SHARP also mentioned he was concerned with the severity of the sentences given the ROSENBERGS and SOBELL and felt that SOBELL, especially, was given a severe and unjust sentence.

PERKINS then introduced Mr. ARTHUR STERNBERG, an attorney, who spoke of financial necessities in continuing


III. STATED AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

On December 11, 1957, this informant furnished a mimeographed form letter which was issued at the National Conference of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell held at New York City on November 30, 1957 and December 1, 1957. This letter bears the caption "Appeal to the President" and is addressed to the President and asks the President to exercise his executive authority either by asking the Attorney General to consent to a new trial for MORTON SOBELL or by granting of Executive Pardon and Commutation. This letter contains space for the sender to place his name and address and below this space are listed the names of the individuals who have signed this request.



On January 13, 1958, this informant furnished a mimeographed letter which is on stationery of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell and is dated January 10, 1958, which enclosed material to launch a new campaign for action by one million Americans. This letter lists suggested ways for using this material and contains order blanks for additional material.

In addition, informant furnished a petition in behalf of MORTON SOBELL addressed to the President of the United States asking for Executive Clemency. Informant also furnished an appeal to the President addressed to the President asking for a new trial or granting of Executive Pardon or Commutation, which appeal contains names of eminent individuals who have signed this appeal.



The December 14, 1957 issue of "Glos Ludowy" on page 12, column 5, of the English section, entitled "Open National Public Appeal by One Million for Sobell ", stated that _______ the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell has announced the opening of a national public appeal for action by one million Americans on behalf of MORTON SOBELL. This article further states that "Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, St. Louis, and New York Sobell Committees will be coordinating-centers to launch this program.

On April 19, 1955, and advised that the "Glos Ludowy" is a Polish - English language newspaper published in Detroit which closely follows the Communist Party line. The entire editorial policy of this newspaper is dominated by Communist Party members.



C., for the purpose of obtaining funds in connection with the Morton Sobell case and to visit Senators and other Government officials concerning this case. Informant stated Rose Sobell plans to remain in Washington, D. C., for one month and that she is currently staying at Room 130, Park Central Apartment Hotel, 1900 F Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

On June 11, 1958, Confidential Informant T-2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported that Rose Sobell would appear on Steve Allison's radio program, station WWDC, on June 18, 1958, Washington, D. C.

T-2 reported he had learned that persons sympathetic to the Sobell case have been instructed to listen to this program, to call the radio station after the program and to follow up with letters to the station.

This latter organization is cited by the "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" prepared by the Committee on Un-American Activities dated January 2, 1957, as follows:

Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in June, 1953, the "Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell," the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case-a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States-was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and "then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case." National headquerters remained at 1050 6th Avenue, New York City. Co-chairmen of the newest organization were Daniel Marshall and Joseph Brainin.


On June 19, 1958, at about 12:25 a.m., Rose Sobell, mother of Morton Sobell, and Sara Hammond, representing the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, were interviewed on the Steve Allison program, Radio Station WWDC, Washington, D. C.

Hammond pointed out that Horton Sobell was convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage which she called a very loose charge. Allison said that in a climate of hysteria, a charge of conspiracy is a bad charge.

Rose Sobell, in answer to a question as to whether she thought the judge was fair in his charge to the jury, stated that she was a government witness, but did not testify and did not attend the trial. She said that the Sobell case is now at a stage where they hope to eppeal to the people; she mentioned that many persons are misinformed concerning her son, who was the third defendant in the Rosenberg case and sentenced to thirty years; she said he carried the implications of the Rosenbergs.

Mrs. Sobell said she had come to Washington, as she has to other cities in the country, Europe and Mexico, to plead to the people to help in obtaining her son's freedom. She stated she has an appeal ready to send to President Lisenhower to ask him to pardon, commute the sentence, or grant a new trial for Norton Sobell. She pointed out that hundreds of people have come out in support of this move; she urged the people to help her son and correct this "horrible mistake."

Sara Rammond stated the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell obtains funds through hard work and mentioned that Friday she and Rose Sobell would travel to

Philadelphia for a house party to request funds; she said the money is to be used to print literature in order to get the facts to the people. Hammond stated she is sonvinced that Morton Sobell was a victim of injustice.


Rose Sobell stated that today is the fifth anniversary of the Rosenberg execution. She added that the dissenting judge, Judge Frank, stated that the Sobell trial was tainted because of the conviction of the Rosenbergs.

Allison asked why Sobell changed his name when he went to Mexico. Mrs. Sobell stated that her son, his wife and children went to Mexico under their right names. She said they were in Mexico at the time the Rosenbergs were arrested and decided to change their name since they were friends of the Rosenbergs. She said since it was a period of hysteria, they were afraid they might be implicated just because they were friends of the Rosenbergs.

Eara Hammond stated that after reading the trial record she could not understand what Sobell was supposed to have done in regards to conspiracy. She said that not once during the trial were any of the overt acts brought out that were mentioned in the bill of particulars. She said the government witness in this case, Max Elitcher, admitted on the stand that he was a perjurer. She said he was a communist and had signed an application that he was not a communist. She said this was held over Elitcher's head by the government but when the trial was over there was no purjury charge filed against Elitcher. Hammond stated that professional witness Elizabeth Bentley even testified that the Rosenbergs and Sobell were communists, that all communists were espionage agents.

Allison asked where persons could write to offer assistance or to criticize. Hammond replied that this could be done by writing to the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, Room D, 940 Broadway, New York 10, New York.

Allison remarked that juries are often swayed by a person's race, politics or religion. He said the Sobell trial was during a period of hysteria and felt the least that can be expected is a new trial for Korton Sobell, especially in view of some of the recent Supreme Court decisions.

The information furnished by T-3 further indicated that part of her CP membership had been in the States of Michigan, Ohio, and Kentucky.

T-4 on January 17, 1955 advised IRMA (WIDGE) NEWMAN was a member of the American Youth for Democracy (AYD) from June 1943 to 1945 while attending New York University, New York City.

MORTON SOBELL was convicted in United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951 for conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union. He was sentenced to 30 years imprisonment in a Federal penitentiary.

The CP, CPA, and the AYD have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.



EARL ROBINSON, a Los Angeles folk singer, sang folk songs, including "Black and White" and "Atomic Blues", belittling the capitalistic system. MILTON LESSNER was chairman and ran the meeting. Approximately 50 persons were present. A total of \$156 was taken in, according to an announcement by LESSNER. HARRY C. STEINMETZ started the pitch by selling five tickets to a \$10 a plate dinner to be given in Los Angeles, California for the benefit of the LASC, in addition to the \$156 above.

HARRY STEINMETZ read the contents of a letter to the President requesting a new trial for SOBELL. Copies of this letter were distributed to persons present for their signatures. The letter was entitled, "Appeal to the President", and contained names of prominent individuals who had signed the letter previously.

T-8 advised on March 25, 1958 that as of that date MILTON LESSNER was Literature Director of the San Diego County CP (SDCCP).

The Supreme Court of the United States on April 23, 1956 refused to consider a California Supreme Court decision upholding dismissal of HARRY C. STEINMETZ from San Diego State College on February 5, 1954 under the California Luckel Act for refusal to answer questions on January 28, 1954 concerning CP membership.

On May 20, 1957 STEPHEN BRIDGE advised on interview that he was a member of the CUF and the SDSC.

On March 25, 1958 T-8 and T-9 advised they attended a meeting of the SDSC at 4561 North Avenue, San Diego, at which EARL ROBINSON entertained. On March 24, 1958, T-10 advised check number 584 dated May 15, 1958 in the amount of \$113.11 payable to WIDGE NEWMAN was drawn on the Superior Fabrics Company, 4421 Park Boulevard, San Diego, and signed by MILTON LESSNER, sole owner. The endorsement contained the name: Los Angeles Sobell Committee, 462 North Western Avenue, Suite 3, Los Angeles 4, California. The check was paid at Security First National Bank, Western and Beverly Branch, Los Angeles.

MILTON LESSNER, chairman, said that those present should not regard the "times" as liberal since the FBI and Immigration may be







MORTON SOBELL was convicted in United States District Court, Southern District of New York, March 29, 1951 for conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union and sentenced to 30 years in prison.

According to source, the Los Angeles Sobell Committee was from its inception dominated and controlled by the Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) through the assignment of Communist Party members to work on the committees and to direct the activities of those committees.

Another confidential source on December 9, 1957 advised that as of that date the LASC was composed of the Los Angeles area chapter, the Long Beach chapter and the San Pedro chapter.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 30, 1950 that on June 23, 1958 a garden party reception, sponsored by the Chicago Sobell Committee (CSC) honoring Dr. HAROLD C. UREY, University of Chicago nuclear scientist, was held at 4745 South Kimbark, Chicago, Illinois, the home of PHILIP BRAIL.

The necting, attended by approximately one hungred persons, began as MALCOLM SHARP, a professor at the University of Chicago, spoke briefly of the legal aspects of the MORTON SCHALL case. SHARP concluded that SCHELL, who was convicted and sentenced to thirty years in prison in the JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG case, was, in his opinion, unjustly convicted.





CHICAGO COUNCIL OF AMERICAN-SOVIET FRIENDSHIP (CCASF)

A source advised on May 7, 1957, that the CCASF since its inception in Chicago in the 1940's has never failed to propagandize for Russia and the Russian way of life. This source further advised that the CCASF has been using speakers who were known to the source as members of the Communist Party since the first meetings in the 1940's. The source advised that the program of the CCASF has always included speakers, movies, and pamphlets praising every aspect of Russia including its foreign policy and has been extremely critical of the United States' domestic and foreign policies.

CHICAGO SOBELL COMMITTEE

LIGHTFOOT DEFENSE COMMITTEE (LDC)

On May 7, 1956, a source advised that the Lightfoot Defense Committee was formed in the fall of 1954 by the Communist Party (CP), for the purpose of publicizing the arrest of CLAUDE MACK LIGHTFOOT, Chairman of the Illinois-Indiana District, CP, USA, under the Smith Act of 1940, and to raise funds for his defense.

The Lightfoot Defense Committee continued to operate under the direction of the CP until March, 1956, at which time the CP broadened the scope of the organization and formed the Chicago Joint Defense Committee to Defeat the Smith Act (CJDC), thereby dissolving the Lightfoot Defense Committee.

A source advised on May 3, 1957, that the CJDC was formed by the CP in March, 1956. The majority of the current leadership of the CJDC are known to the source as current CP members.

Another source on May 15, 1957, furnished a "Memorandum: Annual Budget Estimate - Summary" on the letterhead of the CJDC dated May 13, 1957. In summarizing the past work of this committee, it was stated that its work included "carrying the Lightfoot case--first test of the Smith Act 'membership' provision--to the Supreme Court; assisting in defense of the rights of foreign born Americans; opposition to Congressional witchhunts; opposition to anti-labor laws; defense of civil rights; assistance to families of victims of political persecution."

The same letter listed the future work of the committee as including the "concentrating on helping develop an informational campaign on the Taft-Hartley 'conspiracy case,' on current civil rights struggles;" and work on some key issues in the Illinois Assembly including "FEP, anti-labor bills, etc." and in addition, the continuation of work on current Smith Act cases.

ATIONAL LAWYERS GUILD

The National Lawyers Guild has been cited as a Communist front which "is the foremost legal bulwark of the Communist Party, its front organizations, and controlled unions" and which "since its inception has never failed to rally to the legal defense of the Communist Party and individual members thereof, including known espionage agents".

Well, that's the interesting part about it MR. ALLISON, these were the only overt acts charged to SOBEL in the indictment, not yet once in the trial were they mentioned. Now it seem to me if this is what the man was charged with there should be some discussion of it and yet there wasn't.

So you have a man who says he is afraid of being punished for perjury — testifying against his best friend and then when the trial is all over, you never hear of his being charged for perjury or indicted for perjury or convicted.

Was the fact brought out that SOBELL might have been a communist?

Of course the trial was tainted with these charges. The prosecution said that these people did this because they were communist and they did it for love of Russia, etc., but there was no actual proof of this or of this question of whether they were indeed communist and that wasn't the charge of course. The charge was conspiracy to commit Espionage.

Well, did they have to prove that SOBELL was a communist before they could get the rest of the overt act charge in?

HAMMED

ALLISON:

Well, I don't loss think they would have to prove that, because one doesn't necessarily lead to the other - - I mean - - a person could be a communist but that doesn't mean that he is a spy.

ALLISON:

Right. The whole thing was his connection with ROSENBERG and ELITCHER(ph) testified something about joining the Communist Party at the suggestion of MORTON SOBELL, but that doesn't seem to have anything to do with the case either. It seems to me the Governments job was to prove conspiracy between SOBELL and ROSENBERG, You and you say this was never brought out?.

HAMARLIE -

The five conversations which were charged in the indictment were never mentioned and the only testimony was ELITCHEN's(ph) and he claims that SOREL had asked him for some fire control material —— some papers on fire control which has nothing to do with fighting fires by the way.

It's something to do with firing things —— and that SOBFLihad asked him if he could locate some progressive engineer's for whom he could get job(s) and who would act as spies for him. This was ELITCHER's(ph) charge and SOBELLhas denied all of this and he pleaded innocent to the charge.

ALLISUN:

ROSE SOBEL

I don't quite follow this whole thing. Well, MRS. SOREL in July of fifty, your son went to Mexico - - he used different names, can you give us a little insight on that, why did he do that? My son, his wife and 2 children, a baby of 1 year old, had bought tickets at an airplane office in their own names, had flown to Hexico City, rented an apartment in their own name and lived there very securely; however, when he had come to Mexico City, he read the newspapers of our country and he read of - - that his firend, former friend, JULIUS ROSHMBERG, was arrested and perhaps the younger people don't remember but I do and many older people remember the hysteria and the fear of 1950 MC CARTHY era had brought upon us and my son did get panicky for a while and the thing, that when one is panicky, he acts somewhat irrationally and my son had thought that he might escape all this torrible MC CARTHYISM and he had gone to a couple of shipx lines asking them for passage to other countries and he used different names, but immediately after that, when he came home, and he consulted - - - - and they talked ever, he and his wife, and they decided they would come back to our country, whereupon they immediately went to a doctor, took their injections and were ready to come back to New York City when they - - - my son was taken by force from Mexico City and brought to Laredo(ph) and arrested there, under no charges at all. He was waived immunity at Laredo (ph) and was immediately transferred to New York City and it was two months that no charges were placed for him at all. Our lawyers had asked - - well if you have the man in jail, what are you charging him with? And after which his name was placed at the same list with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG'S

and he was charged with five overt acts, five conversations with

JULIUS ROSENBERG, that he had five different dates. Those were

the five charges that were placed against him.at the time.

In other words you must be very careful to whom you speak, in ten

And here was ELITCHER, who had driven from Washington, D.C. to New York City and SOBELL said that he was tired and he wanted ELITCHER to do the driving, and this is ELITCHER I am quoting mind you. and er--that they then got in the car and ELITCHER drove SOBELL to the vicinity of Knickerbocker Village, where JULIUS ROSENBERG lived, the exact street was Catherine Slip (?) in New York, and that he waited in the car and SOBEL got out, taking with him the .35 mm film can. Er---he waited while SOBELLwent, and when SOBELLcame back, he said to er---SOBEL_"did you tell JULIE about my being followed?". and SOBEL reported JULIE said. *there is nothing to worry about, he spoke to ELIZABETH BENTLY on the phone and he's sure ELIZABETH BENTLY did not recognize his voice." Now this is a very interesting thing because this introduces in the trial ELIZABETH BENTLY, who hither to had not been introduced into the trial. ELIZABEEE BENTLY was put on the stand. She said she did not know the ROSENBERG's; she did not know SOBEU; she'd never heard of him; she'd never seen them. Well what was she doing at the trial? I know enough about law to know that you are not supposed
to bring anything into a trial that does not concern a

SARAH H.: Practically every word, every other word, in the trial was . "Your Honor, I object."

However, the circuit court said that---er---no reversible error has been committed. Ah---it is really a wonderful thing, and I know that working on this case has increased my faith in the American people.

We've got to leave now, good night.




There were about 35 persons present during the evening, including about 15 nearo males and one negro female.

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

DETAILS:

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of January 2, 1957, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. contains the following concerning the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell:

"1. Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in June 1953, the 'Communist' campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell, 'the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case -- a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States -- was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference In Chicago in October 1953 and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case.' National headquarters remained at 1050 6th Avenue, New York City. Co-chairmen of the newest organization were Daniel Marshall and Joseph Brainin. (Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 'Trial by Treason: The National Committee to Secure Justice for the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell, 'August 25, 1956, pp. 118 and 120; also cited in Annual Report for 1955, House Report 1648, January 17, 1956, originally released January 11, 1956, p. 30.)"



The National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell and the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell will be referred to by the initials NCSJMS and CSJMS in this report. The Rosenberg-Sobell Committee and the Sobell Committee will be referred to hereinafter by the initials RSC and SC.

A. Aims and Objectives of the CSJMS

T-1 made available on December 20, 1957, a form letter on the stationery of the CSJMS entitled, "One Million for Morton Sobell - A Report of the National Sobell Conference to Plan Next Steps - New York City, November 30, December 1" which is summarized as follows:

"On November 30 and December 1 delegates representing the man, thousands of Americans who are fighting the Sobell case with devotion and determination met at a National Conference to plan the next steps. This meeting represented a turning point in the Rosenberg-Sobell case.

"On the one hand, despite strong new evidence never refuted by the prosecution, the U.S. Supreme Court had just refused to review Morton Sobell's appeals. The Court's decision came in an atmosphere of new hysteria fanned by the Justice Department through such methods as the special report on the case in Look Magazine, the fantastic and unscrupulous attack on Helen Sobell in the Abel trial, and the attempt by a former prosecutor in the trial to blame the Russian Sputniks on the Rosenbergs.

"On the other hand, history was crumbling the myth that dominated the Rosenberg-Sobell trial--the myth that the 'secret' of the atom bomb was stolen from our country. Important newspapers were writing editorials questioning the credibility of the prosecution witnesses.

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"New support was being voiced for Morton Sobell's freedom or a new trial. Never before had the opportunities been so great for bringing the truth of this case to the American people, and demonstrating how vital this fight is to civil liberties, our democracy, our morality.

"In this perspective, the delegates to the conference faced two roads. One was to continue making progress in the case, but at a pace that might mean a campaign of five, ten or 15 more years while Morton Sobell languishes in Alcatraz. The alternative was to work on a hitherto unprecedented scale that would arouse the moral conscience of our country and create a campaign of such a character and intensity that would build and build until justice would have to be given to Sobell.



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"As the conference developed, it became clear which path would be chosen. All of the delegates reported rapid gains in their respective areas, and the re-affirmation of support when the court decision became known. Delegates were present from such key cities as San Francisco, Los Angeles, St. Louis, Chicago, Milwaukee, Minneapolis and St. Paul, Cleveland, Syracuse and New York. Everywhere the story was the same--the determination and readiness to embark upon a campaign the like of which has not yet been seen on the Rosenberg-Sobell case, with all that has gone before but a prelude to the tremendous scale on which the work would now be carried on.

"It was estimated at the conference that we have already reached millions with the facts. It was decided that a great national effort would be made to secure action by One Million Americans for Morton Sobell, and in the process of this work reach millions more and raise the case to the level that must be reached for Sobell's freedom.

The program through which we are launching this drive follows. We ask that everyone in your city interested in the Sobell case schedule a meeting as quickly as possible to thoroughly discuss the program and plan for participation in your area. It will only be by the mustering of every person pledged to winning justice in this case that we will be able to succeed. We ask, too, that you take the information about our conference, and about our plans, to the major organizations in your area so that you can also enlist their aid.

"Through our unprecedented effort, we can and will achieve Morton Sobell's freedom.

"PROGRAM

"1. A national campaign shall be undertaken to secure action on behalf of Morton Sobell by One Million Americans.

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- "2. A great petition campaign is to be undertaken for the freeing of Morton Sobell by executive action.
- "3. The National Sobell Committee and Committees throughout the country will urge prominent individuals, organizations, and newspapers to conduct public inquiries into the facts on the case.
- "4. An intensified program of legal research and investigation will be undertaken. Efforts to prevail upon the courts to grant a new trial will be pressed.
- "5. Efforts shall be made to win Sobell's transfer from Alcatraz.

"IMPLEMENTATION

"Petitions for Executive Action --

"The circulation of petitions on a huge scale throughout the country will be a focal point for our effort to secure action by a million people......

"Launching the Petition Drive--

"The sub-committee has drawn up a national schedule for the petition campaign. Our first target date is being proposed for the month of April........

"Literature--

"The Conference stressed the need for printed material that would meet the needs and potentialities of the day.....

"Public Inquiry--

"The widespread public interest in the case, the new evidence, the doubts that have been raised, and the report by the Justice Department that appeared in Look Magazine obviously call for objective inquiries into the facts by interested citizens......

"Legal Research and Investigation --

"Funds were designated in the budget for the carrying out of legal research and investigation to uncover new evidence for further court action......

"Budget --

The Conference voted to raise a minimum national budget of \$100,000 for 1958. It was stressed that this was to be considered only the barest kind of minimum budget for the work that must be done, and does not include funds for such special projects such as TV broadcasts, newspaper ads etc.......

"Staff--

"The Conference recognized the inadequacy of the present staff to meet the task that has been decided upon. Suggestions were made that the appropriate additions be made. Suggestions will be appreciated if you know of competent persons who are available. It has been suggested that there be a Sobell representative in Washington to keep the case before members of the Senate and Congress and to take up the Sobell appeal with the major national organizations whose headquarters are in Washington. The need for a national fundraiser was cited, as well as someone who could travel throughout the country."

T-3 advised on October 28, 1957, that HAVEN PERKINS continued to serve as Midwest Organizer and Representative of the CSJMS.

T-3 advised on December 2, 1957, that a meeting of the NCSJMS was held at the Hotel Biltmore in New York City on November 30 and December 1, 1957, and that approximately 30 delegates attended the conference at which TED JACOBS presided. T-3 advised that the national policy for all affiliates of the committee was decided and called for:

- 1. A Commission of Inquiry to investigate the scientific aspects of the case and to inquire about the conduct of the Department of Justice in handling the case;
- An inquiry into possible Civil Rights violations;
- 3. A campaign to open FBI files; and
- 4. More publicity and attempts to have newspapers involved in the case.






T-l advised that this party was attended by approximately 250 persons, most of whom were elderly, and that the party was considered by the sponsors to be a failure, even though \$215.00 was made. T-l advised that the party was considered to be a failure because of the fact that liquor consumption was poor - blamed on the elderly crowd present which caused younger persons to leave early - and because of the poor reception the Sobell Committee literature received, since very few persons signed petitions.



The mass campaign for signatures will begin in late April, 1958, but it is planned to have many thousands prior to that date so that a letter can be sent to the President immediately showing popular approval; there will be a series of fund raising dinners throughout the United States with a final dinner in New York City; the committee is in need of funds; and, the press is giving the committee favorable notice.

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T-11 advised on April 28, 1958, that on April 21, 1958, a rally sponsored by the CSJMS was held at the Community Church, 35th Street and Pask Avenue, New York City.



According to T-11, the speakers repeated the arguments as to Sobell's innocence, protested the Supreme Court's denial of a motion for a hearing and the adverse publicity the committee received.





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T-11 advised that attendance at the rally was approximately 250 persons and estimated the collection to be approximately \$2,500.00.

F. Literature



"Washington, D.C. - October 7-Attorneys acting in behalf of some 5.300 Americans today filed an appeal asking the Supreme Court to review the case of Morton Sobell.

"A 'friend of the court' (Amicus Curiae) brief asking a hearing on new evidence was submitted to the High Court by Attorneys DANIEL G. MARSHALL of Los Angeles, former Judge EDWARD P. TOTTEN of Orange, California, and LAURENT B. FRANTZ of Berkley, California.

"The attorneys submitting the Amicus Curiae brief said they were acting in behalf of Americans who want a full hearing in the Sobell Case because of their concern for the integrity of our system of justice. The names of the 5,300, including persons from 1/2 states, were filed with the Clerk of the Supreme Court. Contributions from among these friends of the court have financed Morton Sobell's present legal appeals....."



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"The United States Supreme Court has declined to decide whether or not Morton Sobell had a fair trial. By not reviewing the case, the Court has in effect left standing the uncontroverted new evidence that the prosecution used fraudulent means to convict Morton Sobell, including illegally kidnapping him from Mexico. This new evidence has never been refuted by the prosecution. That is why 5,300 Americans filed a legal appeal asking the Supreme Court to order a full hearing so that this evidence could be subjected to a judicial review by the court......

T-19 advised that a group of individuals maintained a station at the entrance to the hall and requested each person to sign a Presidential Petition to free Morton Sobell.

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On page 3, column 1, of the October 8, 1957 issue of the "Dily Worker" is an article entitled "Attorneys for 5,300 file Sobell Appeal", which reports the filing of an Amicus Curiae brief with the United States Supreme Court by persons from 42 states asking for a review of the case of MORTON SOBELL.

On Page 7, column 5, of the October 9, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" 16 a news story entitled "High Court Gets Sobell Motion" which reports that the United States Supreme Court had before it the motion asking for a review of the Morton Sobell case.

On page 12, column 4, of the October 13, 1957 issue of "The Worker" is a news story entitled "Attorneys for 5,300 File Sobell Appeal", which is a reprint of the story appearing in the October 8, 1957 issue of the "Drily Worker".

This article, over the byline MILTON HOWARD, uses the Soviet earth-satellite "Sputnik" as a proof of Soviet technical superiority and derides the idea that the ROSENBERGs and SOBELL were engaged in espionage since the Soviet scientists obviously did not need espionage to assist them.

Cn page 1, column 2, of the October 18, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" is a news type article entitled "Hit Tompkins Move to Smear Helen Sobell" which attacks the United States Attorney who in the course of an espionage trial then in progress in New York City, elicited information from a witness, who was a member of the espionage conspiracy, to the effect that the witness had been instructed to recruit HELEN SCBELL for espionage.



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On page 2, column 1, of the October 21, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" is a news type article entitled "Protests Government Use of Magazine in Sobell Case" which attacks the Department of Justice for allegedly furnishing information for an article on the background and evidence in the SOBELL case to a nationally distributed magazine.

On page 2, column 2, of the October 21, 1957 issue of the 'Daily Worker' is a feature article by VIRGINIA GARDNER entitled "Spy-In-The-Sky Fantasies" which quotes a news service as stating that the Soviets obtained information about space satellites from the ROSENBERGS and attacking the evidence utilized in convicting the ROSENBERGS by pointing out the superiority of Soviet scientists.

On page 3, column 2, of the October 23, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" is a news type article entitled "Ask Brownell Repudiate Anti-Sobell 'Look' Article" which criticizes a story on the background and evidence of the ROSENBERG - SOBELL case which appeared in "Look Magazine."

On page 2, column 1, of the October 24, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" is a news article entitled "Norman Thomas Favore Review of Sobell Case by High Court" which reports that THOMAS, former Socialist candidate for President of the United States, supported a movement for a Supreme Court review of the SOBELL case.

On page 1, column 1, of the October 27, 1957 issue of "The Worker" is a caricature depicting a nationally distributed magazine as sitting on the grave of the ROSENBERGS.

On page 1 of the October 27, 1957 issue of "The Worker" is an open letter to Attorney General BROWNELL and a lengthy feature article entitled "Why Let Only One Magazine See Rosenberg Files?" both by VIRGINIA GARDNER, who signs herelf "Reporter, The Worker." On page 3, column 1, of the November 6, 1957 issue of the 'Daily Worker' is a feature article entitled "A Key Document in the Rosenberg Case"which relates testimony before a Senate Internal Security Subcommittee hearing by one of the witnesses in the ROSENBERG-SOBELL trial which proves that the witness lied at the trial.

On page 11, column 1, of the November 10, 1957 issue of The Worker" is a feature article entitled 'What 'Look' Think. About Its Department of Justice Rosenberg 'Scoop' which quotes the efforts of the reporter to prove that "Look magazine was publishing a slanted article at the Department of Justices. bidding.

On page 3, column 2, of the November 11, 1957 issue of the 'Daily Worker' is a feature article entitled

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How Department of Justice Mended Evidence After Trial" which article states that the Department of Justice assigned to one of its attorneys the job of preparing a manuscript which would counterattant the evidence of fraud and conniving by the Department of Justice shown in the book "The Judgement of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg" by JOHN WEXLEY.

On page 1, columns 3,4, and 5, of the November 13, 1957 issue of the "Daily Worker" is a news story entitled "High Court Denies All Sobell Pleas" which reports the denial of the Supreme Court to hear the motions for a new trial for MORTON SOBELL.

According to the article, the Los Angeles dinner would be held April 12 and MALCOLM SHARP of Chicago and HELEN SOBELL would be the principal speakers; the New York dinner would be held April 21, and Reverend PETER MC CORMACK, former Alcatraz Chaplain and HELEN SOBELL would be the principal speakers.

On page two of the April 7, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is a "letter to the editor" from ROSE SOBELL expressing a "mother's gratitude" for the many persons working on various Sobell Committees.

On page eleven of the April 7, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement for a "Sobell Freedom Party" to be held on April 12, 1958, at 4666 North Sherman Boulevard, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, under the auspices of the Milwaukee Sobell Committee.



On page eleven of the April 14, 1958 and April 21, 1958, issues of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement for a meeting to hear HELEN SOBELL discuss the Sobell Case at the Central Methodist Church in Detroit, Michigan, on April 22, 1958.

On page eleven of the April 14, 1958, issue of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement of a party to be held April 12, 1958, at "Weissman's, 325 East 17th Street, New York City" for the benefit of the Sobell Committee.

On page eleven of the April 14, 1958 and April 21, 1958, issues of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement requesting volunteers to report to the National Office of the Sobell Committee, 940 Broadway, New York City, to becassigned either national or the job of canvassing for signatures to the Presidential appeal.

On page two of the April 14, 1958, issue of the "National Guardian" is a "letter to the editor" signed by "JOHN GILMAN, Chairman of the Milwaukee Sobell Committee" which letter urges that an attempt be made to have persons in Europe start a mass campaign for signatures to be joined with signatures in the United States requesting that the President give Executive Clemency to MORTON SOBELL.

On page two of the April 21, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is an editorial entitled, "Mose Green Is it?" which concerns a proposed dinner by the Sobell Committees of the New York area at the "Tavern-On-The-Green" in New York City on April 21, 1958. The "Tavern-On-The-Green", according to the article, a privately owned and operated restaurant in a city owned park, broke its contract for the dinner

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after unfavorable newspaper publicity about the dinners had caused protests to the restourant management. The editorial speaks of the constitutional right of persons to . . petition and urges readers to protest to city officials concerning the cancellation.

On page ten of the April 21, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement for the "Morton Sobell Freedom Dinner!" to be held April 21, 1958, at the "Tavern-On-The-Green" in New York Civy.

On page ten of the April 21, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is a news of type article concerning a proposed dinner to be held April 22, 1958 at the Central Methodist Church in Detroit, Michigan, at which HELEN SOBELL would speak concerning the Sobell Case.

On page one and eight of the April 28, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is a lengthy article entitled, "New York City Repeals the Bill of Rights -Church Opens Door to Parred Sobell Meeting" which advises that due to the cancelling of the achieved dinner at the "Tavern-On-The-Green", New York City and the cancellation of the substitute dinner at the Ch ateau Gardens, both arranged for April 21, 1958, the Reverend DONALD HARRINGTON, Pastor of the New York Community Church, Fark Avenue, New York City, invited the Sobell Committee to hold a public meetings on that date at this church. According to the article, seven hundred persons attended the church meeting and heard speeches by the Reverend PETER MC CORMACK, former Protestant Chaplain of Alcatraz, ROSE SOBELL, mother of MORTON SOBELL, HELEN SOBELL, wife of MORTON SOBELL, YURI SWHL, Professor WICTOR PASCHKIS of Columbia University, DOROTHY DAY of the "Catholic Worker" and Actor MORRIS CARNOVSKY.

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On page eight of the May 5, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is a photograph of ROSE SOBELL conversing with the Reverend PETER MC CORMACK about the case of MORTON SOBELL.

On page two of the May 26, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is an editorial entitled, "Report to Readers" - Beat the Doldrums which reports that in order to beat the doldrums they should take an interest in the Sobell Case by signing the Petition to the President.

On page ten of the June 2, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is a box advertisement entitled, "Freedom Fortnight for Morton Sobell" which requests volunteers in New York City to circulate the Sobell Petition, to hold house gatherings, to take part in the tanvassing, and, to hold house office during the two weeks before the Fifth Anniversary of the Rosenberg Execution. —

On page eleven of the June 15, 1958 issue of the "National Guardian" is an advertisement entitled "The Truth does not change" which advertises a book entitled, "The Rosenbergs - Poems of the United States".

On pages one and seven of the June 16, 1955 issue of the "National Guardian" is a lengthy article entitled, "Five Years Ago the Rosenbergs Were Executed - The Fight Goes On In Sobell's Eighth Year In Prison" which article summarizes the efforts of the Sobell-Rosenberg Committee to prevent the execution of the ROSENBERGS on June 19, 1953 and to secure the release of MORTON SOBELL who had been sentenced to thirty years in prison. The article summarizes

the arguments of SOBELL in his plea for a new trial which arguments had been rejected by the Supreme Court of the United States in February, 1958.

3. New York City Daily Newspapers

On page sixteen of the November 13, 1958 issue of the "New York Times", a New York City daily newspaper, is a news article entitled, "high Court Bars Eighth Sobell Plea - Rejects Charge of Fraud And Kidnapping Led To His Convintion as Spy", which article reports that allegations by SCBELL that his conviction was "steeped in fraud and tainted by false perjured evidence" were rejected by the United States Supreme Court.

On page twelve of the November 13, 1957 issue of the "New York Daily Mirror" and page twenty one of the November 13, 1957 issue of the "New York Daily News", New York City daily newspapers are similar news stories of the rejection of the motion for a new trial for MORTON SOBELL by the United States Supreme Court.

On page two of the March 5, 1958 issue of the "New York Times" is a news article entitled, "Sobell Going to Atlanta Penitentiary" which reports the transfer of MORTON SCHELL from Alcatraz Penitentiary in San Francisco to the Federal Penitentiary in Atlanta, Georgia.

On page three of "New York Journal American", on page five of the "New York Post", on page seven of the "New York Daily News", on page seven of the "New York Daily Mirror", on page thirteen of the "New York Herald Tribune", on page twenty of the "New York Times", and page twenty five of the "New York World Telegram and Sun", all New York City daily newspapers, published on

April 15, 1958, are articles concerning the cancellation of the Sobell Committee Freedom Dinner at the Tavern-On-The-Green on April 21, 1958, and objections to the cancellation by the Civil Liberties Union of New York City.

On page three of the "New York Journal American", on page three of the "New York Daily News", on page twenty four of the "New York Times", on page twenty one of the "New York Post", all New York City daily newspapers, published on April 19, 1958, are articles which report that New York State Supreme Court denied a motion by the Sobell Committee to compel the Tavern-On-The-Green to reinstate the dinner reservation for April 21, 1958. According to these articles, the court had stated that the right of free assembly and free speech was not it issue.







T-38 advised on March 20, 1953, that ETHEL WEICHBROD was at that time a CP member.

T-39 advised on June 2, 1958, that Mrs. ROSE SOBELL, mother of MORTON SOBELL, was at that time visiting Washington, D.C. to obtain the funds for the Sobell Committee and to visit Senators and other Government officials concerning the case.

T-39 advised that the present plans were for ROSE SOMELL to remain in Washington, D.C. for one month.

T-39 advised on June 22, 1958, that a function under the sponsorship of the Washington, D.C. Sobell Committee was held on June 21, 1958, at which ROSE SOBELL gave a talk and motion pictures were shown. He added that \$254.00 was collected.

NATIONAL GUARDIAN

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of January 2, 1957, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the "National Guardian":

"National Guardian

"1. 'Established by the American Labor Party in 1947 as a "progressive" weekly. * * * Although it denies having any affiliation with the Communist Party, it has manifested itself from the beginning as a virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia.'

(Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 'Trial by Treason: The National Committee to Secure Justice for the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell' August 25, 1956, p. 12.)"



APPENDIX

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE, aka: Young Socialist Forum

T-16 advised on April 23, 1958, that the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) was formed at a meeting held October 1, 1957, at New York City, by individual members of the elements formerly comprising the Young Socialist Forum (YSF) in New York City. T-16 advised that the YSF was comprised of youth of various socialist tendencies, however, was dominated by members of the American Youth for Socialism, Left-Wing Caucus of the Young Socialist League, (YSL) and former members of the Labor Youth League (LYL).

T-16 advised that the Statement of Principle set forth in the YSA Constitution states that the YSA: 1. Favors the abolition of our present capitalist system; 2. Advocates the replacement of this system by a socialist system; 3. Firmly resolves to direct its activities toward bringing about this transition.

The stated purpose of the YSA set forth in the Constitution is to bring together all young socialists in a broad, militant, independent, democratic organization.

T-16 advised, however, that the element of the YSA, which directly or indirectly established and controls policy, has become comprised almost exclusively of members of the New York Local of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP).

The headquarters of the YSA are located at 144 Second Avenue, New York City.

The LYL and the SMP have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.
