

DISCUSSION WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COMMITTEE, COMMUNIST PARTY OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA, (CPCZ), CONCERNING THE CZECH DE-STALINIZATION PROGRAM, PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA, 8/63

In early September, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, and who is in a position to know, furnished the following information resulting from discussions among representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCZ, relative to the de-Stalinization program being carried out by the CPCZ.

In reference to the final decision which has been arrived at by the CPCZ concerning the 15 people who were placed on trial in 1952 on charges of high treason, espionage and counterrevolutionary intentions, the representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCZ, advised that the investigation which has just been completed that revised the decisions of the 1952 trials really began in 1954. When the investigation was begun in 1954, Rudolf Barak, former Deputy Premier of Czechoslovakia, who was the Minister of the Interior in 1956, did not really pursue the investigation. It has been learned since then that two viceministers who worked with Barak actually participated in forcing the confessions which were produced during the trials. These former ministers, including Barak, have recently been sentenced to prison terms. This commission, participated in by Barak, actually sabotaged the de-Stalinization of the CPCZ.

The second commission, which was set up to investigate the period of the Stalin era and particularly the 1952 trials, which was set up as a result of the 12th Congress of the CPCZ in December, 1962, was made up of persons who were victims of the purges. This commission was composed of seven members, among whom

were the following, who were victims of the parges: Drahomir Kolder, member of the Presidium of the CDCZ; Jozef Lenart, member of the Presidium of the CPCZ, and FNU Lostivaka, Head of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCZ. Lostivaka was the Head of this investigating commission.

The trouble with the first commission set up to investigate this matter was not that all the members of the commission were dishonest, but was rather because of the fact that some of the people working in the Justice Department and the Ministry of the Interior were involved and the committee was not able to have access to the documents necessary to arrive at the truth in this matter.

This second commission worked for eight months and its. report was issued in August, 1963. This report upon which the Appeals Court acquitted certain people, was actually the commission's second report. The commission's first report was delivered to a plenum of the Central Committee, CPCZ in April, 1963. reports brought out the fact that, in 1949 the Head of the Soviet Secret Police, Lavrenti Beria, sent into Czechoslovakia two men who actually ran the International Department of the CPCZ. Every well known name in Czechoslovakia was involved during the trials, cooperating with these men working for Beria. The commission's reports claimed that these people capitulated completely to Beria and those that worked with him in the Czech Government. Named in the report in this regard were people such as the following: Wlement Gottwald, former President of Czechoslovakia; Viliam Siroky, member of the presidium, CPCZ; Antonin Zapotocky, former President of Czechoslovakia. These men, all cooperated with Beria's men and cooperated with Alexei Cepicka, former Deputy Premier and Minister of Defense, Bruno koehler, former Secretary of the Central Committee, CPCZ, who was then working at the Ministry of Defense Ladislav Kopriva, former Minister of State Security and Karol Bacilek, former First Secretary of the CP of Slovakia. These men were removed from their positions and some were expelled from the Party even as late as this year.

These trials were managed and almost the entire old leadership of the Central Committee, CPCZ, was responsible because they did not resist this pressure from Beria. When the leadership was asked why they did not resist, they asked how could they when the facts came directly from Stalin.

This matter was discussed at the April Plenum of the Central Committee, CPCZ. Nearly every member of the Central Committee, except those who were victims or who were not on the Central Committee at that time, had a sense of guilt and expressed extreme self-criticism. Following this meeting this matter was presented to the membership. The membership was very critical of the leadership but they accepted the report of the leadership and its own self-criticism.

Some of the younger leadership who were not involved had no real sense of feeling on this matter and to them it is something that happened in the long distant past and therefore they did not push the matter very hard as they might have and might even have removed some from the leadership of the Party.

As a result of the commission's report all 15 people who had been placed on trial were absolved juridically. Some were also absolved by the Party but some were not rehabilitated from the viewpoint of the Party such as leading people like Rudolf Slansky, former Secretary General of the CPCZ and Vladimir Clementis, former Czech Foreign Minister. They absolved everyone except those charged with Zionism. Nearly everyone not rehabilitated was one of those of Jewish origin. It was stated that there is still some question as to whether or not the CPCZ is finished with this matter.

Throughout this discussion with the representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCZ, one could detect a note of criticism of the Soviet Union. They were critical of the Russian delay in their de-Stalinization program and they were critical because the CPCZ was pressured by the CP, Soviet Union, to get this program of de-Stalinization done with in the CPCZ. The statement was made that Czechoslovakia has a democratic tradition unlike Russia that guarantees that once the CPCZ eliminates the cult of the personality and the imitators of Stalin, they will be eliminated once and for all and they can never come back. One of

the problems which has arisen in connection with this program is the fact—that some of those who were rehabilitated completely were members of leading organs of the Party. They insist upon reinstate—ment of their leading positions in the Party. They argue that if they have been completely rehabilitated then how can they be kept out of their former high positions. This is currently the biggest fight going on now within the ranks of the CPCZ. Most of those involved in this fight are Slovakians. Some occupied government positions in 1952 in Slovakia.

Apropos of the above they recount a story concerning Antonin Novotny, President of Czechoslovakia. Some months ago Novotny made a trip into Slovakia and while there he met with a number of Party people. Wherever he went this problem of the rehabilitation of the Slovakians was placed before him and he was asked what he was doing about de-Stalinization of the CPCZ. He was asked what he had done to follow the orders of the 12th Congress of the CPCZ in December, 1962 which was supposed to have been accomplished within four months. At first Novotny got quite angry and began to fight back but the Slovaks were adamant and told him to get the job done. On one occasion he picked up and left and went back to Prague, but he later returned a meeker man and began to talk with the Slovaks in a more comradely way.

Throughout these conversations it was quite apparent that finally the breadth of initiative and a greater amount of democracy within the limits of a communist state have reached Czechoslovakia.

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DOCTOR INADORE ZIFECTEIN, LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

During discussions hold in mid-August, 1953, Aleksoi Androevich Crechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the Horth and Couth American Section of the International Department of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Seviet Union (CPCI), advised as follows:

In line with the request of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), Dr. Igadore Ciferatein had been invited to come to the Coviet Union and given an opportunity to work for a period of time in a psychiatric clinic in the USEA. This request, contrary to the Coviet Union's standing Policy of not accepting foreigners for work in such psychiatric clinics, was homored because it had originated with Cus Hall, General Secretary of the CP, USA, and reflected that individual's wishes. Ziferatein was allowed three full menths of work and is the only foreigner over allowed to do this. Now they are "sick and tired" of Ziferatein and his "gangster methods" of pressure and would like to get him back to the United States. The Seviets feel that Ziferstein has gained much knowledge during his stay and should not complain if they ask him to return to the United States.

Since Cuba is now considered by the CPSU as a socialist state, it is no longer included among the Latin-American countries for which the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, has responsibility. The Cuban Communist Party (CP) formerly had the responsibility for assisting and handling the relations with the CPPR and it has now become necessary to reassign the responsibility for the CPPR to the CP, USA. In this regard, the CPSU desires to have the CP, USA, arrange for several representatives of the CPPR to visit the Soviet Union in the near future.



In August, 1963, V. Korianov, the Chiof Deputy to the Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), made the follow-ing comments to a most pensitive source of this Bureau concerning Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

When Castro made his recent visit to the Soviet Union in May, 1963, much of his time was spent in personal conversation with Covict Presier Nikita S. Khrushchov. discussions were utilized by Khrushchov to convince Castro that if he wanted to see Cuba used as an example for other Latin-American countries he must build a solid economy so that the glory of the Cuban revolution will not wear off. It was vory helpful to have had in the Soviet Union at the time such Communist Party (CP) leaders as Luiz Carlos Prestes of Brazil. Victorio Codovilla of Argentina and Rodney Arismondi of Uruguay, all of whom conferred with Castro.

While Castro is not yet completely under the Soviets' influence, he no longer talks the Chinese communist line. The displeasure of the Chinese has been evidenced by the fact that they have not mentioned Castro by name since his visit to the Soviet Union.

The CPSU was pleased with Castro's speech on the anniversary of the 26th of July Hovement when he said that every country cannot have nor is it prepared to carry out armed revolt as had occurred in Cuba. . This is an indication

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

that Castro is no longer as haive as he was a few conths ago when he was urging Latin Americans to take their guns and go to the mountains.

The Coviets would like to see Party representatives from Latin America and the United States who held the correct Larkist-Leninist theoretical line visit Castro in an effort to act as a steadying influence on his Latin-American temperament. This is important in order to keep Castro from falling under the influence of people like Erresto "Cho" Guevara, Cuban Linister of Industries. The Coviets feel that they cannot percently tell Castro that or what not to do and would like representatives from other fraternal Parties to exert the necessary influence on Castro.


Guevara, while a member of the CP in Argentina, was among those the strongly advocated armed uprisings everywhere. Then his views became known, Guevara was talked to by the Argentine CP leaders, who told him that such views were anarchistic. As a result, Guevara told the leaders that if that was their feeling on the matter, he would go into voluntary exile. It is for this reason that the Coviets do not want Castro to come under the influence of Guevara.

During August, 1963, representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, made the following comments to most sensitive sources of this Bureau concerning incidents on the border between the Soviet Union and Communist China.

During the past several years there have been numerous border incidents of one type or another. The most serious of these incidents occurred on the border between the Soviet Union and one of the provinces of China which is heavily populated by Chinese Koslens. On that occasion 60,000 Chinese pensants came across the border into the Soviet Union. These peasants were starving and came across the border in an effort to obtain food. When this occurred, the Chinese Government demanded that the Soviet Union drive these pensants back into China and even went so far as to urge the Soviets to use machine guns for this purpose. Soviets refused to take such drastic action and informed the Chinese that if they wanted these peasants back in China they would have to come to the Soviet Union and take them back themselves.

The main concern of the Soviets arises from their fear that in the future substantially larger numbers of Chinese could cross the border into the Soviet Union. Soviets mentioned the possibility that as many as:6,000,000

In August, 1963, Dr. Karel Duda, Ambassadordesignate to the United States from Czechoslovakia, made the following comments to a most sonsitive source of this Euroau concorning Czechoslovak interests in the United States.

The Czechoslovakian Government desires to win the good will of Czech citizens in the United States, as well as those of Czech or Slovak origin who reside in the United States. As a result, the Czech Government is going to increase its drive in the United States for tourism to Czechoslovakia. In this regard, the Czech Government will increase its assistance to travel agencies in the United States and may establish some travel agency of its own in the United States.

The main emphasis of Czech interest in the United States in the future will be how to utilize some particular group for improvement in relations, as well as to obtain some political easement of relations. One of the vehicles by which relations between the United States and Czechoslovakia may be improved, in the judgment of Duda and the Czech Government, would be an exchange of labor delegations. Trade unions in Czechoslovakia are not working well and are not recoiving the leadership which they received at one time. 

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Soviet Accuses Albania-of Naval Theft Attempt

VIENNA, Sept. 2—The Moscow radio accused Albania, over the weekend of having tried to seize "military property" during the 1961 evacuation of the Soviet naval base at Valona. The broadcast, as monitored by Radio Free Europe, said Albania had broken her last ties with the Warsaw Pact, the Soviet-bloc military alliance. The broadcast, in Albanian, was beamed to Albania.

It said the attempt to seize the military property had been thwarted by Soviet personnel at Valona. The property was

at valona. The property was not identified.

There were unconfirmed reports at the time that the Albanians had forcibly prevented several submarines from leaving the navel here Lest July the Albanian Defense Ministry newspaper Bashkimi implied that the Albanian Navy had at least three submarines but said nothing about their origin.
The Soviet Union was reported in 1961 to have withdrawn eight submarines and a and a tender from Va.ona. banian Defense Minister, Lieut. Gen. Begir Balluku, recently termed this "a chauvinistic and anti-Marxist act."

The weekend broadcast from Moscow said that "the Albanian leaders made rabid, openly hostile efforts to seize part of the Soviet military property at this base at the time of the evacuation of the Soviet sailors from Valona."

"Only the great determina-tion, and cool-headedness of the Soviet sailors and their lovalty

to-proliferian internationalism thwarted this lowly provocation," it added.

The broadcast rejected General Balluku's contention that the Valona evacuation was intended to disarm Albania. It countercharged that the Albanians had carried on "rabid anti-Soviet propaganda" among the Soviet naval personnel and had organized "provocations."

"Under these conditions," the broadcast said, "the Soviet Government was forced to recall

its military personnel."
In 1961 dissension between the Soviet Union and Albania flared into open denunciations

The Soviet broadcast, in its reference to the Warsaw Pact, in which Albania still claims full membership, said the Albanians had long tried to saboltage the organization's work. 



In addition, JANES JACKEON, a member of the National Court, CPUJA, has prepared an article thick in to appear in the forthcoming issue of the "Norld Karxist Review". This article will deal with the Regro question.

Since both articles are appearing in theoretical publications of the communict movement, they will become "the georgel" for the international movement as they relate to the CPUSA's position in the matters discussed.

DISCUSSIONS WITH HERRY WINSTON, VICE CHAIRMAN, CONTUNIST PARTY (CP), USA, 199007, USB, 0/03

During August, 1963, a representative of the CPUJA was in Lincow, UDSA, and while there not with and had several long discussions with HENRY WINDFOH, Vice Chairman, CPUJA, who is temporarily residing in Lincow, UDSA. During the course of these long discussions, WINDFOH engaged in a rambling dissertation concerning his own personal situation, plans and activities, the essence of which is not forth below:

WHETCH stated that he has now been away from the United States for one year and nine ments. The reasons for his trip to the USER were to obtain treatment for his health and to concact the dight against the Me Carran Act on an interpational basis. He noted that he has traveled a lot and has visited many countries in the course of his official duties. He ntated he wished this information to be brought to the attention of the leadership of the CPUDA in order to allay any thoughts that may have arisen in the United States that he has just been taking a vacation all this time in the UNIR.

Insofar as his health in concerned, VINTON stated that in the main the treatment has been completed and he wished to convey all his gratitude to the CFOU and the CFOUA. According to his doctors in the USSA there has been a stabilization of his illness and there is no danger on the basis of recent examinations of a recurrence of his tumor. Thile he has no eyesight, his general health has been improved and his life has been payed. He is totally blind in his left eye and can only recognize light from tark in his right eye. The series of twolve injections has been completed but he may receive more. The doctors are now ready to suggest the kind of treatment he should continue upon his return to the United States.

WINCICH observed that he had attended the 22nd Congress of the CPOU, had been to the German Decoractic Republic twice, had attended Congresses of the CPO in Rungary, Cascheolovakia and Eulgaria and had traveled extensively throughout the CDON. He stated that it would have been well had he been able to make a trip proviously planned to Africa, but which was subsequently abandoned. No believed that he might be able to counter the influence of Chinese racism in the emerging nations of Africa. He believes that a figure from the United States would be able to do that job better than anyone class. In his opinion, this trip, had it been made, would have been a real contribution by the CPCDA in the fight against Chinese species. Windfell presented for consideration by the CPCDA the following possibility: Perhaps he could make that trip on his way home to the United States and if so, he would make it for the same reason. Also, the CPCDA should consider the feasibility of him

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
visiting Cuba on his way back to the United States. WINGTON feels this might be very important and could cement unity between Cuban communists and American communists and also might counter Chinese demands, especially if a United States Regro visits there. Since the United States Government hight pick up his passport when he returns to the Saited States, WINGTON feels the CPENA should compact the possibility of this visit to Cuba prior to his return.

WINDTON then noted that while he did not know what the CPUDA's estimate might be, it was his own estimation that his interpational role as a representative of the CPUDA has been quite successful. Therefore he has gone, at all the Congresses which he attended, he has raised the question of the its Carran Act and mobilized support in behalf of the CPUDA and against the its Carran Act.

DINITION next turned to a discussion of the project in which he was supposed to have engaged, that is, in the writing of his sutoble provers. He stated that he had not begun writing it as yet but intended to commone on September 3. It was his observation that this book night prove to be of some value, especially as a component part of the history of the CPUBA. He noted that this project would take at locat three months if not a year to complete. He wondered whether the Seviet Union might not be the best place to perform this task. Cortain facts favor writing this book in the USSN, such as the availability of research materials, the fact that libraries are hardy and that he would have sufficient help made available to him. Other things he might pick up faster in the Enited States. The reason he has hesitated until now is the question of whether to return to the United States. He noted that if the CPUBA National Doard will set a time limit and say nore exactly then he is to return to the United States then his own cutlock would be clearer also.

VINCTUM stated that his propert now has one year and three months left to run. He does not know of any international moetings in the incident future but observed that there may be an international conference of Communist Parties in about six months brought about as a result of the Dine-Coviet dispute. After some discussion, the CPUJA repredentative advised VINCTON that he would suggest to the National Courd, CPUJA, that VINCTON remain in the Soviet Union for at least another six months. VINCTON agreed that this is the correct approach.

COMMENTS REGARDING DR. VALESTINE GREGORY DURTAN

During discussions hold in mid-August, 1963, in Loncow, UDDR, with HEMRY WINDTON, Vice Chairman, Communist Party, UBA (CPUBA), temporarily residing in the Soviet Union, and with JOHN WILLIAMDON, member of the CP of Great Dritain and a former national functionary of the CPUBA, both mentioned they were acquainted with Dr. DUNTAN and know of his recent visit to the Soviet Union. Doth stated that in their opinion NALL should not trust this individual. WINDTON further noted that he, himself, would not trust DUNTAN to go across the street and that the Soviets held the same opinion concerning him.

When the above was related to GUS MALL, General Sceretary, CPUDA, on 8/29/63, his remarks were as follows: "Look what this guy has done for us. I admit there are sens feelings against him, but INVING POTAGH trusts him implicitly. Haybe we get nothing to gain but we have less to less in using him. If the Soviets don't have confidence in him, then let them be more specific and concrete. Until such time, we will continue to use him.

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DISCUSSIONS WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF COMMUNIST PARTY, COVIET UNION, REGARDING REQUEST OF COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, FOR PRINTING EQUIPMENT, ACCEST, 1003

It will be recalled that when Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party (CP), UBA, initially suggested that sendence proceed to the UBER for discussions relative to Party matters with representatives of the CP, Seviet Union, one item that should be brought up if time was available was that he, Hall, had heard that the Czechs and East Germine are now putting out some "wonderful" printing equipment. Hall indicated that it would be desirable to see if some arrangements might be worked out in order for the CP, UBA, to get some of this printing equipment cheaply.

In mid-August, 1933, this matter tas taken up in a discussion with Edrig II. Ponumarely, a rember of the Secretariat, and Read of the International Department, Contral Committee, CP, Esviet Union. Penemical's responde regarding the printing equipment was that he did not bee why the CP, USA, would tant to buy such printing machines from East Corrany or Cacchoslovakia since they rade better orea in the United States. He then commented with a pulle, "That is, unless you gant then as a donation." Possessor then noted that before any specific inquiry could be made by them in regard to the CP, USA, interest in the printing equipment, it would be necessary to know the specific type of equipment required and related details. The CD, USA, representative participating in the discussion has unable to supply the dotails needed. As a result, it was agreed that some time in the future the opecific needs of the CP, USA, in this regard and concrete details concerning the type of equipment needed would be supplied and at this point, the CD, Soviet Union, would look into the matter for the American Party.

INFORMATION CONCERNING GIFT OF PURECIED ETAILLION BY COMMUNICT PARTY, COVIET UNION, TO GUS MALL, GENERAL SECRETARY, COMMUNICT PARTY, USA

During discussion with representatives of the North and Couth American Section of the International Department, Control Committee, Communist Party (CP), Soviet Union, held in Moscow, USSR, during mid-August, 1933, they advised that the request of Gas Hall, General Secretary, CP, USA, for the gift of a puroprod Russian stallion had been granted. They adviced that this stallion, worth many thousands of dollars, would be available for chipment to the United States at any time Cup Hall desired; however. it would be up to Hall to designate someone, preferably to rake arrangeronts with the United States Government for the admission of this stallion. They requested that all arrangements regarding the importing of this purebred stallion to the United States be made openly and legally. They, the Soviets, would, however, draw up all necessary papers in the Soviet Union reflecting alloged payment for the animal and other natters which were necessary for it to pass through customs.

The fact that the CP, Soviet Union, had approved Hall's request for the above noted stallion was made known to Gus Hall on August 29, 1633. Hall at this time noted he appreciated the CP, Soviet Union, offer and would in the very near future contact his to whother their offer should now be accepted. In they have do not accept the stallion, after consultation with who is also a horse raiser, they will begin to make all necessary arrangements to bring the horse to the United States. Hall concurred with the recombindation of the CP, Soviet Union, that all arrangements regarding the importation of this animal be made open and aboveboard.

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Hall was not easor to accept the stallion; however, he stated he might be willing in the future to take a trip to the USSA to look at the stallion for purposes of determining whether it was the type they needed and if it would be worthwhile to bring back. If he does decide to travel to the USSA and look at this stallion, will comply with every aspect of the law and make his entire trip and other arrangements fully in the open.

CRITICISM OF DOOK PUBLISHED IN USER ENTITLED "THE SERVANTS OF THE LOCOPOLIES", AUTHORED BY PHU GEYEVSKY

During February, 1963, there was transmitted to the USSR a document propared by GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party (CP), USA and GEORGE MORRIS, a member of the editorial staff of "The Worker", a publication of the CPUSA. This document was a severe criticism of a book entitled "The Bervants of the Konopolies", authored by a Soviet named FNU GEYEVSKY and previously published in the USSR, in which HALL and MORRIS contended that the book gives a false impression of the trade union movement in the United States by calling the trade unions servants of capitalism.

While in Moscow, USSR, during August, 1863, a representative of the CPUSA brought this matter up with VITALY KORIANOV, Deputy to the Head of the International Department, Central Committee, CP, Soviet Union (CPSU), and ALEKSEI GRECHUKHIN, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, CPSU. These individuals advised they would make inquiries and subsequently advised as follows:

The CPSU agrees with the criticism of this book as stated by the CPUSA and the general criticism by the CPUSA of that type outlook in other books. A chief aim of the CPSU in the future will be to influence their social scientists, writers and journalists to pay more attention to the CPUJA's attitude on American social problems, particularly in regard to trade unions. In order to reach their social scientists for this purpose the CPSU will have some of their writers publish articles calling attention to social problems in the United States, particularly in trade unions. These articles will point out that it is wrong to call all labor leaders servants of the U.S. monopolists, that the working class of the U.S. is not the servile servent of the capitalist class and that the American working class will find its own way to socialism. These articles will be published in magazines such as "The Norld Economic Situation and International Relations", "Kommunist", the official organ of the Central Committee, CP3U, and other magazines on questions of history. It is understood that one such article has already been prepared by IGOR HIKHAILOV, member of the International Department, Contral Committee, CPSU, who specializes in U.S. trade unions.

As far as GEYEVSKY is concerned, the CPSU will condemn his book but will try to do so without giving him any prominence. This they will do by merely quoting a sentence or two and condemning the

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statements quoted, to show that he is wrong and that he had read some "ancient history" on the U.A. trade union sevement and does not know the real situation now. This will be the CPSU's way to show their people that CEYEVERY is wrong and still not give him any prominence. The reason the CPSU does not want to give this any prominence is because the Chinese might pick this up and print GEYEVERY's book as the CPSU outlook. Cosices, it is too negative to just attack him without some constructive approach to influence future gritings.

Union (CPCU), and V. Korianov, Ponomarev's Chief Deputy, recently furnished the following comments to most sensitive sources of this Eureau concerning Henry Winston, National

Vice-Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA).

The CPSU regards Winston as the greatest living example of United States imperialistic brutality. It feels that because Vinston is a Negro he can speak out effectively against the racial line of the Communist Party of China (CPC). In this regard, the CPSU had planned to send Winston to North Vietnam to exert some positive influence on the North Vietnamese in an effort to change their ideological position in support of the CPC. However, the CPSU has determined that in traveling botween the Soviet Union and North Vietnam it would be necessary for Winston to make a stop in China. The CPSU is concerned over the possibility that the CPC might exert some influence on Winston which could cause him to support the CPC's position. Because of this, the CPSU has not taken any further steps to formalize its plans to send Winston to North Vietnam.
