

"After we had fully discussed my testimony before the Grand Jury DARTICKEV told me that now would be a good time for re to plan on such a thing as an emergency that would require me to leave this country. He did not elaborate too much on this noticing that I was generally upset at this suggestion. He did add that generally it was a good idea to plan for such an eventuality. During this second meeting with DARTICKEV I recall that secretize during the conversation he asked me if I knew anyone who could give information. He did not specify the type of information desired but I do recall that I told him that I did not know any such person. It was during this second meeting that SARTICHAV told me that inquiry had been made about FUCUS and that it had been determined that FUCHS was well and was "still working with us."

"During the second meeting we conversed together for approximately four hours and I do recall that in spite of the number of questions asked and the number of enswers I gave, MARITUHEV did not make any notes remarding the patters under discussion. In my opinion SARYTCHEV was a trained interrogator as illustrated by the fact he apparently knew the type of information he was after and he pursued his questioning most diligently and relentlessly. With the exception of one brief stop in one of the stations of the long Island Rei lroad, this second meeting with SARTTUPEY was carried on while walking in the residential atreets near the secting place. Hear the end of the meeting CARTICHEV told me be wanted to see me again. He explained that the next meeting would be in order to acquaint se with whatever decision was arrived at regarding both the possible consequences of the Grand Jury as well as any future duties I might be asked to undertake. I agreed to must him again. He explained that our next meeting would be at 8 p.m. Cotober 23, 1969, outside the ladies' entrance of a bar across the street from the 150th Street stop of the Bronx Park -Int subway, however I was not to go directly to this sesting place from Penn Station. SARTICREV told so I was to take the Bronk Fark - IRI subway to the 174th Street stop at which point I would find that the train I was on had become an elevated line. I was to get off the train at the 174th Street stop, descend to the street level, and then proveed along the right side of the street beneath the elevated toward 177th Street. Then I was to cross the Steat beneath the elevated at 177th Street and pass in front of a calgioria. In connection with the last, Statement reserved that screens would be in the window of the cafeteria observing me. After performing the foregoing I was to then ascend the stairs to the 177th Street elevated stop on the uptown pids and there take a train to the 180th Etreet station of the same line. I agreed to follow his instructions in this matter.



At the time this second meeting broke up fixITITITY and I were not near a subway station. In view of the inclement weather and my lack of knowledge of the neighborhood, I took a taxical to the Forest Hills Station of the LED subway. SARYTCHEV accompanied me to this destination in the taxical and as I did not have enough money to pay for it he volunteered to do so and I permitted him to pay the taxi fare. I did not pay particular attention to SARYTCHEV after arriving at this subway station although I do recall that upon leaving me he walked to the direction of Jesaica, Long Island. I immediately boarded the subway, returned to Fenn Station, where I secured a train which returned me to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

"Co October 2), 1949, I left Philidelphia, Pennsylvania, in the late afternoon and came to Mew York by train in order to meet EME YICHEV for the third time. I recall this date in particular as on my way nome from this meeting I remember looking at any early edition of the 'How York Duily Hewe: furthe next day, October 24, 1949, which paper carried the story of the football gaze on October 23, 1747, between the Hen York Tankees professional football team and the San Francisco 491 re. Upon my arrival in New York I boarded a subway train at Fonn Station in order to make my meeting with CARTICHEV at the 180th Street - Bronx Park Station of the IRT. In accordance with instructions given as by DARTTCHEV during our last secting, I alighted from the train at the 174th Street Station, walked up on the right-hand side of the street beneath the elevated line as directed and ascended to the elevated mistform at the 177th Street station. I recall that when passing the cafeteria window as directed I did not see SARTYCHEV there observing me. However, after ascending this platform I became confused and took the wrong train and did not motice this until after I observed that I had gone beyond the 185th Street elevated stop. At this time I alighted from this train and then tourded a dumntown train that took so back to the 177th Street stop. At the 177th Street station I boarded the proper train, which took se to the 180th Street-Bronx Park stop of the IRT. After alighting from this train I descended to the street and went and stood outside the ladies! entrance of a near-by har as SARYTCHLV had instructed me to do. As near se I can recall I reached the appointed ascting place at approximately 8 p.p.

"After standing at this stop for about ten minutes (and while on the point of departing) I saw SARTTUHLY approaching me. After he had come up to me started walking in the neighborhood of the meeting place and walked centimously during the entire period of time that we were together with the exception of a short time that we sat momentarily together



"on a beach near the street. He told me that he had been delayed but offered no further explanation. At the very cutset of this meeting MARYTUREV told me that for the mext year or two it was not contemplated that I would resume espionege activities for the Soviet Union. He was specific in saying 'Forget all that occurred in the past, put it completely out of your mind.' He said that I was to just continue working and living normally and in as unobtrusive a canner as possible. He said this was an order.

route whereby I could effect an exit from this country possibly by toat. Then I recall that he pointed out to se during this discussion that this could be easily handled by my leaving the United States, going very temporarily to Mexico first and then briefly going to South America. Then I was to eventually go to one of the countries in Europe. I construed this to mean one of the Iron Curtain countries and not Soviet Russia itself. I cannot recall the exact remark made by FARTICARY, but I do remarker that he stated my ultimate destiny was to be one of the Cantern countries 'friendly to the Soviet Union.' In connection with this conversation he also mentioned that there would be planty of money, 'on the error of thousands of dollars' available for me for this travel. He gave me no indication as to whom or how I was to leave the United States. I was herrified and practically speechless at this suggestion of leaving this country and my family although I did 'give lip service' to these suggestions of SARTICARY.

"FAR VICHEV then discussed with me the matter of arranging regular and exergency rectings for the future. He explained that the regular meetings were for the prisary purpose of enabling the Soviets to verify that I had not been arrested (presumably by the Americans). However, he did not give so any explanation as to any definite reason he might have had for believing that I might be arrested. He explained that the emergency meetings were to be arranged in order that so Might contact each other should any suspicious circumstances arise that made it advisable for one party to contact the other. He explained to be that such regular mackings were to be held every other month leginning with the month of Jecomber, 1949, and that in every case the regular meeting would be at 10 a.m. on the first Sunday of the month. As Sarytchev uppeared uncertain as to where aich regular mentings were to be held I suggested that they could be held on the street corner beneath the 90th Street station or Elshurst Avenue station of the Queens - IRT elevated. It was sutually agreed that this spot was acceptable for regular meetings.



"In connection with recognition eignals to be used at these regular mostlings it was agreed that I should smoke a curved-stem pipewhile the Soviet representative would same a cigar. However, additional detailed arrangements were made for these regular meetings. I distinctly recall the exact arrangement made in this matter. In the event I had nothing to discuss with the person the would possibly be there to contact me, I was to merely stand on the corner near the newsetand; which corner was part of a traffic island at the foot of the elevated stairs (on the side of the elevated going to Plushing. This was designated as my corner. I also distinctly recall that one of the corners beneath this elevated stop was designated as the 'contact's corner' and was to be used by the Foriet representative in the event that individual merely wished to cbserve me and had nothing to sayto me. The 'contact's corner' was designated as being directly across the strest from me but still on the side of the elevated going to Flushing. However, should I desire to indicate to the contact that I had some information for him I would stand on the 'contact's corner' and wait there until the contact approached me. On the other hand, should the contact desire to talk to me he would come to my corner of the intersection and there approach me. In any event the contact approaching me would have in addition to the recognition signal of the cigar previously mentioned the following words to say to se, 'Can you direct se to the Borace Barding Hospital.' I has to reply, 'Yes, I'm going that way. Come elong with me.

"In connection with these 'regular machings' I distinctly rocall that SARYTCHAY also gave we further instructions. So impressed on we that I should come to Mos York late the night before (that is on Saturday night before the meeting) and spend the time sundering around New York City never staying too long in one spot. The morning of the meeting I was to go post the regular meeting place one hour or so in advance and if I observed any signs of surveillance or anything of a suspicious nature than I was not to attempt to make the meeting at the appointed time. In the event I did not make the regular meeting because of either of the foregoing I was to wait until I heard from them. I do not recall receiving these same instructions from "ARTICHAY in the event I decade it undesirable to make one of the storgency meetings.

"After SARYTCHEV and I had discussed the best minner of arranging emergency meetings and as he did not offer any practical concrete suggestions I advanced the following plan which was accepted by him. It was agreed that should I desire to contact the Soviets in an emergency I was to come to New York and personally insert an advertisement in the 'Situations : Wanted' section of the 'New York Times' in the early part of the week.

"This advertisement would read in substance 'Diochemist, age 32, AU, desiresposition in industry or research. Good record of accomplishment. Quality of work principle interest.' In addition to plucing this ad personally, I was to give the name and address of an actual person which name and address sere to be shown by me from the New York Telephone Directory with instructions to the newspaper that any responses to the ad were to be held by the paper. This was to indicate to the Joviets that I desired a scatting with a representative of theirs at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the plucing of this ad.

"Should the Soviets desire to contact me they would send to me at my place of employment, the Miladelphia General Ecopital, by first class sail a-book entitled "Chemistry of the Carbohydrates" or "Further Advances in Carbohydrate Chemistry" by R. GORPP and T.W. FIGMAN. I thought this would be a particularly feelproof method for them to communicate with me insemuch as this book was a technical sublication which sold very few copies each year and was, in addition, very expensive (about 19 a volume) and the chances of my receiving such a book by mistake were extremely remote. It was agreed that I would understand that the receipt of such a book by me was to signify that a representative of the Coviets desired an emergency meeting with me also at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the receipt of this book by me.

"After this had been decided MARTICHEV explained to see where the emergency meeting would be held. The area described by him was and is strange to me. As I rocall the emergency meeting place was in New Rochelle, New York. - SARYTONEY explained the New Rechelle Reilroad Station was bordered on one side by a small park through which park extended a path to a neurby beardwolk or premarade. He said this particular path extended from the atation directly through the middle of the mark and ended on the boardwalk or promenade closely adjacent to what (on the bourdmalk) als a sheltor or banch protested from the weather. In the event of an emergency meeting, this meeting reald be held to the right of the shelter or bench. JARTICERV indicated to me that it was very likely that he would not be at this emergency meeting place and as a consequence recognition signals were agreed upon. It was agreed that the visual recognition signalm of the curved-stem pips and the cigur, which it will be recalled were used in connection with the regular meeting, were also to be used in connection with emergency meetings. Although I disagreed, SARYTCHEV insisted that the verbal recognition signal concerning the directions to the Horace Harding Hospital (used in connection with the pegular sectings) should also be used at these emorgancy mootings es a further means of identification.



plans-PARYTORM made-a few-brief-notes on all the sultent points of the two classes of meetings. He used the back of an envelope for this but I was unable to see the front or address surface of this envelope. After talking with me for approximately one and a half hours TARYTORN told me that he had nothing to further discuss with me. At this point we were in a neighborhood strange to me. After advising me that he had nothing further to discuss with we, MFYTORN merely turned and left me. I had no idea as to where I was and did not even have an idea as to the direction in which the elevated lay. I merely started malking and finally came to an elevated station (which one I cannot recall). I bearded an elevated train at this point and returned to Fann Station. Immediately following this I secured a train that returned me to Thiladelphia.

"In order to make my regular December, 1949, meeting with the Covieta, I left Thiladelphia early in the morning the first Sunday in Recember, 1949, and traveled to Mer York City. Although this was in cirect disobedience to the instructions given ma by "ARYTOWEV that I should leave Thiladelphia the night before in order to make such regular mestings, I last Philadelphia on Funday morning in order to evoid friction at home. Following my arrival in New York I travaled by submay to the 90th Street or Eleberst Avenue station, arriving at this point at approximately 10 a.c. After arriving at this station I went to the street corner beneath this elevated line that was the proper corner for me to be on when I had no desire to communicate with my contact. Ifter remaining on this currier for approximately twenty minutes, and as I was not contacted, I Lecured a texticat from a nearby cab stand and was driven by this cab to the Reservelt frame - Jackson Heights station of the Channs - IND clarated line. My use of this tayloab was for the sole ourbose of making better time and was not a davise used to forestall any surveillance of me. After reaching this elevated atom I boarded a New York bound elevated train and after my return to form "tation secured a train that returned me to Philadelphia, Fennaylvania. During my attendance at this meeting place I did not observe anyone that arm ared to be interested in me.

"Just writer to the data set for my next regular meeting, the first funday In rebruary, 1950, I read that Dr. NLAUS FUCHS, the I ritish accondist with whom I had dealt in the mast (in connection with atomic energy empionage on behalf of the "oviete), had been arrested by the British authorities for espionage activity for the Soviete. I became extremely conserved over this but as my next regular meeting was scheduled for a Sunday following the arrest of FUCHS, I did nothing in the way of attempting to use the "emergency meeting" method to contact the Soviete.

"On the first Sunday of February, 1950, I proceeded from Philadelphia to New York by train and after my arrival in Fenn Station secured a subway to go to my-regular meeting place at the 90th Street station or Klahurst Avenuation. After arriving at the meeting place I remained for several minutes on the location designated as 'my corner'; then becoming punicky I crossed ever to my 'contact's corner.' After remaining on this corner for about five minutes I recrossed to my corner, remained several minutes, and then recrossed again to my 'contacte's corner.' Finally after some themty minutes elapsed and I had not been contacted by a loviet representative I gave up hops of any meeting. Once again I took a taxi to return to the Rocsevelt Avenue — Jackson Heights station of the Queens — Ital elevated and subway. There I secured a subway train that returned me to Fennsylvania Station where I got on a train for Fhiladelphia.

during the time that I was at this regular meeting place in February, 1950. Insample as I knew my contact would be smoking a cigar, I carefully observed all the people that passed me in an effort to put myself in a position that I could be approached by my contact. I might add that an agreed with language I was smoking my curved-stem pipe so that my contact would recognize me. I was not contacted by a representative of the deviate at this meeting place in February, 1950; however, I do recall having seen a picture of Julius Rosenberg in the Philadelphia papers and after later viewing has picture as well as other photographs submitted to me by Special Agent John J. O'HRICH, Federal Eureau of Inventigation, New York City, I am now positive that I did see Julius Rosenberg at my regular meeting place in February, 1950. However, as I mentioned, neither accommends nor any representative of the Soviets suppresched me.

"I aid not go to the regular monthly meeting place on the first Sunday in April. 1950. I was never contacted by schilling following by isst meeting with him on totower 23, 1969, in the vicinity of the looth birect stop of the Bronx - The subsay. During my contacts with Particley this individual did not give me any money for any purpose state than having said my taxi fore on one occasion as I previously mentioned.

"In addition to the foregoing information given by me concarding my contacts with SARYMMAN, I have placed my name, the date, and the place on the back of the photograph of Fillish Alkidevical MARITURE, know I have positively identified as this contact of mine.

### ADMINISTRATIVE PACE

The signed statement signed by GOLD on Movember 1, 1950 and previously mentioned in this report is being retained in the files of the New York Office. The photograph of SARYTCHEV, appropriately identified by GOLD on Movember 1, 1950, is being retained in the files of the New York Office.

By teletype dated October 27, 1950, the Bursan, as well as all interested offices, were advised of the fact that COLD had identified EARITCHLY as being the individual contacting him on several occasions in 1949. In this same teletype, those offices having leads outstanding in this case were requested to disregard these leads.

By letter dated November 4, 1950, the Eashington Field Office was requested to place a Lookout Notice with the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and a Stop Notice with the United States Customs in order that the New York Office might be advised of SARYTCHEV'S reentry into this country.

### Information from Informants

It will be recalled that in the reference report of the writer, information was set forth reflecting the date and place of both the subject's entry into the Uni ed States and departure from the United States, along with information reflecting his employment, business address, and home address while in this country.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, furnished information on October 14, 1746 that among individuals connected with the United Nations Organization in the United States was "Iraida Ivanovna Sarychova, wife of an employee of Soviet representation; travelling on a special passport, born 1912, Kuncra, Kalinsky District, with daughter Olga."


Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised on about February 20, 1947 that a list of Russian nationals in the United States at that time included Iraida Ivanovna Sorycheva. This informant described EARICHEVA as shousewife, born September 12, 1912, at Kinry, Kalininghaya obl., USSR; entered United States September 29, 1946 at Boston via 35 MARSHAL GOVOROV; residence 123 West 90th Street, New York City.\*

On March 10, 1969, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, edvised that the subject's wife had contacted an unnamed New York Hospital advising she had not yet received a birth certificate for her baby born Pebruary 7, 1969. She gave her address as 153 Manhattan Avanue.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised that on September 30, 1949 a list of Seviet nationals connected with Seviet establishments here, listed subject and his wife as being so associated in the following fashion:

"FILIP" TIMECROVICH CARACESV, employee, USSR, Mission to United Stations; 680 Park Avenue, residing at 153 Manhattan Avenue, Apartment 51, New York City with this spouse: RAISA IVANOVRA SAR CHEVA."



In connection with LITT, just previously mentioned, it is to be noted that T-h advised on April 5, 1950 that this individual was identical with MCRIMER LITT, Real Estate Agent, 51 East 91rd Street, New York City.

"Investigation. I know that I do not have to make any statement and that anything I say may be used against me in a court of law. I also know that I am entitled to benefit of counsel.

"On October 27, 1950, I was shown a picture of an individual whose name is FILIPP TIKHONOVICH SARYTCHEV. I had seen this picture on several occasions in July and August, 1950. After carefully considering this photograph, I am now completely certain that this is a photograph of the individual that first contacted me at my residence 6823 Kindred Street, Fhiladelphia, Pennsylvania, on a Saturday evening approximately September 24, 1949.

"Previous to receiving this visit from SARYTCHEV, I received in the late part of July, 1949, a typewritten note on plain paper (in a plain envelope) postmarked Brooklyn. The envelope did have the words 'St. George Hotel' typewritten on it, although it did not bear the regularly printed letterhead. This letter in substance stated that it was hoped that I was well and that the writer was looking forward to seeing me soon. This note bore the handwritten signature 'JOHN.' I knew at the time I received this letter that a representative of the Soviet Maion desired to see me. 'JOHN' I have previously identified as ANATOLI A. YAKOVLEV and it was with this Soviet agent that I steadily engaged in espionage on atomic energy from March of 1944 until late January or early February, 1946. This 'letter arrangement' advising me that a representative of Soviet Intelligence desired to see me had been perfected by YAKOVLEV and myself in 1945 during the time that I was in touch with him.

"After receiving this letter and in accordance with previous arrangements that I had made with 'JOHN,' I went to a sea food restaurant - bar near the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. At that time, as I recall, I was to go to this restaurant a certain number of days after the date on the letter or on a Sunday following receipt of the letter. In addition to going to this meeting place, I was to have taken with me one-half of a temporary bill that I had received sometime in the past from ARTHUR H. THOMAS Company, a laboratory supply house of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It was my understanding that my contact for the representative of the Soviets that appeared there would either know me by sight or by picture that he would have seen of me and that I would have been approached in an innocuous fashion. He would have then presented the other half of the Arthur H. Thomas Company bill which would identify my contact to me. At this time I would then present my half of the same bill. However, I had destroyed my half of the bill prior to being called before the New York

"Federal Grand Jury in 1947. In any event I went to the appointed meeting place at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line in late July, 1949. Inasmuch as I was unsure of the hour of the meeting, I spent a short time — near the meeting place at 7 p.m., left the meeting place and returned again at 8 p.m., and then followed the same procedure at both 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. However I was not contacted at this time.

"At 8 p.m. on a Saturday evening about September 24, 1949, the Joor bell rang at my residence in Philadelphia. At the time my brother JOSEPH was out for the evening, my father was upstairs asleep, and I had been sleeping on the sofa in the living room. When I answered the door, a stranger, whom I now know to be SARYTCHEV, said 'Is Mr. GOLD here' and then said something in an accent I could not understand. I started to close the door when the man said 'Mr. Harry Gold?, I am from John, you remember?' I knew then he was referring to YAKOVLEV, whom I have previously mentioned, when he referred to JCHN. Realizing that SARYTCHEV was a Soviet agent, I invited him into my house.

"He immediately asked me who was at home, whereupon I told him about my brother and father as I have previously mentioned. Apparently feeling reassured SARYTCHEV sat down on the sofa in the living room. About the first thing he said to me was 'You have material from the doctor?' When he referred to 'the doctor' I knew he was referring to Dr. KLAUS FUCHS by the code name used by 'JOHN' and myself in referring to FUCHS. I explained that I did not and that I had turned over the last material from KLAUS FUCHS in September, 1945; the recipient of this material being the Soviet agent YAKOVLEV. SARYTCHEV was strongly under the impression that I had received information on atomic energy from FUCHS at some time subsequent to my last meeting with YAKOVLEV in September, 1945, and had not had the opportunity to surrender this material to a Soviet representative.

"SARYTCHEV then started to berate me for not making the meeting in July, 1949, at the sea food restaurant - bar at the Broadway stop of the Astoria elevated line. I explained to him that I had been there, outside the restaurant, but had not been contacted. He explained to me that I was to have gone into the restaurant rather than to have waited outside. It appeared that there was some confusion about the date on which we were to have met In New York.

"He then mentioned my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in 1947 and after some general discussion stated he desired to talk further at a later date with me about this testimony. He also mentioned at this first meeting in September that arrangements would be made between him and me for regular meetings in the future but that for the time being I was 'to lay low.' I believe that although the Soviets expected to use me in the future they were not going to attempt any such use until it was fully determined whether or not I had been 'compromised' by my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury.

"Sometime during this first conversation I had with SARYTCHEV I brought up the fact that A. BROTTMAN (who is a member of the firm of A. Brothman and Associates, Engineers, New York City) had related to me in early August, 1946, about having seen an article in a New York Sunday 'Herald Tribune' dated about that time concerning Dr. FUCHS. This article purportedly stated that FUCHS was being detained in Great Britain on suspicion of espionage. SARYTCHEV did not seem perturbed over this information and made no explanatory comments regarding it.

"SARYTCHEV then told me at this first meeting that he would next -see me at a time that as near as I can recall was October 5 or 6, 1949 in front of a theater (whose name I cannot recall) located in the general area of the 74th Street stop of the Queens - IND subway. The meeting was set for approximately 9 p.m. at night. He explained that I was to come to New York from Philadelphia for this meeting when I finished work in the late afternoon and was to go/the meeting place and stand outside the theater where he would contact me. I agreed to follow his instructions in this matter and to meet him at the appointed time of 9 p.m. I also recall that in connection with his instructions for this next meeting I was to arrive in New York at least two hours before the time of the meeting and to check carefully for any signs of surveillance before making this meeting. SARYTCHEV talked to me about three-quarters of an hour during the course of our first meeting at my home. When he prepared to leave he had to ask me for directions that would enable him to get back to the Penna. Railroad Station. From this I definitely gathered that he was not acquainted with the area in which I resided.

""On about October 5 or 6, 1949, when I finished my work at the Philadelphia General Hospital I took the train from Philadelphia to New York and then book the Queens - IND subway to get to my meeting place with SALYTOMEV outside the theater at the 74th Street stop of the Queens - IND subway. After I reached the appointed place at about 9 p.m. I stood in

"front of the theater for a short period of time. Suddenly I saw him standing in a doorway and I approached him. He quickly told me to go back down the street one block, then turn to the left and go in that direction an additional two blocks at which point I was to turn to the left again and walk one tlock where he would join me. It was obvious to me from this that SARYTCHEV was very cautious in making this meeting. Due to the inclement weather there were few people about and it did not appear that he had anything to worry about in the way of curious bystanders.

"I did as directed in this matter and found SARYTCHEV waiting for me on the street corner. He immediately launched into a discussion of my testimony before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in 1947. He said that he wanted full details about this at mich time I explained how I had testified. In this connection I received the impression that SARYICHEV was already acquainted with the general facts of my testimony. I do recall him asking how I could explain my use of the name FRANK KESSLER in dealing with BROTHMAN, who I previously mentioned. I told SARYTCHEV that in discussing the possibility of any such question by the investigating authorities that I would say to them that I had used the name of KESSLER merely to avoid my employers at the Pennsylvania Sugar Company finding out that I was holding two jobs. At this time I also gave to SARYTCHEV the names of FRANK O'BRIEN and Agent SHANNON as being the FBI Agents who questioned me and in addition I furnished him the names of THOMAS DONEGAN and T. VINCENT QUINN as the Prosecutors who questioned me in front of the Grand Jury in New York City. During this second meeting SARYTCHEV asked me whether or not I had ever been questioned since 1947, whether or not any of my friends in Hhiladelphia had been questioned about me since then, and whether or not I thought that I was being followed at any time. I explained to SARYTCHEV that I believed that I was in the clear because I had not been questioned in over two years. During the conversation SARYTCHEV asked me whether I had obtained any hint from the Grand Jury that they knew I was involved beyond that with HRUTHMAN.

"I replied to the effect that I thought the matter to be over and done with; and that it seemed to me that I had succeeded in creating the picture of a small, timid, frightened man, who by some set of circumstances had gotten involved in the fringe of industrial espionage — all this some years back. I recall that after I had given this answer SARYTCHEV shock his head and smiled giving me the impression that I was wrong in my opinion of the Grand Jury's naiveness. He then stated that in any case I should just 'sit tight' until our next meeting by which time he would have thought this matter over.

"After we had fully discussed my testimony before the Grand Jury -SARYTCHEV told me that now would be a good time for me to plan on such a thing as an emergency that would require me to leave this country. He did not elaborate too much on this noticing that I was generally upset at this suggestion. He did add that generally it was a good idea to plan for such an eventuality. During this second meeting with SARYTCHEV I recall that sometime during the conversation he asked me if I knew anyone who could give information. He did not specify the type of information desired but I do recall that I told him that I did not know any such person. It was during this second meeting that SARYTCHEV told me that inquiry had been made about FUCHS and that it had been determined that FUCHS was well and was 'still working with us.'

"During the second meeting we conversed together for approximately four hours and I do recall that in spite of the number of questions asked and the number of answers I gave, SARYTCHEV did not make any notes regarding the matters under discussion. In my opinion SARYTCHEV was a trained interrogator as illustrated by the fact he apparently knew the type of information he was after and he pursued his questioning most diligently and relentlessly. With the exception of one brief stop in one of the stations of the Long Island Railroad, this second meeting with SARYTCHEV was carried on while walking in the residential streets near the meeting place. Near the end of the meeting SARYTCHEV told me he wanted to see me again. He explained that the next meeting would be in order to acquaint me with whatever decision was arrived at regarding both the possible consequences of the Grand Jury as well as any future duties I might be asked to undertake. I agreed to meet him again. He explained that our next meeting would be at 6 p.m. October 23, 1949, outside the ladies! entrance of a bar across the street from the 180th Street stop of the Bronx Park -IRT subway, however I was not to go directly to this meeting place from Penn Station. SARYTCHEV told me I was to take the Bronx Fark - IRT subway to the 174th Street stop at which point I would find that the train I was on had become an elevated line. I was to get off the train at the 174th Street stop, descend to the street level, and then proceed along the right side of the street beneath the elevated toward 17 th Ctreet. Then I was to cross the start beneath the elevated at 177th Street and pass in front of a cafeteria. In connection with the last, GAPYTCHEV remarked that someone would be in the window of the cafeteria observing me. After performing the foregoing I was to then ascend the stairs to the 177th Street elevated stop on the uptown side and there take a train to the 180th Street station of the same line. I agreed to follow his instructions in this matter.

"At the time this second meeting broke up SARYTCHEV and I were not near a subway station. In view of the inclement weather and my lack -- of knowledge of the neighborhood, I-took a taxicab to the Forest Hills Station of the IND subway. SARYTCHEV accompanied me to this destination in the taxicab and as I did not have enough money to pay for it he volunteered to do so and I permitted him to pay the taxi fare. I did not pay particular attention to SARYTCHEV after arriving at this subway station although I do recall that upon leaving me he walked to the direction of Jamaica, Long Island. I immediately boarded the subway, returned to Penn Station, where I secured a train which returned me to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

"On October 23, 1949, I left Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in the late afternoon and came to New York by train in order to meet SARYTCHEV for the third time. I recall this date in particular as on my way home from this Leeting I remember looking at any early edition of the !New York Daily News' for the next day, October 24, 1949, which paper carried the story of the football game on October 23, 1949, between the New York Yankees professional football team and the San Francisco 491ers. Upon my arrival in New York I boarded a subway train at Fenn Station in order to make my meeting with EARTTCHEV at the 180th Street - Bronx Park Station of the IRT. In accordance with instructions given me by SARYTCHEV during our last meeting, I alighted from the train at the 174th Street station, walked up on the right-hand side of the street beneath the elevated line as directed and ascended to the elevated platform at the 177th Street station. I recall that when passing the cafeteria window as directed I did not see SARYTCHEV there observing me. However, after ascending this platform I became confused and took the wrong train and did not notice this until after I observed that I had gone beyond the 180th Street elevated stop. At this time I alighted from this train and then boarded a downtown train that took me back to the 177th Street stop. At the 177th Street station I boarded the proper train, which took me to the 180th Street-Bronx Park stop of the IRT. After alighting from this train I descended to the street and went and stood outside the ladies! entrance of a near-by bar as SARYTCHEV had instructed me to do. As near as I can recall I reached the appointed meeting place at approximately 8 p.m.

<sup>&</sup>quot;After standing at this stop for about ten minutes (and while on the point of departing) I saw SARYTCHEV approaching me. After he had come up to me we started walking in the neighborhood of the meeting place and walked continuously during the entire period of time that we were together with the exception of a short time that we sat momentarily together

"on a bench near the street. He told me that he had been delayed but offered no further explanation. At the very outset of this meeting SARYTCHEV told me that for the next year or two it was not contemplated that I would resume espionage activities for the Soviet Union. He was specific in saying 'Forget all that occurred in the past, put it completely out of your mind.' He said that I was to just continue working and living normally and in as unobtrusive a manner as possible. He said this was an order.

"Next SARYTCHEV discussed with me the matter of my plotting a route whereby I could effect an exit from this country possibly by boat. Then I recall that he pointed out to me during this discussion that this could be easily handled by my leaving the United States, going very temporarily to Mexico first and then briefly going to South America. Then I was to eventually go to one of the countries in Europe. I construed this to mean one of the Iron Curtain countries and not Soviet Russia itself. I cannot recall the exact remark made by SARYTCHEV, but I do remember that he stated my ultimate destiny was to be one of the Eastern countries 'friendly to the Soviet Union.' In connection with this conversation he also mentioned that there would be plenty of money, 'on the order of thousands of dollars' available for me for this travel. He gave me no indication as to when or how I was to leave the United States. I was horrified and practically speechless at this suggestion of leaving this country and my family although I did 'give lip service' to these suggestions of SARYTCHEV.

"SARYTCHEV then discussed with me the matter of arranging regular and emergency meetings for the future. He explained that the regular meetings were for the primary purpose of enabling the Soviets to verify that I had not been arrested (presumably by the Americans). However, he did not give me any explanation as to any definite reason he might have had for believing that I might be arrested. He explained that the emergency meetings were to be arranged in order that we might contact each other should any suspicious circumstances arise that made it advisable for one party to contact the other. He explained to me that such regular meetings were to be held every other month beginning with the month of December, 1949, and that in ever case the regular meeting would be at 10 a.m. on the first Sunday of the month. As Sarytchev appeared uncertain as to where srea-regular meetings were to be held I suggested that they could be held on the street corner beneath the 90th Street station or Elmhurst Avenue station of the Queens - IRT elevated. It was mutually agreed that this spot was acceptable for regular meetings.

"In connection with recognition signals to be used at these regular meetings it was agreed that I should smoke a curved-stem pipe while the Soviet representative would amole a cigar. However, additional detailed arrangements were made for these regular meetings. I distinctly recall the exact arrangement made in this matter. In the event I had nothing to discuss with the person who would possibly be there to contact me, I was to merely stand on the corner near the newsstand; which corner was part of a traffic island at the foot of the elevated stairs (on the cide of the elevated going to Flushing. This was designated as my corner. I also distinctly recall that one of the corners beneath this elevated stop was designated as the 'contact's corner' and was to be used by the Soviet representative in the event that individual merely wished to observe me and had nothing to souto me. The 'contact's corner' was designated as being directly across the street from me but still on the side of the elevated going to Flushing. However, should I desire to indicate to the contact that I had some information for him I would stand on the 'contact's corner' and wait there until the contact approached On the other hand, should the contact desire to talk to me he would come to my corner of the intersection and there approach ne. In any event the contact approaching me would have in addition to the recognition signal of the cigar previously mentioned the following words to say to me, 'Can you direct me to the Horace Harding Hospital. I was to reply, 'Yes, I'm going that way, Come along with me. !

"In connection with these 'regular meetings' I distinctly recall that SARYTCHEV also gave me further instructions. He impressed on me that I should come to New York late the night before (that is on Saturday night before the meeting) and spend the time wandering around New York City never staying too long in one spot. The morning of the meeting I was to go past the regular meeting place one hour or so in advance and if I observed any signs of surveillance or anything of a suspicious nature then I was not to attempt to make the meeting at the appointed time. In the event I did not make the regular meeting because of either of the foregoing I was to wait until I heard from them. I do not recall receiving these same instructions from SARYTCHEV in the event I decided it undesirable to make one of the correspond meetings.

emergency meetings and as he did not offer any practical concrete suggestions. I advanced the following plan which was accepted by him. It was agreed that should I desire to contact the Soviets in an emergency I was to come to New York and personally insert an advertisement in the 'Situations Wanted' section of the 'New York Times' in the early part of the week.

"This advertisement would read in substance 'Biochemist, age 32, MS, desires position-in industry or-research. Good-record of-accomplishment.—Quality-of work principle interest.' In addition to placing this ad personally, I was to give jthe name and address of an actual person which name and address were to be chosen by me from the New York Telephone Directory with instructions to the newspaper that any responses to the ad were to be held by the paper. This was to indicate to the Soviets that I desired a meeting with a representative of theirs at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the placing of this ad.

"Should the Soviets desire to contact me they would send to me at my place of employment, the Philadelphia General Hospital, by first class mail a book entitled "Chemistry of the Carbohydrates" or "Further Advances in Carbohydrate Chemistry" by R. GOEPP and W.W. PICMAN, I thought this would be a particularly foolproof method for them to communicate with me inasmuch as this book was a technical publication which sold very few copies each year and was, in addition, very expensive (about \$9 a volume) and the chances of my receiving such a book by mistake were extremely remote. It was agreed that I would understand that the receipt of such a book by me was to signify that a representative of the Soviets desired an emergency meeting with me also at 1 p.m. on the Sunday following the receipt of this book by me.

"After this had been decided SARYTCHEV explained to me where the emergency meeting would be held. The area described by him was and is strange to me. As I recall the emergency meeting place was in New Rochelle. Now York. SARYTCHEV explained the New Rochelle Railroad Station was bordered on one side by a small park through which park extended a path to a nearby boardwalk or promenade. He said this particular path extended from the station directly through the middle of the mark and ended on the boardwalk or promenade closely adjacent to what (on the boardwalk) was a shelter or bench protected from the weather. In the event of an emergency meeting, this meeting would be held to the right of the shelter or bench. SARYTOHEV indicated to me that it was very likely that he would not be at this emergency meeting place and as a consequence recognition signals were agreed upon. It was agreed that the visual recognition signals: of the curved-stem pipe and the cigar-which it will be recalled were used in connection with the regular meeting, were also to be used in connection with emergency meetings. Although I disagreed, SARYTCHEV insisted that the verbal recognition signal concerning the directions to the Horace Harding Hospital (used in connection with the regular meetings) should also be used at these emergency meetings as a further means of identification.

"After this discussion on the regular and emergency meetings plans SARYTCHEV made a few brief notes on all the salient points of the two classes of meetings. He used the back of an envelope for this but. I was unable to see the front or address surface of this envelope. After talking with me for approximately one and a half hours SARYTCHEV told me that he had nothing to further discuss with me. At this point we were in a neighborhood strange to me. After advising me that he had nothing further to discuss with me, SARYTCHEV merely turned and left me. I had no idea as to where I was and did not even have an idea as to the direction in which the elevated lay. I merely started walking and finally came to an elevated station (which one I cannot recall). I boarded an elevated train at this point and returned to Penn Station. Immediately following this I secured a train that returned me to Philadelphia.

"In order to make my regular December, 1949, meeting with the Soviets, I left Philadelphia early in the morning the first Sunday in December, 1949, and traveled to New York City. Although this was in direct disobedience to the instructions given me by SARYNCHEV that I should leave Philadelphia the night before in order to make such regular meetings, I left Philadelphia on Sunday morning in order to avoid friction at home. Following my arrival in New York I traveled by subway to the 90th Street or Elmhurst Avenue station, arriving at this point at approximately 10 a.m. After arriving at this station I went to the street corner beneath this elevated line that was the proper corner for me to be on when I had no desire to communicate with my contact. After remaining on this corner for approximately twenty minutes, and as I was not contacted, I secured a taxicab from a nearby cab stand and was driven by this cab to the Roosevelt Avenue - Jackson Heights station of the Queens - IND elevated line. My use of this taxicab was for the sole purpose of making better time and was not a devise used to forestall any surveillance of me. After reaching this elevated stop I boarded a New York bound elevated train and after my return to Penn Station secured a train that returned me to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Imring my attendance at this meeting place I did not observe anyone that anm ared to be interested in me.

"Just prior to the date set for my next regular meeting, the first Sunday in February, 1950, I read that Dr. KLAUS FUCHS, the British scientist with whom I had dealt in the past (in connection with atomic energy espionage, on behalf of the Soviets), had been arrested by the British authorities for espionage activity for the Soviets. I became extremely concerned over this but as my next regular meeting was scheduled for a Sunday following the arrest of FUCHS, I did nothing in the way of attempting to use the 'emergency meeting' method to contact the Soviets.

"On the first Sunday of February, 1950, I proceeded from Philadelphia to New York by train and after my arrival in Penn Station secured a subway to go to my regular meeting place at the 90th Street station or Elmhurst Avenue stop. After arriving at the meeting place I remained for several minutes on the location designated as 'my corner'; then becoming panicky I crossed over to my 'contact's corner.' After remaining on this corner for about five minutes I recrossed to my corner, remained several minutes, and then recrossed again to my 'contacts's corner.' Finally after some twenty minutes elapsed and I had not been contacted by a Soviet representative I gave up hope of any meeting. Once again I took a taxi to return to the Roosevelt Avenue — Jackson Heights station of the Queens — IND elevated and subway. There I secured a subway train that returned me to Pennsylvania Station where I got on a train for Philadelphia.

"I do recall there were possibly only four people that passed me during the time that I was at this regular meeting place in February, 1950. Inasmuch as I knew my contact would be smoking a cigar, I carefully observed all the people that passed me in an effort to put myself in a position that I could be approached by my contact. I might add that as agreed with SARYTCHEV I was smoking my curved-stem pipe so that my contact would recognize me. I was not contacted by a representative of the Soviets at this meeting place in February, 1950; however, I do recall having seen a picture of Julius Rosenberg in the Philadelphia papers and after later viewing his picture as well as other photographs submitted to me by Special Agent JOHN J. O'BRIEN, Federal Bureau of Investigation, New York City, I am now positive that I did see Julius Rosenberg at my regular meeting place in February, 1950. However, as I mentioned, neither ROSENBERG nor any representative of the Soviets approached me.

"I did not go to the regular monthly meeting place on the first Sunday in April, 1950. I was never contacted by SARYTCHEV following my last meeting with him on October 23, 1949, in the vicinity of the 180th Street stop of the Bronx - IRT sulway. During my contacts with SARYTCHEV this individual did not give me any money for any purpose other than having haid my taxi fare on one occasion as I previously mentioned.

"In addition to the foregoing information given by me concerning my contacts with SARYTCHEV, I have placed my name, the date, and the place on the back of the photograph of FILIPP TIKHONGVICH SARYTCHEV, whom I have positively identified as this contact of mine.

"I have read the foregoing statement consisting of this and eighteen other pages. I have initialled all corrections as well as placing my name at the bottom of each page of this statement. This is a true statement to the best of my knowledge and belief.

On the same date (November 1, 1950), GOLD, after identifying a photograph of SARYTCHEV as being the individual who contacted him on several occasions in 1949, briefly set forth the dates on which SARYTCHEV contacted him (as previously mentioned) on the reverse side of a phtograph of SARYTCHEV and affixed his signature, and the date and the place of his signing the picture.

The signed statement signed by GOLD on November 1, 1950 and previously mentioned in this report is being retained in the files of the New York Office. The photograph of SARYTCHEV, appropriately identified by COLD on November 1, 1950, is being retained in the files of the New York Office.

By teletype dated October 27, 1950, the Bureau, as well as all interested offices, were advised of the fact that GOLD had identified SARYTCHEV as being the individual contacting him on several occasions in 1949. In this same teletype, those offices having leads outstanding in this case were requested to disregard these leads.

By letter dated November 4, 1950, the Washington Field Office was requested to place a Lookout Notice with the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and a Stop Notice with the United States Customs in order that the New York Office might be advised of SARYTCHEV'S reentry into this country.

### Information from Informants

It will be recalled that in the reference report of the writer, information was set forth reflecting the date and place of both the subject's entry into the United States and departure from the United States, along with information reflecting his employment, business address, and home address while in this country.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, furnished information on October 14, 1946 that among individuals connected with the United Nations Organization in the United States was "Iraida Ivanovna Sarycheva," wife of an employee of Soviet representation; travelling on a special passport, born 1912, Kunora, Kalinsky District, with daughter Olga."


Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised on about February 20, 1947 that a list of Russian nationals in the United States at that time included Iraida Ivanovna Sarycheva. This informant described SARYCHEVA as "nousewife, born September 12, 1912, at Kinry, Kalininshaya obl., USSR; entered United States September 29, 1946 at Boston via SS MARSHAL GOVOROV; residence 123 West 90th Street, New York City."

On March 10, 1949, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, -advised that the subject's wife had contacted an unnamed New York Hospital advising she had not yet received a birth certificate for her baby born February 7, 1949. She gave her address as 153 Manhattan Avenue.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised that on September 30, 1949 a list of Soviet nationals connected with Soviet establishments here, listed subject and his wife as being so associated in the following fashion:

"FILIPP TIKHONOVICH SAR CHEV, employee, USSR, Mission to United Nations; 680 Park Avenue, residing at 153 Manhattan Avenue, Apartment 51, New York City with 'his spouse' RAISA IVANOVNA SAR CHEVA."



In connection with LHTT, just previously mentioned, it is to be noted that T-4 advised on April 5, 1950 that this individual was identical with MORTIMER LITT, Real Estate Agent, 51 East 93rd Street, New York City.
