Reference is made to Newark letter dated 7-27-54, in the captioned matter in which Bureau authority is requested to interview the subject.

Bureau authority is granted to interview Samuel Levine. This interview should be conducted in accordance with existing Bureau instructions involving interviews with security subjects.

It is noted that the basic allegation against Levine is that he was unable to account for a number of classified documents which were originally charged to his predecessor at Evans Signal Laboratory, Aaron H. Coleman. It is further noted that an Army Board of Inquiry checked and found no irregularities.

You should, however, thoroughly interview Levine regarding the documents in question as well as the allegation that he may have been a member of the Young Communist League in 1938 while attending the City College of New York.

The results of this interview should be submitted in a report suitable for dissemination, and a recommendation should be made by you as to further investigation to be conducted in this case.

NOTE: Investigation of Samuel Levine, Chief of the Radar System Section, Evans Signal Laboratory, was based on information found in the files of CIC in connection with a review of the Army files in the case entitled, "Suspected Espionage, Ft. Monmouth, New Jersey, and Federal Telecommunications Laboratories, Nutley, New Jersey." Investigation, to date, fails to indicate any evidence of espionage on the part of Levine, and it is believed that an interview with him will resolve the matter of his possible membership in the Young Communist League in 1938.

SAMUEL LEVINE was interviewed 9/2/54 in accordance with Bureau regulations and authority as set out in Bureau letter to Newark dated 8/6/54.

LEVINE was questioned regarding documents he was unable to produce at the request of CIC on 6/15/52. He was also questioned as to whether or not he had been a member of the YOUNG COMMUNIST LEAGUE while attending the City College of New York. The results of this part of the interview are set out in the above referenced report.

In addition LEVINE was asked about a document classified as Secret and identified as Memorandum #16 dated 8/9/49 which was written by AARON H. COLEMAN and CARL GREENBLUM of the Systems Section. Copy #88 of this memorandum was in the possession of the U. S. Naval Electronics Laboratory, San Diego, California, when it was discovered that three drawings had been removed from the document. This is presently being reflected under the title "UNKNOWN SUBJECT, Missing Secret Document at U. S. Naval Electronics Laboratory, San Diego, California; ESPIONAGE-X" (Bufile 65-62059)

LEVINE advised that he became a member of the Systems Section in February, 1950, which was about four months before the document in question was sent from the Evans Signal Laboratory to the Naval Electronics Laboratory. LEVINE knew nothing about the document that was immediately helpful in locating parts. The result of this part of the interview will be set forth in a report bearing the caption as set out in this letter.

Since there is nothing further to interview LEVINE about and no allegations against him have been substantiated, the case in this office is being placed in a closed status.

LEVINE advised that he is presently employed as Chief of the Systems Section at the Evans Signal Laboratory, Belmar, New Jersey, which is a part of Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. LEVINE has held this position since AARON H. COLEMAN (a former Chief) was transferred to other duties. LEVINE previously held the position of Assistant Chief of the Systems Section.

LEVINE advised that he was requested by a representative of Newark Confidential Informant T-1, another government agency that conducts security and personnel investigations, to produce some fifteen classified documents which had previously been signed out to his predecessor, AARON H. COLEMAN. LEVINE stated that most of the work in connection with locating these documents was carried out by representatives of T-1 and the clerical employees of his office.

A considerable amount of work was involved and at the end of the day following the request only seven or eight of the fifteen documents had been located or a satisfactory explanation as to its disposition had been learned.

LEVINE recalled that his office employees were told to continue looking for the missing seven or eight documents and that a representative from T-1 would check back later to see what progress had been made.

LEVINE advised that after several days of searching, his office employees were able to locate the documents or to find a record in the files indicating they had either been destroyed or that the responsibility for the safekeeping of the document had been transferred to another section or in some instances been sent outside of the agency.

After holding this information for some time without receiving a call from T-1, the information was returned to the files. LEVINE stated that insofar as he knew, there was no question concerning the fifteen documents that had formerly been signed out to AARON H. COLEMAN.

LEVINE pointed out that the system of accounting for classified documents was a poor system and that many of the documents had been transferred to other sections and had been sent out of the agency as enclosures to other documents, and the records of the Mail and Record Section had not been adjusted accordingly. As a result, the person who originally signed out the document continued to be charged for it even though he was no longer responsible.

Since that time, a new system has been instituted so that classified documents may be more closely controlled. LEVINE further pointed out that almost all documents which were destined for the Systems Section were signed out to COLEMAN and in almost all instances this transaction was performed by his secretary. Usually these documents were screened and in many instances were sent directly to the engineer who was interested in them and did not even cross COLEMAN's desk.

Even though COLEMAN did not see the documents, he was still charged with the responsibility of their safekeeping.

LEVINE stated that he had known COLEMAN as a classmate at the City College of New York in New York City and had also known JULIUS ROSENBERG, the executed Soviet spy, as a student. LEVINE stated that he had not known that ROSENBERG had approached COLEMAN to become a member of the YOUNG COMMUNIST LEAGUE at the City College of New York until after COLEMAN had been called to testify before some group at which he made this information available. Afterwards COLEMAN told LEVINE about it. LEVINE stated that he had also been approached by ROSENBERG to become a member of the YCL but had declined. LEVINE stated that it was well known around the City College of New York that JULIUS ROSENBERG was active in the YCL and that he himself recalled him in particular because ROSENBERG was always copying from other students because he spent too much time in outside activities to do his school work.
