City advising that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had an outstandingly high academic record and that she was an alert, intelligent, well-informed person who used social work theory well.

A copy of a letter dated February 2, 1946 from MILDRED B. LOCKWOOD, Supervisor of Social Work, Department of Mental Hygiene, Brooklyn State Hospital, Brooklyn, New York reflects that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was a member of the staff from October 1943 to December 1944 and that GLASSMAN was an extremely enthusiastic and hard-working individual who was tireless in her efforts. Although new to psychiatric work, she adjusted very quickly.

A copy of a letter dated March 3, 1951 from FREDERICK HELMAN, Director, Casework Services, Jewish Board of Guardians, New York City reflected VIVIAN GLASSMAN was on the staff from April 1 to October 15, 1946 and was assigned to the Volunteer Department Service in the Ford Hall office. She established good working relations with the volunteers and was well organized in all of the administrative details involved in her job.

A copy of a letter dated February 20, 1951 from BERTHA C. REYNOLDS, Taughton, Massachusetts reflected that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was known at United Seamen's Service, Personal Service Department of National Maritime Union during the war. REYNOLDS was case supervisor of the professional staff. VIVIAN GLASSMAN was liaison between the NNU and the office of the Insurance Division when unemployment insurance benefits became available to seamen and was both a good organizer of detail to expedite application of education of both staffs as to the meaning of administrative policy. VIVIAN GLASSMAN was described as having an attractive personality, imagination, sensitivity to people.

A copy of letter dated February 20, 1951 from ELEANOR RAY, Director of Personnel, United Service for New Americans, New York City reflected VIVIAN GLASSMAN was employed as case-worker in the Migration Department from March 25, 1948 to November 30, 1950. She was a dynamic worker who comprehended quickly and applied theoretical knowledge to her case handling showed sound judgment and imagination, worked quickly and handled case-load skillfully especially her correspondence. Her letters were well organized and thoughts skillfully and clearly presented.

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INVESTIGATION TO LOCATE RUTH ROSENBAUM

STEPHEN JAVIA who operates the Magnetic Devices Corporation, 103 South Van Brunt Street, Englewood, New Jersey, and who has advised that he had known JULIUS ROSENBERG at the College of the City of New York and had given JULIUS ROSENBERG a contract in 1946 to manufacture caps and cores for a solenoid for which he, JAVIA, had contracts to manufacture for the Armed Services, has advised that he had been introduced to VIVIAN GLASSMAN in 1945 by a mutual friend named RUTH ROSENBAUM. RUTH ROSENBAUM'S whereabouts were unknown to JAVIA at the time of his interview on January 17, 1952. JAVIA stated that in 1946 RUTH ROSENBAUM advised that she had been divorced from her husband, LEON ROSENBAUM.

It was ascertained that RUTH ROSENBAUM had been employed at Face Contour, 730 Fifth Avenue, New York City, a beauty salon, under her maiden name of RUTH GABIEL in 1942.

Inquiry was made of Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, concerning Face Contour Incorporated, 730 Fifth Avenue, New York City. Informant advised that this firm was a dealer in wholesale and retail cosmetics and had formerly been located at 1 West 57th Street, New York City. Its most recent location was at Seventh Avenue and 53rd Street, New York City as of March 1951.

Informant stated that the firm was incorporated in New York on April 22, 1936 and had acquired certain assets of the Charmite Cosmetic Company, not incorporated, which business was a partnership of HEROLD LITNER and HILL E. LITNER, JR., who were the original President and Vice President-Secretary, respectively.

In 1949 the entire capital stock of Charmite Cosmetic Company was purchased by one EVELYN KELLY, widow of the late HAL KELLY, former prominent Broadway and Hollywood producer. Mrs. EVELYN KELLY became President and one ANNE LEE RICHARDS became Secretary of Face Contour Incorporated. Informant stated that the corporation discontinued operations in 1951 when the principal at interest, Mrs. EVELYN KELLY, left the New York area due to illness and had not returned as of March 1952.

On August 7, 1952 Mr. CHARLES GABIEL, 915 200 Avenue, Bronx, New York, telephone number KI 2-6624 telephonically advised Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, that he was the father of RUTH GABIEL who was formerly married to

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LEON ROSENBAUM, Mr. CASSEL advised informant that his daughter had been previously employed by the Columbia Broadcasting System in New York City and that she was now known as RUTH FROMA. He stated that RUTH FROMA was at present employed by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) and that she is at present located at 19 Avenue Kleber, Paris, France. He advised that her mailing address is as follows:

Concerning RUTH FROMA, information was received on November 29, 1948 from Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, that a flyer of the Radio Guild of the United Office and Professional Workers of America, CIO, 30 East 25th Street, New York City dated November 15, 1948, announced that the Radio Guild had renewed its agreement with the Columbia Broadcasting System covering 650 white collar and professional employees. The flyer reflected members of the union's negotiating committee, among whom was RUTH FROMA, Columbia Broadcasting System Chapter Chairman.

Information was also received by SA ROBERT L. ROYAL during an interview of Mrs. EILEEN M. KATZ, nee ALICE KATZ, 1475 Katcalf Avenue, Bronx, New York on November 2, 1950, that she, Mrs. KATZ, had known RUTH FROMA and her former husband LEON ROSENBAUM. Mrs. KATZ informed that LEON ROSENBAUM had sold the GARANT his Praxidos enlarger prior to going into military service.

The current Manhattan telephone directory reflects that G. M. ALLEN is Dr. G. MARGARY ALLEN, 312 West 71st Street, New York City. The 1950 American Medical Directory reflects that Dr. GENEVIEVE M. ALLEN was born in 1897 and attended Columbia University, College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City and graduated in 1927. Her office address is 312 West 71st Street, New York City. Her specialty is psychiatry and she is a member of the American Psychiatric Association.

References in the New York Office indices could not be identified with GENEVIEVE MARGARY ALLEN.

It was determined from Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, that a correspondent of subject on February 10, 1952 reflected as M. FLOCK, 246-40 Van Landt Avenue, Little Neck, New York, who it was believed was possibly MILWARD FLOCK a former girl friend of subject, was MICHAEL FLOCK residing at this address. Informant advised that MICHAEL FLOCK's wife's name was MILLICENT and that he was an optician with offices at 33-03 Mitmars Boulevard, Astoria, Long Island.

Confidential Informant T-13, of known reliability, advised on October 24, 1947 that MIKE FLOCK had been transferred to the Freeport, Long Island Club of the Communist Party and then because of a "change in the situation", wanted to be returned to the Kings Highway Club. This was done by transfer #18252, book #24512.

MICHAEL FLOCK resided at 1562 Ocean Avenue, Apartment 1A, Brooklyn, New York and was employed by the firm of H. F. Herman, Opticians, 1458 Madison Avenue, New York City. He was born February 29, 1915, Bronx, New York and was married to MILLICENT FLOCK. He moved to 246-40 Van Zandt Avenue, Little Neck, New York in 1949.

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INFORMANT CR-CA

On August 1, 1952 Confidential Informant T-10, of known reliability, was contacted and a photograph of subject was exhibited. T-10 advised that he had seen subject at Communist Party affairs but did not know her name. He stated that he had seen her at Webster Hall in New York City at a Communist Party function about two years ago or sometime in 1950.

Informant advised that he has never been present with subject at a closed Communist Party meeting and that he had only seen her at open meetings.

On July 28, 1952 Confidential Informant T-11, of known reliability, was contacted and shown a photograph of subject with negative results.

On March 22, 1952 the Bureau instructed that the desirability of issuing a subpoena for MARILYN MILLS, 33-11 74th Street, Jackson Heights, New York, DAVID MARIER, 209 Clinton Street, New York City and GLADYS MEYER SCALES, 36 Carr Street, Carrboro, North Carolina be discussed with the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York in view of their reluctance to furnish information to the FBI.

On July 11, 1952 this matter was discussed with Assistant United States Attorney JAMES P. KILGHEIMER, Southern District of New York who advised that he would be willing to issue a subpoena for recalcitrant witnesses to appear before a Federal Grand Jury, Southern District of New York.

At the trial of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL in the SDNY, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on 3/22/51 that MORTON SOBELL and his wife visited the ROSENBERG apartment at Knickerbocker Village and that among those present was VIVIAN GLASSMAN. ROSENBERG testified on 3/26/51 that he was introduced to VIVIAN GLASSMAN by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers; that he had been in the 65 Morton Street, NYC, apartment and had met ALFRED SARANT there through an introduction by JOEL BARR who was the boyfriend of VIVIAN GLASSMAN. Miss AVIS DELMAN advised that she believes that MAXWELL FINESTONE may have mentioned "VIV" or VIVIAN when he informed her that two sisters had planned to join him and his associate on a trip to Mexico which he took January-March, 1952, but that they were married suddenly and did not go. The sudden marriage of subject and her sister ELEANOR in January, 1952 recalled. Subject's brother MILTON vacated subject's husband's former apartment at 217 East 19 Street, NYC, on 11/1/52. Both are being sued for non-payment of rent. VIVIAN CARLIN, nee FRUCHTBAUM, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, NJ, terminated her

DETAILS:

DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty-year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, and an apartment in the vicinity of Twelfth Street and Avenue E.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG "mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on

Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans. ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment. b7D

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, *NY* but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL (also known to him as WILLIAM WUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT'S apartment, number 6-I, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945 ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBELO-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Norton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

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ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950 fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR'S sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girlfriend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions from PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at

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her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identity of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG'S apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, a third unidentified individual who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950, to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last

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recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERNER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX FINESTONE.

INFORMATION INDICATING SUBJECT'S
ACQUAINTANCE WITH MORTON SOBELL

MORTON SOBELL was indicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States and was tried with the ROSENBERGS in the Southern District of New York in March, 1951. He was convicted and sentenced to thirty years imprisonment. Testimony during the course of the trial by JULIUS ROSENBERG reflects that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was acquainted with MORTON SOBELL. On March 22, 1951

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In the afternoon court session of the trial of the ROSENBERGS and MORTON SOBELL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on direct examination that MORTON SOBELL and his wife had visited at the ROSENBERG'S home in Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, about Christmas, 1947 or 1948; that other people were present but that the only other person that ROSENBERG could remember was VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

JULIUS ROSENBERG'S TESTIMONY
REGARDING VIVIAN GLASSMAN

court

At the morning/session on March 26, 1951 under cross examination by the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, IRVING SAYPOL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified that he knows VIVIAN GLASSMAN and was introduced to her by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers. He believed that it might have occurred at a union headquarters. He stated that he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN off and on since 1939. He was unable to state how many times a year he saw her.

ROSENBERG stated that subject was JOEL BARR'S sweetheart and that BARR sometimes brought her to ROSENBERG'S home and that on other occasions ROSENBERG saw her at musicales. ROSENBERG testified that JOEL BARR left the country about the end of 1947 or the beginning of 1948 and that since that time he has seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN at his own home or at his shop but had never seen her at any gatherings.

ROSENBERG testified that in 1950 he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN a number of times and had seen her for the last time a couple of months before his arrest. He stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was a social worker and that he had discussed his problem child with her and that as a result of this discussion treatment of MICHAEL ROSENBERG was undertaken at the Jewish Board of Guardians. ROSENBERG denied giving VIVIAN GLASSMAN any money or sending her on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio. He stated that he had never heard of this trip or of the money before it was mentioned in the courtroom. He specifically

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denied giving GLASSMAN \$2,000.00 to take to Cleveland. ROSENBERG admitted that he may have read of VIVIAN GLASSMAN in a case in the newspaper a few weeks before. He testified that he did not read however that he had given her any money.

ROSENBERG admitted knowing ALFRED SARANT and saw him for the last time in late 1949 or early 1950. He testified that he saw SARANT at SARANT'S apartment and had gone there to borrow \$300.00 from him. He stated that SARANT gave him this sum and that he now owes SARANT a total of \$400.00.

ROSENBERG stated that he was introduced to ALFRED SARANT by JOEL BARR at an apartment that they were sharing in Greenwich Village. He recalled the number of the house was 65 but could not remember the street. He recognized Morton Street when the United States Attorney suggested it to him. ROSENBERG testified that his wife ETHEL was with him once when he went to the 65 Morton Street, New York City, apartment but he denied ever going there with MORTON SOBELL.

INTERVIEW OF MISS
AVIS DELMAN

On September 19, 1952 Miss AVIS DELMAN, 65 Morton Street, New York City, Apartment 6H, was interviewed by SA Robert F. Royal in regard to her knowledge of MAXWELL FINESTONE and his associates. She advised that in about April-May, 1952 one WALTER WYSS, 96-24 215 Street, Queens Village, Long Island, New York, contacted her regarding a market research job for a Chicago research firm and that in connection with this job she met FINESTONE. Thereafter, FINESTONE dated her on several occasions prior to and subsequent to a trip that he made to Canada in May-June, 1952. (FINESTONE left New York City from Idlewild Airport on May 14, 1952 destined for Montreal, Canada and returned about two weeks later).

Miss DELMAN advised that she recalls that FINESTONE had once mentioned that he had visited at 65 Morton Street, New York City, where she resides at present. She stated that she assumed that this someone was a girl and did not pry further concerning the identity of this individual.

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It is recalled that ALFRED SARANT rented Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 to January 31, 1950, and that subsequent to SARANT'S departure from New York City to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946 with his wife LOUISE, he allowed JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, HENRIETTA SAVIDGE, PERL'S present wife, and FINESTONE to use his apartment during parts of the period between September, 1946 and January 31, 1950.

This is the same apartment building utilized by JULIUS ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage apparatus. Miss DELMAN said that she did not recall FINESTONE ever mentioning the names of WILLIAM PERL, JOEL BARR, ALFRED or LOUISE SARANT, JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG or MORTON SOBELL, in conversation. She did recall that he may have mentioned the name "VIV" or VIVIAN in connection with information which he had furnished to her concerning two sisters who were allegedly planning to join FINESTONE and WALTER WYSS on a trip that FINESTONE and WYSS took to Mexico during January-March, 1952. She stated that FINESTONE advised her that these two sisters and possibly some other people were going with FINESTONE and WYSS and that at the last moment both were "married very suddenly".

MRS. ERNEST C. H. H.

It is recalled that VIVIAN GLASSMAN married ERNEST PATAKI and that her sister ELEANOR married EUGENE E. HUTNER on January 19th and January 20, 1952 respectively in New York City. Information obtained at subject's place of employment, Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, at the time of her marriage reflected that subject's marriage was very sudden and that she apparently had had no anticipation of the matter. Miss DELMAN advised that she is personally acquainted with MURIEL BOUDIN, who is the divorced wife of ARTHUR C. BOUDIN.

She said that MURIEL had claimed that she was never happy in her marriage to ARTHUR BOUDIN and desired a second chance; that she is now aspiring to be an actress and is residing at 505 West 52 Street, New York City. Miss DELMAN

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stated that MAX FINESTONE either mutually shares or owns an automobile with ARTHUR BOUDIN. It is noted that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed on April 5, 1951 leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE and to enter an automobile which was ascertained to be registered to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

A physical surveillance of FINESTONE has revealed that he is residing with ARTHUR BOUDIN at 500A Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOULIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950.

Concerning herself, Miss DELMAN advised that the name AVIS DELMAN is a stage name and she declined to furnish her legal name. She indicated that she was formerly married to an un-named man in Buffalo, New York during 1939-1940; they were subsequently divorced. She stated that while in Buffalo she was connected with a local theatrical group. She indicated that she had formerly lived with her family in Brooklyn, New York and had attended Brooklyn College for approximately three years. In approximately 1942 or 1943 she moved from New York to Los Angeles, California and for approximately one year had attempted to "break into" the movies but did not get past the screen test stage. While in Los Angeles, she was employed by SOL LESSER, a producer doing publicity and secretarial work. She admitted knowing DAVID PRESSMAN and indicated that she knew one "AL" HAMMER but that she definitely did not recall BEA HAMMER.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised in June, 1943 that information had been received in the form of a letter directed to the Communist Party Headquarters, 121 Haight Street, San Francisco, California, concerning one AVIS DELMAN. This letter was directed by the Communist Party of Los Angeles County to the Communist Party Headquarters at San Francisco, California and stated that AVIS DELMAN who had been residing in Los Angeles for two months had come there from New York City where she was a member of the Theatre Section of the Communist Party. AVIS DELMAN

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advised the Membership Director of Los Angeles County that she came without her transfer; that she had previously joined the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York and that for verification of her membership in that Party, BEA HAMMER and DAVID PRESSMAN should be contacted.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in February, 1944 that the name of AVIS DELMAN, also known as TULIP ~~CHESSMAN~~, appeared on the rolls of the Communist Party, USA as a member of Branch 1 which is a Communist branch composed mostly of people residing around the Wilshire Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue Area, Los Angeles, California; in 1943, she had Communist Party book number 26695 having transferred from New York in June, 1943. Miss DELMAN was asked if she was a member of the Communist Party, USA in Los Angeles in 1943, a member of the Theatrical Group of the Communist Party in New York City and the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York prior to that time but she refused to discuss it.

CORRESPONDENTS OF SUBJECT

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the LaFonda Indian Shop, Santa Fe, New Mexico on September 30, 1952.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that on May 9, 1952 one E. ~~HUTNER~~, 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York, was the addressor of correspondence to ARTHUR BOUDIN, 500A Grand Street, New York City. E. ~~HUTNER~~ is believed to be identical with ELEANOR ~~GLASSMAN HUTNER~~, subject's sister, who resides at the above address. ELEANOR ~~GLASSMAN~~ married EUGENE ~~HUTNER~~ of 335 East 17 Street, New York City, on January 20, 1952.

SUBJECT IN ATTENDANCE AT YOUNG PROGRESSIVES OF AMERICA DANCES

On March 24, 1952 Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised SAs ROBERT F. ROYAL, JOSEPH V. WATERS and the writer that JAMES WEINSTEIN, a roommate of MAX FINESTONE, at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, was an

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active member of and the Chairman in 1950-1951 of a club of the Young Progressives of America organization which held its meetings at 95 Avenue B, New York City, in a meeting hall on the top floor. (JAMES WEINSTEIN was an associate of MAX FINESTONE when both were students at Cornell University in 1949).

T-6 identified a photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, subject's sister, as individuals that he had seen at the Tompkins Park Playground, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and at Young Progressives of America dances. T-6 stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was also at a "peace vigil" held at the Central Palace Hall on the lower East Side of New York City during Christmas Week, December, 1951. T-6 stated that JAMES WEINSTEIN was also there but that he did not see WEINSTEIN and the GLASSMAN sisters speaking to each other and could not therefore state that they were acquainted with each other. T-6 could not identify photographs of ERNEST PATAKI, husband of VIVIAN GLASSMAN or of MAXWELL FINESTONE.

Concerning the Young Progressives of America organization, mentioned above, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the RAY FRIEDLANDER Club of the Communist Party was instructed to organize the Tompkins Square Club of the Young Progressives of America and that the organizer recruited nearly all of the members of the Tompkins Square Club. T-7 stated that instructions were to see that not more than 55 or 60 per cent of the Executive Committee of the Young Progressives of America were Communist Party members in order that the group might more effectively fight the tag of Communist.

INTERVIEW OF THOMAS BISHOP
217 East 19 Street
New York City

Mr. THOMAS BISHOP, Superintendent, 217 East 19 Street, New York City on October 29, 1952 advised that the subject's brother MILTON GLASSMAN, has been residing at this address in apartment 4A, which was formerly occupied by ERNEST PATAKI, without payment since April, 1952.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that the owner of the building, Mr. PHILIP KASSIER, had instituted court proceedings in May, 1952, to force MILTON GLASSMAN out of the apartment and that the court had issued an order for GLASSMAN to vacate the premises in forty-eight hours, but that GLASSMAN had an attorney appear in court and that the vacating order was amended to give GLASSMAN ninety days within which to vacate.

Mr. BISHOP stated that MILTON GLASSMAN does not appear to be employed as he is seen at the apartment day and night and that his personal appearance seems to indicate that he drinks alcoholic liquors heavily. Mr. BISHOP has noticed no visitors during the day or night and had not seen the subject at the apartment building within recent weeks.

On November 19, 1952, Mr. THOMAS BISHOP advised that a Sheriff's Order had been obtained on September 15, 1952 ordering PATAKI and MILTON GLASSMAN to vacate the premises at 217 East 19 Street by November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that on November 1, 1952 he had observed ERNEST PATAKI assisting MILTON GLASSMAN to move his effects out of the apartment and that they were placing furniture and other personal effects in a two-door Ford sedan bearing New York 1952 license No. 9024G.

Mr. BISHOP stated that he had observed PATAKI'S wife, the former VIVIAN GLASSMAN, at the apartment within recent weeks but did not recall whether or not she was present when PATAKI and GLASSMAN were emptying the apartment.

Mr. BISHOP stated that ERNEST PATAKI and MILTON GLASSMAN were being sued by PHILIP KASSIER, owner of the building, for non-payment of rent for the period between April, 1952 and November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that shortly before GLASSMAN and PATAKI vacated the apartment MILTON GLASSMAN had informed him that upon his arrival home one evening he had noticed that his apartment door had been "jimmied" open and that he was missing a portable radio and typewriter.

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Mr. RISHOP stated that he believes this occurred some time in late October, 1952 or early November, 1952, and that presumably GLASSMAN made a police report in this matter.

At the New York Motor Vehicle Bureau it was ascertained that New York 1952 license No. 9024G was registered on October 20, 1952 to MILTON GLASSMAN, 217 East 19 Street, New York City. The registration reflected that the automobile was a 1936 Ford sedan, color black, Serial No. 2355911.

At the Union Square Savings Bank, 245 First Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, made available the deposit and withdrawal record of the joint savings account of ERNEST FATAKI and his wife, VIVIAN, 131 East 7 Street, New York City, which reflected the following:

The "National Guardian" in January and February, 1952, was engaged in raising an appeal fund for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG.

PRESENT EMPLOYMENT AND RESIDENCE
OF VIVIAN FRUCHTEAUM CARLIN

On October 10, 1952 the Newark Division advised that a check of the records of the Credit Bureau of Passaic and Bergen Counties, Passaic, New Jersey, reflected that BENSON CARLIN and his wife, VIVIAN, reside at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey; that prior to moving to this address they resided at 6 West 75 Street, New York City. BENSON CARLIN was reported employed as an engineer for the Smith Meeker Engineering Company, 157 Chambers Street, New York City. His wife VIVIAN was reported employed by the United Service for New Americans, New York City, as a Vocational Counselor. Newark reported that numerous unsuccessful attempts had been made to contact VIVIAN CARLIN at her residence in order that she might be interviewed and that in view of the fact that she was believed to be presently employed in New York City that the New York Office conduct the interview of her at her place of employment.

At United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City, it was ascertained from Miss ELEANOR MATE, Personnel Director, that VIVIAN CARLIN, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, was no longer employed by this organization, having terminated her employment on October 10, 1952.

RESULTS OF SURVEILLANCE
OF SUBJECT

On October 13, 1952 the United States Supreme Court denied legal counsel for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL, writs of certiorari. A physical surveillance of subject was conducted following this court decision with the following results: ---

October 13th through October 17, 1952

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On October 13, 1952 no activity was noted

October 14, 1952 - SAS RICHARD A. MINIHAN and
PAUL J. BLASCO - 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

At 11:07 a.m. the subject left her residence at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, and boarded a North bound bus at the corner of Avenue A and Seventh Street, New York City, and left the bus at Eighth Avenue and 14 Street. She boarded an uptown Independent Eighth Avenue subway and left the train at the 168 Street stop where she boarded a bus bound for Fairlawn and Paterson, New Jersey.

At 12:40 p.m. she left the bus at Fairlawn, New Jersey and entered the Fair Spot Luncheonette, 32 Street and Broadway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she remained about ten minutes. She then walked to a residence at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she entered at 12:53 p.m.

At 7:20 p.m. the subject was observed by SAS RICHARD E. BRENNAN and ROBERT W. COHOLAN to leave 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, with an unidentified woman. VIVIAN GLASSMAN boarded a New York bound bus at Fairlawn Parkway and Broadway and the unidentified woman returned to the residence. GLASSMAN returned to her home by the same route she had previously taken and entered her residence at 8:50 p.m.

October 15, 1952- SAS ROBERT W. COHOLAN and
GEORGE M. OWEN

At 6:05 p.m. GLASSMAN was observed leaving her residence and entering a delicatessen at 129 East Seventh Street where she remained for five minutes and returned to her residence.

October 16, 1952 - SAS ARNOLD E. BRANDT and
WILLIAM D. WRIGHT III

At 7:40 p.m. subject was observed to leave her residence and board a North bound crosstown bus at Avenue A and East Eighth Street, New York City. At 14 Street and Seventh Avenue she left the bus and entered the IRT subway station

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boarding a downtown Seventh Avenue express train. She left the train at the Clark Street station in Brooklyn and walked to and entered an apartment building at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, at 8:18 p.m. She left 144 Henry Street at 9:15 and walked to an apartment house at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, New York. At 12:10 a.m. she left 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn and walked to the St. George Hotel at Henry and Clark Streets, where she boarded an IRT West Side express train and rode to the 14 Street stop in Manhattan. At 12:40 a.m. she boarded an East bound bus and was observed leaving the bus at East 8 Street and Avenue A and to enter her residence at 131 East 7 Street at 12:45 a.m.

It is known that the subject's sister ELEANOR GLASSMAN HUTNER resides at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York. It is also recalled that subject is acquainted with Dr. NATHAN BRENOWITZ whose residence is at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, and whose office is at 1 Hanson Place, Brooklyn, New York.

October 17, 1952 - SAS ARNOLD E. BRANDT
and GEORGE M. OWEN

At 8:15 p.m. the subject was observed leaving her apartment with a man answering the description of her husband, ERNEST PATAKI. They walked along Avenue A to the corner of Norfolk and Delancy Street, New York City, where at 8:35 they joined a group listening to speeches at a street rally conducted by the Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and the American Labor Party. At 10:00 p.m. the street rally was brought to a close and subject and her husband walked to the corner of Clinton Street and East Houston Street where they entered Weissberg's Soda Fountain and Luncheonette and were observed eating at the counter. At 10:30 p.m. they left the luncheonette and returned to their residence entering at 10:40 p.m.

The American Labor Party was cited as a Communist front by the Un-American Activities Committee of the United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944.

Following the denial of the ROSENBERGS' petition to the Supreme Court for a Writ of Certiorari which was denied on October 13, 1952 the ROSENBERGS' legal counsel petitioned the

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United States Supreme Court for a re-hearing of their original application which was denied by the Supreme Court on November 17, 1952.

A physical surveillance of the subject was conducted from November 17th to November 23, 1952 but no unusual activity on the part of the subject was noted between these dates.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

At the trial of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL in the SDNY, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on 3/22/51 that MORTON SOBELL and his wife visited the ROSENBERG apartment at Knickerbocker Village and that among those present was VIVIAN GLASSMAN. ROSENBERG testified on 3/26/51 that he was introduced to VIVIAN GLASSMAN by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers; that he had been in the 65 Morton Street, NYC, apartment and had met ALFRED SARANT there through an introduction by JOEL BARR who was the boyfriend of VIVIAN GLASSMAN. Miss AVIS DELMAN advised that she believes that MAXWELL FINESTONE may have mentioned "VIV" or VIVIAN when he informed her that two sisters had planned to join him and his associate on a trip to Mexico which he took January-March, 1952, but that they were married suddenly and did not go. The sudden marriage of subject and her sister ELEANOR in January, 1952 recalled. Subject's brother MILTON vacated subject's husband's former apartment at 217 East 19 Street, NYC, on 11/1/52. Both are being sued for non-payment of rent. VIVIAN CARLIN, nee FRUCHTBAUM, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, NJ, terminated her

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employment at United Service for New Americans, 10/10/52. No unusual activity by subject noted following denial of writ of certiorari to ROSENBERGS and SOBELL by Supreme Court. Banking information set out.

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DETAILS: DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty-year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, and an apartment in the vicinity of Twelfth Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELLITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED BARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on

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Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment. b7D

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT'S apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945 ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBEL-BOES and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

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ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950 fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR'S sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girlfriend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions from PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at

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her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identity of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG'S apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, a third unidentified individual who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950, to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last

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recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX FINESTONE.

INFORMATION INDICATING SUBJECT'S
ACQUAINTANCE WITH MORTON SOBELL

MORTON SOBELL was indicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States and was tried with the ROSENBERGS in the Southern District of New York in March, 1951. He was convicted and sentenced to thirty years imprisonment. Testimony during the course of the trial by JULIUS ROSENBERG reflects that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was acquainted with MORTON SOBELL. On March 22, 1951

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in the afternoon court session of the trial of the ROSENBERGS and MORTON SOBELL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on direct examination that MORTON SOBELL and his wife had visited at the ROSENBERG'S home in Enickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, about Christmas, 1947 or 1948; that other people were present but that the only other person that ROSENBERG could remember was VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

JULIUS ROSENBERG'S TESTIMONY
REGARDING VIVIAN GLASSMAN

court

At the morning/session on March 26, 1951 under cross examination by the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, IRVING SAYPOL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified that he knows VIVIAN GLASSMAN and was introduced to her by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers. He believed that it might have occurred at a union headquarters. He stated that he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN off and on since 1939. He was unable to state how many times a year he saw her.

ROSENBERG stated that subject was JOEL BARR'S sweetheart and that BARR sometimes brought her to ROSENBERG'S home and that on other occasions ROSENBERG saw her at musicales. ROSENBERG testified that JOEL BARR left the country about the end of 1947 or the beginning of 1948 and that since that time he has seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN at his own home or at his shop but had never seen her at any gatherings.

ROSENBERG testified that in 1950 he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN a number of times and had seen her for the last time a couple of months before his arrest. He stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was a social worker and that he had discussed his problem child with her and that as a result of this discussion treatment of MICHAEL ROSENBERG was undertaken at the Jewish Board of Guardians. ROSENBERG denied giving VIVIAN GLASSMAN any money or sending her on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio. He stated that he had never heard of this trip or of the money before it was mentioned in the courtroom. He specifically

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denied giving GLASSMAN \$2,000.00 to take to Cleveland. ROSENBERG admitted that he may have read of VIVIAN GLASSMAN in a case in the newspaper a few weeks before. He testified that he did not read however that he had given her any money.

ROSENBERG admitted knowing ALFRED SARANT and saw him for the last time in late 1949 or early 1950. He testified that he saw SARANT at SARANT'S apartment and had gone there to borrow \$300.00 from him. He stated that SARANT gave him this sum and that he now owes SARANT a total of \$400.00.

ROSENBERG stated that he was introduced to ALFRED SARANT by JOEL BARR at an apartment that they were sharing in Greenwich Village. He recalled the number of the house was 65 but could not remember the street. He recognized Morton Street when the United States Attorney suggested it to him. ROSENBERG testified that his wife ETHEL was with him once when he went to the 65 Morton Street, New York City, apartment but he denied ever going there with MORTON SOLL.

INTERVIEW OF MISS
AVIS DELMAN

On September 19, 1952 Miss AVIS DELMAN, 65 Morton Street, New York City, Apartment 6B, was interviewed by SA Robert F. Royal in regard to her knowledge of MAXWELL PINESTONE and his associates. She advised that in about April-May, 1952 one WALTER WYSE, 96-28 215 Street, Queens/Village, Long Island, New York, contacted her regarding a market research job for a Chicago research firm and that in connection with this job she met PINESTONE. Thereafter, PINESTONE dated her on several occasions prior to and subsequent to a trip that he made to Canada in May-June, 1952. (PINESTONE left New York City from Idlewild Airport on May 14, 1952 destined for Montreal, Canada and returned about two weeks later).

Miss DELMAN advised that she recalls that PINESTONE had once mentioned that he had visited at 65 Morton Street, New York City, where she resides at present. She stated that she assumed that this someone was a girl and did not pry further concerning the identity of this individual.

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It is recalled that ALFRED SARANT rented Apartment 61 at 65 Morton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 to January 31, 1950, and that subsequent to SARANT'S departure from New York City to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946 with his wife LOUISE, he allowed JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, HENRIETTA SAVIDGE, PERL'S present wife, and FINESTONE to use his apartment during parts of the period between September, 1946 and January 31, 1950.

This is the same apartment building utilized by JULIUS ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage apparatus. Miss DELMAN said that she did not recall FINESTONE ever mentioning the names of WILLIAM PERL, JOEL BARR, ALFRED or LOUISE SARANT, JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG or MORTON SOBELL, in conversation. She did recall that he may have mentioned the name "VIV" or VIVIAN in connection with information which he had furnished to her concerning two sisters who were allegedly planning to join FINESTONE and WALTER WYSS on a trip that FINESTONE and WYSS took to Mexico during January-March, 1952. She stated that FINESTONE advised her that there two sisters and possibly some other people were going with FINESTONE and WYSS and that at the last moment both were "married very suddenly".

It is recalled that VIVIAN GLASSMAN married ERNEST PATAKI and that her sister ELIZABETH married EUGENE L. HUNTER on January 19th and January 20, 1952 respectively in New York City. Information obtained at subject's place of employment, Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, at the time of her marriage reflected that subject's marriage was very sudden and that she apparently had had no anticipation of the matter. Miss DELMAN advised that she is personally acquainted with MURIEL BOUDIN, who is the divorced wife of ARTHUR C. BOUDIN.

She said that MURIEL had claimed that she was never happy in her marriage to ARTHUR BOUDIN and desired a second chance; that she is now aspiring to be an actress and is residing at 505 West 52 Street, New York City. Miss DELMAN

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stated that MAX FINESTONE either mutually shares or owns an automobile with ARTHUR BOUDIN. It is noted that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed on April 5, 1951 leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE and to enter an automobile which was ascertained to be registered to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

A physical surveillance of FINESTONE has revealed that he is residing with ARTHUR BOUDIN at 500A Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOUDIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950.

Concerning herself, Miss DELMAN advised that the name AVIS DELMAN is a stage name and she declined to furnish her legal name. She indicated that she was formerly married to an un-named man in Buffalo, New York during 1939-1940; they were subsequently divorced. She stated that while in Buffalo she was connected with a local theatrical group. She indicated that she had formerly lived with her family in Brooklyn, New York and had attended Brooklyn College for approximately three years. In approximately 1942 or 1943 she moved from New York to Los Angeles, California and for approximately one year had attempted to "break into" the movies but did not get past the screen test stage. While in Los Angeles, she was employed by SOL LESSER, a producer doing publicity and secretarial work. She admitted knowing DAVID PRESSMAN and indicated that she knew one "AL" HAMMER but that she definitely did not recall BEA HAMMER.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised in June, 1943 that information had been received in the form of a letter directed to the Communist Party Headquarters, 121 Haight Street, San Francisco, California, concerning one AVIS DELMAN. This letter was directed by the Communist Party of Los Angeles County to the Communist Party Headquarters at San Francisco, California and stated that AVIS DELMAN who had been residing in Los Angeles for two months had come there from New York City where she was a member of the Theatre Section of the Communist Party. AVIS DELMAN

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advised the Membership Director of Los Angeles County that she came without her transfer; that she had previously joined the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York and that for verification of her membership in that Party, BEA HAMMER and DAVID PRESSMAN should be contacted.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in February, 1944 that the name of AVIS DELMAN, also known as TULIP PRESSMAN, appeared on the rolls of the Communist Party, USA as a member of Branch 1 which is a Communist branch composed mostly of people residing around the Wilshire Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue Area, Los Angeles, California; in 1943, she had Communist Party book number 26695 having transferred from New York in June, 1943. Miss DELMAN was asked if she was a member of the Communist Party, USA in Los Angeles in 1943, a member of the Theatrical Group of the Communist Party in New York City and the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York prior to that time but she refused to discuss it.

CORRESPONDENTS OF SUBJECT

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the LaFonda Indian Shop, Santa Fe, New Mexico on September 30, 1952.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that on May 9, 1952 one E. HUTNER, 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York, was the addressor of correspondence to ARTHUR BOUNDIN, 5004 Grand Street, New York City. E. HUTNER is believed to be identical with ELEANOR GLASSMAN HUTNER, subject's sister, who resides at the above address. ELEANOR GLASSMAN married EUGENE HUTNER of 335 East 17 Street, New York City, on January 20, 1952.

SUBJECT IN ATTENDANCE AT YOUNG PROGRESSIVE OF AMERICA DANCES

On March 24, 1952 Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised SAs ROBERT F. ROYAL, JOSEPH V. WATERS and the writer that JAMES WEINSTEIN, a roommate of MAX FINESTONE, at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, was on

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active member of and the Chairman in 1950-1951 of a club of the Young Progressives of America organization which held its meetings at 95 Avenue E, New York City, in a meeting hall on the top floor. (JAMES WEINSTEIN was an associate of MAX FINESTONE when both were students at Cornell University in 1949).

T-6 identified a photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, subject's sister, as individuals that he had seen at the Tompkins Park Playground, Eighth Street and Avenue E, New York City, and at Young Progressives of America dances. T-6 stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was also at a "peace vigil" held at the Central Palace Ball on the lower East Side of New York City during Christmas week, December, 1951. T-6 stated that JAMES WEINSTEIN was also there but that he did not see WEINSTEIN and the GLASSMAN sisters speaking to each other and could not therefore state that they were acquainted with each other. T-6 could not identify photographs of ERNEST PATANI, husband of VIVIAN GLASSMAN or of MAXWELL FINESTEIN.

Concerning the Young Progressives of America organization, mentioned above, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the RAY FRIEDLANDER Club of the Communist Party was instructed to organize the Tompkins Square Club of the Young Progressives of America and that the organizer recruited nearly all of the members of the Tompkins Square Club. T-7 stated that instructions were to see that not more than 55 or 60 per cent of the Executive Committee of the Young Progressives of America were Communist Party members in order that the group might more effectively fight the tag of Communist.

INTERVIEW OF THOMAS BISHOP
217 East 19 Street
New York City

Mr. THOMAS BISHOP, Superintendent, 217 East 19 Street, New York City on October 29, 1952 advised that the subject's brother MILTON GLASSMAN, has been residing at this address in apartment 4A, which was formerly occupied by ERNEST PATANI, without payment since April, 1952.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that the owner of the building, Mr. PHILIP KASBIEH, had instituted court proceedings in May, 1952, to force MILTON GLASSMAN out of the apartment and that the court had issued an order for GLASSMAN to vacate the premises in forty-eight hours, but that GLASSMAN had an attorney appear in court and that the vacating order was amended to give GLASSMAN ninety days within which to vacate.

Mr. BISHOP stated that MILTON GLASSMAN does not appear to be employed as he is seen at the apartment day and night and that his personal appearance seems to indicate that he drinks alcoholic liquors heavily. Mr. BISHOP has noticed no visitors during the day or night and had not seen the subject at the apartment building within recent weeks.

On November 19, 1952, Mr. THOMAS BISHOP advised that a Sheriff's Order had been obtained on September 15, 1952 ordering PATAI and MILTON GLASSMAN to vacate the premises at 217 East 19 Street by November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that on November 1, 1952 he had observed ERNEST PATAI assisting MILTON GLASSMAN to move his effects out of the apartment and that they were placing furniture and other personal effects in a two-door Ford sedan bearing New York 1952 license No. 9024G.

Mr. BISHOP stated that he had observed PATAI'S wife, the former VIVIAN GLASSMAN, at the apartment within recent weeks but did not recall whether or not she was present when PATAI and GLASSMAN were emptying the apartment.

Mr. BISHOP stated that ERNEST PATAI and MILTON GLASSMAN were being sued by PHILIP KASBIEH, owner of the building, for non-payment of rent for the period between April, 1952 and November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that shortly before GLASSMAN and PATAI vacated the apartment MILTON GLASSMAN had informed him that upon his arrival home one evening he had noticed that his apartment door had been "jimmied" open and that he was missing a portable radio and typewriter.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that he believes this occurred some time in late October, 1952 or early November, 1952, and that presumably GLASSMAN made a police report in this matter.

At the New York Motor Vehicle Bureau it was ascertained that New York 1952 license No. 9024G was registered on October 20, 1952 to MILTON GLASSMAN, 217 East 19 Street, New York City. The registration reflected that the automobile was a 1936 Ford sedan, color black, Serial No. 2355911.

PRESENT EMPLOYMENT AND RESIDENCE
OF VIVIAN FRUCHTBAUM CARLIN

On October 10, 1952 the Newark Division advised that a check of the records of the Credit Bureau of Passaic and Bergen Counties, Passaic, New Jersey, reflected that BENSON CARLIN and his wife, VIVIAN, reside at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey; that prior to moving to this address they resided at 6 West 75 Street, New York City. BENSON CARLIN was reported employed as an engineer for the Smith Meeker Engineering Company, 157 Chambers Street, New York City. His wife VIVIAN was reported employed by the United Service for New Americans, New York City, as a Vocational Counselor. Newark reported that numerous unsuccessful attempts had been made to contact VIVIAN CARLIN at her residence in order that she might be interviewed and that in view of the fact that she was believed to be presently employed in New York City that the New York Office conduct the interview of her at her place of employment.

At United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City, it was ascertained from Miss ELEANOR KATZ, Personnel Director, that VIVIAN CARLIN, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, was no longer employed by this organization, having terminated her employment on October 10, 1952.

RESULTS OF SURVEILLANCE
OF SUBJECT

On October 13, 1952 the United States Supreme Court denied legal counsel for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL, writs of certiorari. A physical surveillance of subject was conducted following this court decision with the following results:

October 14, 1952 - SAs RICHARD A. MINIHAN and
PAUL J. BLASCO - 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

At 11:07 a.m. the subject left her residence at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, and boarded a North bound bus at the corner of Avenue A and Seventh Street, New York City, and left the bus at Eighth Avenue and 14 Street. She boarded an uptown Independent Eighth Avenue subway and left the train at the 168 Street stop where she boarded a bus bound for Fairlawn and Paterson, New Jersey.

At 12:40 p.m. she left the bus at Fairlawn, New Jersey and entered the Fair Spot Luncheonette, 32 Street and Broadway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she remained about ten minutes. She then walked to a residence at O-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she entered at 12:53 p.m.

At 7:20 p.m. the subject was observed by SAs RICHARD E. BRENNAN and ROBERT W. COHOLAN to leave O-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, with an unidentified woman. VIVIAN GLASSMAN boarded a New York bound bus at Fairlawn Parkway and Broadway and the unidentified woman returned to the residence. GLASSMAN returned to her home by the same route she had previously taken and entered her residence at 8:50 p.m.

October 15, 1952- SAs ROBERT W. COHOLAN and
GEORGE M. OWEN

At 6:05 p.m. GLASSMAN was observed leaving her residence and entering a delicatessen at 129 East Seventh Street where she remained for five minutes and returned to her residence.

October 16, 1952 - SAs ARNOLD E. BRANDT and
WILLIAM D. WRIGHT III

At 7:40 p.m. subject was observed to leave her residence and board a North bound crosstown bus at Avenue A and East Eighth Street, New York City. At 14 Street and Seventh Avenue she left the bus and entered the IRT subway station

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boarding a downtown Seventh Avenue express train. She left the train at the Clark Street station in Brooklyn and walked to and entered an apartment building at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, at 8:18 p.m. She left 144 Henry Street at 9:15 and walked to an apartment house at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, New York. At 12:10 a.m. she left 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn and walked to the St. George Hotel at Henry and Clark Streets, where she boarded an IRT West Side express train and rode to the 14 Street stop in Manhattan. At 12:40 a.m. she boarded an East bound bus and was observed leaving the bus at East 8 Street and Avenue A and to enter her residence at 131 East 7 Street at 12:45 a.m.

It is known that the subject's sister ELEANOR GLASSMAN BUTNER resides at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York. It is also recalled that subject is acquainted with Dr. NATHAN BRONSWITZ whose residence is at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, and whose office is at 1 Hanson Place, Brooklyn, New York.

October 17, 1952 - RAS ARNOLD E. RANDT
and GEORGE M. CUDN

At 8:15 p.m. the subject was observed leaving her apartment with a man answering the description of her husband, ERNEST PATALI. They walked along Avenue A to the corner of Norfolk and Delancy Street, New York City, where at 8:35 they joined a group listening to speeches at a street rally conducted by the Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and the American Labor Party. At 10:00 p.m. the street rally was brought to a close and subject and her husband walked to the corner of Clinton Street and East Houston Street where they entered Weissberg's Soda Fountain and luncheonette and were observed eating at the counter. At 10:30 p.m. they left the luncheonette and returned to their residence entering at 10:40 p.m.

The American Labor Party was cited as a Communist front by the Un-American Activities Committee of the United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944.

Following the denial of the ROSENBERGS' petition to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari which was denied on October 13, 1952 the ROSENBERGS' legal counsel petitioned the

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United States Supreme Court for a re-hearing of their original application which was denied by the Supreme Court on November 17, 1952.

A physical surveillance of the subject was conducted from November 17th to November 23, 1952 but no unusual activity on the part of the subject was noted between these dates.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

At the trial of JULIUS and EVEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL in the SDNY, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on 3/22/51 that MORTON SOBELL and his wife visited the ROSENBERG apartment at Knickerbocker Village and that among those present was VIVIAN GLASSMAN. ROSENBERG testified on 3/26/51 that he was introduced to VIVIAN GLASSMAN by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers; that he had been in the 65 Morton Street, NYC, apartment and had met ALFRED SARANT there through an introduction by JOEL BARR who was the boyfriend of VIVIAN GLASSMAN. Miss AVIS DELMAN advised that she believes that HAINELL PINKSTOCK may have mentioned "VIV" or VIVIAN when he informed her that two sisters had planned to join him and his associate on a trip to Mexico which he took January-March, 1952, but that they were married suddenly and did not go. The sudden marriage of subject and her sister ELRANOE in January, 1952 recalled. Subject's brother MILTON vacated subject's husband's former apartment at 217 East 19 Street, NYC, on 11/1/52. Both are being sued for non-payment of rent. VIVIAN CARLIN, nee FRUCHTBAUM, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, NJ, terminated her

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employment at United Service for New Americans, 10/10/52. No unusual activity by subject noted following denial of writ of certiorari to ROSENBERGS and SOBELL by Supreme Court. Banking information set out.

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DETAILS:

DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty-year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, and an apartment in the vicinity of Twelfth Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALBERT SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on

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Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment.

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ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT'S apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945 ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBEL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

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ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950 fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR'S sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girl-friend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 488487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions from PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at

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her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identity of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG'S apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, a third unidentified individual who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950, to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last

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recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL PINESTONE, with alias MAX PINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau Agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX PINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX PINESTONE who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX PINESTONE.

INFORMATION INDICATING SUBJECT'S
ACQUAINTANCE WITH MORTON SOBELL

MORTON SOBELL was indicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States and was tried with the ROSENBERGS in the Southern District of New York in March, 1951. He was convicted and sentenced to thirty years imprisonment. Testimony during the course of the trial by JULIUS ROSENBERG reflects that VIVIAN GLASMAN was acquainted with MORTON SOBELL. On March 22, 1951

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in the afternoon court session of the trial of the ROSENBERGS and MORTON SOBELL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on direct examination that MORTON SOBELL and his wife had visited at the ROSENBERG'S home in Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, about Christmas, 1947 or 1948; that other people were present but that the only other person that ROSENBERG could remember was VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

JULIUS ROSENBERG'S TESTIMONY
REGARDING VIVIAN GLASSMAN

court

At the morning/session on March 26, 1951 under cross examination by the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, IRVING SAYPOL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified that he knows VIVIAN GLASSMAN and was introduced to her by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers. He believed that it might have occurred at a union headquarters. He stated that he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN off and on since 1939. He was unable to state how many times a year he saw her.

ROSENBERG stated that subject was JOEL BARR'S sweetheart and that BARR sometimes brought her to ROSENBERG'S home and that on other occasions ROSENBERG saw her at musicales. ROSENBERG testified that JOEL BARR left the country about the end of 1947 or the beginning of 1948 and that since that time he has seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN at his own home or at his shop but had never seen her at any gatherings.

ROSENBERG testified that in 1950 he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN a number of times and had seen her for the last time a couple of months before his arrest. He stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was a social worker and that he had discussed his problem child with her and that as a result of this discussion treatment of MICHAEL ROSENBERG was undertaken at the Jewish Board of Guardians. ROSENBERG denied giving VIVIAN GLASSMAN any money or sending her on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio. He stated that he had never heard of this trip or of the money before it was mentioned in the courtroom. He specifically

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denied giving GLASSMAN \$2,000.00 to take to Cleveland. ROSENBERG admitted that he may have read of VIVIAN GLASSMAN in a case in the newspaper a few weeks before. He testified that he did not read however that he had given her any money.

ROSENBERG admitted knowing ALFRED SARANT and saw him for the last time in late 1949 or early 1950. He testified that he saw SARANT at SARANT's apartment and had gone there to borrow \$300.00 from him. He stated that SARANT gave him this sum and that he now owes SARANT a total of \$400.00.

ROSENBERG stated that he was introduced to ALFRED SARANT by JOEL KARR at an apartment that they were sharing in Greenwich Village. He recalled the number of the house was 65 but could not remember the street. He recognized Norton Street when the United States Attorney suggested it to him. ROSENBERG testified that his wife ESTEL was with him once when he went to the 65 Norton Street, New York City, apartment but he denied ever going there with MORTON BOWELL.

INTERVIEW OF MISS
AVIS DELMAN

On September 19, 1952 Miss AVIS DELMAN, 65 Norton Street, New York City, Apartment 6A, was interviewed by SA Robert P. Royal in regard to her knowledge of MAXWELL FINESTONE and his associates. She advised that in about April-May, 1952 one WALTER WYSS, 96-24 215 Street, Queens Village, Long Island, New York, contacted her regarding a market research job for a Chicago research firm and that in connection with this job she met FINESTONE. Thereafter, FINESTONE dated her on several occasions prior to and subsequent to a trip that he made to Canada in May-June, 1952. (FINESTONE left New York City from Idlewild Airport on May 14, 1952 destined for Montreal, Canada and returned about two weeks later).

Miss DELMAN advised that she recalls that FINESTONE had once mentioned that he had visited at 65 Norton Street, New York City, where she resides at present. She stated that she assumed that this someone was a girl and did not pry further concerning the identity of this individual.

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It is recalled that ALFRED SARANT rented Apartment 6I at 65 Morton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 to January 31, 1950, and that subsequent to SARANT'S departure from New York City to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946 with his wife LOUISE, he allowed JOEL BARR, WILLIAM FAHL, HENRIETTA SAVIDGE, PERL'S present wife, and FINESTONE to use his apartment during parts of the period between September, 1946 and January 31, 1950.

This is the same apartment building utilized by JULIUS ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage apparatus. Miss DELMAN said that she did not recall FINESTONE ever mentioning the names of WILLIAM PERL, JOEL BARR, ALFRED or LOUISE SARANT, JULIUS or EVEL ROSENBERG or MORTON SOBELL, in conversation. She did recall that he may have mentioned the name "VIV" or VIVIAN in connection with information which he had furnished to her concerning two sisters who were allegedly planning to join FINESTONE and WALTER WYSS on a trip that FINESTONE and WYSS took to Mexico during January-March, 1952. She stated that FINESTONE advised her that these two sisters and possibly some other people were going with FINESTONE and WYSS and that at the last moment both were "married very suddenly".

It is recalled that VIVIAN GLASSMAN married ERNEST PATARI and that her sister ELEANOR married EUGENE E. M. THER on January 19th and January 20, 1952 respectively in New York City. Information obtained at subject's place of employment, Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, at the time of her marriage reflected that subject's marriage was very sudden and that she apparently had had no anticipation of the matter. Miss DELMAN advised that she is personally acquainted with MURIEL BOUDIN, who is the divorced wife of ARTHUR C. BOUDIN.

She said that MURIEL had claimed that she was never happy in her marriage to ARTHUR BOUDIN and desired a second chance; that she is now aspiring to be an actress and is residing at 505 West 52 Street, New York City. Miss DELMAN

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stated that MAX FINESTONE either mutually shares or owns an automobile with ARTHUR BOUDIN. It is noted that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed on April 5, 1951 leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE and to enter an automobile which was ascertained to be registered to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

A physical surveillance of FINESTONE has revealed that he is residing with ARTHUR BOUDIN at 5004 Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOUDIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950.

Concerning herself, Miss DELMAN advised that the name AVIS DELMAN is a stage name and she declined to furnish her legal name. She indicated that she was formerly married to an un-named man in Buffalo, New York during 1939-1940; they were subsequently divorced. She stated that while in Buffalo she was connected with a local theatrical group. She indicated that she had formerly lived with her family in Brooklyn, New York and had attended Brooklyn College for approximately three years. In approximately 1942 or 1943 she moved from New York to Los Angeles, California and for approximately one year had attempted to "break into" the movies but did not get past the screen test stage. While in Los Angeles, she was employed by SOL LESSER, a producer doing publicity and secretarial work. She admitted knowing DAVID FRIEDMAN and indicated that she knew one "AL" HANMER but that she definitely did not recall BEA HANMER.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised in June, 1943 that information had been received in the form of a letter directed to the Communist Party Headquarters, 121 Nait Street, San Francisco, California, concerning one AVIS DELMAN. This letter was directed by the Communist Party of Los Angeles County to the Communist Party Headquarters at San Francisco, California and stated that AVIS DELMAN who had been residing in Los Angeles for two months had come there from New York City where she was a member of the Theatre Section of the Communist Party. AVIS DELMAN

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advised the Membership Director of Los Angeles County that she came without her transfer; that she had previously joined the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York and that for verification of her membership in that Party, BEN HANKE and DAVID PRESSMAN should be contacted.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in February, 1944 that the name of AVIS DELMAN, also known as TULIP CRESSMAN, appeared on the rolls of the Communist Party, USA as a member of Branch 1 which is a Communist branch composed mostly of people residing around the Wilshire Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue Area, Los Angeles, California; in 1943, she had Communist Party book number 20695 having transferred from New York in June, 1943. Miss DELMAN was asked if she was a member of the Communist Party, USA in Los Angeles in 1943, a member of the Theatrical Group of the Communist Party in New York City and the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York prior to that time but she refused to discuss it.

CORRESPONDENTS OF SUBJECT

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the Lapenda Indian Shop, Santa Fe, New Mexico on September 30, 1952.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that on May 9, 1952 one E. RUTHER, 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York, was the addressor of correspondence to ARTHUR BOUDIN, 500A Grand Street, New York City. E. RUTHER is believed to be identical with ELEANOR GLASMAN RUTHER, subject's sister, who resides at the above address. ELEANOR GLASMAN married EUGENE RUTHER of 115 East 17 Street, New York City, on January 20, 1952.

SUBJECT IN ATTENDANCE AT YOUNG PROGRESSIVE OF AMERICA DANCES

On March 24, 1952 Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised SAs ROBERT F. ROYAL, JOSEPH V. WATERS and the writer that JAMES WINSTON, a roommate of MAX PINKSTONE, at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, was an

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active member of and the Chairman in 1950-1951 of a club of the Young Progressives of America organization which held its meetings at 95 Avenue B, New York City, in a meeting hall on the top floor. (JAMES WEINSTEIN was an associate of MAX FINESTONE when both were students at Cornell University in 1949).

T-6 identified a photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, subject's sister, as individuals that he had seen at the Tompkins Park Playground, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and at Young Progressives of America dances. T-6 stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was also at a "peace vigil" held at the Central Palace Hall on the lower East side of New York City during Christmas Week, December, 1951. T-6 stated that JAMES WEINSTEIN was also there but that he did not see WEINSTEIN and the GLASSMAN sisters speaking to each other and could not therefore state that they were acquainted with each other. T-6 could not identify photographs of ERNEST PATALI, husband of VIVIAN GLASSMAN or of MAXWELL WEINSTEIN.

Concerning the Young Progressives of America organization, mentioned above, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the RAY FRIEDLANDER Club of the Communist Party was instructed to organize the Tompkins Square Club of the Young Progressives of America and that the organizer recruited nearly all of the members of the Tompkins Square Club. T-7 stated that instructions were to see that not more than 55 or 60 per cent of the Executive Committee of the Young Progressives of America were Communist Party members in order that the group might more effectively fight the tag of Communist.

INTERVIEW OF THOMAS BISHOP
217 East 19 Street
New York City

Mr. THOMAS BISHOP, Superintendent, 217 East 19 Street, New York City on October 29, 1952 advised that the subject's brother MILTON GLASSMAN, has been residing at this address in apartment 4A, which was formerly occupied by ERNEST PATALI, without payment since April, 1952.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that the owner of the building, Mr. PHILIP KASSIRER, had instituted court proceedings in May, 1952, to force MILTON GLASSMAN out of the apartment and that the court had issued an order for GLASSMAN to vacate the premises in forty-eight hours, but that GLASSMAN had an attorney appear in court and that the vacating order was amended to give GLASSMAN ninety days within which to vacate.

Mr. BISHOP stated that MILTON GLASSMAN does not appear to be employed as he is seen at the apartment day and night and that his personal appearance seems to indicate that he drinks alcoholic liquors heavily. Mr. BISHOP has noticed no visitors during the day or night and had not seen the subject at the apartment building within recent weeks.

In November 19, 1952, Mr. THOMAS BISHOP advised that a Sheriff's Order had been obtained on September 15, 1952 ordering PATAI and MILTON GLASSMAN to vacate the premises at 217 East 19 Street by November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that on November 1, 1952 he had observed ERNEST PATAI assisting MILTON GLASSMAN to move his effects out of the apartment and that they were placing furniture and other personal effects in a two-door Ford sedan bearing New York 1952 license No. 9024G.

Mr. BISHOP stated that he had observed PATAI's wife, the former VIVIAN GLASSMAN, at the apartment within recent weeks but did not recall whether or not she was present when PATAI and GLASSMAN were emptying the apartment.

Mr. BISHOP stated that ERNEST PATAI and MILTON GLASSMAN were being sued by PHILIP KASSIRER, owner of the building, for non-payment of rent for the period between April, 1952 and November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that shortly before GLASSMAN and PATAI vacated the apartment MILTON GLASSMAN had informed him that upon his arrival home one evening he had noticed that his apartment door had been "jimmied" open and that he was missing a portable radio and typewriter.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that he believes this occurred some time in late October, 1952 or early November, 1952, and that presumably GLASSMAN made a police report in this matter.

At the New York Motor Vehicle Bureau it was ascertained that New York 1952 license No. 90240 was registered on October 20, 1952 to MILTON GLASSMAN, 217 East 19 Street, New York City. The registration reflected that the automobile was a 1936 Ford sedan, color black, Serial No. 2355911.

BANKING INFORMATION

At the Union Square Savings Bank, 245 First Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, made available the deposit and withdrawal record of the joint savings account of ERNEST PATAKI and his wife, VIVIAN, 131 East 7 Street, New York City, which reflected the following:

PRESENT EMPLOYMENT AND RESIDENCE
OF VIVIAN FRECHTBAUM CARLIN

On October 10, 1952 the Newark Division advised that a check of the records of the Credit Bureau of Passaic and Bergen Counties, Passaic, New Jersey, reflected that BENSON CARLIN and his wife, VIVIAN, reside at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey; that prior to moving to this address they resided at 6 West 75 Street, New York City. BENSON CARLIN was reported employed as an engineer for the Smith Necker Engineering Company, 157 Chambers Street, New York City. His wife VIVIAN was reported employed by the United Service for New Americans, New York City, as a Vocational Counselor. Newark reported that numerous unsuccessful attempts had been made to contact VIVIAN CARLIN at her residence in order that she might be interviewed and that in view of the fact that she was believed to be presently employed in New York City that the New York Office conduct the interview of her at her place of employment.

At United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City, it was ascertained from Miss ELEANOR HATZ, Personnel Director, that VIVIAN CARLIN, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, was no longer employed by this organization, having terminated her employment on October 10, 1952.

RESULTS OF SURVEILLANCE
OF SUBJECT

On October 13, 1952 the United States Supreme Court denied legal counsel for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL, writs of certiorari. A physical surveillance of subject was conducted following this court decision with the following results:

October 13th through October 17, 1952

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On October 13, 1952 no activity was noted

October 14, 1952 - SAs RICHARD A. MINIHAN and
PAUL J. BLASCO - 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

At 11:07 a.m. the subject left her residence at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, and boarded a North bound bus at the corner of Avenue A and Seventh Street, New York City, and left the bus at Eighth Avenue and 14 Street. She boarded an Uptown Independent Eighth Avenue subway and left the train at the 168 Street stop where she boarded a bus bound for Fairlawn and Paterson, New Jersey.

At 12:40 p.m. she left the bus at Fairlawn, New Jersey and entered the Fair Spot Luncheonette, 32 Street and Broadway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she remained about ten minutes. She then walked to a residence at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she entered at 12:53 p.m.

At 7:20 p.m. the subject was observed by SAs RICHARD E. BREKMAN and ROBERT W. COHOLAN to leave 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, with an unidentified woman. VIVIAN GLASMAN boarded a New York bound bus at Fairlawn Parkway and Broadway and the unidentified woman returned to the residence. GLASMAN returned to her home by the same route she had previously taken and entered her residence at 8:50 p.m.

October 15, 1952- SAs ROBERT W. COHOLAN and
GREGORY M. CHEN

At 6:05 p.m. GLASMAN was observed leaving her residence and entering a delicatessen at 129 East Seventh Street where she remained for five minutes and returned to her residence.

October 16, 1952 - SAs ARNOLD E. BRANDT and
WILLIAM D. WHOLEY III

At 7:40 p.m. subject was observed to leave her residence and board a North bound crosstown bus at Avenue A and East Eighth Street, New York City. At 14 Street and Seventh Avenue she left the bus and entered the IRT subway station

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Boarding a downtown Seventh Avenue express train. She left the train at the Clark Street station in Brooklyn and walked to and entered an apartment building at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, at 8:18 p.m. She left 144 Henry Street at 9:15 and walked to an apartment house at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, New York. At 12:10 a.m. she left 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn and walked to the St. George Hotel at Henry and Clark Streets, where she boarded an IRT West Side express train and rode to the 14 Street stop in Manhattan. At 12:40 a.m. she boarded an East bound bus and was observed leaving the bus at East 8 Street and Avenue A and to enter her residence at 131 East 7 Street at 12:45 a.m.

It is known that the subject's sister BLANK GLASSMAN BUTLER resides at 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York. It is also recalled that subject is acquainted with Dr. NATHAN BRINOWITZ whose residence is at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, and whose office is at 1 Hanson Place, Brooklyn, New York.

October 17, 1952 - SAs ARNOLD E. BRANT
and GEORGE H. OWEN

At 8:15 p.m. the subject was observed leaving her apartment with a man answering the description of her husband, ERNEST PATAI. They walked along Avenue A to the corner of Norfolk and Melaney Street, New York City, where at 8:35 they joined a group listening to speeches at a street rally conducted by the Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and the American Labor Party. At 10:00 p.m. the street rally was brought to a close and subject and her husband walked to the corner of Clinton Street and East Houston Street where they entered Weissberg's Soda Fountain and Luncheonette and were observed eating at the counter. At 10:30 p.m. they left the luncheonette and returned to their residence entering at 10:40 p.m.

The American Labor Party was cited as a Communist front by the Un-American Activities Committee of the United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944.

Following the denial of the ROSENBERGS' petition to the Supreme Court for a writ of Certiorari which was denied on October 13, 1952 the ROSENBERGS' legal counsel petitioned the

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United States Supreme Court for a re-hearing of their original application which was denied by the Supreme Court on November 17, 1952.

A physical surveillance of the subject was conducted from November 17th to November 23, 1952 but no unusual activity on the part of the subject was noted between these dates.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

At the trial of JULIUS and EVEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL in the SDNY, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on 3/22/51 that MORTON SOBELL and his wife visited the ROSENBERG apartment at Knickerbocker Village and that among those present was VIVIAN GLASSMAN. ROSENBERG testified on 3/26/51 that he was introduced to VIVIAN GLASSMAN by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers; that he had been in the 65 Norton Street, NYC, apartment and had met ALFRED SARANT there through an introduction by JOEL BARR who was the boyfriend of VIVIAN GLASSMAN. Miss AVIS DELMAN advised that she believes that MAXWELL FINESTONE may have mentioned "VIV" or VIVIAN when he informed her that two sisters had planned to join him and his associate on a trip to Mexico which he took January-March, 1952, but that they were married suddenly and did not go. The sudden marriage of subject and her sister ELEANOR in January, 1952 recalled. Subject's brother MILTON vacated subject's husband's former apartment at 217 East 19 Street, NYC, on 11/1/52. Both are being sued for non-payment of rent. VIVIAN CARLIN, nee FRUCHTBAUM, O-67 Fairlane Parkway, Fallawn, NJ, terminated her

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employment at United Service for New Americans, 10/10/54. No unusual activity by subject noted following denial of writ of certiorari to ROSENBERGS and SURELL by Supreme Court. Banking information set out.

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DETAILS:

DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty-year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City, and an apartment in the vicinity of Twelfth Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANY from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on

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Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment. b7D

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL (also known to him as WILLIAM NUTTKERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELEN, were together in SARANT'S apartment, Number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945 ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACKELINE RUEHL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

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ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950 fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR'S sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girlfriend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions from PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at

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her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identity of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG'S apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, a third unidentified individual who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950, to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last

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recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE who was born on July 26, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX FINESTONE.

INFORMATION INDICATING SUBJECT'S
ACQUAINTANCE WITH MORTON SOBELL

MORTON SOBELL was indicted with JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States and was tried with the ROSENBERGS in the Southern District of New York in March, 1951. He was convicted and sentenced to thirty years imprisonment. Testimony during the course of the trial by JULIUS ROSENBERG reflects that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was acquainted with MORTON SOBELL. On March 22, 1951

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In the afternoon court session of the trial of the ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified on direct examination that MORTON SOBELL and his wife had visited at the ROSENBERG's home in Knickerbocker Village, 10 Monroe Street, New York City, about Christmas, 1947 or 1948; that other people were present but that the only other person that ROSENBERG could remember was VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

JULIUS ROSENBERG'S TESTIMONY
REGARDING VIVIAN GLASSMAN

court

At the morning/session on March 26, 1951 under cross examination by the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, IRVING SAYPOL, JULIUS ROSENBERG testified that he knows VIVIAN GLASSMAN and was introduced to her by JOEL BARR many years ago at a place that he no longer remembers. He believed that it might have occurred at a union headquarters. He stated that he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN off and on since 1939. He was unable to state how many times a year he saw her.

ROSENBERG stated that subject was JOEL BARR'S sweetheart and that BARR sometimes brought her to ROSENBERG'S home and that on other occasions ROSENBERG saw her at musicales. ROSENBERG testified that JOEL BARR left the country about the end of 1947 or the beginning of 1948 and that since that time he has seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN at his own home or at his shop but had never seen her at any gatherings.

ROSENBERG testified that in 1950 he had seen VIVIAN GLASSMAN a number of times and had seen her for the last time a couple of months before his arrest. He stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was a social worker and that he had discussed his problem child with her and that as a result of this discussion treatment of MICHAEL ROSENBERG was undertaken at the Jewish Board of Guardians. ROSENBERG denied giving VIVIAN GLASSMAN any money or sending her on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio. He stated that he had never heard of this trip or of the money before it was mentioned in the courtroom. He specifically

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denied giving GLASSMAN \$2,000.00 to take to Cleveland. ROSENBERG admitted that he may have read of VIVIAN GLASSMAN in a case in the newspaper a few weeks before. He testified that he did not read however that he had given her any money.

ROSENBERG admitted knowing ALFRED SARANT and saw him for the last time in late 1949 or early 1950. He testified that he saw SARANT at SARANT'S apartment and had gone there to borrow \$300.00 from him. He stated that SARANT gave him this sum and that he now owes SARANT a total of \$400.00.

ROSENBERG stated that he was introduced to ALFRED SARANT by JOEL LARR at an apartment that they were sharing in Greenwich Village. He recalled the number of the house was 65 but could not remember the street. He recognized Norton Street when the United States Attorney suggested it to him. ROSENBERG testified that his wife ETHEL was with him once when he went to the 65 Norton Street, New York City, apartment but he denied ever going there with MORTON SOBELL.

INTERVIEW OF MISS
AVIS DELMAN

On September 19, 1952 Miss AVIS DELMAN, 65 Norton Street, New York City, Apartment 6H, was interviewed by SA Robert P. Royal in regard to her knowledge of MAXWELL FINESTONE and his associates. She advised that in about April-May, 1952 one WALTER WYSE, 96-24 215 Street, Queens Village, Long Island, New York, contacted her regarding a market research job for a Chicago research firm and that in connection with this job she met FINESTONE. Thereafter, FINESTONE dated her on several occasions prior to and subsequent to a trip that he made to Canada in May-June, 1952. (FINESTONE left New York City from Idlewild Airport on May 14, 1952 destined for Montreal, Canada and returned about two weeks later).

Miss DELMAN advised that she recalls that FINESTONE had once mentioned that he had visited at 65 Norton Street, New York City, where she resides at present. She stated that she assumed that this someone was a girl and did not pry further concerning the identity of this individual.

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It is recalled that ALFRED SARANT rented Apartment 61 at 65 Norton Street, New York City, from October, 1943 to January 11, 1950, and that subsequent to SARANT's departure from New York City to Ithaca, New York, in September, 1946 with his wife LOUISE, he allowed JOEL BARK, WILLIAM FRIE, HENRIETTA SAVIDGE, FRIE's present wife, and FINESTONE to use his apartment during parts of the period between September, 1946 and January 11, 1950.

This is the same apartment building utilized by JULIUS ROSENBERG in connection with his espionage apparatus. Miss DELMAN said that she did not recall FINESTONE ever mentioning the names of WILLIAM FRIE, JOEL BARK, ALFRED or LOUISE SARANT, JULIUS or ETHEL ROSENBERG or MORTON SOBELL, in conversation. She did recall that he may have mentioned the name "VIV" or VIVIAN in connection with information which he had furnished to her concerning two sisters who were allegedly planning to join FINESTONE and WALTER WYSS on a trip that FINESTONE and WYSS took to Mexico during January-March, 1952. She stated that FINESTONE advised her that these two sisters and possibly some other people were going with FINESTONE and WYSS and that at the last moment both were "married very suddenly".

It is recalled that VIVIAN GLASMAN married ERNEST PAPAKI and that her sister ELEANOR married RUDOLPH E. K. KIRK on January 19th and January 20, 1952 respectively in New York City. Information obtained at subject's place of employment, Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, at the time of her marriage reflected that subject's marriage was very sudden and that she apparently had had no anticipation of the matter. Miss DELMAN advised that she is personally acquainted with MURIEL BOUDIN, who is the divorced wife of ARTHUR C. BOUDIN.

She said that MURIEL had claimed that she was never happy in her marriage to ARTHUR BOUDIN and desired a second chance; that she is now aspiring to be an actress and is residing at 505 West 52 Street, New York City. Miss DELMAN

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stated that MAX FINESTONE either mutually shares or owns an automobile with ARTHUR BOUDIN. It is noted that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed on April 5, 1951 leaving her apartment at 111 East Seventh Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE and to enter an automobile which was ascertained to be registered to ARTHUR BOUDIN.

A physical surveillance of FINESTONE has revealed that he is residing with ARTHUR BOUDIN at 500A Grand Street, New York City. ARTHUR BOUDIN is the brother of LEONARD B. BOUDIN, the lawyer consulted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN immediately after her interview by Bureau agents on August 3, 1950.

Concerning herself, Miss DELMAN advised that the name AVIS DELMAN is a stage name and she declined to furnish her legal name. She indicated that she was formerly married to an un-named man in Buffalo, New York during 1939-1948; they were subsequently divorced. She stated that while in Buffalo she was connected with a local theatrical group. She indicated that she had formerly lived with her family in Brooklyn, New York and had attended Brooklyn College for approximately three years. In approximately 1942 or 1943 she moved from New York to Los Angeles, California and for approximately one year had attempted to "break into" the movies but did not get past the screen test stage. While in Los Angeles, she was employed by SOL LESSER, a producer doing publicity and secretarial work. She admitted knowing DAVID PRESSMAN and indicated that she knew one "AL" HANDEK but that she definitely did not recall ERA HANDEK.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised in June, 1943 that information had been received in the form of a letter directed to the Communist Party Headquarters, 121 Naught Street, San Francisco, California, concerning one AVIS DELMAN. This letter was directed by the Communist Party of Los Angeles County to the Communist Party Headquarters at San Francisco, California and stated that AVIS DELMAN who had been residing in Los Angeles for two months had come there from New York City where she was a member of the Theatre Section of the Communist Party. AVIS DELMAN

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advised the Membership Director of Los Angeles County that she came without her transfer; that she had previously joined the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York and that for verification of her membership in that Party, BEA HANNAH and DAVID PRESSMAN should be contacted.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised in February, 1944 that the name of AVIS DELMAN, also known as TULIP GREENMAN, appeared on the rolls of the Communist Party, USA as a member of Branch 1 which is a Communist branch composed mostly of people residing around the Wilshire Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue Area, Los Angeles, California; in 1943, she had Communist Party book number 26695 having transferred from New York in June, 1943. Miss DELMAN was asked if she was a member of the Communist Party, USA in Los Angeles in 1943, a member of the Theatrical Group of the Communist Party in New York City and the Communist Party in Buffalo, New York prior to that time but she refused to discuss it.

CORRESPONDENTS OF SUBJECT

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the Lapenda Indian Shop, Santa Fe, New Mexico on September 30, 1952.

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that on May 9, 1952 one E. BUTNER, 144 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York, was the addressor of correspondence to ARTHUR BOULIN, 5004 Grand Street, New York City. E. BUTNER is believed to be identical with ELEANOR GLASSMAN BUTNER, subject's sister, who resides at the above address. ELEANOR GLASSMAN married EUGENE BUTNER of 115 East 17 Street, New York City, on January 20, 1952.

SUBJECT IN ATTENDANCE AT
YOUNG PROGRESSIVE OF AMERICA DANCES

On March 24, 1952 Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised SAs ROBERT F. ROYAL, JOSEPH V. WATERS and the writer that JAMES WEINSTEIN, a roommate of MAX FINKSTONE, at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, was an

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active member of and the Chairman in 1950-1951 of a club of the Young Progressives of America organization which held its meetings at 95 Avenue B, New York City, in a meeting hall on the top floor. (JAMES WEINSTINE was an associate of MAX FINESTONE when both were students at Cornell University in 1949).

T-6 identified a photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN and ELEANOR GLASSMAN, subject's sister, as individuals that he had seen at the Tompkins Park Playground, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and at Young Progressives of America dances. T-6 stated that VIVIAN GLASSMAN was also at a "peace vigil" held at the Central Palace Hall on the lower East side of New York City during Christmas Week, December, 1951. T-6 stated that JAMES WEINSTINE was also there but that he did not see WEINSTINE and the GLASSMAN sisters speaking to each other and could not therefore state that they were acquainted with each other. T-6 could not identify photographs of ERNEST PATALI, husband of VIVIAN GLASSMAN or of MAXWELL FINESTONE.

Concerning the Young Progressives of America organization, mentioned above, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the RAY FRIEDLANDER Club of the Communist Party was instructed to organize the Tompkins Square Club of the Young Progressives of America and that the organizer recruited nearly all of the members of the Tompkins Square Club. T-7 stated that instructions were to see that not more than 55 or 60 per cent of the Executive Committee of the Young Progressives of America were Communist Party members in order that the group might more effectively fight the tag of Communist.

INTERVIEW OF THOMAS BISHOP
217 East 19 Street
New York City

Mr. THOMAS BISHOP, Superintendent, 217 East 19 Street, New York City on October 29, 1952 advised that the subject's brother MILTON GLASSMAN, has been residing at this address in apartment 4A, which was formerly occupied by ERNEST PATALI, without payment since April, 1952.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that the owner of the building, Mr. PHILIP KASSIRER, had instituted court proceedings in May, 1952, to force MILTON GLASSMAN out of the apartment and that the court had issued an order for GLASSMAN to vacate the premises in forty-eight hours, but that GLASSMAN had an attorney appear in court and that the vacating order was amended to give GLASSMAN ninety days within which to vacate.

Mr. BISHOP stated that MILTON GLASSMAN does not appear to be employed as he is seen at the apartment day and night and that his personal appearance seems to indicate that he drinks alcoholic liquors heavily. Mr. BISHOP has noticed no visitors during the day or night and had not seen the subject at the apartment building within recent weeks.

On November 19, 1952, Mr. THOMAS BISHOP advised that a Sheriff's order had been obtained on September 25, 1952 ordering PATAKI and MILTON GLASSMAN to vacate the premises at 217 East 19 Street by November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that on November 1, 1952 he had observed ERNEST PATAKI assisting MILTON GLASSMAN to move his effects out of the apartment and that they were placing furniture and other personal effects in a two-door Ford sedan bearing New York 1952 license No. 90246.

Mr. BISHOP stated that he had observed PATAKI's wife, the former VIVIAN GLASSMAN, at the apartment within recent weeks but did not recall whether or not she was present when PATAKI and GLASSMAN were emptying the apartment.

Mr. BISHOP stated that ERNEST PATAKI and MILTON GLASSMAN were being sued by PHILIP KASSIRER, owner of the building, for non-payment of rent for the period between April, 1952 and November 1, 1952.

Mr. BISHOP stated that shortly before GLASSMAN and PATAKI vacated the apartment MILTON GLASSMAN had informed him that upon his arrival home one evening he had noticed that his apartment door had been "jimmied" open and that he was missing a portable radio and typewriter.

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Mr. BISHOP stated that he believes this occurred some time in late October, 1952 or early November, 1952, and that presumably GLASSMAN made a police report in this matter.

At the New York Motor Vehicle Bureau it was ascertained that New York 1952 license No. 90240 was registered on October 20, 1952 to MILTON GLASSMAN, 217 East 19 Street, New York City. The registration reflected that the automobile was a 1936 Ford sedan, color black, Serial No. 2355911.

On October 10, 1952 the Newark Division advised that a check of the records of the Credit Bureau of Passaic and Bergen Counties, Passaic, New Jersey, reflected that BENSON CARLIN and his wife, VIVIAN, reside at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey; that prior to moving to this address they resided at 6 West 75 Street, New York City. BENSON CARLIN was reported employed as an engineer for the Smith Necker Engineering Company, 157 Chambers Street, New York City. His wife VIVIAN was reported employed by the United Service for New Americans, New York City, as a Vocational Counselor. Newark reported that numerous unsuccessful attempts had been made to contact VIVIAN CARLIN at her residence in order that she might be interviewed and that in view of the fact that she was believed to be presently employed in New York City that the New York Office conduct the interview of her at her place of employment.

At United Service for New Americans, 15 Park Row, New York City, it was ascertained from Miss ELEANOR MATZ, Personnel Director, that VIVIAN CARLIN, 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, was no longer employed by this organization, having terminated her employment on October 10, 1952.

RESULTS OF SURVEILLANCE
OF SUBJECT

On October 13, 1952 the United States Supreme Court denied legal counsel for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORRIS SOBELL, writs of certiorari. A physical surveillance of subject was conducted following this court decision with the following results:

At 11:07 a.m. the subject left her residence at 121 East Seventh Street, New York City, and boarded a North bound bus at the corner of Avenue A and Seventh Street, New York City, and left the bus at Eighth Avenue and 14 Street. She boarded an Uptown Independent Eighth Avenue subway and left the train at the 168 Street stop where she boarded a bus bound for Fairlawn and Paterson, New Jersey.

At 12:40 p.m. she left the bus at Fairlawn, New Jersey and entered the Fair Spot Luncheonette, 32 Street and Broadway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she remained about ten minutes. She then walked to a residence at 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, where she entered at 12:53 p.m.

At 7:20 p.m. the subject was observed by SAs RICHARD E. BRENNAN and ROBERT W. CONOLAN to leave 0-67 Fairlawn Parkway, Fairlawn, New Jersey, with an unidentified woman. VIVIAN GLASSMAN boarded a New York bound bus at Fairlawn Parkway and Broadway and the unidentified woman returned to the residence. GLASSMAN returned to her home by the same route she had previously taken and entered her residence at 8:50 p.m.

October 15, 1952- SAs ROBERT W. CONOLAN and
GEORGE E. GALE

At 6:05 p.m. GLASSMAN was observed leaving her residence and entering a delicatessen at 129 East Seventh Street where she remained for five minutes and returned to her residence.

October 16, 1952 - SAs ARNOLD E. BRANDT and
WILLIAM D. WELSH III

At 7:40 p.m. subject was observed to leave her residence and board a North bound crosstown bus at Avenue A and East Eighth Street, New York City. At 14 Street and Seventh Avenue she left the bus and entered the IRT subway station

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Boarding a downtown Seventh Avenue express train. She left the train at the Clark Street station in Brooklyn and walked to and entered an apartment building at 141 Henry Street, Brooklyn, at 8:18 p.m. She left 141 Henry Street at 9:15 and walked to an apartment house at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, New York. At 12:10 a.m. she left 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn and walked to the St. George Hotel at Henry and Clark Streets, where she boarded an IRT West Side express train and rode to the 14 Street stop in Manhattan. At 12:40 a.m. she boarded an East bound bus and was observed leaving the bus at East 8 Street and Avenue A and to enter her residence at 131 East 7 Street at 12:45 a.m.

It is known that the subject's sister BLANCK GLASSMAN BUTLER resides at 141 Henry Street, Brooklyn, New York. It is also recalled that subject is acquainted with Dr. NATHAN BRUNSWITZ whose residence is at 70 Pierrepont Street, Brooklyn, and whose office is at 1 Hanson Place, Brooklyn, New York.

October 17, 1952 - SAs ARNOLD E. BRANT
and GEORGE H. OWEN

At 8:15 p.m. the subject was observed leaving her apartment with a man answering the description of her husband, ERNEST PATAI. They walked along Avenue A to the corner of Norfolk and Delaney Street, New York City, where at 8:35 they joined a group listening to speeches at a street rally conducted by the Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and the American Labor Party. At 10:00 p.m. the street rally was brought to a close and subject and her husband walked to the corner of Clinton Street and East Houston Street where they entered Weissberg's Soda Fountain and Luncheonette and were observed eating at the counter. At 10:30 p.m. they left the luncheonette and returned to their residence entering at 10:40 p.m.

The American Labor Party was cited as a Communist front by the Un-American Activities Committee of the United States House of Representatives on March 29, 1944.

Following the denial of the ROSENBERGS' petition to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari which was denied on October 13, 1952 the ROSENBERGS' legal counsel petitioned the

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United States Supreme Court for a re-hearing of their original application which was denied by the Supreme Court on November 17, 1952.

A physical surveillance of the subject was conducted from November 17th to November 21, 1952 but no unusual activity on the part of the subject was noted between these dates.

At this point, the agents requested that she at least give them the opportunity of asking her the questions, at which point she again gave the same answer. At this time, Mrs. CARLIN was asked if she would prefer not to speak to the agents at all, to which she answered yes.

Inasmuch as it was noted that Mrs. CARLIN was in an advanced state of pregnancy when the contact was made, it was not deemed advisable to prolong the interview any further and it was terminated at that point.

DETAILS: DAVIS GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los

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Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City and an apartment in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG "mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL. b7D

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment. b7D

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist

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Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT's apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944. ~~HELENE~~

~~1/3~~ In 1945, ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBEL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950, fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR's sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girl-friend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN

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GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions for PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identify of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG's apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, and a third unidentified individual, who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

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Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG, who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE, who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University,

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having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX FINESTONE.

Subject Unknown to T-10 as a Member of the Young Progressives of America (YPA) or the Communist Party

On March 24, 1952, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN and her sister, ELEANOR, were noted at the Tompkins Square Park Playgrounds, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and in attendance at YPA dances and that they attended a "peace vigil" at Central Palace Hall, New York City, in December, 1951.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, who advised that some time after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the Ray Friedlander Club of the Communist Party was instructed to join the Tompkins Square Club of the YPA and to see that not more than 55 per cent or 60 per cent of the membership were Communist Party members in order that the club might fight more effectively the tag of Communism, advised on January 23, 1953 that neither the subject nor the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI or her sister, ELEANOR, were known to informant to have been members of the YPA or of the Communist Party.

T-2 also viewed photographs of other suspected members of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus, but did not recognize any of them.

1941 De Soto Automobile Registered to Subject's Husband

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on January 12, 1953 that it was noted that at about 11:30 p.m., that date, a man believed to be the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, was blowing the horn of a coupe

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automobile outside the subject's residence and that GLASSMAN dropped him a key from her window.

At the Motor Vehicle Bureau, New York City, it was ascertained by SE CLINTON E. POLLOCK that the subject's husband, ~~ERNEST PATAKI~~, had a 1953 automobile registration for a 1941 De Soto coupe, color blue, engine number, 877071, serial number 5T57675, New York 1953 license plate 9N-4946. PATAKI had a 1952 registration for a 1950 Hudson sedan, plate number QR6344.

Bank Data

On December 30, 1952 at Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that no deposits or withdrawals had been made in the subject's joint checking account during the month of December, 1952 and that the funds in the account amounted to \$371.20, and that they were subjected to a "hold" court order on December 1, 1952.

T-4 stated that PHILIP KASSIER and PAULINE KASSIER, judgment creditors, recovered a judgment against ERNEST PATAKI, judgment debtor, in the Municipal Court, Borough of Manhattan, First District, on November 26, 1952, in the sum of \$321.00. The Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, was served with a third party subpoena on December 1, 1952, and the order was returnable December 12, 1952 at 52 Chambers Street, New York City. JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, 110 Williams Street, New York City, was attorney for the KASSIERS.

T-4 advised that the subject and her husband, ERNEST PATAKI, were notified on December 1, 1952 of the court order on the bank to hold \$371.00, the balance then in the PATAKIS' account, subject to further order of the court.

Attorney REUBEN M. COHEN, associate of JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, attorney for judgment creditors, requested the court to grant the order on December 17, 1952. Notice was served by GREILSHEIMER on December 17, 1952, that the court would be asked to turn over to judgment creditors the sum of

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\$321.00 on deposit in the Manufacturers Trust Company, pursuant to Section 794 of the Civil Practices Act, on January 6, 1953, in Special Term Part I Court, 52 Chambers Street, New York City.

On January 30, 1953, T-4 advised that PATAKI paid the above mentioned Judgment with a certified check dated January 6, 1953, in the sum of \$321.00.

T-4 furnished the following information from the ledger sheet, reflecting the activity in subject's account:

The Manhattan Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that
FREDERICK F. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City, is an

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attorney at law at this location.

The Indices of the New York Office were negative on this name.

The Brooklyn Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that RICHARD H. TOEPLITZ resides at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised on February 11, 1947 that RICHARD and IRENE TOEPLITZ, 36 Connecticut Avenue, Long Beach, Long Island, New York, signed a petition for candidates for the American Labor Party election, November, 1946. The informant did not know whether or not this individual was identical with the RICHARD TOEPLITZ residing at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

On May 29, 1940, an anonymous letter was received by the Bureau reporting that RICHARD TOEPLITZ, employed by L. W. Dumont and Company, Crude Rubber Brokers, 342 Madison Avenue, New York City, and formerly employed by Hecht, Levis and Kahn, Incorporated, New York City, and by Avia Company, New York City, was a Soviet informer, conveying such information through the Amtorg Corporation, New York City; that he boasts of being the one who engineered recent big purchases of crude rubber for Russia through Amtorg and works very closely with members of Amtorg.

The American Labor Party, mentioned above, was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, report of March 19, 1944.

Investigation for Second Clandestine
ROSENBERG Apartment

It is recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS advised in 1950 that through conversations which he had with JULIUS ROSENBERG he learned that ROSENBERG had an apartment located somewhere in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B, New York City, which he used for possible microfilming work and as a place for contacting individuals who were connected with his espionage apparatus. This apartment was described by ROSENBERG

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to GREENGLASS as being located on the fourth floor of either a walkup or an elevator apartment building and consisted of two and a half or three and a half rooms. The apartment was offered to GREENGLASS by ROSENBERG approximately two years after GREENGLASS was discharged from the Army in 1946.

The subject's apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, is located in the general vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B; its exact location being at Seventh Street and Avenue A and consists of two rooms and a small kitchen. VIVIAN GLASSMAN moved into this apartment in July, 1947.

Investigation to ascertain the occupants of the apartment prior to that date reflected that the immediate previous occupants were acquaintances of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, one CARLA SMALL, who was a co-worker of the subject at Brooklyn State Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, having rented the apartment in November, 1945.

CARLA SMALL married STEPHEN LOUIS JAVNA in December, 1945 and they resided at this apartment, according to CARLA, until August, 1946.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that commencing August, 1946, after she moved, that a co-worker from Brooklyn State Hospital named GRACE NICHOLS, who married JOHN KARWOSKI, moved into the apartment and lived there until approximately December, 1946, after which her brother-in-law, JONAS JAVNA, who was married in 1946, moved into the apartment and lived there until some time in the summer of 1947.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that she accidentally met VIVIAN GLASSMAN at that time, told her that the apartment was available and that GLASSMAN thereupon rented it. Mrs. JAVNA advised that due to the critical housing situation and difficulty in obtaining telephones, the apartment was kept in the name of Mr. and Mrs. JAVNA as were the utilities.

Investigation was conducted at the Consolidated Edison Company to determine the identity of the individuals to whom service was rendered at Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, on July 24, 1950.

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Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised that the records of the Consolidated Edison Company reflected that Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was occupied by Miss LENA BALKER from May 28, 1941 to June 20, 1943, at which time she moved from Apartment 4A to 4B at this address.

On August 12, 1943, Mrs. SOFI MELNYK's utilities were connected and she resided there until November 17, 1945. The utilities for this apartment were again connected on November 27, 1945 for Miss CARLA SMALL and a "turn on order" was used to change the name of this account as of June 20, 1946 from Miss CARLA SMALL to Mrs. S. L. JAVNA. A "turn on order" issued March 12, 1948 indicated responsibility for the account had been changed from Mrs. STEVE L. JAVNA to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN on February 2, 1948.

A letter to welcome new customers from the Consolidated Edison Company, dated March 18, 1948, to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York 9, New York, was located in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company. The bottom of this letter contained questions to be filled in by consumers to be used in determining the credit standing of the consumer. GLASSMAN stated that the address where she used electric and gas last was at 131 East Seventh Street, Apartment 4A and that the apartment utilities were then in the name of CARLA SMALL JAVNA. She indicated that this account was closed as of April 1, 1948 and was to be reopened at that time in her name.

T-9 stated that that a letter appearing in Consolidated Edison files from Miss CARLA SMALL reflects as follows:

"Please discontinue gas and electric service at 131 East 7th St., New York City, effective April 1st. Will you kindly arrange to read the meters at this time and forward the bill in care of Miss Vivian Glassman, 131 East 7th Street, New York City.

"Please refund deposit #120536-3 (\$10.00) to me at Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey.

(Miss) Carla Small."

The following letter was addressed by the Consolidated Edison Company to CARLA SMALL on March 10, 1948:

"Dear Miss Small,

"Our records show that you discontinued using our service at 131 East 7th St., on June 3, 1946.

"Our records show that a check in refund of your deposit was mailed to you on Dec. 17, 1947 but was returned by the Post Office Department.

"Enclosed is our check #121918 for \$10.79 in refund of your deposit #120536-3 with accrued interest of seventy nine cents. We shall appreciate it if you will cash or deposit this check at your earliest convenience.

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There also appears inquiring memorandums in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company which were time stamped at 9:11 a.m., 1:25 p.m., and 4:38 p.m., on November 18, 1946 which indicated that STEVE JAVNA, Apartment 4A, telephone GR 3-8216, called Consolidated Edison and advised that all lights were out in his apartment.

It is noted that from the Consolidated Edison Company letter to CARLA SMALL, dated March 10, 1948, the records reflect that she discontinued Consolidated Edison services at 131 East Seventh Street on June 3, 1946 and that Consolidated Edison services for this apartment were not resumed until March 12, 1948, according to the date of the turn on order; however, it is also noted that an individual using the name of STEVE JAVNA telephoned Consolidated Edison Company three times on November 18, 1946 advising that all lights were out in the apartment, indicating that this individual was unaware that the electricity had been disconnected for Apartment 4A.

The records of the Consolidated Edison Company would indicate that utility services were not utilized in this apartment during the period of June 3, 1946 to March 12, 1948, which does not agree with the information obtained in the interview of CARLA SMALL JAVNA.

Investigation to clarify the continuity of service by the Consolidated Edison Company to Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, to the aforementioned individuals is being continued.

Information from
MILTON KLEIN

It will be recalled that when VIVIAN GLASSMAN made her plane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on Saturday, July 22, 1950, to contact WILLIAM PERL to give him \$2,000.00 in cash and instructions to leave the United States and go to Mexico, she left New York at about 1:30 p.m. and arrived in Cleveland, Ohio, about 3:30 p.m. She contacted Mrs. LOREE WATSON and her mother, Mrs. C. A. MIDDLETON at 16802 Larchwood, Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL had formerly rented a room, at about 4:00 p.m. and inquired for PERL and was referred to PERL at his new address.

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Mrs. WATSON offered her the use of her phone to telephone PERL, but the subject refused, stating that she would go to see him directly; however, GLASSMAN did not appear at PERL's apartment at 666 East 103rd Street, Cleveland, Ohio, until around noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950. The reason for the lapse of time from about 4:00 p.m., Saturday, July 22 to noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950, before the subject made her contact with PERL was unknown; GLASSMAN, upon interview, having stated that she was interested in job prospects, although she would not state who she had contacted for a job on Saturday afternoon and night.

From information obtained from MILTON KLEIN, it would appear that GLASSMAN probably attempted to make her contact on Saturday, but was unable to find PERL at home.

MILTON M. KLEIN, 2690 Morris Avenue, Bronx, New York, instructor in Physics at New York University, a close friend of WILLIAM PERL and a college classmate in 1934-1938 at the College of the City of New York of JULIUS ROSENBERG and of JOEL BARR, former fiance of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, informed SA MAURICE W. CORCORAN in February-March, 1953 that he worked with WILLIAM PERL at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) at Langley Field, Virginia, in about July, 1942 and that subsequently in about July, 1948, they resided at the same address on Franklin Avenue in Cleveland; that both were employed as engineers by NACA; that PERL helped him to get the job in Cleveland; that KLEIN, PERL and JOEL BARR went to BARR's home in about 1938-1940, believed to possibly have been in Brooklyn, New York, where BARR showed some radio equipment he was interested in as he was a radio "ham", or amateur operator; that PERL was a very good friend of BARR, although KLEIN claimed to know BARR only casually at City College.

KLEIN said in reference to VIVIAN GLASSMAN's visit to PERL in July, 1950 that he was unaware that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, until some time in the summer of 1951, when he learned from STANLEY KANAREK, an associate of RAYMOND WISE, PERL's lawyer, off record, that she had done so. KANAREK contacted KLEIN in Cleveland, Ohio, and requested him to be a character witness for PERL.

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KLEIN stated that he had never met VIVIAN GLASSMAN and when shown a photograph of her did not recognize her as anyone that he had ever known. KLEIN advised that he believes on the night of July 22, 1950, a Saturday, a friend, BERT RIBNER, staged a party at his house to which he and PERL were invited.

(KLEIN stated that about 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 22, 1950, PERL telephoned him at his home and advised him that he did not believe that he would go to the RIBNER party that night as he was having some difficulty with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that he believes that his wires are tapped and that he is being followed. He said that he was calling from an outside phone booth instead of from his apartment. PERL concluded by stating that he would stop over to see KLEIN later in the day. PERL appeared at KLEIN's apartment early that evening and explained that he was being investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for disloyalty, but did not explain, according to KLEIN, what the disloyalty investigation was based on other than that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was interested in his acquaintance with JULIUS ROSENBERG and the fact that he had rented the apartment of JOEL BARR. They spent about thirty minutes together and then PERL left.

KLEIN subsequently proceeded to and met PERL at the apartment of a girl named GLENDON BENNETT, upon whom PERL was calling. He placed the time as around 7-8 o'clock that evening and they proceeded to the party and stayed until about 1:00 a.m. They then took their dates home, each going in his own automobile.

On Sunday, July 23, 1950, according to KLEIN, an outdoor picnic was scheduled and PERL accompanied the group.

KLEIN stated that PERL did not tell him that the subject had contacted him in the early afternoon of Sunday, July 23, 1950, at any time that day while they were on the picnic, or thereafter, and the purpose of her visit was unknown to him until PERL's lawyer told him about it.

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KLEIN advised that he had received no telephone calls from anyone, local or long distance, to contact PERL with a message nor had anyone called him for information concerning PERL and had no knowledge of GLASSMAN having been in Cleveland on July 22, 23, 1950.

KLEIN did not recognize photographs of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH or MAXWELL FINESTONE.

A physical surveillance of WILLIAM PERL, on July 22, 1950 in Cleveland, revealed that PERL entered KLEIN's residence at 7:09 p.m. on July 22, 1950.

MILTON KLEIN, close friend of WILLIAM PERL and classmate of JULIUS ROSENBERG and JOEL BARR, the former fiance of GLASSMAN, advised ~~that~~ that he did not see GLASSMAN when she contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, in July, 1950. Surveillance of PERL had revealed that he entered KLEIN's residence at 7:09 p.m. on 7/22/50, the day that GLASSMAN arrived in Cleveland to contact PERL.

DETAILS:

DAVIS GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los

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Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City and an apartment in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG "mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on Morton Street where he, JOEL BARR and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment.

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ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist

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Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT's apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945, ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBEL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950, fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR's sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girl-friend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN

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GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions for PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that the identify of the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG's apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, and a third unidentified individual, who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

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Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PERL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG, who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTEIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTEIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE, who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University,

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having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMER and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX FINESTONE.

Subject Unknown to T-10 as a Member of the Young Progressives of America (YPA) or the Communist Party

On March 24, 1952, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN and her sister, ELEANOR, were noted at the Tompkins Square Park Playgrounds, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and in attendance at YPA dances and that they attended a "peace vigil" at Central Palace Hall, New York City, in December, 1951.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, who advised that some time after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the Ray Friedlander Club of the Communist Party was instructed to form the Tompkins Square Club of the YPA and to see that not more than 55 per cent or 60 per cent of the membership were Communist Party members in order that the club might fight more effectively the tag of Communism, advised on January 23, 1953 that neither the subject nor the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI or her sister, ELEANOR, were known to informant to have been members of the YPA or of the Communist Party.

T-2 also viewed photographs of other suspected members of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus, but did not recognize any of them.

1941 De Soto Automobile Registered to Subject's Husband

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on January 12, 1953 that it was noted that at about 11:30-p.m., that date, a man believed to be the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, was blowing the horn of a coupe

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automobile outside the subject's residence and that GLASSMAN dropped him a key from her window.

At the Motor Vehicle Bureau, New York City, it was ascertained by SE CLINTON E. POLLOCK that the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, had a 1953 automobile registration for a 1941 De Soto coupe, color blue, engine number, 877071, serial number 5T57675, New York 1953 license plate 9N-4946. PATAKI had a 1952 registration for a 1950 Hudson sedan, plate number QE6344.

Bank Data

On December 30, 1952 at Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that no deposits or withdrawals had been made in the subject's joint checking account during the month of December, 1952 and that the funds in the account amounted to \$371.20, and that they were subjected to a "hold" court order on December 1, 1952.

T-4 stated that PHILIP KASSIER and PAULINE KASSIER, judgment creditors, recovered a judgment against ERNEST PATAKI, judgment debtor, in the Municipal Court, Borough of Manhattan, First District, on November 26, 1952, in the sum of \$321.00. The Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, was served with a third party subpoena on December 1, 1952, and the order was returnable December 12, 1952 at 52 Chambers Street, New York City. JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, 110 Williams Street, New York City, was attorney for the KASSIERS.

T-4 advised that the subject and her husband, ERNEST PATAKI, were notified on December 1, 1952 of the court order on the bank to hold \$371.00, the balance then in the PATAKIS' account, subject to further order of the court.

Attorney REUBEN M. COHEN, associate of JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, attorney for judgment creditors, requested the court to grant the order on December 17, 1952. Notice was served by GREILSHEIMER on December 17, 1952, that the court would be asked to turn over to judgment creditors the sum of

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\$321.00 on deposit in the Manufacturers Trust Company, pursuant to Section 791 of the Civil Practices Act, on January 6, 1953, in Special Term Part I Court, 52 Chambers Street, New York City.

On January 30, 1953, T-1, advised that PATAKI paid the above mentioned Judgment with a certified check dated January 6, 1953, in the sum of \$321.00.

T-1 furnished the following information from the ledger sheet, reflecting the activity in subject's account:

On February 13, 1953, Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised that the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation would be notified if any substantial amount of money was withdrawn from this account, or if it were closed.

Information obtained from Confidential Informants T-4, T-5 and T-6 is not to be made public except in a usual proceeding, following the issuance of a subpoena.

Correspondents

Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the following:

January 21, 1953 - TOEPLITZ, 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York and February 19, 1953, FREDERICK F. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City.

The Manhattan Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that FREDERICK F. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City, is an

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attorney at law at this location.

The Indices of the New York Office were negative on this name.

The Brooklyn Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that RICHARD H. TOEPLITZ resides at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised on February 11, 1947 that RICHARD and IRENE TOEPLITZ, 36 Connecticut Avenue, Long Beach, Long Island, New York, signed a petition for candidates for the American Labor Party election, November, 1946. The informant did not know whether or not this individual was identical with the RICHARD TOEPLITZ residing at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

On May 26, 1940, an anonymous letter was received by the Bureau reporting that RICHARD TOEPLITZ, employed by L. W. Dumont and Company, Crude Rubber Brokers, 342 Madison Avenue, New York City, and formerly employed by Hecht, Levis and Kahn, Incorporated, New York City, and by Avia Company, New York City, was a Soviet informer, conveying such information through the Amtorg Corporation, New York City; that he boasts of being the one who engineered recent big purchases of crude rubber for Russia through Amtorg and works very closely with members of Amtorg.

The American Labor Party, mentioned above, was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, report of March 19, 1944.

Investigation for Second Clandestine
ROSENBERG Apartment

It is recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS advised in 1950 that through conversations which he had with JULIUS ROSENBERG he learned that ROSENBERG had an apartment located somewhere in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B, New York City, -which he used for possible microfilming work and as a place for contacting individuals who were connected with his espionage apparatus. This apartment was described by ROSENBERG

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to GREENGLASS as being located on the fourth floor of either a walkup or an elevator apartment building and consisted of two and a half or three and a half rooms. The apartment was offered to GREENGLASS by ROSENBERG approximately two years after GREENGLASS was discharged from the Army in 1946.

The subject's apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, is located in the general vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B; its exact location being at Seventh Street and Avenue A and consists of two rooms and a small kitchen. VIVIAN GLASSMAN moved into this apartment in July, 1947.

Investigation to ascertain the occupants of the apartment prior to that date reflected that the immediate previous occupants were acquaintances of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, one CARLA SMALL, who was a co-worker of the subject at Brooklyn State Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, having rented the apartment in November, 1945.

CARLA SMALL married STEPHEN LOUIS JAVNA in December, 1945 and they resided at this apartment, according to CARLA, until August, 1946.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that commencing August, 1946, after she moved, that a co-worker from Brooklyn State Hospital named GRACE NICHOLS, who married JOHN KARWOSKI, moved into the apartment and lived there until approximately December, 1946, after which her brother-in-law, JONAS JAVNA, who was married in 1946, moved into the apartment and lived there until some time in the summer of 1947.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that she accidentally met VIVIAN GLASSMAN at that time, told her that the apartment was available and that GLASSMAN thereupon rented it. Mrs. JAVNA advised that due to the critical housing situation and difficulty in obtaining telephones, the apartment was kept in the name of Mr. and Mrs. JAVNA as were the utilities.

Investigation was conducted at the Consolidated Edison Company to determine the identity of the individuals to whom service was rendered at Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, on July 24, 1950.

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Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised that the records of the Consolidated Edison Company reflected that Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was occupied by Miss LENA BALKER from May 28, 1941 to June 20, 1943, at which time she moved from Apartment 4A to 4B at this address.

On August 12, 1943, Mrs. SOFI MELNYK's utilities were connected and she resided there until November 17, 1945. The utilities for this apartment were again connected on November 27, 1945 for Miss CARLA SMALL and a "turn on order" was used to change the name of this account as of June 20, 1946 from Miss CARLA SMALL to Mrs. S. L. JAVNA. A "turn on order" issued March 12, 1948 indicated responsibility for the account had been changed from Mrs. STEVE L. JAVNA to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN on February 2, 1948.

A letter to welcome new customers from the Consolidated Edison Company, dated March 18, 1948, to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York 9, New York, was located in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company. The bottom of this letter contained questions to be filled in by consumers to be used in determining the credit standing of the consumer. GLASSMAN stated that the address where she used electric and gas last was at 131 East Seventh Street, Apartment 4A and that the apartment utilities were then in the name of CARLA SMALL JAVNA. She indicated that this account was closed as of April 1, 1948 and was to be reopened at that time in her name.

T-9 stated that that a letter appearing in Consolidated Edison files from Miss CARLA SMALL reflects as follows:

"Please refund deposit #120536-3 (\$10.00) to me at Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey.

The following letter was addressed by the Consolidated Edison Company to CARLA SMALL on March 10, 1948:

"Dear Miss Small,

"Our records show that you discontinued using our service at 131 East 7th St., on June 3, 1946.

"Our records show that a check in refund of your deposit was mailed to you on Dec. 17, 1947 but was returned by the Post Office Department.

"Enclosed is our check #121918 for \$10.79 in refund of your deposit #120536-3 with accrued interest of seventy nine cents. We shall appreciate it if you will cash or deposit this check at your earliest convenience.

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There also appears inquiring memorandums in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company which were time stamped at 9:11 a.m., 1:25 p.m., and 4:38 p.m., on November 18, 1946 which indicated that STEVE JAVNA, Apartment 4A, telephone GR 3-8216, called Consolidated Edison and advised that all lights were out in his apartment.

It is noted that from the Consolidated Edison Company letter to CARLA SMALL, dated March 10, 1948, the records reflect that she discontinued Consolidated Edison services at 131 East Seventh Street on June 3, 1946 and that Consolidated Edison services for this apartment were not resumed until March 12, 1948, according to the date of the turn on order; however, it is also noted that an individual using the name of STEVE JAVNA telephoned Consolidated Edison Company three times on November 18, 1946 advising that all lights were out in the apartment, indicating that this individual was unaware that the electricity had been disconnected for Apartment 4A.

The records of the Consolidated Edison Company would indicate that utility services were not utilized in this apartment during the period of June 3, 1946 to March 12, 1948, which does not agree with the information obtained in the interview of CARLA SMALL JAVNA.

Investigation to clarify the continuity of service by the Consolidated Edison Company to Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, to the aforementioned individuals is being continued.

Information from
MILTON KLEIN

It will be recalled that when VIVIAN GLASSMAN made her plane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on Saturday, July 22, 1950, to contact WILLIAM PERL to give him \$2,000.00 in cash and instructions to leave the United States and go to Mexico, she left New York at about 1:30 p.m. and arrived in Cleveland, Ohio, about 3:30 p.m. She contacted Mrs. LORIE WATSON and her mother, Mrs. C. A. MIDDLETON at 16802 Larchwood, Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL had formerly rented a room, at about 4:00 p.m. and inquired for PERL and was referred to PERL at his new address.

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Mrs. WATSON offered her the use of her phone to telephone PERL, but the subject refused, stating that she would go to see him directly; however, GLASSMAN did not appear at PERL's apartment at 656 East 103rd Street, Cleveland, Ohio, until around noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950. The reason for the lapse of time from about 4:00 p.m., Saturday, July 22 to noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950, before the subject made her contact with PERL was unknown; GLASSMAN, upon interview, having stated that she was interested in job prospects, although she would not state who she had contacted for a job on Saturday afternoon and night.

From information obtained from MILTON KLEIN, it would appear that GLASSMAN probably attempted to make her contact on Saturday, but was unable to find PERL at home.

MILTON M. KLEIN, 2690 Morris Avenue, Bronx, New York, instructor in Physics at New York University, a close friend of WILLIAM PERL and a college classmate in 1934-1938 at the College of the City of New York of JULIUS ROSENBERG and of JOEL BARR, former fiance of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, informed SA MAURICE W. CORCORAN in February-March, 1953 that he worked with WILLIAM PERL at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) at Langley Field, Virginia, in about July, 1942 and that subsequently in about July, 1946, they resided at the same address on Franklin Avenue in Cleveland; that both were employed as engineers by NACA; that PERL helped him to get the job in Cleveland; that KLEIN, PERL and JOEL BARR went to BARR's home in about 1938-1940, believed to possibly have been in Brooklyn, New York, where BARR showed some radio equipment he was interested in as he was a radio "ham", or amateur operator; that PERL was a very good friend of BARR, although KLEIN claimed to know BARR only casually at City College.

KLEIN said in reference to VIVIAN GLASSMAN's visit to PERL in July, 1950 that he was unaware that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, until some time in the summer of 1951, when he learned from STANLEY KANAREK, an associate of RAYMOND WISE, PERL's lawyer, of record, that she had done so. KANAREK contacted KLEIN in Cleveland, Ohio, and requested him to be a character witness for PERL.

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KLEIN stated that he had never met VIVIAN GLASSMAN and when shown a photograph of her did not recognize her as anyone that he had ever known. KLEIN advised that he believes on the night of July 22, 1950, a Saturday, a friend, BERT RIBNER, staged a party at his house to which he and PERL were invited.

KLEIN stated that about 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 22, 1950, PERL telephoned him at his home and advised him that he did not believe that he would go to the RIBNER party that night as he was having some difficulty with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that he believes that his wires are tapped and that he is being followed. He said that he was calling from an outside phone booth instead of from his apartment. PERL concluded by stating that he would stop over to see KLEIN later in the day. PERL appeared at KLEIN's apartment early that evening and explained that he was being investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for disloyalty, but did not explain, according to KLEIN, what the disloyalty investigation was based on other than that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was interested in his acquaintance with JULIUS ROSENBERG and the fact that he had rented the apartment of JOEL BARR. They spent about thirty minutes together and then PERL left.

KLEIN subsequently proceeded to and met PERL at the apartment of a girl named GLENDON BENNETT, upon whom PERL was calling. He placed the time as around 7-8 o'clock that evening and they proceeded to the party and stayed until about 1:00 a.m. They then took their dates home, each going in his own automobile.

On Sunday, July 23, 1950, according to KLEIN, an outdoor picnic was scheduled and PERL accompanied the group.

KLEIN stated that PERL did not tell him that the subject had contacted him in the early afternoon of Sunday, July 23, 1950, at any time that day while they were on the picnic, or thereafter, and the purpose of her visit was unknown to him until PERL's lawyer told him about it.

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KLEIN advised that he had received no telephone calls from anyone, local or long distance, to contact PERL with a message nor had anyone called him for information concerning PERL and had no knowledge of GLASSMAN having been in Cleveland on July 22, 23, 1950.

KLEIN did not recognize photographs of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH or MAXWELL PINESTONE.

A physical surveillance of WILLIAM PERL, on July 22, 1950 in Cleveland, revealed that PERL entered KLEIN's residence at 7:09 p.m. on July 22, 1950.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

VIVIAN GLASSMAN unknown to CI T-1 as a member of either the YPA or CP. Subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, has 1941 De Soto Coupe registered for 1953. Subject's joint bank account at Manufacturers Trust Company, NYC, frozen by court order in December, 1952, and judgement of \$321.00 obtained against husband for non-payment of rent on apartment, which was occupied by subject's brother. Correspondents set out. MILTON KLEIN, close friend of WILLIAM PERL and classmate of JULIUS ROSENBERG and JOEL BARR, the former fiance of GLASSMAN, advised T-1 that he did not see GLASSMAN when she contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, in July, 1950. Surveillance of PERL had revealed that he entered KLEIN's residence at 9:09 p.m. on 7/22/50, the day that GLASSMAN arrived in Cleveland to contact PERL.

DETAILS:

DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los

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Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City and an apartment in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on Morton Street where he, JOEL SARANT and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment.

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist

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Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX ELITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and ELITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT's apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945, ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUALINE RUBEL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950, fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR's sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girlfriend named VIVIAN GLASHEK and that he believes that VIVIAN

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GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Morton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Morton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions for PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that she could not identify the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG's apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, and a third unidentified individual, who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

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Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM FARL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG, who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL FINESTONE, with alias MAX FINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTAIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTAIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX FINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX FINESTONE, who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University,

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having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERME and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX PINESTONE.

Subject Unknown to T-1 as a Member of the Young Progressives of America (YPA) or the Communist Party

On March 24, 1952, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN and her sister, ELEANOR, were noted at the Tompkins Square Park Playgrounds, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and in attendance at YPA dances and that they attended a "peace vigil" at Central Palace Hall, New York City, in December, 1951.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, who advised that some time after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the Ray Friedlander Club of the Communist Party was instructed to form the Tompkins Square Club of the YPA and to see that not more than 55 per cent or 60 per cent of the membership were Communist Party members in order that the club might fight more effectively the tag of Communism, advised on January 23, 1953 that neither the subject nor the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI or her sister, ELEANOR, were known to informant to have been members of the YPA or of the Communist Party.

T-2 also viewed photographs of other suspected members of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus, but did not recognize any of them.

1941 De Soto Automobile Registered to Subject's Husband

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on January 12, 1953 that it was noted that at about 11:30 p.m., that date, a man believed to be the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, was blowing the horn of a coupe

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automobile outside the subject's residence and that GLASSMAN dropped him a key from her window.

At the Motor Vehicle Bureau, New York City, it was ascertained by SE CLINTON E. POLLOCK that the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, had a 1953 automobile registration for a 1941 De Soto coupe, color blue, engine number, 877071, serial number ST57675, New York 1953 license plate 9N-4946. PATAKI had a 1952 registration for a 1950 Hudson sedan, plate number QE6344.

Bank Data

On December 30, 1952 at Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that no deposits or withdrawals had been made in the subject's joint checking account during the month of December, 1952 and that the funds in the account amounted to \$371.20, and that they were subjected to a "hold" court order on December 1, 1952.

T-4 stated that PHILIP KASSIER and PAULINE KASSIER, judgment creditors, recovered a judgment against ERNEST PATAKI, judgment debtor, in the Municipal Court, Borough of Manhattan, First District, on November 26, 1952, in the sum of \$321.00. The Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, was served with a third party subpoena on December 1, 1952, and the order was returnable December 12, 1952 at 52 Chambers Street, New York City. JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, 110 Williams Street, New York City, was attorney for the KASSIERS.

T-4 advised that the subject and her husband, ERNEST PATAKI, were notified on December 1, 1952 of the court order on the bank to hold \$371.00, the balance then in the PATAKIS' account, subject to further order of the court.

Attorney REUBEN M. COHEN, associate of JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, attorney for judgment creditors, requested the court to grant the order on December 17, 1952. Notice was served by GREILSHEIMER on December 17, 1952, that the court would be asked to turn over to judgment creditors the sum of

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\$321.00 on deposit in the Manufacturers Trust Company, pursuant to Section 794 of the Civil Practices Act, on January 6, 1953, in Special Term Part I Court, 52 Chambers Street, New York City.

On January 30, 1953, T-4 advised that PATAKI paid the above mentioned judgment with a certified check dated January 6, 1953, in the sum of \$321.00.

T-4 furnished the following information from the ledger sheet, reflecting the activity in subject's account:

On February 13, 1953, Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised that the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation would be notified if any substantial amount of money was withdrawn from this account, or if it were closed.

Information obtained from Confidential Informants T-4, T-5 and T-6 is not to be made public except in a usual proceeding, following the issuance of a subpoena.

Correspondence

Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the following:

January 21, 1953 - TORPLITZ, 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York and February 19, 1953, FREDERICK P. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City.

The Manhattan Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that FREDERICK P. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City, is an

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attorney at law at this location.

The Indices of the New York Office were negative on this name.

The Brooklyn Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that RICHARD H. TOEPLITZ resides at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised on February 11, 1947 that RICHARD and IRENE TOEPLITZ, 36 Connecticut Avenue, Long Beach, Long Island, New York, signed a petition for candidates for the American Labor Party election, November, 1946. The informant did not know whether or not this individual was identical with the RICHARD TOEPLITZ residing at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

On May 24, 1940, an anonymous letter was received by the Bureau reporting that RICHARD TOEPLITZ, employed by L. W. Duxant and Company, Crude Rubber Brokers, 342 Madison Avenue, New York City, and formerly employed by Hecht, Levin and Kahn, Incorporated, New York City, and by Avia Company, New York City, was a Soviet informer, conveying such information through the Amtorg Corporation, New York City; that he boasts of being the one who engineered recent big purchases of crude rubber for Russia through Amtorg and works very closely with members of Amtorg.

The American Labor Party, mentioned above, was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report of March 19, 1944.

Investigation for Second Clandestine
ROSENBERG Apartment

It is recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS advised in 1950 that through conversations which he had with JULIUS ROSENBERG he learned that ROSENBERG had an apartment located somewhere in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B, New York City, which he used for possible microfilming work and as a place for contacting individuals who were connected with his espionage apparatus. This apartment was described by ROSENBERG

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to GREENGLASS as being located on the fourth floor of either a walkup or an elevator apartment building and consisted of two and a half or three and a half rooms. The apartment was offered to GREENGLASS by ROSENBERG approximately two years after GREENGLASS was discharged from the Army in 1946.

The subject's apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, is located in the general vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B; its exact location being at Seventh Street and Avenue A and consists of two rooms and a small kitchen. VIVIAN GLASSMAN moved into this apartment in July, 1947.

Investigation to ascertain the occupants of the apartment prior to that date reflected that the immediate previous occupants were acquaintances of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, one CARLA SMALL, who was a co-worker of the subject at Brooklyn State Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, having rented the apartment in November, 1945.

CARLA SMALL married STEPHEN LOUIS JAVNA in December, 1945 and they resided at this apartment, according to CARLA, until August, 1946.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that commencing August, 1946, after she moved, that a co-worker from Brooklyn State Hospital named GRACE NICHOLS, who married JOHN KARWICKI, moved into the apartment and lived there until approximately December, 1946, after which her brother-in-law, JONAS JAVNA, who was married in 1946, moved into the apartment and lived there until some time in the summer of 1947.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that she accidentally met VIVIAN GLASSMAN at that time, told her that the apartment was available and that GLASSMAN thereupon rented it. Mrs. JAVNA advised that due to the critical housing situation and difficulty in obtaining telephones, the apartment was kept in the name of Mr. and Mrs. JAVNA as were the utilities.

Investigation was conducted at the Consolidated Edison Company to determine the identity of the individuals to whom service was rendered at Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, on July 24, 1950.

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Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised that the records of the Consolidated Edison Company reflected that Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was occupied by Miss LENA BALKER from May 28, 1941 to June 20, 1943, at which time she moved from Apartment 4A to 4B at this address.

On August 12, 1943, Mrs. SOFI MELNYK's utilities were connected and she resided there until November 17, 1945. The utilities for this apartment were again connected on November 27, 1945 for Miss CARLA SMALL and a "turn on order" was used to change the name of this account as of June 20, 1946 from Miss CARLA SMALL to Mrs. S. L. JAVNA. A "turn on order" issued March 12, 1948 indicated responsibility for the account had been changed from Mrs. STEVE L. JAVNA to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN on February 2, 1948.

A letter to welcome new customers from the Consolidated Edison Company, dated March 18, 1948, to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York 9, New York, was located in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company. The bottom of this letter contained questions to be filled in by consumers to be used in determining the credit standing of the consumer. GLASSMAN stated that the address where she used electric and gas last was at 131 East Seventh Street, Apartment 4A and that the apartment utilities were then in the name of CARLA SMALL JAVNA. She indicated that this account was closed as of April 1, 1948 and was to be reopened at that time in her name.

T-9 stated that that a letter appearing in Consolidated Edison files from Miss CARLA SMALL reflects as follows:

The following letter was addressed by the Consolidated Edison Company to CARLA SMALL on March 10, 1948:

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There also appears inquiring memorandums in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company which were time stamped at 9:11 a.m., 1:25 p.m., and 4:38 p.m., on November 18, 1946 which indicated that STEVE JAVNA, Apartment 4A, telephone GR 3-8216, called Consolidated Edison and advised that all lights were out in his apartment.

It is noted that from the Consolidated Edison Company letter to CARLA SMALL, dated March 10, 1948, the records reflect that she discontinued Consolidated Edison services at 131 East Seventh Street on June 3, 1946 and that Consolidated Edison services for this apartment were not resumed until March 12, 1948, according to the date of the turn on order; however, it is also noted that an individual using the name of STEVE JAVNA telephoned Consolidated Edison Company three times on November 18, 1946 advising that all lights were out in the apartment, indicating that this individual was unaware that the electricity had been disconnected for Apartment 4A.

The records of the Consolidated Edison Company would indicate that utility services were not utilized in this apartment during the period of June 3, 1946 to March 12, 1948, which does not agree with the information obtained in the interview of CARLA SMALL JAVNA.

Investigation to clarify the continuity of service by the Consolidated Edison Company to Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, to the aforementioned individuals is being continued.

**Information from
MILTON KLEIN**

It will be recalled that when VIVIAN GLASSMAN made her plane trips to Cleveland, Ohio, on Saturday, July 22, 1950, to contact WILLIAM PERL to give him \$2,000.00 in cash and instructions to leave the United States and go to Mexico, she left New York at about 1:30 p.m. and arrived in Cleveland, Ohio, about 3:30 p.m. She contacted Mrs. LORKE WATSON and her mother, Mrs. G. A. MIDDLETON at 16302 Larchwood, Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL had formerly rented a room, at about 4:00 p.m. and inquired for PERL and was referred to PERL at his new address.

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Mrs. WATSON offered her the use of her phone to telephone PERL, but the subject refused, stating that she would go to see him directly; however, GLASSMAN did not appear at PERL's apartment at 666 East 103rd Street, Cleveland, Ohio, until around noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950. The reason for the lapse of time from about 4:00 p.m., Saturday, July 22 to noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950, before the subject made her contact with PERL was unknown; GLASSMAN, upon interview, having stated that she was interested in job prospects, although she would not state who she had contacted for a job on Saturday afternoon and night.

From information obtained from MILTON KLEIN, it would appear that GLASSMAN probably attempted to make her contact on Saturday, but was unable to find PERL at home.

MILTON M. KLEIN, 2690 Morris Avenue, Bronx, New York, instructor in Physics at New York University, a close friend of WILLIAM PERL and a college classmate in 1934-1938 at the College of the City of New York of JULIUS ROSENBERG and of JOEL BARR, former fiancé of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, informed SA MAURICE W. GORCORAN in February-March, 1953 that he worked with WILLIAM PERL at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) at Langley Field, Virginia, in about July, 1942 and that subsequently in about July, 1948, they resided at the same address on Franklin Avenue in Cleveland; that both were employed as engineers by NACA; that PERL helped him to get the job in Cleveland; that KLEIN, PERL and JOEL BARR went to BARR's home in about 1938-1940, believed to possibly have been in Brooklyn, New York, where BARR showed some radio equipment he was interested in as he was a radio "ham", or amateur operator; that PERL was a very good friend of BARR, although KLEIN claimed to know BARR only casually at City College.

KLEIN said in reference to VIVIAN GLASSMAN's visit to PERL in July, 1950 that he was unaware that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, until some time in the summer of 1951, when he learned from STANLEY KANARUK, an associate of RAYMOND WISE, PERL's lawyer, off record, that she had done so. KANARUK contacted KLEIN in Cleveland, Ohio, and requested him to be a character witness for PERL.

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KLEIN stated that he had never met VIVIAN GLASSMAN and when shown a photograph of her did not recognize her as anyone that he had ever known. KLEIN advised that he believes on the night of July 22, 1950, a Saturday, a friend, BERT RIBNAR, staged a party at his house to which he and PERL were invited.

(KLEIN stated that about 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 22, 1950, PERL telephoned him at his home and advised him that he did not believe that he would go to the RIBNAR party that night as he was having some difficulty with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that he believes that his wires are tapped and that he is being followed. He said that he was calling from an outside phone booth instead of from his apartment. PERL concluded by stating that he would stop over to see KLEIN later in the day. PERL appeared at KLEIN's apartment early that evening and explained that he was being investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for disloyalty, but did not explain, according to KLEIN, what the disloyalty investigation was based on other than that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was interested in his acquaintance with JULIUS ROSENBERG and the fact that he had rented the apartment of JOEL BARR. They spent about thirty minutes together and then PERL left.)

KLEIN subsequently proceeded to and met PERL at the apartment of a girl named GLENDON BARNETT, upon whom PERL was calling. He placed the time as around 7-8 o'clock that evening and they proceeded to the party and stayed until about 1:00 a.m. They then took their dates home, each going in his own automobile.

On Sunday, July 23, 1950, according to KLEIN, an outdoor picnic was scheduled and PERL accompanied the group.

KLEIN stated that PERL did not tell him that the subject had contacted him in the early afternoon of Sunday, July 23, 1950, at any time that day while they were on the picnic, or thereafter, and the purpose of her visit was unknown to him until PERL's lawyer told him about it.

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KLEIN advised that he had received no telephone calls from anyone, local or long distance, to contact PERL with a message nor had anyone called him for information concerning PERL and had no knowledge of GLASSMAN having been in Cleveland on July 22, 23, 1950.

KLEIN did not recognize photographs of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH or MAXWELL FIRESTONE.

A physical surveillance of WILLIAM PERL, on July 22, 1950 in Cleveland, revealed that PERL entered KLEIN's residence at 7:09 p.m. on July 22, 1950.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

VIVIAN GLASSMAN unknown to CI T-10 as a member of either the YPA or CP. Subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, has 1941 De Soto Coupe registered for 1953. Subject's joint bank account at Manufacturers Trust Company, NYC, frozen by court order in December, 1952, and judgement of \$321.00 obtained against husband for non-payment of rent on apartment, which was occupied by subject's brother. Correspondents set out. MILTON KLEIN, close friend of WILLIAM PERL and classmate of JULIUS ROSENBERG and JOEL BARR, the former fiance of GLASSMAN, advised PERL that he did not see GLASSMAN when she contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, in July, 1950. Surveillance of PERL had revealed that he entered KLEIN's residence at 9:09 p.m. on 7/22/50, the day that GLASSMAN arrived in Cleveland to contact PERL.

DETAILS:

DAVID GREENGLASS and his wife, RUTH GREENGLASS, have advised that they were recruited into the Soviet espionage apparatus by JULIUS ROSENBERG, a brother-in-law of DAVID GREENGLASS. DAVID GREENGLASS is now serving a fifteen year sentence for transmitting certain classified data relating to the atomic bomb project at Los

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Alamos, New Mexico, to HARRY GOLD, a confessed Soviet spy now serving a thirty year sentence for espionage. JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were sentenced to death in April, 1951 in the Southern District of New York for conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States.

DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS learned through conversation with JULIUS ROSENBERG during the period 1946 to 1950 that he was extensively engaged in Soviet espionage in connection with which he was using as a conspiratorial headquarters and for the purpose of microfilming documents and making espionage contacts an apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City and an apartment in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B.

Information obtained from MAX ELITCHER, who admits that ROSENBERG attempted to recruit him for Soviet espionage, indicates that the Greenwich Village apartment was located at 65 Morton Street, New York City. This apartment was rented in the name of ALFRED SARANT from October, 1943 to January, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised on [REDACTED] that JULIUS ROSENBERG "mentioned an apartment rented by a student ostensibly used for studying on Morton Street where he, JOEL SARANT and 'BILL' used to meet in secret to discuss their plans." ROSENBERG did not identify "BILL" at this time, but from other conversations informant had with ROSENBERG, "BILL" is believed by T-1 to be WILLIAM PERL.

On [REDACTED] T-1 stated that ROSENBERG informed that his apartment was ostensibly rented for a student to have a place to study but that the real purpose was to have a place for meetings. ROSENBERG said that he had typed for many hours on various occasions in the Morton Street apartment and that to reduce the typing sounds he placed rubber pads under the typewriter table legs and would let the water run in the bathroom. ROSENBERG advised T-1 that he paid the rent on this apartment.

ALFRED SARANT, upon interview, has advised that he was a member of the Greenwich Village Branch of the Communist

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Party in 1943-1944 and believes that he met JULIUS ROSENBERG through a mutual friend named JOEL BARR. SARANT has denied that ROSENBERG was ever in his apartment at 65 Morton Street, but MAX SLITCHER has advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG, JOEL BARR, WILLIAM PERL, (also known to him as WILLIAM MUTTERPERL), and SLITCHER and his wife, HELENE, were together in SARANT's apartment, number 6-1, at 65 Morton Street, New York City, in 1943-1944.

In 1945, ALFRED SARANT married LOUISE JACQUELINE RUBEL-ROSS and moved to Ithaca, New York, in about September, 1946 at which time the apartment at 65 Morton Street, New York City, was taken by his friend, JOEL BARR. It was arranged that BARR would send him the rent for the apartment in Ithaca, New York, and that SARANT would then pay the landlord of 65 Morton Street by check.

SARANT has advised that WILLIAM PERL, who was a friend of both SARANT and JOEL BARR, used the apartment subsequent to JOEL BARR under the same rental paying arrangement and that PERL in sending the last money order payment in January, 1950 attached a note requesting SARANT to relinquish the apartment as PERL no longer had any use for it.

ALFRED SARANT, following his interview by Bureau agents in July-August, 1950, fled the United States into Mexico, entering under an assumed name. His present whereabouts are unknown.

WILLIAM PERL has been identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to Confidential Informant T-1. PERL is at present under indictment for perjury before the Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York.

JOEL BARR was identified as a Soviet agent by ROSENBERG to DAVID GREENGLASS following JOEL BARR's sailing from the United States for Europe in January, 1948. ROSENBERG advised DAVID GREENGLASS that BARR was going to Europe to continue his espionage work in European countries.

ALFRED SARANT has advised that JOEL BARR had a girlfriend named VIVIAN GLASSMAN and that he believes that VIVIAN

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GLASSMAN sent him the first few rental payments in the form of money orders for the apartment rent at 65 Norton Street, New York City.

The Albany Office advised on July 22, 1950 that a money order number 988487 issued at the Church Street Station Post Office, New York City, on August 8, 1949, payable to ALFRED SARANT from VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, as a remitter, was located in the account of ALFRED SARANT in the First National Bank of Ithaca, New York. This money order was in the amount of \$45.00 and bore a deposit date of August 11, 1949.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN has advised upon interview that she was the former fiancée of JOEL BARR and that she had sent money orders to ALFRED SARANT in payment of the rent on 65 Norton Street in July and August, 1948. She also admitted that she had made an airplane trip to Cleveland, Ohio, on July 22, 1950 to contact WILLIAM PERL with \$2,000.00 in cash and to give instructions to PERL to leave the United States and go to Mexico. She stated that she received the \$2,000.00 and the instructions for PERL from an unknown man who contacted her at her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, on the evening of July 21, 1950. GLASSMAN claimed that she could not identify the man who contacted her was unknown to her, but refused to assist agents to identify him.

Confidential Informant T-1 advised that in conversation JULIUS ROSENBERG stated that on a holiday weekend, which the informant believes may have been the Fourth of July weekend, 1949, WILLIAM PERL removed some secret files from a laboratory located at Columbia University and that PERL took these files to ROSENBERG's apartment at Knickerbocker Village, New York City, where ROSENBERG, PERL, and a third unidentified individual, who was called in from out of town, and a fourth man, together spent fourteen to seventeen hours with two cameras photographing the material that PERL had obtained in order that PERL could return the material at his earliest convenience to Columbia University. ROSENBERG indicated to T-1 that the third man was MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, who he described as a member of his espionage organization.

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Confidential Informant T-1 stated that the fourth man was a definite member of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus; that he is the man who subsequently contacted VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 to arrange with her to proceed to Cleveland, Ohio, to contact WILLIAM PAUL and give him \$2,000.00 in order to facilitate his flight from the United States to Mexico.

The informant advised that JULIUS ROSENBERG indicated that the Russians sent his last recruit to contact VIVIAN GLASSMAN on July 21, 1950 and that the last individual that JULIUS ROSENBERG recruited into his Soviet espionage ring was a man who lived with the son of a wealthy family. The informant stated that the son of the wealthy family owned a black convertible Buick automobile and that he had loaned his Buick to the last JULIUS ROSENBERG recruit who drove ROSENBERG to Ithaca, New York, to see ALFRED SARANT and make a pickup of espionage material.

Concerning the identity of the two individuals described above by T-1, investigation to identify the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG, who lived with the son of a wealthy family and who owned a 1949 or 1950 black Buick convertible automobile with a white top, indicates that one MAXWELL PINESTONE, with alias MAX PINESTONE, was the last recruit of JULIUS ROSENBERG and that EDWARD JAMES WEINSTEIN, commonly known as JAMES WEINSTAIN, was the individual with whom he lived.

JAMES WEINSTEIN is the son of JOSEPH WEINSTEIN, President of the Versailles Garment Corporation, 470 Seventh Avenue, New York City, a ladies' garment manufacturing firm. JAMES WEINSTAIN, in an interview with Bureau agents on August 21, 1950, produced a New York State automobile registration dated January 19, 1950 for a 1949 Buick convertible.

JAMES WEINSTEIN resided at 418 East Ninth Street, New York City, with MAX PINESTONE from February, 1950 to about October-November, 1950.

MAX PINESTONE, who was born on July 28, 1922 at Boston, Massachusetts, is a graduate of Cornell University,

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having graduated in September, 1949 and is a close friend of LOUISE (PUSS) SARANT.

On April 5, 1951 VIVIAN GLASSMAN was observed by SA JOHN J. DOERMEK and the writer leaving her apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, with a man who was subsequently identified as MAX PINESTONE.

Subject Unknown to T-1 as a Member of the Young Progressives of America (YPA) or the Communist Party

On March 24, 1952, Confidential Informant T-1 advised that VIVIAN GLASSMAN and her sister, ELEANOR, were noted at the Tompkins Square Park Playgrounds, Eighth Street and Avenue B, New York City, and in attendance at YPA dances and that they attended a "peace vigil" at Central Palace Hall, New York City, in December, 1951.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, who advised that some time after Labor Day, 1948, a member of the Ray Friedlander Club of the Communist Party was instructed to form the Tompkins Square Club of the YPA and to see that not more than 55 per cent or 60 per cent of the membership were Communist Party members in order that the club might fight more effectively the tag of Communism, advised on January 23, 1953 that neither the subject nor the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI or her sister, ELEANOR, were known to informant to have been members of the YPA or of the Communist Party.

T-2 also viewed photographs of other suspected members of the ROSENBERG espionage apparatus, but did not recognize any of them.

1941 De Soto Automobile Registered to Subject's Husband

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on January 12, 1953 that it was noted that at about 11:30 p.m., that date, a man believed to be the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, was blowing the horn of a coupe

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automobile outside the subject's residence and that GLASSMAN dropped him a key from her window.

At the Motor Vehicle Bureau, New York City, it was ascertained by SE CLINTON E. POLLOCK that the subject's husband, ERNEST PATAKI, had a 1953 automobile registration for a 1941 De Soto coupe, color blue, engine number, 877071, serial number 5T57675, New York 1953 license plate 9N-4946. PATAKI had a 1952 registration for a 1950 Hudson sedan, plate number QE6Y44.

Bank Data

On December 30, 1952 at Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that no deposits or withdrawals had been made in the subject's joint checking account during the month of December, 1952 and that the funds in the account amounted to \$371.20, and that they were subjected to a "hold" court order on December 1, 1952.

T-4 stated that PHILIP KASSIER and PAULINE KASSIER, judgment creditors, recovered a judgment against ERNEST PATAKI, judgment debtor, in the Municipal Court, Borough of Manhattan, First District, on November 26, 1952, in the sum of \$321.00. The Manufacturers Trust Company, 230 Second Avenue, New York City, was served with a third party subpoena on December 1, 1952, and the order was returnable December 12, 1952 at 52 Chambers Street, New York City. JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, 110 Williams Street, New York City, was attorney for the KASSIERS.

T-4 advised that the subject and her husband, ERNEST PATAKI, were notified on December 1, 1952 of the court order on the bank to hold \$371.00, the balance then in the PATAKIS' account, subject to further order of the court.

Attorney REUBEN M. COHEN, associate of JEROME J. GREILSHEIMER, attorney for judgment creditors, requested the court to grant the order on December 17, 1952. Notice was served by GREILSHEIMER on December 17, 1952, that the court would be asked to turn over to judgment creditors the sum of

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\$321.00 on deposit in the Manufacturers Trust Company, pursuant to Section 794 of the Civil Practices Act, on January 6, 1953, in Special Term Part I Court, 52 Chambers Street, New York City.

On January 30, 1953, T-4 advised that PATAKI paid the above mentioned Judgment with a certified check dated January 6, 1953, in the sum of \$321.00.

T-4 furnished the following information from the ledger sheet, reflecting the activity in subject's account:

On February 13, 1953, Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, advised that the New York Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation would be notified if any substantial amount of money was withdrawn from this account, or if it were closed.

Information obtained from Confidential Informants T-4, T-5 and T-6 is not to be made public except in a usual proceeding, following the issuance of a subpoena.

Correspondents

Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that the subject received correspondence from the following:

January 21, 1953 - TORPLITZ, 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York and February 19, 1953, FREDERICK F. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City.

The Manhattan Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that FREDERICK F. GREENMAN, 20 Pine Street, New York City, is an

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attorney at law at this location.

The Indices of the New York Office were negative on this name.

The Brooklyn Telephone Directory, 1953, reflects that RICHARD M. TOEPLITZ resides at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised on February 11, 1947 that RICHARD and IRMA TOEPLITZ, 36 Connecticut Avenue, Long Beach, Long Island, New York, signed a petition for candidates for the American Labor Party election, November, 1946. The informant did not know whether or not this individual was identical with the RICHARD TOEPLITZ residing at 33 Monroe Place, Brooklyn, New York.

On May 27, 1940, an anonymous letter was received by the Bureau reporting that RICHARD TOEPLITZ, employed by L. W. Duxant and Company, Crude Rubber Brokers, 342 Madison Avenue, New York City, and formerly employed by Hecht, Levin and Kahn, Incorporated, New York City, and by Avia Company, New York City, was a Soviet informer, conveying such information through the Amtorg Corporation, New York City; that he boasts of being the one who engineered recent big purchases of crude rubber for Russia through Amtorg and works very closely with members of Amtorg.

The American Labor Party, mentioned above, was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report of March 19, 1944.

**Investigation for Second Clandestine
ROSENBERG Apartment**

It is recalled that DAVID GREENGLASS advised in 1950 that through conversations which he had with JULIUS ROSENBERG he learned that ROSENBERG had an apartment located somewhere in the vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B, New York City, which he used for possible microfilming work and as a place for contacting individuals who were connected with his espionage apparatus. This apartment was described by ROSENBERG

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to GREENGLASS as being located on the fourth floor of either a walkup or an elevator apartment building and consisted of two and a half or three and a half rooms. The apartment was offered to GREENGLASS by ROSENBERG approximately two years after GREENGLASS was discharged from the Army in 1946.

The subject's apartment at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, is located in the general vicinity of 12th Street and Avenue B; its exact location being at Seventh Street and Avenue A and consists of two rooms and a small kitchen. VIVIAN GLASSMAN moved into this apartment in July, 1947.

Investigation to ascertain the occupants of the apartment prior to that date reflected that the immediate previous occupants were acquaintances of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, one CARLA SMALL, who was a co-worker of the subject at Brooklyn State Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, having rented the apartment in November, 1945.

CARLA SMALL married STEPHEN LOUIS JAVNA in December, 1945 and they resided at this apartment, according to CARLA, until August, 1946.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that commencing August, 1946, after she moved, that a co-worker from Brooklyn State Hospital named GRACE NICHOLS, who married JOHN KARWOWSKI, moved into the apartment and lived there until approximately December, 1946, after which her brother-in-law, JONAS JAVNA, who was married in 1946, moved into the apartment and lived there until some time in the summer of 1947.

Mrs. JAVNA stated that she accidentally met VIVIAN GLASSMAN at that time, told her that the apartment was available and that GLASSMAN thereupon rented it. Mrs. JAVNA advised that due to the critical housing situation and difficulty in obtaining telephones, the apartment was kept in the name of Mr. and Mrs. JAVNA as were the utilities.

Investigation was conducted at the Consolidated Edison Company to determine the identity of the individuals to whom service was rendered at Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, on July 24, 1950.

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Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, advised that the records of the Consolidated Edison Company reflected that Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York City, was occupied by Miss LENA BALKER from May 28, 1941 to June 20, 1943, at which time she moved from Apartment 4A to 4B at this address.

On August 12, 1943, Mrs. SOFI MELNYK's utilities were connected and she resided there until November 17, 1945. The utilities for this apartment were again connected on November 27, 1945 for Miss CARLA SMALL and a "turn on order" was used to change the name of this account as of June 20, 1946 from Miss CARLA SMALL to Mrs. S. L. JAVNA. A "turn on order" issued March 12, 1948 indicated responsibility for the account had been changed from Mrs. STEVE L. JAVNA to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN on February 2, 1948.

A letter to welcome new customers from the Consolidated Edison Company, dated March 18, 1948, to Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 131 East Seventh Street, New York 9, New York, was located in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company. The bottom of this letter contained questions to be filled in by consumers to be used in determining the credit standing of the consumer. GLASSMAN stated that the address where she used electric and gas last was at 131 East Seventh Street, Apartment 4A and that the apartment utilities were then in the name of CARLA SMALL JAVNA. She indicated that this account was closed as of April 1, 1948 and was to be reopened at that time in her name.

T-9 stated that that a letter appearing in Consolidated Edison files from Miss CARLA SMALL reflects as follows:

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"Gentlemen:

"Please discontinue gas and electric service at 131 East 7th St., New York City, effective April 1st. Will you kindly arrange to read the meters at this time and forward the bill in care of Miss Vivian Glassman, 131 East 7th Street, New York City.

"Please refund deposit #120536-3 (\$10.00) to me at Box 112, Palisades Park, New Jersey.

"Very truly yours,
Carla Small
(Miss) Carla Small."

The following letter was addressed by the Consolidated Edison Company to CARLA SMALL on March 10, 1948:

"March 10, 1948

Apt. 4-A

"Miss Carla Small

Palisades Park, N.J.

"Dear Miss Small,

"Our records show that you discontinued using our service at 131 East 7th St., on June 3, 1946.

"Our records show that a check in refund of your deposit was mailed to you on Dec. 17, 1947 but was returned by the Post Office Department.

"Enclosed is our check #121918 for \$10.79 in refund of your deposit #120536-3 with accrued interest of seventy nine cents. We shall appreciate it if you will cash or deposit this check at your earliest convenience.

"Very truly yours,
O. F. Dickhut
Personal Service Division."

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There also appears inquiring memorandums in the files of the Consolidated Edison Company which were time stamped at 9:11 a.m., 1:25 p.m., and 4:38 p.m., on November 18, 1946 which indicated that STEVE JAVNA, Apartment 4A, telephone GR 3-8216, called Consolidated Edison and advised that all lights were out in his apartment.

It is noted that from the Consolidated Edison Company letter to CARLA SMALL, dated March 10, 1948, the records reflect that she discontinued Consolidated Edison services at 131 East Seventh Street on June 3, 1946 and that Consolidated Edison services for this apartment were not resumed until March 12, 1948, according to the date of the turn on order; however, it is also noted that an individual using the name of STEVE JAVNA telephoned Consolidated Edison Company three times on November 18, 1946 advising that all lights were out in the apartment, indicating that this individual was unaware that the electricity had been disconnected for Apartment 4A.

The records of the Consolidated Edison Company would indicate that utility services were not utilized in this apartment during the period of June 3, 1946 to March 12, 1948, which does not agree with the information obtained in the interview of CARLA SMALL JAVNA.

Investigation to clarify the continuity of service by the Consolidated Edison Company to Apartment 4A at 131 East Seventh Street, New York, to the aforementioned individuals is being continued.

**Information from
MILTON KLEIN**

It will be recalled that when VIVIAN GLASSMAN made her plane trips to Cleveland, Ohio, on Saturday, July 22, 1950, to contact WILLIAM PERL to give him \$2,000.00 in cash and instructions to leave the United States and go to Mexico, she left New York at about 1:30 p.m. and arrived in Cleveland, Ohio, about 3:30 p.m. She contacted Mrs. LORKE WATSON and her mother, Mrs. C. A. MIDDLETON at 16302 Larchwood, Cleveland, Ohio, where PERL had formerly rented a room, at about 4:00 p.m. and inquired for PERL and was referred to PERL at his new address.

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Mrs. WATSON offered her the use of her phone to telephone PERL, but the subject refused, stating that she would go to see him directly; however, GLASSMAN did not appear at PERL's apartment at 666 East 103rd Street, Cleveland, Ohio, until around noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950. The reason for the lapse of time from about 4:00 p.m., Saturday, July 22 to noon on Sunday, July 23, 1950, before the subject made her contact with PERL was unknown; GLASSMAN, upon interview, having stated that she was interested in job prospects, although she would not state who she had contacted for a job on Saturday afternoon and night.

From information obtained from MILTON KLEIN, it would appear that GLASSMAN probably attempted to make her contact on Saturday, but was unable to find PERL at home.

MILTON M. KLEIN, 2690 Morris Avenue, Bronx, New York, instructor in Physics at New York University, a close friend of WILLIAM PERL and a college classmate in 1934-1938 at the College of the City of New York of JULIUS ROSENBERG and of JOEL BARR, former fiancé of VIVIAN GLASSMAN, informed SA MAURICE W. GORCORAN in February-March, 1953 that he worked with WILLIAM PERL at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) at Langley Field, Virginia, in about July, 1942 and that subsequently in about July, 1948, they resided at the same address on Franklin Avenue in Cleveland; that both were employed as engineers by NACA; that PERL helped him to get the job in Cleveland; that KLEIN, PERL and JOEL BARR went to BARR's home in about 1938-1940, believed to possibly have been in Brooklyn, New York, where BARR showed some radio equipment he was interested in as he was a radio "ham", or amateur operator; that PERL was a very good friend of BARR, although KLEIN claimed to know BARR only casually at City College.

KLEIN said in reference to VIVIAN GLASSMAN's visit to PERL in July, 1950 that he was unaware that VIVIAN GLASSMAN had contacted PERL in Cleveland, Ohio, until some time in the summer of 1951, when he learned from STANLEY KANAREK, an associate of RAYMOND WISE, PERL's lawyer, of record, that she had done so. KANAREK contacted KLEIN in Cleveland, Ohio, and requested him to be a character witness for PERL.

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KLKIN stated that he had never met VIVIAN GLASSMAN and when shown a photograph of her did not recognize her as anyone that he had ever known. KLKIN advised that he believes on the night of July 22, 1950, a Saturday, a friend, PEARL RIBBAR, staged a party at his house to which he and PERL were invited.

(KLKIN stated that about 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 22, 1950, PERL telephoned him at his home and advised him that he did not believe that he would go to the RIBBAR party that night as he was having some difficulty with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that he believes that his wires are tapped and that he is being followed. He said that he was calling from an outside phone booth instead of from his apartment. PERL concluded by stating that he would stop over to see KLKIN later in the day. PERL appeared at KLKIN's apartment early that evening and explained that he was being investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for disloyalty, but did not explain, according to KLKIN, what the disloyalty investigation was based on other than that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was interested in his acquaintance with JULIUS ROSENBERG and the fact that he had rented the apartment of JOEL BARR. They spent about thirty minutes together and then PERL left.)

KLKIN subsequently proceeded to and met PERL at the apartment of a girl named GLENDON BARNETT, upon whom PERL was calling. He placed the time as around 7-8 o'clock that evening and they proceeded to the party and stayed until about 1:00 a.m. They then took their dates home, each going in his own automobile.

On Sunday, July 23, 1950, according to KLKIN, an outdoor picnic was scheduled and PERL accompanied the group.

KLKIN stated that PERL did not tell him that the subject had contacted him in the early afternoon of Sunday, July 23, 1950, at any time that day while they were on the picnic, or thereafter, and the purpose of her visit was unknown to him until PERL's lawyer told him about it.

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KLEIN advised that he had received no telephone calls from anyone, local or long distance, to contact PERL with a message nor had anyone called him for information concerning PERL and had no knowledge of GLASSMAN having been in Cleveland on July 22, 23, 1950.

KLAYE did not recognize photographs of MICHAEL SIDOROVICH or MAXWELL FIRESTONE.

A physical surveillance of WILLIAM PERL, on July 22, 1950 in Cleveland, revealed that PERL entered KLEIN's residence at 7:09 p.m. on July 22, 1950.

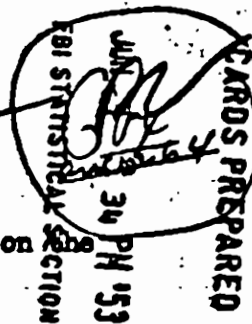
