Dear Friend:

More than a hundred prominent Americans, among them the Hon. Robert Morse Lovett, Dr. Katherine Dodd, Mrs. Bessie Mitchell, B. Z. Goldberg, Capt. Hugh N. Mulzac and others have joined with me in a world-wide appeal to bring about a reversal of the verdict and death sentence in the now-famous Rosenberg ease.

I shall not repeat the information contained in the enclosed pamphlet. You will recall that its author, Mr. William Reuben, was the crusading journalist who first broke the celebrated Trenton Six Case, in which the lives of all and the freedom of four have already been won.

I wish only to call attention to what we believe to be some very alarming features of the case: the prosecution, with the judge's consent, attempted to prove that "communist" and "spy" are synonymous and deserving of death; the Rosenberg's political opinions and their activities in behalf of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee was introduced as evidence of "guilty intent"; the young Rosenberg couple, parents of two small children, are the first and only persons ever sentenced to death in a U.S. civil court on a charge of espionage; a number of important newspapers among them the entire leading Yiddish press, were shocked by the death sentence and have asked whether anti-Semitism has not, in this case, found its ultimate and most deadly expression.

We are alarmed because if an individual's patitical views are proof of "guilty intent" to commit a crime punishable by death, then the lives of none are safe. We are alarmed that traitors to the United States like Axis Sally and Tokyo Rose are sentenced to ten years while a young mother of two children is sentenced to death. We are deeply troubled that this entirely unprecedented sentence was reserved for persons of Jamesh faith. We believe that we are not overstating when we say that all minorities, native and foreign born, will find themselves in dire jeopardy as a result of this unique trial and punishment.

We who have joined together to secure justice in the Rosenberg case differ in our political, social, religious and economic views. But we are agreed that the circumstances under which Mr. and Mrs. Rosenberg, and their co-defendant Mr. Morton Sobell, were tried and sentenced establish an ominous precedent that may bring disgrace to our country, as the Dreyfus case brought shame to France.

We hope that after reading this pemphlet you will agree with us that you and your associates and the organizations and houses of worship to which you belong should take steps to repair this wrong.

We urge that you write to President Harry S. Trumen, the Attorney General of the United States asking that the verdict be set aside and a new trial granted. We urge that you write to Judge Irving Kaufman, Federal Court House, New York City, asking that he reconsider his sentence.

As you may undoubtedly realize, this letter and the pamphlet have been made possible only by the voluntary contributions of thousands of persons from all parts of the country. We need additional funds for further printing, for advertisements, and tor legal expenses in connection with an appeal to the higher courts. We would appreciate any contribution you might care to make.

Should you want additional copies of this pamphlet they are available at 5¢ each, 100 for \$4, 1000 for \$15. We would be happy to send you additional information, speakers where possible, and to cooperate with you in establishing local committees to publicize the Rosenberg case.

We look forward to hearing from you.

Braving a chilling rain to voice their support for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, more than 1,000 people gathered in Straus Square, at East Breadway and Rutgers Thursday evening at a meeting sponsored by the New York Committee for Glemency for the Rosenbergs.

Shielding themselves with umbrollas, scarves, and shawls—standing in nearby decrease, on the corners of the intersection—looking from windows of surrounding apartments, the listeners heard a distinguished array of speakers call upon Precident Truman to spare the lives of the father and mother now in the Sing Sing prison death house where they've been since being convicted and condended on charges of giving atomic information to Russia during World War II. The neeting was chaired by Aaron D. Schneider, New York State Director of the Committee.

The Rabbi Dr. Meyer Sharff, told the audience that he was urging them to ask the President for elemency because I have studied long and deeply over the facts of the case, and they concern not only one human being, but four living souls, a father, a nother and two small sons. I ask you all, be you lew or now-low and regardless of your beliefs to ask the President to spare their lives.

Dr. M.E.B. DuBois, noted scholar, and Negro leader told the sudience I know what it is to be accused of a crime of which I was not guilty.

Dr. DuBois said that he was speaking out for clemency for the Rosenbergs both as a Negro and as one interested in the cause of American justice.

Speaking for Rabbi Louis B. Gross, publisher of the Jewish Examiner Albert Friedman, Managing Editor noted that the Rosenberg's sentence was "disproportionate to the others neted out on the case." He was referring to the 15 year sentence passed on David Groungiass the confessed spy was implicated his sister Mrs. Rosenberg and her husband who have stoutly maintained their innocence to this day.

Rabbi Max Felshin, Radio City Synagogie, said he had written to President Trumun urging elemency. The vacts of the case were given by Mrs. Emily Alann. Uanter Jacob Kaminsky sang a prayer for the Rosenbergs. Several hundred telegrams were sent from the neeling to President Truman.

The Dead Can't Confess!

WERE NOT TOO IMPRESSED with the sanctimonious argument that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg deserve the death penalty because they refuse to 'talk". This idea advanced, surprisingly, by a Rabbi and a Protestant clergyman, among others, smacks of gangster melodrama, not justice.

It would come more naturally from the police department or from a TV writer's perferved pen ("So you won't talk, eh?") than from spiritual leaders.

We're dealing with human beings, not bushels of potatoes. Two lives are at stake and two children may be orphaned.

Those who state the Rosenbergs should be granted their lives only if they "cooperate" cannot honestly claim moral or religious sanction for such a "deal."

It seems to us that these well-ineaning leaders minimize this vital question: Why were the Rosenbergs given the death penalty, although convicted of peacetime espionage for a wartime ally-while others got prison terms for the same crime?

Why does our government spare the lives of Nazi mass murderers like Gen. Eberhard Von Mackensen, who ordered 335 Italian hostages killed in Rome? Mackensen has been released from jail. So has Field Marshal Alfred Kesselring, another Nazi leader. And Franz Eirenschmalz, who helped murder Jews at Auschwitz had his death sentence reduced to a nine-year sentence. And there are many more.

Like Prof. Harold Urey, foremost atomic authority and Nobel prize winner and many others who have studied the trial record, we, who have also studied the trial record, are not convinced beyond a reasonable doubt that the Rosenbergs are guilty.

The idea that a convicted person who aids the authorities rates "consideration" may be valid up to a point—if rather crass. But it cannot morally be applied where the issue

But even those who hold a contrary view should support the elemency appeal, if only to assure an opportunity for ultimate repentance and confession—if there IS anything to confess. And if the Rosenbergs are innocent, what is there for them to reveal?

The names of 50,000 Americans of every race and creed, including outstanding leaders in every field, are signed to an amious cruise brief presented today to the Supreme Court in Washington, D. C. urging a new trial be given Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, young parents facing death after a trial which left grave Rabbi Abraham Cronbach doubts about their guilt. Attorney for the signers was Royal We Prance, a nationally prominent lawyer.

Two thousand people rang doorbells and spoke to prospective signers for six months to amass the signatures. Scores of thousandsor those who did not sign, explaining that they feared economic reprisals, "distributed material on the case, and in other ways aided in bringing the truth to the public.

In recent weeks those collecting signatures reported that literally tens of thousands had sent personal letters, telegrams and postcards to President Truman, urging clemency.

CHUR CHMAN MAGAZINE JOINS ROSENBERG CLEMENCY APPEAL.

NEW YORK MEETING NOVEMBER 13 AND NOVEMBER 19

The Rosenberg death sentences are "excessive and cruel," declares the Churchman in its latest issue, the Mational Committee To Secure Justice In the Rosenberg Case said today. The Churchman, a 150 year old Protestant Episcopal magasine called for clemency, saying "we believe that the execution of these two individuals will only hurt the name of the United States," and contrasts the sentences imposed on the Rosenbergs with "the far milder treatment" accorded to persons convicted of more serious crimes.

The Committee announced that final preparations are under way for two major New York meetings, one in Brooklyn at the Biltmore Hall on November 13th, and one in the Bronz at New Terrace Gardens on November 19th.

The Churchman editorial (Hovember 1, 1952) follows:

For the first time in the history of the United States two individuals are about to be executed for treason in peace time. They are Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, now in the death house at Sing Sing, convicted of having transmitted information on atomic fission to the Soviet Union.

The Churchman is in no position to pass judgment on the guilt or the innoceme of the Kosenbergs. We are concerned, however, because of two considerations involved in their case.

First, the information which they transmitted was given not to an enemy with whom the United States was at war but to an ally in that war. The sentencing judge stated openly that they should have known at that time that they were dealing with an enemy of their country. Isn't that to re-write history?

Second, it is a fact that Dr. Raymond Boyer, convicted of a similar crime in Canada, was sentenced by a Canadian court to imprisonment for two years; that Dr. Klaus Fuchs, who confessed to transmitting atomic information to the Soviet Union, was sentenced by a British court to imprisonment for fourteen years; and that David Greenglass and Harry Gold, each of whom confessed to being a "Soviet spy" at the same time that the Rosenbergs committed their offense, were sentenced by an American court to imprisonment for fifteen and thirty years respectively. Only the Rosenbergs, who appear by any reasonable standard to have been small fry alongside such brilliant physicists as Boyer and Puchs, received the death sentence.

Many prominent individuals, impluding leaders of the two largest Jewish organizations in America and the editors of the largest Jewish newspaper, have asked for some mitigation of this excessive sentence. It is legally possible for the Supreme Court to review the magnitude of the sentence, or for the sentencing judge to reduce it. As a final and last resort, there is the executive power of the President to exercise clemency.

The Churchman feels that the death sentence, in the light of the far milder treatment of more serious offenders than the Rosenbergs, is both excessive and cruel. We believe that the execution of these two individuals will only hurt the mane of the United States, and strengthen their cause as martyrs upon the alters of international communism. It will certainly be exploited in many nations as an example of unequal justice, motivated by the political factors involved. Readers who feel as we do may write to Judge Irving R. Kaufman, U.S. Court House, New York, requesting that he seriously consider a reduction of sentence in the interests of justice and mercy. Unless this is done, the execution of the Rosenbergs will take place within the next three weeks.

Letters should likewise now also go to the Governor of your state, to Congressmen, Mayors, and other officials, urging that they intervene with the President to grant Executive Clemency.

In the past six weeks, we have obtained advertising space in newspapers reaching some five million persons. We hope within the short time left to us to reach another five million. We know that we have called upon you before for financial help. We should like to suggest, at this time, that rather than make another contribution of your own if you have made one already, that you try to arrange a house party or some other sort of function at which urgently needed funds can be raised.

Washington DC -- Mary Church Terrell, 89-year-old Negro leader known throughout the world as educator, lecturer, linguist and fighter against injustice, today wrote President Harry S. Truman, urging that he extend executive clemency to Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

The noted leader said, in part, "I do not know whether they are guilty or not. I am not an expert on atomic science, but I do know that many persons whose knowledge and devotion to this country I respect deeply do believe there is some doubt about their guilt. Many more devoted Americans think that even if they are guilty, death in the electric chair is a punishment too severe ... I plead with you, Mr. President, to stay the executioner and let the Rosenbergs live."

Mrs. Terrell was, in 1895, one of the first two women and the first Negro woman ever to be appointed to the District of Columbia School Board. She assisted in the organization of the National Association of Colored Women, served many years as its first president and was voted a life honorary chairmanship. She also helped organize and became a charter member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in 1909, and her many awards include one from the Washington Chapter of the Americans for Democratic Action for her outstanding work against segregation and discrimination In recent years, she has enlisted co-workers of all races and creeds in the fight to end segregation in the District of Columbia.

The text of Mrs. Terrell's letter to the President follows:

Dear Mr. President:

I appeal to you with all the strength that my deep devotion to my America gives me - please save the lives of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

I do not know whether they are guilty or not. I am not an expert on atomic science, but I do know that many persons whose knowledge and devotion to this country I respect deeply do believe there is some doubt about their guilt. Many more devoted Americans think that even if they are guilty, death in the electric chair is a punishment too severe. As you know, this is the first time in the history of our country that such a sentence has been imposed in such a case.

Mr. President, I have had a life rich in opportunities and rewards. I have seen many injustices doen in my time. I know America can outlive injustices.

But I have seen my country grow in strength and reach out toward true brotherhood. I have seen it rise in the esteem of millions of my people and other peoples throughout the world.

I believe the United States of America is too big, too generous to be unmerciful. I believe America is strong enough to afford generosity.

But I know no nation is big enough or strong enough to become spiteful and unmerciful. What, Mr. President, if future developments make it clear that the Rosenbergs are not guilty? What if that discovery comes too late?

As one who has lived richly in America, who loves America and respects America, I plead with you, Er. President, to stay the executioner and let the Rosenbergs live.

NATION AND JEWISH FRONTIER BACK CLEARINGY FOR ROSENBERGS

The Nation and Jewish Frontier, two influential national magazines have editorially supported clemency for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg in their current issues. Dr. Bernard Loomis, Dean of the Divinity School c the University of Chicago also urged clemency.

In a full page article Freda Kirchwey, the Nation's editor and publisher declares that "what remains important as the day of execution approaches are the deeper considerations of humanity and mercy and an honest weighing of the Rosenbergs' offense against the irreparable punishment they face. It is not necessary to challenge their guilt; it is essential to ask whether the crime they committed, in the circumstances under which they committed it, justifies death."

Miss Kirchwey goes on to analyze the case and the government's charges that the Rosenbergs gave atomic information to Russia during World War II and concludes, "but it was not treason, and it was spying in behalf of an enemy country--however hard it is to keep that in mind in the atmosphere of cold war."

The Nation's editor points out that during the German saboteurs who slipped into the country and "they were also tried and sentenced to death. But they were not executed while the war lasted, and when it had ended and the problem of dealing with them arose, their sentence was commuted and they were sent to federal prison. The complete story of the German spies would provide excellent precedent for reducing, not confirming, the sentence against the Rosenbergs."

Miss Kirchwey notes the petitions for clemency of such "soberminded citizens as the Rev. Donald B. Cloward, Baptist leader of Trumen's church; Professor H. Richard Niebuhr of the Yale Divinity School; Dr. Harold Urey, atomic scientist and Nobel price winner; Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, and several hundred more have strong urged the moral duty of exercising clemency in this case." She notes that the latest petition while "conceding the fairness of the trial urges commutation as a striking demonstration that the spirit and behavior of a democratic people can be...objective, restrained, and humane."

"We recommend these words to President Truman in the firm belief that no finel act would better prove his courage and independence than the granting of clemency to these two convicted spies."

The Jewish Frontier, a spokesman of the Labor Zionist movement edited by Hayim Greenberg and harie Syrkin declared "we join those who sincerely petition the President to exercise hir right of executive clemency in this case." The Frontier asserts its belief that the Rosenbergs are "guilty" but declares that "the request for executive clemency implies going outside the law, acting lifnim meshurat hadin, in accordance with considerations that transcend the law..." The other consideration cited by the Frontier "concerns political ethics" and the editorial urges clemency because "this country should set an example of level headedness."

Dr. Loomis declared he was supporting the clemency appeal "not only because the sentence is out of proportion to the crime committed but also because the effect of this sentence in our present cultural crisis is more destructive than the crime of which the Rosenbergs have been accused."

WORLD SENTIMENT FOR CLEMENCY FOR ROSENBERGS SPREADS

From Rome the report comes that "non-Communist sidewalk sentiment..." favors
President Truman granting elemency to Julius and Ethel Resemberg according to
George Weller, correspondent for the Chicago Daily News Foreign Service.

"An act of morey to save the Rosenberg couple from the electric chair might be poor law in the United States but it would be very smart politics for America in the eyes of the world," declares Weller in the January 9 issue of the News. That is the conclusion one reaches from talking to non-Communists of different mationalities in an international city."

Clemency would also be "the smart thing for Truman or Eisenhower to do" declares the correspondent.

Meanwhile from Icoland the following noted citizens have joined in the worldwide appeal to the President of the United States to grant clemency to the Resembergs.

The harshness of their sentence is unprecedented in English speaking countries and stands in marked contrast to the comparatively light prison sentences imposed upon self confessed spics and traitors."

MORE EDITORIAL SUPPORT FOR ROSENBERGS' CLEMENCY

The Reconstructionist, organ of the Jewish Reconstructionist Foundation and the Jewish Examiner have called upon President Truman to grant clemency to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

In its January 9 issue the Reconstructionist declares "on grounds of humanity, the right to impose a death sentence for any orime is questioned by many ethical thinkers. And admitting the guilt of the Rosenbergs it is hard to see wherein their moral culpability exceeded that of others involved in the espionage to a degree that would warrant the death sentence."

The Reconstructionist disagrees with many areas of thought that have defended the Resembergs for various reasons but concludes "true they did not cooperate with the Government but are we prepared to say that such non-cooperation should spell the difference between life and death. Would it not be wiser to permit mercy to temper justice?"

The Examiner says "we're not too impressed with the sanctimonious argument that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg deserve the death penalty because they refused to 'talk'. This idea advanced, surprisingly by a Rabbi and a Protestant clergyman, among others, smacks of gangstor melodrama, not justice...

"It seems to us that these well-meaning leaders minimize this vital question;
Why were the Rosenbergs given the death penalty although convicted of peacetime
espionage for a wartime ally - while others get prison terms for the same crime?"

The Examiner citos the stand of Nobel prize Winner, Prof. Harold C. Urey "and many other who have studied the trial record..." and concludes, "we, who have studied the trial record are not convinced beyond a reasonable doubt that the Rosenbergs are guilty."

"But even those who hold a contrary view" declares the Examiner, "should support the clemency appeal, if only to assure an opportunity for ultimate repentance and confession - if there IS anything to confess. And if the Resembergs are innocent, what is there for them to conceal?"

*We will never stop marching" was the spoken sentiment of a woman marching in the 24 hour vigil at Delancy and Norfolk streets, to win elemency for Julius and Ethel Resemberg. She showed the feelings of all those who have joined the line since it began at 8 P.M., Friday, January 9th.

The vigil -- just one of many that have begun as the appeal to President Truman to save the Rosenbergs from death in Sing Sing grows -- is being sponsored by the Manhattan Committee to Socure Justice in the Rosenberg Case.

It began in the chilling rain Friday night with about 50 people. And since then more than 1,500 have marched and distributed more than 40,000 leaflots urging people to wire or write President Truman to grant clemency to the Rosenbergs.

Morchants in the neighborhood have donated coffee and cake to warm the marchers in the late hours of the night and the small hours of the morning.

And at no time have the vigil-keepers failed to spur interest and concerned comment among the thousands of passerbhy and this well travelled thorough-fare in the midst of the multi-racial East-side community.

The committee will sponsor a mass vigil and rally Saturday night, January 17th, at the same location at which time many prominent leaders from the community and from the city will add their voices to the growing appeals that the President grant elemency to the Rosenbergs.

WHITE HOUSE VIGIL CLOSES

Washington DC -- On the night of January 14th, Ethel and . Julius Rosenberg might have been electrocuted, with incalculable injury to our country's traditions of fairness and mercy. irrevocable tragedy has been averted, momentarily, by a stay of execution for which millions of Americans prayed and worked threlessly.

The Clemency Vigil which began at the White House on Saturday, December 27, 1952 - when it appeared possible that the Rosenbergs might be executed during the week of January 12th - will close at noon on Saturday, January 17th, after being conducted for more than 500 consecutive hours. It was participated in by lay and religious leaders of 22 states, and on January 5th was joined in by 1500 persons

We urge the many thousands who took part in the Clemency Vigil to return to their communities, inspired by their experiences at the Vigil and by their discussions with Senators, Congressmen and other government officials, to continue those efforts and actions which have already moved millions of Americans to seek clemency for the Rosenbergs.

The clemency decision may be made by President Truman or President-elect Eisenhower. The work and activities of those seeking clemency remains the same: to multiply by many times the great number of Americans who have already written to the President, or who have in other ways signified their desire that executive clemency be granted. We are hopeful that the President will be moved by the unmistakable, nation-wide sentiment for clemency.

Another Clemency and Prayer Gathering in behalf of clemenc for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg will be held in Washington, D.C. January 26, 1953 it was announced today by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case.

On January 5, more than 3,000 delegates from throughout the nation went to Washington, D.C. carrying appeals
from their communities, churches, synagogues and organizations urging the President to grant clemency to the
Rosenbergs. The Rosenbergs had been scheduled to dieon January 14.

A formal plea for Presidential clemency was made, and Federal Judge Kaufman stayed the execution.

In announcing the January 26 gathering, David Alman, Committee executive secretary declared, "the overwhelming response throughout the nation to the last national gathering for the Rosenbergs indicated that ever increasing numbers of Americans feel the Rosenbergs should not die. Since then many scores of thousands more have added their voices to the urgent appeal that Presidential clemency be granted the Rosenbergs."

As before the delegates will seek the support of Congressmen, Senators, other government leaders, and religious and labor organization leaders whose headquarters are in Washington.

Should presidential action come before the inauguration of the new administration, it was likely that the gathering will be canceled, Alman declared.

U.S. AND POREIGN UNIONS JOIN ROSENBERG CLEMENCY APPEAL

The Labor Committee to Secure Clemency for the Rosenbergs announced today that it has received a copy of a letter from Cleveland, Local 755 of the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers to President Trumen urging that he grant clemency to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

"It is our position that the death sentences meted out to these two workers was unusally severe in view of the fact that the United States government is permitting the release, almost daily, of Masi war oriminals who were responsible for the mass mirder of tens of thousands of people, the letter stated. "Many of these Mazis who were condemned to death have had their sentences commuted to that part of the sentence already served. We therefore feel that you should grant executive elementy to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg who were convicted upon extremely questionable testimony."

In New York City, the Teachers Union unanimously passed a resolution at its last membership meeting requested President Trumen to grant the Rosenbergs clemency. Many individuals telegrams were sent from the meeting.

The committee also received a copy of a wife from the Seattle Branch of the National Union of Marine Cooks and Stewards associating themselves with the recent plea of the famed physicist Barold C. Urey and with the "Churchman", Protestant Episoopalian organ, which called the death sentence on the Rosenbergs "excessive and cruel."

"At this critical hour" deck red the Seattle unionists "we call upon you to uphold our cherished American traditions of democracy and justice to all by granting elemency to the Rosenbergs."

The Committee also released the partial text of a letter from Maurive E. Travis, secretary-treasurer of the international union of the Mine, Mine and Smelter Workers (union listed for identification only) to President Truman.

"Allow me to urge you to extend executive clemency to Ethel and Julius Rosenberg so that their lives may be saved." Travis wrote. "I am sure your knowledge of the case indicates that this is the harshest sentence ever imposed on anybody in this country under similar circumstances. In the minds of a great many Americans there is serious doubt as to the guilt of the Rosenbergs... You as a leader of the American people and the Party you represent would be strengthened in the regard of your people by extending mercy in this case."

Meanwhile on the international labor front, it was learned that in England, Peter Freeman, Labor M.P. from Newport added his name to a petition asking President Truman to grant clemency to the Rosenbergs. The London Trades Council has joined the appeal as have the Hounslow Trades Council and 13 executive members of the Aux I gama ted Union of Foundry Workers of Great Britain and Ireland.

It was further learned that in Ireland the Belfast Trades Council has called President Trumen urging that he commute the Rosenberge' sentence.

Washington DC -- After over 500 consecutive hours, the White House Clemency Vigil for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg closed at noon today, January 17th. As hundreds of passersby watched and listened, the Vigil participants from many cities solemnly heard the Rev. H.S. Williamson deliver the 23rd Psalm and plead for life for the Rosenbergs

"Have mercy upon these two people for whom this Vigil has been kept so long - have mercy on the children who stand in the shadow of bereavement should they lose their parents," Rev. Williamson prayed.

"Put into the hearts of those in high places to extend mercy to Thy children, O God, and grant them clemency in Thy name."

The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case stated that the Vigil - which was swelled by the participation of 3000 persons from 22 states during the three weeks of its day-and-night duration - had closed because its purpose had been accomplished; the execution of the Rosenbergs, scheduled for the week of January 12th, did not take place. The Rosenberg clemency appeal is still pending and the court has granted a temporary stay of execution.

The Committee further stated that the Clemency Vigil, which has been unbroken since it began on December 27, 1952, closed out of respect for the new President and the festivities which would accompany the inaugural ceremonies.

The Committee urged all Americans to continue their messages urging executive clemency to the President as a means of experssing the overwhelming clemency sentiment pervading the nation.

In ruling that a new trial in the Rosenberg case should have been granted many months ago, and yet declining to grant one today, the U.S. Appeals Court has avoided the central question, the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case declared today.

Swan writing the opinion, ruled on December 31 that:

We may assume that in this case funfavorable pre-trial and during-trial publicity a cautionary instruction would not suffice, and that if the defendants had moved for a new trial it should have been granted. But they did not so move.

The Committee declared:

Where human life hangs in the balance, it would seem obligatory that the higher courts bend over backwards to insure utter fairness." To say that the Rosenbergs were entitled to a new trial many months ago, and yet to decline to grant them a new trial now is incredible. Should the Rosenbergs die simply because they expected, as they had a right to, that the verdict would not be influenced by unfavorable and misleading publicity? Should they be executed because of their faith in the courts? If a new trial, in the words of the Appeals Court, should have been granted at that time, should the Rosenbergs die because they did not, at that time, move for one? To admit that there are grounds for calling the trial unfair and then to refuse to correct the wrong can only injure the reputation of our courts in the eyes of the American people and the world.

Court the sworn confession by FBI agent John A. Harrington that he abetted one of the witnesses in committing perjury against the Rosenbergs, it becomes utterly unthinkable that the Rosenbergs be sent to their dearbeyond the hope of ever clearly establishing the traction of the charges on which they were tried.

Clemency Vigil participants reported telegrams of encouragement, offers of coffee and good wishes, especially from the New Year's eve crowds.

Washington, D.C.— leaders of several thousand delegates from 22 states, who have been arriving here for a "Clemency Cathering" for the Rosenbergs, appealed to President Truman tonight "to mark the close of your Administration in American history with a merciful grant of clomency" to the two young parents.

At the same time, leaders of the clemency group issued a nation-wide appeal to those of our fellow Americans who have so far hesitated to express their sentiments on this case and who have different views as to the innocence or guilt of the Rosenbergs" to set aside differences on the verdict and to appeal to President Truman to "extend executive clemency".

Late this afternoon, the first 400 delegates had registered in the clemency headquarters at 1857 Kalorama Road. A contingent of thirty from Los Angeles and San Francisco, headed by an official representative of the Regro Baptist Ministers' Alliance, a group of forty from Illinois, as well as large delegations from Massachusetts, Washington State, Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey had arrived.

As the delegates streamed into the capital by train, plane, bus and car, the Clemency Vigil before the White House, which had begun over a week ago, passed its 200th consecutive hour, the number of participants growing to 100 during the day.

Tomorrow, the majority of the participants of the clemency gathering will join the vigil before the White House, while others visit Congressmen, Senators, and the Justice and State Departments, to convey their sentiments for clemency.

Noting that President Truman will deliver a summary of his schievements to the American people on the night of January 15th, the clemency group's appeal to the President said:

Rillions of people, here and abroad, will associate your name with this set of many and will bless you for your act of humaneness.

Their appeal also asserted: "We believe that not once in the past twenty years has the death penalty in a federal offense been allowed to stand either by you or your predecessor. A few months ago, millions greeted your act of mercy in another case. We are hopeful that you will choose this occasion to demonstrate again your capacity for compassion and mercy."

In asking the American public for clemency messages to the President, the clemency gathering's leaders declared that the president faces a "manentous decision" and that in their opinion he "welcomes the counsel of American public opinion."

They also stated that the nation's "moral prestige in these years of tension and trial, can be immeasurably enhanced with an act of mercy toward the Rosenbergs."

In its statements, the clemency group said it includes those who believe in the fairness of the guilty verdict as well as those who believe the Rosenberg's repeated assertions of innocence" and that it represented groups from Churches, synagogues, labor unions, anti-capital pumishment associations as well as the many local Committees for Justice in the Rosenberg Case.

CALIFORNIA LAWYERS CIRCULATECLEMENCY APPEAL FOR ROSENBERGS

Three prominent California lawyers have written to nearly 1,000 members of the California bar urging that they appeal to Fred dent Truman for executive elementy for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, it was learned yesterday by the Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case. They are Robert W. Kenny, former California State Attorney General; Chaim Shapiro, leader in the Jewish community; and William B. Esterman, president of the Los Angeles and Beverly Hills chapters of the Rational Lawyers Guild.

In their joint letter dated December 23, 1952, the three lawyers raised several points of law declaring "although Supreme Court review has been decied, so clety has provided one last remedy for the Rosenbergs, i.e., executive clemency. In the interest of good administration of American justice, we ask you to join us in requesting that the President commute the sentences to life imprisonment."

The lawyers dealt with four points in their letters

- unprecedented animosity against these defendants, directly resulting from pre-trial publicity fed to the press by the Department of Justice. (Reversal of a conviction upon this ground in Delaney v. U.S.-C.A.1 Oct. 10, 1952 199 F. (2d) 107). Among other ways, this prejudice was carried to the jury in the form of repeated irrelevant references to defendants' alleged Communist Party membership..."
- (2) Although Judge Jerome Frank, of the 2nd Circuit, in affirming the conviction, said that without the testimony of David Greenglass, "the conviction could not stand" .. the testimony of this witness is open to question..."

The lawyers pointed out that Greenglass, while admitting he know no physics or mathematics claimed he d prepared an atomic-bomb "cross-section diagram" and handed it to the Rosenbergs. They further showed that while

Greenglass "testified that he had confessed espionage upon his arrest...the government has subsequently admitted that his confession occurred only after prolonged negotiations with him had taken place. It is noteworthy that, though melf-confessed, he was subsequently sentenced to a comparatively mild 15 years imprisonment on recommendation of the prosecution."

Third they noted that while many scientists hold that there is no atom bomb searet, "the trial proceeded on the theory as stated by the prosecution, the Roserbergs stole "the one weapon that might well hold the key to the survival of this nation."

And lastly "though there was no evidence whatever introduced of any causal connection between the alleged sots of the defendants and the Korean War, the court stated, as a reason for passing sentence of death that the defendants had by their sots "...caused, in my opinion, the Communist aggression in Korea." This would seem to be a clear case of erromous reliame on unsubstantiated assertions concerning matters not subject to judicial determination in a particular case. That such a consideration would have a highly prejudicial effect on the defendants' sentence can hardly be questioned."

The lawyers pointed out that never in the history of our country has a civil court decreed a doath sentence for espionage... To do so here, even assuming the justice of the conviction for espionage (for a then wartime ally) would, we believe, only hurt the name of the United States.

Believing that as lawyers we have a paramount duty to speak out on such occasions, we ask you to join with us, whether for reasons of doubt as to guilt or as to fairness of the trial or the sentence or general opposition to capital punishment or for still other reasons, in communicating with the President of the United States your request that the lives of the Rosenbergs be not taken..."

Dear Sir and Brother:

We wish to call to your attention the appeal being made throughout the world to save the lives of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

The Rosenbergs were convicted of "conspiracy to commit espionage" and were sentenced to death in the electric chair. They pleaded not guilty and have always maintained their innocence. No document or other material evidence that tied them in any way to the *conspiracy" charge was introduced at their trial. They were convicted solely on the basis of. oral testimony.

The validity of this oral testimony is open to serious question in view of the recent admission on the part of the F.B.I. that one of the government witnesses lied under oath. (See Enclosed leaflet). F.B.I. agent John A. Harrington withheld his knowledge of the perjury until defense counsel offered proof of it-twenty months after the trial!

This admission of perjury brings to mind the Tom Mooney case. He was convicted of throwing a bomb and was sentenced to death. World protests against the death sentence forced a commutation to life imprisonment. After some twenty years, during which it was shown that all of the testimony against Mooney was perjured, he was set free.

Many world-famous religious, civic, scientific and legal figures have expressed serious doubts as to the due process accorded the Rosenbergs and the nature of the testimony introduced in the court. Others, who feel that the Rosenbergs were given a fair trial, have expressed opposition to the death sentence, which is unprecedented. They point out that no others convicted of similar offenses ever received the death penalty.

Unions throughout the world are calling upon President Truman to commute the death sentence of the Rosenbergs, parents of two young children. In our country, the General Council of Ford Local 600, United Auto Workers, representing some 57,000 workers, recently called upon Truman for executive clemency. Among other unions that have taken similar actions are locals of the C.I.O. Shoe Workers, A. F. of L. Painters, A. F. of L. Jewelers, A. F. of L. Bakers, A. F. of L. Paper Workers, Fur Workers, Building Trades, Longshore and Warehouse Workers.

May we urge that you join in the appeal for executive clemency. We enclose the statement of Joseph P. Selly, International President, American Communications Association, which we are circulating to thousands of union leaders. Counsel for the Rosenbergs will submit this statement, signed by labor leaders, to President Truman when he appeals for commutation of sentence.

To add your name, please sign the enclosed card. Since the execution is set for January 12, we ask you to return the card to us immediately, by air mail. Should other names be available, have them sign on the back of the card.



Four Good Reasons

Justice will be served if the death sentences given Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, convicted of atomic espionage, are commuted to life sentences.

The feeling is inescapable that the severe sentences would not have been passed had not this couple been members of a minority group.

This feeling is bolstered by the fact that never before in the history of the United States has a civil court given a death sentence for espionage.

There are also grave doubts in this case. One is that the government based its case almost exclusively on the uncorroborated testimony of a free lance spy, who by involving the Rosenbergs managed to escape the death penalty and secure for himself a 15-year sentence.

Another is the testimony of Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, Dr. Harold Urey and others that in 1945, the date of the Rosenberg crime, there existed no basic atomic secrets.

Actually at that time it was not certain whether any nation could even produce an atomic bomb.

There may be others, but we think these four reasons are sufficient to justify the President in commuting the death sentences to life imprisonment.

. EXCESSIVE PUNISHMENT

Treason is the most serious crime which can be committed against a state. The maximum penalty is death. Charges of treason however are a favorite device of tyrants, despots, would be dictators and morally unscrupulous politicians to stop criticism, eliminate opposition or advance their lust for power and personal aggrandizement.

Our forefathers who knew a good bit about such things—having been charged with treason and threatened with hanging by a tyrant for petty offense—deliberately wrote into the Constitution of the United States provisions relating to treason surrounding the accused with protection against easy conviction.

"Treason," says the Constitution, "against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act or on confession in open court."

It would seem to one that so far as crimes related to treason are concerned in which the death penalty can be imposed it would only be right and proper, or even more so, that the accused should have the same protection as is accorded those charged with treason. For after all those hung for something less than treason are just as dead as those hung for the greater crime of treason itself.

What even we Americans are now doing however is to try persons who can not be convicted of treason, for something we call espionage or conspiracy to commit espionage, find them guilty and sentence them to be hung. Which is the most we could possibly do to them if they were guilty of treason. And we do this without surrounding those accused of such lesser crimes with the protections they would have if charged with the greater crime of treason.

It does not make sense on any other theory than that it is an ingenious way to get around the Constitution and open the way for possible future tyrants to hang persons without having to do away with the Constitution.

It has already become so bad that an accused might well be in less jeopardy of his life if charged with major treason itself; rather than with some minor treason under some other name.

That is just what is so morely wrong about the Rosenberg case. The Rosenbergs could not have been convicted for treason. That is conceded. So they are charged with conspiracy to commit espionage, found guilty and given the death sentence.

It is not the conviction of the Rosenbergs that is at fault. It is the death penalty for a far less serious crime than treason for which under the Constitution they could not be convicted, the imposition of a sentence that was just as severe as though they had actually been found guilty of treason itself.

It is a sorry state of affairs when such things can happen in United States, fraught with dire danger to our future welfare. It is our honor that is at stake in this Rosenberg case and we are not acquitting ourselves well when we permit fear and hysteria to induce us to use such bad judgment as to kill persons for something less than treason whom our Constitution prevents us from killing for treason itself.

Sign Letter to President Asking
Clemency-Rods in Paris
Protect at Embasey

Pitteen hundred Christian clergymen have signed an open letter to President Truman requesting executive clemency for Julius and Ethet Rosenberg, empricied atomic spice.

Their execution has been postponed pending the President's action on an appeal filed last Saturday by the Rosenbergs, who were originally schemied to be put to death in Sing Sug tonight.

The names of the clergymen who signed the open letter to Mr. Truman were made public yesterday by the Rev. Dr. Jesse W. Stitt, paster of the Village Presbyterian Church and a former president of the Manhattan division of the Protestant Cruncil of the City of New York.

Among the spectrum of the letter were the Rev. Dr. James Luther Adams of the Mesfeville Theological Seminary; the Rev. Dr. Roland H. Bainton, Tale Divinity School; the Rev. Dr. Rohert M. Hopkins.

Dony Partisanship

"We are not partisans," the letter reads. "Our plea does not hang on the decision of the Rosenbergs" guilt or innocence, nor the degree of their wrongdoing. We ask you in the spirit of the love which casts out fear to mitigate a punishment of such terrible finality, and which, for the offense, is unique in our history."

This was the letter that the Rev. of Dr. John Heuss, rector of Trinity of Protestant Episcopal Church, refused to sign. On Monday, he and nounced that he had written Dr. Adams that he considered "the derime which the Rosenbergs were convicted for one of the worst in the annals of mankind."

Pleas on behalf of the Rosenbergs have recently been sent to the White House by a group of close relatives of the convicted couple.

"Time is very short," one of the sisters said. "Pisase give these two young parents of two small chilingen a chance to live so that some play they will be able to prove their innocence. From the time they were first arrested, with no knowledge of the charges, they asid they were innocent, and maintain their innocence to this day."

Dear Friend and Weighbor:

Pope Pius XII has interceded for mercy for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Since His Holiness so rarely intervenes in matters of this sort, this latest addition to clemency pleas by distinguished personages should give hope and courage to those of us who would swell the rising chorus of decent Americans to halt this savage execution.

Death is so irrevocable.

In the words of Prof. Harold C. Urey, atomic physicist, "Would it not be embarrassing in this general situation if after execution of the Rosenbergs it could be shown that the United States had executed two innocent people...." Elsewhere in the same letter, Prof. Urey questions the conclusiveness of the scientific evidence in this "atom-spy" case, in which Professors Albert Einstein and other eminent scientists also concur.

The legalistic aspects of the case (as well as the unprecedented and amazing death sentence) have been questioned and attacked by leading jurists here and abroad, including the Hon. James H. Wolf, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Utah, as well as many outstanding professors of law, and practising attorneys.

As for the numbers of notables, religious leaders and thoughtful people all over the world who have pleaded for clemency on purely humane grounds, regardless of the legal aspects of the case, these are far too numerous to list here.

We urge you, as members of an intellectually enlightened community, to write or wire President Eisenhower to reverse his decision.

There must be no delay...lest America and our own consciences be forever shamed.

Astivity has been stopped up in the last two weeks as the time grows shorter in which to save the lives of the Rosenbergs. The following is a summary of some of these activities.

Many Unions have passed resolutions appealing for elemency, which in turn have been sent on to Washington...the most recent one to do so is the Cleveland local of wine Will and Smelter Workers.

The Cleveland Baptist Ministers Alliance (Negro) and the Methodist Ministers Association (Megro) has given time at their regular meeting to a member of our committee to speak on the Rosenberg case.

A distribution of leaflets at local points throughout the city was quite successful this past week. Shop gate distributions are planned for the very near future.

Prominent people in the community have been visited individually and apart from committee auspices. Many have indicated their feeling for elemency and stated that they would write a letter on their own.

Soveral City Councilmen have been seen and expressed their own individual feeling in favor of elemency. An effort will be made by these councilmen to initiate group action.

****** REPORT OF WASHINGTON DELEGATION ********

Sixtoon Clevelanders joined in the Mational Clemency Vigil in Mashington on January 4th and 5th. They were part of the continuous vigil picket line at the White House which at one time reached a couple of thousand. Our delegation visited three Chio Congressmens Rep. Crosser reiterated his feelings against capital punishment; Rep. Bolton expressed her personal concern over the death sentence and indicated she would make an effort for a group appeal among other Congressmen.

The wide support for elemency was shown in many ways: -22 states sent delegations....their reports showed the tremendous amount of work being done throughout the nation....San Francisco's delegation brought a huge scroll containing 1700 names.....500 leading elergymen of Milwaukee (of all faiths), representing 2/3 of that city's religious leaders, signed a letter to the President imploring him to grant elemency.

Greenglass: The Man Who Sent Sister to Death Cell

Since the day Cain murdered Abel, treachery between blood kin has darkened history's pages. And when David Greenglass dragged his sister Ethel and brother-in-law Julius into an espionage query.

he set in motion the events that put them in the death house.

"Baby" of the family, David was Ethel's special pet, as was his wife Ruth. When he came to the Rosenbergs in 1950 hinting he was in trouble, they grew werried but, before anyone could help, the FBI seized Greenglass on \$100,000 bail, held him in solitary confinement and hammered out a barrage of questions.

Greenglass hired lawyer O. John Rogge, who later tried to send world-famed Negro historian Dr. W. E. B. DuBois to jail by testifying against him. That case was thrown out of court but Rogge scored a "success" in helping Greenglass, After negotlating with the FBI and Prosecutor Saypol, the Rosenbergs names were added to the esplonage indictment.

Greenglass claimed he firew a "cross-section diagram" of the bomb and gave it to Ethel and Julius. Scientists, he said, passed by his machine. He said he sneaked up behind them and pieced together scraps of their talk until he was able to draw the diagram and 12 pages of formulae.

This happened in 1944, Seven years later, allegedly without any eaching or notes, Green-glass was able to reproduce that diagrams



The answer is terribly clear. To begin with, the "crimes" imputed to the Rosenbergs were alleged to have taken place in 1944 and 1945 when the Soviet Union was our staunch ally.

"It is difficult," says Rabbi Abraham Cronbach, noted scholar and author, "to see why Russia should, at that time, have found espionage at all necessary The U.S. was, at that time, sharing its military secrets with Russia."

Case is Unprecedented Example of Injustice

Today, two young parents face death. The trail that leads from happy, hard-working home on New York's lower East Side to the death house at Sing Sing is a terribly short one.

In the summer of 1950, Ethel Rosenberg's brother, David Greenglass, was accused of stealing A-bomb secrets from the Los Alamos project. Greenglass said

he gave the secrets to the Rosenbergs. (See p. 4 for the inside story of why a brother may have sent his sister to the death house).

Brought to trial on Green giass' evidence, the Rosenbergs were not charged with any open



When David Greenglass, one of the machine shop partners. pulled out of the business, Julius Sobell; they found the Sobell Elitcher, who owed his very job agreed to pay him \$1,000. I shall find that 'courage, confidence and perspective to see me through the days and nights of bottomiess horror, of tortured screams I may not utter."

"When you see the Warden next," Ethel begged her attorney, "won't you plead with him to allow me to have Michael's plant outside the cell?" Her son had sent her a green plant she was not allowed to see, "At. the very least, couldn't I see it just once?"



Eisenhower's denial of elemency to Ethel & Julius Rosenberg, public sentiment for commutation of the death sentences has increased, it was reported today by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg case.

however, whether execution (of the Rosenbergs) will best
serve the long-term interests of the United States....*

Under the headline "Why Kill Them," the Buffalo

News asks: "Will the taking of their lives accomplish

any good purposet...killing them won't solve any problems."

Discussing the Pope's appeal to Pres. Eisenhower to spare the Rosenbergs lives, the Des Moines Register suggests that "it might be a good stroke...if a popular move to abolish the death penalty got going...." In another editorial the Register points out that "There is certainly unequal justice in electrocuting the Rosenbergs and letting Klaus Fuchs...off so easily."

The University of Minnesota Daily calls a denial of clemency another blow against the unity America is trying to achieve in Europe.

Alarmed at red-baiting attacks on those who seek clemency for the Rosenbergs, the Mitchell, S.D. Republic demands that "Americans must continue to stand up for what they think is right..."

In like vein, Rabbi A.H. Blumenthal of Mt. Vernon, N.Y., in a letter to the Argus there charges that "it is the height of irresponsibility to label all who are opposed to the death sentence as "Commies or Pinkos."

amr. President:

The Rabbinate of France, profoundly moved by the death sentence pronounced on Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, but wishing to avoid any exploitation of this plea for political purposes, respectfully appeals directly to you to implore you to use your prerogative of clemency in their behalf.

Troubled in conscience by certain indications, and convinced together with an important section of public opinion of the extreme severity of the sentence handed down by Judge Irwin Kaufman, the French Rabbinate joins with all European persons sincere friends of American democracy — in asking this measure of clemency in the very name of our common ideal of justice and of generosity which we derive from the Bible.

With confidence in the spirit of equity and humanity to which your life bears testimony, the French Rabbinate hopes, Mr. President, that you will not allow to be carried out this punishment which is without precedent in the West and which, in addition to the persons of the Rosenberg couple, will affect two young children.

M. Julien Racamond, secretary of the CGT of France (General Confederation of Workers), with a membership of over five million, cabled this message: "We will not rest until our protests to Pres. Eisenhower are heard and the Rosenbergs receive justice."

R. Gilbert De Chambrun, deputy of the French National Assembly and descendant of Lafayette holds an hereditary honorary U.S. citizenship, cabled: "I hope that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg obtain clemency as demanded by the greatest section of public opinion in all countries of the world."

Adding his voice to the clemency appeals was Chief Government Attorney Mornet of France, presiding judge at the trial of Marshall

Petain, who said: "I consider the testimony on which the Rosenbergs were convicted as in no way conclusive. The decision to save them will be made in a country whose love of democracy and liberty is equal to that of France."

The distinguished British attorney, D.N. Pritt, Queen's Counsellor, sent an appeal for elemency as did the French Pastor, Father L. Vienney. Some of the other expressions of elemency were the following:

New York, N.Y., March 13, 1953 —— A clemency petition addressed to the U.S. government is being signed by hundreds of people in Trieste, urging that the Rosenbergs be returned to their two small boys.

In Paris, the nationally prominent attorney Paul Villard is circulating the Rosenberg's dlemency petition among his colleagues, as Italian lawyers are also planning to do.

People of all creeds and political opinions in France, Villard reports, Pray for the salvation of the two innocents, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Millions of people have their name and picture in their hearts.

At the memorial tablet erected in Genoa, Italy to murdered partisan fighters, a wreath has just been placed with a placard asking: "Let us give back the Rosenbergs to their sons."

The Democratic Women's Organization of Israel has petitioned the president to commute the murderous death sentence and ... prevent the assassination of innocent people. We Jewish women regard this brutal sentence ... (as) injuring the honor of every honest person.

A number of outstanding French Catholics have appealed for clemency, including Father Hartin Berger; Louis Martin Chauffier, co-manager of Figaro; Albert Beguin, executive editor of Esprit, and senators, deputies and professionals.

The Independent Labor Party of England adds four voice to others and appeal (s) to the President of the U.S.A. that the Rosenbergs should be allowed to live.

In both East and West zones of Germany, attorneys, pastors, artists and trade unionists have joined in asking elemency. These include Stuttgart and Stockstadt victims of the Nazi Regime, 150 citizens of Muhlheim, all employees of an Oschersleben candy factory, the Hamburg Tenant's Association, the former Attorney-general of Ludwigshafen and many others.

Belgian senators and congressmen of many political beliefs have joined Henri Rolin, head of the senate, directors of hospitals and other public services, attorneys and journalists in urging President Eisenhower to grant the Rosenbergs clamency.

In <u>Peking</u>, Shen Chun-ju, Vice President of the International Association of Lawyers, stated: "I fully support the American people's struggle for ... the release of the innocent Rosenbergs." Dr. Hei Ju-ao, former judge of the Far East International Hilitary Tribunal, termed the death sentence a *most brutal insult to human justice."

Lutheren, Congregationalist and ministers of other denominations hold a public prays: meeting in Peking for the Resentergs, followed by an appeal from 18 Universe Christian churches and societies, including YMOA's calling on U.S. Christians to work for clemency for the Rosenbergs.

NEW YORK, N.Y.---While signs and slogans go up on walls all over Italy protesting the death sentences meted out to Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, world-famed figures of every political belief there are taking public stands on the controversial case, asking that clemency be granted the couple.

Alberto Moravia, whose novels lastuding A Woman of Rome have gained an international audiance, called the dooming of the Rosenbergs "an infamous act" which moved him "to indignation.... humanely speaking there is no proportion between the guilt attributed to the Rosenbergs and the death penalty."

Joining Mcravia was the outstanding film director, Giuseppe De Santis, famed for his movie <u>Fitter Rice</u>, who scored President Eisenhower's denial of clemency to the Rosenbergs. "Too many doubts have aprung up on all sides," DeSantis charged. "Even the conservative press has had to admit it and is fighting...for clemency."

The deen of Italian letters, one of his nation's greatest
living poets, Salvatore Quasimode, who is strongly anti-Communist,
said. "How shameful is the spilling of this blood!"

In addition to these and other statements, a group of leading cultural figures addressed a crowded public meeting on March 1st in one of Rome's largest theatres, Teatro Valle. Under the slogan: "SAVE THE LIVES OF ETHEL AND JULIUS HOSENBERG," such leaders as Prof. Concetto Marchesi of the University of Padua, film star Marina Berti, renowned peot Sibilla Aleramo and Senator Terracini called for clemency.

A young married couple, both members of trade unions, sit in the death house today, convicted of "conspiracy to commit espionage."

Nobody argues that spies should go unpunished.

But there are two things we want to be sure of before punishing people especially when that punishment is death.

Thousands of other lawyers and scientists and sociologists say the same

They have read the court record in the Rosenberg Case—and they fear the jury was influenced by newspaper stoties and the general atmosphere of tension that exists today. They point to the fact that the Rosenbergs weren't even charged with giving secrets to Russia—but with "conspiring" to do that. That means that the prosecution knew it couldn't prove a tase of "espionage." They point out that, just as in the famous Tom Mooney case, the FBI has admitted that perjured testimony was used to convict the Rosenbergs.

CRUEL AND UNUSUAL PUNISHMENT

Millions of Americans, through letters to the President, through prayers, special resolutions in their unions and fraternal organizations, churches and synagogues, have asked that the death sentence be commuted—while taking no stand on the innocence or guilt of the Rosenbergs.

Among them are over 2,000 Protestant clergymen, the Nation magazine, the New Republic, trade unions, women's prganizations, and others.

They ask for elemency because the Rosenbergs are the first and only Amerscans ever sentenced to death on such a charge—in peacetime or wartime.

- Even people convicted of treason—of dealing with an enemy—have been given only 10 year sentences (Axis Sally, Tokyo Rose, others).
- Death sentences in political cases (Sacco-Vanzetti, Tom Mooney, for example) always add to the hysteria of the times, and are used by anti-labor elements to deprive the unions of their rights.

Only a New Trial can answer these questions

 Why did Prosecutor Saypol use perjured testimony to help convict the Rosenbergs?

FBI Agent John A. Harrington admitted in a sworn affidavit, on December 1, 1952, that, with HIS knowledge, a government witness lied at the trial.

• Why didn't Prosecutor Saypol call top atomic scientists Dr. Harold C. Urey and Dr. S. Robert Oppenheimer to testify after he had announced to the court and the press that they would be witnesses?

Dr. Urey subsequently made a public statement saying, "I found the testimony of the Rosenbergs more believable than that of the Greenglasses."

 Why did Prosecutor Saypol rely on the testimony of David Greenglass, a machinist with no scientific education, who said he drew up a sketch of the atom bomb by "overhearing" conversations?

Greenglass, who admitted he stole secrets from the government, received a fifteen year sentence after he implicated the Rosenbergs. His wife, also a confessed spy, was never even indicted and is free today.

 Why did Prosecutor Saypol falsely announce to the press that another "spy" would support Greenglass's testimony?

After sensational headlines in the newspapers this "spy" was never produced. The U.S. Court of Appeals called Saypol's conduct "wholly reprehensible" and one "that cannot be too severely condemned." They said that Saypol's action should have caused a mistrial.


