At 7:20 p.m., May 3, 1950, I received a call from Agent I PUBLATS, State Department, calling from his home phone, Newtown 9-8470. IENTERTS raid he had just received orders from his superior to locate Dr. CORSON and pick up his passport and stop him from leaving the country.

LEMNERTS said he understood the Portau had COPSON under surveillance and he desired any information we might have concerning CORSON'S probable time and method of departure in order that he might locate him. I told ! TMNERTS I had no information and would call him back.

After ascertaining that this matter concerned the cactioned case, contacted SI GRANVIIIE who said SA J. R. LURPHY had handled the matter, 'at that no information should be given out without clearance from the Burcau.

SA J. R. MURPHY advised at 8:20 p.m. that he had interviewed CORSON last Friday at which time CORSON was staying at the Statler Notel, from 1715. MURPHY said that CORSON later phoned the office and said he was leaving for Paris today, May 3, 1950, by plane to study at the French Academy of Sciences.

At 8:25 p.m. I furnished the above information to Bureau might procervisor, NEW MOYKIMAN, who referred me to Tr. ENIMONT. Er. ENIMONT said to furnish IENNEPTS with the information re. COLONYS proposed departure, but to first endeavor to identify LEMMERTS as actually being in the State Department. We mentioned that a Pr. CLANK is in charge of that Department in New York City.



SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

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MARRY GOLD furnished a signed statement on 11/1/50 in which he positively identifield a photograph of subject as being the individual who contacted him at his Philadelphia residence in September, 1919 and the one whom he subsequently not on two occasions in October, 1919 in MI.

DETAILS:

The title of this case is being marked changed to reflect the true name of the subject as FILIPP TIKHOSOVICH SARYTCHEV, inasmuch as HARRI GOLD

identified him as the individual who contacted him on several occasions in 1949, as will be hereinafter set forth.

On November 1, 1950, MART GOLD, admitted Soviet espionage agent, furnished the following signed statement:

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"Investigation. I know that I do not have to make any statement and that anything I say may be used against me in a court of law. I also know that I am entitled to benefit of coursel.

"On October 27, 1950, I was shown a picture of an individual whose name is FILIPP TIKHONOVICH EARTTCHEV. I had seen this picture on several eccasions in July and August, 1950. After carefully considering this photograph, I am now completely certain that this is a photograph of the individual that first contacted me at my residence 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on a Saturday evening approximately September 24, 1949.

*Previous to receiving this visit from SARTICREY, I received in the late part of July, 1949, a typewritten note on plain paper (in a plain envelope) postmarked Brooklyn. The envelope did have the words 'St. George Hotel' typewritten on it, although it did not boar the regularly printed betterhead. This letter in substance stated that it was hoped that I was well and that the writer was looking forward to seeing me soon. This note bore the handwritten signature 'JOHH.' I knew at the time I received this letter that a representative of the Soviet Union desired to see me. "JOHN! I have previously identified as ANATOLI A. TAKOVLEY and it was with this Soviet agent that I steadily engaged in espionage on atomic energy from March of 1944 whill late January or early February, 1946. This "letter arrangement" advising me that a representative of Soviet Intelligence desired to see me had been perfected by TAKOVLEY and myself in 1945 during the time that I was in touch with him.

"After receiving this letter and in accordance with previous arrangements that I had made with 'JOHN,' I went to a see food restaurant — bar near the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. At that time, as I recall, I was to go to this restaurant a certain number of days after the date on the letter or on a Sunday following receipt of the letter. In addition to going to this meeting place, I was to have taken with me ene-half of a temporary bill that I had received sometime in the past from ARTHUR M. BHOMAS Company, a laboratory supply house of Philadelphia, Fenngylvania. It was my understanding that my contact for the representative of the Soviets that appeared there would either know me by sight or by picture that he would have seen of me and that I would have been approached in an innocuous fashion. He would have then presented the other half of the Arthur M. Thomas Company bill which would identify my contact to me. At this time I would then present my half of the same bill. However, I had destroyed my half of the bill prior to being called before the Hew York

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Prederal Grand Jury in 1947. In any event I went to the appointed meeting place at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line in late July, 1949. Inasmuch as I was wasure of the hour of the meeting, I spent a short time mear the meeting place at 7 p.m., left the meeting place and returned again at 8 p.m., and then followed the same procedure at both 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. However I was not contacted at this time.

"At 8 p.m. on a Saturday evening about September 24, 1349, the door bell rang at my residence in Philadelphia. At the time my brother #56878 was out for the evening, my father was upstairs asleep, and I had been sleeping on the sofa in the living room. Hhen I answered the door, a stranger, whom I now know to be SARYTCHEV, said 'Is Mr. GOLD here' and then said something in an accent I could not understand. I started to close the door when the man said 'Mr. Harry Gold', I am from John, you remember?' I knew then he was referring to IAEOVLEV, whom I have previously mentioned, when he referred to JOHN. Realizing that SARITCHEV was a Soviet agent, I invited him into my house.

"He immediately asked me who was at home, whereupon I told him about my brother and father as I have previously mentioned. Apparently feeling reasoured SARTICHEV sat down on the sofa in the living room. About the first thing he said to me was 'Iou have material from the doctor?' When he referred to 'the doctor' I knew he was referring to Dr. ELAUS FUCES by the sode name used by 'JORN' and myself in referring to FUCES. I explained that I did not and that I had turned ever the last material from ELAUS FUCES in September, 1965; the recipient of this material being the Soviet agent TAKOVLET. SARTICHEV was strongly under the impression that I had received information on atomic energy from FUCES at some time subsequent to my last meeting with MAKOVLET in September, 1965, and had not had the opportunity to surrender this material to a Soviet representative.

**SARYICHEV then started to berate me for not making the meeting in July, 1949, at the sea food restaurant - bar at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. I explained to him that I had been there, outside the restaurant, but had not been contacted. He explained to me that I was to have gone into the restaurant rather than to have waited outside. It appeared that there was some confusion about the date on which we were to have met in New York.

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Who then mentioned my testimony before the Federal Brand Jury in New York City in 1947 and after some general discussion stated he desired to talk further at a later date with me about this testimony. He also mentioned at this first meeting in September that arrangements would be made between him and me for regular meetings in the future but that for the time being I was 'to lay low.' I believe that although the Soviets expected to use me in the future they were not going to attempt any such use writh it was fully determined whether or not I had been 'compromised' by my testimony before the Yederal Grand Jury.

brought up the fact that A. BROTHLAH (who is a member of the firm of A. Brothman and Associates, Engineers, New York City) had related to me in early August, 1946, about having seen an article in a New York Sunday *Herald Tribune' dated about that time concerning Dr. FUCHS. This article purportedly stated that FUCHS was being detained in Great Britain on suspicion of aspionage. SARTICHLY did not seem perturbed over this information and made

"SARYTCHEY then told me at this first meeting that he would next see me at a time that as near as I can recall was October 5 or 6, 1949 in front of a theater (whose ness I cannot recall) located in the general area of the 74th Street stop of the Cusens - IED subjey. The meeting was set for approximately 9 p.m. at night. He explained that I was to come to New York from Philadelphia for this meeting when I finished work in the late afternoon and was to go/the meeting place and stand outside the theater where he would contact me. I agreed to follow his instructions in this matter and to meet his at the appointed time of 9 p.s. I also recall that in connection with his instructions for this next meeting I was to arrive in New York at least " -two hours before the time of the meeting and to shock earefully for any signs of surveillance before making this meeting. EARTTCHEV talked to me about three-quarters of an hour during the course of our first meeting at my home. When he prepared to leave he had to ask me for directions that would enable him to got back to the Penna. Railroad Station. From this I definitely .. gathered that he was not sequeinted with the ares in which I recided.

Philadelphia General Mospital I took the train from Philadelphia to Mew York at the and then took the Queens - IED subway to get to my meeting place with SARITCHEN outside the theater at the 74th Street step of the Queens - IED subway. After I reached the appointed place at about 9 p.m. I stood in

Front of the thester for a short period of time. Suddenly I saw him standing in a doorway and I approached him. He quickly told me to go back down the street one block, then turn to the left and go in that direction an additional two blocks at which point I was to turn to the left again and walk one block where he would join me. It was obvious to me from this that SARYTUHEV was very eautious in making this meeting. Due to the inclement weather there were few people about and it did not appear that he had anything to worry about in the way of curious bystanders.

*I did as directed in this matter and found MARYRHET waiting for so on the street corner. He immediately launched into a discussion of my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in 1967. Be said that he wanted full details about this at which time I explained her I had testified. In this connection I received the impression that BARYTCHEV was already acquainted with the general facts of my testimony. I do recall his asking how I could explain my use of the mane FRANK ENSELED in dealing with BRUTHAIN, who I proviously mentioned. I told SARITCHEV that in discussing the possibility of any such question by the investigating authorities that I would say to them that I had used the mane of RESSLER serely to evoid my employers at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company finding on that I was holding two lobs. At this time I also gave to MATTURES the manes of FRANK O'ERIEN and Agent SHANNON as being the TEI Agents the guestioned no and in addition I furnished him the names of TICHAS BOWGAY and T. VINCONT QUID as the Prosecutore who questioned as is front of the Grand Jury in New York City. During this second seeting BARYTCHEV asked se whether or not I had ever been questioned since 1947, whether or not ear of my friends in Hiladelphia had been questioned about me mines them. and whether or not I thought that I was being followed at any time. I can w explained to SARTYCHLY that I believed that I was in the clear because I had not been questioned in ever two years. During the conversation while SARITCHEY asked so whother I had obtained any hint from the Great Jury that they know I was involved beyond that with MOMOLAR.

"I replied to the effect that I thought the matter to be ever and done with; and that it seemed to me that I had succeeded in creating the picture of a small, timid, frightened man, who by some set of circumstances had gotten involved in the fringe of industrial espionage — all this some years book. I recall that after I had given this answer SARTCHEY shook his head and smiled giving me the impression that I was wrong in my opinion of the Grand Jury's naiveness. He then stated that in any case I should just 'sit tight' wrill our next meeting by which time he would have thought this matter ever.

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SARTICREY told me that now would be a good time for me to plan on such a thing as an emergency that would require me to leave this country. He did not elaborate too much on this noticing that I was generally upont at this suggestion. He did add that generally it was a good idea to plan for such an eventuality. During this second meeting with SARTICHEY I recall that sometime during the conversation he asked me if I knew anyone who could give information. He did not specify the type of information desired but I do recall that I told him that I did not know any such person. It was during this second meeting that SARTICREY told me that inquiry had been during this second meeting that SARTICREY told me that inquiry had been made about FUCES and that it had been determined that FUCES was well and was "still working with us."

*During the second meeting we conversed together for approximately four hours and I do recall that in spite of the number of questions asked and the number of ensuers I gave, SARITCHEY did not make any motes regarding the matters under discussion. In my opinion SARYTCHEV was a trained interrogator as illustrated by the fact he apparently knew the type of information be was after and he pursued his questioning most diligently and relentlessly. With the exception of one brief stop in one of the stations of the Long Island Rei lroad, this second meeting with SARTYCESY was carried on while walking in the residential streets near the meeting place. Hear the end of the mosting SARITUREY told me be wanted to see me again. He explained that the next meeting would be in order to acquaint me with whatever decision was arrived at regarding both the possible ecosequences of the Grand Jury as well as any future duties I might be asked 🚕 to undertake. I agreed to meet him again. He explained that our next 18,002, meeting would be at 8 p.m. October 23, 1949, outside the ladies' entrance of a bar scross the stript from the 150th Street stop of the Bronx Park - 💸 IRT subway, however I was not to go directly to this meeting place from Penn Station. EARTYCREV told me I was to take the Brook Park - IRT subway to the 174th Street stop at which point I would find that the train I was on had become an elevated line. I was to get off the train at the 174th Street stop, descend to the street level, and then proceed along the right side of the street beneath the elevated toward 177th Street. Then I was to cross the steet beneath the elevated at 177th Street and pass in front of a existeria. In connection with the last, SARITUHEV remarked that someone would be in the window of the cafeteria observing so. After performing the foregoing I was to then ascend the stairs to the 177th Street elevated stop on the uptown side and there take a train to the 180th 🕾 🕾 Street station of the same line. I agreed to follow his instructions in this matter.

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At the time this second secting broke up SARITCREY and I were not near a subway station. In view of the inclement weather and my lack of knowledge of the neighborhood, I took a taxicab to the Forest Hills Station of the IND subway. SARITCHEY accompanied me to this destination in the taxicab and as I did not have enough money to pay for it he volunteered to do so and I permitted him to pay the taxi fare. I did not pay particular attention to SARITCHEY after arriving at this subway station although I do recall that upon leaving me he walked to the direction of females, long Island. I immediately boarded the subway, returned to Perm Station, where I secured a train which returned me to Fhiladelphia, Pennsylvania.

POn October 23, 1949, I left Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in the late afternoon and came to New York by train in order to meet SARTYCHEF \mathbb{R}^2 for the third time. I recall this date in particular as on my way home from this meeting I remember looking at any early edition of the 'Most Tork Daily News' forthe next day, October 24, 1949, which paper carried the story of the football game on October 23, 1969, between the Mew Mork Tankees prefessional football team and the San Francisco 49 are. Upon my arrival in New York I boarded a subway train at Penn Station in erder to make my meeting with EARTTCHEV at the 180th Street - Bronz Park Station of the IRT. In accordance with Instructions given me by SARYTCHEV during our last meeting, I alighted from the train at the 174th Street station, ... walked up on the right-hand side of the street beneath the elevated line as directed and ascended to the elevated platform at the 177th Street - 1 station。 I recall that when passing the exfeteria window as directed I 帝宗经 did not see SARTICHEV there observing me. However, after according this platform I became confused and took the wrong train and did not notice ... this until after I observed that I had gone beyond the 180th Street elevated stop. At this time I alighted from this train and then boarded a downtown train that took me back to the 177th Street stop. At the 177th Street station I boarded the proper train, which took me to the 180th Street-Bronz Park stop of the IRT. After alighting from this train I descended to the street and went and stood outside the ladies! estrance of a near-by bar as SARYTCHEV had instructed so to do. As near as I can recall I reached the appointed meeting place at approximately 🔆 جائز چيون نور اين کام

"After standing at this stop for about ten minutes (and while on the point of departing) I saw SARTTCHEV approaching me. After he had some up to me we started walking in the neighborhood of the meeting place and walked continuously during the entire period of time that we were together with the exception of a short time that we sat momentarily together

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"on a bonch near the street. He told me that he had been delayed but offered no further explanation. At the very outset of this meeting BARYTCHEV told me that for the next year or two it was not contemplated that I would resume espionage activities for the Boviet Union. He was specific in saying "Forget all that occurred in the past, put it completely out of your mind." He said that I was to just continue working and living normally and in as mostrusive a memor as possible. He said this was an order.

FRENT SAFTICHEY discussed with me the matter of my plotting a route whereby I could effect an exit from this country possibly by boat. Then I recall that he pointed out to me during this discussion that this could be easily handled by my leaving the United States, going very temporarily to Mexico first and then briefly going to Scuth America. Then I was to eventually go to one of the countries in Europe. I construed this to mean one of the Iron Curtain countries and not Soviet Rusda itself. I cannot recall the exact remark made by SARTICHEY, but I do remember that he stated my ultimate destiny was to be one of the Eastern countries 'friendly to the Soviet Union.' In connection with this conversation he also mentioned that there would be planty of money, 'on the order of thousands of dollars' evailable for me for this travel. He gave me no indication as to when or how I was to leave the United States. I was horrified and practically speechless at this suggestion of leaving this country and my family although I did 'give lip service' to these suggestions of SARYICHEY.

"SARYTCHEY then discussed with me the matter of arranging regular and emergency moetings for the future. He explained that the regular meetings were for the primary purpose of enabling the Soviets to verify that I had not been arrested (presumably by the Americans). However, he did not give me any explanation as to any definite reason he night have had for believing that I might be arrested. He explained that the emergency meetings were to be arranged in order that we might contact each other ... should any suspicious circumstances arise that made it advisable for ene party to contact the other. He explained to me that such regular meetings were to be held every mother month beginning with the month of December, 1969, and that in every case the regular meeting would be at 10 a.m. on the first Bunday of the month. As Barytohev appeared uncertain as to where such regular meetings were to be held I suggested that they could be held on the street corner beneath the 90th Street station or Elekurst Avenue station of the Queens - IR? elevated. It was mutually agreed that this spot was acceptable for regular meetings.

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"In connection with recognition signals to be used at these "follows regular meetings it was agreed that I should make a curved-stem pipe while the Soviet representative would smoke a cigar. However, additional detailed arrangements were made for these regular meetings. I distinctly recall the exact arrangement made in this matter. In the event I had mothing to discuss with the person the would possibly be there to contact me. I was to merely stand on the corner near the newstand; which corner walks was part of a traffic island at the foot of the elevated stairs (on the side of the elevated going to Flushing. This was designated as my corner. I also distinctly recall that one of the corners beneath this elevated stop was designated as the 'contact's corner' and was to be used by the Soviet representative in the event that individual merely wished to chserve me and had nothing to sayto me. The 'contact's corner' was designated as being directly adross the street from me but still on the side of the elevated going to Flushing. However, should I desire to indicate to the contact that I had some information for him I would stand on the 'contact's corner' and wait there wrill the contact approached me. On the other hand, should the contact desire to talk to me he would some to my corner of the intersection and there approach me. In any event the contact approaching me would have in addition to the recognition signal of the cigar previously mentioned the following words to say to me, "Cam you direct me to the Horace Harding Hospital.! I was to reply, 'Ies, I'm going that way. Come along with me.

The connection with these 'regular meetings' I distinctly recall that SARTICHEV also gave me further instructions. He impressed on me that I should come to New York late the night before (that is on Saturday night before the meeting) and spend the time wandering around New York City never staying too long in one spot. The morning of the meeting I was to go past the regular meeting place one hour or so in advance and if I observed any signs of surveillance or snything of a suspicious nature than I was not to attempt to make the meeting at the appointed time. In the event I did not make the regular meeting because of either of the foregoing I was to weit until I heard from thom. I do not recall receiving those same instructions from SARTICHEV in the event I deemed it undesirable to make one of the coargency meetings.

energency meetings and as he did not effer any practical concrete suggestions I advanced the following plan which was accepted by him. It was agreed that should I desire to contact the Soviets in an emergency I was to come to New York and personally insert an advertisement in the 'Situations Santed' section of the 'New York Times' in the early part of the week.

This advartisement would read in substance 'Biochemist, age 32, MD, desires position in industry or research. Good record of accomplishment. Quality of work principle interest.' In addition to placing this ad personally, I was to give the name and address of an actual person which name and address were to be chosen by me from the New York Telephone Directory with instructions to the newspaper that any responses to the ad were to be held by the paper. This was to indicate to the Soviets that I desired a meeting with a representative of theirs at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the placing of this ad.

"Should the Soviets desire to contact me they would send to me at my place of employment, the Philadelphia General Hospital, by first class mail a book entitled "Chemistry of the Carbohydrates" ex"Further Advances in Carbohydrate Chemistry" by R. OCEPP and E.E. PICKIE. I thought this would be a particularly foolproof method for them to communicate with me insemuch as this book was a technical publication which sold vary few copies each year and was, in addition, very expensive (about £9 a volume) and the chances of my receiving such a book by mistake were extremely remote. It was agreed that I would understand that the receipt of such a book by me was to signify that a representative of the Ecvieta demired an emergency meeting with me also at I p.m. on the Sunday following the receipt of this book by me.

"After this had been decided SARTICREY explained to me where the emergency meeting would be held. The area described by him was and is strange to me. As I recall the emergency meeting place was in New Rochelle, New York. SARTTUREY explained the New Rochelle Railroad Station was bordered on one side by a small park through which park extended a path to a nearby boardwalk or promended. He said this particular path extended from the station directly through the middle of the park and ended on the boardwalk or promonade elosely adjacent to what (on the boardwalk) was a shelter or bench protected from the weather. In the event of an energency meeting, and this secting would be held to the right of the shelter or beamh. EARYTCHEN indicated to me that it was very likely that he would not be at this energency meeting place and as a consequence recognition signals were agreed upon. It was agreed that the Visual recognition signals, of the surved-atom pipe and the eight, which it will be recalled were used in connection with the regular meeting, were also to be used in connection with emergency meetings. Although I disagreed, SARYTCHEV insisted that the verbal recognition signal concerning the directions to the Ecrace Harding Hospital (used in connection with the regular sectings) should also be used at these emergency meetings as a further means of identification.

plans SARITCHEV sade a few brief notes on all the salient points of the two classes of meetings. He used the back of an envelope for this but I was unable to see the front or address surface of this envelope. After talking with me for approximately one and a half hours CARITCHEV told me that he had nothing to further discuss with me. At this point we were in a meighborhood strange to me. After advising me that he had nothing further to discuss with me, SARITCHEV merely turned and laft me. I had no idea at to where I was and did not even have an idea as to the direction in which the elevated lay. I merely started walking and finally came to an elevated station (which one I cannot recall). I boarded an elevated train at this point and returned to Penn Station. Immediately following this I secured a train that returned me to Thiladelphia.

"In order to make my regular December, 1919, mosting with the : Soviets, I left Fhiladelphia early in the morning the first Sunday in angle Lecember, 1949, and traveled to New York City. Altieuch this was in direct dischedience to the instructions given me by EARYTGHEV that I should leave thiladelphia the night before in order to make such regular : meetiags, I left Philadelphia on Sunday morning in order to avoid friction at home. Following my arrival in New York I traveled by submay to the 90th Street or Elaburst Avenue station, arriving at this point at approximately 10 a.m. After arriving at this station I went to the street corner beneath this elevated line that was the proper corner for me to be on when I had no desire to commissio with my contact. After remaining on this corner for approximately twenty minutes, and as I was not contacted, I will secured a taxical from a mearby call stand and was driven by this cal to the Receivelt Avenue - Jackson Heights station of the Queens - IED elevated line. My use of this taxicab was for the sole purpose of making better time and was not a device used to forestall any surveillance of up. After reaching this elevated stop I boarded a New York bound elevated train and after my return to Penn Station secured a train that returned me to Philadelphia. · Pennsylvania. During my attendance at this meeting place I did not observe anyone that appeared to be interested in me. ...

Sunday in February, 1950, I read that Dr. KLAUS FUGHE, the British scientist with whom I had dealt in the past (in connection with stonic energy espionege on behalf of the Soviets), had been arrested by the British authorities for espionage activity for the Soviets. I became extremely concerned ever this but as my next regular meeting was scheduled for a Sunday following the arrest of FUGHS, I did nothing in the way of attempting to use the 'emergency meeting' method to contact the Soviets.

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to New York by train and after my arrival in Penn Station secured a submay to go to my regular meeting place at the 90th Street station or Elmhurst Avenue stop. After arriving at the meeting place I remained for several minutes on the location designated as 'my corner'; then becoming panicky I crossed ever to my 'contact's corner.' After remaining on this corner for about five minutes I recrossed to my corner, remained several minutes, and then recrossed again to my 'contacts's corner.' Finally after some twenty minutes elapsed and I had not been contacted by a Soviet representative I gave up hope of any meeting. during the time that I was at this regular meeting place in February, 1950. Insumuch as I know my contact would be snoking a cigar, I carefully observed all the people that passed me in an effort to put myself in a position that I could be approached by my contact. I might add that as agreed with the transmit I was snoking my curved-stem pipe so that my contact would recognize me. I was not contacted by a representative of the Soviets at this meeting place in February, 1950; however, I do recall having seen a picture of Julius Rosenberg in the Philadelphia papers and after later viewing his picture as well as other photographs submitted to me by Special Agent 3000 J. O'ELIM, Federal Eureau of Investigation, New York City, I am now peak tive that I did see Julius Rosenberg at my regular meeting place in February, 1950. However, as I mentioned, neither ROSENERU nor any representative of the Soviets approached me.

FI did not go to the regular monthly meeting place on the first Sunday in April, 1750. I was never contacted by SARTRHEV following my last meeting with him on October 23, 1949, in the vicinity of the 180th Street stop of the Bronx - IkT subway. Juring my contacts with SARTYCHEV this individual did not give as any money for any purpose other than having paid my taxi fare on one eccasion as I previously mentioned.

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

The PR-1 form of IRAIDA IVANOVNA SAMYCHEVA reflects that she entered the United States on September 29, 1946, at Boston, Massachusetts, on the SS MARSHALL GOVOROV and that she was the wife of a Mr. F. SARYCHEV who was an employee of the Soviet Representation to the UNO. Her residence address was given as 123 West 90th Street, New York, New York, It would appear that this is the wife of FILIPP SARYCHEV for whom a PR-1 form apparently was not filed.

SERGEI PETROVICH SEDOV

The PR-1 form concerning this individual reflects that he was born July 4, 1915, at Perkino, USSR, and first entered the United States on January 18, 1945, at Seattle, Washington, aboard the SS DVINA. 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Inquiry at the office at 123 west 90th Street revealed that the present owners and managers have had the building only several months. They referred the reporting agent to the former agent and former superintendent, to be named hereinafter.

FRANK OLIVEES, 108 West 90th Street, former superintendent at 123 West 90th Street, and his wife advised that they were employed at this address for a period of about eighteen months until approximately January, 1951. Both advised that the name SARYICHEV is unfamiliar to them. OLIVEES stated that BARYICHEV and his wife's photographs are also unfamiliar to him. However, Hrs. CLIVEES stated that the photograph of SARYICHEV's wife appears vaguely familiar to her and that it is her impression that the woman was an occasional visitor at the KRISTELLER apartment during the period when she and her husband worked in the building.

BENJAMIN SHERER, 216 West 102nd Street, advised that he had been agent for the owner of the buildings at 123 and 125 West 90th Street from April, 1949 until January, 1951. He and the reporting agent examined his records for that period, spartment by apartment, for the two buildings without finding SARYTCHEV's name listed and without finding listed any other name which appeared to be Russian with the exception of one FODOR, occupying apartment 1E at 125 West 90th Street. Mr. SHERER stated that the name SARITCHPV is unfamiliar to him. When shown photographs of SARYTCLEV and his wife, he stated that SARYTCHEV's vife does not appear familiar to him but that the photograph of SANYTCHEV seems veguely familiar to him. He said that the person he had in mind as resembling SaRYICHEV had seemed to him to be Spanish. Kr. SHURER referred the reporting agent to the former superintendent, JOHN HINZ.

JOHN J. HINZ, 235 West 103rd Street, advised that he had been superintendent of the buildings at 123 and 125 West 90th Street, along with two or three other buildings in the block, during the years 1948 and 1949. He stated that the made SARYTCHEV was unfamiliar to him and that because of the transient character of the tenants and the number of buildings he had to attend to, he knew very few of the tenants except by sight. He pointed out, however, that photographs

of both SARYTCHEV and his wife are familiar to him as those of tenants occupying, he believed, a third floor apartment at 125 West-90th Street, and not at 123 West 90th Street, as had been previously indicated. He stated that the persons he is referring to moved out not lone after he became superintendent. He recalls that SARYTCHEV dressed as a chauffeur, and on several occasions had parked a black automobile near the apartment. He said that it was his recollection that the SARYTCHEVS had two children and second to be very quiet tenants, about whom he recalls nothing unusual. He stated that he did not know any of their associates and added that they did not mingle at all with any of their neighbors. He said that they might be known by sight, however, to Mrs. (CDUR, and to the tenant whose name he does not recall, but who occupies apartment lW at 125 West 90th Street. He said that he doubts whether any other tenants would recall the SARYTCHEVS.

Confidential Informant T-1 and T-2, both of known reliability, and both in a position to know past and present occupants of the buildings at 123 and 125 west 90th Street, stated that the name SANYICHEV is completely unfamiliar and stated that photographs shown them of SANYICHEV and his wife are not familiar.

Mrs. EMILIO RODRIGUEZ, tenent, apartment 3R, 123 hest 90th Street; CHANLES HECKINGPH, apartment 1k, 125 West 90th Street; and DAVID HERBIRT KRISTILLER, 121 Bennet Avenue, New York City, formerly a tenent at 123 West 90th Street, all stated that SARYICHEV and his wife are unknown to them by name or photograph.

Records of the Heal Estate Soard of New York, 12 East 41st Street, reflect that the owner of the premises at 123 and 125 West 90th Street, for the period from 1941 to 1951 was Mrs. AGNES LAWLER of 225 West End Avenue.

Mrs. AGRES LAWLER, 225 West ind Avenue, verified that she had been owner of the indicated premises for the period . ¿ stated, but pointed out that she had, probably in March, 1947,

leased the buildings at both addresses to Mrs. ANNA SEGAL, telephone number CLoverdale 2-7813, who operated the buildings thereafter, until she gave up the lease and moved to -- Brooklyn. Mrs. LAWLER advised that the name SARYTCHEV is unfamiliar to her and photographs of SARYTCHEV and his wife are equally unfamiliar.

The current Brooklyn telephone directory reflects that Mrs. AMNA SEGAL of 2016 Avenue N. Brooklyn, New York, has telephone number CLoverdale 2-7813 listed her.

Residents at 153 Manhattan Avenue

A review of the Manhattan telephone directory by addresses for the years 1948 to date reflects no telephone listed in the name SARYTCHEV or any other name which appears to be Russian for that period, nor is any unlisted or restricted telephone indicated at that address for the period indicated.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability and who, for a period of about six years, has been in a position to know the various tenants at the above address, stated that the SARYTCHEVS are unknown to him by name or by photographs. He suggested inquiry of ALMERT HOUCK, the superintendent, whom he described as reliable.

ALBERT SOUCK, superintendent, advised that in addition to information previously furnished, he recalls that in the early spring of 1950, he observed SARITCHEV and another Russian carrying down from apartment 51, five or six large, heavy footlockers which they loaded into official Soviet automobiles. At that time he asked SARITCHEV if they were moving cut and was told brusquely, "When we move out, I will let you know".

He stated that several weeks after that, he was surprised to learn from another tenant, that the SARYICHEV spartment was vacant and standing open. He discovered that SARYICHEV and his family had moved out, apparently suddenly, and without any notice, leaving furniture in the spartment.

The furniture left behind, however, he said, was very sparse and of slight value. He pointed out, however, that they had never seemed to have any furniture except the barest essentials.

Be recalled that SARYTCHEV, although speaking good English, was very reserved and seemed to be suspicious of everyone. He said that visitors seemed never to be velcome in their apartment except for other Russians. There were never any complaints concerning service and no requests to repair utilities.

Every morning about 8:00, SARYTCHEV would leave the apartment and return in a few minutes with an official Soviet limousine. Another man, also a chauffeur, usually returned with him driving a second official Soviet automobile. The two men often had breakfast in the SARYTCHEV apartment, occasionally went for and returned with processes, and then loaded Mrs.

BARYTCHEV, another woman, and the children of both women, into the two automobiles and drove off.

HOUCK stated that he normally then would see nothing of SANYICHEV or the others until the following morning when the same procedure would be repeated.

He said that the second woman referred to seemed to him to be the sister or sister-in-law of SARYTCHEV, but pointed out that he did not know her name and supposed such a relationship merely because she lived in the apartment there with the SARYTCHEVS. He stated, however, that he did not detect any family resemblance of the woman to either SARYTCHEV or his wife.

He stated that after the SARYICHEVS left, the Consolidated Edison collectors appeared, indicating that the SARYICHEVS had moved out leaving utilities unpaid for.

HOUCK advised that he knows of no efforts at all on the part of SARYTCHEV or his wife to reserve their apartment for anyone else at the time they left. He stated that HARRY WINSTON, a barber, was introduced into apartment 51 very shortly after the SARYTCHEVS departure at his own request, they being friends of his. He stated that the WINSTONS have no connection with the SARYTCHEVS of any kind.

ROLANDO RCCA, his wife ELSIE, and the latter's stepfather, FRANK BERRA, all of apartment 44, advised that the

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name SARTICHEV was unknown to them, but immediately recognized photographs of both SARTICHEV and his wife as those of the tenants who occupied apartment 51 for a period of about a year until the spring of 1950. They stated that another Russian couple, name unknown, had occupied apartment 51 for approximately one year before the SARYTCHEVS appeared and lived in the apartment with the SARYTCHEVS for an additional period of approximately six menths before they disappeared.

They described the unknown man as follows:

Mr. and Mrs. HOCA and Mr. SURM continued saying that the unknown couple care to live there with a blonde girl of four or five years and had a son, born to them while living there. They stated that the unknown man was frequently away from the apartment, sometimes for extended periods to the extent that it might be doubtful whether he was the partner or spouse of the unknown woman.

They pointed out also that especially during the early period of residence by the SanYTTHEVS and the others in the building, a:n u mable re of Russians care and went, in the often with valises, giving the appearance that they were staying there at least for short periods. They recalled that SARYTCHEV and the unknown man were frequently moving boxes and crates in and out of the apartment, and they had the impression that shortly before the SARYTCHEVS disappearance, furniture and other postassions were moved out in heavy boxes or crates. They recalled that these boxes were moved out by SARY/CHEV and another Russian man without any apparent outside help. Records of the Real Estate Board of New York, 12 East 41st Street, reflect that the owner of the premises at 123 and 125 West 90th Street, for the period from 1941 to 1951 was Mrs. AGNES LAWLER of 225 West End Avenue.

hrs. ACNES LAWLER, 225 West Find Avenue, verified that she had been owner of the indicated premises for the pariod stated, but pointed out that she had, probably in March, 1947,

leased the buildings at both addresses to Mrs. ANNA GrGAL; telephone number Cloverdale 2-7813, who operated the buildings thereafter, until she gave up the lease and moved to Brooklyn. Mrs. LAMLLR advised that the name S.RITCHEV is unfamiliar to her and photographs of SARLTHEV and his wife are equally unfamiliar.

The current Brooklyn telephone directory reflects that Mrs. Add CuGAL of 2016 Avenue N. Brooklyn, New York, has telephone number Chaverdale 2-7813 listed her.

Residents at 153 Manhattan Avenue

A review of the Manhattan telephone directory by addresses for the years 1948 to date reflects no telephone listed in the name SARYTCHLV or any other name which appears to be Russian for that period, nor is any unlisted or restricted telephone indicated at what address for the period indicated.

Confidential informant 8-3, of known reliability and who, for a period of about six years, has been in a mosition to know the various tenants at the above address, stated that the SARIFCHEVS are unknown to him by name or by photographs. He suggested inquiry of ALMERT HOUGH, the superintendent, whom he described as reliable.

ALL PI MERCA, superintendent, advised that in addition to information previously furnished, he recalls that in the early spring of 1950, he observed SARMCLEV and another Russian corrying down from apartment 51, live or six large, heavy footlockers which they loaded into official Soviet althropiles. At that time he asked SARMICHLV if they were moving out and was told bruspay, "Then we move out, I will let you know".

He stated that several weeks after that, he was surprised to learn from another tenant, that the Santicher apartment was vacant and standing open. It discovered that Santicher and his family had moved out, apparently suddenly, and without any notice, leaving furniture in the apartment.

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___ The furniture left tehind, however, he enid, was very sparse and of slight value. He pointed out, however, that they had never __ seemed to have any furniture except the barest essentials.

He recalled that SARYTCHLY, although speaking good English, was very reserved and second to be suspicious of everyone. He said that visitors second never to be welcome in their apartment except for other Russians. There were never any complaints concerning service and no requests to repair utilities.

Every morning about 8:00, SARYTOREV would leave the spartment and return in a few minutes with an official Soviet limousine. Another man, also a chauffeur, usually returned with him driving a second official Soviet automobile. The two men often had breakfast in the SARYTOREV apartment, occasionally went for and returned with groceries, and then loaded Mrs. SARYTOREV, another woman, and the children of both women, into the two automobiles and drove of.

H.UCK stated that he normally then would see nothing of SANYTCLEV or the others until the following morning when the same procedure would be repeated.

He said that the second woman referred to seemed to him to be the sister or sister-in-law of SARYTChEV, but pointed out that he did not know her name and supposed such a relationship merely because she lived in the apartment there with the SARYTCHLVS. He stated, however, that he did not detect any family resemblance of the woman to either "RAYTCHLV or his wife.

He stated that after the SARTICHEVS left, the Consolidated adjace collectors appeared, indicating that the SARTICHEVE had moved out leaving utilities unpaid for.

HOUCK advised that he knows of no efforts at all on the part of SARYTCHEV or his wife to reserve their apartment for anyone else at the time they left. He stated that HARRY WINSTON, a harber, was introduced into apartment 51 very shortly after the SARYTCHEVS deterture at his own request, they being friends of his. He stated that the WINSTONS have no connection with the SARYTCHEVS of any kind.

ROLANDO ROCA, his wife ELSIE, and the latter's stepfather. FRANK SERRA, all of apartment 44, advised that the

name PANTIC ELV was unknown to them, but immediately recognized photographs of both a BYTC: EV and his wife as those of the tenants who occupied apartment 51 for a period of about a year until the spring of 1950. They stated that another Bussian couple, name unknown, had occupied apartment 51 for approximately one year before the BARYICHLVO appeared and lived in the apartment with the PARYICHLVO for an additional period of approximately six months before they disappeared.

They described the unknown man as follows:

They stated that the unknown man was frequently away from the apartment, senttimes for extended periods to the extent that it might be doubtful whether he was the partment or spause of the unknown woman.

They pointed out also that especially during the early period of rusidence by the Same days and the others in the building, a numbers of sussians came and went. often with valises, giving the appearance that they were staying there at least for short periods. They recalled that Significative and the unknown man were frequently moving boxes and crates in and out of the apartment, and they had the impression that shortly before the SalaiCHLVS Misappearance, furniture and other pospessions have moved out in heavy boxes or crates. They recalled that these boxes were moved out by Suffice V and another dussian man without any apparent cutside help. They believed that SARATHLY and his wife, and other Tuesdans in apartment 51, frequently boucht plotographic film at the incleader and ledge increases the street. 

This report sets forth a lead to identify and interview SAM HIRSH-LAND, I Edgecliff Place, Ithica, New York, concerning his knowledge of and association with MAX INVESTORE and also to obtain his explanation as to the identity of the sender of the telegram which was signed "JOHN" and sent to HIRSHEAD from the residence of FINESTOME in New York City on May 28, 1950. It was also requested that it be appear tained whom he must on the 2:15 plane in Ithaca on May 28, 1950.

The files of the Albany Office contain no record of HIRSHIAND. Investigation at Ithaca, New York, reflects the following:

HIPSHEARD, whose full name is Sabush Lips AlasHLAND, attended Cornell University in the College of Arts and Sciences up until the time of his graduation on June 19, 1951. His file in the Registrar's Office reflects that his residence upon admission was 25th and High Streets. Reading, Pennsylvania, and the address of his father, ROY Pr HIRSH-LAND, was listed as PO Box Th99, Reading. HIRSHLAND'S last known. address, according to records in the Alumni Office, is 507 North 26th Street, Reading.

With further reference to HIRSHIAND, information was previously Proceived from 18 16 16 16 Director of Sofety Cornell University, that he was a roommate of JOHN NAWQUSEE at Zeta Reta Tau traternity, I Edgecliff Place, and also at 312 Park Place, Ithaca. WARTITEE, who also graduated from Cornell University this most dame but is still in Ithaca, is the subject of investigation by this office and has been recommended for inclusion in the Security Index. An unevaluated report received from an outside source in Brussels by the Department of State (of unknown reliability) and transmitted to the Bureau advised that "John MARQUESEL, The American delegate to the Congress of the World Federation of Democratic Youth, held in Prague on August 15, 1950, was one of two persons submitting a report to the First Cominform Bureau during the Congress, which report claims that Communist Propragunda, and particularly the Stockholm appeal, has been successful among American students, especially in the medical schools and hospitals and in the industry manufacturing sanitary and pharmoceutical supplies."

This same source advised that the author of this report was reportedly one "BILL GRAY" (prendonym), a colleague of RARGUSEE, Hungarian born and who had been a Soviet agent in the United States for many years. Investigation has failed to identify "BILL GRAY".

HIRSHLAND was MARQUSED, whose residence is in New York City, and who most probably sent the telegram while visiting MAX PIESTONE'S apartment. JAMES DU GESC, a former employee of MOGH and ANNA CHAFFIN, step-father and mother respectively, of MAX RIMESTONE, has advised that MARQUSEF's an acquaintance of FIESTONE. The CHAFIN'S operate a furniture upholstery business in Ithmen under the nose of "S. FIESTONE".

It is prograted that the Philadelphia Office interview HIRSHLAND along the lines suggested in referenced report, although it seems most possible that the signer of the telegram is identical with MARQUEE. If any information of value is developed concerning MARQUEE, it is requested that such be reported to this office under the caption "JOHN MARQUEE; SECURITY MATTER - C", Albert file [17,71133], Bufile 199271131.

The source of this information was State Department cable from Noscow to Washington dated September 2t, 1945, which listed sixteen Soviet delegates to this conference. It is not known whether the 0/I. BASSOVA listed in this cable is identical with OLGA IVANOVNA BASSOVA.

There was no proord at the Biographic Information Section concerning ANNA BASCOVA nor was there any identifiable information concerning VERA V. OUSPENSKY.

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



Mrs. ANNA SEGAL, 2016 Avenue N, Apartment 5H, advised that she acquired the interest as lessee in the premises at 123 and 125 West 90th Street, in late 1946 or early 1947. She said that she has no records for the period but recalls that the SARYTCHEVS lived in an apartment at 123 West 90th Street, at the time she acquired her interest and stayed there at the most six months before moving out. She said that she knew the SARYTCHEVS only slightly and had dealings with SARYTCHEV himself on only one or two occasions. She stated that she saw SARYTCHEV'S wife more frequently and saw her often in the company of Russian tenants of hers at 141 West 90th Street, on the ground floor.

Mrs. SEGAL was shown photographs of SARYTCHEV and his wife as well as photographs of GRIGORT IVANOVICH KUZMIN, ZINAIDA IVANOVNA KUZMINA, MARINA IVANOVNA KUZMINA, VASILI ALEISEEVICH LAVRENOV, ZINAIDA GEORGIEVNA LAVRENOVA, IVAN ALEKSANDROVICH FILIPPOV, ALEKSANDRE DEMIYANOVICH KABANOV, VERA LEONTYEVNA KABANOVA, all of whom are listed as Soviet chauffeurs and their wives or possibly other family members.

Mrs. SEGAL advised that KUZMIN definitely was a tenant of hers at lul West 90th Street on the ground floor and that his wife or at least the woman living there as his wife was the woman who was particularly friendly with SARYTCHEVA and on one occasion spoke of her as a relative. She recalled that KUZMINA inquired about the possibility of securing an apartment for the SARYTCHEVS at 141 West 90th Street.

Mrs. SEGAL found a photograph of MARINA KUZMINA unfamiliar and said that the photograph of ZINAIDA KUZMINA seemed to be that of the wife of her tenant except that she seemed to be older and heavier. She recalled that the name KUZMIN seemed familiar and seemed to fit the tenant she has in mind and remembered that they had two small girls and that the wife and children

were possibly only the two children who were supposed to have sailed from New York for Hussia on board the ship-Batory at apparently the same time that GERHARDT EISLER fled the United States on that ship.

Mrs. SEGAL recalled that the SARYTCHEVS made no effort to reserve their apartment for anyone else and had the impression that they moved out rather suddenly. She recalled that the SARYTCHEVS had one child and that Mrs. SARYTCHEV was pregnant when they left the apartment. She stated that it is her impression that the second child was born elsewhere. She recalled that SARYTCHEV may have been a chauffeur and remembered hearing from neighbors that a big limousine, which she glimpsed only once, daily took the Russian children away to school and was often used in taking the Russian families to the country weekends.

Mrs. SEGAL advised that the photograph of LAVRENOV seemed familiar to her, as did the name itself, and that he may have been the tall blond Russian tenant of hers on the third floor at 143 West 90th Street. She remembered that this individual seemed to have nothing to do with any of the other Russians in the neighborhood. She said that the photograph of FILIPPOV also seemed vaguely familiar as did that of KABANOV. She said that she knows nothing about FILIPPOV and had the impression that KABANOV was never a tenant, but at most an occasional visitor to other Russians in the neighborhood.

MORTIMER V. LITT, Real Estate Broker, 136 East 93rd Street, advised that he remembers SARYTCHEV as a tenant in Apartment 51 at 153 Manhattan Avenue, who resided there when he took over the building in early 1949 until he surrendered the lease about the end of April 1950. He advised that leases available show that SARYTCHEV originally leased the apartment August 1, 1948 from the Real Estate Agency of SOL COHEN to whose family he is related by marriage. He stated that he saw SARYTCHEV only once when he came to the office to give up the apartment accompanied by YURI SOKOLOV, he was shown photographs of SARYTCHEV, which he described as probably those of a man accompanying SOKOLOV and described

the man as follows: 29-35 years of age; 5' 10" tall; light brown hair; fairly thick; rangy, athletic; typical Russian general appearance; hands well cared for. He stated that he was unable to remember further details of SARYTCHEV'S description, but emphasized -- - that the SARYTCHEV he knew was at least as tall as SOKOLOV and probably over 5' 10".

It is noted that the description available for YURI SOKOLOV indicates that he is 5' 10" to 5' 11" tall, weighing 180-190 pounds, of heavy build.

Mr. LITT further stated that he has no recollection of any effort on SARYTCHEV'S part or on the part of SOKOLOV on SARYTCHEV'S behalf to reserve the apartment for anyone else. He stated that on the contrary, he, LITT, was anxious to transfer the apartment to some other Russian to avoid having to give back to SARYTCHEV a deposit of approximately \$100, which had originally been given as security at the time the lease was signed. He stated that he had suggested such a transfer, but has no recollection of any interest on SARYTCHEV'S part in such a transfer.

Mr. LITT stated that SOKOLOV appeared to be acting as interpreter and general representative for SARYTCHEV and it is his recollection that SARYTCHEV was supposed to know but little anglish. He stated that at the time, however, he had the impression that SARYTCHEV understood anglish better than SOKOLOV'S presence at the transaction would indicate. Mr. LITT stated that he required SARYTCHEV to execute a receipt for the deposit which he returned to him and carefully compared his signature thereon with the signature on the lease to avoid the danger of giving the deposit to the wrong person. He stated that these signatures would be available if needed.

CHARLES SCHREIBER, Manager, Sol Cohen Real Estate Agency, 159 East 92nd Street, New York, advised that he remembers SARYTCHEV very clearly, although he knows very little about him. A check of his records reflected

that Apartment 51 at 153 manhattan Avenue, was originally rented by a yearly lease issued September 1, 1945 to NIKOLAI EASSOV of the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission, 210 Madison Avenue. He stated that from appearances and from the limited conversations he had held with SARYTCHEV, it is his impression that SARYTCHEV seemed to be nothing more than an ordinary fellow and probably a typical chauffeur.

Confidential Informant T-3, another Governmental Agency possessing personnel records, identifies more fully the persons named above by Mr. SCHREIBER as follows:

NIKOLAI V. CUSPENSKY, an Amtorg employee departed from New York City June 15, 1947, aboard the SS Rossia accompanied by his wife, TANIA OUSPENSKAIA, and their child, TURY.

SERGEI DANILOVICH SIDOROV, who also resided at ll East 61st Street and 3 West 108th Street, New York City, arrived in the United States May 14, 1946 aboard the SS Rossia and departed from New York City on July 6, 1949. He was born September 16, 1912, at Nizhnedevich, USSR. His wife was ANASTASIA ALEKSEEVNA, also an Amtorg employee, and mother of their son, VASILI, and their daughter, TAMARA.

ALBERT HOUCK, Superintendent, 153 Manhattan Avenue, was shown photographs of the following Russians: ZINAIDA IVANOVNA KUZMINA, TAMARA VASILIEVNA SIDOROVA, NATALIA LAVRENTIVNA NISOVA, GRIGORI IVANOVICH KUZMIN, ANASTASIA ALEKSEEVNA SIDOROVA, NIKOLAI DMITRIEVICH BASSOV, FEDOR ANDREEVICH NISOFF, SERGEI DANILOVICH SIDOROV. HOUCK stated that he found the photographs of SIDOROV and KUZMIN familiar, but is confident that neither live in the building. He stated that he also believes that SCKOLOV visited the building on several occasions, but did not live there. He stated that the photograph of NISOVA is also familiar to him and that he believes that he has seen her with her children in the neighborhood in recent weeks.

FREDERICK WEISS, druggist, Manhattan Avenue at 108th Street, was also shown the photographs of the persons listed above, and he advised that none of the persons represented seemed familiar to him with the exception of SIDOROV and SIDOROVA. He stated that they may have been customers but that he knows nothing further about them and has not seen them recently.





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

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"Investigation. I know that I do not have to make any statement and that anything I say may be used against me in a court of law. I also know that I am entitled to benefit of counsel.

*On October 27, 1950, I was shown a picture of an individual whose name is FILIPP TIKHONOVICH HABSTORMS. I had seen this picture on several occasions in July and August, 1950. After carefully considering this photograph, I am now completely certain that this is a photograph of the individual that first contacted me at my residence 6823 Kindred Street, Shiladelphia, Fennsylvania, on a Saturday evening approximately September 25, 1969.

Previous to receiving this visit from SMMTCHEV, I received in the late part of July, 1949, a typewritten note on plain paper (in a plain envelope) postarked brooklyn. The envelope did have the words 'St. George Hotel' typewritten on it, although it did not bear the regularly printed betterhead. This letter in substance stated that it was hoped that I was well and that the writer was looking forward to seeing we soon. This note bord the handwritten signature 'JOHE.' I know at the time I received this letter that a representative of the Soviet being desired to see me. "JCHN! I have previously identified as ANGTOLI A. TAKOVLEV and it was with this Soviet agent that I stendily engaged in espionage on atomic energy from March of 1944 until late January or early february, 1846. This 'letter arrangement' advising me that a representative of Soviet Intelligence desired to see me had been perfected by TAKOVLEV and myself in 1945 during the time that I was in touch with him.

Mafter receiving this letter and in accordance with previous arrangements that I had made with 'JONE,' I want to a sea food restaurant — bar near the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. At that time, as I recell, I was to go to this restaurant a certain number of days after the date on the letter or on a Sunday following receipt of the letter. In addition to going to this meeting place, I was to have taken with se one—half of a temperary bill that I had received sometime in the past from ARTHUR E. TIOMAS Company, a laboratory sumply house of Philadelphia, Fennaylvania. It was my understanding that my contact for the representative of the Soviets that appeared there would either know me by sight or by picture that he would have seen of me and that I would have been approached in an innocuous fashion. He would have then presented the other half of the latting I would then present my half of the same vill. However, I had destroyed my half of the bill prior to being called before the New York



"Federal Grand Jury in 1947. In any event I went to the appointed meeting place at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line in late July, 1949. Inasmich as I was unsure of the hour of the meeting, I spent a short time near the meeting place at 7 p.m., left the meeting place and returned again at 8 p.m., and then followed the same procedure at both 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. However I was not contacted at this time.

"At 8 p.m. on a Saturday evening about September 24, 1947, the door bell rang at my residence in Philadelphia. At the time my crother JUNECH was out for the evening, my father was upstairs asleep, and I had been sleeping on the sofe in the living room. When I answered the door, a stranger, whom I now know to be LARTHCHEV, said 'Is hr. GOLD here' and then said something in an accent I could not understand. I started to close the door when the man said 'Mr. Harry Gold', I am from John, you remember?' I knew then he was referring to YARCYLEV, whom I have previously mentioned, when he referred to JCHM. Realizing that SARYTUREY was a Soviet agent, I invited him into my house.

"He immediately asked me who was at home, whereupon I told him about my brother and father as I have previously mentioned. Apparently feeling resosured SARYTUREV sat down on the sofe in the living room. About the first thing he said to me was 'fou have material from the doctor?' When he referred to 'the doctor' I knew he was referring to Dr. RIAUS FUCHS by the code name used by 'JOHS' and myself in referring to TUCHS. I explained that I did not and that I had turned over the last material from FLAUS FUCHS in September, 1945; the recipient of this material coing the Soviet agent YABOVLEY. SARYTCHEV was strongly under the impression that I had received information on atomic energy from FUCHS at some time subsequent to my last meeting with YABOVLEY in September, 1945, and had not nod the opportunity to surrender this material to a Soviet representative.

"SARTICHEV then started to berate me for not saking the meeting in July, 1949, at the sea food restaurant - par at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. I explained to him that I had been there, outside the restaurant, but had not been contacted. He explained to me that I was to have gone into the restaurant rather than to have waited cutside. It appeared that there was some confusion about the data on which we were to have set in Now York.



"He then mentioned my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in 1947 and after some general discussion stated he desired to talk further at a later date with an about this testimony. He also mentioned at this first meeting in September that arrangements would be made between him and me for regular meetings in the future but that for the time being I was 'to lay low.' I believe that although the Soviets expected to use me in the future they were not going to attempt any such use until it was fully determined whether or not I had been 'compromised' by my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury.

"Sometime during this first conversation I had with SARYTCHEV I brought up the fact that A. BROTHMAN (who is a member of the firm of A. Erothman and Associates, Engineers, New York City) had related to me in early August, 1946, about having seen an article in a New York Sunday 'Herald Tribume' dated about that time concerning ar. FUCHS. This article purportedly stated that FUCHS was being detained in Great Britain on suspicion of espionage. SARYTCHEV did not seem perturbed over this information and made no explanatory comments regarding it.

*SAHTTOREV then told me at this first meeting that he would next see se at a time that as near as I can recall was October 5 or 6, 1949 in front of a theater (whose have I cannot recall) located in the general area of the 7hth Street stop of the Cusens - IND subgray. The meeting was set for Approximately 9 p.m. At night. He explained that I was to come to New York from Philadelphia for this meeting when I finished work in the late alternoon and was to go/the meeting place and stand outside the theater where he would contact as. I arrest to follow his instructions in this matter and to uset him at the amounted time of P p.s. I also recall that in connection with his instructions for this next meeting I was to errive in New York at least two hours before the time of the meeting and to check carefully for any signs of surveillance before making this mesting. FARYTURAV talked to me about three-questers of an hour during the course of our first meeting at my home. When he prepared to leave he had to ask se for directions that would enable his to get back to the Fenna. Reilroud Station. From this I definitely gathered that he was not acquainted with the area in which I resided.

"On about Cotober 5 or 6, 1949, when I finished my work at the Fhiladelphia Coneral Hospital I took the train from Philadelphia to New York and then took the Queens - IND submay to got to my meeting place with SARTHARY outside the theater at the 74th Street stop of the Queens - IND submay. After I reached the appointed place at about 9 p.m. I stood in



"front of the theater for a short period of time. Suddenly I saw him standing in a doorway-and I approached him. He quickly told me to go back down the street one block, then turn to the left and go in that direction an additional two blocks at which point I was to turn to the left again and walk one block where he would join me. It was obvious to me from this that ELRITUREV was very cautious in making this meeting. Due to the inclement weather there were few people about and it did not appear that he had anything to worry about in the way of curious bystanders.

FI did as directed in this matter and found FARYTCOST waiting for me on the surest corner. He immediately launched into a discussion of my testinony before the Pederal Grand Jury in New York City in 1947. He said that he wanted full details scout this at which time I explained how I had testified. In this connection I received the impression that . CARYTOREY was already acquainted with the general facts of my testimony. I do recall him asking how I could explain my use of the name PRANK KASSLER in dealing with ERUTHEAS, who I previously mentioned. I told SARYTCHES that in discussing the possibility of any such question by the investigating authorities that I would say to them that I had used the name of RESSLAR serely to avoid my employers at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company finding out that I was holding two jobs. At this time I also gave to SARTTCHS7 the mames of FRACK C-INCOM and Agent SEASKON as being the FRI Agents who questioned as and in addition I furnished him the names of THOMAS DOWNAR and T. VINCENT QUING as the Prosecutors who questioned me in front of the Grand Jury in New York City. Isring this second moeting CARYTSHEV asked me whether or not I had ever been questioned since 1927, whether or not any of my friends in Miladelphia had been questioned about me since then, and whether or not I thought that I was being followed at any time. I explained to Samifornay that I believed that I was in the clear because I had not been questioned in over two years. During the conversation SARTICHEV asked so whother I had obtained any hint from the Grand Jury that they knew I was involved beyond that with BRITHIAN.

and done with; and that it seemed to se that I had succeeded in creating the picture of a small, timid, frightened man, who by some set of circumstances—and gotten involved in the fringe of industrial espicance — all this some years suck. I recall that after I had given this answer SARTCHEV shocking head and smiled giving me the impression that I was wrong in my opinion of the grand Jury's naiveness. He then stated that in any case I should just 'ait tight' until our next meeting by which time he would have thought this matter over.



"After we had fully discussed by tentimony before the Grand Jury MERTTUREY told me that now would be a good time for me to plan on such a thing as an emergency that would require we to leave this country. He didnot elaborate too much on this noticing that I was generally upset at this suggestion. He did add that generally it was a good idea to plan for such an eventuality. During this second meeting with SARYTONEY I recall that sometime during the conversation be asked me if I knew anyone who could give information. He did not specify the type of information desired but I do recall that I told him that I did not know any such person. It was during this second meeting that SARTTONEY told me that inquiry had been made about FUCHS and that it had been determined that FUCHS was well and was "still working with us."

*During the second meeting we conversed together for approximately four hours and I do recall that in spite of the number of questions eaked and the number of enswers I gave, MARITCHEV did not make any notes regarding the matters under discussion. In my opinion SARYTOREV was a trained interrogator as illustrated by the fact he apparently knew the type of information he was after and he pursued his questioning most diligently and relentleasly. With the exception of one brief stop in one of the stations of the Long Island hat lroad, this second secting with SARTRUREV was carried on while welking in the residential streets near the secting place. Hear the end of the meeting CARYTOHEV told we he wanted to see me again. He explained that the next meeting would be in order to acquaint ge with whatever decision was arrived at regarding both the possible consequences of the Grand Jury as well as any fature duties I might be acked to undertake. I agreed to meet him again. He explained that our next meeting smuld be at 8 c.m. October 23, 1949, outside the ladies' entrance of a har across the strout from the 190th Street step of the Brook Fark -IRT subway, however I was not to go directly to this secting place from Penn Station. MAT the time this second meeting broke up SARTICHEV and I were not near a subway station. SARTICHEV accompanied me to this destination in the taxical and as I did not have enough money to pay for it he volunteered to do so and I permitted him to pay the taxi fare. I did not pay particular attention to PARTICHEV after arriving at this subway station although I do recall that upon leaving me he walked to the direction of Jamaica, Long Island. I inmediately boarded the subway, returned to Penn Station, where I secured a train which returned me to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

"On October 23, 1949, I left Fhiladelphia, Fennsylvania, in the late afternoon and came to New York by train in order to meet SARTICHEV for the third time. I recall this date in particular as on my way home from this westing I remember looking at any early edition of the 'Now York Daily News' forthe next day, October 24, 1949, which peper carried the story of the football game on October 23, 1949, between the New York Tankees professional football teem and the Can Francisco 491 rs. Upon my arrival in New York I boarded a subway train at fean Station in order to make my meeting with EMRYTCHEV at the 180th Street - Bronx Park Station of the IRT. In accordance with instructions given as by SARYTCHEV during our last meeting, I alighted from the train at the 174th Street station. walked up on the right-hand side of the street tenesth the elevated line as directed and ascended to the elevated platform at the 177th Street station. I recall that when passing the cafeteria window as directed I did not see SARTHONEY there observing me. Horover, after ascending this platform I became confused and took the wrong train and did not notice this until after I observed that I had some beyond the 160th Street elevated stop. At this time I alighted from this train and then tourded a downtown train that took me back to the 177th Street stop. At the 177th Circuit station I boarded the proper train, which took me to the 180th Street-Bronx Park stop of the IRT. After alighting from this train I descended to the street and went and stood outside the Indias: entrance of a mear-by bar as SARYFORLY had instructed me to do. As near as I can recall I reached the appointed secting place at ammoriately 8 p.m.

*After standing at this stop for about ten minutes (and while on the point of departing) I saw SARYTUHEV approaching me. After he had come up to me we started walking in the neighborhood of the meeting place and walked continuously during the entire period of time that we were together with the exception of a short time that we sat momentarily together **



"on a beach near the street. Re told me that he had been delayed but offered -no-further-explanation. At the very outset of this meeting SARTIUEEV told me that for the next year or two it was not contemplated that I would resume espionage activities for the Soviet Union. He was specific in saying 'Porget all that occurred in the past, put it completely out of your mind.' He said that I was to just continue working and living normally and in as unobtrusive a menner as possible. He said this was an order.

"Next SAFYTCHEY discussed with we the matter of my plotting a route whereby I could effect an exit from this country possibly by beat. Then I recall that he pointed out to me during this discussion that this could be easily handled by my leaving the United States, going very temporarily to Mexico first and then briefly going to Scuth America. Then I was to eventually go to one of the countries in Europe. I construed this to mean one of the Iron Curtain countries and not Soviet Russia itself. I cannot recall the exact remark made by MARITCHEY, but I do remember that he stated my ultimate destiny was to be one of the Mastern countries 'friendly to the Soviet Union.' In connection with this conversation he also mentioned that there would be plenty of money, 'on the order of thousands of dollars' available for me for this travel. He gave me no indication as to when or how I was to leave the United States. I was horrified and practically speechless at this suggestion of leaving this country and my family although I did 'give lip service' to these suggestions of SARTTCHEV.

"TARTTOWNT then discussed with me the matter of arranging regular and emergency postings for the future. He explained that the regular meetings were for the prisary purpose of enabling the Soviets to verify that I had not been arrested (prorumably by the Americans). However, he did not give mo any explanation as to any definite reason he might have had for believing that I might be arrested. He explained that the emergency meetings were to be arranged in order that we might contact each other should any suspicious circumstances arise that made it advisable for one party to contact the other. He explained to be that such regular meetings were to be held every nother month teginning with the month of Escamber, 1949, and that in over ouse the regular meeting would be at 10 a.m. on the first Sunday of the month. As Sarytchev appeared uncertain as to where each regular meetings were to be held I suggested that they could to hald on the street corner beneath the 90th Ttreet station or Elshirat Avent station of the Queens - IRT elevated. It was mutually agreed that this boot was acceptable for regular meetings.

"In connection with recognition signals to be used at these regular meetings 1t was agreed that I should macke a curved-stem pipe while the Soviet representative would amoke a cigar. Rossver, additional detailed arrangements were made for these regular meetings. I distinctly recall the exact arrangement made in this matter. In the event I had nothing to discuss with the person who would possibly be there to contact me, I was to merely stand on the corner near the newsstand; which corner was part of a traffic island at the foot of the elevated stairs (on the side of the elevated going to Flushingl. This was designated as my corner. I also distinctly recall that one of the corners beneath this elevated stop was designated as the 'contact's corner' and was to be used by the Soviet representative in the event that individual merely wished to observe me and bud nothing to sayto me. The 'contact's corner' was designated as heing directly across the street from me but still on the side of the elevated going to Flushing. However, should I desire to indicate to the contact that I had some information for him I would stand on the 'contact's corner' and wait there until the contact approached me. On the other hand, should the contact desire to talk to me he would come to my corner of the intersection and there approach me. In any event the contact approaching me would have in addition to the recognition signal of the cigar previously mentioned the following words to say to mo, 'Can you direct me to the Horses Harding Hospital. I was to reply, 'Yes, I'm going that way. Come along with me. .

"In connection with these 'regular meetings' I distinctly recall that SARTTONEY also gave me further instructions. We impressed on me that I should come to hew York late the night before (that is on Caturday might before the meeting) and spend the time randering around her York City never staying too long in one spot. The marning of the meeting I was to go past the regular meeting place one hour or so in advance and if I observed any signs of surveillance or anything of a suspicious nature them I was not to attempt to make the meeting at the appointed time. In the event I did not make the regular meeting because of either of the foregoing I was to wait until I heard from them. I do not recall receiving these same instructions from SARTICHEV in the event I deemed it undesirable to make one of the energency meetings.

"After FARYTCHEV and I had discussed the best manner of arranging according and as he did not offer any practical concrete suggestions. I adminded the following plan which was accepted by him. It was agreed that should I desire to contact the Soviets in an emergency I was to come to New York and personally insert an advertisement in the 'Situations Ranted' section of the 'New York Times' in the early part of the week.



"This advertisement would read in substance 'Bicchemist, age 32, 43, desires position in industry or research. Good record of accomplishment. Quality of work principle interest.' In addition to placing this ad personally, I was to give the name and address of an actual person which name and address were to be chosen by we from the New York Telephone Directory with instructions to the newspaper that any responses to the advance to be held by the paper. This was to indicate to the coviets that I desired a eseting with a representative of theirs at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the placing of this ad.

"Should the Soviets desire to contact me they would send to me at my place of employment, the Philadelphia General Hospital, by first class mail alrow entitled "Chemistry of the Carbohydrates" or Further idvances in Carbohydrate Chemistry" by R. SCEPP and W.E. Plunk. I thought this would be a particularly feelproof method for them to communicate with me inasmuch as this book was a technical publication which sold very few across each year and was, in addition, very expensive (about 19 a volume) and thus chances of my receiving such a book by mistake were extramely resone. It was agreed that I would understand that the receipt of such a book by me was to signify that a representative of the feviets desired an emergency meeting with me also at I p.m. on the Sunday following the receipt of this book by me.

"After this had been decided SARYTCHOV explained to me where the erargency mention would be held. The area described by him was and is strange to me. As I recall the emergency meeting place was in Hew Rochelle, New York. "RETTING explained the New Hochelle Hailroad Station ass concured on one side by a small park through which park extended a path to a neuroy beardmalk or promenade. He said this particular path extended from the station directly through the middle of the park that anded on the toardmalk or promenade closely adjacent to what (on the boardwalk) was a smalter or bonch protected from the meather. In the event of an asergency meeting, this secting would be held to the right of the amilter or Lanca. LARTHINV indicated to we that it were very likely that he would not be at this emergency meeting place and we a consequence recognition signals were agreed upon. It bas eqiq zora-covure end le (elangie nottingueer lauriv eff tedt beergs use the eiger, which it will be recalled were thed in connection with the regular maching, were also to be used in connection with emergency meetings. Although I disagreed, SARYTORZV insisted that the verbal recognition signal concerning the directions to the Horace Harding Hospital (used in connection with the pegular meetings) should also be used at these emergency meetings . as a further means of identification.



plans PARITCH W mids a few brief notes on all the aslient coints of the two classes of meetings. He wand the back of an envelope for this but I was unable to see the front or address nurface of this envelope. After talking with me for approximately one and a helf hours PARTCHEV told me that he had nothing to further discuss with me. At this point we were in a neighborhood strange to me. Although this was in direct dischedience to the instructions given me by 199772407 that I should leave Thiladelphia the might before in order to make such regular mactings, I loft Philadelphia on Funday morning in order to avoid friction at home. Following my arrival in Men York I traveled by submay to the 90th Street or Elmhurst Avenue station, arriving at this point at approximately 10 a.m. After arriving at this station I went to the street corner beneath this elevated line that was the proper corner for me to be on them I had no desire to communicate with my content. After remaining on this corner for eporoximately twenty minutes, and as I was not contacted, I secured a taxicab from a nearby cab stand and was driven by this cab to the Roosevelt Avenue - Jackson Reighte station of the Queens - IMD elevated · line. My use of this teriosh was for the sole owners of saking better time and was not a device used to forestall any surveillance of we. After reaching this elevated stop I boarded a New York bound elevated train and after my return to Penn Tation secured a train that returned as to Philadelphia, Fennsylvania. During my attendance at this menting place I did not observe anyone that are ered to be interested in me.

"Just prior to the date set for my next regular meeting, the first Sunday-in-February, 1950, I read that Dr. TLATE FUNKS, the British reientist with whom I had dealt in the past (in connection with atomic energy paymonages on behalf of the Foviets), had been arrested by the British authorities for aspidnage activity for the Soviets. I became extremely concerned over this but as my next regular meeting was acheduled for a Sunday following the arrest of FUCHS, I'did nothing in the way of attempting to use the 'emergency meeting' method to contact the Soviets.



"On the first Sunday of Fubruary, 1950, I proceeded from Philadelphia to New York by train and after my arrival in Fenn Station secured a subway to go to my regular meeting place at the 90th Street station or Kimhuret Avenue stop. After arriving at the meeting place I remained for maveral minutes on the location decignated as 'my corner'; then becoming panicky I crossed over to my 'contact's corner.' After remaining on this corner for about five minutes I recrossed to my corner, remained several minutes, and then recrossed again to my 'contacts's corner.' Finally after some twenty minutes elapsed and I had not team contacted by a soviet representative i gave up hope of any meeting. Once again I took a taxi to return to the Accessoral Avenue — Jackson Heights Station of the Camons — IND elevated and submay. There I secured a submay train that returned as to January batton where I got on a train for Thiladelphia.

All do recall there were possibly only four people that passed meduring the time that I was at this regular meeting place in February, 1950. Inexmuch as I knee my contact would be smoking a ciger, I carefully observed all the people that messed me in an effort to put myself in a position that I could be approximed by my contact. I might add that as agreed with leadificably I has smoking my curved—view pipe no that my contact would recognize me. I was not contacted by a representative of the deviate at this meeting place in February, 1990; however, I do recall having meen a picture of Julius hosenberg in the Philadelphia papers and after later viewing his picture as well as other photographs submitted to me by Special Agent JOHY J. 678312%, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Mor York City, I am now positive that I did see Julius Resemberg at my regular meeting place in February, 1990. Nowever, as I mentioned, neither hosenballs nor any representative of the Soviets approached me.

If did not yo to the regular monthly marting place on the first Sunday in April, 1990. I was never contacted by Sedict all following my last masting with him on Counter 23, 1999, in the vicinity of the 189th Street stop of the broax - 187 sabway. PI have read the foregoing statement consisting of this and eighteen of the pages. I have initialized all corrections as well as plucing my name at the bottom of each page of this statement. This is a true statement to the test of my impulsing and belief.

The signed statement signed by GOLD on Movember 1, 1950 and previously mentioned in this report is being retained in the files of the New York Office. The photograph of SAMYTCHEV, appropriately identified by GOLD on November 1, 1950, is being retained in the files of the New York Office.

By teletype dated October 27, 1950, the Bureau, as well as all interested offices, were advised of the fact that COLD had identified SARITCHEV as being the individual contacting him on several occasions in 1969. In this same teletype, those offices having leads outstanding in this case were requested to disregard these leads.

By letter dated Rovember 4, 1950, the Washington Field Office was requested to place a Lookout Notice with the Imagestion and Naturalization fervice, and a Step Notice with the United States Customs in order that the New York Office might be advised of SARTTONEY'S reentry into this country.

Information from Informante

It will be recalled that in the reference report of the writer, information was set forth reflecting the date and place of both the subject's entry into the Uni ed States and departure from the United States, along with information reflecting his employment, business address, and home address while in this country.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, furnished information on October 14, 1946 that among individuals connected with the United States was "Iraida Ivanovna Barycheva, wife of an employee of Coviet representation; travelling on a special possport, born 1912, Kunora, Ralinsky District, with daughter Clgs."

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, envised on about February 20, 1947 that a list of Hussian nationals in the United States at that time included Iraida Ivanovna Sarycheva. This informant described SARYCHEVA as "housewife, born Feptember 12, 1912, at Kinry, Ealininskaya obl., USSR; entered United States September 29, 1946 at hoston via 85 MARSHAL COVOROV; residence 123 West 90th Street, New York City."

On March 10, 1949, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised that the subject's wife had contacted an unnamed New York Hospital advising she had not yet received a birth certificate for her buby born February 7, 1949. She gave her address as 153 Manhattan Avenue.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised that on September 30, 1949 a list of Soviet nationals connected with Soviet establishments have, listed subject and his wife as being so associated in the following fashion:

*PILIP? TIKHOKOVICH SARACHEV, employee, USER, Mission to United Extions; 680 Park Avenue, residing at 153 Manhattan Avenue, Apartment 51, New York City with 'his spouse' RAISA IVANOVNA SARACHEVA."



In oc-meetion with LITT, just previously mentioned, it is to be noted that T-h advised on April 5, 1950 that this individual was identical with MORTINAR LITT, Roal Estate Agent, 51 East 93rd Street, New York City.



name is FILIP? TIMEONOVICE PARTICIEV. I had seen this picture on several occasions in July and August, 1950. After carefully considering this photograph, I am now completely certain that this is a photograph of the individual that first contacted me at my residence 6823 kindred Street, Philadelphia, Fennsylvania, on a Saturday evening approximately September 24, 1949.

"Previous to receiving this visit from SARTELES. I received in the late part of July, 1949, a typesritten note on plain paper (in a plain envelope) postsarked Brooklyn. The envelope did have the words 'St. George Hotel' typesritten on it, although it did not bear the regularly printed latterhead. This letter in substance stated that it was hoped that I was well and that the writer was looking forward to seeing we soon. This note bore the handwritten signature 'JEE's.' I know at the time I received this letter that a representative of the Soviet Union desired to see me. 'JCHS' I have previously identified as AHATOLI A. TAKOVEN and it was with this Coviet agent that I steadily engaged in espionage on atomic energy from Harch of 19th until late January or early February, 19th. This 'letter arrangement' advising me that a representative of Soviet Intelligence desired to see me had been perfected by YAKOVES and myself in 1915 during the time that I was in touch with him.

FAfter receiving this letter and in accordance with previous arrangements that I had nade with 'J'WF,' I went to a sea food restaurant - bar near the Broadway stop of the Antoria elevated line. At that time, es I recall, I was to go to this restaurant a certain number of days after the date on the letter or on a Sunday following receipt of the letter. In addition to going to this meating place, I was to have taken with se one-naif of a temporary bill that I had received somatime in the past from ANTEUR M. THOMAS Company, a laboratory supply house of Philadelphia, Fennsylvania. It was my understanding that my contact for the representative of the Soviete that appeared there would either know me by sight or by picture that he would have seen of me and that I would have been approached in an innocuous fashion. He would neve then presented the other half of the tather H. Thomas Company bill which would identify my contact to me. At this time I would then present my half of the same bill. However, I had destroyed my half of the bill prior to being called before the New York



Prederal Grand Jury in 1947. In any event I went to the appointed meeting place at the Broadway stop of the Astoria-elevated line in late July, 1949. Inasmuch as I was unsure of the hour of the meeting, I spent a short time mean the meeting place at 7 v.m., left the meeting place and returned again at 8 p.m., and then followed the same procedure at both 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. However I was not contacted at this time.

MAT B p.m. on a Saturday evening about Costember 24, 1947, the door bell rang at my residence in Thiladelphia. At the time my prother JUSCUE was out for the evening, my father was upstairs asleep, and I had been sleeping on the sofa in the living row. Then I answered the door, a stranger, when I now know to be SARYYCHEV, said 'Is Mr. GOLD here' and then said sensiting in an accent I could not understand. I started to close the door when the man said 'Mr. Harry Gold', I as from John, you remember?' I know then he was referring to YARDYLEV, whom I have previously sentioned, when he referred to JOHN. Realizing that SARYYCHEV was a Soviet agent, I invited him into my house.

"He immediately maked me who was at home, whereupon I told him about my brother and father as I have previously mentioned. Apparently feeling ressured SARYTONEV sat down on the sofa in the living room. About the first thing he said to me was 'fou have material from the doctor?' When he referred to 'the doctor' I knew he was referring to Dr. NLANS FUCES by the code mane used by 'JOHH' and myself in referring to FUCES. I amplained that I did not and that I had turned over the last material from KLAUS FUCES in 'eptember, 1965; the recipient of this material teing the Loviet agent YAKOVLEY. EARYTONEV was strongly under the impression that I had received information on atomic energy from Fichs at some time subsequent to my last meeting with YAROVLEY in September, 1965, and had not had the opportunity to surrender this material to a Soviet representative.

**SARYTCHEV then started to barate up for not making the mosting in July, 1969, at the sea food restaurant - bar at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. I explained to him that I had been there, outside the restaurant, but had not been contacted. He explained to be that I was to have gone into the restaurant rather than to have waited outside. It appeared that there was some confusion about the date on which we were to have bet in New York.



"He then mentioned my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury in Hew York City in 1947 and after some general discussion stated he desired to talk further at a later date with me about this testimony. He also mentioned at this first meeting in Ceptember that arrangements would be made between him and me for regular meetings in the future but that for the time being I was 'to lay los.' I believe that although the Soviets expected to use me in the future they were not going to attempt any much use until it was fully determined whether or not I had been 'compromised' by my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury.

*Sometime during this first conversation I had with SARYTONEY I trought up the fact that A. BROTHMAN (who is a member of the firm of A. Brothman and Associates, Engineers, New York City) had related to me in early August, 1946, about having seen an article in a New York Sunday 'Herald Tribumb' datud about that time concerning Dr. FUCHS. This article purportedly stated that FUCHS was being detained in Creat Britain on suspicion of espionage. FARTICHAY did not seem parturbed over this information and made no explanatory comments regarding it.

"SARYPOREV then told me at this first meeting that he would next see me at a time that as near as I can recall was Cotober 5 or 6. 1949 in front of a theater (whose mane I cannot recall) located in the general area of the 74th Street stop of the Queens - IND subway. The recting was set for approximately 9 p.m. at night. He explained that I was to come to New York from Philadelphia for this meeting when I finished work in the late afternoon and was to go/the meeting place and stand outside the theater where he would contact me. I egreed to follow his instructions in this matter and to meet him at the appointed time of 9 p.s. I also recall that in commettion with his instructions for this next meeting I was to arrive in Now York at least two hours before the time of the meeting and to check carefully for any signs of surveillance before making this mosting. FARYTTHEY talked to me shout three-nucrters of an hour during the course of our first meeting at my home. when he prepared to leave ne had to ask me for directions that would enable him to get back to the forms. Railroad Station. From this I definitely gethered that he was not acquainted with the area in which I resided.

*On about October 5 or 6, 1949, when I finished my work at the Philudelphia General Hospital I took the train from Thiludelphia to New York and them took the Queens - IND subway to got to my meeting place with SARTIHEV outside the theater at the 74th Street stop of the Queens - 180 million. After I reached the appointed place at about 9 p.m. I stood in



"front of the theater for a short period of time. Suddenly I saw him stand-ing in a doorney and I approached him. He quickly told me to go back down the street one block, then turn to the left and go in that direction an additional two blocks at abich point I was to turn to the left sgain and walk one block where he would join me. It was abvious to me from this that SARYTOZEY was very cautious in making this meeting. Due to the inclement weather there were few people about and it did not appear that he had anything to worry about in the way of curious bystanders.

"I did as directed in this matter and found MARYPOPEY waiting for se on the exrest corner. He immediately launched into a discussion of my testimony before the rederal Grand Jury in New York City in 1947. Be baid that he wented full details about this at which time I explained how-I had testified. In this connection I received the impression that CARTYCHEV was already acquainted with the general facts of my testimony. I do recall him asking how I could explain my use of the name PRANK KASTAIR in dealing with SRUTHEAR, who I previously mertioned. I told SARITCHEV that in discussing the possibility of any such question by the investigating authorities that I would say to them that I had used the same of ABBALLE morely to avoid my explayors at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company finding out that I was holding two jobs. At this time I also gave to SARITCHEV the -coup of FRIAK I FRI and deapt INSKARI as being the FRI AVARIANCE of the couptioned ma and in addition I furnished him the names of THEME DOTTERN and T. VINCENT QUITE as the Propecutors who questioned as in front of the Grand Jury in New York City. During this second moeting SMENTUHEV acked so whether or not I had ever been questioned since 1957, whether or not any of my friends in Miludelphia had been questioned whout we since thou, and whether or not I thought that I was being followed at any time. I explained to IABY mak that I believed that I was in the clear recause I had not been questioned in over two years. During the conversation BARTTUREY asked so whether I had obtained any hint from the Grand Jury that they know I was involved beyond that with HYTTAMAN.
