



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

On 5/2/61, NY 694-S* advised SA \bot that on 4/28/61, during a conversation with GUS HALL, General Secretary, CPUSA, the informant discussed with HALL an article captioned "Funds Grow, But Not Enough, which appeared in the 4/23/61 edition of "The Worker".

According to HALL, during the week prior to that referred to in the article, a "Reverend from Denver" contributed \$1200 to the fund drive. HALL stated that actual contributions to the CP fund drive during the period mentioned in the article amounted to only about \$30. The money supposedly contributed to the fund drive was furnished by HALL from "Funds From Abroad" For bookkeeping purposes, various CP districts are credited as having furnished this money. According to HALL, he tells CP functionaries to whom this money is made available, but are not familiar with "Funds From Abroad," that the money has been loaned to him on a personal basis by influential friends.

It was mutually agreed during this meeting that Mary Kaufman, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA) attorney, is acceptable both to the CPUSA and to the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C., as the person to act as an intermediary. (It will be recalled that the Soviets have exerted efforts in the past to establish a direct intermediary between the Soviet Embassy and the CPUSA and Kaufman has previously been considered for this as she could be in contact with the Soviet Embassy under the guise of legitimate business.) Barkovsky told the informant that the recent statement of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro that there would be no elections in Cuba should not cause any disappointment to the CPUSA and should not be considered by the CPUSA as a source of embarrassment. He added the (U) Cubans will hold elections eventually after they have strengthened and consolidated their position. (It will be noted that Gus Hall, General Secretary, CPUSA, recently expressed considerable concern over Castro's statements on elections.) Conversation was brought up by Barkovsky during this meeting concerning the recent Cuban invasion. He criticized the United States involvement in this matter as being crude and amateurish. Barkovsky stated that it would not be surprising if the next invasion attempt consisted of the use of United States Marines and United States armaments. He said this would be done in order for the United States to reclaim its position and vindicate its stand. Barkovsky pointed out that the Cubans are now ready for any such attack. Enc. You are instructed to furnish the Bureau a description of the information contained in the documents which were microfilmed and provided to Vladimir Barkovsky by NY 694-S*. Also provide detailed description of how this material is microfilmed and whether this is done by the informant or someone else.

Attention is directed to Chicage airtel to Bureau dated 5-9-61, a copy of which was furnished to your office. This airtel sets out that at the next meeting with Barkovsky, NY 694-S* was to relate that there is an urgent need for funds by the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA). Your airtel of 5-9-61 makes no reference to any inquiry being made concerning funds. You should promptly determine whether this matter was discussed and advise the Bureau.

In connection with the intermediary being established between the CPUSA and the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C., you should clarify whether Mary Kaufman will be the only intermediary. You must assure that you are cognizant of the establishment of any other intermediary. In both instances efforts must be exerted to assure you are aware of the information being supplied to the Soviet Embassy through the intermediary or intermediaries. The Bureau is to be kept currently advised of all developments in this matter.

with CG 5824-S* on 3-25-61, raised the question of establishing an intermediary between the Soviet Embassy, Washington, D. C., and the CPUSA which would provide the Soviet Embassy with information upon which to make an evaluation of the Kennedy administration. Barkovsky then mentioned the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship (designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450) which had functioned satisfactorily in the past. On 4-3-61 Irving Potash, CPUSA National Labor Secretary, related to NY 694-S* that the Soviet Embassy was interested in utilizing Mary Kaufman, CPUSA attorney, as an intermediary under the guise of legitimate business. Abovereferenced New York airtel set out that Barkovsky, in meeting with NY 694-S* on 5-8-61, stated it was mutually agreed that Kaufman is acceptable to both sides to make contact with the Soviet Embassy as necessary.

As a result of re Chicago airtel, NY 694-S* was recontacted concerning the meet with VLADIMIR BARKOVSKY with NY 694-S* on 5/8/61. Informant advised SA THORNTON M. WOOD that he had not been feeling too well when he previously furnished information regarding the meet, and had not meant to overlook these points.

NY 694-S* stated that at the outset of the meeting he, informant, raised the question if he "had anything for us," meaning either messages or money. BARKOVSKY answered that he had not received any amounts, nor were there any messages at the moment. Informant then told BARKOVSKY to try to get whatever money possible because the Party was broke and that they had been borrowing money for many weeks. He also informed BARKOVSKY that since the decision had been made to bring "The Worker" out twice weekly starting 7/4/61, the funds are more urgent now than ever before since bringing "The Worker" out twice weekly alone adds \$30,000 to the yearly budget of "The Worker." NY 694-S* stated no one had told him to advise BARKOVSKY of this and the above was his idea alone. BARKOVSKY assured informant that he would do his best to "push" this matter.

Informant stated the delegation of the CPUSA to attend the Red May Day celebration was next discussed. Informant advised BARKOVSKY that should any messages need to be returned to the United States by this delegation, or if there was anything of a confidential nature to be sent to the United States through the delegation, these should be transmitted through JACK KLING.

Informant also discussed the fact that eight individuals went on this delegation instead of the five previously mentioned by BARKOVSKY to CG 5824-S*. Informant explained to BARKOVSKY that there had been a misunderstanding, since IRVING POTASH understood from conversations at the Russian Embassy, Washington, D. C., that two delegations were expected rather than one, the second to consist of two individuals; therefore, the delegations were combined, with eight going rather than seven. BARKOVSKY indicated to informant that there had been no objection raised over this.

In connection with the individuals having travelled to Moscow with the May Day delegation, the point arose over the individual who would contact WILLIAM Z FOSTER in Russia. NY 694-S* advised that FOSTER's physicians have stated he should only talk to one individual at a time, and, according 10 11 to ARMOLD JOHNSON. FOSTER had suggested that JOHNSON be the individual to confer with him. Informant stated he pointed out to BARKOVSKY that JOHNSON had been considered a member of the left faction of the Party in the United States, and to be on the safe side, for political reasons, and further, so that no one could suggest that FOSTER had passed any secrets Rustill to Johnson, JACK KLING be present at any meeting between FOSTER and JOHNSON.

NY 694-S* next brought up the point of the contact

with the Soviet Embassy at Washington, D. C., and it was mutually agreed that MARY KAUFMAN, New York attorney, is acceptable to both sides to make contact with the Soviet Embassy as necessary. In this connection, BARKOVSKY told informant that he (BARKOVSKY) had no direct contact with the Embassy or Consulate at Washington, D. C., and should he have any message which he wished to transmit to the Embassy, it was necessary to send the message to Moscow, who in turn relayed it to the Embassy.

BARKOVSKY assured informant he would look into the matter of PHEC/FRANKFELD's being refused credit in his World Books operation and according to informant, would notify the Central Committee, CPSU, in Moscow to find out why this had happened after he had been assured of credit by the Soviet Embassy at Washington, D. C.

BARKOVSKY also stated he would have the matter of Dr. EDWARD BARSKY and his proposed visit to Russia in August, 1961, checked into.

Informant stated that JOHN AST had left the previous week end for Europe, with his ultimate travel aim as Moscow.

BARKOVSKY stated he would take up the matter of ABT's "being treated right" while in Moscow.

Informant also advised that C. B. "BEANIE" FALDWIN had arrived in Moscow, May 6, 1961, and BARKOVSKY assured informant that he would make sure that BALDWIN will meet with the proper individual in Russia. BARKOVSKY also inquired as to whether he could meet BALDWIN upon BALDWIN's return to the United States. Informant stated he advised BARKOVSKY he thought this could be arranged.

NY 694-S* told BARKOVSKY that the recent statement of FIDEL CASTRO on 5/1/61 that there would be no elections in Cuba had caused disappointment to the CPUSA and is causing serious embarrassment, since it had caused many questions to be raised for which the Party has no immediate answer, and had created what might be considered a bad public reaction.

BARKOVSKY stated that this should cause no worry, for eventually the Cubans will hold elections after they have strengthened and consolidated their position.

BARKOVSKY advised the informant that President KENNEDY, in connection with the recent Cuban invasion, had showed himself to be amateurish and "childish" in permitting a group of Batistite fascists to determine his political future. BARKOVSKY stated that the Party should never lose sight of the fact that President KENNEDY showed political naivete in his acceptance of the influence of others, and what was surprising was that it was so easy for the President to be taken in in such a crude and amateurish way by this fascist group in this instance. Further, it would not be surprising that in order for the United States to reclaim its position and to vindicate its stand, that the next invasion attempt might well be with U. S. Marines and U. S. armaments. BARKOVSKY stated the Cubans were ready and are now ready for such an attack. BARKOVSKY told the informant that in the United States the peace movement should be strengthened.

After discussing the Cuben situation, BARKOVSKY inquired as to whether ALPHEAS HUNTON was known to the Party and was advised by informant that he had been known to the Party for many years and had cooperated, pointing out that he was one of the originators of the Council on African Affairs.



Upon inquiry as to when the Party's new Negro magazine would appear, BARKOVSKY was advised that it should be out the week of May 15, 1961.

Meeting concluded with arrangement that BARKOVSKY would contact informant re next meeting.



On May 8, 1961, CG 5824-S*, during the course of a conversation, advised that he still had not been able to establish the identity of the individual referred to in referenced Chicago airtel. However, at this time he did make the following comment.

A number of years ago, it was rumored that a brother of _______ who now resides in Chicago, but formerly lived in New York City (Bureau file 100-431316, Chicago file 100-31133) had disappeared to avoid a secret indictment outstanding against him based on his Communist Party (CP) activities. This brother at one time had reportedly been active in the CP. In New York and Detroit. CG 5824-S* felt that if this person had actually disappeared for the purpose of avoiding such an indictment, he may have left the country and might be a logical suspect for the unknown subject viewed at the Bolshoi Theater.

The documents microfilmed and provided to VLADIMIR BARKOVSKY by NY 694-S included the following: Minutes of a CP National Executive Committee meeting of March 9th and 10th, 1961, of CP National Board meetings of April 5th and April 24th, 1961, memoranda from the CP Organizational Department to National Committee members concerning the Algerian and Cuban situations, CP youth problems, a Committee on Reorganization report, proposals to publish "The Worker" twice a week, CP proposals and policies with respect to unemployment in the USI, comment by SUS HALL regarding the "threatened" intervention by the USA in the Cuban situation, circulation of "The Worker," the "Washington Peace Conference" held on April 10th and 11th (7th National Conference on World Disarmament and Developmenty and Sa list of publications issued by peace organizations nationally. Also included in the material given to BARKOVSKY on microfilm were photographs of GUS HALL's son and the latter's friend both of whom may visit Moscow during the coming summer.

The above described material previously had been furnished by the informant to the NYO, has been reviewed, and the pertinent information therein has been furnished to the Bureau.

As is reflected in NYairtels to Bureau, 4/16/60, 8/3/60, and 9/12/60, the Soviets, for security reasons, requested that any CP documentary material to be transmitted to them be placed on microfilm.

To date such material has been placed on microfilm by the NYO photo-laboratory, using two Minox Model S3 (9mm) cameras, a Minox enlarger (9mm), and microfilm, all the personal property of NY 694-S. The informant has been instructed by a photographer of the NYO in the use of the camera and enlarger for microfilming so that he may explain, if asked by BARKOVSKY,

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how he processes this material. The informant has received this instruction in a safe apartment under the control of the NYO. It should be noted that the informant has a dark room in the basement of his home, which provides adequate explanation as to where he presumably microfilms CP documents.

With regard to paragraph 2 of the referenced Bureau letter concerning NY 694-S' discussing the matter of funds with BARKOVSKY, the NYO, by letter 5/18/61, furnished the requested information to the Bureau.

As concerns the intermediary between the CPUSA and the Soviet Embassy in Washington, and the employment of MARY KAUFMAN in that regard, NY 694-S has advised as follows:

MARY KAUFMAN will be an intermediary only in the sense that she will deliver messages from the CPUSA to the Soviet Embassy and replies thereto from the Soviet Embassy to the CPUSA, regarding matters of comparatively minor importance. Such messages will have been given, in the first instance, to either NY 694-S or CG 5824-S for transmission to the Soviet Embassy. As an example of the intembd use of KAUFMAN as an intermediary, NY 694-S mentioned that KAUFMAN could be used to request the Soviet Embassy to ascertain from Moscow whether the Soviets would furnish credit to one of the CP controlled corporations selling Soviet books.

KAUFMAN will not be an intermediary in the sense that she has been delegated by the CPUSA to furnish to the Soviet Embassy information of a high level such as BARKOVSKY and MONITORIO had in mind when they discussed the need of an intermediary to advise the Soviet Embassy. For example, KAUFMAN's function will not be to advise the Soviet Embassy concerning the personnel of the KENNEDY administration.

As far as NY 694-S knows, GUS HALL as yet has not delegated - nor has he as yet found - a person to act as a high level intermediary with the Soviet Embassy. Whither, if and when HALL delegates such a high level intermediary, HALL will advise NY 694-S of such a person's identity, and of the nature of the information which such a person, from time to time, transmits to the Soviet Embassy, is conjectural. If at all possible, NY 694-S will attempt to control this situation.

Editorial - Political Affairs, June 1961

CUBA AND PEACE

In the aftermath of the intervention fiasco in Cuba, the crisis of foreign policy becomes sharper, with wide repercussions on the home political front. It cannot be otherwise, for the defeat of the invasion struck home more directly than previous set-backs to the cold war policy initiated under Truman, carried forward by Eisenhower, and taken over by Kennedy. As we pointed out last month, the victory of the Cuban republic is a striking confirmation of the historic fact that imperialism is on the way out in Latin America as in the rest of the world. The victory hits at the heart of U.S. imperialism, which is now being challenged in its home precincts. Not in Africa or Asia, in the remote kingdom of Laos and elsewhere, where U.S. monopoly has reached out more recently, but in its traditional and principal sphere of Latin America.

The victory of the Cuban people, now stronger to meet new threats, also confirms the historic fact that it is indeed a new stage of the national liberation movement which has opened in the Americas. Speeded on its course by the needs of defense against foreign intervention, and solidly grounded in the workers and peasants, the Cuban revolution embarks on the Socialist path. In its national democratic phase, the revolution carried through the basic land reform, nationalized the foreign monopolies and big Cuban property, replaced the puppet tyrannical state with a true people's government, and accomplished many social reforms. On May First, Fidel Castro celebrated the victory over counter-revolution and imperialist intervention by describing the Cuban revolution as patriotic, democratic and socialist. Joining with him and the July 26th movement, in a unity which remains the hallmark of the revolution, the Cuban Communists (the Popular Socialist Party) called upon all the mass forces of the country to achieve the goal of socialism, which has now become the national aim of Cuba.

By their heroic deeds the Cuban people have won the magnificent honor of being the first country in the Western Hemisphere to take the socialist road. They have shown that it is possible for a small country, long within the special domain of the most powerful world monopoly power, to enter the socialist era. It is the strength of the Cuban revolution in the first place that made possible this pioneering national deed, for without this the global supporting forces could not be brought into play. And without the support of the flowering socialist world and the assorping national liberation revolutions of our time the Cuban revolution could not achieve its great advance.

Thus have we reached the historic turning point where the problem of coexist ence between capitalist and socialist countries arises within the Western Hemisp! refited?. Like it or not, U.S. imperialism has to face closer to home the problem is has been trying to ignore, evade or suppress on other continents. But wherever it occibe, in whatever specific situation, the question is world-wide. For the truth of the matter is that on the beaches of Cuba we were on the brink of war. We have the Cuban people to thank for forcing us back from the brink before the CIA scheme for direct military involvement of U.S. forces could be carried out. The Cuban victory has granted the American people the opportunity to change the course of policy before it becomes too late.

It can now be seen more clearly how the failure of Kennedy to set the Administration on a new course leads to serious dangers to world peace and to new perils for democracy at home. By going through with the interventionist scheme against Cuba, Kennedy provided a dangerous opening to the Right, which the forces of reaction and war were quick to exploit. This threat was spelled out by Nixon in his

two-week barnstorming tour. In open competition with Senator Goldwater for leadership of the Right in general and of the Republican-Dixiecrat coelition in particular, he apoke the language which everyone concerned with the defense of peace and democracy has learned to dread.

Fearful lest the American people might learn some sobering lessons from the fiasco in Cuba, Nixon urged the Administration not to permit the humiliating defeat of the intervention to prevent it from "taking decisive steps in the future." More appression is his motto: "Whenever American prestige is to be committed on a major scale we must be willing to commit enough power to obtain our objective even if our intelligence estimates prove wrong." And he wants aggression "on our own" if Cast action together with others is not immediately forthcoming. To make his point even clearer, Nixon decried any negotiations with the Soviet Union as useless. And finally, illustrating the close link between aggression abroad and attacks upon the people at home, he came out against even the peripheral social welfare measures of the Kennedy Administration on education, housing, medical aid to the aged, and farm relief. These, he said, "chip away at the freedoms"—a fitting and unwitting definition of what is meant by defense of the "free world" against communism.

Thus we learn again that anti-Communism raised to the level of program and policy leads in the direction of fascism. Kennedy himself provided the encouragement to the forces on the extreme Right with his pleas for "national unity" against "the clear and imminent danger of world communism," his call for sacrifice, for self-censorship of the press and the implied threat to other basic liberties. What was set loose by this facing toward the Right should make the people's forces who supported Kennedy-and Kennedy himself-sit up and take notice.

In truth, the forces for democracy and peace among the American people are stirring in a way that is new for the cold war period. It can be seen in the conferences and actions for peace within labor's ranks, raising a serious challenge to the Meany leadership. We see it in the growing movement for peace and democracy among the youth, especially the student youth. From the Negro people comes more sharply expressed support for the colonial freedom struggles in Africa and Cuba. The liberal element within the Democratic Party, as well as many eminent scholars of the universities and leading public figures, are are trudy—not by the non-existent danger of Communism but by the real and pressing danger from the Right and the warmongers.

This mounting response from among the people to the actual danger has had no little effect upon the Administration. On the eve of his departure for the Laro meeting at Oslo, Secretary of State Rusk found it expedient to announce the United States had no intention to intervene directly in Cuba or to contribute further emigre invasions. No doubt, this was also intended to assume the LATO allies who, in addition to other differences, were decidedly cool in lowing the ineptitude of policy shown by the Cuban fiasco.

These developments indicate in broad relief the road toward winning a policy of peaceful coexistence and non-intervention, under present circumstances. More popular action and pressure is required to force a clear differentiation between the forces of peace and those of war, within and outside the Administration and in the major parties. It may prove noteworthy that amidst pending negotiations on Laos and on ending nuclear testing, official steps are reported under way for a Kennedy-Khrushchev meeting. If this takes place, it can prove significant in changing course providing the peace and democratic forces within the country begin to fashion a common approach for united and parallel pressures upon Kennedy for serious negotiations within the framework of peaceful coexistence and non-intervention.

followed BARKOVSKY on to the train and they rode to the neighborhood of 120th Street and Myrtle Avenue. They then walked together to the Hofbrau Restaurant at 117th Street and Myrtle Avenue which they entered and where they had dinner.

BARKOVSKY questioned CG 5824-S* regarding the nature of the emergency which required their meeting at that time. CG 5824-S* replied that the CP, USA was in serious need of funds and that BARKOVSKY should transmit this information immediately to the Soviets. BARKOVSKY said that he had not been given any money to transmit to the CP, USA, but that he would advise Moscow that the CP, USA was requesting more funds.

CG 5824-S* then told BARKOVSKY that another reason for contacting the latter was to furnish him with information concerning the National Executive Committee (NEC) meeting of the CP, USA that had been held in NYC on May 27th and 28th; and concerning the fact that the Party was planning to send to Moscow, in July, another group of CP, USA functionaries. BARKOVSKY listened attentively while CG 5824-S* discussed the above mentioned matters, but was obviously very nervous while CG 5824-S* talked.

BARKOVSKY then asked numerous questions regarding when CG 5824-S* last was in NYC, at what hotel he had stayed, whether he had noticed whether he was under surveillance, etc. BARKOVSKY said that he had been under surveillance after his last meeting with the informant, and wondered whether his meeting with CG 5824-S* was the reason why he had been under surveillance. He indicated that he believed he may have "attracted" a surveillance that originally

had been a surveillance on CG 5824-S*. Throughout the conversation, BARKOVSKY repeatedly returned to the subject of his having been under surveillance.

CG 5824-S* then asked BARKOVSKY to transmit to the Poles, before 6/5/61, a message regarding one "Gus."
Politis", a Greek whom the Poles had agreed to allow to go to Poland. BARKOVSKY declined to accept the message stating that he "did not know any Poles", and furthermore that he could not transmit a message to the Poles on such short notice. CG 5824-S* also offered BARKOVSKY a pamphlet published by "Political Affairs", but the latter refused to accept it.

BARKOVSKY referred to Dr. HARRY EPSTEIN.
WILLIAM Z. FOSTER's personal physician, who, at the invitation of the Soviets, was to have gone to Moscow several days ago to inform FOSTER how ill the latter is.
BARKOVSKY stated that through ALEXANDER TRACHTENBERG, the Soviets had furnished EPSTEIN with funds to pay for the latter's transportation to the Soviet Union. "Somebody", according to BARKOVSKY had countermanded the instructions that EPSTEIN leave for Moscow last week. BARKOVSKY indicated that EPSTEIN would leave for Moscow within a short time, possibly within a few days.

CG 5824-S* then briefed BARKOVSKY concerning BEN DAVIS' hostile attitude toward the CP, USA and the CP, USA's intention to take action against DAVIS.

BARKOVSKY then inquired concerning the CP, USA's opinion of the scheduled conference between KHRUSHCHEV and President KENNEDY. The informant replied that the Party did not anticipate that the meeting would resolve any major problems. Regarding Cuba, BARKOVSKY said that "President Kennedy has gambled and lost". BARKOVSKY said he considered

President KENNEDY's inclination to involve the USA in small wars particularly dangerous. He inquired whether the CP, USA was of the opinion that "President Kennedy has gone so far to the right, that he cannot be reversed". CG 5824-S* replied that the CP, USA's opinion was that the people of the USA could force the President to change his policies.

BARKOVSKY then commented that "although Mc Carthyism is gone, more fascist dangers, such as the Birch Society, now exist."

CG 5824-S* then advised BARKOVSKY that at the recent NEC meeting of the CP, USA, it had been agreed that "The Worker" be published in the near future twice a week. The informant stressed the fact that this was one of the reasons why the Party is in need of money.

CG 5824-S* also reminded BARKOVSKY that despite Soviet commitments to the contrary, "World Books" is not receiving any financial credits or books from Moscow. BARKOVSKY stated that in a few days he might have some information regarding this matter, and he instructed CG 5824-S* to have NY 694-S* meet BARKOVSKY at the Town House Restaurant in Queens at 7:00 P.M. on Monday, June 5, 1961. At this point, BARKOVSKY became very nervous because two young men entered the restaurant. He expressed an opinion that they were watching him and the informant. He cut the conversation short and insisted that he and the informant leave the restaurant immediately. On the way out he said he would go to the subway and he suggested that the informant go in to a movie in the neighborhood. According

to CG 5824-S*, BARKOVSKY was greatly upset and apparently believed that the two men who had entered the restaurant were FBI Agents who were surveilling him and the informant. CG 5824-S* waited a few minutes until BARKOVSKY had left the neighborhood and then informant proceeded back to his hotel in NYC.

For the Bureau's information, there was no surveillance conducted on BARKOVSKY on May 29, 1961.



NY 694-S* has been instructed by Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), to make a special trip to Moscow, Russia. Hall is upset over the fact the Russians have just turned over to the Four Continent Book Corporation (a registered foreign agent of the Soviet Union which is financed and controlled by the Soviets) a contract for publications amounting to \$180,000. Hall had desired that the CPUSA bookstore, World Books, be the exclusive agent in the United States for the sale of Soviet publications.

On 6-2-61 Hall told NY 694-S* to "drop everything" and go to Moscow to remonstrate in Hall's name, with the Soviets, in order to do something for World Books. Hall has been told by NY 694-S* that he would let him know right away when he can depart.

NY 694-S* has been authorized to travel to Chicago to be briefed by CG 5824-S* who made the last Solo mission during the latter part of 1960. Our Chicago Office has been in contact with CG 5824-S* who feels a trip at this time by NY 694-S* could be valuable and is necessary in order that both informants may continue to maintain their high level positions of trust with Hall and continue to be intermediaries between the CPUSA and the Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

Hall desires, and had been given reason to believe, that the CPUSA bookstore would be the exclusive agent in the United States for the sale of Soviet publications. MY 694-S* will be in contact with top functionaries of the CP of the Soviet Union on this trip. He is to depart on or about 6-15-61. The extent of time to be spent in Russia is not known, but due to the nature of the mission, it is not anticipated he will be there more than a few days.

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INFORMATION CONCERNING REASON WHY SOVIETS DID NOT ADVISE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, OF PRESENCE IN UNITED STATES OF A MEMBER OF THE NORTH AND SOUTH AMERICAN SECTION OF THE INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COMMITTEE, COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION, DURING MAY, 1961

During the meeting held on May 29, 1961, in New York, New York, between MORRIS CHILDS and VLADIMIR BARKOVSKY, Soviet United Nations official, a complaint was registered by CHILDS concerning the failure of the Soviets to give notice that ALEKSEI ANDREEVICH GRECHUKIN, the assistant to NIKOLAI VLADIMIROVICH TOSTOVETS, head of the North and South American Section of the International Department of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, would be in the United States during May, 1961, as a member of a delegation of Soviet newspapermen. According to CHILDS, had it been known that GRECHUKIN was to be in the United States, the Communist Party, USA, might have been able to set up social affairs or other activity at which people acquainted with GRECHUKIN may have been present.

In response to the complaint of CHILDS, BARKOVSKY noted that it had not been the purpose of this delegation to be in contact with Communist Party, USA, members. The purpose of this delegation was to find out what other people in the United States might be thinking about, like the conservatives, etc. There had been no intention on the part of this delegation to meet with Communist Party, USA, members and, therefore, there was no need to advise them of this group's visit.

Pursuant to telephonic arrangements made previously with BARKOVSKY, he went to the Town House Restaurant in Queens, NYC, at 5:40 pm, on 6/7/61, and left the said restaurant promptly at 7:00 pm. He observed BARKOVSKY standing on the street, some distance from the restaurant. When BARKOVSKY was certain that NY 694-S* had seen him, he began walking away from the area of the restaurant. NY 694-S* followed him, walking on the other side of the street.

BARKOVSKY walked for some time in the general area, and finally went to the Van Wyck station of the Independent subway. He halted momentarily, allowing NY 594-S* to reach him, and said, "No talking." BARKOVSKY then walked ahead, and finally stopped in an isolated area of the concourse in the Van Wyck station. With a shake of his head, he again indicated there was to be no talking.

NY 694-S* then handed BARKOVSKY a match box containing strips of onionskin paper on which was the message from HALL, mentioned above. BARKOVSKY accepted the match box, nodded, and left the informant immediately.

It will be noted that NY 694-S* and BARKOVSKY, according to previously made arrangements, are to meet in the area of 204th Street and Mosholu Parkway in the Bronx on Saturday, 6/10/61, about 3:00 p.m.

Bureau feels the pattern of activity in this case shows that subject has previously been concerned about security but it does not appear that his concern for surveillance has kept him from meeting our informants. It is believed that it is logical for a Soviet official to be concerned about possible surveillance. It is noted that subject has been wrong concerning our surveillances in the past. He has felt that he has been under surveillance when such has not been the case.

Bureau feels that our coverage of subject should be such that the Soviets cannot possibly detect a significant difference in coverage being afforded him from that afforded other Soviets.

Bureau realizes that events relating to action against the Communist Farty may have an effect on this decision and you should not hesitate to recommend a change in our coverage of subject if you feel developments warrant. this informant was the reason they he had been under surveillance. Subject indicated that he believed he may have "attracted" a surveillance that originally had been a surveillance on the informant. Throughout their convergation, BARKOVSKY repeatedly returned to the subject of his having been under surveillance.

BARKOVSKY and the informant continued their conversation until BARKOVSKY became very nervous because two young men entered the restaurant. BARKOVSKY expressed the opinion that they were watching him and the informant. BARKOVSKY out the conversation short and insisted he and the informant immediately depart separately. According to the informant BARKOVSKY was greatly upset and apparently believed that the two men who had entered the restaurant were FBI Agents who were surveilling him and the informant.

It is noted subject has had meets with highly placed confidential informants on the following dates: 1/2%, 2/3, 12; 3/25; 5/8,25/61.

No fisur coverage was afforded subject on 3/25/61 or 5/29/61.

Regarding the six meets subject has had with highly placed confidential informants since 1/25/61 it should be noted that some of these meets were not scheduled in advance and insufficient time was alloted to discontinue spot fisur coverage of subject ten days prior or subsequent to such meets.

In view of the above, and inasmich as BARKOVSKY terminated his conversation with CQ 5824-5* due to the expressed belief he was under surveillance during the meet on \$/29/61, and appears much more concerned over figure now than in the past, the NYO will conduct no more figure of HARKOVSKY while he meets with CQ 5824-5* and NY 604-5, VACB.
