

Gil Turner quoted from Wexley's book and gave a complete sequence of events of the Rosenberg case. He satirized the testimony of Harry Gold whom he characterized as "pathological liar". He told of the impossibility of the train ride claimed to have been taken by Harry Gold due to existing time schedules and the speed at which Gold seemed to have traveled. Turner also accused the government of prompting and coaching witnesses. He called the Governments efforts to publish their story an "unprecedented thing" and called it a whitewash to ease some guilty consciences. He read from Wexley's book the last walk of Julius Rosenberg, to the execution chamber, and left the audience with the word that when America is Socialist the names of Julius and Ethel


will be revered. The topic was given over to the audience for discussion.

Bob Burke of the YSL said that politics were involved and that the C.P. did not even raise a fund to help the Rosenbergs. He named some people and accused them of being Stalinists

Paul Greenberg, in an emotion packed speech, attacked Bob Burke for his indiscrimate use of the word Stalinist and said that this was vulgar and un warranted.

Irwin Edelman told of his participation in the case, and accused the Rosenberg defense of treachery. He told of his discovery of errors in the defense. He said he has written a book on the subject which mainly centered about the diagram of the atom bomb, which with the consent of the defense, was kept secret. Mr. Edelman said there was no reason for this being the secret was already known to the Russians.

Paul Greenborg jumped to the defense of the Rosenberg's lawyer, Emanuel Block, and made some snide remarks about Mr. Edelman. He said it was true the defense made errors, but were honest human errors.



As of December 9, 1957, the headquarters of the LASC continued to be 468 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California.




The Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, which was formerly known as the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case and was sometimes referred to as the Los Angeles Rosenberg-Sobell Committee, adopted its present name, Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, also known as the Los Angeles Sobell Committee, about August, 1954. The avowed purpose of this committee is to have MORTON SOBELL transferred from Alcatraz Prison, to secure him a new trial and to eventually secure his complete release.

Both the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case and the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell were, from their inception, dominated and controlled by the Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) through the assignment of Communist Party (CP) members to work on the committees and to direct the activities of the committees. In March, 1955 critical discussion by CP members was that the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell should be reactivated and revitalized in a more aggressive way than it was in the past, and that its activities should be expanded in terms of securing maximum mobilization of forces to secure SOBELL's transfer from Alcatraz Prison and a new trial for him. ?






SARAH CASHMAN registered as a Communist in 1936 from the Fifth Assembly District, New York, New York, and signed CP nominating petitions on September 30, 1940, and July 12, 1942.

# T-11 (5/6/47)

SARAH CASHMAN was listed as a member of the Speakers' Committee for the Roosevelt Memorial Meeting being held by the Hunts Point Section, Bronx County, New York, CP, U.S.A., on April 12, 1947.

ROBERT CANON, 2737 N.E. Eleventh Avenue, Portland, Oregon, appeared before the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) hearings at Portland, Oregon, on June 19, 1954, in response to a subpoena and readily admitted his connection with the CP at Portland, Oregon, during the period 1946 to 1948. Among others, he identified TOM MOORE as a person known to him as being a member of the CP during this period.

U. S. Attorney C. E. LUCKEY, Portland, Oregon, advised SA FRANCIS J. SMITH on November 16, 1954, that




TOM MOORE appeared before the HCUA at Portland, Oregon, on June 19, 1954, in response to a subpoena and was represented by counsel at this time. TOM MOORE declined to answer questions and invoked a number of Amendments to the Federal Constitution as his reason for declining.

Because of his refusal to answer certain questions, TOM MOORE was cited for contempt of Congress on July 23, 1954.


On November 30, 1954, TOM MOORE was indicted by an Oregon Federal Grand Jury on a charge of contempt of Congress.

On February 14, 1955, TOM MOORE was found guilty by a Federal Jury at Portland, Oregon, on three counts of contempt of Congress.

On February 26, 1955, TOM MOORE was sentenced to six months in jail and \$100. fine. Both the jail sentence and the fine were suspended, and he was placed on probation for three years.




As of December 9, 1957, the aims and objectives 62 of the LASC continued to be as follows:


- 1). Free MORTON SOBELL.
- 2). Obtain a new trial for MORTON SOBELL.
- 3). Educate the public on the Sobell case.
- 4). Publicize the Sobell case.
- 5). Raise funds for legal expenses.
- 6). Influence people to petition President EISENHOWER to exercise Executive authority.

In addition to the foregoing, informant advised that investigative work will be continued to prove that MORTON SOBELL was "framed." Informant advised that there is being planned now a large scale Executive Clemency campaign to be launched in the near future.

The July 15, 1949, edition of the "Washington Times Herald," a Washington D. C. newspaper, carried an article entitled "Probers Told Robeson is a Veteran Red." This article reflects that MANNING JOHNSON, an ex-CP leader, told Congress on July 14, 1949, that PAUL ROBESON has been a member of the CP for many years. JOHNSON said he met ROBESON frequently at the CP headquarters in New York where ROBESON held secret meetings with EARL BROWDER, WILLIAM Z. FOSTER, and others.





A meeting sponsored by the Sobell Committees was held

At this meeting a film entitled "Was Justice Done" was shown showing that MORTON SOBELL was illegally deported from Mexico to the United States. The picture begins with MORTON SOBELL's arrest and continues through his trial with the ROSENBERGS The film alleged that SOBELL was kidnaped by local Mexican police and that he was not then using an assumed name. According to the film, the Mexican Government had nothing 870 to do with the deportation.

At this meeting Mrs. SOBELL spoke about the recent visit with her husband at Alcatraz and made a plea for \$10,000. to carry on the case and prove her husband's innocence. She stated that all the public sentiment that can be gained is needed.



# T-1 (August, 1957)

A garden party and buffet supper sponsored by the Ios Angeles Area Chapter of the IASC as a fund raising affair was held on August 4, 1957, at 2218 West 21st Street, Ios Angeles. HELEN SOBELL, wife of MORTON SOBELL, spoke. She said she had visited Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, and a few surrounding cities in Canada where they had a showing of the film strip concerning the Sobell case. She said she also visited in Seattle, Stockton, and other cities surrounding San Francisco, as well as that city. She said she stopped in Denver before arriving on the West Coast and had talked with the publisher of the "Denver Post" who said his publication would do everything it could for MORTON SOBELL's case. HELEN SOBELL also spoke generally about the Amicus Curiae Brief to be filed with the U. S. Supreme Court. She stated that the legal expenses for the handling of this appeal before the Supreme Court would be \$10,000.

# T-1 (8/12/57)

Informant made available a form letter under the letterhead of the LASC and addressed to "Dear Committee Friend" and signed by HELEN SOBELL. This letter is quoted as follows:

# "August 5, 1957

"Dear Committee Friend,

"With less than a month to complete our Amicus Brief, we thought it might be helpful to you to know some of the responses we have already received.

"Our West Coast Chairman, DANIEL MARSHALL has undertaken the writing of the legal Am. C. Brief to which our statement with all its signers will be attached.

"In Vancouver, B.C., the Sobell Committee is preparing and circulating a Canadian Am. C. Brief with the help of BARRISTER HARRY RANKIN.

"In Seattle, my appearance on two TV news broadcasts and on the radio has helped with the work.

"The plan for mailing the newspaper together with a telephone followup has been discussed and additional people have enthusiastically offered to work.

"San Francisco has set itself a goal of 3000 signers to the Am. C. Brief and is preparing for approaches to Union groups throughout the city. In addition they are planning street collections of signatures because San Francisco has Alcatraz so constantly in view.

"In all of the areas, the film strip continues to be a most effective medium. In Stockton, there was a showing of the film strip at a membership meeting of a union local, and it voted to sign the Am. C. Brief. The same was true for Sacramento, and in Fresno a meeting at the Unitarian Church showed the film and heard me speak. They advertised their meeting in their newspaper, 'The Fresno Bee'. At the meeting itself people signed the Am. C. Brief and made contributions to the legal expenses.

"Los Angeles has developed an approach of asking individuals to take the responsibility of giving Am. C. Briefs to their friends to circulate. The enclosed mimeographed note is being signed and addressed personally and has been speeding up matters. L.A. is preparing a mailing of 3000 Am. C. Briefs.

"In Denver the idea of the Am. C. Brief was presented to a board meeting of the ACLU. It was a most heart-warming experience when our national office received the signature of STEPHEN LOVE together with his financial contribution among the first returns.

"Please look at the outline of action we have prepared and determine how you can help. Remember, we want not only to make this a good fight -- we want to win!



reported that by the end of that week the LASC should have at least 10,000 signatures on the Sobell petitions. She stated she was confident that the U.S. Supreme Court would grant SOBELL a new hearing.

# T-1 (10/31/57)

A special meeting called by the LASC was held on October 23, 1957, at 468 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles. Approximately 55 persons were present. At this meeting DAN MARSHALL and WIDGE NEWMAN shared the chair. DAN MARSHALL opened the meeting with a brief account of recent developments in the Sobell case, i.e., mention of HELEN SOBELL's name in the current trial of Colonel ABEL on October 14, 1957, publication of the "Look" article (October 29, 1957 issue) concerning the ROSENBERGS and SOBELL.

DAN MARSHALL read a memorandum by SOBELL's attorneys which will be filed with a brief now pending before the U.S. Supreme Court which in effect states that the publication of this material is prejudicial. DAN MARSHALL stated that if the U.S. Government has additional information it should be used in the courts. DAN MARSHALL also said that it was ridiculous to think that HELEN SOBELL would engage in espionage while her husband is in Alcatraz, especially when she has been under surveillance.

At this meeting a copy of the film showing an interview by JOHN WINGATE of HELEN SOBELL on his October 11, 1957, "Nightbeat" program was shown. Informant advised that this film is of high emotional content and will be used wherever possible to educate the people and to raise funds.

There was general discussion from the floor with many suggestions, some of which were carried out. A night letter was sent to "Look" magazine expressing indignation. A letter is to be sent to HELEN SOBELL congratulating her on her performance on the "Nightbeat" program.

At this meeting it was decided to mail 4,000 pieces within the next week to the Sobell Committee mailing list bringing people up to date on events.

At this meeting WIDGE NEWMAN stated that some of the newspapers throughout the country are indignant at the release of the material to the press by the U.S. Government. She further stated that the "Oregonian" had come out editorially for a new trial for MORTON SOBELL.

• At this meeting it was stated that the LASC is very optimistic of getting a new trial for MORTON SOBELL. It feels that the U. S. Government would not have released all this information to the press had it felt certain that the U. S. Supreme Court will rule in favor of MORTON SOBELL.

#### IX. LEGAL ASPECTS

# T-1 (8/12/57)

Informant made available a letter signed by HELEN SOBELL dated August, 1957, on her personal letterhead. This letter enclosed a copy of an Amicus Curiae Brief with the request that it be circulated and signed among other individuals.

This letter is quoted as follows:

"August, 1957

"Dear Friend,

"At the beginning of September we are submitting to the United States Supreme Court our petition for a new trial for my husband MORTON SOBELL.

"For 7 years of imprisonment my husband has maintained his innocence. Increasingly, eminent voices such as Senator WILLIAM LANGER, ELMER DAVIS, former Governor CULBERT OLSON, the Chaplain at Alcatraz, hundreds of rabbis, ministers, and professionals have asked for a new trial, or freedom for MORTON SOBELL.

"The recent Supreme Court decisions provide us not only with an atmosphere favorable to review but also with additional legal grounds for appeal. The concern and doubts raised in our case can never be answered until a new trial is granted.

"I therefore come to you directly at this most hopeful moment, asking that you add your name and your dollars to the enclosed Amicus Curiae Brief, in expression of your interest in Justice. Moreover, I ask you to approach others if possible.

"We know that if a hearing is granted, my husband will return home a free man. We know how much this means to you as an American - how much you have done and will do to make this possible.

The Amicus Curiae Brief is quoted as follows:

#### "AMICUS CURIAE BRIEF

"Historically, Americans have availed themselves of the privilege of acting as Friends of the Court in cases which concern their common well-being. We respectfully bring to the attention of the Supreme Court of the United States our grave concern with the serious legal and moral issues in the case of MORTON SOBELL.

"Since his arrest seven years ago, MORTON SOBELL has steadfastly sought to prove his innocence of 'conspiracy to commit espionage,' the charge on which he was sentenced to 30 years and imprisoned in Alcatraz. People throughout the country, and in many nations abroad, have seen the integrity of American justice challenged by his conviction and imprisonment.

"MORTON SOBELL's present appeals offer documentary evidence that the prosecution knowingly used fraud and perjury to obtain his conviction. None of the new evidence has been refuted. Clearly a court review is required. We look hopefully to the Supreme Court to resolve the issues raised in accordance with the Court's traditional vigilance over our system of justice.


"We therefore request that the case of MORTON SOBELL be reviewed and a hearing granted, and we authorize the inclusion of our names in an Amicus Curiae Brief."

This Amicus Curiae Brief contains spaces for names and addresses as well as amount of contribution.

(b)(1)(D) At this meeting it was announced that the three petitions to the U.S. Supreme Court concerning the conviction of MORTON SOBELL will be on the following grounds:

- 1). The known use of perjured testimony by the prosecution.
- 2). The fact that the Extradition Treaty with Mexico was violated by the U. S. Government when the FBI"kidnaped" MORTON SOBELL.
- 3). The attempt of the prosecution to discredit ETHEL ROSENBERG for her use of the Fifth Amendment when testifying.

On November 12, 1957, the U.S. Supreme Court declined all petitions in the Sobell case.


\$4,000. per month to maintain the fight to free MORTON and that the Amicus Curiae Brief is going to cost about That is the reason, she explained, that there is a campaign on for 10,000 signatures and contributions on the Amicus Curiae Brief. She said that she expects an average of \$1. contribution per signature. She said that she keeps in touch with MORTON and that he is fine. said MORTON SOBELL has been promoted to a \$.20 an hour job refinishing office desks. HELEN SOBELL said that the reason MORTON never took the witness stand during his trial was because if he had invoked the Fifth Amendment it would have reflected badly towards him because of the hysteria of the times and to not invoke the Fifth Amendment it would have reflected badly on JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. She said that the U. S. Supreme Court, which has never reviewed the Rosenberg-Sobell case, is going to be asked to either free MORTON or grant him a new trial on the grounds of fraud on the part of the prosecution's witnesses, violation of the U.S. - Mexico Treaty which cancels out the conviction of MORTON because of his kidnaping by U. S. Agents, and the prejudiced manner of conduct on the part of the judge. She said that the judge is going to be asked to disqualify himself on the grounds of improper conduct at a different trial at a later date. She said that in the witnessis' testimony in the court transcript it stated that the witness was followed by the FBI to the home of MORTON SOBELL where he related to MORTON that he had been followed by the FBI.

This witness stated that MORTON told him that they should leave immediately as he had some important secret papers that had to be delivered to JULIUS ROSENBERG. The witness and MORTON drove to a place near the home of the ROSENBERGS where MORTON went alone from there. When MORTON returned to the car he was asked by the witness what JULIUS had said concerning the trailing by the FBI, and MORTON told him that he had said that it did not matter too much. HELEN SOBELL stated that ETHEL ROSENBERG had told her that she was going to invoke the Fifth Amendment before the Grand Jury because she did not want any prosecuting attorney twisting anything around that she might say. HELEN SOBELL said that she did the same thing when she appeared before the Grand Jury. HELEN SOBELL said that all sorts of

accusations of Communists, couriers, and spies during the trial were unjust. At the conclusion of her talk HELEN SOBELL stated that there is a film of the Sobell case available free of charge to any group for home and club showings.



She also told of meeting with various groups across the country like this particular meeting and her hopes through these meetings of securing MORTON SOBELL's release and pardon and subsequently the dropping of the charges surrounding the death of the ROSENBERGS. She also told of her hopes for a retrial very soon under the new U. S. Supreme Court ruling, plus evidence secured since SOBELL's confinement that has not been presented before. At this meeting a collection was taken up to help finance the Sobell case.

At this meeting HELEN SOBELL spoke for some thirty minutes on the Sobell case, the new evidence obtained, and details of the conditions of his imprisonment. Her appeal was based on sympathy and political freedom, terminating with a request for financial help and request for signatures on the new Amicus Curiae Brief. Informant advised that contributions from the group present were generous.



#### AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION

The FBI has never conducted an investigation of the American Civil Liberties Union. It is noted that the Fifth Report of the California Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities (1949) notes the following: "American Civil Liberties Union: Cited as heavily infiltrated with Communists and fellow travelers and frequently following the Communist Party line and defending Communists, particularly in its Los Angeles unit. (California Committee on Un-American Activities Report, 1948, pages 108-12)."

In connection with the foregoing citation the following is noted: In January, 1955, an official of the California Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities advised that a representative of the American Civil Liberties Union contacted the Committee to discuss the above citation. At that time this individual advised that two members of the American Civil Liberties Union in Los Angeles had been expelled because of their pro-Communist sympathies. On May 27, 1955, a representative of the California Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities advised that the status of the American Civil Liberties Union, insofar as the Committee's evaluation is concerned, has not been changed and that the Committee's past characterizations of the American Civil Liberties Union remain the same.

In connection with the above, it is noted that the 34th Annual Report of the American Civil Liberties Union (for the year 1954) re-affirms the anti-Communist and anti-Fascist policy of the American Civil Liberties Union and maintains also that it will defend the civil liberties of all persons regardless of any political party, organization, denomination, race or nationality to which a person may belong.

#### DOWNTOWN CLUB OF LOS ANGELES

An informant advised on May 7, 1957, that the Downtown Club of Los Angeles is a former Independent Progressive Party club which became an autonomous organization during the spring of 1955 after the Independent Progressive Party had lost its place on the ballot.

Its principal activity is to sponsor a weekly "Progressive Forum" which frequently features Communist Party members as speakers. The club is currently active and is dominated by the Communist Party through Communist Party members who hold positions of leadership in the club.

The Independent Progressive Party has been described by the California Committee on Un-American Activities in its 1948 Report, page 41, as follows: "Among typical mass organizations that are victims of Communist domination."

#### HOLLYWOOD ARTS, SCIENCES AND PROFESSIONS COUNCIL

An informant advised on January 4, 1956, that until January 3, 1956, the Hollywood Arts, Sciences and Professions Council was the Southern California Chapter of the National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions in New York City and consistently followed the program and policies of the parent organization. On January 3, 1956, the Hollywood Arts, Sciences and Professions Council officially dissolved by action of its executive committee and vote of its membership.

The National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions has been cited as a "Communist front" by the United States Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities in House Report No. 1954, dated April 26, 1950.

JEWISH INFORMATION SERVICE (LOS ANGELES JEWISH CULTURAL AND FRATERNAL CLUBS; PRATERNAL MEDICAL PLAN OF THE CALIFORNIA FRATERNAL SERVICE ASSOCIATION)

An informant advised on May 6, 1957, that the Jewish Information Service was formed about January, 1954, in Los Angeles for the purpose of continuing "cultural" activity of the International Workers Order. The Jewish Information Service guides the activity of the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs. Prior to March 4, 1956, the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs were identified as the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural Clubs, this group being formerly known as lodges of the Jewish People's Fraternal Order. The Jewish Information Service and the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs are currently active in the Los Angeles area.

The Fraternal Medical Plan of the California Fraternal Service Association was formed about January, 1954, for the purpose of continuing the activity of the Jewish People's Fraternal Order Medical Plan. Since that date, the functioning of the Fraternal Medical Plan of the California Fraternal Service Association has been integrated into the operation of the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs inasmuch as the service provided by the Fraternal Medical Plan of the California Fraternal Service Association is made available almost exclusively to members of the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs; further, effort is made to have members of the Los Angeles Jewish Cultural and Fraternal Clubs also become members of the Fraternal Medical Plan of the California Fraternal Service Association.

The Fraternal Medical Plan of the California Fraternal Service Association is currently active in the Los Angeles area.

The International Workers Order and the Jewish People's Fraternal Order have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

## IDS ANGELES COMMITTEE FOR PROTECTION OF FOREIGN BORN

According to the California Senate Fact Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1955, page 388, "This particular committee is well known as a Communist front."

#### NATIONAL LAWYERS' GUILD

The Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities Report on the National Lawyers' Guild, House Report No. 3123, dated September 21, 1950, cited the National Lawyers' Guild as a Communist front which "is the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party, its front organizations, and controlled unions" and which "since its inception has never failed to rally to the legal defense of the Communist Party and individual members thereof, including known espionage agents."



# UNITARIAN FELLOWSHIP FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE (LOS ANGELES CHAPTER)

An informant advised on May 14, 1955, that the Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice of the First Unitarian Church, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, is controlled and directed by members or former members of the Communist Party (CP). The Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice originally was not a Communist-controlled organization, and in Los Angeles membership in the organization does not necessarily indicate CP membership or CP sympathy on the part of any particular member.

The bylaws of the Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice, adopted in January, 1954, state that the purpose for which the Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice was organized is to implement in daily life the principles of liberal religion; to deepen the sense of individual social obligation by study and investigation of existing economic, political and social problems; and by promoting and participating in social action directed to their solution.

"HIRING AN ORGANIZER. Chicago is hunting for a full time organizer. I drafted a description of the kind of person we need, to be shown to a couple of key people who might find an organizer for us. I'd like to quote from this draft:

'Before I set up standards for an organizer and scare the daylights out of candidates by giving them the idea we want a combination of a Nobel Prize winner and one of Dale Carnegie's go-getter-makes-friends-with-everybody----before we do that let's talk about the attractive features of the job.

'A serious injustice like the Sobell case, as it becomes known, arouses the best instincts of the American people. In a store a clerk asked me what my occupation is. Another customer got in on the conversation. As I picked up my parcel the customer said, "Good Luck!" Then he shook his head, dissatisfied. 'Not good luck—the best!" This happens to me often, and makes me feel wonderful. People seem to admire and respect a person who takes up this kind a thing which is very gratifying to the ego. (Others have found this to be true.)

'People who lead in such matters, and with whom the organizer would be dealing, are for the most part the salt of the earth. What greater pleasure than to be in frequent communication with a ? What greater satisfaction than to know that the object of one's labors will always command the attention of a ?

'PROSPECTS IN CHICAGO. In 11 months, without an organizer, the committee rented an office, sent out mailings and turned in \$3600 to the national office. The money was raised partly by payment of pledges, partly by "affairs". The workers in the committee include a number of gifted organizers. The committee is like a small church. It is like a church in being animated with a civil liberties ideal. But it is like a church with a good finance committee and a superb ladies auxiliary.

'A committee like this is a great pleasure for an organizer to deal with, and it includes some individuals he or she will come to love very much. (The members of the committee feel that I am praising them too much.)

'Because the Chicago support for Sobell is so wide the committee feels it is time to secure a paid organizer and make the support a great deal wider.'



"I quote this partly because it says something of what I think about where we stand and what the prospects are for rapid success. You can see that I think the prospects are excellent. But it also says what I feel about you—the person reading this. You are one of the people I would not have known, one of the pleasures I would not have had, if it had not been my privilege to become a Sobell organizer.

"MY OWN PLANS. A lady in Seattle I have never met was kind enough to write and urge me to come out there. I naturally was very pleased and flattered, and I do not forget that I promised some of you to return soon.

"But I think I ought to spend my time in the middle west. I plan to concentrate on Chicago, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Madison, possible one or two other places.

'MORE COMFORTABLE TRAVEL. I found it too tiring to stay in people's homes——Sobell people are so interesting I would sit up nights talking with them—and in recent trips have been staying in hotels. Though frankly the national committee, which pays my salary and expenses (and that means that the money you help to raise is paying for them, and this in a way, a report of how some of the money you collect is being spent) — the national committee is having a hard time finding the money for this additional expense. And we need to have another organizer or two, I think, on the road doing this kind of work. Yes, I am appealing to you to work still harder and raise still more money.

"I was on a plane Thanksgiving Day. But in New York Yuri Suhl invited me to Thanksgiving Dinner and turned a dismal day into a delightful one. I despise traveling. Fortunately my wife has visited me or gone with me from time to time, and when she does it takes a lot of the grief out of traveling. The Plymouth had to have new rings recently, but otherwise has not given much trouble. It was picked by a Sobell used car dealer, when it rusted, was painted by a St. Louis Sobell committee member with paint supplied by another member.



'People who lead in such matters, and with whom the organizer would be dealing, are for the most part the salt of the earth. What greater pleasure than to be in frequent communication with a \_\_\_\_\_? What greater satisfaction than to know that the object of one's labors will always command the attention of a \_\_\_\_\_?

'PROSPECTS IN CHICAGO. In 11 months, without an organizer, the committee rented an office, sent out mailings and turned in \$3600 to the national office. The money was raised partly by payment of pledges, partly by "affairs". The workers in the committee include a number of gifted organizers. The committee is like a small church. It is like a church in being animated with a civil liberties ideal. But it is like a church with a good finance committee and a superb ladies auxiliary.

'A committee like this is a great pleasure for an organizer to deal with, and it includes some individuals he or she will come to love very much. (The members of the committee feel that I am praising them too much.)

Because the Chicago support for Sobell is so wide the committee feels it is time to secure a paid organizer and make the support a great deal wider.

I quote this partly because it says something of what I think about where we stand and what the prospects are for rapid success. You can see that I think the prospects are excellent. But it also says what I feel about you—the person reading this. You are one of the people I would not have known, one of the pleasures I would not have had, if it had not been my privilege to become a Sobell organizer.

MY OWN PLANS. A lady in Seattle I have never met was kind enough to write and urge me to come out there. I naturally was very pleased and flattered. And I do not forget that I promised some of you to return soon.

But I think I ought to spend my time in the middle west. I plan to concentrate on Chicago, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Madison, possibly one or two other places.


MORE COMFORTABLE TRAVEL. I found it too tiring to stay in people's homes—-Sobell people are so interesting I would sit up nights talking with them—and in recent trips have been staying in hotels. Though frankly the national committee, which pays my salary and expenses (and that means that the money who help to raise is paying for them, and this is in a.

way a report of how some of the money you collect is being spent) -- the national committee is having a hard time finding the money for this additional expense. And we need to have another organizer or two, I think, on the road doing this kind of work. Yes, I am appealing to you to work still harder and raise still more money.

I was on a plane Thanksgiving Day. But in New York Yuri Suhl invited me to Thanksgiving Dinner and turned a dismal day into a delightful one. I despise traveling. Fortunately my wife has visited me or gone with me from time to time, and when she does it takes a lot of the grief out of traveling. The Plymouth had to have new rings recently, but otherwise has not given much trouble. It was picked by a Sobell used car dealer, when it rusted, was painted by a St. Louis Sobell committee member with paint supplied by another member.



BRUST, according to the article, further stated that the organization had no other officers. The article further pointed out that since its inception in the summer of 1957, the state group had raised some \$500.00 for defense purposes and had circulated an appeal to the President among some of the more prominent individuals in the Twin Cities area.








SHARP stated that SOBELL was tried on the basis of a vague and unspecific association with the ROSENBERGS and had never been accused of conspiracy to commit atomic espionage, and that every weakness in the ROSENBERG case is a weakness in the case of MORTON SOBELL. SHARP ended his speech by stating that without regard to the legal niceties of the case involving MORTON SOBELL, the severity of his sentence was uncalled for. This meeting was held 12/5/57.

Paul Greenberg was the chairman for the evening. The meeting was mainly to have been a critical analysis of Tim Wohlforth's speech to the American Forum, but this was deferred to the next business meeting do to a mix-up. The tape recordings made of Tim's speech were not received in time.

The next order of business was the resignation of Nora Roberts as Secretary. Nora said the job was too much of a strain on nerself. Nominations were opened and Sherry Geldman and Judy Mage were nominated. Whitey Knutsen volunteered for the post. Judy Mage declined the job. Nominations were held open until the next business meeting.

Martha Wells resigned her post as mailing director due to the fact that she now has a full time job. Nominations

were opened and Bill Jaber was nominated. Whitey Knutsen volunteered for the job. Nominations were held open to the next business meeting.



Shane Mage made a plea for funds for a French Socialist Paper "L'Versite (Ph). He said the paper was being hounded by the French Government. Faul Greenberg asked Shane what the politics of the paper was and Shane said it was something like the American SWP. Paul contributed \$5.00 on the condition it be used for civil rights only.

The Sobell Committee wanted nothing further to do with them until after the first of the year. This caused Paul Greenberg to get all excited and he said that the YSA should write a nastey letter to the Sobell Committee. Tim Wohlforth said that no fuss should be made of this as it wasn't that important and the threat should be completely ignored. This was agreed upon.

Tim Wohlforth spoke on the National picture of the "Young Socialist". He said the picture looks real good. Philadelphia is doing a fine job. In Denver one man there has set up two different organizations.

Dick DeHaan reported on his meeting with A.J. Mustie.

Mustie, said DeHaan, wants to build up a strong right wing on the American Forum before letting in any more left wingers. However Mustie looks with great favor on the YSA.

Anne Zuckoff gave a treasurers report. The treasury contains \$38.00 and owes out \$37.00. Tim Wehlforth made a plea for more funds for the "YS". He said New York is the most important place in the country and most set an example for other groups. Every one must give blood the next time.

The final item on the agenda was the panal forum on China. This whole thing turned out to be a major foul-up. Tim Wohlforth thought Gil Strunk was handling the panal and Gil thought Tim was handling it. Neither did any thing regarding publicity or a place to hold it. It was also brought up that the China discussion would compete with Pete Seegar's folk singing concert and attendence would be nil. 





LOS ANGELES COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SODELL, aka, Los Angeles Sobell Committee, Los Angeles Committee to secure Justice in the Rosenberg case, Los Angeles Rosenberg-Sobell Committee

An informant advised on 12/17/57 that the Les Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for MCRION SCHELL was formerly known as the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case and was also referred to at the Los Angeles ROSENBERG-SOBELL Committee.

The Los Angeles Committee to Serie Judice in the ROSENBERG Case was cited by the Committee on the American Activities report dated 8/25/55 pages of and of as "A local auxiliary of the National Committee to Sective Judice in the ROSENBERG Case. (Next to New York and Michington, the area of greatest focus in the ROSENBERG campaign was Loc Angeles \*\*\* The Los Angeles campaign was under the direction of SOPHIE DAVIDSON, chairman of the Los Angeles Committee \*\*\*."

Another informant on July 27, 1703 advised that SOPHIE DAVIDSON was then a Communant Party mander.

Informant adviced on December 1: 1007, that the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice to HEALU SCHELL adopted that name in the fall of 1954. The proved purpose of this committee is to have MORICH SCHELL transferred from Alcatraz and to secure a new trial and enchlable his complete release. Both the Los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case and the los Angeles Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SCHELL were from their inception dominated and controlled by the Communist Party through the assignment of Communist Party members to direct the activities of the committees.

The meeting began at about 10:15 PM. Emily asked for attention and then began to talk about the lastest plans for the Sobell Committee. She stated that the present plans are the result of the National Committee meeting and the sub meetings that took place after it. The mass campaign will officially begin in late April. In the mean time the Sobell Committee hopes to have many thousands to begin with, so that at the official opening of the campaign a letter can be sent to the President stating the intention of getting one million signatures to show popular approval for the release of Sobell. There will be a series of dinners commencing in Los Angeles that will continue until the final dinner will be held in N.Y. in late April or Early May. The purpose of these dinners is to highlight the successes of the campaign as the early signatures are forwarded to N.Y.

The N.Y. dinner will be planned for 1000 people at \$10.00 a plate. The Hotel has not been choosen as yet. Emily mentioned that Sputnik has greatly changed the case. People are now beginning to realize that Sobell might not have been guilty and that an injustice was pertetrated. The recent statements by Greenglass & Gold in that they think Rosenberg gave the sputnik secrets to Russia is making people realize these men are pathological liars. All of these trends can be utilized to get people thinking about the case, Emily mentioned that she had worked with the case for years and today finds the confidence of the Committee at a high point. Emily stated that efforts will be made to have Sobell removed from Alcatraz by advocating the discontinuance of that pricon. She stated Congress was written on this subject. The N.Y. office has thus far printed 25,000 newspapers for distribution. N.Y. has supplied the other parts of the country with copies but will not have the money to do so in the future. Orders are in with the printers for thousands more copies. The money that Ben and Jennie gathered in the Bronx went to pay for the newspaper.

Ted Jacobs then spoke for a few minutes about the favorable press which the Committee was receiving. He writes to all the main newspapers and sends them press releases concerning the case. Thus far a few mid-western papers around St. Paul and Minneapolis are supporting the case. As an example of the friendship & respect which Ted Jacobs has the public relations director of the Justice Department, a former N.Y. Times man, answered very cordially Ted letter to him congratulating him on his new job & giving a few more details on the case.

A newspaper in New Orleans which formerly was against the case came out for it recently. This in turned prompted an Unitarian Church to ask to have the movie showing and to order 100 pieces of literature. The nightbeat film showing Helen Sobell on T.V. is being distributed throughout the country and is supposedly winning new friends to the case.

Helen Sobell then spoke about the trip to San Francisco and a vist to her husband. She was accompanied by the two children. They flew both ways. She then read a letter from Morton Sobell which described his longing to know what life outside of a cell is like. She spoke a few more minutes about the new appeal and thanked all for assisting.

In the question and answer period that followed Aaron Katz was the first one to speak. He critcized Emily and Ted for trying to give the impression that the Sobell Committee had a favorable press behind them. Muriel then had about nine "suggestions" to offer which she thought if followed would release Sobell from prison. Emily openly congratulated Ben and Jennie for fine work. She hoped they would get at least 15,000 signatures. Ben has about 40 people in his group in the Bronx. Ben jokingly remarked that he wants to keep the money he collects next time so he can purchase literature on the case. Den said the old A.L.P. (American Labor Party) people were a big help.

Myra Weiss then spoke. She said the Socialist Workers Party's newspaper will carry an article on the Sobell Case every week until the campaign is over. Weiss said she is a staff writer for the paper. She made notice of the Young Socialist Alliance, which she called the fastest growing youth group in the U.S. and said this group will support the Sobell Committee when they meet in Chicago a few weeks from now.

Emily made notice that Sylvia would be on the Committee and would assist anyone who needs help setting up a committee. Leah Schneider was getting people to sign up for office work, especially in the evenings. The office will be kept open during the campaign.




