

### Prosecutor Defends Hi

He came into court like a club fighter. his chin tucked in, his eyes alert for enemies. He knew there would be enemies. hungry for his defeat as for a feast.

The champion always comes into the ring last and Roy Cohn came into Room 110 of the Federal Court House here yesterday five minutes after the judge and attorneys had taken their seats.

Champion? Well, he had seen little but triumph in this courtroom. Here he had helped prosecute the atomic spies, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg; in this chamber he had worked with Sen, Joseph McCarthy on the Communist hunts of the '50s; here, five years ago, he had been acquitted of a perjury charge.

#### Now His Prosecutors Are the Young

Now he was back, accused this time of bribery. It was a long way now from the days when a senator could rise to glory by waving a sheet of paper and claiming it was a list of Communists in the heart of the government.

Once Cohn had been the ridiculously young prosecutor taking on men old enough to be his father. But now he was 42 and the wrinkles showed on his forehead and the crown of his scalp peeped through his thin hair and it was the three assistant U.S. attorneys waiting to prosecute him who looked too young for such a proceeding.

Cohn, in a blue, pin-striped suit, his features tonned, tried hard to win postponements. Each time, he was turned down by Judge Inzer Wyatt, a heavy set Southerner with short pepper-and-salt hair who obviously was determined to get the trial moving without delay.

Cohn expressed distress when forced, by the withdrawal of the defense counsel, to act as his own attorney. He had quoted to the judge the saying: "The man who is his own lawyer has a fool for a client."

But he caught the eye of a nearby newsman and whispered: "Now we'll see how good a te page, name of lawyer I am." It was the champ tossing a remark sper, city and state.) over the ropes in a fight movie.

During a recess, he talked, "I've been a prosecutor and I've been a defendant," he said, "but pever before have I defended in a criminal case. It certainly should make me well rounded in law, if a little schizophrenic."

How about the McCarthy days now? "I never look back." Cohn said.

#### A Talk & a Handshake in the Sun

A reporter reminded him of a bet he had made during his earlier appearance as a defendant. Cohn had bet \$100 that he would be convicted.

He nodded at the memory and recalled that when the reporter declined to collect following the acquittal, Cohn gave \$500 to a newspaper-supported charity.

Cohn talked in the sunshine on the courthouse steps with TV camera on him, in spite of the judge's warning that participants in the case hot make public statements. When he turned to go back into court, a working man grabbed his hand and wished him luck.

The rest of the day was spent in jury selection. So far, nobody was placing any bets on this one.

## Choose Jury for Colin Triel

A Federal Court jury of eight men and four women was sworn in yesterday to weigh bribery-conspiracy charges against lawyer-financier Roy M. Cohn, who lost his defense

counsel and two motions to stave off the trial.

At day's end, after the selection of five alternate jurors, Judge Inzer B. Wyatt recessed the trial until tomorrow morning. It was the only concession the 42-year-old Cohn was able to pry out of Wyatt during the session at the Foley Square courthouse.

Wyatt began the morning session by denying Cohn's motion that he step aside and assign another judge to the case on the grounds that he was prejudi.ed. Cohn had accused the judge of being too chummy with the prosecution, including loaning his Monte Carlo beach tent to Assistant U.S. Attorney Paul L. Perito, who is helping present the government's case.

#### His Own Counsel

Cohn, rumpled and appearing somewhat unsure of himself, decided to act as his own attorney in the face of Wyatt's refusal to delay the trial so he could get a new lawyer after defense counsel Myron J. Greene stepped down.

During the day's proceedings, the government obtained a severance of trial for former city appraiser Bernard Reicher amid indications he would testify for the prosecution.

Thus, Cohn will stand trial with two co-defendants—John S. Curtin, Philadelphia transportation expert and appraiser, and John A. Kiser, a former law partner of Cohn's. They are charged with conspiracy, bribery, extortion and blackmail in connection with the city's condemnation of Fifth Ave. Coach Lines in 1962. Cohn was a director of the company then.

The judge refused to reveal the names of the jurors yesterday. Reporters noted that the foreman is a checker for a refrigeration company. Other jurors included an architect, housewives, a secretary, an auditor, a salesman, a retired druggist and a truck driver.

In selection of the jury, the defense exercised 13 challenges, the government six.

Two other prospective jurors were excused after being questioned by Wyatt about an article in Life magazine they admitted reading. A male juror who also

said he had read the article, critical of Cohn, was permitted to remain on the panel.

Cohn had failed in a motion before Wyatt and an appeal to a higher court to put off the trial on the grounds of the unfavorable publicity given his case.

Judge Wyatt turned down Cohn's request that he disqualify himself, ruling that the motion was neither timely nor sufficient to comply with requirements of the law.

When Wyatt turned to the question of Greene's withdrawal, Cohn said he and his counsel had disagreed on policy in the case. "He may be right and I may be wrong, but it is my life," said Cohn. Wyatt asked Greene if he wished to be excused, and the attorny said he did. He was excused and left court.
