1200 CLERGYMEN FROM THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY SEAR SERVING IN INDEPENDENT APPEAL FOR MORTON SOBELL'S FREEDOM

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov.21--An appeal to President
Eisenhower to free imprisoned scientist Morton Sobell before
leaving office was announced today by spokesmen for 1200
clergymen of different faiths who have joined in the request.

The appeal to the President, signed by many of America's most eminent ministers and rabbis, stated:

"Whenever human beings are involved in matters of judgment and justice, there does exist the possibility of human error. Most particularly, when a trial reflects the national tensions of the day, the verdict may suffer from prejudice or unreason, too difficult to dismiss. Every American who thinks about his own freedoms cannot help but concern himself when the question of this kind of an injustice is raised.

"It is impressive, therefore, that throughout his imprisonment, Morton Sobell has proclaimed his innocence.

Moreover, thirty years is a lifetime sentence that the mother, wife, and children of Morton Sobell share with him.

"It is the quality of mercy that insists that we, who feel the conscience of the United States as a particular responsibility, address you, Mr. President, to ask that you use your great office to urge a new trial for Morton Sobell, or grant him clemency by commutation of his sentence."

The appeal was made public by a delegation of representative clergymen who had come to Washington to speak with government officials about the request for action in Sobell's behalf. It had been initiated on the West Coast by Reverend Peter McCormack of San Francisco and other California clergymen.

Reverend McCormack, a Presbyterian minister for more than 50 years, was Protestant Chaplain at Alcatraz during Morton Sobell's imprisonment there, and became convinced of his innocence. He has since been seeking to arouse the conscience of the country to obtain Morton Sobell's release.

During the past weekend a National Appeal for Freedom was held in Sobell's behalf in Washington. It featured an exhibit on the Sobell case at the Hotel Shoreham, a banquet addressed by nationally known speakers, a prayer at the White House on Sunday, and a panel discussion on facts and issues concerning the much-discussed imprisonment of Sobell.

The Washington weekend program was sponsored by such nationall known individuals as Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr and Dr. John C. Bennett of the Union Theological Seminary in New York; Roger Baldwin, Chairman of the International League for the Rights of Man; Norman Thomas; and Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Last week another independent appeal--one by 600 educators, lawyers, writers and other Americans--was made public. Asking the President to free Sobell were such individuals as Clarence Pickett of the American Friends Service Committee; Harold Cranefield, attorney and general counsel for the International Union, United Alto Workers; author James T. Farrell; Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel Prize scientist, and Alexander Meiklejohn, civil libertarian.

Morton Sobell is now at the Atlanta Federal prison enduring the 11th year of his 30-year sentence. Last week David Greenglass, who had pleaded guilty to charges of conspiracy to commit espionage, was released from prison after serving 10 years. Many who have studied the record have criticized the 30-year sentence imposed against Sobell as being far out of proportion to sentences given to such persons as Greenglass; Klaus Fuchs and Allan Nunn May in England, and to Francis Powers in the recent U-2 episode.

A special inquiry into the Sobell case was made by an independent group that included Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, and Professor Edmond Cahn of the New York University Law School. The group called the case against Sobell "vague in content and slender in proof," and recommended a commutation of sentence.

STATEMENT BY DISTINGUISHED THEOLOGIANS AND LAW PROFESSORS AFTER INDEPENDENT INQUIRY INTO THE FACTS IN THE SOBELL CASE THE UNDERSIGNED are American citizens who believe that the sentence of Morton Sobell should now be commuted. Sobell was convicted of conspiring with others to transmit to the Soviet Union writings and information relating to the national defense of the United States and was sentenced on April 5, 1951 to serve thirty years in Federal Prison. Morton Sobell was tried with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg who were convicted of espionage in connection with the atomic bomb and who were sentenced to death and later executed. Sobell, however, was never implicated in any way with involvement in the atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. This fact was confirmed by the judge who sentenced Sobell, This statement is not concerned with the Rosenberg conviction. The undersigned are and consistently have been convinced anti-Communists. None are associated with any organization, committee or group of any kind concerned either with the case of the Rosenberg or that of Sobell, nor are any of the undersigned connected in any way with Morton So ell or any members of his family. After study of the case, we believe that the following considerations warrant a commutation of the very heavy sentence Sobell is now serving.... 1. Sobell was never implicated with atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. The charges against Sobell, supported mainly by the testimony of one man. Max 2. Elitcher, were that he had solicited information, and had on one occasion taken something which looked like a can of film to Julius Rosenberg. No specific item of information supposed to have been secured b. h.m or transmitted by him to anyone else is specified in the record. The case against him, therefore, is vague in content and slende, ... proof. The possibility that a trip to Mexico which he and his family took should be construed as flight cannot be ignored, though it is subject to various interpretations. 3. Whether or not the judge and prosecution made sufficient efforts to provide a tartrial, we ought to recognize that the emotions surrounding the trial of the Rosenbergs and the fact that Subell's case was tried with theirs made it difficult to separate the Caand to recognize the very different character of the two charges and the evidence introduced to support them respectively.

4. Sobell has already served, with good conduct, nearly eight years in prison, six of them in Alcatraz. 5. As Americans we are fully aware of the threat of communism to our trendom and way of life. Any attack on that freedom from without or within must be resisted. Nevertheless, one of the factors which makes that freedom so precious is its capacity to practice a disciplined and humane administration of justice precisely in those cases where emotions are aroused which make it difficult to remain objective about the merits of a specific case. 

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



Dear Editor:

If you agree that the following is a fair recommendation in the Morton Sobell case, will you publish this editorial or a similar one in your publication?

Authorities cited in the editorial are quoted more fully in the brochure announcing the national appeal in Washington.

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Not TO BE SI

One of the qualities in which our democracy justifiably takes pride is our concern for the individual. It is not surprising that when a cry is raised of a possible injustice to a fellow American, the national conscience is affected.

A number of distinguished individuals and organizations are raising questions concerning the trial and 30-year sentence of Morton Sobell on a charge of conspiracy to commit espionage. Sobell, you will recall, was in the same trial with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, although he was not accused of atomic espionage. He has throughout his imprisonment, now in his 11th year, maintained his innocence, and the Rev. Peter McCormack, who was the Protestant chaplain at Alcatraz while Sobell was held there, believes Sobell.

We are impressed by the fact that those appealing in Sobell's behalf include individuals and groups who in no way could be labeled Communist. For example, a study of the record was made by a group including one of the most distinguished theologians in America, Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, and leading law professor Edmund Cahn of New York University. They found the evidence against Sobell "vague in content and slender in proof."

Roger Baldwin, who has guarded our civil liberties for many decades, calls the 30-year sentence far too severe. One thousand ministers and rabbis have appealed to President Eisenhower, and the 1960 national convention of the Conference of American Rabbis adoited a resolution asking a review of the facts. It is significant too that an educator with the meticulous standards of Professor Sidney Hook, who assumes Sobell guilty of the charge, recommends his release and points out that the sole witness against Sobell merely testified to unsuccessful attempts to procure information.

Whatever the differing points of view about various aspects of this affair, there is a widespread unity of opinion that the 10 years Sobell has endured in prison, including nearly six in Alcatraz, is more than enough pumishment.

It is difficult to see how Sobell's further prolonged imprisonment at public expense can at this point serve the national security. On November 19, 20 and 21 a national appeal is taking place in Washington, D.C., to urge a Presidential commutation of sentence for Morton Sobell during the traditional Christmas amnesty period. We believe this request should be given the utmost consideration.

They are requesting a Presidential commutation during the traditional Christmas amnesty season. Mrs. Morton Sobell announced today that 79

Mrs. Sobell, who has been fighting to prove innocence of Morton Sobell on conspiracy to commi espionage charges and obtain his release, said sh would be in Philadelphia on Sunday to address a gathering of persons interested in learning about or helping with her husband's case.

The meeting will take place at 2 P.M. on Sunday, Dec.18, in the Christian Association auditorium at the University of Penngylvania. A featured event will be the showing of a national exhibition on the Sobell case which was presented at a three-day gathering recently he in Washington, D.C. under sponsorship of eminent Americans. Admissions free.

Morton Sobell is in the 11th year of a 30-year sentence impose in the Rosenberg trial. He is at the federal prison in Atlanta, Ga o which he was transferred after having spent more than five years in Alcatraz.

A study of his case by an independent group that included Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr of the Union Theological Seminary in New York Professor Edmund Cahn of the New York University Law School, has called the case against Sobell "vague in content and slender in proof," and recommended a commutation of sentence to time served.

Among the nationally known individuals who have urged Morton Sobell's release are Clarence Pickett of the American Friends
Service Committee; author James T. Farrell; Roger Baldwin, chairman of the International League for the Rights of Man; Rev. Martin Luth King, Jr.; Norman Thomas; Rev. Peter McCormack, protestant chaplain at Alcatraz during Morton Sobell's imprisonment there; Rabbi Mauric Eisendrath, and Rabbi Israel Goldstein.

Reasons advanced for action in Sobell's behalf include pleas the sentence was out of proportion to evidence presented at the trithat the trial could not have been fair in the atmosphere that prevailed, that Sobell should have been tried separately from the Rosenbergs since he was not accused of any connection with the atombomb project, or that he is in fact innocent as he has maintained throughout his ordeal.

Every American who thinks about his dwn freedoms cannot help but concern himself when the question of this kind of an injustice is raised.

"It is impressive, therefore, that throughout his imprisonment, Morton Sobell has proclaimed his innocence. Moreover, thirty years is a lifetime sentence that the mother, wife, and children of Morton Sobell share with him.

"It is the quality of mercy that insists that we, who feel the conscience of the United States as a particular responsibility, address you. Mr. President, to ask that you use your great office to urge a new trial for Morton Sobell, or grant him clemency by commutation of his sentence."

### **STATEMENT**

BY DISTINGUISHED THEOLOGIANS AND LAW PROFESSORS AFTER INDEPENDENT INQUIRY INTO THE FACTS IN THE SOBELL CASE

THE UNDERSIGNED are American citizens who believe that the sentence of Morton Sobell should now be commuted. Sobell was convicted of conspiring with others to transmit to the Soviet Union writings and information relating to the national defense of the United States and was sentenced on April 5, 1951 to serve thirty years in Federal Prison.

Morton Sobell was tried with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg who were convicted of espionage in connection with the atomic bomb and who were sentenced to death and later executed. Sobell, however, was never implicated in any way with involvement in the atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. This fact was confirmed by the judge who sentenced Sobell.

This statement is not concerned with the Rosenberg conviction. The undersigned are and consistently have been convinced anti-Communists. None are associated with any organization, committee or group of any kind concerned either with the case of the Rosenbergs or that of Sobell, nor are any of the undersigned connected in any way with Morton Sobell or any members of his family. After study of the case, we believe that the following considerations warrant a commutation of the very heavy sentence Sobell is now serving.

1. Sobell was never implicated with atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted.

2. The charges against Sobell, supported mainly by the testimony of one man, Max. Elitcher, were that he had solicited information, and had on one occasion taken something which looked like a can of film to Julius Rosenberg. No specific item of information supposed to have been secured by him or transmitted by him to anyone else is specified in the record. The case against him, therefore, is vague in content and slender in proof. The possibility that a trip to Mexico which he and his family took should be construed as flight cannot be ignored, though it is subject to various interpretations.

3. Whether or not the judge and prosecution made sufficient efforts to provide a fair trial, we ought to recognize that the emotions surrounding the trial of the Rosenbergs and the fact that Sobell's case was tried with theirs made it difficult to separate the two cannot to recognize the very different character of the two charges and the evidence intriduced to support them respectively.

4. Sobell has already served, with good conduct, nearly eight years in prison, six of them in Alcatraz.

5. As Americans we are fully aware of the threat of communism to our freedom and way of life. Any attack on that freedom from without or within must be resisted. Nevertheless, one of the factors which makes that freedom so precious is its capacity to practice a disciplined and humane administration of justice precisely in those cases where emotions are aroused which make it difficult to remain objective about the merits of a specific case. We believe a commutation of the Sobell sentence would demonstrate our national faith in that freedom.



#### VOICES OF CONCERN

In addition to articles and book reviews in various law journals which noted study of the case of Morton Sobell, each indicating that Sobell did not receive justice (to which Ferry S. Martin refers in the article quoted below), clergymen and many religious publications have expressed deep concern in articles and editorials about the case of Morton Sobell. Such publications include CHRISTIAN CENTURY, CHRISTIANITY AND CRISIS, CATHOLIC WORKER, INTERCOLLEGIAN (National Student publication of YM-YWCA), UNITARIAN REGISTER, SOCIAL QUESTIONS BULLETIN (Methodist Federation for Social Action), BULLETIN, DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS LIBERTY (National Council of Churches), and LUTHERAN COMPANION. Here is an article which appeared in the Christmas 1960 issue of NEW-CHURCH MESSENGER:

#### THE SORELL CASE

A few days after David Greenglass was released from prison. 1500 ministers sent a petition to President Eisenhower asking for the pardon or retrial of Morton Sobell. Greenglass, an atom spy by his own confession, had been in prison for 9½ years. Morton Sobell was sentenced to 30 years in prison, convicted by the testimony of a single witness, a known perjurer. Sobell was not charged with having transmitted any specific information to the Soviet Union, but his trial was linked with that of the Rosenbergs, in the atmosphere of hysterical panic that marked the beginning of the McCarthy campaign against "unAmerican activities".

It is not within our knowledge to say whether Sobell was innocent or guilty. But when eminent lawyers, educators, and theologians join in asserting that Morton Sobell did not receive a fair trial, our social conscience bids us to speak for the cause of justice. Prominent law journals such as the Columbia Law Review, the Yale Law Journal, and the University of Chicago Law Review agree that Sobell did not receive due process. Concurring in this opinion we find "The Christian Century", Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, and Nobel Prize scientist Dr. Harold Urey.

Throughout his imprisonment Sobell has steadfastly proclaimed his innocence. Thirty years is a lifetime sentence that his family share with him. During this time his mother and wife have worked unceasingly to obtain his freedom.

. Why should we be concerned about the freedom of this one man? When our country becomes indifferent to the freedom of one individual, the freedom of all is jeopardized. Every person is precious in the Lord's sight and we are doing his will when we defend the freedom and seek justice for our brother man. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Secular publications have also concerned themselves. The NATION, Nov. 12, 1960, carried an article by New York Law School Professor William Kunstler, calling for freedom for Sobell. The NEW REPUBLIC urged the President to grant freedom to Sobell in an editorial on Dec.5, 1960, and this was followed by an editorial in THE PROGRESSIVE in the January 1961 issue, also urging freedom.

# Greenglass Free, Why Not Sobell?

### By TOM KELLY

Mrs. Morton Sobell, a home town girl, is back in Washington for an odd sort of anniversary.

It is 10 years since her husband, Merton, went to jail.

It is, perhaps less significantly, 10 years since David Greenglass, the atomic spy, went to jail.

### **STATEMENT**

BY DISTINGUISHED THEOLOGIANS AND LAW PROFESSORS AFTER INDEPENDENT INQUIRY INTO THE FACTS IN THE SOBELL CASE

THE UNDERSIGNED are American citizens who believe that the sentence of Morton Sobell should now be commuted. Sobell was convicted of conspiring with others to transmit to the Soviet Union writings and information relating to the national defense of the United States and was sentenced on April 5, 1951 to serve thirty years in Federal Prison.

Morton Sobell was tried with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg who were convicted of espionage in connection with the atomic bomb and who were sentenced to death and later executed. Sobell, however, was never implicated in any way with involvement in the atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. This fact was confirmed by the judge who sentenced Sobell.

This statement is not concerned with the Rosenberg conviction. The undersigned are and consistently have been convinced anti-Communists. None are associated with any organization, committee or group of any kind concerned either with the case of the Rosenbergs or that of Sobell, nor are any of the undersigned connected in any way with Morton Sobell or any members of his family. After study of the case, we believe that the following considerations warrant a commutation of the very heavy sentence Sobell is now serving.

- 1. Sobell was never implicated with atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted.
- 2. The charges against Sobell, supported mainly by the testimony of one man, Max Elitcher, were that he had solicited information, and had on one occasion taken something which looked like a can of film to Julius Rosenberg. No specific item of information supposed to have been secured by him or transmitted by him to anyone else is specified in the record. The case against him, therefore, is vague in content and slender in proof. The possibility that a trip to Mexico which he and his family took should be construed as flight cannot be ignored, though it is subject to various interpretations.
- 3. Whether or not the judge and prosecution made sufficient efforts to provide a fair trial, we ought to recognize that the emotions surrounding the trial of the Rosenbergs and the fact that Sobell's case was tried with theirs made it difficult to separate the two cases and to recognize the very different character of the two charges and the evidence introduced to support them respectively.
- 4. Sobell has already served, with good conduct, nearly eight years in prison, six of them in Alcatraz.
- 5. As Americans we are fully aware of the threat of communism to our freedom and way of life. Any attack on that freedom from without or within must be resisted. Nevertheless, one of the factors which makes that freedom so precious is its capacity to practice a disciplined and humane administration of justice precisely in those cases where emotions are aroused which make it difficult to remain objective about the merits of a specific case. We believe a commutation of the Sobell sentence would demonstrate our national faith in that freedom.
