'PURPOSE:

This memorandum requests authority to call a two-day-conference of Bureau and field personnel presently directing our highly sensitive Solo Operation and recommends that the conference be held at the Seat of Government.

BACKGROUND:

We have reached a stage in our Solo Operation where it would be most beneficial to take stock of our over-all policies and procedures to insure there is complete understanding between the Bureau and the field about our future course of action in this highly sensitive operation. There are some complex issues which demand an in-depth discussion among the personnel responsible for supervising this matter.

A most pressing issue involves the effect of the Middle East crisis in relation to our two top level informants. As you know, the Soviet position in opposition to the Israelis has created havoc among Jewish Communist Party members, many of whom have taken a strong stand in support of the Israelis. The fact that our two top informants are Jewish may cause either the Soviets or Party leader Gus Hall to have doubts about their complete reliability. Hall, in particular, may doubt the advisability of continuing to permit the informants to maintain control of more than a million dollars of Soviet money in light of recent developments and may decide to take steps to keep himself from being vulnerable to the loss of such a large sum should the Jewish issue in the Party become so hot as to cause mass defections of Jews from the Party.

In addition, there are other important issues we should examine through extensive discussion. These include steps to be taken should either one or both of our informants

Discussion of these issues is vital now because time and retirements have gradually brought about changes in key personnel handling the Solo Operation. It is essential that we insure that personnel of both the Chicago and New York Offices fully understand not only the complex issues involved in the operation but also understand the great importance of its sensitive nature. The personnel of both offices have expressed the feeling that a discussion of this type would be most beneficial to all concerned and would serve to insure that the Bureau's interests in this operation are best protected and we feel that the importance of the operation merits such a conference.

If approved, the field personnel scheduled to attend this conference will be SAC Marlin Johnson and the Chicago Office Agent most familiar with the Solo Operation; SAC Dillard Howell and the New York Office Agent most familiar with the Solo Operation. In view of the fact that SAC Howell is new in his assignment, this conference will provide an excellent opportunity for him to be fully briefed on all the details of this sensitive operation over which he has personal supervisory responsibilities.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) That we be authorized to hold a two-day conference here at the Seat of Government with selected personnel of the Chicago and New York Offices who handle the Solo Operation.

(2) That Assistant Director Sullivan be authorized to contact the respective Special Agents in Charge of those offices to work out the details for dates in the immediate future that would be satisfactory for the conference.

Yes, we are planning to try to join you when you go to EXPO-67 in the middle of the month. Our problem now is that we have no housing arrangements. Of course, there is always the possibility that something else may interfere and keep us from going, but we definitely plan to spend a few days with you at that time at EXPO-67. If you have the opportunity, will you please drop me a line telling me exactly when you will leave Toronto so that I can keep up with you in case we lose contact and I am delayed for a day. Herbert (Gus Hall) is still thinking about the arrangement in August but is thinking that a place for 3 or 4 days might be just as good.

On the same date, subsequent to the posting of the above note by CG 5824-S*, a note was received from KASHTAN directed to CG 5824-S* at the LYDIA WHITE drop address in Chicago. The text of this note dated June 28, 1967, is set forth below:

Hope to start our vacation this week-end. Will probably be around the apartment the first week and leave for Expo on July 10th for 5 days or so. Will look into the item we talked about at that time. Have still to make up my mind whether to take the additional two weeks during this time and spent it on my own, or hold it over for another day. The trouble with other days is that things take place, making vacations impossible.

However the problem is easier to solve than other crises of recent days.

So much for that. I can be reached the first week at 783-8432.

Therefore, on July 1, 1967, the following hote was dispatched by CG 5824-S* to KASHTAN:

Obviously, our notes crossed. I'll see what can be done to change dates since you are leaving for EXPO-67 somewhat earlier than I originally thought. But I'll give you a ring one of these days soon at the number you indicated.

Bill, there is something else I would like to ask you to do for us please. Is there some way for you to get something over to the Poles and to the Bulgarians? If there is, we'd appreciate it. We have just missed some arrangements due to somebody's leaving, and we thought perhaps there is somebody from your country traveling to some socialist country who might drop it off on the way. This could be done in any city, for that matter. It doesn't necessarily have to be in Warsaw.

The latter paragraph of the above note sent on July 1, 1967, is in reference to communications to the Central Committee of the Polish United Workers Party and the Central Committee of the Bulgarian CP. These concerned matters which GUS HALL had instructed NY 694-S* to take care of but which cannot be handled through usual communications apparatus of the Solo operation. Therefore, the information concerning these matters was telephonically furnished to the Chicago Office by the New York Office with instructions from NY 694-S* that CG 5824-S* handle these two matters. Inasmuch as

CG 5824-S* was aware that NORMAN PREED, National Educational Director of the CP of Canada, was scheduled to leave in early August, 1967, for an extended vacation in Bulgaria, he decided upon this means of communicating with the Central Committees of the Bulgarian and Polish Parties. At the same time that CG 5824-S* was making this effort to deliver these messages to Poland and Bulgaria through NORMAN FREED, he also contacted JACK KLING, State Secretary, CP of Illinois, to once again make contact with KAZIMIR SIUBA to utilize SIUBA as a go-between with ADOLF KITA, Consul General, Polish Consulate - Chicago. As the Bureau and New York will recall, this means of contact with the Central Committee of the Polish United Workers Party has been used in the past by this informant. As of this date, this contact has not been made.

CG 5824-S* advised he was in telephonic contact with WILLIAM KASHTAN on the morning of July 5, 1967, and KASHTAN advised him that he had received both of the above notes and the enclosures. These enclosures had already been furnished to NORMAN FREED who had agreed to deliver them. KASHTAN stated that FREED would leave Canada for Sofia, Bulgaria, on the evening of July 5, 1967. KASHTAN further advised that he, himself, would be departing Toronto for Montreal on July 10, 1967, and would make efforts to locate a place for GUS HALL and his family to stay for three or four days and where KASHTAN and HALL could meet. This is to advise of a possible Federal Reserve Act violation involving officials of the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, Lincolnwood, Illinois. These officials : include Irving Projansky and Stuart Projansky, brother-in-law and nephew respectively of CG 5824-S*, one of our Solo informants.

BACKGROUND:

You will recall that the Securities and Exchange Commission is conducting an investigation of alleged manipulation of stocks in Hercules Gallion and other companies listed on the American Stock Exchange. This investigation has led to the First National Bank of Lincolnwood. Irving Projansky, brother-in-law of CG 5824-S*, is Chairman of the Board of this bank. Stuart Projansky, nephew of the informant, is also an officer. CG 5824-S**s relatives on his wife's side are heavy investors in the bank as are CG 5824-S* and his brother in New York City, our other Solo informant NY 694-S*.

The possible Federal Reserve Activiolation concerns loans obtained at the First National Bank of Lincolnwood in return for which gratuities were furnished Trying and Stuart Projansky and others. Such gratuities include air travel credit cards, and some automobile payments in behalf of Stuart Projansky. Solo is the code word used to refer to the liaison operation performed by our informants between the Communist Party, USA, and other communist parties.

You will recall the Securities and Exchange Commission is conducting an extensive investigation regarding alleged manipulation of stocks on the American Stock Exchange. One of the stocks involved is Hercules Gallion. A prime suspect in the alleged manipulation is Irving Projansky, brother-in-law of CG 5824-S*.

Our New York Office has advised that the Securities and Exchange Commission, as a general practice, interviews all relatives of such a suspect to determine if these relatives have been used as a cover in the rigging of stocks. New York also advises that 80 per cent of the stockholders of record in Hercules Gallion are to be interviewed. CG 5824-S* and his wife, CG 6653-S, have held large amounts of Hercules Gallion stock. It is noted that CG 6653-S is a wealthy woman in her own right and she has handled the stock transactions.

The Securities and Exchange Commission has invited both informants to appear at their New York Office on 7/31/67 for an interview regarding their holdings of Hercules Gallion stock. Informants intend to appear for this interview and truthfully answer all questions regarding their holdings in this stock. To our knowledge, informants have not engaged in any illegal stock transactions and have advised they were unaware of any such illegal activity.

If this had not reached you today we were seriously considering on sending CG 5824-S% to see and talk directly with Central Committee so as to re-establish contact.

Since night of June 30th we have tried every method to contact you, via walky talky, micro-transceiver and drop.

Our arrangements as you know were that the night walky talky meant a drop or micro-transceiver the following day. The acknowledgment of radio was by a morning walky talky or by using the July telephone at 5:05 PM the same day. It is evident that the walky talkies at night were not understood since June 30th and the morning walky talkies were not heard or acknowledged. Since experience and tests prove morning walky talkies are most difficult it is requested that they be discontinued.

This is due to several reasons:

1. The area at this time is a security risk because of the changing of the morning police shifts. This results in a great number of police in the area in all districts and in all streets.

2. Also local electrical interference is worse during the morning hours than the evening hours.

Also called to your attention is that the Florsheim shoe store arrangement is not suited for our purpose. Each night when the store closes an iron gate is put up, preventing access to the inner display windows.

It should be understood two signals indicate personal meeting places; three, a drop; four, a micro-transceiver; and five, a radio repeat.

The space by two large shipping companies, whose reception rooms are away from the entrance to our proposed office. Mr. is personally friendly with the officers of these companies and thinks highly of them. Mr stated he would not have made this request unless he felt it essential.

Our present lease will expire by January, 1968, and a new lease with normal increase will be in the vicinity of \$205.00 plus 5 percent tax. Since we have been requested to relocate, it is felt we should accede to request: 1) since he had been extremely b6 cooperative in backstopping our legitimacy and we need b7C his continued cooperation; 2) our next door neighbor, who has urgent need of our space, can easily become a nuisance and effect our security; 3) our present plant has proved to be one of the worst possible locations for monitoring, and a move to the 19th floor will immeasureably improve reception; 4) our lease expires in five months and we may be forced to move at our expense, which will run into the hundreds of dollars due to the necessity of moving a huge safe of vault-like proportions.

It would seem that overall, we must move so as to avoid being a nuisance to our neighbors and continue to assure the necessary cooperation of the management, both of which have an immediate and direct bearing on security. In the long range, we are better off financially, since we loose our lease in five months and possibly will be forced to move at our expense. All moving costs now will be paid for including telephone installation, lettering on door, new paint job, etc. In addition, the carpeting and drapes which are old, worn, torn, and soiled will be offered for sale at \$50, which, according to Mr. _______ is a fair price. These items should be replaced anyway.

Gus Hall, the Party's General Secretary, has instructed Lement Harris, an old-time Party member, confidant, and financial advisor, to embark on a six-week, cross-country, fund-raising tour. Harris, who has numerous friends and contacts throughout the United States, is expected to contact these individuals most of whom are not Party members for followers of the Communist Party but who are part of the broad-based liberal element in the United States.

Both Harris and Hall privately concede that only a small number of the persons contacted will contribute. Despite the success or failure of this mission with regard to finances raised, Hall's objective will have been accomplished since he will have established a logical cover or front through which he can infuse Party reserve funds received from the Soviet Union into the Party treasury.

In this manner, the leadership of the Party will be able to provide both the outsiders and the membership with a legal and logical explanation as to the source of the thousands of dollars necessary to purchase equipment to launch the new paper.

POSITION OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION ON THE MIDDLE EAST SITUATION

During July, 1967, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

It was recently learned that during the latter part of July, 1967, the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) had delivered to the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) a lengthy letter explaining Soviet actions and position in regard to recent events in the Middle East. The essence of this letter is set forth below:

The letter stated that the Central Committee, CPSU, wished to inform the CP, USA of measures being taken by the CPSU and the USSR to counter the effects of Israeli "aggression" and to support the Arab states. A recent Plenum of the Central Committee, CPSU, studied and approved the political line and practical activities of the Political Bureau for the purpose of stopping Israeli aggression, supporting the United Arab Republic (UAR), Syria, and other Arab states, and halting the dangerous consequences of this aggression for all mankind.

The letter of the CPSU stated that Israel's aggression is supported by U.S. imperialism and that reactionary imperialist circles are trying to change the balance of power in the world, to suppress national liberation struggles, and to maintain a state of international tension. The CPSU foresees possible renewed military action by Israel.

In the political arena, the imperialists will continue to seek the goals they wanted to achieve through the Israel-Arab war which are to overthrow the progressive governments in the UAR, Syria, and Algeria in order to establish the domination of imperialism in the Middle East. Imperialism is pressuring the Arabs to accept a settlement favorable to imperialism in exchange for Arab territory occupied by Israel. Therefore, anti-imperialist forces must first secure the unconditional and immediate withdrawal of Israel's troops from occupied territories.

World public opinion must be concentrated to achieve the isolation of the Israeli aggressors, to actively support Arab victims of this aggression, and to prevent a renewed military action in the Middle East. If Israel is not rebuffed, it would mean direct consent to this aggression and the possibility of a threat to peace elsewhere in the world.

In support of this position, every political and diplomatic means open to the USSR were used. In the Security Council of the United Nations, the struggle was waged to condemn Israel's aggression and obtain withdrawal of her troops. This helped mobilize world opinion to the side of the lawful demands of the Arab states. When a condemnation of Israel and demand for the withdrawal of her troops could not be achieved in the Security Council due to the opposition of the Western powers, the USSR secured the convening of an emergency session of the General Assembly of the United Nations in spite of the resistance of the U.S. and Israel. The Soviet delegation headed by A. N. Kosygin, acting in united front with other socialist states, progressive Arab states, and peace-loving countries, defended the position of the Arab states. It is clear that this action by the USSR was politically correct. However, due to the pressure of the U.S. upon other states, the General Assembly could not arrive at a decision on the settlement of the crisis in the Middle East.



However, the withdrawal of Israeli forces from Arab territory by itself cannot settle all the problems facing the Middle East. It becomes necessary now to work out agreed positions among socialist and Arab states on the major problems of the coming political struggle to make it impossible for the renewal of aggression and to guarantee peace in this area. The USSR is in constant contact with the Arab and socialist governments on this problem. The USSR is seeking the support from other governments, particularly of Asian and African countries.

The imperialists have failed to achieve their principal aims which are the overthrow of progressive governments in the Middle East and the re-establishment of the domination of imperialism and its oil monopolies in this area of the world. But as a result of the military failures of the Arabs and Israeli occupation of their territory, these progressive Arab regimes are in a difficult situation. In order to demonstrate Soviet support to these Arab countries, Chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR and member of the Political Bureau of the Central Committee, CPSU, N. V. Podgorny, visited the UAR, Syria, and Iraq. The Arab leaders took a sober view of the situation and, in particular, President Nasser said his main conclusion is the need for a more decisive struggle against the imperialist states. The USSR continued to provide large economic and other assistance to the Arab countries. By this is meant assistance to the population in the damaged areas in the way of food, medicine, and other assistance provided by Soviet public organizations including trade unions and by voluntary contributions collected among the Soviet people. The Soviet people fully supported the political line and practical measures of the CPSU and the Government of the USSR during the crisis in the Middle East. The CPSU wishes to confidentially inform the CP, USA that in response to the request of the UAR, Syria, Algeria, and Iraq, the USSR is restoring the defensive capacity of these progressive Arab states. These Arab leaders desire great cooperation in this field and wish to use more fully the rich experience of the armed forces of the USSR and other socialist countries. Strengthening the defensive capability of the Arab states will help them to resist the dictates of Israel and the imperialist forces.



The CPSU is also carrying out important political work among Arab leaders and the population of Arab countries. These leaders are not yet Marxists but rather are Arab nationalists. Such nationalism of suppressed nations is inclined to extremism and to propagation of racial and national exclusiveness. This was seen in the statements of some Arab leaders about the State of Israel. That is why the USSR made clear particularly at the United Nations its position concerning this question.

The leaders of the Arab countries are not free of petty bourgeois nationalism although they have declared their socialist orientation. In practice, their socialist theories constitute programs of revolutionary action against both imperialist colonizers and their own upper bourgeoisie. broader and more varied the links of the USSR with them become, the more opportunities appear to exert favorable influence on An important task of the USSR at this time is the strengthening of both the unity of the Arab states among themselves and their friendship and cooperation with the USSR and other socialist countries. Although imperialist forces are carrying on a propaganda campaign to separate the Arab countries and to undermine their friendship with the Soviet Union, the measures now taken by the CPSU have not only improved the situation but also turned Arab public opinion toward friendship with the socialist states.

The leaders of the People's Republic of China (PRC) are continuing their provocative role in this situation, instigating the Arabs to carry on the war at any price. The course of the PRC is directed toward aggravation of the international situation, inciting military conflict, encouraging confrontation of the USSR with the U.S., and the unleashing of a world war which would be waged at the expense of others.

It is important to stress that the CPSU conducts its activities in respect to the Arab states in close contact and cooperation with fraternal CPs. In recent confidential exchanges of letters with them, they expressed their complete agreement with the position and actions of the CPSU. It is the conviction of the CPSU that the unity of all anti-imperialist and progressive forces is most necessary in the struggle against imperialist plans in the Middle East.





The CPSU expresses its fraternal gratitude to the CP, USA for its efforts in the development of a broad campaign to clarify the real causes of the conflict in the Middle East. The overwhelming majority of CPs quickly understood the situation and came forward with positions of principle. These activities played an important part in changing the attitude of public opinion in Western countries which first came out in support of the policy of Israel. The CPSU is convinced that in the future these CPs will increase their efforts for the achievement of mobilizing public opinion against the plans of the ruling circles of Israel and her protectors, in defense of the just demands of the Arab people, towards securing the unity of all progressive anti-imperialist forces. The views of the CP, USA are solicited on measures which could be jointly taken in the struggle for the elimination of the consequences of Israeli aggression.

Dear comrades,

In addition to the information sent to you some time ago we would like to inform you about the subsequent measures being taken by the Central Committee of the CPSU and by the Soviet government aimed at overcoming the consequences of the Israel's aggression, at strengthening peace in the Middle East and active support of the progressive forces of the Arab states in their struggle for preservation of their independence and territorial integrity.

We have believed and still are believing that the present crisis in the Middle East no doubt may be considered as one of the most crucial moments in the development of the international relations in the recent years. Here confronted in acute form the interests of major present political forces.

The question of the Soviet Union's policy in connection with the Israeli aggression in the Middle East was specially discussed at the Plenum of the Central Committee of our party. The report on this matter as is known, was made by the Secretary General of the CC of the CPSU L.I. Brezhnev. The Plenum of the CC analysed comprehensively and profoundly the situation in the Middle East, fully approved the political line and practical activities of the Politbureau of the CC, aimed at stopping the Israeli aggression, supporting of VAR, Syria and other arab states exposed to the aggression and preventing from dangerous consequences of this aggression for the mankind.

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When it became clear that because of the opposition of the western powers it was impossible for the Secirity Council to sucsed in condemning Israel and decide on the withdrawal of her troops we stepped forward with a new political initiative - to convene the emergency session of the General Assembly.

This session was convened in defiance of persistent and open resistance of the USA and Israel. Now it might already be said that our initiative was timely and well calculated. The consent of the overwhelming majority of states to convene this session is the real sign of the profound concern of the peoples, caused by the developments in the Middle East.

Upon instructions of the CC CPSU the Soviet delegation. headed by A.N. Kosygin resolutely defended lawful rights of the Arab states, demanded unconditional withdrawal of the Israeli troops and elimination of the consequences of the aggression. At the session the Soviet Union is acting in united front with other socialist states which also sent to this session the leaders of their Governments, as well as with progressive Arab and other peaceloving countries.

Now it is already clear that the convening of the emergency session of the G.A. proved to be politically right action. The work of the session permitted to concentrate the attention of the world public opinion on the need to take effective measures aimed at overcoming the consequences of Israeli aggression and above all to call the attention to the question of the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the occupied territories of the Arab states.

The Israel's aggression which is supported by certain western imperialist powers and in the first place by the USA, constitutes one more link in the general chain of the policy of international imperialism.

The most reactionary, the most militant imperialist circles are obstinately seeking to change the balance of forces in the world, to suppress the liberation struggle of the peoples, to stop their movement towards social progress, constantly to provoke and maintain the state of international tension.

Although military actions in the Middle East are halted, one cannot exclude that Israeli rulers incited by their imperialist protectors will not attempt again to resort to the help of arms. It is necessary to execuse vigilance and to be ready for any change in the developments in the Middle East.

Now the struggle is expanding in the political sphere. Under these circumstances we take into account that imperialists continue to attain the same goals which they wanted to achieve with the help of war, i.e. to overthrow progressive regimes in the UAR and Syria, as well as in Algeria, and to whip up the internal reactionary in these countries in order to reestablish their domination in the Middle East. In order to make pressure on the Arab states they use the fact of Israel occupation of their territories, trying to force the Arab countries to accept the "settlement" on the profitable to the imperialists conditions in "exchange" for their own territories annexed by Israel.

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Under these conditions we cosider that the main purpose of anti-imperialist, peaceloving forces is now to secure first of all the unconditional and immediate withdrawal of the aggressor's troops from the occupied territories.

opinion should be concentrated on this aspect. Such step from our point of view permits, even under the most unfavorable circumstances, to achieve the isolation of the aggressor, to support activally the Arab states exposed to the aggression and to prevent new outbreak of military fire in the Middle East. To achieve this purpose is also most important on principle. If Israel were permitted to take advantages of her aggression, it would mean, as all know, direct consent to the aggression and possibility of a threat to the peace elsewhere in the world.

We would like to inform you about our measures being taken to this effect. Firstly, all and every political and diplomatic means were used. The heavy struggle in the Security Council aimed at achieving the condemnation of Israeli aggression and the withdrawal of her troops contributed to exposing the imperialist policy of the USA and Great Britain and their real aims in the Middle East. We are sure that it helped to mobilize the world public opinion and to win it over to the side of lawful demands of the Arab states.

All member-states of the UN except the USA and some other protectors of Israel came out against the territorial claims of Israel and supported the demand for immediate withdrawal of Israeli troops from the occupied territories. The fact that the G.A. so far could not take a desision which would meet the requirements of the present moment and the tasks of the rightful settlement of the conflict in the Middle East can undoubtedly be explained by the pressure of the USA upon some states, which it was possible to foresee beforehand. However that does not mean that all the resources of the UN and its current emergency session are exhausted. On the contrary, the decision taken at our demand in respect of the continuation of deliberations at the session provides further opportunities for the unification of wider range of states, based on the demand for the immediate withdrawal of Israeli forces.

We, of course, do not overlook the fact that the withdrawal of Israeli forces taken by itself also cannot settle all the problems facing the Middle East. We understand that in future it will be necessary also to work on providing conditions which would make it impossible for aggression to renew and guarantee the long and stable peace in this area. Taking into account the prospects of the further developments it becomes necessary already now work out agreed positions among the socialist and Arab states along the major problems of the forthcoming political struggle including the ways of settlement of the Middle East problems. We are already dealing with this problem keeping

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constant contacts with leaders of the UAR, Syria and Algeria and with Governments of socialist countries.

We also are seeking to enlist the support from the Governments of other countries, particularly of Asian and African countries for the just struggle of the peoples of the Arab states.

It goes without saying that in doing so we shall attain a kind of settlement of problems facing the Middle East, which would meet the legitimate interests of Arab peoples. The second major line of our policy at the present time is the active support of the Arab states. The imperialists no doubt have failed to attain their principal aims, i.e. the overthrowing of progressive regimes in the Arab East, reestablishment of domination of imperialist powers and their oil monopolies in this region. This is the decisive factor which we take into consideration as we give our assessment of the established situation in the Middle East.

At the same time it is necessary to accept the fact that as a result of the perfidious attack of Israel, military failures of the UAR, Syria and Jordan occupation of a cosiderable part of their territories a rather difficult situation arose for the progressive regimes in the Arab countries.

Under these conditions, apart from the measures in the United Nations, we decided to demonstrate openly our support to the progressive Arab countries along all lines. As you know, at the end of June and the beginning of July a member of the Politbureau of the CC CPSU, the Chairman of the Presidium of the Su-

preme Soviet of the USSR N.V. Podgorny made visits to the UAR, Syria and Iraq. During talks with the leaders of these countries questions concerning the situation in the Middle East in connection with the aggression of Israel and measures which it is necessary to take for the liquidation of the consequences of this aggression, for the coordination of actions of our countries in the international scene were discussed. It is necessary to note that during these talks the Arab leaders took a rather sober view of the established situation and the causes of military failures. In particular, president Masser said that his main coclusion of the developments of the recent weeks is the need of more decisive struggle against imperialist states. Besides, important questions concerning further comprehensive development of friendly relations and fraternal cooperation among the USSR, the UAR, Syria and Iraq were discussed.

Along with the measures of political nature we continued to provide large economic and other assistance for the Arab countries. We mean in this case the assistance to the population in the damaged areas. Considerable resourses for urgent food, medical and other assistance for the suffered Arab people are being provided also by the Soviet public organizations including trade unions. Voluntary contributions are being collected in the Soviet Union among the people in order to send it to the UAR, Syria and Jordan.

In this connection we are informing you with great satisfaction that during these critical days the Soviet people demonstrated once again how closely they support the interests of struggle for liberation of all the peoples throughout the world, how highly they appreciate their international task. The Soviet people fully supported the political line and practical measures of our party and Government taken during the crisis in the Middle East. A broad and mass campaign in support of the just cause of the Arab people has developed in our country.

Confidentially we would like to inform you that in accordance with the request of president Nasser and the leaders of Syria, Algeria and Iraq we are also undertaking measures aimed at restoration of defensive capacity of the progressive arab states. In this connection the arab leaders are expressing the desire to see higher extent of our cooperation in this field and they are seeking to use more fully the rich experience of armed forces of the Soviet Union and other socialist countries. We are seeking first of all to assist these countries in strengthening their security, to enhance their positions in the face of subversive activities and intrigues of imperialist powers. We take into consideration the fact that the armed forces of the ag-: gressor have taken positions as close as some tens kilometers from the capitals of these states, and as we already have stated, it is impossible in fact to exclude the possibility of a new military adventure on the part of Israel. It is also evident that the strengthening of defensive capability of the Arab states will enhace their ability in resisting the dictates of Israel

and imperialist forces.

We also wish to inform you that in parallel with full support and assistance to the progressive Arab states in their just struggle we are carrying out the important political work among their leaders as well as broad public of these countries. As the comrades understand, this in not an easy task. It needs a considerable tact and time. We never overlook the fact that the men who were among leaders even of the most advanced Arab states, of course, are not yet marxists. They rose up by the wave of Arab nationalism which like the nationalism of all previously suppressed nations, according to words said by V.I. Lenin, is legitimate and historically justified. At the same time Lenin also paid attention to the back side of the nationalism of suppressed nations - its inclination to run to extremes, to slide to propagation of racial and national exclusiveness. This becomes apparent in particular from the erroneous statements of some Arab leaders about the state of Israel. That is why we felt it necessary to make clear again, particularly at the UN, our position concerning this question, which is based on the marxistleninist class point of view.

It would be wrong to think that the leaders of the Arab states, the national-democratic parties which are in power in these countries have become free of the ideology of petty-bourgeous nationalism immediately after they declared about their socialist orientation.

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At the same time we are far from the dogmatic approach to the assessment of these parties and we see that in real life, in practice their socialist theories in fact constitute programmes of revolutionary action against both imperialist colonizers and its own upper bourgeoisie. The expirience of our relations with those leaders shows that the broader and more varied our links with them become, the more oportunities appear to exert on them favorable influence. At the present moment we consider the strengthening of both the unity of the Arab states themselves and their frienship and cooperation with the USSR and other socialist countries as an important task in the political work among the Governments and peoples of the Arab states.

Imperialist forces are carrying on now an unruly propaganda campaign in every way trying to separate and to make quarrel among the Arab countries and to undermine their friendship with the Soviet Union, the socialist camp. It should be recognized that there was a moment when a certain part of a public opinion gave way to the campaign. Due to the measures taken in a close collaboration with progressive leaders of fraternal parties of the Arab states it was possible not only to improve the situation but to cause among the Arab public opinion a new wave of liking and friendship towards the socialist states.

It should be said here about that provocative role which the Chinese leaders are playing in course of events in the Middle East. They used this occasion as well in order to step forward

with the customary portion of dirty slander on the CPSU, the So-viet Union. On the other hand, they, as Chou En-Lai did in his message to the leaders of the Arab states, directly instigate arabs to carry on the war at any price, "not to agree with any peaceful settlement". Once more in this case it has been displayed clearly the course of Mao Tse-Tung's group/towards aggravation of the international situation, stimulation of the war fire, collision of the USSR with the USA, unleashing the world war which would be waged at the expense of another.

Completing this part of the information we consider it important to stress that we conduct our measures in respect to the Arab states in close contact and cooperation with fraternal communist parties. These days we maintain especially close connections with them and during the last weeks sent them confidential letters with clarification of our political line and practical steps in course of the Middle East crisis. We received replies from them, in which they express their complete agreement with our position and their satisfaction with measures being taken.

The CC/CPSU would like to express deep convictions that in the arised situation unity of actions of all anti-imperialistic and progressive forces acquire especial significance. Our common success in struggle against the imperialist plans of enslavement of peoples of the Arab East, against the creation

of new seats of aggression to great extent depends on the degree of unity we manage to succeed.

From the very of emergency of tension in the Middle East we consider the development of broad campaign towards clarification of the real causes of the conflict in the Middle East and the positions of the socialist states to be an important task. We know about the efforts of your party in this direction and express our fraternal gratitude. We are aware of those difficulties which your party, as well as the other fraternal parties of capitalist states, pace. Unfortunately imperialist propaganda managed to confuse many peoples in the western countries and to exert influence on someunstable elements within our movement.

But with great satisfaction it can be stated that overwhelming majority of the Communist parties quickly understood the situation and came forward with positions of principle. Their activities played an important role in the already outlined change of feelings of the part of a public opinion in the western countries, which came out before in support of the policy of Israel. We are convinced that in future the Communist parties will continue to increase its efforts aimed at the achievement of mobilization of the public opinion against plans of the ruling circles of Israel and her protectors in defence of the just demands of the Arab people, towards securing the unity of all progressive anti-imperialist forces.

If the leaders of your party wish to express their views concerning the measures which could be jointly taken at this period of struggle for the elimination of consequences of the Israel's aggression, the CC of the CPSU would be greatful for it.

Solo is the code word pertaining to our top level liaison operation between the Communist Party, USA, and other communist parties of the world.

PURPOSE:

This memorandum informs you of results of the authorized two-day conference on the Solo Operation held July 18 and 19, 1967, at the Seat of Government. The conference was attended by selected personnel from Chicago, New York, and the Bureau.

BACKGROUND:

The following are the results of our conference:

- a. Intelligence successes achieved thus far in the Solo Operation reaffirms the policy commitment to pursue same as an intelligence exploitation of Communist Party, USA, other foreign communist parties, and Soviet intelligence.
- b. FBI insight to conduit through which Soviet funds and instructions flow to Communist Party, USA, continues to provide highest order of domestic intelligence data relative to the Party, and Soviet influence over same.
- c. Operational value of Solo has been heightened by Soviet instructions compelling NY 694-S* to more deeply commit his apparatus to Soviet intelligence. Prognosis of Soviet operational interest concurrently increases our potential to further penetrate Soviet intelligence. ATAID MICK recognition of the increased value, New York Office has To been instructed to utilize NY 4309-S to the fullest extent in the apparatus work in order that the Soviets and Party can logically consider him as a replacement candidate, for NY 694-S* when the time arrives

- d. New York and Chicago have been instructed to submit recommendations designed to reinforce replacement candidates such as NY 4309-S and others with renewed efforts to defect, recruit, and/or neutralize Party leaders not currently under our control, but who may be the logical Party and Soviet selections as replacements for the principal Solo informants.
- e. A frank exchange resulted in the unified conclusion that no fact presently exists indicative of a change in the Solo operatives by the Soviets and/or the Party. However, we squarely face the unavoidable conclusion that external factors over which we have no control can kill the present Solo Operation at any time. Among those factors are the open defection of any Soviet official and/or Party official cognizant of the operation, Soviet anti-Semitism directed against the informants, or a drastic change in power politics aligning the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics with the Western world:
- f. While we know the possibilities, we shoulder the operational responsibility with the belief that the FBI can beat Soviet intelligence at each turn. We are continuing a positive and realistic direction of this operation, with the assurance we can recommend the necessary action granting us maximum value at all times, including the day we are forced to face one of the uncontrollable possibilities mentioned.
- g. In furtherance of the positive approach, streamlining methods to facilitate operational value, replacements and apparatus skills, were discussed and are being explored by the field with instructions to submit positive recommendations to the Bureau.

OBSERVATIONS:

All participants contributed freely in an educated exchange resolving a variety of tactical approaches and attitudes into a unified cooperative effort. Based on the past achievements of the Solo Operation and the ability evidenced at the conference, I anticipate this unique operation will continue to move as a sophisticated and productive endeavor.

ACTION:

For information. You will be advised separately regarding our recommendations for proposed changes in various phases of this operation.

On the instructions of GUS HALL, HARRIS departed on a six-week cross-country trip in July, 1967. This trip will take him into the South, the Midwest and across the country into Los Angeles and San Francisco where he will see and solicit every individual he knows and has contact with.

Source advised that HARRIS has in fact numerous friends and contacts, throughout the United States, who are not members of followers of the CP but are a part of the broad based liberal element in the U.S., who could be expected to cooperate with him in this venture.

According to the informant, it is privately conceded by both HARRIS and HALL that it will be ampossible to obtain pledges of \$2,500. from only an infintesimal number of persons contacted by HARRIS.

The plan is, however, in cases where all or part of the contribution is not forthcoming, to solicit the individual as a stockholder, furnish him with all or part of the \$2,500. quota and persuade him to turn the amount back to the CP as a \$2,500. contribution.

These individuals are to be told that the new paper will not be a CP paper as such, that is, another "Pravda," but will be pitched to espouse the broad liberal line so as to appeal to and attract this broad grouping.

HARRIS mission is therefore the building up of a logical cover or front through which to channelize Party Reserve Funds presently held by HALL into the Party so as to provide the Party with a legal and logical explanation as to the source of the thousands of dollars necessary to purchase equipment and otherwise launch the daily paper.

Concerning the channeling of secret Reserve Funds into the open Party apparatus; the following is also noted:

GUS HALL has recently, according to NY 694-S*, relieved HELEN WINTER of her responsibilities in connection with the financial operations of the National Office, CP. It had been the regular practice, instituted by HALL, to furnish WINTER, directly, sufficient SOLO funds to enable her to operate the National Office.

The funds, in the amounts of from \$10,000. to \$70,000. were regularly furnished WINTER.

During the past several weeks, no funds have been furnished WINTER or other open functionary at the CP National Office. This leads to the conclusion that HALL, himself, is now channeling the money into the National Office for organizational and operating expenses, from Reserve Funds presently in his possession.

On 7/24/67 CG 5824-S* and GUS HALL returned to-Chicago but the bag of money was left behind in the custody of HALL's brothers. According to CG 5824-S*, HALL stated that the prime concern of him and his brothers is the safety of the money and they are presently working on ways to protect it on his brother's farm. HALL stated that they will literally bury the money on his brother's property and they are currently considering what type of container should be used in order to protect the money. The entire sum of money will not be buried; rather, some portion of it will be hidden elsewhere at his brother's residence so that it will be readily available when HALL calls for it. HALL stated that when final arrangements are worked out for the safety of the money, he will inform CG 5824-S* in detail of its location and in whose custody it is considered to be maintained so, that CG 5824-S* can obtain the money for him should he be unable to make the trip to pick up the money himself when he needs it.

While at Cherry, Minn., CG 5824-S* learned that the family of HALL is going to build a house for HALL on family property in the vicinity of Cherry, Minn. As a matter of fact, on this trip HALL selected the spot for the house. Among his family there are sufficient skilled carpenters, bricklayers, etc., so that members of the family themselves will build the house for HALL. At this time they are merely waiting for HALL to inform them exactly how he wishes the house built so they will know how much lumber to cut before starting to build the house.

HALL and his family have decided to build a cemetery on the farm in order to insure a burial place for all family members together. HALL instructed that information should be obtained concerning applicable laws regarding the building of a cemetery for family purposes on private property.

At the outset of the interview, BLUMBERG informed CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S that they are not the "target" of the investigation and there is no allegation of wrongdoing on their part. However, he solicited their cooperation and requested them to tell the truth concerning the activities of IRVING PROJANSKY, President and Chairman of the Board of the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, Illinois, who is the brother of CG 6653-S. Both BLUMBERG and AUSA LAWRENCE NEWMAN gave every indication that they expected these informants to lie to them. CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S gave a very forthright account of the transactions in which they had engaged in the stock of Hercules Galion but in some aspects of their account, namely their disclaimer of influence by PROJANSKY in their decision to sell their stock, the attorneys obviously did not believe them.

During the course of the day BURTON KOZAK, one of the principal informants of the SEC in this investigation, appeared and made a show of walkingback and forth through the room where CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S were sitting and it appeared to them he was making some effort to identify CG 5824-S*. He addressed CG 6653-S by name and she responded but she indicated that it was not until later that she recalled who he was. It was learned later that KOZAK informed the AUSA that he did not know CG 5824-S* and had never met him. BLUMBERG read a list of names to CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S who are purportedly involved in the alleged manipulation of stocks but none of them were familiar to CG 5824-S* and he does not recall these names at this time. BLUMBERG informed CG 6653-S he had information which he believed to be true that she almost lives at the First National Bank of Lincolnwood. that she is there almost every day, that she sits in a chair next to the President and that she is getting information and advice from her brother all day every day. CG 6653-S denied this and from our knowledge of the activities of these two informants and the amount of time that they are both absent from Chicago, these allegations are obviously false.



Questions were asked concerning the reason for CG 5824-S*'s absence from Chicago on a number of occasions when transactions in these stocks took place and CG 5824-S* informed the AUSA that he is a cardiac patient of long standing and upon the advice of his doctor he frequently gets away for a month or more for a rest. This matter was not pursued by the AUSA. The AUSA inquired about Arisco Associates, Incorporated, and CG 5824-S* informed him that he is retired for a number of years, that he has no interest in the business although he is there upon occasion. and that it is run by his brother, CS Inquiry was made concerning the New York Branch of Arisco, to which CG 5824-S* replied that this is run by his brother, NY 694-S*, who lives in the New York area. Although it is known that the SEC has been unable to contact NY 694-S* as yet, the AUSA did not press CG 5824-S* for the address or phone number of his brother.

Following a break for lunch, CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S were interviewed by AUSA LAWRENCE NEWMAN and this interview primarily concerned their transactions in the stock of Pentron Electronics, Incorporated. From the line of questioning and from information available in the newspapers it appeared to CG 5824-S* that they were considered victims rather than subjects in the investigation concerning Pentron. NEWMAN questioned CG 6653-S very closely concerning the exact sequence of events leading up to her purchase and subsequent sale of Pentron stock and the individuals who had counselled her and with whom she dealt in these transactions. Some facts relating to both Pentron and to her dealings in Mercury Chemical about two years ago were somewhat hazy in the mind of CG 6653-S and, therefore, it was ultimately agreed that she would return home and after checking her records would call NEWMAN in New York City to inform him of the exact facts which he was seeking. NEWMAN seemed to accept this arrangement.

BLUMBERG, GRANT and NEWMAN all indicated that they did not expect that they would have any further need for an interview of these two informants. However, NEWMAN indicated





that it is nevertheless possible that he might wish to question CG 6653-S again concerning Pentron and Mercury Chemical. CG 6653-S was quite explicit and NEWMAN agreed that in the event he has any questions or doubts it will be CG 6653-S only who will come to New York for interview. All these attorneys indicated that they would have absolutely no need of a subsequent interview of CG 5824-S*.

The entire thrust of the questioning was directed at developing information incriminating IRVING PROJANSKY in an alleged manipulation of Hercules Galion stock. Throughout the entire course of the interview, no questions were raised by anyone concerning the communist background of CG 5824-S* nor concerning his net worth or any of the large amounts of funds which have passed through his bank accounts at the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, some of which we know were Communist Party, USA funds which he was investing for the benefit of the family of GUS HALL.

CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S appeared for this interview without the presence of an attorney and BLUMBERG commented specifically that he considered them to be "brave" to do so but they responded by stating that they were innocent of any wrongdoing and, therefore, had no need for an attorney. When NEWMAN indicated to CG 6653-S that at some future date he might desire her presence once again, he stated that on such an occasion it might be desirable for CG 6653-S to consider bringing an attorney with her for her own protection. CG 6653-S has indicated that she has not made up her mind at this time whether or not she will do so in the event she does return to New York City for interview.

Both informants were interviewed by Blumberg, Grant, and Newman concerning their transactions in the stock of Hercules Galion Products Corporation. The informants answered forthrightly but in some aspects of their account, namely their disclaimers that Projansky had influenced them in the decision to sell their stock, the attorneys obviously did not believe them. Blumberg told CG 6653-S he had information, which he considered to be true, that she lives at the First National Bank of Lincolnwood almost every day, sits in a chair next to the president, and is getting advice from her brother all day, every day. CG 6653-S denied this. (Our Chicago Office advised that this charge is obviously false based on its knowledge of informant's activities.)

CG 5824-S*, questioned regarding his absence from the Chicago area on a number of occasions when transactions in the stocks took place, advised he has a cardiac condition and, upon advice of his doctor, he gets away for a rest.

Grant questioned CG 5824-S* concerning Arisco Associates, Incorporated. (This is the cover company with branches in Chicago and New York.) Informant explained to Grant that he is retired and that the Chicago Branch is run by his brother, CS and the New York Branch is run by another brother, NY 694-S*.

From the line of questioning by Newman, he considered the informants to be victims rather than subjects of the investigation concerning Pentron Electronics. CG 6653-S was questioned closely concerning the exact sequence of events leading up to her purchase and subsequent sale of this stock and the individuals who had counseled her and with whom she had dealt in these transactions. Some of these questions she could not answer on the spot and it was agreed that, after checking in Chicago, she could answer Newman's questions by phone. Newman indicated he may desire to interview CG 6653-S only at a future date. Informants advised that throughout entire course of interview, no questions were raised concerning communist background of CG 5824-S*.

^POLITICAL SITUATION IN CYPRUS

During August, 1967, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, adviséd as follows:

The Communist Party, USA has received information which reportedly originated with George Roussas, described as a close friend of Andreas Papandreou, to the following effect. It was asserted that the United States National Security Council made a decision about July 20, 1967, to enforce a partition of Cyprus into Greek and Turkish sections, and this is to take place sometime around the middle two weeks of September, 1967. The assent of Archbishop Makarios, President of Cyprus, will be demanded, and if he refuses, as he is expected to do, then a military coup will be accomplished by General George Grivas, leader of the Cypriote National Forces, for the purpose of partitioning the island of Cyprus.

According to the information furnished to the Communist Party, USA, Roussas intends to include this information in a book to be published around October, 1967, by Grove Press. Reportedly this book will also contain a statement that the United States National Security Council ordered the military coup in Greece which took place in February, 1967, even to the point of setting the exact date for this coup.

"It is O.K. to publish the information about Cyprus as a leak, but without mention of Roussas or the book as a source."

HALL did not state what his source was for this information but he swore that the information was authentic. HALL instructed that this information should be framed into a message and sent to the Communist Party of the Soviet Union via Solo channels, but that the names of ROUSSAS and Grove Press should be deleted. The text of this note, along with HALL's instructions, were furnished telephonically to the New York Office on 8/7/67.

Based upon the above information, there was prepared a letterhead memorandum (LHM) entitled "POLITICAL SITUATION IN CYPRUS," the original and three copies of which are enclosed herewith for the Bureau and one copy of which is enclosed for New York.

The enclosed LHM has been classified "Sacra" in order to protect the identity of this highly placed source who is furnishing information on the highest level concerning the international communist movement. Unauthorized disclosure would jeopardize the security of this source, thus adversely affecting the national security.

Outside of the headlines, both domestic and international, there is nothing new. We intend to keep our date as agreed upon (the meeting in Montreal). Only something big and unforeseen would override the plans at this time for a visit to the Expo.



However, the Soviets were not to be informed the information had come from Rousseas or that he planned on publishing a book. George Rousseas is a close friend of Andreas Papandreou, son of the deposed Prime Minister of Greece. Bufiles negative regarding Rousseas. In view of Soviet interest in Cyprus crisis and possible political and military moves it may take based on the information, we are disseminating it. The information received from the National Security Council was made available to Special Agent R. H. Haynes through liaison by Mr. A. Russell Ash. National Security Council, following his dissussion of the matter with Mr. Bromley Smith, Executive Secretary of the National Security Council.

Classified "Top Secret" since unauthorized disclosure of this information could reveal the identity of the source (CG 5824-S*) who is of continuing value and such revelation could result in especially grave damage to the nation.

As you have previously been advised, we intend to treat the investigation in the same manner as we would any other such violation and intend to take no steps which would in any way jeopardize the Solo Operation.

The Director has instructed that "nothing be done to forestall any prosecution."

The only change of consequence is found in the second line of the decryption. The portion which read "... #10# - #24# NOVEMBER ..." is changed to read "... #10# - #14# NOVEMBER.

The New York Office is aware of this change.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in August 1967 advised as follows:

The Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU) has made available a document which alleges to set forth the true facts concerning Svetlana Alliluyeva. This document was being made available to Communist Parties throughout the world so that if they encounter any difficulties in connection with this case, they will be able to defend their stand with the facts furnished in this document.

In this document, the CCCPSU states that there is an intensification of anti-Soviet propaganda in the United States and other countries on the eve of the 50th Anniversary of the October Revolution. In this campaign, the role of Svetlana Alliluyeva and her memoirs is a main one. This case is being used to weaken the impression being produced on the working class and the international public opinion by the achievements of the Soviet Union, as well as attempting to discredit the anniversary celebration.

This can be seen through the publication of Mrs. Alliluyeva's book scheduled for October 16th of this year. Also her statements at a news conference in New York on April 26th and her so-called "letter to Pasternak" show Mrs. Alliluyeva to be a blind instrument in the hands of

the American propaganda machinery. They are using this selfish, mentally unbalanced woman, publicizing her as one who has broken with Communism for ideological reasons. To confirm this, they are making use of Mrs. Alliluyeva's statements, "faith in God," "love for people," and "absence of freedom in the USSR."

The Alliluyeva manuscript represents recollections of her childhood, relatives, friends, and time spent with Stalin, as well as her intimate adventures. She has never been closely associated with leaders of our Party, including her father, J. V. Stalin. She does not have in her possession any Party or State secrets and there is no information of a principal significance as far as Stalin is concerned.

The document continues by describing Svetlana Alliluyeva as a selfish, extravagant person, given to hysterics and who would become enraged when criticized by the people around her. They described her as having been married five times, the last to B. C. Singh. This marriage was never officially registered in the Soviet Union due to the fact that Singh was still married in his country.

It was also set forth that Stalin at many times strongly disapproved of the immoral behaviour of his daughter and had tried to show her the right way of life. The facts of the immoral conduct of Svetlana Alliluyeva were known to the CCCPSU. The Party leaders of the institutions where she had been working, as well as some of the members of the Central Committee, repeatedly called her attention to the wrong way of life that she had been living.

After the death of her last husband, B. C. Singh, Mrs. Alliluyeva applied for a visa to go to India with the aim of bringing his ashes there. Competent authorities saw no reason to prevent the trip, considering it a personal matter for Mrs. Alliluyeva.

However, taking into account that certain Western circles might show interest in the person of Mrs. Alliluyeva, the appropriate authorities brought this to her attention. She assured them that she realized her responsibility and would observe necessary caution.

This proved untrue, as her real aim was a desire to get the manuscript out of the USSR, to stay in India or another country and publish her book, thus gaining money and publicity.

This double dealing is confirmed with the following fact: "During one of the Party meetings on world literature at the Gorky Institute, she criticized very sharply Sinyavski and Daniel who published their slanderous books abroad. Now she speaks about these two renegades in a different way."

The "tutors" of Alliluyeva certainly played their part in this change of her opinion. The same "tutors" gave her a helping hand in making public speeches and serve as "revisors" of her memoirs.

According to information at our disposal, /prior to her departure from India to Switzerland and later to the USA, officials from the United States Embassy, including CIA agents, worked with Svetlana Alliluyeva. Pro-American statesmen of India did the same. One of them took the liberty of committing a direct forgery and told Svetlana Alliluyeva that her request to stay longer in India had not been supported by the Soviet Government, although "we" never had such a request.

The document points out that the CCCPSU states that they are going to take measures to paralyze the plans of the United States propaganda machinery aimed at misusing the Alliluyeva book. Some action will be taken which will minimize the sensational character and propaganda effect of this publication. Measures are being taken to draw the attention of public opinion to the fact characterizing the political and moral phase of Svetlana Alliluyeva who betrayed her homeland and left her children.

In explaining this particular case, we consider it important to show that Alliluyeva, who had been brought up in artificial conditions and is a lonely person, does not represent and has no right to represent Soviet intellectuals who, together with the whole people, honestly and selflessly are building Communism. 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Action Accuses Defendants Of Pushing Share Price Up, Then Dumping Holdings

By John F. Lyons Staff Reporter of the Wall Street Journal NEW YORK - A Federal grand jury indicted 16 bankers, brokers and businessmen on charges of fraud and conspiracy to manipulate the stock of Hercules Galion Products Inc., listed on the American Stock Exchange.

This was the second indictment obtained by Federal prosecutors in New York in a continuing investigation of alleged price manipulation of shares of companies traded on the American exchange. The earlier indictment charged stock rigging in the shares of Pentron Electronics Corp. All in all, the share trading in at least seven American exchange companies is under investigation.

Hercules Galion is a Galion, Ohio, manufacturer of dump truck bodies and hoists. The indictment accuses the 16 defendants and six co-conspirators with artificially pushing up the price of the stock in the summer of 1965 and then dumping the stock on the public at inflated prices early in 1966.

During this period, the stock price went from about \$6.75 a share to a high of \$14.50 a share; before collapsing to \$7.50 in June 1966. Brokers were bribed to help in dumping the shares on the public, the indictment charged. As a result, according to the indictment, the public was defrauded of about \$1 million.

The U.S. Attorney's office charged yesterday that the alleged plot originated at the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, Ill., nearly a thousand miles from the American exchange trading floor. The key figures, according to the indictment, were Irving Projansky, Lincoln-wood's chairman and a director of Hercules, and Arthur Keller, Lincolnwood's former president. Both were named as defendants.

The plan, it's alleged, involved the purchase of 250,000 Hercules shares by the defendants, who traded this stock in a "pool" and then dumped it on the public. Hercules had 983,547

shares outstanding at the time.
Other defendants include Irving Projansky's son, Stuart, who is an assistant vice president at First National of Lincolnwood; Harry Brainin, another Hercules director who is president of Argus Capital Corp. of Chicago and president of Chatham Corp, also in Chicago; and Dr. also a director of the bank. Mr. Projansky has also been an official of both Argus and Chat-

Furla, Rolland Among Defendants

The brokers and businessmen indicted ingludo Spero Furla, who was formerly a cusdomers' mun in Chicago for Douglas Securities Corp., and Mark Rolland, a Chicago money lender who was a partner in Investment Asso-Siates Inc., a Chicago finance company. Both Mr. Rolland and Mr. Furla have pictifed guilty in the June 1 indictment charging them with rigging the price of Pentron stock.

Other defendants in the case include Gerald Leavitt, a Chleago businessman who is a relaflyond Mar Rolland; Burton "Buddy" Kojuk, a former stockbroker named as co-conspirator in the Pentron case and a defendant in the Chicago civil suit charging him with conspiring to defraud his former employer, Edward N. Sic-

The others in the plot are alleged to have been Michael Geier, a former customers' man for Hertz, Neumark & Warner, a New York Stock Exchange member firm. Murray Peltz, also of the Hertz, Neumark firm; Harris Nagorsky, a former salesman for First Hanover Corp. in Chicago, Herbert Werman, formerly of Dreyfus & Co.; Edward Wetzel, formerly of Hertz, Neumark; Zafe Zafer, formerly a Chicago salesman for Hornblower & Weeks Inc., a Big Board member, and David Zisfein, formerly a customers' man with Reynolds & Co., another Big Board firm.

Those charged as co-conspirators but not defendants in the case include the First National Bank of Lincolnwood, Argus Capital Corp., George Georges, the Chicago speculator involved in the Pentron case; Irving Taub, a deceased director of the Lincolnwood Bank, and Morris Childs and his wife Eva. Eva Childs is identified as the sister of Irving Pro-

jansky.

Some of the brokers who were indicted had a record of frequent job switches. For instance at the time of the alleged Hercules plot Mr. Furla was a salesman for Blair & Co., Granbery, Marache Inc. He went to Douglas Securitles shortly thereafter. Mr. Nagorsky at the time of the plot was a salesman for Rodman & Renshaw, a Big Board firm in Chicago. Mr. Werman at the time of the alleged plot worked for Ted Bates & Co., a New York City advertis-ing agency. His most recent securities industry job was with the Dreyfus firm. Mr. Kozak, the former Siegler salesman, was with Link, Gorman & Peck at the time of the alleged plot. Mr. Kozak's most recent securities industry job was a month's association with Goodbody &

The indictments came after nearly two years of sleuthing in a trail that led Federal prosecutors to a half dozen cities across the country. Paul Grand, an assistant U.S. Attorncy in the office of the Federal prosecutor, presented the case to the grand jury. Richard Blumberg, of the Securities and Exchange Commission in New York, did much of the investigative work in the case, helped by Assistant U.S. Attorney Lawrence Newman who presented the Pentron case to the grand jury. Bribing of Customers' Men Alleged

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Here is how the plot is described in the court papers rgus Capital, which included about 70 investors in 1965, had obtained control of 245,432 shares of Hercules, Defendants Brainin, Projansky and co-conspirator Taub were directors of Argus. In that month Messus. Projansky and Keller met defendants Leavitt, Roiland and Furla at the bank and they agreed "to raise the market price of Hercules stock from approximately \$6 a share to \$12 a share and to maintain the price at said level." Argus gave Messrs. Rolland, Furla and Leavitt \$261,000 to buy another 36,000 shares of Hercules. These three defendants had "no obligation to repay" the \$261,000 of Argus money, "but could if and when they chose to obtain said 36,000 shares.'

The court papers further allege that Messrs. Projansky and Keller caused defendant Weltz and co-conspirators Morris and Eva Childs to pay "a total of \$5,000" to Messrs. Furla, Rolland and Leavitt.

Messrs. Furla, Rolland and Leavitt thenwent to defeedants Zafer, Nagorsky and Kozak to induce their customers to purchase fierewes

stocf. Options in Hercules and cash were used, to pash the stock, the papers allege. The two First of Lincolnwood top officers also used other brokerage business as inducements. Louis from the Lincolnwood bank were provided to the defendant salesmen and Mr. Rolland's firm, Investment Associates, also provided loans for Hercules purchase, the papers allege.

The indictment further alleges that the plot-ters, "to create actual and apparent trading activity" in Hercules stock, induced their brokerage customers to purchase huge amounts of the stock at the opening and close of the market. The plotters are also accused of arranging among themselves "to enter bids for Hércules Gallon stock in timed sequence at successively higher prices."

When Hercules Gallon stock became temporarily depressed during the time of the plot, it's alleged that Irving Projansky "would and did arrange for the Lincolnwood Bank to lend \$80,000 to George Georges as compensation" for himself and other securities salesmen whom he allegedly induced to recommend to their customers the purchase of Herculess Galion stock. Both Mr. Projansky and Keller also agreed to "make available" 20,000 shares of Hercules stock "at a price below the market as compensation."

Mr. Projansky also allegedly gave Mr. Zisicin at Reynolds and Edward Wetzel at Hertz, Neumark an option to buy Hercules stock so that they would recommend it to their customers. George Georges is alleged to have offered options to Mr. Werman so that Hercules could be pushed. The indictment alleges that brokers Furla, Kozak, Nagorsky, Weizel. Zafer and Zistein caused a total of 227,750 Hercules shares to be pilichased "at gradually increasing prices."

Brokers Geier and Peltz of Hertz, Neumark are alleged to have entered the plot in early 1966 when "additional assistance" to support to support the stock's price was needed. Messis, Rozak, Rolland, and Furla are accused of offering \$120,000 in each to Mr. Geler and Mr. Pellz "If they succeeded in raising the price of Her-cules stock from \$11 to \$16 a share." The U.S. attorney alleges that "Geler and Peliz purchased approximately 42,500 shares for their customers and induced 12 other brokers employed at member firms of the American and New York Stock Exchanges to buy stock."

When the stock reached \$13 a share in early 1966, Mr. Kozak is alleged to have paid brokers Geler and Peltz with \$25,000 in funds that 'came from the First National Bank of Lincolnwood through loans approved by Stuart Projansky." It's further charged that Irving Projansky withdrew \$47,500 from a customers account at First of Lincolnwood and "omitted the withdrawal from the bank records." The withdrawal ommission allowed him to "conceal the fact that he turned the \$17,500 over to Kozak, Rolland and Furla for payment to Geier and Peltz," the indictment charges.

If convicted on the charges, Messrs. Projansky and Keller could each get 61 years in prison and be fined \$90,000 each. Messrs. Kozak, Geier, Peltz and Stuart Projansky could each get 57 years and \$70,000 in times. Messrs. Rolland, Furla and Nagorsky could get 9 years and \$30,000 each. Messrs. Brainin, Leavitt, Werman, Weitz, Wetzel, Zafer and Zisfein could each get 7 years and \$20,000 in fines.

One Defendant Denies Charges

The only defendant who would comment on the charges was Mr. Geler, who, since he left Hertz, Neumark in July, has been the publisher of an investment advisory service called the Geier Letter. Interviewed yesterday he said, "I'm not worried. I have enough faith in American justice to know that someone can't be proved guilty for something that didn't happen. All of the charges against me sound ridiculous." He denies being offered \$120,000 by Mr. Kozak. He says that the figure is "new to me, because when I was questioned, the U.S. Attorney used the figure \$25,000." Mr. Geier claimed that his customers bought 40,000 shares of the stock.

Says Mr. Geier, who was identified as at-'tending a secret brokers' meeting in New York to discuss the Hercules situation, "it was a good situation" as a result of a planned merger with Liquidonics Inc., a company that was then trading for a few dollars a share. The merger talks were broken off and the price of Liquidonics eventually went to over \$100 a share. Mr. Geier sald the brokers' meeting was called to get more information on the Liquidonies merger.

As on previous occasions, Herenica Gallon président Charles F. Myers apa chairman David Van Alstyno said that neither Hercules "Itself nor its management was involved,

The U.S. Attorney's office in New York made no comment beyond the charges that were specified out in the indictment. But there's no doubt that the Federal prosecutors were pleased with their success in obtaining the indictment. For one thing, the charges, which name a national bank, a score of brokerage firms and influential businessmen, represented to securities industry experts the most important criminal case since 1961, when Alexander Guterma, the financier, was involved in a long series of market rigging charges that sent him to prison.

The 19-page indictment gave no hint that the alleged violations might have represented the efforts of criminal syndicate operators intent on infiltrating brokerage houses and rigging the market. But some of the defendants in dicted yesterday have been linked to criminal elements with gangland connections.

For instance, both the defendants Nagorsky and Kozak had business associations with Allan Robert Rosenburg, a Chicago con man and extortionist, who was found murdered on March 17. Rosenburg is known to have been a low ranking associate of a top Chicago mobster named Felix (Milwaukee Phil) Alderisio.

Mr. Nagorsky is known to have bragged to associates that he got Rosenburg involved in the stock market: "I grew up with Al Rosenburg and I taught him all he knew about the market." Mr. Kozak is identified as handling transactions for Rosenburg and other gangland figures while he was a customers man at Link, Gorman & Peck, a Chicago securities firm. But Mr. Kozak, who worked as a ball bondsman before becoming a broker, has denied that he ever had any associations with gangland figures.

Defendants Projansky and Brainin and Argus Capital have a background of stock market adventures. For instance, in July 1963, a civil suit filed in Detroit by Fenestra Inc., a producer of truck and housing components, claimed that the three, along with Mr. Taub, had engaged in an illegal conspiracy to merge Fenestra with Gulf American Land Corp. Fenestra won the suit in the Detroit courts but the Michigan Supreme Court, in Lansing, overturned the lower court decision.

Argus Capital can best he described as an incorporated group of about 70 North Side Chicago area store owners, lawyors, dictors and dentists and their wives. In an interview in Chicago a few months ago, Mr. Projansky sald Argus was his method of letting his friends and relatives in on good investment opportunities.

From the information furnished by this informant, it appears apparent that the Communist Party of the Soviet Union is attempting to counteract the propaganda value attendant to the defection of Alliluyeva to the United States.

The approach of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union in so doing will be of considerable value to the Department of State, the Central Intelligence Agency, and the Department of Justice.

instrument and publicizing her as one who has broken with communism for ideological reasons. She is further described as a person who was never closely associated with leaders of the Communist Party of the Coviet Union or, for that matter, with her own father, J. V. Stalin. For this reason, she does not have in her possession any Party or State secrets or even any significant information regarding Stalin himself.

The CCCPSU goes on to describe Alliluyeva as having been parried five times, the last time to B. C. Singh. This marriage was never officially registered in the Soviet Union because Singh already had a wife in India.

The CCCPCU notes that Stalin strongly disapproved of Alliluyova's immoral behavior on many occasions and attempted to straighten her out. Her immoral conduct was also known to other Party leaders who attempted to call to her attention the fact that she was living in an improper way.

Following the death of her last husband, Mrs. Alliluyova applied for a visa to go to India to make arrangements for the burial of her husband. Competent authorities say no reason to prevent the trip and considered it a personal matter for Mrs. Alliluyova.

However, realizing that certain Nostern circles might show an interest in the person of Mrs. Alliluyova, appropriate Soviet authorities brought this to her attention. She assured them that she realized her responsibility and would observe necessary caution. This proved untrue, as it became evident her real aim was to get her manuscript out of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republies and to stay in India or some other country, publish her book, and, thereby, gain money and publicity.

As evidence of this double-dealing by Alliluyova, the Soviet leadership cites the following.

During one of the Party meetings on world literature at the Gorky Institute, Alliluyeva criticized very sharply the Soviet writers Sinyayski and Daniel, who had published their slanderous books abroad. The CCCPSU notes that now Alliluyeva speaks of these two renegates in a different way.

The CCCPSU further states that prior to her departure from India to Switzerland and then later to the United States, officials from the United States Embassy, including Central Intelligence Agency agents, worked with Alliluyeva. Pro-American statesmen of India did the same. One of them even took the liberty of telling a lie by informing Alliluyeva that her request to stay longer in India had not been supported by the Soviet Government. In fact, the Coviet Government never received such a request.

The CCCP3U goes on to state that the Soviets are going to take measures to paralyze the plans of the United States propaganda machinery aimed at misusing the Alliluyeva book. Some action will be taken which will minimize the somestional character and propaganda effect of this publication. Leasures are being taken to draw attention and public opinion to the political and moral implications of Alliluyeva's having betrayed her homeland and abandoned her children.

In explaining this particular case, the CCCPSU has considered it important to show that Alliluyeva, who was brought up in artificial conditions and who is a lonely person, does not represent and has no right to represent Soviet intellectuals, who, together with the whole people, honeatly and selflessly are building communism.

The leadership of the Coviet Union wants its world-wide Party affiliates to portray Alliluyova as a person with light-minded, superficial judgement, motivated by a simple desire to curry favor with her new masters. The Coviet leadership considers her an undertaking of the ruling circles of the United States of America which do not hositate to use, for their political purposes, a sick, morally degraded person left without any feeling of civic honor.





Aumenta o ritmo de crescimento do bem-estar material. Durante o quinquenio anterior, as rendas reais por habitantes cresceram em 20%, enquanto que no presente quinquenio aumentarão em 30%, apro-

Entre as tarefas mais importantes do novo cinquiento está a do ulterior progresso para diferenças essenciais entre a cidade o campo entre o trabalho manual e o intelectual. No presente quinqueno serão aplicadas liversas medidas destinadas a elevar o nivel cultral e techico do povo. Em março deste ano Presidina do Soviete Supremo da URSS aproou um decreto pelo qual os operários e os appregados passarão a semana de cinco dias de tabalho e dois feriados, sem alterar o número e horas semanais de trabalho. Foram adotadas inclidas para desenvolver a esfera dos serviços, o comércio e da alimentação pública.

No plano de elevação do nivel de vida do

povo, de acordo com o decidido pelo XXIII Congresso do PCUS, um elo decisivo será o aumento da remuneração do trabalho. O salário medio dos operários e empregados aumentará no mínimo de 20%, ou seja, de 95,6 rublos que foi em 1965 para 115 rublos em 1970.

As rendas dos colcosianos procedentes da conomia social dos colcoses crescerão de 1966 a 1970 entre 35 a 40%. Um aumento mais rapido da retribuição do trabalho dos colcosianos fará com que o nivel das rendas reais dos colcosianos continue se aproximando cada vez mais do nível das rendas dos operários e empregados. A orientação no sentido de aproximar o nível da remuneração do trabalho dos colcosianos e dos operários não é novidade. O nôvo é que em 1966 implantou-se nos colcoses o pagamento de um mínimo mensal, tomando como base o nível do salário dos operários dos sovicoses.

Os fundos sociais de consumo aumentarao no novo quinquenio no mínimo de 40%. Por conta disso pensa se em elevar em mais de 30% o valor mínimo das pensos de velhice dos operários e empregados, assim como também dos culcosianos, e rebaixar a idade de aposentadoria dos colcosianos e de certas categorias de mulheres trabalhadoras.

O nôvo quinquênio prévé a ampliação da construção de moradias. Em 1966-1970 passarão a viver em novas casas e melhorarão suas condições de moradia cérca de 65 milhões de pessoas.

Os resultados do 1966, primeiro ano do quinquenio, mostram que as decisões do XXIII Congresso do PCUS estão sendo realizadas com todo exito.

Em 1966, a renda nacional aumentou em 7.5%, a produção industrial em 8.6% e a agropecuária em 10% aproximadamente. As rendas reais por habitante cresceram em mais de 6%; o salário dos operários e empregados, em 3.6%, alcançando uma média mensal de 99 rublos, e a renda dos colcosianos procedente da economia social, em 16%. Cêrca de 11 milhões de pessoas receberam casas novas ou melhoraram suas condições de moradias.

a jornada de oito horas. Só depois do feliz cum primento dos planos apos guerra de restabelecimento e desenvolvimento da economia nacional voltou-se de novo a estabelecer a larefa de reduzir a jornada de trabalho. Em principios de 1956, a jornada de trabalho dos operários e dos empiregados que trabalhavam oito horas diárias foi reduzida aos sábados e vespera de festa em duas horas. A partir de fins de 1956 até 1960, foi implantada em tôda a economia do país a jornada de trabalho de sete horas. e nos rabalhos do subsolo, a de seis horas.

E significativo que a jornada de trabalho seja reduzida sem diminuir o salário. Na indústria, a redução da jornada foi acompanhada de uma serie de medidas para ajustar os salários due resultaram num aumento do nivel médio dos mesmos.

Tendo em conta que uma determinada parte dos operários trabalha de seis a quatro horas diárias em certas oficinas e produções insalibres: a media da jornada de trabalho dos operários industriais adultos foi em 1965 de 693 horas, ou seja, umas tres horas menos que em 1913

Atualmente a média da semana de trabalho dos operários industriais é de 40 horas. Tomando em consideração a jornada de trabalho reduzida de certas categorias de operários, a semana de trabalho média foi em 1965 de 39,8 horas, isto é, uma das mais curtas do nundo. Com efeito, em 1964, por exemplo, a emana de trabalho foi praticamente de 44,1 dras na indústria da República Federal Alemã, a 45 horas na indústria de transformação do lapão, de 45,6 na da França e de 40,7 na dos istados Unidos da América (EUA).

Antes da revolução, os trabelhadores não ocavam na Rússia de férias remuneradas, e autitos deles não tinham sequer férias. Na HSS, todos os operários e empregados têm irreito por lei a 12 dias úteis no minimo, de erias anuais, custeadas de acôrdo com o salário adlio ganho durante o último ano de trabalto. A média de duração das férias aumenta adualmente. Por exemplo, a 1.º de abril de 938, eta de 18,5 dias úteis, a 31 de março e 1964 de 19,3 dias.

AUMENTO DAS RENDAS DOS COLCOSIANOS

Na Russia tzarista, as rendas dos campoeses trabalhadores eram, segundo algumas estiativas, quase três vêzes inferiores as dos operios. A Revolução de Outubro, apesar das diculdades e da ruína provacadas pela guerra, leciu-se em primeiro lugar na situação matial dos camponeses. A este respeito Lênin escreveu em 1919: Em um pais campones, os primeiros que sairam ganhando, os que mais lucrarum, aqueles que se beneficiaram imediatamente com a ditadura do proletariado, foram os camponeses em geral. Sob a ditadura do proletariado, o campones trabalha pela primeira pez para si mesmo e se alimenta melhor que o habitante da cidade (2).

Em 1928, as rendas reais dos camponeses per capita representavam aproximadamente 73% das que percebiam o operário e o empregado. As dificuldades da industrialização repercutiram nas rendas dos camponeses em não menor quantidade do que nas rendas da classe operário. Cabe supor que até 1940 a diferença no nivel do rendas dos operários e dos empregados, de um fado, e dos colcosianos, de outro, era algo maior que em 1928. Por outro lado, e preciso assinalar o impetuoso aumento do bem-estar do uma parte muito, considerável da população camponesa que durante os anos da industrialização passou a engrossár as fileiras dos operários e empregados.

No período de apos guerra, pelo menos a partii de começos da década de cinquenta, as tendas dos colcoses cresceram mais rapidamente que as rendas dos operários e dos empregados. Na URSS, as rendas das familias camponesas provem de três fontes: das que obtem nos coleoses pelo trabalho realizado na economia social, de suas economias auxiliares e do Estado (pensões, subsidios, estipendios, alarios que percebem os membros das familias camponesas que trabalham em empresas e instituições estatais). Nos últimos 10-15 anos, as rendas dos coleosianos pela quantidade e qualidade do trabalho realizado cresceram com maior rapidez-Que o salário dos operários e dos empregados: Em 1965 representavam mais da metade do salário dos operarios industriais e quase 2/3 do salário dos operários dos sovicoses. O aumento das rendas dos colcosianos provenientes da economia coletiva (calculado por cada colcosiano apto para o trabalho) foi (em percentagem):

No total, durante o período compreendido entre 1940 e 1965 inclusive, as rendas reais dos camponeses aumentaram em 240%.

CRESCIMENTO DO CONSUMO

Uma prova do aumento do nível de vida dos trabalhadores da URSS é o crescimento sistemático do consumo de produtos alimenticios e artigos industriais. Por exemplo, a dinâmica do consumo dos produtos alimentícios

fundamentais na URSS caracteriza-se pelas guintes dados (por habitantes, ao ano a quilo):

Do quadro se depreende que durante os anos do Poder soviético mudou essencialmente a estrutura do consumo de produtos alimenticios, aumentando a aliquotal dos que contém mais calorias (carne e toicinho, leite e produtos lácteos, ovos, açúcar). É lógico que como resultado disso tenha-se restringido o consumo do pão. A média de ração alimentícia na União Soviética não é atualmente inferior em calorias a da maioria dos países desenvolvidos. É certo que na URSS ainda consomese menos que em alguns países capitalistas, produtos alimentícios como carne, leite, hortaliças e frutas. Mas neste sentido a diferença vai-se reduzindo ràpidamente.

Durante o Poder sovietico aumentou consideravelmente também o consumo por habitantes dos ártigos industriais mais importantes: tecido, calçado, etc., sem nos referirmos aos bens de uso durável, cuja dinâmica de venda à população durante os últimos 15 anos vê-se no seguinte quadro (em milhar de unidade):

Tratemos agora brevemente dos preços no varejo. Na década de 20 verificou-se uma elevação sistemática, embora insignificante. Durante os anos da industrialização elevou-se o ritmo de crescimento; o mesmo ocorreu durante a Guerra Pátria. Em certos periodos (os primeiros anos da industrialização, a guerra), o aumento das rendas em dinheiro da população foi inferior ao crescimento dos preços.

Uma das grandes conquistas da cconomia da União Soviética do periodo de ajos iguierra e a superação da tendência geral ao animento dos preços no varejo.

Nos primeiros anos de após guerra rediferaram-se reduções sistemáticas dos preços estatais no varejo. Desde fins de 1947 atój 1954 efetitaram-se sete rebaixas, e como resultandados o uivel médio dos preços estatais no varejo reduzid-se quase em 60%.

Em seguida, para assegurar a redução la diferenças infundadas po nível de rendas di certos grupos da população decidio se cessar redução macica dos preços no varejo e emisio lugar orientaram-se os recursos pana elevar al rendas em dinheiro dos trabalhadores. Comp consequencia, ao longo dos últimos dez anos em duas ocasiões elevou-se o salário minino e para a majoria dos operários e empregados foram fixados novos níveis de salários e le munerações, que, geralmente, são superiores anteriores; foram melhoradas consideravelmente as pensões dos operários e empregados, com particularidade de que as mais baixas experimentaram um aumento substancial; foram apli cadas várias medidas para suprimir ou reducij gradualmente os impostos sobre a população, em primeiro lugar sobre trabalhadores pior reconpeusados; implantaram-se as pensoes estatats de velhice para os colcosianos; foi garantido o alto ritmo de aumento das rendas monetárias dos camponeses por seu trabalho realizado nos col-

Nas condições de rápido crescimento das rendas monetárias da população, o nivel die preços estatais no várejo estabilizou-se, sondo em 1956 de 138, em 1958 de 141, em 1966 de 140 com relação ao nivel de 1940. Atém disso, é preciso sublinhar que o indice dos preços dos artigos alimentícios foi em 1965 de 133, o dos industriais de 126 e o dás per bidas aleoólicas de 258. O indice dos preços do comercio colcosiano, formados livremente le

Crescimento do bem-estar do povo soviético

Muito antes da revolução de outubro, em pleno processo de formação do Partido Comunista da Rússia e da elaboração do seu programa, Lenin assinalou que a produção socialista viria "garantir o pleno bem-estar e o livre e completo desenvolvimento de todos co membros da sociedade (1). Esta formulação le ninista ficou plasmada no primeiro programa do Partido aprovado em 1903 e, mais tarde. no segundo programa adotado pelo VIII Congiesso do Partido, reunido ano e meio depois da Revolução de Outubro. O Partido Comunis ta, guiando-se por esta tese programática. orientou os esforços do povo no sentido de desenvolver a economia socialista e de assegurar, sôhre esta base, o rápido crescimento do bent-estar material e do nível cultural da populacan. Justamente esta idéia ficou expressa no novo programa do PCUS e nas resoluções de sen XXIIII Congresso.

Durante os anos da construção socialista una União Soviética criou-se uma poderosa industria moderna o uma agricultura avançada. Atualmente a URSS contribui com quase a quinta parte da produção industrial do mundo, enquanto que em 1913 à Rússia correspondia pouco mais de 4%.

O rápido erescimento da produção social na URSS foi acompanhado de um ascenso sistemático e ininterrupto do bem-estar da populadao, Subentende-se que neste sentido não existe uma dependência direta. A industrialização do pais, realizada em prazos históricos tão curtos e em uma situação internacional extremamente complexa, exigiu, em consequência, do povo sovietico determinados sacrificios. Não dispondo de fontes externas de acumulação para a industrialização, a União Soviética viu-se obrigoda a encontrá-las dentro do país. Não é segredo que com frequência estas fontes foram a parte da renda nacional que em outras circunstancias poderia ter sido utilizada para um crescimento mais rapido do bem estar popular. Tampouco se deve esquecer que dos cinquenta anos de existência do Poder soviético quase vinte foram dedicados às guerras que nos impôs o imperialismo internacional e à liquidação de suas consequências. Por conseguinte, tudo o que se fez no terreno da construção econômica e cultural foi conseguido praticamente nos res-

Mas, mesmo com tôdas as complexidades e dificuldades que teve que enfrentar o Estudo soviético no processo de seu fortalecimento e desenvolvimento, são inegáveis as enormes conquistas alcançadas em todos os terrenos da vida do povo soviético, compreendido ao mesmo tempo o crescimento do seu nivel material e cultural. A experiencia de cinquenta anos de construção socialista e comunista em nosso país refuta plenamente as patranhas da imprensa burguesa referentes a que o Poder soviético não deu nada aos trabalhadores. Analisemos mais de perto certos fatos reas que permitein avaliar objetivamente o caminho percorrido pelo povo soviético e que testemunham incontestavelmente o ascenso de seu bem-estar e de seu nivel cultural.

Um dos indices fundamentais que refletem a elevação do nivel de vida do povo é o aumento do salário real. Por salário real entendo-se o que se recebe em dinheiro, feita a correção correspondente segundo as altrações verificadas no índice dos preços. Isto é compreensível, uma evez que a prática demonstra que paralelamente à elevação do salário nominal dos trabalhadores podem aumentar também os preços dos artigos e dos serviços.

Qual a situação em relação com este índice? Embora na Russia pré-revolucionária não existissem estatísticas a este respeito, por toda uma série del dados pode-se chegar a conclusão de que o salário médio mensal dos operarios industriais era em 1913 de 25 rublos aproximademente.

A Primeira Guerra Mundial e, mais tarde, a guerra civil e suas sequelas na ordem econômica acarretaram uma considerável redução do salário real, que em 1919-1921 não chegava a 7 rublos mensais (em rublos de 1913). Desde 1922 começa a elevar-se o salário real, e em fins de 1925 e comêço de 1926 alcunça-se o nível de 1913 e depois se o ultrapassa.

A accleração da industrialização do pais nos momentos em que aumentava o perigo do fascismo le se intensificavam os preparativos de uma nova guerra mundial exigiu por parte de todo o povo soviético grandes esforços, o mais rigoroso regime de economia em todos os ter-

No terreno da defesa da saúde trabulham na URSS mais de quatro milhões de pesoas. Pelo número de médicos a URSS ocupa o primeiro lugar no mundo, donde de cada quatro médicos, um é soviético.

O cuidado pela saúde do povo é uma das principais tarefas do Estado soviético. Em 1965, por exemplo, nos sanatúrios, casas de repouso, ctc., trataram-se e descantaram mais de 8,3 milhões de trabalhadores. Uma parte consideravel deles (20%) obtiveram lugar gratuitamente e os restantes pagaram apenas 30% do valor. Nos acampamentos de pioneiros, que também são mantidos fundamentalmente pelos fundos sociais, descansam anualmente mais de quatro milhões de crianças.

Graças ao progresso da medicina, à melhora da condições de trabalho, de vida e de repouso e ao crescimento: do consumo, a mortalidade foi em 1965 a quarta parte da de 1913, a concretamente a infantil, a décima parte. A vida media aumentou de 32 anos em 1896-1897 para 44 em 1926-1927 e para 70 anos em 1964-1965.

No fundamental, por conta dos fundos sociais de consumo custeia-se na União Sovictica o sustento das moradias tipo social. O aluguel que paga a população apenas chega para cobrir a quarta parte aproximadamente dos gastos de manutenção do fundo de habitação. Isso indica o beixo nível dos alugueis e o seu insignificante pêso específico no total de gastos familiares dos operários e dos empregados.

O fundo de habitação nas cidades e nos povoados fabris de tipo urbano aumentou em 1965 quase em sete vêzes em relação a 1913, e em três vêzes em comparação com o ano 1940. Desde 1957 a URSS ocupa um dos primeiros lugares do mundo na construção de habitação por cada mil habitantes. Por exemplo, em 1965, por cada mil pessoas foram construidas na URSS 9.5 habitações. A título de comparação recordemos que nos EUA, o índice para esse mesmo ano foi de 7,9, na Inglaterra de 7,3, na Italia de 8,1. Somente em 1957-1966 passaram a viver em novas casas confortáveis ou melhoraram suas condições de habitação 112 milhões de pessoas, quasc a metade da população do país.

Não obstante, a solução do problema habitação continua sendo uma das threlas agudas e urgentes que tem o povo socie A razão disso reside em que paralelamente grande ritmo da construção de moradia, cre com muita rapidez também a população, durante os anos do Poder sovictico aume 4.4 vezes. Por isso que na URSS contin ampliando-se a construção de moradias o tido estabeleceu a tarefa de asseguirar em perspectiva próxima a cado familia sovietica apartamento confortavel.

UMA AUTENTICA REVOLUÇÃO CULTU

Na Russia tzarista, quase 4/5 das eria e adolescentes não imham possibilidade de quentar as escolas. Segundo o censo da R de 1897, 76% da população de mais de anos de idade era analfabeta, e entre as lheres o analfabetismo chegava a 88%

Na União Soviética foram oriadas las dições necessárias para que toda a popu possa instruir-se. Já antes da guerra im tou-se o ensino primário obrigatório, e in gunda metade da década de cinquenta beleceu-se a de oito graus. Atc. 1970, per que no fundamental ficará implantado o no médio para a juventude. A União Sové um país sem analfabetos.

Atualmente, na URSS, de luma popu de 234 milhões de habiatntes, mais de 72 lhões estudam gratuitamente nas escolas de tura geral e técnico-profissionais, em es especiais de ensino médio, em centros dos superiores e em diversos cursos. Isto sigr que na URSS estuda uma pessoa de cada

Em 1965 havia ha União Sovietica 756 belecimentos de ensino superior, nos quais savam 4,1 milhões de alunos. Tres quartas tes aproximadamente dos estudantes que trabalham recebem estipêndios. Em 1965 duaram-se nos centros de ensino superio URSS 403 900 especialistas, dos quais 470 engenheiros. Como comparação direntes que

não regulados pelo Estado nem por seus orgahismos, conércio cujo volume representa 3-4/o do total do comércio estatal e cooperativo no sarção, toi lem 1965 de 111 com relação a 1940.

A política de sustentação de um nível estavel dos preços no varejo exclui a conjuntura inflacionista, assegura a capacidade aquisitiva do rublo e garante às massas trabalhadoras a anaintenção e, à medida que aumenta as rendas em dinheiro, a elevação do nível real de suas rendas e do consumo.

OS FUNDOS SOCIAIS DE CONSUMO

A população da União Sovictica obtem a maior parte de suas rendas em forma de salários e de retribuição pelo trabalho nos colcoses. Para certa parte da população, principalmente rural, outra fonte provém de sua economia auxiliar.

Não obstante, não é conveniente ou e difidi cobrir uma série de necessidades com pagamento pelo trabalho. Eis porque, uma parte dos necessidades da população da URSS, como já dissemos, seja satisfeita por meio dos chatuados fundos sociais de consumo. Estes fundos constituem uma parte da renda nacional que e emprega, de um lado, para custear as penpes, os subsidios e os estipêndios e, de outro. para la manutenção de diferentes serviços de que destrute a população, gratuitamente ou pagando uma parte de seu custo. Por conseguinte, a quantia das rendas provenientes dos fundos sociais de consumo não está vinculada diretamente com a quantidade e a qualidade do trahalho realizado por cada cidadão.

Dulante os primeiros anos do Poder sovietico, apesar da falta de recursos, graças aos tundos sociais de consumo liquidou-se o analfabetismo, assegurou-se a instrução primaria obrigatoria para as crianças, foram organizados o sistema estatal de saúde pública, a proteção a maternidade e à infância e o descons da população. A medida que foram sendo matores os recursos, o Estado soviético empreendeu tarefas mais ambiciosas na esfera da construção cultural, da instrução pública e da saúde, da previsão e da segurança social-

As seguintes cifras dão uma ideia dos subsídios e benefícios adicionais que os trabalha dores recebem por conta dos fundos sociais de consumo. Como já recordimos, em 1965 o saluirio medio mensal dos operários e empregados na URSS foi de 95.6 rublos. Mas incluindo os subsidiis complementares e os serviços gratuitos custeados pelos fundos sociais de consumo imposton em 129 rublos. Por conseguinte, cada operário e empregado recebeu mensalmente dos fundos sociais de consumo uma media complementar de 33,4 rublos, ou seja, mais 35%, aproximadamente, sobre seu salário.

Como se empregam na União Soviética os fundos sociais de consumo?

Em 1965, 26% de sua totalidade (10 bilhões e 900 milhões de rublos) foram destinados aos pensionistas e aos membros da sociedade dos inválidos.

Em principios de 1966, na URSS havia 32 milhões de pensionistas. A idade de aposentádoria dos operarios e empregados da União Soviética é das mais baixas do mundo: 55 anos para a mulher e 60 para o homem. Para um considerável número de operarios ocupados em trabalhos extrapesados as aposentadorias são concedidas aos 50.55 anos e até aos 45.50 anos.

A titulos de comparação diremos que nos países capitalistas a aposentadoria é concedida, geralmente, aos 65.70 anos. A média da pensão de velhice na URSS equivale hoje a mais de 70% do salário, aproximadamente, e para os trabalhadores pior remunerados, a 100%.

Nas cooperativas agricolas (colcoses) as multieres aposentam-se aos 60 anos e os homens aos 65. De acordo com as decisões do XXIII Congresso do PCUS, para o ano de 1970, no que se refere as pensões de velhice, os colcosianos serão equiparados aos operários e aos empregados.

Além das pensões de velhice existem na URSS as de invalidez, as de orfandade, etc. Todos os operários e empregados da União Sovictica, ao perder temporariamente sua capacidade de trabalho (por enfermidade ou outras causas), recebem subsídios do seguro social cuja quantia oscila entre 50% e 100% de seu salário médio. Durante a gravidez e depois do parto coincedem se as multieres 112 dias de férias, com um subsídio equivalente a seu salário médio. As familias numerosas recebem dos fundos sociais um subsídio mensal, assim como também as mães solteiras.

Por conta dos fundos sociais de consumo assegura-se a todos os membros da sociedade, independentemente de suas rendas, a assistência medica gratuita. Pora a proteção da saúde e para o repouso da população destinou-se em 1965 31% da soma total dos fundos sociais de consumo (12 bilhões e 800 milhões de rublos).

renos o inclusive determinados cacrificios. Durante os anos do primeiro plano quinquenal (1929-1932) os salários cresceram num grande ritmo, porem os preços no varejo aumentaram com maior rapidez. Como consequencia, o salário real neste periodo redaziu-se. Também durante a Grande Guerra Patria cairam os salarios reais. O nivel do salário real de pré-guerra (1940) foi alcançado em 1948, e desde então o salário médio dos operários e empregados aumenta sem cessar na URSS. Por exemplo, em 1965 o salário medio mensal dos operários e empregados foi de 95.6 rublos, enquanto que em 1940 era de 33 rúblos. Os preços estatais no varejo em 1965 eram superiores aos de 1940 em 40%. Por conseguinte, o salario real dos operarios e dos empregados em 1965 (tomando em consideração apenas o aumento dos preços uo varcjo) era superior ao de 1940 em 110%, aproximadamente. Se levarmos em conta que o crescimento das tarifas dos serviços, inclusive o aluguel da moradia, foi menor que a alta dos preços dos artigos, vemos que o salário real dos operários e empregados da economia nacional da URSS aumentou o período 1940/1965 (na realidade, em 1948/1965) em mais de 110%.

A falta dos correspondentes dados estatisticos não permitem analisar o crescimento do sulario real dos operários e dos empregados ocupados na economia nacional em compuração com o período anterior à revolução. Entretanto esta análise é possível ser feita em relação aos operários industriais.

Em 1928, o salário médio mensal dos operários industriais era de 69 rublos, ou seja, 25% aproximadamente superior ao salário real que tinham os operarios em 1913. Em 1965, o salário medio mensal dos operários da indústria da URSS foi de 1.013 rublos (segundo os preços vigentes até 1961). Portanto, em comparação com 1928, o salário nominal dos operarios industriais aumentou quase em 14,7 vezes. Os preços no varejo elevaram-se durante esse periodo em 8,7 vezes aproximadamente. Se fizermos o calculo só por este indice, verificaremos quo o salário real dos operários industriais em 1929. 1965 subiu aproximadamente em 70%. Calculando que o indice das tarifas dos serviços aumentou somente o dobro em 1929-1965, teremos que o erescimento do salario real dos operarios industriais durante o período indicado foi não de 70%, mas de 120%. Como foi dito, em 1928 o salário real dos operários industriais ultrapassou o nível de 1913 em 25%. Por conseguinte, em 1965 o salário real dos operários industriais era superior ao de 1913 em 180%. aproximadamente.

Como é sabido as rendas dos operarios e dos empregados da URSS não se limitam ao

salário.No orçamento familiar desempenham um grande papel também as pensões, os subsidios e os estipendios que recebem os estudantes A população recebe uma determinada parte de beneficios gratuitamente ou em condições van tajosas quando utiliza os serviços das escola e outros centros de ensino, os hospitais, sos ben cários, as ereches, as casas de repouso e os sanatorios, assint como os pensionatos. O indices das rendas reais da população é estabelecido na estatistica e na planificação sovietica levando em consideração estas circunstancias. Como o pêso específico das rendas obtidas pelos trabalhadores da URSS, a parte o salário, aumenta sistematicamente (sobre esta questão voltaremos a tratar mais adiante), resulta que as rendas reais crescem, como regra geral, com maior rapidez que o salário real. Por exemplo idirante o período compreendido entre 1940 e 1965 as rendas reais dos operários e dos empregados ocupados na economia nacional da URSS cresceram à razão de cada trabalhador em 130% e as rendas reais de toda a população, calcula dus per capita, triplicaram. Está claro que o crescimento c muito mais consideravel em com paração com o período anterior a revolução.

PLENO EMPREGO E REDUÇÃO DA JORNADA DE TRABALHO

A União Soviética é o primeiro puls do mundo que terminou para sempre com di de semprego e que assegurou a ocupação completo da população. Há mais de 35 anos que na URSS não há uma so pessoa sem trabalho e sem salarto.

Uma das mais importantes tarefas que sempre se propos o Partido Comunista é a redução da jornada de trabalho. A reivindicação do jornada de oito horas foi incluida no primeiro programa do Partido. Três dias apos a tomado do Poder pelo proletariado, o primeiro Governo sovietico promulgou o decreto "Sobre la jornado de trabalho de oito horas", que foi aplicado em todo o país em fins de 1917 e começos de 1948.

Em 1927, por ocasião do X aniversario da instauração do Poder soviético decidiose a passagem gradual à jornada de trabalho de sete horas sem redução do salário. Durante os cinco seis anos posteriores implantouse na UNSS pela primeira vez no mundo, a jornada de trabalho de sete horas (e em alguns casos ainda mais curta) para a maioria dos operarios à do empregados.

são obrigados a pagar. Tomanios 20 famílias entre arrentomanos 20 jaminas entre arten-datários, parecirios e meciros como amostra, que melhor nos pareceram estor em condições de representar a média geral dos contratos. É' cer-

que num artigo de tão polico espaço torne-se impossível desenvol-ver tema tão importante e comple-xa, mas o que segue pode dar ao leitor uma ideia de como audam as

leitor uma idéia de como andam es coisas para os camponeses sem terna, e dos grandes flueros que obtém os latifundiários.

Essas 20 familias, se compõe de
112 pessoas (entre adultos e crianças). Destas, 50 declararam que
tyabalhem, sem contar aqui o serviço prestado pelas 'crianças e mulheres e alguns assalariados utiliza-

tos pelos que cultivaram mais terras.

Tratoram de 133 hectares de terras com lavouras mixtas: café, algodão, milho, atroz, amendoim, feijão. São obrigados a entregar as

jão. São obrigados a entregar as porcentagens das culturos das égua, e da deca, como feljão e amendoim que dão duas colheitas por ano.

¡ O valor da prodição colhida nessa área, cultivada por essas 20 familias, foi Cr3 31,106,000 (trinta e um milhões e cento e acis mil cruzeiros velhos). Desta importância, os donos da terra receberam cia, os donos da terra receberam Cr\$ 17.736.000 (dezessete milhões, setecentos e trinta e seis mil cruzeiros velhos) restando para as 20 familias, Cr\$ 13.369.400 (treze milhões, trezentos e sessenta e nove mil e quatrocentos cruzeiros velhos). Dividide pelas 50 pessons que delararam que trabalharam, coubelhes a infirma importancia de Cr3 (738 (vinte e seis mil e setecentos e trinta e oito cruzeiros velhos) por més, isto é, menos de um letro do salário mínimo estabelecido por lei para a região. Se dividirmos os treze milhos e pour as 112 pessoas que compõem as familias, encontramos opeass NCr8 12.00 mensais, por pessoa. "Art. 96, item VI - Na participação dos frutos da parceria, a cota do proprietario não poderá ser cota do proprietario não poderá ser superior a: a) dez por cento, quando concorrer apenas com a terra nua; b) vinte por cento, quando condo concorrer com a terra preparada e moradin; c) trinta por cento, caso concorrer com o conjunto basiem de benfeitorias, constituido especialmente da casa de morada, galpões, banheiro para gado, corcas, valas aul currais, ronforme o caso; d) cingüenta por cento, esso concorrer com a terra preparada; es concorre: com la terra preparada e o conjunto basico de benfeitorias enumeradas na alinea "c" e mais o fornecimento de maquinas e inplementos agricolas para atender aos tratos culturais, bem como as sementes e animais de tração..."

De acordo com o Estatuto da Terra, que e lei do governo, os contratos que estamos aqui exami-nando, estão incluídos nos precos. nando, estão incluídos nos preços de «quinze por cento do valor ca-dastral do imovel", do art. 95, e "dez por cento, quando concorrer apenas cum a terra mua" na participação dos frutes de purceria para proprietario, como consta do art.

Também o artigo 93, determina: "Aol proprietário é vedado exigir do arrendatário ou do parceiro: I do arrendatário ou do parecire: 1 — prestação de serviçe gratuito; II — exclusividade da venda da colheita; III — obrigatoriedade do beneficiamento la produção em seu estabelecimento; IV — obrigatoriedade de aquistção de generos e utilidades na seus armazêns ou barracêes; V — aceitação do nazarante, em "es-aceitação . on seus armazens ou purracoes; "

formas regionais substituiras da

O PLANO DO GOVÊRNO COSTA E SILVA

SIMÃO BONJARDIM

O atual governo, ao elaborar o programa de Diretrizes e Bases de sua gestão, precisou partir dos resultados e consegüências da aplicação do plano de governo ante-rior, o chamado PAEG, O con-fronto deste último com a realidade do país gerou problemas numerosos e diversos, que se refle-tem no "Plano Trienal" ha pouco aprovado pelo Ministério do ma-rechal Costa e Silva.

rechal Costa e Silva. A política de desenvolvimento subordinada ao imperialismo norte-americano, que o goveno Caste-lo Branco procurou aplicar, incluia promessas cujo cumprimento era indispensavel à aquisição, pela ditadura, de uma base social infer-na minimo, particularmente entre setores da birquesia brasileira. Com esse propósito, ia dupla Cam-pos-Bulhões prometei domar a ju-flação, como contrapartida para a política de franco favorecimento dos monopolios estrangeiros, que execution a titulo de combate à lal-ta dos preços. Prometeu também uma inversão maciça de capitais estrangeiros e uma larga abértura to mercado externo, ara a indústadura, de uma base social interostrangeros e uma targar apertura do mercado externo para a indús-tria e a agropecuária, como fontes alternativas de estímulo a ativida-de econômica interna, já que o mercado interno era sacrificado no

altar da política de estabilização.

Aconteceu que nem os preços foram contidos, nem os investidores estrangeiros acorreram as por-tas que o governo escancarou nem as exportações se revelaram lator as exportações se reveraram rator relevante; para a ativação da économia, especialmente da indústria. O novo governo, ao tomar posse, viu-se então diante do descontentamento declarado de amplos setores das classes dominantes. Diante da ameaça de comple-to isolamento, ficou premido pela necessidade de contemporizar e manobrar com os descontentes. Por manobrar com os descontentes, Por outro lado; tendo em vista que sua tarefa, segundo o Jargão militari do marechal 'Costa e Silva, é a de "consolidar a conquista" do terreno ocupado por seu; antecessor, no caminho da institucionalização da caminho ida institucionalização da ditadura militar entreguista e reacionária, ele teve folga bastante
para "retificar suas linhas"; empreender icertos recuios e jopērações
de "guerra psicológica" que ilhe
possibilitem ocupar efetivamente a
área invadida.

O novo plano de governo deixa

transparente essa tentativa de "lar-gar os aneis sem perder os dedos". transparente essa tentativa de l'argar os ancis sem perder os dedos."
Ele não traduz qualquer compromisso que implique; no plano da realidade, em alteração essencial da política de desenvolvimento proimperialista e antioperária do governo anterior. Ele reformula; os fundamentos e propósitos desmoralizados dessa política, mas deixa intata a maquina montada por ela Desde logo, não há sequer refrencia, e muito menos coidenação, aos atos da ditadura tendentes, a entregar o contrôle dos sectores mais rentáveis e estratégicos

tores mais rentáveis e estratégicos da economia nacional aos monopo-lios norte-americanos. O desfibramento da lei de remessa de lucros

em posição privilegiada face aos sem a intenção de cumprir a pro-concorrentes nacionais; e tôda a messa, é claro, uma vez que todo pletora de concessões e privilegios o complicado esquema de cosição outorgados ao capital imperialista sóbre os trabalhadores foi imputaconcorrentes nacionais; e tóda a pletora de concessões e privilégios outorgados ao capital imperialista nos últimos anos ficaram imunes à nos utimos anos ficaram imunes a crítica do plano assinado pela no-va parelha de burros Beltrao-Delfim.

Tal como o PAEG, o plano do

itual governo procura atribuir ao estatismo todos os maies da economia nacional. A ação econômica do estado é apresentada como pá-ra-raios dos ódios e receios dos capitalistas, com a malicia evidente de desviar a atenção das causas-reais do processo de violenta des-capitalização que o golpe de abril desencadeou sobre as empresas na-cionais. O conflito entre a políti-ca de benesses aos monopólios es-trangeiros e os interesses dos capitalistas nacionais é transformado

trangeiros e os interesses dos capitalistas nacionais e transformado
em conflito entre o setor estatal e
o setor privado, nivelando e confundindo neste último a emprésa
imperialista e a emprésa nacional.
Na verdade; a escasez de capital de giro, a pressão dos altos
custos de produção e a redução,
da procura interna, que resultaram
da aplicação da politica ditada peto FMI e colocaram sob ameaça
de falencia numerosas emprésas
nacionais pequenas e médias, ajustam-se perfeitamente aos interesses
dos monopolitos, especialmente o
o norte-americanos. O plano governamental, entretanto, desfigura essa relação del causa e efeito e apresenta a crise financeira em que se
debate o setor privado macional
como comum a todas as emprésas
privadas. Parte dessa inverdade
para atribuir ia crise ao aumento
da tributação, à colocação de littulos públicos no mercado de capitais e a outros meios que o estado utiliza para financiar seus empreendimentos econômicos, quando,
feato, a accão econômica estatal preendimentos económicos, quando, de fato, a ação económica estatal nos setores básicos e pioneiros é o maior apoio que a grande más-sa de emprésas privadas nacionais recebe, para lo seu próprio desen-volvimento. Outro pilar da linha Campos-Bulhões, a politica salarial, tam-bem e mantido pelo plano agora divulgado. O atual governo já en-controu pronto um mecanismo de sufocação das retvindicações salariais, através da repressão ao principal instrumento de luta dos tra-balhadores, o direito de greve, e da sujeição dos ajustes salariais entre patrões e empregados ao ar-bitrio do governo quanto ao pra-zo de congelamento e ao nivel de atualização dos salários. Por esse meio, o primeiro governo da dita-dura procurou assentar mais pro-fundamente na exploração dos tra-balhadores a base da acumulação capitalista indispensavel a seu es-quema de desenvolvimento subor-dinado aos monopólios norte-alme-ricanos. A semelhança do plano atual com o PAEC, contudo, não apaga as diferenças nem elimina a importância destas. A desmoralização das principais justificativas da po-lítica inicial da ditadura — a es-perança nas inversões estrangeiras, a expectativa de aumento exportações e a promessa de do-minio da inflação — obriga os pla-nejadores do atual governo a modificações importantes do es dificações importantes do esquema teórico em que se fundamenta sua política econômica. Seu plano precisou reconhecer que o desenvolvimento do país deve apoiar-se fundamentalmente no capital nacional e no mercado interno. Essa quebra da rigidez da doutrina de desenvolvimento subordinado ao imperialismo deixa abertas brechas para a crítica e as pressões dos setôres interessados em defender o capital nacional e o mercado interno contra a ação dos monopolios estrangeiros.

No terreno prático o plano faz à burguesia "nativa" concessões importantes em duas questões, para ela, vitais: a política de invesra cia, vitais: a politica de inves-timentos estatais è la política de crédito. Chega inclusiva a pregar "a eliminação das possi-veis condições de desigualdade das empresas nacionais no tocante ao acesso às fontes de crédito: além de desautorizar a tese tradicional de FMI, artigo de fé do governo anterior, isegundo a qual a inflação tem como causa um excesso de procura no mercado, para cará tideia mais do agrado dos capitalistas brasileiros, para a qual a causa da pressão altista sobre os preços está nos fatores externos que elevam os custos de produção. empresas nacionais no toca acesso às fontes de crédito tocante produção:

Deve-se assinalar que também ai a diferença é mais de forma que de conteúdo. Tanto no terreno dos investimentos estatais quanto na investimentos estatais quanto, na política de crédito, a política do governo Castelo foi mais feroz no papel do, que na execução e cedeu até com largueza as pressões que recebeu, para transigir, dos setores interessados. A historia resconderá em definitivo as esserponderá, em definitivo, as essas perguntas, mas o próprio governo parece apressado em desiludir quem possa acreditá-lo capaz de avançar muito nessa questão. Poucos dias após a divulgação do plano, o Banco Central mostrou como entende a política de "eliminar desigualdades": balvou uma portaria determinando que as instituições financeiras efetuass com emprésas nacionais, pelo me-nos metade, em valor, de suas operações de créditos. Ora, as emprésas nacionais, que incluem o se-lor privado e o estatal, representam hem mais de dois terços do total das emprésas; deixar portanto com o capital estrangeiro metade dos cre-ditos é um enormo privilente deditos é um enorme privilégio que se concede a êle. Como se isso não bastasse, uma leve "pressão de Wall Street" foi suficiente para que o Banco Central imediatamen-te completasse o ridicula te completasse o ridiculo da medida, modificando a portaria e in-cluindo na metade obrigatória as empresas de propriedade de estrangeiros naturalizados ou residentes no país", o que da margem a todo tipo de manobras e falcatruas

De qualquer modo, a necessidade em que o governo ditatorial se encontrou de atrair e atender a se-tores descontentes da burguesia bres descontentes da burguesia brasileira obrigou-o a renunciar ao monolitismo da política anterior. Uma política que, antes, era con-traditoria com a realidade e os in-teresses do pais, más guardava en si mesma certa coerencia, tornou-se uma politica contraditoria, in-coerente em si mesma, essa mudan ça incorpora ao governo elemen-tos de vacilação e duplicidade, que conde a agravar-se com a evolu-ção da crise social e econômica do pais, e por seu lado concorreção para agravar essa crise.

Outros paises da América Latina, como o Chile. Colômbia.
