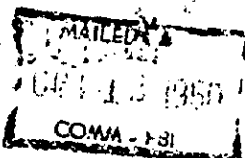
1. Complete name

PURPOSE:

To advise that a full field investigation is being instituted regarding the captioned individual. Levine was a classmate of Sobell at CCNY, class of 1938, and was interviewed in connection with the case entitled "Morton Sobell, Espionage - R."

BACKGROUND:

A preliminary inquiry was instituted regarding Levine on the basis of information received from a former classmate at the City College of New York. Ingbar Jensen, the former classmate, stated Levine was called a "left winger" during their student days, had attempted to interest Jensen as a "leftist" and attempted to get him to read the Daily Worker. He stated Levine was also active in the FAECT.

Levine was recently interviewed in connection with the investigation entitled "Morton Sobell, Espionage - R," at which time he stated he was acquainted with both Sobell and Rosenberg as fellow students at CCNY from 1934 to June, 1938. He stated Rosenberg openly admitted he was a Communist and attempted to recruit other members of the class, including himself, into Communist activities at the school. During the interview Levine denied participation in any such activities. He claimed he was never contacted by Rosenberg after leaving college and admitted accidentally meeting Sobell on several occasions since they were in college.

This matter was discussed with the Espionage Section and it has advised there was no objection to conducting an LGE investigation regarding Levine.

The inquiry was instituted on the basis of information furnished to the New York Office by Ingbar Jensen indicating Jensen considered Levine a "left winger" during their student days and because Levine had attempted to interest Jensen in the Daily Worker. He also advised that Levine has been active in the FAECT.

Levine was interviewed in connection with the investigation entitled "Morton Sobell, Espionage - R," at which time he advised he was acquainted with both Sobell and Rosenberg as fellow students at City College of New York from June, 1934, to June, 1938. Levine stated Rosenberg openly admitted he was a Communist and attempted to recruit other members of the class, including Levine, into the Communist Party at the school. Levine denied participation in Communist Party activities.

In view of the information received from Ingbar Jensen and the employee's admitted association with Sobell and Rosenberg you are instructed to conduct a full field investigation and surep to reach the Bureau by December 27, 1950.

There is no indication Levine has been involved in the case entitled "Morton Sobell, Espionage - R," and caution should be used in reporting information concerning Levine which would involve the Sobell case.

Enclosed herewith for the Boston and New York Offices, are photostatic copies of a Personal History Statement completed by the employee on November 10, 1948.

The Boston Office is requested to interview JOHN MARCIETI, who is listed as a reference in above statement.

For information Boston FBI instituted on basis of information furnished to New York indicating LEVINE a "left wing" during student days and also that LEVINE attempted to interest informant in the Daily Worker. Informant also advised LEVINE active in PALCT.

LEVINE was interviewed in investigation entitled "BOSTON SOBELL, Espionage-R", at which time LEVINE advised he was acquainted with both SOBELL and ROSENBERG as fellow students at CCNY from June, 1934 to June, 1936. LEVINE stated ROSENBERG admitted he was a Communist and attempted to recruit other members of the class, including LEVINE, into the CP at the school. LEVINE denied participation in CP activities.

For further information Boston, referenced letter reflected there is no indication LEVINE has been involved in above mentioned SOBELL case and noted that caution should be used in reporting information concerning LEVINE which would involve the SOBELL case.

BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION

This investigation is based on information received from INGVAR JENSEN, who was a classmate of the employee at the College of the City of New York (CCNY) from 1934 through 1938. According to Mr. JENSEN, the employee, while at the College of the City of New York, was affiliated with the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians, participated in "peace" strikes instigated by the American Student Union and Young Communist League, and was considered by Mr. JENSEN to be a "left-winger."

The Young Communist League has been cited by the Attorney General as an organization within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

Regarding the American Student Union, the Fifth Report of the Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, California Legislature, 1949, states:

"American Student Union

"1. Cited as a Communist front which was the result of a united front gathering of young Socialists and Communists in 1937. The Young Communist League took credit for creation of the above, and the Union offered free trips to Russia. The above claims to have led as many as 500,000 students out in annual April 22, strikes in the United States.

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"2. A Communist Party front organization for the indoctrination of American students in colleges and universities in the United States."

Regarding the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians, BENJAMIN STOLBERG in a book entitled, "A Story of the CIO", on page 151, states:

"Only four CIO unions are under complete control of Stalinist officials. They are the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians..."

On pages 264 and 265 Mr. STOLBERG states:

"The Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists and Technicians was organized in 1934 mainly from the technical staffs in the Works Project Administration. From the very beginning the Federation has been under Stalinist leadership, and its rank and file are chiefly Communist Party followers."

RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Mr. JENSEN, upon recontact, furnished the following signed statement:

"December 20, 1950
New York, New York

"I, Ingvar Jensen, make the following voluntary statement to George Stadtmiller, who has identified himself to me as a special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I am employed as an engineer by the H.K. Ferguson Company, 19 Rector Street, New York, New York, and reside at 137-24 173rd Street, Springfield Gardens, Long Island, New York.

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"If necessary, I would be willing to appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board.

"Samuel Levine and I were electrical engineering students at the College of the City of New York (CCNY) from 1934 through 1938. During the years 1937 and 1938, Mr. Levine and I did much of our laboratory work together and I became quite well acquainted with him. On one occasion, I remarked to Mr. Levine about a pin he was wearing in his lapel. He told me the pin was the pin of the Federation of Architects, Engineers, Chemists, and Technicians (FAECT), and I assumed that he was a member of this organization.

"During the years 1934 through 1938, the Young Communist League and the American Student Union had chapters on the campus of CCNY. These two organizations instigated various demonstrations and student strikes supposedly for the purpose of world peace. These groups were strongly opposed to the Reserve Officers Training Corps and sought to eliminate it from CCNY as well as other colleges. These groups also advocated the support of the Spanish Loyalists, who at the time were engaged in Civil War against Franco of Spain. During the demonstrations on campus, Franco was hanged in effigy.

"To the best of my knowledge, Mr. Levine was not a member of the Young Communist League or American Student Union, but he did support their peace demonstrations.

"As a result of conversations with Mr. Levine, I came to regard him as a 'left winger.' By this I mean he was in favor of social changes along socialistic lines. I do not believe he advocated the violent overthrow of the United States Government, but rather that he believed social and economic changes could be accomplished peacefully.

"I have not seen Mr. Levine since June, 1938, and my knowledge of him is solely as a former classmate at CCNY.

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"I have read the above statement, consisting of two double-spaced typewritten pages, have initialed each correction and each page, and to the best of my knowledge and recollection I believe this to be a true statement.

Regarding FRANCO and the Spanish Loyalists, the World Almanac reflects that on February 16, 1936, the Socialists and Anarchists won the department election in Spain, and that soon thereafter rebellion began in Morocco, and spread to Spain under General FRANCISCO FRANCO. General FRANCISCO FRANCO was proclaimed head of the Nationalist (Insurgent) Government, and on March 29, 1939, the Nationalist Government officially announced "The war has ended. Total victory is FRANCO'S."

The following is quoted from "Americans in Spain," published by the Communist Party, which reflects the active part taken by the Communist Party in the Spanish conflict:

"....the Communist Party has done everything possible to mobilize public opinion to support the Loyalist Government."

STANLEY ROBERT RICH, 24 Cassilis Road, West Hartford, Connecticut, stated he was well acquainted with Mr. LEVINE during 1937 and 1938 as a fellow student at the College of the City of New York. He stated that during these years Mr. LEVINE was sympathetic to the Loyalist cause in Spain and

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participated in the student "peace" strikes on campus. These strikes, he said, were strongly supported by Communist factions on the campus.

Mr. RICH advised that he, himself, had joined an organization on campus known as the Steinmetz Club and was a member for about six or eight months. He said this was a Marxist organization which was affiliated with the Young Communist League at the College of the City of New York. Mr. RICH said he saw Mr. LEVINE at several meetings of the Steinmetz Club, but said he does not know that Mr. LEVINE was actually a member. He said that the organization was relatively small and its membership was not generally known. According to Mr. RICH, the members did not have to be Communist, but were supposed to be in favor of the program, which was to bring about socialism by democratic processes. The members supposedly emulated the scientist STEINMETZ who, he said, was an engineer and ardent socialist.

Mr. RICH advised he has seen Mr. LEVINE only twice since 1938, once in 1945, in Orlando, Florida, and once about a year ago in New Jersey. He said these meetings were chance and of a business nature. He said he does not feel qualified to comment on the employee's loyalty since 1938, but that during 1937 and 1938, he said he regarded the employee as a "left winger."

Mr. RICH said he did not desire to furnish a signed statement. He said he would be willing to appear before a Loyalty Hearing Board.

Birth

According to the employee's Personal History Statement, dated November 9, 1948, he was born May 2, 1916, at New York, Bronx, N.Y."

The records of the Board of Health, Boroughs of the Bronx, Manhattan, and Queens, New York, were found to contain no record of a SAMUEL LEVINE, born May 2, 1916.

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Education

College of the City of New York
137th Street and Convent Avenue,
New York, New York

Miss MILDRED TEICHER, Records Clerk, made available the employee's record which reflects that he entered the Engineering School in February, 1934, and graduated in June, 1938, with the Degree of Bachelor of Electrical Engineering.

His record contains nothing pertaining to loyalty. Miss TEICHER said she is not acquainted with Mr. LEVINE.

JESSE SOBEL, Dean of Student Activities, advised his office has no record of any disloyal activities on the part of the employee. Mr. SOBEL made available a copy of the yearbook, "Microcosm," for 1938, which reflects that SAMUEL LEVINE was treasurer of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and was on the staff of "Vector," a magazine for electrical engineers.

Professor HAROLD WOLFE, Chairman of the Electrical Engineering Department, advised that SAMUEL LEVINE was a studious person who engaged in no disloyal activities to his knowledge. Professor WOLFE said he recalls Mr. LEVINE as a loyal American.

BERNARD LEVINE, who is employed as an engineer by the United States Navy Material Catalog Office, 116 East 16th Street, New York City, advised that he was in the employee's graduating class at the College of the City of New York, but has not seen him for ten years. Mr. LEVINE said he was acquainted casually with the employee while at the College of the City of New York, and never observed any disloyal activities on the part of the employee. Mr. LEVINE said, in his opinion, the employee is loyal.

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JACK KRITZ, who is employed by the W. L. Maxson Corporation, 460 West 34th Street, New York City, advised he entered the College of the City of New York in 1935, and graduated in June, 1939, as an engineer. He said he does not recall the employee as a student at the College of the City of New York, but met him a year or two ago at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, New York, where he and the employee did graduate work. Mr. KRITZ said his knowledge of the employee is very limited and he does not feel qualified to comment on the employee's loyalty.

SAMUEL H. POMERANTZ, whose New York address is 365 East 158th Street, Bronx, advised he attended the College of the City of New York as an electrical engineering student from 1934 through 1938, and became acquainted with Mr. LEVINE in 1936. He said that, to the best of his knowledge, the employee engaged in no disloyal activities while a student at the College of the City of New York. Mr. POMERANTZ said he considered Mr. LEVINE to be loyal to the United States.

He advised that he met Mr. LEVINE again in 1940, when they both began employment at Fort Monmouth in New Jersey. He said he worked in the same section as Mr. LEVINE in 1946, and has seen him occasionally during the other years from 1940 to the present time. Mr. POMERANTZ said he has never questioned the employee's loyalty and believes him to be loyal.

LOUIS A. GRANDIZIO, who is employed by Arma Company, 254 36th Street, Brooklyn, New York, stated he attended the College of the City of New York as an electrical engineering student and graduated in February, 1939, but that he does not recall the employee.

Confidential Informant New York City T-1, of unknown reliability, who has furnished reliable information regarding Communist activities in the past, stated that he was a classmate of the employee's at the College of the City of New York, but was not well acquainted with him. He said, as he recalls, the employee was engaged in no subversive activity at the College of the City of New York, and he has no reason to believe that the employee is other than a loyal American. The Informant added,

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however, that he was not well enough acquainted with the employee to vouch for his loyalty.

Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn
85 Livingston Street
Brooklyn, New York

The records of the above were made available by Miss JOAN GALTES, Office of the Registrar, and reflect that SAMUEL LEVINE entered the Graduate School of Electrical Engineering in the spring semester of 1946, and withdrew November 11, 1949.

His record contains nothing pertaining to loyalty. Miss GALTES advised she does not know Mr. LEVINE. She stated that the adviser for the Graduate School, Professor GEORGE HOADLEY, retired from the school several years ago. The current adviser, Professor ANTHONY B. GIORDANO, advised he does not recall the employee.

MICHAEL LAMORTE, a teaching fellow, and HAROLD FOCKE, instructor, both in the Electrical Engineering Department, advised the employee is not known to them.

Employment

Pomerance and Breines

RALPH POMERANCE, a partner of the above firm, stated he vaguely recalls having hired a SAMUEL LEVINE for a few months in 1938 and 1939, but remembers little about him. He said as he remembers, the employee was a satisfactory employee and he never questioned his loyalty. He said, however, that his recollection is so vague that he does not feel qualified to recommend the employee as a person of unquestioned loyalty.

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Mr. POMERANCE said his records prior to 1940 have been destroyed.

RANDOLPH ALLEN, Chief Draftsman, said he recalls a person named "SAM", who was employed as a junior draftsman to assist with a World's Fair contract in 1938 and 1939. He said the name LEVINE is not familiar but that the company's personnel has always been small in number and that the "SAM" he recalls is undoubtedly the employee. He said "SAM" was a loyal, patriotic American, to the best of his recollection. LEVIN

Mr. ALLEN said that aside from Mr. POMERANCE, he would be the only one who would know Mr. LEVINE.

Albert A. Volk Company
132 Nassau Street
New York, New York

The employee on a Personal History Statement, dated November 9, 1948, stated he was employed by the above company as a checker and field engineer from December, 1939 to March, 1940.

DAVID LEVY advised that the Volk Company has gone into receivership and that he is acting as liquidator. Mr. LEVY said he was formerly the Assistant Manager of the company and does not know the employee. He said the personnel records prior to 1941, have been destroyed and he has no record of the employee. He stated that during the indicated years of the employee's employment, the company was engaged in work for the World's Fair in New York and employed several hundred employees. He was unable to recommend anyone who might recall the employee.

Residence

1136 Metcalf Avenue
Bronx, New York

Mrs. HARRY RABINOWITZ, second floor front, advised that the LEVINE family has resided in the apartment above

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hers for twenty years and that she has known the employee since he was a boy. She said the LEVINES are quiet, respected people, who, in her opinion, are loyal to the United States. She said the employee has resided in New Jersey during the past ten years, but that she sees him occasionally when he visits his parents. She described the employee as a loyal, patriotic American.

Mrs. BESSIE ZINNANTI, second floor rear, said she has known the LEVINE family ten years and considers the family to be loyal to the United States. She said she is well acquainted with the employee's parents and sisters, but has met the employee only upon his visits to his parents. She said she knows him well by reputation and believes that his loyalty to the United States is unquestionable.

Mrs. EVA KATZ advised she owns the building at 1134 Metcalf Avenue and has known the LEVINE family ten years as a neighbor. She said she regards the employee and his family as loyal to the United States.

Mrs. MARGARET GENSLER, second floor apartment, 1134 Metcalf Avenue, said she has known the LEVINE family about ten or more years and believes the family is loyal. She said she knows the employee mostly by reputation and sees him only when he visits his parents. She said she believes the employee is unquestionably loyal to the United States.

Miscellaneous

The Bureau of Special Services and Investigation and the Identification Division of the New York City Police Department have no record of the employee.

The Credit Bureau of Greater New York has no record of the employee.

The records of the Board of Elections, Borough of the Bronx, New York, reflect that SAMUEL LEVINE, 1136 Metcalf

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Avenue, registered in 1938 and 1939, as a member of the American Labor Party. Mr. LEVINE's first registration was in 1937, when he registered as a member of one of the two major political parties.

Concerning the American Labor Party the following appears in a report of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, dated May 29, 1946, at Washington, D. C.:

"American Labor Party

"1. Support of the Communist Party to the above (ALP) has been recognized by the appointment of a Communist to an official position in the city government. (Massachusetts House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1938, page 356).

"2. Cited as a Communist front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, March 29, 1944 (pp 49, 77f, 153, 189)."

Confidential Informants New York City T-2, T-3, T-4, T-5, T-6 and T-7, reliable informants, who have a general knowledge of Communist activities in the New York area, advised they do not know the employee.

MOUTSINOS was [REDACTED] at John Wanamaker's
department store, 8th Street and Broadway, New York City, on

Department at Wanamaker's, advised that Mrs. MOUTSINOS'
purse was searched at the time and was found to contain two

This information was handled administratively because of its vagueness and remoteness to the employee.

The files also reflect that SAMUEL LEVINE, Bath Avenue, Long Branch, New Jersey (Shore Garden Apartments) was a member of the Federation of American Scientists, Monmouth County, New Jersey. This information is contained in the Washington Field Office report of SA GEORGE E. DAVIS, dated February 28, 1943, and entitled, "Federation of American Scientists, IS-C," Washington Field 65-4736, and it is assumed this information will be reported by the Washington Field Office.

The files of the New York Office contain no other information which can be identified with the employee or members of his family.

A copy of this report is designated for the Newark Office for completion of its file in this case.

Miss MILDRED TEICHER, Records Clerk, made available the employee's record which reflects that he entered the Engineering School in February, 1934, and graduated in June, 1938, with the Degree of Bachelor of Electrical Engineering.

His record contains nothing pertaining to loyalty. Miss TEICHER said she is not acquainted with Mr. LEVINE.

JESSE SOBEL, Dean of Student Activities, advised his office has no record of any disloyal activities on the part of the employee. Mr. SOBEL made available a copy of the yearbook, "Microcosm," for 1938, which reflects that SAMUEL LEVINE was treasurer of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and was on the staff of "Vector," a magazine for electrical engineers.

Professor HAROLD WOLFE, Chairman of the Electrical Engineering Department, advised that SAMUEL LEVINE was a studious person who engaged in no disloyal activities to his knowledge. Professor WOLFE said he recalls Mr. LEVINE as a loyal American.

BERNARD LEVINE, who is employed as an engineer by the United States Navy Material Catalog Office, 116 East 16th Street, New York City, advised that he was in the employee's graduating class at the College of the City of New York, but has not seen him for ten years. Mr. LEVINE said he was acquainted casually with the employee while at the College of the City of New York, and never observed any disloyal activities on the part of the employee. Mr. LEVINE said, in his opinion, the employee is loyal.

JACK KRITZ, who is employed by the W. L. Maxson Corporation, 460 West 34th Street, New York City, advised he entered the College of the City of New York in 1935, and graduated in June, 1939, as an engineer. He said he does not recall the employee as a student at the College of the City of New York, but met him a year or two ago at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, New York, where he and the employee did graduate work. Mr. KRITZ said his knowledge of the employee is very limited and he does not feel qualified to comment on the employee's loyalty.

SAMUEL H. POMERANTZ, whose New York address is 365 East 158th Street, Bronx, advised he attended the College of the City of New York as an electrical engineering student from 1934 through 1938, and became acquainted with Mr. LEVINE in 1936. He said that, to the best of his knowledge, the employee engaged in no disloyal activities while a student at the College of the City of New York. Mr. POMERANTZ said he considered Mr. LEVINE to be loyal to the United States.

He advised that he met Mr. LEVINE again in 1940, when they both began employment at Fort Monmouth in New Jersey. He said he worked in the same section as Mr. LEVINE in 1946, and has seen him occasionally during the other years from 1940 to the present time. Mr. POMERANTZ said he has never questioned the employee's loyalty and believes him to be loyal.

LOUIS A. GRANDIZIO, who is employed by Arma Company, 254 36th Street, Brooklyn, New York, stated he attended the College of the City of New York as an electrical engineering student and graduated in February, 1939, but that he does not recall the employee.

Confidential Informant New York City T-1, of unknown reliability, who has furnished reliable information regarding Communist activities in the past, stated that he was a classmate of the employee's at the College of the City of New York, but was not well acquainted with him. He said, as he recalls, the employee was engaged in no subversive activity at the College of the City of New York, and he has no reason to believe that the employee is other than a loyal American. The Informant added,

however, that he was not well enough acquainted with the employee to vouch for his loyalty.

She stated that the adviser for the Graduate School, Professor GEORGE HOADLEY, retired from the school several years ago. The current adviser, Professor ANTHONY B. GIORDANO, advised he does not recall the employee.

MICHAEL LAMORTE, a teaching fellow, and HAROLD FOECKE, instructor, both in the Electrical Engineering Department, advised the employee is not known to them.

RALPH POMERANCE, a partner of the above firm, stated he vaguely recalls having hired a SAMUEL LEVINE for a few months in 1938 and 1939, but remembers little about him. He said, however, that his recollection is so vague that he does not feel qualified to recommend the employee as a person of unquestioned loyalty.

Mr. POMERANCE said his records prior to 1940 have been destroyed.

RANDOLPH ALLEN, Chief Draftsman, said he recalls a person named "SAM", who was employed as a junior draftsman to assist with a World's Fair contract in 1938 and 1939. He said the name LEVINE is not familiar but that the company's personnel has always been small in number and that the "SAM" he recalls is undoubtedly the employee. He said "SAM" was a loyal, patriotic American, to the best of his recollection.

Mr. ALLEN said that aside from Mr. POMERANCE, he would be the only one who would know Mr. LEVINE.

The employee on a Personal History Statement, dated November 9, 1948, stated he was employed by the above company as a checker and field engineer from December, 1939 to March, 1940.

DAVID LEVY advised that the Volk Company has gone into receivership and that he is acting as liquidator. Mr. LEVY said he was formerly the Assistant Manager of the company and does not know the employee. He said the personnel records prior to 1941, have been destroyed and he has no record of the employee. He stated that during the indicated years of the employee's employment, the company was engaged in work for the World's Fair in New York and employed several hundred employees. He was unable to recommend anyone who might recall the employee.

Mrs. HARRY RABINOWITZ, second floor front, advised that the LEVINE family has resided in the apartment above

hers for twenty years and that she has known the employee since he was a boy. She said the LEVINES are quiet, respected people, who, in her opinion, are loyal to the United States. She said the employee has resided in New Jersey during the past ten years, but that she sees him occasionally when he visits his parents. She described the employee as a loyal, patriotic American.

Mrs. BESSIE ZINNANTI, second floor rear, said she has known the LEVINE family ten years and considers the family to be loyal to the United States. She said she is well acquainted with the employee's parents and sisters, but has met the employee only upon his visits to his parents. She said she knows him well by reputation and believes that his loyalty to the United States is unquestionable.

Mrs. EVA KATZ advised she owns the building at 1134 Metcalf Avenue and has known the LEVINE family ten years as a neighbor. She said she regards the employee and his family as loyal to the United States.

Mrs. MARGARET GENSLE, second floor apartment, 1134 Metcalf Avenue, said she has known the LEVINE family about ten or more years and believes the family is loyal. She said she knows the employee mostly by reputation and sees him only when he visits his parents. She said she believes the employee is unquestionably loyal to the United States.

Miscellaneous

The Bureau of Special Services and Investigation and the Identification Division of the New York City Police Department have no record of the employee.

The Credit Bureau of Greater New York has no record of the employee.

The records of the Board of Elections, Borough of the Bronx, New York, reflect that SAMUEL LEVINE, 1136 Metcalf

Avenue, registered in 1938 and 1939, as a member of the American Labor Party. Mr. LEVINE's first registration was in 1937, when he registered as a member of one of the two major political parties.

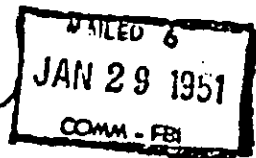

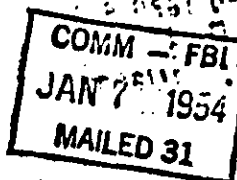

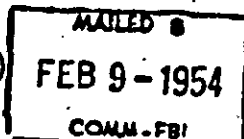
