



THOMAS L. BLACK, ESP - R. RE PHILA, TEL JUNE FIRST, FIFTY. HARRY GOLD INTERVIEWED EVENING OF JUNE FIRST AND SUPPLIED FOLLOWING INFO GOLD SAID HE FIRST MET BLACK IN NINETEEN THIRTY-CONCERNING SUBJECT. THREE AT THE HOLBROOK CO. AT JERSEY CITY, N. J. GOLD SAID HE MET BLACK THROUGH A MAN NAMED FRED HELLER AT PENNA. SUGAR CO., PHILA.

GOLD STATED THAT THERE WAS NO ESPIONAGE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN HELLER,

BLACK AND HIMSELF AND KNOWS OF NO SUCH ACTIVITIES ON THE PART OF HELLE;

GOLD SAID THAT IN NINETEEN THIRTYTHREE HE HAD LOST HIS JOB AT PENNA.

SUGAR CO. AND THROUGH HELLER WAS SENT TO THE HOLBROOK CO. AND

SECURED THE JOB THAT HAD BEEN HELD BY BLACK. BLACK AT THIS TIME HAD

SECURED ANOTHER JOB FOR HIMSELF. GOLD SAID THAT EARLY IN HIS

ASSOCIATION WITH BLACK HE KNEW THAT THE LATTER HAD RADICAL LEANINGS

ALTHOUGH NOTHING CONCERNING HIS FUTURE ESPIONAGE ACTIVITIES CAME UP

DURING GOLD-S STAY IN JERSEY CITY. GOLD SAID THAT HIS ENTRANCE INTO

ESPIONAGE ACTIVITIES WAS PARTLY BECAUSE OF THE DEBT HE FELT TO

BLACK AND ALSO HIS DESIRE TO HELP THE SOVIET UNION. GOLD SAID THAT

IN LATE NINETEEN THIRTYFIVE HE WENT TO MY WITH BLACK AND MET PAUL

SMITH IN DOWNTOWN NY. GOLD SAID THAT SMITH TOLD HIM ALMOST

IMMEDIATELY AFTER THIS MEETING THAT HE WAS MOT TO SEE BLACK AGAIN

EXCEPT UNDER THE DIRECT INSTRUCTIONSS OF SMITH. GOLD SAID THAT

NEITHER HE NOR BLACK COMPLETELY OBEYED THESE ORDERS SINCE THEY HAD

BECOME CLOSE FRIENDS. GOLD RECALLS THAT ONE ONE OCCASION

SUMMER OF NINETEEN THIRTYSEVEN BLACK WAS INJURED IN AN EXPLOSION AND SENT TO A HOSPITAL IN KEARNY, NJ. GOLD SAID HE WANTED TO SEE BLACK IN THE HOSPITAL AND LATER TOLD HIS RUSSIAN CONTACT FRED OF BLACK-S ACCIDENT AND HOSPITALIZATION. GOLD SAID THAT FRED BECAME VERY PERTURBED OVER THE FACT THAT THE TWO HAD MET AGAINST GOLD SAID, HOWEVER, THAT HE IS QUITE SURE THAT BLACK WAS NOT A CONTACT OF FRED. GOLD SAID THAT ONE OCCASION BLACK LET DROP THE INFORMATION THAT HE WAS WORKING ON TROTSKYITE ACTIVITIES IN AN EFFORT TO DETERMINE THE DIRECT LINK BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND TROTSKY IN NINETEEN THIRTYSEVEN OR THIRTYEIGHT. Special Agent T. Scott Willer, Philadelphia Office, advised as follows concerning information furnished by Harry Gold in regard to captioned case:

Gold first met Black in Jersey City in 1933. He knew that Black, a chemist, had radical leanings. Black got him a job at Halbrook Company, Jersey City and Black introduced him to Paul Amith. (This is the only change from Gold's earlier statement on how he first met Paul Smith.) This introduction occurred late in 1935 in New York City. At that time Smith told Gold not to see Black again except on Smith's orders.

Around 1937 or 1938 Black told Gold that he was engaged in "intelligence against the Troskyites" and since Gold and Black had little conversation with each other about their espionage activities, Gold doesn't know what else Black has done for the Russians.

Black frequently lost contact with the Russians and used to come to Gold to get in touch again. Early in 1946 when Gold himself lost contact with them he went to Black only to learn that Black hadn't been in touch with the Russians "for a long time."

About 1938 Black pointed to Whittaker Chambers' name as Editor of "Time" and told Gold be knew Chambers in connection with espionage. He also told Gold that Chambers had given information "on his own activities to Army Intelligence." Several times subsequent to 1938 Black talked about Chambers (prior to 1946) and wondered if Chambers would remember him.

On one occasion Black described to Gold his Russian contact - and - Gold is certain it was Sam (Sementy Semenow).



Reference is made to my monorandum to you deted June 16, 1950. As you are sware, this memorandum to you was delivered by Mr. Ladd and Mr. Belmont to Mr. McInermay and Mr. Theorty, and it was their opinion that there was not sufficient evidence at this time on which to proceed against Black. It was their recommendation that the questioning of Black should be discentified during the day of June 16, 1950, because of the length of time which had elapsed during which Black had been talking to our Agents.

For your information, at approximately 7:00 fH on Juno 16, 1950, the interview with Black was terminated, at which time Black was taken to his home by our Philadelphia Agents.

Subsequently, at 1:45 /M on June 17, 1950, Black telephonically contacted our Newark Office from the Fennsylvania Railroad Station in Newark, at which time he requested that he not be picked up for interview an Henrisy merning upon his return to Ahladelphia. He stated that he wished to come to the Philadelphia office at his convenience during the early part of the week because he had obligations to his jeb and wanted to be rested.

In view of the fact that it is the opinion of Mr. Maintreey and Mr. Mostry that insufficient evidence is available at this time of which to proceed against black, end in view of their opinion that the interview should be terminated, it is requested that you advice is modified; as to whether further interviews with black are desirable, and absolutering the evidence chained against black, as reflected in my confirm memorandum, is insufficient.




Welte stated that the Newark Office, in their surveillance of the subject over the week-end, took him to a movie in New York, 🔫 "The Third Man." This is a spy picture and the picture, among other things, relates devious methods of avoiding surveillances, etc. Since that time the subject has been doubling. In Newark he got 💥 off one train and on another. In Philadelphia today he has an automobile for the first time since the surveillance has been on and he has been traveling slowly, going to infrequently traveled 45 freas, and parking along the street waiting to see if other cars are following him.

Welte said that the Philadelphia Office wanted the Bureau to know of this development, particularly in view of the fact that interviews with Black have been recommended by the Philadelphia 🦫 Office.

I told Welte and also Supervisor Goins that they should ? continue the surveillance of Black, handling it as a loose surveillance as they have during the past several days, and that since they do not now feel that he has become specifically aware of the surveillance being conducted, there appears to be no reason why he should become aware of it if it is discreetly handled. told them that the matter of interviewing Black is being considered, together with other pending interviews of other subjects which have evolved from the Gold case, and that the Philadelphia Office will be informed as soon as a decision is reached as to when the interviews will take place. 🗈

BLACK ESPIONAGE - R At 7:25 P.M. on June 15, 1950, BAC Cornelius called from Philadelphia and advised that Black has been doing considerable :: #### talking but will not admit that he has engaged in espionage pages activities. Essentially, Black has stated that he engaged in consultant work for the Soviet Union through Amtorg but did not engage in espionage. Kr. Cornelius advised that the Agents are continuing the interview of Black. He stated that a search of Black's home is in progress but they have not yet been able to start a search of his laboratory in Patterson, New Jersey, inasmuch as Black's associates are not available at the laboratory. Mr. Cornelius pointed out that the investigation of Black has not been fully opened up as yet in view of the fact that up to now we had not wanted Black to know of our interest in him. I advised Mr. Cornelius that the investigation should be widened immediately and that Alian he should call the appropriate effices and instruct that all angles were the of the investigation of Black should be pursued at once. At 10:25 P.N. Mr. Cornelius advised that the Agents are going to discuss with Black whether he desires to remain with them over night. I advised Mr. Cornelius that he should endeavor to use the same type of permissive statement that was utilized relative to Gold. Mr. Cornelius advised that Black, while telking volubly, had not admitted espionage activities. At 11:45 P.W. Mr. Cornelius advised that Black continued to talk and has admitted meeting several Russian contacts which the Agents have not yet been able to identify. However, Black still states that his activities were not of an espionage nature. From the statements made by Black, there is no question but that he was engaged in espionage activities although he has not so admitted and there is question so far whether such activities are capable of proof and come within the statute. Mr. Cornelius was advised to send a detailed teletype tonight setting forth information furnished by Black in order that we may prepare an appropriate memorandum to discuss the activities of Black with the Department in the morning. in a hotel with the Agents overnight and had signed a written request to this effect along identical lines with the request of Harry Gold. I instructed Mr. Cornelius to take Black to the hotel and see that he got sufficient sleep; that an appropriate log was kept properly; and that the Agents remain awake all night to see that his activities were noted. Mr. Cornelius advised that Black would be taken to the Benjamin Franklin Hotel and that the two Agents who interviewed him would alsep while two additional Agents would remain awake all night.

Attached is a memorandum reflecting information concerning the available knowledge of the activities of Thomas L. Black in order that these activities may be discussed with the Department. You will note that a portion of this memorandum deals with the admission of Black that he had knowledge that Harry Gold was the American contact of Fuchs but failed to Inform authorities of this knowledge.

You will recall that in his signed statement dated May 22, 1950, Harry Gold declared that he originally became involved in Soviet espionage in 1936, when one "Paul Smith" called at his residence in Philadelphia and succeeded in recruiting Gold to furnish industrial information to him for the benefit of the USSR. On subsequent interviews, however, Gold has admitted that he, in fact, was recruited into Soviet espionage by Thomas L. Black, a chemist when he has known since 1933.

During the course of investigation by this Bureau, immediately after Gold's confession on May 22, 1950, it was established that during the period of several weeks immediately prior to May 22, 1950, Gold had been in very intimate contact with Black. Background investigation of Black disclosed that he was born on July 5, 1907, in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, was a bacteriological chemist, and that he was employed by the Charles W. Berg Laboratories, 1827 North Fifth Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Black was interviewed by Bureau agents on May 31, 1950, and listed his present residence as 1929 North Sixth Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He admitted acquaintanceship with Gold since 1933, said he considered Gold to be a fine, upstanding chemist, and that he never had any reason to doubt Gold's loyalty. Black admitted on this occasion that from 1933 until 1936 or 1937, while residing in Jersey City, New Jersey, he was a member of the Communist Parcy, but said he had no knowledge of Gold's ever being a member of the Communist Party or interested in Communist matters. Black said Gold succeeded him in the position of chemist with the Holbrook Manufacturing, Company, Jersey City, New Jersey, in 1933, and that he saw Gold only infrequently from 1935 until 1945, from which time to date he has seen Gold eften and has become well-acquainted with Gold's family. He claimed to have no knowledge concerning travel on the part of Gold except one business urip to Brooklyn, New York.

On June 2, 1950, Gold furnished a signed statement in which he declared that Black had attempted to persuade him to join the Communist Party in 1933, that Black had asked him if he could get information during the course of his employment with the Pennsylvania Sugar Company which might be of interest to the Russians, and that Black at that time told Gold he had been giving to the Russians chemical processes secured by Black in the course of his employment with the Eational Oil Products Company. Gold declared further in this signed

statement that he and Black had several discussions in 1935 concerning the supplying of information to the Russians and including discussions on how the material to be supplied could be blueprinted and photostated. He also set out that in the latter part of 1935, Black introduced Gold to his first Russian contact, one "Paul Smith" in New York City, and that in his subsequent association with this Soviet contact, continuing until the early part of 1937, Gold furnished him information on chemical processes. Gold continued to see Black on infrequent occasions after the meeting with "Paul Smith," and declared that sometime later, Black described his own Russian contact to Gold, who recognized the contact as being identical with "Cam" (Seren H. Comenov). Cold declared that from what Black told him, Black's last contact with the Russians was sometime in 1944.

On June 4, 1950, Gold furnished a second signed statement concerning the espionage activities of Black. In this statement, Gold declared that sometime in early 1942, the Soviet Union was interested in getting information on penicillin, and Black was attempting to secure such data for the USER. Cold declared it is his impression, gained from conversations he had with Black, that during the early 1940's, Black generally was engaged in obtaining information on biologicals for the Soviet Union, and that he made trips to various cities in the United States for that purpose, turning over the information he received on such trips to representatives of the Soviet Union in New York City. Gold also declared in this statement that on occasion, it was necessary for him to borrow money in order to finance his espionage activities, and that sometimes he would borrow sums from Black since the latter would not ask why Gold needed funds. Gold declared that Black knew Gold was engaged in Soviet espionege, and furthermore, that in 1945. Gold told Black he had been to the Southwestern part of the United States in connection with his activities on behalf of the URSE, and also told Black he was planning to make a second trip to the Southwest. Sold declared also in this statement that Black knew that Cold's assignment at that time was important but knew no details concerning it. Gold also declared that as he now recalls it, it was on a Triday in February, 1950, that Fushe' name appeared in the press with the story of his arrest in England. On the rollowing Monday, Gold continued, he set Black, and while they were walking together, Gold cold Black that he was the person to whom Fuchs gave information for transmittal to the Soviets. Black and Gold then decided that in the future, they would meet only at the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia since there would be no suspicion attached to their meeting at that place, and that by such an arrangement, Black would not be discovered in the event Cold were "picked up."

On June 5, 1950, Cold furnished an additional statement concerning Black. In this statement, Gold declared that when he told Black he had

received data from Fuchs, he also told Black he had visited Fuchs' sister in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and that she could probably identify him. According to Gold, Black responded that if he were picked up and questioned, he would deny everything because it would be his word against that of another. Gold said he also told Black that Fuchs had known him well and could positively identify him, and that Black was well aware of the gravity of the situation. Gold further stated, "We even discussed the possibility that Fuchs might be brought to the United States to stand trial and would point me out in a court of law. Here again, Black told me that while that would be very bad, still, it was essentially only Fuchs' word against mine."

Examination of birth records at Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, verified the birth of Black on July 5, 1907, and disclosed that his father was Alfred Bruce Black, who died about 1925, and his nother was Mary Helen Williams Black, who was believed also to be deceased. He was graduated from Bloomsburg High School in 1925, and attended Penn State College, State College, Pennsylvania, from 1925 to 1929. Records of the Court of Common Pleas, Union County, Elizabeth, New Jersey, reflect that Black changed his name from Tasso Lessing Blac't to Thomas Lessing Black on December 22, 1930. He was employed as a chemist by the American Cyanamide Corporation from June 24, 1929, to May 15, 1930, and was subsequently employed as a chemist by the Holbrook Manufacturing Comany, Jersey City, New Jersey, which position he resigned in 1933. As stated previously in this memorandum, Gold took over this position on Black's resignation. Black was employed as a chemist by the National Oil Products Corpany, Harrison, New Jersey, from February 20, 1933, until June 30, 1944, when be was discharged for falsification of reports. In addition to his present employment with the Charles W. Berg Laboratories, Black is employed in a consultant capacity with the Spruce Chemical Commany, 117 East Railway Avenue, Paterson, New Jersey.

On reinterview on June 15, 1950, Black admitted in a signed statement to Bureau agents that he has been a close acquaintance of Harry Gold since 1933, and that pursuant to a telephone call from Gold in early February, 1950, after the arrest of Fuchs, he met Gold and the latter told him that he had been Fuchs' American contact. Black declared further in this statement that Gold told him that if he should be caught, he was going to take an overdose of sleeping tabless, and that Black attempted to persuade Gold not to commit suicide. Black admitted that he knew Gold traveled to New York occasionally without any apparent business, and that he also knew that Gold made a trip to Albuquerque, New Mexico, sometime before the test atomic bomb was exploded. He said he knew Gold made that trip because Gold telephoned bim from Albuquerque asking Black to telegraph him seme funds, which Black did not do because he did not have the money at the time. Black declared

he had no knowledge at that time of the reason for Gold's trip to Albuquerque. Black declared further in this statement that "I fully realize that I had certain responsibilities as a citizen to inform the proper authorities of his statement. The reason that I did not inform anyone was that I was frankly very scared at the time and I did not want to become involved if it could be avoided. Also, it is a very difficult decision to be forced to make as to whether or not I should give any information told to me in confidence which would jeopardize a friend of very long standing. In retrospect, I very deeply regret that I did not at that time come forward with the information which would have aided in Harry's apprehension. If I can be of any further assistance to the FBI. in this or other matters, I am willing to cooperate." He also recited in this statement that "I knew from the newspapers that Klaus Fuchs had been arrested in England for the transmission of A-Bomb secrets to the Soviet Union. Harry Gold told me that he had been the contact man between Fuchs and a Soviet agent in transmitting these sccrets."

In addition to the foregoing information furnished during reinterview on June 15, 1950, Black admitted to agents that he had several meetings in 1933 or 1934 with Gaik Ovakimian, then an official of Antorg in New York City and who was apprehended by agents of this Bureau in 1941 and immediately thereafter returned to Russia. Black contended that he and Ferdinand P. Heller told Gwakimian they desired to go to Russia as chemists, and that the meetings between him and Ovakimian were for the purpose of demonstrating Black's ability in chemistry by providing answers to problems propounded by Ovakimian.

Black also admitted that in 1934 and 1935, he met one Paul Petersen and furnished technical information to him in return for which he accepted giits of books but no money. Black declared Feterson requested him to act as a courier but that he refused and then dropped out of the Communist Party to avoid contact with Soviet agents. Re then joined the Trotshyites in Hewark, New Jersey. In early 1936, Petersen introduced Black to a new contact whom Black identified as "George," and the latter attempted to secure information from Black regarding the Troushyites, as did "John," "John" subsequently Black's next Russian contact whom he met in 1939. introduced Black to another contact named "Jack," who instructed Black to secure a position at the Kellex Company, saying that something "big" was under way at Kellex. As you know, this concern was a prime contractor in the Manhaitan Project. Black claims he never followed the instruction to go with Kellex and had no contact with Soviet agents for approximately a year thereafter, at which time Black furnished a detailed written report to "Jack" on the manufacturing of penicillin. According to Black, he next

heard from "Jack" in 1948, at which time he met "Jack" in front of Macy's Department Store in New York City and "Jack" told Black he wanted him to work for the Soviet Union. Black contends he told "Jack" he would do legitimate consulting work for Amtorg but would not do espionage work.

Throughout interviews to date, Black has insisted that he found himself in an activity from which he could not escape and that he as continually threatened by his various contacts. To further claims that fear kept him from making an open break and that he concentrated on trying to discourage his Soviet contacts and to avoid carrying out assignments.

For your information, Special Agents of the Philadelphia Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation questioned Black in the office throughout June 15, 1950. He expressed a desire to remain with Agents of this Bureau until he had furnished all information in his possession. As a consequence, he has spent the night at a Philadelphia hotel with Special Agents of this Pureau and questioning will be resumed this morning at the Philadelphia Office. It is apparent that Black has not accurately given full information concerning his activities up to the present time. Your attention is called to the fact that Black has admitted knowledge of Gold's activities as the American contact of Dr. Fuchs and that Gold furnished information on atomic energy matters to his Russian contacts which he had obtained from Fuchs. Black further admits that he had possession of this knowledge in February, 1950, and failed to furnish the information to appropriate authorities. This may constitute misprision of felony.

Additional pertinent information in this matter will be furnished to you when it becomes available.

PBI timias unsing black The state of the s Reference is made to my memorandum of June 16, 1950, to the Attorney General setting out information developed up to that time concerning the above-captioned subject. In your reply of June 20, 1950, you requested further; information obtained as a result of our investigation upon which a basis for: prosecution alibt be established. In an interview on June 15, 1950, Herry Gold stated that during 1940 Black received information concerning a rust proofing conjound being worked on by the American Chemical Paint Company which Black furnished to a Soviet igent. cold said black received the information from Ferdinand Phillip heller, a conchemist employed by the American Chemical Paint Company, who was a friend of Black. Gold related that Heller kept auroying Black by volunteering on frequent occasions to supply information to Plack. In this regard, Gold stated Black once told bim, Cold, that the Suviets were not receptive to those who sought to volunteer information but preferred to select their own sources of information. Cold believes Black reported on Weller to the Soviets and made an unfavorable recommendation. Some time around 1940, according to Gold, Black displayed an increasing dislike for his own work in behalf of the foviets, brought about, Gold said by Black's assignment to report on the Trotakyites. Gold said Black is further irritated by his abortive attempt to gain certain biologicals from the diniversity of Pernsylvaria Hospital. In this regard, Gold stated Black suggested to him that fold be alert for some ideas which the two of them could use in selections to business if either or both should come under serious suspicion and loss their Society and the second Gold related that at times when he and Black would become weary and depressed, Black frequently consented that people sometimes are apprehended as a result of some incident which they thenselves consider as very trivial and not likely to be detected. At buch times Black would admonish Cold to the effect that they would not find any rest uptil they were in their graves 至此。正是是一种特別的學樣是對於 Cold further informed that during 1930 or 1937 he and Black rented a room at the Carteret Hotel in New York City, whip false names. There the two of them spent about a day and a half sumbing to aluminum slloy angle irons in the which they drilled holes for ascenbly into a small rectangular suitcase which was litted to hold an ultra-violet ray lampa, "The purpose of the whole device" was for reading bidden messages. Gold informed Black and been instructed by his Soviet superiors to construct this device.

It is Gold's belief that Black ceased his Soviet espionage activities several years ago but he is of the epinion that the termination was initiated by the Soviets rather than by Black, because of the admissions made by Whittaker Chambers as to his own espionage activities. Gold pointed out Black had teld him he was well known to Chambers as Thomas Black. For your information, Chambers to date has been unable to identify photographs of Black.

When interviewed on June 16, 1950, by Bureau Agents at Philadelphia,

Black maintained that he did not act as an intermediary for the Soviets except
as follows.

Black told of having visited Dr. Earl William Flosdorff, becteriologist at the University of Pennsylvania, in about 1939 to ascertain if Flosdorff was willing to cooperate with Antorg as he had previously done. Flosdorff was agreeable and Black reported this to his Soviet contact, "Jack." Black stated it is his opinion that Flosdorff's contact with Antorg was legitimate and that he was not engaged in espionage activities.

Black in relating the only other obcasion on which he acted as an intermediary for the Soviets told that in 1945 "Jack" arranged for him to most William Stapler, who used the name "Bob," and who was employed as a chemist 💥 by the Heronles Powder Company, Ellmington, Delaware. "Jack" told Black the Soviets had previously purchased technical information from Stapler in the past and wanted to reestablish contact with him. Upon contacting Stapler, Black was told by him he had not yet been paid for services he had previously performed and until such payment was made he was unwilling to cooperate. Upon reporting this fact to "Jack," the latter gave Black approximately \$100 which Black, according to instructions, delivered to Stapler. "Jack's" instructions were that meetings with Stapler were to be held at the Pennsylvania Reilroad Station. in Newark, New Jersey. Black advised that he made arrangements through Mrs. Stapler as to the time of such meetings. Black asserted, however, that Stapler never furnished him any information for transmission to the Soviets but that he gave Black for the latter's own personal use a sample of pure resia 🕾 and literature published by the Euroules Powder Company. And

Inquiry of the Beroules Powder Company has reflected that Stapler died in 1947 at Riverdale, New Jersey, while still an employee of that Company and that he did not have access to any information which bore a Government classification.

In the interview on Jum 16, 1950, Black educated that in 1934 he furnished to a Soviet contact processes utilized by his employer, the Estional Oil Products Company (NOPCO) which concerned the sulfametion of oils, textile.

He asserted that effers were made to him in 1935 and 1936 by his Soviet contacts, Paul Petersen and "Jack," to set him up in business and buy him a car for the purpose of his securing information regarding other industrial plants. Black stated, however, that he did not perform these tasks. Black subsequently identified his contact "Jack" as Joseph Kats.

Black admitted recruiting Herry Gold for Soviet espioners and introducing Gold to Paul Paterson in New York City. Black further admitted that in 1945 be furnished the Soviets with a sample of sorbital which he described as the base for ascorbic acid (Vitasin C) and with his own process for this material.

As noted in my memorandum to the Attorney General dated June 16, 1990, Black when interviewed on June 15, 1950, told of receiving a call from Harry Gold from Albuquerque, How Mexico, asking for funds. Black declared he did not have sufficient funds at that time to accommodate Gold. In this regard, Harry Gold when interviewed on June 17, 1950, related that in September, 1945, while in Chicago, Illinois, he phoned Black who wired him \$20 in response to Gold's request for funds to be sent to Gold in care of the Hilton Hotel, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Rerry Gold on Sure 18, 1950, recelled Black's relating to him an assignment Black had received from the Sovieté to ascertain the location of a man Black described as Leon Trotsky's principal agent in the United States. Black told Gold of surveillances he had conducted in this regard. Gold also informed that when he and Black were discussing their Russian contacts they determined that both were contacting the same person who was known to Gold as "Sam" (Semen Semenov) and to Black as "George."

On June 21, 1950, at his request Black was interviewed further. With regard to his joining the Trotskyite novement, Black said he did so partly through his own conviction but mostly to comply with Paul Peterson's suggestion that he join the Trotskyites as an informer for Peterson. Black stated he welcomed this move as a means of escaping from his previous assignment of performing industrial espionage.

Investigation in this matter is continuing and you will be edvised of further developments. Tour advice is requested as to whater the additional information furnished above in conjunction with the information in my memorandum of June 16 constitutes a basis for prosecutive action.

Investigation by the Eureau has established that the abovecaptioned subject was engaged in furnishing information to Soviet intelli once agents in this country in the early 1940's.

Information has been received that one of Black's contacts was probably identical with one Pr. Gregory Lyorich Labinovitch, with aliases Rabinowitz, "abinovich, "Roberts," and "Fr. Rich."

The files of the Bureau reflect information received to the effect that Rabinovitch was head of the Russian Red Cross in the United States from 1934 until he departed in 1938. A confidential informant of known reliability learned from an official of Amtorg in 1936 or 1937 that Dr. Rabinovitch was the "big boss" of the GFU in the United States at that time. Dr. Rabinovitch was also reportedly affiliated with Amtorg during the period he was in the United States.

The following descriptive data concerning Rabinovitch appears in the Emrenu's files:

Age - 43 in 1935; born - Euscia; arrived in the United States, October 10, 1934, at New York City, aboard the SS Majestic possessing a Mussian passport; height - 5'(or 7"; build - stocky; hair - greying black; profession - physician; wife - Fannie Sidorovna Rabinovitch; children Boris - are 13 in 1935, Sonia - age 10 in 1935.

AT SEATTLE, WASHINGTON

The title of this report is being changed to reflect the name TASSCLESSING which claims is BLACK's true first name.

Service, 2725 Hontlake Boulevard, residence advised he was employed from August 6, 1935, until May 15, 1938, as a chemist at the National Oil Products Company, now known as NOPCO Chemical Company, at Harrison, New Jersey. He advised that he was acquainted with THOMAS L. BLACK who was also a chemist and later a bacteriologist for that company during this period.

recalls that to his knowledge BLACK was an only child whose first name was actually TASSOLESSING, a name given him by his father who was a professor. States that it is his impression that BLACK also had a step-mother and that BLACK's original home is somewhere in Pennsylvania.

BIACK attended some university in Pennsylvania, probably the University of Pennsylvania or Pennsylvania State College. is under the impression that he learned from BIACK that BIACK had been expelled from the University of Pennsylvania or Pennsylvania State College prior to graduation, because of BIACK's gradical activities.

lescribed his relationship with BIACK as that of a friend during the period 1935 thru 1938, and stated that that BIACK that BIACK was an individual who made friends easily and who took an interest in aiding other people.

Stated that their relationship was on the basis of their common scientific interest and that they had no outside interests in common

stated that he knew BLACK was interested in Communism between 1935 and 1938 inasmuch as BLACK discussed Communism a great deal. From BLACK's conversation he suspects that BLACK was probably a member of the Communist Party, although he claims to have no definite knowledge of such membership. According to BLACK never solicited his membership in the Communist Party, but he knows that BLACK regularly read the "Daily Worker" and recalls that at one time BLACK purchased a copy of the "Daily Worker" at a news stand.

further recalled that during the period he knew BLACK,
BLACK was strongly considering going to Spain to fight for the Loyalist
cause in the Spanish Civil War.

dissuade BLACK from going to Spain.

recalls that on this trip to New York. BLACK took him to a large building, location not recalled, which recalls as having some connection with the Communist Party in New York City. It is unable to recall the reason BLACK took him to this building but thinks that BLACK wished to purchase a book or perhaps wished merely to show the Communist Party headquarters. described this building as a large dingy building and recalls going down a flight of stairs below grade with BLACK. When he was asked why it was his impression that the name of one of the individuals was GOLD or a similar name, and why he remembers the name in view of the seemingly casual meeting, stated that he is not at all sure that this is the name but feels that this impression may be the result of his knowledge that BLACK was a Communist sympathizer, that BLACK is presently in Philadelphia, and the fact that recent publicity indicated that one HARRY GOLD had been arrested in Philadelphia for Soviet intelligence activities. Stated that when he read this in the newspaper, he immediately thought of BLACK and wondered whether or not BLACK was still interested in Communism as he was in 1935 thru 1938.

of HARRY GOLD in the newspaper that this individual could possibly be the same man whom he met with HIACK replied that he did not feel that it was the same person and recalls that the individual he met was thinner.

brothers, who were also Jewish, during this period and recalls that one of them was named DEN. He stated that HEN and his brother entered the Service during the War, one in the Army and BEN in the Navy, and that they were both stationed in Seattle. Washington, probably in 1944

was unable to furnish the identities of these two individuals but advised that his wife who is presently on a vacation trip has their address book which he is sure contains the names and addresses of these individuals.

he knew him but states that BLACK went to New York City on many week ends. He further stated that he cannot recall ever hearing BLACK mentioning ever traveling to any particular section of the country.

Concerning BLACK's background, stated he knew very little other than he believes BLACK worked in a textile mill when he was young and also was employed at one time in a soap factory in Jersey City. BLACK also was supposed to have been a photographer's assistant at one time.

claims that he has no knowledge of any activities of BLACK since 1938, and definitely denied any knowledge that BLACK ever engaged in espionage activities for the Soviet Union.



Information has been received that one of Black's contacts was probably identical with one Dr. Gregory Lvorich Rabinovitch, with aliases Rabinovitz, Rabinovich, "Roberts," and "Lr. Rich."

The files of this Bureau reflect information received to the effect that Rabinovitch was head of the Bussian Red Cross in the United States from 1934 until he departed in 1938. A confidential informant of known reliability learned from an official of Amtorg in 1936 or 1937 that Dr. Pabinovitch was the "bir boss" of the GPU in the United States at that time. Dr. Babinovitch was also reportedly affiliated with Amtorg during the period he was in the United States.


