NAYLOR obtained an address book approximately 5" x 8", consisting of pages 43 through 180, which has been identified as Item #6 of the material obtained from HELLER.

On Page 44 of the above-described notebook appear numerous for the above subject, whose name is indicated as TASSO L. BLACK : " HELLER, when interviewed, by SA JACK WALDMAN and SA WILLIAM H. NAYLOR on 6/20/50. advised that these addresses are those of the above suject for the period of probably 1928 through 1932 or 1933.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

VERA KANE reported born 12/25/99, Rensselaer, New York, as VERONICA BATCHELLER (not verified). Reported to have graduated from Barnard College in New York City. Married JOHN DELIPSTER KANE. Reported well-versed in law and was head of the Litigation Department of Frazier, Spears, Meyer and Kidder, of Wall Street, New York. KANE described as brilliant, and entertaining and to have many unusual acquaintances. Reported to be an acquaintance of CLARENCE HATHAWAY, former Editor of the "Daily Worker" and acquainted with members of the National Committee of the Communist Party. In 1934 assisted THOMAS L. BLACK, admitted espionage agent of the 1930 period, and FERDINAND P. HELLER, BLACK's associate, in preparation of data for subsequent turnover to Amtorg Trading Corporation in New York. In 1939 reported to have typed formulae and processes obtained by HELLER from American Chemical Paint Company to be given to BLACK's Soviet superior. This turnover not completed; however, did copy information on a Parkerizing process obtained by HELLER, which was turned over to BLACK's Soviet superior "JACK." Associates set forth.

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DETAILS:

This is a joint report of the writer and Special Agent WILLIAN B. WELTE, JR.

I. BASIS FOR INVESTIGATION

THOMAS L. BIACK and FERDINAND P. HELIER have said that VERA KANE on October 23 and 24, 1934 typed reports containing industrial formulae which were then to be given to Amtorg Trading Corporation of New York City. HELLER said these reports were given by him to an unidentified person named PETERSEN, who said he was a friend of GAIK OVAKIMIAN of Amtorg. BLACK has advised KANE, in 1939, typed into report form formulae and processes of the "Thermoil Granodine process" of the American Chemical Paint Company. This process was a variation of a Parkerizing process for rust-proofing of metals which had been converted to treatment of bearing surfaces to shorten the break-in period. BIACK said KANE was aware that this information was to be given to BIACK's Soviet superior in 1939.

Persons who will be mentioned herein by reason of their espionage contacts are identified as follows:

HARRY GOLD

HARRY GOID, 6823 Kindred Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on May 22, 1950, told Special Agents T. SCOTT MILLER, JR. and RICHARD E. BRENNAN that he was the individual to whom Dr. EMIL JULIUS KLAUS FUCHS passed information concerning the atomic bomb, for transmission to Russia.



THOMAS L. BLACK, wa Tasso Lessing Black

THORIAS L. BLACK resides at 1929 North 6th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and is employed as a chemist at the Charles W. Berg Laboratories, 1827 North 5th Street, Philadelphia. BLACK is voluntarily being interviewed currently at Philadelphia and has told Special Agents WILLIAM B. WELTE, JR. and ROBERT W. HOIMES of his Soviet espionage activities. BLACK has admitted giving in 1933-34 industrial processes concerning sulphonation of oils and rust-proofing processes to his then Soviet superior, GAIK OVAKIMIAN of Amtorg Trading Corporation of New York City. He said his later Soviet superiors were PAUL PETERSEN (1934-1938), Dr. SCHWARTZ (1938-1939), JACK (1939-1948) and has given detailed information concerning his association with these persons. In addition, BLACK said he has been a close friend of HARRY GOID, previously mentioned, since the early 1930's and knew GOLD was active in Soviet espionage.

FERDINAND PHILIP HELLER, was, Ferdinand Phillip Heller, Fred Heller, Frem Heller, Fred Berger

FERDINAND P. HELLER, 199 West Chew Street, Philadelphia, has been employed as a chemist and technical representative for American Chemical Paint Company, Ambler, Pennsylvania, since 1937. HELLER has been interviewed by the Philadelphia Division and told of being a friend of THOMAS L. BLACK from Pennsylvania State College days, 1926-1930, to date. He said he has been acquainted with HARRY GOID since about 1931 and aided GOID in obtaining employment at Holbrook Manufacturing Company, Harrison, New Jersey, in 1933. HELLER in 1931-1933 was employed by the Pennsylvania Sugar Company of Philadelphia and its subsidiary, the Franco American Sugar Company, Carlstadt, New Jersey. He was unemployed in 1933-1934, except for approximately six months with the Reese Brothers Company of New York City in 1933. He resided in 1933-1934 with VERA KANE as man and wife at 335 West 11th Street, New York City, until he became employed November 1, 1934, by the Celluloid Corporation of America in Newark, New Jersey, which employment he held until 1937.

HELLER said in 1932-1933 he and BLACK were desirous of securing employment in Russia and as a result, HELLER contacted in 1934 GAIK OVAKIMIAN of the Amtorg Trading Corporation, New York City, making arrangements to meet OVEKIKIEN again on October 21, 1934. As a result of this meeting, BLASK and

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HELLER agreed to provide industrial formulae to Amtorg. KANE typed the information on October 23 and 24, 1934, which she knew was to be given to Amtorg by HELLER. Details of this activity will be set forth later in this report. HELLER said he has had no direct contact with amtorg officials or Russian representatives since October 25, 1934.

II. BLACK'S STORY

The interviews with THOLAS L. BLACK were conducted by Special Agents ROBERT W. HOLMES and WILLIAM B. WELTE, JR., in the Philadelphia FBI Office.

BLACK advised on June 20, 1950, that he was a member of the Communist Party in Unit #3, in Jersey City, New Jersey, in 1932. At that time, a friend of his named J. BYRON McKINNEY, a Party member who was an unemployed seaman living with his family in Jersey City, took him to meet a woman whom McKINNEY described as being brilliant and entertaining. This woman was VERA KANE. At that time she lived at the Level Club, which was formerly a Masonic Hotel on 71st Street in New York City. BLACK kept up his friendship with VERA KANE for the ensuing years. BLACK introduced FERDINAND P. HELLER to KANE and subsequently HELLER lived with her in her apartment during the period of his unemployment in 1933-1934.

VERA KANE had surrounded herself with a number of people, the majority of whom were interested in the Soviet Union. Some of these individuals who were close friends and associates of VERA KANE were:

BUD COOK, a truck driver who came from the State of Washington.

CHARLES NEHER, a chemist who was from Walla Walla, Washington, and at one time had been a Communist Party member.

JOSEPH SKILTON, an old friend of FERDINAND P. HELLER and now a dentist in Philadelphia.

GLADYS MOREHOUSE, now the wife of Dr. JOSEPH SKILTON.

Dr. COPELY, an osteopath now believed to be practicing in New York City.

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IRENE GRAVES, also known as Renee Graves, a native of Rochester, New York, and then the Social Editor of the New York World.

HENRY and AUREL BROWN, husband and wife. AUREL BROWN was an artist.

EDDIE DRAKE, a former DAV member, seaman and steel worker.

HARRY DAIALLAN, a Perm State classmate of HELLER and BLACK, who is now employed at the Lederle Laboratory Division of the American Cyanamide Company, Pearl River, New York.

BLICK also stated that during the period of the depression VERA KANE fed many of her friends who were unemployed and that at one time a number of these individuals had keys to her apartment. Her apartment at that time was at 335 West 11th Street and she subsequently moved to the Cartaret Hotel in New York City.

On June 28, 1950, BLACK furnished the following background information regarding VERA KANE:

She was born December 25, 1899, at Rensselaer, New York. Her maiden name was VERONICA BATCHELLER. Her father was English and her mother was Irish. She was raised in the Catholic Church. According to BLICK, she attended and was graduated from Barnard College in New York City, the exact year not known to BLICK. She married a man by the name of JOHN DEMPSTER KANE, who came from Philadelphia. BLICK believed that JACK KINE, as he was known, later became Superintendent of a paper mill in Up-State New York. VERA KINE has one son, who is reported to be living with his father. VERA KINE and her husband are not divorced, but separated.

At various times she has made claims to BLACK of having been on the stage and in radio. She was employed for a number of years by the law firm of Frazier, Spears, Meyers, and Kidder, of Wall Street, New York. VERL KINE is not a member of the Bar but is well versed in the law and on one occasion told BLACK that she was head of the Litigation Department. At one time she told BLACK that she was employed by a Japanese Silk Importing firm in New York City.

BLICK never had any proof that VER! KINE was a member of



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the Communist Party, but stated that she had many unusual acquaintances close to and in the Party. For example, on one occasion she told him that she was acquainted with a Party member named UDOFF, an attorncy. On another occasion, when BLACK and VERA KANE were having dinner in a restaurant in New York, she introduced him to CLARENCE HATHAWAY, a former editor of the "Daily Worker." She told BLACK that she was acquainted with members of the Central Committee or the National Committee of the Communist Party. BLACK was unable to recall the dates of the above-mentioned incidents.

Through her law firm associatos, she told BL:CK that she had learned that the telephones at the Communist Party Headquarters had been tapped and that when she learned this, she reported this to a friend of hers who was on the National Committee of the Communist Party.

In late 1933 and in 1931 HELLER and BLACK, desiring employment in Russia as chemists, discussed their plans with VER: KANE. HELLER and KANE were living in the latter's apartment at that time at 335 West 11th Street, New York City. HELLER in 1933 went to amtorg Trading Corporation and there contacted GAIK OVAKIMIAN to secure information concerning BLACK's and HELLER's desired employment in Russia. OVAKIMIAN was interested in secing both HELLER and BLACK and made arrangements to meet with them. At the first meeting of the three (BLACK was unable to provide the dates), BLACK mentioned Nopco processes of sulphonation of oils and OVAKIMIAN asked for this information. BLACK provided the information, which was typed by VERA KANE at her apartment for presentation to OVAKIMIAN.

BLICK said the period of the above activity was a few weeks in 1934 and was terminated by OVIKIMIN, who came to KINE's apartment and said the transposition from HELLER's and BLICK's notes was too slow and he wanted all the information in one unit. He took all of the available notes. OVAKIMIN returned the notes in a few weeks; however, BLICK could not recall if the notes were returned to HELLER or BLICK. BLICK said KINE knew the information was to be given Russia, but seemed to regard it as foolishness, not being too sympathetic.

On June 22, 1950, BLICK advised that in 1939 FERDININD P. HELLER, who was then employed by the American Chemical Paint Company, noticed in the files of that Company a letter from Amtorg requesting that the American Chemical Paint Company furnish to Amtorg details on the "Thermoil Granodine" process for the treatment of bearing surfaces. The American Chemical Paint Company never replied to the Amtorg letter.

HELLER then (1939) contacted BLACK at Nopeo and told him



of the above, proposing that BLICK relay the requested information to the Russians if he still had contact with the U.S.S.R. BLICK agreed and HELLER brought the information, consisting of library index cards and several sheets of paper containing notations. From these, HELLER and BLICK wrote a report to include not only formulae but industrial information as to steps in the manufacture as well as the use and application of the product. BLICK explained the "Thermoil Granodine" process was based on the Parker patents, then expired, which had been applied by the American Chemical Paint Company to a new use of surfacing bearings to shorten the break-in period.

KANE typed the report in final form, which BLACK a few months later in late 1939 or early 1940 turned over to his Soviet superior, JACK. BLACK could not recall the place of the typing but believed it was at KANE's apartment, BLACK's apartment in Chellis Austin Apartments, Newark, New Jersey, or at HELLER's residence at 199 West Chew Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Later in 1939 BLACK and HELLER decided that HELLER should make available all the processes of the American Chemical Paint Company that were available to him and they would retain them with the idea in mind for the two of them going into business. In addition to that, BLACK and HELLER discussed the possibility of turning this information over to the Soviets. BLACK estimates that HELLER brought approximately 200 library cards to VERA KANE's apartment one weekend, which library cards contained American Chemical Paint Company formulae and that VERA KANE copied these formulae. BLACK stated that VERA KANE made one copy of the cards which were to be turned over to the Soviet Union.

BLACK said the typing was done by KANE in a room rented by BLACK and HELLER at the Hotel Sherman Square at 71st and Broadway, New York City. The actual period or dates BLACK is unable to recall and has said 1937, then 1939 and later 1942; however, it was accomplished by KANE on a Saturday evening and a Sunday. BLACK has expressed some confusion in that he was unable to recall the details of the copying - once stating it was done at KANE's apertment in the presence of DOROTHY WISWELL and then later at the Hotel Sherman Square.

After completion of the copying, HELLER retained his original cards and BLACK for a short time held the copies typed by KANE. BLACK stated that due to the fact that he was trying to break relations with the Soviets at this time, he did not turn over to them the copies made by VERA KANE. After retaining them for a period of time, he gave them back to VERA KANE. VERA KANE agreed to retain the copies in her safe deposit box in the event that BLACK and HELLER would go into business together in the future. BLACK stated that so far

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as he knows VERA KANE may still retain the copies of the American Chemical Paint Company formulae.

On June 19, 1950, FERDINAND P. HELLER provided the Philadelphia Office with a file containing approximately 900 library index cards. These cards, according to HELLER, bear various formulae relating to processes of the American Chemical Paint Company and contain those BLACK and HELLER planned to use in operation of their own business.

BLICK advised on June 27, 1950, that in 1937 he joined the Socialist Party at the bidding of his Soviet superior in order to secure information about Trotskyite activities for the Soviets. BLICK stated that VERA KANE was well aware of his membership in the Trotskyite faction of the Socialist Party and his later membership in 1939 in the Socialist Workers Party. When LEON TROTSKY was killed in 1940, BLACK stated that he discussed the matter with VERA KANE and told her that he as a member of the Socialist Workers Party was serving as a spy for the Russians. In this capacity he had been assigned in 1938 at Newark, New Jersey, to become acquainted with the leadership of the Socialist Workers Party and ingratiate himself for the purpose of being serm to Coyoacan, Mexico. At Coyoacan, as a member of the household of LEON TROTSKY, leader of the Socialist Workers Party, he would be in a position to do work for the Russians. Since the death of TROTSKY, BLACK believed he had been selected by the Russians as the possible assassin; however, due to his inability to get to Mexico, another person had been selected.

BLACK's association with VERA KANE continued from 1932 to 1944 with the exception of a period of two or three years around 1936 when they were out of contact.

BLACK stated he has no positive information that VERA KANE is involved in Soviet Espionage activity but that there are a number of suspicious circumstances which point to the fact that she may be involved in Soviet espionage activity. BLACK recalled that around 1935 VER. KINE moved from her apartment at the Cartaret Hotel, leaving no forwarding address. For a two year period neither BLACK nor HELLER was able to contact her nor did they know her whereabouts.

After they had reestablished their friendship with her, VERA KANE told BLACK the story as to why she disappeared. He does not recall the story at this late date but recalls now that he had dimmer with her the night before her disappearance and she never mentioned anything to him on that occasion about

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moving. A week after that he went to the hotel to see her and found that she had gone, leaving no forwarding address. A two or three year period intervened. She told BLiCK that she had been living somewhere on the East Side of New York. She told BLiCK that she had to go into hiding and implied that she was in difficulty with law enforcement agencies but she did not enlarge on the story.

BLACK stated that VERA KANE in 1934 asked FERDINAND P. HELLER and himself what she could do to be of use to the Soviet Union. She claimed that she had some confidential information made available to her through the law firm by whom she was employed regarding Allied Chemical and several large steel companies. BLACK stated that OVAKIMIAN was in VERA KANE's apartment one time in 1934 while BLACK was there and that OVAKIMIAN had come to pick up BLACK's Nopco processes.

BLACK recalled that PAUL PETERSEN, his Soviet superior from 1934 to 1938, requested him in 1935 to furnish a biographical sketch of VERA KANE. BLACK knew that such sketches were required of him when the Soviets were considering such people for recruitment as agents. BLACK felt that on certain occasions VERA KANE may have been testing his loyalty to the Soviets. He feels that she might have been assigned to find out for them if he were true.

As an example, in 1940, BLACK said when discussing with VERA KANE his assignment to TROTSKY's household in Coyoacan, he recalled that VERA KANE advised him to report this matter to the FBI and that she would make arrangements for him to do it. BLACK said that he became suspicious of this offer, believing that it would not be necessary for her to make arrangements if he desired to discuss it with the FBI, that he could have done the same. He felt that she may have been sounding him out to see if he were considering the possibility of reporting to the FBI.

VERA KANE was acquainted with HARRY GOLD. She knew in 1933 that GOLD was interested in going to the Soviet Union. BLACK did not know for certain that VERA KANE was aware of HARRY GOLD's espionage activities, but he suspected that she was aware because between 1937 and 1944 VERA KANE on a number of occasions told THOMAS BLACK that HARRY GOLD was not one for HELLER and BLACK to associate with and that it was very dangerous for them to associate with him. BLACK believes that VERA KANE may have known of HARRY GOLD's position in Soviet espionage.

BLACK recalled an incident around 1935 when PAUL PETERSEN, his Soviet contact, was putting tremendous pressure upon him to secure informa-

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tion for the Soviets. He was told that if he BLACK, would work hard he would secure a high position in Soviet espionage and might even receive the reward of the Order of Lenin. BLACK said that he tried to evade this pressure but PETERSEN was pressuring him into working with them. Within a matter of several weeks after this, he had occasion to talk to VERA KINE. At that time VERA KANE told him the story about BUD COOK, who is previously mentioned as one of her associates. COOK was employed as a driver of a tank truck for a firm known as "Oilwell and Alls Well." The operator of this was a bootleg gas dealer. COOK stole a gun which was subsequently turned over to the Communist Party. The Party had previously, according to VER: KINE, endeavored to get a small revolver. The . gun that COOK stole was a machine gun and was turned over to the Party. The Party had considerable trouble disposing of it since it was not a gun that would fit their needs. This gun was stolen by COOK from counterfeiters who were alleged to have operated in the garage of his omployer, the bootleg gas dealer. BLACK felt that this was a subtle way on the part of VERA KANE of indicating to him that he had better submit to the Soviet pressure.

III. HELLER'S STORY

FERDININD PHILIP HELLER, aka Fred Heller, a technical representative of the imerican Chemical Paint Company, imbler, Pennsylvania, who resides at 199 West Chew Street, Philadelphia, was interviewed on June 20, 1950 by Special Agents JACK WALDEAN and WHILIAM H. NAYLOR. At that time HELLER advised that he first met VERA KANE in early 1933 as a result of an acquaintance-ship with THOMAS L. BLACK. As a result of the introduction to KANE he advised that he became very much interested in her and eventually moved in 1933 to 335 West 11th Street, New York City, where he resided with VERA KANE in an apartment. He advised that in September 1933 he and VERA took their vacations together. He stated that he drove to Canada in his 1928 Model A Ford Sedan, going to Lake George, Montreal, and Quebec, returning via Boston, Massachusetts. HELLER advised while in Quebec they registered in the Hotel Hollywood as man and wife under his name. In Quebec he and VERA KANE purchased from the C. Aug Labrecque, 46 Rue de la Fabrique, two rugs, one of which he retained and the other VERA KANE kept.

HELLER pointed out that he has an album in the form of a scrap book in which he maintains souvenirs of various parties and affairs that he has attended. He displayed four ticket stubs dated June 8, 1934 to the "Stevedore" at the Civic Repertory Theatre in New York City. HELLER advised that he has a notation which indicates that he attended this performance with VERA KANE and THOMAS L. BLACK. He also displayed a ticket which indicated that he and VERA had taken a boat ride to Bear Mountain on June 17, 1934. He dis-

played tickets dated September 14, 1934 that indicated he and VER: K:NE had attended a performance of "Tobacco Road" at the 48th Street Theatre in New York City. He further advised that VER: had taken a two or three week vacation to visit her father in Albany, New York, at about this same time.

Concerning HELLER's residence with VER' KANE in 1933 and 1934, HELLER provided a list of associates which is similar to that provided by THOMAS L. BLACK mentioned previously in this report. He adds the following information or comments concerning these individuals:

CHARLES NEHER, alsa "Chuck." HELLER stated that NEHER was a graduate of Whitman College at Walla Walla, Washington, and was a chemist. His parents were farmers near Walla Walla in the period 1932 or 1934. He described NEHER as a "liberal" and a "pink." HELLER advised that as far as he knew NEHER was never an actual member of the Communist Party.

BUD COOK. HELLER described COOK as a cowboy and truck driver who was politically uneducated as compared with NEHER and the other members of the KINE circle. HELLER stated that COOK's father owned a ranch near Walla Walla.

Dr. JOSEPH SKILTON. HELLER described SKILTON as one of his closest friends since high school days, who visited a few times at VER. KANE's apartment while other members of the group were present. (SKILTON is a dentist practicing in Philadelphia and has been interviewed. Details will be set forth later in this report.)

J. BYRON McKINNEY. HELLER described McKINNEY as a Communist Party member, a heavy drinker, and a longshoreman or seaman. HELLER has not received any information concerning McKINNEY since approximately 1934.

HELLER stated that HARRY GOLD was never a regular visitor to VERA KANE's apartment during the time that HELLER resided with VERA. HELLER stated GOLD may have been in KANE's apartment on one or two occasions during parties, but he has no recollections of such visits.

STELL: SARIG. HELLER described SARIG as a librarian in the Allentown High School system in the 1930 period. She was a friend and associate of HELLER and KANE of the period 1933-1934.

MILTON LEHRLIN. HELLER described LEHRMAN as a druggist, Communist Party sympathizer who was associated with KANE and HELLER at this time and is now believed to reside in San Francisco, whose last address he was aware of was 1350 Sutter Street, San Francisco.

HELLER described VER. K.NE as highly intelligent, a graduate of Columbia University Law School, rather eccentric and very high strung. He stated she would now be about 48 to 50 years of age and that she had been married but separated from her husband. K.NE had one son by this marriage and HELLER believed he is now residing with the father. HELLER stated he never knew that K.NE was a member of the Communist Party, although he described her circle of friends as "ultra liberal," explaining that many were Communists.

HELLER provided information similar to that of THOLLS L. BLACK concerning his desire to go to Russia to obtain employment as a chemist. In the planning and preparation for such possible activities, HELLER stated conversations were conducted in the presence of KiNE, who appeared to be disinterested but well aware of the activities. HELLER and BLACK told KINE of their initial dealings with the Amtorg Trading Corporation, and that GAIK OVAKIMIAN, an Amtorg representative, had requested HELLER and BLACK to provide the Russian agency with information on technical processes. HELLER stated that KANE typed up at least one group of chemical formulae for him and BLICK, which were turned over by HELLER to PETERSEN. PETERSEN substituted for GAIK OVAKIMIAN, obtaining information which HELLER and BLACK had gathered concerning sulphonation of oils, which information had been obtained by BLACK from the National Oil Products Company. HELLER advised that this information was typed in VERA KINE's apartment on Saturday, October 23, 1934, and possibly completed on October 24. He stated that he dictated explanatory data concerning many of the formulae which would assist in clarifying and explaining the processes. HELLER advised that when VERA had finished typing the material, it was placed in an ordinary mailing envelope and left in KNE's apartment on a table until OV.KIMIAN or someone representing OV.KIMIAN would call for them.

In this connection, HELLER explained that he received a call from an individual on Monday, October 25; 1934, who identified himself as

PETERSEN, a friend of OV.XIIIAN, requesting the information. HELLER stated that he turned the material over to PETERSEN at a pre-arranged meeting place and told VERA that evening the information had been given the Russian agent.

Concerning the identity of the individual referred to as PETERSON, THOMAS L. BLACK and HARRY GOLD agree that BLACK introduced GOLD to a man who was then (1934) BLACK's superior and who became GOLD's Soviet superior. BLACK knew this individual as PAUL PETERSEN and GOLD knew him as PAUL SMITH, although GOLD later said there was some doubt as to whether the last name used was actually SMITH. BLACK and GOLD have independently furnished a description of this individual as a stocky man, 5'8"-5'9". Although the descriptions vary to some degree, they are generally consistent, bearing in mind that the incident took place approximately fifteen years ago. Their descriptions do not in any respect correspond with that given by HELLER of the man he met under the name PETERSON and there is no reason to believe that the last named is identical with the Soviet superior of BLACK and GOLD.

On November 1, 1934 HELLER started work at the Celluloid Corporation of America in Newark, New Jersey, and either that day or the next moved his belongings from the KANE apartment to Newark. HELLER advised that relations between him and VERA were strained and as a result he became separated from her. He explained that on November 7, 1934, he returned to KANE's apartment and found THOMAS L. BLACK there. He was jealous of BLACK's attention to KANE and inasmuch as he had been drinking considerably, accused BLACK and KANE of being extremely close. KANE slapped his face, as he recalled, and he left the KANE apartment.

HELLER explained that his friendship with K:NE was renewed on a very limited scale in approximately 1937.

HELLER recalled a visit to THOMAS BLACK's apartment in Newark when BLACK, HARTY GOID and an individual known as "JOHN L.", identified by BLACK as CHARLES FREEFIEID, and HELLER were present. At this time, in 1939, HELLER's notes on the American Chemical Paint Company formulae involving the Parkerizing process were written into complete form. HELLER said there was a discussion at this time concerning possibly giving the information to the Amtorg Trading Corporation. He stated the data was not given to Amtorg. It is to be noted this story varies from that of BLACK, who has said KANE was present and typed the report, making no mention of the presence of GOID or FREEFIEID.

On interview of June 17, 1950, by Special Agents WILLIAM

H NATIOR and ROBERT E. M.STERS, HELLER stated that his position in 1939 with the American Chemical Paint Company had become a bit shaky in that the concern had sold its rights to its rust-proofing treatment and he was afraid of losing his job. At this time he, DOROTHY WISWELL and VERA K.NE typed up formulae which he had obtained from the paint company, planning to use this in setting up his own business. He indicated that these formulae concerned phosphate coatings used in connection with rust-proofing of metal.

HELLER stated that he had taken copies of this information to New York in the form of library index cards, where they were copied by KINE and turned over to THOLLS L. BLICK. HELLER recalled that there had been some discussion about sending this information to the Amtorg Trading Corporation, but did not remember who made the suggestion. HELLER had obtained the processes of the American Chemical Paint Company for his own use in connection with his position in the laboratory of the concern, maintaining his own index system.

HELLER stated that he had attempted to secure from VERA KANE the copies of his index system typed by her; however, had been given the "run around." HELLER did not know their exact location now, indicated that he believed they were used in some espionage activity but was unable to provide details and said this was his assumption.

HELLER married DOROTHY WISWELL in 1943 and was divorced from her in 1945. Shortly after his divorce he stated that KANE visited him in Philadelphia for approximately one day. This day was spent in conversation, eating and drinking and he recalls little of the meeting except that at that time he inquired of HARRY GOID. HELLER stated that KANE told him to keep away from GOLD as GOLD was a bad egg. HELLER requested clarification and further information of KANE concerning this statement, but received no further information or explanation.

HELLER stated that during the World War II he was on a business trip for the American Chemical Paint Company in the vicinity of Gadsden, Alabama. He met in Gadsden, JOHN WALDO who he explained was a friend of VER. KINE. HELLER stated that WALDO was in the United States Army at the time and that this meeting was merely a social affair and of very short duration.

IV. MISCELL'NEOUS

A. INTERVIEW OF DR. JOSEPH D. SKILTON

Dr. JOSEPH D. SKILTON, Dentist, who resides at 26 Roseland

Avenue, Fox Chase Manor, Philadelphia, was interviewed by Special Agents JACK WALDMIN and ROBERT E. MISTERS on June 23, 1950. SKILTON advised that he has been a friend of HELLER since their student days in Northeast High School in Philadelphia. He said that HELLER and he had attended a party at VERA KANE's apartment in about 1933. He was unable to provide further details concerning the associates and activities of VERA KANE, stating that he had seen VERA KANE but one other time than that mentioned above. He did recall one individual who played a guitar and sang cowboy songs, whose first name was "CHUCK."

B. INTERVIEW OF DOROTHY WISWELL

On June 27, 1950, Miss DOROTHY WISWELL, former wife of FERDINAND P. HELLER, was interviewed by Special agents ROBERT E. MASTERS and JACK WALDMAN. She stated that she had met VERA KANE but three times, twice in KANE's apartment, the address of which she could not recall, and once in THOMAS L. BLACK's apartment, Chellis Austin Apartments, Newark, New Jersey. She said the first time she met VERA KANE was at a party at VERA's apartment and that the general conversation and tone of political discussion so bored her that she went to sleep. As she recalled, the participants talked about Communism and the new social order but she was unable to remember names of the individuals present because she met them only that one evening. She did recall that THOMAS L. BLACK was present and one individual who was a doctor and whose name was COPLEY.

She stated that one time later, the date of which she could not recall, she visited in New York City with HELIER and again went to KANE's apartment. At this time KANE and HELLER departed, disappearing for several hours. She stated she was left in the apartment with the individual known as COPLEY, remained for a short time and then went to her hotel. On the way to the hotel she stopped in a tavern with COPLEY for a few drinks. Shortly after her entry into the tavern KINE and HELLER entered. WISWELL stated she was never able to find out where they had been or how they know where to meet her. Miss WISWELL was unable to provide further details.

WISWELL was unable to recall typing with VIRA KINE a report or index cards for BLACK or HELLER.

In reference to STELL SARIG, a pretext telephone call was made on June 28, 1950 by Special Agent THOMAS F. HANNIGAN to the residence at 729 Tilghman Street, in Allentown, Pa., which had been indicated by HELLER as the last address of SARIG. Information reflects that a Mrs. FISHER of Reading, Pa., would know the whereabouts of SARIG, who had been married and was now living in Pittsburgh.

Subsequently on June 30, 1950 Special Agent JAY SMITH made a pretext call to Mrs. OFTO H. FISHER of 3713 St. Lawrence Avenue, Reading, and learned that SARIG is now Mrs. J. W. PATTERSON, residing at Dover Gables, House Number 8, 561 S. Megley Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa.

On June 19, 1950 HELIER provided Special agent ROBERT E. MASTERS with a cardboard box containing approximately 900 3 x 5 cards which bear various formulae and processes. According to HELLER, these cards are his notes concerning the processes of the American Chemical Paint Company, which in part were copied by K.NE at her apartment in New York City. HELLER has stated he believes K.NE retained the cards, but does not know their exact location now, and believed that they may have been turned over to Soviet répresentatives by K.NE or BL.CK. These cards have been forwarded to the Bureau by letter dated June 26, 1950 in connection with the investigation of HELLER for an analysis and evaluation.

HELIER on interview stated he recalled that VERN KINE had been employed by the United States Army as secretary to General HUGH DRUM. HELIER was unable to provide further details.

The leads in this case are often duplicates of leads already set out in the report of S. HOLLED A. SELRL, Philadelphia, 7/6/550, in the case entitled "FERDININD P. HELLER, was, Espionage - R."

The filing cabinet of FERDINAND P. HELIER, obtained by the Philadelphia Division, was forwarded the Laboratory by letter dated June 26, 1950, for analysis and evaluation.
