

These recent reflect that the Berg Laboratories which products under the name of "Perlab" and also under the name "Fairchild and French". The recent indicates the Berg Laboratories is the manufacturer of chamical specialties and that CHURLES W. BIRG is in partnership with WHITE ALMUS. The business was initially established in 1919 under the control/of the senior partner, CHURLES W. BIRG, and registered under the style of Fairchild and French on April 19, 1930, by BERG. This latter style is used in connection with distribution of disinfectant. The trade style of Berlab was registered on September 5, 1944, by CHURLES W. BIRG and WILLES ALMUS.

The concern was reorganized on July 1, 1914 to succeed the initial establishment of CHATARS W. FERG by the admission of ALMUS as a partner.

BARG, was born in the United States in 1888, was indicated as married and was interested in the Neatsfoot Cil Refineries Corporation, but disposed of his interest in this concern in 1936.

ALMID, born in the United States about 1912, was wornied and employed by BLAG for a period of approximately 15 years prior to his admission as a perform into the concern.

The records indicate that the number of employees varies but is placed at approximately six, with representation by four salesman, in addition to the sonior partner. The records of Dun and Tradstreet fail to reflect any other buildings of the above branch or of any in other cities.

On 6/14/50, SA CLARENCE W. FRYE, R. A., State College, Pa., telephonically advised the writer that the records of the Office of the Recorder, Pennsylvania State College, State College, Fa., revealed that FERDIMAND PHILIP MELLER attended Fennsylvania State College from December, 1926, to June 10, 1930. HELLER is indicated as attending the School of Chemistry and Physics, graduating with a B. S. Degree in Chemistry and maintained an average of 1.29 out of a possible 3.00. His home address at time of attendance, Pennsylvania State College, was indicated as 199 West Chew Avenue, Philadelphia. He is indicated as having attended and graduated from the Northeast High School in Philadelphia. As further information, the records indicate that HELLER attended the required first two years of ROTC training while at Pennsylvania State College. Agent Frye advised that a notation appears in the file which indicates that HELLER'S transcript of record was forwarded on 12/6/30 to the UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA.

Agent FRYL advises he checked the Student Directories for Pennsylvania State College and obtained the following information:

In the period from 1926-1927, HELLER resided at 628 South Allen Street, State College.

In the period from 1927-1923, no record.

1928-1929, HELLER's residence is indicated as Watts Holl, a men's dormitory at the College.

In 1929-1930, HELLER resided at 113 Heister Street, State Gollege.

Agent Frye obtained from the Pennsylvania State College Yearbook of 1930 a photograph of HELLER, which was taken in the period January to June, 1930, which photograph will be forwarded to this office.

The records of the Alumni Office, Pennsylvania State

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PH 65-4332, MEMO SAC, 6/14/50

College, indicate an entry as of October 14, 1945, which reflected that HELLER resided at 199 West Chew Avenue in Philadelphia and was employed in Tchemical process sales for the American Chemical Paint Company, of Ambler, Pa." No other notations appeared in the records of the Alumni Office.

Agent Frye advised that the records of the Department of Chemistry at Tennsylvania State College are identical with thos maintained in the Recorders's Office; however, in addition, there appeared an address which is believed to be that of HELLIR semetime during the period 1925-1930. This address is set forth as 510 West Cumberland Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

The Directory of Chemistry Graduates of Pennsylvania State College for 1948, which is the last edition, indicas HELLER'S address as 199 West Chew Avenue, with the same employment as listed in the records of the Alumni Office, Pennsylvania State College.

Agent Frye advised that the records at FSC indicate that the above Subject took the first two years of ROTO training as required by FSC. Frye stated that ROTO training is required for all physically capable males attending PSC, and that the last two years are elective. Attention is directed to the fact that he had been ousted from PSC for failure to take ROTO training.

Agent Frye advised that the former head of the Department of Chemistry at PSC, DR. GROVER C. CHANDLEE, would probably recall both DLACK and HELLER, in that CHANDLEE has a remarkable memory and maintains a record of former students of the Chemistry Department at PSC. Previous reference to CHANDLEE appears in Serial 26 of the instant file. Agent Frye states that he had contacted DR. CHANDLEE on numerous occasions in connection with Atomic Energy and Loyalty investigations, and that CHANDLEE has been extremely cooperative and is apparently reliable. It is noted that CHANDLEE presently resides at RFD 1, Conestoga, Pa.



ON May 13, 1750, SA ROBERT W. HOLES and the writer interviewed Mr. LECH CHERKSEY, President of the AMERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY, Ambler, Pa. Mr. CHERKSEY adviced that he is personally acquainted with FRED WELLER, as he is known by that company.

Their employment records show his name to be FNED PHILIP HELLER, a chemist, residence 190 W. Chew Street, telephone number Waverly 3152. He was born on December 12, 1907, Philadelphia, Pa. He was described as being 5'9", 165 pounds, marital status single. His father is FERDINATE HELLER, who was born in Austris, now deceased, and his mother was MARY HANGAH, born in Germany, presently residing at 190 W. Chew Street. Hembership in organizations was listed as ACC and AYH. He stated that he had had military training in ROTC when in college. His education was listed as four years of high school, mraduating in 1926; four years of college, graduating in 1930 with a D.S. Degree; and one year of graduate school. He speaks German.

He was employed from July, 1931, to October, 1934, by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company, Franco-American Chemical Company (a subsidiary), and left when he received a better offer. From October, 1934, to January, 1937, he was employed by the CELLULOID CORPORATION OF ALERICA, and left because of his health. From May of 1937 to the present he has been employed by the ALERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY in Ambler, Pa.


As references he gave J. CKILTON, 6513 M. Park Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa., Treasurer of a storage company; E. GIRARD, K-H Inst. Company Electrical Engineering; H. DAIALIAN, 235 West Linwood Avenue, Archaore, Pa., Chemist; and J. D. SKIITON, Roseland Avenue, Fox Chase Manor, Dentist.

The above application was executed on November 12, 1942, on an employment application form.

Mr. CHERNSEY said that MELLER had recently returned to this country from Rome, Italy, and had spont approximately five weeks making an installation of rust-proofing equipment at the Flat Motor Car Company in Turin, Italy. On

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his return from Italy, INDALN came in to see Mr. CHERKODY and told him that he, CHERKEY, could expect an interview from the FDI regarding HOLLER. CHERKEY asked HOLLER why he should expect an interview and INDLER told him that he had worked with MARRY GOLD when both were employed at the PHILISYLVANIA SUGAR COMMANY in Philadelphia, Fa. He told CHERKEY that the Mayor of Turin was a Communist. Further than the did not discuss any details of his trip.

Griginally he was employed by the ATTRICAN SHRICAL PAINT COLPANY as a chamist, but in recent years he has been employed in the capacity of sales and service, or, rather, technical representative's work. He is sent to various places who are licensees of the ATTRICAN CHAMICAN FAINT COMPANY and assists them in the setting up and eliminating the "bugs" in the equipment and production methods of rust-proofing metal.

This last trip to Italy was arranged and paid for by the ALERICAN CHETICAL PAINT COMPANY, and he was there for approximately five weeks. Prior to this HELLER was sent by the ALERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY to Europe, leaving Philadelphia on August 29, 1949, via TWA, for Geneva, and returned to New York December 15, 1949. While on this trip HELLER visited France, Switzerland, Germany, and presumably England and Italy, on business. On this trip HELLER was again sent there by the ALERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY for the purpose of assisting licensees to work out "bugs" in their equipment that would rust-proof metal. During this trip to Europe HELLER took a one week's vacation and went down somewhere in Italy.

Mr. CHETHERY considers HELIER a very edd individual, stating that he should be a factory laborer rather than a chemist and technical representative. He found that HELIER's main interest in life is wine, women, and song, and he is more interested in drinking and running around than he is in any political ideologies. HELLER never expressed himself in the slightest way as being favorable toward Communism or pro-Russian.

HIMLER's work at the present time is strictly along industrial and charginal lines, and is not classified.

It was necessary for Mr. CHERKSEY to reprimand HEMLER on his return from his last trip to Italy because during the entire time that he was there he never submitted a report on his progress.

MELLER, according to Mr. CHERKSEY, was chosen by the company to make the foreign trip over two men who, while probably more qualified in the particular field of rust-proofing metal, nevertheless had not been with the company nearly as long as HELLER and did not have the experience in the entire line of production of the AMERICAN CHEMICAL FAINT COMPANY as did HELLER. For the latter reason HELLER was chosen by the officials to go on the fereign trips. In addition, HDLLER had done some work for the company throughout the midwestern part of the United States in exactly the same field. For a period of time he lived in a hotel in Chicago and somewhere in Chic. I HELLER did the same work here as he did in Italy for the ALERICAN CHEMICAL I PARTY CHICAGO.

In. DIMINION WILLIA, Comptroller and ersenach Director of the DIMINION WILLIAM CANALY, know MELLIA since 1982. MELLIA was originally employed by them as a chemist in the laboratory. He stated that MELLIA is now in the category of a technical representative, and travels mainly on installation work for the company. It was MAYDOR's recollection that MELLIAM's first trip to Europe in August, 1989, was to consult with their European licensees to iron out their problems. His second trip was made specifically to iron out the problems of an installation of rust-proofing equipment made at the FIAT plant in Turin, Tially.

IF. MATRON stated that his correct name is PIRSHMAND, but that he is commonly known as FRED. So far as Mr. MATRON is concerned, there is no reason to doubt HALLIN's loyalty. MAYLOR stated that HELLER worked from early 1925 to June of 1929 as a technical representative for the AMERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY, working out of Chicago, Ill., and later Chic.

SA ROBERT 4. HOLLAND and the writer interviewed Miss PCROTHY WISWELL, 105 East Gowen Avenue, Chestmut Hill, Philadelphia, /Pa., telephone number Chestmut Hill 76955.

Miss WISWELL was determined to be the ex-wife of FIRDINAND F. MELLER. This information was secured by the Washington Field Office through their checking the records of the Department of State Passport Division records. Miss WISWELL, it was determined, was employed as a clerk by the American Chemical Faint Company, Ambler, Pa.

Mr. LEON CHERKENT, President of the Company, advised that Miss WISWELL, the former wife of FIRDINAND MELLER, was employed by that Company but had no dealings with her former husband. They were not friendly.

Miss TISTELL stated that she first met FERDINARD HELLER in 1937 and started going with him socially. They were married in 1943 and subsequently divorced around 1945. Miss HELLER advised that she met THOMAS L. ELACK either in 1937 or 1936 at a party in BLACK's apartment in Newark, New Jersey. At that time BLACK lived with an ERNIE SEGESSEMAN. Subsequent to her first meeting with BLACK, SEGESSEMAN moved to another apartment and BLACK later had a later roommate whose name was JOHN. She described JOHN as being a rather young man in his late teens, who, in 1942 left BLACK to go into the Army. JOHN, she ascertained, came from a large family and had many brothers. He was not a chemist and was rather ignorant. JOHN was only with BLACK for a short period of time during 1942. She could furnish no other information other than he was 5 ft. 8 in. tall, dark hair, swarthy complexion and appeared to be Jewish.

Miss WISWLLL stated it was the custom of her and her husband, FERDIMAND HELLER, to drive up on a Sunday and visit with BLACK for several hours. Between 1937 and 1945 at the time of her divorce, she estimated that she and HELLER would drive to Newark, N. J. to see BLACK approximately once a month. There were times when HELLER would visit BLACK without the presence of Miss WISWELL. She knew BLACK to

then be employed by the Mational Cil Froducts Company, His residence was in an insurance company project apartment but she did not recall his exact address.

During the time that BLACK and HELLER were visiting together, they often discussed going into business for themselves and opening a Laboratory as consulting chemists. She recalls in many instances, HELLER would take chemical papers with him up to BLACK. She did not know if HELLER actually turned these papers over to BLACK but she did recall that BLACK would go through these papers.

After HELLER and Miss WISWELL were married in 1943, they took up residence at 105 East Gowen Avenue and on a number of occasions, BLACK came to visit HELLER at their apartment. HELLER and BLACK were originally classmates at Penn State College and they kept up their acquaintanceship since graduation.

A photograph of THOMAS L. BLACK was exhibited to Miss WISWELL and she was asked if she could identify that man. She stated immediately that it was TOM BLACK. She stated that HFILLER did not call him TOM BLACK but called him TASSO.

All during the years that she can recall visiting with BLACK he lived in Newark.

After Miss MISMILL and her husband were divorced in 1945 she no longer saw ELACK. However, in the summer of 1946, THOMAS L. FLACK called her up on the telephone and made a dinner engagement with her. She was questioned why BLACK would make such an engagement with her and she advised that she tried to find out from him at that time why he was doing it but had not been successful. He told her at that time that he was working at the Berg Laboratories in Philadelphia and was living in a hotel in Philadelphia. He told her that he had not seen FERDIMAND HOLLER for a period of time and spoke in a rather derogatory fashion concerning him. She immediately stopped this line of approach and told him that she no longer had any interest in what FERDIMAND HELLER was doing.

During the times that BLACK and MELLER discussed matters in the presence of Miss WISMELL, BLACK and HELLER would discuss the work that they themselves were doing as well as the work that their companies were doing. She does recall that BLACK and MELLER exchanged formulas with each other. These formulas that they exchanged she believed, related to the field in which each was working. However, each was not working in the same field as BLACK

was an organic chemist and Willim an inorganic chemist. She believed that they discussed those things with each other possibly with the idea of going into business for themselves and the reason that they never did go into business for themselves was the fact that they lacked capital to start the business. Neither one was practical and both were theoretical men. She recalled that FREDIMAND HIMLER either lent or gave BLACK money on several occasions but she did not know why. She stated that she could not recall BLACK ever giving HELLER any sums of money and doubted very much if he did since BLACK did not have nearly as good a job as HELLER had.

During the 1930's BLACK had some pro-Communist ideas and HELLER and BLACK on a number of occasions in her presence, discussed Marxism and Leninism. Both would discuss the various phases of Communism. In 1948 BLACK told her that he no longer had ideas along the line of sympathy with Russia. This was the time that BLACK took her cut to dinner.

She stated that BLACK and HELDER both got out of school in the early 1930's and that FERDINARD HELDER went to live in Greenwich Village, New York after graduation. BLACK also lived in the New York area. There, she felt they became acquainted with some of the radical element who were living in that part of New York possibly at the time.

She described BLACK as being a "screwball." For example, she stated, BLACK had a pet black crow which had the run of his apartment. He also had some type of animal which she could not recall which BLACK kept in the bathtub. This animal lived in the bathtub and precluded BLACK from ever using the tub himself. She stated his spartment was kept in a constant mess. BLACK, according to her, did not drink and she never saw him in the company of women.

She recalled that on several occasions she heard BLACK and HELLER discuss ALETCRG. She was not exactly certain as to what their particular discussion was but has a recallection that it dealt with the two of them discussing what ALETCRG wanted. She stated that the needs and desires of ALETCRG was not part of their scheme to go into business. She did not know the purpose of these discussions. She also has a recollection of some chemical formulas being discussed in connection with ALETCRG. She does not recall either one ever stating that they were contacted by anyone from ALETCRG.

Miss WISWELL was extremely vague in these particular points and stated that all this occurred during a part of her life, namely with FERDIMAND HELLER, that she was not desirous of remembering.

She furnished the following background information regarding FERDINAND HELLER. IMPLIER'S father is now deceased. His mother is MARY HELLER residing 199 North West Chew Street. He has a sister, IDELA KCCH, who is diverced, residing at 199 West Chew Street and a brother, HEMRY HELLER, address unknown. FERDINAND HELLER is a graduate of Penn State College, having haken his high schooling in Fhiladelphia presumably at the Northeast High School for Boys. Upon graduation from Fa. State College, he went six months to the University of Virginia where he undertood graduate studies. She did not know too much of HELLER's background but stated he had told her on one occasion that he had been married prior to his marriage with her but that there was a Mexican divorce. However, she stated on his application for their marriage license no mention was made of any divorce.

Regarding BLACK and HELLER, she stated in 1948 BLACK indicated to her that they had had a falling out and he had not seen HELLER for some time. Miss WISWELL stated insofar as her ex-husband FREDINAND HELLER is concerned, they are both employed at the same plant. This makes it necessary on occasions for them to talk. However, she is not friendly with him at the plant and has no social contact with him. Her association with him at the plant is no more than absolutely necessary for normal business relations. Miss WISWELL offered to discuss these matters further with the writer and SA HOLLES and arrangements will be made for her to be interviewed at greater length in the Philadelphia office in the near future. She agreed at that time to bring a photograph of FIRDINAND HELLER she still has in her possession.

Frior to the interview with Miss WISVELL, Mr. CWEFREL stated she was considered to be one of their best employees in a clerical capacity, that she was very reliable and loyal and that she had no connections with FIRDINAND HELLER at the present time.

According to JANES, instant automobile, bearing Motor Number BOCS112159, had been rented on June 25, 1950 to JOSEPH A. MULLIM on a six-month basis with an option to purchase said automobile at the end of the six-month period. JANES stated that CAVAM J. QUINLAN, Purchasing Agent at the Western Electric Company, 300 Allegheny Avenue, had recommended MULLIM to JANES prior to the rental of the 1950 Ford automobile. JANES stated that JOSEPH A. MULLIM's son, who was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, had married QUINLAM's daughter and since QUINLAM was a good friend of the Daly Motor Company, his recommendation of MULLIM was accepted without any question.



This statement relates the circumstances of ROSEN'S trip between 9:25 and 10:30 a.m. from the PELLEVUE STRATFORD HOTEL to 199 West Chew Avenue, with a stopover at 5th and Berks Streets. ROSEN identified the photostatic copy of his waybill for that date and also identified a photograph of THOMAS BLACK as the person with whom his fare hold a short conversation at the corner of 5th and Berks Streets.

The signed statement, the photostatic copies of the waybill and the photograph of BLACK, with ACSEN'S signature on it, are being made exhibits in this file.

On 6/14/50. JAMES EDWARD BROWN, Supervisor, Ruth Street Shop. Vellow Rental, Inc., 2761 Kensington Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa., advised that on three different occasions a truck was rented in the name of the Spruce Chemical Company, 3357 Filter Street, Philadelphia, Pa., in order to move that organization to Paterson, New Jersey. Mr. BROWN could not recall the exact address in Paterson, New Jersey, but believed it was 177 Mast Railway Avenue.

Mr. BROWN advised that on the first occasion, an individual by the name of JACK FASS, one of the owners of the Spruce Chemical Company, made arrangements to rent a truck. FASS stated that he needed a driver and asked BROWN if he would drive the truck for him. BROWN said that because the trip to Faterson, New Jersey, was to be made on Sunday, which was his day off, he told FASS he would drive the truck if FASS would meet his price. BROWN stated that FASS paid him \$15.00, plus road expenses which included meals, etc. PASS rested a 2-ton truck at 9:36 a.m. on 4/29/50, and returned it at 5:43 p.m. on 4/30/50. A deposit of \$50 was made and the total bill for the restal of the truck amounted to \$30.38 which was deducted from the deposit.

An individual by the name of JOE A. MULLEN, 6716 North 8th Street, Philadelphia, Pa., signed a bill for the rental of the truck. BROWN said that FASS loaded the truck on 4/29/50, and that the trip to Paterson, New Jersey, was made on Sunday, 4/30/50.

BROWN stated that when they arrived in Paterson, New Jersey, FASS! father and brother, SEYMOUR, helped unload the truck. FASS! father and brother live somewhere in Brooklyn. FASS told BROWN that he would also reside with his parents, and commute between Paterson and Brooklyn daily.

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On the second occasion the Spruce Chemical Company rented a 12-ton truck at 8:35 a.m. on 5/2/50, and returned it at 8:47 p.m. the same day. A deposit of \$40.00 was made. The total amount of the rental came to \$20.42, and the balance of the deposit was refunded. The driver was indicated to be ALPHONSO MC INTOCH. BROWN said that he was working on 5/2/50 and could not drive, but stated that ALPHONSO MC INTOCH, an employee of the Yellow Cab Company in Philadelphia, drove that day since it was his day off. MC INTOCH (colored) was obtained through FASS' uncle, who is also an employee of the Yellow Cab Company in Philadelphia.

On the third occasion the Spruce Chemical Company rented a 3/4-ton truck at 7:32 p.m. on 5/27/50, and returned it at 2:25 p.m. on 5/22/50. A deposit of \$50.00 was made. The total amount of the rental came to \$17.50, and the balance of the deposit was refunded. BROWN said that he drove the truck again on 5/28/50, and was paid \$15.00 and road expenses. On this occasion an individual by the name of TOM (last name unknown) rede to Paternon, New Jersey, with BROWN. BROWN described TOM as being about 5' 8", 175 lbs., heavy build, curly or wavy blond or sandy colored hair, medium complexion, wearing glasses, and using a cigarette holder. According to BROWN, it was necessary to go to TCM's apartment at 1929 North 6th Street, Philadelphia, and pick up some additional equipment to be used by the Spruce Chemical Company in Paterson, New Jersey. BROWN stated that among the equipment was a scale which TOM said was used to measure chemicals and was very delicate.

TOW indicated that he worked in the vicinity of his residence at 1929 North 6th Street, and that he was going to quit his job this fall, and move to Paterson, New Jersey, to work for the Spruce Chemical Company.

BRUAN stated he received the impression that the Spruce Chemical Company was owned by JACK PASS, JOE A. MULLEN, and POP. He added that as best as he could recall the Spruce Chemical Company made scap, dyes, and insecticides.

BROWN indicated that WILLER is a salesman for some leather manufacturing company. MULLER, while traveling for the leather manufacturing company, also plugs the products of the Spruce Chemical Company.

The new building of the Spruce Chemical Company in Paterson, New Jersey, was built by a contractor named ZEIGLER. BROWN also added that an individual by the name of DITTLAN was apparently associated with PASS.

According to BROWN, TON returned to the Yellow Rental Agency on May 30 or 31, 1950, and picked up the balance of the deposit for the trip made on May 28, 1950.

With reference to the background and employment of one ALVIN W. SCHECTER, 4514 or 4515 Pine Street, Philadelphia, Pa., the following investigation was conducted:

A review of the May 1950, Bell Telephone Directory, Philadelphia, reflects one ALVIN W. SCHECTER, 4514 Pine Street, telephone number GR-2-5796.

The following information was obtained by SE PAUL J. HOTTINGER:

ALVIN SCHECTER 12514 Pine Street, Philadelphia, Pa., is the owner of and is self-employed by the Alde Paint Supply Company. He has account number 598 with Lipton Paint and Varnish and account 5762 with HPC, 52nd and Market Streets.

The records of Dun and Bradstreet reflect ALDO Paint Supply Company (not incorporated) 1418 Walnut Street (905) Pelleview Court) under report dated 5/4/49, ALVIN SCHECKER is the owner and the buying was registered by ALVIN W. SCHECTER on 2/21/47, at which time the business was started. SCHECTER is 25, single, and a native of Philadelphia since about 1940, with the exception of service in the U.S. Army from January 1943, to Warch 1946. He was employed as a clerk by an uncle who owns the New York Faint and Supply Company at 2831 Kensington Avenue. According to SCHECTER, he used 33,500 of his savings to start this business. Removal was made from 1712 South 20th Street to the present address in February 1949. He furnishes jobs paint supplies and chemicals to industrial concerns in the Philadelphia area. He has no employees and maintains only mail and telephone privileges at 1418 Walnut Street, in a large central office building. He resides at 4514 Pine Street. On 4/22/49, SCHECTER submitted estimates indicating a net worth of a few hundred dollars, including accounts payable of only \$175. One supplier alone con-Fullted on 4/28/49 reports \$750 owing, and about 8 months past due. His buying at the present time is believed short of providing expenses.

A subpoena was secured by SA HEMRY J. FEELEY on June 15, 1950, which was served on June 16, 1950 on H. J. WALTER, who is Office Manager of the Legal Department of the BELL TELEPHONE COLPANY OF PENNSYLVANIA, 19th and Arch Streets, Philadelphia. As a result of the subpoent, SE JOHN J. GALLAGHER was able to observe the toll tickets for the date of June 12, 1950, on each of the abovementioned telephones.



On June 20, 1950, the writer interviewed Miss ROSALIE G. ROBERTS, Superintendent, Friends Boarding Home, Concord Quarterly Meeting, also known as the Mickman Home, West Chester, Pa. Miss ROBERTS advised that Miss EDITH STAFF presently resides at the home which is primarily a home for the aged. Persons are not admitted to this institution until they are at least 65 years of age. She made available an admission slip concerning EDITH STAPLER which reflected that she entered the institution on March 8, 1949. It reflects that she was born October 17, 1880; that her father was WILLIAM W. STAPLER, and that her mother was EMMA. STAPLER.

The admission slip also includes the following listings:

Decter: Dr. KISTLER

Undertaker: Casper P. Hicks Burial,

Wilmington, Del.

Notify: Mrs. STANLEY AYERS,

1705 Woodlawn Avenue,

Wilmington, Del.

Miss ROBERTS advised that there is no doctor assigned to the institution but that a local doctor is usually listed by the persons taking residence there and he is the one who is called in the event of any sickness.

According to Miss ROBERTS, the file on EDITH STAPLER included a letter, dated February 6, 1949, from Dr. FRANK F. PIERSON, 1007 Jefferson Street, Wilmington, Del. In the letter, Dr. PIERSON advised that EDITH STAPLER had been under his observation for a number of years and that she has a tendency to some elevation of blood pressure but that this does not interfere with her activities. Miss ROBERTS does not recall EDITH STAPLER having been sick since the time she entered the institution, and stated further that, to her knowledge, a doctor was never called to attend her.

Miss ROBERTS also advised that Mrs. STANLEY AYERS, listed above as the person to be notified in the event of death, is a member of the Board of Directors of the institution. She further advised that one RALPH STAPLER, a brother to EDITH STAPLER and Mrs. STANLEY AYERS, had lived at the institution

and died there on January 4, 1943. She was unable to locate the record of the date of his admission but was able to locate a record showing that he had been bern in 1878. PALPH STAPLER, according to Miss ROBERTS, had died of natural causes, specifically uremic poisoning.

At this point, Miss ROBIRTS stated that, if the writer had come to make inquiries concerning RALPH STAPLER, she could appreciate it much more readily. She then stated that RALPH STAPLIR was a "free thinker" and "talked about things that would give people the impression that he had Socialistic tendencies". When questioned further on this point, Miss ROBIRTS stated that she wished to withdraw the opinion since it was merely based on what she had heard from former guests at the institution some years back. She added that probably it would be better to characterize RALPH STAPLER as a "liberal thinker", and she again based this opinion on statements made by individuals concerning STAPLER.

According to Miss ROBERTS, there were no children born to Mr. and Mrs. STAMESY AYERS. Further, she was under the impression that RALPH STAPLER was a bachelor and that Miss EDITH STAPLER is a maiden lady. She advised that she had some recollection of RALPH STAPLER having been in California but she was unable to recall the particular association. She did recollect that he had been friendly with a woman named JESSIE HOOPES, a wealthy woman from Swarthmore, Pa., who also died at the institution a few years back. She stated that her impression was that JESSIE HOOPES held cormen sentiments with RALPH STAPLER and that both, according to information she had received, expressed great sympathy "for the underdog".

The records indicated that JESSIE HOOPES entered the institution in 1941 but Miss ROBERTS was unable to locate a record of her death.

Miss ROBERTS requested that any further inquiries to be made at the Friends Boarding Home be conducted through her, and that, if an interview was desired with EDITH STAPLED, she would prefer to personally make the arrangements for the necessary privacy. She further advised that she would not disclose the fact that an inquiry had been made concerning EDITH STAPLED.

Dr. CLARENCE P. KISTLER, 302 High Street, West Chester, Pa., was also interviewed by the writer on June 20, 1950. It is to be noted that the name Dr. KISTLER was the one listed on EDITH STAPLER's admission slip.

At first Dr. KISTLER was unable to recall EDITH STAPLER but then advised that he had been requested to look after her in the event she became sick while at the Friends Boarding Home. He did not know her before that time, and could not specifically recollect whether he had visited her but advised

that he was under the impression that he had stopped in to see her once or twice because of minor ailments common to elderly persons and he is positive that nothing particularly serious was involved.

Dr. HISTLER stated that he knew no reason why an interview of HDITH STAPLER by agents of this office would adversely effect her. Dr. HISTLER was asked if he recalled that EDITH STAPLER was reported to have a blood pressure condition, to which he replied that it was a minor affair and that he was of the opinion that it would not interfere.

The name EDITH STAPLER is being indexed to this memorandum. Further indexing is left to the discretion of the reviewing agent who is probably familiar with other ramifications of this particular case.

On June 19, 1950, Mr. R. G. ANDERSON, Branch Manager, Merck Company, 1649 North Broad Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, advised that during the early 1940's the Merck Company as well as several other companies were doing research work on penicillin. He said that the research work was somewhat confidential, but was not of a classified nature. Mr. ANDERSON stated that there was free exchange of information between companies doing research work on penicillin. He added that the Merck Company did not have government contracts, although most of the penicillin did go to the armed forces. Mr. ANDERSON stated that Mr. REVERDY JOHNSON of the Legal Department, Merck Company, Rahway, New Jersey, would be able to furnish additional information concerning the development of penicillin. Mr. ANDERSON telephonically contacted Mr. JOHNSON, at which time the following information was obtained.

Mr. JOHNSON stated that penicillin was first discovered back in the late 1920's, but little research was actually done until about 1939. About this time, the government started calling for large quantities of penicillin, so E. R. Squibb and Sons Company, Pfizer Company, and Merck Company started to do considerable research work on penicillin in order to develop new and better means of producing penicillin. During this period there was free interchange of research data between these companies, and the data concerning penicillin was not considered to be of a confidential nature. Mr. JOHNSON said that penicillin was being produced through a fermentation process. However, because of the ever increasing need of the armed services for penicillin, the government through the Office of Scientific Research Development started a program about 1942 to produce penicillin from synthetics. The Office of Scientific Research Development obtained the services of approximately 17 or 18 firms and universities to do research work for the purpose of developing penicillin from synthetics. This program lasted until approximately 1945, at which time it was abandoned with little success. All research data developed by the various firms and universities was forwarded to the Office of Scientific Research Development, where it was correlated and then distributed, so that everyone would have the benefit of all research data. According to Mr. JOHNSON, this program was considered confidential

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Mr. JOHNSON, this program was considered

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by the government, but to his knowledge, was not considered to be of a classified nature. As best Mr. JOHNSON could recollect, none of the firms had government contracts, nor received financial aid from the government with the exception of several universities which had limited financial support and may have received certain expenses. Most penicillin was supplied the government by the Merck Company, E. R. Equibb and Sons Company, and Pfizer Company, which organizations increased their production and facilities to neet the demand. The penicillin produced by these companies was developed from the fermentation process.

Miss S. V. HENKELS, 13 West Gravers Lane, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, advised that FLACK roomed at her residence from about June 13, 1946 to the end of October, 1946. She said that BLACK was recommended to her by the secretary of Mr. BERG, of the Berg Laboratories, Philadelphia, where BLACK was employed as a chemist. Che said that BLACK worked late hours, and that she did not become very well acquainted with him, but had no reason to doubt his loyalty. She was of the impression that BLACK was originally from the Coal Mine Regions of Pennsylvania. Miss HENKELS said that BLACK went to New York quite often, and maintained a residence in Newark, New Jersey where he stayed while in New York. She said the only friend of FLACK's that she could recall was a Mr. GOLD. According to Miss MENKELS, BLACK never said or did anything which would indicate that he was not a loyal American. She was unable to furnish any additional information concerning ELACK.

With reference to a piece of paper secured from a trash cover on THOMAS L. BLACK, 1926 North 5th Street, Philadelphia, bearing the name HOWSBERGER, O'SHEA Employment Service, the writer contacted Mr. HARDLO CLIFFORD "PETE" HOWSBERGER, Director, Technical Degartment, CISHEA System of Employment, Room 336 Midener Building, on June 19, 1950 in order to determine what HONSEMRGER knew about the subject. At the time, HOMSEERGER advised the writer that he was not acquainted with THOMAS L. BLACK and to his knowledge, had no dealings with such an individual.

HONSBERGER then requested that the writer furnish him with detailed background concerning BLACK so that he could check his records. The writer furnished HONSBERGER a photograph, complete description, and detailed background information concerning BLACK. HONSBERGER then stated that the name and features of BLACK were vaguely familiar to him but he could not recall the exact circumstances of having met this individual. He stated that a person fitting the description of BLACK, who came from Princeton or New Brunswick, N. J., may have been a consulting chemist for SAMUEL F. SADTLER, 2100 Arch Street, or for a person named LakOCHE, who has a chemical laboratory in the vicinity of 52nd and Lancaster. Avenue, Philadelphia. HOMSBERGER stated that he believed that this individual, whom he thought might be identical with BLACK, had appeared at his office at the OICHEA Employment Agency on two occasions within the past six months in reference to an employment problem either for SADTLER or LaROCHE.

During the entire interview HONSBERGER appeared to be extremely nervous and ill at ease, a characteristic not usually associated with a person who has been in personnel work as long as HONSBERGER. The writer also noted that HCMSBENGER insisted on securing more detailed information concerning BLACK and his background so he could search his records, even after he had been furnished a photograph, description, and detailed background concerning the subject.

SA FRED T. HOULIHAM, Wilkes Barre Resident Agent, telephonically advised the writer on June 20, 1950, that he just interviewed Mrs. IOIS BLACK, who is the stepmother of the subject and currently resides at 6212 Shepherd Street, Columbus 8, Ohio; however, is vacationing in Orangeville, Pa., staying at the residence of Mrs. HARRY LOW. Mrs. BLACK, whose maiden name was BRUNSTETTER, is a registered nurse, employed by the Grant Mcspital, at Columbus, Ohio. She stated that she married A. BRUCE BLACK in 1919 or 1920, and that the latter individual is the father of the subject. She pointed out that A. BRUCE BLACK was an instructor in penmanship at the Pennsylvania State Normal, in Bloomsburg, Pa., and was very interested in Shakespearean drama. A. BRUCE BLACK died in 1932.

Mrs. BLACK stated that she has not seen the subject since 1939, and had not had many contacts with him since 1925, at which time he left home to go to Pennsylvania State College, and on entry in the college their contacts became very few and far between. She pointed out that they had never lived together and following college he obtained employment and she had not seen him excepting for a period of one week just before the subject's father died in 1932. She pointed out the last time she saw the subject was on her visit to the World's Fair, in New York City, in 1939, at which time she made a brief visit with BLACK. 



On June 20, 1950 the writer interviewed WALFLR ALKUS of the BERG Laboratories, 1827 N. 5th Street, Philadelphia.

ALKUS prefaced his remarks with the statement that all of his information is derived solely from conversations he had with THOLAS L. PLACK during the course of their association at the BHRG Laboratories. He also stated that in so far as he know there was not one instance that in any way reflected adversely upon any of the individuals discussed during the interview.

Mr. ALKUS continued that, from conversations with BLACK, the following individuals were apparently friends of his and have been in contact with BLACK for reasons unknown to ALKUS from time to time:

On June 24, 1950, GOID advised that at the time he had his conversation with BLACK relative to GOID'S implication with FUCHS on the Monday following the announcement of FUCHS arrest in February, 1950, he mentioned to BLACK his conversation with ABRANAI BROTHEAN, which allegedly occurred on about three occasions in the latter part of 1946 and possibly the early part of 1947. This conversation with DECTHING in substance was that DECTHING, who might possibly have been given FUCHS' name by GCID, proviously advised GOID that he saw in the paper (in latter part of July, 1946), that FUCHS had been questioned by British authorities. Iater COMP and PROTHERN had another conversation wherein BROTHERN told GOLD of his conversation with a Dr. BERMARD KOORGAN, of Columbia University, relative to Dr. FUCHS having been arrested.

COLD said that both he and BIAGE were pussed about the alleged arrest for questioning of PUCHE in 1943, and his announced arrest in Mebruary, 1950. COLD said that he and BLACK finally came to the conclusion that FUCMS haw never been arrested or diestioned prior to early 1950, and that RROTHEAN had made up the story about the article in the newspaper relative to FUCHS.

It is requested that BLACK be asked whether he recalls such a conversation with BCID at the time they were conversing about GCID's implication with FUCHS.

On 6/16/50 Mr. BELLIOHT of the Bureau called and stated that the facts relative to BLACK had been presented to the Department; that the Department had advised that the information available was insufficient to justify prosecution on a charge of misprision of felony; that in their opinion there must be an affirmative action on the part of the subject to conceal evidence; that more knowledge and failure to notify authorities is not sufficient to support prosecutive action.

The Department further advised that in their opinion BLACK should not remain with the Agents over night any longer and that if a statement was obtained thereafter the Bureau would be in a better position.

Mr. BELLYCHT instructed that the questioning of BLACK be discontinued at once.

At 7 p.m., 6/16/50 questioning of BLACK was discontinued, at which time I advised ELACK that we had talked with him over a period of two days; that he was not telling us a complete story; that he had had his opportunity to co-operate with us; and that if he didn't desire to co-operate to the extent of telling the complete story that was up to him; but that in view of the fact that he did not desire to tell us the truthful and complete story we had talked to him long enough. I advised him that if he decided to tell us the true story and wanted to talk to us we would, of course, be glad to hear from him.

FETDERAND PHILIP HELLER, Was. ESPICIMGE - R

HELLER care voluntarily to the Muladelphia Office at 1 p.n., June 22, 1950 and was interviewed by SAS ! ASTLES and WALDEAN! until 4:50 p.m. He furnished the following information in addition to that previously set out:

With reference to the circle of friends who surrounded him and HACK during 1933 and 1934 in VERA KALE's apprehent in New York City, HILLER furnished the following descriptive data in addition to that he had previously related and it is set out below in order to facilitate the location of these individualsa

STELLA SATIO (maiden name) was during the early 30ts, a librarian in the Allentonn, Pennsylvania High School. She is now probably married, possibly to a politician. Sie is about TEMER's age (42) and her home was originally in Temple, Pa. Her father was very active politically, was a representative in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and also Lecame Speaker of the Pennsylvania senate under the administration. STALL was not a Communist, according to had IR. but was classified by him as one of the intellectuals who gathered in MALD's apertment. Hallin and ELACK were quite friendly with STELLA SARIG in the early 3018 but HELLER lost track of her over ten years ago.

CHAPLES (CHUCK) INFER was a member of the HAUE circle during 1932-33-34. He was a graduate of Whitman College, Walla Walla, Washington, sh' was a Chorist. His parents are farmers near halla halla. Hillish classified .MIR as a "liberal" and a "pink." He indicated that as far as he know METER never was a Cr renber. METER was also about TELLER's age and during 1933-34 lived directly across the allegray from Valid KANE's apartment. INTER. according to Haller, was very intimate with VIIA MAR prior to Haller's going to live with her. Thinks would not say whether or not he knew that MITTH and KLE lived to jother but gave the general impression that he thought that they did. Shortly after Hiller be an to live with WER MAIE in October 1934, he and MINE had words and quarreled about VEM MUE. WILL believes that halk is very probably back in Walla Walla, Washington. VIEW MAIN told HILLER two or three rears ago that she had heard in the recriced a school teacher and was living in Walla salla.

WITH COOK was another to ler of the WITH MITT Enterate chiefe in 1933-31 and the closest buddy of CHARLE HARLY. GUOR also came from Walle Walle and lived with NEWER in How York. Chall was a combay and a truck driver and was politically uneducated as compared with MARN and most other

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members of the circle. C.OK's father owns a ranch near Walla Walla. HELLER has heard through sources he does not recall that COOK was a Marine in World War II and may have been killed during the war. HELLER does not know COOK's first name but believes he would be about forty years of age if alive.

Philadelphia, how been one of HELLIM's closest friends since high school days and visited a few times in VERA KALE's apartment while other numbers of the group were present. SHLITCH was a major in the Ar y during world War II and, although an intellectual, has never expressed any Communist sympathies. He should be intimately familiar with HELLIM's history and also know VAMA K HE and TOM HACK quite well. HELLIM said that he told SKILTCH many years ago about having applied to Amtorg for work in Bussia but does not recall exactly how much he did tell SHILTCH.

J. ETRON MCKTHET, who was known to FELLER as a CP number, has proviously been described by MALLER in some detail and this will not be repeated here. Movever, MALLER now described McHINEY as a heavy drinker, a "cop hater," and a "cop batter." He indicated that he lost track of McKINEY as long ago as 1934 when McKINEY was living with ENHE SERRISEN EN and TOW MARCH in Meserk.

Mrs. RIBNIE CLAVES, a member of the KALE circle, was friendly and liberal but not too much politically conscious. INLLER believes that during those days she was possibly society editor of the old New York World. She was about the same age as VIRA KAUD and, according to MALLER's recollection, not VERA through McKIESIN. Mrs. GRAVES is now believed by MEMICAL to be a housewife narried to a bank lamper in New York City, the bank being possibly the Chase Mational Bank or the Mational City Lank of New York.

A girl need DOESY MENSEL, a number of the MANE circle, had been an actress on the Chautauqua circuit. She too was not too politically minded and h d no particular political convictions. WHA NAME told HIMMER several years ago that BOMET HABBEL was married, had some children and was living in Georgia. MALEST said that WERA MUE would undoubtedly have her address.

(F.N) COMMI, another master of the Kill circle, was a negrotic, teasy drawing esteofull, probably from Albany, how tooks from those for Like man Coping was well acquainted with MacOl and MINA his activities during the 1933-21, period. Helialt said that Contain knew W.N. This every wells both before and after MINAM lived with her and would be a good source of in formation about her. He described Co.L.Y as liberal, not a Commist, and not too astute.

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(FAU) LEGICLE or IDEE was an individual whom NELLER recalls wisited VERA KALE's apartment while he was there on probably one occasion. Hiller does not recall whether his name was LEGICLE or LOEE, but knows definitely that it was one or the other, since this was not long after the LIUICLE-LOEE kidnapping-murder case in Chicago and this individual told him that he was a second cousin of one or the other of these kidnappers. He was from Fhiladelphia and was probably a salesman of restaurant supplies.

MONIE SECTION was another member of the MAIE circle but MALLER was unable to add any details other than previously furnished by him.

HIRT and AURIA BROWN were man and wife and were frequent visitors to the NAME apartment during 1733-34. They were exceptionally friendly with TOH HACK. They were both liberal politically, although HELIER doubts that they were CP numbers. HELLER recalls little about HERY HOWN, but stated that AURIA HERMI was an artist, very deaf and honely.

iffilled was subsequently asked whether there were any chemists or technicians with whom he associated during that period, but he stated that he could recall none outside of BLACK, MINESSIN and MINES, who are chemists, and MINES MINESSIN, who was a pharmacist. He said that he undoubtedly not a great many chemists since he used to go to the Chemists Club in New York City regularly in an effort to find a job. He filled out many forms at this club and to the best of his knowledge the club is still in existence somewhere on East hist Street in New York City.

LIMITAN is the man whom HELLER had not on a longshoremon picket line in the summer of 1934, and information concerning him has been previously set out.

With reference to MARKY GOLD, MALLER said that he is positive that COLD was never a regular visitor to VERA MALE's apartment during the time that he, MALLER, lived with VERA. He said that GOLD may have been there on one occasion during a party but he has no clear recollection of such a visit. He said that if COLD was at the MALLER may present at mistiacement to him. He is some that if sould was at the MALLER apartment it must have been sometime before well's name this mentioned by him to OVALTERN at Icone's Restaurant in New York Sity in October 1924.

ELLER specifically denied ever having heard of anyone named

PARCOLLI.

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In view of the fact that VAMA EAGE denied ever having actually lived with EMELLA, he was questioned as to who could verify his claim that he did live with her from october 1933 until October 1934. HELLIA said that it was general knowledge among their entire circle of friends, the identities of whom have been set out alove. He also said that TOM BLACK knew it, hrs. HALLIA, the landlady at the address, knew it, and that a Mr. LAUGHATS, rental agent for the house, also knew it. HELLIA said that he knew that VENA KARE had handed out a great many keys to the spartment, most of which were given out before he moved in with her. He said that after he did move in he discouraged the handing out of any more keys, but from time to time strange people, whom he did not even know, dropped in to see her by use of pass keys apparently.

IZLIER said that although he never joined the CP or the Friends of the Soviet Union, he did attend several open meetings of the latter organization in 1933—3h, which were generally held in Greenwich Village at addresses he does not recall. He recalled that during this period he would also read the regazine called Boviet Russia Today, as well as other Communist literature and that on several occasions in this magazine he saw advertisements of an organization called "Technical Committee to Aid the Soviet Union," which, as he now recalls, was formed for the purpose of enlisting the help of American chemists and physicists in solving the industrial problems of the Soviet Union. He said that he had discussed this committee with his friends, undoubtedly with TAM HACK and VIRA HARD and probably with others, and may even have filled out application blanks which were included in the ads, but is inclined to think that he did not fill any out. He does not know of any of his friends who did this.

HELLER was asked about his recollection of VERA KALE's general personality and he described her as highly intelligent, a graduate of Columb a Law Jehool, rather eccentric and very high strung. He said that she would now be bout forty-cight to fifty years of age, that she was married but separated from her husband, has one son and as far as he knows was never a CP nomber, although her circle of friends was "ultra liberal" and may have included some Communists. Hiller said that VERA HALL always had a good job, that she was steadily employed during the time he knew her and that although she was always fully converged to the both his and MASC's activities, the was rether disinterested with reference to their cosine to go to means. Hallings with MIRATE and with AVAKTIMAL and said that she typed up at least one group of chemical formulas for him and for hiller which he, MIRATE, turned over to MIRATELLE, as previously reported. Hamfall described With in general as a "hot Commie" in talking but is sure she never actually joined.

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MELLER was a ain questioned repeatedly as to the number of meetings he had with CVARDIAN and he repeated what he had previously said; handly, he had at most three, but more probably only two, meetings with CVALLITAIL. Efforts were made with MILLER to fix the exact dates of these meetings and after Agents informed him that the records show that he started work at the Colluloid Corporation of America on November 1, 1934, he was able to use this date as a reference point to date his meetings with OVAKRUAN. His last meeting with OVAKHITAL and ELACK at Leone's Restaurant he now places as October 21, 1934. On Saturday, October 23, 1934, ILACK brought the formulas to VINA KALE's apartment. On bunday, October 21, VIDA typed this material in his and IDACA's presence and he added certain explanatory comments to the formulas which VEMA also typed. On Monday, October 25, he delivered the material to FLTHELM. On Friday, October 29, he filed a job application with the Celluloid Corporation of America, Hewark, and was instructed to report for work the following Honday. On Sunday evening, October 31, 193h, BLACK brought a friend of his to VITA KARE's apartment with reference to a job for HILLER. KALE, BLACK, HILLER and this unknown individual then discussed job possibilities for NULLER. FLACK's friend, according to MALLIN's recollection, was the head of a consulting chemical laboratory in uptown Manhattan and had been a friend of ENGE SEGRESIN. Apparently some disagreement developed during the discussion and this friend left the sportment in a "huff." Hiller is certain that this individual was not OVANISTAL or FITTEDES and that his visit had nothing to do with the AMTONE matter. He said that BLACK might be able to furnish the identity of this person.

On Monday, Hovember 1, 1934, HILER started work at the Celluloid Corporation of America. On Movember 3, 1934, IHLER found a room somewhere in Mowark, the address of thich he does not recall since he lived there for only a few days. On Friday, Movember 5, 1934, MACH helped HILLER move his balongings from VAMA's operation to this room, the move being made by submay or train transportation on Sunday, Movember 7, 1934. HILLER quarreled violently with MACH and VAMA KAME and broke off relations with them for a considerable time thereafter. The cause of the quarrel was primarily joulousy which had developed in MALMA, since he believed that relations between MLACH and VAMA NAME were becoming too close.

With reference to PATERNEL, MINUTE insists that he sow him only once, probably on comber 25, 1934. He described him as follows:

Haller is sure he was American-born and is also ture that he did not speak either with a Hem York accent or a southern accent but otherwise has no recollection of him.

median described him as a real man with nothing feminine about him. His clothes were clean, neat and he was very decisive in his actions.

Poculiarities

HELLER insists that he saw PETERSEN on only that one occasion and he has never since heard BLACK or anyone else mention PETERSEN's name.

Since BLACK has stated that he, CVAKEMAN and MELLIR met on one occasion at Luchow's destaurant in New York City, Mallin was questioned about this. Mallin sold that he recalls being at Luchow's only about twice; once with his ex-wife, MCNOTH WISHILL, and once with VAN KANE. He said that this restaurant had the reputation of being frequented by Germans and possibly Fascists. MALLER is positive that he never was a Luchow's with CVAKEMAN or with MLACK alone, although he said it was possible that MLACK may have been with him at Luchow's with either WISHELL or KANE.

It may be noted here that when DENOTH WINDLE was interviewed on June 22, 1950 she said that she had had dinner with HILLE at Luchow's on numerous occasions.

ICALIN was questioned about some of his associates following his break with VIDA HID. Among these associates he mentioned one IUNI MINI, when he met spective in 1935 or 1936 and whom he dated on several occasions. He met this girl at Resoland Bance Hall on broadway, Now South City, and described her as neurotic and Moore of but a good dancer. He wild she was divorced and living alone, that she had told him she was a Hungarian and atuated PANIONA under Install DUNION in Paris and that she had lived with BUNION, former Previer of France. MANION had no particular job but was on city relief and lived in an

apartment in the upper 70's. HEILER said he recalls her because she had a pronounced "spy complex" and indicated to him on several occasions that she was being followed. He denied any knowledge of her political activities, if any, and said that he was just furnishing her name for any value it might have to us. HEILER said that during the same period he met one THEODOLE SHEDIUSHEY at the Roseland Dance Hall, this man becoming quite friendly both with him and with THEME PARKE.

SHEPHOUSKY also attended some of the meetings at 510 Indson Street, New York, which were of a Communist nature. Hilling said that SHEPHOUSKY was then a physical chemist at the Hockefeller Institute and is probably still there: He and SHEPHOUSKY went out on double dates on several occasions and talked about their work in general terms. SHEPHOUSKY's work, as he now recalls, was of a highly theoretical nature and he remembers that on one occasion who LOUSKY asked him for a sample of uninflammable cellulose acctate, which he could utilize for his dask. HILLER gave SHEPHOUSKY a comple of samples of this material which he obtained from the Celluloid Corporation of America, but stressed the fact that there was nothing confidential about this since it could be obtained in any store.

HILLER saw SHEDLOUSH off and on up to 1937 and last heard from him shortly after the outbreak of World War II, when SHEDLOUSHY telephoned him in Philadelphia and said that he had been on a special mission for the government to Russia and had just returned. They did not actually neet on this occasion and HELMER does not know any more about this individual.

HILLER also recalled that about a year ago, while in New York City, he telephoned UNDICUSKY at the Rockefeller Institute and spoke to him very briefly, but not a very cold reception and has not communicated with him since. Miller recalled that at the time he first knew MINDLUSKY, the latter asked him to join a union which he thinks was called the Federation of Chemists, which was probably a constituent union of the CIO. HILLER gave UNDICUSKY a non-committal answer, never did join this or anization and knows nothing about it.

With reference to information proviously furnished by TIVI as to his lash accounts, which take followin, which as he have some significance: Towns to old of 1/45, when he was verying in Chicage, and living at the Ridgeview lotel in Evanston, he maintained a savings accounts or a electing account at the Evanston Trust Company, take street and Chicage Avenue. on this statement indicated a \$150.00 or a \$200.00 deposit of which he had no recollection. Open contacting the bank he was informed that the deposit had been made by check on another Chicago bank. HILLER was rather vague about this whole incident but stated specifically that he never made such a deposit, that he never knew who made it, that he has no idea as to why it should have been made and that the only possibility that occurs to him is that it was credited to his account in error. He later withdrew all his money from the bank and the account is now closed.

He said that at the time he discussed the matter with GEORGE WEIKEL, mid-west representative of the American Chemical Paint Company, who was his superior at the time and that WEIKEL way still recall the story. WEIKEL is located at 130 Main Street, Evanston.

HILLER reiterated that he had never been approached by anyone before, during or since World War II, either in the United States or abroad, a regarding espionage or pseudo espionage activities.

He said that since his employment at American Chemical Paint Company in 1937 he has devoted himself almost exclusively to company business and that he has lost track of all his former friends, with the exception of TCH HAGE and JOH BEHATON. In his recent two trips abroad his work was of a strictly technical nature and he had no political contacts of any kind. As a matter of record, HAGEN'S first European trip ended in the middle of December 1949. His second trip began in the middle of May 1950 and ended in early Juno 1950. During the interin (December 1949 to May 1950) he spent most of his time at home in Philadelphia, although he made short trips on company business to Toronto, Canada; Louisville, Hentucky and Erie, Pennsylvania.

HELLER said that when he visited MACK's home immediately after his return from Italy in early June 1950, he and MACK discussed their prior connections with CWALTERAL. BLACK asked him how deeply he was involved and he told MLACK that he had seen OVARTERAL three or four or, at most, five times, which he now considers in error. He asked MLACK how much further him, MLACK's, connection with OWARTERN had some and MLACK had that he had met CHATMAN only a comple work times. MALLER then suggested to GLACK that they talk to the FRI and he claims that MLACK said that they might as well wait until the FRI comes to interview men. It may be noted that MLACK consisted and or the above remarks with the single exception that he specifically denies that MLACK suggested going to the FRI.

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HELLER was questioned concerning his residence at 510 Hudson Street. He described this house as a four story building, the first floor of which was occupied by a bakery, the proprietors of which were persons of German descent who also occupied an apartment on the second floor. He said that these people were definitely not Communists and were in fact antagonistic toward the other occupants of the building. He said that AGING, with whom he lived, occupied an anartment on the third floor, and ALHER DEW and his family occupied the martment on the fourth floor. Hillish said that during the time that he shared the apartment with AURIS, she occupied the kitchen and front room and he lived in the back bedroom. He said that during the time he was there no other persons lived with ACCO. MILLIR said that ACCOS remained in the apartment about a year after he moved and afterwards he was succeeded by STLVIA and DAVE (LIN). He said AHES was a member of the CP and frequently held affairs in the apartment. He denied that he ever attended any or these. He said the affairs ceased after STEVEN and DEVE moved in and the place became much more quiet. He said he was quite friendly with the DM family, which consisted of ALTER DET, his wife DETTY, his son .E.T. and his sister-in-law MRA KLAPPELLANER. HELLER said he never associated socially or politically with ASLES or with SINVIA and DAVI.

HELLER said that in the summer of 1936 he and BLACE had resimed their friendship. He said that he had heard that LLACE had had an accident in his lateratory and that is how they happened to get back together. He said at that time he and BLACE discussed joing to the office of an organization which he thought was named the Committee to Aid the Spanish Loyalists. He said that they actually went to the office and found that at that time they were taking no more people over to fi ht for Loyalist Spain. Hillier said that as he recalled, Congress had passed an act taking citizenship away from anyone participating in the Spanish war. HELLER said that he was the prime mover in this plan and that HLACE was not too enthusiastic. He said that he and HLACE were not very close at that time, although they did get to ether occasionally. He introduced BLACE to AHLA KLAPARMANIER and she dated BLACE frequently. He said that after he had noved from Rubson Street he saw none of the group from VHA's, however, he did resume friendly relations with VHAA around Christmes 1940.

HELLIR said that his friends at this time consisted of RHEA that the same Toll Linear to the same that the same at the Pennyley Noted on West Mith Street and lived with a woman named GRACE. He said that another individual he met about this time was JP! VAN SIGHE.

whom he met at Roselard Ballroom. ICILER could give no background information on VAN ICHIE. He can't that he also saw MILTON IEHRMAN occasionally and among those who worked with him he was most friendly with Thomas RICKET, who was a technician at the celluloid plant, who resided at 101 North 13th Street, Riconfield, New Jersey. His address book reflects that he was also friendly with h. B. MILMAN 173 plantare Avenue, Newark, New Jersey. HELLER said he became friendly with a medianical engineer named ANT REPERTO, whose address he does not know.

THILE said that his reason for leaving the Celluloid Corporation of America was because a fellow worker named SIRATTON had been needling him and calling him a pansy. INLLAR said that he had no social or professional connections with DIMATANN, however, it is felt that this individual should be located and interviewed.

At 3:30 A.M. the surveillance was joined by Special Agents ALLAN OPPMI and DAVID BREEN in radio car P-66.

At 9:42 A.M. the subject left his residence and proceeded to the Il and L Luncheonette where he arrived at 9:46 A.M.

it 10:16 A.L. subject left the M-and L Luncheonette and entered the Charles ... Berg Laboratories.

At 10:22 1.11. subject proceeded north on Germantown Avenue where at 10:25 A.... he arrived at a barber shop located on Germantown Avenue, between Borks and Horris Streets, on the east side.

At 10:45 A.M. the subject left the barber shop and returned to the Eerg Laboratories.

At 12:34 F.M. BLACK left the Berg Laboratories, proceeded to the cut rate drug store located on Germantown Agenue. He arrived at this point at 12:39 P.H.

At 1:24 P.M. subject left the cut rate drug store, proceeded towards his residence where he arrived at 1:27 P.H.

At 2:05 P.H. a 1947 or 1948 Oldsmobile, two-tone green sedanette, Fennsylvania 1950 license tags, LL166 parked in front of subject's residence. Two men entered the building. It is not known whether or not they were visiting subject. A call made by the writer to - the Philadelphia Field Office requesting a check of the 1950 Automotive License Registration reflected that this car was registered to one FAY WOLF, 4624 North 10th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

SUBJECT: THOMAS L. BLACK - was: ESPIONAGE - R.

> Mr. GERAID SIGILAR, Design Engineer, was interviewed by the writer at his place of employment, Eckert and Mauchly, 3747 Ridge Avenue, on June 19, 1950. SMOLIAR advised that he first met THOMAS BLACK through a friend of his, one JACCB I. FASS. He had known FASS since he and FASS were classmates at Thomas Jefferson High School in Brooklyn, New York. FASS and SUCLIAR graduated from that high school in June 1934. FASS went on to Columbia University where he took a degree in chemistry? in 1938, while SMOLIAR worked for approximately one year before he matriculated at City College, New York. SMOLIAR graduated from the latterinstitute with an electrical engineering degree in February 1939.

After graduating from City College, SMCLIAR went to Washington, D. C., where he worked as a messenger for the War Department in the Adjutant General's Office. In February 1940 he secured a job with the Signal Corps, in which position he travelled to various parts of the United States inspecting Signal Corps equipment. He recalls the following places to which he travelled in connection with his Signal Corps work: Mississippi; Worcester, Mass.; Baltimore, Md.; Washington, D. C.; Pittsburgh, Pa.; and Rochester, N. Y.

SMOLIAR continued with the Signal Corps until approximately June 1947 when he left that position to take up his present employment with Eckert and Mauchly. In connection with his Signal Corps assignment, SMOLIAR advised that he did have access to classified information.

SMOLIAR recalled that it was sometime after his graduation from college in 1939 and prior to his marriage five and a half years ago that he first met ELACK. He is inclined to think that it was between 1940 and 1942 when the Base Office of the Signal Corps, out of which office he worked, was located in Brooklyn, New York. At whatever time it was he recalls that he stopped in at FASS' home, 367 Miller Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, to visit FASS. BLACK was there at the time and he was introduced to him. He adwised that it was no special occasion that brought about the meeting and that he presumes FASS and BLACK had become friendly since both were then employed by the National Oil Products Company in Harrison, New Jersey.

Shortly before World War II the Signal Corps Base Office was moved to Philadelphia, and from that time on SUCLIAR was located in Philadelphia for the most part. BLACK secured employment as a Consulting Chemist with the Berg Laboratory sometime prior to 1944 and commuted from Newark for this work. BLACK did contact SMOLIAR from time to time by phone, but SMOLIAR

states he is unable to recall the frequency of these contacts and is of the opinion that it was at longer than monthly intervals.

In approximately 1944 FASS came to Philadelphia to organize and operate the Spruce Chemical Company. FASS moved in with a relative of his in Philadelphia and took BLACK in to live with him. Both FASS and BLACK contributed to the establishment of the Spruce Chemical Company on a fifty-fifty basis. At that time they were working on a preparation to be used for a "cold-wave," which was probably similar to the preparation that was subsequently marketed under the trade name of "Toni." The "Toni" preparation, however, was not developed by Spruce Chemical Company. BLACK continued his employment with the Berg Laboratory during this time and continues in that employment at present.

SECLIAR recalls that he discussed technical questions with FASS and BLACK many time, but the discussions, according to SMOLIAR, never concerned classified matter or anything that could not be found on library shelves. He specifically recalls discussing a problem that FASS had in properly . mixing dry powders requiring a particular blend to be used as a detergent. It is a type of material purchased by textile manufacturers for cleaning purposes. The problem concerned building a mixer, designing its shape, and a motor that would allow control of rotation. SMCLIAR did work on this problem with FASS but did not do any of the actual construction. FASS also worked on insecticides, and it is SMOLIAR's recollection that FASS did discuss with him some of his problems in this regard.

In regard to BLACK's contacts, SMOLIAR recalled that BLACK had telephoned him at his home during the evening approximately two weeks ago. PLACK advised SMCLIAR that he could not call him from his place of employment because "they are listening to my conversations - I knew HAPRY GCLD." Those were the words used by BLACK, according to SMOLIAR's recollection. He understood by them that BLACK was referring to his boss EERG. SMOLIAR recalled that BLACK had advised him that he had had several arguments with BERG, and believes that at one time before the above incident PLACK had told him that BERG listened in to his telephone conversations. SMCLIAR stated that he could not understand why BLACK did not terminate his work with BERG in view of his apparent antipathy toward him. SMOLIAR stated that he never heard BLACK mention the name "GOLD" before the time of the incident referred to above, and that in addition he had never heard of HARRY GOLD prior to seeing the name in the various newspaper releases attendant to GCLDS recent arrest.

SMOLIAR advised that the purpose of the contact two weeks ago was to discuss the installation of a hot water heater at the Spruce Chemical. Company in Fatterson, New Jersey. ELACK called FASS and gave him the information.

SMOLIAR recalled that shortly after March of this year FASS left Philadelphia and is now working at the Spruce Chemical Company Building located on the property of one of the company's best customers in Patterson, New Jersey.

SMCLIAR also recalled that at approximately noon on Thursday or Friday. of last week he was contacted telephonically by BLACK while he, SMOLIAR, was at work. It is to be noted that BLACK was being interviewed on both Thursday and Friday of last week, June 15 and 16, 1950, at this Office. SMCLIAR stated that BLACK inquired about properly grounding some new equipment received at the Berg Laboratory utilizing a 220 volt line. SMCLIAR stated that he simply advised him to ground it to the water pipe. According to SMOLIAR, he has not heard from BLACK since that time.

BLACK had been to SMOLIAR's house twice in so far as the latter was able to recall. One occasion was in March 1950 when SMOLIAR had a "house warming" at his residence, 4742 Rosehill Street. It was called a house warming in spite of the fact that the SMOLIARS had lived there since February 1949. Both FASS and BLACK attended this affair, which SMOLIAR described as being "social." It was also attended by several of SMOLIAR's friends from Echert and Mauchly.

SMOLIAR recalled, as the other occasion, a dinner party at his home attended by both FASS and BLACK, which took place at the beginning of this year.

SMOLIAR advised that his contacts with both BLACK and FASS have been primarily concerned with technical questions in regard to electrical problems. BLACK and FASS, both being chemists, and having only a limited knowledge of electricity, have called upon SMOLIAR from time to time because of the fact he is an electrical engineer. SMOLIAR stated that he has never given either FASS or BLACK, or been asked to supply to either of them, or to any other person any classified information.

SMOLIAR stated that he has no reason to suspect BLACK of disloyalty, and that his conversations with him have been mainly concerning technical questions, so that he would have no basis for making a statement concerning BLACK's loyalty. He doesn't know if BLACK was ever a Communist and claims to be positive that FASS is not a Communist.

According to SMCLIAR, one NATHAN RUBERSTEIN, a sheetmetal worker, in Brooklyn, New York, is married to a moman who is JACOB FASS' mother's sister, so that NATHAN RUBERSTEIN is FASS' uncle by marriage. RUBERSTEIN is a cousin of SMCLIAR's wife, whose maiden name was SCCOOM, so that SMCLIAR states his wife is distantly related to FASS. STOLIAR advises that FASS frequently consults with RUBENSTEIN in regard to any problems he encounters entailing sheetmetal work.

SMOLIAR advises that he does not know of any of BLACK's associates other than FASS, with the possible exception of some of FASS' relatives with whom BLACK previously lived in Philadelphia.

SMOLIAR further advised that he was not aware that BLACK had changed his residence from the home of one of FASS' relatives until the time of the call approximately two weeks ago.







At 7:20 pome, Hiss DONOTH WISHELL, former wife of FHEDHAND PHILD HELLER, appeared at the Philadelphia Office and was interviewed by SAS ROBERT B. HASTRES and JACK WALDRANG.

Wiss WISTELL stated that in 1937 she first started going out with HELLER, 6:00 said that during the following years she dated him quite frequently. At length in July 1943 they were married. She said that the care marriage ended in a separation in August 1944, and in March 1845 they were divorced.

Ehe said that during the period of their marriage about once a month the, would drive to the apartment of TO. FLACE in Hewark on a Sunday and spend the day. She said that occasionally they made trips to Hew York for the week-end and when they did that they usually went up on a Saturday and returned on a Sunday. She said that on these occasions they neually stayed at the Covernor Clinton Hotel.

Viss WINGLL said that she met VIR. KANE twice in KANE apartment and once at HLACK's apartment. She said the first time she met VARA EALE was at a party in LALE's apartment and that the general conversation and tone of political thinking so bored her that she went to sleep. She stated that as nearly as she could recall these parties, the various participants talked about Communism and the new social order. She said it was impossible for her to remember the names of the individuals present because she only not then that one evening.

She did recall, however, the time ELACK was present and also an individual who was a doctor and who was named CUPIEL. She said that sometime later they returned to New York City and went to VERA KAIE's apartment. She said that this was in the evening and shortly after they arrived WELL KAIE tame and told PILLER that she wanted him to take her someplace. TARE and Miller departed and after several hours had not returned. She said she was left in the spartment with CUPIET and when she amounced that she was returning to the hotel he talked her into having a few firinks in a tayern. It was discretly after this that VERA KANE and PELLER entered. She was never able to find out where they had been nor how they knew they were to noct her at the tayers.

Hiss Wissell said that during the period she know him, Hallings closest friends upon TON HACK and BARL GIRARD.

Miss WISWELL stated that she recalled attending a couple of meetings with MELLER at Town Hall, at one of which the poet LANG-TOW MUZIES appeared, and it was her impression that this had something to do with the embargo on Spain. She stated that after she had gotten to know MELLER he frequently stopped at the newsstand at 15th and Market Streets to buy a Paily Worker. She said that he read this paper very thoroughly but did not recall that he studied any particular part of the paper.

Fiss Wishell stated that sometime prior to their marriage and also prior to (Millin's application for a commission in the Havy, he discontinued reading the Daily Worker and appeared to tone down his theories on politics.

Pies WISWILL was questioned as to the bank accounts used by them during the period of their narriage and she stated that she had a joint . Account with WILLER during their narriage at the Philadelphia Saving Fund Society and that this account totalled about \$500 or \$600. They had no stocks or bonds and no bank safety deposit box.

The stated that during their narried life they both lived and worked in Philadolphia and HILLER took a two week vacation alone in Vermont at Pt. Manafield. She said this is the place they visited on their honeymoon.

liss WISHEL recalled that HELIER and HEACK were interested in AUTOM and what AUTOM was doing in the United States. They had also discussed what they had thought AUTOMS could use. She never heard either of them make any mention of their knowing any person employed by AUTOMS. She recalled that at one time he had mentioned COLD's name to her, but the could not recall the situation at the time. She said, however, that as soon as she read of COLD's extest in the newspapers she immediately recalled that HELIER knew COLD.

At 10:30 a.m., June 23, 1950, Dr. JOSEPH D. SKILTON was interviewed at the Philadelphia Office by SAs JACK WALTENH and ROBERT E. MASTERS.

Dr. SHLITH caid that he was born May 20, 1909 at Philadelphia, Pa. and presently resided at 20 Roseland Avenue, Fox Chase Manor. SHLITH said that he first met Haller when they were students at Northeast Mich School and that he has been friendly with him ever since, although Haller attended college at Ferm State and he took dentistry at the University of Pennsylvania.

He said that while he was still single he and HELLER went to Jersey City where he not TMI HACH who, at that tile, was sharing an apartment with an individual named HEALERON. He said that he graduated from dental school in 1932 and remained in Philadelphia, practicing dentistry until the war, when he became an officer in the United States /rmg. He said that during the period 1933 to 1937 HELLER was in New York and he saw him very infrequently.

He said that FINDERALD and he went to a party at VINA's apartment and at that time SMILTON was accompanied by the girl he later married. He said that he got ranged May 15, 1933 and that he said his wife saw VARA one other time.

SHILTON said that he remembers that HILLIR told him that he had tried to get a job in Russia, that he had told him this years ago and that he told him, as nearly as he can recall, that he, HILLIR, was going to apply for a job as a chemist because they ware paying good salaries in Russia and maybe they would need dentists and he would get SHILTON a job. STILTON said he received one letter from HELLER for HACK which HACK picked up at SKILTON'S office. He knows from HELLER that they did not want to send it to KERO's plant because HERO opened HACK's mail.

SKILTON was questioned as to whether he had knowledge of
HELLER having used another name and he said that he recalled that one time
after they had graduated from high school, he and HELLER visited Washington,
D. C. to try and locate some girls they had not during their high school
trip to Washington. He said that at that time they registered at a third
rate hotel near the Hotel Hetropolitan and one registered under the name
HALE and the other under the name HILL. He explained the use of these
aliases by asying that HELLER was of the opinion that some day he would be a
very successful man and did not want his name appearing on the records of this
cheap hotel.





BRUCE SAMPCRO, it is requested that Seattle Office be furnished all pertinent details in this case so that further contemplated interviews with SANFORD may be intelligently handled.

It is specifically requested that photographs of GOLD and others connected with BLACK at this time, preferably taken around 1938, be forwarded this office in order that they may be exhibited to SANFORD.

Concerning the case captioned "JORGE GURA GILGUN" mentioned in this report, it is requested that the Bureau furnish Philadelphia Office with all pertinent information concerning that case, inasmuch as GILGUN was a chemist and was alleged to be associated with the Communist Party in Argentina, and may conceivably have been connected with ELACK in this case inasmuch as it is noted that SANFORD figures in both of these investigations.

No derogatory information concerning F. BRUCE SAMFORD appears in the Seattle files, and his demeanor during the interview appeared to be cooperative. It is contemplated that he can be re-interviewed in the very near future, as soon as his wife has returned from a vacation trip. It is noted that she has the family address book in her possession.

It is further requested that the Philadelphia Office advise the Newark Office if it desires that the lead set out in the enclosed report for the Newark Office be covered in this case.
