

MEMORANDUM For Coordinator of Research

Subject: Visit to the Vultee Field Division of the Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corporation on January 31, 1344.

- I. CONTACTS: During this visit to the Valtee Field Division, I had an opportunity to speak with Mr. Price, engineering manager; Mr. Frank Davis, chief of aerodynamics and flight; Messrs. Ralph Shiek, Herold Pope, and others of the aerodynamics department; Messrs. Paul Anderson and Howard Dunholter, of the power plants group; Mr. Frank Albright, project engineer on Vultee's new Army project; and Prof. Victor Martin, of the University of Washington, who is rendering consulting service in connection with the new project.
- 2. IP-81: Mr. Price authorized elegrance for me to Tultee's new scoret Army project, variously designated as the FP-81, MX-480, and Tultee project 102. This project is the development of a long-range high-altitude fighter suitable for use as a bomber convey. The airplane will have a gross weight of about 20,000 pounds and is of fairly conventional design except for its propulsive system.
- The propulsive system consists of two power plants. One power plant, located in the nose of the fuscions, is a 2000- (ground) to 3000-horsepower General Electric TG-100 unit driving a limitot four-blade Aero-products propeller. Approximately 80 percent of the power of this unit goes into the propeller, and the remaining power is produced by the jet action of the combustion products as they are ejected through a duct on the bottom of the fuscione. The air intake for this unit is through the nose of the fuscione.
- 4. The second power plant is located behind the pilot's cockpit and well back in the fuselage. It is a 4000-pound-thrust General Electric I-40 jet unit which exhausts through a circular opening in the respend of the fuselage. The location of the air-intake

scoop for this unit is to be either at the battom of the fuselage or at the top of the fuselane behind the pilot's enclosure; the decision in this matter is at immediate concern to Yulter angineers.

- 5. In discussing this problem, Nuited engineers pointed out that the Army is afraid that an intake scoop located underneath—the—fuschare—will pick up stones and other foreign objects thrown by the wheels during take—off; on the other hand, if the intake records located on the top of the functage behind the pilot's enclosure, Tultee engineers fear that compressibility separation on the pilot's enclosure may scriously disturb the air flow into the duct. The enclosure will, of pourse, be designed to have the highest contible critical speed.
- 6. The fuselage of the NP-81 is long and slim and is mounted well forward on the wing. The fuselage is, indeed, mounted so far forward on the wing that Tultee engineers are somewhat concerned about the effect of the short tail length (2.5 M.A.G.) end of the long nose on the stability of the simpleme. A conventional-appearing tail with a single vertical surface is mounted on the rear end of the function, and the landing gear is of the tricycle type.
- 7. Fuel (kerosone) is carried in tunks inside the fuselage over the wing and, on long-range missions, in a streamlined tank mounted under each wing. For short bombing missions, the disposable gas tanks can be replaced with two 2000-pound bombs.
- 8. The wing has an aspect ratio of 6, a tamer ratio of 32:1, and is swept forward so that the leading edge is nearly straight. The wing loading is about 39 pounds per square foot. The wing has MACA 65-sories sections and is 13 percent thick throughout the span. For structural reasons, Tultee will remove the cusp from the trailing edge.
- 9. In discussing the matter of sweep, Tultec engineers said they had chosen to use a sweptforward wing on the KP-81 in an attempt to evoid tip stall. They had made this choice, Mr. Shick said, with the full realization that the lateral stability of a sweptforward wing, especially with flops down, was poor and that the dihedral effect might even be negative.

This condition had been encountered on a number of sirplanes, including some of their own, Mr. Shick stated, but pilots had considered it not at all garious. Insamuch as the wing of the XP-81 has such a high taper ratio, Vultee engineers thought they should give most weight to the factors that improve the stall.

10. Performance estimates indicate that the airplane will have a range of 2500 miles; a speed which, neglecting compressibility shock, would be about 650 miles per hour; a rate of climb at sea leval of better than 6000 feet per minute; and a ceiling of something more than 50,000 feet. The XP-81 is expected to be able to cruise at 250 miles per hour to an objective 1250 miles away, fight 20 minutes at full power, and return at 500 miles per hour. During the outward and the return trips, the TG-100 unit alone will be used. Insemuch as the airplane is expected to convoy bembers at high altitude, it will, I believe, have a pressure cabim.

ll. Great emphasis is being placed on speed of construction for the sirplane is scheduled to fly in September. Since the project is a rush job, the windtunnel test programs are laid out on a very tight schedule and will need to be facilitated in every way possible to be successfully completed in time to contribute to the design. The wind-tunnel test program that Tuitee has laid out specifies tests in four different tunnels which are listed in chronological order as follows:

- (1) Duot and scoop tests with a 1/4-scale fuselage model in the Vultes tunnel. This series of tests is about to start.
- (2) Tests of a 1/6.5-scale complete model in the Caltech tunnel.
- (5) Eccop, duct, and jet tests of a 1/4-scale, powered (?), fuselage-stub wing model in the AAL 7- by 10-foot tunnel.
- (4) Tests of a 1/4-scale powered complete model in the AAL 16-foot tunnel.

- 12. The program of tests was said to have been discussed with the AAL staff during a recent visit Vultee engineers made to the laboratory. Arrangements were made at that time, Mr. Shick said, for AAL to furnish a 150-horsepower motor for the tests. Vultee engineers are now concerned with the procurement of a four-blade 3-foot-dismeter propeller for the tests. Insemuch as they lack the time-and facilities for constructing the propeller, they would like to borrow the blades from any agency that may have some available. They expect, of course, that it will be necessary for them to build the hub and are prepared to do so.
- local aircraft companies concerning the availability of blades for a 5-foot propeller. Douglas informed them that a Douglas model (A-26?) which was tested in the UMAL 19-foot tunnel had 5-foot-diameter propellers but that the model was still at UMAL and was now the property of the Army. Hr. Shick said that the company had addressed a request to the MACA for the loan of a 5-foot-diameter propeller but had been informed that home was available. He said that the request, through business office handling, had been very untactfully worded. If the Committee can furnish three or more blades for an approximately 3-foot-diameter propeller or can inform the Vultee company where such blades are obtainable on loan, the Vultee engineering steff will be very appreciative.
- 14. IA-41: In the experimental shop I inspected the Vultee IA-41 sirplane, which was approaching completion and which will fly in a very few days. The IA-41 sirplane is the only one to be built under a contract which was canceled a few months ago.
- 15. The sirplane was being instrumented for flight tests, but the instrumentation did not include the Vultee Radio Resorder as that device appears still to be in an experimental stage of development. The Radio Recorder project, as well as Mr. Giffen and others who are in charge of it, was reported to have been transferred to the San Diego Division. At the San Diego plant, the Radio Recorder will be installed in an airplane for extensive tests to determine its operating characteristics.

- 16. The IA-41 sirplane, which has been described in previous memorandums, has a gross weight of around 18,000 pounds and is of fairly conventional appearance except for a very stubby, low-aspect-rutio (about 1.5) vertical tail surface. The surface seems even shorter because of the deep dorsal fin which extends forward several feet and finally, at its forward end, fairs into the shield of a directional entenna located behind the pilot's canopy. Despite the apparent inadequacy of the vertical surface, wind-tunnel tests were reported to have indicated that the value of dCn/dp was equal to 0.0017, which Vultee engineers consider satisfactory.
- 17. The airplane has a slotted flap and sealed, internally balanced ailerons with a geared booster teb. The elevator has a blunt lending-edge balance with a curtain-sealed gap. It has a spring booster tab on one side and a trim tab on the other. The rudder has a blunt-nose balance with a curtain-sealed gap and a spring tab.
- 18. Provisions have been made for the installation of heavy armament consisting of four 37-mm cannon and several .50-saliber machine guns. The fuselage has a large bomb bay which can be used alternately for bombs or the partial enclosure of a tornedo.
- 19. The airplane is powered with a Wasp Major 4560-9 engine which has a 2:1 gear ratio, develops rated power at 2700 rpm, and turns a 13-foot four-blade Hamilton Standard 6507A-0 propeller. The engine that is now in the sirplane is the second one that Vultee has received from the Pratt & Whitney company. The first one suffered a failure while being tested on Vultee's new engine etatic test stand. Although the damage to the engine was known to include a broken connecting rod, Vultee engineers never did determine the full extent of the damage nor the cause of the trouble as the engine was returned to the Pratt & Thitney company without being torn down for inspection.
- 20. After the failure occurred, Vultee engineers were afraid that they would not be permitted to have another engine for installation in the airplene, but their fears were unfounded. They are taking no chances with the second engine, however, and have installed it immediately in the airplane. The first Masp Major engine was reported by Vultee engineers to have run very smoothly during their static tests; in fact, these engines run so smoothly, Mr. Anderson said, that Pratt &

Thitney had installed one, in a test simplene, without Lord shock mounts.

- 21. The engines are received from the Fratt & Thitney company equipped with shielded total-head tunes and thermocouples attached to the heads and beses of the cylinders. Pratt & Thitney was said to have installed this instrumentation for the nurpose of cetting consistent results from tests of the engines—mounted—in different airplanes.
- 22. The engine cowling is of conventional design though it involves the use of a spinner and an inner cowling or spinner fairing for increased inlet efficiency. The cowling has an external carburetor-air scoop on top extending well forward toward the lip of the combine and a large external air scoop on the forward bottom part of the cowling leading to two oil radiators below the engine. The Siamezed exhaust stocks are long and exit through a number of tunnels underneath the cowlings.
- 23. The fuel system of the XA-41 similane has been tested in the Thompson Products Isboritary at Inglewood, where some difficulties from sersition and vapor look were noticed. Although, in these tests, it was found desirable to have two booster numps in the fuel tank. Tultee has found it convenient to install but one and, when the fuel level in the tank gets low, this one does not function very estisfactorily. This difficulty cannot be alleviated by installing the nump in a sump because there is no room for a tank sump in the simpleme. The fuel system thus is considered not entirely satisfactory but, inesmuch as only one airplane is to be built. Tultee believed the expenditure of more time on it to be undesirable.
- 24. XP-54: The second and lest XP-54 is being assembled and will be completed in a month or two. Vultee has apparently turned over the first XP-54 to the Army. The previously reported oil-foaming problem on the XP-54 was not entirely solved as it appeared to be, partly at least, the fault of the engine. The engine apparently had insufficient scavenging-pump capacity, and the drainage passages for the oil in the orankouse and other parts of the engine also were apparently too small. The Lycoming company was reported to be studying the oil-scavenging problem on the engine in its laboratory.

25. HANDLING QUALITIES: Mr. Davis has recently had an opportunity to fly a number of sixplanes, including the F4F, the F4U, and the F6F, it close succession and thus to compare their handling characteristics. Although it is slower than the others, he found the F6F to have the best handling qualities. Perhaps somewhat biased, he said that even the F6F did not have as good handling qualities as the P-66, the Vultee Vanguard.

Section 9A of Public 252-76th Congress, approved August 2, 1939, otherwise known as the "Hatch Act," provides:

MEMORANDIN For Chief, Wind Turnel and Flight Division.

Subject: Request for official leave.

- 1. Official leave is requested for the period of January 24 through January 28 during which time the writer attended the annual meetings of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences and the American Physical Society in New York.
 - 2. Some highlights of the meetings are as follows:
- (a) The paper of Busemann on "The Problem of Brag at High Subsonic Speeds" was based on the concept of Suderley that flows past airfoils with continuous local supersonic regions occur theoretically only rarely regardless of size of local supersonic region. This concept is in contradiction with the actual calculations of supercritical velocity distributions for airfoils by the methods of Kaplan, Emmons, and Perl. No attempt was made by Busemann to reconcile these results with the aforementioned concept of Guderley.
- tropic turbulence was outlined by Lin in the turbulence symposium. The progress has been based essentially on applying the concept of similarity to the spectrum of turbulence. Very impressive checks with experiment were indicated. The theory is still basically phenomenological. A basis has been established however for deepening the analysis on the one hand toward a truly statistical theory and on the other hand for making a start on non-isotropic turbulence. Much emphasis is being placed on refining and making precise the experimental results, on which the theory is extremely dependent. These aspects were discussed by Corrsin, Laufer, Kovasznay, and Frenkiel. The astronomers seem to be taking a great interest in turbulence. For example, turbulent flow processes in the sun are required to explain the high temperatures (of order on million degrees Centigrade) existing in the sun's outer atmosphere and responsible for the ultra-violet and x-ray radiations received by the earth.
- (c) The joint paper by Klein and Perl on "Calculation of Compressible Flow Past Ellipsoids of Revolution by an Integral Method" elicited an inquiry from Mr. Kent (of Aberdeen Proving Ground) as to how the method compared with the relaxation method. The impression is that a wait-and-see attitude exists toward the integral method pending more extensive comparisons of results with those by other methods.

- (d) The use of the shock tube as an instrument for high speed (possibly hypersonic) investigations and for studies of transient phenomena and chenomena requiring low free stream turbulence was discussed. The results presented. considering the simplicity and negligible power requirements of the shock tube, were very impressive to me. Research on this instrument might well be undertaken at this laboratory.
- (e) An interesting paper on the stability of plane fine fronts normal to a stream was presented. The methodsused were similar to those by which the stability of a laminar boundary layer is analyzed. A photograph of the initial stages of the breakup of a laminar flame front was presented which showed that the theoretical problem is not an acaimic one.
- (f) On the fundamental side, the retiring presidential aidress of the American Physical Society by J. R. Oppenheimer on "Fields and Quanta" was ma model illustration of how to combine difficult technical considerations with a poetic and generally illuminating method of delivery. Oppenheimer's - opinion seemed to be that in a couple of years, when "the mathematics has been slugged through, " the particle and wave aspects of a field of radiation and the particle and wave aspects of the matter with which the radiation is in interaction will have been combined into a satisfactory over-all theory.
- 3. In general, the opportunity afforded by the meetings of exchanging "views and gossip with other researchers was considered quite valuable. In my opinion the Lewis laboratory would benefit materially from a wider representation at such meetings.

It is noted that the records of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, Cleveland, Ohio, have reflected that WILLIAM CERL was on annual leave from July 18th through July 22, 1949. These dates were Monuay through Friday so PERL could have been in New York from July 16th through July 24, 1949. PERL has advised that during this period he visited New York on vacation, stopping at his parents home (936 Tiffany Street, Bronx, New York), and at the residence of HETTI SAVIDGE (104 East 38th Street, New York City), who is now PERL'S wife.

On September 18, 1951, Mrs. FLOYD ELWIN, JA., reiterated to SA MOBERT F. ROYAL that she is positive that on the moving day, mentioned above, she observed LAYTON, FIRESTONE and PERL together in the basement at 65 Morton Street. Mrs. ELWYN further definitely recalls that on April 17, 1951, while sitting in the Grand Jury waiting room, United States Court House, Foley Square, New York City, near DAYTON and FIRESTONE, she overheard FINESTONE remark to DAYTON "You don't have to worry about the woman. (He looked in her direction) However, you will have to worry about the man (looking in FLOYD ELWYN, JR.'s. direction)". Mrs. ELWYN said there was also a general discussion between DAYTON and FIRESTONE pertaining to the identification of DAYTON by the ELWYNS and that cither DAYTON or FIRESTONE stated "We will Imye to stick together."

Miss MELISARDE "NORRY" CONGDON, who resides at the Evangeline residence, 123 West 13th Street, New York City, and is employed in the Personnel Division of Lever Brothers, Park Avenue and 59th Street, New York City, was interviewed by SA ROBERT F. ROYAL, on July 25th and September 20, 1951. It should be noted that hiss CONGDON is a former girl friend of GARY PICKARD and on several occasions she visited 65 Morton Street where PICKARD resided in an apartment 6-I, leased by ALFRED SARANT. PICKARD'S tenancy of this apartment dated from October, 1949 to January 29, 1950.

Miss CONGDON stated that from a review of her engagement calendar, she noted that she spent the afternoon and evening of January 28, 1950 at the Morton Street apartment of GARY PICKARD and she definitely recalled that the superintendent of the building and two or three other individuals visited the apartment on that date while she was there. She said it was her understanding that one of these individuals was a prospective tenant.

It is noted that THOMAS DONOVAL, Mrs. FRAIK GARLAND, and Mr. and Mrs. THOMAS A. HC GILL accompanied FLOYD LLEYN, JR., on an inspection of this apartment on January 28, 1950, during the dinner hour. Mr. DONOVAR subsequently rented this apartment.

Miss CONGDON advised SA ROYAL that a review of her engagement calendar indicator that the next time she saw GARY PICKARD was at her residence approximately two to four days subsequent to January 28, 1950. She stated that she definitely recalls that PICKARD advised her during this visit that he and HAXWELL FIRESTONE moved the remaining furniture from apartment 6-I, 65 Morton Struct, to the basement at that address on the day following her last visit to PICALRD'S apartment. She said that this moving day would have been on Sunday, January 29, 1950. Miss COMGDON continued that prior to this visit by PICKARD, she had discussed with FICKARD his difficulty in getting FINESTONE to help him remove furnishings from 65 Morton Street. In this connection, Miss COMGDON stated that from a review of her engagement calendar, she noted that FIRESTORE was living at 418 East 9th Street, New York City, on January 7, 1950, for she had recorded an entry indicating that she had attended a party at that address on that cate. Miss CONGDON also advised SA ROYAL that she definitely recalls that PICKARD told her during his visit to her residence, mentioned above, that during the moving of the furniture, two men had dropped in on FINESTONE and himself at the Morton Street apartment. She said PICAAD did not identify these individuals and it is her recollection that PICMARD did not know their complete identities as FIRESTON: had been vague in introducing them to PICKARD. that PICKARD told her that either one or both of these men were connected in some way with Cornell University.

It is recalled that PICKARD has advised that FINESTONE introduced these two men to him as "BILL and ERUCE", and that PICKARD identified the individuals as WILLIAM PERL and subject DAYTON. Miss CONGDON was shown photographs of DAYTON, PERL and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, among others, and she said that DAYTON'S photograph was familiar and that she could have met him at either the Morton Street apartment or at the 418 East 9th Street apartment where FINESTONE resided. She also stated that WILLIAM PERL and ELEANOR GLASSMAN looked familiar to her and that she had possibly met PERL at FINESTONE'S 9th Stree apartment with ELEANOR GLASSMAN, (She is the sister of VIVIAM GLASSMAN). However, Miss CONGDON could not actually say that she had ever met DAYTON, LLEANORGLASSMAN or PERL.

On Septembor 10, 1951, Miss BETSIE EVALS, Kanager of Robinson Airlines, New York City, advised SA ROBERT F. ROYAL that a check of reservation records maintained by her office for the month of January, 1950 reflected only one reservation for anyone named DAYTOE, this being a reservation for January 20, 1950. Miss EVANS said that on January 19, 1950 a "Mr. DAYTOE, Hotel Rovere, R. 46, Morristown (New Jersey)" made a reservation for a flight number 11 the following day and the records indicate that DAYTON had made this flight. She also stated that the records contained a notation that the company was to call "Mr. DAYTON" at the Hotel Revers before 8:00 a.m. on January 20, 1950 if his flight was cancelled.

Mr. EUGENE MILLER, Chief, Division of Research Information, NACA, was unable to locate a copy of the above referred to document but stated that the subject matter thereof differed entirely from that with which ROSENBERG'S statement to GREENGLASS was concerned, the latter being a Satelite Missile Project while the subject of the report by ROOT concerned the controlling of the boundary layer which was described as follows: As the wing or other exterior surface of an aircraft is passing through the air, the air molecules in the immediate vicinity are compressed forming a minute layer over the surface which causes a certain amount of friction or drag. By variations in wing and aircraft design the amount of boundary layer can be somewhat diminished with a consequent lessening of drag.

(Aircraft Propulsion) National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, further verified the Fact that the subject matter of the ROOT report differed entirely from that referred to by ROSENBERG above. He further stated that the Sky Platform, or Satelite Missile Project, was still in a computational stage and that he doubted seriously that a man of the caliber of PERL would have considered as important information concerning the Sky Platform unless he were able to furnish accurate results of experimentation.




For your information, Lt. Col. Gregori Alexandrovich Tokaev was born in North Ossetia, Russia, on October 13, 1909. He studied at the Zhokorski Military Air Academy in Hoscow ... between 1932 and 1937 and remained at the Academy for an additional year in order to pursue scientific work and to 🖰 🤼 assume the position of head of the aerodynamics laboratory and as lecturer. In June, 1945, he was posted from the Soviet Air Force to the Air Division of the Soviet Linistry of Aircraft Production in Germany as an aviation specialist. During the period from June to August, 1945, he served as adviser on-air matters to the Soviet Delegation at Pottsdam. Tokaev was one of the Secretaries of the Russian element of the Allied Secretariat of the Control Council from August, 1945, to February, 1946. In February, 1946, at his own request he 🕮 became Senior Assistant for Scientific Questions to the Chief of the Air Section of the Soviet Ministry of Aircraft Production He defected from the Soviets on November 3, 1947.


Subsequently, Mr. Bell of NACA advised that Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, Director of NACA, was vitally interested in this matter and has indicated a desire to have Tokaev interviewed by one of their technical aeronautical specialists with the view of obtaining certain intelligence information concerning the status of the Soviet aircraft research production as of the date of the defection of this individual. It was pointed out that on the basis of information known by Tokaev as to the laboratory and testing equipment utilized by the Russians they would be in a position to determine the exact status of the Russians in the research and development of aircraft production as compared with the production in the United States. Dr. Dryden indicated his request that if possible arrangements be made to enable such an interview by one of their officials subsequent to the time that the Bureau has completed its interview of Tokaev.

<u>PURPOSE</u>

To recommend that additional inquiry be made of AEC through Liaison with respect to the nature of information appearing in the report on the Nuclear Energy for the Propulsion of Airplanes known as the NEPA #4 Report. To also recommend that AEC be requested to furnish information as to whether copies of this report were made available to NACA, Cleveland, to the Department of the Air Force, and to Dr. Theodore Von Karman.

DETAILS

Mr. Robert Bell, Security Officer of NACA, recently advised that he had located in the files of NACL, Washington, a copy of a previous comprehensive report on the Nuclear Energy for the Propulsion of Airplanes Project, which was referred to as the NEPA #4 Report. This report was stated to contain a summary of the NEPA Project as developed as of the date May 15, 1947.

As you are aware, considerable investigation is presently being conducted on the basis of information received through David Greenglass, confessed Soviet agent, to the effect that Rosenberg made the statement that he had received the mathematics for the nuclear propulsion of airplanes. It has further been learned through Jerome Eugene Tartakow. an informant who was incarcerated in the Federal House of Detention in New York City with Rosenberg, that Rosenberg made the statement he had received information concerning nuclear propelled airplanes through Perl. The investigation to date has been unsuccessful in developing definite information as to the exact NEPA informution which Rosenberg may have obtained, as well as the COPIES DESTROYED of such information.

It is believed advisable to make an appropriate R47 NOV 22 1960 inquiry through AEC to determine the following:

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- 1. The exact date when the NEPA #4 Report was completed and disseminated by AEC.
- 2. Could the information appearing in the NEPA #4 Report be considered as "the mathematics of the NEPA Project?"
- 3. How many copies of the NEPA #4 Report were issued and the exact charge out system which may have been maintained by AEC concerning such reports disseminated to other agencies.
- 4. If appropriate charge out records were maintained, do these records indicate that a copy was furnished to NACA, Cleveland, to the Pupin Physics Laboratory, Columbia University, or to Dr. Theodore Von Karman, who was serving as an advisor to the Department of the Air Force?
- 5. If the charge out records do not indicate that copies were directly submitted to any of the foregoing, how many copies of the NEPA #4 Report were distributed to NACA in Washington and the Department of the Air Force?

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Liaison make an appropriate inquiry along the above line of AEC for information which might be of assistance in connection with instant investigation.

Buscher, dated September 21, 1950, at Washington; D, -C. (1888)

In accordance with your request an inquiry was made of Lloyd Blankenbaker, Assistant Security Officer, NACA, and he advised that under normal circumstances such NACA memoranda and reports are never returned to their headquarters; further, that the recipient thereof is authorized to destroy any copies of these reports which have served their purpose but that it has been requested that RACA be appropriately advised concerning the destruction of such reports so that their records can be maintained up to date. The state of the s

Mr. Blankenbaker instituted a check of HACA records concerning this matter and stated that no notification has been received from Dr. 🔾 Von Karman indicating the destruction of any of the reports or memorands furnished to him. He advised that a further check would be made with respect to each individual copy thereof listed as having been sent to Dr. Von Karman to verify the fact that none of these reports were indicated as having been destroyed.

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In view of the Bureau's present interest with respect to the possible photographing of confidential material by various members of the Rosenberg network on July 4, 1949, NACA is being requested to furnish a list of any additional classified memoranda or reports which may have been sent to Dr. Von Karman during the period from October, 1948, to July 4, 1949.

It was suggested by Mr. Blankenbaker that the Bureau might desire to directly contact Dr. Von Karman and have him voluntarily surrender the original copies of the various NACA research memoranda and reports which were made available to his office. In view of the possibility that the FBI Laboratory might destroy the memoranda or reports during the course of the examination thereof NACA has agreed to replace any of these memoranda and reports in the event Dr. Von Karman requests their return. Mr. Blankenbaker stated, however, that in the event Dr. Von Karman refuses to cooperate in turning over these reports NACA will immediately recall all of these memoranda and reports from Dr. Von Karman's office. He noted that NACA continues its ownership of such documents and has a right to recall them at any time.

The New York Division is requested to make an immediate effort to determine the present location of these research memorands and reports, as well as the identity of the person in whose custody and possession they are presently located. It is presumed, however, that same are still in the possession of Dr. Von Karman and possibly maintained in his office at the Pupin Physics Laboratory, Columbia University. In the event the latter is found to be true an immediate contact should be had with Dr. Von Karman concerning this matter and his cooperation requested in making all of the pertinent NACA memoranda and reports available for examination by the FBI Laboratory. In accordance with the aforementioned information received from NACA he can be assured that any of these documents which are destroyed during the course of the Laboratory examination will be replaced by NACA upon his indicating that he desires to retain a copy thereof.

In connection with the obtaining of the aforementioned NACA reports you should make an effort to account for every one of the reports, particularly those of a classified nature which are not presently located in the possession of Dr. Von Karman. This is considered as being of importance on the basis of the information received from Soviet defector Gregori A. Tokaev to the effect that he had seen actual NACA reports in the possession of the Soviet Ministry of Aircraft Production.

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With respect to your request that the Bureau similarly obtain all copies of the "Lexington Report" and the Appendix to Chapter III of the report it is noted that according to NACA headquarters all of the following indicated copies of this report with one exception are still in the possession of NACA's Levis Flight Propulsion Laboratory in Cleveland, Ohio:

"Lexington Report," Copy B7-A, furnished HACA, Cleveland, October 11, 1948

"Lexington Report," Copy 88-A, Turnished NACA, Cleveland,
November 4, 1948

Appendix to Chapter III ("Lexington" PIA), furnished NACA, Cleveland, December 27, 1948

by Oak Ridge January 18, 1949

"Lexington Report," Copy 89-A, furnished RACA, Cleveland,
February 17, 1949

"Lexington Report," Copy 74-B, furnished MACA, Cleveland, April 5, 1949

As you may recall, Copy 88-A of this report was returned to the Atomic Energy Commission in May, 1949, and was replaced by Copy 74-B; further, Copy 88-A has previously been examined by the FBI leboratory and it was concluded that there was no indication that any pages thereof had been removed subsequent to the time same was originally bound. No latent fingerprint examination, however, was afforded this document at the time of the Leboratory examination.

In analyzing your suggestion as to obtaining all copies of the "Lexington Report" and the Appendix to Chapter III which might have been sveilable to Perl at the NACA Laboratory, Cleveland, during the pertinent period, it is pointed out that from the time element it would have been impossible for Perl to have had access to any of these copies for photographing on the July 4, 1948, week end. It is more likely that if any nuclear energy for the propulsion of sircraft (NEPA) information was photographed on that date the NEPA No. 4 technical report may have been used. Additional information concerning the latter report is being furnished to your office by spearate letter.

However, it is conceded that if this photographing actually took place on the July 4, 1949, week end the possibility of the "Lexington Report" being part of the material photographed cannot be overlooked. If this were so it would have been necessary for Perl not only to have had access to a copy of this report, which has not been established to date, but also to have removed this report from the MACA Laboratory, Cleveland, Ohio, and to have taken it to New York City for that July 4 week end.

وبالمواقع أأوا المسالة It would appear more likely that if the "Lexington Report" were photographed on the July 4, 1949, week end Perl may have had access to another copy of this report either through the Pupin Physics Laboratory, Columbia University, or through some scientist at that University who may have had a connection with the NEPA Project. To this end the New York Division is requested to conduct a thorough investigation for the purpose of determining whether any copy of the "Lexington Report" or the Appendix to ChapterIII was in the possession of either the Pupin Physics Laboratory or any of the nuclear scientists then associated with that Laboratory. It should be ascertained whether any of these scientists at Columbia University may have participated in the REPA Project so that further check can be made as to the possible availability of the "Lexington Report" to such individuals during the pertinent period. It is further suggested that the charge out records of the Atomic Energy Commission's classified library in New York City should also be checked for information along this

At the time of the interview with Dr. Von Karman with the view of obtaining possession of the various MACA research memoranda and reports as previously set forth in this letter he should be questioned as to his knowledge concerning the "Lexington Report" and the Appendix to Chapter III of that report. It should be specifically ascertained whether he may have had in his possession at the Pupin Physics Laboratory any copy or copies of this report during the pertinent July 4, 1949, week end period.

The Cleveland Division is requested to immediately recheck the records of RACA, Cleveland, and advise as to the identity of the person to whom each of the available copies of the "lexington Report" and the Appendix to Chapter III was charged out as of July 4, 1949. Thereafter in the event same appears advisable such persons should be interviewed for the specific purpose of determining the possibility of the report having been surreptitiously or otherwise obtained by Perl during this week-end period.



Upon completion of the above-requested investigation the Bureau will give further consideration to the matter of obtaining the aforementioned copies of the "Lexington Report" and the Appendix to Chapter III for a thorough laboratory examination. It is pointed out that in the event such action is deemed advisable it will be necessary to have the copies presently in the possession of the MACA Laboratory, Cleveland, recalled and replaced with additional copies.

A copy of this communication is being directed to the Los Angeles Division for their information and assistance in the event it is determined that Dr. Von Karman is presently located in Los Angeles rather than New York

This matter should be given immediate attention.

Emrich today and indicated he had learned that Major Sergei Y. Ivanov. Assistant Air Attache of the Russian Embassy, made inquiry several days ago relative to three confidential reports, the titles of which were confidential and thus could only have been ascertained through access to a similarly confidential and

To further advise that Mr. Bell is presently making an additional check of the records of NACA and will furnish complete details concerning this matter in the immediate future.

DETAILS

Robert Bell, Chief Security Officer of NACA, telephonically advised Special Agent E. F. Emrich in connection with the above-entitled matter that he had received information which indicated the possibility that the Russians have obtained within the past year another of their confidential reports in an aircraft matter. He stated that according to his information Major Sergei Y. Ivanov, Assistant Air Attache of the Russian Embassy, Washington, D. C., appeared at the Library of Congress three days ago and made inquiry concerning the possibility of his obtaining three confidential reports concerning aeronautical matters. According to Mr. Bell, NACA has been cognizant of the fact that the Russians, over a period of time, have been obtaining numerous unclassified and nonconfidential reports on aeronautical matters through the Library of Congress, these reports being borrowed for a week or ten days which, in his opinion, indicates they were merely being bor-

rowed for copying purposes.

With regard to Major Inchestry recent inquiry concerning the three confidential reports, Mr. Bell stated that the names of these reports themselves were considered as con

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fidential and could only have been secured by the Russians through access to a confidential and alassified report issued by the NACL laboratory in Cleveland where the report was prepared. He mentioned that this report has only been out approximately one year and therefore the Russians must have received this information from the report during the past year.

It might be noted in this respect that subject Perl, who is suspected of having made available to the Russians numerous reports containing confidential information concerning aeronautical matters, was in the employ of NACA's Laboratory in Cleveland up until September, 1950.

Mr. Bell stated he has not been cble to check all the necessary details at the present time but is doing so and will contact Supervisor Emrich within the next few days and furnish the complete details concerning the matter.

Page 7 of the report of Special Agent JOHN B. O'DONOGHUE dated May 17, 1951, Cleveland, refers to a memorandum written by PERL which might have indicated that the latter had knowledge of classified information contained in the Lexington report.

Mr. ROBERT BELL, Security Officer, NACA, advised that the document to which he had originally referred in this connection, was a memorandum dated August 18, 1948, signed "W. PERL," the subject matter of which was "drag of a long yawed cylinder," which document has been furnished the Bureau by the WFO. BELL stated that he has since been advised by Mr. ADDISON ROTHROCK, NACA, that the preparation of such a memorandum by PERL would not have necessitated any knowledge on his part of the Lexington project. His computations as reflected in the memorandum might well have been done upon specific instructions of the lexington project. The level has a minimum number of facts being given him which in no way would compromise information about the Lexington project.

Rebulet dated June 14, 1951, and WFO Teletype dated June 27, 1951, Mr. LLOYD BLANKENBAKER, Assistant Security Dfficer, NACA, made available a letter from H. B. BRACY, Security Officer, Lewis Laboratory, Cleveland, dated June 26, 1951, in which he set forth information concerning the "recruiting trip to Columbia University of PERE February 2 to 4, 1950." It was noted that he talked to a a starte of the started of the sta who had been in the Lewis Laboratory July to September, 1940, who worked in the Laboratory during the same period. Both of the latter individuals had resigned to return to Columbia University and the letter states that apparently FERL attempted to interest them in re-employment with the Laboratory. BRACY'S letter listed the names of persons interviewed by PERL. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION TO VERIFY RESIDENCES
OF PERL IN 1944

The following investigation was conducted by the writer:

11703 Madison Avenue

It was determined through investigation that the above address is non-existent and that the premises 11709 Madison Avenue are occupied by the National Carbon Division of the Union Carbide and Chemical Corporation and were occupied as such during 1943 and 1944. The aforementioned company's property extends from 11709 Madison Avenue to 11900 Madison Avenue.

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16808 Madison Avenue

Mrs. LILLIE R. REAGAN, 1331 Phelps Evenue, Lakewood, Chio, landlord of the apartment unit at the above address, located two ledger sheets containing the name W. MUTTERPERL as occupying Suite #3. These ledger sheets were obtained from Mrs. REAGAN for photostating and the originals have been returned to her. Copies of these photostats are being enclosed for the Bureau, the New York Office and for the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, with their copies of this report and for clarification purposes will be referred to hereinafter as Exhibit No. 1 and Exhibit No. 2. Mrs. REAGAN after examination of these records stated that she could not conclusively state from her records the dates during which MUTTERPERL occupied Suite #3 although she would assume from the interpretation of them that he moved into Suite #3 in January, 1944, and vacated the apartment in November, 1944.

A perusal of Exhibit No. 1 indicated the names of MIDDLETON, LEE CORLREY, MULLEN and W. MUTTERPERL and the notation #3 listed in the upper right-hand corner. Further, in the right-hand ledger column under the date 1940 no rent payments are noted after June 1. This, according to Mrs. REAGAN, could possibly be the time MIDDLETON vacated because, as can be noted, the name of MIDDLETON is crossed out in the upper right-hand corner of the ledger sheet. Under the year 1943 it will be noted that in the entry March 12 only \$18 is entered and again, according to Mrs. REAGAN, this could possibly denote the time at which LEE CORDREY vacated the suite. After the entry December 1, 1943, in which \$45 is entered and which is underlined, it will be noted that the notation, deposit January 1 - \$10, is next entered immediately below the foregoing entry. Mrs. REAGAN advised that it is probable that MULLEN'S residency was terminated on December 31, 1943, and that the deposit of \$10 on January 1, 1944, related to W. MUTTERPERL inasmuch as his name is listed above MULLEN'S in the upper right-hand corner of the ledger sheet.

An examination of Exhibit No. 2 reflects the names of W. MUTTERPERL, RANNY, BRANDT (all of which are crossed out) and WATTS, together with the notation #3. In the ledger column on the right-hand side of the ledger sheet it will also be noted there is the notation "Think this is MUTTERPERL." Further examination of the figures in the right-hand column of the ledger sheet it will be noted that the payment of \$40 on October 1, 1944, is the last entry for that year. Mrs. REAGAN stated that in all probability these rental payments were those of MUTTERPERL and that he vacated the suite in November, 1944.

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that in December, 1944, purchases in the amount of \$6.08 for window shades and \$23.34 for "Textolite" (paint) were made for Suite #3. This latter purchase, according to Mrs. REAGAN, would almost preclude the possibility that MUTTERPERL renovated the apartment during the time that he was in there. She continued by stating that she did not recall the reason for MUTTERPERL'S leaving and stated she did not know whether he was married or single at the time he left. She did state, however, that he was single when he rented the apartment but inasmuch as she had no contact with him during the time that he resided in the apartment she stated she was in no position to furnish any information concerning him. She advised that Suite #3 was sufficiently large enough for two people in the event he did get married subsequent to the time of his original rental and, hence, she doubted that MUTTERPERL moved because of crowded conditions in the apartment.

Dr. H. L. REAGAN, 11720 Lorain Avenue, husband of Mrs. REAGAN, was interviewed at his office concerning any knowledge he might possess relative to MUTTERPERL. He stated that he could not recall the dates during which MUTTERPERL occupied Suite #3 in the apartment building nor was he able to offer any explanation for MUTTERPERL'S vacating the suite which he might have advanced. Dr. REAGAN advised that for record purposes he is carried as the owner of the apartment building and his wife is listed as landlord inasmuch as she keeps the records. He stated that he has very little contact with the tenants in the building and, hence, was unable to furnish any information concerning MUTTERPERL.

The records of the Cleveland Area Rent Office, Room 800, 2108 Payne Avenue, for the house accommodation at 16808 Madison Avenue as produced by JOHN HAVLACH, Supervising Rent Examiner, reflected a report of change in tenancy from the former tenant MULLEN to the new tenant WILLIAM MUTTERPERL on January 1, 1944. Photostatic copies of this original form were obtained and are being enclosed for the Bureau, New York and the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, with their copies of this report. Again for clafification purposes these latter photostatic copies will be designated as Exhibit No. 3.

An examination of Exhibit No. 3 will indicate that WILLIAM MUTTERPERL was to have been a tenant at 16808 Madison Avenue on January 1, 1944, in the housing accommodation formerly held by MULLEN and that this form will further reflect that WILLIAM MUTTERPERL signed this form on February 24, 1944.

Mr. HAVLACH advised that a review of the records maintained at the Area Rent Office for the building at 16808 Madison Avenue contained no further information relating to Suite #3 or to WILLIAM MUTTERPERL. He added that landlords had the responsibility of submitting forms to his office when apartments were vacated and the names of tenants changed; however, he stated that a great number of them failed to comply with the rent control orders.



Mr. HAVLACH stated that in the event the above records which are in their possession pertaining to Suite #3-at-16808 Madison Avenue and as concerns WILLIAM MUTTERPERL should be needed as evidence, subpoences should be directed to either Mr. FRANK WEISER, 2577 Overlook Road, Cleveland Heights, Ohio, or Miss RAE SPECTOR, 1632 Coventry Road, Cleveland Heights, Ohio, both of whom are attorneys for the Cleveland Area Rent Office. Mr. HAVLACH stated that either of the aforementioned individuals could properly introduce the records of the Cleveland Area Rent Office

THOMAS McNAMEE, Customer Service Department, East Ohio Gas Company, 1405 East 6th Street, advised from the records of that company that service was rendered to WILLIAM MUTTERPERL, Suite #3, 16808 Madison Avenue, from January 4, 1944, to November 2, 1944.

-- Mr. McNAMEE advised that in the event such records are needed for court testimony a subpoena duces tecum should be directed to the East Chic Gas Company, 1405 East 6th Street, who in turn would delegate the proper official to introduce the records in court.

2744 Mayfield Road

It will be noted in the report of SA JOHN B. O'DONOGHUE dated March 27, 1951, at Cleveland in instant matter that bank statements of the Cleveland Trust Company for the months of November and December, 1944, and January, 1945, indicated that PERL had received statements at 2744 or 3744 Mayfield Road.

It should also be noted that investigation revealed that the address 3744 Mayfield Road was a vacant lot.

HARRY ROGIN, owner of the apartment building at 2744 Mayfield Road, advised that he recalled a MUTTERPERI, whom he believed to be identical with a photograph of PERL, as having resided in his apartment building sometime during the war.

Mr. ROGIN upon contact by the writer advised that he had previously made an attempt to locate some evidence which would indicate the length of residence for PERL in his apartment building but that the results of such an attempt were unsuccessful. ROGIN stated that to the best of his knowledge PERL was a tenant of his, at best, for only a week or two weeks and that he had requested PERL to move. He stated he recalled that PERL brought in a great number of boxes, among which were several boxes of electrical apparatus and wires and PERL on occasions was known by him to be working with such apparatus as early as 2:00 and 3:00 a.m. ROGIN stated that he became afraid of PERL'S motives and requested him to leave.



JOHN HAVLACH, Supervising Rent Examiner, Cleveland Area Rent Office, produced the records for the apartment building at 2744 Mayfield Road, and after an examination of these-records advised that he could locate no information which would indicate that WILLIAM MUTTERPERL or PERL was mentioned at this residence.

Mr. WILLIAM BRAUCHER, Customer Service Department, East Chio Gas Company, 1405 East 6th Street, advised from the records of that company that service was rendered to WILLIAM MUTTERPERL, Suite #2, 2744 Mayfield Road, from November 2, 1944, until November 6, 1944. BRAUCHER stated that the records further reflected a change of address for WILLIAM MUTTERPERL from 2744 Mayfield Road to Upper of 1516 East 120th Street. It will be noted that the information concerning the subpoens of these records is listed in connection with the contact of THOMAS MCNAMEE of the East Chio Gas Company.

1516 East 120th Street

It was ascertained from MAX KONETSKI, 7519 Superior Avenue, who is the former custodian of the apartment building at the above address, that the Yental management of this building for the latter part of 1944 and for the year 1945 was handled by the A. D. Frazer Company, Room 610, National City Bank Building. KONETSKI stated that he terminated his services at the apartment building in July, 1944, and that PERL was not a tenant at that time.

WILLIAM GROVES, Sales and Lease Department, A. D. Frazer Company, advised that they Tormerly handled the rental for the apartment building at 1516 East 120th Street. He stated that actually the address of the apartment is 11912 Ashbury Avenue and that the address 1516 East 120th Street is a rear part of the building containing two suites. He advised that all records pertaining to the apartment building have been destroyed by the company inasmuch as they are in the process of moving and that at their new location they would not have the storage space to keep all of their old records. GROVES added that he recalled the rental arrangements with the apartment building but advised that he did not recall the name of WILLIAM MUTTERPERL or WILLIAM PERL.

JOHN HAVLACH, Supervising Rent Examiner, Cleveland Area Rent Office, advised after a review of the records of that agency pertaining to the apartment building at 11912 Ashbury Avenue that such record contained no information relative to WILLIAM MUTTERPERL or WILLIAM PERL.

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WILLIAM BRAUCHER, Customer Service Department, East Ohio Gas Company, advised from the records of that company that service was rendered to WILLIAM MUTTERPERL at 1516 East 120th Street, Suite #6, from November 6, 1944, to February 12, 1946. CONTACT AT N.A.C.A. RELATING TO PERL'S PAPERS AND THE J-31 OR I-16 JET ENGINE

JESSE HALL, Assistant Chief of Research, N.A.C.A., was contacted and accordingly copies of the papers prepared by PERL entitled "Some Effects of Compressibility of the Flow Through Fans and Turbines" and "A General Representation of Axial Flow Fans and Turbines" were obtained for examination and discussion. In this respect, HALL advised that the contents of the aforementioned papers were highly theoretical in content and no relationship whatsoever existed between the content material and the J-31 or I-16 Westinghouse jet engine.

HALL explained that PERL'S paper "Some Effects of Compressibility of the Flow through Fans and Turbines" was an examination conducted to get compressibility effects on the flow through compressors and turbines in order to get some idea of these effects and at what Mach numbers these effects become important. HALL defined a Mach number as the ratio of the speed of the plane to the speed of sound.

In regard to PERL'S paper "A Representation of Axial Flow Fans and Turbines," HALL advised that the paper recommended several unconventional arrangements of fans and turbines in jet engines. HALL pointed out that the arrangement of the fans and turbines in the J-31 and I-16 jet engine was conventional.

In reference to Item No. 6 pertaining to the air compression engine, Will said that such a statement as "tangential direction" made no sense to him inasmuch as such a term is never referred to in aeronautical technical language. He stated that directions are always described as either axial or radial (centrifugal).





PURPOSE

DETAILS

It was suggested that the circularization of certain of the aircraft firms in the United States concerning this jet fighter plane may have referred to the invitations or solicitations for competitive bids which were sent out by the Air Force as a result of which invitations the P-80 plane was subsequently produced.

RECOMMENDATION



The details of the aeronautical and guided missile data furnished by Tokaev were discussed with Mr. Robert A. Bell, Chief Security Officer, NACA. As a result of this discussion he submitted the attached letter, with its enclosures, setting forth details concerning the various aeronautical and guided missile projects to which it was believed Tokaev was making reference. This letter suggested that Tokaev be further interviewed along the lines mentioned therein to enable a more positive identification of the particular projects and thereby to assist in determining the source through which this data may have come into the hands of the Soviets.

It will be noted that the enclosures furnished by NACA were comprised of various restricted, confidential, declassified, and unclassified research memoranda and reports. These were furnished to the Bureau for information and possible assistance in handling the further interview with Tokaev. These documents are, however, being retained by the Bureau for possible use in evaluating the information which is obtained by the Bureau's Legal Attache in London in the future interview.

Mr. Bell further advised that NACA would, upon request of the Bureau, make available to us one of their technical research men for assistance in connection with any future interviews of Tokaev. He mentioned that in the event it is learned that Tokaev is familiar with the research facilities of the Soviets NACA may be desirous of having one of their officials interview him in the future for information of an intelligence nature. In this respect it is noted that Tokaev was head of the Research and Aerodynamics Laboratory for the Air Academy in Moscow, in 1938, Aviation Specialist for the Soviet Air Force in Germany in 1945, Secretary with the Russians in the Allied Secretariat of the Control Council in 1945 and 1946, and Senior Assistant for Scientific Questions to the Chief of the Air Section of the Soviet Ministry of Aircraft Production.

PURPOSE

To set forth detailed information concerning the identification numbers and subject matter of the confidential and classified reports which, according to MACA (Estional Advisory Committee for Acronautics) were requested at the Library of Congress by Sergei Y. Ivanov, Assistant Soviet Air Attache, on July C, 1951. To advise further that NACA has indicated that, although both the identification numbers and the reports were classified at the present time, it is possible the existence of such reports may have been determined by Ivanov through reference to subsequent unclassified reports of NACA, Havy or USART which he may have had access.

To indicate that LACA has made available the attached copies of their Aeronautical Intelligence Bulletine Hos. 1698 and 1700, in which the identification numbers and titles of the research reports requested by Ivanov appear. Further, according to NACA, these AIB's were sent to some 145 interested government agencies and direraft componies, all of which had been previously aleared for receipt of confidential and restricted materials. A list of the agencies and companies receiving copies of the listed AIB's is being propared and will be made available for information.

To report that MACA made available the attached list of all research memorands and reports requested and obtained by Ivanov since July 2, 1951, from the Library of Congress, all of which memorands and reports are no longer classified. A photostatic copy of the sheet on which appears the identification numbers of the requested reports, the handwriting on which is presumably that of Ivanov, will be made evailable to the Aureau by NACA.

To further advise that NACA has been requested to furnish the information as to whether the partinent AIB's or classified reports were made evaluable to Boris Somion Maximoff of the Lero-Electronics Company, Chicago, Illinois, it being noted that Maximoff is known to have been in recent contact with Ivanov.

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DETAILS

In your memorandum to Mr. Ladd on July 11, 1951, in the Perl case, it was pointed out that Robert Bell, Chief Security Officer of MACA, had telephonically advised that the Assistant Soviet Air Attache, Ivanov, had made a request at the Library of Congress for three confidential reports, the existence of which was considered as classified by MACA. It was further indicated that Bell was awaiting full details and would make the results available to the bureau at a future date.

On July 27, 1951, former Special Agent Lloyd: Blenkenbeker, who is now Assistant to the Chief Security Officer at NACA, made available a letter which NACA had received on July 9, 1951, from the Library of Congress. This letter edvised that Sergei Y. Ivanov, Assistant Soviet Wilitary Attoche, had visited the Aeronautical Division of the Library on several occasions during the past week. Further, that on July 2, 1951, he borrowed MACA technical notes numbers. 2190, 2250, 2300, 2306, 2314, 2317, and 2298. On July 6, 1951, he borrowed NACA technical notes numbers 2302, 2322, 2314, 2320, and 2327, together with MACA technical memorandum number 1297. On the latter date, Ivanov also requested MACA research memoranda numbers 2-50HOSDR (incorrect number possibly referring to number E-50D05 or number E-50L05), E-50D17DC, and E-50D20. According to the Library of Congress letter, these latter three NACA research memorands were not supplied to Ivanov and he was odvised that they were not available. According to Blankenbaker, all of the aforementioned EACA reports, with the exception of the lest three, were no longer classified documents and, therefore, some were made quailable to Ivanov. Blonkonboker turned over to the Bureau a list of all of the LACA reports which were requested by and furnished to Ivanov during the month of July, 1951, together with a copy of the AIB's portaining to the three class. sified items which Ivanov had requested. It might be noted that the AIB's contain the same classification as the reports revearch neveranda described thereon.

According to information received by MACA from the Library of Congress, Ivanov also borrowed a copy of Volume 6, Bos. 2 and 3, for the year 1951 of the Swedish Aviation Publication "Interavia." According to Blankenbaker, these are unclassified items.

Blankenbaker advised that insofer as the three aforementioned classified items are concerned, the identification numbers are not considered classified but these numbers would not be generally known to enjone who had not had access either toothe AID's, the research memos, or some other classified report. He mentioned that the listing of the publications by MACA has received the same classification as the documents themselves. It was later learned, however, through Mr. Miller at Langley Field, Virginia, where these AIB's and research namoranda are printed, that it is possible that the identification numbers of these classified documents may have appeared in some subsequently issued unclassified report issued by MACA, Many or USA/F.

The following information was furnished as to the meanings of the various letters or numbers appearing in the identification numbers of NACA research memorands:

According to Blankenbaker, no information is available at MACA as to the exact meaning of the "DC" and the "DR" appearing at the conclusion of the identification numbers of these documents requested by Ivanov, as such designation has never been used by MACA. It was suggested, however, that the latter may have been used to designate that these items were confidential or restricted ("DR" Data Restricted and "DC" Data Confidential.

As proviously mentioned, all of the AIB's and research memoronda issued by UACA are printed at Langley Field, Virginia. It was explained by Blankenbaker that the AIB's are distributed to their mailing list consisting of some 145 interested agencies and aircraft companies which have previously received the necessary electronee to receive confidential and restricted items. Further, according to Blankenbaker, their chargeout records reflect that around 300 of instant research memoronda were distributed. He mentioned that a list of the agencies and aircraft commanies receiving the AIB's in July, 1950, was being prepared and would be made avoilable to the Bursau.

Inactuch as instant file on Ivanov reflects that he is known to have been in contact with one Boris Semion Maximoff of the Aero-Electronics Company, Chicago, Illinois, it was requested that Blankenbaker advise the Bureau whether there was any record indicating that the AIE's or the research memoranda requested by Ivanov at the Library of Congress may have been made available by EACA to Maximoff or his company.

MACA is also making available to the Bureau a photostatic copy of the list of items requested from the Library of Congress by Ivanov, which list is reportedly in the hand-writing of Ivanov. The Bureau will also be kept advised through MACA concerning any future request made of the Library of Congress by Ivanov.

RECOMBINDATION

It is recommended that the list of companies to which AIB's are distributed by MACA when obtained be carefully examined to determine whether Ivanov is known to have been in contact with any representative of such companies. It is further recommended that, in view of Ivanov's activities in obtaining aeronautical information for the Soviets, the investigation of his activities should be intensified in an effort to determine his contacts and possible source for obtaining confidential data concerning MACA research projects. It is noted in this respect that, according to Soviet defector Takeov; the present Soviet Air Attache, Kuvinov, who is Ivanov's superior, during the period of his association with the Soviet Air Linistry in Moscow during 1947 and 1948 is reported to have received classified MACA reports.

Please refer to my letter of June 6, 1951.

It appears that the Federal Bureau of Investigation is in contact with a confidential source of information on Soviet aeronautical developments. I am informed that this source, whose identity is unknown to the NACA, is located in Western Europe.

The National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics is anxious to obtain all available information on the status of Soviet aeronautical research. In order that American plane manufacturers and the military services might be able to design and produce superior military planes, NACA must be able to supply the manufacturers and the military services with the data acquired from our research. The rate of improvements in military aeronautics is paced by the rate of accomplishments in aeronautical research.

As a matter of intelligence I am interested in, first, the status of Soviet research as compared with that in this country, and, secondly, with the specific results of Soviet aeronautical research.

I would appreciate it if you would advise me whether the informant on Soviet aeronautical developments would be available for an interview by representatives of NACA. The primary purpose for such an interview would be the acquisition of intelligence information. However, it may be that our representative could be of assistance on technical matters to your representative in a reinterview of the informant COPIES DESTROYED clarify the allegations referred to in my letter

The attached documents and the following explanatory material and suggested questions are being submitted as a result of the conference between Special Agent Elmer F. Emrich and my Security Officer.

The nature of the allegations, the brevity and Anaccuracies or lack of clarity have posed considerwable obstacles to an evaluation of the allegations. A brief statement of the informant could be interpreted as relating to a vast quantity of technical data contained only in numerous reports, or could be interpreted as relating to any part of this body of data.

The informant's unqualified statements are too inclusive; for example, the statement that they possessed all Secret material from the NACA Laboratory at Langley Field. An effort to determine in advance all of the material to which the informant might conceivably be referring would only result in the wildest form of far-reaching guesswork, covering a Atremendous body of technical material. This would be who mean task and of questionable value.

To reduce the magnitude of the problem to one capable of practical solution, the following approach has been used: explanatory material has been submitted for the benefit of, and to give the necessary background to, the interrogator; some samples of technical reports relating to the subjects mentioned in the allegations are attached; there are set forth suggested

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questions, the answers to which will enable the NACA to-determine more accurately the matters referred to in the allegations. It should be emphasized that the technical reports submitted are only a sampling of those which relate to the subjects mentioned in the allegations. It is hardly to be expected that answers can be obtained for all of the questions suggested; numerous questions are suggested because the answers to any of them will assist us in delineating the problem.

Some of the reports submitted are still "classified", and would be of value to a potential enemy. The current classification of each NACA report is indicated thereon. As you know, it is a well recognized principle that classified material originating in one agency will not be further disseminated by another, without the approval of the originating agency. of the attached reports were issued by one of the military services. I request that you obtain the permission of the appropriate military agency should you desire to exhibit this material to the informant. of the NACA reports might be of some value to an enemy. However, if there is reasonable anticipation that the exhibition of these reports will assist in the solution of this problem, it appears the risks are well worth taking.

As basic explanatory material, there are attached three copies of an unclassified brochure describing the organization and research facilities of the NACA. This might be of value as background material for the interrogator.

The remainder of this letter is organized into (a) a sentence or phrase from the allegations, followed by (b) pertinent explanatory material, and (c) suggested questions relating to the sentence or phrase from the allegation.

- 1. (a) Possessed all Secret material from NACA Laboratory at Langley Field. Material obtained by

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someone in "Sonic Speed Laboratory".

(b) The Langley Aeronautical Laboratory (formerly Langley Memorial Aeronautical Laboratory) Langley Field, Virginia, was the first, and for many years the only, NACA research laboratory. The Ames Aeronautical Laboratory, Moffett Field, California, was opened in August 1940, and the Lewis Flight Propulsion Laboratory (formerly Aircraft Engine Research Laboratory), Cleveland, Ohio, was opened in May 1942. Since 1942 the majority of work relating to aircraft propulsion systems (such as jet engines) has been performed at the Lewis Laboratory.

Reports published by NACA are given relatively wide distribution to branches of the military services, aircraft manufacturers, etc., even when the reports are classified.

There is no "Sonic Speed Laboratory" in NACA. Research on subsonic, transonic, and supersonic problems are handled at all three Laboratories. wind-tunnels are known as transonic or supersonic There is some indication that the term "Sonic Speed Laboratory" is used loosely by some persons to refer to any aeronautical research labor-There was a small Sound Laboratory at Langley Field which had relatively limited access to classified material. The research division of the Langley. Laboratory most concerned with transonic and supersonic problems was the Compressibility Research Divi-In addition the Pilotless Airoraft Research Division, the Flight Research Division, and the Physical Research Division were concerned to a lesser degree with these problems. The name of the Laboratory where the research was conducted is shown on each technical report published by NACA.

Red diagonal-striped cover sheets were not used, normally, by NACA, and no instance can be recalled where such cover sheets were used on reports at the





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Langley Laboratory.

by the Langley Laboratory, or does it also include
such material issued by others and received by this
Laboratory? What basis does the informant have for
the opinion that all such material was possessed?

Did the informant see the material in the form in which it was originally received, and, if so, were there actual copies of reports, or were there photographs or abstracts of reports, letters, and similar documents? If actual reports or photographs thereof were not seen, did the informant see any charts or graphs, and, if so, in what form? Was the material being received continuously from time to time, or was it obtained at one time?

What indications are there that the material was obtained from NACA (as opposed to, say, an aircraft manufacturer receiving NACA reports)? What indications were there that the material was received from the Langley Laboratory (as opposed to the other two NACA Laboratories)? What indications were there that the material was received from some one in the "Sonic Speed Laboratory", and what is meant by this terminology? Does the informant possess any information which would indicate there is only one or more than one source (defectee) for this material? Does the informant have any indication that the source of the material was in a certain Division, or was associated principally with a certain wind-tunnel, or was concerned principally with certain types of problems?

What is the significance of the question, "Who





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was in touch with the gas dynamics department at Langley-Field? -- The Fluid and Gas Dynamics Analysis Section of the Langley Laboratory was established February 23. 1944. In November 1946 the name was changed to the Gas Dynamics Section. Likewise, what is the significance of the questions relating to the Bell Aircraft Works (sio) and the aerodynamics laboratory of a Massachusetts University? Is the informant referring to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology? The Bell Aircraft Corporation is a large aircraft manufacturer, and many persons in NACA had contact with the corporation for one reason or another.

- 2. (a) Had complete set of blueprints and technical data on GE jet engine.
 - It appears the informant could be referring to any one of three GE jet engines: the J-31, also known as the I-16; the J-33, also known as the I-40; or the J-35. also known as the TG-180. Four reports, each dealing with one or more of these engines, are attached. They are:
 - Investigations of Jet-Propulsion Engines in the NACA Altitude Wind-Tunnel",
 - "Altitude-Wind-Tunnel Investigations of Thrust "Final Report of Development of XP-59A and YP-59A (AAF)
 Model Airplanes", and

 - "Thrust-Augmentation Tests of Type I-16 Jet-Propulsion Engine by Bleedoff and Water and Alcohol Injection".
 - (c) To which of these three engines is the informant referring? What type of technical data was available. as, for example, the amount of thrust, fuel consumption, "blow-out" altitude, acceleration, or combustion temperature? Wag the technical data obtained from flight or



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tunnel tests? Did the report or reports deal primarily with the performance of the complete engine or with tests on modifications for improvement of component parts, such as the compressor, turbine, burning chamber, etc?

Was a complete set of construction or shop blueprints available, or is the informant referring to line drawings showing, by scale, shape and location of principal component parts? Were the "blueprints" part of a report or a separate item?

Who prepared the report-NACA, GE, or Air Force? Was the report classified "Confidential" or "Secret"? If the report was prepared by NACA, were tests conducted at the Langley Laboratory or at the Aircraft Engine Research Laboratory at Cleveland, Ohio? Did the report deal only with the jet engine or with a plane using that engine?

- 3. (a) Used Secret NACA data on their work in estimating maximum curvature at subsonic speeds.
 - (b) The terminology used is not definitive. It appears the statement could refer to
 - (A). The curvature of airfoils or wing sections,
 - (B) Minimum radius of turn of an airplane.

An unclassified report "Aerodynamic Characteristics of 24 NACA 16-Series Airfoils at Mach Numbers of between 0.3 and 0.5" is an example of (A). The material included in this report was made available at a Confidential conference at the Ames Aeronautical Laboratory in 1947.

Seven reports are submitted as possible examples of (B):

"The Locus of Possible Positions of a Heavy





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Bomber in Space after a 12-Second Time Interval",

"Calculated and Measured Turning Performance of a Navy F2A-3 Airplane as Affected by the Use of Flaps",

"Effects of Compressibility on the Maximum Lift Characteristics and Spanwise Load Distribution of a 12-Foot-Span Fighter-Type Wing of NACA 230-Series Airfoil Sections",

"Effect of Mach and Reynolds Numbers on the Power-Off Maximum Lift Coefficient Obtainable on a P-39N-1 Airplane as Determined in Flight",

"Effect of Mach and Reynolds Numbers on the Maximum Lift Coefficient Obtainable in Gradual and Abrupt Stalls of a Pursuit Airplane Equipped with a Low-Drag Wing",

"Preliminary Investigation of the Effect of Compressibility on the Maximum Lift Coefficient".

"Wing Pressure-Distribution Measurements up to 0.85 Mach Number in Flight on a Jet Propelled Airplane".

(c) If the informant is referring to material in category (A). the following questions are suggested:

The data covered what series of airfoils? What classification did the report bear? Were the tests made at the Langley or Ames Laboratory?

If the informant is referring to material in category (B), did the reports refer to general studies on the maximum lift coefficient, or to the possible diversionary tactics capabilities of specific planes? Is the informant referring to data obtained as a result of wind-tunnel or flight tests?

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4. (a) Had details of American Gorgon and other rockets.

(b) There were four models of the Gorgon controlled These models were the II A and III A rocket propelled air-to-air missiles, and the II B and II C missiles which were propelled by ram jet power plants generally similar to the German V-1 "Buzz bomb". Attached are three reports dealing with phases of the developmental work on these missiles. The reports are "Wind-Tunnel Tests of the Gorgon IIA and IIB Airframes. II - Power-Off Longitudinal and Lateral Stability and Control", "Design, Construction and Preliminary Flight Tests of a 14" RESOJET Power Plant for the GORGON II-C Controlled Missile", and "AN APN-58 Status and Progress". The latter report deals with the control mechanism for the II C missile. Previously transmitted was a report "Guided Missiles, Status, Development and Availability". It is to be noted that a copy of this latter report has been missing since approximately November 1944.

(c) What type of "details" of the Gorgon missile was available, such as the construction details of the guiding mechanism, power plant, or launching device, or test data, such as static thrust, flight tests or wind-tunnel tests of the power plant; or performance characteristics, such as speed, altitude, and range; or performance or test data on the control mechanism, such as the range, operating characteristics, stabilization or radio frequencies used; or geometry of the airframe or aerodynamic data thereon?

On what other types of rockets did informant possess details? By rockets, does informant mean a propulsion system not requiring air? If so, were the rockets test vehicles for the solution of aerodynamic problems, such as lift/drag, stability, etc., of. for example, various wing configurations; or were the rockets potential or developmental missiles? If the latter, were they long range or short range, guided or aimed, and, if guided, whether primarily by directional or homing devices? Were all of the following types of

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information available on each of the types of rockets--Construction (general description, engineer's line drawings or shop or construction blueprints)? Procurement rate, goals, cost? Power plant thrust, type of fuel, orifice, burning rate or time? Performance speed, range, pay load? Guiding mechanism type, range, and operation? Launching device?

- 5. (a) Had details of American Shooting Star.
 - (b) The "American Shooting Star" was the popular name for the Lockheed XP-80 or P80 airplane. Two reports, "High-Speed Wind-Tunnel Tests of a 1/3-Scale Model of the XP-80 Airplane" and "Final Report of Development, Procurement, Performance and Acceptance XP-80 Airplane" pertaining to this, are attached.

While this plane was developed primarily as a military pursuit plane, the plane has been used by NACA as a vehicle for flight tests. The memorandum report "Wing Pressure-Distribution Measurements up to .85 Mach Number in Flight on a Jet Propelled Aircraft", previously mentioned under (3), is an example of reports in this category.

(c) What type of "details" was available, such as construction data, performance data, or procurement data? With what did the material primarily deal, such as the status of a developmental project, estimates of the effects of battle damage, aerodynamic tests of models or flight tests of the plane. Did the material relate, primarily, to aerodynamic tests concerned with one type of problem, such as stability, control, landing speed or spin characteristics, or to the overall performance of the plane? If the material or reports dealt with the use of the plane as a test vehicle, what was the purpose of the tests? What classification did the reports bear? Did the NACA, the Air Force, or Lockheed prepare the reports?

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- (a) Had complete set blueprints and diagrams of aerodynamic tests of Bell X-1.
 - (b) The Bell X-1 is a flight research airplane built by the Bell Aircraft Corporation under contract with the Army Air Force. It was a cooperative project to produce a plane capable of equaling or exceeding the speed of sound, with NACA furnishing much of the design It is capable of making flights of very short duration, and is not a serviceable military plane. Developmental work began in 1944. Glide tests (no power) and wind-tunnel tests of models were made in 1946. Flight tests were made in 1947, and in October 1947 the plane flew at a speed exceeding the speed of sound. Tests have continued on the plane to this date, and there is a large quantity of data pertaining to gerodynamic tests.

Three reports dealing with wind-tunnel tests of scale models of the X-1 are attached. They are

mind-Tunnel Tests of a 1/4-Scale Model of the Bell XS-1 Transonic Airplane (Army Project MX-653). II - Lateral and Directional Stabilitary and Control, and

"Force and Longitudinal Comtrol Characteristics of a 1/16-Scale Model of the Bell XS-1 Transonic Research Airplane at High Mach Numbers".

(c) Were the "blueprints" actual construction or shop blueprints or copies thereof, or were they engineers! line drawings showing, to scale, the size, shape, and location of principal components? Were the "blueprints" part of a report or separate documents?

Data was available on what type of aerodynamic tests at what speed or Mach number? Was the data on



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wind-tunnel tests of models, or flight tests of the airplane? (The Mach number or speed at which the tests were preformed is particularly valuable in determining the status of development, and thus the date of the report.)

Did the data relate principally to the complete plane or to component parts, such as power plant, changes in controls to improve stability, etc.?

Further effort is being made to identify the material referred to by the informant. Further elaboration on the allegations made by the informant will be of material assistance to NACA in evaluating the allegations and identifying the material.
