All sources used herein have prowided reliable information in the past.

"The Detroit Evening News", a Detroit, Michigan, newspaper of general circulation, carried an article on November 22, 1973, indicating that Russell Means has been invited to speak at a banquet at the Latin Quarter, Incorporated, 3067 East Grand Boulevard, Detroit, on December 6, 1973. The article further indicated that Means' appearance is an attempt to raise money for a Detroit organization which is the Indian equivalent of Alcoholics Anonymous. The organization needs money to purchase a mini bus and other equipment to aid destitute Indians with alcoholic and drug problems.

Russell Means is one of the leaders of the American Indian Movement (AIM) who has publically stated that he took part in the AIM sit-in at the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C. and led the occupation of Woumded Knee, South Dakota, during February, 1973.

The AIM was founded in Minnesota in 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM recently led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota. AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February through May, 1973.

On November 22, 1973, a member of the sponsoring organization, and a member of Detroit Chapter, AIM, advised an Agent of the FBI that the banquet would begin at 8:00 pm on December 6, 1973, and tickets cost \$25.00 each.

Prior to the banquet, Russell Means appeared on a radio talk show entitled "Viewpoint". The program is broadcast nightly over WXYZ radio station, Detroit. Their audience is general in nature. The following is a synopsis of pertinent statements made by Means:

#### NATURE AND OBJECTIVES OF AIM

AIM is first a spiritual group and secondly a political group whose objectives are to obtain reparations from the U. S. Government. The Government signed and broke 371 treaties which were made with various Indian tribes in the United States. AIM wants the treaties enforced but, above all, they want the white man removed from their lands. Means defined their lands to include the entire Sioux nations area. AIM was created to bring these grievances to both the public and political arenas. The public arena is the news media, and the political arena includes contact with foreign nations not economically dependent upon the United States.

#### STRUCTURE OF AIM

AIM was established in 1968, at Minneapolis, Minnesota, by Clyde Bellecourt and Dennis Banks, to express the grievances of the 750,000 native Americans in the United States and Canada. The organization does not speak for all these people.

AIM is a loose knit organization of 70 to 80 autonomous chapters in the United States and eight chapters in Canada. The national organization does not interfere in the activities of the local chapter but will aid the chapter if their dispute with local authorities cannot be resolved. If the national organization is called in by the local chapter, the actions taken by the national organization will be decisive.

AIM members do not carry identification cards. They are members because they are native Americans and hold the same beliefs which AIM holds. An Indian may be a member one day and not the next.

#### ACTIONS OF AIM

AIM took over the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C. and had other skirmishes with the U. S. Government. In January, 1973, AIM planned to take over the hamlet of Wounded Knee, South Dakota. They executed their plan during February,

1973, using 73 vehicles driven by members of their organization. They established a three to four square mile area at Wounded Knee and used force to defend the area against U. S. Marshals, FBI Agents, Border Patrol Officers with attack dogs, and the U. S. Army, who used F-4 phantom jets, 30, 50 caliber automatic weapons, and M-16 rifles. The Army also had armored personnel carriers and manned five road blocks on the roads around Wounded Knee. AIM occupied the town for 71 days until an agreement with the U. S. Government was reached.

#### REASONS FOR THE OCCUPATION OF WOUNDED KNEE

After the AIM occupation of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C., a state of paranoia existed within the U.S. Department of the Interior and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Security was increased at all Indian reservation Bureau of Indian Affairs headquarters. The Bureau of Indian Affairs headquarters at Pine Ridge, South Dakota, was sandbagged and guarded by 80 U.S. Marshals. AIM was thus forced to take over property other than the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Pine Ridge to express and make public their treaty grievances.

AIM wanted to drive the white trespassers from their lands. Means stated that he knew before taking over Wounded Knee what the United States laws stated regarding the actions he was about to take. He also knew what the U. S. Constitution said and what treaty agreements had been made with the Government. AIM leaders agreed that they probably would not survive the insurrection at Wounded Knee, but, according to Carter Camp, an AIM national leader, "Our people are more important than jail". Means stated that treaties made by the U. S. Government with Indians are law and are on par with the U. S. Constitution. Therefore, when a treaty is broken, the Indian people lose rights guaranteed by the Constitution. Non-Indians have no rights under the Constitution because constitutional rights can be broken by the Government at will.

MIM chose Wounded Knee to occupy because the Department of the Interior funded a 45 man "goon squad" of Oglala Sioux Indians to police the reservation. They were armed with guns, clubs, mace, and helmets, and were not police trained. The squad ran rampant around the Pine Ridge reservation, violating the civil rights of the reservation Indians. These men were the law of the reservation.

#### PLANS OF AIM

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Means does not expect to win in the courts. He does expect to bring pressure upon the Government to force Congress to recognize previous treaties made with the Indians. He stated that if the publicity efforts fail, then AIM has set 1976 as a target date for the end of peaceful negotiations with the Government. He said that AIM members would rather "die fighting than live under the tyranny of the united States of America." He declined to project violence if AIM demands are not met, but "leaves it to the violence prone attitudes of this country".

DE T-1 advised on December 13, 1973, that approximately 225 individuals attended the banquet at which means spoke on December 6, 1973. Half of the individuals were white, and all but 10 of the rest were Indian. Ten were black.

means spoke at length about his experiences at Wounded Knee, during the occupation of that hamlet. He also mentioned that AIM will contact foreign countries at the United Nations in New York for financial aid for their cause. He also made a plea for money to help in the defense of the AIM leaders who will be tried for their "crimes" at Wounded Knee.

Means was interviewed by Louise Leismer, a reporter for "The Detroit Evening News", and her interview was published on December 2, 1973. Means made the following comments during the interview, which are summarized and quoted as follows:

Re: Russell C. Means

"Members of his militant American Indian Movement (AIM) 'will not wait any longer than 1976 for justice that is long overdue'. "As ridiculous as it may sound, we still have faith that the American Government will acknowledge us as sovereign people with treaty rights that must be kept, as are pacts with other countries." "Bond for the defendants, about \$6,000,000, was met by contributions from the National Council of Churches, the Council of Episcopal Bishops, and three Lutheran Synods... Means is attempting to raise \$1.2 million to pay legal fees for nearly 300 defendants who participated with him in the occupation at Wounded Knee. "AIM learned many lessons from the occupation and would not repeat 'mistakes' made during the siege." Means also told Leismer that "We don't want to take up arms again, but it will happen if the U. S. (Government) continues to ignore its obligation to uphold the treaties it made with Indian nations. By the same token, we don't enjoy threatening to spoil the United States' 200th anniversary celebration (in 1976)."
Means does not speak for those "who have been brainwashed by the dominant society."

DE T-2 advised on December 7, 1973, that he observed Means departing Detroit by air. Means flew back to Minneapolis, Minnesota.

"The Harvard Crimson," an undergraduate daily newspaper published at Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts, published an article in its December 3, 1973 issue entitled, "AIM Leader Says Further Takeovers are a Possibility." This article gave details of the December 2, 1973 speech given by American Indian Movement (AIM) leader Russell Means to a group of newsmen and supporters at the Cambridge Law Commune.

Since January, 1973, AIM has been actively involved in demonstrations and violent confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City and Custer areas of South Dakota. From February 27 through May 8, 1973, AIM leaders and members and their supporters occupied the community of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms taking a number of the community's residents as hostages. Before surrendering to Federal authorities, they engaged in numerous violent and destructive acts and gunfire was exchanged with Federal authorities resulting in the death of two of the insurgents.

The Law Commune, 698 Massachusetts
Avenue, Cambridge, is a collective of three separate law firms, two of which contain only male attorneys, and the third is an all-female group. The three firms furnish legal aid to indigent residents of the Boston-Cambridge, Massachusetts area and have, in the past, represented persons charged in the following two types of cases: (1) The person is charged with a violation of the Selective Service Act, and (2) the person is considered to be active in revolutionary activities.

If elected, Means promised to abolish his office and the tribal government system in order to remove the reservation's Indians from the ultimate authority of the Federal Government.

"By 1976, the U.S. had better deal with its treaty obligations, or that birthday party white America is planning will be an unhappy one," Means told a group of newsmen and supporters at the Cambridge Law Commune, local headquarters of the Wounded Knee Information and Defense

Means said AIM, in cooperation with other Indian organizations, will reestablish a separate, independent state within the U.S. "If this self-sovereignty doesn't become a reality, this nation will be chaos, because blacks, Chicanos, and other groups will support us," Means said.

Means stopped in Boston as part of a two-month tour to raise funds, enlist legal volunteers, and attract media attention to defendants in upcoming Wounded Knee trials. More than 300 people are indicted for offenses related to the 71-day siege of the Pine Ridge Reservation town, Means said.

AIM organizers Means and Dennis Banks face trial on January 8 in St. Paul, Minn., on multi-count charges of conspiracy in the Wounded Knee siege and of aiding and abetting assault, burglary and larceny.

Means will begin his candidacy for the presidency of the Pine. Ridge tribal council in a primary January 2, he said. "If the Bureau of Indian Affairs allows me to run, I will vindicate myself against charges that Wounded Knee was not supported by all of the Oglala Sioux," Means said.

If elected, he will abolish his office and the tribal government system to remove the reservation's Indians from the ultimate authority of the federal government, Means said.

Means' fund drive has yielded less than \$150,000 so far, Lewis S. Gurwitz, a Cambridge attorney who spent six weeks last summer working on the bailing of Wounded Knee defendants, yesterday.





The purpose of this memorandum is to summarize an assessment by our Minneapolis Office of the forthcoming runoff election for tribal president between Russell Charles Means and incumbent Richard Wilson on the Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Indian Reservation scheduled for 2/7/74.

An analysis of primary election indicates Means, a national leader of the American Indian Movement (AIM), appears to have the advantage in the election. Means is of the opinion he will receive all votes cast for other primary candidates who were AIM supporters. He has stated that if he wins the election he will have immunity as head of a sovereign nation and he "will walk out of that courtroom," and "the Federal people will have to face 12 thousand people to get me." He has stated further he "will run all Catholic people off the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and take their land back for the Indians."

Prior to the primary election, Means announced he would accomplish the following if elected tribal president: Abolish the tribal presidency and re-establish a traditional form of consensual government with a rotating presidency; establish checkpoints around the reservation to prohibit transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages and drugs; investigate use of tribal lands and revoke leases held by whites living off the reservation.

Supporters of Richard Wilson, the incumbent, who is Means opponent in the forthcoming election, feel many conservative older people who did not vote in the primary will vote for Wilson in the runoff. Both sides are in agreement the election is the most important ever held on an Indian reservation and that Means appears to be the favorite.

Memorandum to Mr. W. R. Wannall Re: Russell Charles Means

SAC, Minneapolis, indicates a Means victory would bolster Means' chances for acquittal in his current trial at St. Paul, Minnesota, where he is facing charges relative to his involvement in the Wounded Knee takeover. It is possible Means will take refuge on Pine Ridge Indian Reservation (PRIR) and no longer appear for trial. In addition, property owned by U.S. Government, the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) building, and BIA records would come under control of Means, and BIA might be forced off the reservation with the BIA law enforcement agency being replaced by tribal police. Because of Means' dislike for the FBI, it is possible FBI Agents would not be able to conduct investigations within the FBI's jurisdiction on PRIR, and free access to PRIR would be denied if road blocks are set up and free movement of the public curtailed. Minneapolis is of opinion if Means is elected a confrontation and possible violence could occur between the Means faction and those persons still loyal to Wilson as well as with white ranchers who may be forced off leased land.

In making its assessment, Minneapolis notes the PRIR is an area of exclusive Federal jurisdiction. The Governor of South Dakota has previously stated he would not use the National Guard on the reservation and accordingly any breakdown in law and order will require response from the Federal Government.

Our Minneapolis Office is closely following all developments in the forthcoming election and related events on the PRIR.

Pertinent data submitted by our Minneapolis Office relative to this situation is being sent by teletype to The White House, Department of Army, Secret Service, Attorney General, Office of the Deputy Attorney General, and the Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division. This information also being furnished U. S. Marshal's Service and Department of the Interior.



On May 8, 1973, the occupation ended by the surrender of the remaining occupants. More than 200 arrests were made in connection with the occupation.

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

#### PUSSELL CHAPLES MEANS

On February 6, 1974, MP T-1, a knowledgeable source, advised the situation in Gordon, Nebraska, and Rushville, Mebraska, which are now described by Russell Means as being 100 per cent better, is as follows:

MP T-1 stated that in February, 1972, Russell Means went to Gordon, Mebraska, with approximately 600 Indian followers and held a demonstration because of the killing of an Indian, not named, by a white man. This white man was later tried in Nebraska on charges of manslaughter and convicted. Means at that time described the general area of Gordon and Rushville, both of Nebraska, (which are located eleven miles apart) as the most racist towns in Nebraska towards Indians. Recently, Russell Means has stated these problems, referring to the alleged racist attitude, have been resolved and there is now a 100 per cent improvement in the treatment of Indians by the white communities.

MP T-1 stated the only problems Means has ever stated against Martin, South Dakota, is Means' dislike of the law enforcement jurisdiction for Bennett County, South Dakota. MP T-1 said Means has repeatedly said the law enforcement of Bennett County, South Dakota, in which Martin, South Dakota, is the County Seat, should be under the administration of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, Fine Ridge Indian Reservation (PRIR). MP T-1 said Means has alleged there is discrimination against the Indians which results from having South Dakota state authority over Indian residents in Bennett County which Means terms as "white mans law."

Rayhill said Means, when campaigning for Oglala Sioux Tribal President, PRIR, stated that should he win the election, he would take Bennett County, South Dakota, back into PRIR in order to have jurisdiction of the Indians in Bennett County under their own administration. #### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

On March 18, 1974, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Russell Charles Means delivered a lecture at 8:00 p.m. on March 16, 1974, at Bennett Hall, University of Maine, Orono, Maine. The lecture was sponsored by the Distinguished Lecture Series at the University of Maine, Orono, Maine, and approximately 230 persons were present at the lecture. The audience was comprised of students from the University of Maine, Orono, Maine, and Indians from the Penobscot Indian Reservation located at Indian Island, Old Town, Maine.

During the lecture Means denounced the United States of America, Christianity and education as the three major enemies of Indian people in the United States. Means said the educational system in the United States was the "most sophisticated brainwashing machine mankind has ever devised."

Means said that medical examinations of the Indians who held off nearly 200 federal marshals at Wounded Knee have revealed that many of them sustained irreversible brain damage from malnutrition suffered during the ordeal.

Means said the United States Department of Interior and its Bureau of Indian Affairs is usually ignored by the press, even though it is the seat of economic power in the United States controlling the forest, paper, oil, mining and power generating interests.

Means said that "ducks" have more laws protecting them than does the American Indian. He said that "If you kill an Indian in Nebraska or South Dakota, you get out on your own recognizance, get tried for third degree manslaughter, and then get exonerated by an all white jury."

The source advised that the lecture was low key and that there was no violence advocated. The source further advised that at the conclusion of his lecture Means said that "If you take away the treaty rights of the Indian, the American Indian might just as well be dead."

The "Bangor Daily News," a daily newspaper published at Bangor, Maine, in its issue of March 18, 1974, carried an article entitled, "ATM Leader Scathes U. S. at Orono." In this article it was set forth that "Russell Means, stalwart of the American Indian Movement (AIM)"... speaking before a largely partisan audience at the University of Maine maintained that "Indian people have a right to enter the international community." Means also stated that "AIM is after complete independence."

The AIM was founded in Minnesota in 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM recently led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota. AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February-May, 1973.

Source 1 advised that these individuals would then travel to Boulder, Colorado to make a speech at the University of Colorado (CU) and would thereafter return to St. Paul. Minnesota. Source 1 learned from an individual whom he regards as reliable, that supporters of the American Indian Movement (AIM) and also Mexican-Americans, who are members of the Crusade for Justice, are to meet at Stapleton International Airport (SIA), Denver, Colorado and march to the Indian center. Source 1 learned l a leader of the Crusade for Justice (CFJ), from that numerous out-of-town persons including Banks and Means would support the crusade at their rally in memory of one Luis "Jr." Martinez, to be held at the State Capitol Building, Denver, Colorado on March 17, 1974.

#### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was founded in Minnesota in 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM recently led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City - Custer area of South Dakota AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February - May, 1973.

#### CRUSADE FOR JUSTICE

The Crusade for Justice is a militant Mexican-American organization founded in 1968 with headquarters in Denver, Colorado. Its political arm is known as "La Raza Unida" - The United (Mexican - American) People. Its objective is development of the Mexican-American community in political education and social action.

On March 6, 1974, Source 2, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that Banks and Means were scheduled to arrive in Denver on Western Airlines (WAL) Flight 479 from St. Paul, Minnesota at 7:35 p.m. on March 8, 1974.

On March 8, 1974, a Special Agent of the FBI observed approximately 60 Indians at the boarding area of Concourse "C", SIA, Gate 1, awaiting the arrival of WAL Flight 479. Observed in the crowd were Vincent Harvier, Director of the Denver Chapter of AIM and several known members of the Denver AIM Chapter. Also observed were approximately eight Indian males wearing red armbands who were not from Denver and appeared to be part of a security patrol for the AIM leaders. At approximately 7:40 p.m., WAL Flight 479 arrived and Banks and Means were observed deplaning and being greeted by Harvier.

On March 9, 1974, Source 1 stated that he was at SIA on the evening of March 8, 1974 to await the arrival of Dennis Banks and Russell Means, who were to speak that night at the Indian center. Source 1 stated that approximately 70 Indians showed up at the airport. Source 1 observed Vincent Harvier and several other members of the Denver AIM at the airport. Source 1 stated that when Banks and Means arrived via WAL they were transported by car to Source 1 stated that at the Indian center were approximately 150 Indians and an equal number of Mexican-Americans. Source 1 stated that he recognized numerous Mexican-Americans who are affiliated with the CFJ and some individuals who reside in Ft. Lupton, Colorado who are connected with the United Farm Worker's Union. At the center, Source 1 also observed an individual <u>known to Source l as </u> and (first name unknown) These individuals had previously been observed

by Source at an AIM sponsored pow wow and march at Ft. Defiance, Arizona and Gallup, New Mexico in September, 1973.

At the center, Source 1 also observed Corky Gonzales, leader of the CFJ and Vernon Bellecourt, member of the Board of Directors of the National AIM.

Source 1 stated that both Means and Banks spoke at the gathering. Means talked about the unity between the Indians and Chicanos and the mockery of the trial in St. Paul, Minnesota. Means stated he found it incredible that the U.S. Government was prosecuting native Americans whom Means described as the original owners of this land. Means also described the Chicanos as being part Indian and alleged that the theft of the land which had victimized the Indians had also victimized their Chicano brothers. Means spoke in some detail concerning the Indian religion and culture and the need for the Indians to regain their identity and win their rights against the corrupt society of the White man.

Source 1 stated that Banks spoke concerning unity with the Chicano movement and noted that the Chicanos had been the primary supporters for the Indian struggle at Wounded Knee, South Dakota and they provided both physical and material aid.

On March 18, 1974, Source 1 stated that on March 9, 1974, Dennis Banks and Russell Means gave speeches at Boulder, Colorado in Room 140 of the Chemistry Building on the campus of CU. Source stated that the speeches virtually were identical with the speeches given the night before at the Indian center. Source 1 stated that who introduced herself as was the of this session. Source 1 stated that also speaking at the CU campus was a large heavy-set Indian female, name unrecalled, who is President of the Indian National Youth Congress or similar organization in Albuquerque, New Mexico. This individual was also at SIA on March 8, 1974 with to await the arrival of Means and Banks.

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On March 18, 1974, Source 1 stated that he attended a rally at the State Capitol Building, Denver, Colorado on March 17, 1974. The rally was sponsored by the CFJ and attracted an audience of 1500 persons most of whom were Mexican-Americans and perhaps 100 to 200 Indians. Source 1 stated there were numerous speakers including Corky Gonzales, who is the leader of the CFJ and Russell Means, leader of AIM. Source 1 noted that most of the speakers denounced the U.S. Government, the Government of Colorado, local and Federal law enforcement officials. The speakers emphasized that a revolution among the minority of this country is imminent and that they should band together for strength.

On March 17, 1974, Special Agent of the FBI observed a rally at the State Capitol Building, Denver, Colorado. The rally was attended by approximately 1200 to 1400 persons. Among the numerous speakers was Russell Means, a leader of the AIM. Means noted in his speech that a majority of the support for the Indians at Wounded Knee came from Chicanos. He talked

against the White man's pollution and other problems noting that the Indian society never had a need for old folks' homes, insane asylums and never suffered with unemployment, pollution, gettos or crimes. Means stated that the White man is scarring the landscape. Means stated that the AIM had been requested by leaders of the Northern Cheyenne Indian Reservation to come to the reservation in June, 1974, to prevent the planned starting of strip-mining of coal on reservation land. Means requested the aid of persons in the audience to "get it on" as they had in Wounded Knee. Means drew a big response when he made the standard joke about George Washington not being the Father of his country. Means condemned the schools run by the White man as being nothing more than the brainwashing of Indian children. He threatened that unless there is progress in meeting the AIM demands by the Government. 1976 will be "a very unhappy birthday for the U.S."

Also speaking at the rally was William Kunstler, Attorney for Means and Banks at their trial in St. Paul, Minnesota, for numerous charges arriving out of the occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota in 1973. Kunstler claimed that the defendants could not be convicted if the "people" worked to free them. Kunstler stated that the courts were one tool in the struggle against the system. Kunstler noted that the people assembled at the rally would make the revolution which was certain to come, long before 1976. Kunstler further stated that people might have to die in the streets to win the revolution. Kunstler denounced what he described as the ruling class of capitalist imperialists and politicians, who he alleged were in their employ. He stated that the country had been built by the sweat of the people and that the people would take back what they had built when the revolution was won.

### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

On March 6, 1974, MP T-1 advised that Russell Means is no longer a member of the National Officers of the American Indian Movement (AIM). However, he is a member of the AIM Central Committee which makes all decision of importance for the Organization.

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was founded in Minnesota in 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota. AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February - May, 1973.

On February 27, 1973, members of the American Indian Movement (AIM) with non-Indian supporters. seized hostages and by force of arms, occupied the town of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, during which parts of the town were burned and ransacked, six members of AIM were wounded, two fatally, two Federal officers were wounded, one permanently paralyzed, in several exchanges of gunfire between occupants and surrounding Government forces. On May 8. 1973, the occupation ended by the surrender of the remaining occupants. More than 200 arrests were made in connection with the occupation.

### RUSSELL CHARLES HEARS

On March 6 - 7, 1976, MP T-1 advised Russell Means went to San Francisco for several days in an attempt to free Patricia Meanst, who was hidnered by the Symbionese Liberation Army, which is a terrorist organization responsible for hidneping Miss Meanst. The course also said Means has made few speeches recently and has spent much time drinking heavily in his motel room. The source said the long-standing animosity between Means and Dennis Eanks continues in private, but is carefully concealed in public.

MP T-1 advised in January, 1974, that Dennis Banks is the National Executive Director of AIM.

On March 39, 1974, Captain Abordeen Police Department, Abordeen, South Dakota, advised Russell Heans and several followers checked into the Holiday Inn. Abordeen, South Dakota.

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On March 30, 197d, Sergeant Aberdeen Police Department, Aberdeen. South Dekota, advised an annual pov-vov ves scheduled at Ron Calli Catholic High School, Aberdeen, South Dekota, on the veckend. He said Richard Wilson, Chairman, Tribal Council, Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Pine Ridge, South Dekota, vas one of the scheduled speakers. He said there were various disturbances during the early morning hours on March 30, 197d at the Holiday Inn and Sheraton Hotel at Aberdeen, South Dekota, involving Indians to which the Aberdeens Police Department responded. He said Means stayed in his motel room throughout these disturbances and did not participate in any vey. He said tension was sufficiently great that Chairman Wilson canceled his speech and all appearances at the pow-vow.

On March CS, 1976, an article appeared in "Grand Forks Merald", Grand Forks, North Dakota, a newspaper of general circulation, which said Russell Means addressed over 500 people at the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks, North Dakota. In his speech, Means reportedly compared America's treatment of native American Indians to Namic' treatment of the Jews and likened Indian reservations to concentration comps. He also said after the occupation of Wounded Knee, Federal Agents shot up church alters in the village and blazed the Indians for this.

## RUSSELL CHARLES WEARS

On Harch 29, 1974, an article appeared in the "Grand Forks Herald" in which Russell Means was quoted as soying he wishes the trial in St. Paul, Hinnesota, in which he is a defendant for his participation in the takeover of Hounded Knee, South Dakota, from February 27, 1973, to May 8, 1973, to continue in order to allow the defense an opportunity to "uncover more filth than Matergate." "If for some reason a dismissal is ordered, I predict another Mounded Knee." "If acquitted, this would justify more Hounded Knees because the Government will have been found wrong."

On March 30, 1974, a program entitled "Indian Country Today" was telecast by the Mayor Broadcasting Company, NTYN - TV, Dismarch, North Dahota. During the telecast, Russell Means said that after the ANN Dational Companion in June, an ANN caravan is going to Aberdeen, South Dahota, to confront the Durasu of Indian Affairs Area Office conserming the issue of land-camer rights of Indians on the reservations.

On April 3, 1974, Mr T-1 adviced that Pussell Made spoke at the AD. Notional Meeting, St. Paul, Minnesota, on Match 11, 1974, and said that requests for ADMS help have been received from Apache Indians, the lowthern Chayenne, over atrip mining on their reservation in Montana, Indians of Micronecia and Latin America and Talians in South Weltota State Prisons.

On April 14, 1974, on article appeared in the "Horning Bioneer", Mondan, Horth Deltota, a newspaper of general circulation, in which lussell Heans was quoted as saying that an ATH carevan plans to go to Montana in an attempt to stop strip mining on Indian reservations there, immediately after the ATH Matienal Convention in June, 1974.

HP T-D edviced Means has expressed fear of Carter Camp the was expelled from AIM leadership earlier this year, who may attempt to take over AIM leadership and has said that Camp is to be "hit". The source also said that Camp has said he is going to have Heans and Dennis Banks "hit" when the trial in St. Paul is over.

On May 1, 1976, Sorgeant , Sioux Falls, Police Department, Sioux Falls, South Denote, advised on April 30, 1976. Russell Means spoke over local radio and television stations stating that Indians of this country and Canada have drelated a national energency because of the injustices and inscribing in the judicial system in South Denote toward Indian people. Means said AIII has been asked to come to Sioux Falls to give assistance.

On May 1, 1974, an article appeared in the "Minneapolic Tribune", Minneapolic, Minneapolic, a narapaper of general election, which stated that a bettle crupted in the Siom Folle. South Detote Courtmoon, where defendants involved in the Custer incident of February 6, 1973, are on trial, when police attempted to forethly remove a band of Indian demonstrators who refused to stand when Circuit Judge Joseph Bottom entered the courtmoon. Means was photographed helping an injured non-from that courtmoon.

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On April 20, 1076, an article appeared in the "Sieux Falla Argus Leader", Sieux Falla, South Datota, a newspaper of general circulation, which described a confrontation between AIH demonstrators and police carlier that day. Russell Means was said to have not with Judge Dottum in chambers before the incident in order to rock out a compromise between AIH demonstrators and the Judge over the issue of standing when the Judge entered the courtroom.

Minnehaha County Sheriff's Office, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, advised on April 30, 1973, he observed Russell Means break a plate glass window in the Minnehaha Courthouse Building, and later observed Means outside the building apparently urging other demonstrators.

On May 2, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press", St. Paul, Minnesota, a newspaper of general circulation, which stated that Russell Means was in the Courtroom when a battle erupted between police and Indians who were being ejected for failing to stand when the Judge entered the Courtroom. Means was quoted as warning that Sioux Falls, South Dakota, will "Reach a state of seige" with National Guardsmen on every corner.

On May 2, 1974, MP T-2 advised that Russell Means has stated a policy for AIM to begin to make plans to assassinate police officers. Means suggested this could be done by enticing police officers to an isolated area through the use of phony telephone calls for assistance and then ambush the officers by the use of snipers.

On May 6, 1974, MP T-2 advised that Russell Means made a statement on May 6, 1974, that he will try to restrict tourism in South Dakota. Means also reportedly said he will have all white people on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation surveilled by AIM members and that white people traveling on the reservation are doing so at their own risk.

On May 7, 1974, an article appeared in the "Minneapolis Tribune", a newspaper of general circulation, Minneapolis, Minnesota, which said Russell Means had handed out an AIM statement which declared that the State of South Dakota was a war zone. The AIM statement said AIM will discourage tourism in the state and on the state's Indian reservations and will confiscate out of state automobiles operated on the reservations with Indian permits.

On May 11, 1974, MP T-4 advised he had learned through a second party that an individual close to Russell Means has in his possession 25 pounds of plastic explosives, and it is intended to be used on May 14, 1974, when the Custer trials resume in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

On May 14, 1974, an article appeared in the "Sioux Falls Argus Leader", which stated that Russell Means was arrested on two charges based upon the April 30th violence at the Minnehaha County Courthouse. Means demanded a preliminary hearing which Judge Robert J. Patterson set for 10:00 a.m., June 28, 1974. Means' bond was set at \$1,000 on each count.

On May 14, 1974, Deputy Marshal Office of the U. S. Marshal, Minneapolis, Minnesota, advised Russell Means was placed aboard an airplane at Sioux Falls. South Dakota, and flown to Minneapolis, Minnesota. stated this action was pursuant to a writ at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. said upon arrival at Minneapolis, Minnesota, Means was taken immediately to the Federal Building, St. Paul, Minnesota, where Means is presently on trial.



## RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS EXTREMIST MATTER-AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

Unless advised to the contrary, all sources utilized herein have provided reliable information in the past.

This investigation is based on information which indicates Means is engaged in activities which could involve a violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection) or 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy). Means has been identified as being actively involved in militant activities of the American Indian Movement (AIM). Since January 1973, AIM has been actively involved in demonstrations and violent confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City and Custer areas of South Dakota. From February 27 through May 8, 1973, AIM leaders and members and their supporters occupied the community of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms taking a number of the community's residents as hostages. Before surrendering to Federal authorities, they engaged in numerous violent and destructive acts and gunfire was exchanged with Federal authorities resulting in the death of two of the insurgents.

Source One, who is knowledgeable of AIM activities in the Los Angeles area, advised on May 30, 1974, that Russell Means, National Leader of AIM, would arrive at Los Angeles International Airport from Sioux Falls, South Dakota, on June 1, 1974.

### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

Source Two, who is knowledgeable of AIM activities in Los Angeles, advised on May 30, 1974, that Means was to receive a "Humanitarian of the Year" award from the Fellowship for Social Justice (FSJ) of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West Eighth Street, Los Angeles, California, on June 1, 1974.

On June 3, 1974, Source Three, who is cognizant of Indian extremist matters in Los Angeles, advised that FSJ held its annual awards presentation between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 10:45 p.m. on June 1, 1974, with approximately 250 persons in attendance.

Source Four advised on June 4, 1974, that Means expressed the following thoughts in his speech:

Means said the three greatest enemies of the American Indian people were identified and named by AIM in 1968 and these were, the United States Government, Christianity, and Education. Means said "we lived in harmony with the other creatures of the earth until the white man came". Means said do not mistake AIM when it says that the United States Government is its enemy, and it does not want anything to do with the United States Government. Means said "We want our own lands back, we want our treaty rights, we want the right to rule as our own sovereign nations, the lands that were given to us in our treaties and which have been broken time and again by the United States Government." He said "you can have Nixon, we do not want him. You can have the police and the government, we do not want them. Do not mistake AIM when it says christianity is an enemy. Christians came onto our properties on the reservations, after we have been put there by the government, and they claimed that we were savages. They tried to destroy us by killing in our children and in our children's children, the Indian way of life and our religious beliefs by making our children cut their hair and teach them about the white man's god. We saw this white man's god. We saw this white man's religion. We examined it with an open mind, and we saw that the people beat their children, they went out and got drunk, they mistreated their woman, they lied and they cheated one another, stole from one another, and we want no part of this religion." Means said "do not mistake the Indian, he is not a fool. When AIM first started we went back and we are trying to draw our children back to the Indian way of life, to the Indian religion, where all men are brothers. We do not kill food wantonly and abuse our mother earth as the white man has Do not mistake AIM when it says that education is its

enemies. Educated men are fools, they do not learn the lessons that their brothers, the four leggeds and the insects on this earth have to teach them. They do not learn to live in harmony on this earth and they are destroying it. We do not want this so we do not want the white man's education that teaches him to fear his other brothers. We had education long before the white man came, and that is the way we want to rear our children again. Some of the white man's tools that he needs to get along in this world, reading, writing, and arithmetic, and English, driving a car, this is fine. We do not want white teachers telling our children that they were savages, that their relations and ancestors were savages, that they had no religion and that they were ignorant, because we were not."

Source Four advised Means' speech was very effective and the audience gave him a standing ovation. Means was interrupted many times during his half-hour speech with bursts of applause. According to source, Means also referred to "Nazi America" during the course of his speech and compared Indian reservations to Nazi Germany concentration camps.

Contact with above sources determined that Means departed Los Angeles sometime Sunday, June 2, 1974.

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



General and and and were also present. I reviewed with him the considerant ins which had been given this matter with the Bureau on 6/26/74 including those discussed at our meeting upon my return to the city yesterday afternoon.

As a result of our discussion this morning the Deputy Attorney General gave assurance of his support to the FBI to command any assault that might be necessary in resolving this matter in the event Means does not appear in Federal Court on Monday; July 1, 1974. In the interim he has instructed the necessary motions to be filed by the United States Attorney for the revocation of the bond and the issuance of a bench warrant on Means in the event of his non-appearance at State Court in South Dakota on June 28, 1974; the order to be executed by Federal Judge Nichol on July 1, 1974, should Means not appear on that date. In the interim he is in accord with our position that it is the responsibility of the United States Marshal to effect Means' apprehension if possible without incident upon his appearance at State Court on Jun: 28, 1974, or any other time it might be propitious without inciting an incident.

The Deputy Attorney General stated that he would consider approaching the White House with a request that martial law he announced and the use of Federal troops should the situation require same depending upon what developes on July 1st with regard to Means' appearance in Federal Court. He is not

#### ACTIVITIES

On April 15, 1974, MP T-1 advised that RUSSELL MEANS is expected to announce numerous new plans and tactics to be used by the American Indian Movement (AIM), which were described as "heavy."

The source also said MEANS allegedly is planning to invite numerous Indians to the Custer State Park, Custer, South Dakota, where a large herd of buffalo is located, and these Indians will be invited to hunt buffalo. MEANS allegedly will justify the hunt on old treaties which state that the Indian can hunt buffalo on the prairies as long as the buffalo roam free.

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was founded in Minnesota in 1968, dedicated to improving conditions for the American Indian. AIM led and participated in confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota. AIM led the takeover and occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, in February-May, 1973.

On April 26, 1974, an article appeared in the "Daily Trojan" published by the students of the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, California, which is a newspaper of general circulation, and this article stated on April 25, 1974, RUSSELL MEANS spoke at the university at the invitation of the Campus Speakers Committee. MEANS reportedly said that the American Indian has been, and continues to be, the object of a program of genocide directed by the white majority of this country. He compared the Government's system of Indian reservations to Nazi concentration camps of World War II. MEANS also reportedly compared the Indian Organization Act of 1934 to the Bantu Government Act passed in the Union of South Africa in 1964. MEANS said the racist attitudes that characterized the Indian wars of the 18th and 19th centuries are still present today. MEANS said that corruption in the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), both in Washington and on the local level, was a large factor in the distortion of justice on Indian reservations.

On April 28, 1974, MP T-1 advised that at the AIM South Dakota State Convention at Eagle Butte, South Dakota, RUSSELL MEANS reportedly said a spiritual camp will be set up at Porcupine, South Dakota, beginning on July 1, 1974. The purpose of the camp, although listed as spiritual, will be for a select few individuals to receive military (commando) training.

The source also said MEANS and others discussed getting rid of \_\_\_\_\_\_ Agency Special Officer, Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Pine Ridge, South Dakota. The source said attempts would be made to have \_\_\_\_\_ removed through Court action; and if that failed, they would attempt to cause him to have an accident or have him assassinated.

On May 12, 1974, MP T advised that RUSSELL MEANS is fearful of being convicted on State charges outstanding against him in Nebraska and South Dakota, if he is acquitted on Federal charges currently pending in St. Paul, Minnesota. The source also said the antagonism between MEANS and DENNIS BANKS continues to grow because of MEANS continued support for violent acts as a method of calling attention to the needs of the Indian people.

DENNIS BANKS is a member of the AIM Central Committee MP T-2 on January 28, 1974

On May 23, 1974, MP T-2 advised that RUSSELL MEANS recently purchased a yellow over white Buick, four-door, Minnesota license LV 3564. The source said MEANS and others would use this vehicle from time to time and will be well armed when traveling by car.

On May 24, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Dispatch," St. Paul, Minnesota, a newspaper of general circulation, which reported that RUSSELL MEANS attended the regional AIM conference at Cumberland, Wisconsin, and reportedly said that the Indians will no longer tolerate the massive abuse of treaty rights by Department of Interior officials, and that hopefully this year will mark the beginning of the downfall of those who have manipulated and exploited Indian and poor people.

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On May 27, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press", St. Paul, Minnesota, a newspaper of general circulation, which reported that RUSSELL MEANS allegedly said an International Treaty Conference at Mobridge, South Dakota, will be held in mid June. MEANS continued that the conference will try to get AIM groups in Europe to pressure their governments to place AIM grievances before the United Nations.

MEANS also reportedly said AIM was calling for a tourist boycott in South Dakota and hoped to cut the South Dakota tourist business by 60 percent.

On May 29, 1974, MP T-3 advised that he learned through a source he believes to be reliable that RUSSELL MEANS has been causing considerable internal problems in the AIM. His source told him that there is a consensus of opinion among AIM members that RUSSELL MEANS is either "on something" or on the verge of a mental breakdown.

On May 31, 1974, MP T advised that he had learned through a source he believes to be reliable that various Canadian and United States AIM people attended a meeting in New York State on May 12, 1974. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the forthcoming demonstration to be held on the United States-Canadian border tentatively scheduled for July 4, 1974, in order to protest Canada's failure to recognize the Jay Treaty, which grants the natives the right to duty-free border access.

On June 3, 1974, MP T-2 advised that RUSSELL MEANS may attempt to flee the United States at the conclusion of the trial in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he is presently under indictment on various charges arising out of the Wounded Knee takeover.

On February 27, 1973, members of the American Indian Movement (AIM) with non-Indian supporters, seized hostages and by force of arms, occupied the town of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, during which parts of the town were burned and ransacked, six members of AIM were wounded, two fatally, two Federal officers were wounded, one permanently paralyzed, in several exchanges of gunfire between occupants and surrounding Government forces. On May 8, 1973, the occupation ended by the surrender of the remaining occupants. More than 200 arrests were made in connection with the occupation.

On June 10, 1974, MP T-1 advised that RUSSELL MEANS has suggested digging up white peoples graves and displaying the bones in protest to the display of Indian bones at various South Dakota universities.

On June 11, 1974, MP T-5 advised that RUSSELL MEANS recently told AIM members that they must broaden their movement and make contacts with various radical groups. The source said some Indians interpreted this to mean they should join the CPUSA, and some have done so.

The CPUSA was described on May 28, 1942, by the then Attorney General as "... from the time of its inception in 1919 to the present time, is an organization that believes in, advises, advocates and teaches the overthrow by force and violence of the Government of the United States." The CPUSA was also cited on December 4, 1947, and September 21, 1948, by the then Attorney General as a "subversive" organization which seeks "to alter the form of government of the United States by unconstitutional means." There has been no evidence that the primary aims and objectives of the CPUSA have changed over the years.

On June 18, 1974, MP T-2 advised that during demonstrations at the BIA Building in Aberdeen, South Dakota, on June 17-18, 1974, RUSSELL MEANS and JOHN THOMAS, Spokesman for the Wounded Knee Legal Defense-Offense Committee, urged demonstrators to cause a disturbance which would result in a confrontation between AIM and the police.


On June 21, 1974, MERYLN SOVERSON, Chief of Police, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, advised that Sioux Falls, South Dakota, police officers responded to a call at the Osco Drug Store, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, on that date regarding two adult shoplifters, both of whom were said to be AIM members. As the officers were explaining the charges and bonding procedures to the two suspected shoplifters, RUSSELL MEANS and six other Indians entered the store. MEANS confronted the store owner and reportedly said, "If you arrest them Sioux Falls will be in a lot of trouble this summer." The store owner then refused to press charges against the two shoplifters, or to press charges of intimidation against RUSSELL MEANS.

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On June 22, 1974, Chief SOVERSON advised that on that date two Mission, South Dakota, police officers answered a call that a disturbance was in progress at the Mission Golf Course, Mission, South Dakota. Upon arrival at the site the two police officers were severely beaten by RUSSELL MEANS and 15 other Indians. It was later discovered that a .30 caliber carbine and a shotgun were stolen from one of the police cars. Both officers were admitted to a hospital at Valentine, Nebraska. Both officers sustained broken noses and severe lacerations and contusions.

| A continuous content of the police cars are local resident, also sustained a serious gunshot wound shortly after the police officers escaped from the golf club.



On June 24, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Dispatch" which said that RUSSELL MEANS had failed to surrender to Federal authorities as stipulated in a Federal warrant for his arrest, stemming from an incident at Mission, South Dakota, on June 22, 1974.

On June 25, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Dispatch" which said that Chief Tribal Judge MARIO GONZALES, Rosebud Sioux Tribal Court, Rosebud Indian Reservation, Rosebud, South Dakota, issued a temporary restraining order to prevent the Federal Government from arresting RUSSELL MEANS and

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On June 26, 1974, an article appeared in the "Minneapolis Star," Minneapolis, Minnesota, a newspaper of general circulation, which said that RUSSELL MEANS remained free on a Rosebud Sioux Tribal Order despite Federal warrants for his arrest. The article also said that MEANS was tentatively scheduled to appear at Sioux Falls, South Dakota, on June 28, 1974, to face riot charges stemming from an April 30, 1974, disturbance at the Minnehaha County Court House in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

On June 27, 1974, an article appeared in the "Rapid City Journal", Rapid City, South Dakota, a newspaper of general circulation, which reported that RUSSELL MEANS allegedly vowed on June 26, 1974, that he would not return to jail. MEANS was quoted as saying, "I'm just tired of going to jailall the time for no justified reason whatsoever. No longer will I submit to Federal authority, their harassment and intimidation."

The article continued that United States District Court Judge ANDREW BOGUE, Rapid City, South Dakota, ordered MARIO GONZALES, Rosebud Chief Tribal Judge, Rosebud Indian Reservation, Rosebud, South Dakota, to halt proceedings whereby GONZALES had restrained Federal Agents from arresting RUSSELL MEANS and and from ordering the Federal Government to prove that it has jurisdiction on the reservation.

On June 28, 1974, an article appeared in the "Rapid City Journal", which reported that RUSSELL MEANS surrendered himself to Federal authorities on that date.

On June 29, 1974, an article appeared in the "Rapid City Journal", which stated that RUSSELL MEANS posted a \$15,000 bond on June 28, 1974, and was released.

On July 24, 1974, MP T-6 advised that he had learned that RUSSELL MEANS had reportedly said that AIM is planning to make 1976 a bad year for Canada and the southwestern part of the United States. The source said MEANS is reportedly upset because white people are living on land he believes was given to the Indians in the treaty of 1868, and because he believes the Government is harassing MEANS also reportedly said that if the United States District Court in Rapid City, South Dakota, overturns the Oglala Sioux Tribal election held on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation on February 7, 1974, that he will be elected Tribal president. MEANS also was reportedly upset because of news reports from Farmington, New Mexico. These reports told of a number of Indian bodies found near Farmington. MEANS reportedly vowed to "tear it up," the City of Farmington, when the trial in St. Paul, Minnesota, is over. Referring to Farmington, he allegedly said, "We are going to give our bodies at Farmington," and that next time "We will be on the attack and will pick and choose our times." The source said MEANS' behavior was reported to have been hyper active during this conversation, and not like his normal self.

On July 29, 1974,

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On July 31, 1974, Lieutenant South Dakota Highway Patrol, Rapid City, South Dakota, advised that RUSSELL MEANS and a second Indian male were admitted to the Regional East Hospital, Rapid City, South Dakota, after being brought to Rapid City by ambulance from the Rosebud Indian Reservation. The source said MEANS and the other Indian were reportedly involved in a fight at Valentine, Nebraska, during the night of July 30-31, 1974.

On July 31, 1974, JAMES "TINY" WILLIAMSON, Sheriff, Tripp-Todd County, Winner, South Dakota, advised that RUSSELL MEANS and a second Indian male were involved in a fight with a Mission, South Dakota, police officer who was off duty at the time. The source said after returned to his home, unknown persons shot at his home and his personal car.



On July 31, 1974, MP T-7 advised that RUSSELL MEANS was treated at the Regional East Hospital, Rapid City, South Dakota, and was found to have several bruises, but no broken bones.

On August 6, 1974, MP T-4 advised that he had learned from sources, which he believes to be reliable, that RUSSELL MEANS was arrested on July 20, 1974, at the Sioux Valley Indian Reservation, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, and charged with Section 167A of the Manitoba Liquor Control Act, which is a misdemeanor. MEANS was ordered to appear at Court in Canada on August 7, 1974. MEANS allegedly said at the time of his arrest that he would appear in Court when he could. MEANS was told if he failed to appear in Court, a warrant would be issued for his arrest on this charge.

On August 16, 1974, Mr. Special Officer, BIA, Sisseton-Wahpeton Reservation, Sisseton, South Dakota, advised that RUSSELL MEANS organized a group of Indians at Sisseton who were involved in a dispute with a local store owner. MEANS allegedly caused a Tribal warrant of arrest to be issued against the store owner, charging him with assault. The store owner had reportedly pointed a rifle at a group of Indians and had ordered them off his property. The store owner was arrested and later released. The charge against the store owner was later dropped.

#### ARREST RECORD



On August 7, 1974, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press", St. Paul, Minnesota, which reported that RUSSELL MEANS was bound over for trial on charges stemming from a Court House brawl on April 30, 1974, at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The article stated that MEANS was not present at the hearing, which was before Municipal Judge ROBERT PATTERSON. No trial date was set by Judge PATTERSON.

As of August 23, 1974, RUSSELL MEANS' trial at St. Paul, Minnesota, on charges stemming from the Wounded Knee confrontation continues.

MP 157-1460 ACTIVITIES On August 2. 1974. MP T-1 advised that RUSSELL MEANS continues his heavy drinking and irresponsible behavior and it has been decided by American Indian Movement (AIM) (see appendix) Central Committee that MEANS will be dropped from membership at the conclusion of the trial in St. Paul, Minnesota. The source said that MEANS and his brothers, TED and BILL MEANS, who are AIM members, were given an opportunity to receive funds for an Alcoholic Rehabilization Program to be established at either the Pine Ridge or Rosebud Reservations, both in South Dakota, however, the MEANS brothers indicated they were not interested because the responsibility would be too great for them. The recent disclosure of this information has contributed to RUSSELL MEANS' disfayor within the AIM leadership, according to the source. (S) TED MEANS is the State Coordinator for AIM in South Dakota MP T-2 on May 1, 1974 On August 9, 1974, MP T-3 advised that ATM is upset about Mineral Rights deals made by the Federal Government in Lame Deer, Montana, on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation. The source said RUSSELL MEANS has been very vocal about this situation and is planning to attend a "powwov" set for August 15, 1974, at Lame Deer, Montana. The source said MEANS and two caravans of cars comprising about 20 cars are scheduled to leave the Rosebud Indian Reservation, Rosebud, South Dakota, on August 14, 1974, and travel to Lame Deer, Montana. (8) On August 22, 1974, an article appeared in the Minneapolis Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Minneapolis, Minnesota, entitled, "Surprise Witness Links Banks, Means to Most U.S. Charges," written by DENNIS CASSANO, staff writer, in which the following was reported regarding the testimony of LOUIS MOVES CAMP, who is a former member of the AIM and who testified for the prosecution at the Wounded Knee Leadership Trials in St. Paul. Minnesota. MOVES CAMP testified that prior to the takeover of Vounded Knee, South Dakota, (also see appendix for AIM), a large group of Indians met at Calico Hall a few miles from Wounded Knee, RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS, who were present at the time, and a small group of others had a private moeting

MP 157-1460 across the street from the hall. He testified that MEANS said "they should go to Wounded Knee and take it over." MOVES CAMP then said he and the others were excluded from the meeting and a short time later, the group of Indians left the Calico Hall, formed a caravan of cars, drove to Wounded Knee and the occupation started. MOVES CAMP also testified that MEANS occupied bunkers which were built at Wounded Knee at various times. MOVES CAMP said that RUSSELL MEANS ordered and led a contingent of about 30 or 40 Indians on an assault against an FBI armored personnel carrier, at a Government roadblock on March 8, 1973. He said it was MEANS who fired the first shots in this assault against Federal Agents and he used an M-1 rifle at this time. MOVES CAMP also testified concerning an incident in which an FBI Agent was shot. MOVES CAMP said that a vehicle pulled up in front of him as he was standing in front of the Wounded Knee Trading Post and five people got out. These people said there had been a gun fight. He said someone sent for MEANS and BANKS. He stated when MEANS arrived and learned what had happened, he said. "Should have killed some more of those goddamned bastards." DENNIS BANKS is a member of the AIM Central Committee MP T-1 on January 28, 1974 On August 27, 1974, MP T-1 advised that DENNIS BANKS appears to be planning on disassociating RUSSELL MEANS from AIM as soon as the Wounded Knee Leadership Trial in St. Paul. Minnesota, is concluded. The source said MEANS has lost considerable support from his followers and the traditional Indian people because of his violent actions and excessive drinking. On August 31, 1974, Special Agents of the FBI observed a demonstration to protest immigration laws, racial discrimination, political repression and the memory of the August 29, 1970. East Los Angeles Chicano Moratorium, Which was held in East Los Angeles, California. The demonstration was sponsored by the National Coalition for Fair Immigration Laws and Practices (NCFILP), which is an Ad-Hoc organization opposed to current immigration laws. The protest consisted of speeches by leaders of various organizations including RUSSELL MEANS, representing AIM, 3 -

On September 3, 1974, MP T-4 advised that RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS are planning to leave St. Paul, Minnesota, on September 6, 1974, and travel to Farmington, New Mexico. RUSSELL MEANS reportedly said that he intends to create a national issue there and expects that there will be violence in Farmington.

On September 10, 1974, MP T-4 advised that RUSSELL MEANS said that if he is found not guilty in the AIM Leadership Trial at St. Paul, Minnesota, there will be a victory celebration in St. Paul, Minnesota, and then a caravan of about 60 people will leave St. Paul and visit eight Indian Reservations in South Dakota. MEANS stated the caravan will grow to about 1,000 people as it proceeds through South Dakota and will terminate at Porcupine, South Dakota, where another victory celebration will be held.

On September 16, 1974, MP T-4 advised that RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS are going to Washington, D.C. to talk to United States Attorney General WILLIAM SAXBE or to President FORD to grant amnesty for all Wounded Knee defendants. The source said accompanying MEANS and BANKS will be professors of law, lawyers, as well as United States Congressmen.

The source also stated MEANS publicly stated that he believed that the AIM had been denied the right of law by not having the jury decide his case in the Wounded Knee Leadership Trial.

The source advised MEANS reportedly said a caravan of AIM members will travel from St. Paul, Minnesota, to visit Indian Reservations in South Dakota upon his return from Washington, D.C.

On September 27, 1974, MP T-1 advised that AIM leaders have tentatively agreed with DENNIS BANKS to let RUSSELL MEANS go his own way and possibly suspend him from the movement. The source said members of the BANKS faction of AIM are confident that they can rid themselves of MEANS with very little backlash from the membership. They feel that MEANS has lost much prestige and that BANKS is better received among the Sioux people than MEANS. If MEANS leaves the organization, his brothers, BILL and TED MEANS, will probably succeed him.

The source also advised that RUSSELL MEANS, other AIM leaders and MARLON BRANDO were in New York City in the recent past in order to tape a segment of the Today Show to be televised on September 30, 1974. He said that he had learned that they discussed a proposed movie on Wounded Knee and that none of the AIM leaders would act in the movie. He said he had heard that some of the parts in the movie would be filmed at Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Indian Reservation.

The source also advised that GEORGE ROBERTS, who the source reported is the AIM National Press Secretary, reportedly advised RUSSELL MEANS, DENNIS BANKS and who is an AIM member, that they should go to cuba and seek asylum as they will likely be convicted on charges now pending in the State of South Dakota.

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On September 27, 1974, MP T-5 advised that RUSSELL MEANS is drinking exceptionally heavy. A possible reason for his drinking is that even though Federal charges stemming from the Wounded Knee incident have been dropped, he must still face several charges stemming from this incident in South Dakota.

On September 28, 1974, MP T-4 advised that on that day, RUSSELL MEANS and about 130 others attended a celebration at Porcupine, South Dakota. At this celebration, RUSSELL MEANS reportedly said that the HEARST family, whose daughter, PATRICIA HEARST is a Federal fugitive, will help AIM to obtain an audience with President FORD in order to present AIM's demands for amnesty for all Wounded Knee participants and also to discuss Indian treaties.

On October 4, 1974, MP T-1 advised that GEORGE ROBERTS has requested asylum in Cuba for RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS in the event that they are found guilty on state charges arising out of the Custer incident, which was an AIM led confrontation with local authorities which occurred on February 6-8, 1973. Because of the incident and recent overtones between the United States and Cuba, this request, the source said, was turned down, but not ruled out by high level Cuban officials after four days of meetings.

The source also advised MEANS continues to alienate his followers by his irresponsible actions. If MEANS were arrested separately from BANKS, the source said it is possible he would become a lone martyr provided it served AIM's purposes. He said if MEANS and BANKS were arrested together or tried together on state charges in South Dakota, this action would reunite them.

The source also said that who is an AIM member, has expressed a desire to kill RUSSELL MEANS but has been successfully put off by AIM leaders.

On October 13, 1974, the Austin American Statesman, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Austin, Texas, contained an article entitled, "Wounded Knee Leader Wants Sovereignty for Indian Nation." The article stated that RUSSELL MEANS said in reference to the dismissal of the United States case against him, "I refuse to believe in the Judicial process of this country. We're called the radicals, the communists, yet we were willing to let representatives of the Government, the jurors, decide our fate."

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MEANS also was quoted as saying, "White men's law and Indian's law do not jive. In our society which is called primitive, not only by Karl Marx, but by Ben Franklin, there are no old age homes, orphanages, courts, juries, or lawyers.

"I doubt seriously that white people will ever get involved in the Indian struggle. They are afraid of the unknown. Thanks to John Wayne and Tonto, they have stereotyped the Indian. He's either dying or building a campfire for the white man."

On October 14, 1974, the Austin American Statesman, supra, contained an article entitled, "'Nazi America' Rapped By AIM Leader Means." This article reported on a speech made by RUSSELL MEANS at Austin, Texas. MEANS is quoted as saying, "The AIM movement represents the traditional Indian people who have been relegated to concentrations camps, better known as reservations. We welcome you to Nazi America."

The October 14, 1974, issue of the <u>Daily Texan</u>, a student newspaper published at the University of <u>Texas</u>, Austin. Texas, contained an article entitled, "Columbus Day Criticized 'Indian Leader Means Calls Holiday Gross Insult' ". This article quoted RUSSELL MEANS as saying, "What I represent and what the American Indian Movement represents is the traditional Indian people."

"Columbus Day is the grossest insult to anyone with intelligence I can imagine."

"He was a half a world off course. We (the Indians) found him."

"White America plans to celebrate 200 years in 1976, and I can guarantee you that for the American Indian Movement and our people, its going to be an unhappy anniversary."

"And I guarantee you there's going to be blood."

MEANS stated that the Americans do not know the true plight of the Indians and is quoted as saying, "In this country the Government is not telling you about the reservations, and the news media is not telling you the truth about the deprivation on Indians."

On October 23, 1974, the Tomorrow Show, which is a five days a week television program on NBC, featured RUSSELL MEANS and ROBERT BURNETT, SR., who identified himself as the tribal chief on the Rosebud Indian Reservation, Rosebud, South Dakota, JOYCE SELANDER, who also identified herself as an alternate juror on the Wounded Knee Leadership Trial in St. Paul, Minnesota, and MARK LANE, a defense attorney for RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS in the St. Paul trial. MEANS and BURNETT stated during the program that they were the "landlords of the United States," indicating that they owned the country as Indians. MEANS also was asked by the program commentator what he or AIM wanted. MEANS said he wanted Minnesota among other things and the right for the Indian to enter into the international community and United Nations. He said the Indian wanted their own Government and corrective control of agriculture, business, railroads. etcetera. When asked if he was referring to a socialist form of Government, MEANS replied, "Call it what you want, call it a tribal state."

On October 25, 1974, an article entitled, "Means' 'genocide' Remarks Spur Calls" appeared in the Rapid City Journal, a newspaper of general circulation, published at Rapid City, South Dakota, which reported that RUSSELL MEANS appeared on the Tomorrow Show, broadcasted on October 22, 1974, and also quoted as saying there was "genocide" of the Indian in South Dakota.

On October 30, 1974, an article appeared in the St. Paul Pioneer Press, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in which RUSSELL MEANS reportedly said he fully expects a confrontation in Pierre, South Dakota, on November 1, 1974, when an AIM proposed demonstration is scheduled because of "rampant racism that exists among federal officials and white residents of South Dakota."

On November 12, 1974, MP T-6 advised that RUSSELL MEANS is allegedly losing support of his followers because all he does is talk about taking action but does nothing. The source said MEANS' followers are getting tired of listening to him. He said MEANS' brothers, TED and BILL MEANS, have split with him because of his drinking problem and irresponsible statements.

#### ARREST RECORD

On September 16, 1974, the Minneapolis Star, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Minneapolis, Minnesota, reported that on that day, all charges against RUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS stemming from the Wounded Knee incident in 1973 were dismissed by United States District Court Judge FRED NICHOL.

Concerning RUSSELL MEANS' arrest stemming from an incident that occurred on the night of June 22, 1974, at the Mission Golf Club, Mission, South Dakota, where two police officers were severely beaten! On October 1, 1974, RUSSELL MEANS was arraigned in United States District Court in Pierre, South Dakota, and the case was bound over for trial.

On October 25, 1974, Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) R. D. HURD, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, advised that the Office of the United States Attorney (USA) is considering trying RUSSELL MEANS separately from the other persons under indictment in the Mission, South Dakota, matter. He said no trial date has as yet been set for MEANS or the others under indictment.

### RESIDENCE

On September 22, 1974, MP T-1 advised that RUSSELL MEANS continues to reside at the downtown St. Paul Holiday Inn. occupying rooms 604 and 606, which are provided free of charge by the motel when he is in St. Paul, Minnesota. The source advised to his knowledge, MEANS continues to claim Porcupine, South Dakota, as his permanent residences.

AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT (AIM)

Since January, 1973, AIM has been actively involved in demonstrations and violent confrontations with local authorities in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City and Custer areas of South Dakota. From February 27 through May 8, 1973, AIM leaders and members and their supporters occupied the community of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms taking a number of the community's residents as hostages. Before surrendering to Federal authorities, they engaged in numerous violent and destructive acts and gunfire was exchanged with Federal authorities resulting in the death of two of the insurgents.

### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

Characterization of the American Indian Movement (AIM) is set forth as an appendix page attached hereto.

Russell Means and John Thomas are telling a man in Houston. Texas, they possess knowledge of where Patty Hearst is located, whereas they actually do not know her whereabouts. Their purpose in making this false claim is merely to obtain money from this man. Their plan is simply a "rip off" scheme.

Symbionese Liberation Army (SLA) people do not trust Russell Means. In fact, there is every indication that SLA people trust very few people connected with AIM.

The SLA is the underground terrorist group which has claimed responsibility for the kidnaping of Patricia Campbell Hearst in California on February 4, 1974.

Russell Charles Means holds no office in AIM, but is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision making body.

There has been a recent split in AIM. Russell Means pulled his people out of AIM and he is now residing in Porcupine, South Dakota.

### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

John Thomas is the AIM Co-ordinator at Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

(OC T-1, April 3, 1974)

On May 30, 1974, Deputy United States Marshal, St. Paul, Minnesota, advised that John Thomas is co-ordinating the trials against non-leadership AIM people in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, for the AIM organization.

A source made available a resume of statements directed to W. W. Keeler, Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, on November 25, 1974. The statements were made by an American Indian male who indicates he is well acquainted with and has the confidence of some AIM leaders, including Dennis Banks, Russell Means, and John Thomas.

Dennis James Banks holds no office in AIM but is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision making body.

(OC T-1, January 28, 1974)

The above mentioned Indian male reported the AIM had attempted to attract him to their ranks for several years but this person had not become affiliated with AIM because he could not equate himself with AIM leadership and some of its stated goals. He continued, reporting he considers that while AIM originally set itself some worthwhile goals, its leadership in the persons of Russell Means, Dennis Banks, and John Thomas have long since prevented those original noble goals and turned AIM's activities into self-serving actions, designed to reward themselves monetarily at the expense of the Indian people.

This Indian male reported he had some conversation with AIM people and based on their statments he began to believe they were either in control of or in close touch with the persons having Patty Hearst. He reported he was invited to Phoenix, Arizona, to pursue this contention. He traveled to Arizona in this matter and there met with

Russell Means and John Thomas. These two AIM leaders assured this person they could put him in touch with Patry Hearst.

In addition to this verbal assurance and as an apparently collateral action Means and Thomas offered to display an example of their "power". This demonstration consisted of their ordering a number of young Indians to take their wardrums and go into the courtyard of the Sands Motel in Phoenix, where they held a war-dance, throwing beer cans everywhere in an obvious effort to provoke the Phoenix Police Department.

This Indian male individual reported he is convinced the above indicated AIM leaders are closely aligned with the people who have Miss Hearst, if they do not have her themselves.

In addition to this supposition concerning the indicated AIM leaders and Miss Hearst the above Indian male reported he had conferred at length with Means and Thomas and became convinced they both are drunk with their own sense of self-importance. He also stated his convictions that Means and Thomas are going to cause a number of young Indians to perhaps be gravely injured, perhaps in another "Kent State" because of the fact Means and Thomas are "spoiling" for another confrontation.

The above mentioned Indian male continued his statements commenting in effect as follows:


They, Means and Thomas, naturally have a certain charisma...and having literally tweaked Uncle Sam's beard on three occasions and gotten away with it, they represent excitement to young Indians. Certainly no one in his right mind would buy that "revolution" stuff they preach, but they are preaching it to young, impressionable minds which respond to the idea.

I can state this with absolute certainty: Based on my conversations with Means and Thomas, they propose to stage some type of headlinegrabbing incident during our Bicentennial Year AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT that I fear will reflect badly on the many Indian people who do not share their views. I would hope that some recourse should be available whereby the American Indian Movement could be re-oriented and re-channeled into a direction consistent with those many things so many people have worked so hard to achieve for Indian people. I believe we have the interest of the American people now--as well as their good will. I would hate to see these valuable assets literally thrown to the winds because of some foolish activities fostered by AIM. It would be a sad thing indeed if the present AIM leadership, which, according to Thomas, has "connections" with Havana, should bring about severe harm to any of the many Indian youth who are now responding to their pronouncements. I fear that there simply is not sufficient awareness of just how far these people are willing to go to further their own aims, but I do know they have something in mind which they plan to propose to the UN General Assembly. In conclusion of his statements the Indian male individual reported his conclusions, as related above, are based on intensive talks with Means and Thomas and after watching them send upwards of a thousand Indian youths out to taunt and provoke a Police Department. He stated it appeared the principal thrust of their actions at this point seems to be to continue to attempt to bring about confrontations, which of themselves bring about publicity and of course adds to their following. A confidential source abroad advised that on January 31, 1975, he learned that Russell Heans, along with some Indian associates, would be holding meetings with Tribal leaders in Honolulu, Hawaii.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, indicated he is unaware of any plans of Russell Means to travel to Hawaii; however, he advised Ted and Bill Means, brothers of Russell Means, are to travel to an unknown city in Hawaii where they will participate in an American Indian Movement fund raising event. No additional details are known to the source.

Theodore Means (Ted) is the current South Dakota State Coordinator for American Indian Movement.

William Allen Means (Bill) is currently one of ten directors and is an incorporator of the American Indian Movement of South Dakota.

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#### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was formed in 1968 at Minneapolis, Minnesota, by Clyde Bellecourt, Dennis Banks and George Mitchell, Chippewa Indians, as a civil rights organization. Its stated goals are to secure Indian self-determination and the right to be and think Indian; to eliminate the destructive tendencies of Christianity, white oriented education and the Federal Government from Indian life, along with the yoke of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

All AIM chapters, leaders and members are not considered to be violence-prone. Members of AIM, however, led by violence-prone leaders, participated in the takeover of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Building, Washington, D. C., during November, 1972. These leaders subsequently led and participated in confrontations with local authorities, resulting in violence at Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota, From 2/27/73, through 5/8/73, these leaders with AIM members and supporters occupied the community of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms, taking a number of the community's residents as hostage. Since that time they have been involved in numerous confrontations with local and Federal authorities, including the shooting and killing of a deputy sheriff in Arizona and the severe beating of two other police officers in South Dakota.

#### DETAILS:

#### ACTIVITIES

On November 29, 1974, MP T-1 advised that RUSSELL MEANS and another man are telling an unknown individual in Houston, Texas, that they know the location of PATRICIA HEARST, the daughter of RANDOLPH A. HEARST, who was allegedly kidnaped from her Berkeley, California, apartment on February 4, 1974, by members of the Symbionese Liberation Army (SLA).

The SLA was organized during the Summer of 1973 as a multiracial revolutionary organization. The catalyst for the organization's formation was apparently visitations by revolutionary white youths, some of whom had been associated with the Maoist Venceremos Organization, with various inmates within the California prison system.

Sources whose identities are concealed herein have furnished reliable information in the past.

MP 157-1460 In a separate Associated Press article, the "Papid City Journal," in the December 7, 1974, edition, published an article captioned, "Means Urges Indian-White Peconciliation." The article quoted MEANS as stating, "Reconciliation is the only hope for peace between the Indians and the white people in South Dakota." MEANS also advised that as long as the Rureau of Indian Affairs and white racists remain in South Dakota there will be confrontations. He is further quoted in the article as stating, "The Senators and Congressmen of this state have to recognize our treaty rights, and the responsible leaders of South Dakota have to recognize the dual system of justice in this state." On January 6, 1975, MP T-2 advised that PUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS, National AIM leaders, have been requested by the Menominee Warriors Society in Wisconsin to assist them in their current confrontation in connection with their takeover of the Alexian Brothers Novitiate at Gresham, Wisconsin, on January 1, Source stated BANKS and MEANS were planning to travel to Gresham, Wisconsin, to offer their assistance. DENNIS BANKS is a member of the AIM Central Committee. MP T-1 January 28, 1974 On January 7, 1975, an article appeared in the "Minneapolis Tribune," a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in Minneapolis, Minnesota, entitled, "Tribal Election, Lost by AIM Leader, Ruled Invalid." The article indicated that the Oglala Sioux Tribal election last year at the Pine Pidge Indian Reservation has been declared invalid by the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights, which said that nearly one-third of all the votes cast appeared to be improper "in some manner." The commission recommended that the Pine Ridge Reservation's Tribal council order a new election. The article stated that RUSSFILL MFANS, American Indian Movement leader who ran against incumbent RICHARD WILSON for Tribal Council President, had requested the investigation after WILSON won the election with 1,714 votes to 1,514 votes for MEANS. The article indicated that the Commission said it had checked 739 names, about one-fourth of the total voters, and found 154 voters who apparently were not Tribal members. On October 31, 1974, MP T-3 advised that RUSSELL MEANS attended a Puerto Pican Solidarity Day event at Madison Square Garden, New York City, on October 27, 1974. According to the source, he was a speaker at the rally, the purpose of which was to - 3 -

demonstrate support for the independence of Puerto Pico.

The Puerto Pican Solidarity Day Committee is a self-described nationwide committee of all peoples and nationalities in the United States. Its purpose is to demonstrate support for the independence of Puerto Rico.

On January 11, 1975, MP T-2 advised that PUSSFLL MFANS was in Tulsa, Oklahoma, during the week of Pecember 30, 1974, to January 3, 1975, purpose of visit unknown.

On January 14, 1975, MP T-4 advised that during the week of January 3, 1975, both PUSSELL MEANS and DENNIS BANKS were visiting on the Pine Bidge Indian Peservation in South Dakota.

On January 29, 1975, MP T-1 advised that ATM leaders, including RUSSELL MEANS are at Gresham, Wisconsin, to offer their support to the Menominee Warriors Society, and to assist them in their confrontation involving their takeover of the Alexian Brothers Novitiate at Gresham, Wisconsin, on January 1, 1975.

On February 12, 1975, an article appeared in "The Sarasota Herald Tribune," a newspaper of general circulation published in Sarasota, Florida, which announced that RUSSFLL MEANS would be a speaker at New College, Sarasota, Florida, at 8:00 PM on Thursday, February 13, 1975. The article identified MEANS as "A director of the militant American Indian Movement which gained attention with the seizure of the village of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs Building in Washington, D. C." The article indicated the speech is sponsored by the New College student body and is open to the public.

On February 23, 1975, an article appeared in "The Miami Herald," which is a daily newspaper of general circulation published in Miami, Florida. The article, captioned "Latin Indians Speak Up, Ask For Changes," stated that Indians from nine Latin American nations and the United States were invited to a conference at the University of Florida to "speak up." RUSSELL MTANS appeared, according to the article, as an observer and not a participant. MFANS did speak at the conference and in his speech outlined the problems of the North American Indians, and complained of persecution and boasted of a degree of success despite it. He explained that ATM was

MP 157-1460 "entering a phase of international strategy based on legal interpretations of old treaties with the United States."
He further advised "one of our strategies in order to enter the international community is to politically embarrass the United States of America." RESIDENCE According to MP T-1, RUSSFLL MEANS continues to reside at Porcupine, South Pakota. - 5 -

#### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

The American Indian Movement (AIM) was formed in 1968 at Minneapolis, Minnesota, by Clyde Bellecourt, Dennis Banks and George Mitchell, Chippewa Indians, as a civil rights organization. Its stated goals are to secure Indian self-determination and the right to be and think Indian; to eliminate the destructive tendencies of Christianity, white-oriented education and the Federal Government from Indian life, along with the yoke of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

All AIM chapters, leaders and members are not considered to be violence-prone. Members of AIM, however, led by violence-prone leaders, participated in the takeover of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Building, Washington, D. C., during November, 1972, and participated in confrontations with local authorities, resulting in violence at Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota. From 2/27/73, through 5/8/73, these leaders with AIM members and supporters occupied Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms. Since that time AIM leaders, members and supporters have been involved in numerous confrontations with local and Federal authorities, including the shooting and killing of a deputy sheriff in Arizona, and the severe beating of two police officers in South Dakota. A county court house, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, was extensively damaged during a disturbance at the Wounded Knee nonleadership trials.

From 1/1/75 through 2/3/75, a group of Indians led by. a Wisconsin AIM leader took over the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, Gresham, Wisconsin. Subsequent court appearances by those involved in the takeover have resulted in disturbances and violence with minor injuries to numerous individuals including police officers.

For information of the Bureau, referenced Minneapolis letter reviewed the charges still outstanding against MEANS in Scotts Bluff County, Nebraska; at Custer, Scenic and Sioux Falls, South Dakota; at Fort Totten, North Dakota, and at Phoenix, Arizona,

These charges were discussed on 5/19/75 with Scotts Bluff County Attorney ROBERT O. HIPPE, Gering, Nebraska. HIPPE stated he desired to fully review his evidence and the availability of witnesses to the Scotts Bluff County charges, namely, carrying a concealed weapon and resisting arrest before making a final decision as to prosecution of MEANS.

On 6/9/75 HIPPE stated his files indicate he still has sufficient witnesses and evidence to sustain, in his opinion, the charges against MEANS. However, he stated he does not intend to attempt to bring MEANS to trial locally, at least not until the state murder charge is disposed of at Scenic, South Dakota.

#### Arrests:

On March 3, 1975, an Associated Press article appeared in the "St. Paul Dispatch", which is a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in St. Paul, Minnesota. The article advised that American Indian Movement (AIM) (See Appendix) leader RUSSELL MEANS, was being held at the Pennington County Jail in Rapid City, South Dakota, in connection with a shooting that left one man seriously wounded about midnight, Saturday, March 1, 1975.

RUSSELL MEANS holds no National Office, however, he is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision-making body.

MP T-1 March 17, 1975

According to the article, Fonnington County Sheriff, NEL LARSON, said MEANS and seven others in a car, were apprehended early Sunday morning, following a high-speed chase east of Rapid City, South Dakota. LARSON said the chain of events leading to MEANS' arrest started about midnight, Saturday, March 1, 1975, when 28-year-old MARTIN MONTILEAUX was shot in the neck at a Scenic, South Dakota bar. MONTILEAUX was reported to be in serious condition at a Rapid City hospital. A short time after the shooting, according to the article, a highway patrolman spotted the car containing MEANS, two miles east of Rapid City, South Dakota and attempted to stop it. A high-speed chase ensued and LARSON said he was finally able to get the vehicle stopped.

The article advised it was not known who was in the car with MEANS.

On March 4, 1975, an Associated Press article appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press", which is a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in St. Paul, Minnesota. The article advised that RUSSTLL MTANS was charged with shooting a man with intent to kill, a felony. The article further indicated that Magistrate CHARLES CARRELL had set bond at \$50,000 for MEANS, who was charged with attempting to kill MARTIN MONTILEAUX in a Scenic, South Dakota bar. RICHARD MARSHALL, age 24, of the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, faces the same charge as MEANS. MARSHALL's bond was set at \$5,000. The article revealed that MONTILEAUX was shot in the neck, with a small caliber weapon in the restroom of a bar at Scenic, South Dakota.

On March 5, 1975, an article appeared in the "Rapid City Journal", which is a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in Rapid City, South Dakota. The article indicated that RUSSELL MEANS and RICHARD MARSHALL remained in custody in Pennington County Jail, Rapid City, South Dakota and that the victim of the shooting, MARTIN MONTILEAUX, remained in critical condition.

On March 7, 1975, a review of the records of the Pennington County Sheriff's Office, Rapid City, South Dakota, by a Special Agent of the Federal Eureau of Investigation, revealed that MARTIN MONTILEAUX, the victim in the Scenic, South Dakota shooting case, involving RUSSELL MEANS, had expired during the early morning hours of March 7, 1975. Records indicated that an autopsy had been ordered.

On March 10, 1975, an article appeared in the "Rapid City Journal", captioned "Pair Charged With Murder". The article indicated that AIM leader, RUSSELL MEANS, age 35, and RICHAED MARSHALL, age 24, were arraigned in Circuit Court on charges of murder in the shooting death of MARTIN MONTILEAUX, age 38, Kyle, South Dakota, who died in a Rapid City hospital on Friday, March 7, 1975. Eand was set by Circuit Court Judge MARSHALL YOUNG, at 930,000 for MEANS and \$20,000 for MARSHALL. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for May 1, 1975. Judge YOUNG said he set MARSHALL's bond at what he considered to be the minimum amount in a murder charge. He said WANS' bond of (30,000 was higher because he is out on bond, pending court action on felonies in two other states. The Judge said when the charges build up, there is tendency to consider the alternative-to leave the jurisdiction.

On April 16, 1975, an article appeared in the "Minneapolis Star", a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The article stated that actor MARLON BRANDO had, on April 15, 1975, posted \$30,000 cash bond for AIM leader MUSSELL MUANS, who was charged with murder in the shooting death of a Kyle. South Dakota man, MARTIN MONTILEAUX. The article further advised that BRANDO also posted cash bond for two other AIM members. He posted \$20,000 bond for RICHAED MARSHALL, 24, Pine Ridge, South Dahota, and also \$4,000 bond for DAVID CLIFFORD, 26, of Pine Ridge, South Dakota, who was charged with felonious possession of firearms. The article stated that RUSSELL MEANS told reporters on hand that he intends to return to his home in Forcupine, South Dakota, as he stated he "has a lot of work to do" in connection with events that occurred during his sixweek stay in jail.

On May 1, 1975, an article appeared in the "Eapid City Journal", captioned "Doctors Testily At Means and Marshall Hearing." The article stated that Doctor EDWARD JAMES, a Rapid City neurosurgeon, who attended the victim, while he was hospitalized, testified that NONTILEAUX was able to verbalize upon admission to the hospital, but that his voice was hoarse. He said the victim was paralyzed from the neck down. The article further advised that Doctor DONALD KELLY, a local pathologist in Rapid City, who performed an autopsy on March 7, 1975, testified that he had determined that MARTIN MONTILEAUX had been shot in the front of the neck, on the right side, with a small caliber bullet. He testified that the bullet remained in the body and was removed at the time of the autopsy.

On May 15, 1975, an article appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press", which is a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in St. Faul, Minnesota. This article, which was captioned "Means, Marshall to Stand Trial" revealed that Circuit Judge, MARSHALL YOUNG, of Rapid City South Dakota, ruled that there is sufficient grounds to continue the murder case against AIM leader, RUSSELL MEANS and RICHAED MARSHALL. Judge YOUNG stated that MEANS was bound over as an "aider and abettor" in the shooting.

On June 10, 1975, an article appeared in the "Minneapolis Tribune", a newspaper of general circulation, published daily in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The article, which was captioned "AIM Leader Means Shot On North Dakota Reservation" revealed that RUSSELL MEANS was listed in satisfactory condition on Sunday, June 3, 1975, in a Bismarck, North Dakota, hospital, where he was recuperating from a gunshot wound he had received the prior Saturday The article further explained that the Euroau afternoon. of Indian Affairs (BIA) officials on the Standing Rock Reservation, in south-central North Dakota, and RUSSELL MDANS, had far different explanations as to how the shooting had occurred. BIA officials said that MEANS was whot accidentally, about 4:00 p.m., on Saturday, June 7, 1975, in an incident, which occurred near the Cannonball Eridge,

on the Reservation. According to the BIA, Lieutenant PAT KELLY of the BIA police, had shot MEANS, when KELLY's pistol discharged during a struggle with MEANS, hitting MEANS in the lower abdomen. MEANS said he was shot in the lower back by MELLY's son, as he was trying to break up a scuffle between the elder KELLY and TOM FOOR BEAR, a member of MEANS' party. Officially, the BIA explained the shooting as follows, according to the article:

WEANS was wanted for questioning in connection with an incident which occurred earlier, Saturday, June 7, 1975, in which two men claimed they were beaten by MEANS. Lieutenant WELLY was reportedly on patrol about 3:40 p.m. and was taking his son to work as a dispatcher for the BIA police. According to the BIA, Lieutenant WELLY saw a couple of cars and a pickup truck parked next to the Cannonball Bridge. As he passed the vehicle, the BIA said that MEANS motioned for the car to stop. The BIA said that MEANS motioned for the car to stop. The BIA said MEANS then asked WELLY why the BIA police were harassing him and words were exchanged between MEANS and WELLY's son. At this point, according to the BIA, TOM FOOR BEAR approached IELLY's son and WELLY drew his pistol. A scuffle ensued, the BIA said, between MEANS and the elder WELLY.

In a follow-up article, which appeared in the "Minneapolis Tribune," on June 12, 1975, Attorney WILLIAM MUNSTLER stated that RUSSELL MEANS was not shot by BIA Lieutenant KELLY - as the BIA had indicated - but by KELLY'S son, TED. KUNSTLER stated that the attending physician's report on MEANS' injury indicated that there were not powder burns on MEANS' wound or on his clothes, near the point of the bullet's entry. The article stated that such burns, according to KUNSTLER, are normally made by a .357 Magnum, which is the type weapon that injured MEANS, when fired from ten feet or less. The article further pointed out that MUNSTLER reiterated MEANS' contention that he was shot in the back, not in the abdomen, as BIA officials had contended. BIA Special Officer MENNY GAYTON, of the BIA Office in Cannonbell,

admitted that MTANS had not been shot in the abdomen, but in the side, where, according to GAYTON "it's hard to tell if it went in from the front or the back".

According to the same nevspaper article, RICHARD SCHNELL, State's Attorney in Bisearch, North Dakota, said MWANS was released on a \$25,000 personal recognizance bond on charges that he hit a man in Fort Rice, North Dakota, with a rifle butt. MWANS signed a similar \$5,000 bond, according to the article, on charges that he interfered with the elder MWALN, while MWANY was performing his duties as a BIA policeman. The article stated that MWNSTLAN did downplay carlier AIM statements that MWANS' shooting was an assassination attempt. MWNSTLAN said he did not think the incident was planued as a way to dispose of MWANS. MWNSTLAN added "you put a gun in the hands of a nervous hid and give him the chance to shoot a man most of white America would like to see out of the way, and anything can happen."

In an article which appeared in the "Rapid City Journal" on June 10, 1975, RUSSELL LEANS is quoted as asking for a Federal investigation of the shooting incident which led to his arrest by Federal officials. The article stated that Federal authorities arrested IMANS on Honday, June 9, 1975, acting on a warrant authorized by the United States Attorney's Office in Pargo, North Dahote. U.S. Marshall MALTER LINK, served the warrant, which alleges that the AIM leader resisted, impeded and interfered with a Lieutenant of the BIA Folice Department, while the officer, PAT MELLY, "was in the performance of his duties". MEANS' room in the hospital was closed to the news media and visitors following his arrest.

The same article indicated that the National AIM organization was calling for a Federal investigation. He said AIM members were being asked to contact Econtor CUENTIN BURDICK and INTERPOLITION YOUNG, requesting they urge an impartial investigation into the shooting of RUSSELL MEANS. MEANS was also quoted in the article as stating he thought the incident, wherein he was shoot, arose from attempts to "discourage" his being hired as director of a boys ranch on the Standing Seek Reservation. MEANS had indicated recently, that he was seeking the position, which was to help youngsters, ago 14-15, according to the article.

In an article, which appeared on June 20, 1975, in the "Daily World", a newspaper which is published weekly in New York, New York, by the Communist Party, the Minnesote-Dakotas District of the Communist Party was quoted as demanding that all charges against MUSSELL MEANS be dropped immediately and that indictments be prepared against those responsible for the shooting. The Communist Party demanded "an end to the continuing brutalities committed against Indian activists by the Eureau of Indian Affairs police and other police agencies to halt the struggle of the Indian people against repressive and genecidal policies of the Federal and state governments".

#### Current Charges Cutstanding Against RUSSULL CHARLES MEANS

The following resume of current Federal, State and Tribal charges outstanding against MDANS has been compiled from records maintained by the Federal Duvecu of Investigation:

- 1. January 14-20, 1973, Scottsbluff, Nebraska; carrying a concealed weapon and resisting arrest; State Court; no trial date set; \$5,000 kond.
- 2. February 6, 1973, Custer, South Dakota; simple arson, assault, riot; State Court; no trial date set; \$25,000 bond.
- 3. May 2, 1973, indicted Phoenix, Trixona; Conspiracy to purchase and transport weapons interstete to Wounded Enec, South Dakota; Federal Court; no trial date set; \$25,000 bond.
- 4. April 30, 1974, Sioum Falls, South Daliota; riot and damage to a public building; State Court; no trial date set; \$2,000 bond.

- 5. July 27, 1974, Fort Totten, North Dehote; contributing to the delinquency of a minor, refusing to return a minor to her parents; Tribal Court; no trial date set; own recognizance.
- 6. February 26-27, 1975, Scenic, South Dehota; accomplice to nurder; State Court; no trial date set; \$30,000 bond.
- 7. June 7, 1975, Bismarch, North Dakota; aggravated assault, interference with a police officer performing his official duties; not rrial date set; \$20,000 personal recognizance bond.

In an article, which opened in the "Papid City Journal" on April 17, 1975, captioned "ALL Trick Dismissed Will Stand", information was released that a three judge panel of the Eighth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals had ruled that "the double jeopardy dause of the Constitution bars the government from appealing the dismissal of Federal charges against MALTHAMEANS and DENNIS BANKS", two leaders of the Indian occupation at Wounded Knee, South Dabota.

#### Activities:

On June 1, 1975, an article appeared in the "Mapid City Journal" captioned "MEANS cays he Plans to Settle Down". In the article, MEANS is quoted as saying that he plans to shed his activist role around the nation and settle down in the Dakotas to work with Indian people. MEANS is further quoted as stating "If you're going to organize a revolution, it whas to be with the people" and "I'll be available to the reservation people in South Dakota, North Dakota and Montana". He further stated "I'm tired of going to jail. I'm tired of being on the law enforcement front. I'm not going to do anything that jeopardizes my freedom anymore".

The article also quotes MEANS as stating "takeovers are swamping us so that we don't have time to do anything but go to court. We don't have enough lawyers, enough money or enough volunteers".

In a subsequent article, which appeared in the "Rapid City Journal" on June 1, 1975, RUSSELL-MEANS was quoted as stating he has had no "falling out" with AIM leaders, and he has no intention of splitting from AIM. MEANS is further quoted in the article as stating that "Resigning from AIM would be like resigning from Mother Earth." MEANS further advised that he now makes his home on the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation in North Dakota.

On March 25, 1975, MP T-1 advised that DENNIS BANKS has completely divorced himself from MEANS and in fact, refused to even talk about MEANS.

As of January, 1975, DENNIS BANKS held the position of National Executive Director of the American Indian Movement.

MP T-1 March 4, 1975

On April 24, 1975, MP T-2 advised that RUSSELL MEANS, DENNIS BANKS and other AIM leaders met in Minneapolis, Minnesota, to make plans for an AIM rally to be held in Rapid City, South Dakota, during the weekend of May 2, 1975. BUFFY ST. MARIE, the actress, is expected to attend the rally, along with hundreds of Indians from the Minnesota and Colorado areas.

On May 15, 1975, information was received from the Tribal Council at the Standing Rock Sioux Indian Reservation, Fort Yates, North Dakota, that on the previous day, RUSSELL MEANS had appeared before the Tribal Council and had made application for a position of Director of a Youth Ranch to be opened at the Agency.

This operation was formerly known as the "Poys Ranch" and is now closed, but has received further funding to bring it up to date and will be opened to both boys and girls. The home is designed as a place to handle juvenile delinquent types. No decision was made by the Tribal Council concerning MEANS' application in view of all his legal problems.

On May 15, 1975, MP T-3 advised that DENNIS BANKS and/or RUSSEL MEANS are on MARLON BRANDO's island in Tahiti and when they return, they will begin making their movie on Wounded Knee.

On June 4, 1975, MP T-4 advised that RUSSELL MEANS recently announced his retirement from AIM and that AIM leaders are very upset over it.

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# AIM leader Means says he's 'retiring'

By Dennis Cassano Staff Writer

American Indian Movement (AIM) leader Russell Means said Thursday he is "tired of being the only one on the front line" of AIM activism and is retiring to the Dakotas to strengthen the AIM organization through person-to-person contact.

His comments in a telephone interview from New York City implied that he is splitting from AIM and co-leader Dennis Banks, but he denied that was the case.


Banks and another AIM leader, Vernon Bellecourt, are about to return from a trip to Germany and France, Means said. He said of Banks, "He's, a Chippewa and should be working with Chippewa people, not going to Germany and talking to people who have never seen an Indian."

Means, perhaps the most charismettic, flamboyant and aggressive of the AIM leaders, is facing four rals in Nebraska and South Dakot involving charges ranging from floting to being an accomplice to a murder. Charges against Means and Banks for leading the 1973 occupation of Wounded Knee, S.D., were dismissed in St. Paul last year at the end of a nine-month trial.

"I'm tired," Means said yesterday. 'I'm tired of going to jail I'm tired of being on the law-enforcement front. I'm not going to do anything that jeopardizes my freedom any nore."

Means said he is tired of sitting in jail "trying to scrounge up bail money." In the AIM ofganization, that function is usually performed by the people who are not in jail on behalf of the people who are.





We'ye got to get across to Indian people," he said, "that seizing fulldings has got to end, because it gets more people involved in court trials. Takeovers are swamping us so we don't have time to do anything but go to court. We don't have enough lawyers, enough money or enough volunteers."

Means led, the occupation of the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) building in Washington in 1972, and he and Banks led the 71-day occupation of Wounded Knee that ended in May 1973. Trials of people involved in the Wounded Knee occupation are still continuing.

He had mild criticism for other AIM leaders such as Banks who are begging money from white men and making speeches." AIM has won large donations from individuals, churches and other organizations, particularly the American Lutheran Church, Means said he refused to attend a recent meeting of AIM leaders in St. Paul because he no longer wants to be a part of the speech-making, fund-raising circuit.

"We should be economically independent," Means said.

Means said he wants to work with people on a one-to-one basis to strengthen AIM.

A characterization for the American Indian Movement (AIM) is set forth on an apparate page attached hereto.

On July 17, 1975, captioned article, "Bicentennial Criticized by AIM Leader," which appeared in the St. Paul, Minnesota, "Dispatch," a published daily of general circulation, advised that "AIM Leader" Russell Means said that America's Bicentennial Celebration is "just another creation of the White man to prove to himself that he is superior to everyone else."

"Russell Charles Means hold no National Office in the American Indian Movement (AIM), but is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision-making body."

The article advised that by "White Man," Means said he meant a "state of mind" and not a race, "because I know there are White men who are decent."

Means, according to the article, opened a three-day conference on "institutional oppression" at the University of Colorado. The article advised that a predominantly student Indian audience of some three-hundred persons frequently interrupted his speech with applause and laughter as Means made references to American historical figures.

On July 24, 1975, Minneapolis Division of the FBI received an up-to-date copy of Means' FBI Identification Record as follows:

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On July 29, 1975, captioned article, "Means Cut in Incident," which appeared in the Minneapolis, Minnesota, "Star," a published daily of general circulation, advised that AIM Leader Russell Means was treated for a head wound in Mission, South Dakota, after he was cut when a window was shattered in a car in which he was riding.

A Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) spokesman, according to the report, said an object was thrown at the car from a passing vehicle on the Rosebud Indian Reservation.

On August 14, 1975, MP T-3, a source who has provided reliable information in the past, provided the FBI with a copy of an AIM newsletter postmarked August 14, 1975, which advised that AIM was soliciting contributions for the "Russell Means Defense Fund," Box 30116, St. Paul, Minnesota, 55165.

On August 29, 1975, captioned article, "Means to be allowed to Act as Co-Counsel," appeared in the Rapid City, South Dakota, "Journal," a published daily of general circulation, advised that Means was permitted by the Judge to act as Co-Counsel for his up-coming trial at Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

The article advised that New York Attorney William Kunstler might also come to Sioux Falls to assist in Means' defense.

The article advised that Means had pled innocent to charges of rioting and injury to a public building in connection with a April 30, 1974 disturbance, at which AIM members clashed with riot-equipped police in a courtroom at the Minnehaha County Court House, Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The article advised that the building suffered extensive damage during the brawl.

On September 16, 1975, an article contained in the Minneapolis, Minnesota, "Star," supra, advised that AIM Leader Russell Means said his organization will take a "counter offensive" to be directed at the Federal Government and at the South Dakota State Government. The article advised that Means refused to give specific plans, but said they deal with the White Man's two-hundreth birthday celebration in South Dakota.

On September 16, 1975, captioned article, "Means said AIM Harassed," which appeared in the Minneapolis, Minnesota, "Tribune," a published daily of general circulation, advised that AIM Leader Russell Means stated that leaders of his organization are being harassed and put into prison by Federal and State authorities. The article advised that as a result, Means announced a "counter offensive" by AIM.

Means cited incidents in six states, including Minnesota and South Dakota, where he claimed there was proof that AIM Leaders were "being busted, killed, and maimed because of racial fears that the Rednecks and law enforcement agencies have against the AIM."

On September 16, 1975, MP T-2, a source who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that the reason Russell Means missed his appearance in court at Sioux Falls, South Dakota was because he was drunk for two days prior to his appearance. The source advised that Means' representatives told the State Court Judge that Means was very ill and could not appear in court for that reason. Source advised that Means is a habitual, heavy drinker and has been drinking steadily since 1973.

On September 26, 1975, captioned article, "Means Calls for Wagner Demonstration," which appeared in the Sioux Falls, South Dakota, "Argus," a daily publication of general circulation, advised that AIM Leader Russell Means announced that the first phase of AIM" counter offensive against the State of South Dakota will be a demonstration in support of the persons convicted in the May 2, 1975 Wagner, South Dakota pork plant takeover.

The article advised that members of the AIM-affiliated Eagle Warrior Society who were convicted for their involvement in the plant takeover, were "railroaded to the pen."

The article advised that Means stated that "hope-fully, this (demonstration) will be peaceful." The article advised that Means stated "We will deal with the Rednecks and with anyone who feels the pork plant was unnecessary."

The article advised that the Yankton Sioux Industries pork planet in Wagner, South Dakota was held for three days by members of the Eagle Warrior Society in protest of work conditions and the pay and contract agreement. The article advised that the plant had been seized twice by the Indian society.

The article advised that Means promised that AIM's counter offensive would be expanded following the Wagner demonstration to include actions in Rapid City and Pierre, South Dakota. The article advised that Means stated "We are asking for the table to be used, instead of guns."

The article further advised that Means in commenting about legal proceedings against him stated "The people in the State of South Dakota and the powers that be, want me in prison or dead."

#### AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT

A source advised on May 22, 1975, that the American Indian Movement (AIM) was formed in 1968 at Minneapolis, Minnesota, as a civil rights organization with stated goals to secure Indian self-determination and to eliminate the destructive tendencies of Christianity, white oriented education and the Federal govenment from Indian life, along with the yoke of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA).

All AIM chapters, leaders and members are not considered violent-prone; however, AIM members led by various violent-prone leaders have participated in the takeover of the BIA Building, Washington, D.C., in November, 1972, and participated in confrontations with local authorities which resulted in violence at Scottsbluff, Nebraska; the Rapid City-Custer area of South Dakota; the Occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms from February 27, 1973, through May 8, 1973. Since that time, AIM leaders, members and supporters have also been involved in numerous confrontations with local and Federal authorities, including the killing of a deputy sheriff in Arizona, the severe beating of two police officers in South Dakota, and extensively damaging a county courthouse at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Other incidents which AIM has been a party to included the takeover of the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, Gresham, Wisconsin, the Fairchild Plant, Shiprock, New Mexico, and a Pork Plant in Wagner, South Dakota, all occurring in early 1975.

Scotts Bluff County Attorney ROBERT O. HIPPE, Gering, Nebraska, on October 30, 1975, advised that on October 28, 1975, he ordered a dismissal of charges pending against MEANS. HIPPE stated he based his request for dismissal due to the nearly three years that has passed since the charges were filed and the fact certain necessary witnesses were no longer available.

HIPPE also noted that in view of the continuing prosecutive action being taken against MEANS in South Dakota there was no way for him to be even relatively certain that he could institute prosecutive action against MEANS any time in the near future.

In view of above, this case considered RUC by Omaha.

A characterization of the American Indian Movement (AIM) and Wounded Knee are set forth on appendix page attached hereto.

On September 28, 1975, an article entitled "We may be brothers after all, we shall see", appeared in the Sioux Falls, South Dakota, Sun, a newspaper of general circulation which is published daily, appeared as follows:

## We reay be brothers after all, we shall see."

As Russell Means of the American Indian Movement (AIM) announced AIM's counter-offensive this week, the Sioux Falls Sun was able to interview Means about some of his philosophies.

Sun: What led you to become an AIM leader?

Means: I can't tell you, man. It's my grandfather, my grandmother. You have to understand between the time I entered white school and all through my education, through four years of college. I naturally believed in the personification of money, the dollar sign.

I don't know what led me up to AIM. I think it was kind of natural. I've been an Indian all my life.

I did want to point out this, I've never broken bread or never been invited into a white home until and after I joined the American Indian Movement.

Sun: What significance do you think that has?

Means: To me, it shows that unless the Indian stands up on his hind legs and asserts himself as an individual and as a human being and as an Indian, only then will the white man consider inviting you to whatever he's got.

Sun: Is this pretty much how you got involved in AIM?

Means: I was invited into AIM by Dennis Banks and Clyde Bellocourt. The first time I ever met AIM was at an urban-Indian conference in San Francisco, at the time I was living in Cleveland, Ohio, and I was poposed to them. And the next thing I heard they invited me to participate in one of their doings. What AIM has to say is what I believe in.

Sun: I'd like for you to comment on Leonard Crow Dog's Influence on AIM and what this all means to the Indian people?

Means: Leonard Crow Dog from the Rosebud Sicux people, Green Grass community, is probably one of the finest individuals I've ever met in my life, because every word he speaks, in broken English, is the truth. I've never known aim to lie. He definitely is a spiritual leader.

Sun: What is the significance of religion in the AIM movement?

Means: (The American Indian Movement and traditional Indian people.) which to men are one in the same, do believe in the spiritual way of life, in fact, it dictates our political way of thought, our social way of thought and every other kind of thought that we have. First and foremost all our spiritual ways. Personally, I know of no tother people, outside the Jewish, who put spiritally before themselves....

Sun: Could you explain the spiritually of the Indian people?

Means: I don't expect to explain over 40,000 years, according to the white man's calendar, of legend and belief in a couple of minutes. It would be an insult to my ancestors to even attempt to.

Suffice it to say, that we believe in all the good and sacred and holythings that our mother earth has brought to us. And when I see the rape of my mother...mother earth, I'll fight.

As I grew up and as I stand by right now watching day go by, day go by, and another day go by, they're still raping my mother, our mother. All living things conie from our mother and they're raping not only my mother, but they're raping all my relatives, the trees, rocks, things that crawl

and swim, things that fly, the green things 🕟 hemisphere and we don't even have to prove That's what the American Indian Movement it. is;all about, respect for our mother and our right to save the rape of our mother. And I'll i to turn the other cheek and bend over and fight any rapist.

Sun: What affect does Leonard Crow Dog's arrest have on the movement?

Means: He's on probation and the dirty feds and the local law enforcement agencies have done to Leonard what they want to do to everyone of us-convict us, put us on probation, then bust us, get us off probation and put us all in the joint. The whole design is, either kill us or put us in the joint. The joint being of course prison.

Sun: How do you view death?

Means: Our views of death-there is no death, only the white mar. thinks there's death. To us there's only a change of worlds.

Christians do not believe, the way we believe we laugh at the fact about tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and what they call natural disasters. This is the spirit world attempting to alleviate the pain and the suffering of our mother earth and the spirits are trying to warn us, those who are raping from our mother ....

We'll fight as long as it's necessary and after 500 years you white people have failed to turn me, our children and my ancestors into white people. We are, who we are, the most beautiful people in the western

I'll tell you one thing, we are not going get the other two kicked. That day is long

You put us down, in the next 10 years, put us down, put us in jail, kill us, force us into Indian, allegedey Indian oriented programs, sponsored by the government, but in another 100 years from now, we'll be back, or maybe 30 years from now, or maybe 10, who knows, who cares except the white people.

Sun: Do you have anything else to add? Means: Since I've joined the American Indian movement, I've traveled the country and I've spoken to many different colleges, to many different radio and TV stations, that reach the mass media. In '70, '71, I was saying, the young people are becoming angry and they're going to do something, listen. Nobody wanted to listen. Then after something happened, then they come up and say what's happening....! say listen, do you want a civil war in this country, another one. People refuse to listen.

Let me say this in closing...This final , statement is in the words of Chief Settle, who was a Squawmish Indian in what now is claimed as the state of Washington, and what he said to the generals and governors that came out after he was militarily defeated and forced him into one of our concentration camps, what the white man calls our reservations....

He said, "Wave follows wave, and nation follows nation. It's like the waves of the sea, it's the order of nature and regret is 🕠 all, we shall see."

Russell Charles Means holds no National Office in the American Indian Movement (AIM), but is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision-making body.

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On October 1, 1975, Lieuterant
Falls, South Dakota, Tolice Department, advised that
Charles Heans and 12 to 15 of his AIM followers were living
at Street, Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

On October 10, 1975, a Special Agent of the FBI
advised that three individuals identifying themselves as
French television journalists had been staying at the Downtown
Holiday Inn, Sioux Falls, South Dakota. This Agent advised
that Dussell Means was observed in the company of the following
Individuals:

[Paris, France]

On October 14, 1975, MP T-2 provided the FBI with a copy of a September 24, 1975, press statement by Russell Heans which in part read as follows:

"Today, the American Indian Movement announces the beginning of our counter-offensive. We will convene in Wagner, South Dakota, to demonstrate our disregard for the South Dakota system of justice and our support for our brothers.

Yesterday, the Federal government in conjunction with the government of South Dakota brought in 5 extra judges for the Federal courts in order to railroad 154 Indian people into the Unite Man's prisons. I ask yesterday, today, and tomorrow why Indian people are continually being subjected to the very thing that brought about Custer--1973.

Included with these facts is the effort by politicians of South Dahota to replace the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for the State of South Dakota, and the only Indian within the state to effectively bring together every warring faction.

The American Indian Movement, which is on every Lakota Reservation and in the cities, once again offers the table before the gun.

The American Indian Movement acknowledges the fact that we are being harassed, killed, and imprisoned. The past ten days prove, unequivocably, that we are being busted, killed and maimed because of the racial fears that the red-necks of law enforcement have against the American Indian Movement.

Today we are announcing a counter-attack against these vile, sadistic strategies that the respective governments have been using to eradicate the Traditional Way of Life. Today, the American Indian Movement will inaugurate our plans for the White Man's 200th birthday celebration here in South Dakota."

Heans also included in his statement the following quote allegedly derived from the words of the noted Indian Statesman Mahatama Ghandi:

"When the choice is set between cowardice and violence, I would advise violence because he who runs away commits moral violence; he has not the courage of facing death by killing. I would a thousand times prefer violence than the emasculation of a whole race. I prefer to use arms in the defense of honor than remain a vile witness of dishonor."

On October 17, 1975, MP T-3, a source with whom insufficient contact has been made to determine reliability, advised that Means during the 1974 Wounded Knee Leadership Trials, which took place in St. Paul, Minnesota, purchased several .22 caliber rifles with appropriate ammunition and a number of American flags from the Rice Street Store, Sears Roebuck Company, St. Paul, Minnesota.

On October 30, 1975, Scottsbluff County Attorney Robert O. Hippe, Gering, Rebraska, advised that on October 28, 1975, he ordered a dismissal of charges pending against Russell Heans. Hippe stated he based his request for dismissal due to the nearly three years that had passed since the charges were filed and the fact that certain necessary witnesses were no longer available.

Hippe also stated that in view of the continuing prosecutive action being taken against Heans in South Dakota, there was no way for him to be even relatively certain that he could institute prosecutive action against Heans in the near future.

On Hovember 4, 1975, an article captioned "Prosecutor: Means started court melee" which appeared in the limespolis, Limnesota, Tribune, a published daily of general circulation, advised that the prosecutor for the State of South Dakota accused Min Leader Heans of planning and starting a courthouse melee for which Heans went on trial in Sioun Halls, South Dakota, yesterday. The article adviced that the prosecutor also accused Heans of throwing the first punch.

The article noted that the prosecutor said that Means held a meeting of ANM supporters on April 29, 1974, to complain about a "lack of publicity" at hearings in the Minnehaba County Court Mouse, Shoun Falls, South Dakota.

The exticle set forth that the procedurer stated that he would prove that Heans was standing in an east aidle toward the front of the countroom with his arms crossed and as a policeum approached, means struck him.

The article advised that the prosecutor said that the crowd then surged forward and the riot began. The article stated that the prosecutor advised that a chair was tossed through a vindow and almost immediately rocks were thrown through the window from a crowd gathered outside.

The article stated the prosecutor said that heans went to a second floor stairway and kicked out a windo. and then went outside and broke windows of the County Treasurer's Office.

According to the article, the prosecutor also contended that Means had planned the trouble the day before seeking publicity for a mis-trial for the Custer defendants and his own trial in St. Paul, Minnesota.

On November 4, 1975, an article captioned "Dahl Says AIM Leaders Plotted Melee", which appeared in the Sioux Falls, South Dakota, Argus Leader, a newspaper published daily of general circulation, advised that the State of South Dakota's chief witness in the trial of Russell Means, claimed AIM leaders plotted the 1974 disturbance in the Minnehaha County Court House.

The article advised that Kenny Dahl, defendant during the Custer County Court House trial, Siour Falls, testified he attended two meetings prior to the April 30, 1975, disturbance where volunteers were chosen to serve as spectators in the courtroom.

The article set forth that Dahl stated that Russell Means and other AIM leaders agreed that the Wounded Knee occupation trials in St. Paul, Minnesota, and the Sioux Falls trials required "more publicity and mistrials".

The article advised that Dahl said Means told a group of approximately 75 to 100 people at a meeting in downtown Sioux Falls to sign up as volunteers calling for "13 to 15 of the toughest warriors they had".

The article stated that at a second meeting, according to Dahl, Means said to the ones not selected that "there would be other activities going on outside the courthouse".

The article said that Dahl stated that on the day of the disturbance the Sioux Falls Tactical Squad entered the courtroom and one of the men was struck by Means and "it just exploded".

The article advised that South Dakota Circuit Court Judge Joseph Bottum was also called as a prosecution witness and stated that during the selection of jurors for the defendants in the Custer, South Dakota, Court House riot trial, spectators had refused to rise when he entered the courtroom and had shouted profanity. The article advised that the Judge testified that he ordered his courtroom cleared and as soon as this was attempted, he heard from his chambers "breaking windows, yelling, and noise".

On November 7, 1975, an article captioned "Member of Tactical Squad Accuses Means of Striking Mim; AIM Leader Attacks Media", which appeared in Sioux Falls Argus Leader, mentioned above, advised that a member of the Sioux Falls, South Dakota, Tactical Squad accused AIM leader Means of striking him during the 1974 incident at the Minnehaha County Court House.

The article advised that Patrolman Richard Ideker stated that he was the third member of the tactical team to enter the courtroom and was attempting to edge by Means in the east aisle when he was hit by the AIM leader. The article stated that Ideker said "When Means struck me, he then grabbed the left part of my upper torso and another person came from the seating area and began striking me". Ideker continued that a third person pulled his riot baton away from him and he struck Means as he began to fall. The article advised that Ideker stated that a blow cracked his helmet and forced its chin strap around his throat cutting off his oxygen. The article set forth that Ideker said that things got fuzzy and he did not know what happened for a few seconds.

On November 21, 1975, an article captioned "2nd Neans trial set for next week," which appeared in the Minneapolis, llinnesota, Tribune, mentioned above, advised that a judge had ordered that Russell Means must stand trial on Federal charges while a trial involving Means in South Dakota State Court is recessed for the Thanksgiving holiday.

The article advised that Peans and several other AIM members are accused of assaulting two off-duty policemen at the Mission, South Dahota, Country Club during June, 1974. The article stated they are also charged with robbery for allegedly taking a gun and a can of mace from the officers.

The article set forth that Means and his companions have said they went to the club to prove that an Indian would not be served food and beverages by the management. The article advised the club is on privately owned land on the Rosebud, South Dekota, Indian Reservation.

The article stated that the two officers reportedly arrived at the club after Means had ordered a hamburger. A fight, according to the article, subsequently broke out between the Indians and the officers.

The article advised that Heans said he will waive his right to have a jury trial.

On November 25, 1975, an article captioned "heans gives opening statement in riot trial", which appeared in the Minneapolis Tribune, advised that Russell Means, a leader of the AIM, gave his opening statement Monday in a case where he is on trial for riot and injuries to a public building.

The article set forth that Means said he was charged when he protested what he called a racist contempt citation against an attorney in another case.

The article advised that Means said "The only reason these charges were brought is because I'm a leader of the American Indian Movement and my name is Russell Means".

### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

On December 16, 1975, article captioned "Judge Finds Means Guilty in Riot Case," which appeared in the "Minneapolis Tribune," a newspaper published daily of general circulation in the Minneapolis, Minnesota, area, advised that Russell Charles Means, a leader of the American Indian Movement (AIM) (See Appendix Page), was found guilty Monday of rioting in a 1974 Courtroom fight between police and spectators.

The article advised that Means predicted that he would be killed in prison, but he promised to appear for sentencing, on December 31, 1975.

The article advised that Means, age 36, faced a possible sentence of two to ten years. The article pointed out that Means was found innocent, however, of injury to a public building in the April, 1974, clash between police and spectators in the Minnehaha County Court House in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

The article advised that Means was allowed to remain free on \$2,000 bond until sentencing, after Russell Means stated, "I am not Dennis Banks." "I am Russell Means of South Dakota, Lakota Country, and absolutely no one is going to run me out of my country."

A national press release made by AIM at Farmington, New Mexico, on January 12, 1975, in connection with National AIM Convention being held at this time listed Dennis Banks as current National Executive Director of AIM.

The article advised that Means claimed that a guard at the State Penitentiary had indicated he would be killed by someone in the institution within four hours after landing behind bars.

The article advised that Means called the verdict "political" and said it meant certain conviction for seven others still to be tried in the case.

The article advised the verdict was the first felony conviction handed down against Means, who faces eight more trials in several states.

On December 16, 1975, article captioned "Means to Appeal Judge's Verdict," appeared in the "Rapid City Journal," a newspaper published daily of general circulation in the Rapid City, South Dakota, area, which advised that AIM leader Means said he would appeal his conviction on a riot charge.

On December 31, 1975, article captioned: "Means Asked to be Put on Probation, Not Jail," which appeared in the "Rapid City Journal," supra, advised that Means asked that he be put on probation rather than jail so he could continue his Indian work and fight several other pending Court battles.

The article advised that the State of South Dakota recommended a six-to eight-year term in the State Penitentiary but did not recommend the maximum of ten years because it was Means' first felony conviction.

The article advised that Means' lawyer asked the Court to allow him probation, "With the trust that he will achieve great things for his people and society."

The article advised that Means told the Court he was still a candidate for president of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, although he was omitted from the ballot of the January 6, 1976, primary. Means stated, "Tribal legal remedies are being taken."

The article advised that Means pleaded to be allowed to stay with his family of four children, a mother, and wife.

The article advised that in a statement issued Tuesday Means said he would seek a restraining order in Federal Court against the Tribal presidential elections on the Pine Ridge Reservation. The article advised that Means, whose candidacy for the post had been denied by the Tribal Election Board, said Tuesday, "The Oglala people will not get a fair electoral process and a fair choice."

On January 7, 1976, article captioned "Means Freed for Appeal of Prison Term," which appeared in the "St. Paul Pioneer Press," a newspaper published daily of general circulation in the St. Paul, Minnesota, area, advised that AIM leader Means would remain free on \$2,000 bail while he begins appeal of his riot conviction.

The article advised that the Court has allowed Means unlimited travel, but stated that he report his movements and plans to Court officials every 15 days.

The article advised that this appeal could run for a period as long as two years.

On December 12, 1975, MP T-1, a source who has provided reliable information in the past, advised Russell Means is considering traveling to Canada to avoid going to jail. Source advised that Means is rumored to have a Canadian passport under an unknown assumed name.

On January 21, 1976,

1974 he recalled that Russell Means, accompanied by two

stated that they rould course proper identification and return

equipment, which included a large number of tents and associated gear, with cash. He advised that the price of the objects meant relatively little to Means, and they appeared to have plenty of money.

On January 19, 1976, MP T-1, supra, advised that he had learned if Russell Means has to do jail time he intends to run. Source advised that he had learned that Means has a passport but does not know if it was issued in his true name or under an alias.

On February 17, 1976, article captioned "Means Serving Jail Term in Sioux Falls, appeared in the "Rapid City Journal," supra, and advised that AIM leader Means is in Minnehaha County Jail serving the remaining two weeks of a 30-day sentence.

The article advised that Means had been sentenced to 30 days for assault at the Mission, South Dakota, Country Club last year. The article advised that he began serving the time in Rapid City, South Dakota, but was taken to North Dakota for hearings on another case pending against him.

The article advised that next month Means faces a murder trial in Rapid City and that he is currently free on bond after being convicted of rioting at the Minnehaha County Court House in April, 1974.

# AMERICAN INDIAN MOVEMENT (AIM) CHARACTERIZATION OF EXTREMIST ORGANIZATION

A source advised on May 22, 1975, that the AIM was formed in 1968 at Minneapolis, Minnesota, as a civil rights organization with stated goals to secure Indian self-determination and to eliminate the destructive tendencies of Christianity, white-oriented education and the Federal Government from Indian life, along with the yoke of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA).

All AIM chapters, leaders and members are not considered violence-prone; however, AIM members led by various violence-prone leaders have participated in the takeover of the BIA Building, Washington, D. C., in November, 1972, and participated in confrontations with local authorities which resulted in violence at Scottsbluff, Nebraska; the Rapid City -Custer area of South Dakota; the Occupation of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, by force of arms from February 27, 1973, through May 8, 1973. Since that time, AIM leaders, members and supporters have also been involved in numerous confrontations with local and Federal authorities, including the killing of a deputy sheriff in Arizona, the severe beating of two police officers in South Dakota, and extensively damaging a county courthouse at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Other incidents which AIM has been a party to included the takeover of the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, Gresham, Wisconsin; the Fairchild Plant, Shiprock, New Mexico; and a Pork Plant in Wagner, South Dakota, all occurring in early 1975.

Two FBI Agents were ambushed and slain by Indians on June 26, 1975, on the Pine Ridge, South Dakota, Indian Reservation. On November 25, 1975, four Indians were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in Rapid City, South Dakota, in connection with the murder of the Agents. Sources advised on December 9, 1975, that all four indicted Indians are members of the AIM.

#### RUSSELL CHARLES MEANS

A characterization of the American Indian Movement (AIM) is set forth on Appendix Page attached hereto.

On March 15, 1976, MP T-1, a source who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that AIM leader Russell Charles Means appeared in Gordon, Nebraska, at the monthly meeting of the Nebraska Indian Commission. Source advised Means spoke to the group and announced that an "International Treaty Convention" will be held in Yankton, South Dakota, from June 10, 1976, through June 18, 1976. Source advised that Means stated this would be observed by a "United Nations Team".

Russell Means holds no national office, however, he is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision-making body.

Source advised that Means told the audience a Sundance would be held prior to the convention and at the conclusion of the meeting, a caravan would leave Yankton, South Dakota, traveling through Rosebud and Pine Ridge, South Dakota, and Gordon, Nebraska, terminating at the Little Big Horn River, Montana, on June 26, 1976, to "celebrate the 100-year anniversary of General Custer's Sensitivity Training". Source advised Means said the group planned to stay in Montana for three or four days.

Source advised that Means was very careful not to make any inflammatory remarks in his speech and continually emphasized that the Yankton Convention and the caravan to Montana were not connected with AIM. Source advised that Means adamantly stated that "nothing he was saying was to be taken as inflammatory or involved with AIM".

Source advised the Nebraska Indian Commission is a legitimate Indian organization and is officially recognized by the State of Nebraska.

Source advised that although Means continually stated he had nothing to do with AIM, there were several individuals present with him who were well known as AIM members.

## Means, Indian Leader, Injured; 4 Sought in Shooting Arrested

WAGNER, S.C., May 5 (AP)-Russell Means, leader of the American Indian Movement, and another member were shot early today at a housing area on an Indian reservation near here, Attorney General William Janklow said.

Mr. Means and John Thomas, the other victim, underwent surgery at Sacred Heart Hospital in nearby Yankton and both were listed in satisfactory condition.

The hospital administrator, Ron Morton, said Mr. Means suffered a single small-caliber bullet wound in the lower chest. Mr. Thomas underwent exploratory surgery for damage to the face and neck from a single shot, he said.

In the Volume 1 #3 Edition of the "NASC News", a newsletter of the "Native American Solidarity Committee in Sovereignty and Independence", which is published on awas required basis at Post Office Box 3426, St. Paul, Minnesota, on Page 2, an article entitled "Happy Bicentennial" advised that Russell Charles Means and his Brother Ted, the national and state leaders of the South Dakota American Indian Movement (AIM) respectively, announced the Second Biennial International Indian Treaty Conference to be held May 28 through June 6, 1976 on the Yankton Sioux South Dakota Indian Reservation, or on the Pine Ridge, Sioux, South Dakota Indian Reservation. The article advised that the headquarters office and the International Indian Treaty Council expects 7,000 to 10,000 delegates from the western hemisphere.

On April 16, 1976 captioned article "AIM sponsoring July 4 demonstration at Mount Rushmore", which appeared in the Rapid City Journal, Rapid City, South Dakota, a published daily of general circulation, and advised that AIM leader Russell Means stated that his group had asked for a United Nations Observer Team to attend a demonstration July 4, 1976 at Mount Rushmore, South Dakota.

The article advised that Means told an audience at Moorhead, Minnesota State University that AIM was sponsoring an International Treaty Convention which he said was expected to draw 7,000 Indians to the tourist site. The article advised that the AIM leader said he did not term the planned convention an anti-Bicentennial demonstration.

The article concluded by saying that Means stated the United Nations team would include Arabs.

On April 22, 1976 captioned article "Means Trial to Remain in Pennington County" which appeared in the Minneapolis, Minnesota Tribune, published daily of general circulation, and advised that the murder trial of Russell Means would remain in Rapid City, South Dakota, although on Monday the Judge had moved the trial to Pierre, South Dakota on a request by defense attorneys. The article advised that the attorneys had requested a specific county in its motion and would not accept an alternate site so the Judge denied the motion for a change of venue and ordered the trial to begin in Rapid City, South Dakota on May 3, 1976.

The article advised that Means is to stand trial as an accomplice in the 1975 shooting death of an Indian Man in a Scenic, South Dakota bar.

On May 4, 1976 captioned article "Banks Says He Will Quit Post if Not Extradited" which appeared in the Minneapolis, Minnesota Tribune, supra, and advised that AIM Leader Dennis Banks told the Oregon Governor that he would like to retire as the head of AIM and would teach if the Governor granted his request to refuse extradition to South Dakota.

The article advised that Banks, Age 39, was scheduled to stand trial in United States District Court, Portland, Oregon beginning on May 12, 1976 on federal firearms and explosives charges in connection with a shootout between Indians and State Police near Ontario, Oregon last fall. The article advised that another AIM Leader, Russell Means, publicly accused Banks of "selling out" after Banks made his comments. The article advised, that Means stated "If Mr. Banks is sincere about being a school teacher, then we invite him back to South Dakota to teach at the AIM Survival School, which is well and functioning in Rapid City".

The article advised that Means added "It is sad when the day comes that for a price someone would sell out a whole people and a whole movement for the limited glory that the White Man offers".

The article advised that Banks faces extradition to Custer, South Dakota for sentencing on a riot and assault conviction in a February, 1973 incident at the Custer County Court House.

On May 5, 1976 captioned article "Two AIM Members Held in Shooting" which appeared in the Minneapolis, Minnesota Star, a published daily of general circulation, and advised that AIM Members Russell Means and John Thomas underwent surgery after being shot at the Yankton Sioux Indian Reservation, Wagner, South Dakota early today.

The article advised that a Sacret Heart Hospital Administrator in Yankton, South Dakota said neither man was in any serious danger but the hospital listed both in serious condition.

The article advised that the South Dakota State Attorney General said that Means and Thomas were at the reservation to plan an AMI Treaty Conference.

On May 5, 1976 captioned article "Means Shot on Yankton Reservation", which appeared in the St. Paul, Minne sota Dispatch, a published daily of general circulation, and advised that AIM Leader Russell Means and a companion, AIM Member, were shot and wounded in an incident about 4 A.M. at Wagner, South Dakota on the Yankton Sioux Indian Reservation.

The article advised that Means was shot in the abdomen and his companion was suffering from a gunshot wound in his neck.

The article advised that South Dakota State Attorney General said the shooting was allegedly committed by two (2) young Indians who were participants in the takeover of the Wagner, South Dakota Pork Plant in protest of the White management policies.

On May 7, 1976 captioned article, "Five Suspects Arrested in Means Shooting", which appeared in the St. Paul Pioneer Press, a published daily of general circulation, advised that four men and a juvenile boy were arraigned in the shooting of AIM Leader Russell Means and an AIM Member, John Thomas, on the Yankton Sioux Indian Reservation.

The article advised that the five, all Indians from the reservation in south central South Dakota, were arrested by Sioux City, Iowa Police Wednesday a few hours after Means and Thomas were cut down from gunfire in a pre-dawn shooting.

The article advised that sources stated that the assailants forced Means and Thomas to kneel on their hands and knees before opening fire on them.

The article stated that Means and Thomas were removed from the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital and should recover from their wounds.

The article advised that two of the accused men, James Weddell, 19, a federal fugitive and Michael Weston, 18, were charged with two counts of Assault with fatent to Kill and their bond was set at \$25,000 each.

Russell Charles Means holds no national office, however, he is a member of the AIM Central Committee, a decision making body.

C., in November, 1972, and participated in confrontations with local authorities which resulted in violence at Scottsbluff, Nebraska; the Rapid City - Custer area of South Dakota; the Occupation of Wounded Knce, South Dakota, by force of arms from February 27, 1973, through May 8, 1973. Since that time, AIM leaders, members and supporters have also been involved in numerous confrontations with local and Federal authorities, including the killing of a deputy sheriff in Arizona, the severe beating of two police officers in South Dakota, and extensively damaging a county courthouse at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Other incidents which AIM has been a party to included the takeover of the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, Gresham, Wisconsin; the Fairchild Plant, Shiprock, New Mexico; and a Pork Plant in Wagner, South Dakota, all occurring in early 1975.
