ROBERT SCHLENGER had ever worked for FINESTONE in connection with the American Research Bureau's television surveys.

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Mr. REYNOLDS stated that there was a second hearing pertaining to FINESTONE'S claim approximately five weeks after the initial hearing, at which time FINESTONE did not make a personal appearance. The referee in action for the Unemployment Compensation Commission, 342 Madison Avenue, New York 17, New York, advised Mr. REYNOLDS that FINESTONE had telephonically contacted him during the morning prior to this second hearing and advised that he could not make a personal appearance that date due to a business trip which he was taking to Detroit, Michigan.

Mr. REYNOLDS further advised that Dr. CHARLES L. VAUGHN, mentioned previously, had indicated to him that FINESTONE went to Boston, Massachusetts, during either February or March, 1950, in connection with a survey which the Psychological Corporation of New York City was conducting.

On June 4, 1951, Mr. REYNOLDS advised of the following pertaining to FINESTONE'S and PICKARD'S earnings with the American Research Bureau during 1949 and 1950:

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Mr. REYNOLDS stated that PICKARD'S salary and expenses were included in the salary and expense checks to FINESTONE. He stated further that between December 9, 1949, until April 15, 1950 (payroll dates), he paid FINESTONE a grand total of \$499.15.

On May 17, 1951, Mr. GURTH WILLIAMS, Office Manager, advised the writer that MAX FINESTONE made application for employment on November 30, 1949, and in so doing indicated that he was then residing at Apartment 6-I, 65 Morton Street, New York City, and could be reached in care of telephone number TR 7-2563.

FINESTONE'S application for employment further reflected his date of birth as July 28, 1922; that he was single; and that he was referred to the Psychological Corporation by a Mr. LITTLE of Pharmacrast. FINESTONE stated that he had graduated from Ithaca High School in 1940 and received a Bachelor of Science degree, majoring in industrial and labor relations, from Cornell University in 1949. FINESTONE also indicated that he began to work at the American Research Bureau on November 28, 1949, at \$1.25 per hour doing free lance survey work. He also indicated that from September, 1948, until June, 1949, he was employed by the Cornell University Sociological Department doing interviewing work at \$1.00 per hour. He also indicated that he was trained for personnel work.

Mr. WILLIAMS also advised that on April 6, 1950, FINESTONE began to work for the Psychological Corporation as a "house-to-house" canvasser in connection with a market research job at \$1.00 per hour. FINESTONE discontinued this free lance employment on

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August 2, 1950, and earned \$313.05. His Social Security Number was 061-16-3482.

Mr. WILLIAMS further advised that FINESTONE stated that he resided at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, as of April 6, 1950.

FINESTONE gave his Social Security Number as 061-16-3482.

Miss CANNON stated that they paid FINESTONE \$90.00 for his ten days' employment with this concern.

Mrs. BERNICE MILLMAN, Personnel Department, advised the writer on May 17, 1951, that MAX FINESTONE, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, Social Security Number 061-16-3482, born July 28, 1922, was employed as a temporary employee in their market research department as a tabulator at \$8.00 a day from July 27, 1950, until August 15, 1950. His total earnings were \$104.

FINESTONE gave as his telephone number GRamercy 5-2146 and described himself as male, single, 6' tall, 165 pounds, and a graduate of Cornell University.

Miss JOAN VanRAALTE, secretary to Mr. ERNEST DICHTER, advised the writer on May 21, 1951, that MAX FINESTONE, 173 West End Avenue, New York City, telephone number TR 3-3104, conducted two "Guide Post" interviews at \$3.50 each, plus \$.35 telephone charges on approximately January 25, 1951. She stated that they paid him \$7.35 on February 5, 1951.

Mrs. VIRGINIA MULVANEY, secretary to the Vice-President in charge of personnel at the Industrial Surveys Company, Incorporated, advised the writer on May 21, 1951, that the personnel records for former employees are maintained in their Chicago office; however, she stated that she would teletype their Chicago office that date and would advise the writer upon receipt of personnel information pertaining to FINESTONE.

On May 22, 1951, Mrs. MULVANEY telephonically contacted the writer and stated that MAX FINESTONE, 173 West End Avenue, New York City, telephone number TR 3-3104, worked for Industrial Surveys Company from January 29, 1951, through February 3, 1951, and received \$46.56 plus expenses in compensation for his time. He also worked from April 23, 1951 through May 2, 1951, and received \$90.00 plus expenses.

On May 23, 1951, Mrs. MULVANEY forwarded to the New York Office the original employment application

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which FINESTONE filed with the Industrial Surveys Company on January 12, 1951. Photostatic copies of this application have been made and are being retained as exhibits in the New York file.

From a review of this employment application, it was noted that FINESTONE indicated that he had previously been engaged in market research interviewing for six companies and listed Cornell University at \$1.00 per hour, Psychological Corporation at \$1.00 per hour, Hofstra College (U.B.C. TV Study) at \$1.25 per hour, and O'Brien Sherwood at \$1.00 per hour. FINESTONE indicated that he had been employed as a reporter for an unnamed organization and stated that during the last fifty-two weeks he had been engaged in forty-five weeks of research interviewing or supervising and five weeks of market research statistical work for the Pepsi Cola Company and Kenyon and Elhardt. He also indicated that he is now or had been connected with or helped in some type of political work. He stated that he could organize a small crew of ten workers for this organization and had available to him a 1950 Oldsmobile.

On May 21, 1951, Mr. THOMAS JOSEPH FITZPATRICK, an associate in the O'Brien Sherwood Associates, Incorporated, advised the writer that MAX FINESTONE, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, telephone number Gr 5-2146, was employed as a field interviewer for this research organization during parts of the period from June 19, 1950 until November 5, 1950. His Social Security number was reflected as 061-16-3482 and he earned \$142.50. FINESTONE received checks on July 11, 1950, October 11, 16, 23, 30, 1950 and on November 5, 1950. Mr. FITZPATRICK indicated that FINESTONE had previously been employed by the American Research Bureau and the Psychological Corporation, both survey organizations with offices in New York City.

Mr. FITZPATRICK stated that in applying for a position with this organization, FINESTONE stated that he was 28 years old and that he did not own a car. However, he indicated that he could drive.

Miss DISKEY also advised that this television study was conducted by outside personnel.

Confidential Informant T-12, of known reliability, has advised that MAX FINESTONE received mail in care of his 173 West End Avenue, New York City, address from Amos Parrish and Company, Incorporated, 500 Fifth Avenue, New York 18, New York, on April 6, 1951 and on July 11, 1951. On May 17, 1951, Miss BEATRICE KEELER, Assistant Treasurer, advised the writer that MAX FINESTONE, 173 West End Avenue, New York City, telephone number Trufalgar 3-3104, was paid \$11.35 on March 13, 1951 for one interviewing job. He worked under Mr. ELIAS S. GOTTLIEB in the manufacturing division of Amos Parrish and Company, Incorporated. She stated that he had been recommended to them by Mr. WILBUR DANIELS of the International Ladies Garment Workers' Union. Miss KEELER indicated that FINESTONE was single and is a graduate of Cornell University.

Mr. ELIAS S. GOTTLIEB advised Miss KEELER on May 17, 1951 that he had given FINESTONE some work that date pertaining to a consumers' survey, which was being conducted in Manhattan.

IX. NEIGHBORHOOD INVESTIGATIONS

A. Apartment 6-I
65 Morton Street
New York City

It is noted that considerable neighborhood investigation has been conducted in connection with the Morton Street apartment, which FINESTONE resided at from approximately October, 1949 until some date in January, 1950. This information has been previously set forth in this report.

On June 4, 1951, Mrs. PATRICK E. BROWN, who resides diagonally across the hall from apartment 6-I, 65 Morton Street, advised the writer that the photograph of MAXWELL FINESTONE exhibited to her is identical with the individual who resided in apartment 6-I during the Fall of 1949. She recalls that this individual had on several occasions assisted her in the carrying of her groceries up the apartment steps.

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Mrs. MARY BARRY, mother of Mrs. PATRICK B. BROWN, identified a photograph of MAXWELL FINESTONE on June 4, 1951, subsequent to the identification of FINESTONE by her daughter. She recalls that he lived in apartment 6-1 during the Fall of 1949 and had noticed him coming and going from this apartment.

B. Apartment B-2
418 East 9th Street
New York City

1. Interview of EERO K. TOLMUNEN

On August 21, 1950, EERO K. TOLMUNEN, superintendent of the apartment building located at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, and who resides in apartment A at this address, was interviewed by SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer. He advised that two men, by the names of MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN, currently reside in Apartment B-2 in this building. He advised that JAMES WEINSTEIN leased this apartment in December, 1949, and paid the first month's rent on December 9, 1949 for the month of January, 1950, in the amount of \$100.00.

Mr. TOLMUNEN stated that the apartment leased by WEINSTEIN had from the beginning been occupied jointly by WEINSTEIN and FINESTONE, and added that it had been used by a number of different men, whom he had observed on various occasions entering or leaving the apartment. He was unable to furnish any description of these individuals. He further advised that he had observed large mixed groups entering and leaving apartment B-2 on occasions since it was leased by WEINSTEIN.

Mr. TOLMUNEN stated that WEINSTEIN and FINESTONE had rented apartment B-2 through an ad which had been placed by the apartment owners in a local New York newspaper. He

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said that to the best of his knowledge and belief, neither FINESTONE or WEINSTEIN had any connection with the prior tenant of the apartment; a Mr. PETER LONGYEAR, who had moved to Falmouth or East Falmouth, Massachusetts, vacating apartment B-2, as Mr. TOLMUNEN remembered, prior to the last week of December, 1949.

Mr. TOLMUNEN stated that he learned later that Mr. LONGYEAR had left the telephone in apartment B-2 under his name, and that either FINESTONE or WEINSTEIN ran up toll charges billed to LONGYEAR in the amount of \$90.00.

Mr. TOLMUNEN further advised that there were currently three names listed on the door bell for apartment B-2, these being FINESTONE, WEINSTEIN and BERLSTEIN. He advised that he did not know the identity or have any information pertaining to the individual named BERLSTEIN.

Mr. TOLMUNEN was questioned concerning the furniture which might be in apartment B-2, and he advised that he had observed furniture being moved into that apartment on three separate occasions. He could not recall any details of these incidents, only that several pieces of furniture were moved into the apartment at three different times. He said he did not observe the vehicle in which such furniture had been transported to that address.

On September 7, 1950 Mr. TOLMUNEN was reinterviewed by the writer, at which time he advised that it was his definite recollection that FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN have occupied this apartment since the last week of December, 1949. He advised that on several occasions the mail was too bulky for their mail box, and that the postman would leave this excess bulk mail at his apartment for delivery. He stated that he noted in receiving this mail that some of it contained Communist literature. He was unable to specify the exact nature of this literature.

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The current Manhattan telephone directory reflects a listing for PETER H. LONGYEAR, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, telephone MURRAY-Hill 3-3623. It is to be noted that this telephone number was used by FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN, according to information furnished by TOLMUNEN, after LONGYEAR vacated his apartment in December, 1949. Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised that this telephone was disconnected on February 2, 1950.

Mr. TOLMUNEN further advised that although he realized that there were three names on the mail box for apartment B-2, BERNSTEIN, WEINSTEIN and FINESTONE, he did not know the identity or have any information pertaining to the individual named BERNSTEIN. He did state, however, that he believed that LONGYEAR'S wife's maiden name was BERNSTEIN.

TOLMUNEN also advised that there seemed to be some connection between the tenants in apartment B-2 (MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN) and those in apartment A-3. He stated that two women, one by the name of MIRANDA, who is a kindergarten teacher, and the other by the name of DE MAURIAC, who is also possibly a teacher, are the tenants of apartment A-3.

The current Manhattan Telephone Directory reflects that there is a telephone listing for Miss G. C. MIRANDA, Oregon 7-6009 at 418 East 9th Street, New York City.

2. Information From Confidential Informant T-4

In a 1950 Manhattan address telephone directory there was reflected listings for both MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, telephone number GRammercy 5-2146.

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Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised on August 4, 1950 that Grammercy 5-2146, which is listed to MAX FINESTONE, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, and an additional listing to JAMES WEINSTEIN at the same address, was connected on March 3, 1950. This informant stated that FINESTONE was employed as of that date by the American Research Association (American Research Bureau). The informant stated that FINESTONE did not give any address for this employment.

3. Information from Confidential Informant T-14

On February 26, 1951, Confidential Informant T-14, of known reliability, advised that on December 18, 1950, MAX FINESTONE, 418 East 9th Street, New York City, filed a removal at Cooper Station to forward his mail from 418 East 9th Street to 173 West End Avenue, New York 23, New York.

C. Top Floor Rear Apartment
173 West End Avenue
New York City

1. Interviews With Mr. JONAS and Mr. SZIMMERMAN

On May 17, 1951, Mr. FRANK JONAS and Mr. MORRIS SZIMMERMAN (their wives own the 173 West End Avenue apartment building) were interviewed by the writer. Mr. JONAS and Mr. SZIMMERMAN own and operate the Modern Auto Radiator Company, which is located at 173 West End Avenue, New York City, telephone number SC 4-0684. They advised that HARRY SHACH and MAX FINESTONE (identified photograph) currently reside on the top floor rear apartment at 173 West End Avenue. They pay \$24.00 a month rent. SHACH moved into the apartment building in September, 1950 having obtained this apartment through one LARRY GOLDMAN, a friend.

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GOLDMAN allegedly resided in the apartment building with a woman believed to be his wife, who is a teacher at the Stewart Park High School in Manhattan. They both believed that LARRY GOLDMAN and HARRY SHAICH have been or are now members of the Communist Party. This belief is based on conversations with them and neighborhood gossip which was filtered back to them. SHAICH was described as follows:

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On June 15, 1951, Mr. JONAS and Mr. SZIMMERMAN were reinterviewed by the writer. Mr. SZIMMERMAN stated that HARRY SHAICH on approximately June 1, 1951 advised him that he desired to sublease his apartment to someone else. SHAICH was advised that this procedure was not desirable; however, Mr. JONAS stated that information had come to his attention that SHAICH evidently has moved from his apartment and that another man is residing there now. He also advised that FINESTONE evidently left the apartment somewhere in the neighborhood of the 1st of June, 1951 and has not been seen since.

On June 20, 1951, it was noted on the door leading to the SHAICH-FINESTONE apartment that the names N. EAGLE and H. SHAICH appears.

On April 5, 1950, Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability, advised that the name of HARRY SHAICH, 104 West 64th Street, New York City, appeared on a mailing list card of the Workers' Book Shop, 50 East 13th Street, New York 3, New York. This card indicated that HARRY SHAICH desired the Workers' Book Shop to send him their catalog regularly as well as to add his name to their mailing list.

Mr. SZIMMERMAN advised on May 17, 1951 that HARRY SHAICH, who resided at 173 West End Avenue, New York City, had formerly resided on West 64th Street.

Confidential Informant T-16, of known reliability, has advised that the Workers' Book Shop is located in the building owned by the Communist Party, USA, at 50 East 13th Street and is the official book store for the Communist Party, USA.

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Confidential Informant T-17, of known reliability, has advised that LAWRENCE GOLDMAN, who resided at 173 West End Avenue, New York City, with NEWTON PACHT, is a member of the Randolph Bourne Club of the Communist Party, consisting wholly of undergraduate and graduate students of Columbia University, New York City.

The records of the Registrar's Office reflect that GOLDMAN was born on March 21, 1915 in Palestine, is white, 5' 11" tall, 165 lbs., brown hair, short and curly, wears glasses, has a somewhat acne complexion and as of 1949 was a graduate student at Columbia University and a part time instructor at Hunter College, New York City.

2. Information Furnished By Confidential Informant T-25

On June 20, 1951, Confidential Informant T-25, of known reliability, advised that MAX FINESTONE notified the Ansonia Station, United States Post Office, 203 West 69th Street, New York 23, New York, that his mail should be delivered in care of LEARY, 546 West Broadway, New York 12, New York.

On June 20, 1951, Mr. JOHN A. LEARY and his mother, Mrs. DOLORES DELEIN, ground floor left apartment, 546 West Broadway, New York 12, New York, were interviewed by the writer in an attempt to locate MAX FINESTONE. Mr. LEARY stated that MAX FINESTONE had contacted him by telephone approximately one week prior from "ART'S" residence located at 500 Grand Street, New York City. FINESTONE advised him

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that he was going to the Willard Parker Hospital to recuperate from a case of measles. LEARY stated that he had telephoned the Willard Parker Hospital after a Deputy United States Marshal had attempted to serve a subpoena for FINESTONE approximately four or five days ago. LEARY stated that he had been advised that FINESTONE had been discharged from the hospital.

Mr. LEARY explained that he had known FINESTONE when they were both in the Maritime Service and that recently they had by chance met one another, at which time LEARY stated that he discussed with FINESTONE the possibility of the two of them forming an import business. LEARY stated that he had business connections in Japan and he desired to open an import merchandising business in New York City and needed someone to take care of the New York end of the business. He stated that FINESTONE had impressed him with numerous business contacts in the New York City area and therefore he had tentatively decided to go into business with FINESTONE.

LEARY also advised that FINESTONE had told him that he was forced to move from HARRY SHAICH'S apartment located at 173 West End Avenue due to the fact that SHAICH allegedly was married on or about June 1, 1951, and that he (FINESTONE) would not be able to obtain a permanent apartment until July 1, 1951. FINESTONE requested LEARY to keep his mail and from time to time he would pick it up. He also advised that originally FINESTONE had planned to reside with him at 546 West End Avenue; however, their plans were not consummated inasmuch as LEARY'S mother, Mrs. DOLORES DE LEIN, who is a nurse, had returned home and needed the bedroom accommodations which FINESTONE would have used. LEARY stated that he did not know the full name of "ART". He stated that FINESTONE told him in a

- FINESTONE

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telephone-conversation, mentioned previously, that his call was being made from "ART'S", who resided at 500 Grand Street, New York City. It is noted that FINESTONE was referring to ARTHUR CARL DOUDIN, who resides at Apartment 12-C, 500 A Grand Street, New York City.

LEARY further advised that FINESTONE had spoke of a friend of his by the name of BETTY _____.

Mrs. DA LEIN advised the writer substantially the same concerning her unexpected return home and therefore there was not sufficient bedroom accommodations for FINESTONE to reside at their residence. She recalled FINESTONE'S having telephonically contacting her son allegedly from his friend "ART'S".

Both Mr. LEARY and his mother assured the writer that in the event FINESTONE contacted them, they would immediately advise the writer pertaining to the same.

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E. C/O MR. AND MRS. ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN
APARTMENT 12 C, 500A Grand Street
NEW YORK CITY

Confidential Informant T-18, of known reliability, advised on June 20, 1951, that ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, who resides at Apartment 12C, 500A Grand Street, New York City, Telephone OR 4-0802, is an old friend of MAXWELL FINESTONE. The informant stated that BOUDIN disclosed that MAXWELL FINESTONE resided in his apartment from approximately June 1, 1951 until approximately June 11, 1951, at which time he developed the measles and was taken to the Willard Parker Hospital in New York City. The informant further advised that BOUDIN indicated that FINESTONE had been released from the Hospital, however, BOUDIN did not know as of June 20, 1951, the current whereabouts of FINESTONE.

On June 21, 1951, Mrs. MURIEL BOUDIN, wife of ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, advised the writer that FINESTONE had resided in their apartment for approximately ten days during the earlier part of June, had developed the measles, and had gone to the Willard Parker Hospital, where he remained for several days. She stated that they had taken FINESTONE'S clothing to him at the Hospital on approximately June 15, 1951, and that thereafter he had gone out of town, possibly to his mother's and step-father's residence in Ithaca, New York.

Confidential Informant T-24, of known reliability, advised on August 8, 1944, that ART BOUDIN, Nine Jay Street (14), Telephone Watkins 9-8782, economist - UOPWA - 16, age 23, is a member of the Greenwich Village Club First and Second Assembly Districts School, CPA, Manhattan, New York. His membership card was 5438. The informant advised that he had registered with the CPA from the First Election District.

It should be noted that ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN formerly resided at Nine Jay Street, Greenwich Village, New York City, in 1944.

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The Communist Political Association has been declared within the purview of Executive Order 9835 by the Attorney General.

F. WILLARD PARKER HOSPITAL
FOOT OF EAST 15th STREET
NEW YORK CITY

During the evening of June 20, 1951, inquiry was made at the Willard Parker Hospital for FINESTONE by the writer. It was ascertained that FINESTONE was discharged on June 15, 1951.

On June 21, 1951, SA JOHN L. FAGAN further reviewed the records of the Willard Parker Hospital which were unavailable to the writer during the evening of June 20, 1951, and the following information pertaining to him was developed:

Miss KATHLEEN PETERS, Secretary to the Medical Superintendent of the Willard Parker Hospital, advised that MAX FINESTONE, age 28, born July 28, 1922, U. S., who gave as his current residence 500A Grand Street, New York City, was admitted to this Hospital on June 11, 1951. She stated that he gave as an alternate home address 1476 West Terrace Circle. FINESTONE was picked up by an ambulance at Apartment 12C, 500A Grand Street, where he was residing with a family by the name of BOUDIN. His ailment was diagnosed as German Measles.

Miss PETERS further advised that FINESTONE gave ARTHUR BOUDIN, 500A Grand Street, as his closest friend; that his occupation was market research, and that he had a relative by the name of GEORGE FINESTONE who resided at 1476 West Terrace Circle, West Englewood, New Jersey. FINESTONE indicated that his father's name was SAMUEL and was born in Russia, and that his mother's maiden name was ANNA SANDERS and she was also born in Russia.

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Miss PETERS stated that FINESTONE was discharged on June 15, 1951, and that their visitors records indicate that no one visited him during his stay at the hospital.

Miss PETERS advised that on June 14, 1951, FINESTONE called OR 4-0802, which is currently listed to ARTHUR C. BOUDIN, 500A Grand Street, New York City. FINESTONE told someone answering this telephone to bring his clothes as he was ready to be discharged from the Hospital.

On June 21, 1951, SA FAGAN reviewed the records of the Department of Hospitals, 125 Worth Street, New York City, pertaining to FINESTONE'S being hospitalized. Their records indicated that prior to FINESTONE'S being dismissed from the Willard Parker Hospital that he was interviewed by one of their investigators pertaining to his background. FINESTONE advised that he had resided in care of BOUDIN, 500 Grand Street, New York City, from June 1, 1951 to June 11, 1951. He indicated that prior to this he had resided at 173 West End Avenue, from early 1951 until June, 1951; that he resided in care of RFD Number 4, Ithaca, New York, from 1946 until April, 1951. FINESTONE also indicated that from December, 1949 until December, 1950, he had resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City.

FINESTONE further advised that he had always lived in New York State and had been in New York City since April, 1951. He indicated that his father, whose name was SAMUEL, is deceased, and that his mother's name is ANNA S. CHAFFIN, and currently resides with his step-father, HUGH CHAFFIN, RFD Number 4, Ithaca, New York. FINESTONE listed his occupation as market researcher and stated that he had worked for AMOS PARRISH, 500 Fifth Avenue, New York City for two weeks. He listed prior employment as with Andrew's Survey, 415 West 118th Street, New York City, from April to May, 1951.

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This record reflected that FINESTONE was without any income, savings, property, insurance benefits, and refused to pay for his being hospitalized at the Willard-Parker-Hospital as described above. The records further reflect that FINESTONE could not give the names of employers and stated that he had worked only a few weeks in each place since 1949. When asked if he could pay his hospital bill he replied, "Why should I?"

G. C/O DANIEL AND RANDY MARIEN
APARTMENT 6C
209 CLINTON STREET
NEW YORK CITY

On July 6, 1951, Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. FOLEY, Southern District of New York, advised the writer that FINESTONE informed him that date by telephone that he is currently residing at 209 Clinton Street, New York City, with an un-named friend. FINESTONE stated that he was not currently employed.

Current Manhattan Address Telephone Directory indicates that one DANIEL MARIEN resides at 209 Clinton Street and has telephone number OR 7-6809. This number first appeared in a 1951 Directory.

It is recalled that GARY PICKARD has advised that one DAVID MARIEN, who he believes to be a former student at Cornell University, had resided with FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN at 418 East Ninth Street sometime in 1950.

The records of the Board of Elections for New York City have reflected that the signature of one DANIEL MARIEN, 1916 Grand Concourse, Bronx, New York, appeared on a Communist Party Independent Nominating Petition, State of New York, dated August, 1946. It is not known whether DANIEL MARIEN who allegedly resided at 1916 Grand Concourse, Bronx, New York, in 1946 is identical with the DANIEL MARIEN who now resides at 209 Clinton Street, New York City.

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Mr. JACOB TICBACHTING, Rental Agent for 209 Clinton Street, New York City, and who currently resides at 2995 West 29th Street, Brooklyn, New York, telephone number ES-3-6530, advised the writer on July 21, 1951, that he is not personally acquainted with the tenants who reside in Apartment 6C, namely FINESTONE, DANIEL and RANDY MARIEN. Mr. TICBACHTING indicated that he would attempt to collect the rent for Apartment 6C on the following Monday and he would thereafter telephonically contact the writer and advise him as to what he had learned pertaining to the 6C Apartment.

He pointed out that there were four apartments on the sixth floor of this building, however, he did not know the names of any of the tenants who lived on that floor.

On July 23, 1951, Mr. MAX BLEHER, JR., an attorney with offices at 1501 Broadway, New York City, telephonically advised the writer that he was the attorney for the 209 Clinton Street apartment building. He stated that Mr. TICBACHTING desired that he communicate with the writer that date and advised that Mr. TICBACHTING had attempted to collect the rent at Apartment 6C. Mr. BLEHER said that Mr. TICBACHTING informed him that there was no one home at that address. He also stated that a tenant by the name of MARIEN resided in Apartment 6C for approximately three months.

The informant stated that the telegram sent on August 1, 1950, was to MORRIS EASON, 332 Convent Avenue, Two Bells, New York. Informant stated that the message is as follows: "WE NEED NAME OF YOUR LAWYER LAST YEAR. PLEASE CALL IKE, CHELSEA 3-0116. JIM" A

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Inasmuch as it appears that this message was sent by JAMES WEINSTEIN, no further investigation is being conducted to identify MORRIS EASON.

Confidential Informant T-23 advised on October 10, 1950, that the telegram charged to GR 5-2146 on May 28, 1950, to Ithaca, and the telegram sent on July 26, 1950, to Jackson, could not be located.

Confidential Informant T-23 advised on July 19, 1951, that the telegram sent from GR 5-2146 on January 21, 1951, was to JAMES HUTCHINS, Six Hall Street, Brooklyn. This telegram stated, "PLEASE NOTIFY BELL BAILYN SON AS TO YES OR NO. URGENTLY SAY YES. LET HER KNOW WHEN AND WHERE WE CAN MEET MONDAY OR TUESDAY NIGHT. CULTURAL COMMITTEE, U.E., JAMES WEINSTEIN."

The informant further advised that the telegram dated March 27, 1951, was to President HARRY TRUMAN, White House, Washington, D. C. This telegram said, "URGE YOU FREE WILLIE MC GEE. SHOCKING EXAMPLE OF AMERICAN JUSTICE. HARRY SHLICH."

XII. INTERVIEWS WITH MISS FRANA KLEIN

On May 29, 1951, Miss FRANA KLEIN, who is currently employed as secretary to Mr. LOU FRANKEL, Manager, Radio Station WFDR, 1710 Broadway, telephone number JU 2-1190, New York City, and who resides at Seven East 85th Street, New York City, telephone number PL 9-3467, was interviewed by the writer. Miss KLEIN advised that she had dated GARY PICKARD during a period in 1950, having been introduced to him by Mr. LOU FRANKEL. She stated that PICKARD resided, during the time of their friendship, at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City, with two former Cornell students by the names of GATTY and LYLE. Miss KLEIN furnished what she believed to be the full and accurate address of these individuals as follows:

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Miss KLEIN further advised that LYLE, as of that date, was enroute to Los Angeles, California, where his father allegedly resides in Temple City. .

Miss KLEIN advised that she had met MAX FINESTONE through GARY PICKARD and that on possibly two occasions she had lunch with FINESTONE. She stated that she immediately had a personality clash over their political differences and explained that FINESTONE was very pro-Communist in his beliefs and that she is extremely anti-Communist.

On June 1, 1951, Miss KLEIN was shown photographs of MAX FINESTONE, which she readily identified.

Miss KLEIN recalls that MAX FINESTONE had introduced her to a girl friend of his whose name she does not recall. However, she furnished the following description: white, approximately 5' 6" tall, chestnut brown or dirty blond hair, light complexion, approximately 28 years of age, well built - stocky. She stated she believes that she met this girl at PICKARD'S 700 Greenwich Avenue Apartment during the Summer of 1950.

GARY PICKARD was questioned while he was in New York City pertaining to the identity of this girl. He stated that she was probably identical with Miss BETTY BUEHLER, who currently resides at 178 East 71st Street, New York City.

On June 6, 1951, Miss KLEIN telephonically advised the writer that she had received a letter from HAROLD GATTY and that he was still in Company B, Class Number 36, AOC Division, at Fort Riley, Kansas.

She stated she recalls the incident at the 780 Greenwich Avenue apartment at which MAX FINESTONE, GATTY, LYLE, PICKARD, and possibly others, and herself were present. She stated that it was during the time

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that Senator McCARTHY was making the accusations against the State Department. She states that they were listening to a news broadcast which furnished information pertaining to the McCARTHY incident. She recalls that MAX FINESTONE stated to GARY PICKARD that there was something in his background which would not allow him to take a Government job. She stated that FINESTONE did not elaborate further pertaining to his statement.

XIII. INTERVIEW WITH MRS. RICHARD WENDT

On May 29, 1951, Mrs. RICHARD WENDT, of Bedford Hills, New York, was interviewed at her residence by SA EDWARD J. CAHILL and the writer. During the early stage of this interview her husband, RICHARD WENDT, a graduate of Princeton University and currently President of the Morritt Printing Company of Mt. Kisco, New York, was present.

Mrs. RICHARD WENDT stated that she was the former wife of GARY PICKARD and that her maiden name was Miss ANN SHELDON FARLEY.

Mrs. WENDT recalls that in October, 1949, subsequent to her separation from GARY PICKARD, she talked to PICKARD concerning his moving into New York City from his parent's home in Pleasantville, New York. PICKARD stated that he was going to go to night school and would be working for the Psychological Corporation. He mentioned that he would possibly move into an apartment in the Greenwich Village area of New York City with MAX FINESTONE, whom she had met in Ithaca, New York, in approximately 1946. She related that at one time she and her former husband had lived next door to MAX FINESTONE'S parents and that often FINESTONE would ride to school with her husband.

Concerning PICKARD'S residence with FINESTONE in the Greenwich Village area in New York City, she stated that it was her belief that this was to be on a

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gratis basis. She recalls that in November, 1949, GARY PICKARD borrowed her automobile to move his personal effects from Pleasantville, New York, to New York City.

She recalls that possibly the next time she saw GARY PICKARD was on or about Christmas Day, 1949, at which time he brought a Christmas gift for their daughter DEBORAH. She recalls that at that time her husband informed her that he had a Christmas job with one of the New York department stores selling clothing in the Men's Department. He was also doing survey work by telephone for the Psychological Corporation, or some similar research organization. PICKARD told her that he had come from New York and was spending a day or so with his family.

Mrs. WENDT advised that possibly on Christmas Day, 1949, or on some other occasion, GARY PICKARD, in conversation, advised that "he had heard and gotten interested in a lot of new people and ideas". In commenting on this she stated that it was her recollection that he was speaking about a "liberal" element and political philosophy that he was being exposed to through his contact with MAX FINESTONE.

She advised that she does not specifically recall having ever been furnished the 65 Morton Street address or the 418 East Ninth Street address for her former husband. However, she does believe that he may have mentioned that he lived on Morton Street in the Greenwich Village area of New York City with MAX FINESTONE.

Mrs. WENDT advised that it was her impression that after PICKARD had moved from the Greenwich Village apartment, he stayed for approximately two days with one JOHN MOORE. JOHN MOORE was away at the time and possibly loaned him the use of the apartment. She stated

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that MOORE lived in the neighborhood of Lexington Avenue and 44th Street. According to Mrs. WENDT, MOORE was alleged to have had a maid.

It is to be noted that during the interviews with GARY PICKARD in New York City, he was questioned pertaining to having had use of an apartment of one JOHN MOORE during the interval between his having resided at the Morton Street apartment and the Ninth Street apartment. PICKARD stated that he lived somewhere for approximately two days. However, the name JOHN MOORE is not familiar to him.

Mrs. WENDT further advised that her former husband had been a ski trooper in the United States Army during World War II. He was wounded and is currently receiving disability benefits from the Veterans Administration. She recalls that either during the Fall of 1949 or the Spring of 1950, PICKARD attended the evening school at Columbia University under Public Law 16. She stated that up until the time of their divorce, which became final in October, 1950, she received \$100 monthly support from her husband.

Mrs. WENDT stated that her former husband, GARY PICKARD, had never been, to her knowledge, a member of the Communist Party or any of its front organizations. She states that he had formerly been a member in 1947 of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. In commenting on MAX PINESTONE, she stated that he had indicated to her that he was interested in the American Youth for Democracy in 1946, the Americans for Democratic Action in 1947 and 1948, that possibly he was affiliated with the Young Progressives of America and/or Young Progressives. She definitely recalls that he was a member of the NAACP during the Fall of 1947. At such time she was membership chairman of this group at Cornell University.

It is noted that the American Youth for Democracy has been cited as an organization coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835 by the Attorney General.

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XIV. EXHIBITING OF MAXWELL FINESTONE'S PHOTOGRAPHA. HARRY GOLD

On August 14, 1950, HARRY GOLD was shown photographs of MAXWELL FINESTONE. He was unable to effect an identification.

B. DAVID GREENGLASS

On June 30, 1951, DAVID GREENGLASS was interviewed at the City Prison, New York City, by the writer. Numerous photographs of MAXWELL FINESTONE, some of which were taken as late as June 29, 1951, were exhibited to GREENGLASS. He advised that this man's physical appearance is familiar, however, he could not recall when or where he had seen FINESTONE. GREENGLASS stated definitely that he did not relate this tentative identification as anyone he had seen in relation to JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG. DAVID GREENGLASS recalled that ROSENBERG on several occasions, as late as the Summer of 1949, would remark that a friend or friends would drive him different places for the purpose of making espionage contacts. GREENGLASS was unable to furnish any of the particulars pertaining to these trips.

C. RUTH GREENGLASS

RUTH GREENGLASS, the wife of DAVID GREENGLASS, who is a self confessed former Soviet espionage agent, was interviewed in Room 425, U. S. Court House Building, Foley Square, New York City, by the writer on July 2, 1951. Numerous photographs of FINESTONE were exhibited to Mrs. GREENGLASS, however, she was unable to identify FINESTONE as anyone she knew or had seen.

D. Mrs. TESSIE GREENGLASS

Mrs. TESSIE GREENGLASS, DAVID GREENGLASS' mother, was interviewed in Room 425, U. S. Court House Building, Foley Square, New York City, on July 2, 1951, by the

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writer. Photographs of FINESTONE were exhibited to Mrs. GREENGLASS. She was unable to identify FINESTONE as anyone she know or had ever seen at the apartment of her daughter and son-in-law, ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG, at 10 Monroe Street, New York City.

It is noted that Mrs. TESSIE GREENGLASS has advised that on various occasions through the last eight years she has kept the ROSENBERG children in JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG'S apartment at 10 Monroe Street, New York City, and has had the opportunity to observe anyone who may have come or had gone out with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG.

E. MAX ELITCHER

MAX ELITCHER, who testified in the espionage trial of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBEL as an individual whom JULIUS ROSENBERG attempted to recruit as a Soviet espionage agent from 1944 to 1948, has been shown photographs of MAX FINESTONE by SA JAMES T. O'BRIEN. ELITCHER was unable to identify FINESTONE'S photographs as anyone he had known in the past.

On 6/20/51, Confidential Informant T-1 furnished information by which a most probable identification of MAXWELL FINESTONE as the last man JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his espionage organization. T-1 advised that on the July 4th week-end in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4th week-end, 1948) WILLIAM PERL brought to ROSENBERG'S home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town (Cleveland, Ohio) for an individual with a Leica camera, believed to be the informant to be MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, one together with a fourth man, believed to be ELI STONE, photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption. Informant advised that ROSENBERG considered that a man, believed to be ELI STONE, borrowed a 1949 or 1950 black convertible Buick from a friend, believed to be JAMES PERL - 1, to ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to ALBERT SARGENT and make a "pick-up" of secret material. 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DETAILS: I BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION

A. Probable Identification of Maxwell Finestone
as a Soviet Espionage Agent

1. Information Furnished by Confidential
Informant T-1

On June 20, 1951, Confidential Informant T-1, of unknown reliability, furnished information by which a most probable identification of MAXWELL FINESTONE as identical with the man who will be referred to as "X", was effected. JAMES WEINSTEIN is believed identical with the man who will be referred to as "Y".

The Informant stated that JULIUS ROSENBERG advised that the last man he recruited into his organization, which is interpreted by the Informant to mean recruited into the JULIUS ROSENBERG espionage organization, is a man described as "X" who lives with the son of a wealthy family, described as "Y". "Y" owns a black convertible Buick with a white top, either a 1949 or 1950 model. "Y" studied law, though he does not practice it, and "Y" is a personal friend of O. JOHN ROGGE. "Y" has considerable ideological arguments with his family. "X" borrowed "Y's" car to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York to see ALFRED SARANT and make a "pick-up" of espionage material.

ROSENBERG stated to Informant that he does not know for certain, but considering all the circumstances, he believes that the Russians sent "X" to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN. The Informant said that "X" may be an Abraham Lincoln Brigade Member; that ROSENBERG did not indicate "X's" profession or occupation. However, he did state that "X" lived in New York City.

ROSENBERG advised the Informant that "X" drove him to Ithaca, New York in a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible coupe owned by the individual described as "Y". T-1 stated JULIUS ROSENBERG could not drive a car and thus necessitated the need

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for an individual to drive him to Ithaca.

The Informant stated that ROSENBERG indicated to him that "PUSS", the wife of ALFRED SARANT, and the man referred to as "X", went into another room or another part of the SARANT home while ROSENBERG and SARANT talked. ROSENBERG said that they were at the SARANT residence only a few hours and then he and "X" returned to New York City.

"X", according to information furnished to the Informant by ROSENBERG, "drove like mad -- 60, 65, and 70 miles an hour all the way". ROSENBERG said that it rained all the way back to New York City.

Confidential Informant T-1 was questioned pertaining to the date of this alleged trip to see SARANT at Ithaca, New York by ROSENBERG, and the individual described as "X". The Informant stated that he does not recall ROSENBERG having furnished this date, however, based on information furnished to him by ROSENBERG pertaining to ALFRED SARANT, he believes it was probably subsequent to the completion of SARANT'S home in Ithaca, New York. It was also the observation of the Informant that this trip would have been subsequent to the purchase of the 1949 or 1950 model black convertible Buick.

ALFRED SARANT advised during interviews conducted by agents of the Albany Office (July 19 through 25, 1950) that from July, 1948 until February, 1949, he and his family lived with the WELDON BRUCE DAYTONS, Tayuga Heights Road, RD No. 1, Ithaca, New York. During this period, he stated that he worked on the construction of his house located next door. SARANT advised that from February, 1949 and up until the dates of his interview, he resided in the previously referred to house located on Tayuga Heights Road, Ithaca, New York.

ROSENBERG, according to information furnished by the Informant, in commenting on "X" stated that he believed him to be a very capable individual and showed great promise as a member of his organization. ROSENBERG also referred to him as an intelligent man.

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The Informant stated that ROSENBERG, in commenting on "X's" "great promise", stated that he showed considerable adaptability in performing duties assigned to him in his (ROSENBERG'S) organization.

This Informant further advised that on the 4th of July weekend in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4 weekend, 1948), WILLIAM PERL brought to ROSENBERG'S home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town for an individual with a Leica camera, and together with a fourth man, they photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption.

The Informant stated on July 10, 1951, that the individual who was brought in from out-of-town, according to information he had received from JULIUS ROSENBERG, was a man from Cleveland, Ohio. The Informant stated that considering all the previous information furnished to him by JULIUS ROSENBERG, he believed that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH is identical with the individual who was brought in from Cleveland.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that the fourth man is identical with the man herein described as "X".

The Informant has advised that ALFRED SARANT, WILLIAM PERL, and MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, were also members of his "organization". The Informant has interpreted this to mean that SARANT, PERL, and SIDOROVICH were Soviet espionage agents, and were affiliated with ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage endeavors. JULIUS ROSENBERG was sentenced to death for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States, on April 5, 1951.

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2. ANALYSIS OF IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION

a. "X" Lives With Son of a Wealthy Family

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York have reflected that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, who is the father of JAMES WEINSTEIN, is President of Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 7th Avenue, New York City, a ladies garment manufacturing concern.

b. "Y" Owns a Black Convertible Buick

The records of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Department of Taxation and Finance, State of New York, 80 Center Street, New York City, were reviewed on June 22, 1951. The records reflected that JAMES WEINSTEIN had owned a 1940 and a 1949 Buick convertible coupes.

Re: 1940 Buick Convertible Coupe.

A 1947 Registration Renewal Stub, No. 07590, dated January 16, 1947, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, to BOBBIE K. WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, New York, for a 1940 Buick convertible, weight 3785, 8 cyls., Serial No. 13855147, and Engine No. 54052642.

This automobile (1940 Buick) was transferred from BOBBIE K. WEINSTEIN (Mother) to JAMES WEINSTEIN (son) 211 Central Park West, New York, New York, on January 5, 1948.

A 1948 Passenger Vehicle Registration 04707, dated January 7, 1948, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles to JAMES WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, 24, New York, for this automobile.

A 1949 Passenger Vehicle Registration Renewal Stub, 3886912 (consigned to Tioga Company, New York), dated February 2, 1949, was issued to WEINSTEIN at the above address for this automobile.

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This automobile was transferred to LEONARD BLUM, Engineers Building, Cleveland, Ohio, on May 14, 1949.

Re: 1949 Buick Convertible Coupe

Certificate of Sale No. C411307 reflects that the GLIDDEN Buick Corporation, 1731 Broadway, New York, New York, sold JAMES WEINSTEIN, 211 Central Park West, New York, a 1949 Buick convertible coupe, weight 4000, model 56C, 8 cyls., Serial No. 35160786, Engine No. 53837655, and color grey on May 16, 1949.

A 1949 Passenger Vehicle Registration, No. 13382, dated May 16, 1949, Plate No. C4707, was issued for this 1949 Buick Convertible coupe in WEINSTEIN'S name at the above address. WEINSTEIN'S age is listed as 22.

A 1950 Passenger Vehicle Registration, No. 2G9296, dated January 30, 1950, was issued by the State of New York, Bureau of Motor Vehicles for the above described 1949 Buick Convertible coupe to JAMES WEINSTEIN, 418 East 9th Street, New York 3, New York. WEINSTEIN'S date of birth is reflected as "6/17/26."

It will be noted that a 1951 passenger vehicle registration for the 1949 Buick convertible coupe in WEINSTEIN'S name is not reflected in the records of the Bureau of Motor Registration at New York, New York, nor is there any record of a transfer in ownership.

c. "Y" Studied Law, Though He Does Not Practice It

The records of Columbia University, New York City have reflected that JAMES WEINSTEIN entered Columbia Law School in September, 1949 and attended first year classes, but did not take the final examination in May, 1950. He registered for the second year, but being absent from examinations had given him a mark of failure, which, without other grades under the average rule, disqualified him, and made it necessary for him to petition in order to enter second year classes, which he has not done.

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d. "Y" Personal Friend of O. John Rogge

O. JOHN ROGGE, advised SA JOHN A. HARRINGTON on June 21, 1951, that he is personally acquainted with both JAMES WEINSTEIN and his father, JOSEPH WEINSTEIN. ROGGE stated that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN is a wealthy clothing manufacturer in New York City, and that he has represented him on occasions in the past.

ROGGE advised that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN has told him that his son, JAMES, rebelled against his wishes and had moved out of their apartment (211 Central Park West, New York City) and has taken an apartment on the Lower East Side of New York, (418 East 9th Street). JOSEPH WEINSTEIN related to ROGGE that his son, JAMES, was a stubborn and headstrong boy, who had upset him over his associates whom his father believed to be too "radical".

ROGGE states that he talked to JAMES WEINSTEIN pertaining to this, and other matters, and tried to convince him to continue his law studies and had recommended that he could study with his (ROGGE'S) son, who is also a law student.

e. "Y" Has Considerable Ideological Arguments
With His Family

It is noted that as set out above, O. JOHN ROGGE stated that JOSEPH WEINSTEIN had related to him that his son, JAMES, was a stubborn headstrong boy who had upset him over his associates, whom his father believed to be too "radical".

JOSEPH WEINSTEIN has advised ROGGE that his son, JAMES, had rebelled against his wishes and moved out of their apartment and has taken an apartment on the Lower East Side of New York City.

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f. "X" Borrowed "Y's" Car to Drive Rosenberg
to Ithaca, New York

Although it can not be definitely shown at this time that MAXWELL FINESTONE borrowed JAMES WEINSTEIN'S 1949 Buick convertible, to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, it should be noted that GARY PICKARD, who resided with JAMES WEINSTEIN and MAXWELL FINESTONE at their 418 East 9th Street Apartment, during February, 1950, has advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE borrowed WEINSTEIN'S 1949 Buick convertible to move PICKARD'S clothing from 65 Morton Street, New York City, on or about January 29, 1950 to the East 9th Street apartment. PICKARD has advised that WEINSTEIN would loan FINESTONE his 1949 Buick convertible upon request.

PICKARD also advised that FINESTONE moved into WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, sometime during the month of January, 1950, and lived there during 1950.

g. "X" May Be an Abraham Lincoln Brigade Member

On May 20, 1946, Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that on May 20, 1946 the name of one M. FINESTONE, appeared on page 37 of a souvenir program for the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade - 15th Anniversary of the Spanish Republic under the caption, "Greetings from New Yorkers."

Although it is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE would have been too young to have fought in the Spanish Civil War, inasmuch as he was born in 1922, it would appear that FINESTONE had some connection with the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, based upon the information furnished by Confidential Informant T-2.

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h. Summary

Based on the above information in this section, it is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE is identical with the unknown individual described as "X", and that JAMES WEINSTEIN is identical with the unknown individual described as "Y".

B. Alleged Espionage Activities

1. Photographic

As has been previously set forth, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that on the fourth of July weekend in possibly 1949 (believed to be July 4 weekend, 1948), WILLIAM PERL brought to the ROSENBERG home secret material from Columbia University. ROSENBERG sent out-of-town for an individual with a Leica camera, and together with a fourth man they photographed steadily for 17 hours without interruption.

The Informant stated that on July 10, 1951 that the individual who was brought in from out-of-town, according to information he had received from JULIUS ROSENBERG, was a man from Cleveland, Ohio. The Informant stated that considering all the previous information to him by JULIUS ROSENBERG, he believes that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH is identical with the individual who was brought in from Cleveland.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that the fourth man is identical with the man described as "X". It is believed that MAXWELL FINESTONE is identical with the man described as "X", based on the analysis of identifiable information developed in this report.

The records of the National Advisory Committee on Aviation (NACA) in Washington, D. C., have reflected that WILLIAM PERL signed receipts for 24 classified documents on July 3, 1948. This material was obtained through the Pupin Laboratory, Columbia University, New York City.

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The records of NACA in Cleveland, Ohio, have reflected that WILLIAM PERL was on annual leave from June 26, 1948 through July 9, 1948.

From the review of a 1948 calendar the July 4 weekend would have included Saturday, July 3rd, Sunday July 4th, and Monday, July 5th.

The records of the Tucker Industries, Cleveland, Ohio, have reflected that MICHAEL SIDOROVICH was on annual leave on July 5, 1948 and it is believed that he would have been off on July 3rd and July 4th, 1948, as well, due to the weekend days.

It is noted that JULIUS ROSENBERG, as of July 4, 1948, resided at 10 Monroe Street (Knickerbocker Village) New York City.

Although the whereabouts of MAXWELL FINESTONE for the July 4th, 1948 weekend are not known, it is known that he was still in attendance at Cornell University during this period. Investigation is being directed to ascertain the whereabouts of MAXWELL FINESTONE on the July 4th weekend in question.

2. Rosenberg's Driver

As has been previously reported, Confidential Informant T-1 stated that ROSENBERG confided that "X" borrowed "Y's" 1949 or 1950 black convertible Buick to drive ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a "pick-up" of espionage material.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that JULIUS ROSENBERG can not drive a car and thus necessitated the need for an individual to drive him to Ithaca, New York. The Informant stated that ROSENBERG indicated to him that "RUSS", the wife of ALFRED SARANT, and the man referred to as "X", went into another room or into another part of SARANT'S home

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while ROSENBERG and SARANT talked. ROSENBERG said that they were at the SARANT residence only a few hours and that he and "X" then returned to New York City.

"X", according to information furnished by ROSENBERG to the Informant, "drove like mad -- 60, 65, and 70 miles an hour all the way". ROSENBERG said that it rained all the way back to New York City.

BERNARD GREENGLASS, 65 Cannon Street, New York City, brother of DAVID GREENGLASS and ETHEL GREENGLASS ROSENBERG, advised the writer during interview at the New York City Office on June 23, 1951, that JULIUS ROSENBERG could not drive a car. He had discussed with him his plans to have DAVID GREENGLASS, his brother-in-law, to teach him to drive. ROSENBERG expressed a desire to learn on several occasions.

Photographs of MAXWELL FINESTONE were exhibited to BERNARD GREENGLASS on June 23, 1951 by the writer. He stated that he does not know this individual and in no way does he connect this person with either JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG.

On June 26, 1951, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE formerly of Route No. 4, Ithaca, New York, has a current New York State Operators License, No. 5135816, issued on May 31, 1949, and to expire on September 30, 1951. The Informant stated that on the reverse side of FINESTONE'S operators license his change of address to 418 East 9th Street, New York City, appears.

This operators license reflects that FINESTONE was born on July 28, 1922, is white, male, 160 lbs, 6', brown hair and eyes.

Photographic copies of this original operators license for FINESTONE have been made and are being retained as exhibits in instant investigation.

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3. Probable Identification of MAXWELL FINESTONE as Unknown Man Who Contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

a. Interview with VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and the writer interviewed VIVIAN GLASSMAN at her apartment, 4A, at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of August 3, 1950. She advised that she had formerly been the girl friend of JOEL BARR and that this relationship continued up until the time that he sailed for Europe in January, 1946. She advised that she had been an extremely close friend of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and she is also acquainted with ALFRED SARANT and WILLIAM PERL. She stated that on Friday, July 21, 1950, an unknown man came to her apartment during the evening hours, and having introduced himself as a friend of her former boy friend, JOEL BARR, and having in some way been connected with his leaving the country, he requested that she should go to Cleveland, Ohio, and contact a friend of hers who was an aeronautical engineer. This unknown man further stated that this aeronautical engineer was also a friend of VIVIAN'S sister, ELEANOR GLASSMAN. GLASSMAN stated that this unknown man left her \$2,000 in ten and twenty dollar bills and gave her verbal instructions to contact this aeronautical engineer who she believed to be WILLIAM PERL, and that PERL should go to Mexico. She further advised that she immediately made a reservation on the United Air Lines plane to Cleveland under the assumed name of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG, and flew to Cleveland on Saturday, July 22, 1950.

GLASSMAN stated that she contacted PERL on Sunday, July 23, 1950, at PERL'S residence at Cleveland, at which time PERL refused to accept the money or the instructions. She advised she immediately returned to New York City and that this unknown individual again contacted her on Thursday, July 27, 1950, at her home during the very late evening hours, at which time he wanted to know the results of her contact with the aeronautical engineer in Cleveland. She advised him that PERL refused

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to accept the money or the instructions and had sent her away. She stated that she returned this \$2,000 to this unknown man and that this was the last contact she had with this individual.

GLASSMAN provided the following description of the unknown man:

In subsequent interviews with VIVIAN GLASSMAN she refused to identify the unknown man.

On August 11, 1950, Miss GABRIELLE DENMODY, of the United Air Lines, New York City, advised that a reservation was made with the United Air Lines for a Mrs. S. GOLDBERG on July 22, 1950, for a flight to Cleveland, Ohio. Miss DENMODY advised that the records of United Air Lines reflect that a reservation was made in the name of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG on Flight #643, leaving La Guardia at 1:30 PM, Daylight Saving Time, July 22, 1950,

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arriving in Cleveland, 3:30 PM, Daylight Saving Time. According to Miss DERMODY, this reservation was made by telephone by an individual who refused to give her telephone number or her address. The ticket was picked up at the United Air Lines Terminal at 80 East 42nd Street, New York City. Miss DERMODY further advised that this reservation was made by a United Air Lines employee who was on duty between 12:30 AM and 8:00 AM, on July 22, 1950, but no exact time as to when the reservation was made was available.

On August 5, 1950, the registration of Mrs. S. GOLDBERG, 165 East 33rd Street, New York City, was located at the Hotel Regent, Cleveland, Ohio, for July 22, 1950.

At Cleveland, Ohio, the registration of a Mrs. GOLDBERG on Flight #642, United Air Lines, July 23, 1950, leaving Cleveland at 4:35 PM, Eastern Standard Time, was located. This registration was booked by phone between 1:20 and 1:40 PM, July 23, 1950.

It is noted that WILLIAM PERL has furnished a signed statement to agents of the Cleveland Office which verified VIVIAN GLASSMAN'S contact with him on July 22, 1950, in Cleveland.

b. Information Furnished by Confidential Informant T-1.

As has been previously reported earlier in this report, Confidential Informant T-1 states that JULIUS ROSENBERG has confided that he does not know for certain, but considering all the circumstances, he believes that the Russians sent X to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

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c. FINESTONE'S Contact With VIVIAN GLASSMAN,
Evening April 5, 1951.

On April 5, 1951, VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and SA RICHARD T. HRADESKY leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, during the late evening hours, with an unknown man described as follows:

These two individuals entered an automobile bearing 1951 New York State license plate 6Y89-19. The New York Motor Vehicle Bureau advised that this automobile license is registered to ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN, 500A Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOUDIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950, and who represented JULITH COPLON, Soviet spy, at her trial in New York City in 1950.

ARTHUR BOUDIN'S application for a New York State Operator's License, 1949/52, reflects that he was born on March 21, 1920, is 5'9" in height, has brown hair and green eyes, and is employed at Ted Bates and Company, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City, an advertising firm.

On May 23, 1951, ARTHUR CARL BOUDIN was observed by the writer at Ted Bates and Company, 630 Fifth Avenue, New York City, and it was ascertained that he was not the individual observed with the subject on April 5, 1951.

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A check of the photograph and descriptive data on MAX FINESTONE available in the New York Office was made by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and SA RICHARD T. HRADSKY and FINESTONE was identified as the unknown man observed with VIVIAN GLASSMAN on the night of April 5, 1951.

On May 23, 1951, inquiry of Miss LOIS ANDREWS, owner of Andrews Surveys, 415 West 18th Street, New York City, indicated that MAX FINESTONE was definitely working on April 5, 1951, in connection with his employment with her firm as a market research survey interviewer and that he borrowed an automobile to conduct this work. Miss ANDREWS advised SA ROBERT F. ROYAL that MAX FINESTONE had stated to her that the automobile belonged to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

It should be noted that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were sentenced to death for conspiracy to commit Espionage on April 5, 1951.

C. FINESTONE'S Association with ALFRED and LOUISE SARANT.

1. Interview With ALFRED SARANT

On July 19, 1950, ALFRED SARANT executed a waiver authorizing agents of the Albany Office to search his residence at Ithaca, New York. During this search the agents located a Bates List Finder which contained an entry under the initial "F", which read as follows:

"FINESTONE
ALP - 318 8th Avenue.
CI 6-2086
(crossed out)
210 West 21st Street"
(FINESTONE, Ch 3-2964 was also written in).

ALFRED SARANT commented on this entry by stating that FINESTONE worked for him as a painter in Ithaca, New York, and was a student at Cornell University.

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2. Interviews with LOUISE SARANT

Mrs. LOUISE SARANT, in commenting on the above Bates List Finder entry, stated that this is MAX FINESTONE, a friend of their's who at one time worked for her husband as a painter. She stated she first became acquainted with him while attending high school in Ithaca, New York, and that FINESTONE later attended Cornell University and during the war was employed in the Merchant Marine Service in 1944 and 1945. Mrs. SARANT further advised that FINESTONE had visited the SARANT apartment frequently, at 65 Morton Street, New York City. She said that since his parents reside at Ithaca, New York, he has moved frequently between New York City and Ithaca. She stated she believes he is currently working on a television survey (July, 1950) in New York City. She stated that he also resides in New York City. However, she did not know his current address.

She further advised that FINESTONE was never too well acquainted with her husband and that she does not recall whether he ever met JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, or VIVIAN GLASSMAN in any of his visits to the Morton Street apartment.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, has advised that a telephone call initiated from Murray Hill 3-3623, to the SARANT residence in Ithaca, New York, on December 31, 1949. The informant stated that this telephone number was then connected in the apartment of PETER LONGYEAR, 418 East 9th Street, New York City. Information has been developed which will be set forth in greater detail in a later part of this report which indicates that MAXWELL FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN had use of PETER LONGYEAR'S telephone as early as the beginning of the fourth week in December, 1949.

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Mrs. SARANT has been interviewed pertaining to this telephone call and specifically questioned as to whether FINESTONE could have instructed her or her husband to give up the Morton Street apartment at that time. She stated she does not recall this particular telephone call. She, however, denied that she has ever received any instructions from FINESTONE with regard to the Morton Street apartment. She was questioned again concerning the reason for terminating the lease on the Morton Street apartment (January 23, 1950) and she advised that she still does not recall who instructed them to give the apartment up or their reason for terminating the lease at that particular time.

LOUISE SARANT was subsequently interviewed by agents of the Albany Office concerning both MAXWELL FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN. She advised that JAMES WEINSTEIN is unknown to her and that to her knowledge he was not a friend of MAXWELL FINESTONE when she knew him in New York City. She further advised with regard to FINESTONE that he never resided in the apartment #65 Morton Street. She added that he never paid rent on this apartment and that he never had use of the apartment.

Mrs. SARANT advised that she never visited this apartment after vacating same on September 13, 1946.

Mrs. SARANT again stated that she has no knowledge of its being used for Russian espionage activity, that she has no knowledge of its use between 1946 and 1950, other than a place of residence for JOEL BARR and WILLIAM FERL, and that she does not recall who instructed her or her husband when to give up the apartment.

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With reference to the utility payments she advised that she and her husband only paid the monthly rent (September, 1946 to February, 1950) and that all other payments must have been made by the occupants of the apartment.

3. Employment For ALFRED SARANT.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that MAXWELL FINESTONE was employed by ALFRED SARANT in 1949 or 1950 as a painter and that he had an address of 418 East 9th Street, New York City, in 1950.

D. FINESTONE'S Use of SARANT'S Apartment, 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City.

1. Chronology of Users

a. Records, 65 Morton Street Realty Company.

The records of the 65 Morton Street Realty Company, 310 East 55th Street, New York City, reflect that ALFRED SARANT rented apartment 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 until February, 1950.

Among the correspondence located in the file pertaining to apartment 61, at the 65 Morton Street Realty Company was a letter dated January 23, 1950, which is being quoted:

"Mr. ROBERT GARLOCK
65 Morton Street Realty Company
310 East 55th Street
New York, New York

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"Dear Sir:

"Having decided to make permanent residence in Ithaca, I wish to give you occupancy of apartment 6I at 65 Morton Street, effective as of your receipt of this letter.

"I am enclosing a check for \$45.50 covering rent for the month of January. My belongings have been removed from the apartment so it is available now for a succeeding tenant.

"Yours truly,

s/ "ALFRED SARANT"

According to the records of the 65 Morton Street Realty Company, this \$45.50 check mentioned in the above quoted letter was received on January 27, 1950.

b. Interview of ALFRED SARANT Pertaining to the Apartment.

ALFRED SARANT furnished the following information concerning the apartment, 6I, 65 Morton Street, New York City:

SARANT advised that in about August, 1943, he was transferred to New York City from Bayonne, New Jersey, by Western Electric Company, and that he went to New York City in the evenings to look for an apartment. He finally located Apartment 6I at 65 Morton Street, New York City. He said that he moved there about October, 1943. He said that no one helped him locate the apartment.

During the course of the search of SARANT'S home on the evening of July 19, 1950 and morning of July 20, 1950, on Cayuga Heights Road, Ithaca, New York, by authority of a waiver of search signed by SARANT on

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July 19, 1950, a lease was located by SA JOHN D. MAHONEY between SARANT and the 65 Morton Street Realty Corporation, which agreement was made on September 19, 1943. This agreement was for the rental of apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, for a period of twelve months at an annual rental of \$540 to become effective October 1, 1943, and to end on September 30, 1944.

SARANT advised that the rental for the apartment included water and heat, but he had to pay for gas, lights and telephone. He also said that he had an A.C. current run into his apartment so that he could use his record player and occasionally use his electric shaver. He had this from about the time he moved into this apartment at a monthly charge of fifty cents.

SARANT advised that he lived in the apartment at 65 Morton Street alone until he was married on July 6, 1945 to LOUISE JACQUELINE ROSS, whose nickname is PUSYCAT or PUSS.

SARANT stated that in the summer of 1946 he decided that he wanted to go back to school to get a master's degree and he came to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946, to try and enroll at Cornell University. At the time he decided to leave, JOEL BARR told him that he would take over his (SARANT'S) apartment for himself and he intimated that he might turn it over to WILLIAM PERL who was studying in New York. At that time apartments were scarce in New York City, and because of this fact, BARR wanted the apartment.

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SARANT stated BARR, or whoever stayed at the apartment would send the money to him and he would send a check to 65 Morton Street Realty Corporation. He said that he told the manager of the apartment that he was not giving up the apartment because he didn't know for sure whether he would be coming back to New York or not. SARANT stated that the manager was trying to oust him from the apartment and to insure that BARR got the apartment he left a small amount of furniture in it. He claimed he did not remember what furniture he left there, and said that he was not paid for the furniture.

During this interview SARANT said that he kept the apartment until about 1948, and paid the rent by check. He advised that he received money orders from BARR for the rent and after BARR left, the date of which he could not remember, PERL lived in the apartment and sent him money orders, some of which came from Cincinnati or Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL was working.

SARANT thought that when PERL moved out, he had received a note from PERL stating that SARANT should give up the apartment as he didn't need it any longer. At the time of the interview SARANT stated that he believed he still had the note from PERL at his home. He thought that it had been a year or more ago that he heard from PERL concerning the apartment.

ALFRED SARANT was interviewed at the New York Office during the evening of July 28, 1950, by SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer, and he advised that when he left the 65 Morton Street apartment approximately September, 1946, he turned it over to JOEL BARR and he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN, BARR's girl friend had sent the first few rental payments to him in the form of money orders and that he in turn, would pay the rental agency for the apartment by check.

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SARANT stated that WILLIAM PERL and HENRIETTA SAVIDGE (now Mrs. WILLIAM PERL) had used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR and that they too had sent money orders to him for payment of the apartment. He stated that he believes either BARR or PERL made a \$270 lump sum payment toward the rental of this apartment which would have been for a six months rental.

SARANT reiterated that he does not know of anyone else who used the apartment and he believes that WILLIAM PERL, in sending the last money order for the rental of the apartment in January, 1950, attached a note to the money order requesting that SARANT relinquish the apartment as he no longer had any need for the apartment.

SARANT stated that he believes that he visited the apartment while PERL was residing there in 1947 and possibly that he visited JOEL BARR in 1948 at the apartment.

c. Probable use of the apartment by FINESTONE, Christmas, 1948 and February, 1949.

(1) Toll Calls

Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised July 25, 1950, that two telephone calls were made from ALFRED SARANT'S telephone at 65 Morton Street, New York City, telephone Watkins 4-1927 to YONkers 3-3862 on December 24, 1948 and February 4, 1949. This informant has advised that YONkers 3-3862 was currently listed to HERBERT M. COLE, 122 Caryl Avenue, Yonkers, New York.

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The "Herald-Statesman", a Yonkers daily newspaper, in its April 4, 1949 issue announced the marriage of Miss BARBARA A. COLE to BARRY FEIDEN. The article stated that both BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN were graduates of the New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University.

The current Queens telephone directory reflects a listing for BARRY FEIDEN at 143-15 38th Avenue, Flushing, telephone INdependence 3-3697.

(2) Interviews of BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN

On August 23, 1950, SA HERMAN C. LITTLEJOHN and the writer interviewed BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN at their residence at 143-15 38th Avenue, Flushing, Long Island, New York. They advised that BARBARA had graduated from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, in February, 1948 and that BARRY graduated from Cornell in February, 1949. Both had attended the New York School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell. They stated that they had both been at the home of BARBARA'S parents, Mr. and Mrs. HERBERT M. COLE, Caryl Avenue, Yonkers, New York, and the home of BARRY'S parents at Newburgh, New York, during the Christmas vacation of 1948. BARRY said that in February, 1949, he had travelled from Ithaca, on approximately February 1, 1949, to his parent's home in Newburgh, New York, and from there, after a day or so, travelled to BARBARA'S home in Yonkers, New York.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN stated that they had friends named MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN who shared an apartment at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. They stated that they had known FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN at Cornell for approximately two years as they had both attended classes with him and that WEINSTEIN had been a roommate of BARRY FEIDEN during BARRY'S last six months at Cornell.

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At this point, BARRY FEIDEN advised the interviewing agents that he had just recalled that at one time, date unknown, possibly during the Christmas vacation of 1948 or during the mid-semester vacation in February, 1949 or at approximately the time of MAX FINESTONE'S graduation in June, 1949 (September 20, 1949), MAX FINESTONE had been in New York City, at which time he told BARRY FEIDEN that he, MAX, had the use of an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York. BARRY stated that he recalled from this conversation with MAX FINESTONE that this apartment was seldom used and he said he somehow gathered the impression that it was a "woman's" apartment.

BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN were then questioned concerning MAXWELL FINESTONE'S travel to New York. They advised that they believed he had been in New York City during the latter part of the Christmas vacation, 1948; during the mid-semester vacation in February, 1949; and they both recalled that MAX had gone to New York job hunting after his graduation in June, 1949.

BARRY and BARBARA stated that all of their friends, they believed, have BARBARA'S Yonkers address and telephone number, including MAX FINESTONE, and they believed that MAX would probably have called either BARBARA or BARRY at BARBARA'S home when he was in New York.

BARRY and BARBARA stated that they had visited FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street between February and June, 1950. They said they had been there on one occasion at a party and on another occasion after a theater party. The FEIDENS stated that they believed that the furniture now in the apartment occupied by FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN had been supplied mainly by WEINSTEIN. They stated that they

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believed that FINESTONE had brought a dresser from Ithaca and said that he had told them that his mother had decorated the apartment with such things as draperies. They said that MAX had use of his father's truck on several occasions, which they described as a one-half to three-quarter ton buff colored Studebaker truck, model unknown. The FEIDENS advised that they had noticed that there were two telephones in FINESTONE'S and WEINSTEIN'S apartment at 418 East 9th Street, one being in the living room and one in the bathroom, and they thought that one of these phones had been left in by a previous tenant and would be disconnected and taken out.

The FEIDENS also advised that MAX FINESTONE had been employed only part time while in New York and that he seemed to accept employment only sufficient for him to "get along." They stated that he has been working on "public opinion surveys" and had helped conduct one survey concerning television programs. They said that he told them he only accepted such employment until he obtains another job and that he was qualified for personnel work. They stated that in their opinion FINESTONE has personality defects and presents a poor appearance. They said that they could not picture FINESTONE as "dressing up" or putting on a clean shirt in order to hold a job.

Mr. and Mrs. FEIDEN were shown photographs of ALFRED SARANT and his wife, LOUISE SARANT. They advised that they did not recognize the photograph of LOUISE or ALFRED SARANT; however, the photograph of ALFRED SARANT somehow looked familiar to them. They were given SARANT'S name and questioned concerning their knowledge of MAX FINESTONE'S employment at Ithaca, New York. BARRY FEIDEN advised that he did not recognize the name SARANT although it also sounded familiar to him. He said

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that he knew that MAX FINESTONE was employed by some contractor as a painter at one time during his attendance at Cornell University but said he did not know the identity of this contractor.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN identified photographs of MAX FINESTONE, which were displayed to them, as identical with their friend MAX FINESTONE who resides at 418 East 9th Street, New York City.

Both BARRY and BARBARA FEIDEN denied any knowledge of any espionage activities on their part or on the part of any of their associates or contacts.

BARRY FEIDEN advised that he was currently employed at Peter F. Mallon, Incorporated, a printing plant located at Court Square, Long Island City, New York. BARBARA advised that she was employed as an employment interviewer at the New York State Employment Service, 225 West 34th Street, New York City.

It is to be noted in connection with the two toll calls made from ALFRED SARANT'S apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in December, 1948, and February, 1949, to the home of HERBERT H. COLE at Yonkers, New York, that MAX FINESTONE was probably in New York on the dates the calls were made according to information furnished by BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN.

BARBARA and BARRY FEIDEN advised that they had friends named RUBIN DIAMOND, aka, "RUBY" and wife, MARION, who are now residing at 370 West 58th Street, New York City. They stated that RUBY DIAMOND was a classmate at Cornell University and also was a friend of MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN.

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They also advised that they know a GLADYS GLASSMAN who had dated a student named DAVE GELBIN or GELHEN at Cornell University. They stated that they recalled that GLADYS GLASSMAN worked for the United Office and Public Workers of America. They said that they did not know a VIVIAN GLASSMAN and had no knowledge as to whether or not GLADYS GLASSMAN was related to her.

In connection with MAX FINESTONE and JAMES WEINSTEIN, the FEIDENS stated that JIMMY had dropped out of Columbia University where he had been studying law and that they had gotten the impression that there was a personality clash between FINESTONE and WEINSTEIN.

The files of the New York Office contained no information which could be identified with BARBARA COLE.

Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised in approximately December, 1947, that one BARBARA COLE had been elected recording secretary of the Young Progressive Citizens of America chapter at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and that another one of the officers was named RUBIN DIAMOND. Confidential Informant T-6 said that the Young Progressive Citizens of America group was organized at Cornell University in March, 1947 and by May, 1947 had acquired a membership of about 75 students. The informant said that it was his personal belief that several members of this group were also members of the American Youth for Democracy, Marxist discussion group, and other leftist or ultra-liberal student groups. Confidential Informant T-6 stated that in the spring of 1947 the principal activity of the Young Progressive Citizens of America had been to oppose President TRUMAN'S proposed aid to Greece, and to oppose the President's Executive Order calling for the loyalty check on Federal employees.

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Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised on March 15, 1948 that the Communist Party was instructing their youth groups to join the Young Progressive Citizens of America, and then attempt to take over leadership of this organization.

The American Youth for Democracy was cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944, and by the Attorney General of the United States as "Communist" under Executive Order 9835.

d. Interviews of GARY PICKARD

(1) Location of GARY PICKARD

The records of the Psychological Corporation of New York City have reflected that MAXWELL FINESTONE, in applying for employment on November 30, 1949, indicated that he was then residing in Apartment 61, 65 Morton Street, New York City, and could be reached in care of TR 7-2563.

Confidential Informant T-4, mentioned previously, advised on May 18, 1951, that BARRIE REIL of 5 Riverside Drive, New York City, is the subscriber to TR 7-2563.

The current Manhattan address telephone directory indicates that this listing first appeared in the December, 1949 directory.

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any record of BARRIE REIL.

Mr. HARRY ROONEY, Doorman, 5 Riverside Drive, New York City, advised the writer on May 18, 1951, that

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a Miss BARRIE REID formerly resided in Apartment 2E. He stated that three young ladies currently reside in this apartment namely:

1. Miss (CAROL ELIZABETH) RITTER
2. Miss MARLOW (ph.) MITCHELL
3. CHRISTINE DUNLAP

The indices of the New York Office failed to reflect any record for these three women.

Miss CAROL ELIZABETH RITTER, who is also known as BETTY RITTER, advised SA RICHARD T. HRATSKY on May 19, 1951, that as of November 30, 1949, Miss JOAN PICKARD resided with Miss MITCHELL and herself in Apartment 2E, 5 Riverside Drive, New York City. She stated that JOAN PICKARD'S brother, GARY PICKARD, prevailed upon his sister, Miss MITCHELL and herself to take incoming calls from MAXWELL FINESTONE and himself in the latter months of 1949 and possibly early 1950.

Miss RITTER indicated that GARY PICKARD was a former student at Cornell University and is a personal friend of MAX FINESTONE; that PICKARD formerly resided at 780 Greenwich Street, Greenwich Village, New York, and she recalls there was some type of business relationship between PICKARD and FINESTONE. Miss RITTER also recalls having received incoming calls for FINESTONE and PICKARD on several occasions and having spoken to FINESTONE on the telephone on several occasions pertaining to these incoming calls. She recalls having spoken to some unknown woman pertaining to these incoming calls for FINESTONE. She was unable to recall any details pertaining to these calls and stated that although she personally knew GARY PICKARD, she had never met MAXWELL FINESTONE. Miss

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RITTER indicated that FINESTONE and PICKARD resided in the Greenwich Village area of New York, possibly together, and that PICKARD was doing some type of "market analyst or research work."

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Miss RITTER indicated that GARY PICKARD had operated a radio station at Cornell and recalled that Miss MITCHELL and herself visited PICKARD in his second Greenwich Village apartment which was located at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City, on one occasion during the period extending from late January 1950 to August or September 1950.

Miss RITTER stated that PICKARD is alleged to be currently operating a radio station in Las Vegas, Nevada, and had something to do with the Flamingo Club there. PICKARD, according to Miss RITTER, left New York City in approximately September 1950 and went to either Reno or Las Vegas, Nevada, for the purpose of obtaining a divorce.

Pertaining to the visit to PICKARD'S apartment at 780 Greenwich Street, Miss RITTER noted that it was sparsely furnished, mostly by purchases from war surplus and discarded furniture from unknown sources. PICKARD resided with two men, namely, J. LYLE, also known as DAVID LYLE and H.L. GATTY.

Miss RITTER described J. LYLE as being male, white, in his 20's, tall, slender, blond hair, graduate of Cornell University, having majored in English and had attended the New School for Social Research in February 1950. LYLE owned a "jeepster".

Miss RITTER described H. L. GATTY as being male, white, in his 20's, tall, dark hair, a graduate of Cornell University, majoring in hotel management, and recalled that GATTY'S father had flown with WILEY POST, a famous aviator.

Miss RITTER described GARY PICKARD as being male, white, in his 20's, 5'8", 150 pounds, long nose, dark blond or light brown hair, attended Cornell University, has a sister named JOAN PICKARD, and his mother's name is HEVA or REBECCA PICKARD, alleged to have an interest in a hardware store in White Plains, New York. Miss RITTER said PICKARD'S occupation is a radio announcer, Las Vegas, Nevada, and he is divorced.

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Miss RITTER advised that GARY PICKARD'S family formerly resided in Pleasantville, New York, and is alleged to now reside in White Plains, New York. JOAN PICKARD married R. T. CRAIG in October 1950 in the New York City area. Her current address is in care of Goodyear Tire Rubber Company, 3rd and Pendergast, Jamestown, New York. Miss RITTER stated that her husband is the Manager of the Goodyear store in Jamestown.

Miss RITTER stated that she last saw GARY PICKARD in October 1950 when he was home for his sister's wedding.

Mr. EDWARD JONES, Superintendent of apartment building located at 780 Greenwich Street, Greenwich Village, New York City, advised SA RICHARD T. TRADSKY and the writer on May 19, 1951 that J. LYLE, E. L. GATTY and G. PICKARD formerly occupied apartment 3B from some time subsequent to February 17, 1950 until August, 1950. He stated that their apartment rented for \$145.00 a month, was sparsely furnished and recalled that J. LYLE had a jeep with Connecticut license plates.

Mr. JONES recalled that house furnishings were moved to this address via LYLE'S jeep by H. L. GATTY. He recalls that GATTY and a young man with a Southern accent moved furniture out of the apartment in August 1950 and that a sofa and a living room chair are currently stored in this building's storage room.

Mrs. REVA PICKARD, who is employed at the PICKARD Hardware Store in White Plains, New York, advised on May 22, 1951, that her son, GARY PICKARD, is currently employed as announcer and program arranger for the Las Vegas Radio Station, Las Vegas, Nevada. Mrs. PICKARD indicated that her son formerly resided at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City, some time subsequent to February 1950 with JOHN DAVIS LYLE and H. L. GATTY or L. H. GATTY. She indicated that from approximately the summer of 1949 until February 1950, her son, GARY, had a permanent residence at their home in Pleasantville, New York.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that on various occasions, her son had spent weekends at MAX PINESTONE'S apartment

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located at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. Mrs. PICKARD indicated that she was not familiar with the location of FINESTONE'S previous apartment at 65 Morton Street, Greenwich Village, New York City. She stated that her son, GARY, had been formerly married to a Miss ANN FARLEY who had resided in Chappaqua and Mount Kisco, New York.

Mrs. PICKARD further indicated that her son's former roommates, LYLE and GATTY, are probably not acquainted with MAX FINESTONE, however, she did indicate that she had met FINESTONE on one occasion and thereafter cautioned her son as to his further association with FINESTONE.

On May 29, 1951, Mrs. PICKARD was reinterviewed by SA EDWARD J. CAHILL and the writer at the Pickard Hardware Store, 145 Post Road, White Plains, New York, telephone number, White Plains 2-5100, where she is employed. Her brother-in-law, VICTOR PICKARD, owns this hardware store.

Mrs. PICKARD advised that soon after her son, GARY, began to attend Columbia University in the fall of 1949 (February 1950), he discontinued hitch-hiking from their Pleasantville, New York residence as had been his custom for a short period, possibly during the month of October 1949, and resided with MAX FINESTONE in an apartment in the Greenwich Village area of New York City on a gratis basis. Concerning this residence, she stated that GARY never furnished the address of the apartment building, however, she did explain that he could be reached through his sister JOAN PICKARD, who then resided at 5 Riverside Drive, New York City.

She stated also that subsequent to GARY'S residence in the Greenwich Village apartment, he stayed for a short time at FINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street, New York City. In approximately the latter part of February 1950, GARY obtained an apartment located at 780 Greenwich Street with two former Cornell students by the name of GATTY and LYLE.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that she gave her son some "odds and ends" to help him furnish his apartment at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City and also recalls having

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given him \$25 to \$30 to buy a bed. She was unable to place the exact time of this purchase, however, she believes that it was prior to his residency at 780 Greenwich Street, New York City.

Mrs. PICKARD recalled that LYLE, GARY, her son, and a young lady, whose last name is DARCEY (Phonetic), visited her in Pleasantville, New York in 1950. They came out in LYLE'S jeep from New York City.

She described Miss (CLARE) DARCEY (Phonetic) as white, 5' 1"-5' 2" tall, slight build, dark complexion, dark hair, in her 20's and employed by some advertising firm in New York City.

Concerning her dislike for MAX FINESTONE, she stated that it was partially based upon information received pertaining to him from her daughter JOAN. She said that her daughter was employed by Lever Brothers Incorporated in New York City in the 1949/1950 period, and at the suggestion of either JOAN or GARY, FINESTONE filled out an application for employment with Lever Brothers Incorporated. JOAN PICKARD was then working in the personnel section and according to Mrs. PICKARD, her daughter personally gave FINESTONE an employment application.

Mrs. PICKARD stated that her daughter had advised her that FINESTONE filled out the application but failed to sign the non-Communist affidavit which was included in this application, or to fill in the section of the application which included questions pertaining to Communist Party membership. FINESTONE refused to sign either the affidavit or the pertinent section, but she did not know which. She related that her daughter JOAN was quite upset over FINESTONE'S reaction and was at a loss to explain why he refused to do this other than the supposition that he was now or had been previously a member of the Communist Party. Mrs. PICKARD stated that her daughter JOAN tore up the employment application in FINESTONE'S presence, inasmuch as he refused to complete this application.

Mrs. PICKARD further advised that her son GARY

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explained FINESTONE'S action as, "A man has a right to his own beliefs".

Mrs. PICKARD also related that during the period which her son GARY was residing at FINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street, New York City, sometime during the early months of 1950, one of his government disability checks was stolen from their mailbox at their apartment building. Mrs. PICKARD stated that her son is a veteran of World War II, having been disabled through his war service and that he receives disability checks each month from the Veterans Administration. She pointed out that his disability checks were forwarded in care of FINESTONE'S apartment on East 9th Street during the period of GARY'S residence there and that a check at the Veterans Administration in New York City would place the exact time during which her son lived in the FINESTONE apartment.

(2) Initial Interviews With GARY PICKARD

GARY PICKARD, currently residing at 711 7th Street and employed at Radio Station KRAI and "Fabulous Las Vegas" weekly magazine, Las Vegas, Nevada, advised he first met MAX FINESTONE while both were students at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, and had frequent contact with him until approximately the summer of 1949. PICKARD and his wife separated at this time and he cannot recall associations with FINESTONE during the summer of 1949.

PICKARD left Cornell University September 1949, and went to New York City seeking employment. He met FINESTONE in New York City in the latter part of October 1949 and, being short on finances, FINESTONE insisted that he reside with him in an apartment located at 65 Morton Street, Greenwich Village, New York City. PICKARD could not recall the exact number of the apartment, but stated it was on the sixth floor. FINESTONE told PICKARD the apartment was actually being rented by friends of his who allowed him to stay there while they were out of the city. The names and whereabouts of these friends are unknown to

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PICKARD. These friends had indicated to FINESTONE that they might not return to the apartment and they had almost completely stripped the apartment of furniture. The only furniture in the apartment was a double bed, day bed, card table, three wooden chairs, and two book cases, all being broken down and almost worthless.

In January 1950, FINESTONE received word through the superintendent of this apartment building that these friends were releasing the apartment, requiring FINESTONE and PICKARD to vacate. At the request of the superintendent and to make way for painters to redecorate this apartment, FINESTONE and PICKARD carried the above described furniture down to the basement of the apartment building. PICKARD maintained no one else was present when the furniture was moved. The exact date of moving the furniture is unknown, but it is believed to have been the middle or latter part of January 1950.

About three weeks after moving from the apartment, PICKARD returned to the apartment building one day in a borrowed jeep with FINESTONE and obtained the day bed from the basement, which PICKARD took to another apartment he had obtained with DAVID LYLE and HAROLD GATTY, both graduates of Cornell University. PICKARD placed this date around the first part of February 1950 and maintained no one else assisted but FINESTONE.

In December 1949, while residing with FINESTONE in the apartment at 65 Morton Street, PICKARD met JAMES WEINSTEIN, a close friend of FINESTONE and a former student of Cornell University. WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, and was attending the School of Law at Columbia University. When moving from 65 Morton Street, FINESTONE moved in permanently with WEINSTEIN and PICKARD moved in temporarily until he could locate something else. A short time later, PICKARD moved into an apartment at 760 Greenwich Street, New York City, with LYLE and GATTY. PICKARD lived at this address until August 1950 when he went to Las Vegas, Nevada, to obtain a divorce, and after obtaining a divorce decided to stay in Las Vegas. Pickard stated he has returned to New York City twice, the last time being in February 1951 and that he has seen FINESTONE both times.

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While residing together in New York City, FINESTONE and PICKARD were employed doing survey work for the American or U. S. Research Bureau, New York City Branch, headquarters in Washington, D.C., and later, doing the same type of work, by the Psychological Corporation, Fifth Avenue, New York City. FINESTONE was last known to be employed in the Survey Branch of a large advertising agency in New York City, exact name and location unknown. FINESTONE'S residence address is unknown to PICKARD, but FINESTONE can possibly be located through WEINSTEIN at 418 East 9th Street, New York City. It is believed that WEINSTEIN is still probably attending Columbia University.

PICKARD stated he became well acquainted with FINESTONE and considers him a close friend, but recalls no particular associates he had in New York City. PICKARD claimed he knew WEINSTEIN only briefly and did not become friendly with him.

PICKARD stated that DAVE LYLE is currently residing in Lexington, Massachusetts, with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. F. K. LINDSAY. HAROLD GATTY is a Private in the United States Army, present station unknown. PICKARD'S former wife, ANN FARLEY, has remarried and is now Mrs. RICHARD WENDE, residing in Bedford Hills, New York.

The Salt Lake City office advised on June 1, 1951, that numerous photographs were exhibited to GARY PICKARD and he could not recall having seen any of the

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individuals whose photographs were exhibited with the exception of MAX FINESTONE. It is noted that among the photographs exhibited to PICKARD were those of WILLIAM PERL and WELDON BRUCE DAYTON.

(3) Interviews with GARY PICKARD at
New York City

On June 1, 1951, Assistant United States Attorney JOHN M. RILEY advised that a Federal Grand Jury subpoena was being issued for the appearance of GARY PICKARD, Southern District of New York, on June 12, 1951.

On June 11, 1951, SA EDWARD J. CANTIN and the writer met GARY PICKARD on his arrival at LaGuardia Field at 7:30 pm.

PICKARD stated that the last time he saw MAX FINESTONE was when he was in New York during FEBRUARY, 1951.

GARY PICKARD stated that he left Ithaca, New York, on or about September 30, 1949, having graduated from Cornell University and resigned from his position with the radio station there and returned to his parents' residence at Pleasantville, New York. He stated that in October 1949, he came to New York City job hunting. He recalled definitely attempting to get a position with the Radio Station WOR in New York City.

PICKARD does not recall how he initially contacted MAX FINESTONE during October 1949, however, he does recall that during the summer of 1949, MAX worked as a painter or contractor and during September or October, FINESTONE came to New York and that the two of them got in touch with one another. PICKARD stated that at that time MAX FINESTONE was residing in Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, and offered the use of this apartment to him on a gratis basis. He recalled having seen the name of SARANT printed on the doorbell. FINESTONE had advised him that a couple had possession of the

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apartment and that they had moved to California. They were retaining the apartment with the idea that they were returning to New York City.

GARY PICKARD recalled that during the Christmas vacation period of 1949, either FINESTONE or himself invited DAVID LYLE, HAROLD GATTY and his brother, RONALD GATTY, Mr. and Mrs. NORMAN POIRIER, of Worcester, Massachusetts, to spend the Christmas holiday period with them at 65 Morton Street, New York City. He stated that all of these individuals were students at Cornell University and had come to New York City to see the "lights" and that staying with them at Morton Street was a convenience extended toward them by FINESTONE and himself. PICKARD explained that it was necessary for them to improvise sleeping facilities by making beds on the floor to handle this overflow group. PICKARD stated that he had a double bed and a daybed in the apartment, which would have slept three or four of the individuals and that the others slept on the floor. He advised that this group came to New York via LYLE'S jeep.

It is noted that Mr. FLOYD ELVYN, JR. advised that during the Christmas period, 1949, he had occasion to be in Apartment 6I and noted seven men present in the apartment and that there were sleeping bags laid out on the living room floor. ELVYN did not recall that there was any woman present in the apartment at that time.

PICKARD stated that this group, previously mentioned, stayed until after New Year's Day, and returned to Cornell; that he was present during most of the Christmas holiday period, however, he took off two days and went to Pleasantville to visit with his family. He believed that possibly upon his return from Pleasantville, in discussing the continuance of his residence at 65 Morton Street with FINESTONE, MAX indicated that possibly the apartment would have to be vacated, however, there was no immediate necessity for them to move to another location.

PICKARD stated that FINESTONE told him that the rent for the apartment was \$45.00 and change, of which FINESTONE has not paid any of this amount. FINESTONE was in contact with the legal tenants of the apartment, according to PICKARD, however, he did not know their method of communication. He stated that FINESTONE was
