of resignation. In a letter of resignation dated August 31, 1943, her reason for resigning was to obtain a position in the field of mathematics and statistics in order that she might utilize her abilities to the best advantage.

A Personnel Security Questionnaire dated May 25, 1942 reflects employee has access to material of a secret and confidential nature; and that her work is of prime interest to the Signal Corps General Development Laboratory, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey in connection with the preparation and revision of restricted specifications for procurement of Signal Corps equipment.

The following information is reflected in a photostatic copy of an Application for Federal Employment dated April 6, 1943: GLASSMAN's duties while employed by the Signal Corps General Development Laboratory, Fort Monmouth, Red Bank, New Jersey, are described by her as being in charge of 20 trainees, teaching mathematics for three or four months, and inspection work. Her sister, ELEANOR GLASSMAN, was presently employed by the Signal Corps General Development Laboratory, 320 Ocean Avenue, Long Branch, New Jersey. Her mother, SADIE HOROWITZ, was born in Russia and was naturalized on December 29, 1931. It is noted that an undated Application for Position reflects the mother as having been born in Russia, entered the United States in 1894 and being naturalized in December, 1930.

In an undated Application for Position, supra, the answer is "No" to the question, "Are you now, or have you ever been a member of any political party or organization which advocates the overthrow of our constitutional form of government in the United States?" No information is reflected under the heading "Organization Membership".

In Declaration of Appointee forms dated May 25, 1942 and April 8, 1943, and Oath of Office and Personnel Affidavits dated May 25, 1942 and April 8, 1943, VIVIAN GLASSMAN denied membership in political party or organization advocating the overthrow of the United States Government by force or violence.

ReNYtel dated 8/4/50, whereby the Newark Office was requested to interview ERNEST PATAKI at the Federal Telecommunications Laboratories, Inc., Nutley, N.J.

This is to advise that a check of the indices in the Newark Office reflected the following reference to ERNEST PATAKI.

On 4/28/48, GEORGE BRETT was interviewed by SA WILLIAM H. ROCKETT at the Newark Office of Sperry Products Corp., 1505 Willow Ave., Hoboken, N.J., at his own request.

BRETT advised at the time of the interview that he had been employed at the Federal Telephone and Radio Corp. Laboratory in Nutley, N.J., from September of 1944, until 2/6/48. BRETT stated that while at Federal Telephone and Radio Corp. Laboratory, he was a member of the T.A.E.C.T. He said that one HARRY HYMAN was president of the chapter and that ERNEST PATAKI was a steward in BRETT's section. He continued at this time an individual by the name of SHADOWITZ was the chief steward.

BRETT advised that all of these three men, HYMAN, SHADOWITZ, and PATAKI, told him not to sign the personnel security questionnaire which was being filed with the AEC after being filled out by the employees at the laboratory. According to BRETT, PATAKI told all of the employees not to sign the questionnaire. BRETT further advised that HYMAN, SHADOWITZ, and PATAKI made critical statements of the U.S. foreign policy and spoke favorably of Russia. BRETT could furnish no specific statements made by the men.

KENNETH COUGHLIN of the Federal Telecommunications Laboratories, Nutley, N.J., furnished the following information on ERNEST PATAKI in 1948.

On July 26, 1950 WILLIAM PERL advised the writer he had been contacted by VIVIAN GLASSMAN and he subsequently furnished the following statement, which he refused to sign, but which contains corrections in his own handwriting and which he stated to be true and accurate to the best of his recollection:

*July 26, 1950

"I, WILLIAM PERL of 666 East 105 St, Cleveland, Ohio make the following voluntary statement to Special Agents John A. Harrington, John B. O'Donoghue and Leo H. Frutkin of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They have told me that I do not have to make a statement and that

"anything I say can be used against me in a court of law. They have made me no promises or threats to obtain this statement. They have advised me that I have the right of counsel.

"On Sunday, July 23, 1950 at approximately noon I was in the alcove of my apartment on the second floor of 666 East 103 St., Cleveland when a girl appeared at the entrance to my apartment. She identified herself and I recognized her as Vivian Glassman of New York City. I asked her to come in. She explained in writing on several sheets of 8 X 10 1/2 ruled paper that she had been instructed by a stranger, one whom she did not know, to speak to ~~me/11/11/1950/~~ and an aeronautical engineer in Cleveland and to give to this engineer money and instructions on how to leave the country. ~~She/identified~~ She wrote down something about a ship incident concerning herself and Barr." (In FERL's own writing he inserted at this point: "I recall also the name John about here. The name John and the ship incident [as well as much else she wrote] had no particular meaning for me.").

"I got the impression that she had been instructed to use this incident as a means of identifying herself to me. Somewhere along the line she also wrote that she knew Julius Rosenerg. ~~I/did~~ I recall that she wrote the name Mexico down in connection with her instructions on how to leave the country. I remember her writing down the word friend in connection with the aeronautical engineer that she was to get in touch with in Cleveland. It was my understanding that she took me to be the aeronautical engineer. I am actually an aeronautical research scientist at this time. As far as I remember she did not write down or mention any specific sum of money but she did write that she had money for me. As I recall I told her orally that I ~~did/didn't~~ didn't know what she was talking about and that I hoped she did not have anything on her conscience. I asked her to leave which she did. I estimate she was in my apartment about ten minutes. After she left I tore up the paper after taking it into the bathroom and then I flushed it down the lavatory bowl. I was very upset by her visit which apparently led me to destroy the papers she had written on. The message she had written ran about a page and a half. I can't recall exactly what Julius Rosenberg's name was placed in the message for. I asked her orally how she had found me and she explained orally how she had gotten my address from my former landlady at Larchwood. ~~Specifically/11/1950~~ About this time she said orally that she was in Cleveland to look for a job. I told her again she had better leave."

"William Perl read this statement, endorsed some corrections on it in

"his own handwriting and said that it was accurate to the best of his recollection. He declined to sign it but wished to prepare another statement by himself.

On July 26, 1950 WILLIAM PERL appeared at the Cleveland Office and furnished the following typewritten statement which he had signed and which he acknowledged in the presence of the witnessing agents:

"STATEMENT BY WILLIAM PERL

"During the past several days agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, including John A. Harrington, John B. O'Donoghue, Leo H. Frutkin, David Wibel and one other whose name I cannot recall have questioned me respecting my acquaintance with a Joel Barr and Alfred Sarant. During the questioning I tried to cooperate with the Bureau in every way including voluntarily granting the right to search my apartment and to read and take personal papers for examination. Last Sunday, July 23, 1950, a series of incidents began which are described below. For reasons which will become apparent these incidents aroused my suspicions. I first tried to consult a lawyer on Monday but because he was out of town I was unable to reach him until the following day, Tuesday, July 25, 1950. After consultation I concluded that the full story of these incidents should be placed before the F.B.I. Early on Wednesday morning, July 26, 1950, I estimate the time at about 9:50 A.M., and before I had an opportunity to call the Bureau they called me and asked that I come down for further questioning. The questioning on this day took a total of 5 or 6 hours being conducted in two separate sessions, one at the offices of the F.B.I. and one at the apartment which I have sub-let for the summer. I have previously advised the Bureau of my desire to set down in writing the chronology and detail of the incidents to which I have referred. As nearly as memory will allow, what follows is an accurate resume of the occurrences. The substance of this has also been given the Bureau orally:

"1. Last Sunday, July 23, 1950, at about noon, as I was preparing

"food in the kitchen alcove of the apartment I am occupying at 666 East 103rd Street, a woman appeared through the curtain which shields the alcove from the stair leading to the street. This woman identified herself as, and I recognized her as, Vivian Glassman of New York City. I asked her to come in which she did. I asked her what she wanted. She reached for some paper that was lying on a table and for a lap-board which was also nearby. She sat down on the couch in the apartment, motioned me to sit next to her and indicated that I was to read what she was writing. She wrote approximately as follows: That she had been instructed to talk to me by writing rather than talking. That she had been approached by a stranger in New York City and told to go to Cleveland to see an aeronautical engineer; that she was to give him money and instructions which she had memorized as to how he and a friend were to leave the country. In this connection I remember the word Mexico. She wrote that for identification she was to mention a ship incident in which she had been concerned with Joel Barr and also the name John. As nearly as I can remember she also wrote to the effect that she knew Julius Rosenberg. She used about a page and a half of 8" X 10 1/2" ruled paper. I told her in effect that I did not know what she was talking about; that I hoped that she had a clear conscience and was not getting mixed up in anything; that I thought this whole thing was some kind of trap and I asked her to leave. I also asked after her sister Eleanor Glassman at whose house I had stayed in New York and where I had most recently (about four months previously) seen Vivian Glassman once or twice. As she was leaving I asked how she had found me at my present address. She replied orally that she had inquired about me of my former landlady at 16802 Larchwood Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio and then of my neighbors downstairs at 666 East 103rd Street. She was dressed in a light colored dress and carried no suitcase or valise. I do not remember noticing any large handbag. She also mentioned in leaving I believe, that she had come to Cleveland to look for a job. I did not see her again after she left. I estimate she was in my apartment anywhere from ten minutes to half an hour. I was quite upset by her visit and destroyed the papers on which she had been writing.

"2. On Tuesday, July 25, I received in the mail two cards. One was from my brother who is studying music in Paris, France and who is apparently vacationing in the south of France. In closing his card to me he used the phrases 'Good food, good wine, good living.' The other card was from the University of Tennessee and was a form card on which was typed 'Re: "Good Food" and underneath, the printed form words to the effect that the above material was not available.

"Copies of both of these cards are attached to this statement.

"3. Upon returning home on Tuesday, July 25, at about 8:00 P.M. I found a copy of the magazine Science and Society lying on top of a bookcase in the apartment. I had casually noted same after moving into the apartment some weeks previously. This magazine was part of the contents of the bookcase in the apartment. I am sure I did not leave this magazine on top of the bookcase. It was furthermore my impression that a page reference mark placed after the title of an article by Morris Schappes in the contents listed on the front cover had not been there when I had glanced at this magazine previously. It is my impression that this magazine is radical in its outlook.

"4. My impression of the previous incidents is that whether they are related or unrelated to one another, they constitute one or more attempts to manufacture some kind of evidence against me in connection with my acquaintanceship some years previously with Mr. Joel Barr and Mr. Alfred Sarant. I knew Mr. Barr as a classmate at the College of the City of New York. After my graduation and departure from New York in Spring, 1959, I did not, to the best of my recollection, see Mr. Barr again until I came to New York in the summer of 1946. I last saw Mr. Barr sometime in 1947. I met Mr. Sarant through Mr. Barr and subleased Mr. Sarant's apartment during the period of approximately fall, 1947 to spring, 1948, while I attended Columbia University. (I first met Mr. Sarant in summer, 1946.) I last saw Mr. Sarant, to the best of my recollection, in late 1946.

"5. I affirm my absolute loyalty to the United States and I urge the Bureau to fully investigate the foregoing incidents to the end that any implication in them reflecting on my patriotism may be removed.

On July 26, 1950 Agent WIBLE was advised by Mrs. C. A. MIDDLETON, 16802 Larchwood, Cleveland, that on Saturday afternoon, July 22, 1950, a lady approximately 30 years of age came to the home of her daughter, Mrs. LOREE WATSON, same address, upstairs, where WILLIAM PERL has rented a room in the past. It is to be noted that inquiry of Mrs. MIDDLETON was made as a result of information obtained in the interview with PERL on July 26, 1950 at which time PERL stated that he had been contacted Sunday, July 23, 1950, by VIVIAN GLASSMAN from New York City and that GLASSMAN probably had gone to his Larchwood address and was directed to his East 103rd Street address.

Mrs. MIDDLETON stated that the woman had indicated that she had flown in shortly before coming to the residence of Mrs. WATSON. She did not indicate where she had flown from, but indicated that she had taken a bus from the airport to arrive at the WATSON home. Mrs. MIDDLETON stated that the unidentified woman left no name. Mrs. MIDDLETON advised that her daughter, Mrs. LOREE WATSON, would be able to furnish additional information concerning this visit.

On the same date, Mrs. LOREE WATSON advised that to the best of her recollection the unidentified woman came to her home on Saturday afternoon, July 22, 1950, at between 3:00 and 4:00 p.m. Mrs. WATSON stated that the lady said that she was a friend of WILLIAM PERL and that she wanted to get in touch with PERL. Mrs. WATSON told the unidentified woman that she could reach PERL by telephone and offered the use of her phone for the lady to call PERL. Mrs. WATSON stated that the lady said that she did not care to use the phone, but would rather go directly to see PERL. Mrs. WATSON stated that she has since been a little suspicious of this action on the part of the woman inasmuch as it would have been quite handy to contact PERL telephonically.

Mrs. WATSON stated that the unidentified woman had an accent which she would place as a New York accent, inasmuch as she talked similar to PERL.

The following is a description of the unidentified woman as furnished by Mrs. WATSON, and to which Mrs. MIDDLETON was in subsequent agreement:

A photograph of VIVIAN GLASSMAN was exhibited to Mrs. WATSON on August 2, 1950 at which time she advised that she believed that this was the woman described above who asked for PERL. Mrs. WATSON stated that the facial features were similar but that she would not make a positive identification.

PERL advised he first met VIVIAN GLASSMAN through JOEL BARR sometime during 1946 or 1947 and saw her approximately three times. He did not see her again until April of 1950 when he stayed at the home of ELEANOR GLASSMAN on the northwest corner of East 8th Street and Avenue D, New York City. PERL explained that he had not known ELEANOR GLASSMAN prior to April 7, 1950 when he made her acquaintance as a casual pickup and lived with her for the week following.

It is noted PERL failed to mention VIVIAN GLASSMAN prior to his interview of June 26 although he had been specifically questioned as to associates of JOEL BARR. It is also noted on prior interviews he stated he had stayed at his parents' home, 956 Tiffany Street, Bronx, New York, or his former wife's home, HENRIETTE SAVIDGE, 104 East 88th Street, New York City, during his facation to New York in April, 1950.

AND WAS VERY AGITATED AND UPSET, AND TOLD HIM THAT SHE HAD BEEN QUESTIONED BY FBI AGENTS AND WANTED TO STAY WITH HIM AT HIS APARTMENT. CLAIMED SHE DID NOT INFORM HIM OF REASON FOR OR NATURE OF INVESTIGATION, AND STATED THAT SHE WANTED COMPANIONSHIP. PATAKI WAS ASKED ABOUT HIS ALLEGED STATEMENTS TO EMPLOYEES AT FEDERAL TELE-COMMUNICATION LABORATORIES URGING THEM NOT TO SIGN THE PERSONNEL SECURITY QUESTIONNAIRE. On August 3, 1950, I submitted to you by memorandum information concerning the activities of William Perl. You will recall that this memorandum pointed out that on July 23, 1950, a girl named Vivian Glassman of New York City visited his apartment in Cleveland, Ohio. This girl at the time of the visit gave him instructions to go to Mexico and advised that she had in her possession a sum of money for his use in leaving the country.

As you were advised, Vivian Glassman was the paramour of Joel Barr who, according to David Greenglass, was a part of the Rosenberg network and found it necessary to leave the United States.

In view of the above information received from Perl, Vivian Glassman was interviewed at her residence at 131 East 7th Street, New York City, on August 3, 1950. During the course of this interview she advised that she was acquainted with both Julius Rosenberg and his wife but claimed she has seen neither since Rosenberg's arrest. She also readily admitted that Joel Barr was her former fiance who had gone to Europe.

In connection with the incident referred to by Perl, Glassman advised that at about 8:00 P.M. on Friday, July 21, 1950, a man knocked on her apartment door. Upon her requesting information as to the identity of this individual he merely informed her that he was a friend. She stated that she permitted this stranger to enter her apartment, whereupon he made inquiry of her as to whether she knew John. When she advised him in the negative he made reference to Joel Barr and she promptly replied that Barr was her former fiance. According to Glassman, the stranger then stated by way of identifying himself that at one time he was going to help Joel Barr go to Europe. She advised that after his reference to Joel Barr she felt that she could trust him even though she did not know his identity.

Glassman stated that this stranger then asked her if she would go to Cleveland to visit her friend, an aeronautical engineer who was interested in her sister. She stated that she believed this man was referring to her sister Eleanor, who was very fond of William Perl, an aeronautical engineer in Cleveland, Ohio. The man then told her to advise Perl to go to Mexico and gave her a roll of money which he stated consisted of \$2,000. This man then left her apartment.

Glassman insisted that no particular city in Mexico was mentioned to her by this man nor were any additional instructions given to her to be conveyed to Perl. She mentioned that she gained the impression from this stranger without his so stating that Perl would know what to do when she related to him the information concerning the stranger's visit.

During this interview Glassman stated that she made airplane reservations on United Airlines for Cleveland, Ohio, under the name of Mrs. S. Goldberg. This plane was scheduled to leave LaGuardia Field, New York City, at 12:35 P.M. on the following day. She advised that although she did not know Perl's exact address in Cleveland she went to her sister Eleanor's apartment the following morning and secured his address from a letter which Perl had sent to Eleanor. She then went to the airport and departed for Cleveland.

Upon arrival in Cleveland, Ohio, Glassman advised that she obtained a room at the Regent Hotel, likewise under the name Mrs. S. Goldberg. She stayed in this hotel that night. The following day about noon she called on William Perl at his apartment in Cleveland, Ohio. She stated that Perl seemed surprised to see her and when she informed him of the stranger's visit, Perl told her she must be crazy to get mixed up in any such deal. She advised that she wrote out the information given to her by the stranger on a pad of paper. The information which she wrote on this paper was the instructions for Perl to go to Mexico and the information that she had some money for him. According to Glassman, Perl informed her that he knew nothing about the stranger nor did he know of any reason why anyone should want him to go to Mexico. She informed that Perl told her to return to New York City and wash her hands of the whole affair.

Glassman stated that she thereupon took a plane from Cleveland and returned to New York City that very evening, still keeping in her possession the \$2,000 which Perl had refused to accept. She mentioned that she carried this money with her until the evening of Thursday, July 27th, when the stranger again appeared at her apartment. She stated that he made inquiry of her as to whether she had gone to Cleveland. After she related to this stranger what Perl had told her and returned the \$2,000 to him she asked him to leave and not to come back. The stranger thereupon departed. She claimed that she has never seen this man again since that date.

When questioned further concerning the information which she had written on the slip of paper for Perl, she advised that she did not recall including therein any statement as to a ship incident involving Joel Barr.

She explained, however, that at the time Barr was planning to go to France to study in 1947 she also intended to go there for the same purpose. She advised that they at first had reservations on different steamship lines but that Barr changed his reservation so that he could go on the same ship with her. She stated that she was of the impression that Barr was going to marry her but when he failed to do so before the sailing date she cancelled her reservation and did not make the trip. She claimed to have received no correspondence from him since the date of his departure and stated that she had not communicated with him since that date.

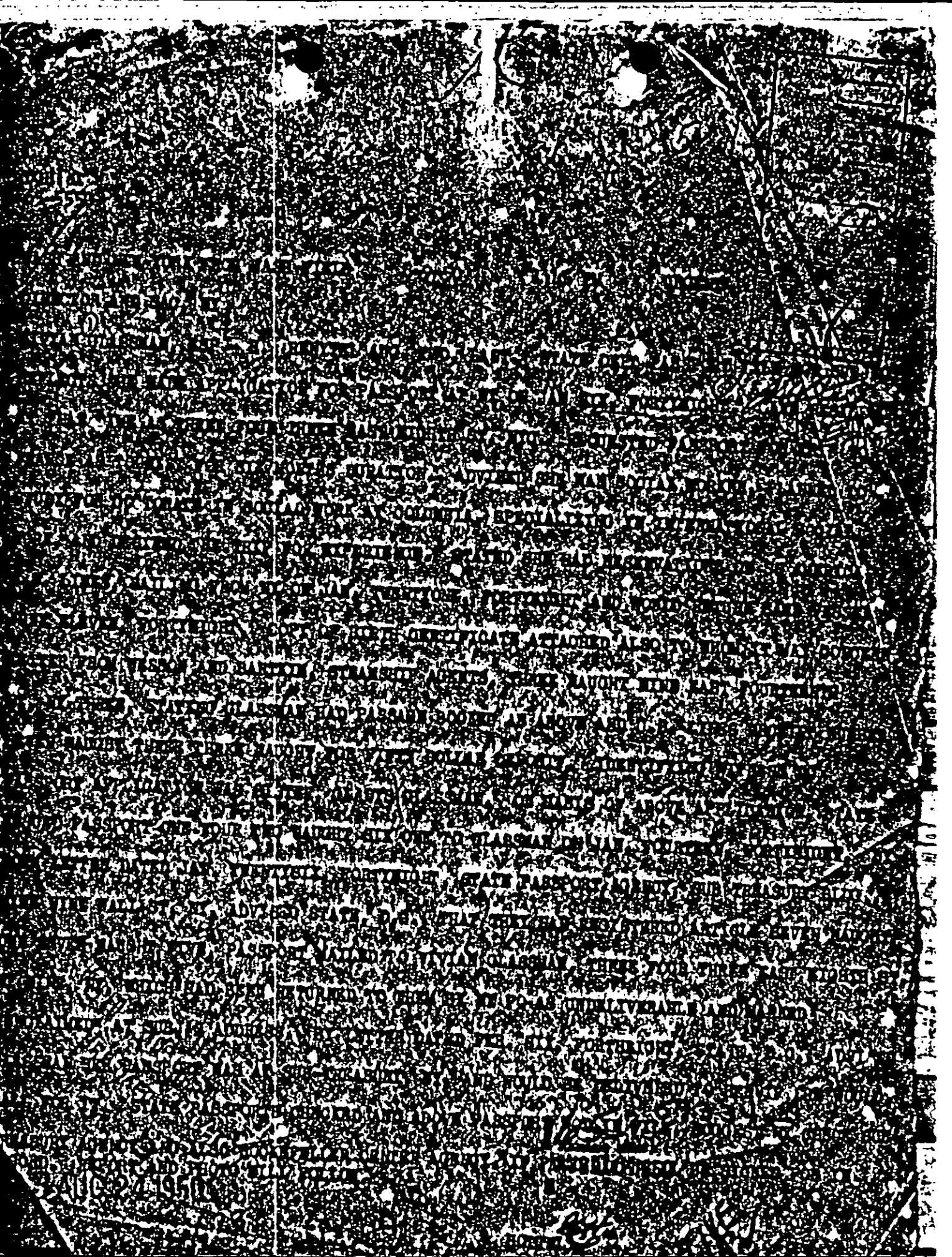
At the conclusion of this interview with Vivian Glasman she stated that she desired to seek legal counsel before she signed any statement concerning the information which she had given to the Agents. She agreed to visit the New York Office of the FBI on August 4, 1950, in order to complete the interview and the statement. However, on August 4, 1950, she telephonically advised that she had been unsuccessful in her attempt to contact her attorney, Leonard Boudin, as he was on vacation. She informed that an associate in Boudin's firm advised her not to talk to the FBI until she could discuss the matter with Boudin. She mentioned that she would advise the New York Office of the FBI on August 7, 1950, as to whether Boudin would handle her case and his instructions to her as to furnishing information in this matter.

Vivian Glasman was born in New York City on June 30, 1919. Her parents were Samuel Glasman (deceased) of Russian-Jewish extraction, and Sadie Horowitz. She attended Washington Irving High School in New York City. She subsequently graduated from Hunter College with a B.A. Degree and took graduate work at City College of New York. Since her graduation she has been employed as a credit clerk at Belmonts and H. L. Gross and Brothers, both of New York City. She has also worked for the New York City Department of Welfare, Department of Labor and Brooklyn College. From March to September, 1943, she was employed as a Jr. Professional Assistant at the U. S. Army General Development Laboratory at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. While employed at this laboratory she was reported as being the leading figure in the Communist dominated Monmouth Chapter of the UPWA - CIO union.

The investigation in this matter has developed that Vivian Glasman is presently residing in an apartment which Julius Rosenberg reportedly occupied in 1946. It was also determined that a money order in the amount of \$45 was issued in her name and deposited on August 11,

1949, to the bank account of Alfred Sarant in Ithaca, New York. This money was believed to constitute a rental payment on the apartment located at 65 Morton Street, New York City, which apartment was reported as having been used by Alfred Sarant, William Perl, Michael Sidorevich and other known associates of Julius Rosenberg.

The above is being passed on to you for your information. You are advised that the New York Office of the Bureau is discussing the facts concerning Vivian Glassman with United States Attorney Irving Saypol in the Southern District of New York.

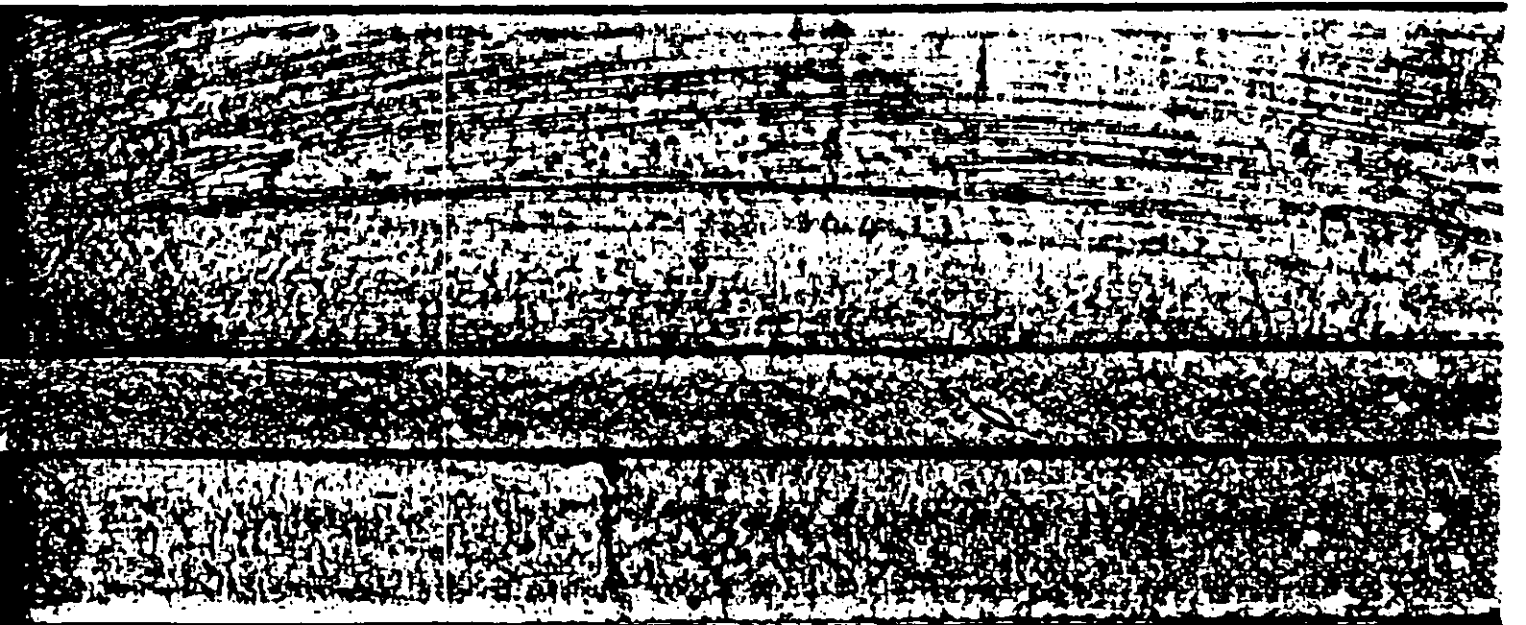

Regarding family background, it was indicated that her father was SAMUEL GLASSMAN, born in Russia on or about 1880, and whom she indicated was deceased. GLASSMAN stated that her father had immigrated to the United States in 1900, and had lived in the United States from 1900 to 1930. She further stated that he had been naturalized, but she was not familiar with the details of this naturalization.

GLASSMAN indicated that her mother, SADIE GLASSMAN, had been born in Russia on November 15, 1890, and her present address was Box 6, Lincolndale, New York. She stated her mother had immigrated to the United States in 1894, and had resided continually in the United States from that date to the present time. Her mother was naturalized in 1929.

With regard to her anticipated trip abroad, GLASSMAN stated that her port of departure would be New York, and that she expected to leave on January 21, 1948, aboard the United States lines vessel SS "America" for a six-months' trip to France as a tourist. The identifying witness to this application was her sister, GLADYS GLASSMAN, also of 343 East Eighth Street, New York, New York.

In accordance with the above application, Passport No. 142061 was issued to GLASSMAN on January 14, 1948. The subject had attached to this application for passport a photostatic copy of her birth certificate registered No. 5179 of the Department of Health, City of New York. This photostatic copy confirmed subject's date of birth, and the residence of her parents at the time of her birth was given as 450 Bradford Street, Brooklyn, New York. Her father's occupation at this time was given as Game Dealer. On this birth certificate her mother's name was given as SADIE GLASSMAN, nee MOROVITZ, and her occupation was given as housewife. The number of children, including the present one listed on this birth certificate was four, and it further indicated that all four were presently living.

GLASSMAN also attached to her application for passport a "To Whom It May Concern" letter dated January 5, 1948, on the stationery of Lesson and Bartkiew Steamship Agents, 309 East Fourteenth Street, New York 3, New York. This letter was signed by A. WESSON and read as follows:

"The undersigned hereby states that Miss VIVIAN GLASSMAN, of New York City, has purchased from us passage on the SS 'America' of the United States Lines, sailing from New York to France on January 21, 1948, and returning from France to New York on the SS 'America' June 11, 1948.

"Cabin B-19, Berth 4, in the tourist class reserved. Deposit receipt of the United States Lines No. 70330 for the sum of \$50.00 herewith attached."

Also accompanying her application for passport, GLASSMAN directed the following letter in longhand to the Department of State. This letter, with the return address of 343 East Eighth Street, New York City, was dated January 7, 1948.

"I should like to apply for a passport to go to France as a tourist. I am a social worker by profession and want the experience of living abroad as background for my future work. After my trip, I plan to study for my Doctorate in Social Work at Columbia University and want to specialize in International Social Work. I am also interested in improving my knowledge of French, which will aid me in this work.

"I plan to sail on the SS 'America' leaving the Port of New York on January 21st. I have made arrangements to return to the United States on June 11, 1948.

"The ship is due to arrive in Cherbourg on January 28. From there, I plan to go to Paris, where I have hotel accommodations. In the course of my stay, I plan to visit the surrounding cities and villages where I have several friends."

This letter was signed with subject's signature, VIVIAN GLASSMAN.

The next document in subject's passport file was a form letter dated January 26, 1948, to the Department of State, Washington, D. C., from Department of State Passport Agency, Sub-Treasury Building, New York City. This letter advised the Department of State, Washington, D. C., that registered article No. 701705, which was identified as addressed to VIVIAN GLASSMAN, 343 East Eighth Street, New York 9, New York, had been received on that date by the Sub-Treasury Office of the Department of State from the New York Post Office as undeliverable and marked "Unclaimed." In answer to this notice, the State Department, on February 6, 1948, directed a letter to the subject at the above address, advising her that Passport No. 142061 had been issued to her and was being held at the Passport Agency, Sub-Treasury Building, Wall and Nassau Streets, New York City, and would be delivered to her if she would call at that office.

There was no further indication in the files of the State Department that GLASSMAN had ever made further inquiry concerning her passport or had ever received it from the New York Sub-Office. In view of this, canceled or unclaimed passports on file at the Department of State were checked, but Passport No. 142061 was not in file. The State Department expressed the opinion that it is possible this passport is still at the Sub-Office in the Sub-Treasury Building, and possibly in the Passport Office of the Rockefeller Center, New York City. It was further stated that if it had ever been picked up by the subject or an authorized Agent for her, the records of one of these offices would reflect this.

VIVIAN GLASSMAN, ESP-R. REMYTEL AUGUST TENTH. ROBERT SEIDMAN, AN ATTORNEY, APPEARED AUSA MYLES LANE-S OFFICE THIS MORNING AND LANE ASKED IF HE REPRESENTED SUBJECT. THEORETICAL QUESTIONS WERE PUT BY LANE AND SEIDMAN TO EACH OTHER AS TO WHETHER OR NOT AN ANSWER WOULD INCRIMINATE AND DISAGREEING WITH EACH OTHER, LANE INVITED SEIDMAN TO LEAVE HIS OFFICE INASMUCH AS HE WAS NOT REPRESENTING SUBJECT. GLASSMAN APPEARED BEFORE GRAND JURY FOR FORTY MINUTES AND LANE AND USA IRVING SAYPOL STOPPED THE PROCEEDINGS AND CONFERRED WITH GLASSMAN IN PRIVATE OFFICE FOR ABOUT THIRTY MINUTES. SAYPOL THEN ADVISED AGENTS THAT SUBJECT HAD DEMANDED PROMISE

AUSA Miles Lane advised also that Vivian Glassman has indicated through her attorney that she wants to talk to the Grand Jury. It is still questionable whether she will talk freely. However, she is to appear before the Grand Jury Wednesday, September 6, 1950.

Mr. Whelan advised that in view of this the New York Office would like to remove the physical surveillance on Glassman which has been conducted for the past several weeks.

I advised him it was satisfactory to remove this surveillance until we determine what her attitude is before the Grand Jury.

Lane explained the procedure leading to a contempt citation for failure to answer questions before the Grand Jury. Following this explanation, Lane took GLASSMAN before the Grand Jury, where she refused to answer questions on the grounds that her answers might tend to incriminate or degrade her. She was excused to appear again before the Grand Jury on August 11, 1950.

On August 11, 1950 ROBERT SEIDMAN, an attorney, appeared at the office of Assistant United States Attorney Lane and advised that although he had not been retained as a counsel by the subject and did not represent her, he was acting in the capacity of an adviser. SEIDMAN explained that he was not admitted to practice in Federal courts. Lane told him that the subject was cooperative with the FBI until she talked to him and that she had told the Grand Jury that SEIDMAN had advised her not to talk to the FBI. SEIDMAN denied so advising her and stated that he had merely informed her of her constitutional right not to answer any questions on grounds that it might incriminate or degrade her.

On August 11, 1950 the subject appeared before the Grand Jury for forty minutes and Assistant United States Attorney Lane and United States Attorney Irving Saypol stopped the proceedings and conferred in private with GLASSMAN for about thirty minutes. Saypol then withdrew from the conference room and advised Agents that the subject had demanded a promise of immunity from prosecution before further interview or assistance to the FBI. Saypol asked about the subject's relative importance in the ROSENBERG espionage ring as far as present knowledge of the Bureau was concerned.

He was advised of the present known facts concerning her. He stated that if her information would materially assist in further identification of Soviet agents he would be willing to go along with her to make her a witness instead of a defendant, but that it had to be borne in mind that if she is subsequently used to testify against others her testimony would be weakened if her grant of immunity were brought out. Saypol and Lane then returned to confer with GLASSMAN to again try to persuade her to cooperate, but she was adamant in her refusal without a promise of immunity. Saypol then advised Agents that he would release her until Monday, August 14, 1950, in view of the imminent arrest of ETHEL ROSENBERG, and hoped that this arrest would have the psychological effect of getting her to talk without a definite promise of immunity. He said he planned to take the subject before a Federal Judge Monday, August 14, 1950, for a contempt citation if she refused to testify.

While the subject was seated in the Grand Jury waiting room waiting to testify on August 11, 1950, ETHEL ROSENBERG also appeared in the waiting room in response to a Grand Jury subpoena and took a seat facing GLASSMAN, on the opposite side of the room. Neither GLASSMAN nor ROSENBERG spoke to the other, nor did they indicate any sign of recognition of each other.

Following GLASSMAN'S private conference with United States Attorney Saypol and Assistant United States Attorney Lane, she was again brought before the Grand Jury and again declined to answer questions and was excused until August 14, 1950.

On August 14, 1950 she again appeared before the Grand Jury and refused to answer questions and Assistant United States Attorney Lane took her before Federal Judge T. Hoyt Davis in closed court and explained to Judge Davis GLASSMAN'S refusal to answer. Judge Davis then ordered GLASSMAN to answer. She was returned to the Grand Jury room and again refused to answer on the previously mentioned grounds. BURSTEIN advised that he wished to discuss the extent of the interrogation that his client would be subjected to should she resume talking to the FBI. He stated he concluded from talking with his client that she had had no part in the ROSENBERG espionage set-up and proposed that if inquiry would be confined to questions covering only the identity of the stranger who appeared with \$2,000.00 and to the subject's trip to Cleveland, he would advise her to come to the FBI and tell all she knows

about it, as he was in agreement that identifying this man was of paramount importance. He wished to restrict any questioning, however, to developing this identity, stating that his client had informed him that she had been asked if she were a member of the Communist Party before the Grand Jury, which he thought outside an investigation of espionage, and in view of Supreme Court decisions she could decline to answer. He stated he wished to advise his client to cooperate but could not advise her to do so unqualifiedly as he could not foretell future developments in regard to Communist Party members. He stated that his client did not wish to become a "stool pigeon" in regard to Communist Party members. The impossibility of limiting interrogation as proposed by BURSTEIN was pointed out to him without revealing the present extent of investigation nor the identities of individuals involved. BURSTEIN then proposed limiting interrogation only to individuals who would be named to him and whom he would discuss with his client. This was not agreed to and his attention was directed to previous discussion with GLASSMAN of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG, WILLIAM PERL, ALFRED SARANT and JOEL BARR, as well as the Cleveland trip, and it was proposed that he discuss these individuals with GLASSMAN to convince himself that an unlimited interview with the subject was necessary to properly conduct this investigation.

Assistant United States Attorney Lane told BURSTEIN that he was not endeavoring to make a defendant of the subject. He pointed out that in the ROSENBERG indictment which he exhibited to BURSTEIN, some individuals, although incriminated, were named as co-conspirators but not defendants.

The two hour conference concluded with BURSTEIN advising that he would recommend that GLASSMAN cooperate but that the final decision would have to be her's. He said that if she were brought to court for possible contempt he would represent her but that he would decline to represent her in any prosecutive action. He requested that the appearance of the subject before the Grand Jury, scheduled for Friday, August 18, 1950, be postponed over the weekend to give him an opportunity to confer with GLASSMAN.

GLASSMAN'S appearance before the Grand Jury was postponed by Lane until August 24, 1950.

On August 23, 1950 the subject's attorney, HERBERT BURSTEIN, appeared at the office of Assistant United States Attorney Lane and advised that he had discussed with GLASSMAN her possible involvement in the ROSENBERG espionage ring and did not believe that she was involved. He stated he had recommended to the subject that she talk to the FBI but explained that she was troubled with the thought that if she should be shown a photograph of an individual and asked if she knew him or had ever seen him before and she replied in the negative, the FBI might subsequently obtain information which might make it appear that she should know the individual; or she might state that she was not at a certain place at a certain time and information might subsequently be brought in to show otherwise. BURSTEIN stated GLASSMAN feels that her memory might fail her and subsequently she would be indicted because her interview reflected that she had advised inaccurately.

Lane explained that he was not interested in indicting GLASSMAN but was interested in the information she may have concerning other people, possibly members of the ROSENBERG espionage ring, and that if she should consent to further interview and should give certain answers to questions which subsequently prove to be different than the way she related, she would be given a chance to refresh her memory by hearing the facts of the incident as ascertained by investigation. Lane was of the opinion, after talking to BURSTEIN, that GLASSMAN would probably cooperate and he stated that he, therefore, granted BURSTEIN'S request for additional time to talk with GLASSMAN and postponed her Grand Jury appearance to Wednesday, August 30, 1950.

He wished to restrict any questioning, however, to developing this identity, stating that his client had informed him that she had been asked if she were a member of the Communist Party before the Grand Jury, which he thought outside an investigation of espionage, and in view of Supreme Court decisions she could decline to answer. He stated he wished to advise his client to cooperate but could not advise her to do so unqualifiedly as he could not foretell future developments in regard to Communist Party members. He stated that his client did not wish to become a "stool pigeon" in regard to Communist Party members. The impossibility of limiting interrogation as proposed by BURSTEIN was pointed out to him without revealing the present extent of investigation nor the identities of individuals involved. BURSTEIN then proposed limiting interrogation only to individuals who would be named to him and whom he would discuss with his client. This was not agreed to and his attention was directed to previous discussion with GLASSMAN of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG, WILLIAM PERL, ALFRED SARANT and JOEL BARR, as well as the Cleveland trip, and it was proposed that he discuss these individuals with GLASSMAN to convince himself that an unlimited interview with the subject was necessary to properly conduct this investigation.

Assistant United States Attorney Lane told BURSTEIN that he was not endeavoring to make a defendant of the subject. He pointed out that in the ROSENBERG indictment which he exhibited to BURSTEIN, some individuals, although incriminated, were named as co-conspirators but not defendants.

The two hour conference concluded with BURSTEIN advising that he would recommend that GLASSMAN cooperate but that the final decision would have to be her's. He said that if she were brought to court for possible contempt he would represent her but that he would decline to represent her in any prosecutive action. He requested that the appearance of the subject before the Grand Jury, scheduled for Friday, August 18, 1950, be postponed over the weekend to give him an opportunity to confer with GLASSMAN.

GLASSMAN'S appearance before the Grand Jury was postponed by Lane until August 24, 1950.

On August 23, 1950 the subject's attorney, HERBERT BURSTEIN, appeared at the office of Assistant United States Attorney Lane and advised that he had discussed with GLASSMAN her possible involvement in the ROSENBERG espionage ring and did not believe that she was involved. He stated he had recommended to the subject that she talk to the FBI but explained that she was troubled with the thought that if she should be shown a photograph of an individual and asked if she knew him or had ever seen him before and she replied in the negative, the FBI might subsequently obtain information which might make it appear that she should know the individual, or she might state that she was not at a certain place at a certain time and information might subsequently be brought in to show otherwise. BURSTEIN stated GLASSMAN feels that her memory might fail her and subsequently she would be indicted because her interview reflected that she had advised inaccurately.

Lane explained that he was not interested in indicting GLASSMAN but was interested in the information she may have concerning other people, possibly members of the ROSENBERG espionage ring, and that if she should consent to further interview and should give certain answers to questions which subsequently prove to be different than the way she related, she would be given a chance to refresh her memory by hearing the facts of the incident as ascertained by investigation. Lane was of the opinion, after talking to BURSTEIN, that GLASSMAN would probably cooperate and he stated that he, therefore, granted BURSTEIN'S request for additional time to talk with GLASSMAN and postponed her Grand Jury appearance to Wednesday, August 30, 1950.

On August 28, 1950 Assistant United States Attorney Lane advised that he had decided against instituting contempt proceedings against the subject as he did not believe that a contempt citation could be supported and that he was going to rely upon voluntary cooperation of the subject through the influence upon her of her attorney, and that he did not plan to summon her for another appearance before the Grand Jury in the immediate future. He also stated that he did not plan further Grand Jury appearances of ERNEST PATAKI.

On September 6, 1950 the subject and her attorney, HERBERT BURSTEIN, and Assistant United States Attorney Lane conferred in private at Lane's

office, at which time Lane conducted a preliminary interview regarding the identity of the stranger who appeared at her apartment on the evening of July 21, 1950 and gave her \$2,000.00 to give to WILLIAM PERL in Cleveland, Ohio. Subject stated that this stranger's identity was unknown to her, that she had never seen him before and she described him to Lane exactly as described to Agents upon interview on August 3, 1950. Lane exhibited photographs of WILLIAM DANZIGER, STANLEY ROBERT RICH, MICHAEL SIDOROVICH, ABE SILVERSTEIN, WELDON BRUCE DAYTON, RUSSELL WALTON MC NUTT, NATHAN SUSSMAN, ANATOLI A. YAKOVLEV, MAX ELITCHER, SEMEN SEMENOV and MORTON SOBELL, to the subject, who stated that none resembled the man who contacted her. Lane advised that the subject appeared cooperative to the above extent and that he did not endeavor to interrogate her at any length as he is trying to make her feel at ease and to build her up for additional questioning before the Grand Jury. He advised that HURSTEIN wishes subject to cooperate but that she is reticent to talk to the FBI.

Lane advised the subject that he wishes her to tell the story of the July 21, 1950 contact to the Grand Jury on Monday, September 11, 1950. No appointment was made and the subject was not given a subpoena by Assistant United States Attorney Lane for her appearance on this date but HURSTEIN is to telephone Lane relative to subject's willingness to testify before the Grand Jury.

Developments will be closely followed with Lane, and the Bureau kept appropriately advised.
