Ro: Analymis of search material obtained from the subject's room at 139 West Chew Street on June 16, 1950, by SA ROBERT E. MASTERS and the writer.

DESCRIPTION: Item #1 consists of a letter from GERM.RDO COLLARDIN of Germany to FRED HELLER, dated March 10, 1950, with three policy copies of letters from GERM.RDO COLLARDIN to INGMAS L. BLACK, dated March 10, 1950, March 10, 1950, and December 13, 1943. This material pertains to BLACK's obtaining detergents for GEREARDO COLLARDIN for sale in Germany.


Item #2 is a letter from CENWARD COLLARDIN to FRED HELIER, dated December 13, 1949, which pertains to the above refound to detergents.

REMARKS: FRED MILLER was questioned by the writer and SA JACK WALFMAN regarding MEDLER's dealings with GEMMARDO COLLARDIN and he advised that he has become a fairly close personal friend of COLLARDIN due to the fact that GEHMARDO COLLARDIN has been the Germany representative for the American Chemical Paint Company for many peaks even prior to the wor. He stated that the Collardin Company is located only in the Western Zone of Germany, that COLLARDIN is extremely anti-Red in his political views but that he does not know whether or not he favore Nazism.

Since NEW LOADS first trip to Europe in 1940, he has dealt with COLIARDIN concerning various products of the ACP and also entered into considerable discussion with COLIARDIN relating to detergents and praphites. According to MENOTY, detergents in particular were needed builty in Germany and that COLIARDIN thought it would be an excellent field to handle. Inasmuch as the ACP did now deal in detergents, HELLER via is der introduced COLIARDIN and THOMAS L. BLACK. SLACK was to handle natters regarding detergents and graphices

for COLLADIN and in return-receive a ten percent regulty such as COLLARDIN mid to ACP on other materials. However, HELLER stated that there was no written agreement between him and BLACK as to the disposition of the royalty payments.

HELLER advised that he was positive that any information furnished to COL. REEL would be perfectly legitimate and that under no circumstances would any such material fall into the hands of the Russians through GEMLARDO COLLARDIN. In fact, he stated that all of the ACP representatives throughout Europe were anti-Red and that he had planned to develop similar arrangements with numerous ACP representatives.

With respect to the graphites, HELLER stated that COLLARDIN was interested in graphite as a lubricant and that he, HELLER, had made arrangements with BLACK to obtain information on collodial graphites from Acheson Colloids through MORRELL DOUBLERTY, a representative of that Company. However, HELLER stated that he had told PLACK not to let DOUBLERTY know what the material was for inasmuch as DOUGLERTY was an opportunist and would probably poster HELLER if he felt that there might be something to gain through the enterprise.

On 7/3/50 I telephonically communicated with Mr. MINNIECH of the Eureau in connection with the above case. I called to his attention the fact that the statements dictated by MARRY GOLD concerning the activities of BROTHMAN, as well as supplemental statements from GOLD on FUCHS, SLACK, and GREENGLASS, were ready for GOLD's signature. I pointed out to Mr. HEIMRICH that there was nothing relating to motive or intent on the part of GCLD contained in these statements other than the flat statement of fact relative to GOLD's contacts with Soviet agents. I mentioned that unless the Bureau had any objections it was our intention to call Mr. JOHN D. M. HAWILTON, GCLD's attorney, and advise him we had the above-described statements which we intended to take to GOLD for his signature; that we would mention that there was nothing in these statements relating to GOLD's motive or intent, as indicated above; and that it was expected that Mr. HAMILTON would not interpose any objection to GOLD's signing these statements.

Mr. HTTWRICH stated that he desired to discuss this matter further with Mr. FILMONI and would subsequently return my call.

At 3.30 p.m., Mr. HEMPICH called and advised he had discussed this with Mr. BHINON: He instructed that this office should call Mr. HAMILTON and tell him about the nature of the statements and that it was our intention to submit them to GOID for signature; that Mr. HAMILTON can see these statements if he so desires; that we wanted to give him the opportunity to review them. We were to mention to Mr. HEXILION that nothing was contained in the statements relative to intent or motive on the part of GOLD, as previously described by him, but on the over-all picture of intent as related to all of GOLD's activities and associates it was felt he should be the judge, and the purpose of my call to him was to advise that if he so desires he could see them. Mr. HEMNIICH was advised that this would be done.

I subsequently telephonically communicated with Mr. HAMILTON's secretary at his law office and learned that Mr. HAMILITON was in Canada on vacation and not expected back in Philadelphia until 7.10.50. I also learned from her that Er. FALLARD, associate counsel for CCLD, was out of the city over the 4th of July holiday and would not be back until Wednesday.



At 11:45 A.M., July 3, 1950, SA LOUIS TURNER of the Newark Division telephone and desired to alert Philadelphia since it appeared BLACK might be on his way back to Philadelphia. BLACK traveled from Patterson to Newark, carrying his bags with him. He was at the time of the call, at the PRR Station in Newark eating lunch. He had as yet made no effort to contact the Van Posnack Warehouse in Newark.

At 2:30 P.M., TURNER called again, speaking with SA ROBERT W. HOLIES. He said that after eating, BLACK had gone to the Van Posnak Warehouse on foot and returned to the PRR and then gone to the bus station and taken the bus to Patterson.

Accordingly, the Agents who had been standing by to take over the surveillance were permitted to go about other duties.

GERLSTRAM, also known as LAVIS, was originally employed by the Ellipsoy of EXPER I, 1925 as a Recognitionalist to work at MANER'S LABORATORIES in Linion, New Jersey. GREISPANN was transferred to the Stanford Laboratories about 1937. He is now the Birester of the Basic Mitrogen Mivision.

Miss JOSEPHIE MEITAKER, Personnal Department at the MEMICAE CTANNED LABORATORIES, made svailable a photograph of Doctor CHRISTHAE, which was taken in the fall of 1946 for a publication prepared by the AMMICAE CLANNED LABORATORIES in Stemford. Miss WHITTAKER, who has been acquainted with Dr. CHRISTHAE during the past fifteen years has advised that the latter's photograph is a true likeness of the individual and that his appearance last changed to any degree during the past fifteen years.

It was pointed out by Miss WHITTAER that the personnal file suisting to Br. CHRISTHARN was retained by the AMERICAN CTANABLE COMPANY'S Bow Fork office, 30 Reskefeller Plaza, New York City. Br. CHRISTHARN's current residence was furnished as No. 9 Center Roelle, Breuzville S, New York, telephone number Boverly 76750. Miss WHITTAER advised that to the best of her possilection Br. CENISTHARN at no time has over recided in Connections.

The indices of the New Haven office contain no identifiable information relating to Dr. CHRISTHIN with one exception, which is a reference to a plant informant file which has been destroyed. It is peoplife that Dr. CHRISTHIN was considered as a plant informant at one time or may have been interviewed in connection with the plant informant program. The Bureau recertion may contain information consuming such reference, which is no longer available in the New Haven office.

Employed as Chemist at Pennsylvania Sugar Co., Phila. and its subsidiary, Franco-American Company at Carlstadt, N.J., 1931-1933. Unemployed 1933, except for few months with Reese Brothers, MYC. Late 1933-1937, employed as chemist with Celluloid Corporation of America, Newark, vacationing 3 months in Miami 1937. Employed as Chemist, American Chemical Paint Company, Ambler, Pa. 1937 to date. Married DOROTHY WISWELL 1943, divorced 1945. Fiance ROSE MC GETTIGAN, Camden, N.J. At Penn State with THOMAS L. BLACK formed liberal club for study of Atheism. 1932-33 associated with "pink elements", including BLACK and VERA KANE, residing at latter's residence in NYC. Attended under alias FRED BERGER, Communist Workers School 1934 and participated in waterfront picket line. residing at 335 W. 11th Street, NYC, KAME's residence, HELLER and BLACK desired employment as Chemists in Russia and applied at AMTORG TRADING CORPORATION, MYC. Contacts initiated for both by HELLER through GAIK OVAKEMIAN, AMTORG official. Both "stalled off" in favor of becoming consulting chemists for AMTORG in USA. HELLER interviewed voluntarily on 6/16,17,19-22/50 at Phila. giving consent to search of premises, 199 W. Chew St., conducted 6/16/50. HELLER provided HARRY COLDs (admitted Soviet espionage agent) name to AMTORG, encouraged GOLD's cooperation with USSR, and

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aided GOLD in securing BLACK's former position at HOLBROOK MANUFACTURING CO. Industrial processes obtained by BLACK from NOPCO rewritten by HELLER for submission to OVAKIMIAN of AMTORG. HELLFR reports meet 10/25/34 with Soviet Agent using name of PETERSEN, a friend of OVAKIMIAN. BLACK reports MELLER unacceptable to Soviet 'gents, due to emotional instability, affairs with women and drinking. Separated from BLACK 1934-1937. In 1939 HELLER requested. that BLACK forward AMERICAN CHEMICAL PAINT CO. processes to USSE. VERA KANE, HELLER and BLACK prepared information in 1939 and latter delivered to "JACK", his Soviet superior. HELLFR enthused at reception and secured all ACP processes to forward to Soviet. BLACK unaware of HELLER's possible more recent Soviet Agent contacts and HELLER denied personal contect with Soviet Agents since 1934. Subject as Business ? Representative, AMFRICAN CHEMICAL PAINT COMPANY made trips : through Europe duming September-December 1949 and in May-June 1950. Interviews of HELLER terminated on 6/22/50 pending completion of major interviews of THOMAS L. BLACK.

5:52 D.m. BLACK caught a trolley going west at 6th and Market Streets.

Subject left trolley at 13th and Market Streets. 5:58 p.m.

Subject entered the Horn and Hardart's Restaurant on 5:59 p.m. Market Street, in the vicinity of Penn Square.

Subject departed from restaurant. 6:05 p.m.

Subject and unknown man walked side by side and parted on friendly terms near the west entrance to City Hall Court. BLACK headed south on Penn Square enroute to F.B.I. office. Unknown man crossed Penn Square, walked south, stopped, and looked in various windows along the way; suddenly turned and retraced his steps north to Market Street. He made a surveillance of the immediate vicinity and proceeded west on the south side of Market Street. The unknown man was followed by SAS HOLDER and G.MATHOUSE to 17th and Market Streets. This unknown man, while under surveillance, was observed checking, apparently to see if anyone was following him.

The writer and SA GREATHOUSE have viewed photographs of JACOB FASS and this unknown individual bears a strong resemblance to FASS, but a positive identification could not be made by either agent inasmuch as the unknown man appeared to be somewhat shorter than the description of FAGS which was given as 5' ll%" in his file.

6:13 p.m. BLACK entered the Widener Building.

6:15 p.m. The unknown man who had previously contacted BLACK, after stopping at 17th and Market Streets, made a surveillance of the vicinity, crossed 17th Street, and headed south on the west side of 17th Street, checking the vicinity in

back of him and peering in windows enroute. He proceeded to Chestnut Street, turned west on that street, and was lost by the agents making surveillance in that vicinity. The unknown man was definitely surveillance conscious.

Agents HELMER and GREATHOUSE returned to the office.

SAG McHID called from Newark today in connection with the above-entitled case and referred to our teletype of 7/6/50 indicating DLACK was expected to return to New Jersey over the weekend and requesting that the Newark Office be prepared to take over the surveillance. Mr. McKEE discussed the negative results of the surveillance during the past and indicated that he thought some consideration ought to be made for presenting the case to the Bureau in order to have the curveillance discontinued. His purpose in making this suggestion was the fact that his office was utilizing a considerable amount of manpower.

This case was discussed with Supervisor N. S. MARZENSTEIN, and the background of the surveillance, results, etc., were considered. Consideration was given to our own desire to terminate this surveillance as early as possible because of our own numpower condition; also, that I had discussed this case with Mr. MEMMAICH of the Europa this week and had mentioned that when we terminated the interviews with SLACK we contemplated recommending that the surveillance be discontinued, as it probably would be as good a point at which to discontinue the surveillance as any. No instructions were issued by Mr. HEMMRICH, but he suggested we might consider keeping BLACK under a spot surveillance.

It thereafter returned Ir. McKEE's call and informed him that this office did not feel it wise to recommend the discontinuance of the surveillance at this time, especially since we were in the final phases of interviewing ELACK; that it was expected that this interviewing would be terminated sometime next week. Therefore, I informed Mr. McKEE that this office did not plan to request authority to discontinue this surveillance at this time. After a long discussion, Mr. McKEE agreed that the surveillance be continued this weekend in New Jersey.





On 7/12/30 I telephenically communicated with Mr. BELMONT of the Euroau and advised that this office had learned that Dr. JOSEPH SMILTON, a dentist who had been interviewed on two occasions by this office, as set forth in our letter to the Eureau dated 6/30/50, and who had recently had an accident by running his car into a tree, had committed swieide last work and was buried yesterday. I advised in BELMONT that we had not interviewed SMILTON since the two interviews recorded in the above letter. I pointed out that the death was confirmed by a newspaper notice of the death, and that in view of the circumstances this office did not believe it expedient to check into the matter of the swieide through the coroner or to interview Dr. SKILTON's wife.

I also pointed out that subject THOMAS L. BLACK had been informed by Mrs. SHILTON that her husband had committed suicide with a knife, and BLACK had attended a wake for SKILTON. Mr. BELNONI agreed that we should have no contact with Mrs. SKILTON and not check into SKILTON's suicide.

At the time of furnishing the above information to I'r. EXIMENT, I also called attention to the fact that subject FIRDHAND HELLER had indicated that he is also contemplating suicide. I pointed out that subject DIACH, when interviewed last night, had advised that HELLER was drinking two bottles of whickey daily, was fighting with his mother with whom he lives, and had told BLACK that he was going to the nowatrine for two weeks and if his nerves did not improve he would do the same an ISSUM SKILICH.

In this connection I pointed out that BLACK was going to try to see HELLER tonight. BLACK mentioned that he would have to go to HELLER's home and then take HELLER away from his home in order to talk to him. He pointed out that he, BLACK, is acquainted with the fact that he has been unler surveillance and stated he is not concerned about it. However, he feels that should he meet HELLER and HELLER makes the surveillance it might cause more serious consequences to HELLER.

with reference to the surveillance of FLACK, I told Nr. DELICET that this office recommended to discontinuance due to the fact that it has been unproductive. DLACK has advised us that he knows of it, and OBETHES DING, DLACK's employer, telephoned this office yesterday complaining about the fact that we were conducting a surveillance in the vicinity of his office. I pointed o to ir. BEE OLA' that BENG's office and shop were located in an area where numbers writers comply engage in their setivities; that these numbers writers made our Agents very shortly after they started their surveillance near BLACK's place of employment,

undoubtedly due to the fact that they thought they, the numbers writers, were under surveillance. The surveillance has continued in this vicinity for a long period of time, and undoubtedly by word of mouth BETG has become aware of it. I pointed out that if we did discontinue the surveillance we would institute a surveillance on a spot-check basis. Ir. BELLONT stated that this office should immediately send a wire to the Bureau recommending the discontinuance of the surveillance and the institution of a spot check unless advised to the contrary by the Bureau.

Mr. DELLCT also advised that a letter should be forwarded to the Eureau relative to the above information on SHILTCH and HELLIE.





Volumes I through III of the "CHEMICAL TECHNOLOGY AND ANALYSIS OF OILS, FATS, AND WAXES, indicated as the 6th edition of Lewkowitsch. This is indicated as item A in the referenced letter. A search of these volumes indicates no notations, entries, or identifying marks.

A thin book entitled "LABORATORY COMPANION TO FATS AND OILS INDUSTRIES, which on examination failed to reflect any notations other than the small letter "4", in ink, appearing on the inside of the rear cover. The importance of this numeral is unknown, and it is suggested that BLACK be queried as to its meaning, if known by him. This item is indicated as Item B in the referenced letter from Newark.

A well-worn leather-bound volume entitled "ELECTRO ANALYSIS." by EDGAR F. SMITH, on examination reflects a pen and ink entry in the inside of the front cover "KRNEST L. or D. WILSON." BLACK advised that this was a copy of a movie film entitled "Sizing Up Size" prepared by him while he was employed at the National Oil Products Company. The film was prepared for advertising purposes, and shows the results of an emulsified paraffin wax used for sizing paper. The film was prepared by ARNOLD K. HILL and THOMAS L. BLACK. However, BLACK did the actual photography. This project was discontinued prior to its being completed and BLACK retained the film because the ultimate aim was never completed.

BLACK stated that he had told PETERSON that such film had been made by him, but PETERSON did not ask BLACK to furnish him a copy. The white 4 x 6 card was exhibited to BLACK on June 30, 1950, by SAS R. W. HOLLES and W. B. WELTE, JR.

BLACK stated that it is simply a memorandum of things for him to do. He stated that the "SS WHITE" was the SS WHITE DENTAL MANUFACTURING COMPANY from whom he has purchased dental equipment. The "BRANDORF" mentioned thereon is RUTH BRANDORF, the laboratory stenographer, at the National Oil Products Company. The notation "Instruct JAMES about 1392 Samp." refers to work that he had to do at Notco; 1392 was a company number for one of Notco products. BLACK states that the card indicates that he was to instruct JAMES regarding a samp. of this 1392 product. "Photo Shop Institute, 3:30" HLACK described as being the place where he took his course in color photography, and believes that the 3:30 applies to the time that he had his appointment for his instruction.

The other notation regarding the Bastman Kodak Store and the KISTNER listed therein is a salesman, and BLACK believes that he was probably interested in acquiring information regarding movie screens.

The Metal Frame Acquarium Company at Pine Brook,
New Jersey, made a special acquarium for some tropical fish that
BLACK was raising. The notation "Meet CHARLIE at Civic Centre in
Verona at 6:30" undoubtedly refers to an appointment that BLACK





BLACK'S EXPLANATION

The following explanation was furnished by the subject on July 6. to SAS ROBERT W. HOLMES and WILLIAM B. WELTE, JR.

BLACK stated that he and JACK ROSNER, whom he has previously identified as an SAP member, had come up with the idea that if a sermicide were added to cutting oils, the risk of infection to machinists would be 2.5 lessened. HLACK stated that ROSNER had made contact with the individual mentioned in this memo for the experimentation of their cutting oil with a germicide added. The deal was handled through Fine Organics, Inc.

BLACK mixed up the cutting oil and added a germicide. He then shipped the cutting oil, the quantity of which he called a working sample, to the aforementioned individual. The idea was that they would use the oil and if they found it satisfactory, ROSNER and BLACK would be given an order for an additional quantity. BLACK advised that he and maker never heard anything more of their business endeavor in this field.
